

Pace Car Program Rolls Out

I'm happy to tell you that our Pace Car Traffic Calming Program has been expanded citywide following a successful pilot program. If we can all agree that promoting a culture of responsible driving - a culture of courtesy - I think we would all be safer. The program, launched as a pilot in 2015 in partnership with Reconnect Rochester and the Highland PlaceMaking Team, improves traffic safety and promotes pedestrian-level vibrancy on city streets. Pace cars help calm traffic, making our streets safer.

The Pace Car Program encourages motorists to sign a pledge to drive safely and responsibly and display a Pace Car sticker on the back of their vehicle. By doing so, they are informing the drivers behind them that they will not drive over the speed limit, won't drive in bike lanes and will yield to pedestrians, among other safe-driving practices. The Pace Car Program complements other traffic-safety measures underway in the City, including traffic enforcement; and implementation of the Complete Streets Policy, which considers the use of pedestrians and bicycles in the design, maintenance and upgrade of city streets.



Market Improvements on Track

Thanks to many hardworking and talented contractors and cooperative vendors and customers, the improvement project at the Market is well underway. The new outdoor, covered "D" Shed is complete, and has been temporarily enclosed and heated to house indoor shed vendors while their shed is being replaced. The new "D" Shed is a replica of an original shed that existed roughly on the same footprint from 1905 to 1963.

In early October, the existing indoor "B" or "Winter" Shed was demolished to make way for a new structure that will provide much better amenities and comfort for vendors and customers. The new "B" Shed will also be in closer harmony architecturally with the historic marketplace.

Next summer, indoor vendors will move

back from the temporarily enclosed "D" Shed into the new building, and the enclosure will be removed from "D," making space for 46 additional outdoor vendors.


The four stand-alone food stands on Market grounds are also being replaced with modern new structures located temporarily in the small lot near the North Union Street gateway entrance while the new indoor shed is built. Once the indoor shed is complete, the food stands will be moved back to their original locations flanking the indoor shed.

Pulling the Plug on Red Light Cameras

On December 1, I submitted legislation to City Council that would terminate the City's Red Light Camera Program.

The Red Light Camera Program has been wildly unpopular among Rochester's citizens, and its benefits simply do not justify a further extension of our contract. Too many of these tickets have been issued to the people who can least afford to pay them, which is counterproductive to our efforts to reverse our city's troubling rates of poverty. I could not, in good conscience, wage a fight against poverty while also imposing burdensome fines that have a disproportionate impact on people living in poverty.

Legislation passed by City Council will bring an end to the Red Light Camera program

effective Dec. 31, 2016 by terminating the City's contract with the Redflex Traffic Systems Inc.

Volunteer to Keep it Clear - Adopt a Hydrant

We launched a new safety initiative where citizens can assist with snow removal around a fire hydrant in their neighborhood or near their business. "Adopt-A-Hydrant" is the newest addition to the Citv's snow removal plan. Purging Blight from North Clinton Avenue



Our children should not have to encounter needles in their playgrounds and on the sidewalks they use.

Just as heroin destroys the minds and bodies of its users, it also destroys neighborhoods. We have seen it in the neighborhoods surrounding North Clinton Avenue. That's why we launched a comprehensive operation to reverse the plague of heroin use and sale in the area.

I have ordered extra police patrols to arrest drug dealers and buyers. We installed fencing and barricades to deter the foot traffic from drug dealing, removed trees, shrubs and

vines and installed new LED street lights.

I am also working with service agencies such as Rochester Regional Health, Trillium Health and Monroe County Department of Health to explore a drop-off treatment center so users can get the help they need.

I fully understand the complex realities of drug addiction and realize we cannot eliminate heroin use in our city overnight. But the first step of recovery is to handle the most pressing crisis - and this neighborhood is in crisis. We are going to purge heroin from this neighborhood and deal with what comes next.

New Vanpool Pilot Project to Help Connect Residents to Jobs

I'm excited to tell you about the Rochester Vanpool Pilot Project--a new transportation initiative that will help connect Rochester residents to jobs in the region. A vanpool is a group of up to 12 commuters who voluntarily participate in a rideshare arrangement. The van makes one trip to a workplace and one trip home during the day. Vans are driven by a volunteer driver, who is also commuting to work.

The City has contracted vRide, Inc., the nation's largest vanpool vendor, to provide a turn-key vanpool program in Rochester and


Make College a Reality at FAFSA Fest 2017
