

****** **“DO THE RIGHT THING”** was instituted to reward children for their positive accomplishments and to enhance the lives of many of our city’s needy youth

****** **“DO THE RIGHT THING”** Award program was established, with students selected on a bimonthly basis for recognition by the police department for their outstanding accomplishments

****** **“DO THE RIGHT THING”** will continue to build a sense of mutual respect and understanding between young people and police officers by initiating new projects and activities to stimulate the relationship

****** **“DO THE RIGHT THING”** mission statement:

“The mission of Do The Right Thing of Rochester is to foster a positive relationship between the Rochester Police Department and Rochester’s youth. The “Do The Right Thing” award program recognizes Rochester youth for their positive behavior, accomplishments and good deeds by distinguishing school-age children who strive to make good choices, do well in school, make a difference in their communities or demonstrate turnaround behavior.”

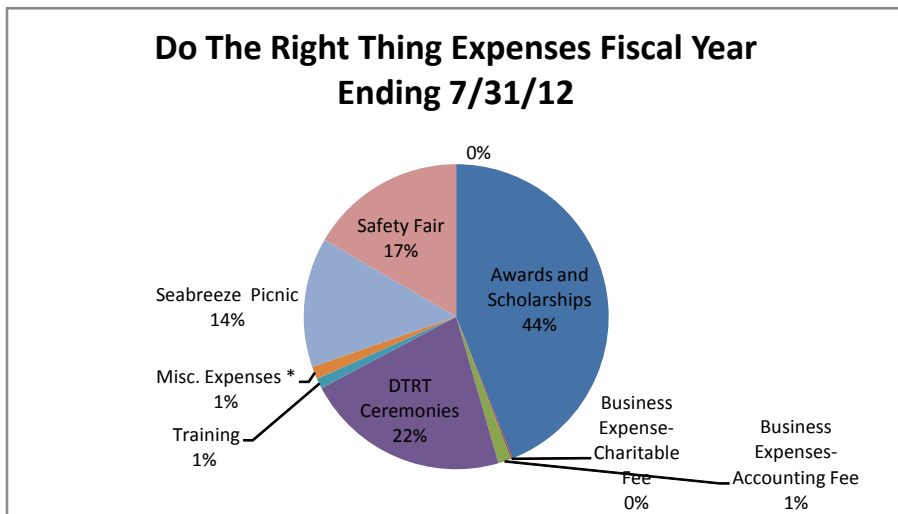

As a result of this incident, Donald was invited to join the Principal Advisory Council as a representative. Donald showed both courage and school pride when he decided to get an adult involved.

School Resource Officer Carlos Alvarado nominated Jeremy for his honesty and integrity. After finding a driver's license and credit card on Lake Avenue belonging to an elderly stranger Jeremy turned it in to Officer Alvarado, who said Jeremy has a great attitude and is kind hearted. The girls called their Mom who then called 911, relaying questions from Ms. Calloghan to the girls. The girls answered all questions that were asked even though they were afraid. Their ability to stay calm, give accurate descriptions, and monitor the males until the Police arrived resulted in the males being arrested for Trespassing. Abigail is described by her teacher as an enthusiastic learner who is motivated by success and a role model for her peers. Juliet is also an impressive student who competed at the state level in "Odyssey of the Mind", an international educational program that provides creative problem-solving opportunities for students from kindergarten through college.

School Resource Officer, Virgil Ross, nominated Charles for his courage and bravery in sharing information on a violent attack on an individual. Charles came forward with a video of the incident he had on his cell phone; this video ultimately became crucial evidence in a gang assault. Despite a pervading attitude among many youth not to come forward with information that can help the police, Charles

showed great integrity and fortitude in providing this powerful evidence. He is described by his teacher as someone who consistently works hard and values his education. Charles is also an usher at his church, and volunteers for Unity Hospital at Parkridge as a transport for patients.

Evelyn was nominated by her Girl Scout leader, Kathie Entress, after Evelyn developed, organized, publicized and conducted a book drive collecting over 1500 books for the new Discovery Charter School on the Bishop Kearney School Campus. Evelyn learned that the school needed books for their

library. She asked the teachers what types of books were most needed and communicated that information to her potential donors. She also recruited other High School students to create and donate artwork for the new school. She began in July 2011 and held a special book drive in August during which over 900 books were dropped off. She collected approximately 600 more and donated those additional books to the school on September 14, 2011. Evelyn's Principal calls her a conscientious student of top quality character, and adds that she is also talented, unique, caring and highly motivated.

Elijah was nominated by 911 Operator Jody Englert after he called 911 for his grandmother who was attempting to control a family member. Elijah was very polite and calm while relaying information for his grandmother who could not speak with 911. Ms. Englert felt that he showed potential leadership skills and was impressed by his ability to be calm during what must have been a scary and stressful situation for someone his age. Elijah's teacher says he is kind and respectful, completes his work in a timely manner and is eager to do classroom activities.

Mr. Thomas Rende, Ricardo's teacher, nominated Ricardo for an unselfish, self-sacrificing act. Over the summer, Ricardo donated bone marrow to his brother. The bone marrow extraction process is a very painful one but the donation gave Ricardo's brother a new chance for a healthy life. Ricardo is described as a student who always has a smile, is pleasant to work with and is cooperative with his peers. Mr. Rende said that Ricardo is a hero and

believes his courage should be recognized.

Shaquille was nominated by School Resource Officer Bonita Powell because of his bravery and willingness to calmly intervene in an assault. Shaquille witnessed a younger female student being assaulted by a male student while on a bus. Shaquille intervened by stopping the male from further striking the female and moving the student toward the front of the bus away from the victim. Shaquille informed the bus driver of what

occurred and kept the bully away from the victim. Shaquille prevented further injury to the victim, standing up for someone who could not defend herself. His teachers describe Shaquille as a conscientious student who works well in class.

Jan DeMunck, a 911 operator, nominated Berfin for her courage and calmness. On August 29th, Berfin called 911 when her grandmother collapsed and stopped breathing. Ms. DeMunck, guided Berfin in providing CPR to his grandmother until the ambulance personnel arrived. She was very brave and helpful. Teachers and staff at Rogers Middle school say that Berfin is a role model for her peers, calling her helpful and polite and said she often takes

on responsibilities that most children her age would not. Berfin often serves as a translator for her family who are limited in speaking English.

Sebastian was nominated by the school secretary Ms. Aleida Garcia for his trustworthiness and integrity. On October 31, 2011 as Sebastian arrived to school and locked up his bike in the back parking lot, he observed some money on the ground. He picked it

up and handed it to an adult in the building who then came to the main office to ask if anyone lost money by the back door. Ms Garcia realized that she was missing the money that she had brought to work with her and explained that the money must have fallen out of her pocket as she got out of her car that morning. Needless to say, she was very grateful to Sebastian for being honest and turning in \$150. Sebastian is described by his teachers Ms. Gagliano and Ms. Quinn as a role model student for their entire school community. His decision to turn in a large sum of money is remarkably honest and is a decision some adults would have found difficult to make. Sebastian is a Boy Scout; an active member of Pack 33, a member of the school choir, a Safety Patrol Officer, and is also a Green Team member.

Sierra and Allyson were nominated by Ms. Janette Marino. Ms. Marino's son James, a senior varsity football player at Spencerport High School, was diagnosed with Leukemia

in late August. Both Sierra and Allyson, who attended a recreation summer camp where James worked, found out about his illness and felt compelled to do something on his behalf. Allyson phoned Ms. Marino for permission to organize a school wide fundraiser in James' name. Sierra and Allyson researched Leukemia and provided morning announcements for the entire school on facts regarding the disease. In addition, they made posters and a "wear a hat for the day" fundraiser was created. Students paid a dollar to wear a hat for the day and on Halloween, they collected money from students who wore orange to school. These efforts raised \$400 for the American Cancer Society in James' name. Principal Ned Dale states "the most incredible part of their efforts was that the girls didn't want any recognition and didn't have a strong connection to the family, yet they wanted to do the right thing and support a cause that would help defeat this terrible illness. Both Sierra and Allyson went above and beyond to support James and this important cause".

Ms. Cholach was able to obtain the necessary information on the female and medical assistance

was dispatched. Brittany is credited with getting this young lady the medical help needed. Brittany is described by school officials as a young lady who demonstrates the characteristics of the Spartan Way: compassion, respect and hard work.

Latinas Unidas President, Daisy Algarin, nominated Valeria who recently received the Young Latina Leader Award for her civic responsibility and volunteerism from Latinas Unidas. She is passionate about helping both the young and the elderly. Valeria returned to Manta Ecuador and volunteered with Go Forth

International a humanitarian aid organization that were in urgent need of bilingual volunteers. In her first assignment she served as an interpreter for both medical and dental professionals as they assisted those in need. During the six day mission Go Forth International distributed medicine to over 2,500 citizens and Valeria earned over 60 volunteer hours. This past spring Valeria returned to Ecuador and met with the Mayor's wife of Manta and exchanged ideas about construction of the city's first senior center. Eager to convert this idea into her senior project she received permission from Ms. Mendoza the President of Go Forth International. She is now visiting senior centers in Rochester in hopes of gaining some ideas to implement back in Ecuador. Valeria also volunteers at Foodlink here in Rochester. Brady was nominated by his Mom for his outstanding bravery and maturity in the face of a traumatic incident. On June 10, 2011, four year old Brady and his Nanny were involved in a serious, head-on collision in the family's mini-van. The Nanny's air bag deployed causing her to blackout. When she woke up, Brady had unbuckled himself from his booster seat in the rear of the van. Despite an untreated ankle injury, Brady had crawled into the front seat, and was calmly, holding her hand. They were transported together to a hospital where Brady's injury was treated and he was re-united with his

family. A NYS Trooper commented to Brady's Mom that he did a remarkable job for his age, remaining calm and cooperative during such a serious accident. Brady has a rare neurological disorder that has had him hospitalized A LOT since birth, making his bravery all the more remarkable.

Endrick's Vice Principal, Ms. Gladys Vasciannie nominated Endrick for finding a knife with a 12 inch blade on the way to school and turning it in to the School Safety Officer as soon as he arrived. Endrick's teachers say he has shown significant improvement and maturity since last year and has

put forth an excellent effort to improve both socially and academically. We want to support and encourage that positive effort. Endrick plays trumpet in the school band and is planning to play football for the Rochester Rams this summer.

Caleasha was nominated by Rochester Fire Department Captain Chris Peer. On Thanksgiving morning 2011, Engine 13 responded to a home on Cady Street for a man having a diabetic emergency. While the fire truck was en route, they were informed that the man also had a history of heart problems. The person calling and relaying all of this information was 9 year

old Caleasha. She called 911, reported that her Grandpa was unconscious and stayed with him while trying to call her Mom and Grandma. When the fire department arrived, she directed them to the second floor where her Grandpa was located. Captain Peer was impressed with Caleasha's calm demeanor during the incident and says that the information she gave and the actions she took clearly saved her Grandpa that day. Assistant Principal Dr. Sheila Marconi said on this date, Caleasha rose to the occasion and displayed many of the six pillars of characters encouraged by her school.

Sarah was nominated by her neighbor Gail Matyi and School Principal, Mr. Swinson for her compassion and good citizenship. As a result of the Pilato family tragedy in Webster, Sarah took it upon herself to make 100 bracelets and sell them in school. Sarah worked intensely on the bracelets, completing them in just 7 days. The total amount

raised was \$600.00 which she took and purchased a Mall gift card. Sarah's intent was to raise money for Elizabeth in hopes that she could purchase some items for herself after the fire destroyed all of her belongings. Sarah's desire for everyone who bought a bracelet was for them to make a wish for the Pilato family. Sarah's described by her Mother as a caring dedicated person. Sarah is an Irish Dancer of 5 years, very passionate about dance and school. She also enjoys playing the flute in the school band



Julia Abrey
6th Grade
Willink Middle School (Webster)

Julia was nominated by her school's Assistant Principal, Brian Zimmer for her compassion and sense of community. Julia, after hearing about the Pilato family tragedy, felt a tremendous need to help. She went to her Grandfather, Neil Bauman, and asked if they could do something at the family restaurant to raise money. On December 19, 2011, at the Prime Steakhouse in Webster, the fundraiser was held and with the support of the community raised approximately \$27,000 for the family. Julia helped plan, and participated in the Prime Steakhouse fundraiser. Julia is described as having a huge heart and is willing to do whatever she is able to, to support all of her classmates at Willink Middle School. She plays soccer with the Webster Soccer Association, snow boards with the School Ski Club, and has been active with the Girls Scouts since 1st grade. She is described as being a positive role model and always looking for ways to challenge herself.

FEBRUARY 2012

The following five students submitted a proposal (and presented it in front of staff, building and district administration) to purchase and sell special bracelets to honor the life of Josh Pilato, a 6th grader at Spry Middle School who perished in a tragic house fire in December 2011. The approval was granted and they sold bracelets at school and for the entire duration of the PRIME Steakhouse fundraiser.
