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2 Project Overview

What is the food system?



... and what is a food system plan?

A food systems plan is a set of interconnected, forward-thinking strategies that strengthen a community's food system through the collaborative creation and implementation of plans and policies.

Through the planning process, local and regional stakeholders develop and implement activities and policies to influence and shape how food is produced, processed, distributed, consumed and disposed.

Center the roles of equity, sustainable agriculture and environmental stewardship in a healthy food system

RECOMMENDATION 2.1 — Improve access to land and capital for farmers, especially new and beginning farmers and farmers of color.

STRATEGY 2.1.1: Utilize a buy, protect, lease strategy to make farmland available to farmers at affordable rates.

Development pressure has resulted in a reduction in the availability of high quality agricultural land and an increase in the cost of land, making it difficult for farmers to access and afford land. Structural racism has and continues to increase these barriers for farmers of color. For some farmers, long-term lease models provide the best opportunity for accessing desirable land for cultivation.

CURRENT STATUS

Currently, the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy Farmland Initiative Program, Three Rivers Agricultural Land Initiative, and the PA Farmland Preservation Program programs all work to address land access challenges.

NEXT STEPS

- Advocate for additional funding and resources for existing programs.
- Connect farmers to existing programs and opportunities.
- Increase awareness of farm leasing opportunities among new and beginning farmers and connect farmland leasing initiatives with young farmer and farm apprenticeship networks.

About the Project

The Rochester Community Food System Plan is a **city-wide assessment and planning initiative** intended to inform City policies, strategies, and activities to improve healthy food access and create a stronger food system in Rochester.

The assessment and plan will be informed by qualitative and quantitative research, mapping and data analysis, robust community and stakeholder engagement, and an inventory of assets, challenges, needs, and opportunities.



DIRECT TO CONSUMER SALES

When farms sell directly to consumers through farmers' markets, farm stands, and CSAs

- Monroe County has 3x the % of farms with Direct to Consumer sales compared to U.S counties as a whole
- Direct to Consumer sales in the Finger Lakes region grew at over 2x the pace of U.S. counties as a whole, 2017-2022

WHOLESALE DIRECT SALES

When farms sell directly to local retailers, restaurants, and institutions

- The Finger Lakes Region had **3x** the % of farms with Wholesale Direct sales compared to U.S. counties as a whole
- Even so, stakeholders see potential for growth in institutional purchasing



Rochester residents want expanded access to community gardening, but perceive barriers to land tenure and resources.

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
- Many **residents believe the city needs to take a more supportive approach** via improved permitting process should be streamlined, and made more accessible.
- Focus group attendees cited community as the most common benefit of urban agriculture and gardening.

66 Historically, the city makes it hard to have community gardens (compared to Buffalo and other cities). Best you can have is to lease it from the city for a year. This is tenuous and prevents folks from investing in abandoned lots."

- Rochester had 80 food-growing gardens in 2024
- About half utilized city garden permits and 20% were on private land
- City's permit program has grown, has hovered around 80 since 2019 (includes non-food gardens)



Food is an important part of Rochester's economy - but entrepreneurs face challenges when attempting to scale their small businesses.

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- Rochester is home to over 12K food-related jobs about 10% of all jobs
- In manufacturing categories, Rochester overperforms (relative to US) in:
 - Baked Goods
 - Beverages
 - Packaged Fruit & Veg
 - Food Packaging

66 Extra labor is needed. We've had people looking to hire part-time and full-time staff. Dozens of interviews, half no shows, half not qualified."

I researched loans, grants, everything. But we were too small. Didn't have a 1-year or 5-year revenue sheet to show people."





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



 While Rochester has a lower density of supermarkets, it has a robust number of smaller stores.

12. How satisfied are you with the ease with which you can access the food you want to eat in your neighborhood?

The majority of respondents said they were very satisfied (134 respondents; 43.4%) or somewhat satisfied (228 respondents; 38.2%) with food access in their neighborhood.



Respondents most frequently cited price and lack of transportation as impediments to shopping at their store of choice.





66 Transportation is a challenge. Can't go on a bus with kids and bring a box of food."



Benefit and incentive programs are widely utilized at food stores but there is room to increase participation among eligible populations.

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- Well utilized programs include
 SNAP, WIC and Fresh Connect
- In 2020, estimated 66% of eligible households were enrolled in WIC in Monroe County
- Community survey respondents most frequently cited uncertainty around eligibility as the primary reason why they don't use benefits.
- Frobably 90% of the women we work with are eligible for WIC. About 51-52% of them are registered."



HEADWATER FOOD HUB Regional food hub building regional supply chains; innovative product lines

Rochester is home to uniquely innovative organizations and initiatives which can be further leveraged to strengthen the food system.



- Additional key organizations include: The Commissary, Taproot Collective, Common Ground Health, Rochester Food Policy Council, network of ~90 food pantries, farmers' markets, etc.
- Recent initiatives include: \$3M in Innovative Food Model grants, Healthy ROC Grocer Program, SNAP Restaurant Meals Program (RMP).
- The city, anchor, and smaller organizations can **convene and coordinate to increase impact.**



Information and data about Rochester's food system are fragmented, difficult to navigate, and incomplete.

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- Stakeholders said a lack of shared understanding and data about the food system hindered more strategic and collaborative approaches.
- Some individual organizations/initiatives maintain their own public-facing data platforms.
- But there is no central hub for information about food access points (retailers, pantries, farmers' markets, etc.), food security information, gardening opportunities, entrepreneurship supports, food production, etc.



Recent investments set the stage for the City of Rochester to take a stronger role in addressing food system issues.

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• Recent investments include: Healthy ROC Grocer, Innovative Food Model grants, and this planning process.
