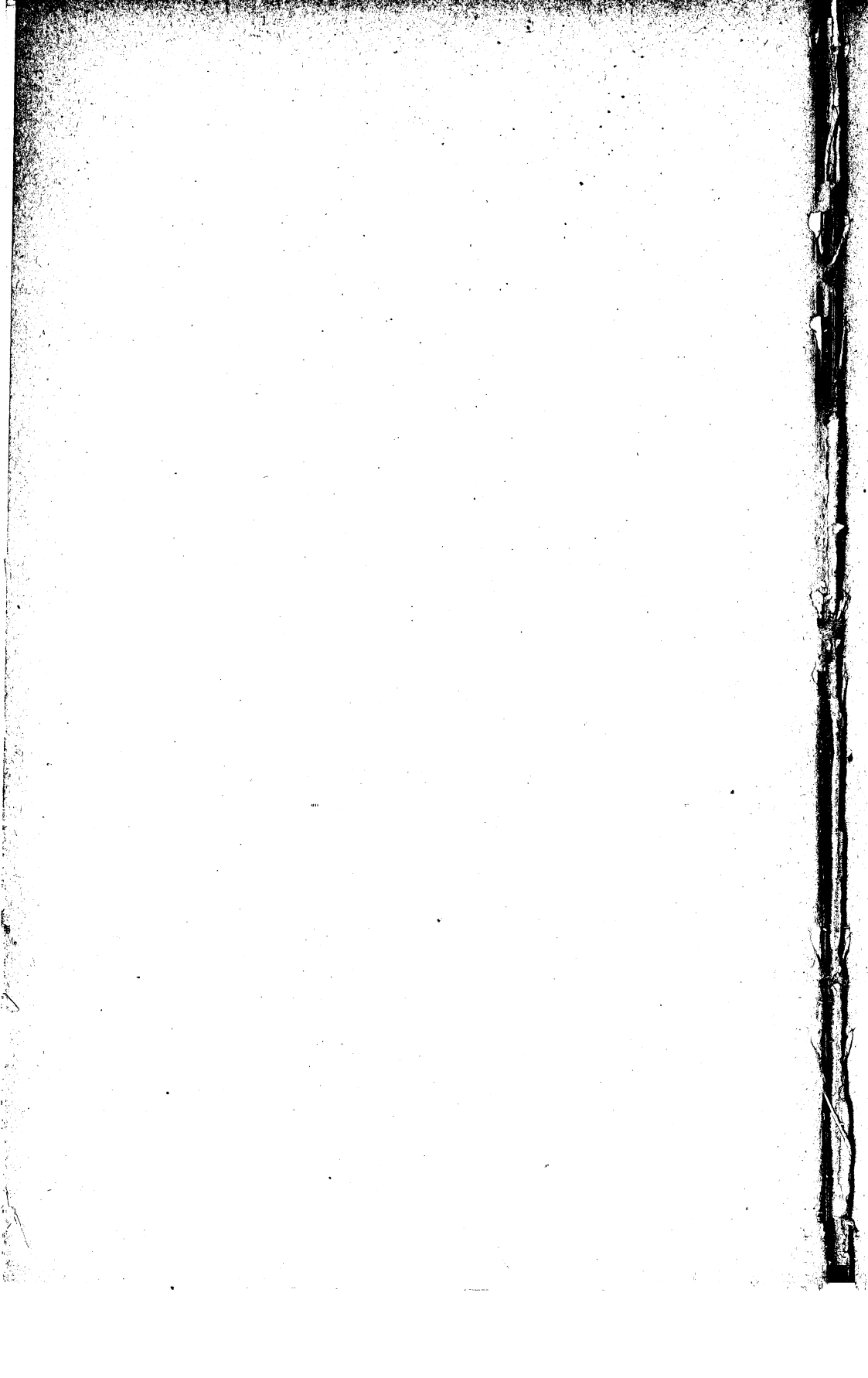

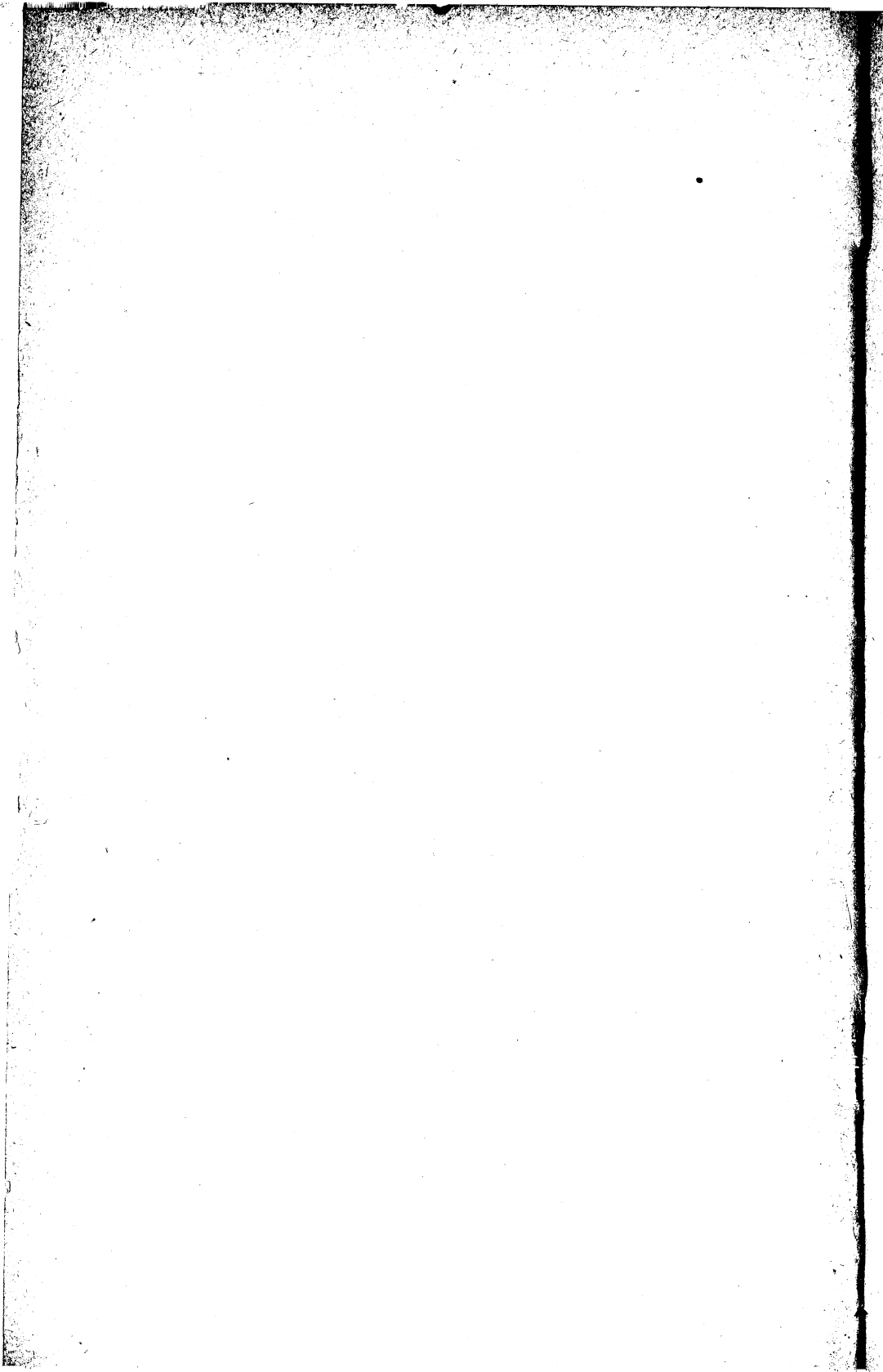

In Common Council, April 7th, 1884.

CHARTER MEETING.

Organization of the Board.

The City Clerk called the Board to order.

Ald. Kelly moved that Ald. Watson act as temporary chairman. Adopted.

Ald. Watson upon taking the chair thanked the Board for the honor conferred and asked the the pleasure of the Council.

Ald. Barron moved to proceed to appoint a member of the Board. Adopted.

Ald. Barron nominated Ald. Kelly.

The chair appointed Ald. Kohlmetz and Tracy as such committee.

The committee having performed the duty assigned them the President addressed the Board as follows:

GENTLEMEN: Allow me to return to you my sincere thanks for the honor you have conferred in selecting me as your presiding officer for the ensuing year. I ask your cordial support in every good measure, and it will be my aim to discharge the duties of the office for the best interest of the people. I shall endeavor to decide all questions impartially and seek to promote harmony and good feeling in the board. Gentlemen, the government of the city has been entrusted to our care for the year. To the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—In the year 1880 an ordinance was passed for the improvement of North St. Paul street from Scrantom street to the city line, consisting of Medina stone curbs and gutters and gravel roadway upon a stone foundation.

The improvement was made the same year, and, has, from the nature of the gravel used, proved an utter failure.

Considerable sums of money have been expended yearly in repairs, yet the surface has steadily deteriorated and is now a perfect quagmire, with which most country roads will compare favorably, if not to the great disadvantage of this so-called improvement. Something must be done at once in justice to the taxpayers to put this street in such condition as the importance of the thoroughfare demands.

The expense will be so considerable that the Executive Board does not feel warranted in doing the work entirely from the highway fund without direction from your honorable body.

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester

GENTLEMEN: It will be remembered that the First Reformed Presbyterian church of this city appealed from the report of the commissioners in the matter of the widening of North St. Paul street.

The argument on the appeal was heard at the Special Term of the Supreme Court held in this city last week. The court confirmed the report. The time has not yet expired within which the church can take an appeal from the order confirming the report to the General Term, and therefore, under the provisions of the charter, no action can be taken as to the ordering of the assessment roll.

The two cases, Susanna Schomer against the city of Rochester, and James G. McCartney against the city of Rochester, which it will be remembered, were tried during the term of ex-City Attorney Fanning, were appealed by him to the General Term. Under an arrangement between Mr. Fanning and your honorable body he has had charge of these cases. They were argued at the General Term and decisions have just been handed down in the two cases affirming the judgments. I have written for the opinions of the court. Until they are received I cannot advise as to the propriety of an appeal to the Court of Appeals.

The action brought by George Innis against the city of Rochester to recover \$1,000 damages for injuries alleged to have been sustained by reason of the negligence of the city in allowing a sidewalk to remain out of repair, was this day tried in the County Court, and resulted in a verdict in favor of the city. A stay of sixty days has been granted to the plaintiff. Respectfully,

PLANK WALK ON WOODFORD PLACE.

By Ald. Aikenhead—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a plank walk on Woodford place.

Your Committee ascertains that the official proceedings for the year just ended contained seventy-five pages more than the official proceedings of the previous year. In addition to this the number of notices emanating from the various departments of the city government, most of which require to be published several days, have very largely increased.

Your committee, after careful consideration of the subject, believe that a wide publicity should be given to the official proceedings and notices, and, to that end, believe that such proceedings and notices should be published in all of the daily newspapers.

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Your special committee to which was referred the communication of George H. Hammond presented to the meeting of the Common Council held April 1st, 1884, asking that a certain portion of Centre street might be closed for the purpose of allowing him to erect thereon a refrigerator building for the purpose of receiving, storing and selling Chicago dressed beef, hereby reports:

It appears that by reason of the contract between the elevated track commissioners and the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company Centre street west of the formerly northeasterly track of the Niagara Falls branch of said railroad has been closed and discontinued. Such closing leaves a small triangular tract of land easterly of the present elevated tracks of the said railroad and westerly of Jones st. practically of no value as a public thoroughfare. The lot of land fronting on that portion of Center st. thus rendered valueless as a street on the north is owned by George H. Hammond, the said petitioner. The land fronting said part of Center street on the north is owned by said railroad company. Your committee is informed that said railroad company has consented to the closing of said part of Center st. This presents a proper case in the opinion of your committee for the taking of action under the provisions of the law with reference to the closing and discontinuance of that part of said Centre street. The only way provided by which any street in this city or any part of a street can be discontinued is that pointed out in the statutes of the state and the city charter. Under those provisions the members of the Executive Board, as commissioners of highways, have power, whenever authorized by the Common Council to take the same proceedings with reference to the closing and discontinuance of a street that commissioners of towns have with respect to roads in the towns. Such proceedings, in brief, are the summoning of a jury who shall hear the testimony of all parties appearing, and who shall view the premises and render a verdict. Ample provisions are made for the protection of all parties having any interest in the matter.

Your committee therefore recommends that the accompanying resolution be adopted.

To the Board of Education:

GENTLEMEN: The present crowded condition of nearly all your school buildings is deplorable. It seems to devolve upon this Board to bring the true state of affairs to the attention of the Common Council and urge immediate relief.

Your committee, appointed pursuant to the resolution at your last meeting, beg leave to report that we have, with several aldermen, personally visited the schools which are in greatest need of help, in order that by personal inspection the Council can see the overwhelming increase of population and school children in the outer wards of the city.

From the verified official reports we note the increase of pupils now attending is 1 105 over March, 1883. The increase of pupils registered in 1883 over 1882 was 672. In October, 1882 over 1881 the increase was 1,306 of registered pupils. In March, 1881, the total number of pupils registered was 11,899. In March, 1884, the number was 14,133, or a total increase of 2,634 during the past three years. These pupils must be provided with reasonable school accommodations for pursuing the public school course.

The spring term usually brings the largest increase in attendance, which last year was 361 over the winter term. Calculating the same proportionate increase you may safely expect to provide for a probable influx of 400 pupils for your next school term, which number is not embraced in the foregoing figures.

The following school buildings are overcrowded:
No. 3 school overcrowded and should have an annex.
No. 4 school has annex with 50 pupils.
No. 6 school has annex with 75 pupils.
No. 10 school has annex with 40 pupils.
No. 12 school is overfull, particularly in the lower grades.
No. 13 school has annex with 95 pupils.
No. 14 school is overfull, especially in the lower rooms.

No. 16 school is crowded in lower grades.
No. 17 school has annex with 55 pupils.
No. 18 school is crowded in all its rooms.
No. 21 school should have annex at once.
No. 24 school has annex with 45 pupils.
No. 27 school has annex with 45 pupils, and notwithstanding this annex one room of No. 27 has 71 pupils in attendance and 113 in another.

In No. 21 school we found one small room with 90 pupils.

In No. 18 school we found nearly 100 pupils in one room of the 9th grade and 80 pupils in the 8th grade in one room.

In No. 17, notwithstanding the annex, 40 pupils are crowded into a small apartment partitioned off from the hall.

In No. 13 every room on the lower floor is overcrowded.

In No. 12 the lower rooms are crowded and the principal's office is converted into a class-room.

In No. 4 school there are only three rooms to accommodate 206 pupils, all other rooms being full.

In No. 3 the grades are overcrowded in many rooms, and must have some immediate relief, especially by way of ventilation.

In all there are 405 pupils accommodated in annexes. This obliges an outlay of \$34 per week for rents, which is an unwise policy.

For rentals we pay an amount equivalent to the interest on nearly \$30,000.

We cannot expect to entirely relieve this condition of affairs in any one year, but with the concurrence of the Common Council the conditions may be greatly improved.

The most disastrous result of crowding these rooms is found in the want of proper ventilation. The Board of Health have given this matter proper attention and will soon report upon the same.

In our judgment the following improvements are imperative, based on the most careful estimates we can make as to cost:

For No. 3 school, \$4,900.

For Briggs Place school, to relieve Nos 4 and 21, with site, \$3,000. There will be at least 300 pupils ready for that school as soon as completed.

For No. 7 school at least \$5,500 will be required to enlarge the building and change the rooms. In 9th grade there are 90 scholars and in 8th grade 60 scholars attending, and neither rooms sufficient to accommodate the pupils. Two rooms now used were never intended for pupils' use. This improvement will relieve No. 6 school and save an expense for enlarging there and a rental of \$300 per year.

In regard to No. 8 school there is room enough when finished to accommodate the district. For \$1,200 the upper part of the building can be completed properly. At No. 9 school an outlay of \$500 at least is imperative.

At No. 10 school the ventilation is frightful, and the rooms on lower floors all crowded. The annex does not entirely relieve the school rooms, and an outlay of \$3,000 is necessary to properly reform the building.

To relieve No. 12 school \$4,500 is necessary to build a suitable addition.

To relieve Nos. 13, 15 and 24 schools a new building is necessary, which will also save hiring annexes. Some location between Grand and Alexander streets would be proper, and \$14,000 will be necessary for a six-room building and the site for the same.

No. 17 district requires a four-room addition, at an expense of probably \$5,000.

No. 18 is one of the worst conditioned buildings. The old part can be remodeled and enlarged for about \$4,000.

No. 27 school is already over-crowded and the annex cannot afford ample relief. There are 113 pupils in one

room 26x36. To duplicate the present building will require \$4,000 at the least.

These facts are apparent to any person giving the subject attention. The Common Council is limited by the provisions of the City Charter to an annual appropriation of \$15,000 for building purposes. We therefore recommend that the Common Council request the State Legislature to pass an enabling act authorizing them to appropriate \$42,500 in addition to the amount provided by charter for the purpose of purchasing sites and placing school buildings and additions thereon during the present year, as hereinbefore set forth.

Resolved, That the foregoing recommendations be and they are hereby adopted, and that the City Attorney and the president of this board be requested to act with this committee to secure the passage of the act referred to.

By Ald. Pitkin—Resolved, That the communication from the School Superintendent and the Board of Education be received, filed and published, and that this board recommends the passage by the State Legislature of the following act:

AN ACT to authorize the Common Council of the City of Rochester to raise money and enlarge and erect school buildings, to relieve the overcrowded schools of said city.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The Common Council of the city of Rochester is hereby authorized and empowered to raise, in addition to the amount authorized by the city charter for building purposes, the sum of forty-two thousand five hundred dollars for the purpose of purchasing school sites and erecting school buildings and additions thereon, to relieve the overcrowded schools of said city.

§ 2. Such amount as the said Common Council shall by resolution designate for that purpose, not exceeding forty-two thousand five hundred dollars, shall be assessed and collected together with the other general city taxes for the present fiscal year.

§ 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN—In the performance of their duty your

Committee on Police, Excise and Markets have ascertained some facts relating to the revenues made by the enforcement of the excise law which your committee believes should be brought to the attention of your

Honorable Board. Your committee learns that the number of special tax permits to retail dealers in liquors in this city issued by the Collector of Internal Revenue during the past year is 1,019, while the number of licenses issued by the Excise Board during the same period is 761, the difference being 258. The average license fee charged by the Excise Board is \$40. It will thus be seen that if

permits are issued to persons to whom special tax permits are issued by the Collector in excess of the number of licenses issued by the Excise Board were suitable persons to receive licenses, and were licensed by the Excise Board, that the revenues payable to the poor fund from this source would be increased over \$10,000 per annum. It is, of course, true that some special tax permits are issued to persons to whom the Excise Board in the performance of their duty would not grant licenses by reason of the fact that the places kept by such persons are disorderly, or that such persons are not respectable. Those who, in pursuance of the excise law of the state, have paid to the city the license fee charged by the Excise Board have a right to insist that the city, in dealing in the matter, have not taken out a city license should be compelled either to obtain such license or to close their business. Such persons as the Excise Board would not license, but who continue to sell liquor, should be compelled to pay the penalties provided by law, upon conviction, which penalties would go to the poor fund of the city.

Your committee ascertained that, under the law as it now stands, persons selling liquor without a license are not subject to indictment. Therefore the District Attorney has no power to take any action with reference to the prosecution of offenders under the excise law. The sale of liquor is regulated by the State law, and not by the charter or ordinance of this city. It is simply the duty of the Excise Commissioners to grant licenses when proper applications are made to them, and it is no part of their duty to hunt up and punish persons engaged in the sale of liquor without a license. Under the provisions of the statute persons selling liquor without a license are subject, upon conviction, to the payment of a penalty. The action to recover a penalty must be brought in the name of the Overseer of the Poor of the city, and, as has been stated above, the penalties recovered are credited to the Poor Fund of the city.

Your Committee finds, upon an investigation, that of the large number of persons who have during the past year sold liquor in this city without procuring any city license, but a single conviction has been had in the Police Court, the judgment recovered in that action has been appealed from.

Your Committee believe that all persons who have not obtained a license, and who are engaged in the sale of liquor, should be prosecuted, to the end that disorderly places may be closed, and that persons who can comply with the provisions of the Excise Law should be compelled to pay the same to the Excise Commissioners. If the Excise Law were strictly enforced, your committee is of the opinion that, at least, \$10,000 could be added to the Poor Fund of the city, thus affecting a saving to the tax-payers, and, at the same time, the closing of all disorderly places could be effected.

Heretofore there has been in the employ of the city a person known as the clerk of the Excise Board, whose duty seems to have been to act as investigator. The result of this employment is stated by the facts given above. Your committee believes that some competent person should be appointed whose duty it shall be to obtain the necessary evidence and prosecute all persons selling liquor without a license. Such person, of course, should be versed in the law and competent to conduct such prosecution.

Your Committee desires to state that the Excise Commissioners have, during the past year, made collections for licenses granted largely in excess of former years, and have faithfully and earnestly performed their duty, so far as your committee has been able to ascertain, but as there is no obligation resting on the Commissioners to do ought, except to grant licenses to persons, upon proper applications and to report to the Overseer of the Poor the names of those who have not obtained licenses, it will be seen that the enforcement of the Excise Law does not rest with the Excise Board. The suggestions made in this report are concurred in by the Excise Board.

To the Honorable, the Common-council of the City of Rochester.

GENTLEMEN: In presenting to your honorable body the proposed tax levy for the coming year, your committee desires to call attention to some matters in explanation thereof. The aggregate amount reported by your committee is \$1,244,013.25. It will be observed that this amount is somewhat in excess of the tax levy of last year, as well as of previous years. This excess is caused largely by the fact that the appropriation made in last year's tax levy for the various funds was found to be inadequate. The deficiencies from last year, for which this council has to provide, and which are now represented by outstanding notes of the city, amounts to \$242,633.58. Included in this amount is the deficiency in the water pipe extension fund, which alone amounts to \$75,000.00, and that of the contingent fund \$42,000.00. The large deficiency in the contingent loan is caused mainly by the fact that the discounts on all notes issued by the city is chargeable to that fund. The finance committee last year estimated that the surplus revenue from water rents, which would come into the hands of the treasurer, would be \$100,000.00, while the surplus proceeds from water-rents, over expenditure, has been, in fact, but \$60,000.00, leaving a deficiency of \$40,000.00 to be provided for in this tax levy. It will, therefore, be noted that \$282,633.58 of this tax levy, as reported, is for deficiencies of the previous year. The charter of the city provides that not more than \$15,000 shall be expended in any one year for the purchase and improvement of sites and the building and enlargement of school houses. It will be remembered that the Board of education presented to the Common-council, at its last meeting, a communication upon the subject of the overcrowding of the schools of the city. This overcrowding, of course, comes from the large increase in population, and it necessarily followed that some action should be taken which would result in the providing of sufficient accommodations for school work in the various districts. The legislature has passed, and the governor has signed, an act to enable the Common-council to raise an amount, not to exceed \$42,500, besides the amount which the charter permits for the construction and repair of school houses. After a careful consideration of the claims of the Board of education in the matter, your committee is of the opinion that \$37,000, in addition to the \$15,000 which the charter authorizes to be raised, will be sufficient for the purpose above specified.

Your committee also desires to call the attention of your honorable body to the fact that \$310,360.25 of this proposed tax levy is for the payment of interest upon the debt of

the city, and of certain bonds which will mature during the coming year. It will thus be observed that, exclusive of the amount to be raised for the building and repair of school houses, \$592,993.83, of the tax levy is to provide for the payment of the obligations which this Common-council had no part in creating. Your committee is of the opinion that the estimates made, and herewith submitted, will be, with economical and prudent administration of affairs, sufficient to provide for the expenses of the city during the coming year.

To the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—An examination of the Saxton street outlet sewer at the point where it passes under the Erie canal develops the fact that this portion of the sewer is constructed in such manner that the bottom foundation is placed some two or two and one-half feet below the portions immediately east and west thereof, and in order to pass under the canal without interfering therewith the top of said portion is correspondingly lowered, forming what is technically known as a diving culvert. The effect of this construction is to form a catch basin or receptacle for all substances carried along in said sewer that are heavier than water. If it was entirely cleaned out the first heavy storm of rain would completely fill it again. The clear area of this portion of the sewer is 9 1/2 feet as against 14 1/2 feet for the portions both east and west of the canal. Hence it is not singular that the territory west of the canal should be flooded as frequently as the storm water seeking an outlet through this channel exceed the capacity for discharge of that portion under the canal. Relief to the full capacity of the sewer both east and west of the canal can most effectually be secured by deepening the portion east of the canal to the depth of that under the canal.

GENTLEMEN: The following report of the Finance Committee of the Board of Education was presented at the regular meeting held on Monday evening, May 5th, and unanimously adopted. S. A. ELLIS, Clerk.

To the Board of Education:

GENTLEMEN—Your Finance Committee and the chairmen of the various committees having funds under their charge, have carefully considered the question of amount of money required this year, and have come to the conclusion that the amounts asked for are absolutely necessary for the proper maintenance of our public school system.

The school population of our city is constantly increasing, so that during the past year we have been obliged to rent seven additional school buildings in order to relieve the overcrowded school rooms, and give for the time being temporary relief. With these facts in view a special committee was appointed by this Board to investigate the matter, which they did in a thorough and most satisfactory manner, and in their report to the Board, which set forth a truthful state of affairs, they recommend that the Common Council allow an additional appropriation of \$42,500 for building purposes, which we trust will meet with favorable consideration.

The Teachers' Committee have carefully computed the amount that will be required in addition to the regular State appropriation, and the amount they ask for is upon the present basis of salaries paid our teachers, every dollar of which will be needed.

The Building Committee is allowed by our city charter \$15,000 per year, but as the demands will be so large upon this committee during the present year, it was considered wise to ask for an additional allowance of \$42,500 to enable this Board to provide suitable school

buildings for the large increase of pupils attending our public schools.

The repair committee by our city charter is allowed only \$10,000 per year, a sum in our opinion that is insufficient for all the work chargeable to this committee. We have a 27 school building under our charge, and the wear and tear from one year to the other is surprising; therefore it is with the utmost economy that this committee can make anything like a good record with the amount at their disposal. Our city charter should be amended so as to give at least \$15,000 per year to the repair fund, and we suggest that some action be taken by this board to secure this change.

We ask for the Contingent Fund the sum of \$33,939.34, which we feel safe in saying is an honest and just estimate of the contingent expenses of this Board. From this fund is paid the salaries of officers and janitors, fuel, stove and steam heating, repairs, supplies of various kinds, the care and protection of the Free Academy, printing, and the necessary books annually required to replenish our Central Library.

In addition to the teachers we have about forty employees, all of which are faithful and attentive to their duties. We have no sinecures, as all employees of this Board render honest services for the salaries they receive.

The Fuel and Fire Fixture Committee is one of the important committees of this Board, upon it falls the care and the management of the heating in a proper manner all of our public school buildings, and in order to perform the duties effectually and satisfactorily a large amount of money is annually expended.

Our Free Academy has a warm place in the hearts of our people, and its growing popularity shows conclusively that it stands upon a solid basis. During the past year the committee in charge has won the praise of the Patrons of the Academy for the many modern changes and improvements to the building, all of which have been conducive to the health and comfort of the pupils. There are yet other necessary improvements to be made, and with the amount asked for by this committee, and which amount we do not deem excessive, good results will be accomplished.

The supply committee in their estimate this year have used wisdom, and have asked for no more than will be necessary. The new school buildings to be erected will require new seats and desks, and this committee has the purchase of these articles under their charge, together with a hundred other things that make up a list of school supplies.

The other committees have exercised good judgment in arriving at the amounts they will require for the present year, and in no case is the estimate excessive.

Rochester to-day with her population of 100,000 or more is indeed in a prosperous and thriving condition, and holds her rank among the busy commercial cities of our country, and when we say that her educational facilities have largely brought about these pleasing results, we simply express the sentiments of her people. Education is the acknowledged bulwark and strength of all communities, and Rochester and her people have just cause to feel proud of our department of public schools; a department which we think is the most important of any in a city government.

ELLIS, being duly sworn says, he is Superintendent of Schools of the city of Rochester, and that the average number of resident pupils enrolled in the several public schools of said city for the school year ending May 1, 1884, according to the verified monthly reports of the principals of said schools, was, twelve thousand two hundred and seventy-five (12,275).

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, Assessors of the City of Rochester, hereby respectfully represent.

Since the last meeting of your honorable body the State Assessors have, in performance of their duty, visited Rochester, and have conferred with the undersigned with reference to the proper method of taxation, and as to the duties to be performed by the Assessors of this city. Many valuable suggestions have been made to said Board by the State Assessors which we desire to

put into operation. It is a matter of considerable importance to the tax-payers at large that all property properly subject to taxation should be placed upon the assessment rolls of the coming year.

The proper performance of our duties will require us to be absent from the assessors' office a large portion of the time during the coming year. All sections of the city should be visited by the assessors and a vast amount of labor performed which necessarily takes a large portion of the time of the assessors and keeps them away from the office. It is proper that some provision should be made by which the records in the office of the County Clerk can be systematically examined to the end that personal property which now escapes taxation, may be, as it should be, placed upon the assessment rolls. The amount of clerical labor required in the office in the copying of rolls and in work of like nature, has largely increased owing to the great number of improvements and the rapid growth of the city.

In view of these facts we deem it to be for the interest of the people generally that some provision should be made which will enable us to give more time to the performance of our judicial duties as assessors. The only way that this result can be accomplished is by making provision for adequate clerical assistance.

We have made a careful examination of the question and are of the opinion that there should be appropriated for hire in our office during the coming year the sum of \$900.

GENTLEMEN—Your special committee on salaries respectfully reports:

In January last the Law Committee of the Common Council presented a report setting out the various causes in the increase of work in the office of the City Attorney, among which was the constantly increasing growth of the city, bringing with it the opening of new streets and the extension or widening of old ones, litigation growing out of the sewage system of the city, and more numerous demands upon the City Attorney's time, both in the examination of questions arising in the various departments of the city government, and for the investigation of the claims presented to your honorable board and considered by the various committees; in addition to which were mentioned the litigations caused by the coming into the city of new railroads; the action to test the validity of the Church street assessment; the numerous actions brought by the Honeyoe millers to recover damages, and the condemnation proceedings recently instituted in behalf of the city to acquire the right to use the waters of Hoop and Canal Lakes, in addition to these matters the volume of the litigation of the city is constantly increasing and a great number of actions are now pending in the various courts of very great importance to the city. The amount involved in litigation or legal proceedings in which the city is a party is more than one million of dollars.

In view of these facts it is plain that the responsibility resting upon the City Attorney is at least as great as that resting upon the head of any other city department. It is a matter of great importance that ample provision should be made for the employment of a sufficient number of skilled employees in that office to thoroughly and promptly perform the labor connected therewith.

The salary to be paid to the City Attorney should be, in view of the great amount of labor required and the responsibility which will devolve upon him, liberal. It would be a false economy at this time to make any other than a fairly liberal provision for that office in comparison with the amounts appropriated to the other departments of the city government.

Your Committee, after a careful consideration of the matter, recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

GENTLEMEN—Your Law Committee, to which was referred the communication of the trustee of school district No. 1 of the town of Irondequoit, and the report of the Law Committee of the Board of Education with reference to said communication, hereby reports:

At the time the city boundaries were enlarged said school district No. 1 was divided so that a portion of said district remained in the town and a part in the city. The school building was, after the extension within the city limits. The building has, until a recent time, been used by the Board of Education for school purposes. The claim is made, that at the time possession was taken of the building for school purposes by the city, that there were seats, desks and books, and other school furniture in the building of the value of \$236.25, and that none of said property has been returned by the city to the trustee of said district, but has been lost or destroyed. Said trustee also claims that rent should be paid for the time that the city occupied the said building; his whole claim being for \$235.

The Law Committee of the Board of Education, which made an investigation into this matter, report adversely to the claim on the ground that the contents of the building were, when the city took possession, almost worthless.

Your Committee has examined into the matter and is of the opinion that the Common Council would not be justified in appropriating in payment of said alleged claim, believing that the claim, if it has any foundation in fact, should be established in the courts.

Your Committee, therefore, reports adversely to said claim. Respectfully submitted.

GENTLEMEN: Soon after the term of the present City Attorney began application was made to the then Overseer of the Poor that proceedings be instituted upon a bond given in bastardy proceedings some years before by John O'Connor and others. The City Attorney, after an examination of the matter, advised the Overseer of the Poor not to take any action in the matter, for the reason that the probability was that the sureties upon the bond had a valid defense. The parties interested in the enforcement of the bond subsequently made application to the District Attorney, and the Overseer of

the Poor thereupon signed the necessary papers authorizing the commencement of an action.

Soon after such action was brought, being entitled Nathaniel Thompson as Overseer of the Poor of the city of Rochester against John O'Connor and others, the District Attorney appearing as the attorney of the plaintiff in said action. Such action was brought in the County Court and resulted upon the trial in the dismissal of the complaint as to two of the defendants who were summoned on the bond, with costs. The judgment for such costs, for \$66.25, was thereupon docketed against Nathaniel Thompson as Overseer of the Poor of the city of Rochester.

Judgment was recovered against John O'Connor as the principal in said bond for the amount thereof. A motion was made by said O'Connor for a new trial, and a new trial was granted. Upon the second trial of the action the court non-suited the plaintiff, and judgment has been entered upon said non-suit against said Thompson as Overseer of the Poor for \$160.62.

The City Attorney knew nothing of the fact that an action had been brought by the District Attorney in the name of the Overseer of the Poor until after the same was a issue and upon the calendar for trial. The City Attorney then intervened on behalf of the city and made a motion, after giving notice to all parties, that an order be made discontinuing the action, upon the ground that the city of Rochester was practically a party without its consent. The court denied said motion, so that there was no redress left except to allow said litigation to continue.

While the judgments recovered are not in form against the city, they are enforceable against the city, and should be paid.

Your committee therefore recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution providing for the payments of said judgments.

GENTLEMEN—Your Water Works Committee and the Executive Board have examined the several petitions for water pipe extensions which have been presented to your board and duly referred to us up to this date, and for which no money has been heretofore appropriated, and beg leave to present the following report and resolution relating thereto:

The several petitions for water pipe extension enumerated in the list hereto annexed comprise streets on which active building operations are in progress and which require the introduction of water for their successful development. Many of them are situated in the 15th and 16th wards, and the owners have filed majority petitions therefor, which makes the property liable with that in the old city for the water debt and also for the three cents per foot frontage tax if water is not used.

We therefore recommend that the Common Council shall authorize the making the city's notes from time to time as the same may be needed for this purpose for an amount not exceeding in the aggregate forty-nine thousand (\$49,000) dollars, and also for an additional

sum of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars to complete other work now under contract and previously ordered by the Council, making a total of fifty thousand (\$50,000) dollars and for this purpose we recommend the adoption of the annexed resolution.

GENTLEMEN—Your Committee on Police, Excise and Markets, to which was referred the communication of Police Commissioner Zimmer and ex-Police Commissioner Howe requesting that the Common Council authorize the increase of the police force by the addition of ten new policemen, hereby reports:

Your committee has given a very careful consideration of the matters set out in said communication, and has investigated as to the proposed increase.

Your committee believes that it is very important that public servants should in every way possible re-trench in municipal expenditure, and as far as may be reduce the amount of taxes to be paid by our people.

Your committee believes that if the Police Commissioners shall properly and thoroughly re-district the city and reorganize the force, that the needs of the city, so far as its police protection is concerned, will be amply subserved.

The addition of ten men to the police force would increase the pay roll nine thousand dollars per annum. When the Police Commissioners shall have re-districted the city, and reorganized the force, your committee believes that the people will be satisfied with the police protection which will be then furnished, especially in view of the fact that a large saving will thereby be effected.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

Gentlemen of the Common Council:

I return to you without approval, the resolution adopted at your meeting held May 6th, 1884, authorizing and directing the Committee on Police, Excise and Markets to employ for the ensuing year a competent attorney to prosecute unlicensed liquor dealers, the salary of such person not to exceed \$150 per month. I have looked in vain to find authority for such action, and patient investigation convinces me that were your Board authorized so to act, no necessity exists for an increased expenditure of a single dollar to enforce the provisions of the excise law. To make this latter assertion good, allow me to say that according to the statement of your committee, the number of persons in Rochester to whom as retail dealers the government of the United States has issued a special tax, is 1,019. The number of licenses granted by the Excise Board of this city and now in force is 785, showing a discrepancy of 234. Among the latter are thirty persons to whom the commissioners have declined to issue authority to sell. There are also included 48 druggists, who claim to be exempt, and decline to apply for license and 40 other persons whose applications are on hand but which have not as yet been passed upon by the Board. The number of

licenses which expired in April, some of which have not as yet been renewed, is 17. The sum total of these four classes added to those who have taken out license is 920, still leaving as the number not accounted for by the Excise Board, who have obtained government authority for the retail of liquors 99. The taking out of a special tax does not necessarily imply that the party is selling, and then there are a large number who start in business, procure the government stamp, sell out after a few days, move away, or are broken up by the police. It is almost an utter impossibility under such circumstances, with the deficient excise laws of this state, to secure a license fee (or exact a fine for violation) from this class of persons, and the same cannot, in my judgment, be secured to the city any more readily by your proposed action. A single place may change hands several times during the year, and as a government stamp is not transferable a new one must in each instance be secured. A photographer may deal in alcohol; he is required to pay a United States tax but is not required to procure a license from the Excise Board. During the year fairs of different descriptions are held, societies and organizations enjoy picnics, races take place, balls are given, and in most instances liquors and beer are sold and in each case the "tax stamp" must be procured, and thus the discrepancy mentioned is accounted for. There is no question but there are many who should take out a license or pay a fine, but the number is far less than the naked figures would seem to indicate. Questions of merit and of fact constantly arising, take time to decide, and hence there will probably always be a difference in the number of those engaged in selling liquor, as implied by the books of the government and of the city. The members of the Excise Board should be and are vigilant. The amount collected last year (\$38,010.70) was nearly double that collected five years ago. As stated in the communication of your committee it is the duty of the Commissioners to report to the Overseer of the Poor the names of those who have not obtained license, and the action to recover a penalty must be brought in his name. Such legal advice and assistance as may be required can be easily secured without additional cost. Under all the circumstances a sense of duty to the tax payers will not permit me to approve of the resolution before mentioned.

Gentlemen of the Common Council:

At the first regular meeting of your board held in January last, the Law Committee, pursuant to a suggestion previously made by Mr. Tubbs, submitted a communication relating to clerk hire in the office of the City Attorney, and by resolution fixed the amount to be paid for the same at \$1⁰⁶/₁₀₀ per month, from January first to April first. Many reasons were advanced for such a course, the principal one being because of the large number of suits pending against the city growing out of the construction and operation of the water works. At your last meeting, following a report of your special committee on salaries, a resolution was offered and adopted fixing the amount to be paid in salaries to the City Attorney and his assistants at \$585 per month, aggregating in round numbers seven thousand dollars per year. The question of taxation is one now agitating the minds of many people in this community, and it is our duty in every reasonable way to curtail expenses—as far as may be possible. I have no particular suggestions to offer in connection with this matter.

believing that by calling your attention to certain facts as they exist, you will apply the remedy. The question to be considered is, is the great increase of expense in the law department of this city compared to the expense of the same a few months ago, now warranted. I think we all had a right to expect that when the work preliminary to many suits soon to be tried had been completed, that there would then be a curtailing of expense. The fact that by the terms of your resolution we shall be paying this year in salaries in the department named, more than double what we were compelled to pay a year ago, saying nothing of the payment to outside counsel previously engaged, and the matter of a couple of hundred dollars to be paid for opinions (and which by the way, I have also disapproved,) is one that should cause the most serious reflection. The resolution referred to and which was presented by Ald. Upton, and adopted at your last meeting, fixing the compensation of all those connected with the law department of our city, is hereby returned in its entirety without the sanction of my approval. I believe upon reviewing your action you will be able to reconstruct the same in a manner calculated to do no injury, and in terms more advantageous to the city.

Gentlemen of the Common Council:

At your last regular meeting a resolution was adopted authorizing your special committee to obtain the opinion of two lawyers as to the liability of the sureties on the bond of the City Treasurer and in the matter of the City Bank, the expense of the same not to exceed \$200. I do not see why the city should be subjected to this additional cost. There is nothing to be gained, in my opinion, by such a course, as nothing can destroy the facts as they exist. The bondsmen may or may not be liable. We have a competent City Attorney and the question has already been submitted to him. He has not said they are not liable, but has stated that there are involved in the case questions of law and fact. Opinions cannot change these. Then why pay for them or seek them if unnecessary? It seems to me if the bondsmen are unwilling to enter into an arrangement, such as has before been suggested, that the issue should be tried. If it is possible to arbitrate, and thus deal justly by all, and avoid a long, expensive and uncertain litigation, the same may be worthy of consideration, but I cannot see why the city is justified in incurring the expense mentioned, and therefore return the resolution disapproved.

From my own personal experience for a frame building, the stone walls should be not less than 16 inches thick in any case, and should go 3 feet in depth below the grade line, and in no case should an excavation be made below the bottom of a cellar wall when made in the earth. In case of the necessity of the deepening of a cellar, such inadequate walls in height or depth should be underpinned.

The size of timbers required for a one-story frame building, for suitable strength, are as follows: i. e., on the outside sills 6x6 inches with cross sills where joist are framed in 6x8 inches. For larger buildings the size of timbers would have to be increased in proper proportion.

One important feature in the construction of a building is its foundation, it being immaterial what the superstructure may be whether wood or brick, but this important necessity in all cases must be pursued.

CHAP. 213.

AN ACT to authorize the Common Council of the City

of Rochester to raise money to enlarge and erect school buildings, to relieve the overcrowded schools of said city.

Passed April 25, 1884; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The Common Council of the city of Rochester is hereby authorized and empowered to raise, in addition to the amount authorized by the city charter for building purposes, the sum of forty-two thousand five hundred dollars for the purpose of purchasing school sites and erecting school buildings and additions thereon, to relieve the overcrowded schools of said city.

Such amount as the said Common Council shall by resolution designate for that purpose, not exceeding forty-two thousand five hundred dollars, shall be assessed and collected together with the other general city taxes for the present fiscal year.

§ 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAP. 67.

AN ACT to amend chapter twenty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-one, entitled "An act to empower the executive board of the city of Rochester to acquire land and other property for the water-works of said city."

Passed March 29, 1884; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section five of chapter twenty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-one, entitled "An act to empower the executive board of the city of Rochester to acquire land and other property for the water-works of said city," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 5. On presenting such petition to the supreme court as aforesaid with proof of service of a copy thereof, and notices aforesaid, any of the persons whose estates or interests are to be affected by the proceedings may show cause against granting the prayer of said petition and may to that end disprove any of the facts alleged therein. The court shall hear the proofs and allegations of the parties, and if no sufficient cause is shown against granting the prayer of the petition, it shall make an order for the appointment of three disinterested and competent freeholders, residents of the state of New York, as commissioners to ascertain and appraise the compensation to be made to the owners or persons interested in the property so to be acquired, and shall fix the time and place for the first meeting of said commissioners. The commissioners shall take and subscribe the oath prescribed by the twelfth article of the constitution. Any of them may issue subpoenas, and administer oaths to witnesses. A majority of them may adjourn the proceedings from time to time in their discretion. They shall view the premises described in the petition and hear the proofs and allegations of the parties, and reduce the testimony taken by them, if any, to writing, and after the testimony is taken in each case they, or a majority of them, all being present or having notice of the meeting to the end that they may be present, shall, without unnecessary delay, ascertain and determine the compensation which ought justly to be made to the owners or persons interested in the property so sought to be acquired. They, or a majority of them, shall also determine what sum ought to be paid to the general or special guardian or committee of any infant, idiot, or person of unsound mind, or attorney appointed to attend to the interests of any unknown owner or party in interest not personally served with notice of the proceeding and who has not appeared, for his costs and expenses. They shall make a report of their proceedings to the supreme court with the minutes of the testimony taken by them. The compensation to which they shall each be entitled for every day they are actually engaged in the performance of their duties, shall be fixed by said supreme court, and such compensation, together with their expenses, shall be paid by the city of Rochester. When the owners or persons interested in the property sought to be acquired shall have awarded to them an amount not exceeding the compensation offered by said city of Rochester for such property so sought to be acquired, or their interest therein, said city may recover, and the said supreme court may award against such persons the amount so paid to said commissioners necessarily expended for witnesses, or such part thereof as said supreme court shall deem proper.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee hereby calls the attention of your honorable body to the decisions of the Court at General Term in the actions entitled James G. McCartney against the City of Rochester, and Susanna Schromer against the city of Rochester. It will be remembered that both these two actions were decided by the General Term adversely to the city. Each of the actions were tried during the term of ex-City Attorney Fanning. In the McCartney case the recovery against the city was \$2,500, and in the Schromer case the recovery was \$1,750. The cases were appealed, and when Mr. Fanning's term of office expired the then Law Committee of the Common Council made an agreement with Mr. Fanning by which he was to have charge of said actions until the decision by the General Term. The cases were argued by him at Syracuse in January last, and decided in April last. The total amount of damages and costs in the Schromer case to this date amounts to \$2,416, and the total amount of damages and costs in the McCartney case to this date amounts to \$3,531.21.

The question presented in these cases is whether they should be carried to the Court of Appeals, or whether they should be settled. Your committee has examined the opinions of the General Term in said cases, and, after a careful consideration of the same, and after consultation with the City Attorney, is of the opinion that there is no reasonable chance of succeeding if appeal should be taken to the Court of Appeals.

Your committee herewith submits copies of the opinions in each of said cases, and recommends that a resolution be adopted providing for the payment of the claims.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—Your special committee, appointed March 13th, 1884, to consider and report to the Common Council from time to time the necessary steps to be taken for the preservation of the purity of the waters of Hemlock Lake, respectfully submit the subjoined partial report:

Your committee has had several meetings, at which the members of the Executive Board, the City Attorney and the Chief Engineer of the Water Works were present by invitation.

At these meetings a full interchange of opinions was invited, and discussion had on the various suggestions submitted. It was also deemed important that a personal inspection of the lake and its surroundings should be made. The committee therefore fixed upon the 11th and 12th days of the present month for that purpose, at which time several members of the committee, accompanied by the Executive Board and Engineer of the Water Works, made a thorough inspection of the lake with a view to determine the sources from which contamination of the waters might proceed.

Examination disclosed the following conditions: The west side of the lake, from a point about one-half mile south of the foot thereof, is a bold and steep bluff densely wooded from the shore to an elevation of three to four hundred feet, and intersected at intervals with deep rocky ravines which run out at the surface of the ground on the top of the adjacent hills. At the south end of the lake is a swamp of no great extent, which in the early part of the season is filled with water setting back from the lake, and southerly from this extends the Springwater valley, about one mile in width, in which is located the small village of Springwater, at a distance of about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles south of the head of the lake. Through this valley passes the inlet stream to the lake, which at most seasons is small and

contributes a volume of water insignificant in quantity when compared with the amount supplied by the natural and other outfalls at the foot of same. The shore of the east side of the lake is similar in its natural features to that of the west side previously described, from its southerly extremity to a point about two miles south of the foot thereof, the balance of the east side being principally cleared farming lands intersected with ravines.

The following is a summary of the several cottages houses and other buildings located on or adjacent to the shores of the lake.

Comparatively few of the cottages are at present occupied, but from an observation of the location, surroundings and general sanitary arrangements, your committee is satisfied that the majority of the occupants are deeply interested in maintaining the purity of the waters of the lake, and that care is exercised by them, to maintain their premises in such a condition that no just criticism shall apply to them.

The following are the principal sources from which pollution to the waters of the lake are liable to come:

- First—From the springwater valley at the head.
- Second—From the water closets, garbage or barns of cottages.
- Third—From the yards of farms on the slopes of the hills at the head of the ravines.
- Fourth—From the deposit of the carcasses of animals in the ravines or on the slopes of the hills.
- Fifth—From the deposit of fish offal or small dead animals in the lake by sportsmen.
- Sixth—From the washing of sheep in the lake.
- Seventh—From the sinking of underbrush in the lake, in clearing off lots for location of cottages and other buildings.

Your Committee believe that the watchful surveillance heretofore and now exercised by the Executive Board and its officers, has prevented any such pollution of the water as need to give rise to suspicion of its quality in the minds of the consumers in Rochester, yet it is deemed wise to reduce the precautionary measures now in vogue or likely to be hereafter required to a system, which will not only now, but in the future, surely preserve the water of Hemlock Lake in its pristine purity.

With this object in view, your Committee will in the near future, have some well considered and sharply defined suggestions to submit for the consideration of your honorable body, which may involve additional legislation, the co-operation of the State Board of Health, and the development of a system of periodic collection, by the city, of garbage and the products of a dry closet system at all the cottages about the lake.

GENTLEMEN: At the meeting of your board on May 6th, 1884, the final ordinance No. 2,604 was adopted for the improvement of Chestnut street from East avenue to Monroe avenue by re-setting the present curb stone, supplying any deficiency with new curb on a line one foot outside of the present curb lines, re-laying the gutters, constructing a blue stone flag walk five feet in width in one course on each side of the street, except where good flag walks now exist, re-laying the present brick pavement on each side of the flag walk, constructing the necessary new cross-walks, re-laying such of the old cross-walks as may be found in good condition, and making the necessary repairs to the surface sewers. The work was duly advertised for letting by the City Surveyor, and on date of June 2d proposals were received by the Executive Board and the contract awarded to Thomas Oliver and Son. During the interim between the introduction of the ordinance into the Council and the letting of the improvement a very large number of the owners of property on said street constructed new cement walks therein and should the contractor proceed to perform the work in accordance with the terms of the ordinance, all those new cement walks must be removed and replaced by blue stone flag walks, as any exception in favor of other than flag walks, it is believed would vitiate the assessment. The Executive Board has not executed the contract on the part of the city, and the Messrs. Oliver, the contractors, have been directed not to proceed in any way with the work until further notice. The Executive Board presents the matter to the Council, and trusts that such action may be taken in the premises as may seem to be legal and proper. In the absence of such action

by the Common Council, it will be the duty of the Executive Board to cause the improvement of Chestnut street to proceed under the terms of the ordinance requiring all the sidewalks to be of flag stones.

If said cap was broken or displaced, and the street was thereby made defective, there is still nothing to show that said defective condition was known to any city official having in charge the Water Works, and that a sufficient time had elapsed after such defective condition was created so that constructive notice of such condition can be implied.

GENTLEMEN: Your City Property Committee deem it their duty to call your attention to the fact that the insurance placed upon public school buildings of the city, and their contents, by the direction of the Common Council three years ago, amounting to \$250,000.00, will expire to-morrow, July 2d.

Your committee has made an examination into the question as to the amount of insurance which should be placed upon each building, and the contents of each building, and is of the opinion that the appointment made three years ago should be continued.

We are of the opinion that the interests of the city require at least the amount of insurance above specified. The loss which the city sustained in the burning of No. 15 school caused the action which was taken three years ago by the Common Council, and the possibility of further loss from fire certainly makes it advisable, in the opinion of your committee, that a reasonable insurance should be effected.

Your committee, therefore, recommends that the amount of insurance upon the various school buildings and contents of the city be placed as is set forth in the following schedule :

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester, N. Y.:

GENTLEMEN: Your Law and Salary Committee, to which was referred the subject of fixing the salaries of the Judges of the Municipal Court of the city of Rochester, hereby report:

The amendment of section 254 of the charter of the city of Rochester, the passage of which was unanimously recommended by the old Council, passed by the Legislature, signed by the Governor, and became a law several weeks ago.

It provides, in substance, that the salaries of the Judges of the Municipal Court shall not be less than \$1,800, nor more than \$2,500 per annum, payable monthly, and that the salary of the Clerk of said Court shall not be less than \$600, nor more than \$1,200, payable monthly, to be fixed by the Common Council in the same manner that other salaries are fixed.

It therefore becomes the duty of the Common Council, under the charter as thus amended, to fix the compensation of the Judges and Clerk of said Court.

Your Committee, to which this matter was referred, have made a careful examination as to the subject and submit the following as the result:

The Municipal Court of the city of Rochester was established by the laws of 1876 and commenced to transact business on or about June 1st, 1876.

The organization of the said court was an experiment, and was designed to take the place of the three Justice's Courts then in existence in said city, with an increased jurisdiction from \$200 to \$500. From June 1, 1876, to January 1, 1877, the first three months of its existence, there was commenced in said court 477 new cases, and the sum of \$343.68 was paid into the city treasury as costs brought into said court at said time.

In the following year of 1877, from 1,600 to 1,900 cases were commenced in said court, and the sum of \$1,901.08 paid into the city treasury between April 1, 1883, and April 1, 1834, about 3,500 cases were commenced and disposed of in said court, and the sum of \$8,119.60 was paid into the city treasury, exclusive of cases brought in said court by the city, and defended in said court by it.

As an experiment this court has proven highly successful, gives universal satisfaction, and is held in high esteem by the bar, business men and the public generally. By reason of the increased jurisdiction of this court from \$200 in Justice's Court, to \$500, many cases that were formerly brought and tried in County and Supreme Courts are now brought and tried in the Municipal Court, not only more speedily and at less expense to the litigant, but at about \$100 less expense per day to the city, and county than it would be tried in the County or Supreme Courts.

While the business of said court has doubled since its organization, the salaries of the judges and clerk of said court remains the same and have never been changed.

Section 245 of the city charter provides, in substance, that it shall be the duty of each of said judges to hold such court, which shall be open for business each day, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open during seasons of the transaction of business.

Aside from this provision of the charter, the duties of each of the judges of said court, owing to the amount of business now transacted by them, render it impossible for them to engage in any business outside of said court for their own private use and benefit. Your committee are informed and believe that the judges of said court have almost exclusively refrained from the practice of law since they became judges of said court, to the end that there should be no conflict of private interest with public duties.

Although the charter before its amendment, provided for a clerk and deputy clerk, to be appointed by said judges, each of whom should receive a salary of \$600 per annum, the judges of said court have never appointed but one clerk, and while the duties of said clerk have doubled since its organization, and have become onerous, no increase of pay or other assistance has been afforded him up to the present time.

In view of these, among other facts, your committees believe that the salaries of said judges and clerk should be sufficient to adequately pay them for the work they do in the responsible positions to which the people of this city have called them, and recommend the adoption of the accompanying resolutions.

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

Ald. Pitkin, from the special committee on Church street assessment, reported progress and asked for further time. Granted.

By Ald. Upton—

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN—Your special committee, appointed to consider the questions relating to the failure of the City Bank of Rochester, so far as the city is interested therein, hereby reports:

Your Committee was authorized by recent action of your honorable body to obtain an opinion of two competent attorneys of this city, at an expense of not exceeding two hundred dollars, as to the liability of the sureties upon the bond the treasurer by reason of the loss of the city growing out of the failure of said City Bank. Under, and in pursuance of the authority thus conferred, your committee caused to be prepared a statement of the facts, so far as your committee understand them to be conceded, relating to such liability, for the purpose of submitting such statement to the attorneys who might be selected.

Your committee, upon enquiry, ascertained that some of the attorneys of this city, who would naturally be selected by reason of their position as lawyers, were disqualified from giving an opinion by reason of the fact that they have been concerned in litigations growing out of the failure of said bank, or have been retained by the sureties, or some of them on said bond, or the directors of said suspended bank. Mr. Cogswell and Mr. Bacon are two of the attorneys, who, by reason of their having been consulted by the sureties or directors, did not deem it proper to give an opinion.

Your committee, thereupon, consulted ex-Judge William C. Rowley, Hon. John Van Voorhis and Joseph A. Stull, Esq., as three attorneys from whom to obtain an opinion upon said subject indicated. While the resolution adopted by your Honorable body provided that the opinion of two attorneys should be obtained, your committee have been able to obtain the opinion of the three above named at an expense of \$150, thus using fifty dollars less than the amount limited by the resolution referred to.

The statement of facts submitted to the three lawyers selected, and the questions propounded, are as follows: The Common Council of the city of Rochester has instructed the Board of Assessors, a special committee appointed to consider the question of the liability of the sureties upon the bond of the Treasurer, on account of the failure of the City Bank of Rochester, to obtain opinions from eminent attorneys as to the liability of the sureties upon said bond, at an expense not exceeding two hundred dollars, upon the statement of facts which is herewith submitted, the undersigned committee respectfully requests an opinion from you as to such liability.

The following are the facts as admitted by all the parties concerned:

Section 7 of the city charter provides that the Treasurer, before he enters upon the duties of his office, shall execute and file with the Mayor a bond in the penal sum of fifty thousand dollars, or such other sum as the Common Council may have fixed, with good and sufficient sureties, which bond shall be conditioned for the faithful performance of all his duties as Treasurer, and of all duties imposed upon him by law in respect to the money, property and affairs of said city. In accordance with this section the bond of the Treasurer was duly given. The bond, as drawn, follows exactly the form laid down by the charter.

Section 72 of the charter provides that the City Treasurer shall, by virtue of his office, be the chief official officer of the city and have the care and custody of all the funds and securities belonging to the city, except as may be otherwise provided.

Section 118 of the charter contains the following provision:

"All moneys received by the Treasurer belonging to the city shall be deposited in one or more banks of the city, to be designated by the Common Council, and the Treasurer shall keep a bank book with every bank in which any money of the city shall be deposited, in which shall be entered all sums received by such bank to the credit of the Treasurer, and all sums paid out on his checks and drafts, which books shall be written up and the balance stated on the last day of each week and at any other time when the Mayor shall direct. And every member of the Common Council shall be entitled during usual banking hours to inspect the ac-

count of the Treasurer with any bank in which deposits of money are made. The Common Council shall also have the right to order deposits transferred to, and made in any other bank or banks."

On November 14th, 1882, the following resolution was adopted by the Common Council:

"Resolved, That the City Treasurer be, and he hereby is, authorized to issue the city's notes for one hundred thousand dollars, discount on the same to be charged to the contingent fund; notes to be countersigned by the chairman of the finance committee."

In pursuance of this resolution ten notes of ten thousand dollars each, in the usual form, were drawn by the Treasurer and countersigned by the chairman of the finance committee. One of said notes was discounted by the Flour City National Bank. The other nine were discounted by the City Bank of Rochester at a less rate of interest than that offered by any other bank. The City Bank, as not a city depository, at the time. The depositors of the city's money during the year 1882, duly designated by the Common Council in pursuance of the provisions of the charter, were the Flour City National Bank and the Traders National Bank of Rochester. These notes were discounted on the fourth day of December, 1882. The following is a statement of the moneys which such discounts down to the time of the failure of the City Bank of Rochester on said bills was \$1,336.88, leaving available proceeds of the discounted paper \$88,663.12, for which the City Bank issued a draft on New York for \$23,950 paid the Treasurer \$5,000 in currency and gave the Treasurer a cashier's check for the balance, namely, \$56,713.12.

The cashier's check is the same in form as the one of which a copy is herewith given. On the sixteenth day of December the treasurer surrendered to the City Bank said cashier's check, and received from said bank \$5,000 in currency and a cashier's check for \$54,713.12. On the eighth day of December the treasurer surrendered said last mentioned check and received from said bank \$10,000 in currency and a cashier's check for \$44,713.12. On the eleventh day of December the treasurer surrendered said last mentioned cashier's check and received from said bank in currency \$4,713.12, and a cashier's check for forty thousand dollars. On the thirteenth day of December the treasurer surrendered to the bank the said last mentioned cashier's check, and in return received from the bank \$5,000 in currency and a check for \$55,000. On the eighteenth day of December the treasurer surrendered the cashier's check last mentioned and purchased drafts on New York to the amount of \$4,870.50, and received a cashier's check for \$30,129.41. The drafts above mentioned were duly paid by the banks on which they were drawn, leaving, at the time of the failure, the claim of the city against the City Bank, the amount of said last mentioned cashier's check. Such cashier's check is in the following words and figures, to wit:

No. 2,392. ROCHESTER, N. Y., Dec. 13, 1882.

City Bank of Rochester pay to the order of cash thirty thousand one hundred and twenty-nine and 41-100 dollars. (\$30,129.41).

H. C. FENN, Teller, and the Treasurer has since held said last mentioned cashier's check.

It is the desire of the committee that your opinion shall be ready for submission at the next regular meeting of the Common Council, which is to be held on the first day of July next.

The opinion in which all of the three concurred, is as follows:

We are asked by a special committee of the Common Council for an opinion upon a given statement of facts, as to the liability of the sureties upon the bond of the City Treasurer for the moneys of the city which were in the City Bank of Rochester at the time of its failure, December 19th, 1882. The statement furnished us, as the basis of our opinion, contains the provisions of the existing statutes relating to the matter, as well as the facts, and briefly stated is as follows:

1. Before entering upon his duties the City Treasurer is required by law to file, with the Mayor, a bond in the penal sum of \$50,000, with good and sufficient sureties, "conditioned for the faithful performance of all his duties as Treasurer, and of all duties imposed upon him by law, in respect to the money, property and affairs of said city." The present Treasurer gave a bond in compliance with this statute.

2. The City Treasurer is, by the charter of the city, and by virtue of his office, made the chief fiscal officer of the city, and has the care and custody of all the funds and securities belonging to the city, except as may be otherwise provided.

3. The charter also contains the following proviso:

"All moneys received by the treasurer belonging to the city, shall be deposited in one or more banks of the city, to be designated by the Common Council, and the treasurer shall keep a bank book with every bank in which any money of the city shall be deposited, in which shall be entered all sums received by such bank to the credit of the treasurer, and all sums paid out on his checks and drafts, which books shall be written up and the balance stated on the last day of each week, and at any other time when the Mayor shall direct. And every member of the Common Council shall be entitled, during usual banking hours, to inspect the account of the treasurer with any bank in which deposits of money are made. The Common Council shall always have the right to order deposits transferred to or made in any other bank or banks." Under this provision of the charter the Common Council designated the Flour City National Bank and the Traders' National Bank as depositories of the money of the city for the year 1882, and the City Bank "was not a city depository at the time."

4. On November 14th, 1882, the Common Council passed the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the City Treasurer be, and he hereby is, authorized to issue the city's notes for one hundred thousand dollars; discount on the same to be charged to the Contingent Fund; notes to be countersigned by the Chairman of the Finance Committee."

Under this resolution ten notes of \$10,000 each were made and the Treasurer procured one of them to be discounted at the Flour City National Bank. The other nine notes were discounted by the City Bank of Rochester at a less rate of discount than that offered by any other bank. This discount was on the 4th day of December, 1882. The avails of this discount were \$88,000 and upwards. This money in part was allowed by the Treasurer to remain in the City Bank. On the day of the discount the treasurer drew \$28,950 and took a cashier's check for \$59,713.12. Two days later and on December 6th the treasurer surrendered the cashier's check to the bank and received a new check for \$54,713.12 and \$5,000 in currency. On the 8th of December the treasurer surrendered the last mentioned check and received a new check for \$44,713.12 and \$10,000 in currency. On the 11th of December the treasurer surrendered the last mentioned check and received therefor a new check for \$40,000 and \$4,713.12 in cash. On the 13th of December the treasurer surrendered to the bank the last mentioned check and received a new check for \$35,000 and \$5,000 in currency. On the 18th of December the treasurer surrendered the cashier's check last mentioned and received a new check for \$30,120.41 and drafts on New York, which were paid, for \$4,870.50. On the 19th of December the bank failed, leaving the last check for \$30,120.41 unpaid in the hands of the treasurer.

Upon this state of facts we are clearly of opinion that the sureties upon the bond of the City Treasurer are liable for whatever loss this city may sustain in the premises. It is the policy of the law to hold fiscal officers to strict accountability. They must not only exercise the highest degree of vigilance, but they must keep safely the moneys which come to their hands. In this case it was the duty of the treasurer to deposit the moneys in question in either the Traders' National or the Flour City National Bank. The law required him to do so. His neglect to do so was a violation of law. It does not help the case that he acted in good faith and was actuated by a motive to get the lowest rate of discount possible. It does not appear that the smallness of the rate of discount was induced by any understanding between the treasurer and the bank, that the money, or any portion of it, was to remain in the City Bank. If it did it would be an illegal arrangement. The treasurer had no power to make any contract of that nature. The power to designate where the funds of the city shall be kept is vested solely in the Common Council. That body has exercised the power and made the designations.

Without doubt the Common Council, by proper action on its part, could have authorized the Treasurer to deposit the moneys in question in the City Bank, and if it had done so, he would simply have performed his duty in placing them there.

But the statement furnished us is just the contrary of this. It says: "The City Bank was not a depository at the time. The depositories of the city's money during the year 1882, duly designated by the Common Council in pursuance of the provisions of the charter, were the Flour City National Bank and the Traders' National Bank of Rochester." The Treasurer kept no bank book with the City Bank, as section 113 of the charter requires him to do, "with every bank in which any money of the city shall be deposited," &c.

Our conclusion is, upon the case presented to us, that the sureties upon the Treasurer's bond, as well as the principal, are liable to the city of Rochester for the moneys of the city lost in the City Bank, as above mentioned.

Your committee intended to obtain the opinion of leading business men and tax payers in this city as to the advisability of accepting the proposition which has been made of forty cents on the dollar of the amount of the city's claim, but upon making inquiry, your committee was almost invariably met by the response that the advisability of accepting the proposition depended upon the question as to the liability of the sureties upon the opinion above given did not reach your committee until Monday afternoon of the present week, no opportunity has been afforded for a canvass among business men and tax payers as to the advisability of accepting the offer made.

In view of the opinion above given, your committee sees no other course open but to instruct the City Attorney to take the necessary steps looking to a test of the question as to the liability of the sureties upon the treasurer's bond. Upon a full and careful consideration of all the facts, your committee is of the opinion that the proposition made should not be accepted. If a proposition should hereafter be submitted which shall be more favorable to the city than the one now under consideration, even though the full amount of the city's claim is not under such proposition to be paid, its acceptance or rejection can be considered without reference to the fact that litigation may then have been begun. We recognize the fact that as members of the Common Council we are but trustees acting for the people of the city, and, in the absence of generally expressed opinion on the part of the people in favor of compromise, we see no course open, except to insist upon the strict legal rights which the city has in the premises, to the end that all sums of money legally recoverable by the city, shall be collected.

GENTLEMEN: The notice of the Executive Board has been repeatedly called to the condition of that portion of the North avenue outlet sewer ditch extending from the outfall of the covered sewer at North avenue to the city line at Norton street and particularly to the fact that at every rain storm of any magnitude the adjacent gardens and cellars are flooded from the overflow of the ditch, causing great damage to the owners.

We believe that if the Council should provide money for all the work, that the requisite materials could not be procured in season to do the work the present year.
We have therefore selected the locations where the present need seems greatest, as contained in the annexed list amounting to \$9,920, and respectfully recommend that the Common Council authorize the Executive Board to extend the pipe in the indicated streets and authorize the making of the city's note

when necessary for the cost thereof, not to exceed \$9,920.

For the streets not contained in the annexed list, the Council may, if it shall deem it expedient, at a later date, make such an appropriation as shall enable the Executive Board to procure the materials therefor during the coming winter, when they can without doubt be procured on much more favorable terms.

ROCHESTER, July 15, 1884.

To the Honorable the Common Council :

GENTLEMEN—On the 8th day of January last your Water Works Committee and the Executive Board in a formal communication recommended the sale of such portions of the Hopough mill property owned by the city, as would not subserve any useful purpose in connection with the operation and management of the Water Works. In this communication one of the reasons for the recommendation was stated as follows: "As the dam connected with said property is in a dilapidated condition, as are also the mills, houses and other structures connected therewith, and the repairs and maintenance of the same will involve large immediate expenditures by the owner, with possible large contingent damages to farms, mills, bridges and highways in case the dam should give away, it seems that the time has now arrived when it is both prudent and desirable that the property should be sold with the reservations desired and particularly indicated hereafter."

The Common Council in response to the recommendation authorized the advertising of the property for sale. On the 21st of January, 1884, proposals were received, of which F. P. Michel of this city was the highest, amounting to \$9,200.

The Council did not authorize the transfer of the property to Mr. Michel at his bid, and it has therefore continued to remain the property of the city.

The dam, by the exercise of extra precautions, was maintained during the winter, when a break would have caused large damage, but on or about the fourth of the present month forty-four feet of the dam broke down and washed out. There still remains about 70 feet of old dam as rotten and liable to break down as the part already gone. Until the whole dam is rebuilt, the mills are useless and must remain idle. The bottom of the pond, embracing an area of 120 acres, is exposed to the heat of the summer sun, and it is thought by the people to be likely to prejudice the health of the citizens of the village.

The business of the village will no doubt also be injured by the loss of patronage which a custom mill brings to a small town.

The question which we are called upon to decide is whether the city shall cause the dam to be rebuilt at an estimated expense of \$1,900 for a stone or \$1,500 for a timber dam, or whether it shall be left in its present condition, and the mills and machinery be allowed to go to decay and ruin, or finally whether the property shall be sold on the best terms which the city can get, reserving all such portions and rights as can in any case ever be useful to the city in the management of its water works.

The undersigned emphatically recommend the sale of the property at once. It has been suggested by some citizens that the holding of the property by the city might in some mysterious and unexplained way prove of advantage in the settlement of the claims of the Honeyey millers against the city of Rochester.

We have examined this question with great care and

are satisfied that the retaining of the fee of this property in the city will have no more influence in the final adjustment of these suits than the maintenance of a mill dam in the town of Irondequoit, and we are further of the opinion that to avoid other complications of a nature hinted at in the foregoing statement and also having a due regard to the interests and convenience of the village adjacent, the property should at once be sold to the highest bidder.

Also the necessary sewer connections and manholes.

And the whole expense shall be defrayed by the assessment upon the lots and parcels of lands to be benefited thereby; and the City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council having made an estimate of such expense, and reported the same at \$2,000, which estimate is hereby approved; and the portion of said city which said Common Council deem will be benefited by said improvement is described as follows:

All the territory enclosed within and described by the following boundary lines, viz.: Beginning at a point in the west line of Exchange street opposite the centre of Court street; thence southerly along Exchange street, including one tier of lots on the west side thereof, to Troup street; thence westerly along Troup street, including one tier of lots on the north side thereof, to Fitzhugh street; thence westerly along Fitzhugh street, excepting one tier of lots on the south side thereof, to the alley extending north and south between Fitzhugh street and Plymouth avenue; thence southerly along said alley to a point opposite the division lines between properties heretofore owned by A. L. Johnson and George L. Stratton; thence westerly along said division lines to the west line of Plymouth avenue; thence southerly along said Plymouth avenue, and including one tier of lots on the west side thereof, to Edinburgh street; thence continuing southerly along said Plymouth avenue and through Plymouth Park to Greig street; thence southerly along Greig street, and including one tier of lots on the west side thereof, to Clarissa street, excepting the lot on the northwest corner of Clarissa street and Greig street; thence easterly along Clarissa street, excepting one tier of lots on the north side thereof, to lands belonging to the Genesee Valley railroad; thence northerly along the west line of said railroad lands to Glasgow street; thence easterly along Glasgow street to the Genesee river; thence northerly along the Genesee river to the Rochester, Carroll & Fitzhugh race; thence northerly along the west line of said race to the centre of Court street; thence westerly along Court street to the place of beginning.

On which above described portion of the city the expenses of said improvement are hereby ordered assessed.

And the taxpayers to be assessed for making such improvement may pay their assessments in five equal payments, as follows:

One-fifth of the amount assessed within thirty days after the advertisement of the assessment roll; one-fifth of the amount within one year from the confirmation of such roll; one fifth within two years from the confirmation of such roll; one fifth within three years from the confirmation of such roll; and the remaining one fifth within four years from the confirmation of such roll. On all sums paid prior to the maturity of the last instalment, a discount will be allowed of six per cent. per annum.

To the Honorable Members of the Council of the City of Rochester.

GENTLEMEN: I am authorised by parties interested to make the enclosed offer for the claim of the city of Rochester against the City Bank of Rochester. The matter having been referred to three prominent attorneys of the city, it is proper for me to state that through some oversight the exact facts in regard to the claim were not fully set forth and some material questions were not presented.

The year that this loan was negotiated, the contract with the banks was not the same as the one made in previous years, and the fact that the city only

entered into an agreement as to the rate the banks should pay for the deposits, leaving out of the agreement that the banks should agree to furnish such sums as the city might need during the year at a specified rate. Instead, the city would enter into the market and obtain its funds on the best terms, and it was under this arrangement that the city treasurer borrowed the amount from the City Bank with the full agreement and understanding that the money should be only drawn as needed for the use of the city, in that way obtained the amount at a much lower rate than could have been had except for such an arrangement. That the city treasurer did in the same year borrow \$145,000 to pay for the opening of Church street of the Monroe County Savings bank at the low rate of three and sixty-two and one-half hundredths per cent. per annum (.362½ per cent.), on the agreement that the money should be drawn out slowly as it should be needed, and that during that year it was the policy of the city to do its business upon that basis, and that after the City bank failed the city changed its policy and again went back to the policy of binding the banks who received its deposit to furnish the money needed at a stipulated rate. It was generally understood that the city had saved a large amount by thus borrowing its money, and the city treasurer was acting in the best of faith when the loan was made, having obtained very large sums previously at very low rates of interest, and that the finance committee were fully aware that such had been the action of its treasurer. No doubt it was an oversight that these facts were not presented, and, therefore, it seems to be the opinion of many of the influential business men that the enclosed offer should be accepted and save further expense and costly litigation both to the city and all others interested.

GENTLEMEN: Your Finance Committee has given due notice to all banks of discount of this city that propositions would be received for taking the city deposit for the ensuing year. The notice given embraced several enquiries, the subject of which enquiries, together with the propositions made by the several banks, will be found in the following report:

The Merchants' Bank and the German American Bank decline to make any propositions.

The Flour City National Bank offers \$1,600 for the city deposit, and proposes to loan to the city during the year, when required, \$150,000 at six per cent, the city being at liberty to obtain its loans during said period elsewhere at lower rates.

The Traders' National Bank offers to pay \$1,500 for the city deposit for the ensuing year; \$800 for one-half of the deposit; \$600 for one-third of the deposit, and \$400 for one-quarter of the deposit, but will not bind itself to loan the city any money whatever.

The Commercial National Bank offers \$1,500 for the city deposit, and in like proportion for any part of it. Such bank offers at the rate of \$100 for the whole deposit, and agrees to bind itself to loan the city during the year such money as it may require at six per cent interest. Said bank also agrees to pay \$500 for the deposit and loan the city such money as it may require during the year at six per cent upon condition that the

city agrees to obtain from such bank all moneys needed during the year.

The proposition made by the Bank of Monroe are the same as those made by the Commercial National Bank. It will be observed that the highest offer made for the whole deposit is \$1,600.00, which is made by the Flour City National Bank. In coming year making such proposition said bank proposes to bind itself to loan to the city the sum of \$150,000.00, leaving the city at liberty to borrow at any time at the lowest attainable rate.

In view of the fact that the city is ordinarily able to obtain its loans at from four to five and one-half per cent., and that a much less amount will be required to be borrowed during the coming year than during past years, your committee is of the opinion that the contract should be awarded to the Flour City National Bank, and that the bond to be given by said bank shall be in the penalty of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester, N. Y.:

GENTLEMEN—Your Assessment Committee, to which was referred the communication of the Assessors, which communication is printed at page 37 of the proceedings for the current year, hereby report:

Your committee has made a careful examination into the subject of the said communication, and is of the opinion that the proper exercise of the important work in the office of the Assessors cannot be adequately performed unless some provision is made for ample clerical assistance. It is essential that the Assessors should be left free to visit all parts of the city with the view of keeping posted as to the increase in the value of property liable to assessment, and also that the personal property liable to assessment in the city should be discovered and placed upon the assessment roll. This cannot be properly done with the force which the Assessors have at their disposal. The amount of clerical labor required in the office in the copying of the rolls, and in work of like nature, has very largely increased owing to the great number of improvements and the rapid growth of the city. It seems desirable to your committee that some provision should be effected by which the records of the County Clerk's office could be personally examined, to the end that the personal property, which now escapes taxation, may be, as it should be, placed upon the assessment rolls.

Your committee believes that the appropriation of sufficient amount to make provision for the doing of this work would result in placing upon the assessment rolls of the city of a large amount of personal property which now escapes taxation. If this result is accomplished, certainly the Common Council will be justified in making some provisions for the employment of the help required. We are of the opinion, after a careful investigation, that if the sum of \$900 was appropriated for ex-

peniture for that purpose during the present year, the work referred to can be accomplished.
Your committee, therefore, recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Bronson—

To the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—Your committee appointed to provide a location for draymen to stand on the east side of the river report that the penal ordinance "Relating to Cartmen and Porters" provides as follows:

§ 7. Such common or public carts or vehicle, with the consent of the owners or lessees, and not otherwise, of property adjacent, shall be permitted to stand waiting for employment in any public street in said city except thirty feet from the north side of West Main st. each way from the corner of State st.; except also thirty feet on the south side of West Main st. each way from the corner of Exchange st.; except also thirty feet on each side of State st. from the corner of West Main st.; except also thirty feet on each side of Exchange st. from the corner of West Main st.; except also on South and North St. Paul sts., and except also thirty feet on each side of Main st. from the corner of St. Paul st.; except also on each side of East Main st. from Water st. to Minerva alley, and no such cart or vehicle shall be allowed to stand within forty feet of any other cart or twenty feet from any cross-walk or cross-walks of a street, so as in any manner to obstruct the entrance to any street or alley, or so as in any manner to obstruct the access to any tavern by horses, stakes, or other carriages. Each cart or vehicle shall stand with the rear end or side thereof to the sidewalk as near as the same can be placed to such sidewalk. Any person violating the provisions of this section, or either of them, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of five dollars for each offence.

The foregoing ordinance seems to cover all the suggestions that have been made with reference to the subject. Your committee does not deem it necessary to take any action on the matter in view of the fact that this penal ordinance was adopted after full notice to all parties concerned.

Gentlemen of the Common Council:

Your resolution increasing the salaries of the two judges of the Municipal Court from eighteen hundred dollars to twenty-four hundred dollars each per year, is hereby returned disapproved. This court was originally established in 1876, at which time the so-called Justice's courts were abolished. It has most acceptably accomplished the purposes for which it was created, still it has been a matter of considerable expense to the tax-paying people of Rochester. Since it first went into operation, it has cost the city in round figures twelve thousand dollars more than it paid into the treasury. Its present excess of expenses over the amount in fees annually collected by it, taking last year as an example, is in the neighborhood of twelve hundred dollars. If your resolution, therefore, for an increase of salaries becomes operative, its burden will necessarily become heavier, and its deficiency for the next year will not be less than twenty-seven hundred dollars. Are we justified in permitting this? In reply to this question I most emphatically answer no. The salaries of the judges as originally fixed by the statute was eighteen hundred dollars each per year, and they have remained at that figure until the present time. Those who have accepted the position of judges have done so fully understanding the amount of compensation to be paid by the city for services rendered. It is claimed, however, that the duties of the court have multiplied, but there is no evidence that it must cease its operations, or that it will not hereafter prove as efficient as now, if no increase of salaries is sanctioned. I have only words of commendation for the young gentlemen composing the court. They are faithful and capable, and in addition to the amount annually paid them, they are entitled to the respect and the con-

fidence of our citizens. With all this they should for the present at least be content. I am inclined to think that the fees received in most instances for the business transacted in the Municipal Court are smaller than they should be. Whether or not they can be legally increased is a matter with which I am not conversant. Many of the cases brought into the court are of a petty character. People living out of the city avail themselves very often of the advantages it offers. All these things swell the volume of business and as is usually the case, the tax-payers are called upon to, and do pay the deficiencies. It seems to me that there could be a reform in some of these matters that would materially alter the complexion of things. These suggestions I offer for your consideration. In view of the present high rate of taxation we should endeavor to lighten the burden instead of making it more oppressive. No necessary work, however, should be neglected.

Our water system should be extended as fast as our finances will permit and occasion requires. Cisterns and wells, and outhouses should be abandoned and cleanliness should in every direction be encouraged and enforced. The extension of light in a reasonable and businesslike way is also to be encouraged. For these latter things the mass of the people cheerfully contribute. Several arguments are advanced why the salaries of the officers of the Municipal Court should be increased. It is claimed that in the course of its business much time is saved to litigants, and many cases that would naturally be tried in the County Court are disposed of by it. That a great saving also to the city has been effected by the employment of but one clerk while the law permits the appointment of two. In reply to these arguments I have only to state, that for all the good work the court has done and is doing, it is entitled, to the thanks of the community. It is its duty to save to the people in every possible way, and it is no argument that because money is saved in one direction the same should be expended in another. Financially speaking, the Municipal Court, established on the theory that it would be self-sustaining, has been and is still a burden, and any movement calculated to make it more so will certainly meet with disfavor. The proposed increase of expense is in my judgment unnecessary, and at the present time without justification, and if permitted, with you must rest the responsibility.

GENTLEMEN: The Executive Board is in constant receipt of complaints from parties owning lands on the Wakelee Farm, through which the Court and William streets outlet sewer ditch runs; also from parties owning lands along the North avenue and Monroe avenue outlet sewer ditches. Claims are made for damages for the past, and payment is demanded for right of way in some cases for the future. The residents of the town of Brighton are moving through the town Board of Health to compel the city of Rochester to devise some means of disposing of its sewage other than that of passing it in open ditches through the town. FIRST ORDINANCES.

PLANK WALK ON GENESEE STREET

By Ald. Simmelnk—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a plank walk on Genesee st.

Adopted.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate \$4,010

By Ald. Simmelnk—Resolved, That the following improvement is expedient, viz: The construction of a plank walk 4x8 ft. in width on each side of Genesee st., from Hunter st. to Brooks avenue, except where good flagstones and plank walks now exist at the proper grade. Also the necessary crosswalks.

And Whereas, The City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof and reported the same at \$4,010, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, That the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and proper to be assessed for the whole expense thereof, viz.:

One tier of lots on each side of Genesee st., from Hunter st. to Brooks ave.

And further, Resolved, That the tax-payers to be

assessed for making such improvement may pay their assessments in three equal payments, as follows: One-third of the amount assessed within thirty days after the advertisement of the assessment roll; one-third of the amount within one-year from the confirmation of said roll; and the remaining one-third within two years from the confirmation of said roll. On all sums paid prior to the maturity of the said last instalment, a discount will be allowed at six per cent. per annum.

GENTLEMEN:—Your Lamp Committee, to whom was referred the whole matter of street lighting; also, to test the power and brilliancy of the Standard Lighting Company's lamps; also, to request them to place twenty-five lamps on each side of the river, to be located by the Lamp Committee, would most respectfully report: That your Lamp Committee, after consultation with Mr. Rising, the agent of the Standard Lighting Company, we found that he was unwilling to place twenty-five lamps on each side of the river, but would place ten on South St. Paul street, in front of or as near the Osburn House as possible, but could not do so at present, as he would be obliged to leave town and would be absent for some time, owing to the reluctance of Mr. Rising to accede to the request of the Common Council, your committee could not examine the brilliancy, power, &c., of the Standard lamp, and therefore have given it no further consideration. Your committee would further report the relative cost of vapor light over kerosene: 1,550 vapor lights @ \$18.24 per light would cost \$28,272.00, same number of kerosene @ \$7.32 would cost \$11,346, making an increase of the vapor light over kerosene \$16,926.

IN BOARD OF HEALTH, August 10, 1884.

Hon. C. R. Parsons, President of the Board of Health presented the following:

ROCHESTER, N. Y., August 7, 1884.

Hon. C. R. Parsons, Mayor, Rochester, N. Y.:

DEAR SIR: I desire to call your special attention, and through you the special attention of the Common Council to the regulation of the Board of Health of the town of Brighton in regard to the Monroe avenue and East avenue outlet sewers, a copy of which regulation has been served upon you and other officers of the city. I have been informed by the Health Officer of Brighton and by other competent and reliable judges that the discharge of sewage from those two sewers mentioned, and particularly from the former, has become not only a nuisance but a prolific source of disease. Thomas Creek, which runs for more than a mile through that town below the point where the contents of the Monroe avenue sewer enters, was formerly a stream of comparatively pure water. It has become a filthy, sluggish and offensive stream, solely by reason of its receiving the contents of these sewers. As a consequence, property along the line of the stream has depreciated in value, sickness has ensued and the health of a large portion of the town endangered. For these results the city of Rochester is responsible and there is no excuse for any delay on its part in remedying the evil. There is no more reason why the city should deliberately empty its sewers into private property and into flowing streams in the town of Brighton than that a resident of East avenue should empty the drain from his residence into his neighbor's lawn. The common law provides a penalty for the former as well as for the latter; statute law relating to the public health authorizes penalties in either case and common decency is offended at the one almost if not as much as at the other. I have a special reason, however, for calling your special attention to the matter, and that is for the purpose of impressing upon the city authorities the fact that the complaints that are now made are not new ones. The Common Council and city officials have been informed of the offense time and again. One of the Executive Board with one or more city officials, too, as I am informed made an inspection of the infected premises and declared that the sewer in question created an offensive nuisance and the Board of Health of Brighton has long had in force resolutions which have in whole or in part been violated by the city, decreeing every hour that these sewers have been in their present condition since the resolutions were passed. The residents of Brighton ask, therefore, that when the resolution of their board of health, served upon you August 4th is brought to the attention of the common council that the council will not treat it as a new subject, admitting of long delay and reference to special or standing committees to investigate and report. A great wrong has been done to a large number of worthy citizens of the county and the evil should be remedied promptly at any expense of trouble and money on the part of the city that may be necessary. If I am not im-

pertinent in so doing, and provided it is not overstepping your authority as mayor, may I suggest that you send a special communication to the board of aldermen relating to the subject and urging immediate action. The people of Brighton are not so urgent about the matter because their property is damaged, but because their health is endangered. The city is amply responsible for the former, but it cannot repair the injury that may arise from the latter evil. I remain very respectfully yours,

Inspector Harder presented the following report in relation to Saxton street sewer:

At Maple street no trouble. Junction Wilder and Saxton street, a grocery; has never had water to speak of; the cellar is five feet nine inches deep. On northeast corner, occupied by a private family, water comes in the cellar; cellar six feet deep. On the southwest corner, trouble with water; next number on the street is troubled a good deal with water; cellar five feet deep. On the northeast corner of Saxton and Campbell is a grocery; cellar five and a half feet deep, water comes in a foot deep or more. Northeast corner of Campbell, meat market; cellar five feet one inch deep; water at times 2 feet deep; has lost pork and meat. Southwest corner Campbell, at rains water comes in eighteen inches. Northeast corner Campbell, private family, cellar 5 feet 8 inches, no water. Northwest corner of Orange street, water every heavy rain, sometimes 19 inches deep; cellar 5 1/2 feet deep. Southeast corner of Orange; no water. Southeast corner of Saxton and Jay, cellar 5 feet deep; water comes in every hard rain from two to four feet. Northeast corner of Jay, some water every hard rain. Northeast corner of Jay, cellar 5 feet 7 inches; have water every time it rains hard, from 1 to 3 feet; cleaned cellar three times in one week; furnace nearly ruined. Southwest corner of Jay, house stands three feet above ground; water comes in every time it rains hard. Southwest corner Smith and Saxton, water comes in when it rains hard. Southeast corner of Smith, water used to come in, but drain has been stopped. Northeast corner Smith, never more than 4 inches water; cellar 5 feet 10 inches deep. Northwest corner Smith, house is high above the ground, no drain, cellar 5 1/2 feet deep and dry. Northwest corner of Saxton and Lime, cellar 5 1/2 feet deep; every time rains water and mud comes in about 1 foot deep. On the 1st of August visited 33 dwellings on Saxton street; found water in 13, varying from 6 inches to 3 1/2 feet; 14 no water; also visited 26 dwellings on Jay street; found water in 12 cellars. On August 5th visited 17 dwellings on Lyell avenue, on the lower part, found 7 troubled with water, 1 no cellar, 3 locked up; out of 7 examined on Bolivar street found no water.

Many people residing upon Saxton street think that it is unfair that they should be called upon to pay for the enlargement of the sewer, for the reason that the present one was built thirty years ago and paid for by them; that it was large enough then to accommodate the territory drained by it; that since then all the western part of the city has been drained into it without the new territory paying anything towards this outlet sewer in Saxton street. The result, they say, is that it floods their cellars when formerly it did not, and that it fills their homes with the worst kind of filth. Some of the residents object to having the sewer enlarged; others say that if they cannot have it enlarged they will resort to legal measures and compel the authorities to prevent the emptying into it of a great portion of what now comes from other streets. Complaint is also made that whole families are sick, and that the physicians say that they cannot be cured so long as the cellars are in their present condition. It is claimed by many that their taxes are now so high that they do not see how they can add to the present burdens of taxation, and that if the sewer is enlarged it should be paid for by the entire city or by the whole territory which is turned into Saxton street sewer and drained by it. The subject was referred to the Common Council for action at its next meeting.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS.

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester, N. Y.:
GENTLEMEN—The Retail Grocers' Association of this city respectfully show to your honorable body: That the members of the Association are all residents and taxpayers of Rochester; that the rents which we are compelled to pay for our places of business are very high, running as high in some cases as \$2,600 per year; that those of our number who own their own stores are heavily burdened with taxation.

That the business of huckstering in this city has recently grown to large proportions and is constantly increasing in size; that the said business of huckstering is generally carried on by persons who pay few or no taxes, and that said business thus carried on, with either no license, or one that is entirely disproportionate to the amount of business done, is working injustice and injury to the members of this Association; that the license fee of fifteen dollars required by the ordinance regulating the sale from house to house within the city of Rochester of vegetable, fruit and garden produce is inadequate to protect the interests of retail grocers; that the penalty of five dollars imposed for the violation of said ordinance is not large enough to accomplish the end sought to be obtained by the passage of the ordinance; that your petitioners are absolutely unprotected against the competition of these non-tax-paying hucksters, in the sale of general groceries;

Wherefore, we petition your honorable body to amend the ordinance regulating the sale of vegetables, fruit and garden produce by fixing the license fee for the sale of said vegetables, fruit and garden produce at seventy-five dollars for each single wagon, and one

hundred dollars for each double team, and the penalty for the violation of said ordinance at twenty-five dollars. We also petition your honorable body to adopt an ordinance regulating the sale of general groceries from house to house within the city of Rochester, requiring a license fee for the sale of said groceries of seventy-five dollars for single wagons, carts or other means of conveyance, and one hundred dollars for double teams, and fixing the penalty for the violation of said ordinance at twenty-five dollars.

AMENDING CHAPTER FORTY OF PENAL ORDINANCES.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE SALE OF VEGETABLES AND GROCERIES.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. No person shall peddle or sell from house to house within the city of Rochester, any vegetables, fruit, garden produce, or groceries, without having a license therefor, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offence.

§ 2. The Common Council shall license any proper person to sell as above on payment therefor a license of seventy-five dollars for each single wagon, cart, baskets, or other mode of conveyance, and one hundred dollars for each double team, per year.

§ 3. The provisions of the preceding sections shall not apply to the taking of orders from customers, by regular grocers having an established place of business.

§ 4. Every execution issued under a judgment recovered for a violation of this ordinance shall command the amount to be made out of the property of the defendant, if any such can be found, and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentiary for a period of not more than twenty-five days.

§ 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

On the 5th day of September, 1882, your honorable body adopted a final ordinance for the acquiring of lands for the opening of a new street from Clifford street to Norton street. On March 7th, 1883, I was instructed by your honorable body to take the usual proceedings necessary to obtain the appointment of commissioners of appraisal, and in pursuance of such direction such was taken under the said ordinance as resulted in the appraisal of the damages to be paid the owners for the land to be taken, the report of the commissioners being made to the Common Council January 22d, 1884, and confirmed February 5th, 1884. On the 17th day of June, 1884, the assessment roll for said improvement was duly confirmed.

Owing to the oversight of the City Surveyor in the preparation of the final ordinance provision was made that the expense of the improvement should be divided into three payments instead of one as the charter provides in the case of taking lands for public improvements.

This defect in the ordinance I did not discover until since the confirmation of the assessment rolls. CHAP. 302.

AN ACT to amend the charter of the city of Rochester as contained in chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty.

Passed May 19, 1884; three fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section one hundred and thirty-seven of the charter of the city of Rochester, as contained in chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 137. It shall be the duty of the common council within fifteen days after receiving the certificate of the board of education hereinbefore required, of the sum necessary or proper to be raised for school purposes, to determine and certify to said board of education the amount that will be raised by them for the year commencing on the first Monday of

September thereafter, for the purposes mentioned in said certificate, distinguishing between the amount to be raised for teachers' wages and contingent expenses, and the amount to be raised for the repair of school-houses. The amount raised for school purposes shall constitute four separate and distinct funds, namely: teachers' fund, contingent fund, building fund and repair fund, and in case the said common council shall neglect or fail to certify to the board of education the amount that will be raised by them, within thirty days, as above specified, then the common council shall raise the several amounts embraced in the certificate of the board of education, as specified therein, which amount shall be subject to the disposal of the board of education.

§ 2. Section one hundred and sixty of the charter of the city of Rochester, as contained in chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 160. Any person who shall, without the consent of the executive board, its authorized agents or successors in office, tap, open or connect with any water pipe or open any hydrant, valve or stop-cock connected with said water-works, or make any extension of existing service pipes, whereby increased quantities of water are or may be used, without said consent, or shall leave open any valve, faucet, stop-cock or other fixture for continuous flow of and through which there shall be continuous flow beyond what may be necessary for actual use, or the purposes required in connection with such hydrant, valve, faucet, stop-cock or other fixture, shall be liable to the city of Rochester in a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars, which penalty the executive board or its successors in office for and in behalf of the city of Rochester may sue for and collect in a civil action. The said acts or any of them are hereby also declared to be a misdemeanor, and the person so offending may be prosecuted therefor, and on conviction shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding two hundred dollars, or imprisonment of not exceeding one year, or both; but the penalty in a civil action and also in a criminal action shall not be enforced for the same offense.

§ 3. Section two hundred and fifty-four of the charter of the city of Rochester as contained in chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 254. Said judges shall each be paid in monthly payments an annual salary of not less than eighteen hundred dollars, nor more than twenty-five hundred dollars; and shall receive to their own use no fees or other compensation for services as judges of said court. Said clerk shall be paid in monthly payments an annual salary of not less than six hundred dollars, nor more than twelve hundred dollars, and if it shall become necessary to appoint a deputy clerk, he shall be paid in monthly payments an annual salary of not less than three hundred dollars, nor more than six hundred dollars, except that if a clerk and deputy clerk be appointed, the aggregate salary to be paid to them shall not exceed twelve hundred dollars, and said judges, clerk and deputy clerk shall receive no fees or other compensation for services as judges, clerk or deputy clerk of said court, except as is above provided. The salaries of said judges, clerk and deputy clerk shall be fixed by the common council in the same manner that other salaries are fixed.

§ 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

An ordinance to improve Chestnut street, from East avenue to Monroe avenue.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester, do ordain and determine as follows:

The improvement of Chestnut street, from East avenue to Monroe avenue, by resetting the present curbstones, (supplying any deficiency with new curb stones) on a line one foot outside of the present curb lines, relaying the gutters, constructing a flag stone walk five feet in width in one course on each side of the street, except where curb stones and gutters have been moved one foot out from the original curb lines and located on the proper grade and except where good flag and cement walks with brick pavements on each side thereof now exist at the proper grade. On which above described portion of the city the expenses of said improvement are hereby ordered assessed.

And the tax-payers to be assessed for making such improvement, may pay their assessment in three equal payments, as follows:

One-third of the amount assessed within thirty days after the advertisement of the assessment roll; one-third of the amount within one year from the confirmation of said roll; and the remaining one-third within two years from the confirmation of said roll. On all sums paid prior to the maturity of the said last instalment, a discount will be allowed at six per cent. per annum.

Also the necessary crosswalks surface sewers, lot laterals and manholes.

And the whole expense shall be defrayed by the assessment upon the lots and parcels of land to be benefited thereby; and the City Surveyor, under the direc-

On which above described portion of the city the expenses of said improvement are hereby ordered assessed.

And the tax payers to be assessed for making such improvement, may pay their assessments in three equal payments, as follows: One-third of the amount assessed within thirty days after the advertisement of the assessment roll; one-third of the amount within one year from the confirmation of such roll; and the remaining one-third within two years from the confirmation of such roll. On all sums prior to the maturity of the said last instalment, a discount will be allowed of six per cent. per annum.

Ald. Pitkin presented a petition for, also a remonstrance against the ordinance for Tappan street improvement. The ordinance was then adopted by the following vote:

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Strouss—

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, who were appointed a committee to inquire into the assessment of property owned by the United States on Church street, would respectfully report that they have given the matter careful consideration and have ascertained the following facts:

On the 17th day of March, 1883, the owners of the property in question made propositions in writing to the United States government for the sale of their respective lots; on the 20th day of March these propositions were formally accepted by the government; between March 20th and May 2d the deeds of the several pieces of land were executed and acknowledged, and on the 2d day of May said deeds were formally delivered to Hon. Martin I Townsend, United States District Attorney for the northern district of New York, and were by him formally accepted; on the 12th day of June the assessment roll for general city taxes for 1883 was confirmed by the Common Council; and that in and by said assessment roll there was assessed to the several grantors of said pieces of property, so sold to the United States, the following amounts for said general city taxes of 1883:

To Mary E. Briggs, parts of lots 56 and 57, east side of Fitzhugh street, \$207.33.

To Joseph Curtis, part of lot 57 east side Fitzhugh street, \$254.95; to Mary E. Briggs and Sarah S. Woolard, the south 63 feet of the east, 74 ft. 4 in. of lot 58, assessed with other property as parts of lots 58 and 59, east side Fitzhugh street, \$221.17; that subsequently and on the 10th day of July, 1883, the assessors of the city certified that the south 63 feet of the rear, 14 ft 4 in. of lot 58, which said 63 feet had been sold to the United States, should equita-

bly be charged with \$69.12 of the entire amount of \$21.17 assessed on parts of lots 58 and 59, and that the remainder of said premises should be charged with the balance of said tax, to wit, \$152.05.

That said Mary E. Briggs and Sarah S. Woollard have heretofore petitioned your honorable body to apportion said last mentioned tax and have been and are now willing to pay on the part of said premises owned by them, the equitable share of said tax chargeable to them, namely \$152.05.

That on the last Thursday of March, 1884, the City Treasurer sold the various lots so assessed, on which the taxes for 1883 were unpaid, and that on such sale all of the said lots were struck off to the city of Rochester, except the part of lot 58, assessed to Mary E. Briggs and Sarah S. Woollard, which was sold to M. M. Granger for \$242.56, the amount of said tax, together with interest, costs, fees and expenses.

It will be seen that the Federal government acquired title to the property in question more than a month before the confirmation of the Assessment Roll for the General City Taxes for 1883. Such being the case, your committee is of the opinion that the various assessments above referred to are invalid, and therefore recommend the adoption of the accompanying resolution. Strouss—Whereas, the United States purchased of the several owners property on the corner of Church and Fitzhugh streets, for a site for a Governemne Building in the city of Rochester, before the assessment for general city taxes for the year 1883 was made, and by reason of such purchase such property was exempt from taxation; but not withstanding such exemption, such property was assessed to the several prior owners in the assessment rolls for general city taxes for the year 1883, as follows:

To Mary E. Briggs, parts of lots 56 and 57 east side Fitzhugh street, \$207.35.

To Joseph Curtis, part of lot 57 east side of Fitzhugh street, \$234.98.

To Mary E. Briggs and Sarah L. Woollard, the south 63 feet of the east 74 feet 4 inches of lot 58, assessed with other property as parts of lots 58 and 59 east side Fitzhugh street, \$221.17.

And, whereas, the assessors of the city did, on the 10th day of July, 1883, certify that the south 63 feet of the rear 74 feet 4 inches of lot 58 recently sold to the United States, should equitably be charged of the tax of \$221.17 levied on parts of lots 58 and 59 east side of Fitzhugh street the sum of \$69.12; and the remainder of said premises should be charged with \$152.05 of said tax.

And, whereas, the said Mary E. Briggs and Sarah L. Woollard heretofore petitioned this Council to apportion said tax and tendered to the treasurer the amount of said certified by said assessors as the just portion thereof to be charged upon the part not sold to the United States. But the said tax has never been apportioned, and said treasurer refused to receive such portion of said tax and discharge the land not so sold.

And, whereas, the said taxes remaining unpaid the city treasurer advertised and sold all such land for unpaid taxes; and all of said lots were struck off to the city of Rochester, except parts of lots 58 and 59 east side of Fitzhugh street assessed to Mary E. Briggs and Sarah L. Woollard, which were sold to M. M. Granger for \$242.56.

Now, therefore, Resolved, That the city clerk be and he hereby is directed to draw an order on the city treasurer in favor of M. M. Granger for \$242.56 and interest, in satisfaction of his tax certificate of rate of parts of lots 58 and 59 east side of Fitzhugh street sold for general city taxes of 1883, assessed to Mary E. Briggs and Sarah L. Woollard, said order to be payable from the Contingent Fund 1, and that the treasurer charge said amount to Lrroneous Assessments.

That the tax of \$221.17 assessed upon parts of lots 58 and 59 east side of Fitzhugh street be and the same is apportioned as follows:

\$69.12 upon the south 63 feet of the rear 74 4-12 feet of lot 58, and \$152.05 on the remainder of said premises.

That the city treasurer be and he is hereby directed to cancel the taxes so levied in the assess-

ment rolls for general city taxes for the year 1883 against Mary E. Briggs, for parts of lots 56 and 57 east side of Fitzhugh street, \$207.35.

Joseph Curtis, part of lot 57 east side of Fitzhugh street, \$234.98, and \$69.12, of the tax of \$221.17, assessed to Mary E. Briggs and Sarah S. Woollard, parts of lots 58 and 59, east side Fitzhugh street, and release the south 63 feet of the rear part of lot 58 from such tax. And upon the payment by Mary E. Briggs and Sarah S. Woollard of the sum of \$152.05, he cancel the balance of such tax and discharge the remainder of said premises.

And that said treasurer charge the amount so cancelled without payment to erroneous assessments.

FIRST ORDINANCES.

CONSTRUCTING A CAST-IRON CULVERT ACROSS THE GENESSEE VALLEY CANAL.

By Ald. Kolmetz—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a cast-iron culvert across the abandoned Genesee Valley Canal from the west side thereof to the Genesee river.

Adopted.
The Surveyor submitted as such estimate \$500.
By Ald. Kohlmetz—Resolved, That the following improvement is expedient, viz:

The construction of a cast-iron pipe culvert, 12 inches in diameter, under the bed of the abandoned Genesee Valley canal, and the railroad tracks adjacent thereto, from the berm wall of said canal to the Genesee river. To be located on the site of the old culvert, directly opposite the engine house of J. C. Lighthouse.

And Whereas, the City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reported the same at \$600, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, That the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and proper to be assessed for the whole expense thereof, viz:

One tier of lots on the west side of and adjoining the lands formerly occupied by the Genesee Valley canal, from the point where the proposed cast-iron culvert shall be constructed to the street now known as the River Road. Also, the lands belonging to the Buffalo, New York and Philadelphia Railroad, located between the limits above mentioned.

And the Clerk is hereby directed to publish notice in pursuance of Title VII., section 172 of the Revised Charter of 1830, of the city of Rochester, that all persons interested in the subject matter of said improvement are required to attend the Common Council, on Tuesday evening, Sept. the 23d, 1884, at 7½ o'clock, at the Common Council Chambers when allegations will be heard.

Adopted.

IMPROVING SAXTON STREET OUTLET SEWER.
By Ald. Kohlmetz—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of improving the Saxton street outlet sewer from the center of Maple street to the Genesee river.

Adopted.
The Surveyor submitted as such estimate \$70,528.

By Ald. Kohlmetz—Resolved, That the following improvement is expedient, viz:

The deepening, enlargement, and the extension of the Saxton street outlet sewer, and the construction of an independent sewer where considered practicable, along the following described route, viz.: Beginning in Saxton street, at the center of Maple street, thence through Saxton street and the culvert under the Erie Canal to Moore street; thence through Moore street to Lyell avenue; thence through Lyell avenue to Saratoga avenue; thence through Spencer street, to the Genesee River. Also the necessary sewer connections and manholes.

Size of sewer from center of Maple street to center of Orange street to be 3x3 feet with arch and invert; from the center of Orange street to the center of Lime street to be 3½ by 3½ feet with arch and invert and from the center of Lime street to the Genesee River, to be 4x4 feet with arch and invert.

And, Whereas, The City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reported the same at \$70,528 which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, That the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and proper to be assessed for the whole expense thereof, viz.:

All the territory included within, and described by

the following boundary lines viz.: Beginning at a point in State street thirty feet north of Jay street; thence northerly along State street and including one tier of lots on each side thereof to Smith street and Vincent place respectively; thence westerly along Smith street and including one tier of lots on the south side thereof to Jones street; thence southerly along Jones street and including one tier of lots on the east side thereof to Jay street, excepting the lot on the northeast corner of Jay and Jones streets; thence westerly along Jay street and excepting one tier of lots on the north side of Jay street to the Erie canal; thence northwesterly along the Erie canal to Lyell avenue; thence easterly along Lyell avenue and including one tier of lots on the north side thereof to Durkin alley; thence northerly along Du kin alley to Jones avenue; thence easterly along Jones avenue and including one tier of lots on the north side thereof to Saratoga avenue; thence northerly along Saratoga avenue and including one tier of lots on the west side thereof to Lorimer street, excepting the lot on the south-west corner of Saratoga avenue and Lorimer street; thence easterly along Lorimer street, excepting one tier of lots on the south side thereof, to Frank street; thence southerly along Frank street to Ambrose street; thence easterly along Ambrose street and including one tier of lots on the north side thereof to Lake avenue; thence southerly along Lake avenue and including one tier of lots on the east side thereof to Spencer street; thence easterly along Spencer street, and including one tier of lots on the north side thereof to the end of Spencer street; thence easterly in a continuation of the north line of Spencer street to the Genesee River; thence southerly along the Genesee River to Vincent place; thence westerly along Vincent place and excepting one tier of lots on the north side thereof to Lake avenue; thence direct to the place of beginning.

Also, all the territory on the southwesterly side of the Erie canal enclosed within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz.: Beginning at the intersection of Lyell avenue with the Erie canal; thence northwesterly along the Erie canal to a point opposite the south line of Otis street; thence westerly to and along the south line of Otis street to Cameron street; thence southerly along Cameron street, excepting one tier of lots on the east side thereof to Lyell avenue; thence westerly along Lyell avenue and including one tier of lots on the north side thereof to a point 400 feet west of Murray street; thence still westerly along Lyell avenue, excepting one tier of lots on the south side thereof to the city line; thence southerly along the west line of the city to West avenue; thence easterly along West avenue and including one tier of lots on the south side thereof to Hancock street; thence southerly along Hancock street and including one tier of lots on the west side thereof to Chill avenue; thence easterly along Chill avenue and including one tier of lots on the south side thereof to Briggs place; thence southerly along Briggs place and including one tier of lots on the west side thereof to the south end of Briggs place; thence northerly along Briggs place and including one tier of lots on the east side thereof to West avenue; thence easterly along West avenue to Brown street; thence northeasterly along Brown street, and excepting one tier of lots on the north side thereof to Wilder street; thence northerly along Wilder street and Grape street, and excepting one tier of lots on the west side thereof to Orange street; thence northerly along Grape street, and including one tier of lots on the east side thereof to Jay street; thence easterly along Jay street and including one tier of lots on the south side thereof to the Erie canal; thence northwesterly along the Erie canal to the place of beginning.

And further, Resolved, That the tax-payers to be assessed for making such improvement, may pay their assessments in five equal payments, as follows:

One-fifth of the amount assessed within thirty days after the advertisement of the assessment roll; one-fifth of the amount within one year from the confirmation of such roll; one-fifth within two years from the confirmation of such roll; one-fifth within three years from the confirmation of such roll; and the remaining one-fifth within four years from the confirmation of such roll. Bills were presented by said Earl for such work, which bills included all work done down to the 30th day of March aforesaid. The work which was done by Mr. Earl, from March 31st on, was performed by him at the request of the then chairman of the then City Property Committee. Subsequently, when the bill was presented, it was approved only by the chairman aforesaid.

GENTLEMEN—There are several tar walks on both sides of North avenue, between Tappan street and the N. Y. C. and H. R. railroad that are worn beyond repair, and other walks requiring to be relaid. The owners have been repeatedly notified to put these walks in proper repair, but without result. The Executive Board would therefore respectfully recommend that an ordinance be passed to build flag walks where good walks do not now exist at the proper grade, and to relay those that are uneven and dangerous. CONSTRUCTING A CAST-IRON CULVERT ACROSS THE GENESSEE VALLEY CANAL.

On motion of Ald. Kohlmetz, the Board proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the ordinance below:

After hearing such allegations from all persons appearing—

Ald. Kohlmetz submitted the following:

An ordinance to construct a cast-iron culvert across the Genessee Valley canal from the berm wall of said canal to the Genessee River.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain and determine as follows:

The construction of a cast-iron pipe culvert, 12 inches

in diameter, under the bed of the abandoned Genessee Valley canal, and the railroad tracks adjacent thereto, from the berm wall of said canal to the Genessee river. To be located on the site of the old culvert, directly opposite the engine house of J. C. Lighthouse.

And the whole expense shall be defrayed by the assessment upon the lots and parcels of land to be benefited thereby; and the City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council, having made an estimate of such expense, and reported the same at \$500 which estimate is hereby approved; and the portion of said city which said Common Council deem will be benefited by said improvement is described as follows:

Referred to Contingent Expense Committee.

By Ald. Jeffords—

To the Hon. the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Police, Excise and Markets, to which was referred the petition of the Retail Grocers' Association, asking for an amendment to the ordinance regulating the sale of vegetables, fruits and garden produce, by fixing the license fee at \$75 for each single wagon and \$100 for each double team, respectfully reports: That after hearing allegations from all parties who appeared before your committee, and after giving the matter careful consideration, your committee is of the opinion that the license for hucksters should be fixed at \$15 for each wagon employed; that the penalty for the violation of the ordinance should be fixed at \$10; and that retail grocers and gardeners offering for sale produce raised by themselves should be exempt from the provision of the ordinance requiring a license. Your committee therefore recommends that chapter L of the penal ordinances in reference to the sale of vegetables, be amended so as to read as follows:

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE SALE OF VEGETABLES AND PROVISIONS.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester, do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. No person shall peddle or sell from house to house within the city of Rochester any kerosene oil, vegetables, fruit, garden produce, or provisions of any kind without having a license therefor, under a penalty of \$10 for each offense.

§ 2. The Mayor of the city of Rochester shall license any proper person to sell as above on payment thereof of a license of \$15 for each wagon employed.

§ 3. All vegetables, garden produce, or provisions sold by measure shall be measured by measures sealed by the City Sealer within three months from the time of obtaining license to sell, under the penalty of \$5 for each offense.

§ 4. The provisions of the preceding sections shall not apply to the taking of orders from customers by regular grocers having an established place of business, nor to persons offering for sale produce which they have themselves raised.

§ 5. Every execution issued under a judgment recovered for a violation of this ordinance, shall command the amount to be made out of the property of the defendant if any such can be found, and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentiary for not more than twenty days.

§ 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

By Ald. Jeffords—Resolved, That licensed draymen be allowed to stand on South Water street, subject to the provisions of section 7 of the penal ordinances relating to cartmen and porters. Adopted.

By Ald. Foley—

To the Common Council of the City of Rochester: The committee of citizens appointed by your resolution of the 26th of August, 1884, "to confer with the lamp committee of the board to devise the best means of lighting our city," respectfully report that frequent conferences of the two committees have been held, and careful attention has been given by them to the subject committed to their charge.

We find that four systems of lighting the city are now in use, to wit: The Brush Electric Light, for which there is a contract for five years at forty-five

cents per light per night, or \$164.25 per year. Three hundred and six of these lights are now in use under this contract at an expense to the city of \$50,-250.50.

The gas light furnished by the Rochester Gas Light company and the Citizens Gas Light company. These companies have, for the past year, lighted 1,848 lamps at \$25 per year per lamp and at a total cost of \$46,200.

The Municipal Gas Light, under a contract for three years at a cost of \$25 per annum. Under this contract a portion of the Eighth ward, lying south of Hunter street, is lighted.

The oil lamp by which various portions of the city, not reached by the gas mains, are partially lighted by 1,500 oil lamps at a cost of \$7.32 per lamp per annum, and at a total cost of \$10,980.

The direct cost of lighting the city under these systems is \$108,530, including incidental expenses known to us.

This does not include the expenses which are borne by the city for materials for repairs and supplies and other incidents to some of these contracts, amounting, we believe, to several thousands of dollars per annum, but which cannot now be accurately traced or ascertained.

We have received from the New York and New Jersey Gaslight company, limited, a proposal to light such lamps as may be designated with their naphtha gas lamps, including apparatus, materials and care, the year round, for \$17.75 per lamp per year.

The Standard Lighting company offers to furnish their naphtha gaslight, including lamps, care, etc., for \$18.24 per lamp per annum.

The Rochester and Citizens' gaslight companies offer to furnish gas for such lamps as are now lighted by them, at \$21.90 per lamp, with five-foot burners, every night and all night.

The Brush Electric Light Company offers to furnish the city with 800 electric lights (including those now in use) of 2,000 candle power, for \$90.00 per annum for four years. If a less number of lights shall be required, down to 50 in number, the said price will be reduced at the rate of thirty cents per light per night, and if a greater number than 800 lamps shall be required, the number used in excess of 800 shall be furnished at the rate of thirty cents per lamp per night. All the materials, repairs and care to be furnished by the company. The present contract to be cancelled at an early date and the new lamps to be charged for under the new contract as fast as put in.

After careful consideration of the subject we are satisfied that 800 electric lamps will be amply sufficient to light all parts of the city now lighted by gas, oil or electricity, and in a much better and more satisfactory manner than they are now lighted.

We are also satisfied, from our experience in this city and from inquiries in other places, that the naphtha lamp will prove neither cheap nor satisfactory, and its adoption here would only add one more to our already too numerous and costly systems.

The retention of the gas lamps even at the price of \$21.90 per lamp, must result in the retention of the present five years' contract with the Electric Light company, and also the continued use of oil in those parts of the city where the gas mains do not extend.

In view of all the facts we therefore recommend that the proposal of the Brush Electric Light company be accepted, and that a committee be appointed to arrange the details of the contract—instruction to require the abrogation of the present contract at an early date and not later than January 1, 1885.

And we give as our reasons for this recommendation:

First—That by adopting this mode of lighting the city can be lighted for at least \$18,539 less than at present.

Second—That the present contract with the Electric Light company, which is a source of constantly increasing expense, by the increase of lamps at a high price for a long time, will be canceled.

Third—That the change will relieve the city of all

the incidental expenses now connected with the systems of lighting now in use.

Fourth—That the city will be much better lighted than it now is.

§ 2. The Mayor of the city of Rochester shall license any proper person to sell as above on payment thereof of a license of \$15 for each wagon employed.

§ 3. All vegetables, garden produce, or provisions sold by measure shall be measured by measures sealed by the City Sealer within three months from the time of obtaining license to sell, under the penalty of \$5 for each offense.

§ 4. The provisions of the preceding sections shall not apply to the taking of orders from customers by regular grocers having an established place of business, nor to persons offering for sale produce which they have themselves raised.

§ 5. Every execution issued under a judgment recovered for a violation of this ordinance, shall command the amount to be made out of the property of the defendant if any such can be found, and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentiary for not more than twenty days.

§ 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately."

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Common Council held on the twenty-second day of January, 1884, a resolution was adopted directing the Mayor to enter into a contract on behalf of the city with the owners of property necessary to be taken for the opening of Pinnacle avenue under the ordinance adopted by said Board, at prices as reported by the Executive Board and adopted by the Common Council.

In order that said resolution should be carried into effect it was necessary that the owners of property thus to be taken should be able to furnish satisfactory abstract of title of the said premises. I have faithfully endeavored to perfect the title of all of the property above mentioned, but, down to the present time, the title of the Montgomery property is in such condition that the city cannot acquire, by purchase, the same. In view of the fact that a large number of property owners upon Pinnacle avenue desire that this improvement should be completed, I respectfully recommend that your honorable body adopt a resolution directing that proceedings be taken for the appointment of a commission under said ordinance. GENTLEMEN:—In pursuance of a resolution of the Board of Health, I have been delegated to urge upon your honorable body the necessity of adopting at once some measure by which the nuisance caused by the outlet sewers at Scrantom and Evergreen streets may be abated.

The abatement of this nuisance can only be accomplished by an uninterrupted sewer from the

present outlets to the bed of the river. The opening of the Scrantom street outlet is within a few feet of the sidewalk, and the gases emanating from this opening are extremely offensive to passers by, and more easily disseminated throughout the neighborhood. The recent outbreak of typhoid fever in the immediate vicinity of these sewers has necessarily aroused the residents in that district. I would therefore request that this matter receive the immediate attention of your honorable body. Respectfully,

is desired with reference to the cost of constructing the stone dam at the Hoppough mills. When the first examination was made of the remains of the old dam it was thought that a considerable portion at both ends could be saved and the former estimate was based upon that supposition, but when the debris was removed and the old material was uncovered, it was found to be so badly decayed that no portion, excepting a little timber, could possibly be used, and as this state of facts obtained, it became necessary to remove every portion of the old dam and extend the new work so as to cover the whole length of the old, and having to construct the new one of stone it became necessary, in order to get a secure foundation, to excavate at the lower end about two and a half feet lower than the base of the old in order to reach the rock upon which to build.

These several facts will account for the increased cost over the amount at first estimated. The structure is a substantial one, and is believed to have added to the value of the property more than its cost.

The surveyor has provided lamps sufficient to light brilliantly all portions of the city alike and anticipating the future needs of the city has included in his estimate lamps for vacant streets and sections where no light is needed and none is now provided in any way. Your committee in its estimate has sought to provide sufficient lamps to light the portions of the city now lighted as well as they are now lighted. We do not by our plan purpose to illuminate the town nor to provide light for those sections not yet inhabited and not likely to be occupied in the near future. Our only purpose is to effect as large a reduction as possible in the cost of lighting the city now and for the next four years. We are all satisfied that our purpose will be accomplished by the use of the number of lamps mentioned in our former report.

ROCHESTER, December, 26, 1884.

To the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—Your Law Committee respectfully presents the following report and recommendation in relation to the action now pending entitled Daniel Runkle against the city of Rochester.

This action grew out of the furnishing of 16,637 gross tons of water pipe to the City of Rochester during the years 1874, 1874 and 1875. The pipe was furnished by D. G. Clarke of New York as assessor of that part of the contract of James McDonald for the construction of the water works. On the making up of the final account by the Board of Water Commissioners, a voucher for a balance of \$1,515.47 was tendered to Clarke as a final settlement, and received by him on the ground that he was entitled to a large interest balance on current account, and also on the ground that he had been improperly debited by the water Commissioners with broken or cracked pipe to the amount of \$1,475.12.

On the refusal of Clark to accept the settlement, as prepared by the Water Commissioners, they deposited the said sum of \$1,515.47, with the City Treasurer, as a special Water Works deposit.

At a later date, Clark assigned his claim to Daniel Runkle, who, on the 19th of October, 1882, commenced an action in the Supreme Court for the recovery of the sum of \$16,739.24, together with interest thereon from July 20th, 1875, making a total at this date of about \$27,000.

The case was referred by the Court to Hon. T. E. Ellsworth, of Lockport, and the case was heard for trial on the 21st of November. After examination of the proofs proposed to be submitted on either side, and a consultation, a proposition was made to settle the case on the following terms.

Each party to pay its own costs, and half of the referee's fees, amounting to \$30, and the city to pay Runkle three thousand dollars, in full. When it is considered that the city has had the use of the \$1,515.47, deposited by the Water Commissioners with the City Treasurer, for a term of nine and one-third years, which would amount, principle and interest, at this date, to about \$2,500, believing that the expense and uncertainty attending a long and sharply contested litigation would not warrant a further contest on the part of the city, when the real difference had been thus reduced to five hundred dollars, your committee has deemed it best for the city to make this statement to the Common Council, with the earnest recommendation that the suit be settled on the terms named, and that the amount in question (\$3,000) be paid by the City Treasurer from the special deposit now in his hands for that purpose, and the balance from the Water Works fund when the City Attorney shall certify that the proper receipts and releases have been executed and delivered. GENTLEMEN: The undersigned committee, to which was referred the matter relating to the sewer outlets to Scrantom and Evergreen streets, on St. Paul street, respectfully report: That, accompanied by the City Surveyor, the localities mentioned have been carefully examined, also the Clifford street outlet at Avenue B, which is governed by similar existing circumstances.

What is known as the "Scrantom street" outlet does not in fact drain any portion of the territory drained through Scrantom street, but territory situated south-easterly therefrom and drained entirely through the St. Paul street sewer.

The "Evergreen street" outlet drains Scrantom street and territory extending more south-ly.

The Clifford street outlet at Avenue B drains an area extending in the vicinity of Clifford street to Hudson street. It is recommended that the sewer on North St. Paul street be extended to the sewer in Avenue B; that the sewer in Avenue B be extended down the high bank by means of an iron pipe and otherwise, to the Genesee river; that the present outlets opposite Scrantom and Evergreen streets be abandoned for use as outlets for ordinary sewage, but used only as storm water overflows, and that each of these overflows be closed at the end by an automatic valve in such manner as to exclude them from the sewers.

To the honorable the common council of the city of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN:—Your finance committee believes that the attention of your honorable body should, at this time, be called to the condition of the various funds provided for in the last tax levy. It will be seen upon referring to the treasurer's last monthly statement of the balances of the principal funds in his hands, that expenditures have already been made which will probably necessitate the making of some provision for an increase of the amount appropriated. It was the opinion of your committee that the amounts estimated and fixed by your committee in the last tax levy would, with economical and prudent management on the part of those having charge of the several funds, prove sufficient for all necessary expenses of the city during the fiscal year. It was, of course, conceded that contingencies might arise during the year which would necessitate the creation of a small municipal indebtedness for the benefit of some fund or funds, but in all such instances it was thought that this would be done only after a very careful investigation of the necessity for so doing, and not except in the least possible degree. An examination of our last tax levy, in connection with even a slight acquaintance with our municipal affairs for the past few years, will convince any one that the deficiencies arising year by year, and the creation of deficiency notes which must be paid the next year, constitute a serious and growing evil. It should be incumbent on all who have charge of the various funds, to give constant attention and care to the incurring of debt, as well as to the expenditure of the money to be disbursed with their approval, in municipal matters, and with a view at all times of keeping expenditures rigidly within the amount appropriated.

It is unfortunately evident that this requisite solicitude has not been exercised, and with four months of the fiscal year yet left, certain funds are already exhausted, and others nearly so. Upon the finance committee is imposed the duty of making an estimate of the amount needed for the various funds for the year. They prepare for submission to the common council the tax levy. If any fund is to be increased during the year, that committee, being responsible largely for the

estimate reported, should make a careful examination as to the necessity of such proposed increase. Your committee believes that expenditures should be prudently curtailed for the next four months, in order that the next year's tax levy shall not be increased by an appropriation for the payment of deficiency notes authorized by this council. It is better to forego in municipal administration everything except actual necessities, if such course is necessary, in order to keep within the amounts collected for the various funds. Your committee therefore submits the accompanying resolution and recommends its adoption.

LOCAL IMPROVEMENT ASSESSMENT, NO. 959.

By Ald. Strouss—Whereas, An ordinance for the improvement of Oak street was duly adopted by the Common Council of the city of Rochester on the 2nd day of May, 1865, under which ordinance said street improvement was duly made, and,

Whereas, The assessment for said improvement of Oak street upon certain lots and parcels of land fronting on said street was confirmed by the Common Council on the 3rd day of May, 1865, and,

Whereas, Said assessment has been duly declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal and void, and a portion of said assessment remains unpaid, and,

Whereas, The said improvement has been made and completed, from Allen street to Lyell avenue, formerly Lyell street, in accordance with the said ordinance, and it is just and equitable that the expense thereof should be paid by the owners of the real estate benefited thereby, and that the same should not be a charge upon all the taxable property of said city, and,

Whereas, All the lots and parcels of land fronting on said Oak st., as described in said ordinance, have received the entire benefit of the said improvement, and,

Whereas, The whole expense of said improvement has been ascertained, and is hereby declared to be the sum of fifty nine thousand six hundred seventy-six dollars and fourteen cents:

Therefore, resolved, That one tier of lots on each side of Oak st. from Allen st. to Lyell avenue, formerly Lyell st., has received the entire benefit from the said improvement, and should be re-assessed for the whole expense thereof.

Resolved, That the sum of fifty nine thousand six hundred seventy-six dollars and fourteen cents, being the whole amount of the expense of the said improvement shall be assessed upon such lots and parcels of land, and,

Resolved, That Wm. Maher, V. Fleckenstein and John Gorton, the Assessors of said City, being not interested in any of the property so benefited, and not of kin to any person so interested, are hereby designated and directed to make a re-assessment upon all

the lots and parcels of land and houses within the portion or part of the City so designated, of the amount of the total expenses of said improvement, in proportion, as nearly as may be, to the advantage which each shall be deemed to acquire by the making of said improvement; and said Assessors are hereby notified to meet for this purpose on Saturday, the 20th day of Dec., 1884, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, at the office of said City Assessors, in the City Hall building in the city of Rochester.

Resolved, That the tax payers to be assessed for such improvement may pay their assessments in five equal payments, as follows: One-fifth of the amount assessed within thirty days after the advertisement of the assessment roll; one-fifth of the amount within one year of the confirmation of such roll; one-fifth within two years of the confirmation of such roll; one-fifth within three years from the confirmation of such roll; and the remaining one-fifth within four years from the confirmation of such roll. On all sums paid prior to the maturity of the said last installment, a discount will be allowed of six per cent, per annum.

Resolved, That such moneys as have been paid on the assessment declared to be void, and not refunded by the city of Rochester, shall, with legal interest thereon from the date of payment be credited by the Assessors on the assessment hereby ordered to the property on which said assessment was made, and if the amount so paid, with legal interest thereon from the date of payment, shall exceed the amount re-assessed on the same property, such surplus shall be paid by the treasurer of said city to the person who paid the same, and if the amount paid, with legal interest thereon from the date of payment, shall be insufficient to pay the amount re-assessed, the deficiency shall be collected in the same manner as other assessments are collected.

On motion of Ald. Strouss action was postponed until the next regular meeting.

By Ald. Strouss—Whereas, The total cost and expense of the improvement of Oak street, including all interest that the city has paid, has been ascertained to be the sum of fifty-nine thousand six hundred and seventy-six dollars and fourteen cents.

Therefore, Resolved, That all persons interested in the question as to the ordering by the common council of the assessment of said sum upon the lots and parcels of land deemed benefited, to wit: one tier of lots on each side of Oak street from Allen Street to Lyell avenue, formerly Lyell street, be heard at the next regular meeting of the Common Council to be held in the Com on council chamber on the sixteenth day of December, 1884, at 7.30 o'clock p. m.

And it is further Resolved, That the City Clerk be, and he hereby is, directed to publish a notice in all of the newspapers which are required to publish corporation notices, for at least, four days, stating that allegations with reference to the ordering of an assessment in in said matter will be heard at said time and place. GENTLEMEN—In accordance with the direction of your honorable body the Executive Board has attempted to negotiate for the lands necessary to be taken for opening and extending Campbell street from Hague street to Pomeroy street. It appears from all the information which we have been able to obtain that there is a question as to ownership of a portion of the lands necessary to be taken.

A map on file in the County Clerk's office shows the lands now owned by John A. Cline subdivided as indicated upon the accompanying plat, with certain streets already laid out, of which the proposed extension of Campbell street forms a portion of one. So far as can be determined Mr. Cline has not paid any taxes upon said portion included in these streets, yet he makes claim to damages in the sum of \$400. Ald. Kelly presented a remonstrance against the opening and extension of Campbell street, and moved that the whole matter be referred to the Committee on Opening and Alteration of Streets. Adopted.

GENTLEMEN: Your Assessment Committee, to which was referred the petition of a large number of property owners on Lincoln street, hereby respectfully reports: That when the Channing street outlet sewer was constructed the property on Lincoln street was assessed for the improvement.

The lots fronting on Lincoln street, north of Stevens street, owing to the slope of the land, cannot be drained into the Channing street outlet sewer, and for that reason such lots should not have been placed in the territory deemed benefited by the Channing street outlet sewer.

All of the lots north of Stevens street on Lincoln street are now drained by a sewer recently constructed through Lincoln street into the Clifford street outlet sewer, and all of such lots have been assessed for the construction of said Clifford street sewer.

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Your Committee on Street Lighting respectfully report that since our last meeting we have received new propositions for lighting the streets from the Rochester Gas Light Company and the Citizens' Gas Light Company, which are hereto annexed.

We have ascertained that the Brush electric light company will not be able to complete its plant during the present winter, owing to the season, to carry out the contract heretofore recommended by us. We therefore recommend that the propositions of the Rochester gaslight company and the Citizens' gas company, to light the public lamps now lighted by them at \$18.12

per lamp for one year be accepted. By so doing a saving of \$11,910 will be effected in 1,731 lamps. We further report that two bids for lighting the oil districts of the city—one from George Kingston to light the oil districts west of the river for \$7.32 per lamp for one year, and one from J. W. Maser to light the oil district east of the river for the same price—have been made to the lamp committee of the common council and it seems to be necessary under the circumstances to continue this system. We therefore recommend that contracts be made with these persons.

GENTLEMEN—Your finance committee hereby submits its report with reference to the application made by the city property committee, the board of health and the city treasurer as to the borrowing of money to provide for necessary disbursements soon to be made. The city property committee has presented to your finance committee a statement showing the amount of outstanding bills to be \$314.36, and the amount at present to the credit of the city property fund \$57.65. Said committee estimate that they will need the following amounts for the balance of the fiscal year, namely: \$500 for insuring school houses, \$728 for gas furnished in city buildings, \$325 for monthly cleaning and \$600 for repairing and painting the roof of the front street building, and for anticipated plumbing, etc., in the city buildings. Your committee, after a careful examination, is of the opinion that the sum of \$2,000 will be sufficient to provide for the expenses which will be actually necessary until April 1st. Your committee is of the opinion that with prudent and judicious management of this fund by the committee the amount above specified will be sufficient to pay all expenses until the end of the fiscal year. The board of health presented to your committee a statement showing their expenditures from April 1st to December 1st last. The amount expended by said board, as shown by such statement, is \$12,502.95. Said board of health state that they will require, to cover actual expenditures already known, the sum of \$6,000. Your committee is aware that extra care and precaution are needed, in collecting garbage, and in keeping the city in a cleanly and healthful condition, by reason of the anticipated visitation of cholera. While your committee desires to express its opinion that, in this department, as in all others, prudence and judicious management should prevail, it nevertheless realizes the importance of

being prepared for epidemics, and would therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted providing for the raising of the sum of \$6,000 for the board of health fund. If for any reason it shall become necessary to make additional provision of moneys in order that the city may be kept in a proper sanitary condition, such provision can be made when the emergency arises.

The city treasurer states to your committee that it is necessary to borrow on the city's notes the sum of \$225,000. Such necessity arises from the fact that there has been advanced to pay for local improvements the sum of \$480,110.96, against which the treasurer has issued acceptances for \$151,457.87, leaving a balance advanced on local improvements of \$328,653.09. Such advancement has saved the city interest, but as the interest on the bonded debt of the city falls due on the first of January, and as other payments are to be made from the general fund, it is now necessary that said sum of \$225,000 be borrowed upon the city's notes to repay advances, as aforesaid. Of course, the city treasurer will have in his office for collection, with those now received, the assessment rolls for local improvements on which advances have been made for the sum of \$480,110.96, as above stated, so that the borrowing of the money now made necessary does not create a deficiency but a simple borrowing against claims not yet collected held by the city.

Your Committee hereby call attention in full explanation of the above to the communication from the City Treasurer, published at page 201, Council Proceedings, 1882-83. Your committee therefore recommend the adoption of the accompanying resolution:

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN:—At the last meeting of your honorable body, I presented a communication in which I recommended that provision should be made for the payment for the judgments which had been recovered against the City of Rochester in favor of the various owners of property who had paid their assessments in favor of Oak street improvement.

The resolution was adopted at the meeting in accordance with that recommendation. Following the adoption of such resolution two people who have purchased lots on Oak st. appeared before the Mayor and asked that as to the judgments recovered by former owners of their property some action be taken by the city, if possible, which would result

in protecting them against loss by reason of the proposed reassessment.

The lot on which the assessment recovered by Aurelia R. Allis was made is now owned by Isaac T. Post.

The lot on which the assessment recovered by William Sedgwick was made is now owned by J. D. Osborn.

In case a reassessment is ordered, it must, of course, be made upon the lots deemed to be benefited. In such event as between the present owner, who has purchased since the assessments were paid, and the former owner, who paid the assessments, the amount paid on the void roll should be credited on the assessment on each lot so owned.

The city, under the decisions of the Court of Appeals in the following cases, among others, namely, Peyser vs. the Mayor, etc., 70 N. Y., 497, and Purcell against the Mayor, etc., 85 N. Y., 330, has no defense to an action properly brought to recover the amounts paid on such void roll, with interest. At the same time such a course should be taken by the city as will protect the property owners, as far as consistent and proper. For these reasons I advised the Mayor to veto the resolution for the purpose of having such arrangements made as will protect the interests of all parties concerned.

The veto of the Mayor, should, in my opinion, be sustained, and a resolution should be adopted directing me to take such action as I deem advisable looking to the protection of the interest of the city and of the property owners, as above suggested. Respectfully submitted,

By Aid. Simmellink—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a plank walk on the west side of Union place.

And whereas, The City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reported the same at \$15, which estimate is hereby approved.

IMPROVING THE SEWER OUTLETS AT SCRANTOM STREET EVERGREEN STREET AND AVENUE B, AND CONSTRUCTING A PIPE SEWER IN NORTH ST. PAUL STREET.

By Aid. Kolmetz—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of extending the Clifford street outlet sewer, from its present terminus at the west end of Avenue B, down the high bank to the Genesee river, and of constructing a pipe sewer in North St. Paul street, from the south line of Scrantom street, to the sewer in Avenue B, and of the necessary surface sewers, manholes and sewer connections relating to said sewer, and of adjusting valves to the North St. Paul street outlet opposite Scrantom street, and of the arrangement of said outlets as overflows. The Surveyor submitted, as such estimate, \$9,999—as the whole expense thereof, which estimate is to be divided as follows:

\$2,999 for extending the Clifford street outlet sewer, from its present terminus to the Genesee river, and \$7,000 for the construction of the pipe sewer in North St. Paul street and the necessary surface sewers, manholes and sewer connections relating to said sewer, and the improvement of the sewer outlets opposite Scrantom street and Evergreen street.

Adopted.

By Aid. Kolmetz—Resolved, That the following improvement is expedient, viz:

The extension of the Clifford street outlet sewer from its present terminus at the west end of Avenue B, down the high bank along the present route of the open stream, by a wrought iron pipe, to the Genesee river. Also the construction of a vitrified pipe sewer eighteen inches in diameter, in North St. Paul street, from the south line of Scrantom street, to the sewer in Avenue B. Also the necessary surface sewers, manholes and sewer connections relating to said sewer. Also the adjustment of valves to the North St. Paul street outlet opposite Scrantom street, and the Evergreen street outlet opposite Evergreen street, and the arrangement of said outlets as overflows.

And whereas the City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof and reported the same at \$9,999, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved further, That the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and proper to be assessed for the whole expense thereof viz:

For its proportion of the cost of extending the Clifford street outlet sewer from its present terminus at the west end of Avenue B, down the high bank, to the Genesee river.

All the territory included within and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

And for its proportion of the cost of extending the Clifford st. outlet sewer from its present terminus at the west end of Avenue B down the high bank to the Genesee river, and the entire cost of constructing the pipe sewer in North St. Paul st., together with the surface sewers, manholes and sewer connections relative to said sewer, and the improvement of the sewer outlets at Scramton st. and Evergreen st.

All the territory inclosed within and described by the following boundary line, viz:

FINAL ORDINANCE, NO. 2,714.

PIPE SEWER IN OTIS STREET.

On motion of Ald. Kohlmetz, the Board proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the ordinance below:

After hearing such allegations from all persons appearing.

Ald. Kohlmetz submitted the following:

An ordinance to construct a pipe sewer in Otis street, from the sewer in Sherman street, to a point opposite the east line of Brooks avenue.

The Common Council of the city of Rochester do ordain and determine as follows:

The construction of a pipe sewer 12 inches in diameter in Otis street, from the sewer in Sherman street to a point opposite the east line of Brooks avenue; also, the necessary surface sewers, lot laterals and manholes.

And the whole expense shall be defrayed by the assessment upon the lots and parcels of land to be benefited thereby; and the City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council, having made an estimate of such expense and reported the same at \$615, which estimate is hereby approved; and the portion of said city which said Common Council deem will be benefited by said improvement is described as follows:

One tier of lots on each side of Otis street, from Sherman street to a point opposite the east line of Brooks avenue.

On which above described portion of the city the expense of said improvement are hereby ordered assessed.

Ayes—Ald. Tracy, Barron, Watson, Kohlmetz, Strauss, Foley, Siener, Stein, Aikenhead, Kelly, Simmelink—11.

The president declared the ordinance lost, three-fourths not voting in the affirmative.

Ald. Barron moved to reconsider the vote on the ordinance. Adopted.

The final ordinance for a pipe sewer in Otis street was then adopted by the following vote: Ayes—Ald. Tracy, Barron, Watson, Kohlmetz, Strauss, Foley, Upton, Siener, Aikenhead, Kelly, Simmelink—12.

The final ordinance for opening and extending Edward street came up.

Ald. Stein moved the adoption of the ordinance.

Lost by the following vote:

Ayes—Ald. Barron, Kohlmetz, Upton, Stein, Aikenhead—5.

Nays—Ald. Tracy, Watson, Foley, Siener, Rice, Kelly, Simmelink—7.

On motion of Ald. Kelly action on the ordinance for opening Edward street was reconsidered.

Ald. Kelly moved that the ordinance be amended by inserting in the territory to be assessed "180 feet west of Hudson street" in place of "300 feet west of Hudson street." Adopted.

Further action was postponed under the rule.

Ald. Kohlmetz moved to reconsider action on the ordinance "No. 2,713" for a plank walk on Clifford street. Adopted.

On motion of Ald. Kohlmetz further action was indefinitely postponed.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

The following came up:

"By Ald. Strauss—Whereas, The total cost and expense of the improvement of Oak street, including all interest that the city has paid, has been ascertained to be the sum of fifty-nine thousand six hundred and seventy-six dollars and fourteen cents.

Therefore, Resolved. That all persons interested in the question as to the ordering by the common council of the assessment of said sum upon the lots and parcels of land deemed benefited, to wit: one tier of lots on each side of Oak street from Allen street to Lyell avenue, formerly Lyell street, be heard at the next regular meeting of the Common Council to be held in the Common Council chamber on the sixteenth day of December, 1884, at 7:30 o'clock p. m.

And it is further Resolved, That the City Clerk be, and he hereby is, directed to publish a notice in all of the newspapers which are required to publish corporation notices, for at least four days, stating that allegations with reference to the ordering of an assessment in said matter will be heard at said time and place. Adopted."

After hearing all persons appearing Ald. Barron submitted the following as a substitute for the Local Improvement Assessment No. 959, published at page 236, current proceedings.

OAK STREET REASSESSMENT.

LOCAL IMPROVEMENT ASSESSMENT, NO. 959.

By Ald. Barron—Whereas, An ordinance for the improvement of Oak street was duly adopted by the Common Council of the city of Rochester on the 2d day of May, 1865, under which ordinance said street improvement was duly made; and

Whereas, The assessment for said improvement of Oak street upon certain lots and parcels of land front-

ings on said street was confirmed by the Common Council on the 30th day of May, 1885; and

Whereas, Said assessment has been duly declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal and void, and a portion of said assessment remains unpaid; and

Whereas, The said improvement has been made and completed from Allen street to Lyell avenue, formerly Lyell street, in accordance with the said ordinance, and it is just and equitable that the expense thereof should be paid by the owners of the real estate benefited thereby, and that the same should not be a charge upon all the taxable property of said city; and

Whereas, All the lots and parcels of land fronting on said Oak street, as described in said ordinance, have received the entire benefit of the said improvement; and

Whereas, The whole expense of said improvement has been ascertained, and is hereby declared to be the sum of thirty thousand and two hundred and eighty-nine dollars and fifty-seven cents;

Therefore, Resolved, That one tier of lots on each side of Oak st. from Allen st. to Lyell avenue, formerly Lyell st., has received the entire benefit from the said improvement, and should be reassessed for the whole expense thereof.

Resolved, That the sum of \$30,289.57, being the whole amount of the expense of said improvement shall be assessed upon such lots and parcels of land, and

Resolved, That Wm. Maher, V. Fleckerstein and John Gorton, the Assessors of said City, being not interested in any of the property so benefited, and not of kin to any person so interested, are hereby designated and directed to make a re-assessment upon all the lots and parcels of land and houses within the portion or parts of the City so designated, of the amount of the total expenses of said improvement, in proportion, as nearly as may be, to the advantage which each shall be deemed to acquire by the making of said improvement; and said Assessors are hereby notified to meet for this purpose on Saturday, the 20th day of Dec., 1884, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, at the office of said City Assessors, in the City Hall building in the city of Rochester.

Resolved, That the taxpayers to be reassessed for such improvement may pay their assessments in three equal payments, as follows:

One-third of the amount assessed within thirty days after the advertisement of the assessment roll; one-third of the amount, within one year from the confirmation of said roll; and the remaining one-third within two years from the confirmation of said roll.—On all sums paid prior to the maturity of the said last installment, a discount will be allowed at the rate of six per cent. per annum.

Resolved, That such moneys as have been paid on the assessment declared to be void, and not refunded by the city of Rochester, shall, with legal interest thereon from the date of payment be credited by the Assessors on the assessment hereby ordered to the property on which said assessment was made, and if the amount so paid, with legal interest thereon from the date of payment, shall exceed the amount re-assessed on the same property, such surplus shall be paid by the Treasurer of said city to the person who paid the same, and if the amount paid, with legal interest thereon from the date of payment, shall be insufficient to pay the amount re-assessed, the deficiency shall be collected in the same manner as other assessments are collected.

Adopted by the following vote:
Ayes—Ald. Tracy, Barron, Watson, Kohlmetz, Foley, Upton, Pitkin, Siener, Rice, Stein, Aikenhead, Kelly, Simmelnk—14.

The following came up:
"By Ald. Kohlmetz—Resolved, That the bill board erected at the lamp post in front of the Casino theater on North St. Paul street be excepted from the provisions of section 7 of the penal ordinance relating to streets. On motion of Ald. Kohlmetz action was postponed for two weeks."

Ald. Kohlmetz moved that action on the resolution be indefinitely postponed. Adopted.

Ald. Upton called up the following:
To the Common Council of the City of Rochester, N. Y.:

We, the undersigned residents of the said city of Rochester, do most respectfully petition and pray that we may be relieved from the effect of the ordinance of your body in reference to the erection and maintenance of signs upon the street front of stores and buildings in the said city of Rochester, and that we and our several tenants may be allowed and permitted to erect and maintain signs upon the street fronts of the stores and buildings fronting upon North St. Paul and East Main streets, in said city, owned by Messrs. Sibley & Lindsay, and in front of the store occupied by Messrs.

Sibley, Lindsay & Curr, on Main street, in said city, the said stores and buildings being at the corner of North St. Paul and East Main streets. Such signs not to project into the street and upon and over the sidewalk in front of said buildings and stores more than three feet, and to be suitably and securely anchored and fastened, either to the walk upon which the same shall stand or to the building from which the same may be suspended, as the case may be.

And that we may be heard upon this application before the board or committee, if any, to whom this petition shall be referred. And your petitioners will ever pray, etc.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

ferred them to the Finance Committee for payment.

By Ald. Barron—

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester :

GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee, to which was referred the communication of the Protectives asking that a contract in writing be made between the city and said organization embodying the agreement entered into at the time of the purchase of the lot on which the Protectives' building now stands, hereby reports :

An examination of the proceeding of the Common Council since 1880 show that the lot above referred to was conveyed to the city in 1881 by the Protectives, and that the city paid on such conveyance a mortgage on said property amounting to \$3,000. In pursuance of an act of the Legislature the Common Council authorized the raising of \$10,000, by general tax, which sum was used by the city in the erection of the building now standing on said lot. The failure of the contractor and the advance in the cost of building material and in the price of labor involved an expenditure of \$7,450 more than the contract price for the building, so that the entire expenditure made by the city upon the lot and building is \$15,450.75.

The action taken by the city was in pursuance of a proposition made by the Protectives to the Common Council, which proposition, in effect, accepted by the city. That proposition provided that the Protectives would convey the lot to the city upon the payment of the mortgage aforesaid, and upon an agreement by the city to construct at a cost not exceeding \$10,000 a building, and that the Protectives should have eight years within which to redeem from the city the property upon the payment of the amount provided for in the written agreement was ever entered into between the city and the Protectives embodying in substance the agreement as above set forth.

It is certainly due to the Protectives that the agreement which was made, and under which the building has been erected, should be reduced to writing and recorded.

Your committee, therefore, recommends that the City Attorney be instructed to prepare an agreement with the Protectives, to be executed by the Mayor on behalf of the city, in accordance with the accompanying resolution.

Gentlemen of the Common Council:
I herewith return disapproved the resolution of Alderman Stein, presented and adopted at your

last regular meeting, authorizing the treasurer to receive without cost or interest the city taxes due on lots 17, 18 and 19 farm track, Moulson's sub-division.

The resolution covers the taxes due on those lots for the years 1874, '75, '76, '77 and '78, and they aggregate \$373.90. The disbursements already made in the suits commenced to compel the payment of the amount due the city are \$35. The amount due to the city for interest on the aforesaid taxes at 12 per cent. (which interest the city can collect), is about \$32.30, making in the aggregate nearly \$370 belonging to the treasury which you entirely wipe out, or give away, by the passage of a resolution, the terms of which are unjust to every tax-payer, and which resolution is entirely devoid of merit, being unaccompanied by a report or explanation of any character whatever. Such legislation is open to the severest criticism and meets with my unqualified disapproval.

Perhaps the city ought not to exact from any one the sum of 12 per cent. per annum on taxes remaining unpaid, but in cases where there can be no dispute the legal rate of interest should in each instance be collected.

Therefore, the owner or owners of the aforesaid lots should pay into the treasury of the city the sum of \$575, or thereabouts, instead of \$373, which your board has generously authorized the treasurer to receive. As before stated the resolution is hereby returned disapproved.

Clifford st. outlet sewer from its present terminus at the west end of Avenue B down the high bank to the Genesee river, and the entire cost of constructing the pipe sewer in North St. Paul st., together with the surface sewers, manholes and sewer connections relating to said sewer, and the improvement of the sewer outlets at Scrantom st. and Evergreen st.

All the territory inclosed within and described by the following boundary line, viz:

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

GENTLEMEN: Your Assessment Committee, to which was referred the various matters hereinafter referred to, respectfully reports that it has given a full and careful consideration as to the complaints of the various parties named, and finds as follows:

The claim of the estate of William Otis that too great an assessment was imposed upon the lands of said estate for the Lyell street lift bridge and approaches, your committee finds is unsustained by the proof taken, and, therefore, your committee reports adversely as to said claim.

A claim presented by Mr. Keogh relates to an alleged excessive assessment upon lot number 10 and part of lot number 9, of the Addison tract, north side of Gardner park, for the Gardner park improvement, ordinance 2264.

Your committee finds, as shown by the accompanying certificate of the Assessors, that the amount of the assessment which should have been imposed upon said lot is \$115.34, and your committee, therefore, recommend the adoption of the resolution accompanying

said certificate of the Assessors, which is herewith submitted.

Sidney W. Dibble claims that he formerly owned lots 12, 24 and 36 on Mansion street, in the city of Rochester, and that it appears by the assessment rolls in the Treasurer's office in 1876 an assessment roll was confirmed to extend Mansion street past said lots, and that \$233.20 assessment on said lots remain unpaid. Mr. Dibble claims that he conveyed to the city a strip of land 30 feet wide by 264 feet long from said lots, being one-half of the width of said street extended, as aforesaid, and that said assessment was imposed upon said lots by reason of the purchase of the remaining land needed for said street. It is further claimed that said street was not in fact opened until the year 1884.

Your committee has ascertained that the statements made by Mr. Dibble, as above summarized, are true, and is of the opinion that interest should not be charged on the amount of the assessment imposed upon said lots in view of the fact that said lots have not had any benefit from said street until the present year. Your committee, therefore, recommends that the treasurer be authorized to receive \$233.20 in full of the assessments for Mansion street extension upon said lots.

The petition of John A. McGorry, referred to your committee, shows that the general city taxes for 1836, 1869, 1870 and 1882, and various assessments upon lot number 422 of the Jones tract, situate upon Frank street corner of White street in the Ninth ward are unpaid. The tax for 1866 was for the deficiency loan, and that and the other taxes unpaid, except the tax of 1882, were assessed before McGorry became the owner of the property. Your committee has made an examination as to the various claims alleged by said McGorry with reference to said taxes and assessments, and is of the opinion that the treasurer should be authorized to receive the tax of 1866 without interest and the taxes of 1869 and 1870 with interest at six per cent.; that as to the tax of 1882 and the assessments imposed upon said property the full amount should be collected.

With reference to the claim of E. W. Tripp your committee reports: It appears that the assessments imposed upon the lots owned by the claimant for the Genesee Valley canal outlet sewer are in proportion to the assessments imposed upon other lots of land similarly located, and that the remission of the whole or any part of the assessment should not be made.

Your committee is of the opinion as the result of the investigation it has made, that the treasurer should be authorized to receive the amount of the general city taxes for 1870 on the east half of lot 27, McCrackenville tract, Perkins street, and assessed to Mary A. Rankin, as the same appears on the sales register, with interest at six per cent. per annum upon the same being paid, and the treasurer be authorized to charge the balance of such assessment to erroneous assessments.

By Ald. Bronson—

To the Common Council of the City of Rochester, N. Y.:

Your committee to whom was referred the petition of John F. Montgomery, asking that a certain judgment recovered against him December 22nd, 1875, by the city of Rochester, N. Y., for \$612 be satisfied of record on the payment of \$200, respectfully report that they have carefully examined the circumstances under which said judgment was recovered against Mr. Montgomery, which are substantially as follows:

In the year 1873, one Anthony McNeise brought an action against the City of Rochester for injuries sustained by him by being thrown from his wagon while passing along Front street, in consequence of a pile of dirt and sand being placed in the street by Montgomery.

McNeise recovered a judgment against the City for \$400 and costs and the City paid the same, and afterwards the City brought a suit against Montgomery and recovered a judgment for \$612 and costs, from which judgment Mr. Montgomery appealed to the Court of Appeals and was beaten, the judgment being affirmed.

Mr. Montgomery paid J. B. Perkins, the City Attorney, at this time all the costs, and the only interest the city has in the judgment is the sum of \$612, the amount of the recovery exclusive of costs.

We are also informed and verily believe that Mr. Montgomery has sustained financial reverses and is insolvent, but is endeavoring to effect an adjustment and discharge of his debts.

We therefore recommend the judgment recovered by the city of Rochester, December 22d, 1875, against John F. Montgomery for the sum of \$612, be assigned or discharged of record, as Mr. Montgomery may elect, on his paying to the City Treasurer the sum of \$400.

Whereas, The assessment for said improvement of Oak street upon certain lots and parcels of land fronting on said street was continued by the Common Council on the 30th day of May, 1885; and,

Whereas, Said assessment has been duly declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal and void, and a portion of said assessment remains unpaid; and,

Whereas, The said improvement has been made and completed from Allen street to Lyell avenue, formerly

Lyell street, in accordance with the said ordinance, and it is just and equitable that the expense thereof should be paid by the owners of the real estate benefited thereby, and that the same should not be a charge upon all the taxable property of said city; and,

Whereas, The lots and parcels of land fronting on said Oak street, as described in said ordinance, have received the entire benefit of the said improvement; and,

Whereas, The whole expense of said improvement has been ascertained, and is hereby declared to be the sum of twenty-eight thousand one hundred and eighty-seven dollars and thirty-five cents.

Therefore, Resolved, That one-tenth of lots on each side of Oak street, from Allen street to Lyell avenue, formerly Lyell street, has received the entire benefit from the said improvement, and should be reassessed for the whole expense thereof.

Resolved, That the sum of \$23,187.35, being the whole amount of the expense of said improvement, shall be assessed upon such lots and parcels of land; and,

GENTLEMEN—Some time since His Honor the Mayor received an anonymous communication stating that the firm of Hiram Sibley & Co., seedsmen, were asking their employees to sign a document to the effect that they (the firm) would not be responsible for accidents that might occur in their building.

The Mayor deemed the communication to be of such importance that he requested me to make an investigation, and at his request thereby present the following report:

That having made a thorough investigation of the premises, I found that the building was heated by steam and lighted by gas; that there was no kerosene oil used in the building; that there was hose and hose attachments on every floor connected with the hydrants in the cellar; also three fire escapes connected with the building; also a fire escape by way of a platform running from the nine story building to the roof of the premises known as the Sibley block; also, two back stairs and front stairs, which, in my judgment, afford ample means of escape for the occupants. I also found the joists in good condition, the girder beams well supported, and the building in all respects as safe as all the improvements can make it.

I found that the firm of Hiram Sibley & Co. were willing to do everything in the power for the protection of the building and its occupants.

GENESEE VALLEY CANAL CULVERT.

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
ROCHESTER, Jan. 20, 1885. }

Gentlemen of the common council:

By resolution emanating from your assessment committee and which was adopted at your last regular meeting, the treasurer was authorized to receive from Sidney W. Dibble the sum of \$233.20, in full of assessment on certain lots owned by him and which were taxed for the Mansion street extension. The ordinance for the extension of said street was passed by the board of public works in November, 1874, and was simply for the taking of the necessary land. Several of the property owners petitioned for the improvement, and among them Mr. Dibble, through his representative. The claim is made that the city not having opened the street after paying for the land taken, now entitles him to rebate of interest. The fact that the city may not have removed a fence or two, or graded that portion of the street at the expense of the highway fund, does not constitute neglect on its part. There is no evidence that the people interested asked for the same or even desired it, and it is possible that for the time being they were desirous that neither should be done. Too many years have now elapsed to get at the exact facts. Mr. Dibble supposed his tax was paid and now to rebate the interest on the same will obligate the city to make other concessions not only in this case but many similar ones. The interest which the city has already collected from other parties taxed for said improvement with the amount of interest still due on taxes unpaid aggregates about \$800, and all of this must be refunded or canceled [at least there is no reason why it should not be] if this resolution becomes operative.

For these reasons I return the said resolution disapproved. CORNELIUS R. PARSONS, mayor.

No person or company of persons shall exhibit or perform for gain or profit any theatrical or circus representations or exhibitions, or any paintings, animal or animals, or other natural or artificial curiosity, or any puppet show, wire or rope dance, or any other idle show, acts or feats which common showmen, mountebanks or jugglers usually practice or perform, or any concert, musical entertainments, exhibition or dances, or series of lectures for private emolument or gain, or conduct any roller skating rink, without having obtained a license for the same from the Common Council of said city, and no owner or occupant of any house outhouse, yard or other place shall furnish or allow the same to be used for the accommodation of such exhibition or performance, unless such license shall be obtained as aforesaid, under a penalty of fifty dollars for each offense.

Ald. Rice moved that action be postponed two weeks. Lost.

Every veterinary physician or surgeon, and every person practicing as such, or any persons owning or having in their care, within the city of Rochester, shall present to the Board of Health of said city a written notice of the existence of any and every case of the disease known as glanders or farcy, or other contagious or infectious disease in animals dangerous to the life or health of human beings, or animals, which may have come under his personal observation, or to his own knowledge, within two days after he is so made aware of it; which notice shall contain the name and residence of the possessor of the animal so diseased, so far as the same can be ascertained, a description of the animal, and where last seen by the person giving such notice, and be signed by the person giving it.

§ 2. Every person violating this ordinance shall forfeit and pay the penalty of twenty-five dollars for each and every such violation; and, in default of payment,

shall be imprisoned in the Monroe County Penitentiary for the period of thirty days.

It is a well known fact that real estate bears much more than its share of the burden of taxation and that much injustice is done to freeholders by the evasion of a personal property tax on the part of those whose estates consist almost entirely of personal property. Your Committee is of the opinion that the personal property tax could be largely increased if the City Attorney were present at the meeting of the Assessors to conduct the examination of all persons who desire to swear off their personal property tax. Your Committee does not deem it expedient at this time to report to the Council a list of persons who swore off their personal property tax last year. It is also deemed advisable by your committee that proper legal proceedings should be at once commenced by the city attorney to enforce the collection of the personal property taxes now unpaid upon the assessment rolls in the Treasurer's office. The adoption of the following resolution is therefore recommended.

GENTLEMEN—On the 10th day of October, 1884, two judgments were recovered against the city in the Municipal Court, one in favor of Luke C. Hart for \$321.26, and the other in favor of George W. Tuttle, as administrator, &c., of Willis Tuttle, deceased, for \$378.46. The actions were brought to recover the sums paid to the city under the original assessment for the improvement of Oak street, which assessment was afterwards declared by the Court of Appeals to be illegal. Mr. Hart is still the owner of the lot on which he paid the assessment, and all but a small portion of the property owned by Willis Tuttle is now owned by his heirs. Sheriff Hannan informs me that executions upon these judgments have been issued and that the amount due on the Hart judgment, including interest and Sheriff's fees, is \$340.20, and the amount of the Tuttle judgment, including interest and Sheriff's fees, is \$399.85. There is no reason why these judgments should not be paid, inasmuch as the amount of the new assessment will be imposed on the lots owned wholly or partly by said parties and there will probably arise no conflict between present and former owners. They must, of course, be paid sometime, and I recommend that they be paid at once.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN--Your Law Committee hereby reports:

The judgement for nine dollars and 90 cents costs rendered against the city in favor of Julius C. Bowen in the Municipal Court, October 17th, 1884, we find was rendered in an action brought by the city against Mr. Bowen to recover a penalty for maintaining a nuisance on his premises on Monroe avenue. It appears that the suit was begun at the instigation of the Board of Health, and your committee is of the opinion that the judgment recovered should be provided for out of funds under the control of that Board.

The claim of Nathaniel Arnold for the remission of a fine of twenty dollars imposed upon him by the Police Court in October last, has no merit in the opinion of your committee and should be disallowed. It appears that Mr. Arnold was arrested at the instance of the

agent of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals for selling a glandered horse, was convicted and fined \$20. By statute all fines and penalties collected under the provisions of any act affecting animals inure to said society. The city not having received the amount of the said fine, your committee is unable to see how it can be remitted by the city.

Your committee finds the facts upon which the judgment against the city in favor of Ernest M. Close was obtained, are as follows: On the 24th of February, 1883, judgment against Mr. Close was recovered in the Police Court for a penalty of \$50 for the violation of the penal ordinance relating to the sale of jeweler's goods at auction. The judgment was paid, the money being received by the Treasurer, as appears from the report of the police clerk, dated March 3, 1883. Mr. Close obtained a writ of certiorari to the Supreme court, where it was argued at General Term in October last. The General Term reverses the judgment of the Police Court, and directs the return of the money paid on the judgment to Mr. Close, with an allowance of fifty dollars costs, and his disbursements. The reversal of the judgment is based on the ground that the Common Council had no power under the charter to pass the ordinance in question. Your committee is of the opinion that the judgment should be paid.

Your committee has made a careful examination with reference to the subject, of the remonstrance presented by various citizens upon North St. Paul street to the granting by the Executive Board of permission to E. F. Woodbury to construct a platform and steps from three to five feet in width, which he proposes to extend from the line of said street upon the sidewalk. Your committee finds that the permission granted by the Executive Board was granted under the provisions of section 31 of ordinances relating to streets. Your committee is of the opinion that said ordinance, so far as it assumes to confer the power upon the Executive Board of granting to any person the right to encumber or obstruct any street, is unauthorized in law, and that the action taken under such ordinance by the Executive Board does not confer upon Mr. Woodbury the right to construct the platform as proposed by him. Your committee is aware that the Common Council and the Executive Board have heretofore assumed to grant permission to property owners to construct platforms and other obstructions on side-walks of various streets of the city in front of their buildings, but such permissions is clearly void, so far as relates to the right of citizens to an unobstructed use of a street in all its parts.

GENTLEMEN.—The undersigned, the Lamp and Citizens' Committee on lighting of the public streets has agreed upon a form of contract to be executed between the city and the gas companies with reference to the lighting of the streets of the city for the eighteen months beginning January 1, 1885, in pursuance of the resolution of your honorable body.

With reference to this subject of street lighting your committee recommends that a count of all of the public lamps of the city, electric, oil and gas be at once made, to the end that the exact number and location of each may be ascertained.

Some two or three years ago a book was prepared in which it was proposed to enter the number of each kind of lamps upon each street actually in use, and in which book all changes made might be noted.

Your committee is of the opinion that this book should be utilized, in order that the city officials having the charge of the public lighting of the city may be in position to verify the correctness of bills presented month by month. This book can be kept by the City Clerk without increased expense to the city. Of course the making of the count, above suggested, will be necessary, in order that the information may be obtained, upon which proper entries can be made in such book.

One tier of lots on each side of Division street, from North St. Paul street to a point 73 feet west of North Clinton street.

And further Resolved, That that the taxpayers to be assessed for making such improvements may pay their assessments in three equal payments, as follows: One-third of the amount assessed within thirty days after the advertisement of the assessment roll; one-third of the amount, within one year from the confirmation of such roll; and the remaining one-third within two years from confirmation of such roll. § 2. Every person violating this ordinance shall forfeit and pay the penalty of twenty-five dollars for each and every such violation; and, in default of payment, shall be imprisoned in the Monroe County Penitentiary for the period of thirty days."

I recommend the immediate passage of an enabling act authorizing the issue of \$300,000 five year 4 per cent. bonds, the proceeds of which will take up all the floating debt out against assessments on ordinances, and at the end of five years such assessment rolls should be collected as would redeem this issue.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN:

At the request of the City Treasurer I submit herewith such considerations bearing upon the subject of his communication with reference to the funding of the indebtedness of the city created as stated in said communication, and bearing upon the legal questions involved as seems necessary. The constitutional amendment to which the treasurer refers provides in substance that after the first day of January, 1885, no city in this state, having 100,000 or more inhabitants, shall become indebted in an amount exceeding 10 per cent. of the assessed valuation of the property in said city. By the census of 1880 the population of this City was shown to have been 89,363. I have examined the question as to

whether the constitutional amendment above referred to applies to this city at the present time. Of course it has not application if the population of this city is less than 100,000. As there is no way provided by which the population of this city can be determined except by the census about to be taken, I am of the opinion that whether as a matter of fact this city has more or less than 100,000 population the constitutional amendment does not at this time have any application, and will not until the census, soon to be taken, shall show that there are 100,000 or more people residents of this city. As the funded indebtedness of this city amounts to something over \$5,000,000, and as by the last assessment roll the assessed valuation of property was in round numbers \$27,000,000, and will not probably be materially increased the coming year, it will be seen that when the constitutional provision does apply to this city it would be impossible for it to borrow any money whatever beyond its present funded indebtedness. If an enabling act should be passed at this session of the Legislature providing for the funding of the indebtedness to which the Treasurer calls attention in said communication, the bonds issued can undoubtedly be negotiated at par, and thus serious difficulties which will attend any other course will be avoided. If the bonds should bear 4 per cent. interest the city would be a gainer by the transaction, as the indebtedness referred to represents advances made by the city for local improvements, the amount of which improvements will, within five years, be collected from those whose lands are benefited thereby, with 6 per cent. interest. If the authority to issue bonds as suggested by the present Legislature, the city may be prevented from making any provision for the indebtedness referred to, if the population is shown to be one hundred thousand or more by the census of 1885, which will be taken previous to the next session of the Legislature.

I would respectfully suggest that the subject matter of the Treasurer's communications be at once considered by your honorable body, to the end that such action as shall be proper under the circumstances may be adopted.

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN—The petition of George W. Elliott respectfully shows that in the year 1872 James M. Pitkin filed a map of the Pitkin tract in the Monroe County Clerk's office, on which map lot No. 70 of said tract, forty feet (40), in width and fifty-two feet (52) in depth, was designated as a part of a street known as Rowley street; that thereafter lots were sold on said street and said street was used by the public, and became for all purposes a public street; that, in 1874, the Board of Public Works took proceedings for the extension of said Rowley street, by which extension the use of a strip of land on the west side of said lot 70 was abandoned by the city, to wit.: Beginning at the southeast corner of lot 71, on the Brooks tract, thence running east 19 3-10 feet along the north line of Harvard street, thence running north on the west line of Rowley street as now laid out fifty-two (52) feet on a line 19 3-10 feet distant from and east of the easterly line of said lot 71, thence running west on a line 52 feet north of and parallel with the north line of Harvard street, to the east line of lot 71; thence southerly along the east line of said lot 71 fifty-two (52) ft. to the place of beginning; that, in 1875, Mr. Pitkin quit-claimed all his right, title and interest in said strip to Mrs. M. J. French, who was at that time the owner of the adjoining lot No. 71; that in 1879 Mrs. French sold said lot No. 71, and the said strip of 19 3-10 feet on the west side of the said lot 70, to your petitioner; that since 1875 the said strip of land has been assessed with said lot 71 adjoining, and the said Mrs. French and your petitioner have paid, since that time, all taxes and assessments on said strip of land; that by reason of the premises a question has arisen as to whether the city has any interest in said strip because of the filing of said map by said Pitkin designating said lot 70 as a public street.

Wherefore your petitioner prays that your honorable body direct the Mayor to execute a quit-claim deed of any right, title or interest which the city may have in said strip, to your petitioner.

And your petitioner will ever pray, etc.

To the Hon. the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—Your Water Works Committee and the Executive Board present herewith a complete list of all the Water Works petitions which have been referred to us by your board, and which are now on file in the water department, together with an estimate of the cost of making the several extensions asked for. The said list also includes certain changes and extensions recommended by the Executive Board for the more effective working of the Water Works system in relation to the suppression of fires. The work embraced in the said complete list is estimated at \$66,167.

We have carefully examined the said list and the several streets named therein, and have selected those on which there are now a considerable number of dwellings requiring water, and on which active construction of buildings are now in progress. The annexed list number two contains these selections made by us, and in which streets we recommend that water pipes be immediately laid. The estimated cost of the work thus recommended is \$94,474.

There are materials and money on hand applicable to this work amounting to 8,500

Leaving to be raised the sum of \$25,974
This sum may be raised in the tax levy for 1885, in which case the appropriation for water pipe extension will be as follows:
Previously anticipated by notes \$72,364 00
Required to extend as per present recommendation 25,974 00
Total \$98,348 00

There is abundant evidence to indicate that the demand for pipe extension will be active during the coming season, in excess of the amount now recommended, but we believe that the present apparent necessities for extensions will be fairly met by the recommendations now made,

C. Knapp, Emma B. Knapp, Louise L. Knapp, Mary W. Knapp, and Orinda E. Knapp, heirs at law and widow of Royal C. Knapp, deceased. We find the value of the second above described premises to be \$1,150, which we award to Michael McRoden.

by and at the private expense of Dr. J. B. Henion, grantor of said Knapp, namely, \$1,300. Refused.

5. That the said place is in fact and for several years past has been assessed for taxation to said Knapp and prior to him, to his grantor. Refused.

6. That Orinda E. Knapp and Charles S. Baker are the administrators of R. C. Knapp, deceased. So found.

7. That there should be paid to the proper representatives of R. C. Knapp, deceased, the sum of \$6,100 or \$7,100 as damages for appropriating the lands and premises of said Knapp proposed to be taken for such proposed street. Refused.

8. That nothing is deducted from the award in favor of the widow and heirs of Knapp by reason of their rights over said lands conveyed in and by the deeds to lot owners fronting on Henion place. Refused.

9. The Commissioners are requested to state what, if any, deductions may be made from the value of Henion place for any cause. Refused.

Ald. Foley moved to amend by inserting "Stein Park" in place of "Cleveland Park." Lost by the following vote:

Ayes—Ald. Tracy—12.

Nays—Ald. Barron, Bronson, Watson, Kohlmetz, Strouss, Jeffords, Upton, Pitkin, Siener, Rice, Stein, Aikenhead, Kelly, Simmelinck—14. The resolution was then adopted.

Ald. Simmelinck presented the petitions of Abram De Mallie and Margaret Skillman, for permission to erect wood buildings on Harlem and Hawthorn streets, and moved that permission be granted. Adopted.

Ald. Simmelinck presented a petition for a sewer in Brighton street. Referred to the Sewer Committee.

Ald. Simmelinck presented a petition for Water in Brighton street. Referred to the Water Works Committee and Executive Board.

By Ald. Simmelinck:

Resolved, That the street extending from Clinton street to Joiner street, heretofore known as Blumenthal street, be named Bloomingdale avenue, and the clerk be directed to enter the same in the street register. Adopted.

The Board then adjourned.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LAW COMMITTEE.

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee hereby submits its annual report regarding the actions and proceedings in which the city of Rochester is interested and under the charge of your Law Committee during the past year:

1. The action brought by Richard Smith against James H. Kelly and others, to recover \$10,000 for personal injuries, has been treated since its commencement practically as an action brought against the city, in so far as the conduct of the defense has been concerned. It will probably be remembered that this action grew out of the Centennial celebration. The court, upon the trial, non-suited the plaintiff, except as to the defendants, Gibson and Williams, as to whom the case was allowed to go to the jury. Last October a motion for a new trial made by the plaintiff was argued at the Special Term and denied. An appeal to the General Term has been taken and is still pending.

2. The action brought by Henry Bamber as receiver, etc., vs. The City of Rochester has been decided by the Court of Appeals during the past year in favor of the city. The determination made by the Court of Appeals in this action is important for the reason that it decides that this city is not liable in damages by reason of the seizure and destruction of infectious rags or other articles. The case grew out of the seizure and burning, in 1876, of a quantity of rags which were in possession of a person in whose family small pox existed. The plaintiff was non-suited on the trial and the decision of the Court of Appeals affirms the judgment of non-suit.

3. The action brought in the Supreme Court by James H. Hooker to recover \$13,000 damages for the pollution of the stream running across his premises in the town of Irondequoit by the drainage into the stream of a sewer by the city is still pending before the General Term on appeal. It is expected that the appeal in this case will be brought to a hearing at the session of the General Term to be held during the month of April next. In this action the plaintiff sought to recover his damages which had accrued from the time of the construction of the North avenue outlet sewer to

the time of the commencement of the action, which was December, 30, 1878.

4. Another action was brought by James H. Hooker against the City to recover damages for the pollution of the same stream from the time of the commencement of the action last above mentioned to the month of August, 1883, the date of the commencement of the second action. In this case, the plaintiff sought to recover \$10,000. This action was tried at the last June Circuit and resulted in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff of \$110. As precisely the same questions of law are involved in this case as in the one brought by the same plaintiff which was first tried, and as the verdict was so small, your Law Committee did not deem it advisable to take an appeal to the General Term.

5. A third action was brought by Mr. Hooker at the beginning of the present year to recover damages for the pollution of the same stream from the time of the commencement of the second action above referred to. The city has served its answer in this action, but the cause has not yet been tried.

6. The action brought by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad company and others against the city of Rochester, for the purpose of obtaining a permanent injunction restraining the city from connecting the Upton Park outlet sewer with the East avenue outlet sewer, is still pending.

7. The motion for a new trial in the action brought by Amelia Groves and Thomas H. Groves against the city of Rochester has been submitted to the Special Term of the Supreme Court, but no decision has as yet been rendered.

8. The action brought by Ransom D. McCrossen and others against the city of Rochester and the Aldermen of the 16 wards of the city of Rochester, is at issue and has not yet been tried. This action was brought for the purpose of obtaining a permanent injunction restraining the defendants from adopting any resolution or ordinance providing for the taking down of the bridges over the abandoned Genesee Valley Canal on Atkinson and other streets of the city. The determination of the issues involved in this cause would, so far as the specific question is concerned, be of little moment now, as it is supposed the railroad company and the property owners who brought the action are no longer at variance, but the principle involved in this litigation is one of considerable importance.

9. The action brought by William Kavanagh against the city of Rochester, to recover \$1,000 damages in consequence of injuries received by the plaintiff at the locality of the Genesee Valley canal swing bridge is pending. It is expected that this cause will be tried at the next term of the County Court. This action involves the question of the liability of the city by reason of the alleged unsafe construction of said canal bridge, said bridge having been constructed by the city.

10. The action brought for the purpose of testing the validity of the Church street assessment roll has been tried and submitted, the title of it being Frank W. Elwood against the City of Rochester and Ambrose C. McGlathlin as Treasurer of said City. It will be remembered that this action was referred to Hon. E. A. Nash County Judge of Livingston County, to hear, try and determine. The preparation and trial of this action has required a great amount of time and is, by reason of the amount involved and the number of questions raised, of very great importance to the city. No decision has yet been rendered.

11. One of the many actions brought to recover damages for injuries sustained by reason of side walks alleged to be defective is that brought by George Ennis against the City of Rochester. This cause has been tried during the year and resulted in a verdict in favor of the city.

12. The action brought by William Lusink to recover \$1,400 damages, alleged to have been sustained by him by the overflow of the outlet of the East avenue sewer, is still pending.

13. Albert J. Fiske, by his guardian, has brought an action against the city of Rochester to recover \$1,400. The cause of the alleged damages is substantially the same as that claimed in the Lusink case.

14. The action brought by Duane Earle against

the city to recover \$204.78 has been settled without a trial. It appeared upon examination that the plaintiff did carpenter work on and furnished materials for city buildings, under the direction of the chairman of a former City Property committee. The claim of the plaintiff was not audited by a former Common Council, because of the refusal of such committee to audit the same. The nature and amount of work done and materials furnished were arrived at by your committee after the examination of witnesses familiar with the facts, and this cause was, in pursuance of the report of your committee, settled.

15. An action has been brought by Emily Clark against the city to recover \$1,000 damages, in consequence of the alleged negligence of the city in failing to provide drainage for the street upon which her premises are located. This action will probably be tried at the next term of the county court.

16. The action brought by Daniel Runcle against the city to recover \$16,730.24 and interest claimed to be owing by the city for iron pipe used in the construction of the water works, has been settled. It will be remembered that this cause was referred to Hon. T. E. Ellsworth of Lockport to hear, try and determine. The preparation of this cause for trial involved the examination of the entire water works construction account. On the day when the trial was to proceed before the referee, the plaintiff made a proposition for settlement, which proposition was substantially the one made by the city of Rochester in 1876. The trial of the action was thereupon postponed for the purpose of giving an opportunity on the part of the city for consideration, and in pursuance of a report presented to your honorable body, the proposition was accepted and the cause was thereupon discontinued without costs to either party. The settlement arrived at in this case was, in the opinion of your committee, a very advantageous one for the city.

17. At the time of the commencement of the first term of the present city attorney, a contract was made with John R. Fanning, late city attorney, by which he retained charge of four actions brought against the city and then on appeal.

The first of these actions was entitled James G. McCartney vs. The City of Rochester. This action was brought to recover damages for personal injuries received by the plaintiff by reason of the defective and unsafe condition of the approach to a canal bridge in one of the city streets. The action was tried by Mr. Fanning and resulted in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$2,500. The cause was taken upon appeal to the General Term and there argued by Mr. Fanning and a decision was thereafter rendered by said court against the city. Thereupon the judgment was paid.

18. The second action retained by Mr. Fanning was entitled Susanna Schomer vs. The City of Rochester. This cause involved substantially the same legal questions as the McCartney case. The trial of the action resulted in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$1,500. Mr. Fanning for the city took the case to the General Term, which court affirmed the judgment, and thereupon the city paid the amount thereof.

19. The third action retained by Mr. Fanning was one brought by George Truesdale against the city to recover a balance due the plaintiff as Police Justice. This cause was tried in the Municipal Court and resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff. An appeal was taken to the County Court, where the judgment was affirmed, whereupon the cause was taken to the General Term, and argued, and decided adversely to the city. This case has also been settled, the city paying the amount of the judgment.

20. The fourth and last action in which Mr. Fanning was continued was entitled William S. Little vs. The City of Rochester. This action was brought to recover \$1,000 damages by reason of the overflow of the East avenue outlet sewer ditch. It was referred to Hon. James L. Angle as referee to hear, try and determine, and by him decided in favor of the city, the complaint being dismissed. The decision of the referee was that the city of Rochester had no pow-

er, as a municipality, to construct the East avenue outlet sewer ditch beyond the city limits, and that what the city did with reference to such construction, through its contractors, was *ultra vires*, and therefore the city was not liable. The plaintiff appealed from the judgment entered upon the report of the referee to the General Term which reversed the judgment, holding that the construction of the ditch in question was not *ultra vires*. The General Term directed that the cause be tried before another referee. At this point Mr. Fanning's connection with the case ended. The cause was referred to Theodore Bacon, Esq., to hear, try and determine, and has been tried before him. No decision has as yet been made.

21. The action brought by Lewis Kleehammer against the city to recover damages for the pollution by the city of a stream passing through his premises is still pending. The claim of the plaintiff in this action is substantially the same as that made in the Hooker cases above referred to.

22. The action brought by the city against the Genesee Valley Canal Railroad Company, James Shanahan and others has not as yet been tried. In this action an injunction was granted restraining the defendants from flowing that portion of the Genesee Valley canal south of the southerly end of the Ohio basin with water. It was subsequently stipulated on the part of the Common Council that the injunction granted might be so far modified as to permit the water to flow over said portion of the canal for the purpose of testing the sewer under the bed of the same. Thereafter a motion was made by the Attorney General on behalf of the Superintendent of Public Works, that the injunction in this case be vacated, which motion was by the court denied. Answers have been served by the Superintendent of public works and others, but the action has not yet been brought to trial.

23. Growing out of the matter last above referred to, there were brought two actions by the Buffalo, New York and Philadelphia railroad company against the city of Rochester and others. Each of said actions sought to restrain the city, the members of the Common Council and the Executive board of the city from constructing a dam in such manner as to prevent the water of the Erie canal from flowing into the Genesee Valley canal south of the southerly end of the Ohio basin. The injunction in each of said last mentioned cases was modified by the court so far as to permit the construction of said dam. Said actions are at issue, but have not yet been tried.

The three actions last above referred to present the question as to whether the city of Rochester, under the contracts made between it and the State and the Genesee Valley Canal Railroad Co., has the legal right to prevent by injunction the flow of water in that portion of the abandoned Genesee Valley canal south of the southerly end of the Ohio Basin, and as to whether the city has the right to fill up so much of the abandoned Genesee Valley canal as to make West avenue, at the place where it crosses said canal, of the same width as said street is east and west thereof and as to whether the city has the legal right to prevent the further use of the swing bridge across said abandoned canal.

24. Growing out of the decision of the Court of Appeals in the Oak street assessment case, entitled Hassan and others against the city of Rochester, a number of actions have been brought against the city to recover the amount of the assessments paid by property owners upon the void roll. It is held by the Court of Appeals that parties paying the assessment upon an assessment roll held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be void, may recover the amount of their payment with interest, of the city. There was, therefore, no defense which the city could interpose as against the persons who paid assessments on said roll. The commencement of such actions resulted in the proceedings which have been taken by the Common Council with reference to a reassessment for the expense of the improvement of Oak street. The course taken by the Common Council with reference to such matter is of course too familiar to need recapitulation here. It is expected that

the action taken by the Common Council will terminate in a satisfactory manner this long continued and disastrous litigation.

25. An action has been brought by Mary S. Hebard against the city of Rochester to recover \$5,000 for personal injuries, alleged to have been sustained by reason of the defective and unsafe condition of the roadway of East Main street in the neighborhood of the Liberty pole. This action has not yet been tried.

26. Obed M. Rice brought an action against the city and the Street Railroad company to recover \$15,000 damages for personal injuries sustained by reason of the alleged unsafe condition of West avenue in the winter of 1884. This action was tried at the last January circuit, and resulted in a verdict for the defendants.

27. The action, brought by Suttieff T. Seward against the city to recover \$6,375 damages on account of the bursting of the water-pipes crossing his farm in the town of Livonia, Livingston county, was tried at the Livingston Circuit in November last. It was shown upon the trial that a portion of his farm was rendered unfit for cultivation by such bursting and by leakage, and that his dwelling was rendered unfit for occupancy and that other damage resulted. The plaintiff recovered a verdict of \$525. A stay of proceedings was granted and, under the direction of the Executive Board, an appeal is to be taken to the general term.

28. During the summer of 1884 the Common Council passed an ordinance providing for the construction of a plank walk on Jennings street. Previous to the letting by the Executive Board of a contract for the construction of such walk under said ordinance, Jacob Sniegl and other property owners on said street brought an action against the city and the members of the Executive Board for the purpose of obtaining an injunction restraining the defendants from executing a contract for the laying of said walk. An answer was interposed and the cause was tried and submitted at the last Equity term. No decision has yet been rendered.

29. Mary Ann Frothingham has brought an action to recover \$10,000 damages to her property by reason of the drainage of the Lyell and Saxton street outlet sewer into a natural stream which crosses said premises. The city has served its answer, but the cause has not yet been reached for trial.

30. George Chapman has brought an action against the city to recover \$10,000 damages by reason of the pollution of the water of Thomas creek, a stream crossing his premises in the town of Brighton. He also seeks, in the same action, to obtain an injunction restraining the city from using said stream as an outlet for the Nichols park and Monroe avenue outlet sewers. This cause has been tried at the equity term, but no decision has yet been rendered.

31. An action has been brought by David K. Bell and others, constituting the Board of Health of the town of Brighton, against the city to enjoin the defendant from the further pollution of the stream in the town of Brighton known as Thomas creek by reason of the emptying therein of the sewers known as the Nichols park, Monroe avenue and East avenue outlet sewers. This action has been also tried at the equity term, but no decision has been rendered. By reason of the fact that a relative of the City Attorney owns land in the town of Brighton through which Thomas creek runs, the City Attorney employed at his own expense, Edward Harris, esq., to represent the city in each of the actions last above named.

32. The action brought in the supreme court by Anthony Cooman against the Board of Education of the city of Rochester was tried on the part of the city by an attorney employed by the Board of Education, and resulted in a decision in favor of the defendant. In September last, after such trial, the City Attorney was substituted as attorney for the defendant. The plaintiff has carried the case by appeal to the general term, where it has not been argued.

33. The action brought by James Gosnell against

the city to recover for work done and materials furnished upon the Protectives' house on Fitzhugh street, was tried at the last county court and resulted in a nonsuit. The question presented in this case was as to the liability of the city for work ordered to be done by members of the Executive Board upon city buildings, and the court held that the city was not liable.

34. Sarah P. Bull has brought an action against the city to obtain a judgment vacating an alleged erroneous assessment. This action has not yet been tried.

35. Growing out of the construction of the Baltimore and Ohio telegraph line into the city, is the action brought by the city against the Baltimore and Ohio telegraph company. Said company proceeded to erect its poles and string its wires in front of lots owned by persons who had not consented thereto. An injunction was granted restraining the company from the further erection of poles, which injunction was subsequently modified. An answer has been served by the defendant and the cause will be tried when reached.

36. The Buffalo, New York & Philadelphia railroad company some time since raised that part of Trowbridge street in front of their freight house, from two to three feet, for the purpose of furnishing a better approach to such freight house. Complaint was made to the Executive Board by property owners upon the street, whereupon the Executive Board, by resolution, directed the superintendent of streets to restore said Trowbridge street to the grade as established by the Common Council. Before the superintendent of streets had executed the orders of the Executive Board, the said railroad company brought an action against the city and the members of the Executive Board to obtain an injunction restraining any interference on the part of the city with the street as at present graded. The court granted in said action, a temporary injunction restraining the contemplated action by the board. Answers were served on the part of the defendants, and it is expected that the issues will come on for trial within a few days.

37. It will be remembered that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company entered into a contract with the Elevated Tracks Commissioners of the city which, among other things, provided that when the city should open a street and build a bridge across the Genesee River on the 25 feet next south of the tracks of said company as elevated, that said company would cede to the city the land thus used, 25 feet in width, forever for street uses. Subsequently, proceedings were taken by the city for the purpose of acquiring title to a strip of land about 25 feet wide next south of the land so to be ceded by the company as aforesaid. In such proceedings, the title to said last mentioned 25 feet was acquired. Thereupon, in pursuance of such contract and of such proceedings the city began the construction of the bridge now known as the Central Avenue bridge, whereupon an action was brought by Jonathan E. Pierpont and others to restrain the contractors from entering upon a certain portion of the land ceded to the city as aforesaid, which action was based upon the claim of the plaintiffs that such portion of said land was owned by them and not by the railroad company. The court, on the motion of the plaintiff, granted an injunction restraining the contractors from entry upon said land for the purpose aforesaid. Such injunction was, by motion of the city, vacated, an answer was served and the issues involved in this trial are still pending, undetermined. It is expected this cause will come on for trial at the next equity term.

38. An action has been brought by Warner B. Bary against the city to recover \$1,000 damages for personal injuries alleged to have been sustained by reason of the defective condition of a sidewalk in this city. The answer of the city has been served but the case has not yet been tried.

39. By direction of a former Common Council, the Fire Marshall tore down a building on the corner of Sycamore and Cedar streets, occupied by one Amanda Hamilton. Such action was taken by reason of the alleged unsafe and dangerous condition of the structure, and by reason of its being so infested with vermin and so filthy as to be a public

nuisance. The owner of said building has brought an action to recover \$2,000 by reason of the alleged unauthorized and unwarranted destruction of said building. Issue has been joined in this action, but the cause is not yet tried.

40. Three actions have been brought against policemen of the city, which have been defended by the City Attorney.

The first of these was an action brought by Daniel Leary against John Sullivan. The cause of action was an alleged improper arrest and false imprisonment. This action was tried in the County Court at the last September term and resulted in a verdict for the defendant.

Another action brought by John O'Connor against John Sullivan for the same cause as the one last mentioned and growing out of the same transaction, has not been tried, but the plaintiff's attorney has proposed to stipulate for a discontinuance of said action without costs, which proposition will probably be accepted.

The third is one brought by John Cawthra against John Dean, and is for the same cause as those last mentioned. This action was tried at the last term of the County Court, and resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff of \$70. A motion was made by the City Attorney for a new trial upon the minutes, which motion has been granted, and the case it to be retried at the present term of the County Court.

41. The action brought by Hiram Smith and others against the city of Rochester, known as the Honeoye miller's action, which was decided by the Court of Appeals adversely to the city, has been retried at the Special Term. Under the rule of law laid down by the Court of Appeals as interpreted by the special term, a judgment directing that an injunction issue against the city at the expiration of six months from the time of such decision, unless the city shall have acquired in the meantime the right to draw water from Hemlock Lake, has been granted. An appeal has been taken from the said judgment to the general term, and it is proposed to take the case to the Court of Appeals for further consideration in the event of the decision of the General Term being adverse to the city.

42. By reason of the decision of the Court of Appeals in the action last above-mentioned, various owners of mills, factories and mill privileges upon Hemlock Lake outlet and Honeoye Creek have brought actions to recover damages for injuries alleged to have been sustained by reason of the diversion of the water by the city from the natural outlet of said lake. In such actions, the plaintiff's seek to recover the damages sustained from the first day of January, 1876, the time when the city began taking the water, to the time of the commencement of such actions. The titles of the actions and the amounts claimed for such past damages are as follows:

Most of these cases have been by stipulation, referred to the three commissioners who have been appointed in the condemnation proceedings hereinafter referred to, and it is expected that all of the actions brought to recover past damages will be tried before the said three commissioners as referees, at the conclusion of the condemnation proceedings.

43. The decision in Smith against the city above referred to of course compelled the city to institute proceedings for the purpose of determining the amount of money to be paid to the various owners of mill privileges on Hemlock lake outlet and Honeoye creek for the permanent and perpetual right of taking from Hemlock and Canadice lakes for the use of the city, nine millions of gallons of water a day, that quantity being the amount which can be drawn through the conduit constructed.

Such proceedings have been instituted by the city, and the court appointed three commissioners to determine the compensation to be paid. The commissioners selected by the court were H. V. Howland, of Auburn; James T. Gardner, of Albany; and Charles C. B. Walker, of Corning. The testimony in said proceedings has all been taken and the summing up therein is to occur on the 9th day of April next. The preparation and trial before the commissioners has involved a vast amount of labor on the part of the City Attorney and the engineers in the water works department.

44. In pursuance of an act of the Legislature passed at the session of 1885, the Board of Education contracted for the purchase of three lots of land in the 12th ward to be used as a school site, such lots forming together a lot of suitable size for the erection of a school building. When the abstracts of title of said lots reached the City Attorney, it was ascertained that the title of the middle lot was in dispute, and hence no satisfactory title could be acquired by the city. It therefore became necessary, if such lot was to be purchased, to have title acquired by a judicial proceeding in which an order could be made directing the payment into court of the money determined upon as compensation. Under the provisions of the Charter of the City of Rochester and other law, it was found that this city had no power to institute proceedings to condemn lands under the right of eminent domain. A bill was therefore drawn and presented at the present session of the Legislature, conferring upon the city the power of acquiring lands for school sites by condemnation proceedings. Under the provisions of the act thus passed, proceedings have been instituted for the taking of the lot above referred to, which proceedings are still pending undetermined.

45. During the past year, a large number of proceedings have been instituted for the purpose of acquiring lands for the opening, extension and widening of streets. The following is a list of the more important proceedings thus instituted and which have in some of their stages, been conducted during the present year:

In the matter of the extension of Ward and Hamburg streets.

In the matter of opening a new street from Pinnacle avenue to Griffith street.

In the matter of opening a street from Clifford to Norton streets.

In the matter of the opening and extension of Hayward park.

In the matter of opening a street from Campbell street to Maple street.

In the matter of widening North St. Paul street from Division street northerly to a point near River street.

Some of these street opening cases have been sent back for rehearing before other commissioners. The amount of labor involved in each of these cases is much more than that required in ordinary litigations in the Supreme Court. It is not deemed necessary to describe in detail the proceedings taken in each case, as the reports of the commissioners in each case have been, within a comparatively recent period, before the Common Council for action.

There are a large number of other actions and proceedings of minor importance, as compared with those above referred to, which have been under the direction of your Law Committee, to which cases and proceedings it is not necessary at this time to make a more particular reference. Many claims have been considered by your committee, in the investigation of which considerable time was necessarily expended.

The foregoing summary, as briefly made as possible, affords an indication of the great amount of litigation to which the city of Rochester is a party.

The expenditures for the Lamp Department for this year shows an increase of about thirteen thousand dollars over last year. This increase is accounted for by the extension of the electric light system, the substitution of gas for oil lights in a considerable portion of the city, and placing lamps in new territory. The entire expenditures for all purposes, except lighting, amount to about thirty-five hundred dollars.

At the meeting of your Honorable body held August 26th last, a resolution was adopted for the appointment of a committee of citizens to confer with this committee and take into consideration the various plans of lighting the city, and report by what system of lighting the best results could be obtained at the least cost.

The joint committee held numerous meetings, carefully examined into the merits of each of the proposed systems; received competitive bids for lighting the whole or part of the city by electricity, gas and oil, and made a report which was adopted by your honorable body at a meeting held December 30th, 1884, by which the old system of using three kinds of light is continued, but a much better light is obtained than formerly at a cost largely reduced over that of previous years. Your committee begs leave to refer to the fact, that the action taken by your honorable body at the suggestion of the joint committee, directing the City Surveyor to have a count made of all the lights now in use, has revealed a discrepancy between the number reported by the Surveyor and the number charged for by the companies and oil contractor. It is but just to say that of the latter claim that the discrepancy can be accounted for, and they ask that time be granted them to make a recount of the lamps. When that is done a proper reduction will be made for any over charge that has been made. In conclusion your Lamp Committee wishes to place on record its appreciation of the earnest and effective work performed by the citizen members of that committee, and to say that to their efforts are due in a very large measure the saving to the taxpayers of Rochester in the amount to be expended for lighting the city of thousands of dollars.

 REPORT OF THE WATER WORKS COMMITTEE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR, 1884-5.
 ROCHESTER, March 27th, 1885.

To the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—Your water works committee submit the following report in relation to the work done during the past year in the extension of water mains in the streets of the city, and also in relation to the litigations arising out of the construction and maintenance of the water works system:

There was inserted in the tax levy for 1884 the sum of \$75,000 for water pipe extensions, all of which sum had been anticipated by the raising of money on city notes issued on the credit of that tax levy.

A portion of the money thus anticipated was, however, raised for and used in the purchase of pipe and other materials during the winter of 1883-4 for work to be done in the summer of 1884.

Immediately on the adoption of this levy the Common Council directed the issue of city notes on the credit of the tax levy for 1885, when necessary, to the amount of \$50,000 to pay for work which it then authorized and which was urgently demanded.

The Common Council had also on date of November, 1883, authorized the raising of \$20,632 when necessary thus for water-pipe extension, but only \$8,198 had been raised at the date of the adoption of the tax levy for 1884, and only this latter amount was placed in that levy, leaving the sum of \$12,454 under that resolution, which was raised at a later period as a charge against the levy of 1885.

On date of July 15th, 1884, the Common Council also authorized the borrowing of the further sum of \$9,920 on the credit of the tax levy of 1885 for water-pipe extensions.

The sums thus borrowed on the credit of the tax levy of 1885 and which must under the provisions of the charter be raised in said levy are as follows:

There is at this date on hand and applicable to water-pipe extension the present year money and materials amounting to about \$8,500.

There are petitions for water-pipe extensions now on file in the Water Department, amounting to \$60,106.90.

It is believed that an urgent necessity does not exist for the extension of all the pipes desired by these petitions during the present year. On a careful examination of the several streets which are the subject of these petitions, your committee is of the opinion that an appropriation of \$25,000 for water-pipe extension, in addition to the amount on hand, will reasonably meet the necessities of our citizens for that purpose for the coming year. Your committee make this suggestion with more confidence in view of the fact that, in consequence of the apprehended visitation of a cholera epidemic during the coming summer, it is deemed important, for sanitary reasons, that frequent and extensive excavations in the public streets should be avoided, and particularly that excavations, whether for street improvements, construction of sewers or for laying water-pipe, shall be confined to the work of an urgent character and to the early part of the season.

It seems very desirable that the twelve-inch feeding main, which is intended to connect with the sixt een-inch main in South avenue and feed the east and northeast parts of the city, through Caroline and Goodman streets, be finished during the coming summer.

It is immediately needed for increased fire protection in the portions of the city named.

The Executive Board is of the opinion that under the provisions of Section 155 of the charter it has authority to make this extension and to pay the cost thereof from the water rents accruing during the year.

Your committee concurs with said Board in its judgment of the necessity and propriety of such action, and also recommend the concurrence of the Common Council. In case the cost of this extension is paid from water rents, it will by so much reduce the amount of the net income from that source which can be paid into the city treasury in reduction of the tax levy.

The connection required is in Goodman street from Park avenue to the Erie canal, a distance of

about 3,300 lineal feet and the estimated cost is \$7,800.

WATER WORKS LITIGATION.

In the case of Daniel Runkle (assignee of B. G. Clarke) against the City of Rochester, the amount claimed was about \$26,000 and a settlement was made for \$3,000.

This suit arose out of the furnishing of the water pipe during the original construction of the works.

In the final settlement, the water commissioners made certain deductions because of imperfect pipes furnished, which left a balance due to Clark of between \$1,500 and \$1,600, which amount was deposited with the City Treasurer. Mr. Clarke was dissatisfied with the proposed settlement and brought suit for recovery of the amount of these deductions and for interest on daily balances. The settlement is regarded as a favorable one to the city.

A commission has been created by the Supreme Court to determine the amount of damage which the city must pay to the water power owners on Hemlock lake outlet and Homeoye creek, for the diversion of water from Hemlock lake. The testimony in this case has been presented to the commission, the time for submission of the case set down for April 9th, and it is expected that a decision will be rendered some time during the early summer. APPROVAL OF MINUTES.

The minutes of the preceding meetings March 24th and 26th, were approved as published.

There being no further business before the Board, Ald. Pitkin arose and addressed the president as follows:

MR. PRESIDENT—Another year has rolled by, and with this meeting our official duties for the year will end. Whether we have performed our duties well, our constituents must decide. I have been chosen by your associates in this council to express their thanks for the patient and impartial manner in which you have presided over our deliberations. As a slight memento of their friendship and best wishes for your future welfare and prosperity, the members of this Board and other city officials ask you to accept this beautiful ring.

The memento, a beautiful and valuable diamond ring, was accepted by Ald. Kelly in a few suitable and well-chosen remarks feelingly expressed.

The president then addressed the Board as follows:

GENTLEMEN OF THE COMMON COUNCIL:—The Common Council of 1884 and 1885 is now in session for the last time. According to custom, it devolves upon your presiding officer to pronounce the valedictory. I cannot let this opportunity pass without acknowledging the deep obligation I am under to you all.

The labors of the Chairman have been made easy and pleasant by your courtesy and forbearance, for which I return my most sincere thanks.

I have always felt under deep obligations to you for honoring me with this position, and I have, at all times, tried to treat each one with as much consideration as the circumstances would allow. If any have ever felt aggrieved, I can only say that I have only done what seemed best at the time, and have striven to allow no personal feelings to influence my actions.

Some criticism has been passed upon the board during the year for the high rate of taxation imposed upon our citizens, but it should be remembered in mitigation of the force of the criticism, that the occasion of building several school-houses and fire-houses during the year was an extraordinary one, and that a not inconsiderable portion of the last tax levy was to make up deficiencies created by former boards.

It can be readily seen that, with economy, the incoming board will be able to reduce the taxes very much. The annual tax levy should be jealously watched by every member of the board; the strictest economy should be practiced, and if this be done, a great reduction can be made in our taxes.

Gentlemen, the hour for parting has come, and

as I am about to relinquish the duties of the chair to other hands, I wish to say to you that if I have, in any way, offended you, I now ask your pardon.

The City Attorney, City Surveyor, City Clerk, City Messenger and Assistant and all the subordinate attaches of the Board, together with the press reporters, have placed me under obligations for so many special courtesies that a sense of duty impels a public acknowledgement of the same. Their kindness cannot be forgotten by me, but will be treasured among the pleasant recollections of five years spent in the city's service—years that have brought their joys and their sorrows in turn.

Gentlemen, God speed you all, and prosper the city in which we live.

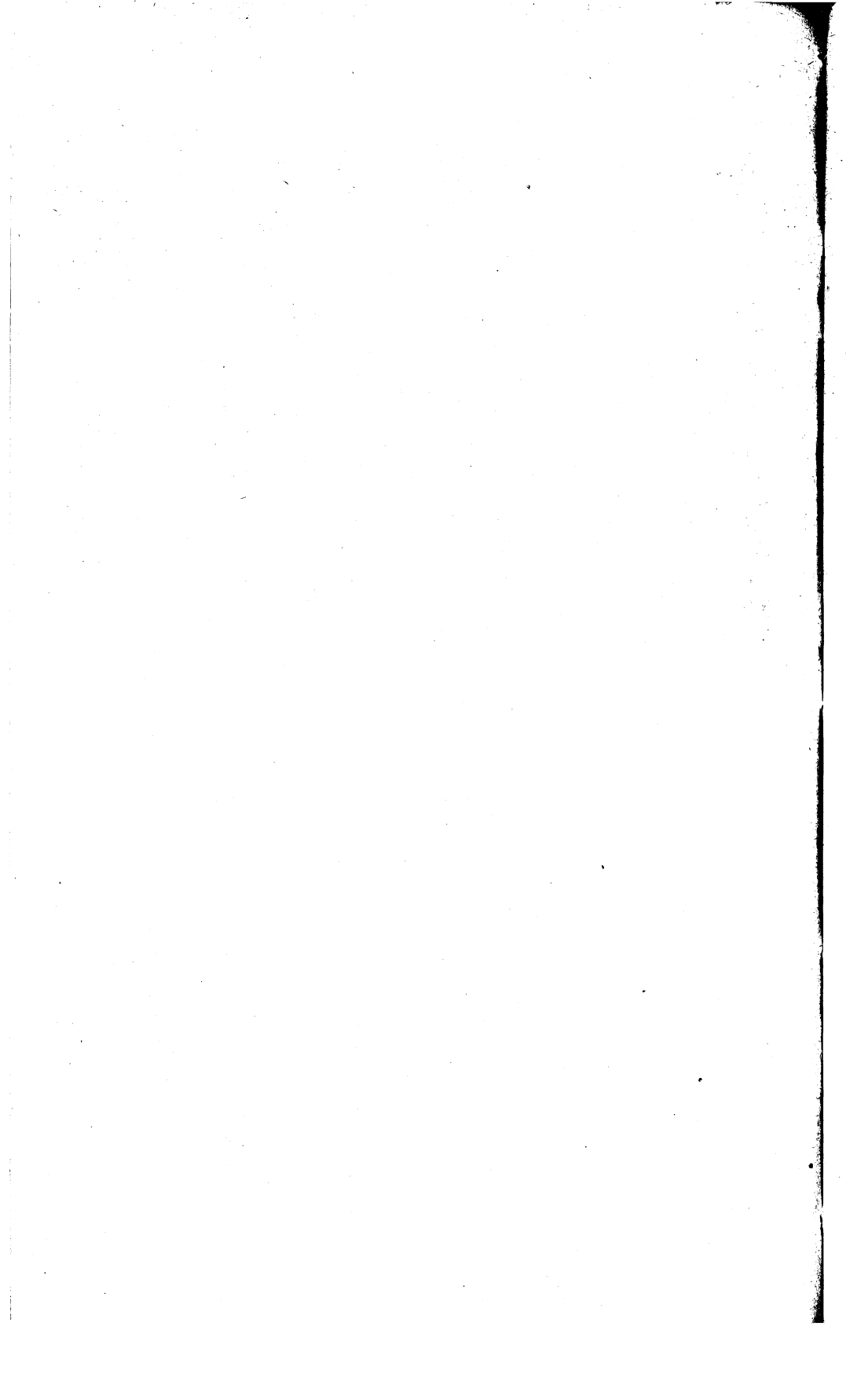
