



#### A MESSAGE FROM CHIEF MOORE



On behalf of the 921 dedicated men and women of the Rochester Police

Department, I am pleased to present our Annual Report for 2008. This report has been prepared to provide an overview of

Department activity for the past year. The report will not be able to articulate all of the hard work done each day and night by the men and women of the Rochester Police Department, however, it will highlight a few programs of interest. I would like to thank Mayor Robert J. Duffy, City Council, and the community for the support and cooperation provided to the Police Department throughout the year

During 2008, the Rochester community experienced decreases in many crime categories. Realizing that more work needs to be done, the Rochester Police Department implemented several crime initiatives to address the areas needing improvement. Building upon the philosophy of "Zero Tolerance" policing, the Department increased the size of its Special Operations Division to over 100 uniformed

police officers.

The additional officers of the Special Operations Division focused on proactive crime fighting efforts in areas of the city identified by intelligence gathering and the use of our Monroe Crime Analysis Center. The Monroe Crime Analysis Center allows the command staff to analyze criminal activity data in real time. Once the criminal activity data is analyzed, departmental command can deploy personnel to address potential areas of violence. The ability of the Police Department to analyze criminal data in real time gives law enforcement the advantage over the criminal element.

Additional ways to fight crime were made available by way of technological advances to assist law enforcement with suppressing crime in 2008. The Rochester Police Department installed 50 cameras in many of our neighborhoods in an effort to assist police officers in reducing criminal activity. Technology, via the implementation of the cameras, has assisted police officers by having an extra set of eyes and ears on our streets to ensure our citizens' safety.

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With the implementation of our recent crime initiatives, along with the advent of technology and the use of the Monroe Crime Analysis Center, we have seen tremendous results. In the year 2009, we plan to broaden our crime fighting efforts, building upon the successes realized in 2008

The following document will highlight some of the accomplishments in 2008. I would like to thank every sworn and non-sworn member of the Rochester Police Department for doing an excellent job in 2008. The job that you perform daily is essential in ensuring the Department continues to carry out its mission.

Finally, I would like to thank the citizens of Rochester for providing support and enthusiasm to their Police Department. Community support is crucial; with it we will continue to provide protection and safety for all. Neighborhood groups, community associations, and citizen involvement with programs such as PAC-TAC, remain a vital aspect of ensuring the Rochester Police Department's mission to reducing criminal activity.

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The Office of the Chief of Police consists of the Chief of Police, the Chief's personal staff, and the Public Information Officer. The Chief's Office is responsible for managing the Department and police-community relation matters. Additionally, the Chief's Office is responsible to liaison with the City of Rochester's Bureau of Human Resource Management, Labor Relations, and the labor unions representing Department employees for all labor matters. The Chief's Office also supervises the Professional Standards Section, Research and Evaluation Section, Special Events, and includes the following components: Operations Bureau and Administration Bureau.

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The Professional Standards Section is responsible for investigations of complaints of police actions, police misconduct, civil claims investigations for the Corporation Counsel, the administrative review of all fleet vehicle accident investigations, and other investigations as directed by the Chief of Police. This Section's Long-Term Disability Unit also monitors disabled personnel as assigned, due to injuries or illnesses that prevent regular performance of duties.

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The Research and Evaluation Section

develops

Department policies and procedures, prepares and revises Administrative and General Orders, represents the Department in matters with outside agencies, and is responsible for data management. It also directs the activities of the Information Systems Unit. Duties include coordination with the Monroe County Office of Emergency Preparedness, policy development for handling emergencies with Department units and external agencies, as well as oversight of Department accreditation processes. This section procures and administers all grant funding, oversees special projects and experimental

supplements the

Department's training programs with the use of video presentations and is responsible for the inventory and maintenance of all audio/video equipment utilized by members of the Department. The Media Coordinator is reponsible for maintaining the Video Library System, a system that catalogs all of the Department's video programs as well as those available through the Municipal Police Training Council. This system affords all personnel access to the various video programs. The Coordinator also maintains the video training distribution record keeping system for all issued video programs. This system documents the individual viewing of all video production programs.

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The Media Coordinator assists the e-learning trainer by placing requested lesson plans into digital format for on-line distribution via the Department's intranet. The Coordinator also serves as the Department's representative and network administrator for the county-wide Emergency Training and Information Network (E.T.I.N.).



The Police Artist is responsible for both graphic and forensic duties for the Department. Graphic design projects include creating and executing promotional and printed materials, designing the annual report and other multimedia projects for the Department.

Forensic requests include composite sketches from witness descriptions, postmortem sketches, digitally enhanced photo-line-ups, and forensic video analysis. Working with the Monroe County Medical Examiner's Office, the Artist completes postmortem facial reconstructions from skeletal remains, aiding the identification of individuals.

As the only known full-time Police Artist in the region, the Police Artist's services are frequently requested by surrounding police agencies.

for assisting with maintaining, monitoring and developing new programs as needed. This includes recruitment and placement of civilians at unpaid positions within Department sections and in the

Community Volunteer Response Team (CVRT) members canvass the neighborhood where a homicide took place to see if residents are experiencing stress. After being disbanded in 2007, CVRT was reinstated in Feb. 2008. Police and Citizens Together Against Crime (PAC-TAC) volunteers patrol streets to prevent crime. Administrative volunteers assist the department with a variety of clerical needs. Friendly Visitors to Animals volunteers help make the stay for dogs and cats at the Animal Shelter more comfortable. This is the third year for the RAS Explorer Program.

Accreditation ensures that law enforcement agencies provide progressive, customer-focused services and meet the highest professional standards.

The Rochester Police Department received national

recognition upon accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA) in 1987 and the New York State Bureau of Municipal Police in 1990. Under both programs, these accrediting agencies rigorously review Department practices for compliance with recognized and accepted law enforcement standards.

Accreditation is granted for three years by CALEA and for five years by New York State. During these periods, the agency must comply with all applicable standards. A report is submitted annually to each accrediting body, attesting to continued compliance. At the end of each accreditation period, the agency undergoes a thorough on-site assessment to verify compliance for its re-accreditation.

As a leading law enforcement agency, members of the Rochester Police Department are proud of the high quality of service for which they have been recognized, and continue to pursue excellence in law

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Special Events Section





Rochester, NY 14605] The Patrol Division East is commanded by Temporary Commander Mark Case. Comprised of Patrol Service Areas 23-32, it is bounded to the north by Lake Ontario and the City's municipal boundary with the Town of Irondequoit, Penfield and Brighton to the east, the Town of Brighton to the south and the midpoint of the Genesee River to the east, to exclude the Inner Loop and the geographical confines within the Inner Loop. It follows the midpoint of the Genesee River north to Lake Ontario, and the midpoint south to its intersection with the north embankment of the Erie Canal. It then continues west along the Erie Canal to the midpoint intersection beneath Scottsville Road at the City's municipal borderline with the Town of Chili. It then continues south along the City's municipal boundary, to include the area of Genesee Valley Park on each side of the river. The park boundary ends on the north embankment of the Erie Canal, west from the canal's midpoint intersection with the Genesee River.

The Patrol Division West is commanded by Temporary Commander Thomas D'Angelo. It is comprised of PSA's 43-54, is bounded to the north by Lake Ontario, the City's municipal boundary with the Town's of Greece and Gates to the West, the Town of Chili to the south and the midpoint of the Genesee River to the east, to include the Inner Loop and the geographical confines within the Inner Loop. It follows the midpoint of the Genesee River north to Lake Ontario, and the midpoint south to a point at its intersection with the north embankment of the Erie Canal. It then continues west along the Erie Canal to the midpoint intersection beneath Scottsville Road at the City's municipal borderline with the Town of Chili. It then continues north on Scottsville Road to a midpoint intersection with Kingsboro Road. It continues west along the City's municipal boundary, which corresponds to the north embankment of the Erie Canal, and continues northwest along the canal embankment to midpoint at the intersection of the canal, Brooks Avenue, and the City's municipal boundary with the Town of Gates. It continues north along the east embankment of the Erie Canal, which follows the City's municipal boundary with the Towns of Gates and Greece. The K-9 Unit, commanded by Sergeant Greg Kelly, provides K-9 services for building, narcotics, nitrate and explosives searches, as well as assists with dignitary support. All K-9 dogs are German Shephards and they undergo intensive training in compliance with New York State requirements. All the K-9 dogs are patrol tracking dogs, with some cross-trained for nitrate searches or narcotics searches.

The Traffic Enforcement Unit (TEU) is a highly trained, specialized group of officers whose main function is the reduction of traffic related accidents, fatalities, and injuries. TEU officers are trained in radar operations, DWI enforcement, taxi inspection, weigh scale operation, vehicle and traffic law, and motorcycle operation. TEU performs enforcement, traffic direction, traffic-related in-service training to the Department, dignitary escorts, Honor Guard, special events, and neighborhood speed watch programs.

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Mounted Unit - Special Operations Division

The Mounted Unit provides specialized mounted horse patrol capabilities to augment regular patrol.

Mounted capability offers high visibility patrol for special details and is also an important part of special events, offering crowd control and a uniformed presence. Mounted units can be seen patrolling in neighborhoods and downtown, at parades, and at special events such as the 4th of July fireworks, Music Fest, Blue Cross Arena functions, and the Lilac and Corn Hill festivals. Mounted also performs Honor Guard functions and offers tours of their Verona St. facility.

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Youth Services Unit - Special Operations Division

The Youth Services Unit coordinates youth related programs. Its focus is the prevention of youth-related crimes and the reduction of youth violence. It coordinates the Department's educational and crime prevention programs for at-risk youth. Intervention services include the Truancy and Curfew programs and the School Resource Officer program.

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Bomb Squad - Special Operations Division

The Bomb Squad, commanded by Lieutenant Michael VanRoo, responds to incidents involving explosives, bombs, explosive chemicals, military ordnance, fireworks, and conducts post blast investigations.

All members have been trained to respond to any chemical, nuclear, or biological terrorist threat.

The Bomb Squad is one of the only RPD part-time squads directly involved in case investigations, arrests, and expert testimony.

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Emergency Task Force - Special Operations Division

The Emergency Task Force, commanded by Captain Todd Baxter, is a volunteer group of select officers specially trained to deal with unique situations, high-risk suspects, high-risk warrant service, protection of dignitaries, and other special assignments. Assignments may include incidents with hostages or barricaded suspects.

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Mobile Field Force - Special Operations Division

The Mobile Field Force is a specially trained group of personnel assigned to provide rapid, organized, and disciplined response to civil disorder, crowd control, or other tactical situations.

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Scuba Squad - Special Operations Division

The SCUBA Squad, supervised by Sergeant Michael Giaconia, is a volunteer team specially trained and equipped to handle underwater assignments such as emergency rescues in cold water, near-drowning victims, surface rescues, water recovery of bodies, criminal evidence or other property recoveries.

Other duties include safety standby operations at special community water events.

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Crisis Negotiation Team - Special Operations Division

The Crisis Negotiation Team, commanded by Sergeant Norma Marchetti-Smith, responds to incidents involving hostage taking and barricaded suspects. Negotiators establish a dialogue with the hostage taker with the goal being the release of hostages and the capture of the hostage taker. Negotiators also work with suicidal persons and in various crisis intervention matters.

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CrimeStoppers is a community action program for the apprehension of suspects, utilizing the cooperation of the community and the media. With the assistance of the media, monetary rewards are offered to anyone who may confidentially or anonymously supply information leading to the arrest and indictment of perpetrators.



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City Security Division, overseen by Vincent McIntyre, assists the Rochester Police Department in their public safety efforts by providing mobile services thoughout the City.

The Division consists of 28 full and part-time New York State Licensed Security Guards assigned to patrol areas to ensure safety of persons and property. The Division is responsible for observing, detecting, and reporting incidents encountered during routine post assignments. Security Guards respond to alarms monitored by the Division, check all City-owned property, including vacant properties, lots, and warehouses, and ensure properties remain secure and free of trespassers or hazards. The Division also enforces vehicle safety regulations, keeps order at public events, performs special assignments designated by managment, and are a visual deterrent to potential criminal activity.

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The Major Crimes Unit,

under the command of

Lieutenant Michael Wood, is responsible for the investigation of all homicides, incidents of suspicious or unexplained deaths, undetermined or incendiary fires, missing persons cases and bank robberies. Major Crimes Unit also conducts investigations of intra-familial child abuse (physical or sexual) in which the suspect is 16 years of age or older. Department personnel work in conjunction with other area law enforcement agencies and the Monroe County Department of Social Services. This Unit is also responsible for determining dispositions of open child abuse or child neglect investigations, assisting patrol sections (or other agencies as directed by the Commanding Officer of the CIS) in the investigation of any crime involving a child victim or any complaint of child abuse or neglect.

Major Crimes will investigate any crime or series of crimes as directed by the Commanding Officer of the Central Investigations Section or the Commanding Officer of the Investigations Division.

The Administrative Unit is responsible for providing the day-to-day administrative supply support services necessary for the effective and successful narcotics and firearms suppression operations for SIS. This Unit is also responsible for case/investigation coordination, asset forfeiture, and maintenance of the confidential informant files, expense system, training, and the fleet vehicles.

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The Narcotics Unit, which includes the East Side Narcotics Team (ESNT) and West Side Narcotics Team (WSNT), is responsible for primary enforcement efforts at drug houses and open air markets. These enforcement teams address locations identified as having potential for violence, and therefore have an immediate impact on public safety and quality of life. Investigations by these teams have resulted in numerous search warrant/drug house arrests and dealer arrests.

The Intelligence Unit is responsible for the suppression of organized crime activities and conducting conspiracy investigations. These often complex investigations include traditional and non-traditional organized crime, organized prostitution, pornography, and criminal subversive group activities. 

The Firearms Training Unit (FTU) is responsible for all aspects of firearms training, repair, deployment and training and evaluation for the Department.

The Unit is also a resource for all other police departments in the county and surrounding regions, including the FBI, ATF, US Border Patrol, US Immigration & Customs, US Marshall, US Federal Detention, NY Attorney General's Office, and military units.

The Unit maintains an inventory of all Department weapons and ammunition, including specialized weapons, gas launchers, bean bag guns and related support equipment. In 2008, the Unit researched and facilitated the purchase of new handgus and holsters, followed by initiating the transitional training. FTU staff members conduct all repairs on weapons except for the most complex.

All firearms related training is conducted in the 16 position indoor range or the 21 position outdoor range. The indoor range targets have the capability of turning 180 degrees with a maximum distance of 25 yards.

The Victim Assistance Unit, is responsible for ensuring compliance with New York State Fair treatment standards for crime victims and witnesses, all provisions of law regarding crime victim compensation and services, recontacting the victim/ witness as needed, and periodically determining whether needs are being met.

The Victim Assistance Unit is a comprehensive crime victims program serving victims of assault, robbery, sexual assault, and family members of a homicide. It is also responsible for providing domestic incident follow-ups, enhancing the probability of successful prosecution by providing services upon the arrest and post-arrest processing of a suspect, explaining to the victim/witness their role in court proceedings, interviews, and other required appearances at the convenience of the victim/witness and, if feasible, provide transportation to court. It is further responsible for assigning a victim advocate, if available, to the victim/witness during the follow-up investigation and assist in the return of victim/witness property taken as evidence, where permitted by law of rules of evidence.

The program is primarily funded by VOCA (Victims of Crime Act).

Animal Services is responsible for impounding unleashed and menacing dogs, stray animals, unwanted and abandoned pets, and animals that have injured a person. The Unit enforces all local and state animal control ordinances including: leash law, barking ordinance, number of dogs allowed per household, rabies quarantines, dangerous dog law, and dog licensing. Animal Control Officers (ACOs) respond to animal related calls for service dispatched from the 911 center. ACOs also assist Police Officers in the execution of warrants to ensure officer and public safety when animals are involved. The Unit operates a shelter for temporarily housing impounded animals, which serves as both an adoption center and lost and found facility. Animal Care Technicians maintain the shelter and the animals and assist citizens in finding missing or new pets. The shelter includes an on-site spay/neuter clinic and offers outreach programs, and has an active volunteer program that is essential to the maintenace of care for the animals.







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#### CALLS FOR SERVICE

The Rochester Police Department tracks all services to the community by "Calls for Service", "Police Responses", and "Self-Initiated Activities". "Calls for Service" are 911 calls dispatched by the Emergency Communications Department (ECD). A "Police Response" occurs each time an additional unit provides service at a given scene. As one call for service may result in multiple units in response, the number of responses is likely to be greater than the number of calls for service. "Self-Initiated Activity" is an event the officer comes across on the beat or initiates.

ECD assigns each specific incident a Crime Report number. The "CR" number is a unique number assigned to each event by which all reports, tickets, arrests, etc. can be traced. When one needs to refer back to a given incident, searches can be conducted by entry of the CR number, as well as the date or location of the incident. These retrievals are performed in the RPD Police Activity Tracking System (PATS): an in-house computer application that maintains data on all RPD activity and responses transferred from ECD to the RPD Informations Systems Unit.

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




POLICE CALLS FOR SERVICE - 3-YR. COMPARISONS

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HIGHLIGHTS OF 2008

"Zero Tolerance" is a crime fighting initiative that created omnipresence by members of the Rochester Police Department to change the mindset of those individuals who believed it to be okay to terrorize the streets of Rochester. The mission of "Zero Tolerance" is to increase the visibility of police personnel performing their duties in a proactive and aggressive manner, enforcing all laws and ordinances within the city of Rochester. The initiative began in October 2007 and continued well into 2008. The crime fighting initiative concentrated on minor violations of the law to the most severe offenses of the law.

#### MONROE CRIME ANALYSIS CENTER (MCAC)

The Rochester Police Department is committed to making Rochester, New York one of the safest mid-sized cities in America. MCAC analysts gather crime data from law enforcement agencies within Monroe County, and then share the information with adjoining law enforcement agencies. The multi-agency partnership is lead by Rochester Institute of Technology Professor John Klofas. With the use of the Monroe Crime Analysis Center, Rochester Police Department command staff can analyze criminal activity in real time. Once criminal activity data is analyzed, the appropriate level of resources (police personnel and/or technology) can be factored into the equation.

ZERO TOLERANCE

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HIGHLIGHTS OF 2008 cont'd.

#### **CAMERAS**

In 2008, the Rochester Police Department announced another crime fighting tool to use for the protection of our citizens and the safety of our officers. Surveillance cameras provide the Rochester Police Department an added tool in keeping our streets safe. Technology has allowed us, through the use of surveillance cameras, to have an extra set of eyes on our streets. Fifty surveillance cameras were purchased and were up and running by year's end.

ADDED POLICE PERSONNEL TO SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

In 2008, the Police Department sought the need to deploy police personnel to areas of the city based on information developed from the Monroe Crime Analysis Center. The Rochester Police Department added several officers to the Special Operations Division bringing the total count to over 100 police officers in the division. Deploying police personnel to various geographical locations based on criminal intelligence data proves to be a strategic success for the Department and the community.

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HIGHLIGHTS OF 2008 cont'd.

PROJECT T.I.P.S. (TRUST, INFORMATION, PROGRAMS AND SERVICES)

In August 2008, the Rochester Police Department, along with other community leaders, kicked off a community initiative called Project T.I.P.S. The goal of Project T.I.P.S. involved community agencies and law enforcement personnel working in selected neighborhoods to rebuild trust among residents and share information. Project T.I.P.S. members visited residents within neighborhoods to create conversations about quality of life issues, as well as to hopefully obtain information about crime and violence in an anonymous format for residents.
