HUD Funding Background

- Rochester receives about \$13M in HUD grant funding/year
- The City of Rochester adopted a new 5 Year HUD Consolidated Plan in July 2020
- HUD funds can be used for many activities that are recommended in the *Rochester 2034 Comprehensive Plan*:
 - Neighborhood reinvestment
 - Expanding homeownership
 - Affordable rental units in mixed income developments
 - Stabilizing housing through code enforcement
 - Park and playground improvements
 - And much more!

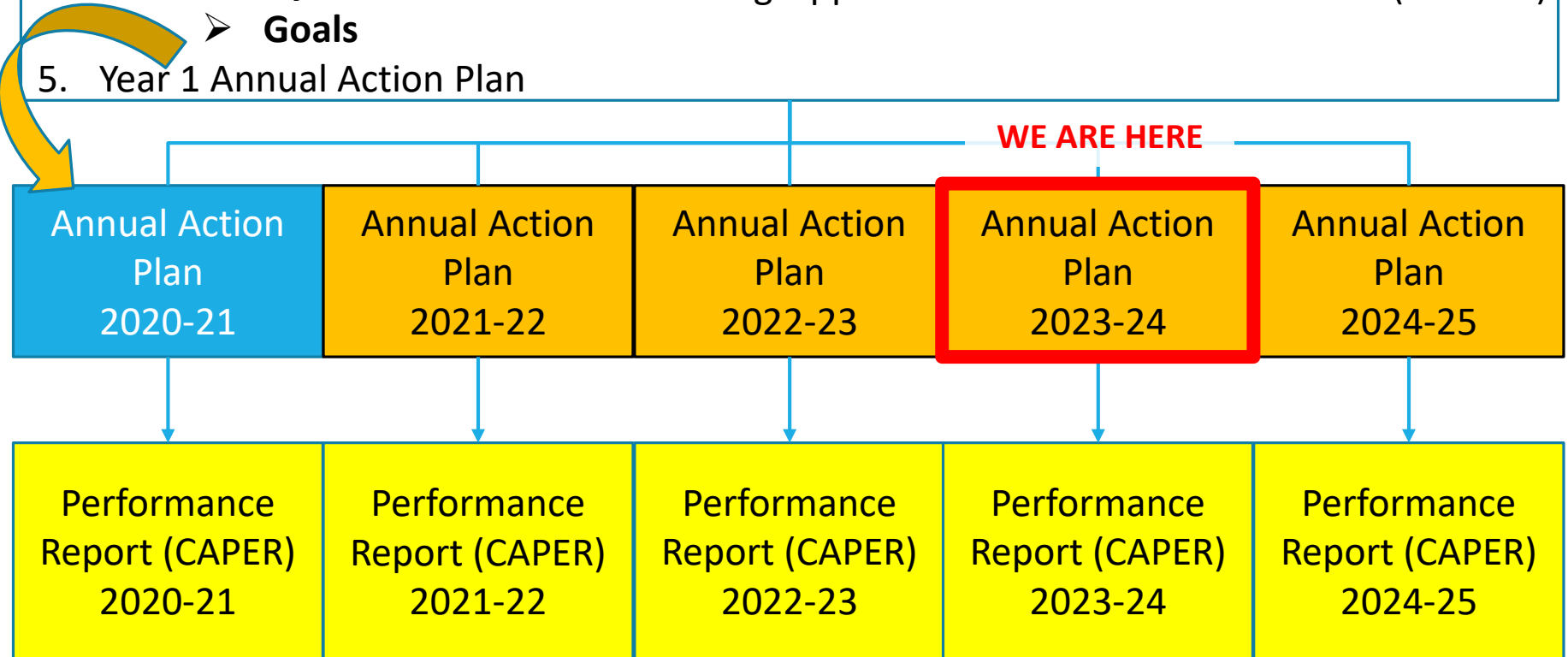


5-Year Consolidated Plan – 2020-2025

5. Year 1 Annual Action Plan

Consolidates the planning for four grant programs:

- Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)
- HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME)
- Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG)
- Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA)



2023-24 Annual Action Plan

- Posted for 30 days for public comment from April 17 through May 18, 2023
- Plan covers the period from July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024
- Details Rochester's budget and planned activities for funding for Year 4 of the five-year Consolidated Plan
- Includes:
 - Budget and anticipated accomplishments for funding allocated for CDBG, HOME, HOPWA, and ESG programs
 - Framework to address priorities established by the City in the Rochester 2034 plan
 - Input from the public
- **Does not include** funds allocated to the City through the American Rescue Plan or the CARES Act to respond to COVID-19

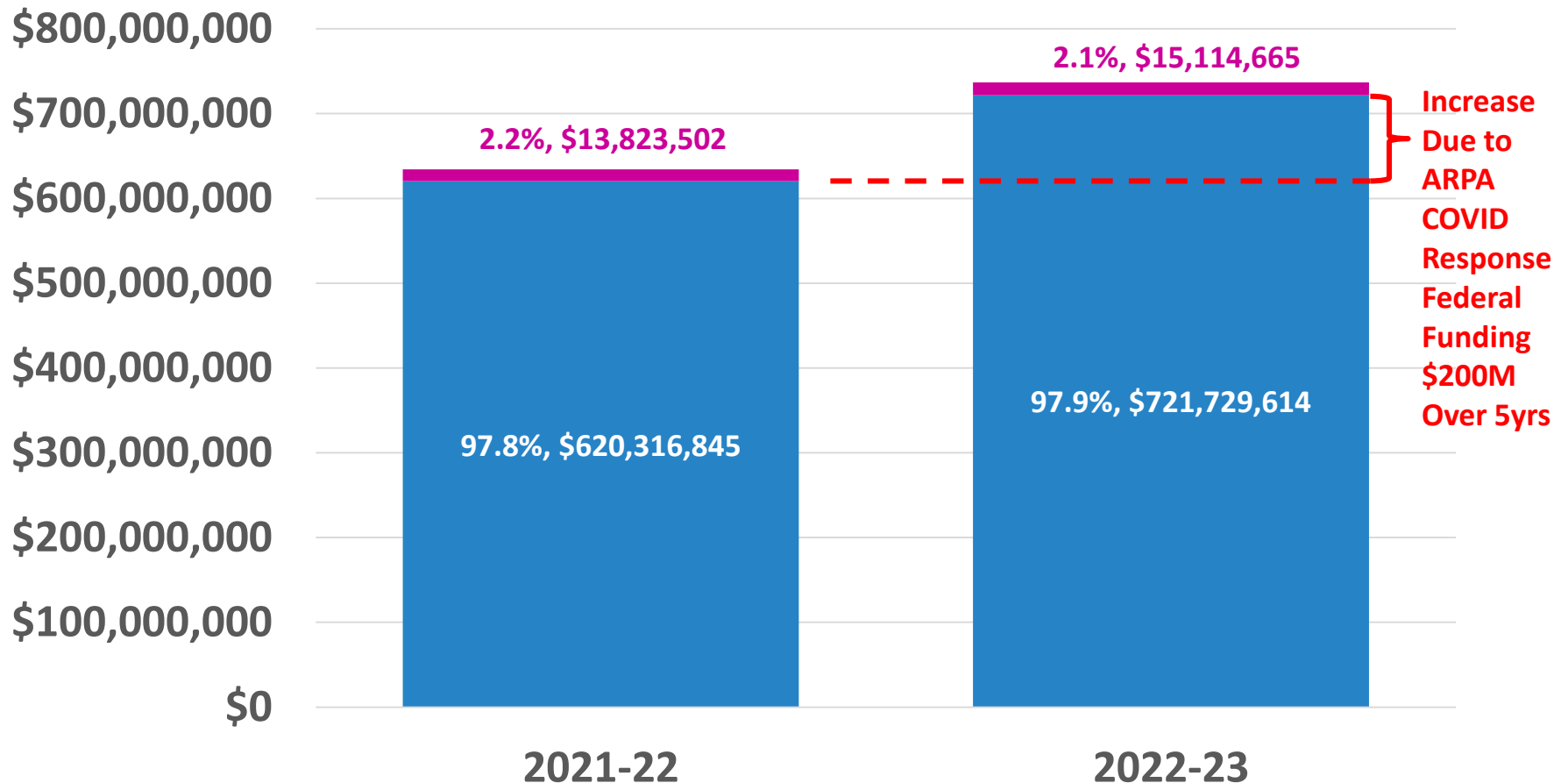

The City attempts to balance many funding priorities in the Annual Action Plan budget. There is far more need in the community than HUD funding can serve.

Increasing one program's budget would require cutting from another program

 - Grants and low-interest loans
- **Goals & objectives for 2023-24:**
 - Continue to stimulate economic growth and create/retain jobs
 - Supporting significant projects, including Vigneri Chocolates and two Potential Large High-Tech Companies

CDBG: Rehab and Demolition

Priorities:

- Analyze City neighborhoods to determine areas of greatest need that would benefit most from CDBG funding
- Undertake planning and analysis of the City's program delivery systems to address areas of weakness and to capitalize on program strengths
- Address child lead poisoning through the City's lead hazard Control program
- Address the housing repair needs of low to moderate income homeowners

Demolition Program	\$1,960,439	80 buildings demo'd
Emergency Assistance Program	\$200,000	80 houses rehabilitated
Owner Occupant Housing Rehabilitation Program	\$750,000	30 units rehabilitated
Rental Housing Rehabilitation Program	\$190,000	8 units rehabilitated
Lead Hazard Control Program	\$400,000	25 units rehabilitated

CDBG: Housing Programs

- **CDBG Housing Priorities and Activities:**
 - To provide decent housing and a suitable living environment for LMI households through public services and the rehabilitation of housing
 - To help residents become more stable in their housing
 - Activities include assistance to seniors to remain in their homes, landlord-tenant education, and mortgage default resolution
- 2023-24 goals and objectives: continue to help maintain and improve housing stability for low- and moderate income households

HOME Rochester Program Management	\$186,000	Combined with CHDO goals
Aging in Place	\$60,000	212 households assisted
Legal Services for Seniors	\$40,000	47 persons assisted

HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME)

- Strictly for housing activities to assist low- and moderate-income households
 - Homeownership assistance
 - New construction
 - Rehabilitation
- } Since 1992 83% of HOME assisted rental units have benefited households under 50% AMI

CHDO Reserve (15% of annual allocation, not including PI)	\$414,015	10 rehabbed units sold to first-time buyers
Homebuyer Assistance	\$300,000	50 homebuyers

Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA)

- Housing assistance and supportive services for low-income persons with HIV/AIDS and their families
- Partner with Trillium Health and Catholic Charities Family and Community Services to provide housing services

HOPWA Administration (up to 3%)	\$33,776	
Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS- Trillium Health	\$546,069	108 persons assisted

Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG)

- Street outreach and emergency shelter activities
- Homeless assistance
- Homelessness prevention
- Partner with many community agencies to provide housing services
