

Ald. Howard, from the Committee to wait upon his honor, the Mayor, presented the following:

MESSAGE FROM HON. GEO. G. CLARKSON. MAYOR.

Io the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN—We this day enter upon another municipal year, and I avail myself of the occasion which it affords of presenting such facts and practical suggestions as may serve to awaken considerations as to the proper line of policy to be pursued in the faithful discharge of our public duties.

Our city has within the past year more than doubled its area, by Legislative enactment, and doubled its area, by Legislative enactment, and has by this extension added many thousands to its population. This, with its steady growth for a long series of years, has developed us into a city of first importance, having great interests to wisely foster and protect. To satisfy ourselves and the public is no easy task, as a little experience in public life score makes monifest. experience in public life seen makes manifest; for the faithful discharge of Aldermanic duties requires careful thought, sound judgment and great labor and sacrifice of time, especially in some of the prominent committees. best we may, there are always some in every community who cast unjust reflections on mo-tives, traduce character on the slightest tives, traduce character on the slightest grounds and think it next to impossible that a public servant can conscientiously labor for the welfare of the people without fee or reward, as you are called upon to do.

I know of but one safe course to pursue in public life, and that is to act for the public as we would for ourselves. Governed by this rule, it is true, errors of judgment may be commit ted, but we should endeavor to maintain a selfrespect and a consciousness of integrity of purpose which will, in a great measure, disarm unjust criticism of its shafts. Indeed, just criticism on public acts is both desirable and salutary, and ought to be invited rather than repelled. The only question then, as I conceive, for public servants to ask is—"What is the right, just and wisest thing to do, under any and every circumstance which may arise?" To act responsively to this appeal requires independence of thought and action, as well as careful and calm consideration, and as far as possible a disregard of party trammels. To any one who stops to reflect at all, it must be obvious that the government of municipalities is mainly, if not altogether, a matter of business and not of politics; and whilst we cannot, probably, altogether avoid partisan feeling, our better judgment will dictate that the interests of the public cannot be subserved by any considerations other than those which arise from a sincere desire and effort to promote the prosperity and general welfare of the people.

CITY FINANCES.

So much has been lately said in relation to the debt of the city of Rochester that I deem it my duty to call special aftention to the subject, with the two-fold object—first, of remarking upon and correcting erroneous impressions;

and secondly, of presenting facts as they are.

The ease with which an excitement can be raised by misinformation and misrepresenta tion on a subject of great local interest is well known. The truth should always be told, and all avenues to it in the conducting of public affairs be open and free to all taxpayers. So far as I know, no public business is conducted in this city where any desired information cannot be freely obtained; and it is somewhat surprising that original sources of information are not sought, but instead, currency be given to wild and damaging rumors, very often destitute of truth, or having only the barest semblance of it. Sensationalism may serve its purpose for a time, but eventually the truth will prevail, and whatever the motive may be in the pursuit of any object, the weapons of truth alone in the end will be found the most powerfal and effective. In a late statement in a metropolitan journal we are told that on the 1st of January last \$2,400,000 had been expended on our water works, and: it is added." the work is not more than half done." This latter statement is a reckless assertion, wholly destitute of truth, as might easily have been ascertained, if truth was the object of the writer. Equally false is the impression intended so be conveyed by the following from the same source: The debt of the city has been increased to between \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000 on a total valuation of about \$13,000,000.

I should not deem these statements of sufficient importance to notice in a paper of this kind, were it not for the fact that their currency is calculated to injure the business interest and standing of the whole mercantile and manufacturing community of the city. Already the "news" is being copied into the journals of other cities, magnified to a round \$6,000,000, or, as it is further said, "about 50 per cent. of

our valuation."

I will now proceed to give the facts. debt of the city of Rochester to-day, as taken from the Treasurer's books, is \$4,993,186.13, from which is to be deducted \$263,688.13, payment of which is provided for, making the actual amount \$4,729,498.00. This sum includes the \$3,000,000 of Water Works bonds. As an offset to this indebtedness, the city owns property, real and personal, exclusive of the Water Works, worth in cash \$2,000,000. The assessed valuation of city property for the current year. as I am informed by the Assessors, whose labors are not yet completed, is expected to reach about \$65,000,000, \$6,000,000 of which is the estimate for the new wards, which, according to the stipulation of the act of incorporation, are assessable only on about \$1,600,000 of the city's debt.

It cannot be reasonably doubted that, when the water works are completed, the indebtedness of the city cannot exceed \$5,250,000, in-

cluding the accumulated interest which it has been proposed to fund. It will thus be seen that, if we take no account of the new wards, It will thus be seen and call the valuation \$69,000,000, the debt, placed at figures as above, will be 8½ per cent. on that amount. But we must still further consider that \$75,000,000 would, in reality, more nearly represent a reasonable valuation, and thus would reduce the percentage to 7 only.

With such showing, there can be no cause for excitement or special alarm for the credit of the city or its debts, when the facts become as well known as the merely rhetorical verbiage palmed off as such, now receiving a mo-

mentary currency.

The object in view in the above brief and plain statement has already been given; and whilst it may, or should, serve to reassure us of the perfectly sound condition of our financial standing, by a consideration of the basis on which it rests, it should not for a moment divert us from the policy of a rigid adherence to the strictest economy and prudence in the management of municipal affairs.

As a city, we are highly favored in regard to all the essential elements of prosperity and growth; and it is our duty to foster and encourage all prudent efforts designed or calculated to extend the area of her intercommunication and sources of trade and commerce. At the same time we must not forget that we have a duty to perform to the city itself, to make it attractive and desirable as a residence. perform these duries properly requires serious consideration and good judgment; an adaption of means to ends that will preserve that wise balance which will invite and not repel popula-

WATER WORKS.

So much has been said lately in regard to this important enterprise, that a portion of the public mind, I fear, is unduly excited, and to a considerable extent misled, by statements having little foundation in fact. I shall not, therefore, at this time, do more than allude to one or more facts, which do not seem to be in controversy, viz.: That the work, so far as finished, has been done in a substantial and workmanlike manner; and when completed, as designed, we shall have works of unsurpassed power and efficiency, both for fire protection and domestic uses. We are already experiencing the benefits of the former, and of the latter we are fully assured we shall have Hemlock Lake water flowing through our streets and houses before the close of the present year. That these works have not been built one year too soon is now, I think, clearly demonstrated and very generally admitted. Of the Holly Works, it may be said they have already fully justified the expenditure in the security and protection which they afford against the devouring and destructive element of fire, and in the reduced rates of insurance. It is generally felt, however, that these rates are yet much too high, and further reductions will have to be made to all to satisfy insurers.

RAILROADS.

The Rochester, Nunda and Pennsylvania, and State Line roads have not made that pro gress towards completion which we had hoped for and anticipated. Our citizens have a deep interest in both these enterprises, and cannot but wish them a speedy release from their temporary embarassments. Whilst we may conscientiously differ as to certain measures which have been adopted, and others proposed, in order to promote the mutual interests of the city and the roads, there is a very general agreement as to their great value to the interests and prosperity of the city; and I cannot but earnessly hope that before long we shall be all the adventages which their correlations. realize all the advantages which their completion promises.

EDUCATION.

I deem it of great importance that the interests of education shall be wisely fostered and promoted, and to that end I shall always use my best efforts, but, at the same time, endeavor to confine expenditures within reasonable limits. That there has been considerable mismanagement of the funds provided for this purpose in previous years, I think has been made apparent by the revelations developed during the past year; but there seems to be an evident desire at the present time to make such an economical use of funds as to bring the expenditures within the amount limited by the charter for the various purposes contemplated and designed. The Common Council having come to the relief of the School Board in order to extricate it from its financial embarrassments and enable it to commence the new fiscal year free from debt, I shall use all the power conferred on me by the charter to restrain expenditures to its requirements, for I am satisfied that, by a wise use of the funds allowed by that instrument, our educational interests can be faithfully and satisfactorily provided for.

I would suggest in this connection that economy can be nowhere more effectually secured than in the proper management of the Contingent Fund. Instead of having all expenditures coming under this head, charged to a general fund, it seems to me it would be a better plan to open a separate account with each school, and publish the several statements, so that the public may know to whom to bestow praise or censure for a wise or unwise use of public funds. A little more careful keeping of accounts on the part of the Board, so that expenditures could be accurately determined, seems to me quite desirable. In case this was done, it could scarcely happen that so many conflicting statements should be made of a single year's dis-

bursements.

On March 30th, 1874, the expenditures for the school year of 1873-74 were officially reported at \$262,652.07; in June they were reported at \$168,766.36; in September, \$183,766.36; and in the thirty-first annual report they were reported at \$188,306.66. Thus we have four different statements as to the expenditures of a single year; but whether the first or the last is to be considered as the official statement remains, perhaps, somewhat doubtful yet.

MISCELLANEOUS.

As it is not my intention to dwell at length on the many subjects which invite comment on the many subjects which have commented or consideration, I will refer you to the various annual reports of the committees, just presented to the Common Council, for full information as to the work accomplished and the manner in which responsible duties have been performed. Many of these reports are very interesting, and deserve careful study. I am glad to believe that the business of the city has, on the whole, been carefully and conscientiously conducted.

The Poor and Fire departments deserve special commendation for their wise, efficient

and economical management.

Of the Police department, I can only say at this time that it is in a very satisfactory and efficient condition; and it would be quite safe to reiterate the best words ever uttered in its favor. The quarters provided for it, and all the offices and business connected therewith in the new City Hall, are ample in accommodation, admirably well arranged, and give great satisfaction. The Board of Health has done much effective service and given much thought and attention to the various and important questions which arise in regard to sanitary measures, and the public weal. I trust you will, in the coming year, make the necessary appropriations, to enable this board to perform its salutary work.

In conclusion, gentlemen, allow me to express the hope that our united efforts, during the coming year, will be productive of such results as will meet our own self-approval and deserve the commendation of our fellow-citizens.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Ald. Brinker, from the Charter Amendment Committee, presented the following and moved its adoption by this Board:

N ACT to amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester," passed April eight, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, and the various acts amendatory thereof or relating to the city of Rochester.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as

SECTION 1. Sections six, seven, eight, ten eleven, twelve, thirteen, fourteen, fifteen and nineteen of an act passed May twenty, eighteen hundred and sevency-two, entitled "An act to amend the several acts in relation to the city of Rochester," are hereby repealed, and the office of "commissioner of public works of the city of Rochester" is hereby abolished, but said commissioners shall possess and execute the powers heretofore given them until the first day of June, eighteen hundred and seventyfive, and the repeal, by this section directed, shall take effect on that day.

§ 2. Section one hundred and fifty-five of an act entitled "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester," passed April eight, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, as heretofore amended,

is hereby amended so as to read as follows: § 155. The mayor of said city shall forthwith appoint, subject to approval or rejection by the common council, three electors and freeholders of such city, who shall constitute the executive board of the city of Rochester. They shall be appointed for one, two and three years respectively, and shall serve during such terms and until their successors are appointed and quali-The terms of such first commissioners shall begin on the first day of June, eighteen hundred and seventy-five. Their successors shall be appointed for a term of three years, or for the unexpired portion of any term whenever any vacancy occurs, and shall also hold office until their successors are appointed and qualified. Not more than two of such commissioners shall belong to the same political party. Each of such commissioners shall notify the mayor in writing of his acceptance of the office within five days after receiving written notice of his confirmation by the common council, and shall take the oath required of other city officers, and a failure to give such notice shall be deemed a refusal to serve. Any of said com-missioners may be removed by the mayor for official misconduct, but notice in writing shall be given any such commissioner of the charges made against him, and he shall have an opportunity of being heard in his defense. ary of said commissioners of said executive board shall be fixed by the common council, and paid by the city treasurer in the same man-

ner as the salaries of the officers elected by said common council. Such executive board shall to let all con-said city, except directed to be the power sole be made by tracts to by such as made, and shall superintend otherwise the execution of the same, and shall have the superintendence and control of all work or improvements ordered by the common council, and of letting the contracts therefor, and paying for the same. On or before the first day in June in each year said board shall present to the common council a statement of the money needed by it for the current fiscal year, specifying the purposes for which it shall be used. It shall be the duty of the common council to raise the sum so reported in the same manner with other general city taxes. Such expenses for the year ending June one, eighteen hun-dred and seventy-six, shall be paid from the fund raised, and to be raised, for the construc-tion and repair of streets, alleys, lanes and bridges, and for the use of the board of public works of said city, under the existing provisions of this act, and if they prove insufficient the treasurer of said city, with the consent of the mayor, is hereby authorized to borrow on the credit of said city a sum sufficient therefor, which shall be included in the general city tax for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-six. Said board shall have control of the construction, improvement, repair and cleaning of streets, alleys, avenues, sewers and bridges, except the bridges owned by the State of New York, for the repair of which, or any damages in any way arising from which the city shall not be liable, and shall have control of the expenditure of the funds therefor; but whenever the expense of any such work or improvement shall require to be defrayed by a local assessment, the common council of said city shall alone have power pass any ordinance therefor, subject the veto of the mayor, as hereinbefore provided, and in the manner and subject to the restrictions established by the charter of said city as hereby amended. A majority of said Executive Board shall constitute a quorum for any purpose. Said Board may employ such a sistance and establish such by-laws for its meetings and proceedings as it may see

§ 3. On said first day of June, 1875, said Executive Board shall assume control of all work contracts, moneys or matters begun or controlled by the Commissioners of Public Works of the city of Rochester, and which shall rightfully belong to said Executive Board, under the authority hereby granted. On said day all authority, rights and duties heretofore possessed by said Commissioners of Public Works, except such as are hereby conferred upon the Executive Board of said city, shall vest in and be thereafter exercised by the Common Council of said city, to be performed and possessed in the same manner, as near as may, as heretofore performed by said Commissioners, except as herein otherwise directed.

*8.4. No member of said Executive Board, nor any clerk or agent thereof, shall be directly or indirectly interested in any contract, work or business, or the sale of any article, the expense, price or consideration of which is to be paid from the city treasury, nor in the purchase of any property for or on account of the city, or which shall be sold by or on behalf of

said city. Any contract, sale or purchase in which any such person above named shall be interested shall be absolutely void. Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars or by imprisonment not exceeding one year, or both.

§ 5. Said executive board may appoint a superinten lent of streets, who shall hold office as its pleasure. The salary of such superintendent shall be fixed by the common council.

§ 6. Section sixty-one of said act last aforesaid is hereby amended so as to read as fol-

lows:

§ 61. It shall be the duty of the superintendent of streets to superintend, under the general direction of the executive board, all work to be done or performed or ordered, or required to be done or performed upon or in relation to any of the public streets, walks, bridges, sewers, or public pumps or reservoirs of said city.

§ 7. Section one-hundred and sixty-five of

§ 7. Section one-hundred and sixty-five of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 165. Before the common council shall determine to make any such public improvement they shall cause an estimate thereof to be made and shall, by an entry in the minutes, describe the portion or part of the city which they deem proper to be assessed for the expense of such improvement. They shall cause a notice to be published in one or more daily newspapers printed in the city of Rochester, for four days, and the city of Rochester for four days, and the city of Roc which notice shall specify such improvement, the estimated expense thereof, and the portion or part of the city to be assessed for such expense, and shall require all persons interested in the subject matter of such improvement to attend the said council at the time appointed in such notice. At the time appointed in such notice the said council shall proceed to hear the allegations of the owners and occupants, of houses and lots situate with in the portion or parts of the city so described as aforesaid, and after hearing the same shall make such further order in respect to such improvement as they shall deem proper. Said Executive Board is hereby directed to cause a notice to be published in one or more of the official papers of said city, at least ten days before the letting of any contract, for sealed proposals therefor, each to be accompanied by a bond signed by "t least two responsible sureties, conditioned that the persons making such bid, if it is accepted, will perform the work mentioned in such proposals and fulfill any contract that may be made with him; such bids shall be opened on the day named in such notice. Said Board may let any contract as it deems for the best interest of the taxpayers, but it shall publish all bids received by it and the persons to whom contracts are awarded. Neither the principal or sureties on any bid or bond shall have the right to withdraw or cancel the same until the Board shall have let the contract for which such bid is made, and the same shall have been duly exe-cuted. No contract shall be let for any improvement at a price greater than the estimate thereof made, as aforesaid.

§ 8. Wherever the words "Commissioners of Public Works" occur in the charter of the city of Rochester, they shall be struck out and the words "the Common Council" shall be in-

serted in the place thereof, except as herein otherwise provided.

\$9. Section one hundred and sixty-four of said act is hereby amended so as to read as fol-

§ 14. The Common Council shall not open or widen any street or alley, or make or ordain any work or improvement, the expense whereof is to be derrayed in whole or in part by a local assessment, except upon the petition of the majority of the owners of property to be assessed theretor, unless three-tourths of all the members elected to said Common Council vote therefor, after allegations have been heard. No improvement which shall be covered or secured by letters patent shall be adopted, except upon the petition of two-thirds of all the owners of property to be assessed therefor.

§ 10. Section eight of said act is hereby

amended so as to read as follows:

§ 8. The Common Council shall annually, or often as a vacancy exists in any of the offices in the first part of this section named, appoint by ballot one City Attorney, one City Cierk, one City Surveyor and one Overseer of the Poor, who shall hold their respective others for two years; one Chief Engineer, one or more Assistant Engineers, one Fire Marshal, one Scaler of Weights and Measures, one Cierk of Markets, not less than three nor more than seven persons, of whom the Mayor shall be one, to constitute a Board of Health, and one physician, to be the physician thereof, and so many Fire Wardens, and so many Pound Masters as it may deem and so many round masters as it may deem necessary, each of which said officers shall hold his office during the pleasure of the Common Council; also, one Commissioner of Mount Hope Cemetery, who shall hold his office for two years. The office of Comptroller of said city is abolished, and the Treasurer of said city is hereby authorized and directed to perform all the outles required of the Comptroller by said the auties required of the Comptroller by said act, except as one of the Superintendents of Mount Hope Cemetery, and except as herein otherwise provided; and said Treasurer shall give bonds in such sum as the Common Council may require for the faithful performance of the duties imposed by this act; and upon the passage of this act, the Comptroller is hereby required to deliver to said Treasurer all the money, books and papers in his possession or under his control by virtue of his office.

§ 11. Section eleven of said act is hereby

amended so as to read as follows:

§ 11. The city treasurer, assessor and over-seer of the poor may be each removed from office by the common council for official misconduct, or for the unfaithful or insufficient performance of the duties of his office; but notice of the charges against them, and an opportunity of being heard in their defense, shall first be given.

§ 12. Section one hundred and seventy-six of said act is hereby amended so as to read as fol-

lows:

\$ 176. Any person considering himself aggrieved by any part of such report may, within thirty days after the filing thereof, erve upon the mayor of said city a notice of appeal to the supreme court from the report and determination of said commissioners, and shall accompany such notice with a bond, executed to the said city, by two or more sureties, to be approved by the mayor of said city, or the county judge of Monroe county, in the penalty of one thousand dollars, conditioned for the diligent prosecution of said appeal, and for the payment of all costs and charges which may be incurred by the said city in resisting the same and defending the said report in case the same shall be confirmed. A copy of such notice shall also be served at the same time upon the county clerk of Monroe county.

§ 13. All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

§ 14. This act shall take effect immediately. Ald. Stone moved to amend by striking out all the words in section 10 after the words "during the pleasure of the Common Council." Carried.

Ald. A. H. Martin moved to amend by striking out the words "said Executive Board" in section 5 and substitute therefor "the Com-

make night hideous.

These parks are popular resorts for those who are in the carpet cleaning profession and it is highly delectable to the persons living opposite to have their dwellings perfumed by the dust of

The green, tender grass makes heroic efforts to emerge from its hard bed, but is promptly put down by the sturdy foot of some ball play-The visits of Policemen are like those of angels; at their approach the multitude melt away, again to return as soon as the brass buttons are out of sight.

CHAP. 45.

AN ACT to amend an act entitled "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester," passed April eighth, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, and the various acts amenda-

tory thereof.

Pessed March 9, 1875; three-fifth being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as

SECTION I. Section forty-one of an act ensection 1. Section forty-one of an act entitled "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester," passed April eighth, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, as heretore amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 41. The commissioners of public works of said city shall have power by ordinance to cause any mill race within said city to be covered with bridges or arches or otherwise, in the same manner that other public improvements are directed to be made and pursuant to the provisions of title seven of this act so far as the same are applicable. The expense of said improvement may be assessed wholly upon the owners or occupants of such mill race, or upon such other property as the said commissioners shall deem benefitted, or both, in the same manner as other assessments for local improve-The common council shall have power by ordinance or otherwise to cause any gaslight company in said city to lay its mains or gas-pipes in any of the public parks, streets, lanes or alleys within the limits of said city, upon making proper and just compensation therefor, and said company is hereby required upon such compensation being made to so extend said mains in pursuance of any ordinance duly passed by said common council, and the said common council may, in its discretion, assess the expenses of said extension upon the property benefitted thereby, wholly or on said city at large or both.

§ 2. Section forty-two of said act is hereby repealed.

§ 3. Section seventy-three of said act as heretofore amended is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 73. The city treasurer shall, by virtue of his office, be the chief fiscal officer of the corporation, and shall have the care and custody of all the funds and securities belonging to the sinking fund of said city. He shall also have the care and management of all the lands and real estate of said city by this act authorized to be sold for the increase of the said sinking fund.

§ 4. Section eighty-three of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 83. The overseer of the poor of the city of Rochester shall have power to administer to, and examine under oath, any person applying to him for relief; and false swearing during such examination shall be deemed willful perjury. He shall also have the same power to settle cases of bastardy, as now conferred upon the superintendent of the poor, and shall also

possess all the powers and authority of overseers of the poor in the towns of this State.

§ 5. Section one hundred and four of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 104. If at any such sale no bid to the amount of the tax thereon, and expenses of sale, shall be made for any such parcel of land, the same shall be struck off to the city, and the Treasurer shall make a memorandum of the fact, that the land was so struck off to the city, in a

book to be kept for that purpose. § 6. Section one hundred and seven of said act, as heretofore ameuded, is hereby amended

so as to read as follows:

§ 107. Any holder of any certificate of lands sold for city taxes or assessments, shall within one year after the expiration of the period of redemption provided for by the preceding section, caused to be served upon the owner of such lands a notice of such sale, signed by the person claiming such premises under such sale, or his agent, and specifying the amount of the tax or assessment and charges at the time of such sale, and the time for which such premises were bid off, and that the owner is required to redeem the same within thirty days, and any person making redemption after service of said notice, shall, within the time therein provided, pay the amount for which the land was soid, with the addition of fifteen per cent. per annum, into the city treasury, for the use of the person who shall hold said certificate.

§ 7. Section one hundred and eight of said act, as heretofore amended, is hereby amended

so as to read as follows:

§ 108. The notice required in the prededing section shall be served on the owner of such land if he live in Rochester, personally, or by leaving at his residence. If such owner does not live in Rochester, but has an agent living in said city, whose appointment is in writing and his name entered in a book, to be kept by the city clerk for that purpose, then such notice shall be served upon such agent, personally, or at his residence. If such non-resident owner does not have such agent, then such notice may be served on any tenant in possession of said premises, and a copy thereof shall also be sent by mail, addressed to such owner at his residence, if the same is known or can be ascertained by reasonable diligence, and if there be no tenant, service by mail as aforesaid shall be If there be no occupant, and the sufficient. residence of such owner is not known, and cannot be ascertained by reasonable diligence, or if the owner of such land be unknown, then such notice shall be served by publishing the same once a week, for six successive weeks, in at least two of the city papers authorized to publish corporation notices, and the cost of such advertisement shalt be added to the amount already accrued upon his certificate.

§ 8. Section three of an act passed March sixth, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, entitled "An act to amend an act entitled 'An act to amend and consolidate the sev. eral acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester,' passed April eighth, eighteen hundred and sixty-one," is hereby repealed, and section one hundred and nine of an act entitled "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the city of Rochester," passed April eighth, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, is hereby re-enacted and amend-ed so as to read as follows:

§ 109. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to deliver to the attorney of said city within one month after the expiration of two years from the time any lands have been sold for any tax or assessment, where the same has been struck off to said city, a list of all such lands, with the names of the owners and a description thereof, as the same is described on the sssessment roll, containing the tax for which the same is sold. It shall be the duty of the attorney to cause a notice to be served upon all owners of land so purchased by said city, in the same form and manner as specified in the two last preceding sections

§ 9. Section one hundred and ten of an act passed April eighth, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester," as heretofore amended, is hereby amended so as to read as

follows: § 110. Whenever any lands in said city shall have been sold for taxes and bid off to said city and notice to redeem shall have been served as provided in the last section, for more than thirty days, and such lands have not been redeemed as provided in sections one hundred and six and one hundred and seven of this act, the mayor of said city shall execute a certificate of the fact of such sale having been made and the lands struck off to the city, and that the same has not been redeemed, which certificate shall be acknowledged as deeds to be entitled to be recorded, and shall be recorded in Monroe county clerk's office. Such certificate, or the record thereof, or a copy of such record duly authenticated shall, in all courts and places, be prima facie evidence that the tax or assessment was legally imposed, of the regularity and legality of all proceedings prior to such sale and of such sale, and that notice has been duly given to redeem and that such lands have not been redeemed. Upon the recording of such certificate, the said city or its assigns shall acquire an absolute title to such lands in fee, with the right to immediate possession, and may enjoy and hold such lands free and clear from all claim or demand of any owner or claimant thereof, or any person having any lien thereon or interest therein, but the equity of redemption in such lands struck off to the city, shall only be barred as hereinafter provided. At any time after such certificate is executed the equity of redemption of all persons having any lien or interest in said lands may be foreclosed by an action to be brought by said city in any court having equity jurisdiction, in which action the same proceedings shall be had as nearly as may be, as on the foreclosure of mortgages and judgment of strict foreclosure or of foreclosure and sale, may be had therein as the court may direct. Whenever judgment of foreclosure and sale shall be ordered, any of the parties to such action may become the purchaser of such premises. The provisions of this section shall apply to all lands heretofore or hereafter struck off to said city.

§ 10. Section one hundred and twelve of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 112. Any judgment creditor or mortgagee having a lien on the premises sold for any tax or assessment under the provisions of this act may redeem the same within the same time and on the same terms as the owner thereof as here-inbefore prescribed. The right of any such The right of any such

judgment creditor or mortgagee to redeem such lands shall only be cut off by service of notice in the same manner as provided by sections one hundred and seven and one hundred and eight of this act, or where his equity of redemption is foreclosed as provided in section one hundred and ten of this act.

§ 11. Section one hundred and fifteen of said act as amended is hereby amended so as to read

as follows:

§ 115. An affidavit of the service of the notice required by the preceding sections of this title, in order to determine the time of redemption of such lands, specfying the time of such service, and taken before an officer authorised to take affidavits to be read in courts of record, shall be filed with the clerk of the city within ten days after such service, and the said affidavit shall be presumptive evidence of the facts contained therein.

§ 12. Section one hundred and sixteen of said act as heretofore amended is hereby amended so

as to read as follows:

§ 116. If the said lands so sold in the manner hereabove provided, shall not be redeemed within the time and in the manner in this title hereinbefore prescribed, the holder of such certificate, shall, at the expiration of such time, be entitled to a lease of said premises for the term for which the same were bid off, which term shall commence two years from the time of the sale of said lands; said lease to be given by the mayor, or other officer legally discharging the office of mayor, under the corporate seal of the said city, on production to him of a certificate of the city clerk, that an affidavit was filed as by the next preceding section, and a certificate of the city treasurer, that money has not been paid to redeem said lands, which lease, or the record thereof, or a duly certified copy of such record, shall be prima facie evidence in all the courts and places that such tax or assessment was legally imposed, and of the regularity and correctness of such sale and of all proceedings prior thereto, and that notice has been given to redeem, and that such lands have not been redeemed; and the said lessee, his heirs or assigns, shall have, hold and enjoy the said premises during the term for which the same were granted to him free and clear from all claim of any owner or occupant of the same, or of any person having any lien thereon or interest therein, but subject to any taxes or assessments that may be charged thereon, during the said term; and at the expiration of such term, such lessee, his heirs or assigns, may remove any building or fixtures that may have be been erected on the said pre-mises during the said term. But no lease or conveyance of such lands or any part thereof shall be executed by the mayor, or any person discharging the duties of the office of mayor, untill all city taxes and assessments upon such lands shall have been paid.

§ 13. Section one hundred and sixty-seven of said act, as heretofore amended, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

\$ 167. The commissioners of public works shall cause a copy of such resolution, together with a map of the street, alley, square, park, or other public improvement, to be made and filed in the office of the city clerk, showing, on such map, the lots, tracts and parcels of land which are deemed necessary to be taken, and the commencement and termination of the road, street, park or alley proposed to be laid out.

of Rochester is hereby authorized to raise the sum of eighty-three thousand dollars to pay teachers' wages, and the contingent expenses of schools, and the Board of Education of said city during the current fiscal year, in addition to the sum heretofore raised for such purposes. § 2. To obtain the sum so to be raised, the

said city of Rochester may borrow the same on its credit in the same manner as is provided by law in section eighty-five of the charter of said city for providing for deficiencies in the various funds of said city.

§ 3. Said sum of eighty-three thousand dol-lars shall be assessed and collected, together

with the other general city taxes for the next fiscal year, in addition to such other sums as the Common Council may vote, and the law shall allow to be raised for the purposes enum-erated in the first section of this act for said next fiscal year.

The commissioners, or a majorary or them, representing any municipal corporation within this State, holding the bonds of the Rochester and State Line Railway Company, in exchange for the bonds of such municipal corporation, pursuant to the provisions of chapter nine hundred and seven of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, entitled "An act to amend an act entitled 'An act to authorize the formation of railroad corporations and to regulate the same, passed April second, eighteen hundred and fifty, so as to permit municipal corporations to aid in the construction of railroads," passed May eighteen, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, and the several acts amendatory thereof, or supplementary thereto, are hereby authorized and empowered to exchange with said railway company its bonds so held by said commissioners for the second mortgage bonds of said company to an equal amount, whenever a guaranty is given by the directors of the Rochester and State Line Railway Company, to be approved by said Commissioners, or a majority of them, that said railroad shall be ready for operation by January first, eighteen hundred and seventy-seven.

At that part of the highway in SECTION 1 the town of Brighton, in the County of Monroe, commonly called the Culver road, lying within the following described boundaries, to wit: commencing at the intersection of the north line of University avenue, in the city of Rochester, with the east boundary line of said city (being the west line of said Culver road), thence easterly on a line in continuation of the north line of University avenue to the east line of said Culver road, thence southerly on the east line of said Culver road and in said line continued about one hundred and eighty rods to the south line of the highway known as East avenue, thence westerly along the southerly line of East avenue to the present easterly line of said city. thence northerly along the present easterly line of said city to the place of beginning is hereby added to and made a part of the city of Rochester, and the charter of said city is so amended as to include within the limits of said city all that part of the Culver road above described.

N ACT authorizing and empowering the Board of Public Works of the city of Rochester to construct a turn-table or swing bridge over the Genesee Valley Canal in West avenue in the city of Rochester.

Passed Feb. 16, 1875, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The Board of Public Works of the city of Rochester are hereby authorized to construct under the supervision of the Canal construct under the supervision of the Canal Commissioner in charge, a turn-table or swing bridge over the Genesee Valley Canal in West avenue in said city, in place of the bridge now over the canal at the point aforesaid, and the whole expense thereof shall be assessed and levied upon such portion of the real property within the said city, as shall be deemed by the said Board of Public Works to be benefitted thereby. The said assessment shall be made and proceeded with in all respects as in cases for other local imprisonments.

2. The said Board of Public Works are hereby authorized to use in such manner as they may deem proper to facilitate the con-struction of said bridge, so much of the materi-al in the abutments and superstructure of the old bridge, as shall, in their opinion, be necessary or expedient.

§ 3. So long as the said canal shall remain the property of the State, the said bridge so to

for the time being in charge, who shall appoint a person or persons necessary to turn or swing a person or persons necessary to turn or swing the said bridge during the season of navigation, and the salary of such person or persons so ap-pointed to turn or swing the same, snall be paid by the City of Rochester; and in case of the apardonment or sale of the said condithe abandonment or sale of the said canal, the said city shall thereupon become vested with all the rights now enjoyed by the State, so far as relates to the control and management of the said bridge so to be constructed; but all the expenses of erecting the said bridge shall be provided for and paid by the said city, except as the same may be provided for by the use or sale of the material composing the present bridge as hereinabove provided.

§ 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

SECTION 1. The Common Council of the city of Rochester is hereby authorized to cause to be submitted to the electors of the city of Rochester, qualified to vote at an election for charter officers, at the next charter election to be held in said city, the questions of whether it is expedient that the office of Commissioners of Public Works of the city of Rochester shall be continued, and whether it is expedient that said city should exchange the first mortgage bonds or stock of the Rochester and State Line Railway Company for the second mortgage bonds of said company.

§ 2. The Canal Commissioners, before prosecuting any work in pursuance of this act, shall require and receive a full and sufficient release, properly executed and acknowledged, and de-livered free of all expense to the State, of all claims for damages in consequence of said bridge or of the approaches or embankment of the same, as herein provided to be built; and also a good and sufficient license or permission to the State, duly and properly executed, acknowledged and delivered as aforesaid, to alter, raise, or change such bridge, approaches or embankment, wherever and whenever necessary (which necessity is to be determined by the Canal Commissioners), from all persons whose property, rights or interest may be affected by said bridge, approaches or embankment herein provided to be built. Addison Gardner, Henry Lampert, Oscar Craig, Michael Filon and Chauncey Perry, are hereby appointed Commissioners to investigate into the acts, accounts, proceedings and doings of the Board of Water Commissioners of the city of Rochester, who were appointed under and in pursuance of an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled "An act to supply the city of Kochester with pure and wholesome water," passed April twenty-second, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, and all acts amendatory and supplementary there-to, and also to investigate the acts, accounts, doings and proceedings of the Commissioners appointed under and in pursuance of an act of said Legislature, entitled "An act in relation to the erection of public buildings for the use of the city of Rochester," passed April twelve, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, and allacts amendatory and supplementary thereto.

And said Commissioners are hereby authorized to issue sub-poenas and require the attendance of witnesses before them for the purposes of examination as to the matters aforesaid, and in case of the failure or neglect of any witness duly subpensed as aforesaid to attend before such Commissioners, such Commissioners may apply to a Justice of the Supreme Court, or the County Judge of Monroe County for an attachment against such witness, and such Justice or County Judge may thereupon issue an attachment against such witness in the same manner as if the witness witness in the same manner as if the witness was duly subpcensed in an action pending in a court of record of this State, and any Sheriff of this State is hereby required to serve such attachment, if any shall be issued.

\$5. The Commissioners to be appointed as aforesaid shall issue all subpcense that shall be

required by any member of either of said Boards of Commissioners, so as aforesaid to be investigated, and the attendance of all witnesses who shall be duly subprenaed shall be compelled as hereinbefore provided. And all necessary disbursements connected therewith shall be paid as hereinster provided. hereinafter provided. And such witnesses so subprenaed shall be examined in the same manner as witnesses subpœnaed by the Commissioners to be appointed under this act. All examinations shall be public.

AN ACT in relation to the care, custody and management of the water-works of the city of Rochester, and to regulate the collection of water rents in said city.

Passed June 9, 1875; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York represented in Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:

Section 1. The board of water commission-SECTION 1. The board of water commissioners of the city of Rochester, or their successors in office, may enter upon any road, street, bridge, highway or public square in said city for the purpose of laying down pipes for the conveyance of water, or constructing, repairing, altering, maintaining or extending any portion of the water works of said city, and may for said purpose carry conduct and mainmay for said purpose, carry, conduct and maintain any aqueducts, pipes, or other work by them to be made, laid down or conducted over, under, through or across any water course, ca-nal, street, bridge, railroad, highway or pub-lic square, in such a manner as not to obstruct travel or the free use thereof, only so far as

may be necessary during actual construction or work, provided also, that such water course, canal, street, railroad, highway or public square so entered upon shall be restored by them

in as good order, and condition as before. § 2. It shall be the duty of the said water commissioners or their successors in office, and authority is hereby given them to fix and adjust from time to time, in an equitable manner the prices and rents, which shall be paid to said city for the use and consumption of water supplied by said water-works, and to collect and receive the amounts which shall become due for the same, and establish such needful regula-tions, as shall enable them to enforce collection of said water rents, if not paid when due, and, also, such other regulations as they may deem necessary for the management, maintenance or protection of said water-works, and to sue for and collect any and all penalties which may be imposed for violation of such regulations, provided that no penalty shall be imposed for any violation for an amount exceeding two hundred dollars. The proceeds of the water rents in whatsoever manner collected for the use and consumption of said water and all penalties collected fhall be deposited with the treasurer of nected than be deposited with the treasurer of said city and be reserved and used by him exclusively for payment of operating, expenses, salaries, repairs, maintenance or extension of said works, of the interest upon the water bonds issued for construction of said works or for issued for construction of said works or for further extension of the same, or for a sinking

further extension of the same, or for a sinking fund for payment of principal of said water bonds; but for no other purpose whatever.

§ 3. Any person who shall willfully do, or cause to be done, any act whereby any work, materials, or property whatsoever, erected or used by the city of Rochester, for or in connection with the water works of said city, shall be inventible as interest on what had be interested or ball direct done in the control of the city of Rochester. impaired or injured, or shall divert, draw down or dsminish the waters of Hemlock or Canadice lakes without authority of law, or shall in any way interrupt or prevent the flow of water through the water mains, pipes, or service of said works, or shall throw, deposit, place, cast, pass or cause to be passed, cast, placed, deposited or thrown into the waters of said Hemlock or Canadice lakes, or into any reservoir, conduit, aqueduct or pipe belonging to said works, any dead animal, odure or deleterious, offensive, filthy, impure or obstructing matter, thing or liquid, or who shall place any of said de-scribed matter, thing or liquid, so that the same may be washed, carried or flow into either of said lakes or any conduits, pipes, or aqeducts supplied with water therefrom shall be liable to prosecution for misdemeanor and on conviction shall be punished by fine of not exceeding two hundred dollars, or imprisonment of not ex-

ceeding one year, or both.

§ 4. Any person who shall, without consent of said water commissioners, their successors in office, or their authorized agents, tap, open, or connect with any water-pipe, or open any hydrant, valve or stop-cock connected with said water works, without said consent, or the consent of other properly authorized parties, or shall leave open any valve, faucet, stop-cock or other fluture for continuous flow of water and other figture for continuous flow of water, and through which there shall be continuous flow, beyond what may be necessary for actual use. or the purposes required in connection with or the purposes required in connection with such hydrant, valve, faucet, stop-cock other fixtures, shall be deemed guilty of a misde-meanor, and be, on conviction, punished by 17

fine of not exceeding two hundred dollars. § 5. It shall be the duty of said water commissioners or their successors in office, on or before the first day of May in each year to make and deliver to the assessors of said city a complete statement of each and all unpaid water rents, with a description of the lot, building or real estate, and the name of the owner thereof, where water has been used for which water rents are and remain due and unpaid. Whereupon the said water rents, and the amount thereof, together with ten per cent. interest from the date when they were due, shall become a lien and tax upon said lot, building or real estate, in the same manner as other city taxes, and shall be collected in the same manner as is or may be prescribed by law for the collection of taxes for city purposes of the city of Rochester.

GENTLEMEN :- Immediately after the bill authorizing an exchange of bonds became a law, the directors of this company began the work of negotiating the proposed new issue of bonds. Parties who were familiar with the value of such securities made a personal inspection of the road, the progress of the work of construction, and the prospective business of the road when completed, and expressed entire satisfac-tion therewith. Several propositions have been made, one of which is deemed quite favorable to this company, but we have not been able to obtain a specific, positive offer, owing to the fact that the Common Council had not yet by formal resolution agreed to make the exchange when all the conditions contained in the act were complied with.

Indeed it has been difficult to enlist the ser-

vices of responsible and influential parties in an effort to place the new bonds, for the reason we could not give positive assurances that if a proposition satisfactory to this company was made, the bonds would be exchanged, and the new issue ready for delivery without delay. In transactions and negotiations of this character when the loan is subscribed for by responsible parties, the seller must be ready to deliver at once. If the bonds were in the hands of the City Treasurer, and that officer authorized to make the exchange whenever this company complied with the terms in the act referred to, we would in a great measure be relieved from the embarrassment referred to. The Commissioners of the several towns have given positive and satisfactory assurances that they will make the exchange whenever a satisfactory guaranty is given that the railway shall be ready for operation by January 1, 1877, and we respectfully ask your honorable body to pass a resolution to the effect only that whenever this company complies with the conditions imposed in the act referred to, the Treasurer be authorized to make the exchange.

We do not intend or propose to ask for the exchange until every condition of the law authorizing it is on our part complied with, but to enable us to make any satisfactory progress in our negotiations we ask to have the assurances above indicated given. The guaranty to be given is for the completion of the road, and we ought not to be asked to perfect that until cerebility to be asked to perfect that until cerebility to be asked to perfect that until cerebility to be asked tain that we can complete it from the proceeds of the bonds, and we cannot negotiate the new issue until formal assurance is given by your Honorable Body that whenever we do comply with the law the exchange will be made.

We desire to resume work on the road at the earliest possible day and we need not urge the importance and necessity of immediate action by you in this matter.

A delay now is encouraging to rival enterprises and may be fatal to tais.

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: In the matter of the construction of what is known as the "North avenue outlet sewer," the Commissioners appointed by the court for that purpose made their final report to the Court on the 31st day of August, 1874, in which was set forth the cost of construc-tion including all disbursements, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of thirty-five thousand dollars, seven thousand dollars of which was by them assessed upon individuals or property deemed to be benefited thereby and located outside of the city limits as they existed at the time of the commencement of the proceedings. On the 7th day of September, 1874, the Commissioners in the above matter, as required, served proper notice upon the Mayor of the amount directed by them to be assessed on houses and lands within the city of Rochester. according as the Common Council should deem the same to be benefited thereby and by ordinance so declare, which amount was twentyeight thousand dollars. By the act authorizing the drainage and appointing the Commissions, for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction the Commissioners were authorized to issue bonds from time to time as required, which bonds were by them duly issued and were outstanding at the the time of said notice to the Mayor.

The basis of the report of the Commissioners

was made upon the supposed early payment from and by the city of the said twenty-eight thousand dollars, but contrary to their expectation there has been long delay in the passage of an ordinance by the Common Council as required by law and long delay in payment to the Commissioners of the amount of said bonds, thus subjecting the Commissioners to individual loss by way of interest on the bonds to the amount of eight hundred and sixteen dollars and 66-100 dollars being for five months.

Added to this is the loss to which the Commissioners are subjected by reason of your honorable body finally directing payment to them in the form of time orders which they were compelled to get discounted at a total discount of one hundred and seventy-eight 50-100 dollars.

The undersigned therefore ask for an appropriation of \$995.16 payable to them to cover actual loss sustained by us.

AN ACT in relation to the justices of the peace in the towns of Gates, Greece and Irondequoit, in Monroe county, who reside in that part of said towns added to the city of Roch-

SECTION 1. All the proceedings and official acts of Anthony H. Martin and David Marshall, who were elected justices of the peace for the town of Gates, Harrie A. Olmstead, who was elected justice of the peace for the town of Greece, and John Smyles, who was elected justice of the peace for the town of Irondequoit, in Monroe county, are hereby ratified and confirmed from the nineteenth day of May, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, on which day they were taken into the corporate limits of the city of Rochester by the act extending the same and known as chapter four hundred and eighty-two of the laws of eighteen hundred and

seventy-four. § 2. The said justices of the said towns are hereby authorized to continue to act as such justices with the same effect as if the extension of the city limits of Rochester had not taken place, and to hold their courts, during the term for which they have been elected, in the said portions of said towns taken to extend the limits of the city of Rochester, with the same effect as if chapter four hundred and eighty-two of the laws of the State of New York for eighteen hundred and seventy-four had not

taken effect.

§ 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as

Section 1. Section six of chapter three hundred and eighty-seven of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-two, entitled "An act to supply the city of Rochester with pure and wholesome water," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 6. The common council of said city is hereby authorized to issue the bonds of said city at a rate of interest not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, payable in not more than thirty years, in such form and executed in such manner as said common council shall direct to an amount equal to the interest which has accrued and shall accrue upon the bonds authorized to be issued by this act prior to and until the time

of the completion of the system of waterworks hereby authorized, provided, however, that no bonds shall be issued for the payment of any interest which shall accrue on such bonds subsequent to the year eighteen hundred and seventy-six. Such bonds may be sold at not less than par, and the proceeds shall be used solely to pay the interest accruing on such bonds as above specified. The common council is hereby authorized and directed to raise, from time to time, by tax, upon the estates, real and personal, subject to tax in said city the sum or sums which may be required to pay the interest on the bonds hereby authorized to be issued, except as herein otherwise provided and to redeem them at maturity. The common council of said city is hereby authorized, if in its opinion it shall be deemed necessary for the completion of the water works for said city to direct the issue of the bonds of said city in the manner heretofore prescribed by law, at a rate of interest not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, payable in not more than thirty years from date thereof, but the amount of such bonds shall not exceed in the aggregate the sum of one hundred and eighty-two thousand dollars, and such bonds shall not be sold at less than par. The common council of said city is hereby authorized and directed to raise from time to time by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to tax in said city, the sum or sums which may be required to pay the interest on the bonds hereby authorized to be issued and to redeem them at maturity.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

It is also impracticable to make a table and have it printed upon the bill, as it would take much more room than there is on a bill.

A table for the several rates on \$100 would not be reliable, as the decimals would be so small that you could not make a different rate on two funds varying less than \$5,000.

By Ald. Parsons: The financial condition of our city is at present anything but a satisfactory one for contemplation. No one will deny, however, the fact that our city is growing rapidly in wealth and population, and that we should thus continue must be the hope and desire of every good citizan and avery benerable many cheefel he zen, and every honorable means should be employed to bring about so desirable a result. Becoming retrenchment should be practiced whenever possible, and while minds and men will always differ as to the course to be pursued, it needs careful judgment and honesty of purpose to accomplish all the people have a right to ex-

Our system of water works is a good one, our fire department exceeded in efficiency by none, and our people and their property have and will have ample and sufficient protection against the action of fire. Rochester has been singularly fortunate in this respect, and the records show that while her people have annually been paying nearly or quite \$400,000 in fire insurance premiums, the losses for a number of years were but about one-quarter of that amount, and for the last year, since our water works have been completed, was but \$75,000.

The great discrepancy between the amount paid on the one hand and the loss sustained on the other, has, as a matter of course, gone into the hands of insurance agents, and the compa-nies they represent, while the people have reaped no direct advantages whatever.

That this thing should be changed in some way seems obvious and necessary, and if so large an amount could annually be saved to the credit of the city it would not take many years to wipe out all the indebtedness, both bonded and other wise.

Taking this view of the case, why not investigate the matter carefully, to the end that some plan may be matured which will bring the desired relief?

In this connection a cautiously devised system of fire insurance has for a long time been maturing in the mind of our well-known citizen, Thomas Hawks.

Its objects and the end to be attained by its adoption strike us most forcibly as something which the people of Rochester will most heart-

ily approve.

NORTH AVENUE OUTLET SEWER.

To the Hon, the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen: Your committee, to whom was referred the communication of the Commissioners for the construction of the North avenue outlet sewer, would respectfully report that they find the facts set forth in the communication to be true.

They further find that in thirty days from the time the Commissioners made their report to the Mayor, the amount to be paid by residents of the city, whose property was benefited became due, under the terms of the law; that the delay in the passage of the ordinance subjected the Commissioners to loss by reason of added interest on outstanding bonds, as set forth in their communication; that the ordinance passed by the Common Council, while it was beneficial to the persons assessed, was still not according to provisions of the statute. The Common Council derived its power and authority to pass an ordinance for the assessment not from the city charter, but from the general statutes and a special act of the Legislature, in neither of which was there any provision for the payment of the assessment in installments.

Your committee further find that this ordinance having been based upon an improvement not in the then city, and not rightly under the provisions of the city charter, the amount due to and claimed by the Commissioners cannot be reassessed upon the property benefited, and, therefore, becomes a charge upon the city at large.

Your committee would, therefore recommend the passage of the following resolution:
Resolved, That the City Clerk be and is hereby directed to draw an order on the City Treasurer for \$995.16, payable to the order of Thomas J. Jeffords, Treasurer of said Com-

mission, and charge the same to the Contingent Fund.

CHAPTER IV.

IN COMMON COUNCIL.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO RAILROADS.

Passed February 17, 1863.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain and determine as follows:

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain and determine as follows:

SECTION 1. No railroad company or any other person shall direct, cause or suffer any engine, railroad car, or train of cars, to be driven, drawn or propelled upon any railway in sa.d. city, west of North street, and east of Brown street, on the road leading to Batav.a, and east of Jay street, on the road leading to Ratav.a, and east of Jay street, on the road leading to Niagara. Falls, at any greater speed than eight miles per hour, under a penalty of one hundred and fifty dollars for each offence.

§2. No whistle connected with any railway engine shall be sounded or used within the city limits, except as a signal to apply the brakes in cases of immediate and impending danger, under a penalty of one hundred and fifty dollars for each offence.

§3. No railroad company or any person in its employ shall use or occupy any portion of any street, lane, alley, or square, within said city, for the purpose of making up a train of cars, or switching off or switching on any car or ears, or shall in any manner obstruct any street, square or alley, under a penalty of one hundred and fifty dollars for each offence.

§4. No railway company, or any person in its employ shall use any portion of any street, lane, alley or square, for the purpose, or during the process of loading on unloading any car, under a penalty of one hundred and fifty dollars for each offence.

§5. No railway company, or any person in its employ shall leave or station any car used for the transportation of horses, cattle or other animals, within the limita of said city, or direct, cause or suffer the same to be done, unless such car shall be thoroughy cleansed, under a penalty of one hundred and iffty dollars.

§6. Every ordinance of this board in conflict with this ordinance, is heveby repealed.

§7. No person, unless an employee or passenger on any car of such railroad company, while passing through the city limits, shall get on or off such car, while in motion, under a pena

each offence.

§8. Every execution issued upon a judgment recovered for a violation of the preceding sections, shall command the amount to be made of the property of the defendant, if any such can be found; and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe county penitentiary for a period of ten days.

To the Officers and Directors of the Rochester, Nunda, and Pennsylvania Railroad Company:

Gentlemen:—The tax payers of the town of Nunda have invested the sum of \$75,000 in the stock of the railroad under your control, to aid in its construction.

You have called a meeting of the stockholders for July 27th, for the purpose, among other things, of electing a Board of Directors to manage the affairs of the company for another year.

Your Board and its predecessors have received from the towns of Angelica, Birdsell, Nunda, Mt. Morris, York, and from the city of Rochester, a sum exceeding one-half a million of dollars. The company has been in operation over five years and yet up to this time no full report has ever been submitted to the stockholders of the transactions of the Board of Di-We are advised that you have issued rectors. first mortgage bonds in vast amounts upon the railroad partly constructed with the stockholders' money, and for a long time have been en-deavoring to dispose of these bonds in the mon-ey markets of Europe, but without success. We see the road partly constructed and partly ironed lying idle, and we cannot learn what is to be done with it.

From time to time statements are made as to what you are doing, what you propose, and what the prospects are. In nearly every instance these statements have proved to be nothing more than idle gossip or reports set to quiet an anxious and interested people.

Under these circumstances the tax-payers of Nunda, as one of the largest stockholders of this roilroad, respectfully insist that they have a right to know what their servants have been doing with their property, and they demand a report of the operations of the company in order to enable them to act intelligently at the meeting on the 27th mst. We demand nothing more than is usual, and nothing more than is contained in the annual report of every well managed company organized for any purpose. But in order that there shall be no mistake about the matters in regard to which we desire specific information, we will submit some of them, and ask you to make the report we desire on or before July 26th, and that it may be full

as to the following points, viz.:
First—How much money and from what sources realized has been received by your com-

pany? Second—How has such money been expended? An answer to this inquiry detailing each item is not expected, but only the objects for which it has been paid out may appear, and particularly to show what portion has been expended for the construction of the road, and what for other purposes and for what other purposes. Nevertheless, if desired, the stockholders should have the privilege and oppor-tunity of examining the books of the company as to details.

Third—What is the present indebtedness of the railroad company, and to what parties are such liabilities due or owing, and for what was

the same incurred?

Fourth—Has any settlement been had with the Messrs. A. L. Dolby & Co., the contractors and has any portion of the road constructed by them ever been accepted by you, and if so what portion!

Fifth-How much has been yaid to the individual directors for their services and expenses, respectively, add how has the same been paid?

If the railroad company is indebted to the directors or any of them, which of them and to what sum, and for what was this liability incurred?

Is there any compensation for the duties of directors, and if so who fixed it when is was

uxed, and the amount thereof?

Sixth-How many first mortgage bonds have been issued by the company, and what disposi-tion has been made of them? State particularly whesher any part, and if so, what portion of these bonds are in the hands of other parties and out of the control of the railroad company, also in whose hands and on what account?

Seventh-State whether the directors or any part of them and which of them have involved themseves individually for the railroad company, and if so, in what sum, and how much has been paid, and how much remains unpaid and

its conditions, &c.

State what security the directors have for these loan advances or liabilities assumed, and particularly whether they hold any of the first mortgage bonds of the company as collateral security, and if so, what amount.

Eighth—What has been done by way of ne-

gotiating these first mortgage bonds, and what expenses have been incurred thereon, and what the prospects of an ultimate sale are, if any.
Ninth—State how much stock has been issued

and to whom; include the amount, if any, is-

sued to the directors and contractors, and the conditions for which the same were issued.

State whether there is anything in your agreement with the contractors which requires you to issue stock to them before their work or portions of it are accepted, and if there is no such clause, state the authority for issuing the same to them, and whether by settlement or otherwise it has ever been determined how much they were entitled to.

Tenth—State whether the directors have any plan or proposition to offer in regard to the future action of the stockholders, or any in regard to their plans and wishes, and generally

what they recommend or propose.

To the Railroad Commissioners of the Town of Angelica, Birdsall, Mt. Morris, York and Chili, and the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Rochester.

The tax-payers of the town of Nunda invite you to meet them at the village of Mt. Morris, in Livingston hall on the 26th day of July inst, at 1 o'clock p. m., to consider what our inter-est demand of us to do in reference to the Rochester, Nunda and Pensylvan'a railroad company. We also invite you to join us in demanding of the officers of said company a full report particularly as to the matters embraced in the address we have adopted, and which accompanies this invitation.

Ald. J. W. Martin, from the special committee on Rochester, Nunda & Pennsylvania Railroad, presented the following: To the Hon. the Common Council:

Gentlemen—Your committee, appointed at a special meeting of the Common Council to attend a meeting to be held in Mt. Morris, to

& Pennsylvania Railroad, would respectfully report: That while they do not feel justified in drawing any very favorable conclusions as to the present condition or its final completion, have deemed it best to report to this Board as full a statement of the proceedings of said meeting as possible under the circumstances.

There were present to represent said railroad C. L. Bingham, Esq., the treasurer; James Hill, Esq., contractor and director; also, Mr. Dow, a director.

The following questions were asked the di-

rectors:

1st-How much money and from what sources realized has been received by your

company?

Mr. Bingham then presented the report of the directors, made July 21, 1874. It shows that \$484,260 have been received, par value of town and city bonds. Since the date of that report the company has received from the city of Rochester \$50,000 in first mortgage bonds at one time, and the proceeds of \$50,000 bonds laid aside for them. That was all he knew had been received. Of the entire \$100,000 the com-

pany had receives \$95,000.

To the second query, "How has such money been expended?" Mr. Bingham said nothing had been paid out other than moneys needed in the construction of the road, that he knew of. The items paid contractors and others were read, making a grand total of \$484,157.

3d-What is the present indebtedness of the railroad company, and to what parties are such liabilities due or owing, and for what was the

same incurred?

The report appears to be silent as to Ans. the indebtedness of the company, except to contractor and engineer. The indebtedness to Directors for monies advanced, was \$53,500. There is another claim against the Directors of \$50,000, and one of \$10,000 to the Trust Company of New York.

4th-Has any settlement been had with Messrs. A. L. Dolby & Co., the contractors, and has any portion of the road constructed by them ever been accepted by you, and if so what por-

tion ?

A. No settlement has ever been made.

5th-How much has been paid to the individual Directors for their services and expenses respectively, and how has the same been paid?

If the railroad company is indebted to the Directors or any of them, which of them and to what sum, and for what was this liability in-

curred?

Is there any compensation for the duties of Directors, and if so who fixed it, when was it fixed and the amount thereof?

A. Up to the time of the report, one year ago, \$12,280. Not a shilling since. Not a cent of the money received from the city of Rochester has been paid to the directors. Some of it went for expenses incurred in Europe. There was no fixed compensation for directors. was always understood that they were entitled to compensation for liabilities incurred, in case the road proves a success. Since the date of the report, July 21, 1874, no director has been paid one cent. It is understood they are to receive pay when the road is completed. Not one of them expects to receive one-half the money he has advanced in securities or anything else. I cannot say that any salaries have been fixed for directors. No resolution has been passed consider the condition of the Rochester, Nunda for paying directors money or bonds. The company could not legally do that. Think salaries have been paid within the past 30 days. [Here Mr. Bingham virtually admitted that some arrangement had been entered into for the payment of directors, but said he could not speak for the corporation. He was not authorized to pass over to the meeting any of the papers in his possession.]

6th—How many first mortgage bonds have been issued by the company, and what disposition has been made of them? State particularly whether any part, and if so what portion of these bonds are in the hands of other parties and out of the control of the Railroad Company, also in whose hands and on what account?

A. The total issue of bonds is \$4,050,000—\$27,000 per mile. There have been paid to contractors \$329,000 for iron, &c. Do not recall any other bonds that have been issued.

7th—State whether the Directors or any part of them, have involved themselves individually for the Railroad Company, and if so, in what sum, and how much has been paid, and how much remains unpaid and its conditions, &c.

State what security the Directors have for these loan advances or liabilities assumed and particularly whether they hold any of the first mortgage bonds of the company as collateral security, and if so what amount?

A. This question no one can be expected to answer. I do not care to state how much I have advanced on security. At the time the liabilities were incurred, the company received the securities in first mortgage bonds as collateral for obligations they had incurred. This was a simple business transaction. In addition to the bonds given as collateral security, some stock was set apart for the Directors, for private expenses. This was the first year of the organization. This stock has all been recalled and returned, except in one or two instances.

In answer to the ninth question Mr. Bingham stated that under the contract contractors were entitled to a certain amount of stock.

10th—State whether the Directors have any plan or proposition to offer in regard to the future action of the stockholders, or any regard to their plans and wishes, and generally what they recommend or propose.

A. Cannot say what they intend to do. An agent in Europe holds \$90,000 of bonds as collateral security for what may be due him.

Your committee would further say that notwithstanding the Directors repeatedly stated that they were more than willing to give all necessary information, it was with the greatest difficulty that they succeeded in learning the amount of indebtedness or stock issued or any important facts relating to the present condition of its affairs, they claiming, perhaps with some consistency, that it was not good policy to publish these facts to the world—it would interfere with future negotiations, &c.

As near as your committee could learn there has been, as stated before, \$4,050,000 bonds. \$329,000 have been paid to contractors for iron, &c.; \$90,000 held by their agent in London as collateral security for a forfeiture for the non-fulfillment of a contract arising from the negotiating of their bonds with other considerations, \$160,000 held by the directors as collateral security for moneys advanced by them.

\$100,000 held by the city of Rochester as collateral for the last moneys advanced of the \$150,000 conditioned for the completion of the road, &c., leaving \$3,371,000 bonds, which we

were told were held by parties in London or Paris, subject to the control of the directors.

The total amount of stock subscribed for was \$123,000. But they failed to state what amount of stock was actually paid for. Your committee are of the opinion that a small, very small portion if any has been sold for cash.

They claim to have a road 150 miles in length, an average of 70 miles graded and 20 miles ironed. That they have received \$560,000 from all sources whatsoever, and that they have expended about \$800,000, which would leave the company in debt about \$240,000. Your committee could not learn to whom this sum was due, nor are they prepared to say that it is all the said direction are owing, but it is all the figures given or that they were able to get from the directors.

Your committee would further state that the city of Rochester resolved to pay to the Roches ter, Nunda and Pennsylvania RR. \$150,000, for which they were to receive second mortgage bonds. Whether this was a wise or justifiable act we do not care to state. But one thing your committee does feel prepared to say in credit to the Mayor and Common Council who the disbursing had charge of sum, that they have that they said sum, have done their well. guarded duty have the interests of the city of Rochester very The most of the money paid has never gone into the hands of the directors, but has been paid directly to the creditors of the road for material, labor and freight. The last for material, labor and freight. payments were not made until they received first mortgage bonds as collaterals; and finally, in refusing to pay the last installment absolutelyclaiming it as interest past due on bonds, leav ing to the credit of the city now in the Rochester Savings Bank \$5,185.95.

Your committee are not ambitious to be recorded as prophets, and, therefore, will not undertake to give the future history or wonderful achievements of the road. But from the statements of the directors, they seem to have no definite plan for the future. They acknowledge their inability to negotiate their bonds upon the present basis, and that they are unable to proceed further without funds, of which they have none. Hence they find themselves, Miccawber-like, waiting for something to turn up. In the meantime we must wait patiently the result.

Your committee are not unmindful of the great benefit this road will be to our city when completed, and earnestly urge upon the directors the importance of an early completion of the Rochester, Nunda and Pennsylvania Railroad.

AN ORDINANCE FOR THE REGISTRATION OF MARRIAGES AND BIRTHS. The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain and determine as follows:

SECTION 1. That from and after the first day of Oot. next, the Health Officer shall register in separate books

in the manner hereafter directed, the returns made to him of the marriages which are solemnized within the city of Rochester, and the births which may occur in the said city. He shall also make or cause to be made, an abstract of the same at the end of each and every month, and publish the same with the monthly mortality report, and at the end of each year, shall report to the Common Council a full statement of the marriages and births which shall have occurred in the said city during the year next preceeding the first day of April of each year—this to be reported and published in connection with, and to be a part of, the annual report of the Health Officer.

§ 2. That it shall be the duty (under a penalty hereinafter named) of all clergymen, magistrates, and every other person by or before whom any marriage may hereafter be solemnized, and that every practicing physician and every practicing midwife in the said city, on or before the first day of October next, to report his or her name and place of residence to the Clerk of the Board of Health. The practicing physicians and the practicing midwives shall also report the college or medical institution from which he or she graduated, or the society wnich granted them a license to practice their profession. It shall be the duty of the Health Officer to have the same registered in index form in suitable books to be furnished by the Common Council. In the event of any of the persons above specified changing their place of residence, they shall report or notify the Clerk of the Board of Health of such change within thirty days thereafter, unless they cease to act in such capacity, as makes them subject to the provisions of this ordinance.

§ 3. That every practicing physician or practicing midwife in the said city, under whose charge or superintendence a birth shall hereafter take place, shall keep a true and exact record of such birth. This record shall contain and set torth, as far as the same can be ascertained, the full name of the ordinance, the full name of the

its birth to the Health Officer within the time above required.
§ 5. That every clergyman, magistrate and every other person who may hereafter perform the marriage ceremony, and every physician and practicing widwife in the said city who shall refuse or neglect to perform any of the duties specified in this ordinance, shall forfeit and pay for each offence the sum of ten dollars.
§ 6. Every execution issued upon a judgment recover ed for a violation of this ordinance, shall command the amount to be made of the property of the defendant, to be applied to the benefit and maintenance of Hope Hospital, if any such can be found, and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentiary for the period of ten days.
§ 7. That the Health Officer shall prepare and furnish such books, blanks and schedules as will be required to carry out the provisions of this ordinance, and the same shall be paid for by an appropriation by the Common Council.
§ 3. The book and registry shall be kept in the office of the Health Officer and at all times accessible to the inhabitants of said city.

REASON SUBMITTED BY THE HEALTH OFFICER FOR THE PASSAGE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

Vital statistics (in short) mean, a record of

births, marriages and deaths.

The value and importance of such a record to a community it great, for it embraces all questions pertaining to the estimation of lives, longevity, hereditary tendencies and many of the causes of disease.

It is from vital statistics that most often information is gained and possessed in regard to health and the conditions which influences it. The conditions may be such as to promote health or good to a community or sickness and poverty. Vital statistics, correctly kept, are valuable to a community for a record. They are or may be made prima facia evidences in courts to establish claims and legacies, to secure rights of sufferage, to establish pension claims and to protect the government against frauds in this department.

Upon these depends the whole system of life insurance and endowments in all their plans, the expectation of life and under special cir-

cumstances of hereditary influences

Birth rate, marriage rate and death rate, the relative number of still births and the mor tality of different diseases in different places and at different periods, the mean age at death of different populations, the influence of occupation, age, locality, etc., on health, and the death rate of different classes and nationalities, all enter into the question of State economy, the value of human life in dollars to the community, the State and the nation. The government has an interest not openly in the prosperity, but also in the health and strength and effective power of each one of its inhabitants, and it has a claim upon all to develope their estate and themselves, bodily and materially to the greatest extent. The death of every child is a loss financially to the government.

It is by the information obtained of carefully kept vital statistics that the cause of disease and short lives are obtained. From it we learn what sanitary laws are requisite to diminish sickness and to promote an extension of life.

A high birth rate, in the presence of a low death rate, implies that a population is living under the most favorable condition for health, vigor and longevity, The annual number of births enables us to estimate the population of a community or country. Of marriages, feundity is to a great degree controlled by the age of those married. Too early marriages induces sterility and produce feeble and short lived children.

Death rates are the most important. As the prosperity of all communities depend upon the preservation of the health and lives of the individals who compose them rather than upon their multiplication. Essentials to the preservation of health is in no other way attainable than by carefully kept records of births, marriages and deaths, with as many of the attending conditions of age, sex, nationality as possible.

It will be seen at a glance the importance of such a record, and how beneficial to the sani-

tarian and compiler of statistics.

It might be added that a bureau of vital statistics is organized in almost every city in this country and Europe. There is no city of half the population of Rochester in this State but what furnish the Board of Health monthly re-turns on this important subject. To recipro-cate is a right they have from us, but there is a duty we owe the world and our fellow man.

ORDINANCE FOR THE PROTECTION OF FIRE ENGINES, TENDERS, HOOK & LADDER AND FIRE EXTINGUISHER ON THEIR WAY TO FIRES.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do or-dain and determine as follows:

SECTION 1. The steam fire engines, tenders, hook and ladder, extinguisher, sack and bucket, and volunteer hose companies, shall have the right of way upon all streets when going to a fire, or an alarm of fire.

§ 2. It shall be the duty of all teamsters, cartmen, hack drivers, street car drivers and all public or private conveyances of any kind, and they shall on an alarm of fire give the right of way to said fire apparatus on their approach under a penalty of five dollars for each offence.

ratus on their approach under a penalty of five dollars for each offence.

§ 3. It shall be the duty of persons employed on swing bridges across the Erie or Genesee Valley Canals, upon the approach of any of the said fire companies within 20 feet, not to swing said bridge unless a boat is within one hundred feet of said bridge. Any person violating this provision shall forfeit a penalty of TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 4. Every execution issued upon a judgment, reovered for a violation of this ordinance, shall command the amount to be made of the property of the defendant, if any such can be found, and if not then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentary for the period of thirty days.

ester GENTLEMEN: I withhold my approval of the resolution to pay Dwight Palmer two hundred and thirty-five (235) dollars for a wagon pur-

chased ostensibly to exercise the fire department horses.

The horses of the department can be exercised with profit to the city by using them under the direction of the Street Superintendent in removing the dirt from the streets, which would be quite a saving of expense to the city. I am informed that some years ago the horses were employed to team in our streets which saved in one year to the city five thousand (5,000) dol-lars. The objection then was that if a fire occurred the horses were perhaps at a distance from their engines, thereby losing time; but that objection does not now have the same force. Since the completion of the Holly Works the steamers are called out only un-der a general alarm, and also there has been very many less fires or alarms than there were before the introduction of the Holly engines.

The Holly is an immense stationary fire engine, and was built as a protection against fire. The citizens were told that the Holly engine would reque the expense of the Fire Department very much, and that quite a saving would be made to our citizens, but the reverse is the case. I make the above exhibit to show that the utmost economy should be exercised in running the department, and every means used by the Committee to lessen the cost of the two systems for extinguishing fires. I do not find in the for extinguishing fires. charter or by resolution that any of the Standing Committees have authority for making extraordinary purchases. But, on the contrary, at the same session the Fire Department Committee asked authority to purchase one thousand feet of hose for the use of the Department which, in my opinion, was very proper. The current expenses of the Department are and should be under the control of the Committee, and they should jointly, as a Committee, see that the money of the taxpayers is judiciously

expended.

I also have grave objections to ante-dating salaries after they have been fixed by the Com-mon Council. It is the same in principle as the action of the Congress of 1872, which was so severely denounced by the respectable press of the country.

By reference to the proceedings of your honorable body on the 6th of April, 1875, you fixed the salary of Mr. C. M. St. John as assistant in the Assessor's office (being an appointment caused by an emergency and not provided for by the charter), at one thousand (1,000) dollars. If it was not enough Mr. St. John then should have insisted on an increase of salary, but as he accepted the office and the salary, I think it too late, having performed the duties of the office for six months, to ask extra pay for the past half reacher. half year.

In conclusion I beg to refer you to the following quotation from my message to the Honorable the Common Council of April 7th, 1874:

"In regard to the salaries of the various municipal efficers, I beg to suggest that they be fixed on such an equitable basis as may be reasonable and just. There are some offices requiring special talent to properly fill, and those you select for them should be paid a satisfactory salary: for cheap labor, as a rule, is delu-sive economy. I particularly refer to this subject because the too common practice of voting extra compensation at the close of the year is vicious in principle and should rarely, if ever, GEO. G. CLARKSON be tolera ed.

The practicing physicians and the practicing midwives shall also report the college or medical institution from which he or she graduated, or the society which granted them a license to practic their profession. It shall be the duty of the Health Officer to have the same registered in index form in suitable books to be furnished by the Common Council. § 2. Every execution issued upon a judgment recovered for a violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall command the amount to be made of the property of the defendant.

Special meeting, at the suggestion of his Honor the Mayor, to accept a portrait of Ex-Mayor John Allen, deceased.

Ald. John Mauder presiding.

Quorum present.

The platform was occupied by Mayor Clarkson, ex-Mayors Isaac Hills, Henry L. Fish, N. C. Bradstreet, Gen. A. W. Riley, James C. Cochrane and D. M. Dewey. The President's and Clerk's desks were ornamented with vases filled with beautiful and tastefally arranged bouquets. The portrait on the wall at the right of the President's desk was covered with the national flag, and at the appointed time it was unveiled. His Honor, Mayor Clarkson, then spoke as follows:

THE MAYOR'S ADDRESS.

Gentlemen of the Common Council:

I can but regard the unveiling of this excellent portrait of the Hon. John Allen as an important event in the municipal history of our

More than thirty years ago, in the year 1844 John Allen, then in the prime of his life and of his usefulness, was elected Mayor of this city. He had then resided here for many years, universally known and as universally respected.

Five of his surviving sons, all of whom were born in this city, have united in presenting this portrait of their venerated father to the city of Rochester, to take its appropriate place among the portraits of its former Mayors. We may recognize in this act of filed affection for the recognize in this act of filial affection for the memory of their father not only an acknowledgement of the distinction conferred upon him in the highest office within its gift, but also a not less graceful expression of their respect for the

city of their birth.

As the official representatives of the city, accept this portrait in the same spirit which prompted its donation, and we are happy to connect the names of the sons of John Allen with the conception and execution of this munificent gift. I will not detain you with any attempted criticism of the artistic excellencies of this work. The city press of Brooklyn and New York have called attention to its distinguishing characteristics as a work of art; and the living friends of John Allen have testified to its truth-The manly form, the dignified bearfulness. ing and the genial countenance are expressed with singular fidelity. A full length portrait of life size, superb in execution, impressive in its details, and faultless as a work of genius, it will remain upon the walls of this Council Chamber to speak for itself through future

We congratulate the artist, Professor Boyle, (who has honored this occasion by his presence) upon the high gratification which his successful

work has conferred on the city

Amid the excitements of political life, the occurrence of an event like the present, in which neither passion nor prejudice have a place, is full of promise and encouragement. When a citizen like John Allen has served his day and generation with acceptance and has finished his earthly career, it is a pleasure to recall, and by fitting tributes to honor, his memory. To-day we are able to unite in this grateful work through the public spirit and liberality of his sons who have placed at the disposal of our city this portrait of their lamented father.

While it should stimulate us all to renewed exertions for the public good, may it also arouse those generous sentiments which give to this life its highest attractions.

At the conclusion of the address Ald. Mauder accepted the portrait on behalf of the Common Council, and introduced Mr. Cochrane, who delivered the following eloquent and exceedingly appropriate eulogium on the deceased:

MR. COCHRANE'S ADDRESS.

Mr. Mayor and Gentlemen of the Common Council: At an early day in the history of Rochester John Allen became one of her citizens. He was a native of Ireland and arrived in America about the time that the magnificent vision of DeWitt Clinton was realized by connecting the waters of the great lakes with the Atlantic ocean. He at once took an interest in the canals which only ceased with his death. They were indeed works of the first importance to the State as well as to the nation. They were the avenues of travel between the east and the west. They were the thoroughfares of transportation for all the western produce, and poured into the lap of our metropolis a constant stream of wealth. They were the nighways of the hardy pioneers who went forth in armies to conquer the forests and the prairies, and command the earth to bring forth the richest treasures of her harvest fields. They were the links in the vast chain of commerce which bound the States together, and the real power which made New York—our own grand State—the leader of them all. And while the rapid spreading of the iron rail had shorn them of their strength, had diminished their usefulness, the glory of the past, in which John Allen largely shared, can never be for-gotten. Mr. Allen became extensively en-gaged in the navigation of the cauals, and before the present generation his name and the lines of boats with which he was connected were favorably known throughout the whole country, and even in Europe. In 1844 Mr. Allen was elected Mayor of Rochester. He was deservedly popular with the people. His charity and kindness of heart were known to all. He never turned a deaf ear to any tale of dis-In him the widow found a friend and the fatherless put their trust. His countenance was open as the day. His smile, like the sunlight, gladdened all around him. His integrity no man questioned. The purity of his life was never clouded. This was the man whom the people elected. Upon the election day on banners through the streets was this inscription: "John Allen; The Poor Man's Friend." What more could be said of him than was implied from this loving appellation spontaneously given by his fellow citizens? It told of his generosity, of his disinterestedness, of the kindness of his heart, of his sympathy with the distressed. of his broad charity, of nearly everthing that constitutes goodness in man.

Friendship for the rich and the influential, and the great is mostly a summer friendship which lives till the harvest time, with great expecta-tions of reaping many golden sheaves, and dies with the early frosts of the closing year.

But friendship for the poor has no expectations of reward, unless it be of the happiness which dwells in every good action.

Yet it survives the storms of Winter, and blooms again among the sweetest flowers of the Spring. The poor man works for his family and has nothing to give. His wife labors, often surrounded with troubles and cares, while his children toil for their raiment, toil for their education, and alas! not unfrequentby lose their childhood with all its joyous sports in toiling for their daily bread. To such as these Mr. Allen was always the firm and abiding friend.

"Despising wealth, receiving but to pay, No wanderer, hungry, ever turned away." Thirty years have rolled by since Mr. Allen was Mayor of Rochester, and he, with most of his generation, has joined the congregation of the dead; should I not rather say has joined the great congregation of the living. Has not the darkened glass of faith been taken from his eyes? Have not the narrow gates of mortal life been opened wide, and does he not tread the immortal paths, looking with unclouded vision at the ever changing beauties of the boundless eternal fields?

His sons, in whom the generosity of the sire lives, have now presented you with a splendid gift—a life-like portrait of their honored father, in trust for the city of Rochester, where his warmest affections were centered, and where

the best days of his life were spent

I hope it may long occupy a place in our pub-In hole it may long occupy a pace in our public halls, and when, as ages pass, the future citizens look upon the long array of portraits of the chief magistrates of our city, while they will doubtless see many of those justly entitled to great honor, some, perhaps, for military exploits, some for learning in the law, some for scientific attainments and some for some for scientific attainments, and some for many things that go to make up what men call greatness, yet they will stop at this and listen to a tradition of him the picture represents, for the story of a good man's life never dies. It lives forever and grows more beautiful with the polish of advancing time. This is the tradition which they will tell. In the early days of the city, in her infancy, for it was her eleventh year, that man was elected by the people as their chief magistrate. Upon the election day, on triumphant banners through the streets, our flags proudly floating from the masts, and on placards posted on the public buildings was this inscription: "John Allen, the poor man's friend." It was his coronation; it is his coronation; it is his epitaph. And as the tale is told many a tremulous voice will respond in the true language of the heart: God bless John Allen, the poor man's friend! And God bless the poor by sending more John Allens to cheer them in their labors and comfort them in their homes!

Ald. Stone then moved that the thanks of the Common Council be extended to the sons of Hon. John Allen for the splendid gift, and that the City Clerk be directed to have the same sent with the seal of the city attached. Car-

ried.

Remarks were then made by General A. W. Riley, ex-Mayors Hills, Fish and Bredstreet, and D. M. Dewey. These gentlemen related interesting incidents in the history of ex-Mayor Allen, and testified to his noble traits of character, kindness of heart, unexampled generosity to the poor, and deserved popularity among all classes of citizens. As one speaker remarked he was the poor man's friend through life and a high-minded Christian gentleman in the fullest sense of the term. Mr. Hills referred to John Allen's boys, and their attendance at the old High School; how they were drawn to and from the school by the

old bald-face horse. He said General Riley and himself were the only remaining trustees of the old High School, and concluded by saying that this tribute to the memory of their father speaks volumes in their praise. The other speakers also spoke of the sons of Mr. Allen and their commendable act. Mr. Dewey said the placing of the picture in the Common Council Chamber was the inauguration of a new era in Rochester. The City Hall was a building in which works of art could be safely placed, and it is a proper depository for them. He hoped something would be done every year in this direction

Ald. Stone moved that the Board now adjourn. Carried.

REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

Ald. Stone, from the Special Committee, to make arrangements to go over the entire line of water works from the city to Hemlock Lake and inspect the work, made a brief verbal report. The Mount Hope and Rush reservoirs were found to be good pieces of work. At Slab City the greatest amount of work is yet to be done. The engineer and the commissioners assured the committee that the work would be completed by December 1st. The water was clear, pure and pleasant to the taste. The only estimate in regard to the work could be made from statements of the commissioners. Although an anti-commission man from the first, the speaker was free to say that, so far as he could see, the work had been well done. For the purpose of bringing the matter before the council, Ald. Stone wished to present a resolution to be considered a part of the report.

By Ald. Stone—Resolved, That the City Tresurer be and is hereby authorized to issue the bonds of the city, for the completion of the Water Works, in the sum of one hundred and eighty-two thousand dollars, and negotiate the

same at not less than par, as follows:

Fifty thousand dollars so that the money may be realized by the 15th day of October next; fifty thousand dollars by the 15th day of November next, and eighty-two thousand dollars when the waters of Hemlock Lake shall flow

My attention has been called to a very important matter by our very able Supervisor of the fourteenth ward (Dr. W. H. Dake) of which

the following is the substance:

That the city of Rochester has been for years past paying an unequal and unjust proportion of the compensation which this county allows her treasurer. Should any person be inclined to question the correctness of any statement, I would refer them to the able report of the comwould refer them to the able report of mittee on treasurer's accounts, found on page 277 of published proceedings of the Board of Supervisors of 1874, which report furnishes positive proof of the inequality above mentioned. The percentage allowed and paid by the city on collection of our city's county taxes amounts to six thousand four handred and ninety-two and 13-100 (\$6,492 13) dollars, according to said report, which the city has been paying annually, in excess of an equal propor ion.

The towns allow no per cent. compensation (in collection of taxes) to our County Treasurer, as I am informed, and after paying 53-100 of the whole of the county tax, we are obliged to pay over \$6,000 annually more than our equal

proportion. In view of these facts the question arises whether it would not be for the interest of our city to place the wards and towns upon the same basis in this tax matter, and let the county at large bear this burden equally and I cell the attention of the Board to this subject at this time for the reason that the new law governing the relations of the Board of Su-pervisors with the County Treasurer will compel the Board of Supervisors to provide at its annual session a suitable compensation for the County Treasurer, and hence any change or alteration in the marter should be attended to before the said Board take action, therefore recommend the following:

Although not prepared to form an opinion as to the leng h of time which ought to be consumed under the most favorable circumstances in the making of such a complete and careful survey as seems to have been made, yet we are satisfied that there should have been employed from the beginning, for the most rapid prose-cution of the work, in addition to the Chief Engineer, one competent draughtsman, one transitman, two chainmen and two flagmen, the chainmen and flagmen to have been retained only during the Summer sea-on; the Chief Engineer's time to be filled in examination of old filed maps, old deeds and other sources of information, and the general direction of the work. Assuming from information furnished by Mr. Beardsley, that no such force as is above enumerated has been furnished him during the progress of the work, we are clearly of the opinion that there exists no basis of fact on which an intelligent judgment can be formed by us as to whether the work has been pushed with sufficient perseverance by Mr. Beardsley with the force at his command, and no evidence but what it has been so prosecuted.

OFFICE OF CITY ATTORNEY, ROCHESTER, Oct. 26th, 1875.

Ald. J. H. Kelly and others, Committee, etc. :

GENTLEMEN:—The importance of the question relating to Mr. Beardsley's office must be my excuse for discussing it at some length. no provision of the charter giving the Common Council power to have a general survey of the city made, but by an act of the Legislature, passed April 26, 1869, the Common Council was authorized to raise the "sum of \$5,000 for the purpose of making a new survey and map of

Accordingly, on motion of Ald. Qualtrough, \$5,000 for this purpose was included in the tax

levy for that year.
On May 19, 1869, a resolution was adopted directing the Committee on Maps and Surveys "to cause an accurate survey and map of the city to be made as provided for by act of the Legislature, passed at its last se sion." Accordingly, on the 1st of June a contract was executed between Cyrus Beard-ley and the members of the Map and Survey Committee in behalf of the city, in which, after reciting the act of the Legislature and the resolution of the Common Council, Mr. Beardsley was employed to make an accurate survey and map of the city "as contemplated by said acts and resolutions," and to receive therefore \$3,000 per year. The city was also to pay for stationery, assistants. etc.

In this contract no limitation is contained as to time or amount of expense, but as the Common Council had no authority to spend over \$5,000, the committee was only authorized to have a survey made in accordance with that act, and the contract expressly refers to the act and resolution, it was binding against the city until \$5,000 had been spent, and no longer.

But by an act passed May 6, 1870, the Common Council was authorized to raise for that mon Council was authorized to among for year \$5,000 more, to be expended in paying for the man and survey. The the continuation of the map and survey. contract made with Beardsley does not appear to have been reported to the Common Council and no other or further contract has ever been made. But as the work was continued and the Common Council continued to pay for it, the contract was kept in force as long as there was any money applicable to this purpose.

On April 8th, 1871, a further act was passed authorizing the Common Council to raise for that year a sum not exceeding \$10,000, to be used in paying for the continuation of this sur-

I have not found any act since that of 1871 authorizing any further expenditure for the purpose of making a map and survey, the en-

tire amount authorized being \$20,000.

For the year 1872, however, the sum of \$8,000 was put in the tax levy for the purpose of making a map and survey. I do not see by what authority, eight thousand dollars was also appropropriated in the year 1873 and \$1,500 in 1874, as I understand, although I do find it in the tax levy

More than \$20,000 have been raised and paid

on this survey and map.

The original contract with Mr. Beardsley can only be binding on the city so long as there are funds legally applicable to that purpose. No committee nor the Common Council itself can make a contract involving a greater expense than the law authorizes, and after the authorized amount is spent the concract is of no further validity against the city.

It therefore seems to me that Mr. Beardsley would have no valid claim for damages if the Common Council should refuse to employ him further in making a map of the city, and that any further expenditure for that purpose is without authority of law.

MAYOR'S OFFICE. ROCHESTER, Oct. 25th, 1875.

I hereby approve the proceedings of the Common Council of October 19th, 1875, except the ordinance offered by Ald. Westbury and passed by the Common Council to compel vegetable gardeners and farmers to take out a license to sell the products of their land.

There are various reasons which induce me to think that the adoption of the ordinance would not be productive of good to the citizens of Rochester, for it imposes restraints upon that freedom of intercourse between producer and consumer which favors monopoly and inures to the disadvantage of the public at large, but

chiefly to its poorer classes

Apart from the grave doubts which I entertain of the legality of the measure, I would ask if it is not an injustice to the citizens who have been recently brought within the bounds of our city? A great deal of the land annexed is used for garden purposes, the product of which naturally seeks a market in the city. Would it be just to impose a tax on these our citizens which is onerous and oppressive, by compelling them to pay a tax for the privilege of selling in the city the products of land already taxed for city purposes? For the foregoing reasons, as well as many others which might be adduced, I withold my approval.

GENTLEMEN: The undersigned in accordance with your request, desires to make the following with your request, uesires to make the following proposition in introducing the "Carburetter for the saving of gas," viz: I will place the Carburetter in your public buildings free of cost, labor or expense, asking only for my research muneration one half of the savings made. An actual test to be made by burning the city gas a certain length of time adjudging the difference or amount saved by then turning on the Carburetter the same length of time. Both tests to use the same number of burners. A committee of your Board to have the entire control of such tests.

duced in the brief and sensible report of the Fire Department Committee, and the weighty reasons elicited in debate in favor of the adverse report at the last meeting of your Honorable Body. When it is declared by competent authority "that the present force is sufficient for all purposes," and we have every reason to emphatically endorse the opinion, it should be plainly seen that to encumber a force by excess of numbers and appliances, is to weaken and enfeeble it rather than enhance its efficiency.

At this late day, with the accumulated testimony gained by observation and experience in regard to the evils of the volunteer system as developed by other cities, to say nothing of our own, I deem it unnecessary to enter upon any fuller exposition by way of elucidation of facts so patent, but will leave the subject for your reconsideration and final disposal

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: In the Board of Health, Nov. 15th, 1875, the following report was presented by Health Officer Hovey, and ordered accepted and referred to your honorable body for publication:

To the Hon. Board of Health:

Gentlemen:—In obedience to your resolution of September 20th, 1875, His Honor, the Mayor, and myself, visited thirteen of the public school buildings of the city, in the following order: Nos. 6, 17, 2, 4, 10, 14, 16, Monroe avenue, 18, 3, 7 11 and 18. The committee were cordially received by the principals and teachers, and the committee were cordially received by the principals and teachers, and they severally gave us all the information at their command, on the question we were inquiring after, and were very particular to show us

the plans adopted by them to secure warmth and ventilation.

For this attention and interest the committee

acknowledge their sincere thanks.

It can hardly be expected of us to give in detail the condition of each building, for they are all substantially alike. The older buildings are, however, more defective in means of ventilation and in construction than the new ones. But in making this comparison, we by no means pronounce the new buildings what they should be. There are in those buildings a lack of means for the supply of pure air, and the ventilators, as at present used, are worthless for carrying off impure and vitated air. We observed in these the same effort, on the part of the teachers, to keep the air pure as in the older buildings. At recess and intermissions the windows and doors were opened as a necess ty. The ventilators opened into cold chimneys and were generally closed to prevent an incoming draft, which was observed, rather than an outgoing

Monroe avenue, Nos. 2 and 4 are built with a The registers view of warming by furnaces. and conducting pipes are all in position. It was specially noticed that all the registers are either in the centre of the room in the floor or in the wainscoting in the centre walls, near the floor. By this arrangement the warmth is admitted into the warmest part of the room. And the pure or cold air is admitted at the windows, which is the coldest part of the room. It requires no stretch of imagination to say there will be persons suffering from opposite causes, heat and cold, in the same room, with this plan of warming and ventilating.

At present these, as well as all the school

buildings, are warmed by coal stoves.

The stoves are enveloped in tin casings, from four to six feet high. This casing is for two purposes—to prevent accident and excessive heat to those seated near by the stoves.

The supply of pure air in the school buildings are alike--the open windows and the transoms over the inner doors. This is impracticable for healthy purposes, for the out door air is admit-ted at a lower temperature than that in the room and of necessity falls to the bottom. its passage it comes in direct contact with those in that part of the room, exposing them to a cold current of air. This could in part be obviated by guards, directing the current of the

air upwards. Many of the school buildings have one large room called a collecting room. The object of this room is to gather the whole school together for some general exercise or for public exhibi-This is pleasant and commendable when used for this purpose. But when, as is universally the case, these large rooms are divided by sliding doors into four or five class rooms, with no means of ventilation and warming (except what has been mentioned), they become pens, unfit for human occupants, after a brief time. It will be seen that the inner rooms have but a single outer wall, and from this comes the light, the cold, the pure air, the cooler and only ven-With this arrangement i is an impossibility to have a wholesome atmosphere. This construction of class rooms should be discon-

tinued. With this brief description of our public school buildings the most casual observer will see how imperfectly they are constructed for the purposes for which they are built. ings erected at great expense for the education

of children without proper means of warming and ventilation; class rooms crowded to excess by children in tender years, breathing over and over again contaminated air, is certainly a question of inconceivable magnitude.

The causes that render air vitiated in occu-, ied rooms are carbonic acid gas, watery vapor thrown off by the lungs and skin, dust from clothing, furniture, &c. The watery vapor contains animal matter and almost immediately goes into decomposition. These, with other elements gathered in the clothing worn by the poorer class of persons, are in some instances so perceptible that the occupations of parents are detected and the smoke of the paternal tobaccopipe is observed. Science says that germs of disease is in the air about us, and the most careless would startle at the details of this saying; but this is unnecessary, since we are discussing ventilation, not where unusual causes create foul air, as in the sick wards of hospitals, but in the simpler question, now can we best ventilate our school rooms?

It will be noticed further that the air we breathe is exhausted of its life-giving power after a few inhalations. When it is deprived of its normal proportion of oxygen it is then rendered unfit for its proper use. It must be manifest, therefore, that the entire air of a class room soon becomes vitiated. It will be further noticed that we are considering rooms in which children daily spend five or six hours and teachers seven or eight. Children at school ages require as much air as adults, for their respiration is more active and nature demands an ample supply of air of the purest quality to ensure to them health and mental vigor.

We are, then, forced to conclude, from the nature of the evil, and from the imperative necessity of its entire removal, that no remedy can be successful which does not provide a full and complete renewal of the air in the room as often as it becomes foul or vitiated.

Authorities differ as to the amount of air to be supplied to insure a proper ventitation. But it is generally admitted that it should not be less than ten to fifteen cubic feet per minute to each person. To estimate this accurately the capacity of each room should be carefully measured, and then the amount of inflowing air can be governed to accommodate the requirements of each person.

It is obvious that no means of supplying air can accomplish ventilation which does not also provide for the removal of the old or vitiated

A room heated by an open fire-place is constantly throwing off the impure air through the open chimney, while a close room heated by a furnace has no means for the escape of vitiated air except by crevices, or occasionally opening of doors. The difference of air in two such rooms is distinctly noticed by the common observer.

Then the object should be in warming and ventilating occupied rooms to maintain a balance between the supply or incoming and the outgoing air. The old notion or theory was that the impure air went to the top of the room, consequently make a hole in the ceiling or near it, open it, and then let on the heated air through the registers and the work is done. With this plan very soon a current would be established between the register and the opening, leaving the foul air in all parts of the room without the line of the current. Here might be discussed the several methods or systems of ventilation. One is mechanical and accomplished by blowers or fans operated by machinery. The other is natural, dependent on natural laws, requiring no machinery for its workings—simply an opening into a vacuum. This avails itself of the natural tention which is the result dency of warm air to rise, which is the result of the law of the dilitation of gases.

It will readily be perceived, from what has

been said, that a mere hap hazard arrangement of the registers in the floors and the ventilators will not answer. Good ventilation consists in the proper distribution of the openings for the outgoing and incoming air, and in proper rela-tion and correspondence with each other, so as to secure the perfect removal of the bad air and the thorough diffusion of the new.

It need not be stated that heated air rises and the cold and impure air falls to the floor. Hence, to secure ventilation by natural laws, the sim-ple heating the air in a vertical shaft or chimney will, as certainly as it is done, cause an urward movement of the air in the shaft. Then, if ventilators are connected to these shafts there must of necessity be an outward movement of the air in the room if the temperature is higher in the shaft than it is in the room. Here, it seems to me, is all there is of the question. The application of that principle will secure perfect ventilation, no matter how crowded the room, if the change of air is sufficient to give to each person the ten cubic feet per min-

The problem is, how can this be done? It requires no argument to show that carbonic acid gas, watery vapor, dust and animal matter is heavier than common air. This is demonstrated in nature, for at the bottom of wells and caves we find this deadly poison. Experiments fully corroborate this statement. Then if the poisons are at the bottom, and lay there by their own weight, the only rational method to get rid of them is to make an opening in the floor, or near it, and this connected to a heated shaft, the cold air rushes in to fill the vacuum created in the heated shaft. It will be observed that the shaft is worthless unless it is heated. If cold it becomes a source of incoming air, as was observed by your committee in almost every building

The number of openings for the escape of foul air, depends upon the size of the room, the time it is occupied and the number of persons it This, as with the admission of pure contains. air, can be computed to a fraction by keeping in

mind what is required for each person.

Much discussion has been had as to where the pure air should be admitted to the room—at the top or bottom. I will answer in a general way. If the air admitted is at a lower temperature than that in the room it should be admitted at the top; if warmed by passing over heated bodies it should enter at the bottom. Without discussing this question, allow me to say, by observing this rule we produce what is desirable, to wit, agitation. If the cold air is admitted at the top of the room (where the heat is greatest) it forces its way through the layers of warm air, passing towards the floor, all the time acquiring the temperature of the room and supplying the place of the foul air driven out by this new supply. If the air is heated to a higher temperature than that in the room before its admission it should enter that part of the room which has the lowest temperature

(which is at the floor); for by coming in contact with air of low temperature it produces agitation—the thing desirable to secure a pure and wholesome air in occupied rooms.

One other point as to where apparatus for warming should be placed to secure best and most uniform warmth in a room. The answer radiators, registers, pipes, &c.. should be placed on the outside of a room or building. It will be noticed that by this arrangement the excess of heat is balanced by the excess of cold from the windows and outer walls. This is illustrated in the improvement of placing a stove at each end of a railread car instead of one large one in the center of the car as for-Now there is uniform heat in the car; then there were two classes of sufferers—the one freezing and the other roasting. Public buildings warmed on the former principle will invariably have these two classes of persons when occupied.

To secure a perfect system of warming pub-lic buildings the heat should be applied to the solid substances in a room. If the floors, walls and furniture of a room were heated to a temperature near that of the body, it certainly would prevent an abstraction of heat from the Mr. Leeds, an author, advises that pipes be placed under the floors of school buildings for the purpose of warming. By this means, he says, the entire air of a room is warmed and put in motion, on the same principle that water is boiled by putting the fire

under the vessel.

The question for present relief presents itself or consideration As will be seen from what for consideration has been said, the condition of our school buildings is such that an imperative duty is required of the authorities having this matter in charge. Not a building or a room but what the teacher is obliged to devise every strategy to relieve their pupils of the gases and vitiated atmosphere in them. The windows are lowered, allowing the cold air to stream in upon the heads and shoulders of the scholars. The stoves are situated near the blackboards in many rooms and heated to excess, and pupils for blackboard exercises are worked physically and mentally in this heated position, and when this exercise is over return to their seats, immediately under the cold drafts streaming in from vindows. A mention of these will commend itself and demand open windows. things And improvement. to this submit that in all cases the stoves should be placed (when possible) on the outer side of the rooms, and particularly away from the seats used for class exercises. That the pure and fresh air be admitted from the windows and conducted in box pipes to the floor underneath the stoves. The air box or pipe should be provided with a valve or slide to regulate the quantity of air admitted. The stoves to be enveloped in a tin casing reaching to near the ceiling. This arrangement acts upon the same principle as the cold air box of a furnace. cold air from out of doors is warmed by the stoves, and rises within the tin casing to the ceiling, where it diffuses itself and is subsequently drawn down by the action of the ventilating these and its warment. tilating flues and its own gravity. plete this action the ventilating flues must be put into a working condition. It has been stated that one or more ventilators are in each room and opened into a chimney flue, but invariably the air in the chimney was at a lower temperature than that in the room. The relief must consist in heating the chimney to a higher temperature than that in the room, in order to insure an outward movement of the vitiated This can be done by a common kerosene lamp or gas burner, if out of the reach of the smoke pipe of the stoves.

Or the plan advocated by Mr. Leeds would answer all the requirements desired. course would be more expensive and perhaps should not be considered, since it is believed the former will secure complete relief.

It will be seen that the plan is simple and it is believed to be based on true philosophical

principles.

This subject is one demanding thoughtful nsideration. It has been said: "Fresh air is consideration. not a luxury, not even an essential comfort, but an absolute necessity for children." The duty of providing it is imperative. School house should be planned and built in the first instance, with free channels for the air to come and go, and when this is done the item of ventilation will be small in the construction accounts.

The sickness and mortality of school children and premature death of teachers is, no doubt, in a great degree due to a want of sufficient and proper ventilation. It is estimated that this is a cause of more mortality among school children than any other single cause. Since the Health Department publish monthly statements of deaths with locations of the same I invite your attention to the fact that more mortality is recorded in districts where ventilation is most de-B. GENTLEMEN: -The I aw Committee, to whom was referred the claim of Jesse Sheppard, late City Attorney, for the sum of \$342, would res-

pectfully report as tollows:

That the claim is for taxable costs in several suits which were discontinued by the direction of the Common Council, in which it is claimed he would have been entitled to his costs from the other side if the suits had been allowed to go on. This claim turns upon the construction of section 45 of the Charter. This section provides that the City Attorney may receive for himself the taxable costs in any action in which the city shall prevail, provided the same may be collected of the adverse party. That any liability can arise against the city under this section seems to your committee very doubtful indeed; again, to allow this claim will tend to establish a precedent for all future City Attor-Also, with this construction established the Common Council would not have power to discontinue suits without first getting the consent of said City Attorney or incurring a liability to its own officer.

Therefore, your committee do not deem themselves justified in allowing this bill to be paid, as it would establish a precedent not only this bill, but similar bills of all future City Attorneys, until the validity of such a claim has been tully established by the courts.

REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

Ald. Beck, from the Special Committee on County Treasurer's affairs, presented the following:

To the Hon. Common Council of the City of Rochester .

Gentlemen: - Your Committee appointed to confer with a Committee of the Board of Supervisors in reference to the percentage paid on county taxes, by the tax payers of the city in excess of the towns, would most respectfully submit: That they find that each tax payer in the county pays a percentage on his county tax. In the towns the Collector gives notice that he will be in some given place in the town on one day, the date of which is given in each week for four successive weeks. The tax payer goes then to pay his tax, and pays, as compensation to the Collector, one per cent upon his tax. After the expiration of thirty days the percentage is raised to five per cent.; and unless a special statute is passed extending the time,

he only has from December 15th—when the roll s given to the Collector—to February 1st in which to pay in the city. The County Treaswhich to pay in the city. The County Treasurer is made ex-officic Collector of county taxes in the city. He pays all the expenses of collecting the tax, including an advertisement in each daily newspaper first when he receives the tax, and again in February when the unpaid taxes are placed in the hands of collectors. Also clerk hire, all receipts and every expense connected with the collection of the tax. The tax payer in the city has from December 1st in which to pay his tax, the percentage going up gradually from one to five per cent., not at one leap as in the country, and all tax-payers have the privilege of paying at one per cent. if they choose, or if they prefer to wait until it is five per cent. they can and do. A portion of your committee have agreed to the report made by the committee of the Board of Supervisors. but have come to the conclusion, and reconsidered their action, and now agree that the percentage on the city's portion of the county tax is a matter that belongs wholly to the Board of Supervisors, and any change in charter in relation to the County Treasurer belongs wholly to the Legislature.

Your committee would also say that it seems to be very doubtful whether the city tax-payers are bound to pay any percentage if they pay before the 15th day of January under the law

as it now stands.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as

SECTION 1. The Commissioners of Public Works of the city of Rochester are hereby au-thorized to construct, under the supervision of the Canal Commissioner in charge, a swing bridge over the Erie Canal at Lyell street, in said city, in place of the bridge now there, and to repair or alter the roadway as may be proper in approaching the bridge. Such bridge shall be built parallel with the line of said street. The expense of such bridge and im-provement shall be assessed upon such portion of said city as the said Commissioners shall deem benefited thereby, and the ordinance and assessment therefor and collection thereof shall be made and proceeded with in conformity with the provisions of the charter of the city of Rochester in reference to local assessments.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING SKATING UPON THE SIDE-WALLS IN THE CITY OF ROCHESTER.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain and determine as follows:

SECTION I. It shall be lawful for all persons, male or female, under the age of fifteen years, and residents of the city of Rochester, to skate upon the sidewalk in any street, lane or alley in the said city, from the first day of December to the first day of April, Sundays excepted

§ No person or persons shall skate upon any sidewalk in the city of Rochester in such a manner as to prevent, hinder or molest any pedestrian from freely passing along the same, nor shall any person so skating make, aid, countenance or assist in making any noise, disturbance or improper diversion in any of the streets, lanes or alleys in the said city, under a penalty of Three Dollars for each offense.

§ Every execution issued upon a judgment for a violation of any section of this ordinance shall command the amount to be made from the property of the defendant. if any such can be found, and if not then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentury for a period of not more than five days.

Gentlemen: We, the undersigned, mail carriers of the city of Rochester, do most respectfully call the attention of your Honorable Body to the great importance and necessity of requiring, on the part of the citizens in the various districts of our city, strict conformance and compliance with sections 22 and 23 of the penal

ordinances, said sections reading as follows:
(§ 22.) No dog shall be permitted to go abroad in any of the s reets, squares, lanes, alleys or public places in this city, without being led and securely confined by a chain or string, or properly muzzled, under the penalty of ten dollars for each offence, to be recovered against the owner or possessor of such dog, or the person who harbored such dog within two days previous to the time of such dog being found so going abroad."
(§ 23.) "No person shall hinder or molest any

person or persons who may be engaged in law fully seizing, shooting or killing any dog going abroad as aforesaid, or in removing the carcass thereof, under the penalty of ten dollars

for each offence."

The duties devolving upon us as servants of the private and business community require of us to make our deliveries of mail matter to the counters, desks and offices of merchants and business men, and to the front, side and rear doors of their private dwellings, thereby sub-jecting us. in case of dogs being let loose and running at large, to great risk and jeopardy of clothes and person. We are continually made clothes and person. to suffer in manner as above set forth-first one, then another, of our force of carriers.

By rigid enforcement of the above sections of the penal ordinances of our city, great benefit and convenience would alike be enjoyed by man, weman and child living and laboring in our community, and this great source of annoyance and discomfort would at once cease.

We therefore most respectfully urge an early consideration and prompt and efficient action in this (to us at least) most important matter of

public concern.

No person or persons shall skate upon any sidewalk in the city of Rochester in such a manner as to prevent, hinder or molest any pedestrian from freely passing along the same, nor shall any person so skating make, aid, countenance or assist in making any noise, disturbance or improper diversion in any of the streets, lanes or alieys in the said city, under a penalty of Three Dollars for each offense.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

and the construction of sewers, who shall inspect the same and see that all work shall be done properly and report to the common council as they shall direct.

The said Commissioners shall also have the

supervision and control of the Water Works when completed, to make all directions pertaining to the same, and they also shall have the control and direction of the Fire Department, with all the functions and powers of the Common Council.

Or, if not elected, to be appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation of the Common Council.

Fifth—The Mayor shall appoint, subject to confirmation of the Common Council, five electors, who shall constitute the Board of Health, with all the powers conferred by the charter on the present Board.

Sixth—Elect at the next charter election ten Commissioners who shall possess all the power now possessed by the Board of Education.

Seventh—The salaries of the Commissioners of Water Works shall be fixed by the Common Council, and they may be removed for cause by the Mayor, who may fill a vacancy until the next charter election.

DRAFT OF AMENDMENTS TO BE PRESENTED TO THE LEGISLATURE.

First-The city shall be divided into nineteen, instead of sixteen, wards. The bill dividing the city into nineteen wards to be sent to Albany as soon as the Common Council fixes the boundaries.

Second-The Common Council shall be composed of one Alderman for each ward, to be elected for a term of two years. There shall be no election for Alderman in the spring of 1876, but in the spring of 1877; Aldermen shall be elected for two years from the wards having odd numbers, and for one year from those having even

numbers, and after that for terms of two years. Third—The Board of Public Works shall be abolished, and the powers belonging to them shall vest in the Common Council, except as otherwise provided.

Fourth—There shall be an Executive Board, composed of five members, to be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the Common Council, for one, two, three, four and five years, and thereafter for five years. They shall give all their time to the business of the office, and shall receive a salary to be fixed by the Common Council.

Fifth-Such Executive Board shall have conrol of the Water Works, Fire Department and Highway Fund. They shall have control of the streets, and shall let and superintend all contracts; but they shall advertise for all con-

tracts and publish all bids. Sixth—The Aldermen shall receive a salary of \$500 per year, if there is but one from a

Seventh-The Board of Health shall consist of six members of whom at least two shall be physicians of five years standing. Such Board shall be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the Common Council for terms of 1, 2 and 3 years, and thereafter for 3 years.

Eighth—The Board of Health shall appoint a Health Officer to hold office during its pleasure, but his Salary shall be fixed by the Common

Council.

Ninth—The Board shall have power to direct the removal of any person sick of an infectious disease to a proper hospital when they deem it for the interest of the public health.

It shall be an advisory board as to the proper ventilation of public buildings and in case any public school or factory is in process of erection without proper facilities for ventilation in the opinion of such Board, it may stop the erection of such building until the action of the Common Council can be had and the Common Council shall have power to direct proper facilities for ventilation to be furnished.

Tenth—The Common Council shall elect not less than four nor more than six City Physicians, who shall be graduates of some regular medical college of at least two years standing, who shall receive salaries to be fixed by the Council, and shall attend gratuitously the poor of the city who are unable to hire physicians under the direction of the Poor Committee of

the Common Council.

Eleventh—The powers of the present Board of Education shall vest in seven Commissioners who shall be appointed by the Mayor and constitution of the common shall be appointed by the Mayor and constitution of the common council in the same firmed by the Common Council, in the same way as members of the Executive Board. Four shall be of one political party and three of the

Four of the first Commissioners shall be appointed for one year and three for two years, and afterwards for terms of two years.

Twelfth—The Overseer of the Poor shall be

chosen for a term of two years.

CITY SURVEYOR'S OFFICE, Rochester, Jan. 25, 1876.

To the Chairman and Members of the Special Committee on Van Street Encroachment:

GENTLEMEN: The undersigned having surveyed Van street and the adjacent territory, reports as follows relative to the location of said street: That this street is in the Johnson and Atkinson tract; that the dimensions of lots and distances between streets do not accord, when measured on the ground, with said dimensions as given on the filed map of said tract, there being surplussages and overlappings in every case.

Farther allowing thirty-three feet (33) width for Van street, the lots each way from said streets have the measured dimensions given in blocks on the map accompanying this report. The dimensions of said lots, as given in the deeds, are marked in red on said map.

An examination of the map will show that to leave the street thirty-one feet (31) wide, which is substantially its present fenced width, would give all the lots the full amount called for in their respective deeds, with the single exception of Odell's lot. The surplus in lots adjacent to this one would make up the deficiency in that lot within four-tenths of a foot.

> FIRE ALARM TELBGRAPH OFFICE. ROCHESTER, Jan. 31st, 1876.

To the Honorable the Common Council: GENTLEMEN:-I have the honor of herewith presenting for your perusal my seventh annual report as Superintendent of the Fire Alarm Telegraph.

From the annexed tables it will be observed that the number of alarms during the year ending January 31st, 1876, was seventy, of which

two were false and one accidental.

During the past year by your request, about five and one-half miles of line were tuilt and seven new boxes put up, numbered and located as follows:

75-Corner Lyell and Child.

83---Clinton and Scrantom. 84 -Pinacle ave. and Meiggs. 91 Center and the Race. 123

North ave. and Bay. 124-Goodman and Park ave. 125-Vacuum Oil Co.—Madison st.

We have now about forty-five and one-half miles of line, fifty-four signal stations, twentyfour gongs, all of which require about two hundred and ten cells of battery to work them.

The expense of operating the elegraph the past year was two thousand, two hundred and fifty-five dollars and twenty-three cents.

All the boxes in the city have just been tested upon the various alarm gongs, and out of two thousand and three breaks of the electric current which they make in the aggregate not one blow upon the gongs was recorded incorrectly.

The telegraph has worked the past year without a fault save when two and three boxes were pulled clo ely together for the same fire, which was the case on six different occasions.

The water was clear, pure and pleasant to the taste. The only estimate in regard to the work could be made from statements of the commissioners. Although an anti-commission man from the first, the speaker was free to say that, so far as he could see, the work had been well done. For the purpose of bringing the matter before the council, Ald. Stone wished to present a resolu-tion to be considered a ; art of the report.

By Ald. Stone -Resolved, That the City Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to i sue the bonds of the city, for the completion of the Water Works, in the sum of one hundred and eighty-two thousand dollars, and negotiate the same at not less than par, as follows:

Fifty thousand dollars so that the money may be realized by the 15th day of October next; fifty thou-and dollars by the 15th day of November next, and eighty-two thousand dollars when the waters of Hemlock Lake shall flow into and through the city for good.

And provided further, that the Commissioners of Water Works shall file with the Mayor a written assurance that the same shall be finish-

ed by the first day of January, 1876.

Ald. Booth moved to refer the matter to the

Finance Committee to report. Lost. Ald. Weldon moved as an amendment that the Treasurer advertise for proposals in the cities of New York, Buffalo and Rochester.—

The original resolution of Ald. Stone as

amended was then adopted.

Ala. Stone moved that the Finance Committee and City Treasurer have sole charge of the issue and sale of the bonds. Carried.

The Treasurer received an offer for the first \$100,000 issued of 5 per cent.premium, but your committee thought that if adversised and sold to the highest bidder more could be realized.

Your committee appointed by this Board several months ago to consider the proposition of Mr. Hawks with regard to the establishment of a municipal insurance, would respectfully report: That they have given the matter extended attention, and have had various consultations with Mr. Hawks and with the City Attorney. We are satisfied that our city, with its improved means for the prosecution and extinguishmen of fires, with its unexcelled fire department and extensive water works, is paying insurance premiums vastly out of proportion to the risk assumed. That if a plan similar to that proposed by Mr. Hawks can be made practicable, the city—should it sustain as few losses in the next five years as it has during the la t five years-could make a sufficient gain to discharge a considerable part of its large debt. We would therefore submit to your consideration the annexed outline of the plan proposed by Mr. Hawks, and would recommend that, if the Board deem it advisable, the City Astorney be instructed to draw up a bill to meet the requirement of the case.

POINTS IN THE THOMAS HAWKS PLAN MUNICIPAL INSURANCE AND REVENUE FOR THE CITY OF ROCHESTER.

-The city to take upon itself the insur-

ing of all in urable property in the city Second—Create an insurance bureau, to be in charge of a commissioner, who, under the direction of the Common Council, shall have control of insurance in this city.

Third-An adjuster, who shall have, under the direction of the bureau, the adjusting of

losses, and inspection of personal property.
• Fourth—The assessors, when making their yearly or other assessment, shall put an insurance valuation on every building in the city, said valuation to go upon the ax rolls.

Fifth—The Common Council shall determine what amount they wish to raise, and the per cent. is put on accordingly, and the amount is added into, becomes a part and is collected by the Treasurer with the other city tax

Sixth -When the rolls are confirmed, every building in the city is insured.

Seventh-Amount of insurance not to exceed three-fourths of its valuation, nor less than onefourth.

Eighth—The City Treasurer gives the bureau

credis for the amount raised.

Ninth-When a fire occurs, the Adjuster examines, and if all loss reports to the Bureau, who, if sa isfactory, give an order on the Treasurer; if part loss, adjusted and paid. Adjuster and loser cannot agree, a commission to be appointed.

Tenth—Personal property to be insured direct from the office, by policy, in a similar way as now by companies.

Eleventh-Risks to be divided into classesordinary, hazardous and extra-hazardous.

Twelfth—The bureau to have authority, under circumstances, to issue short policies on

buildings or personal property.
Thirteenth—What money there should be on hand at the expiration of the year, after pay-ing all losses and expenses, should be, by a commission composed of the finance committee of the Common Council, invested in United States, our own state, or county bonds, or buying up our city bonds, and kept as a fund to pay extraordinary losses and our city debt. Fourteenth—if the tax is not paid the build

ing is insured the same, the property being holden for the tax, the same as for other taxes.

Fifteenth-In case of over-insurance on personal property, the Bureau to have authority to reduce or cancel.

DEAR SIR-Referring to the verbal proposition presented to your committee this morning I submit the following as containing briefly the substance and main points of the same for the consideration of the parties in interest. The present condition of the Rochester and State Line Railway Company, so far as its authorized issue of stock and bonds is concerned is as \

Capital stock, 20,000 shares, par value \$100 each, \$2,000,000.

Authorized by law to issue first mortgage bonds on each mile of its road, not exceeding \$25,000, making total issue on 109 miles of road,

Of the first mortgage bonds so authorized to be issued the City of Rochester and bonded towns held \$1,105,000, which were received at par in exchange for bonds of said municipal corporations issued in aid of the construction

of this railway

In view of the foregoing my proposition is as follows: Increase the capital stock of the company to \$2,500,000. By contract and agreement restrict the entire bonded debt to \$20,000 per mile, thus decreasing the amount of bonds secured by mortgage on the road as now sur-

veyed \$545,000.

Exchange the stock of the railway company at its par value for the mortgage bonds now held by the city of Rochester and the towns. The balance of the stock, except what is now issued, and the bonds so restricted as to the amount to be issued to me in such form and proportion as is hereinafter specified.

The first mortgage shall be on the entire railroad constructed and to be constructed, both real and personal property, and the rights, privileges, franchises and equities from Rochester to Salamanca, together with all rolling stock, machinery and equipments, and to be issued for \$12,000 per mile. The second mortgage to be a lien on the same property to the

amount of \$8,000 per mile.

In consideration whereof 1 will complete the said railway from Rochester to Salamanca within six months from the day the formal conwithin six months from the day the formal contract i, signed, will fully equip the same as follows: twelve locomotives, 350 platform and gondola cars, 150 box cars, 8 passenger cars, 4 postoffice and baggage cars, 20 hand-cars, round houses, machine shops, station buildings, 3 turn-tables, 7 water tanks, 2 track scales, yard room, &c. The shops, station buildings, &c., &c., to be located at suitable points on the line of the road, as the Board of Directors shall determine, and the whole to cost at least \$90,000 exclusive of the rolling stock above mentioned.

I will also settle and pay the floating debt of

the company upon such terms as I may be able to make with the respective claimants.

For the faithful performance of my part of the contract I will enter into a bond with sureties acceptable to the railroad company, the city of Rochester and bonded towns or give a satisfactory guarantee.

The first step to be taken under the contract will be to complete the grading, masonry and bridging ready for ties, iron, etc. When the iron is laid a fair equipment must

be provided, together with round houses, turn. tables, water stations depots, ample sidings and turn outs, cattle yards, machine shops, &c., &c., or the road cannot with its earnings meet interest, taxes, &c., after paying ordinary running expenses. Completed and thoroughly running expenses. equipped as mentioned above, I have no doubt but it will be able at once to pay its current expenses, interest on bonded debt, taxes, and in a comparatively brief time pay a dividend on its capital stock.

This statement is based on my knowledge derived from personal observation of the country

through which this railway runs, the connections it will make, and my experience with roads in this State similarly located.

REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Kelly:

To the Hon. Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: The Joint Special Committee, appointed by the Common Council and the railroad commissioners of the bonded towns, respectively, to examine the contract and prepare a bill for presentation to the Legislature, respectfully submit to your honorable body a copy of the contract between the Rochester and State Line Railway Company and J. Condit Smith, for the completion and equipment of the State Line Railway

Also, a draft of a bill, necessary to be enacted by the Legislature, to enable this city and the bonded towns to effect the proposed exchange, and to protect their interests in the railway after such exchange is made. The contract was carefully drawn, and was examined and approved by the City Attorney before it was agreed to by the contracting parties.

While some of its conditions may be criticised it will be borne in mind that a contract must be satisfactory to both parties, and, as a rule, those which are fair, equitable and just in their conditions, are in a large majority of instances carried out according to their true intent, and Tre faithfully observed by the parties to the

The bill herewith submitted, if it becomes a law, will enable the several municipal corporations interested to carry into effect the proposed exchange, and will protect the rights of all parties. It is also approved by the City Attornev.

We recite briefly some of the reasons which influenced your committee in approving of the contract referred to, and the form of the pro-

posed law.

First—The contract contemplates and provides for the speedy completion of the entire railway in a thorough and substantial manner, complete in all the requirements of the law and in what is usual and necessary in first-class railways.

Second-It provides for the necessary rolling stock and equipment to enable this railway, as soon as it is opened, to be in readiness to do a passenger and freight traffic, without being

subject to the arbitrary demands and conditions of a lease or the exactions of a rolling stock company. A railway owning its rolling stock and machine shops is practically independent of other railway corporations, and, by reason of its independence, can demand and will receive the most favorable terms from other roads, whether they are friendly or otherwise.

Third-It provides for an expenditure which will locate the passenger and freight depots near the business centre of the city, with ample facilities for receiving and shipping heavy freights by canal.

Fourth—The extension proposed by the contractor, leading southwardly from Salamanca, and which is now being surveyed, will give to this railway connections with the entire system of railways in Western Pennsylvania, with the best of gas and steam coal in that State and an extensive lumber district.

Fifth—Mr. Smith is largely interested in coal lands now developed, and with railways running directly to the same, and on the comple-tion of the State Line Railway, Rochester, with the railways centering here, and its connection with Charlotte, and facilities furnished by canal, will be a distributing centre for coal, and it requires no argument to demonstrate that this will cheapen materially the cost of hard and soft coal to all consumers. The general advantages which will result to this city from the speedy completion of this road, need not be repeated here.

Sixth-This city and the bonded towns will have, if they so elect, immediately, a representation in the Board of Directors.

Seventh—The contract, in a great measure, protects individual creditors of the road who have furnished it with supplies and materials, now distributed on the line of the road or in use, and who are entitled to consideration, as well as the municipal corporations which receive direct and positive benefit from the construction of this railway.

Eighth—This contract is approved by Waterman & Beaver, the largest creditors of the road, and who have withdrawn their own proposi-

Ninth—If the material in place and delivered for use on the line of the unfinished portion of this road is not used this season, it will be worthless for any purpose.

Finally—Argument is not needed to show that the stock of a railroad whose bonded debt, limited to \$20,000 per mile, is a lien on all its real and personal property, cannot but prove much more valuable, with fair prospects of being eventually remunerative, than first mortgage bonds on an uncompelted road.

It will not be overlooked that the entire bonded debt and the whole issue of stock, on the plan now under consideration, is \$45,000 less than the s ock and bonded debt of the road on the propo i ion for the exchange of first for second mortgage bonds, and the guarantee in that proposition, provided only for the completion of the road, without any rolling stock or equip_nent.

The contract and proposed act are approved by the Commissioners from the various towns, and we respectfully ask for definite ac ion at

this meeting of the Council, as, for obvious reasons, there should not be any further delay.

Section 1. The Common Council of the City of Rochester, is hereby authorized and empowered to exchange with the Rochester and State Line Railway Company, the first mortgage bonds of said company, which were issued to said city pursuant to the provisions of chapter one hundred and eighty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy two, entitled, "An Act to authorize the City of Rochester to issue its bonds in aid of the Rochester and State Line Railway Company, and to take bonds of that company therefor," passed April sixth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, and the unpaid intere t coupons attached thereto, for an amount of the capital stock of said company, which shall be equal to the principal of the bonds so exchanged, whenever said railway company shall have entered into a written contract for the completion and equipment of said railroad from Rochester to Salamanca, and a guaranty shall have been given by such contractor to said city, with sufficient sureties to be approved by the Common Council of said city; that said railroad shall be ready for operation and equipped, by the first day of January, 1877, provided also, the mortgage bonds issued or to be issued by said company on its said road, and equipment, shall not exceed the sum of twenty thousand dollars for each mile in length of said railroad, as located from Rochester to Sala-

The Commissioners or a majority of them, representing any municipal corporation within this State, holding the bonds of the Rochester and State Line Railroad Company, issued in exchange for the bonds of such municipal corporation, pursuant to the provisions of chapter nine hundred and seven, of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, entitled "An act to amend an act entitled . An act to authorize the formation of railroad corporations, and to regulate the same, passed April second, eighteen hundred and fifty, so as to permit municipal corporations to aid in the construction of railroads," passed May eighteen, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, and the several acts amenditory thereof, or supplementary thereto, are hereby authorized and empowered to exchange with said railway company its bonds and the interest coupons attached thereto, so held by said Commissioners, for the capital stock of said company to an amount equal to the principal of the bonds so exchanged, whenever said railroad company shall have entered into a written contract for the completion and equipment of said railroad from Rochester to Salamanca and shall have given to the city of Rochester the guaranty required by the first section of this act, and said Commissioners may, in their discretion, require a like guaranty to be approved by them or a majority of them.

§ 3. The Commissioners of said several municipal corporations named in section 2 of this act shall have the custody and control of said bonds until the same shall be exchanged as herein provided, and upon such exchange being made, they shall respectively have the custody and control of said capital stock, and the said Commissioners, so long as they control said stock, shall also be entitled to elect two directors of said company, who need not be stockholders

thereof.

§4. The capital stock of said company shall not exceed \$2,500,000. The capital stock to be issued to the said municipal corporation as provided by this act, shall be deemed and taken to be full paid up stock, and not liable to future

assessment.

§ 5. The Common Council of the city of Rochester, so long as said city shall own said stock, shall be entitled to elect two of the directors of said company, who shall be citizens of Rochester, and need not be stockholders of said com-

pany.
§ 6. This act shall take effect immediately. Ordered received, filed and published.

OFFICE OF CITY ATTORNEY. ROCHESTER, Feb. 8th, 1876.

To the Hon, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN:-As I stated to you in my report last March, special endeavor would be made this year towards the collection of the

unpaid taxes due the city.

This has been. I believe, regarded as not part of the City Attorney's business, and the taxes have been suffered to get in arrears until many are uncollectable; some are also erroneous, and on many no notices of redemption have been served. Bonds were issued in 1872 for \$35,000 to clear up all the old taxes then outstanding, and there are also the sales since. During the last year \$20,000 of back taxes have been collected, of which about \$6,000 are the usual redemptions, and the balance have been enforced on old taxes.

Five thousand dollars of this was for taxes back of 1871, and is applied to pay that amount

of the deficiency bonds.

Including the amount represented by the \$30,000 of these bonds still unpaid, the city still holds over \$50,000 of tax certificates

Some considerable proportion of this will be paid if proper care is taken in serving redemption notices. A large amount, from various reasons, is now uncollectable, but I think that by sufficient attention being given, from \$10,-000 to \$20,000 could be collected, in addition to what has already been done, if sufficient time is allowed for it. I need, however, a thorough search made of old notices served and changes in title. I cannot give the time to this myself, and I already pay out for clerical help more than the city should ask, considering the amount of work that is now done in the City Autorney's office.

Under the e circumstances, I wish the Common Council would authorize me to expend not exceeding seventy-five dollars to clerks to make the proper search into titles, &c., for my my assistance in the collection of these old ta es.

SIR: In accordance with the request of the Common Council of this city you will please call that body together on Monday, the thirteenth inst., to meet the Commissioners of the towns, interested in the State Line Railroad, for the purpose of taking action in relation to the sale or exchange of bonds.

Ald. Kelly presented the following: An Act to authorize Municipal Corporations holding the first mortgage bonds of the Rochester and State Line Railway Company, to sell and dispose of the same.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The common council of the city of Rochester is hereby authorized and empowered to sell and dispose of the first mortgage bonds of the Rochester and State Line Railway Company, which were issued to said city pursuant to the provisions of chapter one hundred and eighty-five, of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-two, entitled "An act to authorize the city of Rochester and State Line Railway Company, and to take bonds of that company therefor," passed April sixth. passed April eighteen hundred and seventy-two, and the unpaid coupons attached thereto upon such terms and conditions as to said common council shall seem best for the interest of said city, when-ever said railway company shall have entered into a written contract for the completion and equipment of said railroad, from Rochester to Salamanca, and a guaranty shall have been given by such contractor to said city, with sufficient sureties to be approved by the common council of said city, that said railroad shall be ready for operation and equipped by the first of January, eighteen hundred and seventyseven, provided alto the mortgage bonds issued or to be issued by said company on its said road and equipment, shall not exceed the sum of twenty thousand dollars for each mile in length of said railroad as located, from Rochester to Salamanca.

§2. The commissioners, or a majority of them, representing any municipal corporation within this State, holding the bonds of the Rochester and State Line Railway Company, issued m exchange for the bonds of such municipal corporation, pursuant to the provisions of chapter nine hundred and seven, of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, entitled "An act to amend an act entitled "An act to authorize the formation of railroad corporations, and to regulate the same, passed April second, eighteen hundred and fifty, so as to permit municipal corporations to aid in the con truction of railroads, passed May eighteen, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, and the several acts amendate. datory thereof or supplementary thereto, are hereby authorized and empowered to sell and dispose of the bonds of said railway company, and the interest coupons attached thereto, so held by said commissioners, upon such terms and conditions as to said commissioners or a majority of them shall be deemed best for the interest of said municipal corporation they represent whenever said railway company shall have entered into a written contract for the completion and equipment of said railway from Rochester to Salamanca, and the contractor shall have given to the city of Rochester the guaranty required by the first section of this act and said commissioners may, in their discretion require a like guaranty to be approved by them or a majority of them.

- § 3. The commissioners of said several municipal corporations named in section two of this act, shall have the custody and control of said bonds until the same shall have been sold and disposed of as herein above provided, and they shall respectively have the custody and control of the proceeds of the sale of the said railway bonds until the proceeds of the same shall be applied as provided in section six of this act, and until so applied, said commissioners shall be entitled to elect two of the directors of said railway company who need not be stockholders thereof.
- The Common Council of the city of Rochester, (until the proceeds of said bonds are applied as provided in section 6 of this act,) shall be entitled to elect two of the Directors of said Railway Company, who need not be stockholders thereof.

§ 5. The capital stock of said company shall not exceed two million five hundred thousand dollars.

§ 6. All the proceeds and avails of said bonds, when converted into cash, shall be applied to the payment of the interest and principal of the bonds heretofore issued by said corporations respectively, in aid of said railway company, and not otherwise.

This act shall take effect immediately.

D. D. S. Brown, from the Commissioners of Towns, presented the following:-

It was Resolved, That we approve of the amendments suggested to said bill, and respectfully urge upon the members of the Legislature representing the several towns bonded as aforesaid, the importance of passing said bill at as early a day as practicable with or without said amendments, as the Legislature may deem ad-

AN ACT to amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester," passed April eight, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, and the various acts amendatory thereof or relating to the city of Rochester.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION I. Sections six, seven, eight, teu, eleven, twelve, thirteen, fourteen, fifteen and nineteen of an act passed May twenty, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, entitled "An act to amend the several acts in relation to the city of Rochester," are hereby repealed, and the office of "commissioner of public works of the city of Rochester," are hereby repealed, and the office of "commissioner of public works of the city of Rochester," is hereby abolished, but said commissioners shall possess and execute the powers heretofore given them until the first Monday of May, eighteen hundred and seventy-six, except that no ordinance for public improvements or opening of streets shall be passed by said board of public works after the passage of this act, and the repeal by this section directed shall take effect on that day.

§2. Section one hundred and fifty-five of an act entitled "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester," passed April eight, eighteen hundred and sixtyone, as heretofore amended, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

There shall be an executive board of said city, which shall consist of six electors and freeholders therein, three of such board shall be chosen by the electors of said city in the same manner as other city officers, at the election to be held in March, eighteen hundred and seventy-six, for terms of one, two and three years respectively, the mayor of said city, during the month of April in said year, shall nominate the other three of said board for terms of one, two and three years respectively, subject to approval by the people and one nominated by the mayor during the month of April, subject to approval of the common council, as above provided, for terms of three years. The mayor shall appoint such persons that each of the two chief political parties shall have three members of such board. Any vacancy shall be filled by the

§ 4. No member of said executive board, nor any clerk or agent thereof, shall be directly or indirectly interested in any contract, work or business, or the sale of any article, the expense, price or consideration of which is to be paid from the city treasury, nor in the purchase of any property for or on account of the city, or which shall be sold by or on behalf of said city. Any contract, sale or purchase in which any such person above named shall be interested, shall be absolutely void. Any person vio ating any of the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one year, or both.

§ 5. Said executive board may appoint a superintend ent of streets, who shall hold office at its pleasure, the salary of such superintendent shall be fixed by the common council.

§ 6. Section sixty-one of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows.
§ 61. It shall be the duty of the superintendent of streets to superintend, under the general direction of the executive board, all work to be done, or ordered upon or in relation to any of the public streets, parks, walks, bridges, sewers, pumps or reservoirs of said city, and to perform, under the direction of said board, such other duties as are by law imposed upon him. If no superintendent of streets shall be appointed, then all powers and duties by this act, given and imposed upon him, shall belong to, and be performed by, the executive board of said city.
§ 7. Section one hundred and sixty-five of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:
§ 185. Before the common council shall determine to make any such public improvement, they shall cause an estimate thereof to be made, and shall, by an entry in their minutes, describe the portion or part of the city which they deem proper to be assessed for the expense of such improvement. They shall cause a notice to be published daily in one or more daily newspapers printed in the city of Rochester, for four days, which notice shall specify such improvement, the estimated expense thereof, and the portion or part of the city to be assessed for such expense; and shall require all persons interested in the subject-matter of such improvement to attend the said council at the time appointed in such notice. At the time appointed in such notice. At the time appointed in such notice, the said council shall proceed to hear the allegations of the owners and occupants of houses and lots situate within the portion or parts of the same, shall make such further order in respect to such improvement as they shall deem proper. Said executive board is hereby directed to cause a notice to be published in one or more of the official papers of said city, at least ten days before the letting of any contract, for sealed proposals therefor, each to be accompanied by a bond signed by at least two respons

read as follows:

§ 6. The officers of said city shall be one mayor, read as follows:

§ 6. The officers of said city shall be one mayor, one treasurer, two aldermen for each ward until the first Monday in April, eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, and one alderman from each ward thereafter, one police justices, three justices of the peace, one constable for each ward, one supervisor for each ward, three inspectors of election for each ward or election district, one commissioner of schools for each ward, all to be elected by the electors of said city, by ballot, as hereinafter provided, one city clerk, one city attorney, one overseer of the poor, three assessors, one sealer of weights and measures, one city surveyor, one chief of police, one chief engineer, and one fire marshal, to be appointed as hereinafter provided, and such other officers as are by this act or the laws of this State authorized. There shall be an election for alderman in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-six, to hold office for one year, but at the election to alderman and the hold office for two years, but all be chosen from each of the wards having an even number, and an alderman to hold office for one year from each ward having an odd number, and thereafter aldermen shall be elected for the years, as the terms expire of those elected for the respective wards.

§ 11. Subdivision four of section twelve of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

4. The said commissioners of police, when entering upon the duties of their office respectively, shall take upon themselves the usual oath of office, and shall meet at the mayor's office, or other suitable place, at such times as may be expedient, and as they shall from time to time designate, and on special occasions as the mayor may appoint in writing, notice of which shall be served on such commissioners personally, or select at the place of residence or business of such commissioners respectively; and if any of said commissioners should be elected to and accept the office of mayor, then the common council shall proceed, as in the case of vacancy, except in case of re-election of the mayor; and no alderman shall be eligible for appointment to the office of police commissioner; and no commissioner except the mayor, who shall be publicly nominated for or appointed to any political office, and shall not, within ten days after being motified thereof, publicly decline the same, shall be deemed to have vacated his office of said commissioner. The said commissioners of police, other than the mayor, shall receive an annual salary of five hundred dollars, to be paid quarterly out of the current expenses of the police department, the same to begin at the commencement of the official year in which this act small be passed, except those now holding such office shall receive the same salary as heretofore during the residue of their term.

§ 12. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

§ 13. This act shall take effect immediately.

GENTLEMEN—In answer to a resolution of your honorable body, the Board of Water Commissioners respectfully report: That the water works were substantially completed in the month of December, in the sense that the whole line of conduit frum the city to Hemlock lake was connected; but owing to necessary delays in testing and matting repairs, where defects apocared, the water communication was not perfect until the latter part of January. Solved, Water, pure as crystal, flowed in abundant streamsthrough the streets of the city and entered the dwellings of het people to bring health and comfort and rejoicing. It came in unmeasured quantities to flush the sewers, cleanse the cesspools and drive away the pestilence which ever lurks amid the impurities and filth of populous cities.

To accomplish this great object at the earliest possible day, the Board of Water Commissioners spared no efforts. With difficulties to encounter, which no one, not familiar with the work accomplished, can understand, and in the face of opposition, fanned, no doubt, by the breath of the noisy trumpeters of the old defunct water company, the enterprise went on; night and day relays of tofling men continued the work.

To accomplish this great object in the opinion of the board, continuous labor, and for many weeks there was not a single moment, night or day, when the fires of the forges did not plow, and the clang of the hammers was not neard, in the effort to complete the main conduit line before the closing of the year. It was done; what was promised to your Honorable Board has been accomplished; and the citizens of Rochester have a system of works unsurpassed, it is believed, by any in the country, and a supply of pure water unsurpassed by any city in the world.

Notwithstanding the ereat amount of work upon the main line, this board, than was not unmindful of the wants of the citizens of less cost or importance. And they assert, without fear of c

The report of the Chief Engineer, which accompanies this communication, will show the present condition of the water fund, as nearly as can be determined before the final measurements and settlement with the contractors; and it also contains an estimate or the expense of work which ought to be performed. Considering the magnitude of the enterprise and the extent of the main lines, some imperfections were to be expected as an unavoidable necessity. Thus far, two only have been discovered; first, defects in a considerable number of the cast from bells, forming the connections of the large wrought iron pipes. These have been repaired and were the cause of the delay to which reference has been made. Second, a small flow of water below the banks of the distributing reservoir has appeared, indicating a slight leak, probably caused by a defect in the puddle lining at the bottom, if it does not come from springs in the vicinity. But the water has been drawn down so as to avoid any possibility of danger, and repairs will be made, if necessary, as soon as the weather may permit.

REHORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER WATER WORKS.

GENTLEMEN:—In accordance with your instructions, I respectfully submit the following concise statement of the present condition of the Rochester water works. A few weeks later, I should have been able to give a more satisfactory and detailed statement, as I am engaged now with my assistants in making the final calculations, in minute detail, of all work done under contract with James McDonald, for the purpose of settling the same, as soon as his obligations to maintain the conduit line in good working order for three months after the letting in of the water shall cease.

There have been laid in the streets of the city pipe mains to the extent of \$7/4\$ miles, being an increase of 174 miles over what was contemplated and promised by the Commissioners in their original report. Of this amount, 7/4 miles is connected with the Holly system. In connection with the city distribution, there have been set 735 stop valves and 518 fire hy drants—118 more than was estimated in the original report. An iron conduit main twenty-eight miles in length has been laid from Hemlock Lake to the distributing reservoir near Mt. Hope, ten miles of which is wrought iron thirty-six inches diameter, two and six-tenths miles of wrought iron twenty-four inches diameter. The amount of water which this ine can furnish to the city is about 9,000,000 gallons in twenty-four hours, an increase of capacity over the pipe line originally estimated for by you, of 100 per cent. Also, to fully carry out the plan to supply the mills on the outlet of Hemlock Lake with such an amount of water as will entirely preclude any attempt in the future to collect damages from the city for the abstraction of water for the use of Rochester, it will be necessary to construct a bulkhead and a short channel, so that as the lake is drawn down the mills may receive a supply at the same time, and to the same depth in the lake as the city is supplied. I think, however, it can be conclusively shown that the mills may be fully supplied, for the present, to the full extent of our obligation, by drawing from Canadice alone during the dry season, but as the proposed bulkhead will soon be imperatively needed, I sm satisfied that serious complications may be fully avoided by its immediate construction.

without receiving such adequate returns in the shape of fire protection and water for the common purposes of life, as their great need imperatively demands. The Water Board has no funds which they can apply to these objects, and it must rest with the Common Council to inaugurate such measures for the relief of these parties as they may deem just and wise.

It is the opinion of your Engineer that an addition of twenty miles to the city mains, at an average expense of \$6.000 per mile, would fully meet the necessities of citizens for many years, and would practically cover all the territory in which mains should be laid.

The Water Board has yielded, in many cases, to the pressing representations of the people in some localities and their representatives in the Common Council, and caused extensions to be made and paid for out of funds which were estimated for and designed by the undersigned solely for the completion of the work outside the city; and while I concur in the substantial justice of the expenditure, yet even some of the parties who have been most benefited by such diversion of funds, have most ungenerously charged the undersigned with either being incompetent to make a correct estimate, or with a deliberate intention to deceive the public.

About one year ago I estimated that \$182,100 additional appropriation would substantially complete the work; not one dollar was included in that estimate for extensions in the city, and yet more than three miles of such extensions have been made since that estimate. Not withstanding that, in deference to the demand of citizens, many extensions to the city mains have been made which were not originally contemplated or estimated for, yet the great work is substantially completed for the money, and within the time predicted; and that, too, in the face of physical obstacles of the most formidable and discouraging character, and the unreasoning opposition of some who would have better subserved the public interest by a kindly good-speed. It is true that some more work is to be done the present year; but I am sure that soon it will become a matter of pride, as well as of self-interest, with our citizens to improve, extend and beautify these works from year to year, as the benefits of pure water become more widely diffused and arpreciated.

There is now on hand a large amount of cast iron pipe, and, particularly, of valuable and always expensive special castings, which will be very useful and materially decrease the expense of making future city extensions.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the

City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN:-The Clerk of the Board of Health begs leave to present the annual report of the Health Department for the year ending

April 1st, 1876.
The Board organized on the 9th day of April. 1875, composed of the following named gentlemen: Hon. George H. Clarkson, President; Ald. James O. Howard, Ald. B. F. Thomas, Ald. W. S. Smith, Ald. Wm. Buell, James Logan, Joseph Yawman.

Small pox made its appearance in our midst at first to an alarming extent, but by means suggested by Health Officer Hovey adopted by the Board and promptly carried out by our effi-cient Health Officer, and aided by Mr. Woellart and family at the hospital, its spread to any great extent was stayed and the loathsome disease driven from our city.

The popular prejudice against this loathsome malady is so strong that the thinking public cheerfully submit to any judicious regulations which the Board of Health may impose to pro-

tect them from this contagion. In the instances in which this disease has made its appearance during the year immediate notice of its presence has been followed by prompt attention on the part of the Board of Health and its officers, to those precautions best calculated to prevent its spread-vaccination

and disinfection. By reference to the disbursements you will observe that quite a large sum for vaccination, virus, &c., was expended, but the Board feel confident that their action will be heartily endorsed by the public as large.

During the present month our faithful keep-er of Hope Hospital, Mr. August Woellart, has been removed by death. He has served the city honestly and faithfully for many years, and will be greatly missed from his post of duty at the hospital.

In examining the following report it will be found that the reason for the large outlay of money from the fund is in consequence of the prevalence of small-pox in our midst; alse the amount paid for the collection and removal of garbage (\$3,833.25) is a great drain on the fund.

Scarlet fever, which has prevailed during the year, number of deaths 210. Diphtheria, measles, &c. Consumption 197, inflammation of lungs 121; total from lung diseases To small pox the report is quite exhausgiving the number of cases in each month and the origin so far as possible. Up to about the first of January there were only sporadic cases and were confined to the house in which in appeared, though many cases were in localities peculiarly favorable to its propagation.

It is certain that vaccination and other preventive measures were the sole causes of this

remarkable result.

On the 30th day of December and 4 days following, small pox broke out in six different localities in the city and seemed to be the result of contagion emanating from a single cause.

On the 5th of January the Board of Health empowered the Health Officer with absolute power with instructions, if possible, to eradi-

cate the disease from the city.

In addition to those then sick on that day, 38 new cases were reported within the next fifteen days, making in all for the month of January 58 cases. On the 2d day of February the Health Officer reported to the President of the Board of Health that there was not a case of small

pox in the city under treatment.

During the month of January there were vaccinated, under the direction of the Health Officer, between 8,000 and 9,000 school children. He was assisted in this great work by the City Physicians and Drs. Mallory, Preston, O'Hare and Weigle, and had it not be n for the efficient and timely help of those gentlemen the work could not have been so effectually done. Be-sides this work, under the direction of the Health Department, the entire medical fraternity attended to their own families, and it is estimated that 25,000 or 30,000 persons were vaccinated in the city in the month of January.

During the year 32 persons have been treated at Hope Hospital. The Health Officer has given personal attention to these persons besides care to outside patients of about an equal number- Our mortality has been exceeding low, which is only about 12 per cent.

To the success in eradicating the disease from the city so quickly is due to the Health Department in appreciating the danger of the contagion of small pox and relying upon known pre-

wentative means in suppressing it.

To the prompt and decided action of the Board of Health, on the 5th of January, great credit is given, for by their action the Health Officer was sustained. It also showed an appreciation of the danger of the disease to the health and lives of the citizens, besides the inevitable loss of business in every department of

In estimating the cost of suppressing small pox so quickly with a neighboring city it is but trifling, for here it is less than \$3,500, while there the direct tax was nearly \$100,000 and an estimated loss in trade of millions of dollars besides scores of lives, if not hundreds.

The present system of removing garbage and night soil is defective, and is very expensive, costing more than one-half the entire expense of the Health Fund, and very unsatisfactory to the inhabitants. A change in the system is demanded.

Special reference to the subject of sewerageadvocating that in the constructing of them a proper allow ance should in all cases be made for traps, and that all lateral or other openings should be immediately trapped, as the escape of sewer gas is a source of more sickness than any

other single cause.

The abundant supply of water is bailed with great favor as a sanitary agen', besides the use for culinary purposes. The report predicts that within the year to come there will be a diminution of preventable diseases, and due to the supply of pure water. Water should be "free for all," as it is one of the best sanitary agents known.

The subject of ventilation of public schools is thoroughly discussed, - reciting the action of the Board of Health in this particular, and the already action the Commissioners of Public

Schools have taken on his subject.

The question of the propriety of continuing the office of Superintendent of Health Inspectors is discussed. It is questioned whether the Health Department require it, and regards it a superfluous office. In this connection it is urged that good, competent men, with intelligence, should in all cases be selected as Health Inspec-

The effort of the Board of Health of last year is fully endorsed, in its action towards securing an abattoir, givingreasons, estimating that over 30,000 beef cattle are required for consumption in this city annually, and about 120,000 small animals.

The Heal h Officer's duties should be definitely defineo, and the salary of that officer made ommensurate with the duties specified.

Suggesting a plan for the sick poor of the city in case of contagious and infectious diseases; urging that the City Physicians should be under the direction of the Board of Health.

This is followed by general remarks upon sanitary laws, congratulating the authorities for their prudence in the administration of the Health Department, and yet free to protect the people against epidemics and pestilential diseases.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CITY TREASURER.
CITY TREASURER'S OFFICE,
ROCHESTER, N. Y., March 16, 1876.
To the Hon. Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to transmit herewith the Annual Report required from this

office—Section 59, Title 4, Revised Charter.

Accompanying the same will be found abstracts from the Ledger and Journal, giving a detailed statement of every charge to any fund or account, with proper vouchers for every such entry, except such as are mere matters of book-keeping, which explain themselves.

No withstanding the present embarrassment

No withstanding the present embarrassment of the business of the whole country, (our own city suffering its due share of the general stagnation), it is with great pleasure that I can

present to you so flattering a statement of the year's work as I am able to do

Out of a tax levy of \$804,960.50-100, the list of delinquents is very small in view of the times. The whole amount of sales for unpaid taxes (which includes the fees, interest and cost of selling, an average of fully 15 per cent. of the amount) was only \$22,601.22-100, of which the city will receive from sales of the tax certificates \$9,842.01, leaving only \$12,759.21-100, for which the city has not received its pay.

The local taxes are also very well paid up as a rule, the installment plan enabling many to pay large taxes, which they would otherwise

You will observe that very many of the local assessments show large debtor balances upon the books, bu these being three payment rolls and the second or third payments, or both, not being yet due, they are generally credited with as much as the city has actually paid out and the notes given by the city for the remainder

can be met by future payments. There is no office in the city where the popular ideas are so much at fault as this. very many of our best citizens under the impressi n that in addition to the Treasurer receiving a fixed salary that he receives large perquisites in the shape of fees, interest, &c., when, if you will look into this matter carefully you find the increase of labor and incedible, you detail almost will find allow ance from that. with an the city of \$1,000 for clerk hire, that during the past year I have been compelled to employ three clerks most of the time, two of them all the time, and at times extra help in addition. You will also find that both myself and clerks in order to accomplish the amount of labor accamulating from time to time have been compelled to work nights the greater part of the year.

It is but justice to me that you should look into this matter thoroughly, for I am now behind from being obliged to pay such heavy expenses in conducting the office, and you will be easily convinced that it is impossible to do what I have done the past year for the compension.

I am obliged to give large bail, to incur great responsibilities and work very hard, and the amount of my salary without clerk hire as fixed last vear, viz: \$3,500, for the city and \$500 for the Water Works would be a moderate rate for what I can show as the result af my labors.

The regular city books exhibit the following items of profits to the city and only credited as such:

For what is past I make no claim for extra compensation, but trust you will see the propriety of recommending the new Board to leave this matter until such an examination of the merits of my case can be had as they may

deem necessary, and if the new members have any doubts they can personally investigate. I feel that I am entitled to enough compensa-

I feel that I am entitled to enough compensation to afford a living and a little more, and in addition to clerks enough to conduct the office in a proper manner, and to give the tax-payers such attention as they feel themselves entitled to, but whatever is done I wish it to be openly and to have every Alderman justified in granting it, being confident that I can satisfy every one a year from now that I have been able to give the city value received for such salary as I shall receive.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CITY ATTORNEY.

CITY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE. ROCHESTER, March 26, 1876.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit the following report of the matters under my charge during the past year:

The following suits have been disposed of: The action of Kimble against the city was brought to recover \$1,000 damages for overflowing lands. The case was tried before Judge Rawson as referee, and he has not yet rendered his deci-ion.

The suit of Hassan and others against the city was brought to restrain the collection of the tax for the Oak street improvement, being about \$24,000 and interest for several years, on the ground that the assessment was irregular. The action was first tried some years ago and judgment rendered for the city on the pleadings. This was, however, reversed in the Court of Appeals and a new trial ordered. The case was tried on the merits before Judge Dwight in December. He held the asse sment was regular and decided for the city, and the City Treasurer will proceed to collect the tax. The plaintiffs have appealed, but I see no reason to doubt that the judgment will be affirmed.

The suit of the city against Langworty was brought to recover for alleged embezzlement. The suit was tried last January and the jury rendered a verdict for the defendant. I have moved for a new trial on the ground that this verdict was contrary to the evidence, as it seems to me it certainly was.

There are still pending the actions against Langworthy's bail, and notwithstanding the result in the last suit, I think the city will get a verdict against the bondsmen and, if recovered, is will be paid, as the bondsmen are entire-

ly responsible.

The suit of Russell against the city was brought to recover \$5,000 for the death of Mr.

Russell on River street.

The suit of Gould against the city, growing out of the same accident being decided in favor of the city last year. Mrs. Russell abandoned her case on my relinquishing any claim

against her for the costs of the suit.

The sait of Mary Niven against the city was brought to recover \$5,000 for damages sustain ed by her from falling on a sidewalk. The case was tried in October and the jury disagreed. The case It was tried again in January and the plaintiff got a verdict of \$750, wuich was a very moderate one The city has paid up the judgment. erate one

The action of Lutes and others against the city was brought to restrain the collection of a tax of about \$20,000 imposed for the Platt street outles sewer on the ground of irregularities in letting the contract. The case was referred to Mr. Angle, who decided against the city, and it was enjoined from collecting the tax. I appealed to the General Term and the judgment was affirmed. I appealed to the Court of Appeals and its decision was announced last week, reversing the judgment below. This court holds the proceedings regular, and this is the end of the suit.

The suits of Hanvey and Boyd and Hart were brought to recover of the city respectively \$1,-000 and \$1,600, have been partly tried before

referees, and are still pending.

The suit of the city against Yates to prevent his scattering coal dust on Hill stree was brought on before Judge Rumsey, who ordered it to be tried by a jury, but it will not be reached until the June Term.

The suit of the city against Riley to collect certain old unpaid taxes, was settled by his

paying the city \$5,500.

The suit of Winser against the city was brought to recover \$1,000 damages caused by the plaintiff's falling on the ice. The suit was tried in the County Court in November and the plaintiff was nonsuited.

The suits of Still against the city were two actions brought each to recover \$1,000 for damages caused by an accident on River screet. The suits were tried in October and the plain

tiffs were nonsuitep in both cases.

The suit of Montgomery against the city was brought to recover \$9,000 on account of the fall of the river wall on the Front street building, for which it was claimed the city was liable The suit was tried before Judge Rumsey, and he held the city was not liable and dismissed the complaint. This is the end of the case.

The suit of the city against Montgomery was brought to recover the amount of a judgment McNeiss got against the city last year, McNeiss' accident being caused by Montgomery's negligence. The case was referred, and the referee reported for the city for the full amount paid

and interest, being \$760 in all.,

Montgomery has appealed to the General

The proceeding of Jennings against the City was brought, claiming the tax on North Water street for repairs was illegal. The Court decided in favor of the City.

Besides these there have been tried in the County Court, on appeal from lower Courts,

twelve suits, which are not of enough importance to need any detailed statement.

The same remark applies to street openings and suits in the Police and Justices' Courts. Thirty-two suits are now pending in the higher Courts in which the City is a party. Of

these twenty-one are against the City.

Eleven are brought to recover damages sustained in various ways.

Four for damages caused by overflow of Court street sewer.

Two to settle title of land.

Two to retrain the collection of taxes, Three to recover for moneys claimed to be owed by the city.

Eleven suits are brought by the City:

Four against Langworthy and his bondsmen. Three to collect taxes.

Three to retrain nuisances.

One to recover money paid on a judgment. The amount involved altogether exceeds \$100,000.

The total judgments recovered against the City during the last year, for damages and costs in all suits, have been a trifle over \$1,000.

The Law Committee has paid a few hundred dollars in settlement of various claims and

The City has recovered judgments for damages and costs for about \$1,500, besides about ,000 paid to it in foreclosures of old taxes.

The total of judgments on any cause recovered against the City during the past two year has been less than \$4,000. Of this about \$1,800 has been for injuries; \$1,500 balance of contracts, and the rest for costs. Nothing has been recovered for the overflowing of sewers, but \$600 or \$700 has been paid in settlement of claims.

In a previous report 1 have alluded to the subject of the collection of old taxes, to which I have given special attention during the past year. Not quite \$20,000 have been collected, being about \$15,000 more than has ever been paid to the City Treasurer in any previous year.

It seems to me eminently unfair that those

who pay their taxes promptly should also have to bear the burden of those who neglect to pay

at all.

By proper attention I think \$15,000 or \$20,-000 more of these old taxes can be collected which otherwise will become too stale to be enforced and the burden will have to be borne by the rest of the tax payers.

The entire legal expenses of the city during the past year, apart from salary, for all the incidental expenses of my office, including subpceaning witnesses, printing, my traveling expenses, &c., have been \$367.37. The Board of Public Works has also paid about \$80. expenses in the Lute's suit.

I have pursued the policy of my first year of attending to all the legal business of the city and during my term of office the Common Council has paid nothing to any counsel to as-

sist me in any case.

I wish in conclusion to express my very hearty thanks to the members for the uniform courtesy and consideration all have shown me during my connection with them during the past Yours respectfully, two years.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPART-MENT.

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: -Herewith I have the honor to submit my report of fires and losses for the year

ending March 31st, 1876.

The number for the past year has been 72, false alarms 3, making 75 times the department has been called out, an increase of four over last year; loss about seventy-five thousand dollars. Part of the department was called on for fires out of the city, twice at Avon and once at Spencerport, and did good services. They were sent by order of the Mayor.

In the following report I show the hour of the day or night that the alarm was given, the day of the month, street that the fire was on, what burned, and the box that the alarm was

As its presiding officer for the past year, in accordance with custom and in conformity with my own desire, I feel constrained to say a few words to you before our parting. It is needles: for me to say anything in regard to the prosperity of the city during the past year, or of the added means of protection from fire, and the abundant supof water as pure at the world affords, which is one of the chief gifts to us with which the past year has been freighted. Add to this the increased railroad communication with the surrounding country, affording ne . avenues of trade and commerce, and we may truly say that during this year much good has come to us. It is true that this has largely increased the city's indebtedness, but I thing in this case we can all learn the lesson that there is a withholding which impoverishes and a giving which enriches.

To you, gentlemen, by whose courtesy and favor I was appointed to the position of President of this Council, I return my most hearty thanks; and to you, gentlemen, whose generous political opposition I can do no les than say was right, I return equally hearty thanks for your uniform kindness, forbearance and aid, and this, too, I do to all. I have endeavored to conscientiously discharge my duty; whatever has been error has been of judgment, not in-

I should be untrue to you, and also to myselt, if I did not here confess to a feeling of pride for the position I have occupied during the past year. Gentlemen, your kindness is made more appreciative from the fact that I came to our city a stranger, with the knowledge only of a foreign tongue, and yet my way has been prosperous, and you have honored me There are some here who can with me realize what feelings it must rouse in one to be so received in the country of his adoption, not only by adopted citizens, but also by those who can claim this as their fatherland, and in that sense peculiarly their own. Again I thank you, gentlemen, and ere we part permit me to express

the hope for the continuous welfare of our city, and that each of you, in your several walks of life, may be advanced in your highest interest. With this, gentlemen, farewell.
