A note from Loretta Scott

Just a short time ago I joined my long-time friend and colleague Councilmember Carolee Conklin in a dedication ceremony where we named a room in City Hall after one of our City's most famous citizens, "The Susan B. Anthony Room."



In celebration of Women's History Month we held this event to recognize

the contributions of women in our region. In honor of the 110th Anniversary of Susan B. Anthony's Funeral, the dedication took place on March 15, 2016. We were joined by many women who have helped shape our community including many of the former women who have served on the City Council, as well as elected officials in our City and County. The Susan B. Anthony Room is located behind City Council Chambers in Rochester City Hall. This room is the office of Councilmember Carolee A. Conklin, and it contains two historic portraits of Ms. Anthony; the portraits, one photograph and one painting, depict the suffragist icon in her later years.

We know that Susan B. Anthony would be pleased to see how far women have come, but we also know that even amid the praise she would encourage us all to, "go on with the work." We are lucky to have diverse representation throughout our government. Ms. Anthony would be pleased to see the number of women who are participating. Locally, the City Council is comprised of a majority of women, we have a female Mayor, and a female County Executive, and on the state and national level a female Lieutenant Governor, a Congresswoman, and Senator.

Our City has been the genesis of transformational dialogue and action that moved the needle forward on many progressive issues. Even today, the City of Rochester is among the leading municipalities in the country with regard to effective policies relating to sexual orientation, gender identity, and gender expression; we are a City born in progress and equality, and we continue to build on that legacy.

Each year the Rochester City Council completes an extensive review of the City Budget. Councilmember Carolee Conklin, the Chair of the Finance Committee, presides over this review. In addition to Councilmember Conklin, the Finance Committee is comprised of Councilmembers Molly Clifford and Adam McFadden; Council President Loretta Scott and Vice President Dana Miller also join the Finance Committee as ex-officio members. The Council receives a draft copy of the Budget in mid-May to review. The Council then holds a formal public Budget Review which takes place over two days, hearings will be held on Thursday, June 2, 2016 and Tuesday June 7, 2016. The Budget review is an opportunity

"We take the Budget process very seriously, the Budget is how we as a City identify our priorities for the future. The City Council reviews the budget, poses questions, and acts as a voice for our citizens to ensure that the needs, and wants of each of our City residents and neighborhoods are heard at the budget review. We know it is our responsibility to ask tough questions to make sure that every dollar of taxpayer money we spend is accounted for, and that

for Council to review the programs and services offered by the City of Rochester and assess the efficacy and efficiency of City Government. The Budget provides the financial plan for the upcoming fiscal year, the document lists many programs and services the City will offer this year, along with details on goals and outcomes. The Budget Hearings are broken down by department, and each department's Commissioner or Director will answer questions and provide additional information to Council. The department leaders will review their goals for the upcoming year and respond to any questions from Council. Councilman McFadden Leads Father's Day Pledge

For the third consecutive year Councilmember Adam McFadden is leading a gathering of men, encouraging the community to take the Father's Day Pledge to End Violence. As the Chair of the Public Safety Youth and Recreation Committee, Councilmember McFadden has focused his work around anti-violence initiatives and opportunities for youth. The National Father's Day Pledge is a national event that takes place in cities all over the country. Councilmember McFadden brought this event to Rochester while he served as the former President of the National Black Caucus of Locally Elected Officials (NBC-LEO) during 2014-15; this is a sub set of the National League of Cities. This year Councilmember McFadden partners again with the National League of Cities, and the City of Rochester, the Coalition of Black Trade Unionists, SAFER, Phi Beta Sigma National Fraternity, Inc., WDKX, REOC and Resolve Rochester to host stand up as men in our community and the Father's Day Pledge on the steps of Rochester City Hall located at 30 Church



Street in Downtown Rochester. Councilmember McFadden is calling all adult males, fathers, young men, and the general public to join the event which is scheduled to take place at 12:00 (Noon) on Saturday, June, 18, 2016. "We need to commit to ending violence. We can not raise another generation of children for

whom hate filled language, domestic violence, and gunshots are a way of life. As the father of two daughters, I know first hand how important it is to make sure that we as men stand up and make every effort to provide our next generation with a safe environment. We hope to see a great turn out on Saturday and encourage all to attend," said Councilmember McFadden.

Councilmember Ortiz Leads 3,3,3

City Councilmember Jackie Ortiz serves as the Chair of Intergovernmental Ad-Hoc Committee that has representatives from the Rochester City Council, Rochester City School Board and the Monroe County Legislature. The 3,3,3 Working Group will develop and strengthen a working rela-



tionship between the governmental bodies to facilitate the improvement of academic outcomes for children by focusing on maximizing and fully utilizing resources. Currently the group is working to find ways of better serving the young people in our community by exploring a data sharing initiative that will allow Recreation Centers, Libraries, and the City School District to partner together to try to increase rates of attendance and achievement for Rochester City School District students.

Patterson: Spotlight on the Northeast District

Northeast District Councilmember Mike Patterson is excited to discuss the new development in Northeast Rochester. Upper Falls Square, a DePaul Properties Project, is a 128 unit development that will be built on Cleveland Street and Hudson Avenue. The project is slated to be a mixed-population, low-income and supportive housing unit. While the Upper Falls Neighborhood has a long history of available affordable housing rental units,



supported housing options are almost non-existent. "It is important that we have housing options for all members of our community, and DePaul Properties is a shining example of how a nonprofit can work with the community to integrate housing for special popula-

> tions while making sure that the neighborhood voice is heard," said Councilmember Patterson. DePaul will provide opportunity for persons living in



this community to benefit from skilled staff and supports that increase their health and wellness, while improving community wellness and public safety. "This is just one of a number of developments happening in the Northeast District," said Councilmember Patterson, "I'm very excited to the see so much progress in the District."

Councilmember Haag to Chair Historic Subway and Aqueduct Task Force

Councilmember Matt Haag will be joined by Councilmembers Elaine Spaull and Carolee Conklin on the Historic Subway and Aqueduct Task Force. The purpose of this group is to bring together relevant stakeholders in the community with interest in the subway and aqueduct. The group is seeking advice on accessibility and use issues related to this space. The group shall be tasked with creating feasible, agreed-upon ideas and plans for access to the area immediately adjacent to the former Lehigh Station as well as the Rundel Building of the Rochester Public Library. Additionally, this group will take in to consideration the larger issue of use of this historic, cultural amenity within our city and discuss the possible implementation of any proposed recommendations.
