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PROGRAM HISTORY AND OVERVIEW

About the Program

The Do The Right Thing Award program has been part of the Rochester Police Department since 1995, and incorporated as a 501(c)3 nonprofit corporation in March 2000. The program functions under the auspices of the Rochester Police Department, and is overseen by an appointed Executive Board of Directors. A copy of the by-laws can be found on our <u>website</u>. Program sponsors provide generous donations which are distributed to award winners, and also help fund program operations.

The goal of the Do The Right Thing Award Program is to foster positive relationships between all local law enforcement and school-aged youth. The program recognizes students for their exemplary behavior. Actions such as volunteering in the community, aiding law enforcement and other first responders, acts of heroism, leadership and role model behavior, and demonstrated 'turn-around' or improved behavior are acknowledged. Highlighting these students and their stories in the media promotes positive recognition for these youth, and shows that good choices are newsworthy. The ceremony and our winners are highlighted on our social media, as well as through program sponsor News 10NBC WHEC-TV. Stories are televised on their news broadcasts, as well as on-line at <u>WHEC.com</u>.

Any student enrolled in grades Kindergarten - 12 in any school within Monroe County is eligible for nomination. Students may be nominated for incidents that have occurred within one year of the nomination, and the act must have occurred within Monroe County. Anyone over 18 years old can nominate a student - this includes first responders, teachers, coaches, family, friends, and neighbors. Nominations are accepted throughout the entire year, and are reviewed by a committee that selects students to receive the Do The Right Thing Award. The committee is comprised of members of our community and representatives from our sponsor organizations.

Up to fifty students can be selected as Do The Right Thing Award winners each year, and these students are celebrated at one of three ceremonies which are held at the City Public Safety Building during the school year. Winners receive several rewards and prizes donated by program sponsors, and may also apply for a college or trade school scholarship when they are high school seniors. Students selected as winners must attend an award ceremony in order to officially be considered a Do The Right Thing Award Winner.

Since the program began, we have recognized over 1,200 winners, and awarded \$118,000 towards scholarships for our winners. Most students that are nominated will receive a letter of recognition for their act, even if they are not chosen as a winner.

2023-2024 Ceremonies

In total, we recognized thirty students throughout three ceremonies during the 2023-2024 school year. This included twenty-nine incidents that involved times of heroism, bravery and courageousness while helping family and/or first responders during serious incidents such as calling 911 or helping family members during emergency situations; intervening during altercations at school and standing up to bully behavior; acts of kindness, thoughtfulness, generosity, and volunteerism; as well as role model and turn-around behavior. Many of these acts would be remarkable if adults had done them, so it's even more phenomenal when you read these stories and see how young some of the winners are!

All ceremonies were very well attended by family and friends of the winners, as well as many other supporters of the program. We also broadcast the ceremonies via Facebook Live for those that were unable to attend. This also allows everyone to watch the ceremony again at a later time if they would like. Scholarship Announcement

Last year we partnered with The Summit Federal Credit Union, who pledged to match funds to support our annual scholarship. To acknowledge this partnership, the scholarship is now named the **Do The Right Thing / The Summit Federal Credit Union Scholarship**. Last year we awarded two \$2000 college scholarships, and this year we did the same. We look forward to continuing this partnership for many years to come!





2023-2024 AWARD WINNERS

It isn't always easy for children these days to do the right thing. Standing up against bullies, acting courageously during a traumatic event, or acting unselfishly and putting the needs of others before their own, are things that can be difficult for anyone at any age. But there are many Monroe County youth that choose to go above and beyond, and we were privileged to recognize 30 of them and their commendable actions at three award ceremonies throughout the 2023-2024 school year. Listed below are each of their incredible stories.



November 2023 Ceremony Winners



LILY CLARK 4th Grade Lakeshore Elementary (Greece CSD)

Lily was nominated by her aunt, Angela Scott, for her ability to remain calm and brave during a medical emergency. One morning this past May, Lily realized something was not right with her grandmother, who she called Ninny, after she woke up. Lily telephoned her mother, who was outside helping her brother get on the bus, to let her know that something was wrong with Ninny. Lily quickly hung up and began checking Ninny's blood sugar and oxygen (which she knew to check because of pre-existing conditions). When Lily's mom came back into the house, she immediately recognized the symptoms of a stroke and called 911. Lily stayed calm the entire time, and was very helpful to both her grandmother and her mother. After her stay in the hospital, Ninny was transferred to a nursing home, where Lily visited every day, bringing and eating dinner with her. Lily continued this until Ninny passed away at the end of August.



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NICHOLAS FUSILLI, II 4th Grade Plank Road South Elementary (Webster CSD)



Nicholas was nominated by West Webster Fire Chief Brian Kelly for his bravery and quick actions during a fire emergency. At approximately 3:00 a.m. on Saturday April 1st, the West Webster Fire Department was dispatched to the Fusilli home for the smell of something burning and visible smoke on the first floor. Fire crews arrived and were able to determine that the dishwasher had malfunctioned, resulting in plastic items inside melting and creating a smoke and fire hazard. The dishwasher power was isolated and the dishwasher made safe. When discussing the incident with the family, it was discovered that smoke alarms in the residence did not activate to alert the family, and that it was actually Nicholas who had awoken to the smell of smoke, identified the dangerous condition and immediately alerted his parents. His parents were then able to grab Nicolas' brother and sister, call 911 and exit the house safely. Nicolas' actions were integral in the safe outcome of this event, in both alerting his family to a dangerous condition, as well as limiting what could have been a larger fire event.





AUSTIN GILLIS 12th Grade McQuaid Jesuit High School



Austin was nominated by his mother, Kelly Gillis, for the work he did for his Eagle Scout service project. Austin built a sensory garden for the Arc of Monroe. The Arc of Monroe has been providing a variety of programs and services for over 1,400 people with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities and their families in the Rochester community for over 65 years. The Arc works to enhance the quality of life and self-esteem of people in their programs, providing them with meaningful social development, supported employment, residential community living and enrichment opportunities. Austin's idea was to help people with intellectual and developmental disabilities have a safe place to rest, enjoy and stimulate their senses. A sensory garden is all about stimulating and engaging the five basic senses of sight, smell, sound, touch and taste. Spending time in a sensory garden can help enhance your sense of wellbeing, reduce stress and calm your mind. Austin spent a year planning his project, seeking ideas from The Arc employees, as well as the community. The large sensory garden was installed this past spring at the Arc of Monroe's Ballantyne Day Services location, and will be used for those supported by The Arc for daily activities.





SHUAIB HUSSEIN 6th Grade Roberto Clemente School #8 (RCSD)



Shuaib was nominated by Arnett Branch Librarian Bruce Tehan for his outstanding work as an advocate for literacy, youth and libraries, as well as being an exceptional brother to his siblings. Mr. Tehan said that Shuaib is a regular patron at the Arnett Branch Library, visiting almost daily with his brothers this past summer. Throughout the summer he was an enthusiastic participant in library programs, and won numerous prizes for being one of the branch's best readers. His conduct in the library was always gentlemanly, and he was a remarkably kind big brother to his siblings, constantly looking out for them and making sure they were safe and happy. This summer Shuaib also emerged as one of the Branch's best volunteers. He took a keen interest in the All Together, Kids' Summer Reading Program. This program is designed to encourage literacy, library use, and general education in a fun and entertaining way. Mr. Tehan observed Shuaib, on his own, tell many kids about the program, and encouraged them to join. Shuaib's actions were directly responsible for approximately twenty percent of the program's enrollment. One noteworthy incident Shuaib was involved with occurred on an afternoon when there were a lot of kids in the building with no planned activities. Shuaib approached Mr. Tehan and suggested that something be done. When asked if he could think of something for the kids to do that would be fun and would teach them something about the library, Shuaib came up with the idea of a library themed scavenger hunt. Mr. Tehan asked Shuaib to plan and run this activity, and Shuaib met this challenge brilliantly. He scattered images throughout the library so that kids could learn about the various collections and services the library provided, and then supplied each of the kids with a list of things they needed to hunt for. If they got stumped during the hunt, he provided clever hints to help them on their way, and at the end of the event, he passed out prizes supplied by the library. Shuaib's program was so well crafted and received that it was repeated two more times this summer!



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MATTHEW KLINKBEIL 8th Grade John Williams School #5 (RCSD)



Matthew was nominated by his mother, Terry Sinopoli Klinkbeil, for his ability to remain calm during a dangerous situation. One day while Matthew was at his great-grandmother's (he calls her Nana) house after school, the kitchen started filling with smoke. Nana had accidentally left food in the oven when she went to pick up Matthew's sister from softball practice. Matthew called his Nana and let her know what was going on, and she gave instructions over the phone to help Matthew turn off the oven and safely remove the food. Matthew is a very high functioning person with autism, but a large number of instructions can easily confuse him. Yet during this incident, he was able to remain calm and follow everything his Nana told him, keeping himself, his elderly aunt who was with him, and the house safe!





GRAYSON NGUYEN 3rd Grade Durand Eastman Primary (East Irondequoit CSD)



Grayson was nominated last year by substitute teacher Debbie Deuschle for the kindness and compassion he displayed towards another student. In second grade, Grayson was in a General Education program at Ivan Green Elementary School, and his class was combined with a Special Education class. One day in May, Ms. Deuschle was working with both groups in a Physical Education class. During this class, she observed Grayson help a special needs student learn to play basketball. She says Grayson was not promoted to help, and showed so much compassion to this classmate that it truly touched her heart. Mrs. Deuschle said Grayson has a heart of gold and she will never forget what he did! His teacher last year, Grace Di Maria, said that Grayson has a kind heart, and accepts others for exactly as they are. She said he comes to school every day with a smile and ready for whatever the day has to bring. She went on to say he is very kind and thoughtful, and has a way of making others feel special. He would often bring her little gifts delivered with a big smile, and his mother says that Grayson insists on bringing school staff members, as well as his friends, small gifts each week.





MADELINE SCAHILL 11th Grade Bishop Kearney High School



Madeline was nominated by School Administrator Keith Miller for being an outstanding, wellrounded, role model student who always seems to do the right thing, even when no one is looking. Madeline is an individual that shows kindness and caring to all, always making sure to include everyone, and goes out of her way to ensure that everyone is treated with dignity. Madeline is involved in many school activities. She leads the Best Buddies program, which helps build one-to-one friendships between people with and without intellectual and developmental disabilities, offering social interactions while improving the quality of life and level of inclusion for a population that is often isolated and excluded. She is a Global Ambassador, a position that assists the foreign exchange students that attend the school, and she is also involved with the Art and Drama group, where she has participated in several of the school's theatre productions. All of this while maintaining an overall GPA of 96.7%. Over the summer, she worked as a lifeguard at Seabreeze Amusement Park.





NYLA SERRET Pre-Kindergarten Rochester Early Childhood Center (RCSD)



Nyla was nominated by 911 Telecommunicator Kathleen Burns for her quick thinking and bravery. Back in July, Ms. Burns took a 911 call from a very young child requesting help for her mom. The child said that her mom cut herself and needed a doctor. Later in the call, she said that her mom needed a band aid, but they didn't have any. The call disconnected during the brief interview, so Ms. Burns was only able to obtain very minimal information from the child. She did hear her say she was four years old, but never even had a chance to get the child's name. Fire dispatch was eventually able to speak to the mother on the phone to confirm that she was ok, and police also responded to the location to confirm everyone was ok. Nyla's mom had a minor cut on her hand that she accidentally did while cooking. Ms. Burns was so impressed that Nyla knew at such a young age to call 911 if she needed help, and nominated Nyla so that her bravery would be recognized.





KWYNN WALTON, JR. 2nd Grade Nathaniel Hawthorne School #25 (RCSD)



Kwynn was nominated by School Administrator Denise Quamina for his quick thinking during an emergency situation that took place during school last April while Kwynn was in first grade. One day in the middle of lunch, one of Kwynn's classmates began choking. Kwynn ran across the cafeteria to get the parent liaison, Ms. Montalvo's, attention. He told her that his friend needed help because he was choking. Without hesitation, Ms. Montalvo accompanied Kwynn to the choking victim, where she firmly hit him on his upper back, causing the chip that was lodged in the student's throat to dislodge. Kwynn's actions of quickly seeking adult assistance on this day helped save his classmate's life, and everyone at School #25 is so proud of him!





AUBREY WILLIAMS 7th Grade Rochester Prep Chili Campus Charter Middle School



Aubrey was nominated by her mother, Rachel Lynette Davis, for her role in helping her mother during a serious medical emergency. Last May, Aubrey came home from school to find her mother unconscious. Aubrey was able to contact 911 through her mother's personal emergency response system on her medical alert button. With the operator's guidance over the phone, Aubrey gave her mom CPR until the ambulance arrived. Ms. Davis said the last thing she remembered was that her blood glucose level was very low so she went to get some juice, and the next thing she knew she was waking up in the hospital. It was there she learned what her daughter did for her. Ms. Davis is so proud of her daughter for saving her life! She says Aubrey is an amazing daughter who always helps around the house with things like cooking and cleaning. Her teacher, Kim Roberts, said Aubrey is an exceptional young lady who is kind to everyone, always willing to help, and who loves to make everyone smile!





February 2024 Ceremony



ANMOL BISWA 10th Grade School of the Arts (RCSD)



Anmol was nominated by School Support Staff member Leslie Hunter for his role model behavior and civic mindedness. Ms. Hunter says that Anmol has a steadfast interest and belief in personal and community responsibility. He and his family are from Nepal, and over the past two years, he has displayed the qualities of a personally responsible individual including courage, persistence, and self-control. He takes his education and personal growth seriously, as well as his civic responsibilities, and has never failed to demonstrate that they are sincere, family and community based. A notable incident that Ms. Hunter learned about occurred this past spring, when Anmol was walking to school. While on East Main Street in front of the Riverside Convention Center, he noticed an object on the ground. Curious, he picked it up, inspected it, and found it to be a real bullet. Instead of ignoring it or keeping it, he immediately called 911 and waited for the police to arrive so that he could turn it over to them, thus removing a potentially dangerous item from the street. According to Ms. Curtis, the school has a lot of foot traffic alongside its green space, and often during the overnight hours people visit and leave items behind. The school decided the money will be used for a pizza party for the entire school during School Spirit Week in March, so every student at the school will benefit from Carter's remarkable act!





NIKKYAH BOONE 7th Grade Northwest Junior High at Douglas (RCSD)



Nikkyah was nominated by Principal Rodney Moore for her heroic actions during Home and Careers class earlier this year. When two students began arguing back and forth with one another, the teacher and some other students attempted to calm the situation. Instead it escalated when one student became enraged, grabbed a pair of scissors and rushed toward the other student. Mr. Moore also says Nikkyah is a positive role model at Northwest Junior High, always putting forth her best effort, is a joyful person who always assists her classmates with problems, and acts as a calming force in the classroom. Nikkyah's counselor, Jennifer Greenberg, says that Nikkyah is honest, focused and a great friend to her peers, and never hesitates to do the right thing even when she is not asked to do so.





AZ'RYEL CASTRO 6th Grade Charles Carroll School #46 (RCSD)



Az'Ryel was nominated by his principal, Gina DiTullio, for his role model behavior as a peer mediator for his classmates and the younger students at School #46. Az'ryel has been demonstrating leadership in restorative practices this year. He recently intervened when two first-grade students were engaged in a conflict. Biljana Ilievska is a Telecommunicator at 911, and nominated Canari for the way she handled herself while her mother was experiencing a medical emergency this past summer. When Canari's mom wasn't feeling well, she called 911, but was having trouble communicating with Ms. Ilievska, who was the 911 operator that answered the call. Canari took the phone from her mother and relayed information between the 911 operator and her mom. Ms. Ilievska said that Canari did a very good job at remaining calm and answering all the questions asked by the operator, relaying information to her mom and keeping mom calm while help was on the way. Canari's mom is grateful for the help she provided during this stressful situation. Canari's teacher, Michele D'Alessandro, said that Canari is kind and caring, always helpful in class, makes good choices for herself and others, and is a model student at School #8!





ANGELENA LIPANI 12th Grade Penfield High School (Penfield CSD)

Since 1997 our program has award 114 recipients \$118,000 in college and/or trade school scholarships!

To acknowledge this partnership, the scholarship is now named the **Do The Right Thing / The Summit Federal Credit Union Scholarship Program.**


