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Who we are and what we do

General History:

- Chartered by the Rochester Police Department in 1995 and implemented in 1996, based on what is now an International program originated by the Miami Police Department in 1990
- In March 2000, incorporated as a 501(c)3 nonprofit corporation, functioning under the auspices of the City of Rochester Police Department and overseen by an appointed Board of Directors

Program Goals:

- Promote positive behavior among local students by reinforcing socially desirable behavior among youth in the community
- Reward students who are involved in good things and publicly highlight their accomplishments in the media to demonstrate that good kids are news worthy
- Foster positive relationships between law enforcement and youth by building bridges of trust, understanding and civic responsibility

What We Do:

- Students in Monroe County, in grades K-12, may be nominated by any adult, at least 18 years old
- Students can be nominated for any good deed or accomplishment, such as; civic responsibility/volunteerism, heroic acts, helping law enforcement, leadership/quick thinking, "Good Samaritan" acts and overcoming personal challenges.
- Students must attend school within Monroe County and have performed the act for which he/she is nominated within a year of being nominated.
- Recipients of the award must be students in good standing and are chosen by a tally of votes from our Selection Committee. The Committee is comprised of representatives of our sponsors, as well as, community businesses/organizations
- Award recipients are celebrated publicly in a bi-monthly ceremony hosted by the Rochester Police Department and are presented a prize package comprised of generous gifts from our sponsors.

On March 13, 2014, Noah and his younger sister, Mylah, observed their grandmother, Shirley Kinney experiencing a major medical problem and that she had stopped breathing. Mylah immediately called 911 to summon assistance and following the directions of the 911 operator, both Mylah and Noah began courageously performing CPR on their grandmother until emergency personnel arrived.



Kevin Honan, Jr.6th GradeGreece Olympia Middle SchoolBrandon Honan3rd GradeLongridge Elementary School

Kevin and Brandon were nominated by their mother, April Honan. Their father had recently been diagnosed with an illness and was in the midst of a diabetic seizure. Kevin and Brandon worked together as a team to get their father the help he needed. Kevin Jr. checked his father's blood pressure, called 911 and gathered up his father's medications for the paramedics; Brandon told the paramedics what they needed to know. Kevin and Brandon's awareness, maturity and quick actions kept a treatable medical emergency from becoming a fatal incident.



Joshua McNair 8th Grade Urban Choice Charter School

Joshua was nominated by a family friend, Cheryl Dyer. Ms. Dyer became legally blind and Joshua, a co-workers son began assisting her in navigating the world as she lost her sight. When she began to lose her sight, Joshua volunteered to get her back and forth to work. Although she no longer works, Joshua still assists Cheryl with her grocery shopping and as a result he has learned to shop and budget. Joshua also reads greeting cards in the store and calls her to remind me that her favorite shows are airing. Joshua has been assisting Cheryl since he was eleven and has never asked for and will not accept monetary compensation.

Jackson was nominated by his aunt, Tiffany Gadacz, for his compassion. It is because of his passion for baseball that he volunteers for various baseball camps in the Rochester area and has been umpiring for the Webster Athletic Association since he was 12 years old. This year Jackson umpired a total of 13 games for the WAA spring house league, spring travel league and the summer house league. His earnings totaled \$420.00. When the time came for Jackson to turn in his tokens and receive his pay, he contacted the Umpire Coordinator and League President via email and informed them both that he would like to donate all of his earnings to The Miracle Field. Jackson volunteered for WAA Challenger Baseball and saw first-hand all of the hard work, time and effort that is put into an all-volunteer organization. It was a desire of Jackson's heart to give to the Challenger Baseball Players as well as to give back to a game that meant so much to him growing up.

Tyler was nominated by his physical education teacher, Mr. Juan Melendez, for his leadership. During PE class, Tyler observed a student struggling to perform a skill. The student was by herself while everyone else was done. Children began to whisper and comment about the child. Tyler took it upon himself to go back on the floor and do the skill again right next to the child who was struggling so she wouldn't be alone. His exact words were "this isn't fair" so he went to help the child. This was a tremendous act of kindness and leadership, showing great empathy especially for someone so young. Eventually all the students followed Tyler's lead.

Hailee was nominated by her teacher, Jessica Thompson for her bravery and quick thinking. On Sunday, June 22, 2014 Hailee was swimming in her neighbor's pool. While the adults were chatting nearby, her neighbor's 14 month old granddaughter fell into the pool. Noticing the adult's panic and hesitation, Hailee swam over, grabbed the 14 month old and got her to safety. In essence, Hailee's quick reaction saved the baby's life.

Kaori-Mei was nominated by her mother, Tiana Stephens for her maturity and empathy. On August 17, 2014 Kaori-Mei home was at alone and chatting with an old classmate online. He started to tell her he was upset, was on a bridge and was going to jump off. Kaori-Mei without hesitation called 911. All the while she kept talking to her friend, advising him that this was not the way to resolve anything. Officer Andrea Bouffiou responded and Kaori-Mei was able to provide her with her friend's home address. It was later learned that her friend was not on a bridge but was at home, feeling suicidal. As a result of Kaori-Mei's sharing this information with the police, her friend is now getting the help he needed.

Natosha and King were nominated by their Assistant Principal, Margaret Crowley after they helped quell an escalating, verbal altercation at school. They each restricted the movement of a participant, speaking to them calmly and guiding them away from the conflict. While it is not recommended that students take on the role of peacemaker, for their own safety's sake, Ms. Crowley felt that because they cared enough about their friends to prevent them from engaging in destructive behavior, they should be publicly acknowledged for the mature way they intervened.



Inalia Sierra 3rd grade Henry Hudson School #28

Inalia was nominated by Shannon Grieve, a City Recreation Supervisor for her honesty and civic responsibility. Inalia frequents one of the City Recreation Centers that Shannon supervises. On November 10th, Sierra found a \$50 bill on the basketball court. Without hesitation, she turned it into a staff member. Because Inalia did the right thing, the money was returned to its rightful owner.

Kashawn showed a great deal of compassion and was very attentive to her while waiting for help to arrive. Officer Carmo felt that Kashawn demonstrated a high level of responsibility and maturity during the event and felt he should be recognized for that.

It was later discovered that Javine had broken his foot in the accident and had acted above and beyond what is expected of an 11 year old student.

While Selin was outside, she heard a loud banging noise near her next door neighbor's house. She went over to see what was wrong and found her 86 year old neighbor lying in the snow banging a broom on her garbage can. The elderly neighbor lives alone and had fallen on the icy steps and could not get up. Selin helped her up out of the snow and made sure that she got safely back into her house. Selin retrieved the neighbor's mail from the mailbox at the end of the driveway, brought it to her and contacted an adult to follow up with her neighbor. Had Selin not taken the time to check on her neighbor, this story could have had a tragic ending. The neighbor is now being cared for in a nursing facility. Selin was a member of the travel Soccer team and a Girl Scout but took steps back from that to focus on her AP classes.
