A MESSAGE FROM CHIEF MOORE



It is with great pride that I present the 2006 Annual Report of the Rochester Police Department. This report provides a snapshot of the events and accomplishments of the RPD in 2006. What

this report will not be able to articulate is the awesome police work that was done each day and night. An example of this valiant effort is the recovery of 1,033 firearms in 2006. The services provided by each member of the RPD was crucial to maintaining the quality of life in the City of Rochester and for their efforts I cannot express my appreciation enough.

In 2006, Rochester like many mid-sized cities has seen an increase in violent crime. In an effort to combat this increase we have developed several new initiatives as well as continued our Anti-Violence initiatives with our partners in Law Enforcement. Initiatives such as Operation Impact, Project Exile, and Ceasefire continue to make a difference in our community. As we continue to strengthen these relationships we continue to form new ones with various

aspects of the community to further our Anti-Violence efforts, such as the partnership with the Rochester Institute of Technology to form the Public Safety Center. The center will help to create public safety and anti-crime policies and initiatives that are based on data and research on Rochester crime trends and patterns. These crime trends and patterns will be reported on a daily basis in order to deploy personnel in the most efficient and productive manner. The deployment of “ShotSpotter”, a gunshot location system, which was deployed in July of 2006, has become one more tool that is being utilized in our efforts to fight violent crime. This system detects gunfire and enables the emergency communications dispatcher to dispatch officers prior to receiving a call from a citizen. This software has proven to be very successful and has resulted in numerous arrests.

As a result of hard work and cooperation, the Rochester Police Department has once again been granted re-accreditation for a three-year period by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA). We have been accredited by this organization since 1987 and because of this we were able to gain a meritorious distinction.

I would like to thank every employee of the Rochester Police Department for doing an excellent job in 2006. I would also like to thank Mayor Robert Duffy and the City Council of Rochester for their continued support, without which we could not provide the law enforcement needs of our community. Finally, I would like to thank the citizens of Rochester for providing support and enthusiasm to their Police Department. Their community support is crucial, and with it we will continue to provide protection and safety for all.

We will strive to become a “World Class” police department by focusing our resources on accomplishing our Mission. We will realize this through teamwork, partnerships with the community, and accountability.

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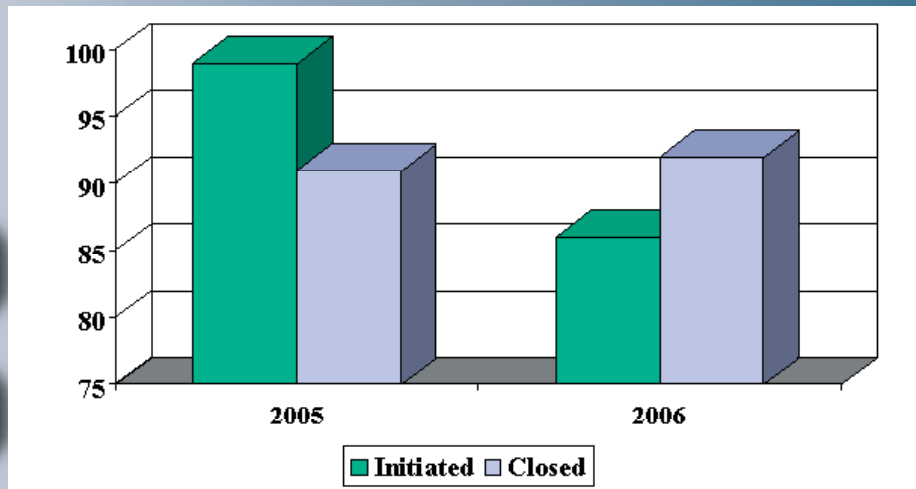
OFFICE OF THE CHIEF

Patrol Division East [630 North Clinton Avenue,

Rochester, NY 14605] The Patrol Division East is commanded by Commander Peter Brunett. Comprised of Patrol Service Areas 23-32, it is bounded to the north by Lake Ontario and the City's municipal boundary with the Town of Irondequoit, the City's municipal boundary with the Towns of Irondequoit, Penfield and Brighton to the east, the Town of Brighton to the south and the midpoint of the Genesee River to the east, to exclude the Inner Loop and the geographical confines within the Inner Loop. It follows the midpoint of the Genesee River north to Lake Ontario, and the midpoint south to its intersection with the north embankment of the barge canal. It then continues west along the barge canal to the midpoint intersection beneath Scottsville Road at the City's municipal borderline with the Town of Chili. It then continues south along the City's municipal boundary, to include the area of Genesee Valley Park on each side of the river. The park boundary ends on the north embankment of the barge canal, west from the canal's midpoint intersection with the Genesee River.

Patrol Division West [1099 Jay Street, Rochester, NY 14611]

The Patrol Division West is commanded by Commander Glenn Hoff. It is comprised of PSA's 43-54, is bounded to the north by Lake Ontario, the City's municipal boundary with the Town's of Greece and Gates to the West, the Town of Chili to the south and the midpoint of the Genesee River to the east, to include the Inner Loop and the geographical confines within the Inner Loop. It follows the midpoint of the Genesee River north to Lake Ontario, and the midpoint south to a point at its intersection with the north embankment of the barge canal. It then continues west along the barge canal to the midpoint intersection beneath Scottsville Road at the City's municipal borderline with the Town of Chili. It then continues north on Scottsville Road to a midpoint intersection with Kingsboro Road. It continues west along the City's municipal boundary, which corresponds to the north embankment of the barge canal, and continues northwest along the canal embankment to midpoint at the intersection of the canal, Brooks Avenue, and the City's municipal boundary with the Town of Gates. It continues north along the east embankment of the barge canal, which follows the City's municipal boundary with the Towns of Gates and Greece. The Patrol Division West also is comprised of the Special Operations Section.

The Tactical Unit is responsible for augmenting and assisting patrol operations in covert surveillance, saturation patrol, and providing coordination and technical assistance for specialized details related to robbery, burglary, rape, and larceny prevention and apprehension. The Tactical Unit also provides uniformed Honor Guard for various functions and dignitary funerals, uniform support for the Special Investigation Section, as well as being an integral part of the Mobile Field Force (MFF) and IMPACT.

The K-9 Unit, commanded by Sergeant Thomas Fantigrossi, provides K-9 services for building, narcotics, nitrate and explosives searches, as well as assists with dignitary support. All K-9 dogs are German Shepherds and undergo intensive training in compliance with New York State requirements. All the K-9 dogs are patrol tracking dogs, with some cross-trained for nitrate searches or narcotics searches.

Traffic Enforcement Unit - Special Operations Section

The Traffic Enforcement Unit (TEU) is a highly trained, specialized group of officers whose main function is the reduction of traffic related accidents, fatalities, and injuries. TEU officers are trained in radar operations, DWI enforcement, taxi inspection, weigh scale operation, vehicle and traffic law, and motorcycle operation. TEU performs enforcement, traffic direction, and traffic-related in-service training to the Department, and also assists with, or provides dignitary escorts, honor guard, special events, and neighborhood speed watch programs.

Mounted Unit - Special Operations Section

The Mounted Unit provides specialized mounted horse patrol capabilities to augment regular patrol. Mounted capability offers high visibility patrol for special details and is also an important part of special events, offering crowd control and a uniformed presence. Mounted units can be seen patrolling in neighborhoods and downtown, at parades, and at special events such as the 4th of July fireworks, Music Fest, Blue Cross Arena functions, and the Lilac and Corn Hill festivals. Mounted also performs Honor Guard functions and offers tours of their Verona St. facility.

Youth Services Unit - Special Operations Section

The Youth Services Unit coordinates youth related programs. Its focus is the prevention of youth-related crimes and the reduction of youth violence.

It coordinates the Department's educational and crime prevention programs for at-risk youth. Intervention services include the Truancy and Curfew programs and the School Resource Officer program. Enforcement services include Operation Night Watch. Programs such as T.O.P.S. and Good Grades Pay encourage and reward promising youth.

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OPERATIONS BUREAU

Bomb Squad - Special Operations Section

The Bomb Squad, commanded by Captain Robert Johansson, responds to incidents involving explosives, bombs, explosive chemicals, military ordnance, fireworks, and conducts post blast investigations. All members have been trained to respond to any chemical, nuclear, or biological terrorist threat. The Bomb Squad is one of the only RPD part-time squads directly involved in case investigations, arrests, and expert testimony.

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OPERATIONS BUREAU

Emergency Task Force - Special Operations Section

The Emergency Task Force, commanded by Lieutenant Eric Paul, is a volunteer group of select officers specially trained to deal with unique situations, high risk suspects, high risk warrant service, protection of dignitaries, and other special assignments. Assignments may include incidents with hostages or barricaded suspects.

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OPERATIONS BUREAU

Mobile Field Force - Special Operations Section

The Mobile Field Force is a specially trained group of personnel assigned to provide rapid, organized, and disciplined response to civil disorder, crowd control, or other tactical situations.

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OPERATIONS BUREAU

Scuba Squad - Special Operations Section

The SCUBA Squad, supervised by Lieutenant Frank Churnetski, is a volunteer team specially trained and equipped to handle underwater assignments such as emergency rescues in cold water, near-drowning victims, surface rescues, water recovery of bodies, criminal evidence or other property recoveries. Other duties include safety standby operations at special community water events.

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OPERATIONS BUREAU

Crisis Negotiation Team - Special Operations Section

The Crisis Negotiation Team, commanded by Sergeant Norma Marchetti, responds to incidents involving hostage taking and barricaded suspects. Negotiators establish a dialogue with the hostage taker with the goals being the release of hostages and the capture of the hostage taker. Negotiators also work with suicidal persons and in various crisis intervention matters.

Investigations Division

The Investigations Division, commanded by Commander Robert Wale, is responsible for providing investigative support services necessary for the effective operation of the Police Department. The Investigations Division consists of the Field Investigations, Central Investigations and the Special Investigations Sections.

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OPERATIONS BUREAU

CrimeStoppers is a community action program for the apprehension of suspects, utilizing the cooperation of the community and the media. With the assistance of the media, monetary rewards are offered to anyone who may confidentially or anonymously supply information leading to the arrest and indictment of perpetrators.



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OPERATIONS BUREAU

Paralegals assist members with preparation of selected Department forms, grand jury packages, and digital identification system viewing. This component also tracks felony cases submitted to the court system, grand jury referrals, and juvenile petitions prior to submission to court. The unit also prepares arrest warrant packages for crime victims.

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OPERATIONS BUREAU

The Central Investigation Section, commanded by Captain Lynde Johnston, is responsible for the Major Crimes, License Investigations and Technicians Units. This Section has the main responsibility of coordinating liaison activities both internally and inter-agency.

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OPERATIONS BUREAU

The Major Crimes Unit, under the command of Lieutenant Michael Wood, is responsible for the investigation of all homicides, incidents of suspicious or unexplained deaths, undetermined or incendiary fires, missing person cases and bank robberies. Major Crimes Unit also conducts investigations of intra-familial child abuse (physical or sexual) in which the suspect is 16 years of age or older. Department personnel work in conjunction with other area law enforcement agencies and the Monroe County Department of Social Services. This Unit is also responsible for determining dispositions of open child abuse or child neglect investigations, assisting patrol sections (or other as directed by the Commanding Officer of the CIS) in the investigation of any crime involving a child victim or any complaint of child abuse or neglect.

Major Crimes will investigate any crime or series of crimes as directed by the Commanding Officer of the Central Investigations Section or the Commanding Officer of the Investigations Division.

The Special Investigations Section, commanded by Captain Edward Giblin, consists of the Narcotics, Intelligence, Administrative, Firearms Suppression, and the Surveillance and Electronic Support Units, Violent Crime Team, and the Greater Rochester Area Narcotics Enforcement Team (GRANET).

The Special Investigations Section is responsible for the suppression of illegal narcotics trafficking, organized crime, and other vice-related activity. This Section has investigative, enforcement, and intelligence gathering responsibilities, as well as the responsibility of conducting other investigations deemed appropriate by the Chief of Police.

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OPERATIONS BUREAU

The Administrative Unit is responsible for providing the day-to-day administrative supply support services necessary for the effective and successful narcotics and firearms suppression operations for SIS. This unit is also responsible for case/investigation coordination, asset forfeiture, and maintenance of the confidential informant files, expense system, training, and the fleet vehicles.

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OPERATIONS BUREAU

The Narcotics Unit, which includes the Community Response Team, Neighborhood Response Team, Street Narcotics Team, and Tactical Narcotics Teams is responsible for primary enforcement efforts at drug houses and open air markets. These enforcement teams address locations identified as having potential for violence, and therefore have an immediate impact on public safety and quality of life. Investigations by these teams have resulted in numerous search warrant/drug house arrests and dealer arrests.

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OPERATIONS BUREAU

The Intelligence Unit is responsible for the suppression of organized crime activities and conducting conspiracy investigations. These often complex investigations include traditional and non-traditional organized crime, organized prostitution, pornography, and criminal subversive group activities. The Intelligence Unit is also responsible for the gathering of criminal intelligence information and dignitary protection.

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OPERATIONS BUREAU

The Firearms Suppression Unit (FSU) is a multi-agency task force which. It is comprised of the Rochester Police Department; the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms; and the New York State Police. The FSU conducts activities including “Project Exile”, weapon tracking investigations, weapon crime intelligence, and firearm trafficking investigations. Member agencies work in close cooperation with the Monroe County District Attorney’s Office and the United States Attorney’s Office to investigate and prosecute state and federal firearm offenses.

OPERATIONS BUREAU

The Violent Crime Team, under the supervision of the Firearms Suppression Unit Sergeant, works with the U.S. Attorney's office, but coordinates with the Monroe County District Attorney's Office on cases being investigated. This team works very close with the Major Crimes Unit, Firearms Suppression Unit and GRANET. They have distinguished themselves as a very important element to arresting and prosecuting violent criminals in our community.

(GRANET) is a collaborative effort of local law enforcement agencies whose mission is to achieve maximum coordination and cooperation, and bring to being the combined resources of member agencies to primarily investigate mid and upper level narcotic and marijuana related offenses in the Greater Rochester/Monroe County area.

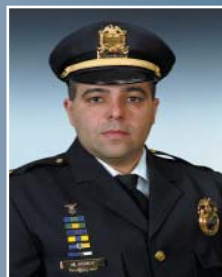

Accreditation ensures that law enforcement agencies provide progressive, customer-focused services and meet the highest professional standards.

The Rochester Police Department received national recognition upon accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA) in 1987 and the New York State Bureau of Municipal Police in 1990.



Under both programs, these accrediting agencies rigorously review Department practices for compliance with recognized and accepted law enforcement standards.

Accreditation is granted for three years by CALEA and for five years by New York State. During these periods, the agency must comply with all applicable standards. A report is submitted annually to each accrediting body, attesting to continued compliance. At the end of each accreditation period, the agency undergoes a thorough on-site assessment to verify compliance for its re-accreditation.

As a leading law enforcement agency, members of the Rochester Police Department are proud of the high quality of service for which they have been recognized, and continue to pursue excellence in law enforcement.

The Firearms Training Unit is responsible for all aspects of firearms training, repair, deployment and training and evaluation for the Department. The unit is also a resource for all other police departments in the county and surrounding regions, including state, federal and military agencies.

The unit maintains an inventory of all Department weapons and ammunition, including specialized weapons, gas launchers, bean bag guns and related support equipment. Staff members conduct all repairs on weapons except for the most complex.

All firearms related training is conducted in the 16 position indoor range or the 21 position outdoor range. The indoor range targets have the capability of turning 180 degrees with a maximum distance of 25 yards.

Recruitment Unit

The human resources of any organization are usually its key ingredient for success. Employees provide the services, operate the technology, and manage resources and other employees. Employees are also the most unpredictable resources and often incur the greatest costs. These circumstances make the recruitment and selection of the right employee a matter of fundamental importance.

Recruitment is particularly important for the Rochester Police Department. In order to function properly, police services need to maintain high levels of trust and cooperation with other governmental agencies and with the citizens of Rochester. The selection of the right people as police officers is essential if public confidence in the integrity and effectiveness of the police services are to be established and maintained.

The RPD's recruiting website averaged 45 hits per day, and the Unit sent over 2,000 e-mail responses and 750 U.S. mail responses (including brochures) to inquiries received. The Unit answered questions regarding the Department and employment with RPD to an average of 150 people per month via telephone and in-person visits.

POLICE RECRUIT EDUCATION PROJECT (PREP)

PREP was designed to supplement the goals and objectives of the Recruitment Unit, as well as the Call Reduction Unit. PREP offers a holistic approach in preparing full-time, Law and Criminal Justice college students for the Hiring Process of the Rochester Police Department. Potential candidates will be subjected to preliminary criteria for project eligibility and acceptance. Once accepted, PREP will provide an environment of academic excellence and encouragement to assist students in completing their post-secondary degree. PREP will also provide expert instruction from experienced police personnel through "Weekly Forums". Students will receive practical experience through a paid internship working for the Call Reduction Center as a Public Safety Aide; job shadowing through the Mentorship Program; and an invitation to attend pre-test workshops prior to taking the Civil Service test and Physical Fitness Test.

In conclusion, the PREP program provides a pool of viable candidates, both minority and majority, in an effort to meet the standards and decree of RPD.

The Background Unit is responsible for all pre-employment background investigations on sworn police officer candidates and non-sworn civilian applicants. These include Public Safety Aides, FACIT, Animal Control, Technical Services Section personnel, Auto Pound and Parking Monitor positions.

The Background Unit consists of one full-time Sergeant and two officers. Five officers were temporarily assigned from various sections of the Department to conduct background investigations. Officers on light-duty status were also assigned to the unit.

The background investigation is a long, tedious process that ensures that only acceptable candidates are hired into the ranks of the Rochester Police Department. The average background currently takes 40 hours to complete for each candidate.

The Police Artist is responsible for both graphic and forensic duties for the Department. Graphic design projects include concepting and executing promotional and printed materials, designing the annual report and other multimedia projects for the Department.

Forensic requests include composite sketches from witness descriptions, postmortem sketches, digitally enhanced photo-line-ups, and forensic video analysis. Working with the Monroe County Medical Examiner's Office, the artist completes postmortem facial reconstructions from skeletal remains, leading to the identification of individuals. As the only known forensic artist in the region, the Department's forensic artist's variety of services are frequently requested by surrounding police agencies. Demonstrations of forensic art are also presented to In-services for both the Department and surrounding agencies.

The Victim Assistance Unit, which is responsible for ensuring compliance with NYS fair treatment standards for crime victims and witnesses and all provisions of law regarding crime victim compensation and services, as well as recontacting the victim/witness, as needed, and periodically determining whether needs are being met. It is also responsible for providing domestic incident follow-ups, enhancing the probability of successful prosecution by providing services upon the arrest and post-arrest processing of a suspect and by explaining to the victim/witness their role in court proceedings, assisting in scheduling lineups, interviews, and other required appearances at the convenience of the victim/witness and, if feasible, provide transportation to court. It is further responsible for assigning a victim advocate, if available, to the victim/witness during the follow-up investigation and assist in the return of victim/witness property taken as evidence, where permitted by law of rules of evidence.

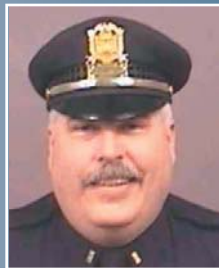

Animal Services is responsible for impounding unleashed dogs, unwanted and abandoned pets, and animals that have bitten or scratched a person. The unit enforces all local and state animal control ordinances including leash law, barking ordinance, number of dogs allowed per household, rabies quarantines, dangerous dog law, and dog licensing. Animal Service Officers assist Police Officers in the execution of warrants and work to ensure officer safety when animals are involved.

The unit also operates a shelter for temporarily housing stray, injured, surrendered, or menacing animals. The shelter serves both as an adoption center and as a lost and found facility. Animal Care Technicians maintain the shelter and the animals and assist citizens with finding missing pets or new companions. Animal Services offers outreach programs such as Dog Obedience classes, Pet First Aid, Dog Bite Prevention, and Responsible Pet Guardianship. The unit also has an active volunteer program that is essential to the maintenance of care for the animals. 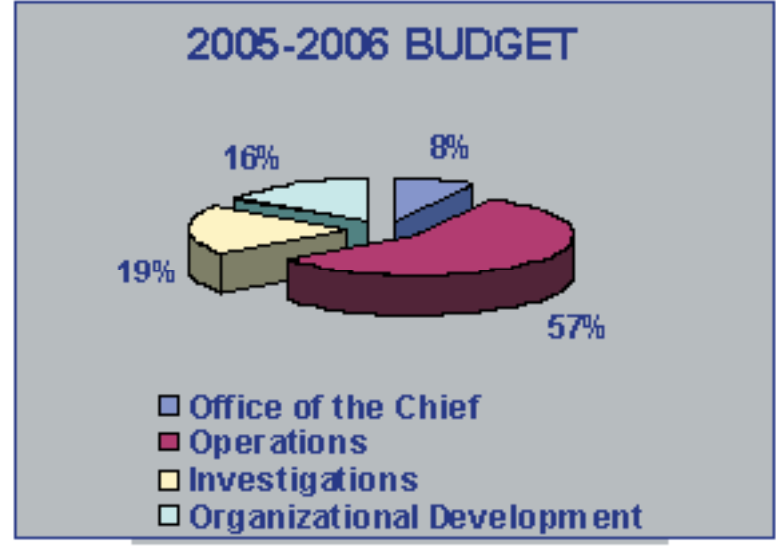
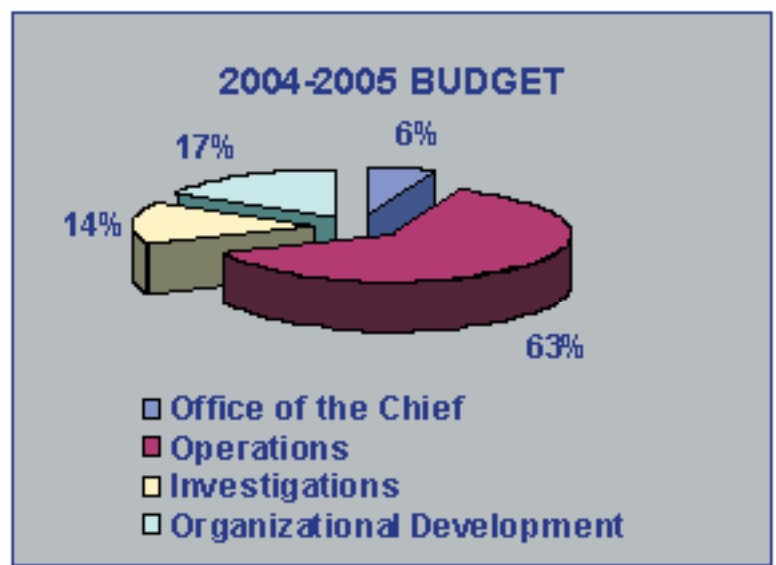

Part I and Part II Offenses are defined in accordance with the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, a cooperative statistical effort of more than 17,000 city, county, and state law enforcement agencies. Administered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation since 1930, the Program's primary purpose is to generate reliable statistics for use in law enforcement administration and operation. The data, which has become one of the leading social indicators of our nation, is reported by the Rochester Police Department to the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services, and is forwarded to the FBI.

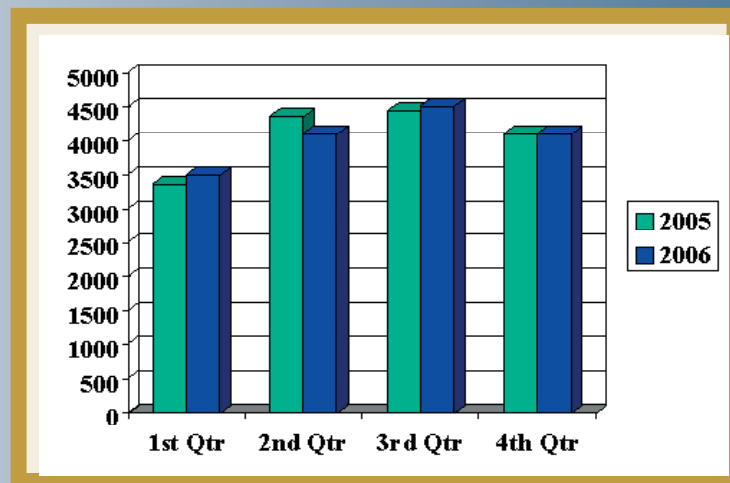

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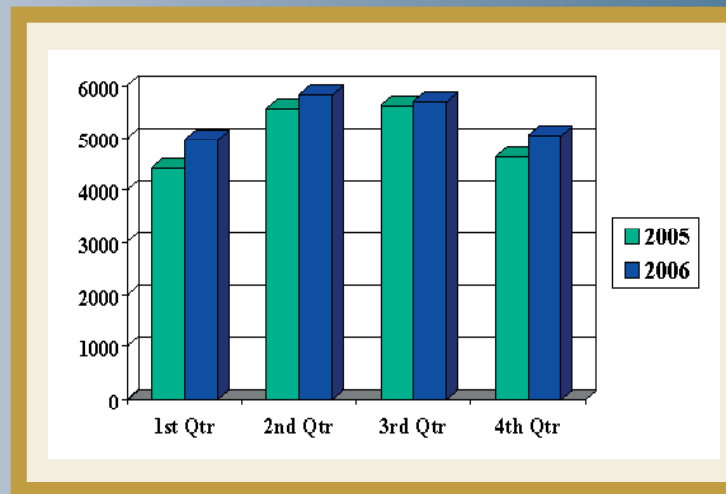

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CALLS FOR SERVICE

The Rochester Police Department tracks all services to the community by “calls for service”, “police responses”, and “self-initiated activities”. “Calls for service” are 911 calls dispatched by the Emergency Communications Department (ECD). A “police response” occurs each time an additional unit provides service at a given scene. As one call for service may result in multiple units in response, the number of responses is likely to be greater than the number of calls for service. “Self-initiated activity” is an event the officer comes across on the beat or initiates. In 2006, the number of calls for service increased 2.3% by 9,310 calls, and the number of responses by units increased 5.8% by 38,984 responses.

ECD assigns each specific incident a Crime Report number. The “CR” number is a unique number assigned to each event by which all reports, tickets, arrests, etc. can be traced. In the event that there is a need to refer back to a given incident, searches can be conducted by entry of the CR number, as well as the date or location of the incident. These retrievals are performed in the RPD Police Activity Tracking System (PATS), an in-house computer application that maintains data on all RPD activity and responses transferred from ECD to the RPD Informations Systems Unit.

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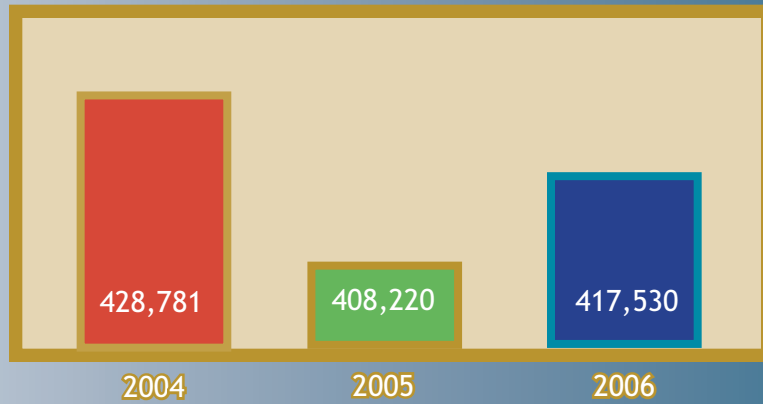
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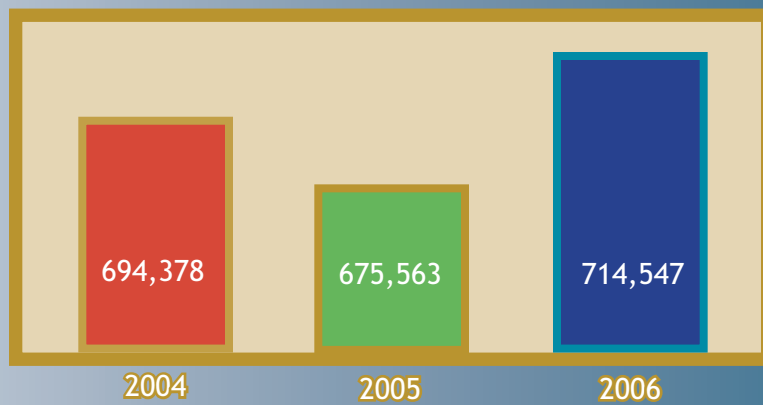
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RESPONSES BY UNIT



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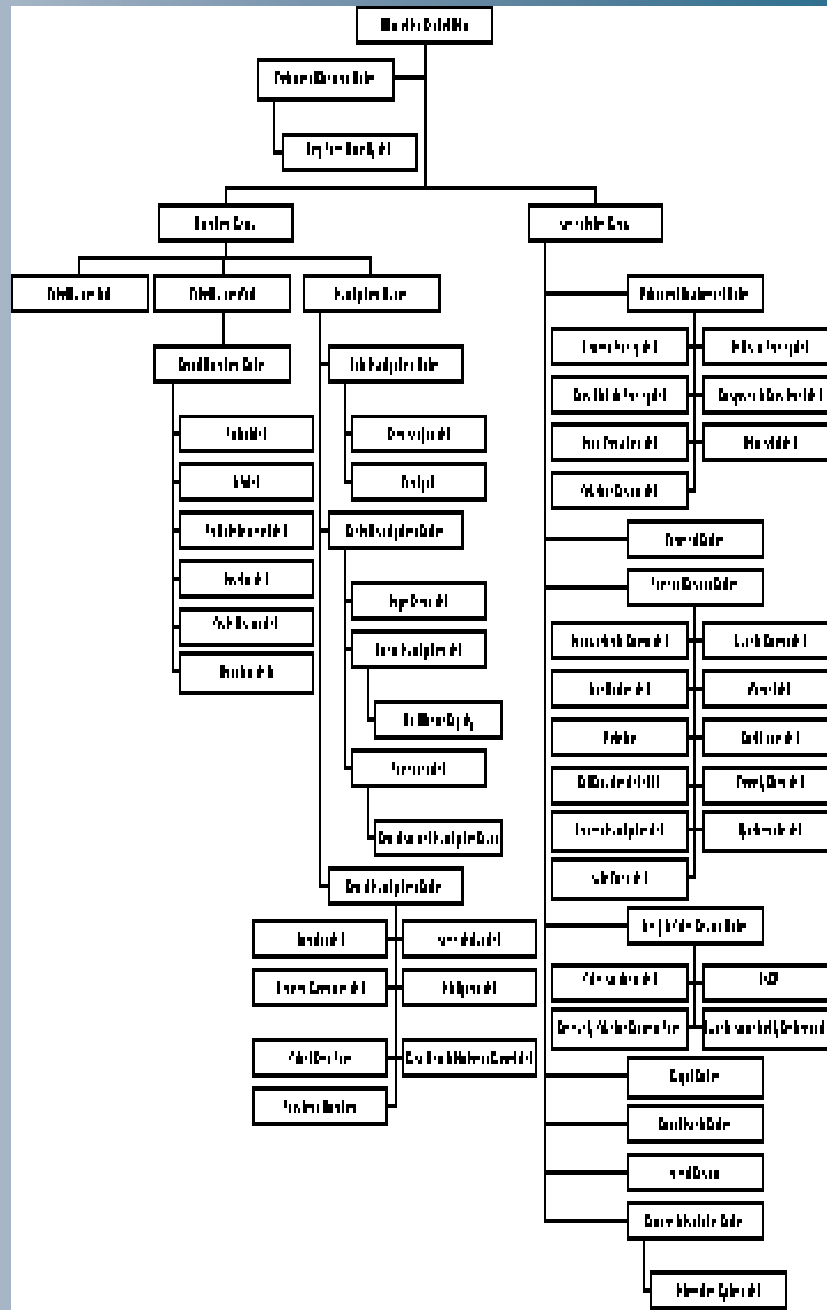
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VIOLENCE ENFORCEMENT AND SUPPRESSION TEAM (VEST)

The Rochester Police Department created a new initiative that would target Rochester's most violent criminal offenders who have committed Robbery, Rape, Serious Assaults, Weapons Possession, or Murder. A strong message is communicated to these offenders that they are being watched closely. Intervention services are offered to help them avoid further criminal activity. The Rochester Police Department, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Drug Enforcement Agency, United States Attorney's Office, New York State Police, New York State Parole, and the Monroe County District Attorney's office are represented in this effort. They will work closely with Monroe County Probation, Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms, United States Marshall's, and the Monroe county Sheriff's Office to continue a relentless attack on violent crime in the Rochester community.

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PARTNERSHIP WITH INTERFAITH ACTION

The RPD expanded our relationship with Interfaith Action and its member congregations to implement a comprehensive plan to address crime. This program presents an opportunity for uniform officers and our faith-based community to interact with our citizens together. This initiative involves foot patrol beats in challenged neighborhoods on both the east and west sides of the City.

SHOTSPOTTER ACTIVATION

Shotspotter is a gunshot location system designed to trace the sound of gunshots in an urban environment using microphones or remote sensors that can detect the sound

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of a gunshot and transmit them through telephone lines to a central computer system. The computer analyzes the acoustical data for gunshots and provides a precise location for police to respond. This program was activated in the City of Rochester and has allowed officers to have a quicker response to weapon related incidents, resulting in multiple arrests and preventing further violence.

CURFEW

A curfew program was developed for protecting the children in our community. Minors who were out after the curfew restriction were either taken home, to the care of another responsible adult, or transported to a designated facility for intervention. This program sent the message to minors to be safely home during these hours and to their parents to know where their children were.

WALKING WITH PRIDE

As a response to several violent incidents, the RPD deployed approximately sixty-four police officers and investigators from their regular assignments to the Tactical Unit for high visibility foot patrols. As a result of the efforts put forth by all the members that were temporarily transferred there was an 18.3% reduction in Part 1 crimes when compared to the same time frame in 2005.

GUN DROP PROGRAM

The RPD, along with the Clergy Response Team, sponsored three "No Questions Asked" Gun Drop off programs. Twenty-two guns, three knives, and two hundred, ninety rounds of ammunition were turned in.

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DEPARTMENT INFORMATION:

COMMISSION ON ACCREDITATION FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES (CALEA)

In August, the RPD participated in a thorough inspection by three CALEA assessors, observing all aspects of the department. The RPD complied with over four hundred national standards and received a Meritorious CALEA accreditation award. This was the sixth award presented to the Rochester Police Department for our high standards and work performance.

AUTOMATED EMERGENCY DEFIBULATOR (AED)

In a continued effort to provide immediate medical support to both our community and employees, the RPD installed eight defibrulators, one on each floor of the Public Safety Building and in the East and West Divisions.

EMOTIONAL DISTURBED PERSON RESPONSE TEAM (EDPRT)

EDPRT is specifically trained group of employees that respond to assist emotionally disturbed individuals in situations including suicidal persons, persons exhibiting irrational behavior, handling psychiatric patients, the homeless, and other various mental concerns.

COMMUNITY NARCOTICS ENFORCEMENT TEAM (C-NET)

C-NET is a collaborative effort between the Rochester Police Department and the New York State Police. The details employ the use of under cover officers provided by the NYS Police to address open-air drug markets within the City of Rochester.

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DEPARTMENT INFORMATION:

GREATER ROCHESTER AREA NARCOTICS ENFORCEMENT TEAM

In May 2000, the Rochester Police Department's Special Investigations Section's Administrative Narcotics Unit and the Monroe County Narcotics Unit (MRNU) were merged to form the Metro Rochester Narcotics Unit (MRNU). In May 2000, MRNU merged with the Multi-Agency Drug Tasks Force, consisting of Police Agencies from Irondequoit, East Rochester, Fairport, Webster, Brighton, and the National Guard. This Unit is now called the Greater Rochester Area Narcotics Enforcement Team (GRANET). GRANET's Advisory Board consists of one town Police Chief, the RPD SIS Captain and the MCSO CID Captain. The mission of GRANET is to achieve maximum coordination and cooperation and bring to bear the combination resources of member agencies to primarily investigate mid-level and upper-level narcotics offenses in the greater Rochester area. This team is currently commanded by a RPD lieutenant and consists of members from Town and Village agencies, along with the Monroe County Sheriff's Office.

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PROJECT EXILE

Project Exile is a program run by the Firearms Suppression Unit in conjunction with the US Attorney's Office and Monroe County Crime Lab. The program concentrates on reviewing all weapons arrests in the Rochester area to determine whether the defendants would be prosecuted in federal court or state court. The decision depends upon which prosecution will result in a greater term of incarceration. When prosecuted federally the defendant is "exiled" from the community by mandatory incarceration in a facility far removed from their home. Project Exile is not solely an enforcement tool and has evolved into

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a community partnership with Partners Against Violence Everywhere (PAVE), a victims' anti-violence group. The group works in community education to make the wider community aware of Project Exile.

OPERATION NIGHTWATCH

Operation Nightwatch is a collaborative effort between the City of Rochester Police Department and the County of Monroe, Office of Probation and Community Corrections. The effort pairs RPD police officers with county probation officers and together they check for court ordered compliance for probationers that reside in the City. Over the past several years the City of Rochester has funded one Monroe County Probation Officer position in Operation Nightwatch through the use of grant funds earmarked for the city. The special emphasis of this program is on youth that are on probation and have an established curfew. Violators can be arrested at the scene of their violations.

PROJECT CEASEFIRE

Project Ceasefire was first developed as part of the Boston Gun Project in 1995-96. Its goal was to reduce gang related firearms violence and homicide with a coordinated law enforcement attack on specific offenders, coupled with an attempt to generate a strong deterrent to gang violence. Locally, ceasefire was tried prior to SACSI and then reintroduced as a strategy developed during the SACSI process. More recently as part of the Project Safe Neighborhood, the department has continued this program and this effort is currently in progress.

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DEPARTMENT INFORMATION:

FIREARMS SUPPRESSION/VIOLENT CRIME TEAM

The Firearms Suppression Unit (FSU) continues to be a part of the Greater Rochester Special Operations Group. FSU is partnered with the New York State Police, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco & Firearms (BATF) and the Bureau of Immigrations & Customs Enforcement. One mission is the tracing program, which traces the history of all firearms coming into the possession of RPD. This aids in the identification and investigation of persons trafficking firearms into the Rochester Area. FSU also conducts training for local law enforcement officers on federal/state gun laws, trafficking and carrier recognition. In addition, the Violent Crime Team works to target and investigate those known (violent) offenders with an extended history of criminal activity. Cases are frequently conspiracy cases and it's not uncommon that the charges are lodged for long-ago offenses that had not yet been prosecuted.

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IMPACT

IMPACT is a collaborative effort amongst the City of Rochester Police Department, the County of Monroe Child Protective Unit, the Monroe County Sheriffs Office and the Monroe County District Attorney's Office. This City/County team was established in 1996 and acts as a central point of contact to allow victims maximum availability to follow-up services. Three investigators are assigned by the RPD to work with child Protective caseworkers to jointly interview child abuse victims. This joint interview decreases the trauma to the victim by reducing the number of interviews they have to give and it also permits a more

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consistent recount of the incident by the victims. The team utilizes the Bivona Child Advocacy Center, 275 Lake Avenue. The Center also provides medical exams and counseling services. Approximately 275 victims of child abuse are helped annual by this joint effort.

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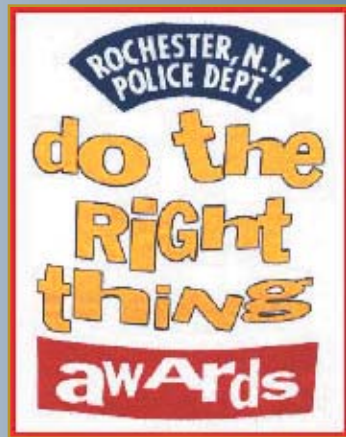
