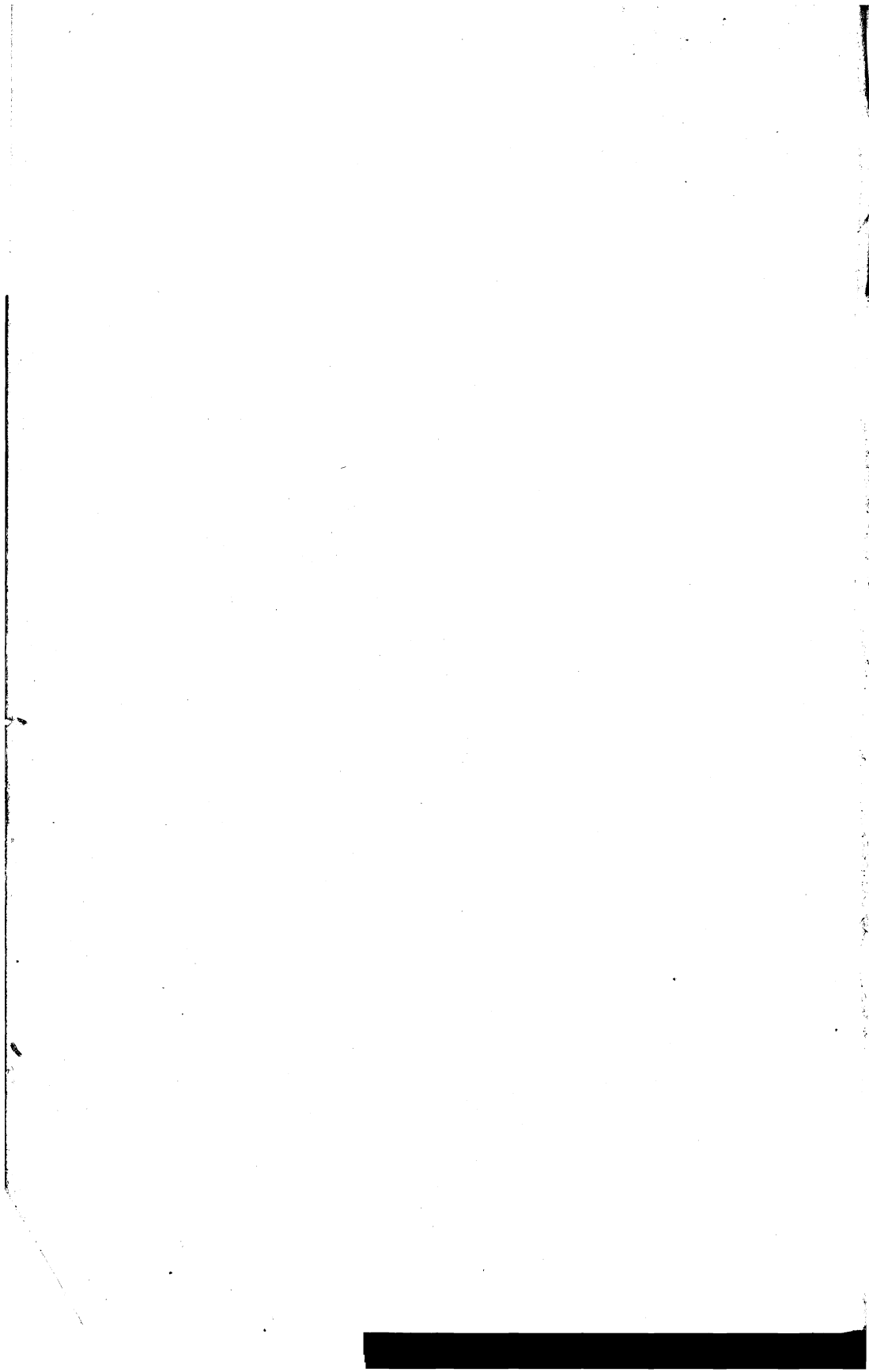

CHARTER MEETING—ORGANIZATION OF THE BOARD.

The City Clerk called the Board to order.

Present—Ald. Tracy, Coughlin, Bronson, Watson, Kohlmetz, Fritzsche, Jeffords, Foley, Upton, Mandeville, Siener, Weider, Stein, Bohrer, Kelly, Schaeffer—16.

Ald. Mandeville moved that Ald. Upton act as temporary chairman. Adopted.

Upon taking the chair Ald. Upton said: Gentlemen—I briefly but earnestly thank you for this honor, and ask your further pleasure.

Ald. Mandeville moved to proceed to appoint a President of the Board. Adopted.

Ald. Mandeville nominated Ald. Tracy.

Ald. Tracy was named by Ald. Coughlin, Bronson, Watson, Jeffords, Foley, Upton, Mandeville, Siener, Weider, Stein, Kelly—11.

Blank was named by Ald. Kohlmetz, Fritzsche, Bohrer, Schaeffer—4.

The chair declared Ald. Tracy appointed President of the Common Council.

Ald. Foley moved that a committee of two be appointed to conduct the President to the chair. Adopted.

The chair appointed as such committee Ald. Foley and Bronson.

The committee having performed the duty assigned them, Ald. Tracy addressed the board as follows:

GENTLEMEN.—For the honor which you have conferred upon me in selecting me as your presiding officer, I return you my sincere thanks. This position comes to me at this time unsought and unasked for, and while I would have preferred that your selection should have fallen on some other member of the board, still I can assure you that I am deeply grateful for the honor conferred, and for the very flattering vote which you have given me. We have now arrived at a time when there seems to be an earnest desire for reform in municipal affairs, and it behooves us, as members of this board, to see to it that our every act will be such as to satisfy and meet with the approval of the people who we have the honor of representing. So far as I am concerned personally I pledge you to discharge the duties of the position faithfully and impartially, and am satisfied that I will have your hearty cooperation in all things pertaining to the interests of the people. I sincerely hope that at the end of the fiscal year when the Common Council of 1885-86 may go out of existence, we may retire with the full knowledge that we have done our whole duty and have in every respect satisfied the expectations of our constituents.

Gentlemen, what is your further pleasure?

Ald. Kelly gave notice, as required by Rule 41 of the rules of the Common Council, that at the next meeting of the Common Council he would move to amend Rule 31 of the Rules, so as to read as follows :

RULE XXXI. Unless otherwise specially ordered, all committees of the Board shall consist of FIVE members, who shall be appointed by the presiding officer.

Frank S. Upton, Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Common Council :

DEAR SIR : We deem it our duty to call your attention to the following statement and to make a recommendation founded thereon :

On the sixth day of April, which was the day when the present Treasurer began his term of office, the city of Rochester had advanced upon local assessments, either by issuing of notes or by advances from funds in the hands of the Treasurer, the sum of \$405,822.60, exclusive of interest. Such advances may be stated in detail thus :

You are, of course, aware that for the advances thus made the treasurer has in his office assessment rolls, which, when collected will produce a sum of money equal to the amounts advanced with interest.

If the census about to be taken shall show the population of this city is 100,000, or more, it will be difficult for the city to renew the paper issued for the above purposes, if not impossible. We do not mean to be understood to say that in the contingency above suggested the city may not legally renew said indebtedness or any part thereof but simply that it will be difficult to induce capitalists to loan any money to this city for any purpose. We are informed that if an act be passed by the Legislature authorizing the issuance by the city of bonds at 4 per cent per annum that such bonds if issued previous to the determination to be made by the census can be negotiated at par. Such bonds can be made payable at such times as will enable payment thereof to be made from the amounts collected on said local assessments. The amounts as collected on local assessments can, of course, be held in a separate fund until such time as enough is collected to take up a certain proportion of the bonds. As all of the assessment rolls against which advances have been made bear

interest at six per cent, no loss of interest can accrue to the city by issuing of the bonds for said purpose at 4 per cent. It is announced in the public press that the Legislature will probably adjourn on or about the 23d of the present month. Whatever is done in the way of authorizing the issuing of bonds for the above specified purpose must be speedily done. We therefore recommend that you, as chairman of the Finance Committee, request the Mayor to call a special meeting of the Common Council to consider the subject above suggested, for some evening during the present week.

Section 1. The city of Rochester is hereby authorized and empowered to issue its bonds in such denomination and amount not to exceed the sum of \$400,000, as the Common Council shall direct, for the purpose of obtaining money with which to pay notes and acceptances issued by said city upon local assessments and advances made by said city upon local assessments; such bonds to bear interest at a rate not exceeding 4 per cent. per annum, and to be payable at such time as the Common Council shall direct; but the said bonds shall not be negotiated or disposed of at any rate less than the par value thereof.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

To the Finance Committee of the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: The undersigned, at your request and by your appointment, has made a thorough examination of ex-Treasurer A. C. McGlachlin's annual report, covering the period from March 11, 1884, to March 24, 1885; and, also, the supplementary report from the latter date to April 4, 1885, inclusive.

It is deemed unnecessary in this report to enter into full details to show that the word "thorough"

is used without requiring any qualification. The same care has been taken in verifying the correctness of every account and every item or entry connected therewith, as if the same had to be proven in court; and I have no hesitancy in affirming the entire accuracy and reliability of the reports, in every particular as therein set forth.

In this connection, acknowledgments are due to the efficient services rendered by Mr. John H. Davis in clerical work; as also to the employees of the office, and particularly to Mr. Tracy, for the prompt and cheerful manner in which all requests for books, papers or information to facilitate the investigation, have been responded to.

I might here close this report, for, strictly speaking, it is no part of an examiner's duty—under the resolution of the Common Council, which simply authorized an "examination of the Treasurer's annual report"—to extend his investigations beyond this limitation; or to make any suggestions that may be deemed relevant to the general subject; but I will, nevertheless, make one or two observations in relation thereto, especially as an intimation has been given by one of your number, that such comments would be in order.

And first, then, I respectfully suggest that all resolutions by the Council, hereafter passed, authorizing examinations of the Treasurer's accounts or reports, shall be sufficiently broad to include necessary investigations of other departments of the city government having a reciprocal and direct relation to the Treasury department; for it by no means follows that because the Treasurer produces properly executed vouchers for every dollar of disbursements, that the warrants themselves were, in all cases, duly or legally authorized. In these remarks, I refer more especially to the department in charge of the City Clerk. By reference to sections 55 and 58 of the city charter, it will be seen that the City Clerk has very important duties to perform, and that the position is one of great trust and responsibility—entirely too great not to be rigidly investigated, as frequently at least as the Treasurer's office.

I do not mean to intimate even that there has been any malfeasance or neglect of duty in this department, but I see a greater opportunity for fraud or other misdoings in this department than in that of any other, and yet it is seldom or ever investigated. How this may be done, will, I think, appear so obvious, after a careful reading of the sections above referred to, that I need not here attempt any explanation of this subject.

One other matter I may be excused for referring to, namely, that the salary payments in the Treasurer's office have exceeded the appropriations for this purpose by the Council by the sum of \$980 during the past fiscal year; the year previous by \$200. It may be that the city has had *quid pro quo* for these extra and unauthorized expenditures; but when the Common Council has voted a definite sum for a special purpose it is clearly the duty of officials to conform strictly to the limits prescribed. If deemed, or found to be insufficient, the Council alone has authority to increase the amount; and it is presumable that any fair showing of the necessity of such increase would meet with a reasonable response. The amount in this case is comparatively small, but the principle involved is by no means a small affair.

Before closing this report, I may add that, in this investigation, I have gone beyond the letter of the Council's resolution to the extent of an examination of the cash debits to the Treasurer made by the Board of Education, the Executive Board and the Police Department, and have found all these charges properly credited to their respective accounts. GENTLEMEN—In obedience to the direction given me by your honorable body, I hereby submit my opinion as to the power of the Common Council to assess the Rochester City and Brighton Railroad Company for a part of the expense of sprinkling streets through which their cars run.

The power of the Common Council to cause the payment of the expense of sprinkling a street to be made by local assessment is conferred by subdivision seven of section 168. So far as material to the question here being considered, the following is the language of the section:

"The Common Council are hereby authorized to cause the whole or any part of any street in said city to be sprinkled with water, and may pay the expense thereof by an assessment upon the lots or parcels of land fronting on such streets, or any specified part thereof, in proportion to the benefit and advantage thereby derived. The proceedings of said Common Council in relation to said work, and for the assessment and collection of the expense thereof, shall be conformed, as nearly as may be, to proceedings in relation to making local improvements and collecting the expense thereof, as now required from persons owning or occupying the lots to be assessed."

The evident design of the provision above quoted was to enable the Common Council to cause the expense of sprinkling streets to be paid by an assess-

ment upon the lots of land on either side of the street, instead of out of the public treasury. I do not think that, under the provision quoted, the Common Council has power to assess any part of the expense mentioned upon the tracks or property of the street car company, except as such property is land fronting on the street to be sprinkled.

GENTLEMEN: I call your attention to a judgment rendered in the Municipal Court April 20, 1885, in favor of Eugene Leonard, and against the city for seventy-five dollars and costs. The action was brought to recover two hundred and fifty dollars damages claimed to have been sustained by the plaintiff by reason of the drawing by the Assistant Street Superintendent of the city, of an ice breaker through that portion of the Erie Canal lying between Exchange and Fitzhugh streets, which had been leased from the State authorities by the plaintiff for use as a skating rink. The case presents some interesting questions with reference to the liability of the city for unauthorized acts of its officers, and I recommend a reference of the matter to the Law Committee with power to act, if that committee should deem an appeal advisable.

We trust the Common Council will see the urgent necessity of taking, without delay, such action as will insure good results before the warm weather of early summer.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Your Police Committee submits herewith the following report and recommendation: the careful examination as to the administration of the excise law in the City of Rochester has convinced your Committee that the duties imposed upon, and the powers exercised by, the Excise Commission could be better performed and exercised by the Police Commission. Your Committee ascertains that the Police Commission is hampered in its efforts to close disorderly places by the fact that the proprietors of many of such places hold licenses from the Excise Commissioners.

The Police Commissioners are charged with the duty of maintaining order in the city, and, in general, of preventing the commission and causing the punishment of crime. By reason of information which the Police Commissioners, in the perform-

ance of their duty, obtain, they are better qualified to decide as to the licences to be granted or refused than the Excise Board has been shown to have been in the past.

If the Police Commissioners are made, by statutory enactment, Excise Commissioners as well, the city will be saved considerable expense, and law and order will be the better maintained. If the Police Commissioners are also the Excise Commissioners of this city, your committee is of the opinion that the persons engaged in selling liquor, ale, beer, etc., without a license, will be arrested and punished, as the evidence of such violation of law will be easily obtainable by the Police Commission.

For the reasons above outlined, your committee suggests that the proposed bill, which accompanies this report, be presented to the Legislature with a resolution from your honorable body requesting its immediate passage.

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Board, the office of Excise Commissioner as it now exists in the City of Rochester, should be abolished, and the powers conferred, and the duties imposed upon Excise Commissioners in said city should be hereafter exercised by the Police Commissioners, to the end that a better Administration of law may be effected, and an expense saved to this city.

It is further Resolved, That the Legislature be, and hereby is, requested to enact the following proposed bill, having for its object the purpose above suggested.

An act conferring upon the Police Commissioners of the city of Rochester the powers, and imposing the duties, heretofore exercised by the Commissioners of Excise of said city.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Police Commissioners of the city of Rochester, in addition to the rights, privileges and powers conferred, and duties imposed upon them by law, shall possess all the rights, privileges and powers, and perform the duties now conferred or imposed by law upon the Commissioners of Excise of said city, and the Commissioners of Police shall hereafter, by virtue of their office, be the Commissioners of Excise for said city.

Section 2. The office of Commissioner of Excise of the city of Rochester, as now existing, is hereby abolished.

Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

The Mayor presented his annual message as follows:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, }
ROCHESTER, N. Y., May 1st, 1885. }

GENTLEMEN OF THE COMMON COUNCIL: In entering upon the tenth year of the administration of the affairs of this city, it is with a desire to promote solely its best interests and to unite with you in what I trust may prove a highly successful discharge of a great and sacred trust. To rule over a population of a hundred thousand souls. to guard their property, their health and their welfare generally, is an obligation as extensive as the character of that obligation is inviolable. In accepting, then, the duties and responsibilities of administering our municipal government, it is with devout gratitude to the giver of all good that during the eventful year now closed, our city has escaped inundation, conflagration and pestilence. Its march has been one of progress; its growth both remarkable and substantial. To-day, evidences of thrift and improvement are to be seen in many directions and it but remains for us, we, in whom the people have placed their confidence, to be true to them and true to ourselves in order to make Rochester famous among the cities of our land.

Around the

PUBLIC SCHOOLS

a great interest will always center. The success which has attended this system of education in Rochester is, I assume, a matter of pride to all our citizens; the constantly increasing attendance, and the almost continual demand for new buildings as well as the enlargement of old structures, fully attest its growth and popularity. The organization a year or two since, by the board of education, of the normal and training class was a most commendable step, for, by it inexperienced teachers are fitted for their work through a course of instruction in the science of education and in theory and practice of teaching. The necessity of a frequent examination of the sanitary condition of school buildings and their surroundings has not been over looked, and too much attention cannot be paid to so important a matter. A celebrated physician once remarked that, 'the well are made sick and the sick are made worse for the simple lack of God's pure air and pure water,' and Hippocrates more than four centuries before the christian era in these words, 'pure air, pure water and a pure soil' announced the cardinal formula for health. This doctrine holds good to-day and it is our duty in

the case of the thousands of children whom we seek and strive to educate, to exert every effort to protect their lives and health. The necessity existing last year for increased accommodations for school children was very great, and a large sum of money was raised and expended for new buildings and additions, but the expenditure of monies by the Board of Education was in some instances characterized by a reckless disregard of some of the plainest provisions of the charter. However, I am now happy to announce that with the organization of the present board, the dawning of a new era seems apparent, and a most gratifying feature of this year's management of the schools is the fact, that the appropriation, as compared with last year, will be lower in amount by \$44,000.

WATER WORKS DEPARTMENT.

The demand for water pipe extensions during the past year has been very large, particularly in the Fifteenth and Sixteenth wards of the city. The introduction of Hemlock water mains into new streets has come to be a prerequisite to the building up and improvement of the property. In fact, the demand for these pipe extensions in the new sections may now be regarded as a fair index of the rapidity and extent of the building operations and other improvements being made therein.

The extent of this demand is indicated by the following statement of work done during the past year in the extension of water pipe mains:

I am informed that there are petitions and recommendations now on file in the water works department, which would involve the expenditure of about \$66,000 if the whole work is performed during the coming year. It will probably be discovered on a careful examination of these petitions, that a portion at least may be deferred until a later period.

It is certainly to be desired that the greatest economy shall be exercised not only in the expenditures of the several departments during the coming year, but also in the appropriations for each which are to be raised in the tax levy of this year.

The daily average use of water from April 1st, 1884, to April 1st, 1885, was as follows:

The income from water works for the past year is reported as being \$154,308.09.

The city of Providence, R. I., has a population about the same as our own city, and the water works system of each was constructed at about the same time, and I desire to call your attention to the following suggestive comparative statistical table in relation to the water works of the two cities:

The foregoing statement is a very suggestive one, and the following inferences, it seems to me, can fairly be deduced therefrom:

First—That the average daily use of water per capita in this city, is nearly double the amount which may fairly be considered a full and adequate supply for our population, and the conclusion inevitably follows that the surplus use is in fact a waste, which has a tendency to reduce the pressure in the water mains which is needed for the suppression of fires and for carrying a water supply to the upper stories of our highest buildings. It also follows as a conclusion, that the officers in charge of the water works will be derelict in duty if they do not apply the needed correction in this matter.

Second—The statement alluded to also seems to clearly point out the remedy for this waste of water, and that is the general application of meters to the water services. In Providence 54 per cent. of the services are metered, while in Rochester less than 7 per cent. are metered.

Third—The fact that the receipts for water in Providence are nearly double those in Rochester, and those receipts are derived from the sale of only about one-half the amount sold in Rochester, or in other words, we sell twice as much water and for it only receive one-half as much money as in Providence, indicates that we do not receive an adequate compensation for the water furnished, or that a large amount is furnished for which no compensation is received. For any public city use of water no credits are made to the water receipts. It would seem, as a matter of justice to the

water works department, that a fair amount should be credited to that fund each year for city uses.

It is suggested, also, that the rates now charged for water used for purely commercial purposes should be so adjusted as to fairly represent the cost of furnishing the same, and that if any water is furnished to citizens at exceptionally low rates, it shall be that furnished for domestic uses only.

The introduction of pure water into this city has proved of untold value to our citizens both financially and in a sanitary point of view, and our works should be fostered and maintained at the highest point of efficiency.

The water litigation is progressing to a final, and I trust satisfactory, conclusion.

LAW DEPARTMENT.

A pretty good idea of the amount and character of the litigation which the city has had on hand the past twelve months, may be formed by a careful perusal of the report of the law committee recently submitted to the Common-council. But that report does not by any means tell the whole story. While it refers to the more important litigated cases, I desire to make brief allusion to the work of minor interest performed by the city attorney's office, as giving insight to some things with which the public are not generally familiar.

It appears that forty actions have been begun during the year to enforce the payment of back taxes by foreclosure. All but a very few of these cases have been settled, resulting in the payment into the treasury of a large sum of money. It is thought that not more than two or three of the actions thus begun will proceed to final judgment and sale, and in these cases sale under decree of the court is desired by the parties interested, for the purpose of perfecting the title.

At the instigation of the overseer of the poor, proceedings have been instituted in the municipal court in seventeen cases, to determine the paternity of unfortunate infants, which are chargeable upon the city. But few of these cases have come to trial, the majority of them having been settled either by the marriage of the parties most interested, or by the payment by the defendant of an amount sufficient to relieve the city from all expense.

There have also been several cases tried in the police court for non-support of family. Upon the bonds given by the defendant, upon conviction in such cases, there have been four prosecutions in the municipal court, all of which have been settled before trial, except the case of the overseer against William B. Shelly and another, in which the plaintiff received a judgment of \$500 and costs. This case was appealed to the county court where the judgment was affirmed. An appeal will be taken by the defendant to the general term.

The city-attorney has prosecuted several actions in the Municipal court, under directions from the board of health, for the recovery of penalties for the violation of the ordinance relating to nuisances.

Prosecutions have also been had in the municipal and police courts for the violation of the ordinances relating to street signs, obstructions on sidewalks, milk licenses, disorderly houses, the erection of buildings and the sale of jewelers' goods at auction.

Several actions to recover penalties for the violation of the rules of the Executive board with reference to the use and management of the water works, have also been tried in the municipal court, as have two actions to recover the contract price of labor and material furnished to parties by the Executive board.

The city attorney also has defended two actions brought in the municipal court against the Board of education by the trustee of school district No. 1 of the town of Irondequoit. One of these actions was brought to recover the rent of the school house formerly in the town of Irondequoit, but taken into the city by the extension of the city limits in 1874. The other action was to recover \$500 damages for the wrongful conversion by the defendant of the library and school furniture in said building at the time it came into the possession of the defendant. The plaintiff was beaten in both cases but has appealed in the action for conversion to the county court.

During the year several actions to recover damages for injury to property, alleged to have been caused by the negligence of the city, or its employees, have also been tried in the municipal court.

It will thus be seen that the legal business of the city has furnished abundant employment for those who are engaged in conducting it, and I embrace this opportunity to pay tribute to City Attorney Beckley and his able assistant, Mr. Slocum, for the faithful and generally successful manner in which they have performed their duties.

MUNICIPAL COURT.

The amount of fees received by this court and paid into the treasury of the city for the year ending March 31, 1885, was \$3,409.16. In this amount is not included fees in the actions brought for and against the city and which number about sixty-five cases. The number of actions brought during the said year was 4,253 and the judgments recovered aggregate \$98,976.56. A conscientious discharge of duty and faithful devotion to work characterize the young gentlemen comprising this court.

During the year there were fifty-seven streets sprinkled under ordinances of the Common-council, at a cost of \$17,707.47. This amount was raised by local assessment.

STREET NUMBERING.

The subject of re-numbering the various buildings in the city was first presented to the Common-council in the year 1882, and an appropriation of \$5,000 was made with which to prosecute the work. The field work and the necessary maps, after several months of labor, were completed in the spring of 1883; 33,183 numbers having been duly mapped. The total cost of this work was \$4,336.07 and the same has been most satisfactorily performed under the direction of City Surveyor Peacock. The corrected numbers (16,977 in the aggregate) were placed in position during the spring of 1884 by Mr. Wm. Huddy, the contractor, at a cost of 12 cents each. The amount expended (\$2,037.24) was paid from the contingent fund, and this sum will again find its way into the treasury of the city as the same is to be collected from the various individuals with the general tax on their property for the year 1885.

From the annual report of the chief engineer of the

FIRE DEPARTMENT

many interesting facts are to be gleaned. The total number of alarms sounded for the year ending March 31, 1885, was one hundred and thirty, an increase of thirty-one over the previous year.

The total number of permanent men in the department is sixty-four, and this force is augmented by the volunteer members of those famous organizations known as the Alerts, Protectives and Actives. The fire apparatus consists of six steam fire engines held in reserve, six two horse hose carts, one hand hose carriage, three hook and ladder trucks, one wheeled chemical engine, and one protective wagon for horses. There is on hand 19,000 feet of rubber-lined hose, 3,000 feet of which is new, and the balance, with the exception of 1,300 feet, is in serviceable condition. The number of horses in active service is twenty. The chief engineer recommends the purchase of 3,000 feet of additional hose and the organization of another hose company for duty in the outskirts of the city. The total expenditures by companies for the year, including salaries and all miscellaneous expenses, were \$50,159.76. During the past two years the fire alarm telegraph has been practically rebuilt, and as a matter of course, is in very superior order. The replacing of the old fire alarm boxes during the past year by new non-inteference boxes has entirely done away with confusion in the matter of alarms, and no purposely false alarms have been registered. The superintendent, Mr. Finnegan, recommends the purchase of seven new gongs

to take the place of the old ones now in use. Four new fire alarm boxes in needed localities have been erected during the past twelve months. The total expense of maintaining the fire department for the year was \$85,978.38.

THE WORK OF THE POOR DEPARTMENT.

During the year, 296 persons have been sent to the county house, eighty-five persons to St. Mary's hospital and forty-three persons to the City hospital. The number of children admitted to orphan asylums was sixty-three. The total amount of money paid to the various institutions of the city for the care of the sick poor, the aged and the infirm and the orphans, was \$30,836.65. This is an excess of \$2,300.68 over the sum paid the previous year for like purposes. The number of burial orders issued for adults was eighty, for children thirty-nine. The total cost of maintaining the department was \$64,554.25, an excess of \$11,125.92 over the amount paid for the year ending March 31, 1884. The winter just passed has been unusually long and severe, and the poor have been more dependent on charity than has been the case in some of the former years. The number of families receiving aid was nearly 200 greater than during the year previous, and this fact alone would to a great extent explain the increased cost. I have no doubt but that those in charge of the poor department labor to the best of their ability in endeavoring to economically administer its affairs, but until there is a radical change in the manner of disbursing relief there can be no reform tending to reduce expenses. The experience of past years abundantly prove the truthfulness of this assertion. We are traveling in the same rut which I may say we have always followed. Perhaps there is no relief for us, but I do not believe it. Patient study and inquiry as to what should be done will surely bring its reward, and I commit the matter to your hands in the full hope that you will at least try to solve the problem.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The work devolving upon this branch of our city government is constantly on the increase. I do not mean by this that crime is more prevalent than it has been, for such a statement would be unwarranted, but rather because of our constantly increasing growth and expansion comes a demand for police protection which cannot in all cases be ignored and, consequently, furnishing active employment for the ninety men constituting the force.

The following statement shows the transactions of the police department and police court from April 1, 1884, to April 1, 1885.

The excise commissioners have labored faithfully and honestly, and have shown excellent judgment in the discharge of their delicate and onerous duties. The amount of money turned into the treasury for the year ending April 30, 1885, was \$39,828.50. This is an increase over the amount received last year and nearly double the sum collected for licenses five years ago.

A message of this character giving a detailed account of the workings of a municipality, must necessarily abound in data and figures, and there is no department whose workings in such manner are more satisfactorily or truthfully explained than is

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH.

During the past year, under the direction of the board of health, 2,660 privies have been cleaned and nuisances in 212 cellars under private property have been so dealt with, as to render tenable the structures over them. Alleys, yards and barns to the number of 189 have been satisfactorily cleaned. Sewers under residences and blocks to the extent of forty-eight have been reconstructed and eleven stench trap supply places which had been without them. Fifty-seven complaints were lodged against persons who, to the disgust and annoyance of their neighbors, were harboring hogs, fowls, etc. These complaints received prompt and satisfactory attention. Notices warning people against contagious diseases were posted on 167 places of residence during the year, and as deemed necessary, 67 of the same, by order of the board of health, were after sickness or death thoroughly disinfected. The number of nuisances of all kinds abated was 3,661. The number of sewers flushed, of both private and public character, was 770. The total number of barrels of garbage collected from the 19th day of May, 1884, until April 1st last was 24,148.

The total number of births registered during the year was 2,060, of which 1,016 were males, 1,022 females, and to the extent of 22 no sex was given. 917 marriages were reported and 1,798 deaths. In the latter were embraced 423 children under one year of age, 308 between the ages of one and ten years, and 79 persons whose age in each instance exceeded 80 years.

And now as spring has come with balmy atmosphere let us see to it that it shall not bring germs of disease. Let us heed the oft repeated warning and prepare ourselves for the expected conflict. The accumulated refuse which has

been hoarded in the snow and ice of a prolonged winter will now be exposed to the warmth and moisture which are so favorable to decomposition. Each citizen is personally interested in the work of cleaning the yards, alleys and streets, and every family is vitally concerned in purifying its home from garret to basement. Let the cellars receive the first attention. No part of the house is more important to health than the cellar. Therefore it should be scrupulously clean. Cleanliness in all things, pure water and abundance of sunshine will help materially to ward off disease. Disease is not wont to lurk in places supplied with these necessities. Remove refuse from your premises. Keep the water supply pure, and throw open the shutters to the sunshine and you will do much to prevent disease and promote health. I repeat, then, that the public health depends largely upon the individual efforts of our citizens to remove filth and to provide pure air, pure water and abundance of sunlight in dwellings. Bear in mind the usefulness of that cheap and excellent disinfectant, copperas, and spare neither pains nor expense to provide sewer traps, to apply disinfectants and to use every means to make the purifying process complete in all of its details.

STREET LIGHTING.

This is always an interesting subject, and one with which the people are generally familiar.

There is no department of our city of greater importance and no fund to which tax payers more cheerfully contribute. Well lighted streets are what our citizens desire and for which they are willing to pay. There has been considerable discussion in Rochester the past year on this most important topic, the result of which has been advantageous to the city. The prices we are now paying for gas are of a satisfactory character and the contracts under which we are now operating, so far as gas is concerned, will not expire until July of next year. The kerosene lamps, generally unsatisfactory, but in some localities a matter, perhaps, of necessity, are being more cheaply maintained than has been the case for some years. The contract for electric lighting has a little more than three years to run at an annual expense of \$50,000. The total cost of lighting our city for the present year will be about \$95,000. We have in Rochester 1,950 gas lamps, 1,373 oil lamps and 305 electric lights. There is a variety of opinions as to what constitutes the best light for street purposes. The electric light is of an effective character, but the manner of its distribution should, if possible, be radically changed. The disfigurement of our streets by unsightly poles and numerous wires, to say nothing of the

dangerous character of the latter, is indeed unfortunate. In the streets of Boston, for example, no poles are allowed. The wires are in every instance run from buildings to neat iron posts, the latter being after the pattern of the one located at the corner of Main and Water streets in this city, and which was sent to us without charge by the Boston municipal authorities. Perhaps we have a right to hope that with the inventive genius of the American people, some plan will soon be devised to place all wires underground, and thus satisfactorily and effectively remedy what now constitutes a very great evil.

THE CIVIL SERVICE.

The popular demand for reform in the civil service having taken shape in legislative enactment, and rules and regulations for the carrying out of the same having been established by the proper authorities, it is the duty of all departments of the municipal government affected thereby, cheerfully to conform to the same. As strictly falling within the province of the council, I respectfully suggest that such appropriation shall be made by your body as may be necessary to cover the expenses and disbursements of the local examiners, and that sufficient compensation be allowed the secretary, Mr. George A. Benton, for the time which he is compelled to devote to a proper discharge of the duties incumbent upon him.

For lack of appropriation heretofore, those in charge have been embarrassed in their work, and, as the examiners serve without compensation, it is certainly proper that they should not be compelled also to provide personally for expenses incurred in the interest of the public.

FINANCIAL.

The total assessed valuation of real estate for the present year, as estimated by the assessors, will amount to a little less than \$39,000,000, and that of personal property to about \$3,000,000. The increase in the former over last year aggregates nearly \$1,500,000, while the increase in the assessed valuation of personal property is quite \$1,000,000. That our city has prospered is evidenced by the fact that more than 1,000 new dwellings and stores have been erected during the past twelve months. The increase of valuations noted above would naturally have a tendency to make taxes lower than they were last year, but the financial problem with which we now have to deal and which has grown out of the adoption by the people of an amendment to section 11 of article 8 of the constitution of this state, limiting the power of cities to contract debt, will, in all probability, necessitate our making calculations for the future that would swell the tax levy for this year to greater proportions than ever. For example, the amount required to pay bonds

due and interest on bonded debt less the estimated amount of receipts over expenditures from water works and which amount is applicable to the payment of interest is about \$300,000. The sum required for current expenses and to meet deficiency notes, will aggregate \$884,000. Now, if we shall be required to make provisions this year for the payment of bonds and interest falling due in January and February next, the further sum of \$207,000 must be provided for. This will swell the amount of the tax levy to \$1,400,000 or thereabouts. It may be possible, as has been done in the past, to carry some portion of the amount above stated over into next year, but this custom is an evil which affords but temporary relief, and consequently in the long run, so to speak, is of no benefit whatever. The adoption of the amendment to which I have referred, limits a city of over 100,000 inhabitants to raise for current expenses a sum not exceeding two per centum of the assessed valuation of its real and personal estate. Therefore, if our total valuations are \$42,000,000, we will be permitted to raise for the purpose mentioned the sum of \$840,000. The question is one of great seriousness and must constantly be kept in mind. That a rigid economy must be practiced is very plain, and nothing short of the most judicious management and a carefully considered calculation faithfully carried out, will save us from the most serious embarrassment in the future. We have now fairly entered upon another year. Let us apply ourselves faithfully to the duties devolving upon us, that when those duties are ended we may look with pride and satisfaction upon what has been accomplished.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Your Finance Committee in submitting the tax levy for 1885-6 deems it proper to make some suggestions in connection therewith.

The amount of the proposed tax levy is \$1,249,538.76 while last year's tax levy was \$1,244,013.25, the increase being \$5,525.51. Your committee hoped and expected to be able to submit a tax levy for an aggregate amount considerably less than last year. It is impossible, consistent with an honest provision for absolute necessities and in accordance with prudent business principles to reduce the tax levy for this year below the amount named. Of course, estimates for the smaller amounts for the various funds might be made, as has in many instances been the custom, with the certainty of being compelled to borrow money to make up deficiencies, which in turn would have to be taken care of in the following year's tax levy. Your committee has spent a great amount of time and earnest effort to ascertain the lowest possible amount which will be required by the various departments, and having decided what that amount is, has placed it in the tax levy. These amounts have been fixed upon as representing the sums for which the various departments can be with rigid economy conducted without having any deficiency to provide for next year. This course your committee regards as not only the honest one to pursue, but the only proper course in view of the possible difficulty of borrowing money when the recent amendment to the constitution shall apply to this city.

In presenting this tax levy, your committee desires to impress upon each committee and department the necessity of expenditures being confined within the appropriations. Your committee, being charged with general oversight of the finances of the city, proposes to do everything in its power to limit

expenditure to the amount appropriated as an outside limit. The garment must be cut according to the cloth. If the people hereafter complain because deprived of advantages which a larger expenditure would bring, they will understand that compensation will result to them and all other taxpayers by the fact that their servants, the officials of this city, are not exceeding appropriations in expenditure, and that therefore and thereby taxes will be assessed.

The tax levy as presented represents the total expenditure of the coming year. Tax levies under the custom heretofore existing, have been made with the knowledge that money must be borrowed with which to complete the payment of the year's expenses. We have endeavored to meet the situation frankly and fully, though by adopting the course observed in the past an apparent saving could be effected at a real loss.

with the certificate of the action taken by the committee upon the same, to the Board. No such account, claim, contract or other matter shall be ordered paid unless it be accompanied by such affidavit and approval of the committee, as aforesaid, and until the next regular meeting after the same shall have been reported to this Board by said committee.

Your Assessment Committee submits the following report upon two matters referred to it by this Board.

John Duffner claims that when he bought lots 12 and 13, Gorham tract, on Gorham street, he obtained tax searches on said lots, but that an assessment for repairing a walk which was assessed on said lot about the year 1870, was not placed on the search. Said lot was sold for said assessment in March, 1871, the total amount of said assessment, as the same stands on the sale register being the sum of \$13.70. Mr. Duffner has lately ascertained that the certificate for said sale is held by said city while he supposed that no tax lien existed on said property. He has paid all other taxes and assessments and is willing to pay the face of said assessment, which includes all expenses which the city has paid. Your committee is of the opinion that the prayer of Mr. Duffner should be granted, and therefore submit the accompanying resolution.

Lots Nos. 12⁶ and 127, west side of Elizabeth street, were sold for the general city tax of 1882 to John Gleichauf. Said tax was against the heirs of M. W. Kirby and was for \$10,000 personal property and \$5,000 real estate tax. The lot at the time of the tax was held under contract by the present owner, who purchased of said M. W. To the Honorable, the Common Council of the city of Rochester, N. Y.:

GENTLEMEN: Your Assessment Committee, to which was referred the matters relating to the reassessment for the improvement of Oak street, hereby reports:

Your Committee has given a careful and patient hearing to all parties who complain of the proposed reassessment upon the property fronting on Oak street.

Your Committee is aware that under the plan which has been adopted great injustice will in fact in many cases be done to property owners upon said street. Your Committee is, however, satisfied that as far as the strict legal rights of the city is concerned, the plan of making the reassessment which was provided for by the ordinance, is correct. The difficulty that presents itself is this: Credits have been given on the assessments only in cases where the payments made were made by those who are at present the owners of the land assessed. In cases, therefore, where a former owner made one or more payments, the present owner does not obtain credit therefor on the reassessment, and, hence, is called upon to pay for the expense of an improvement which, at the time of his purchase, he supposed was paid in whole, or in part. It is fair to assume that in every case where a sale of property on that street has been made, the one who sold obtained from the purchaser a greater price than he would have received if the improvement had not been made, and yet a present owner must, under the plan adopted, pay the reassessment, not receiving credit for the amounts paid by the former owner.

Your committee is advised that most, if not all, of the former owners of property who received from the city the amount heretofore paid by them with interest, will assign their claims against the city by virtue of payments made to the present owners of the lands to be assessed. If this be done, it will enable the assessors to credit upon the respective lots all payments heretofore made, with interest, as though the former owners were the present owners.

Your committee, therefore, recommends that the further consideration of said assessment roll be postponed to the next regular meeting for the purpose of enabling present owners of property to obtain from their grantors or from those who have made payments upon old assessments, assignments of their claims against the city to the extent of the amount to be reassessed, leaving any surplus above such amounts to be recovered of the city by such former owners.

Your committee respectfully suggests to the owners of property upon said street that they at once proceed to obtain such assignments with a view of having this vexed matter satisfactorily settled and adjusted by the Common Council at its next meeting. Respectfully submitted.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Police, Excise and Markets submits the following:

Subdivision 19 of section 40 of the charter provides that the Common Council may from time to time appoint a competent person, and fix his compensation, whose duty it shall be to test and inspect articles of food, whenever the sale thereof is regulated by ordinance or license, for the purpose, and to the end that unwholesome, impure or adulterated meats, vegetables, fruits, fish, poultry, milk and food shall not be sold or exposed for sale in this city. Under this provision the Common Council has heretofore adopted ordinances regulating the vending of milk, meat and other articles of food, and has appointed a milk inspector.

In view of the fact that much complaint has been made to the Common Council, and to this Committee, with reference to the sale of unwholesome meat in some of the markets of the city, as well as of the sale of impure and adulterated articles of diet, your Committee is of the opinion that, in addition to the duties heretofore performed by the milk inspector, he should be required to test all articles of food, the sale of which is regulated by license, and also to test and inspect other articles of food whenever he shall deem such action advisable, with a view of reporting to the City Attorney any violation of the statutes of the State with reference to the sale of adulterated or impure food, to the end that action may be taken under such statutes, and under the charter and ordinance of the city, by prosecution, or otherwise, as may be deemed advisable.

The proper performance of the additional duties here suggested will require a great amount of labor on the part of the milk inspector, but your Committee is of the opinion that if he should give his entire time to the performance of his duty as milk inspector and inspector of other articles of food, that much good would result, and thereby the appointment of an additional inspector could be avoided.

Your Committee therefore recommends that in addition to his duties as milk inspector, there be imposed upon the milk inspector the duty of inspecting other articles of food on sale in the city, and to report to the City Attorney any violation of law which may be committed by any dealer under the statutes of the State, the charter and the ordinances of this city regulating the sale of unwholesome, impure or adulterated articles of food; and that for the performance of such additional duties the milk inspector be paid in addition to the salary which he now receives the sum of \$300.

GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee hereby recommends the payment of the judgment recovered by James H. Hooker against the city of Rochester, which judgment was docketed in Monroe County Clerk's office on the 9th day of October, 1884, for \$110 damages and \$163.05 costs, for the following reasons:

This judgment was recovered in a second action brought by Mr. Hooker to recover damages sustained by him by reason of the pollution of a stream running through his farm by the emptying therein of the North avenue outlet sewer. The first action, which was tried, was brought to recover \$13,000, and in that case the plaintiff obtained a verdict of \$600. An appeal was taken from the judgment in that action which appeal was argued at the last General Term, and is as yet undecided.

The second action, being the one in which the verdict of \$110 was recovered, was brought to recover \$10,000 damages. Your committee does not think it advisable to take this case by appeal to the General Term. If a new trial should be granted the plaintiff would probably recover more than the amount of the verdict on the first trial, and in view of the fact that the same questions are presented in the appeal taken in the first action, it is not worth while to involve the city in the costs of the appeal of the second action.

Your committee therefore recommends the adoption of a resolution providing for the payment of this judgment, the amount whereof with interest being \$283.06.

GENTLEMEN—Your Law Committee submits the following: Several years ago William S. Little brought an action against the city to recover \$1,000, damages by reason of the overflow of the East avenue outlet sewer ditch in the town of Brighton, in consequence of which valuable nursery stock and property were destroyed.

Said action was referred to Judge Angle as referee and before him tried on behalf of the city by the late City Attorney, Mr. Fanning. Said referee reported in favor of the city, upon the ground that under the law the work done by the city in the deepening and construction of East avenue outlet sewer ditch beyond the city line was ultra vires, or beyond

the power of the corporation to legally perform, and that in consequence thereof the city was not liable to the plaintiff in damages for any consequence of such illegal action on the part of the city.

The defendant appealed from the judgment entered upon the report of the referee to the General Term, where the case was argued by Mr. Fanning on behalf of the City. The judgment was reversed, the Court holding, that the view taken of the law by Judge Angle was erroneous, and that the city was liable to the plaintiff for the damages sustained. The General Term directed that the case be tried before another referee. The action was thereupon referred to Theodore Bacon, Esq., who assessed the damages, including interest to the date of his report, at \$910.03. Judgment was docketed April 16, 1885, for \$910.02 damages and \$411.24 costs, making a total of \$1,321.26. The interest on such judgment to May 20, 1885, is \$7.47, making a total amount of \$1,328.73.

As no question could be presented before the last referee under the decision of the General Term, except the one of the amount of damages, your committee is of the opinion that the judgment docketed should be paid.

Wherefore your Committee recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

From the Board of Education—
Commissioner Moody, from the Finance Committee, presented the following report:

To the Board of Education:

GENTLEMEN: Your Finance Committee, together with the various committees requiring the use of funds in the administration of our schools, have met and carefully considered the amounts that will be necessary for the proper performance of the work committed to each for the ensuing year; and with a view to economy in the management of our schools, have agreed to ask the Common Council for the following sums:

For teachers' wages.....	\$113,291 00
For building, per charter.....	15,000 00
For repairs, per charter.....	10,000 00
For contingent expenses.....	54,000 00
Total.....	\$192,291 00

It will be borne in mind that the population of our city is constantly and rapidly increasing, and with it the school population also in a like proportion. The increase of pupils in the average enrollment since last year at this time is shown to be 522. Here are pupils enough for a large school, requiring the employment of thirteen or fourteen additional teachers. This fact will readily explain the occasion for the asking for a slight increase in the amount for teachers' wages. As will be seen by a reference to the amounts asked for last year, the total is thirty-nine thousand six hundred dollars less. The amount asked for, for contingent expenses, is \$4,959 less than last year.

The amount authorized by the charter for building and repairs is \$15,000 and \$10,000 respectively. In view of the extra amount that was granted by the Council last year for building, and the promise of an unusually large tax levy for the year, as well as for the general demand for economy and the administration of the city's affairs, your committee have thought best to ask for only the regular amount for building purposes, although it is necessary to maintain annexes at Nos. 10, 13, 17, 20, 24 and 27, while, in several of the school buildings the halls are used as recitation rooms, and at No. 6 it has been necessary to divide the three 9th grade into two classes one class being in attendance in the morning and the other in the afternoon.

Concerning the amount for repairs, it will be readily seen by even a superficial observer, that \$10,000 must be used in the most economical manner in order to keep twenty-nine school buildings in tolerable repair. The sums asked for, we regard as absolutely necessary to enable the Board of Education to properly discharge its duty to the patrons of our schools, and to the public generally; for our schools are a matter of interest and of pride, to all our citizens, whether patrons or not.

Therefore your committee feel that any less sum than the amount here certified to, would compel the Board to incur liabilities they would be unable to meet, or would seriously interfere with the progress and prosperity of our schools.

Subjoined will be found the sworn statement of the Superintendent as required by the charter.

S. A. Ellis, being duly sworn, says he is Superintendent of Schools of the city of Rochester, and that the average number of resident pupils enrolled in the several public schools of said city for the school year ending March 27, 1885, according to the verified monthly reports of the principals of said schools, was twelve thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven (12,797).

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: At the recent term of the County Court three actions in which the city is a party were tried. The first action was the case of Warner B. Bary against the city, in which the complaint demanded \$1,000 damages for injuries sustained by the plaintiff on the night of December 31, 1884, by falling on the sidewalk on the west side of Hudson street near the corner of Hope street. In this action the plaintiff was nonsuited. The second action tried was that of William Kavanagh against the city to recover \$1,000 for injuries sustained by the plaintiff by being thrown from a carriage on the night of April 19, 1883, into the canal at the swing bridge over the Genesee Valley canal on West avenue. In this action the jury rendered a verdict for the defendant under the direction of the court. The third action was that brought by Emily Clark against the city to recover \$1,000 damages for the flooding of her lot on Edward street by reason of changing the grade of said street pursuant to an ordinance for that purpose adopted by your honorable body in the month of May, 1882. The jury rendered a verdict for the plaintiff for \$300. A motion for a new trial was made, but has not yet been argued.

The case of John Cawthra against John Dean, a member of the police force, for false imprisonment and assault and battery, was also tried at the last term of the County Court. This action has been three times tried. The jury upon the first trial found for the plaintiff in the sum of \$70. On the second trial the jury disagreed, and upon a third trial a verdict for the plaintiff was rendered in the sum of \$75. In this case also a motion for a new trial has been made, which motion will be argued at an early day.

GENTLEMEN: Your Finance Committee calls attention to the following facts as bearing upon the recommendation herewith submitted:

The amount allowed to the Treasurer's office for salaries of all employees therein, including the Treasurer, was as follows for the years named: 1881, \$11,000; 1882, \$11,200; 1883, \$12,000; 1884, \$12,180. The amount allowed to said office for the same purposes for the coming year, as provided by the report of the Salary Committee adopted by your honorable body, is \$10,000.

The Treasurer states to your committee that the business of his office cannot be properly conducted on the appropriation which has been made for the coming year. Your committee has made a careful investigation for the purpose of determining what amount of money is the least sum for which the affairs of said office can be properly conducted. Your committee is satisfied that the appropriation of \$10,000 is inadequate, and that the work to be done in that office cannot be properly done for that amount.

Your Committee believes that the office of search clerk should be abolished, and that the duties now performed by the search clerk should be performed by the other employees in the office of the Treasurer. If this be done, and the appropriation be increased from \$10,000 to 10,900, the Treasurer thinks, and your committee believes, that the work in the office can be accomplished during the year in a proper manner. A comparison of the amounts allowed for the various years above specified tends to show that the reduction of the appropriation for the Treasurer's office was greater than should have been made. There is no economy in making such a scant appropriation as to cripple that office and prevent a proper performance of the necessary duties therein. An appropriation of \$10,900 for the coming year for that office would be \$100 less than in 1881; \$300 less than in 1882; \$1,100 less than in 1883, and \$1,280 less than in 1884.

Your Committee therefore recommends that the office of search clerk be abolished, and that the salary of \$1,000 appropriated therefor be allowed to the Treasurer for clerk hire, and that a further appropriation of \$900 for clerk hire be made, thus making the total appropriation for the office, including the salary of the Treasurer, \$10,900.

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

By Alderman Kelly—

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN—Your Special Committee, which was directed to make a report as to the best plan to pursue with reference to any local improvements which may hereafter be made, and to make suggestions as to any changes in the charter which can be made with a view of removing the difficulties which have heretofore existed in the matter of the collection of assessments for local improvements, hereby reports:

Of course any change in the plan of making local assessments, and in the payment of the expense thereof, must be made by legislative enactment, which cannot be accomplished until next winter.

The difficulty, which has heretofore existed under the charter, has been that contractors have been paid their cash orders and given acceptances previous to the confirmation of the assessment roll. In consequence of this the Treasurer has not been able to collect from the tax payer the various installments making up the expense of the improvement until some time after the city has been called upon to pay such expense to the contractors.

Your Committee, while of the opinion that no local assessments should be ordered to be paid for installments, except where absolutely necessary, believes that the difficulty complained of can be, in the main, done away with by the adoption of the resolution offered at the last meeting by Alderman Weider. If the provisions of such resolution should be executed, no money can be paid to a contractor until after the assessment roll for the improvement is in the hands of the Treasurer for collection. In all probability enough would be paid within ten or fifteen days by the taxpayers on the roll to enable the Treasurer to pay the cash orders without using any of the city funds, or borrowing any money for payment. If the acceptances also are issued after the confirmation of the assessment roll and made payable in one and two years respectively, such acceptances would fall due after the time when the second and third payments on the assessment roll respectively becomes due.

Your Committee is, therefore, of the opinion that said resolution should be adopted.

Gentlemen of the Common Council:

The resolution of Alderman Upton, adopted at your last regular meeting, providing for the payment of the finance budget, is hereby returned disapproved. My objection to said resolution is, because among other things, it provides for the payment of the salaries of E. Foster Hoyt and M. Kelly, two employees of the Board of Health, whose appointments were made in violation of law.

These persons each hold the position of health inspector and are faithful public servants, but chapter 354 of the laws of 1883, amended by chapter 410 of the laws of 1884, specifically state the manner in which persons who seek to enter the civil service of the State or that of cities shall be appointed. In the case of the persons whose names I have mentioned, not the slightest regard has been paid to a statute which to my mind is clearly applicable to them. The regulations prescribed by me pursuant to the statutes of this State for the admission of persons into the public service of this city exempt officers elected by the people, and the subordinates of any such officer for whose errors or violation of duty such officer is financially responsible, and the head or heads of any department of the city government and persons employed in or who seek to enter the public service under the educational departments of any city, and any subordinate officer, who by virtue of his office has personal custody of public moneys or public securities, for the safe keeping of which the head of an office is under official bonds, etc.

This clearly indicates that the officers or employees of the Board of Health come within the provisions of the said civil service law, and in view of the fact that no person in the civil service of Rochester whose position is subject to the law and the regulations which have been duly prescribed, is entitled to compensation, unless appointed pursuant thereto, prompts me at this time to call your attention to the irregularity which has been practiced, and prompts me to prevent, so far as the same may be in my power, the payment of salaries to persons illegally appointed to positions under the municipal government of Rochester.

GENTLEMEN—We, the undersigned, respectfully request your honorable body to pass the following ordinance, which we deem a protection to the honorable members of our trade, who desire that fairness and honorable dealing should be protected from the dishonest practices of such parties in the trade as would take advantage of their position to not furnish the legal weight of a ton of coal in this State, which is 2,000 lbs.

The following is a copy of the ordinance which was passed in the City of Buffalo, which we would respectfully submit to you with the hope that you will pass it and enforce it at your earliest convenience.

Alderman Drake, from the Committee on Ordinances, reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution:

That Chapter — of the City Ordinances be amended by adding thereto the following:

OF THE SALE AND WEIGHING OF COAL.

Section 2. The legal standard ton of coal in the city of Buffalo shall be 2,000 lbs.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of every vender of coal to send, with each and every load or part of a load of coal sold by such vender a card or ticket which shall indicate on its face, in plain characters, the vender's name, the date of delivery, and the weight of the coal contained in the cart or other vehicle in which it is being transported, and the weight of such cart or vehicle.

Section 4. Any vender of coal violating such provision or being found selling or delivering any load of coal without such card or ticket, or refusing to allow the weights to be tested, as provided in the following section, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of not less than five (5) dollars nor more than ten (10) dollars for every such violation.

Section 5.—It shall be the duty of the Sealer of Weights and Measures and of police officers, from time to time, and whenever they suspect that the quantity of coal being transported for sale does not correspond with the amount indicated on the card or ticket aforesaid, or whenever requested by the purchaser of such load, to cause such load to be weighed upon any lawful scale most accessible for that purpose, and if, upon the weighing thereof, it shall be found that such load of coal is less than the net amount indicated upon such card or ticket, the vender furnishing such coal shall be liable to and shall forfeit and pay to the city of Buffalo a penalty of not less than ten (10) dollars, nor more than fifty (50) dollars for each and every offense. The Sealers of Weights and Measures shall be entitled to receive for any coal they may be called upon to weigh, a fee of twenty-five (25) cents per load, payable by the vender of such coal, unless, upon weighing such coal, it shall be found that the amount indicated upon such card or ticket is correct, or within one per cent. of the correct weight, in which case the vender of such coal shall not be liable to any expense or fee for weighing it.

Section 6.—Any scale which shall have been sealed in accordance with the ordinances pertain-

ing to weights and measures shall be deemed a lawful scale within the meaning and purpose of this chapter.

Section 7.—One-half of all the fines collected under the provisions of this chapter, shall be paid by the City Treasurer to the Commissioners of Police, to be added to the Police Life Insurance Fund.

Said bond shall also contain a stipulation or agreement that parties to whom the permission is hereby granted shall furnish upon the proper request of the city of Rochester, within three months after the mains or pipes are laid and their works are in operation, the requisite amount of gas necessary to light and heat any or all buildings occupied by said city, or any of its departments for public purposes, which front on any street, alley, avenue, public square or place through which said mains or pipes are laid at a price not to exceed seventy-five cents per thousand cubic feet for all the gas used by the city for public purposes during the period of ten years from date of the granting of this franchise.

Resolved, That this franchise is granted to J. Oscar Campbell, Charles A. Keeler and Samuel Blodgett, and their associates or any corporation or association organized by them for supplying of such hydrogen gas, conditioned that the above provisions are fully complied with and pavements are replaced with the same material with which they are already paved.

Resolved, That permission shall extend and is hereby given to any corporation or association now or hereafter organized by J. Oscar Campbell, Charles A. Keeler and Samuel Blodgett and their associates for furnishing hydrogen gas for the purposes hereinbefore stated. Gentlemen of the Common Council:

I have learned, that a few weeks ago, your Committee on Police, Excise and Markets, or a majority thereof, at a meeting held, appointed Maurice Moynihan, Clerk of the Excise Board. Until the Common Council had taken action tending to ratify the selection of Mr. Moynihan, I have not felt called upon in any manner to interfere. The law, however, does not confer upon your Board or any committee thereof, the power to appoint a clerk to the Excise Commissioners. If it did, then clearly such official could only be appointed subject to the

tatute relating to the civil service. The wise provisions of this law seem also in this case to have been entirely lost sight of.

At your meeting held June 16th, the action of the committee which assumed to appoint Mr. Moynihan to the clerkship mentioned, was virtually approved by the adoption of the following resolution:

By Alderman Bronson—

Resolved, That the salary of Maurice Moynihan, Clerk of the Excise Commissioners for the ensuing year, be and is hereby fixed at \$32.50 per month. The appointment (if such it can be called) of Mr. Moynihan has been illegally made, and I hereby return disapproved the resolution fixing his compensation, with the notification to you that any resolution hereafter adopted for the payment of salary to him will also meet with my disapproval.

At your last regular meeting a communication addressed to your Honorable body, signed by James P. Henry, in behalf of the Flower City Zouaves, was received and incorporated in the minutes of that meeting. The same related to a proper celebration of the Fourth day of July and an invitation was extended to the members of your Board to participate therein, and said invitation was very properly accepted. Immediately after this acceptance, the following action was taken:

Alderman Foley moved that an appropriation of \$50 for the proper observance of the 4th of July, be voted to the Flower City Zouaves.

Adopted, etc.

The object of this communication is to state that I disapprove of that portion of your proceedings which relates to the appropriation of the said sum of fifty dollars. A careful perusal of Mr Henry's document fails to show that the company he represents has asked or desired from the city an appropriation of any amount whatever for the celebration mentioned.

It seems to have been a free-will offering of a majority of the members of your board of money which you had no right to give, and because of the illegality of your action the said resolution or motion as it may be termed, is hereby returned disapproved.

 From the Milk Inspector—
 To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: I submit herewith a report of my inspection of milk and the markets of the City of Rochester from June 8 to June 30, inclusive:

This report is presented in pursuance of a resolution adopted by your honorable body at its last meeting.

I may say, in brief, that I found the markets, fruit-stands, etc., examined in good condition and cleanly and properly conducted.

The milk examined was, in the main, found to be of good quality and unadulterated. In one case, that of John Markel, of Irondequoit, I found, upon examination, that the milk in his cans being offered for sale on the 11th day of June, contained eighty per cent only of pure milk. I turned all the milk in his cans into the gutter.

In some other cases I found that the test of the milk showed ninety-two. Milk of this quality is not up to the standard, and the persons selling the same have been notified that the quality of the milk sold by them must be improved, or that I shall proceed against them.

In this connection I deem it proper to call the attention of your honorable body to the situation, so far as prosecutions are concerned, under the ordinance providing for the inspection of milk. Comparatively few of those engaged in selling milk within the city have paid any license fee. This failure to pay is not due to any lack of effort on my part, but rather in the legal difficulties in the way of enforcing collections. Actions have been brought by the City Attorney under my instructions against persons who have failed to take out a license, and such actions have been tried resulting in the decision against the city. The ground of the decision is that the ordinance under which licenses are demanded, is held by the court to be an ordinance intended to produce revenue to the city from the sale of a necessary article of food. The court holds that such an ordinance, intended to accomplish such a purpose, is void. An appeal has been taken from the actions tried, and it is expected that the question will be passed upon by the General Term of the Supreme Court at its next session, which is to be held in October.

In the meantime I would recommend that the subject of a revision of the ordinance intended for the protection of the public against the sale of impure and adulterated milk be referred to the Charter Amendment Committee with a view of having an ordinance prepared under which the city can compel all milk dealers and market-men to take out a license, with a view of thereby regulating the vending of food in the city and preventing the sale of impure and adulterated food. If each milk-peddler and market-man in the city was required to obtain a license, for which a nominal sum can properly be charged, it would be comparatively an easy matter to regulate them in the conduct of their business. If such licenses are taken out, a record can be kept showing their location, nature of business, etc., and the business of inspection can be much more successfully carried on.

I shall be glad to appear before any committee of your honorable body to which this question may be referred with a view of making suggestions that have occurred to me during my term of office. Pending the appeal which has been above referred to, I have, under the advice of the City Attorney, not proceeded against any other milkmen for failure to pay a license fee, but have devoted my time to the inspection of milk offered for sale in the city, attended to complaints which have from time to time been made, and, in general, done that which I thought would tend to improve the quality of milk offered for sale.

Rochester: that he has commenced the construction of several dwelling houses on said lots and that he desires to extend into each of these houses a service connected with the city water mains in order to procure water for the occupants thereof;

That as he is informed that the Executive Board have no moneys which can be used to extend a water main into said Boardman street, he desires to make the following offer to the Common Council:

That he will, under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Executive Board, extend a six inch cast-iron water pipe into said Boardman street, a distance of about three hundred and eighty feet at his own expense, provided the City of Rochester, will, after the adoption of the tax levy for 1886, reimburse him an amount equal to the cost of said extension without interest, the said cost to be determined by the Executive Board or the Chief Engineer of the Water Works.

Also that he will file a majority petition for extension of the Water Works in said Boardman street immediately so that the lots adjacent thereto shall become liable for taxation for Water Works purposes to the extent required by existing laws.

Alderman Mandeville, from the Finance Committee, submitted the following:

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: The Executive Board and your Finance Committee, to which was referred the subject matter of the necessary provisions to be made with reference to local improvements, and the payment of the expense thereof, hereby report: It will be remembered that the subject referred to us was suggested by reason of the amendment to the Constitution recently adopted prohibiting the creation of any indebtedness on the part of a municipality of one hundred thousand or more inhabitants in excess of ten per cent. of its assessed valuation. It was supposed at the time the subject was first suggested that a State Census

would soon be taken, which, it was expected, would show a population in this city of more than one hundred thousand people. It was, and is known that if such should be the fact, it would be difficult, if not impossible, to obtain any money whatsoever upon the notes or other obligations issued by the city in excess of the limit fixed by said amendment. For this reason, therefore, it became a matter of very great importance to arrange in some way for the payment of the expense of local improvements by the city after, and not until after, the assessments therefor should be collected. While an enumeration of the inhabitants of this State is not to be taken until after the first of January next, such enumeration will not probably be long postponed, and, therefore, it is advisable that action should be taken with a view of averting an evil, rather than to wait until the evil is upon us. The portion of the charter relating to local improvements is somewhat indefinite in its provisions. The plan which has been adopted under that part of the charter has been to pay on one payment rolls the whole amount of the expense of the improvement to the contractor previous to the ordering of the assessment roll. On three and five payment rolls the cash payments have been made to the contractor, and the time orders have been issued previous to the ordering of the assessment rolls. The consequence has been that the treasurer has been constantly called upon to pay on orders and obligations issued previous to the time when any money whatsoever was available on the respective assessment-rolls. Naturally and necessarily the result has been that a large sum has accumulated by way of advances on local assessments, which advances the Common Council has, under authority of the Legislature, been compelled to make provision for by the issuing of Funding Bonds.

If the time of payment to contractors in some manner be postponed to a time when the assessment rolls for the respective improvements shall be collected, the necessity of raising money on the paper of the city by reason of local improvements will be obviated. We think the plan suggested in the accompanying resolution, if adopted, will accomplish the result sought. The plan, briefly, is this: Make all cash payments to contractors for local improvements, costing more than one thousand dollars, due six months after the date when by the terms of the contract the work is to be completed. Make the orders issued by the Executive Board for second and third payments on three payment rolls, payable respectively in one year and six months, and in two years and six months from the time when the contract provides that the work is to be completed, but the orders to draw interest respectively for one and two years only. Authorize the making of no five payment rolls. It is believed that this plan, if adopted, will not only be advantageous to the city, but just to the contractor and to the property owner who is called upon to pay for the expense of local improvements. The reason for suggesting that no five payment rolls be ordered is that the charter does not authorize the issuing of notes for the purpose of raising money with which to pay the contractor, except as such notes are payable within two years. Furthermore it is thought that any improvements which are likely to be undertaken during the coming year can be as well paid for by the property owner in three instalments as in five. We therefore recommend the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

When the total cost of said work is limited to two thousand dollars by the ordinance therefor, and exceeds the sum of one thousand dollars, to issue from time to time in payment for said work, orders on the City Treasurer, payable in cash, without interest, in six months after the date fixed in the contract for the completion of the work. When the total cost of said work under an ordinance therefor, exceeds the sum of two thousand dollars, to issue from time to time in payment for said work, orders on the City Treasurer to an amount equal in the aggregate to one-third of the cost, payable in cash, without interest, in six months after the date fixed in the contract for the completion of the work; also orders to an amount equal in the aggregate to one-third of the cost, payable in eighteen months after the date fixed for the completion of the work, together with interest on same for one year at the rate of six per cent. per annum; also orders to an amount equal, in the aggregate, to one-third of the cost, payable in two and one-half years after the date fixed for the completion of the work, together with interest on same for two years at the rate of six per cent. per annum.

Whereas, The Common Council has duly caused notice of said application, and that the same would be first considered at the meeting of this Council held June 30, 1885, and adjourned to this time, to be printed in two daily newspapers of this city, designated by the Mayor, for fourteen days.

Resolved, That the consent of the city of Rochester, subject to the approval of the Mayor, is hereby given that the Rochester City & Brighton Railroad Company may construct, maintain, operate and extend lines and branches of its surface railroad upon streets of the city of Rochester of follows:

A single track branch from the Lake avenue tracks of your petitioner from the intersection of McCracken street and Lake avenue northerly upon and along the east side of Lake avenue between the curb stone and side walk to the crossing of said street by the city boundary line:

And the like consent is hereby given for the construction and operation of such switches, sidings, turn-outs and turn-tables, and suitable stands in connection with said extension and tracks as may be necessary for the convenient working of the railroad. The consent hereinbefore granted, June 30, 1885 now reconsidered, and by this resolution renewed, is given upon the express condition that each and every of the provisions of an act to provide for the construction, extension, maintenance and operation of street surface railroads, and branches thereof, in cities, towns and villages, passed May 6, 1884, by the Legis-

lature of the State of New York, and known as chapter 252 of the Laws of New York of the year 1884, shall be complied with so far as the same are pertinent to the construction, maintenance, operation, use and extension of the lines and branches of surface railroad to which consent is hereby given.

GENTLEMEN—Your Assessment Committee, to which was referred the petition of taxpayers on Hibbard street, requesting relief from the alleged assessment for the German street sewer, respectfully report:

The ordinance for the construction of a sewer in Hibbard street contemplated the emptying of said sewer into the German street sewer. After the contract had been let and the work begun on the Hibbard street sewer, it was discovered that a large water main three feet in diameter, obstructed the passage of the Hibbard street sewer into German street. This fact necessitated the abandonment of the Hibbard street sewer, or the deepening of the sewer sufficiently to allow it to run under said water main, and the consequent deepening of the German street sewer as well.

It appears from statements made to your Committee that the Executive Board, before taking any further action in the matter, sought to obtain an expression of opinion from the taxpayers assessed for the improvement, and it was the unanimous wish of the residents of Hibbard street that the improvement should be carried through. The work of deepening both sewers was, therefore, done, and now some of the Hibbard street residents wish to avoid the payment of their assessment. The entire expense of the construction of the sewer, including the deepening on the German street sewer, was within the original estimate.

Your Committee is of the opinion that the petitioners are not entitled to the relief asked for in their petition, and, therefore, report adversely thereon.

GENTLEMEN: Your Assessment Committee, to whom was referred the petition of Hiram Barker for relief from the erroneous assessment upon lot 49 of the Jacob Keyle tract for unpaid water rents, respectfully reports that it has made a careful examination of the facts set forth in the petition and finds they are substantially as follows:

In the spring of 1883 the Executive Board delivered to the Assessors a statement of unpaid water rents for the year 1882, placed by said Board against said

lot 49. Said statement contained a large number of unpaid water rents which should have been properly assessed against other and adjoining lots of the same tract, and which amounted in the aggregate to the sum of \$469.97. Said sum of \$469.97 was thereupon by the Assessors placed upon the assessment rolls for the general city tax for 1883 as unpaid water rents upon said lot 49.

In March, 1884, neither said water rents or the general city tax for 1883, having been paid upon said lot, the Treasurer sold the said lot to John Gleichauf for the sum of \$531.89, that being the amount of general city taxes for 1883 and the said water rents already assessed to said lot, together with interest, costs and expenses of sale.

The lot in question has recently changed hands, and is now owned by Mr. W. H. St. John. He is desirous to have his lot released from the lien of said erroneous assessment for water rents, and is willing to pay the general city tax for 1883, amounting to \$16.59 with interest.

Your committee therefore recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee hereby reports upon the claims of Martha Hussey and John C. Donovan, as follows:

The petition of Martha Hussey shows that she is the owner of certain real estate situated at the corner of White and Cliff streets; that in the spring of 1884 she constructed through a portion of said real estate, for her own purposes, and at her own expense, a stone arched covered sewer.

The claim is made that the city has unlawfully turned the White street sewer into the petitioner's said private sewer to her great damage. The petitioner asks to be reimbursed for the expense which she has incurred and paid out in and about the construction of her said private sewer to the amount of about one thousand dollars.

Your committee reports adversely upon said claim.

John C. Donovan asks the city to pay him a reasonable sum for damages sustained by him by reason of a fall on an icy sidewalk in front of the Opera House on St. Paul street in February last, which resulted in a broken leg.

From the evidence before your committee it does not appear that the Executive Board of Sup-

erintendent of Streets had any notice of the dangerous condition of the walk before the accident occurred.

For this reason your committee is of the opinion that the city is not liable, and therefore reports adversely upon said claim.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

A communication from the Mayor in relation to the gas burners for the public lamps was received and referred to the Lamp Committee.

To the Hon. the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with the resolution adopted by your honorable body at your last regular meeting, in accordance with the recommendation of the Executive Board, directing the City Surveyor to prepare an ordinance for replacing the old wooden bridge over Deep Hollow on Locust street, I would respectfully report as follows, viz: As the Executive Board in its communication to the Common Council evidently contemplated a structure of a permanent character to replace the old one, but as in the language of the resolution this was left in some doubt, it was deemed best to consider three plans for making the improvement in question and to make three corresponding and closely approximate estimates for them, to be submitted to your honorable body for further instructions before drawing up an ordinance for any of them.

The first plan would be for a wooden bridge similar to the present structure, with improved approaches, and would cost six hundred and sixty-five (\$665) dollars.

The second plan would be a wrought iron deck or sub-trussed bridge, the total cost of which, including abutments and approaches, would be twenty-eight hundred (\$2,800) dollars.

The third plan of making the improvement would be by constructing a stone culvert one hundred (100) feet long, across the street and along the entire line of Deep Hollow, with suitable retaining walls at right angles with the length of the culvert and filling in with an earth embankment. The cost of this would be about thirty-two hundred and twenty-five (\$3,225) dollars.

The first plan, though by far the least expensive, would necessarily be a temporary expedient, and would not meet the purpose plainly implied in the communication of the Executive Board and the resolution of the Common Council.

Of the three plans I would recommend that of the iron bridge, but of this as well as that of the culvert the assessment for the cost would fall heavily upon those who would properly be called upon to meet it.

Glenwood avenue on the north side of Locust street already extends over Deep Hollow and it is now proposed to improve this portion of it at a large expense. Emerson street, next south of Locust street has a culvert in Deep Hollow and the chasm over it has been filled in so as to be almost ready for traffic. It would therefore be hardly proper to assess the property on either Glenwood avenue or Emerson street or that on the north or south of them for the proposed improvement on Locust street.

In this connection it should be observed that the traffic over the Locust street bridge mainly comes from territory west of the Erie canal and by the bridge over the canal on Emerson street, turning to the north for a short distance to Locust street, and then through Locust street. When the Emerson street culvert bridge is completed, as will soon be the case, the larger part of this traffic will be diverted from Locust street. Very respectfully,

GENTLEMEN: The undersigned, who were appointed by order of the Monroe County Court, duly granted on the 27th day of April, 1885, commissioners to inquire into and determine to what damages and compensation the owners and occupants of the lands to be taken for the opening and extension of Campbell street in the city of Rochester will be entitled, do respectively report and certify their award of damages as incident to the opening and extension of said street, as follows:

The several pieces and parcels of land required for said improvement are described as follows:

Beginning at the southwest corner of Ames and Campbell streets, as at present laid out; thence running westerly along the south line of Campbell street about 316 feet to the west line of lot No. 119 of the German tract, as designated on a map of said German tract made by S. Cornell, and filed in Monroe County Clerk's office in July 1848; thence southerly along the west line of said lot No. 119, seventeen feet; thence easterly along a line parallel with the south line of Campbell street about 316 feet to the west line of Ames street; thence northerly along the west line of Ames street seventeen feet to the place of beginning.

These premises are owned by Caspar Fromm, of Rochester.

Also, all that tract or parcel of land described as follows: Beginning at the southwest corner of lot

No. 32 of the Moulson subdivision of the west part of town lot No. 66; thence northerly along the west line of said lot No. 32, twenty-three feet; thence easterly along a line parallel with the south line of said lot No. 32 about thirty-two feet; thence southerly along a line at right angles with the south line of said lot No. 32 twenty-three feet; thence westerly along the south line of said lot No. 32 about thirty-two feet to the place of beginning. These premises are owned by Catharine Bosolt, of Rochester.

Also, all that tract or parcel of land described as follows: Beginning at the southeast corner of lot No. 32 of Moulson's subdivision of town lot No. 66; thence running westerly along the south line of said lot No. 32 about 31½ feet; thence northerly along a line at right angles with the south line of said lot No. 32, 23 feet; thence easterly along a line parallel with the south line of said lot No. 32 about 31½ feet; thence southerly along the east line of said lot No. 32, 23 feet to the place of beginning. These premises are owned by Henry Kondolf of Rochester.

Also, all that tract or parcel of land described as follows: Beginning at the southwest corner of lot No. 33 of Moulson's subdivision of the west part of town lot No. 66; thence northerly along the west line of said lot No. 33, 23 feet; thence easterly along a line parallel with the south line of said lot No. 33 about 65 feet; thence southerly along the east line of said lot No. 33, 23 feet; thence westerly along the south line of said lot No. 33 about 65 feet to the place of beginning. These premises are owned by Valentine Welker and Margaret Welker of Rochester.

Therefore, we, the subscribers, the Commissioners, having been duly sworn as required by the statute in such case made and provided, and having all met and acted upon the matters submitted to us at the City Attorney's office in the City of Rochester, N. Y., pursuant to a notice of at least ten days published according to law, and having taken a view of every part of the premises affected by this proceeding and having inquired into and heard the allegations and proofs of the respective parties in interest, do determine and appraise the damages which the several owners and occupants of the lands and premises thus to be taken for the opening of said street will severally sustain by being deprived thereof, and do award the full amount of such damage and fix the compensation which each of the aforesaid owners and occupants will receive therefor, as follows:

The award so made, after deducting the amount of taxes and assessments which have become a lien upon the land described, and which are now due, to be paid as hereinafter provided:

To Henry Vollmer, \$2,715, payable to him.
To Joseph Lehner, Julia Eckle, Rosa Guest, Mary Weber, Margaret Collomeiner and Henry Lehner, \$325, payable to them.

To Christian Yakey, \$25, payable to him.
To Caspar Fromm, \$1, payable to him.
To Catharine Bosolt, \$1, payable to her.
To Henry Kondolf, \$1, payable to him.
To Valentine Welker and Margaret Welker, \$1, payable to Valentine and Margaret Welker.

The commissioners were requested by Mr. Jacob Spahn, attorney for Henry Vollmer, owner, to find the following facts:

1. That upon the land owned by Henry Vollmer and sought to be condemned for the benefit of the city of Rochester, there are located valuable properties belonging to said Henry Vollmer, which must be destroyed, and for which he must be compensated at a fair price. Found.
2. That upon said piece or parcel of land so to be condemned, as mentioned in No. 1 hereintofore, there are three several structures, to wit: a new business structure nearly completed, a dwelling house of some years' standing, a barn and seven fruit trees, besides 316 feet of running fence, and one well. Found.
3. That when said structures are razed and destroyed, when said trees are cut down, when said well is obliterated, when said 316 feet of fence are levelled, and when the amount of land deemed necessary by the city of Rochester for the pur-

poses of the improvement contemplated by this proceeding, and taken from Henry Vollmer as aforesaid, the land remaining to him is worth not to exceed six hundred dollars (\$600) See testimony to Joseph Culver, called for the city. Refused.

4. That the damages and injury caused to the said Henry Vollmer as in No. 3, hereinbefore set forth, is the difference between the present value of his premises, with all the properties enumerated, in No. 2, hereinbefore thereon, and the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600). Refused.

5. That the present value of his premises with all the structures and properties thereon enumerated in No. 3 hereinabove, is not less than four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500.00.) Refused.

6. That the damages and injury caused to the said Henry Vollmer as No. 3 hereinbefore set forth, is the difference between the present value of his premises with all the properties enumerated in No. 2 hereinabove thereon, and the value of the bare lot of land which will remain after taking away from said Vollmer's premises such portion as is necessary and to be condemned for the purpose of the widening and improvement contemplated by this proceeding in the said city's behalf. Found.

7. That the bare per foot value of said Vollmer's premises is from twelve to fifteen dollars a foot, irrespective of the structures and properties upon said premises. Found.

8. That the fruit trees upon said Vollmer's premises are each worth not to exceed the sum of twenty-five dollars apiece. Found.

9. That the well upon said Vollmer's premises is worth not less than twenty-five dollars. Found.

10. That seven of said Vollmer's fruit trees must be cut down and destroyed. Found.

11. That seven fruit trees enumerated in No. 10 hereinabove, are worth in the aggregate one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$175). Found.

12. That the barn upon the portion of said Vollmer's premises sought to be condemned in this proceeding for the benefit of said city, is worth not to exceed the sum of one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125). See testimony of Mat. Jacobs. Refused.

13. That the old structure and dwelling house upon the portion of said Vollmer's premises sought to be condemned in this proceeding for the benefit of said city, is worth not to exceed the sum of one thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,250) nor less than the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.) Refused.

14. That the new structure upon the portion of said Vollmer's premises sought to be condemned in this proceeding, as above set forth is worth not less than the sum of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800) as said structure now stands. Refused.

15. That the lawful damages and injury caused to said Vollmer, and said premises by the condemnation of his property, real and personal, as such condemnation is necessary in this proceeding, will not be less than the sum of thirty-two hundred dollars (\$3,200.) Refused.

16. That the said 316 feet of fence upon said Vollmer's premises mentioned in No. 3 hereinabove, are worth not less than fifty dollars (\$50.) Refused.

17. That the whole of said Vollmer's damages by reason of the widening and improvement contemplated in this proceeding, to wit: the opening and extension of Campbell street to the east line of Hague street in the city of Rochester, are not less than the sum of three thousand five hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,550), to which said Vollmer is fairly entitled from said city, not including the value of the 17 feet mentioned in request No. 18 below. Refused.

18. That the 17 feet to be taken off from said Vollmer's premises have a value which must be appraised by the commissioners and added to the sum total due Vollmer for his damages on account of the opening, etc. Found.

The construction of a vitrified stone pipe sewer eighteen (18) inches in diameter on the plank or Webster road, beginning at a point seven hundred (700) feet northeast of the intersection of such road with Goodman street, and extending to the north line of Bay street, and thence continued by a stone covered sewer three hundred (300) feet north of Bay street, with the necessary manholes, lot laterals and connections, surface sewers, street intersections, &c.

And the whole expense shall be defrayed by the assessments upon the lots and parcels of land to be benefited thereby; and the City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council having made an estimate of such expense, and reports the same at six thousand three hundred dollars, and said estimate being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved; and the portion of said city which said Common Council deem will be benefited by said improvement is described as follows:

All the lots and parcels of land enclosed within the following described boundaries:

Beginning at the intersection of College avenue and Goodman street; thence westerly along College avenue to a point 500 feet east of Prince street; thence southerly and parallel with Prince street to a point 450 feet north of University avenue; thence westerly and parallel with University avenue to a point 200 feet east of Prince street; thence southerly and parallel with Prince street to a point 100 feet north of East avenue; thence westerly and parallel with East avenue to a point 245 feet east of Alexander street; thence southerly and parallel with Alexander street to a point 234 feet north of Park avenue; thence easterly and parallel with Park avenue to a point 100 feet west of Meigs street; thence southerly and parallel with Meigs street to Park avenue; thence easterly along Park avenue to a point 150 feet west of Rowley street; thence southerly and parallel with Rowley street to Brighton avenue; thence easterly along Brighton avenue to a point 140 feet east of Rowley street; thence northwardly and parallel with Rowley street to a point 100 feet south of Park avenue; thence easterly to a point 265 feet east of Goodman street and 1,300 feet southerly from East avenue; thence northwardly on a line parallel with the east line of Goodman street and 265 feet east therefrom 800 feet; thence easterly at right angles to last mentioned line 202½ feet to the west line of H. E. Hooker's land; thence northwardly on said Hooker's west line and on said line produced to a point 300 feet north of the north line of East

avenue; thence easterly to a point midway between Culver park and Hawthorn street; thence northerly and parallel with Culver park and in said line continued to University avenue; thence easterly along University avenue to Delaware street; thence northerly along Delaware street to Anderson avenue; thence easterly along Anderson avenue to Arch street; thence northerly along Arch street to land of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company; thence westerly along said railroad company's lands to Goodman street; thence southerly along Goodman street to the place of beginning. Also one tier of lots on each side of the Webster plank road from a point 700 feet east of Goodman street to Bay street.

On which above described lots and parcels of land the expenses of said improvement are hereby ordered assessed, the assessment upon each lot and parcel of land to be in proportion to the benefit which each derives therefrom.

And it is further ordained and determined that the taxpayers to be assessed for making such improvements may pay their assessments in three equal payments as follows: One-third of the amount assessed within thirty days after the advertisement of the assessment roll; one third of the amount within one year from the confirmation of such roll, and the remaining one-third within two years from the confirmation of said roll. On all sums paid prior to the maturity of the such last instalment, a discount will be allowed of six per cent. per annum.

By Alderman Stein—

Whereas, The Rochester City and Brighton Railroad Company applied in writing at a meeting of the Common Council for the consent of the city of Rochester to the construction, maintenance, operation, use and extension of lines and branches of the surface railroad of said company upon streets of the city of Rochester, described in the resolution herewith submitted, and for a like consent for the

construction of switches, sidings, turnouts, turntable and suitable stands in connection, therewith, and

Whereas, The Common Council has duly caused notice of said application, and that the same would be first considered at the meeting of this Council held July 14, 1885, to be printed in two daily newspapers of this city, designated by the Mayor, for fourteen days.

Resolved, That the consent of the city of Rochester, subject to the approval of the Mayor, is hereby given that the Rochester City & Brighton Railroad Company may construct, maintain, operate and extend lines and branches of its surface railroad upon streets of the city of Rochester as follows:

First—To extend a track from the intersection of Central avenue and Clinton street easterly along Central avenue to St. Joseph street, thence with a double curve around the corner of Central avenue and St. Joseph street, thence northerly along St. Joseph street to Kelly street.

Second—To extend the present track of your petitioners on North Clinton street from the intersection of North Clinton street and Clifford street to the intersection of North Clinton street and Holbecht street.

And the like consent is hereby given for the construction and operation of such switches, sidings, turnouts and turn-tables, and suitable stands in connection with said extension and tracks as may be necessary for the convenient working of the railroad. The consent granted by this resolution is given upon the express condition that each and every of the provisions of an act to provide for the construction, extension, maintenance and operation of street surface railroads, and branches thereof, in cities, towns and villages, passed May 6, 1884, by the Legislature of the State of New York, and known as chapter 252 of the Laws of New York of the year 1884, shall be complied with so far as the same are pertinent to the construction, maintenance, operation, use and extension of the lines and branches of surface railroad to which consent is hereby given.

We, your petitioners, humbly show to your honorable body as follows:

1. That we are the owners (as Trustees) of a certain piece of property, situated on the west side of North St. Paul street, below Andrews street, in the City of Rochester. This property has a frontage on the new street line of said street of about seventy-one feet.

That, should we be compelled to put in said retaining wall and fill up what was formerly a part of the church basement, etc., etc., it is found by us upon careful examination, made by competent men, that it would cost us between \$800 and \$1,000. And when the work is completed according to the ordinance it would be of no value to the property for present purposes and would be utterly useless in the construction of any building for commercial purposes, as any such retaining wall would be removed and the place again excavated to provide for an area way, as witness, the buildings already erected on this street or on any street where large buildings are erected.

4. Wherefore, we humbly petition your honorable body to grant us the privilege of covering the present opening with platform flagstone set on iron beams supported by iron columns, as per a contract entered into with the firm of Whitmore, Rauber & Vicinus, which walk will be of permanent use to any person or persons who may build upon said lot in the future, and be useful to us so long as we may continue in use of the building as a religious soci-

ety, and be considerably less expense to the society. So petitioning, we are, gentlemen,

The petition of Thomas C. Montgomery, who is assessed the sum of \$89.84 as a tax upon personal property held by him as executor, shows that he appeared before the Assessors at the time of the hearing of allegations, and upon his statement that the trust funds upon which said assessment was levied had passed out of his hands, it was agreed by the Assessors that the said assessment should be stricken from the rolls. GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee respectfully reports that a judgment has been entered in the case of the city against George S. Riley and another, in favor of the defendants.

The action was begun by ex-City Attorney Fanning in March, 1881, to foreclose the lien of an assessment upon property owned by the defendant, George S. Riley, for the improvement of Lewis street. The action was referred by the court to J. P. Varnum, esq., for trial. The case was recently tried and the referee finds the following facts: That in 1874 the Commissioners of Public Works adopted an ordinance for the improvement of Lewis Street from Scio street easterly to Union street; that the defendant Riley was the owner of a large tract of land in the locality of said improvement, including the strip where the said improvement was made, and which is now known as Lewis street; that the city never acquired title to said strip of land either by purchase or condemnation proceedings; that the defendant Riley never laid out or dedicated said strip of land as a public street; and that said strip of land had not been used for a period of five years as a street at the time of said improvement.

From these facts the conclusions of law follow: That the Commissioners of Public Works had never acquired jurisdiction over the lands of the defendant Riley in that part of Lewis street lying east of Scio street, nor the right to lay out a street over the same, and, therefore, that the assessment was illegal and void.

Your Committee is informed by the City Attorney that the findings of fact by the Referee are in accordance with the evidence in the case, and is, therefore, of the opinion that the judgment of \$168.24, costs in favor of the defendants, should be

paid. The adoption of the accompanying resolution is, therefore, recommended.

GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee, to which was referred the matter of the confirmation of the new assessment roll for the improvement of Oak street, respectfully reports that it has given the matter the careful consideration which its importance demands. It has heard at great length the arguments in favor of and against the confirmation of the assessment roll in its present form, and, after mature deliberation, has come to the conclusion that, before being confirmed, the roll should be so amended as to give credits to each lot on Oak street for the amount paid on said lot under the old assessment, with interest.

Your committee has been fully advised by the City Attorney as to the legal effect of this action, and while there are arguments against the adoption of this plan, yet, upon the whole, your committee deems it advisable, for the following reasons:

First—It must be presumed that each of the present owners of lots on Oak street, purchasing after the improvement was made, and the assessment, or a part thereof, had been paid, have already paid for this improvement once in the enhanced price which they gave for their property by reason of the improvement.

Second—Many of said present owners, at the time of purchasing, secured from the City Treasurer a tax search of the property purchased, which search showed the property free and clear from all lien or incumbrance. The purchasers did all that could be expected of them, and for the unfortunate position in which they now find themselves by reason of the proposed assessment, the city, through the representation of its agents, is solely responsible. To compel the present owners of Oak street lots to pay for this improvement again would be an act of great injustice, and, as the City of Rochester, through its agents, is responsible for the present condition of affairs, the City of Rochester, and not the taxpayers on Oak street, ought to stand the consequences.

Your Committee, therefore, recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned members of the Law Committee respectfully present the following minority report upon the matter of the confirmation of the pending assessment roll for the improvement of Oak street:

The question at issue narrows itself down to the determination of whether the expenses of the improvement of Oak street shall be borne by the owners of the property on that street who have received the entire benefit of the improvement, or whether the expense shall be thrown upon the city at large. Judgments against the city have already been obtained in several instances by persons who made payments on the old roll, which has been declared void by the Court of Appeals. It is the opinion of the City Attorney that the adoption of the roll in the proposed amended form, by giving credits in each case to the property, will not prevent the recovery from the city by the former owners, or their assignees, of the amounts paid on the old roll. By crediting the old roll payments on the new roll, the city assumes the burden of re-paying the amounts paid on the old roll twice; once to the present owner of the property, and once to the former owner of the property. This action the members of the committee signing this minority report are not prepared to recommend, and we would, therefore, report in favor of postponing further consideration of the assessment roll until the next meeting of this Board, for the purpose of giving an opportunity for the obtaining of assignments from former owners which will result in protecting property owners who have bought their lots on the street since the payment of the assessments as well as of the city at large.

Y., be, and hereby are, designated as the banks in which the Treasurer of said city shall deposit all moneys received by him belonging to the city, and that the Mayor be, and he hereby is, directed to enter into a contract with the Flour City National Bank aforesaid, which contract shall provide, in substance, that said bank shall pay for one half of the city deposits for the year beginning August 1st, 1885, the sum of \$1,650; one half thereof payable on the first day of August, 1885, and the balance on the first day of February next, which contract shall be drawn by the City Attorney in accordance with the proposition made by said bank relating to the city deposit for the ensuing year; and that the Mayor be, and he hereby is, directed to enter into a contract with the Traders' National Bank aforesaid, which contract shall provide, in substance, that said bank shall pay for one half of the city deposit for the year beginning August 1st, 1885, 2 per cent. per annum upon the daily balances of the city's money deposited in said bank, such payments to be credited to the account of said city monthly, and that each of such contracts shall provide that each of said banks shall be entitled to receive one half of all moneys received by the treasurer belonging to the city, and each of such contracts to be operative when said banks shall respectively deliver to the Finance Committee of the Common Council a bond, to be approved by such committee as to form and as to the sufficiency of the sureties, indemnifying the city against loss by reason of said respective contracts, the penalty of each of such bonds to be in the sum of \$25,000.

By Alderman Foley—

To the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

The committee appointed by your honorable body, in pursuance of a resolution passed September 23, 1884, for the purpose of considering and reporting their opinion upon the following questions, viz:

First—Whether the charter of the city of Rochester should be revised, and if so, what changes are needed with a view to a more economical and effective administration of municipal affairs?

Second—What are the best methods of conducting Municipal Government?

Third—Is it advisable at this time that a sinking fund be created to the end that provision for, at least, part of the bonded indebtedness of the city may be made as the same matures?

Do respectfully report: First, In our opinion the charter of the City of Rochester should be revised, and the general nature of the changes recommended are set forth in the pamphlet hereto attached, entitled, "Amendments to the Charter, proposed by the Committee appointed by the Common Council." We recommend the appointment of a Commission to draft a charter in accordance with the amendments proposed. Second, The question of

the advisability of creating a sinking fund has been deferred for future consideration.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CHARTER PROPOSED BY
THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY THE
COMMON COUNCIL.

First—That the Mayor shall be elected by the people as now provided, and shall retain all the powers and perform all the duties imposed by the existing Charter, and shall possess and perform such other duties as may be by law conferred; that at every annual Charter election after he shall have been chosen to his office, there shall be a separate ballot-box at each poll designated "Mayor"; that each citizen voting at such election shall have the right to cast a ballot for any person he prefers for the office of Mayor; and that if any person, duly qualified, shall receive a number of votes in excess of the number cast for the incumbent of the office when chosen, such person shall supersede such incumbent, with the power to retain or remove all heads of Departments in his discretion.

Second—That the Common Council shall be a legislative body only. All executive powers shall be transferred to, and executed by other departments of the city government.

Third—That the Executive Board shall be abolished, and all other Boards reorganized, excepting that having charge of Mount Hope Cemetery.

Fourth—That the Mayor shall appoint all Heads of Departments; that all Heads of Departments shall have the appointing of their own subordinates, and be responsible for their faithfulness and efficiency, and may remove them at pleasure.

Fifth—That the following Heads of Departments shall be appointed by the Mayor:

- One City Attorney.
- One Auditor.
- One Superintendent of City Improvements.
- One Superintendent of Streets.
- One Superintendent of Water Works.
- One Superintendent of Fire Department.
- One Commissioner of Police.
- One Commissioner of Excise.
- Three City Assessors.
- Six members of the Board of Health.
- One Overseer of the Poor.

The power and duties of these several Heads of Departments will hereafter appear.

Sixth—The Mayor shall, once in each month, or oftener, call together the heads of departments for consultation and advice upon the affairs of the city; and at such meeting the heads of Departments shall furnish such information as to matters under their control and management as the Mayor may require. Records shall be kept of such meetings by the City Clerk; and rules and regulations not inconsistent with any law or ordinance may be adopted by said body for the administration of the affairs of the city, and especially for the purpose of preventing frequent and unnecessary openings of the streets, and to promote system and economy in repairing over breaks made for underground work. All such meetings shall be open to the public.

Seventh—That no heads of Departments shall be eligible to the office unless they are electors of the city.

Eighth—That all the heads of Departments intrusted with the expenditure of appropriations for work or supplies, shall be required to give bonds in a penal sum to be fixed by the Common Council, and all such bonds and other bonds required to be given by the City Charter, shall be those of incorporated guarantee companies.

Ninth—Each of said Heads of Departments shall be required to make estimates in detail of the amount of money required during the fiscal year for his department and submit the same to the Board of Estimate, to be by them considered and determined. When agreed upon and certified to by said Board, it shall be submitted to the Common Council. The said Council may diminish or reject any item, but shall not increase any of said estimates for any department or purpose.

Tenth—That the expenditures for each department, office, or other specified object, during the fiscal year, shall be kept within the estimate made for it. For the purpose of this section each department, office, or other specified object, shall be credited with the amount included in the estimates for it; and it shall be debited with the salaries and the certain and fixed sums to be paid out of it, and the other expenditures shall not exceed the balance remaining of the estimate. Contracts made in any form or manner for an amount exceeding such balance shall not be binding upon the city beyond such balance, and the excess may be recovered from the members of the Common Council jointly or severally who voted in favor thereof, or of the Heads of Departments who contracted therefor. When liabilities to the amount of such balance shall have been created, all contracts made in any form or manner for further expenditures or liabilities shall not be binding upon the city, but may be enforced against the members of the Common Council, jointly or severally, who voted in favor thereof, or against the heads of departments who contracted therefor. Provided that in case of any extraordinary emergency requiring the immediate expenditure of money, the Common Council may vote such sum as that body and the Board of estimate may agree to be necessary by vote of three-quarters of the members of each.

Eleventh—That the Mayor shall have power to veto distinct items of appropriations in any ordinance or order passed by the Common Council; and the same general powers shall also apply to the Board of Education.

Twelfth—That the Mayor or the Common Council shall have power at all times to examine the books, vouchers and papers of any department, office or employee of the city, or of any officer paid wages or salaries by its Treasurer, and of the Excise Commissioners, and to summon and examine under oath any person in connection therewith; and shall also have power, if it is deemed necessary, to employ once in each year, but not for a longer period than two months, an expert to examine the books, vouchers and papers of any department, officer or employee charged with the receipt and disbursement of public moneys.

Thirteenth—That the Common Council shall have power to impeach the Mayor by a resolution passed by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected thereto, but such power of impeachment shall not operate to prevent or stay any other action or proceeding against him for

misfeasance or nonfeasance in office. In case the Mayor shall be impeached, his assent to the resolution shall not be necessary. The court for trial of the Mayor so impeached shall be the Supreme Court at Special Term, and the proceedings shall be taken in accordance with rules to be prescribed by the court.

Fourteenth—That any person a candidate for Mayor or other elective office of the city, or who is proposed or put in nomination for such offices, who, whether in consideration or in acknowledgment of his receiving such nomination, or with the view or for the purpose of securing, obtaining or receiving the aid, assistance, service or support of any person or persons or associations in such nomination, or in promoting his election to said office or otherwise, agrees or promises, either directly or indirectly, expressly or impliedly, to appoint or not to appoint any particular person, or any person or persons of any political party or association to any office to which in the event of his election, he is or may be by law authorized to appoint, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, or on conviction shall forfeit his office.

Fifteenth—That no law or ordinance shall be passed by the Common Council, nor any resolution adopted involving an appropriation or expenditure of money for any purpose, unless by a vote of a majority of all the members elected to the said Common Council, to be taken by yeas and nays, which vote shall be entered on their minutes; and no such vote shall be taken, except by unanimous consent, at the same meeting at which such law, ordinance or resolution shall be offered.

Sixteenth—That the Board of Education as now organized shall be abolished, and shall hereafter consist of seven members, two of whom shall be women. All of said members shall be appointed by the Mayor. On assuming office, the members first appointed shall draw lots to determine which one shall serve one year, which one two years, which one three years, which one four years, and which one five years, and so on. Thereafter one member shall be appointed annually by the Mayor, to serve for seven years. The fiscal year of the Board shall coincide with that of other departments of the city government.

Section 140 of the city charter shall be amended to read as follows:

Seventeenth—No member of the Board of Education shall vote for the payment of any moneys out of any of the funds authorized to be raised by the city charter, knowing that such fund is without money to pay the same, or by vote or otherwise, create any debt or liability beyond the amount of any particular fund, for the then current fiscal year. Contracts made in any form or manner, in violation of this provision, shall not be binding on the city, but may be enforced against the members of the Board of Education jointly or severally, who voted in favor thereof.

Eighteenth—That the following powers and duties of the Overseer of the Poor shall be added to title 9 of the city charter, or to section 79, title 5:

Section 1. The Overseer of the Poor shall be the head of this department. He shall be appointed by the Mayor and shall hold his office two years.

Sec. 2. He shall have charge and control of all the expenditures of money by the city for the poor.

Sec. 3. He shall appoint and may remove his subordinates at any time.

Sec. 4. The overseer shall prepare, monthly, a full statement, showing the amount and kind of aid granted during the previous month, and it shall include the amount granted that year to each applicant and family. The Overseer of the Poor shall make an annual report to the Common Council, which shall contain a summary of such monthly statements. The monthly statements and all other records and books pertaining to the department, shall be open for examination at all times for any taxpayer of the city, and by the officers of the police department, and the names and residences of those relieved shall be kept in such books and records.

Sec. 5. The Overseer of the Poor shall, from time to time, report to the Common Council the amount which he shall need for the relief of the poor, and thereupon the Common Council may direct the proper warrant to be drawn in his favor. The Overseer shall, with each report, submit a statement of the sums already drawn by him from the treasury, and the amount in his hands unexpended.

POWERS OF THE COMMON COUNCIL.

Nineteenth—That section 40 of the City Charter be amended to read as follows: The Common Council shall have the supervision of the affairs of said city, and of all property, real and personal, etc.

Twentieth—That the Common Council shall not have power to alter the names of streets. Nor shall it have power to change the grades of streets, without the consent of the owners of the property abutting upon the improvement on a two-third vote of the Common Council, or upon compensation for damages done.

Twenty-first—That expenditures for water pipe extensions shall be limited to \$25,000 per annum.

Twenty-second—That in the taking of land, or in doing of damage by change in grade of streets, subsequent to passage of ordinance, the proceedings shall, as far as possible, conform to the general Railroad Act.

Twenty-third—That all officers of the city other than those hereinbefore designated, shall be elected by the people, for terms, and in the manner as now by law provided, and that the powers and duties of appointed officers not especially herein mentioned shall remain as under existing laws.

Twenty-fourth—That the designated officers hereinbefore mentioned, shall assume the following functions:

HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS.

Sec. 1. The duties of the Auditor shall be such as usually pertain to his office, and no bills contracted by any department of the government shall be paid except upon his allowance. He shall render detailed monthly reports to the Common Council of all bills contracted by the city.

Sec. 2. The Superintendent of City Improvements shall also act as City Surveyor. He shall provide for all plans of sewers, bridges, street improvements, and shall let, supervise and control all such work in way and manner as now provided by the charter in regard to the duties and powers conferred on existing departments.

Sec. 3. The "plans" before mentioned, shall, in all cases, before being adopted, be approved by a board consisting of himself, the Superintendent of Streets and the Superintendent of Water Works.

Sec. 4. The Superintendent of Streets, etc., shall have charge of the cleaning of streets and the care of parks, repairing of street sewers, bridges and pavements. He shall have charge of all city buildings, except the fire department, school and water works buildings; also of all lamps and the lighting of the city, and the collection of garbage. He shall have power to supervise and cause all work to be done in his department and control the same; shall appoint his assistants and employ laborers. He shall also be Commissioner of Highways of the city.

Sec. 5. The Superintendent of Water Works shall act also as Chief Engineer of the same, and possess all the powers in relation to water works now conferred by law on the Executive Board, except that all water rents shall be collected directly by the City Treasurer.

Sec. 6. The Superintendent of the Fire Department shall act as Chief Engineer of the same, and shall exercise all the powers and perform all the duties, in regard to the fire department, now vested by law in the Executive Board. He shall perform all the functions of the Fire Marshal, and shall control the fire alarm telegraph.

Sec. 7. The Commissioner of Police shall also act as Chief of Police; and the Excise Commissioner and said Chief of Police shall constitute the Board of Excise.

Sec. 8. The Police and Excise Boards, as now constituted, shall be abolished.

Sec. 9. The Board of Health shall consist of six members, two of whom shall be physicians, two shall be appointed for one year, two for two years and two for three years. As fast as said terms expire, two members shall be appointed for the full term of three years.

Sec. 10. The Sealer of Weights and Measures shall be appointed by the Mayor, and shall perform the same duties as at present required, but all fees shall be paid into the City Treasury, with a detailed account of the fees collected, and from whom.

We recommend the creation of a special Board of Estimate, as follows:

The Board of Estimate shall consist of the Mayor, City Treasurer and three citizens, who shall have been inhabitants of, and freeholders and legal voters in, the city of Rochester for ten years next preceding their appointment. The Mayor and City Treasurer shall jointly make such appointments.

That section 46 of the present charter be amended by inserting after the words "select one daily newspaper" in the last sentence thereof the words "and only one, and such paper shall be the one which, being published in the English language, shall be the lowest bidder therefor."

That section 286 of the City Charter be amended by adding to the last sentence but one: And if the County Clerk shall record any deed of conveyance of lands in the city which has not been stamped by the assessors he shall forfeit to the city the sum of ten dollars.

That section 289 be amended so as to read after the words "County Clerk": And a copy thereof shall be filed with the assessors.

There shall also be the following added to said section: "And the said assessors shall give receipts to said owner which shall be his vouchers that he has complied with both the within specified provisions. For every violation thereof the owner shall forfeit to the city the sum of ten dollars; and in default of payment, the same shall be inserted in the next tax roll for general taxes, and become subject to the laws in relation to "unpaid assessments" as specifically set forth in section 209.

GENTLEMEN: In accordance with your request an examination of the sewer in Merriman street has been made, and the following facts established: The sewer is a 9-inch pipe, laying from 4½ to 10½ feet below the surface of the street, and at the several points opened was found substantially clean and unobstructed, except at the location of the surface lateral sewers, where about four inches of dirt was found to have lodged. This has been flushed out as thoroughly as possible.

Four more surface lateral sewers and two man holes are needed, and should be provided for in case the street is improved.

GENTLEMEN—The R. C. & B. R. Co., in laying their track on the east side of Hudson street, from North avenue northward have placed the center of the west rail of same at a distance of twenty-five inches east of the roadway edge of the east curb line. The operation of their road with the tracks thus located, will require the removal of the sprinkling hydrant near corner of Woodbury street, one fire hydrant at corner of Woodbury street, and one just south of the N. Y. C. & H. R. E., and also the sprinkling hydrant near corner of North avenue.

The hydrants at corner of Foehner, Helena and Harrison streets are from 9 to 12 feet east of the present east curb of Hudson street, the said curb

having been carried several feet to the west since the hydrants were set. It has been the intention of the water department to shorten these hydrant branches so as to bring the hydrant near to the curb line so that the hydrants could be flushed without the use of hose. The west rail of the street car track having been located but 25 inches from the curb, will entirely prevent the location of any hydrant between the track and curb. The changing of all these hydrants will prove a very expensive operation, as they will have to be changed to the west side of Hudson street; and if the Executive Board should determine to remove them, a definite understanding should be had with the Street Car Company that it shall pay all the expense thereof.

The said company have also performed their work without any reference to the location of the service curb boxes and a considerable expense will have to be incurred by the city to restore these boxes to a position where they can be readily found and operated.

In view of all these circumstances I respectfully recommend that the Executive Board should call the attention of the Common Council to the complications which are constantly arising because of the granting of permission to the street car company to lay their tracks in the streets of the city without providing in such permits that the work shall be done under the supervision and direction of the Executive Board, so that existing city constructions may be properly protected.

To the Honorable Common Council, City of Rochester:

In response to the resolution adopted by your honorable body at its last regular meeting, directing the City Surveyor "to ascertain if the street-numbering on Clinton Park is correctly done, and if he finds said numbering to be incorrect that he have the same corrected." I would report that the new numbers as originally given are correct but that some little confusion has arisen in consequence of changes in dwellings on the park, notably that of one, for which one number (4) was assigned. It now has four doors opening upon the street instead of one and the proprietor wishes four distinct numbers. To give him such would require a change of all the numbers in the park, unless he accepts fractional numbers as he has been advised and which would be quite as distinctive as whole numbers. As the new directory is now out a change of all the numbers would be unwise, as well as unjust, to the other house-holders on the park and would necessarily give rise to much confusion to say nothing of needless expense. Another reason why it would be unwise to make the change at this time is the fact that a bridge is soon to be thrown over the Canal to connect Pinnacle avenue with Clinton park, when a change in name will perhaps be made and a change in the numbering will become necessary.

For these several reasons I would advise that for the number four (4) those 4, 4½, 4¾ and 4¾ be substituted.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: The lessee of the flouring mill owned by the city of Rochester at Hemlock village having complained to the Executive Board that the machinery in said mill needed improving and modernizing to enable him to retain his custom and to successfully compete with neighboring mills in the manufacture of wheat flour, the said Board requested a committee of Rochester millers of experience to visit said mill and make a thorough examination of the machinery thereof, and to suggest such action on the part of the city as their long experience in the milling business should dictate as wise and prudent in the premises. The committee consisted of J. H. Chase, J. A. Hinds and James Wilson, who visited the mill as requested and without charge; and on the 21st of July last made a report, in which they recommended certain changes and additions to the machinery of the mill, accompanied by a diagram indicating the same in sufficient detail to enable a practical mill furnisher to make the necessary detailed drawings and estimates therefor. The following extracts from their report contain their general conclusions:

"We find the said mill in reasonably good condition for the grinding of feed and buckwheat flour. That it contains good wheat cleaning machinery, quite sufficient for the required capacity of the mill." * * * * * "The flouring machinery of the mill is very old and dilapidated and almost useless for that purpose. * * * * *

"We are of the opinion that nothing less than what we have recommended in the way of improvements to the machinery of the mill would answer the purpose desired or would prove an economical or judicious expenditure of money."

"With the improvements recommended, we believe the mill would be fully equipped to compete successfully with neighboring custom flouring mills in the manufacture of flour; it would increase materially the rental value of the mill property, and would appreciate the value of the mill to the full extent of the expenditure contemplated in case the city should desire to sell the property."

"We do not hesitate to advise the officers of the city to make the improvements contemplated in this report, as a good business transaction, as without it the mill is of little practical value as a mill."

In view of this report from the committee of millers the Executive Board have informally requested the agents of several mill furnishing concerns to prepare plans and make proffers for the improvements recommended, the same to be in exact conformity to the suggestions of the committee.

A reply to this request has been received from the John T. Noye Manufacturing Co., of Buffalo, only. The price named by said Company for the material and work complete, ready for operation, is \$2,700. The Executive Board concurs in the recommenda-

tion of the Committee of Millers, and in the necessity which exists for making the expenditure as soon as possible, so that the property may not only have some rental value, but also that it may be made saleable.

The Executive Board therefore respectfully recommends the adoption of the annexed resolution by the Common Council.

Whereas, The Common Council has duly caused notice of said application, and that the same would be first considered at the meeting of this Council to be held August 11, 1885, at 7.30 o'clock to be printed in two daily newspapers of this city, designated by the Mayor, for fourteen days.

Resolved, That the consent of the city of Rochester, subject to the approval of the Mayor, is hereby given that the Rochester City & Brighton Railroad Company may construct, maintain, operate and extend lines and branches of its surface railroad upon streets of the city of Rochester as follows:

First—A single track easterly from the intersection of St. Joseph street and Central avenue along Central avenue to the Center of North avenue.

Second—A single track westerly from the tracks of your petitioner on Jay street, along Jay street from the intersection of Childs street to the intersection of Ames street.

And the like consent is hereby given for the construction and operation of such switches, sidings, turnouts and turntables, and suitable stands in connection with said extension and tracks as may be necessary for the convenient working of the railroad. It appears from the proofs presented before your Committee that Mary D. Kelly, Elizabeth R. Hoyt and Sarah E. Clark are the owners of an undivided one-half of parts of lots numbers one and two of section C of the Johnson and Seymour tract, known as Washington Hall block, situated on the corner of East Main and Clinton street, and that Michael Filon is the owner of an undivided one-half thereof; that on October 8, 1851, a certificate of tax sale was made by the Mayor of the City of Rochester to said city, and was recorded in Monroe County Clerk's office in Liber 97 of deeds at page 285; such sale was made of the west part of lot number two aforesaid on the fifth day of June, 1849, for \$12.04, and interest and expenses of sale amounting to \$13.50.

All other taxes and assessments are paid upon said premises. The sales register containing all particulars of said sale is, and for some years has been, lost from the City Treasurer's office, and it is now impossible to learn any particulars concerning the same.

The city of Rochester has never taken possession of said premises or performed any acts of ownership in, or claim to, to the same. It is believed that a production of the sale register would show that said property has been redeemed from the lien of said certificate. Mr. Volmer demands \$1,500 for his land, besides being guaranteed immunity from assessment upon his remaining land for the expense of the improvement.

The latter demand could not, of course, be complied with as it is clearly illegal. The price \$1,500 demanded is excessive.

Your Committee, therefore, recommends that no further action in the premises be taken.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: In obedience to a resolution adopted by your honorable body June 16th, 1885, directing the City Attorney to prepare and compile, in compact form, all the provisions of the city charter relating to the Rochester City and Brighton Railroad Company, and report the same to this Board, I hereby submit the following report:

Although the resolution only calls for the compilation of the provisions of the city charter relating to said railroad company, I assume that the resolution was intended to include general statutes applicable to street railroad companies, special statutes applicable to the Rochester City and Brighton Railroad Company and the penal ordinance adopted by the Common Council with reference to said company.

Chapter 252 of the laws of 1884, entitled "An act to provide for the construction, extension, maintenance and operation of street surface railroads and branches thereof in cities, towns and villages," reads as follows:

Section 1. Any number of persons, not less than thirteen, may make and sign articles of association, and form a company for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating a street surface railroad for public use in the conveyance of persons and property in cars for compensation, in any of the cities, towns or villages in this State, or in any two or more civil divisions thereof. Such articles of association shall state the name of the company, the number of years the same is to continue, the names of the cities, towns and villages, and the counties, and the names or descriptions of the streets, avenues and highways in which the road is to be constructed, the place from and to which the road is to be constructed, maintained and operated, the length of said road, or as near as may be, the amount of the capital stock of the company, which shall not be less than \$10,000 for every mile of road constructed, or proposed to be constructed, and the number of shares of which said capital stock shall consist, and the names and places of residence of the seven or more directors of the company who shall manage its affairs for the first year, and until others are chosen in their places. Each subscriber of said articles of association shall subscribe thereto his name, place of residence, and number of shares of stock he agrees to take in said company. Such articles of association shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of State when \$1,000 of stock for every mile of railroad proposed to be constructed has been subscribed thereto, and 10 per cent. paid thereon in good faith, in cash, to the directors named in said articles of association, and when there is endorsed on said articles of association, or annexed thereto, an affi-

affidavit made by at least three of the directors named in said articles, that the amount of stock required by this section has been in good faith subscribed, and ten per cent. paid in cash thereon, as aforesaid, and that it is intended in good faith to construct or to maintain and operate the road mentioned in said articles of association, which affidavit shall be recorded with the articles of association. The Secretary of State shall endorse on said articles of association the day they are filed, and record the same and said affidavit in a book to be provided by him for that purpose, and for the date of such filling the persons who have so subscribed such articles of association, and all persons who shall become stockholders in such company shall be a corporation by the name specified in such articles of association, and shall possess the powers and privileges granted to corporations, and be subject to the provisions contained in title three of chapter eighteen of the first part of the Revised Statutes, except the provisions contained in the seventh section of said title. Such corporation shall also have all the powers and privileges granted, and be subject to all the liabilities imposed by this act, or by the act entitled "An Act to authorize the formation of railroad corporations, and to regulate the same," passed April 2d, 1850, and the several acts amendatory thereof, except as the said acts are herein modified. No existing street surface railroad company shall extend its line, or construct any branch thereof under this act, until it has made and filed with the Secretary of State, a certificate signed by its board of directors, which certificate shall contain a statement of the names of the cities, towns, villages and counties, and the names or descriptions of the streets, avenues and highways in which such extension or branch is to be constructed, the places from and to which the same is to be constructed, maintained and operated, and the length thereof as near as may be.

Section 2. The board of directors of every corporation formed under this act shall consist of not less than seven nor more than thirteen.

Section 3. Any company organized as aforesaid, or any existing street surface railroad company or corporation heretofore organized for the purpose of building and operating a street railroad, make construct, maintain, operate, use and extend a railroad or branches on the surface of the soil, through, upon or along any of the streets, avenues, roads or highways of such cities, towns and villages, and also through, along and upon any private property which said company may acquire for the purpose and may also construct such switches, sidings, turnouts and turn-tables and suitable stands as may be necessary for the convenient working of such road, provided that the consent in writing of the owners of one half in value of the property bounded on, and the consent also of the local authorities having control of that portion of the street or highway upon which it is proposed to construct or operate such railroad be after the passage of this act first obtained. The consent of such owners shall be acknowledged as are deeds entitled to be recorded. In any city the Common Council, acting subject to the power possessed by the Mayor to veto ordinances, and in any village the Board of Trustees shall be the local authorities to give all the consents required under this act in respect of such city or village. Provided that where in any city the exclusive control of any street, road, highway, avenue, or property which is to be used or occupied by any such company is, by law, vested in any local authority other than the Common Council of such city, the consent of the local authorities, in whom such exclusive control is so vested shall also be obtained.

Section 4. In incorporated cities, before acting upon an application for their consent the local authorities shall give public notice of such application and of the time and place when such application will first be considered by a notice thereof, to be published daily for at least fourteen days in two daily newspapers of said city to be designated by the Mayor of the city, and when such application is made to the local authorities of any incorporated

village, the notice of such application shall be published for at least fourteen days in a newspaper published in said village, if any there shall be, if none, then in two daily newspapers published in the city nearest such village. The consent of the local authorities shall in all cases be applied for in writing, and when granted shall be upon the express condition that the provisions of this act pertinent thereto shall be complied with, and shall be filed in the office of the County Clerk of the county in which said railroad is located. Any consent so given by said local authorities shall cease and determine at the expiration of one year thereafter, unless prior to the expiration of such period the company obtaining such consent shall have filed the consent of the requisite amount in value of property owners, or the determination of Commissioners confirmed by the court, as herein provided. The consent of the local authorities, given as aforesaid, shall operate as the consent of such city, town or village, as the owners of any property, that such railroad may be constructed, maintained and operated in, upon and along any street, avenue road or highway by which such property is bounded, except that where such railroad runs through any street or avenue bounded on one side by any public park or square the consent of one-half the owners of property on the other side of said street or avenue, and opposite such park or square shall also be first obtained. For the purpose of this act the value of the property so bounded shall be ascertained and determined from the assessment rolls of the city or town in which such property is situated, confirmed or completed last before the local authorities shall have given their consent, excepting such property owned by such city, town or village, the value of which shall be ascertained and determined by allowing therefor the same price or value as is shown by such assessment roll to be the value of the equivalent in size and frontage of any adjacent property on the same street. In case the consent of property owners required by any provision of this act cannot be obtained, the company so failing to obtain such consents may apply to any General Term of the Supreme Court, held in the district in which the road of such company is proposed to be constructed, for the appointment of three commissioners to determine, after a hearing of all parties interested, whether such railroad ought to be constructed and operated.

Section 5. Notice of such application shall be served personally upon each property owner not having given his consent by delivering the same to him, or his agent or representative, as such owner, agent or representative appears upon such assessment roll of the city or town in which the property is situated; or by mailing the same, properly folded and directed to such owner or representative, at the post-office nearest his usual place of residence, with the postage paid thereon, at least ten days prior to such application. If the person on whom such such services is unknown, or his residence is unknown, and cannot by reasonable diligence be ascertained, no service of such notice, personally or by mail, need be made. And said General Term of the Supreme Court to which application is made, upon due proof of the service aforesaid, shall appoint three disinterested persons, who shall act as Commissioners, and said Commissioners, within ten days after their appointment, shall cause public notice to be given of their first sitting, in the manner directed by said General Term, and may adjourn from time to time until their business is completed. Vacancies may be filled by said General Term, after such notice to persons interested as it may be deemed proper to be given, and the evidence taken before as well as after the occurring of the vacancy shall be deemed to be properly before said Commissioners.

Section 6. The said Commissioners shall determine, after such public hearing of all parties interested, whether such railroad ought to be constructed and operated and shall make a report thereon, together with the evidence taken, to said general term, and their determination that such road ought to be constructed and operated, con-

firmed by said court, shall be taken in lieu of the consent of the property owners before mentioned. Such report shall be made within sixty days after appointment of said commissioners, unless the said court, or a judge thereof shall, for good cause shown, extend such time.

Section 7. The local authorities of any incorporated city or village to whom application, under the provisions of this act made be made for consent to the construction, maintenance, use, operation or extension of a street surface railroad upon any street, road, avenue or highway, may, at their option, provide for the sale of, and sell at public auction the franchise, subject to all the provisions of this act, to so construct, maintain, use, operate or extend such street surface railroad. Prior to such sale, notice of the time, place and terms thereof, and of the route to be sold, and of the conditions upon which the consent of said local authorities to the construction, maintenance, use, operation or extension of a surface street railroad thereon will be published three times a week for at least three weeks, in two daily newspapers of said city to be designated by the Mayor of said city. And local authorities of any incorporated village shall, prior to any sale therein, as herein provided, cause the above notice provided for to be published three times a week for at least three weeks in a newspaper published in said village, if any there shall be, if none, then in two daily newspapers published in the city nearest said village.

Section 8. Every corporation incorporated under, or constructing or operating a railroad constructed or extended under the provisions of this act, within the cities of the State having a population of 250,000 or more, as aforesaid, shall for and during the first five years after the commencement of the operation of any portion of its railroad, annually, on the first day of November, pay into the treasury of said respective cities in which its road is located to the credit of the sinking fund thereof, three per cent. of its gross receipts for and during the year ending the next preceding 30th day of September, and after the expiration of said five years, make a like annual payment into the treasury of said respective cities, for the credit of said sinking fund, of 5 per cent. instead of 3 per cent. of said gross receipts; provided, however, that every corporation now existing and operating its street surface railroad which shall extend its tracks or construct branches therefrom, and operate such extensions or branches under the provisions of this act, or the corporation operating such branches or extensions shall pay such percentages as aforesaid only upon such portion of the gross receipts as shall bear the same proportion to the whole value thereof as the length of such extension and branches shall bear the entire length of its tracks. In any other incorporated city or village the local authorities shall have the right to require, as a condition to their consent to the construction, operation or extension of a railroad under the provisions of this act, the payment annually of such percentage of gross receipts, not exceeding 3 per cent. into the treasury of said city or village, as they may deem proper. In case of extension the amount to be paid shall be ascertained in the manner hereinbefore provided. The company or corporation failing to pay such percentage of its gross earnings, as aforesaid, shall, after said first day of November, pay in addition thereto 5 per cent. a month on such percentage until paid. The President and Treasurer of any company required by the provisions of this act to make a payment annually upon its gross receipts shall, on or before the first day of November in each year, make a verified report to the controller or treasurer of the city, of the gross amount of its receipts for the year ending the next preceding thirtieth day of September, and the books of said company shall be open to inspection and examination by said comptroller, treasurer, or his duly appointed agent, for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of said report as to said gross receipts. The corporate rights, privileges and franchises acquired under this act, by any corporation

which shall fail to comply with all the provisions of this section, shall be forfeited to the people of the State of New York, and upon judgment of forfeiture rendered in a suit brought in the name of the people by the Attorney General, shall cease and determine. Any person intentionally making a report as herein provided, which shall be false, shall be guilty of perjury.

Section 9. Every such corporation incorporated under, or constructing, extending or operating a railroad constructed or extended under the provisions of this act, within the incorporated cities and villages of the State, shall also whenever, and as required and under the supervision of the proper local authorities have and keep in permanent repair the portion of every street and avenue between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and a space two feet in width outside and adjoining the outside rails of its track or tracks so long as it shall continue to use such tracks so constructed under the provisions of this act. In case of the neglect of such corporations to make such pavement or repairs, the local authorities may make the same at the expenses of said corporation, of thirty days notice to do so. The local authorities having charge of the streets, avenues, roads or highways in cities and incorporated villages may make such reasonable ordinances or regulations as to the rate of speed, mode of use of tracks, and removal of ice and snow, as the interest and convenience of the public may require. A corporation whose servants or agents willfully or negligently violate such an ordinance or regulation as aforesaid, shall be liable to such city or village for a penalty not exceeding five hundred dollars.

Section 10. In case any corporation incorporated under this act, or seeking to extend its road under the provision thereof, shall not commence the construction or extension of its road within one year after it has acquired the consent of the local authorities and property owners, or determination of the general term of the Supreme Court, as herein required, and shall not complete the same within three years after obtaining such consents, its rights, privileges and franchises acquired under the provisions of this act shall cease and determine. During the pendency of legal proceedings the Supreme Court shall have power to extend the period for the performance of any act herein required.

Section 11. The commissioners provided for in this act, to be appointed by the General Term, shall receive the sum of \$10 each per day for each and every day they may be engaged, and the charges, expenses and disbursements of such commissioners shall be paid by the company making the application for their appointment.

Section 12. Any street surface railway company may in any case operate any portion of said road by animal or horse power, or by any power other than locomotive steam power, which may be consented to by the local authorities or by a majority of the property owners, obtained in accordance with sections 3 and 4 of this act.

Section 13. No company or corporation incorporated under, or constructing and operating a railroad under the provisions of this act, shall charge any passenger more than five cents for one continuous ride from any point on its road, or on any road or line, or branch operated by it or under its control, to any other point thereon, or on any connecting branch thereof within the limits of any city or incorporated village. This section shall not be construed to apply to any part of any road heretofore constructed, and now in operation, unless such company shall acquire the right to extend such road, or to construct branches thereof under the provisions of this act, in which event its rate of fare shall not exceed its authorized rates prior to such extension.

Section 14. Except for necessary crossings no street surface railroad company shall construct, extend or operate its road or tracks in that portion of any street, avenue, road or highway in which the street surface railroad is, or shall be lawfully constructed, except with the consent of the company owning and maintaining the same, provided,

however, that any two or more railroad companies now existing, or hereafter formed under the provisions of this act, may join and unite and use each other's tracks for a distance not exceeding one thousand feet, whenever the court, upon an application for the appointment of commissioners next hereinafter provided, shall be satisfied that such use is actually necessary to connect main portions of the line to be constructed as an independent railroad, and that the public convenience requires the same, in which event the right of such use shall be given only for a compensation to an extent and in a manner to be determined and ascertained by commissioners appointed by the court, as provided in respect to acquiring title to the same, under chapter one hundred and forty of the laws of 1850, entitled, "An Act to authorize the formation of railroad corporations, and to regulate the same," and the several acts amendatory thereof; or by the Board of Railroad Commissioners in cases where the company interested shall unite in a request for such board to act. Such commissioners, in determining the compensation to be paid for the use by one company of the tracks of another, shall consider and allow for the use of tracks and for all injury and damage to the company whose tracks may be so used.

Section 15. It shall be lawful for any street surface railroad company or companies to lease, or to transfer its or their right, subject to all its or their obligations in respect thereof, to run upon or to use any portion of its, or their railroad tracks to any other street surface railroad company authorized to run upon such route, upon such terms as may be agreed upon by a majority of the respective boards of directors thereof, subject to approval or rejection by a vote of a majority of the stock represented at meetings of the stockholders of each of such companies, called for that purpose, and held within three months after such agreement shall have been adopted by the several boards of directors, but nothing in this section shall be construed to authorize any railroad company in cities of over three hundred thousand population, to lease its rights or franchises to any other company in said cities which owns and operates a road parallel thereto.

Section 16. No street surface railroad shall be constructed to run in whole or in part upon the surface of any street or highway under the authority of any commission appointed under the provisions of chapter six hundred and six of the laws of 1875, entitled, "An Act further to provide for the construction and operation of a steam railway or railways in counties of the State," or in the acts in addition thereto, or amendatory thereof.

Section 17. No street surface railroad shall be constructed or extended under the provisions of this act upon ground occupied by buildings belonging to any town, city, county, or to this state, or to the United States, or in public parks, except in tunnels, to be approved by the local authority having control of such parks.

Section 18. All acts, and parts of acts, whether general or special, inconsistent with this act, are hereby repealed, but nothing in this act shall revive or make valid for the purposes of this act any consents of property owners or local authorities obtained prior to the passage of this act, or shall interfere with or repeal or invalidate any rights heretofore acquired under the laws of this State by any horse railroad company, or affect, or repeal any right of any existing street surface railroad company to construct, extend, operate and maintain its road in accordance with the terms and provisions of its charter, and the acts amendatory thereof, or revive any charter which has become lapsed or forfeited or any pending litigation.

Section 19. The Legislature may at any time alter, amend or repeal this act.

Section 20. This act shall take effect immediately. Chapter 34 of the laws of 1869, entitled, "An Act for the Relief of the Rochester City and Brighton railroad Company," provides as follows:

Section 1.—The Rochester City and Brighton Railroad Company is hereby authorized and empowered to maintain and operate a railroad in all of the streets of the city of Rochester in which it

has a tracks now laid, and with the permission of the Common Council of said city, in such other streets in said city as it shall elect to use for that purpose; and with the consent of said Common Council to lay a double track in any such street or streets, and the said company shall not be bound or required to construct and operate a railroad in any street of said city where there is now no track.

Section 2. Said company, by and with the consent of the Common Council of said city, may at any time hereafter, abandon the use of any street now used, or which may hereafter be used by it for the operation of its road, and upon such abandonment shall take up its track and restore such street to as good condition as it was before the removal of such track.

Section 3. The right to use any real estate or interest therein which the said company has not acquired, and which may be required for the purpose of constructing or operating said road, as hereinbefore authorized, may be acquired by said company in the manner specified in the fourteenth, fifteenth, sixteenth, nineteenth, twentieth and twenty-first sections of the act. "An Act to authorize the formation of railroad corporations, and to regulate the same," passed April 2d, 1850, except that all the proceedings for any of the purposes authorized by this section, may be had either in the County Court of Monroe County, or in the Supreme Court; and in the petition to the court it shall not be necessary to make any allegation of or reference to any incorporation, capital stock survey or maps, or of the filing of any certificate of location. And the notices to be published as provided in subdivisions two and five of sections fourteen of said act, need not be published in the State paper; and the court shall appoint three disinterested and competent persons who reside in the County or Monroe, to act as commissioners, instead of five persons being appointed in the manner provided in section fifteen of this act.

Section 4. Said company may, and is hereby authorized to charge, collect and receive from each and every passenger for riding any distance on its said road, towards or from the intersection of Buffalo street with State and Exchange streets in said city, the sum of five cents, except that children under twelve years of age shall only be required to pay three cents fare, and children under five years of age, accompanied by parents or other persons having them in charge, shall ride free.

Section 5. Said company shall put, keep and maintain the surface of the streets inside the rails of its tracks, in good and thorough repair, under the direction of the committee on streets and bridges of the Common Council of said city of Rochester; but whenever any of said streets are by ordinance, or otherwise permanently improved, said company shall not be required to make any part or portion of such improvement, or bear any part of the expense thereof, but it shall make its rails in such street or streets conform to the grade thereof.

Section 6. This act shall not be construed as in any way impairing the force or effect of the resolution or ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Rochester, entitled, "An Ordinance in relation to street railroads," passed June 24, 1862, and the amendments thereof, as is herein specifically provided.

Section 7. This act shall take effect immediately.

The following is the Penal Ordinance originally adopted by the Common Council, June 24, 1862, and re-adopted November 30, 1880.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain as follows:

That the Common Council of the city of Rochester will permit to be constructed in said city, by the Rochester City and Brighton Railroad Company, a corporation organized under and by authority of the general railroad law, passed April 2, 1850, and the several acts amending the same, a railroad which shall commence in the town of Brighton, Monroe County, to run along the Brighton road to East avenue in said city, along East avenue, East Main and West Main streets, and West avenue to

the town of Gates; also, from East avenue along and through Prince street to University avenue, and through University avenue to East Main street; also, from University avenue along East Main street to East avenue; also, from the town of Brighton through Mount Hope avenue to and through Clarissa street to Greig street; also, through Greig street to and through Plymouth avenue to West Main street; also, from Clarissa street to and through Exchange street to West Main street; also, from West Main street through State street and Lake avenue, so called, into the town of Greece.

Also, from the junction of Clarissa street and Mount Hope avenue, through said avenue and through South and North St. Paul street to the town of Irondequoit. Also, from East Main street through Clinton street to Monroe avenue to and through Alexander street to East avenue.

Also, from East Main street through North Clinton street to the town of Irondequoit. To be constructed, established, maintained and operated upon the terms, conditions, and stipulations hereinafter prescribed.

Section 1. Such railroad shall consist of a single track, to be laid in the center of the streets and avenues named, unless the Common Council shall otherwise direct in respect to some of the wider streets and avenues, with necessary turn-outs, sidetracks and switches, and to be constructed with the improved Philadelphia broad rail, of the most approved kind and weight, six inches face, half inch raised edge, to be laid flush with surface of street, and four feet ten inches apart between the raised edges, so as to accommodate the most width of carriage wheels, and to be laid on suitable timbers, with suitable cross-ties.

Section 2. The track of said railroad shall be so laid as to permit the free passages of vehicles and carriages over the same, and the rails shall be laid even with the surface of the streets, and shall conform to the grades thereof as now established, or as they shall from time to time be established or altered. Said company shall, as soon after the adoption of this ordinance as the condition of the streets through which their track will permit, put the surface of said streets, inside the rails, and for one foot outside thereof, in good and thorough repair, under the direction of the Committee of Streets and Bridges of the Common Council, and shall thereafter keep said streets in good repair inside of or between the rails of their track only during the term of five years, and whenever it becomes necessary to improve, by ordinance or otherwise, any of the streets through which their track is laid, by a new or permanent improvement, said company shall not be required to make any part or portion thereof or bearing part or portion of the expense of making the same, during the term of five years from the adoption of this ordinance.

Section 3. During the operation of laying the rails, a free passage for carriages and vehicles over the streets shall be kept open, and immediately after the rails shall be laid, the pavement, flagging and other materials necessarily removed in laying the same shall be replaced in a good and substantial manner as before such removal, and the surface of the pavement made flush with the rails, and no portion of the pavement or surface of the streets shall be kept broken or disturbed for a greater time than five days. And all surplus street material shall be carefully removed by said company and deposited in such place or places adjacent to the street as may be directed by the officer having charge of the repairs of the same.

Section 4. The cars to be used on the railroad shall be drawn by horses or mules, only at a speed not exceeding the rate of seven miles per hour, and shall run as often as once in fifteen minutes during fourteen hours every day.

Section 5. The Common Council shall have the right to require that the cars shall commence running as early as 6 o'clock a. m. each day in the year, and the fourteen hours mentioned above shall commence at that hour in the morning. The said Common Council shall have the further right to require that said company, after the said expiration of said fourteen hours of each day, shall run their

cars on each day, as often as every half hour, until 11 o'clock in the evening, and as often as once each hour during the entire night, after 11 o'clock, if the said Common Council shall direct. And said Common Council may regulate also the running of cars on Sunday.

The said company, while they comply with the requisitions in respect to their running their cars, above referred to, may run their cars as much oftener as they shall choose, either on the whole length or over a portion or portions of said road.

Section 6. The said company may charge and collect from every persons on entering their cars or carriages, for riding any distance upon said road, to or from the extremities, and to the intersection of State and West Main streets, a sum not exceeding five cent., except children under five years of age accompanied by parents or other persons having them in charge; such children shall ride free; and except also that said company shall not charge or receive from children under twelve years of age more than three cents for any of above distances.

Section 7. No car shall be allowed to stop on a cross-walk, nor in front of any intersecting street, except as shall be necessary to avoid collisions, or to prevent danger to persons in the street.

Section 8. When the conductor of any car is required to stop at the crossing of any two streets to receive or land passengers, the car, if convenient, be stopped so as to leave the platform slightly over the crossing.

Section 9. It shall be the duty of the company to employ careful, sober and prudent agents, conductors and drivers, to take charge of their cars while on the road, and it shall be the duty of such agents, conductors and drivers, so far as the same is practicable, to keep a vigilant watch for all teams, carriages and persons on foot, and especially children, either upon the track or moving towards it, and at the first appearance of danger to such teams, carriages, footmen, children or other obstructions the cars shall be stopped in the shortest time practicable. The company, may in their discretion, run cars without any other conductor than the driver.

Section 10. The conductors shall not allow women or children to leave the cars while in motion.

Section 11. Conductors shall announce the names of the principal streets and avenues as the car reaches them.

Section 12. While the cars are turning the corners from one street to another they shall not be moved faster than a walk.

Section 13. Cars driven in the same or opposite directions on the same tracks shall not approach each other within two hundred feet, except in case of an accident or when it may become necessary to connect them together, and also except at stations and turnouts.

Section 14. Whenever there shall occur a fall of snow which materially obstructs the track and allows vehicles to pass over the same on runners, the company is authorized and required to use a sufficient number of sleighs to convey passengers over the road from day to day until the cars can be used on the track, and to so use said sleighs the same as they have a right to run their cars, and to charge fare for the carriage of passengers on such sleighs the same as if said passengers were carried on their cars.

Section 15. Whenever it shall be necessary to remove any snow or ice from the track or tracks of said road the same shall be done by said company in such manner and so evenly spread on the street as not to obstruct the free passage of sleighs or other vehicles along said street, or in crossing the same at or upon cross streets. The use of salt for the purpose of removing snow or ice from said track or tracks, or for any purpose, is expressly prohibited.

Section 16. The said company shall place, and keep placed, a printed copy of the foregoing rules and regulations, from number six to number thirteen, both inclusive, in a conspicuous place in each car upon the road.

Section 17. It is hereby reserved to the Common

Council of the City of Rochester to make such further orders, rules and regulations, in relation to the construction, repairs and operation of said railroad as from time to time may be deemed necessary to protect the interests of said city, and the safety, welfare or accommodation of the public, but no alteration of these rules shall be made which have the effect to impair the substantial right of said company.

Section 18. Wherever gas or water pipes, or sewers, are now laid in any street or avenue, the said railroad must be laid down and maintained subject to the rights over the same now in the city, and the gas and water companies to take up, alter, repair or remove said pipes or sewer in such manner as not unreasonably to damage or injure said railroad in its use, without claim to said city, gas, or water companies, and the Common Council of said city reserves to itself the right hereafter to lay down, or permit to be laid down in said streets or avenues, gas or water pipes, or sewers, and to alter, improve and repair said streets or avenues whenever the public or private convenience may require.

Gas or water companies, or private individuals who shall take up pavement or excavate the street for the purpose aforesaid, being always required as by the present city ordinance to restore the street to its former condition.

Section 19. In case said company shall fail to keep the said streets and avenues in which their said railroad shall be laid in repair, as herein provided, and shall neglect to make such repairs for two days, after notice in writing from the Street Commissioners or other officers having supervision of repairs of streets or avenues, served upon the superintendent or other managing officers of said railroad, specifying the repairs, the said Common Council shall have the right to cause such repairs to be made, and to assess the expense thereof upon the property of said company, or sue for and collect the same of said company. And in case said company shall fail to comply with any of the rules and regulations of the Common Council herein contained and provided for, the said company shall pay to the city a penalty of \$25 for each and every violation; and if the said company shall refuse or neglect to comply with any of such rules and regulations, after notice served in writing on the Superintendent or other managing officer of said railroad requiring compliance, the said company shall pay to the city an additional penalty of twenty-five dollars for each and every day during which such violation is continued.

Provided, however, that an action for such penalty or penalties shall be brought within two months from the time of such violation.

Section 20. The construction of said railroad shall be commenced within four months from the passage of this resolution, and said railroad shall be completed in and upon all the streets and avenues hereinbefore mentioned, and the cars running thereon within three years thereafter.

Section 21. It is expressly provided hereby that a majority of the directors of said railroad company shall at all times be residents of the said City of Rochester.

Section 22. That said company shall not be permitted to use or run any other than passenger cars upon said railroad within the corporate limits of said city of Rochester between the hours of 6 in the morning and 8 o'clock in the evening, except for the purpose of conveying the baggage of passengers, when necessary, between the New York Central and Genesee Valley Railroad depots.

Section 23. Should said company fail to complete said railroad, and commence running their cars within the time limited by these rules, or should said company within the time limited by this grant neglect to run cars or sleighs on said railroad after the completion thereof, for the accommodation of the public, as provided by the rules and regulations of the Common Council, for the space of two consecutive months, then the said company shall forfeit all privileges and rights which they may have acquired by said grant or by the use and possession of said

streets and avenues; and in such case the city of Rochester reserves the right to cause all obstructions and materials placed in said streets and avenues by said company to be removed therefrom, and said streets and avenues put in as good condition and repair as they were before said materials and obstructions were placed therein, and the expense thereof shall be paid to said city by said railroad company; and said city, also, in such case reserves the right to grant the same rights and privileges to any other person or persons, corporation or corporations, free from all charge or liabilities for damage on account thereof.

Section 24. It is expressly provided hereby that the said grant, and powers, rights and privileges proposed to be conferred to said company, shall, and they hereby are limited to the term of thirty years from and after the date of acceptance of the same by said railroad company.

Section 25. This resolution or grant shall not be binding on said city, unless formally accepted by said railroad company, within sixty days, in such manner as shall legally bind said company to perform the same on their part, and as shall be approved by the attorney of said city.

Section 26. If by reason of any act, omission or neglect of the said railroad company, its officers or agents, the corporation of the city of Rochester shall be subjected to any damages or liability, the said railroad company shall be liable to the said city to the same extent.

Section 27.—The said railroad corporation, or any other corporation or company, which has been, or may be hereafter organized to construct or operate a railroad in the streets of said city, shall as often as once a week, remove all dirt, filth, snow and ice from the surface of the street inside of the rails, and for two feet four inches outside thereof, and in case any such company or corporation shall refuse or fail to comply with this ordinance, it shall pay to said city a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each and every day it shall so refuse or neglect.

Section 28.—All the provisions of the foregoing ordinance shall be and are hereby made applicable to any new company or corporation which has been or may be hereafter organized to construct or operate a railroad in the streets of said city, upon the said company or corporation giving its assent thereto. And in case it shall neglect or refuse to file with the City Clerk such assent in writing, within five days from the service on its president or secretary of a copy of this resolution, then the consent of the city to the construction, maintenance and operation of such street railroad within the limits of said city is hereby withdrawn.

Section 29. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The construction of a stone sewer 1½x2 feet in size on Reynolds street, beginning at a point forty (40) feet north of the north line of Cady street and extending along the centre of Reynolds street to the Bronson avenue sewer with the necessary manholes, surface laterals, lot laterals and connections, &c.

And the whole expense shall be defrayed by the assessment upon the lots and parcels of land to be benefited thereby; and the City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council, having made an estimate of such expense, and reports the same at one thousand one hundred and fifty dollars, and said estimate being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved; and the portion of said city, which said Common Council deem will be benefited by said improvement is described as follows:

One tier of lots on each side of Reynolds street from Cady street to Bronson avenue excluding forty (40) feet of the lots on the corners of Cady street and Reynolds street and also forty (40) feet of the lot on the southeast corner of Reynolds street and Bronson avenue.

An ordinance to construct a plank walk on Culver park from Hawthorne street to the east curb line on the north and south arm of Culver park.

The Common Council of the city of Rochester, do ordain and determine that the following improvement be made, to-wit:

The construction of a plank sidewalk five (5) feet wide on the south side of Culver park, between Hawthorne street and the east curb stone on the north and south arm of said park.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Alderman Coughlin from the Health Committee, Alderman Watson from the Lamp Committee, Alderman Foley from the Poor Committee, Alderman Siener from the Police Committee, Alderman Weider from the Contingent Expense Committee, reported in favor of the pay rolls referred to their respective committees, and referred them to the Finance Committee for payment.

By Alderman Bronson—

To the Honorable, The Common Council of the City of Rochester:

ENTLEMEN—Your Assessment Committee, to which the petitions of various parties have been referred, respectfully reports:

In 1866 Mr. William Streeter purchased the west part of lot seven of the Johnson and Mastick tract, situate on the east side of Anson Park. At the time of said purchase, and again in 1880, a tax search was obtained from the City Treasurer, both of which searches showed the said property free and clear from unpaid taxes. A search recently made, however, indicates as unpaid the general city tax for 1886, two years prior to Mr. Streeter's purchase, amounting to \$11.75. Mr. Streeter is willing to pay the face of said tax but asks to be relieved from the payment of interest.

Inasmuch as the mistake occurred by reason of the inadvertence of the searching clerk in the Treasurer's office, your committee is of the opinion that the Treasurer should be instructed to receive the face of said tax without interest.

Scphla Konath is the owner of lots five and six of Louis Bauer's subdivision of part of the Jones tract on the west side of Sherman street. She has paid the general city tax on said lots for 1885 and now petitions the Common Council to refund to her the amount which she claims to be erroneously assessed.

Your committee ascertains, upon consultation with the Assessors, that there are two houses on said lots, but that the said property was erroneously assessed as if there had been three houses, the mistake occurring by reason of one of the houses being on the corner, and assessed upon each street. It appears from the certificate of the Assessors that \$37.18 is the amount erroneously assessed to Mrs. Konath, and your committee therefore recommends the adoption of a resolution directing the Treasurer to refund said sum of \$37.18 to Mrs. Konath, and charge erroneous assessments.

The petition of Helen J. Chamberlain represents that injustice has been done her in the valuation of her property on Frost avenue, and she petitions for the appropriate relief.

Your committee have given the matter a careful investigation, and have come to the conclusion that no injustice has been done Mrs. Chamberlain, and, therefore, would report adversely upon her claim.

John Hahn is the owner of lot three on the Edwards subdivision of lot fourteen of the Johnson and Seymour tract on the east side of St. Paul street. The assessment on said lot for the general city tax for 1885 amounts to \$139.41. In addition to this, Mr. Hahn is assessed for two thousand dollars' worth of personal property, the assessment on which amounts to \$61.96. Your committee is convinced that Mr. Hahn's personal property tax should be cancelled, for the reason that it appears that he has no personal property liable to taxation.

Mr. James P. Major is the owner of a lot on the east side of Pearl street known as part of 241, northwest part of 12 and southwest part of 11

tract, on which the general city tax for 1885 is \$44.26. He is also assessed for \$1,000 worth of personal property, the tax amounting to \$80.98. Mr. Major has produced before your committee affidavits showing that the personal property tax was erroneously assessed, and your committee, therefore, recommends the adoption of a resolution directing the Treasurer to receive the sum of \$44.26, the tax on said lot, and cancelling the personal property tax.

The petition of Joseph May and Valentine Heberger, executors of the will of George M. Heberger, deceased, asks for the remission of an assessment for Vincent place improvement on lot number 2, Caring and Cook's purchase, on the west side of North St. Paul street, which lot was owned by the said George M. Heberger at the time of his death in 1883. It appears that no part of said lot No. 2 fronts on Vincent place, but that said lot was expressly included in the ordinance for said improvement as part of the property to be assessed. It also appears that there is a triangular strip of land, twenty-five feet in width, on the west end and converging nearly to a point on North St. Paul street, lying between Vincent place and said lot no. 2; that said triangular piece was only nominally assessed for the improvement, and that no other property than the said lot No. 2, not fronting on Vincent place,

was assessed for said improvement. Your committee is of the opinion that lot No. 2 has derived no special benefit from Vincent place improvement which is not shared by other adjacent property on St. Paul street, which property has not been assessed for said improvement; that the assessment against said lot No. 2 was erroneous and unjust, and that, therefore the prayer of the petitioners should be granted and said assessment should be cancelled.

To the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN:—Your Water Works Committee, to whom was referred the resolution of Alderman Fritzsche presented to your Board Aug. 11, 1885, in relation to making improvements in the machinery of the flouring mill owned by the city at Hemlock Lake Village, respectfully submit the following report:

We have made a careful examination in detail of the several pieces of property owned by the city of Rochester at and in the vicinity of Hemlock Village. It appears from such examination that the city purchased said property for the purpose of securing certain rights in the outflow waters of Hem-

lock Lake and in other property owned by the old Rochester Water Company necessary to the city for the maintenance and operation of the city water works, and also to stop litigation. This purchase embraced the remaining assets of said old company, and included, among other property, a flouring mill, and saw mill with a mill-pond of about 120 acres of flowed land, also a number of vacant lots, as well as several houses and lots in the village of Hemlock Lake.

A considerable number of these outlying lots have no necessary connection with the mill property and are not needed as accessories for its successful operation for milling purposes, neither is the continued fee ownership of the same by the city necessary to the maintenance and operation of the city Water Works.

The Common Council heretofore, to wit: on the 2d day of June, 1885, passed a resolution authorizing your Water Works Committee and the Executive Board to sell a number of these lots on such terms as they might consider just and equitable, and under the terms of said resolution, one of these lots has been sold, and favorable proffers have been received for the others.

Your committee are, however, of the opinion that it would be to the advantage of the city to sell an increased number of lots beyond those authorized to be sold by said resolution of June 2d. We have therefore caused a map to be prepared, on which map the lots recommended to be sold are marked "A," and are further indicated by being surrounded by a green tint.

In the sale of these lots, all water rights, rights of way, or other rights necessary for the city to retain for the operation of its water works system will be carefully reserved.

We are also of the opinion that after these outlying lots which are not necessary to the operation of the mill, are sold, that an attempt should be made to sell the mill property in a separate parcel, believing that it will sell to a party desiring to operate a mill, for nearly as much separately, as it would if offered for sale with the outlying parcels included.

In case, however, a satisfactory price is not offered for the mill property, we believe that the money obtained for the outlying parcels and for the rental of the mill, should be used for improving the machinery thereof to the extent recommended by Messrs. Chase, Wilson and Hinds, the expert millers, recently appointed by the Executive Board to make an examination for that purpose.

The durable stone dam recently erected by the city, together with the proposed improvements to the machinery, we believe would enable the mill to compete successfully with neighboring mills in the manufacture of flour, and would make it a salable property.

We therefore make the following recommendations: First—That the Water Works Committee and the Executive Board be authorized to sell such portions of the property owned by the city at and in the vicinity of Hemlock village as they may deem unnecessary for the practical operation of the said mill or for the maintenance of the water works. Second—That they be authorized to receive proposals for the said mill property separately, and if, in their opinion, a fair and reasonable price is offered therefor, to sell the same. Third—That if they are of the opinion that a fair price is not offered for the said mill property, that they may use the money obtained by the sale of the outlying pieces or parcels, together with the rents received for the mill, in improving the machinery thereof to the extent recommended by the report of the committee of expert millers mentioned in the foregoing. The resolution as amended was then adopted.

Ald Upton moved that rule 38 be suspended, and that the pay rolls of the several departments as presented be placed upon the finance budget.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS.

By Alderman Schaeffer—

OFFICE OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD,
ROCHESTER, Sept. 8, 1885. }

To the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—Herewith please find claims for damages from Frederick Kreckmann, Mathias Dubelbeis and William Doehne, owners of lands on the Wakelee Farm, through which the Court and William Streets outlet sewer ditch passes, together with their proposition for deeding to the city permanent rights of way across their lands for the said outlet sewer ditch.

Your attention is respectively called to the following facts relating to said ditch, and to the recommendations of your Sewer Committee and the Executive Board in regard thereto.

The Court and William streets outlet sewer has its out fall into an open ditch north of the N. Y. C. & H. R. Railroad, and just west of Goodman street, upon the lands of E. S. Hayward; thence it passes northerly and easterly through the lands of said Hayward and others, including these claimants, sometimes in open ditch, at other points by covered stone sewer, and again by a series of sewer pipe culverts at the crossing of the several streets and avenues. A temporary right of way has been secured from individuals owning lands between Bay street and the city line which may be terminated at any time on the part of the city, and by the grantors, at the expiration of two years from the time that written notice shall have been served upon the city authorities of a desire upon their part to terminate the same. The annual cost for these several temporary rights of

way is \$850. Permanent right of way has also been secured from Benjamin Wilson through his lands on the south side of Pennsylvania avenue at a cost of \$250 together with the expense of inclosing and covering said ditch through his premises.

Permanent right of way has also been secured through lands of E. S. Hayward, lying between Pennsylvania avenue and the N. Y. C. and H. R. Railroad. There are about thirty city lots lying between Pennsylvania avenue and Bay street, through which the open ditch passes, and over which the city has no right of way; and the owners will, undoubtedly, one and all, as these claimants have, demand, and collect if possible, damages of the city, or force it to secure right of way upon such terms as may be agreed upon, or a commission may assess, unless some other plan is adopted which will obviate the necessity for passing over these lots.

Taking the prices which these claimants demand, as a fair average of the probable claims upon each of the thirty lots, the cost of right of way over all would amount to about \$8,625.

In consideration of the foregoing your Sewer Committee and the Executive Board would recommend that the City Surveyor be instructed to prepare an ordinance for a sewer from the point in Goodman street where the outlet ditch now crosses said street, north of Bay street, through Goodman street to Pennsylvania avenue, thence through Pennsylvania avenue to where said Court and William street outlet sewer now crosses the same. We would also recommend that said ordinance include inclosing and covering that portion south of Pennsylvania avenue where it crosses the lands now or formerly owned by the estate of Conrad Ester, and also the clearing out and dry walling the sides of the ditch through the lands of E. S. Hayward.

ACTION ON ORDINANCES—FIRST ORDINANCES

WEST AVENUE REPAIRING.

By Alderman Kohlmetz—

Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of repairing West avenue between the Erie canal and York street by replacing the present macadam roadway surface by a Medina stone block pavement, taking up, redressing and resetting the present curb-stones, so far as they are of good quality, and replacing those which are not by new curb-stones, cleaning and repairing existing surface sewers and the construction of the necessary manholes, etc.

Adopted.
The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$72,000 00.

By Alderman Kohlmetz—

Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, viz:

The repairing of West avenue between the Erie canal and York street, by replacing the present macadam roadway surface of said avenue by a Medina stone block pavement, from curb to curb, taking up, redressing and resetting the present curb-stones, so far as they are of good quality, and replacing those which are not by new curb-stones, cleaning and repairing existing surface sewers, taking up existing cross-walks, redressing the flag-stones of said walks, where they are of good quality, and replacing those which are not by new ones, and relaying such walks, the construction of manholes on the line of the sewer in said avenue, etc.

And whereas, The City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and report the same at \$72,000, which estimate is hereby approved.

GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee hereby calls attention to the subject hereinafter referred to:

All the preliminary steps to the entry of the order confirming the report of the commissioners appointed to appraise the compensation to be paid to the Honeye millers for the permanent and perpetual right on the part of the city for taking nine millions of gallons of water per day from Hemlock and Canadice lakes have been taken. A brief statement of the situation with reference to said proceeding is deemed necessary by your committee as a basis for the recommendation which is hereinafter made.

The statute under which said proceeding was instituted provides, in substance, that the report of the commissioners must be confirmed, either by the General or Special Term of the Supreme Court, and that after such confirmation any party may appeal from the order confirming such report. It was necessary that the court, under the act referred to, should fix the compensation to be paid to the commissioners, and the costs to be awarded to the parties to the proceeding. The compensation of the commissioners was fixed by the court as follows:

H. V. Howland, \$1,100, and disbursements \$35.89.
James T. Gardiner, \$1,100, and disbursements \$37.

C. C. B. Walker, \$1,000, and disbursements \$35.

The attorneys for the various claimants made a motion before the Special Term for an allowance of costs. The court after hearing the arguments presented on both sides, and after due consideration of the written briefs filed, awarded \$15.00 costs to each of the claimants, and decided that they were entitled to their witness fees. Cora J. Trimmer under this decision is entitled to \$35.00 costs and disbursements and each of the other twenty-one claimants is entitled to \$20.20 for costs and disbursements.

It is necessary that some provision should, at once be made for the payment of the fees and expenses of the commissioners.

Your Committee, in connection with the City Attorney, has given a careful consideration to the question as to whether an appeal should be taken from the order confirming the report of the com-

missioners Your committee is advised that important legal questions were passed upon by the commissioners adversely to the city, and it is the opinion of your committee that an appeal should be taken from such order to the end that a review may be had of the entire proceeding by an appellate court.

The payment of the fees and expenses of the commissioners, of course, should be made from the water-works fund, which is in the charge of the Executive Board.

Your committee, therefore, recommends that the subject of the payment of such fees be referred to such Board, with the request that provision for their payment be made.

GENTLEMEN:—The undersigned committee, appointed by your honorable body to ascertain and report as to the claim of damages presented by Johanna O'Leary, respectfully reports:

Some time prior to June 24, 1885, the Executive Board granted permission to a fire extinguisher company to lay an iron pipe from a hydrant situated on Exchange street, near the Erie canal, across the sidewalk to the rear of a building on Exchange street for the purpose of giving a demonstration of the merit of the fire extinguisher sold by said company. Such pipe was laid by said company in pursuance of such permission, and on the 24th day of June, 1885, extending across said sidewalk. The said Johanna O'Leary on that day, while passing along such sidewalk, stumbled against such pipe, fell, and received severe injuries. Since the time of the accident said claimant has been unable to do any work, and during most of time has been confined to her bed in consequence thereof.

She offers to settle her claim against the city for a sum which will represent the amount paid for doctor's bill and the amount lost by her in wages since said 24th day of June, which we ascertain to be the sum of \$300.

In the opinion of your Committee, upon the facts stated, the city is, as a matter of law, liable, if it be shown that the claimant exercised reasonable care in passing along the street at the time of the accident.

We have made a careful investigation as to the facts bearing upon such question, and there is no doubt but that she was entirely free from negligence. The liability of the city is, of course, based upon the permission given by the Executive Board to the laying of the pipe across a sidewalk which was much used by pedestrians.

We, therefore, recommend that this claim be settled by the payment of \$300, upon the execution by the claimant of a satisfactory release to the city.

It seems to your committee necessary that some decisive action shall be taken by your honorable body looking to the re-assessment of the expense of said improvement upon the property which was benefited thereby. Your committee has again given this matter a full and careful consideration, and has decided to recommend the re-consideration of the vote recently taken in the Common Council adverse to the confirmation of the roll made by the assessors, and to recommend that the roll prepared by the assessors be confirmed.

All of the members of this committee are led to make this recommendation for the reason that the Common Council, after the confirmation of the roll, will have power to correct any specific injustice that may exist with reference to such assessment, while it seems impossible to make any such corrections until such roll shall be confirmed. To the Honorable, The Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN:—Your honorable body referred to this committee a petition signed by a large number of persons owning property on the east side of Lake avenue, asking that some action might be taken by the city with reference to the alleged nuisance caused by the Lyell and Saxton street outlet sewer ditch from White street to the Genesee river. The claim is made in such petition that previous to the emptying of the said sewer into the ravine beginning at White street, a stream of comparatively pure water flowed down said ravine, and that by reason of the drainage of the said sewer into said stream the water therein has become very foul, and the health of the people living in the vicinity suffers by reason thereof.

Your committee, and other committees of your Board, have had under consideration, at various times, the question of providing a better outlet for the Lyell and Saxton street sewer.

An investigation which has been made by your committee discloses the fact that previous to the enlargement of the Erie Canal the sewer now called the Lyell and Saxton street sewer was of sufficient depth and height in the vicinity of the old canal to properly carry off the sewage from the portion of the city now draining into the Lyell and Saxton street outlet sewer. When the State enlarged the canal it so deepened the same at the place where it crossed the said sewer as to materially diminish the size, and interfere with the usefulness of the said sewer. At the point where the sewer reaches the lands of the State the sewer now descends several feet, passing under the canal, and rises an equal number of feet. The consequence of this construction is that the sewer is constantly obstructed. Any plan which is adopted looking to the relief of the petitioners aforesaid, should also provide for the relief of the people draining into said sewer.

It is thought by the City Surveyor and the City Attorney that, by a presentation of the facts to the Legislature at the coming session, an appropriation could be obtained from the State of a sufficient amount to restore the said sewer to its former condition. Such appropriation will go far toward paying the expense of the work necessary to be done in connection with the said sewer.

If your honorable body should, at once, adopt an ordinance under which the trouble complained of could be done away with, the work could not be begun before the coming spring. It is the opinion of your committee, therefore, that no action should be taken with reference to the Lyell and Saxton street outlet sewer until an effort has been made to obtain from the State an appropriation, as is before suggested.

GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee has given a careful consideration to the statements and petition presented with reference to the removal of the Monroe avenue toll-gate from its present location to a point outside of the city limits. The facts, as far as disclosed to your committee, are substantially as follows:

The charter of the Rochester and Pittsford Plank-road Company expired February 4, 1880. At the time such charter was first obtained Goodman street was the eastern line of the city, and the toll-gate was then outside of the city limits. At the time of the expiration of the charter the city limits had been so extended as to take in the location of said toll-gate. The Board of Supervisors, at the session of 1879-1880, extended the charter of said company for ten years. It is claimed by the said company that it has kept the road within the city limits in repair, having last fall put on 249 yards of gravel from the toll-gate to the city line. The question presented, in the first place is as to whether the toll-gate should be allowed to remain. Your committee is of the opinion that the toll-gate constitutes an obstruction to public travel, and that the interest of the city, and of property owners upon Monroe avenue, demands the removal of the same.

It is claimed, however, on behalf of the said company that the city has no power to remove said toll-gate. This question has been carefully considered by your committee, and we are of the opinion that the toll-gate, being an obstruction in the said street unauthorized by the municipal authorities of this city, can lawfully be, and should be removed.

Your committee therefore recommends that the said Rochester and Pittsford Plank-road Company be notified by the City Attorney to remove their toll-gate to some point beyond the city line, and that in the event of its refusal to so remove the same, the City Attorney be instructed to institute proceedings to compel such removal.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

By the Clerk—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: The undersigned deem it their duty to call your attention to the following facts:

Some time since your honorable body confirmed the assessment roll for the improvement known as the extension of Edward street. Such improvement requires the taking of lands for the purpose of said extension. Under the provisions of the charter the city is not compelled to pay for the lands taken until four months has expired from the time of the confirmation of the roll. But upon the land taken stand two dwelling houses which for some time have been unoccupied. Such dwelling houses, of course, pass with the title to the land to the city when the city shall have paid the money awarded by the commission. The dwellings are being torn to pieces and carried away. Purchasers are now ready to buy the dwelling houses of the city at a fair compensation, but if the four months shall expire from the confirmation of the assessment roll before the city acquire title, little can be obtained for the dwelling houses.

This would seem to be a case where your honorable body should authorize the Treasurer to borrow the money with which to make the payment for the land taken. The roll is in the hands of the Treasurer for collection, and if the recommendation here made should be carried out no interest will be lost to the city.

Whereas, The German population of the City of Rochester is nearly 40,000, and only a small percentage of those who have not enjoyed the training of our public schools and mastered the English language sufficiently to understand the proceedings of our municipal and political life as represented by the organs of the public press. In order to elevate them to the highest standpoint of American citizenship, it necessary to make such matters intelligible for them by means of the German-American press, and consequently in all cities of large German population newspapers have been established, aiming to interpret our institutions, and the proceedings of our public authorities to our German fellow citizens into their mother tongue, thus educating them to a full understanding and an intelligent use of American citizenship. A lively interest in all action of public authorities is an indispensable characteristic of every good and intelligent citizen, and for this reason they ought to be accessible to each and all of them. It is therefore considered a duty of our Common Council, which they owe not only to the great number of their German constituents, but also to their obligations as guardians of a wholesome development of our people, and their education to good citizenship, that the proceedings of our various municipal bodies should be published in German, and thus made intelligible to that large class of our citizens, who by their place of birth and their education need such means for a thorough enjoyment of and education to the great advantages of American citizenship; therefore,

Resolved, That the Committee on Printing be directed to procure proposals from the German newspaper publishers of this city for the publication of all notices required by the provisions of the city charter, or emanating from any department of the city government, for the balance of the current fiscal year, and report the same to this Board at the next regular meeting.

GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee, to which was referred the claim of Maurice Moynihan for \$375.00 for services rendered as investigator for the Excise Board for the months of April, May, June, July, August and September, 1885, hereby reports:

Several years since the Common Council authorized the Police and Excise Committee to employ a clerk or investigator for the Excise Board. The said committee, in pursuance of such instructions, employed Maurice Moynihan for \$62.50 a month. Mr. Moynihan continued in such employment from that time until the first of April last, and was month by month paid his salary for the services rendered by him at the rate aforesaid. No new appointment was made by the Police and Excise Committee of

the present Board, but said Moynihan continued to render services of the same nature as before the date last mentioned.

The Finance Committee did not put the salary of said Moynihan for any of said months upon the budget, and no part of such salary has been paid.

In the month of June last, a resolution was adopted by the Common Council fixing the salary of said Moynihan as such clerk, at \$62.50 per month. That resolution was vetoed by the Mayor upon the ground that said Moynihan had not been appointed by the Common Council to said office, and that the salary should not be fixed until such appointment had been made. The Common Council sustained the said veto at the meeting of this Board held on the 30th day of June last.

Upon the facts presented, your committee is of the opinion that said Moynihan has a legal claim against the city for his salary for the months of April, May and June, and not for the months of July, August and September.

GENTLEMEN: I am directed by the Executive Board to transmit to your honorable body the following extracts from a communication received by the Executive Board from City Surveyor Quinby, concerning the proposed construction of Reynolds and Goodman streets sewers:

"First—In the case of the Reynolds street sewer it was designed to make the sewer in Bronson avenue, its outlet, which would have given it a depth barely sufficient to answer the wants of the petitioners, and the estimates were made and the ordinance prepared under the supposition that this outlet could be used. But in sinking a test pit in the Bronson avenue sewer at the point where the Reynolds street sewer would enter, it was found to be filled to the depth of a full foot with sediment. The sewer in Reynolds street

running southward from Cady street which might have been made an outlet for the proposed sewer, though at a slightly less depth, was found obstructed to a still greater depth (fourteen (14) inches.) As neither of these outlets, the only available ones, could be used while in their present condition and give the interested parties on Reynolds street a sewer, constructed at a large expense without proportionate benefit, it is recommended that your Honorable Board request the Common Council to reconsider and then postpone the final ordinance for the sewer in Reynolds street, and that the City Surveyor be instructed to prepare an ordinance for cleaning the Bronson avenue sewer and constructing the necessary man-holes therein before the Reynolds street sewer is constructed.

Second—The difficulties in the way of the construction of the Goodman street pipe sewer are even greater than those in the case of the first named. The portion of the street through which it is to pass is depressed, and under the most favorable circumstances the sewer could not be made more than deep enough to drain the cellars of the buildings already erected, on account of the small depth of the outlet into which it should discharge. But in sinking a test pit this was found to be filled to the depth of at least one foot with mud and water, while at a point several hundred feet beyond it was found virtually dry, no sewage flowing through it. Probably during storms this water forces its way through the obstruction. Besides this, for the present, fatal objection, the sewer would intersect two water mains in its natural course, and to pass these it would have to be depressed below the level of the outlet, or raised above the level of the water mains, and in either case it would be useless for the purposes intended. There seems to be but two possible remedies to these difficulties, the one to change the grade of the water mains up or down, which would involve large expense, and to which your honorable Board might object, and the other to extend the proposed sewer along Goodman street a distance of five hundred and thirty (530) feet to intersect the Twelfth Ward outlet sewer where investigations indicate, the flowage is entirely free and rapid. But here other troubles are met: Goodman street from Pinnacle avenue northeastward to the outlet named is occupied by a 12-inch pipe sewer, laid, as is understood, at private expense and not under the direction of the Common Council, and about which there are no records in the City Surveyor's office. Through arrangements with the party or parties by whom this sewer was constructed, it might be used as an outlet for the new sewer, provided that the requisite depth and capacity were afforded. This is a question that has been inquired into so far as time has permitted. If no such arrangement can be made the petitioners in Goodman street asking for the new sewer would be compelled to pay for 530 feet in length more than that upon which their property fronts, and an independent sewer for the distance mentioned would become a necessity, with the advantage, however, that they could have a sewer deep enough for their present and probable future wants.

In consideration of all these facts I would therefore suggest that your honorable board recommend the ordinance for the Goodman street sewer be reconsidered and then indefinitely postponed, to give the parties interested an opportunity to acquaint themselves with the facts and make a new petition accordingly.

GENTLEMEN—Prior to the construction of that portion of the Exchange street sewer extending from Main to Court streets the outlet for Exchange street sewer was through Court street and Aqueduct street and under the Carroll and Fitzhugh race, on to the vacant property now occupied by the buildings of W. S. Kimball & Co., thence across said property to the river.

Upon the construction of said new outlet the old one was abandoned being, closed at the junction of Court and Exchange streets, and cut-off on the west bank of the race. Frequent complaints have been made to the Executive Board that this abandoned sewer has become filled with offensive water and other matter which finds its way into the basement of the Hayden Furniture Co.'s Building, corner of Exchange and Court streets, creating an intolerable nuisance.

Efforts have been made by the Executive Board to abate said nuisance which have proved ineffectual, and from examination made it is believed that the only remedy is to completely take up said abandoned sewer and fill up the space occupied by it with clean earth.

The Executive Board would therefore recommend that the City Surveyor be instructed to prepare and introduce an ordinance for taking up the abandoned sewer in Court and Aqueduct streets, and filling the space occupied thereby with clean earth.

And the whole expense shall be defrayed by the assessment upon the lots and parcels of land to be benefited thereby; and the City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council, having made an estimate of such expense, and report the same at nine hundred and fifty dollars, and said estimate being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved; and the portion of said city, which said Common Council deem will be benefited by said improvements described as follows:

One tier of lots on each side of Dake street between Alexander street and Hebard street, and also one tier of lots on each side of Hebard street included between the extended north line of Dake street and German street.

On which above described lots and parcel of land the expenses of said improvement are hereby ordered assessed, the assessment upon each lot and parcel of land to be in proportion to the benefit which each derives therefrom.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee appointed "to confer with the Committee of Citizens and Aldermen on Charter Amendments" and ascertain their views in relation to submitting to the people the question of revising the City Charter, as proposed by the report of said Committee, submitted to your Honorable Body July 28, 1885, hereby reports that at a conference with that Committee we were informed that the following action had been taken. At the meeting of the Committee on Revision of the City Charter, held on the 20th day of February, 1885, on motion of Mr Purcell that the question of the appointments of the other officers by the Mayor be submitted to the people at the next charter election.

Mr. Luckey moved as an amendment that it be at the next fall election

Mr. Archer moved as an amendment that all the important amendments be submitted at the fall election

The amendment was accepted, and the resolution was passed—All ayes. J. L. LUCKEY, Secretary.

Your committee acquiesce in the action of said committee and believe that a question involving such radical changes in the fundamental law of municipal government should be submitted to the people for their consideration and approval before incurring the expense that would be required to prepare a new charter.

Your committee therefore recommend that action on the resolution of Alderman Upton authorizing the preparation of a new charter, be postponed until such time as an expression from the people can be obtained, and that the Common Council take such action as may be necessary to submit the question of a new charter to the people at an early date.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

From the Executive Board:

OFFICE OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD,
ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 4, 1885.

To the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: A petition signed by numerous residents and taxpayers in the Fifth Ward, north of the N. Y. C. and H. R. R. Co., and requesting an improvement of the condition of the tunnels formed by carrying North St. Paul street and North Clinton street under said railroad, has been received by this Board.

The improvements asked for by the petitioners are substantially as follows:

First—Better facilities for the drainage of the roadways and sidewalks than those which now exist, the latter having been found by past experience to be inadequate.

Second—The improvement of the sidewalks by slightly raising the grade and slope of same, also by paving with brick the bare spaces at present left between the flagstones on said walks and the curbs and abutments respectively.

Third—Rendering the floors of the said railroad bridges water-tight so as to prevent drippings or

leakage of oil, water, &c., from falling upon the occupants of vehicles which use the street roadways below.

Fourth—Painting the interior surface of the said tunnels some light colors, so as to render the surroundings less gloomy in the daytime.

Fifth—Providing the North St. Paul street tunnel with an additional electric light for illuminating the same by night.

Sixth—Providing suitable high screens, fences or shields on each side of said bridges so as to conceal the locomotives and cars from the view of approaching horses, and thereby prevent danger that may be caused by them becoming unmanageable.

In reference to these several demands of the petitioners, the Executive Board would respectfully represent to your honorable body that said Board has made a careful examination of the localities mentioned, and that the complaints presented appear to be well founded.

The existing drainage facilities become inadequate during the winter on account of the accumulations of ice which during slight thaws are rapidly formed in the shaded portions of said tunnels, and which frequently even completely chokes up the surface sewers.

Large quantities of water are furthermore brought down into the depressions at all seasons in the channels formed by the rails of the street railway; and this water collects in large pools, often of considerable depth, until the surplus finds escape by overflow, while the remainder is removed only by the slow process of evaporation. It is therefore obvious that relief in this regard can be secured only by requiring the officers of the Street Railway Company to provide suitable surface sewers between the rails of their tracks at each end of the said tunnels, and to maintain their tracks therein closely upon the true grades which have been fixed by the proper city authorities, as per contract made with the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. Co.

Additional surface sewers should also be provided in the street gutters at each end of said tunnel for the interception of all water which flows through these channels down into the depressions.

The improvement of the sidewalks is also recommended, as suggested above; but this work can be performed by the Executive Board only under the authority of an ordinance from your body.

The renewing of the railroad bridge floor water tight, the painting of the interior of the tunnels and the provisions of suitable screens on each side of said bridges, as well as of additional drainage facilities in the street gutters at the points mentioned are perhaps matters that should be brought officially to the notice of the local railroad commissioners for suitable action; while the question of additional illumination can be presented to your committee in charge of this department.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: In the month of January last a resolution was duly adopted by your honorable Board directing the Mayor to enter into contracts with the owners of the lands necessary to be taken for the opening of a street from Clifford street to Norton street, for the purchase by the city of the said land, at prices agreed upon by the Executive Board and said property owners.

It has been found impossible to obtain good title to a large number of the lots required for the opening of said street, for various reasons, among which may be named the facts that several of the lots are owned by non-residents; others are owned by a large number of infant heirs, and the title to other lots is in dispute. Under condemnation proceedings good title may be obtained to each of said lots by paying the amount awarded therefor into court.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Alderman Coughlin from the Health Committee, Alderman Watson from the Lamp Committee, Alderman Foley from the Poor Committee, Alderman Mandeville from the City Property Committee, Alderman Siener from the Police Committee, and Alderman Weider from the Contingent Committee, reported in favor of the various bills presented to their respective committees, and referred them to the Finance Committee for payment.

By Alderman Kelly—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee, to which was referred the petition and remonstrance with reference to the proposed opening of a new street from Gardner park to Union park, hereby reports:

The question referred to your committee was whether the Common Council was justified, by the facts, in taking as granted that a majority of the owners of the property to be assessed for the expense of the opening of said street was in favor of the ordinance therefor. Of course, the only object of receiving a correct answer to the inquiry, so far as the legal aspect of the case is concerned, is that it may be determined whether twelve votes are required for the passage of said ordinance, or simply a majority of the members of the Common Council.

Many of the facts bearing upon the question referred to are familiar already to the Board. A brief statement of some of them is necessary.

At a meeting of the Common Council, held on the 16th day of June, 1885, a petition for the said improvement was presented, which petition was dated June 16, 1885. This petition was certified to, on the back the eof, by the Assessors as being a majority petition, such certificate being undated. It appears, however, that this petition was originally prepared in May, 1884, and it soon after that time received some of the names which now appear thereon.

While the Common Council had under consideration the ordinance referred to a remonstrance was presented, which remonstrance was signed by a majority of the owners of the property whose lands are to be assessed. The Common Council, therefore, had under consideration an ordinance, in favor of which a petition, certified by the assessors to be a majority petition, had been presented, and against the passage of which ordinance a remonstrance, signed by a majority of the owners of the property to be assessed, had been presented.

The ordinance, when the same came up on its final passage, received eleven votes, and there being a doubt in the mind of the chairman as to whether a majority of the owners to be assessed for the improvement was in favor of it, or opposed to it, the ordinance was declared lost, as not having received twelve votes. Under this condition of things your committee began its investigations.

Your Committee has made a very careful investigation into the whole matter, and has heard the statements and allegations of all persons who expressed a desire to be heard before it, and hereby submits the facts found and the conclusions which your committee have drawn therefrom.

The section of the Charter relating to the question under consideration is section one hundred and seventy-one. That section provides, in substance, that the Common Council shall not open any street or alley, or make or ordain any work or improvement, the expense whereof is to be defrayed in whole or in part by a local assessment, except upon a petition of a majority of the owners of the property to be assessed therefor, unless three-fourths of all the members elected to the Common Council vote therefor, after allegations have been heard.

Your Law Committee is of the opinion that the time when the Common Council takes action upon a petition presented to it is the time when consideration must be had as to whether or not a majority of the persons to be assessed is in favor or against the improvement. To make application of this principle to this case the question arises, did a majority of the persons whose lots were to be assessed, under this ordinance for the opening of this street, favor this improvement on the sixteenth day of June, 1885?

Under the ordinance the following named persons are to be assessed to provide for the expense of the improvement, namely:

Smith Chapman, L. B. Ashley, C. F. Booth, W. A. Stevens, H. R. Stockbridge, C. W. Havens, Florence C. Lukens, Board of Trustees of the Free Methodist Church, heirs of Godfrey Tallinger, E. W. Osborn, G. Mannel, J. McGill, S. E. Brace, E. E. McDowell, C. H. Brace, S. V. McDowell, C. A.

Vickery, W. R. Oatley, Louise H. Canfield, C. B. Webb, heirs of M. Conway and E. W. Hyde, a total of twenty-two owners of property. The lot now owned by Florence C. Lukens was, prior to July 13, 1885, owned by William W. Gilbert.

It follows, therefore, that twelve of the owners of property must have petitioned for said improvement in order to render valid an ordinance for the same adopted by the votes of less than twelve Aldermen.

The following named persons never signed the petition, namely: Smith Chapman, L. B. Ashley, H. R. Stockbridge, C. W. Havens, heirs of Godfrey Tallinger, E. W. Osborn, G. Mannel, J. McGill, Louise H. Canfield, heirs of M. Conway and E. W. Hyde, a total of eleven. All of the said persons were owners of lots to be assessed on the 16th day of June, 1885, the date of the presentation of said petition.

J. W. Canfield formerly owned property on Union street which was to be assessed for the improvement. While such owner he signed the petition. He died some months prior to the 16th day of June aforesaid, and by his will devised said land to his wife, Louise H. Canfield, who was the owner of the same on the last mentioned date. The name of Mrs. Canfield appears upon the remonstrance.

L. M. Winn, who appears upon the petition, and who was counted as one of the property owners to be assessed, and in favor of the improvement, owns land fronting on Union street. Such land is, however, not to be assessed for any part of the expense of the improvement.

From the foregoing it appears, and your committee reports, that at the time the petition for the said improvement was presented a majority of the then owners of property to be assessed had not signed the petition to the Common Council in favor of the proposed improvement, and therefore it will require twelve votes to pass the ordinance.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Since the confirmation of the assessment roll for the Oak street improvement a large number of persons who owned property on that street at the time of the confirmation of the original assessment roll, who made payments on said roll have indicated their willingness to pay the present assessment against the property, provided the Common Council will, at once direct the payment to them of the amount originally paid by them, with interest to date.

There are now five actions pending against the city in the various courts to recover the amounts paid on the old roll, with interest. The names of the plaintiffs in these actions are as follows: Patrick Harrigan, Ezekiel Wagner, Caspar Knopf, Caroline Stocking, as executrix, etc., of Lucy Foster, deceased, John H. Moody, as administrator, etc., of David Moody, deceased.

Turk is attorney for the plaintiffs in each of these cases, and has expressed a willingness to discontinue each of said actions, upon payment by the city of the amount of their claims, after deducting the present assessment against the property, and the payment to him of \$75 costs and disbursements in said actions.

In addition to these parties, Messrs. D. W. Walbridge, Joseph P. Cromer, representing the estate of John Cromer, Charles F. Beach, as executor, etc., of Eva Barhydt, William Carroll, N. S. Adams, George G. Carroll, as executor, etc., of Hugh Bradley, deceased, James Gleason and others are willing to settle upon the same basis.

I, therefore, recommend the adoption by your honorable body of a resolution directing the payment to the parties who made payments on the old assessment roll of the amount which they paid, with interest, in all cases where the said parties, or their representatives, are willing to pay the new assessment upon the property.

In cases where parties who made payments on the old roll are unwilling to pay the new assessment upon the property, I think the Common Council should advise the contesting of the payment in the courts to the last extremity.

All the territory described within and enclosed by the following boundary lines, viz.:

Beginning at the intersection of the south line of Rowe street with the west line of the city, thence southerly along said west line to the north line of Emerson street, thence easterly along the north line of Emerson street, excepting one tier of lots on the north side thereof to the west line of the Erie Canal property, thence northerly along the west line of the Erie Canal property to the south line of Rowe street, thence westerly along the south line of Rowe street to the place of beginning. Also one tier of lots on each side of the proposed sewer from Rowe street to the Erie Canal.

Excepting from the above one tier of lots on each side of Seventh and Eighth streets from Emerson street to a point 300 feet north thereof.

On which above described lots and parcels of land the expense of said improvement are hereby ordered assessed, the assessment upon each lot and parcel of land to be in proportion to the benefit which each derives therefrom.

FINAL ORDINANCE, NO. 2846.

SOUTH ST. PAUL STREET SEWER.

On motion of Alderman Schaeffer, the Board proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the ordinance below:

After hearing such allegations from all persons appearing, Alderman Schaeffer submitted the following:

An ordinance to construct a pipe sewer in South St. Paul street from a point ten feet north of the north line of the New Osburn House to the sewer in East Main street.

The Common Council of the city of Rochester, do ordain and determine that the following improvements be made, to wit:

The construction of a sewer of vitrified pipe fifteen (15) inches in diameter in South St. Paul street, beginning at a point ten (10) feet north of the north line of the New Osburn House and extending northward to intersect the sewer in East Main street, said sewer to be laid in the roadway of South St. Paul street and as near to the east curb line thereof as may be practicable, with the necessary man-holes, lot laterals and connections, surface sewers, lamp-holes, etc.

And the whole expense shall be defrayed by the assessment upon the lots and parcels of land to be benefited thereby; and the City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council, having made an estimate of such expense, and report the same at two thousand four hundred and fifty dollars, and said estimate being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved; and the portion of said city, which said Common Council deem will be benefited by said improvement described as follows:

One tier of lots on the east side of South St. Paul street from East Main street to a point ten (10) feet north of the north line of the New Osburn House; also the two (2) lots on the west side of South St. Paul street immediately south of the Opera House, which two (2) lots are assessed on the Assessors books to Elizabeth Hawes.

On which above described lots and parcel of land the expenses of said improvement are hereby ordered assessed, the assessment upon each lot and parcel of land to be in proportion to the benefit which each derives therefrom.

And it is further ordained and determined that the taxpayers to be assessed for making such improvement may pay their assessments in three equal payments as follows: One-third of the amount assessed within thirty days after the advertisement of the assessment roll; one-third of the amount within one year from the confirmation of such roll; and the remaining one-third within two years from the confirmation of such roll. On all sums paid prior to the maturity of said last instalment, a discount will be allowed of six per cent. per annum.

Alderman Watson presented a remonstrance. The ordinance was then adopted by the following vote:

R. shall be raised and that the spaces between said walks and the curbs and abutments respectively be properly surfaced with gravel; also that additional drainage facilities be provided under said elevated tracks at North St. Paul and North Clinton street, by the construction of several new surface lateral sewers in the street gutters at said places; and also that the faces of the stone abutments of the railroad bridges over each of said streets shall be whitened so as to improve the illumination of the present gloomy passages; and,

Whereas, The N. Y. C. and H. R. R. Co. has completed the work of elevating its tracks and providing proper roadways and side-walks at the above mentioned streets under its agreements with the municipal authorities, and should therefore not be required to perform the aforesaid work; and,

Whereas, The proposed improvements at said localities are not repairs, but are actually in the nature of new work, the cost of which is therefore not properly chargeable to the Highway Fund; and

Whereas, If said work be treated as local improvements, the assessments for the payment thereof according to benefit derived, would necessarily extend over so large a territory as will render the costs of assessment and collection really, if not quite, as great as the cost of the work herewith proposed; therefore

Resolved, That the Executive Board be and it is hereby directed to cause the flagstone walks on each side of North St. Paul street under the elevated tracks of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R. to be suitably raised and the spaces in the sidewalks adjacent to said flagstones to be properly surfaced with gravel; also, to cause a sufficient number of new surface sewers to be constructed in the street gutters under said elevated tracks at North St. Paul street and North Clinton street; and also, to cause the faces of the stone abutments of the railroad bridges over each of said streets be whitened. And the City Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to pay the expenses thereof, not to exceed in the aggregate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), on the voucher of the Executive Board, out of the Contingent Fund.

Alderman Upton moved to amend by inserting "Highway Fund" in place of "Contingent Fund."

Alderman Kelly moved that the matters referred to in the resolution be referred to the Elevated Track Commissioners with the request to said Commissioners to compel the railroad company to carry out the provisions of its contract with reference to the crossings at North St. Paul and Clinton streets, especially in the particulars mentioned in the said resolution, and to report the action taken by them to this Board at its next meeting.

§ 2. The Mayor of the city of Rochester shall license any proper person to sell as above on payment thereof of a license of \$5 for each wagon employed.

§ 3. All vegetables, garden produce, or provisions sold by measure shall be measured by measures sealed by the City Sealer within three months from the time of obtaining license to sell, under the penalty of \$5 for each offense.

§ 4. The provisions of the preceding sections shall not apply to the taking of orders from customers by regular grocers having an established place of business, nor to persons offering for sale produce which they have themselves raised.

§ 5. Every execution issued under a judgment recovered for a violation of this ordinance, shall command the amount to be made out of the property of the defendant if any such can be found, and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentiary for not more than twenty days.

§ 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately."

It appears from proof which has been produced before your committee that the total amount of personal property subject to assessment and owned by said Allen at the time the Assessors were hearing allegations, was of the value of \$1,900 and the indebtedness of said Allen amounted to \$1,600. This would leave as the proper amount to be assessed the sum of \$300.

The amount of the tax upon said personal property was \$30.98, which was paid by the said Elias Allen on the 25th day of July, 1885, under protest.

Your committee, in view of all the circumstances of this case, recommend that a resolution be adopted providing for the refunding to the said Elias Allen of \$21.86, being the amount of the tax upon \$700, thus leaving a net payment of \$9.30 by said Allen upon a tax of \$300.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester :

GENTLEMEN—Your Law Committee hereby submits the following: Something more than a year ago, two actions were brought against the City of Rochester. One by the Board of Health of the town of Brighton, and the other by George Chapman. Such actions were brought to enjoin the further use, by the city, of East avenue and the Monroe avenue outlet sewers, and for damages. The outlet of these sewers is Thomas creek, a stream running through the town of Brighton, and emptying into Irondequoit Bay. This stream crosses land owned by a relative of the City Attorney. By reason of the relationship above mentioned, the City Attorney did not regard it as proper that he should represent the city upon the trial of those actions, and therefore employed Edward Harris, Esq., to appear for and represent the City upon the trials thereof. The selection of Mr. Harris was made with the concurrence of the people residing upon East avenue affected by the actions brought.

These actions were tried before Judge Rumsey by Mr. Harris. In one of them—that of the Board of Health against the city—the city succeeded; in the other, the plaintiff recovered a judgment of \$1,300 for past damages, and costs, and the court granted an injunction to be operative six months after the decision made by him.

The bill which Mr. Harris has rendered for the service mentioned, amounts to \$300. The charge made by him is very reasonable for the service rendered.

Your committee is of the opinion that the City Attorney should not be required to pay this bill. In no actions that have been brought since his first term of office began, has the city been called upon to pay any counsel fee whatsoever. The only reason a counsel fee is incurred in the matters aforementioned, is that the City Attorney felt himself to be disqualified to try the cases, by reason of the relationship suggested, and the position maintained by him must be conceded as alike honorable and worthy of commendation. Your committee does not regard it as fair or just that the City Attorney should be expected to pay this bill, under the circumstances, and therefore recommends that a resolution be adopted providing for the payment of the bill rendered by Mr. Harris. Without the recognition even of a moral sense of responsibility, the propriety of the action herein recommended, commends itself to all who recognize the same standard in the consideration and determination of public business, as would be characterized in their own private affairs, as dictated by the recognized standards of common honesty and justice.

Your committee deems it proper to state that the recommendations herein contained, are made without the knowledge of the City Attorney, and believe that the action hereby suggested is as much due to him, as it may be considered magnanimous on the part of the city.

FINAL ORDINANCES

FINAL ORDINANCE, No. 2,847.

OPENING A STREET FROM JEFFERSON AVENUE TO GENESSEE STREET.

On motion of Alderman Bohrer, the Board proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the ordinance below:

After hearing such allegations from all persons appearing, Alderman Bohrer submitted the following:

An Ordinance to open a street from Jefferson avenue to Genessee street.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain and determine that the following improvement be made, to wit:

The opening of a street from Jefferson avenue to Genessee street, the center line of the proposed street to be the division line of the lots fronting on Flint street and Magnolia street respectively and the north and south lines of the said new street to be parallel to and twenty-five (25) feet from the center line aforesaid.

And the whole expense shall be defrayed by the assessment upon the lots and parcels of land to be benefited thereby; and the portion of said city which said Common Council deem will be benefited by said improvement is described as follows:

One tier of lots on each side of the proposed street and included between Jefferson avenue and Genessee street.

On which above described lots and parcels of land the expenses of said improvement are hereby ordered assessed, the assessment upon each lot and

parcel of land to be in proportion to the benefit which each derives therefrom.

To Christian J. Schaeffer, Alderman of the Sixteenth Ward, Rochester, N. Y.:

Your inquiry with reference to the alleged obstruction of North avenue by the Rochester and Lake Ontario Railroad Company has been received, and I hereby submit the following answer:

The said Rochester and Lake Ontario Railroad Company was organized under and in pursuance of chapter 606 of the Laws of 1875, entitled "An act further to provide for the construction and operation of a steam railway or railways in the counties of the State."

The said railroad company proceeded to construct its railroad beginning at the intersection of Bay street with North avenue and extending down North avenue to, and beyond, the city line. The city of Rochester was not, so far as I have been able to ascertain, made a party to any proceedings taken under said act, but in many, and in perhaps a majority of cases, the consent of the owners of property upon said street was obtained to the construction of such railroad. The route of the said railroad was determined upon by the Commissioners appointed under said act, and their determination was duly approved.

By chapter 311 of the Laws of 1880, the route of said railroad, as laid out was thereby in all respects confirmed, the same as if said route had been particularly specified in the original articles of association, and the said railroad company was by said act empowered and authorized to hold the title of all the real estate owned by said company at the time of the passage of the said act.

It is a matter of common knowledge that North avenue from Bay street to the city line has been, for a great number of years, a public highway. The public has, and has had, a right to the use of such public highway, and the whole of the same. As against the public, I am of the opinion that said railroad company has acquired no rights in the use or occupation of said highway, or in any part thereof, inconsistent with the free and unobstructed use of the same by the public.

If the said railroad company has, as is stated in your inquiry obstructed public travel upon said highway by placing barriers on or across any portion thereof, such obstruction was without warrant of law, and the Executive Board may institute proceedings looking to the removal of any such obstructions.

GENTLEMEN—Your Assessment Committee, to to which was referred the petition of the Trustees of the Parochial Fund of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of New York, respectfully reports as follows:

That your petitioner is a religious corporation, and is the owner of lots Nos. 133 and 134, situated on the south side of Munger street in the Twelfth Ward in the city of Rochester; that said premises are held by the said petitioner, in trust, for the use of St. Andrew's Church and have been used and occupied by said church for religious purposes for many years last past; that a large part of both of said lots are taken up with one church building, commonly known as St. Andrew's Church, which consists of a church, chapel and rectory; that in said rectory are vestry and robing rooms, forming a part of the church building, which is used for public worship, and for no other purpose; that a part of said building known as the rectory is a necessary part of the church edifice, and in the continuous use thereof as a building for public worship.

It appears that there has been assessed upon these two lots the sum of \$48.34 for the general city tax for the year 1884, and the sum of \$46.47 as general city tax for the year 1885.

Since the reference of the petition herein to your committee the petitioner has brought an action in the Supreme Court against the city to have the

said taxes vacated, annulled and set aside, upon the ground that under the laws of the State every building for public worship, and the several lots whereon such buildings are situated, are exempt from taxation. After consultation with the City Attorney we have come to the conclusion that no defense can be successfully interposed in said action. We are informed by the City Attorney that the plaintiff is willing to discontinue said action without costs, if the said taxes are, at once, ordered by your honorable body cancelled and set aside.

Your Committee, therefore, recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

Gentlemen of the Common Council:

Alderman Kelly's resolution adopted at your last regular meeting, ordering the payment of the sum of \$300 to Edward Harris, for services rendered in the matter of the Board of Health of Brighton against the City of Rochester, and George Chapman against the City of Rochester, is hereby returned disapproved. It seems by reason of the relationship of Mr. Beckley, the City Attorney, to one of those interested in the prosecution of the said suits against

the city, he felt disqualified to act for the defense, and employed Mr. Harris at his own expense, and with the consent of the authorities, to act for him. (See annual report of Law Committee at page 356, Common Council proceedings for year 1884-5.)

There is no evidence in the communication of your present Law Committee, which communication precedes the resolution to which I object, that Mr. Beckley makes any claim upon the city, or even desires that the city should settle his obligation to Mr. Harris; nor is there any evidence that Mr. Harris so desires it, or that he makes any claim against the city for the services rendered by him in the matter mentioned.

Under these circumstances, I hardly think your Board has a right to interfere in a matter that concerns Mr. Harris and Mr. Beckley only, and especially in view of the fact that it contemplates the payment of the sum of \$300, which the city does not in any sense of the word owe, and cannot afford to pay. To the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—At a regular meeting of your Honorable Body held November 17th ultimo, Final Ordinance No. 2845. "To extend the Rowe street sewer from the Center of Rowe street opposite Dove street to the Erie Canal" was passed. Between the South line of Rowe street and the canal said extension will pass through private property.

For the first one hundred feet, approximately, it will pass through the property of Platt Horton, for the next one hundred feet through that of Cyrenius H. Finch, and for the balance of the distance, about one hundred and fifty feet through property owned by said Finch and the firm of C. J. Hayden & Co.

The Executive Board cannot let or enter upon the construction of the work under this ordinance until right of way has been secured from these several owners.

The Executive Board has endeavored to negotiate with them for the necessary easement and has thereby learned that they demand a sum which shall be equivalent to that which will be assessed against them severally, for the construction of said sewer, together with the right and privilege to drain their said premises into the same.

Inasmuch as it will not be possible to determine these sums in advance of the construction of the work, and as it is understood that each of said parties will grant right of way for said sewer for a nominal sum, together with the privilege of using the same, on condition that their property as aforesaid if excluded from the territory described to be assessed therefore, the Executive Board would respectfully suggest, if it be competent for your honorable body so to do, to amend said ordinance in respect to the territory to be assessed, or that condemnation proceedings be at once instituted to acquire the necessary easement.

To the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: During the winter season for several years past a foot-bridge across the canal at Fitzhugh street has been constructed under the direction of the Executive Board, the expense of which has been paid from the highway fund. The erec-

tion of this bridge each winter has heretofore been requested and expected by the residents of the Third Ward, as well as others who have occasion to walk into that district of the city, so that the custom has gradually grown into a necessity, by providing a means of avoiding the danger which attends the walking up or down the steep hill at Fitzhugh street bridge.

A request for another foot bridge at said street has again been made this year by numerous citizens, but in view of the decision recently given by Hon. John S. Morgan, County Judge, in the case of Leonard vs. the city of Rochester, the Executive Board finds that it has now no authority to cause the erection of said bridge, as will be seen from the following extract from Judge Morgan's opinion.

"The work that was undertaken to be done here at the outset, the building of this bridge, though a little thing in itself, cannot be considered a repair; it is an original construction just as much as if it had been a bridge built in any other place. The Common Council solely, under the charter, has authority to authorize such work. The Executive Board had not authority as a Board to direct the building of any bridge, or to direct the erection of any construction whatever."

The Executive Board deems that the erection of this foot bridge would prove a great convenience to a large number of our citizens, and would therefore respectfully present the subject to your honorable body for proper action. Respectfully,

To Alderman Bronson and others, Assessment Committee of the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: In compliance with the request of your Committee, the Executive Board has made an examination of the assessment for water works purposes on lot No. 4, being the property of George Moulson, situated in the sixteenth Ward, fronting on North Union street and bounded on the south by the N. Y. C. and H. R. R., and on the north by lands of the Fourteenth Ward Building Association. As a result of the examination the following facts are disclosed:

In the early part of the year 1884, a majority petition was presented to the Common Council in the language following, to wit:

"The undersigned property owners on Union street, from Pennsylvania avenue to the south line of lot No. 2, a distance of about 180 feet south of south line of Pennsylvania avenue in said city, respectfully petition your honorable body that you will cause water pipes or mains for the purpose of supplying the adjoining premises with water, to be laid in said street, etc."

The Common Council directed that the pipe should be laid in said street in accordance with the petition therefor. The engineer of the Water Works, without having made a critical examination to determine whether 180 feet from the south line of Pennsylvania avenue would exactly correspond with the south line of lot 2, caused the pipe to be laid the distance of 180 feet from the south line of Pennsylvania avenue measured on the east line of Union street. This, in fact, resulted in extending said pipe 52 7-10 feet beyond the south line of lot 2, thus extending the said pipe 52 7-10 feet along the front of lot No. 4 the premises of said Moulson.

The Executive Board therefore certified to the City Assessors that the water pipe had been thus extended, and that the property in front of which the pipe was so laid was jointly liable with the property in the old city for the water works debt.

The dimensions of the said Moulson lot, as given on the City Assessors' roll, are 214 feet frontage on Union street; width in rear 814 feet; depth 866 feet, and is assessed as one lot at \$4,000.

Although the water pipe only extended in front of 52 7-10 feet of the frontage of the lot, yet as it had never been subdivided by Mr. Moulson, but had always been assessed as one lot, the City Assessors spread the tax for water for 1885 over the whole lot.

The tax on water on said lot amounts to \$31.17. As no water is used and no water rents paid on said lot, the Assessors also placed a frontage tax on said lot of three cents per lineal foot in pursuance of section 5, of act, chapter 129, laws of 1882

After an examination of the whole matter and procuring the opinion of the City Attorney in relation thereto, we have arrived at the following conclusions:

First—That the petition for the extension of the water pipes in Union street was a majority petition only to the south line of lot 2, or to the north line of lot 4, belonging to Mr. Moulson, and that the extension of said pipe 57 7-10 feet along the frontage of Mr. Moulson's lot in the absence of a majority petition, did not under the charter render the lot liable for the water debt.

Second—That the assessment of the frontage tax of three cents per lineal foot on the whole front of 214 feet, was erroneous, but that an assessment of three cents per lineal foot on 52 7-10 feet being the distance which the said pipe is laid along said front would be in accordance with the statute.

Third—We therefore recommend that the tax for water works debt amounting to \$31.17 be remitted.

Also that there be remitted the frontage tax on 161 3-10 feet of front amounting to \$4.84, making a total recommended reduction of the assessment on said lot of \$36.01. Respectfully submitted,

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN—At the request of Alderman Foley I have given a careful examination to the question of the right of the Common Council to include the property of the Rochester City and Brighton Railroad Company among the property to be assessed for the proposed improvement of West avenue.

If the determination of the question rested solely upon a proper construction of the powers conferred upon the Common Council by the charter with reference to making assessments for local improvements, I think that under the decisions of the courts which have repeatedly held, in this State and elsewhere, that the tracks of street railroads, and the ties upon which they rest, are real estate, there would be no doubt of the power of the Common Council having power to determine that the property of the railroad company was benefited by the improvement, and to order that property to be included within the territory to be assessed for the payment thereof. But in determining the question consideration must also be given to the provisions of chapter 34 of the laws of 1869, entitled, "An act for the relief of the Rochester City and Brighton Railroad Company." Section 5 of that act reads as follows:

Said company shall put, keep and maintain the surface of the streets inside the rails of its tracks in good and thorough repair, under the direction of the Committee on Streets and Bridges of the Common Council of the said city of Rochester, but whenever any of said streets are, by ordinance or otherwise, permanently improved,

the said company shall not be required to make any part or portion of such improvement, or bear any part of the expense thereof, but it shall make its rails in such street or streets conform to the grade thereof."

The ordinance before your honorable body reads as follows:

"Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, namely, the repairing of West avenue between the Erie canal and York street by replacing the present Mcadam roadway surface of said avenue by a Medina stone block pavement from curb to curb, taking up, redressing and resetting the present curb stones so far as they are of good quality and replacing those which are not by new curb stones, cleaning and repairing existing surface sewers, taking up existing crosswalks, redressing the flag-stones of said walks where they are of good quality, and replacing those which are not by new ones, and relaying such walks, the construction of manholes on the line of the sewer in said avenue, etc.

In my judgment such an improvement as is above described, would be held by the courts to be a permanent improvement within the meaning of the section above quoted, and I am, therefore, of the opinion that the Common Council has no power to assess the Rochester City and Brighton Railroad Company for any part of the expense of the proposed improvement. Whereas, The territory embraced within the limits of the City of Rochester cover _____ square miles, making it almost impossible to properly patrol the same, owing to disadvantages herein-after stated, as well as the lack of proper numerical strength of our Department.

And, Whereas, The present mode of conducting a prisoner from remote beats to the police headquarters as now located necessarily leaves said officer's beat (in each and every instance) for more than one hour; and,

Whereas, Other cities of the population of Rochester are provided with sub-stations located at different points in said cities, thus providing against the above contingency in these cities; therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board recommend to the Common Council the appointment by that body of a committee to confer with the Police Committee and this Board upon the feasibility of the procurement of a patrol system or the establishment of sub-stations or such other relief as in the opinion of such joint committee the necessities herein referred to may, in their opinion, demand.

WEST AVENUE IMPROVEMENT.

By Alderman Kohlmetz—

Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of improving West avenue, from Prospect street to the west line of the city.

Adopted.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$70,000.

The improvement of West avenue from the west line of the city to a line at right angles to said avenue running from the intersection of the southerly line thereof with the westerly line of Prospect street, by removing the present macadam roadway surface and so much of the stone foundation thereof as may be necessary, and by replacing the thoroughly screened macadam material with the addition of a sufficient quantity of broken stone or gravel to form a bed at least six (6) inches in thickness of concrete, to receive upon it a genuine Trinidad asphaltum pavement of no less than two and one-half (2½) inches in thickness; and also the redressing and resetting the present curb-stones, where it may be needed; the replacing of the old curb-stones where found unsuitable for use by new curb-stones; the cleaning of the main and surface sewers, with the necessary repairs; the construction of new manholes and surface sewers where needed, and the laying of water service and gas pipes where such pipes are needed or their use are contemplated.

And Whereas, the City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at \$70,000 which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, that the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and proper to be assessed for the whole expense thereof, viz.:

One tier of lots on each side of West avenue between the west line of the city and the line at right angles to West avenue running from the intersection of the southerly line of the said avenue with the westerly line of Prospect street.

And further Resolved, That the taxpayers to be assessed for making such improvements may pay their assessments in three equal payments as follows: One-third of the amount assessed within thirty days after the advertisement of the assessment roll; one-third of the amount within one year from the confirmation of said roll, and the remaining one-third within two years from the confirmation of said roll. On all sums paid prior to the maturity of the said last installment, a discount will be allowed at six per cent. per annum.

Rauber street is a street running easterly from Clinton street to St. Joseph street. About half way between the two streets is a ridge. Several years ago a sewer was constructed in St. Joseph street, into which sewer drains that portion of Rauber street lying east of the ridge, and for which sewer the said portion of Rauber street was assessed. AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER OF THE QUESTION WHETHER THE CHARTER OF SAID CITY SHOULD BE REVISED.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Common Council of the city of Rochester is authorized and empowered to order that a special election to be held in that city for the purpose of having submitted to the electors thereof the questions set forth in section two of this act.

Section 2. The questions which shall be submitted to the electors of said city of Rochester at the special election provided for by section one of this act shall be the following, to-wit:

First—Should the charter of the city of Rochester be revised?

Second—Should the Executive Board be abolished and the powers now exercised by that Board be conferred upon one Superintendent of city improvements, one Superintendent of Streets, one Superintendent of Water Works and one Superintendent of the Fire Department?

Third—Should the Common Council be a legislative body only, all executive powers being transferred to, and executed by, other departments of the city government?

Fourth—Should there be one Commissioner of Police and one Commissioner of Excise, in the place of the Boards of Police Commissioners and Excise Commissioners, as they now exist?

Fifth—Should there be created the office of Auditor?

Sixth—Should there be conferred upon the Mayor the sole power of appointing the heads of all departments?

Section 3.—Notice of such special election and of the propositions to be voted upon, shall be given by the publication of a notice thereof by the Common Council of said city once a day for ten days in at least three of the daily newspapers published in said city. The polls at such election shall be, and remain, open from 9 o'clock in the morning until 9 o'clock in the evening, and all electors of said city who were entitled to vote in their re-

spective election districts at the last general election and who have not changed their respective places of residence or become disqualified from voting for city officers at a charter election, shall be respectively entitled to vote once upon each of the propositions submitted, as provided for in this act.

Section 4—It shall be the duty of the Inspectors of Election of the city of Rochester to act as inspectors of the election provided for by this act. All provisions of law relating to compensation and the duties of Inspectors of Election shall be applicable to the compensation and duties of said inspectors of election at said special election.

Section 5—The Common Council is authorized and empowered to make such provisions for the special election authorized by this act as shall be necessary.

Section 6—This act shall take effect immediately.

ROWE STREET SEWER EXTENSION.

All the territory described within and enclosed by the following boundary lines, viz.:

Beginning at the intersection of the south line of Rowe street with the west line of the city, thence southerly along said west line to the north line of Emerson street, thence easterly along the north line of Emerson street, excepting one tier of lots on the north side thereof, to the west line of the Erie Canal property, thence northerly along the west line of the Erie Canal property to the south line of Rowe street, thence westerly along the south line of Rowe street to the place of beginning.

Excepting from the above one tier of lots on each side of Seventh and Eighth streets from Emerson street to a point 300 feet north thereof, on which above described lots and parcels of land the expenses of said improvement are hereby ordered assessed, the assessment upon each lot and parcel of land to be in proportion to the benefit which each derives therefrom.

AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER OF QUESTIONS RELATING TO PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE CHARTER OF SAID CITY.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Common Council of the city of Rochester is authorized and empowered to order that a special election to be held in that city for the purpose of having submitted to the electors thereof questions provided for in section two of this act.

Section 2. The questions which shall be submitted to the electors of said city of Rochester at the special election provided for by section one of this act shall be the following, and such others as the Common Council shall deem proper, to-wit:

First—Should there be conferred upon the Mayor the sole power of appointing the heads of all departments?

Second—Should the Executive Board be abolished and the powers now exercised by that Board be conferred upon one Superintendent of city improvements, one Superintendent of Streets, one Superintendent of Water Works and one Superintendent of the Fire Department?

Third—Should the Common Council be a legislative body only, all executive powers being transferred to, and executed by, other departments of the city government?

Fourth—Should there be one Commissioner of Police and one Commissioner of Excise, in the place of the Boards of Police Commissioners and Excise Commissioners as they now exist?

Fifth—Should there be created the office of Auditor?

Section 3.—Notice of such special election and of the propositions to be voted upon, shall be given by the publication of a notice thereof by the Common Council of said city once a day for ten days in at least three of the daily newspapers published in said city. The polls at such election shall be, and remain, open from 9 o'clock in the morning until 9 o'clock in the evening, and all electors of said city who were entitled to vote in their respective election districts at the last general election and who have not changed their respective places of residence or become disqualified from voting for city officers at a charter election, shall be respectively entitled to vote once upon each of the propositions submitted, as provided for in this act.

Section 4—It shall be the duty of the Inspectors of Election of the city of Rochester to act as inspectors of the election provided for by this act. All provisions of law relating to compensation and the duties of Inspectors of Election shall be applicable to the compensation and duties of said inspectors of election at said special election.

Section 5—The Common Council is authorized and empowered to make such provisions for the special election authorized by this act as shall be necessary.

Section 6—This act shall take effect immediately.

One hundred and fifty thousand dollars of four per cent. bonds were sold July 1st, 1885, to Blake Brothers & Company, of New York, at \$101.654, the amount of the sale being \$152,481. One hundred and fifty thousand dollars of the proceeds of such sale were credited to assessments on ordinances, special, and the balance being the premium, amounting to \$2,481, being credited to the contingent fund.

On the 30th day of November, 1885, the balance of said issue, being one hundred and fifty thousand dollars of four per cent. bonds, were sold to John H. Bonnington, and, by order of the purchaser, issued to the Dime Savings Bank, of Brooklyn. The bid on such sale was \$101.77 and accrued interest, and the amount realized thereon was \$155,088.33. One hundred and fifty thousand dollars of said proceeds were credited to assessments on ordinances, special, and the balance, being the premium and accrued interest, amounting to \$5,088.33, was credited to the contingent fund.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

To the Hon. Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: In the matter of complaint by Frederick Hartley, in relation to the unwarranted use of his property for highway purposes, in passing from Rowe Street at the west end of the Erie Canal Bridge, into Eleventh Street, which was referred by your Honorable Body to the Executive Board and City Attorney, the undersigned would respectfully report: It appears from the records in

the office of the County Clerk of Monroe County, that Kondolf & Brayer were in 1871 owners of the tract of land embracing the territory at the junction of said street, and that on the 10th day of Aug., 1871, they placed on file in said Clerk's office, a map upon which said streets are laid down, designated and dedicated as public streets. It further appears that the State of New York did, subsequent to said 10th day of Aug., 1871, cause to be erected, and has since maintained the Rowe street bridge, with its abutments and approaches. In making this construction, the State failed to provide means of access to Rowe street from Eleventh street, which should have been done by the construction of a side approach leading from said street on to said Rowe street bridge approach.

At the time said bridge was constructed the lands at the junction of said streets were vacant and have so remained until within the past four or five years and access has been had by driving over and across the lands owned and occupied by the complainant. It is the opinion of the undersigned that the State should now do what it neglected to do when said bridge was erected, and we would respectfully recommend that the City Attorney be authorized and instructed to prepare an act to be submitted to the Legislature directing the Superintendent of Public Works to cause the erection of said approach without delay.

The necessary embankment for this approach is estimated to cost about \$500.

Railroad through which the Upton park sewer discharges, or by continuing through Goodman street under the said railroad, at the Goodman street crossing and intercepting said Upton park sewer at some point south of the railroad.

Palmer, are, and have been since the 9th day of February last, the owners of property embracing some ten acres, situated on Schanck avenue, and formerly known as the Thompson tract. We are now occupying and improving the premises in conducting our business, and have a

great many buildings already erected, and are about putting up a number of tenement houses for the use of our men. Formerly there was a stream of water running from Leighton avenue through to Schanck avenue, and the City, without the consent of the owners, caused the Upton park, and other sewers to be drained into the said stream, thus producing a horrible stench, which is almost unbearable, and putting the property in such condition, that we do not dare, for sanitary reasons, build the proposed tenement houses there, or in the vicinity. We hereby submit to your honorable Board, the following proposition:

We will, in consideration of a cash payment to us of \$500, and also upon the construction of a properly covered sewer by you, execute to you a deed of the right of way of said property, providing, however, that you agree that there shall not at any time hereafter be made any assessment or tax against the property, for any sewerage purposes.

REAL SCHOOL PROPERTY—REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Supervisor Burritt, from the Committee on Law and Local Legislation, presented the following report, which was adopted.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors:

GENTLEMEN—Your Committee on Law and Local Legislation, to whom was referred the resolution of December 17, 1885, relating to the "Real School property," situated on Mortimer street, in the Fifth ward, would report, that in 1868, and until 1872, the building was controlled by Board of Trustees, and was used for school purposes, and recognized by the school authorities and assessors as free from tax. In 1872 the trustees conveyed said property to John Meinhardt, January 10, 1877, the same property was again conveyed to John Meinhardt and wife, by Sheriff's deed, where it now remains. During this time, up to 1883, the property was used for school purposes, and your committee believe, was exempt from tax; but in 1883 the property ceased to be used for school purposes, and since that year has been leased as a private residence. Your committee would report that said property is liable to tax, and should be entered upon the tax roll for taxes since the year 1883.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Permit me to call your attention to the following: Actions are being constantly brought against the City of Rochester, to recover damages, by people claiming to have received injuries, for which said city is claimed to be in some way responsible.

The growth of the city, and the consequent construction of street improvements, the extension of the water mains, the building of sewers, etc., are some of the causes for an increased number of accidents, and a consequent increase in such litigation.

In many cases where actions have been brought within the past few months it is practically impossible to obtain evidence as to the exact cause of the alleged injuries, or as to the responsibility therefor on the part of the city. The reason for that inability to obtain needed information is that the city officers had no knowledge of the accidents in question until the presentation of demands for damages in consequence thereof, which presentations were made months after the accidents occurred.

If the facts with reference to all accidents that occur upon the streets of the city, and the names of witnesses familiar with those facts, could in some way be reported to the City Attorney within a day or two after the accidents occur, a record could be kept which would be of great benefit to the city in the event of any action being brought to recover damages in consequence of an injury received.

I some time since requested the Executive Board to investigate all cases of accident or injury coming within their knowledge, and that Board promptly, and very efficiently, complied with the suggestions made. But the number of such cases coming within the knowledge of the Executive Board is, necessarily, limited.

The department of our municipal government which is best qualified to furnish the information above suggested is the Police Department. If patrolmen were instructed to report each day to the Chief the name of any person within their respective beats, receiving an injury, the nature of the injury, the place of the accident and, so far as can be stated, the names of witnesses of the accident, such reports could be by the City Attorney, if delivered to him by the Chief, promptly classified and investigated.

The fact that such a record, covering the entire city, if kept, would of itself prevent the commencement of actions, as well as furnish information enabling the city to successfully defend when actions are brought.

I take the liberty, therefore, of suggesting that your honorable body request the Police Commissioners to instruct the police force to comply with the suggestions herein contained.

GENTLEMAN—The appeal taken by the city in the case of Groves against the city of Rochester, has been decided by the General Term, the decision having been rendered on Saturday last; by such decision the judgment was affirmed. The opinion of the Court is written by Mr. Justice Bradley. I have written Judge Bradley, asking that a copy of the opinion be sent to me at his early convenience, and I expect to receive that opinion sometime during the present week.

The appeal taken by the Brighton Board of Health in the action against the city, relating to the East avenue and Monroe avenue outlet sewer, was also decided by the last General Term, the decision being in favor of the city. I am informed that an appeal will be taken by the plaintiffs in that action to the Court of Appeals.

The appeal taken by the city in the action brought by Suttieff T. Seward against the city of Rochester to recover damages by reason of the construction of the Rochester Water-works, was also decided by the last General Term, the judgment being affirmed.

The action brought by Micajah W. Jackson against the city to recover \$3,000 damages by reason of the pollution of the stream forming the outlet of the North avenue outlet sewer, was tried at the last Circuit. Such action was brought to recover damages sustained by the plaintiff for six years, by reason of the facts alleged. The verdict of the jury was for \$300 damages.

I respectfully suggest that the questions as to the action which should be taken in these cases, be referred to your Law Committee for consideration, and with a view to an early report.

And where the old curb-stones are not found of such quality and dimension as are suitable for such redressing and resetting, they shall be replaced by new curb-stones of approved quality and between the Valley canal and the west line of Prospect street the old curb-stones to be taken up, redressed, when of good and acceptable quality, and reset on the present lines. The defective curb-stones to be replaced by new and of approved quality, and the roadway for the whole distance between the Erie canal and the west line of Prospect street to be improved, from curb to curb, by a Medina stone block pavement; from the west line of Prospect street to the east line of York street produced southward, the old curb-stones to be taken up, redressed, where of good quality and reset upon the present lines and where not of good and approved quality, said curb-stones to be replaced by others of approved quality; and the roadway, from curb to curb, within the specified limits to be improved by an asphaltum pavement of the best quality.

The improvement for the whole distance, between the Erie canal and York street to include the necessary examination, cleaning and repairing of the existing main sewers, the cleaning, repairing, and extension to the curb-lines of the present surface sewers, and the construction of new ones where deemed necessary; the redressing and re-laying of the old cross-walks, supplying new flag stones where needed, and the construction of new ones where public convenience requires them, and the laying of water and gas service pipes where such are now needed or their use is contemplated, and such other accessories as may be necessary to make the whole improvement of the first class and permanent in character.

The estimated expense is \$68,000.

Adopted.

On motion of Alderman Kohlmetz the Board proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the ordinance below:

An ordinance to construct a plank walk on Goodman street from a point 100 feet north of Benton street to Pinnacle avenue.

And the whole expense shall be defrayed by the assessment upon the lots and parcels of land to be benefited thereby; and the City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council, having made an estimate of such expense, and report the same at five hundred and twenty-five dollars, and said estimate being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved; and the portion of said city which said Common Council deem will be benefited by said improvements is described as follows:

One tier of lots on each side of Goodman street from Pinnacle avenue to points on each side thereof one hundred (100) feet north of the northerly line of Benton street excepting those lots in front of which suitable side walks already exist.

No hack, cab, stage, livery carriage or other vehicles used for the conveyance of passengers, or their baggage, in which a person known to the owner or driver thereof to be affected with any infectious, pestilential or epidemic disease shall have been carried, shall hereafter be used for the transportation of any passengers, or their baggage, until such hack, cab, stage, livery carriage or other vehicle shall have been thoroughly purified to the satisfaction of the Health Officer of the City of Rochester.

Every hack, cab, stage, livery carriage or other vehicle used for the conveyance of passengers for hire, shall have its doors so arranged that they can be easily opened from the inside.

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this section shall forfeit and pay \$50 for each offense, to be sued for and recovered of such owner or driver severally and respectively.

Gentlemen of the Common Council:

Your Committee on City Property have recently had under advisement, the promiscuous letting of the City Hall for entertainments at a rental that is inadequate and out of proportion to the benefit derived by those who thereby gain its use.

The fact has long been recognized by your Committee that injustice was being done to the tax-paying citizens, who were the owners and proprietors of halls, built for the purposes of like entertainments as an investment, by the letting of the City Hall for the price that was being charged.

Your committee find that for a number of years, it has been customary to charge barely enough to pay for lighting and cleaning, until within a few months when the price was raised to twenty five dollars. It was thought that this advance would check in a measure at least, the growing demand, but in this we were mistaken.

We are constantly besieged for the use of the Hall for purposes as varied in their character as are the applicants in person, and the precedent being established, and the bars all down, we find it difficult to draw the line and stop the indiscriminate use of the same without the aid of some positive action on the part of the Common Council.

We recognize, however, the right of all political parties to the free use of the hall as heretofore, for public meetings, conventions, etc., and recommend that the Council discriminate in favor of such objects as are strictly charitable in their nature.

In view of the facts as above set forth, Your committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: At a meeting of your board on date of January 26th, 1886, the following resolution was adopted:

By Alderman Mandeville—

Resolved, That the Executive Board be and is hereby requested to report to this board at its next regular meeting the amount expended for the collection of garbage at Hemlock Lake, and for such other sanitary measures as were adopted by that Board during the year, 1885, together with a statement of what service was rendered and by whom.

The Executive Board respectfully submits the following report as containing in detail the information called for by said resolution.

On the 13th day of June, 1885, the Legislature of this State passed act chap. 543, entitled "An Act to confer upon the State Board of Health power to protect from contamination, by suitable regulations, the water supplies of the State and their sources."

The said act provided generally as follows:

First—The State Board of Health was empowered to make rules and regulations for protecting from contamination all public supplies of potable waters and their sources within this state.

Second—Said rules and regulations are to be approved by the County Judge of the county in which they are to become operative.

Third—The rules and regulations are to be published in a newspaper once a week for six consecutive weeks in each county to which said rules and regulations apply.

Fourth—The cost of said publication is to be at the expense of the corporation or municipality owning the water supply.

Fifth—When rules are made which require the providing of public means of removal or purification of sewage, the corporation or municipality owning the water works shall construct and maintain such work or means of sewage disposal as shall be approved by the State Board of Health.

On the 23d day of July, 1885, the State Board of Health under authority of said law, ordained certain rules and regulations for the sanitary protection of the water supply of the city of Rochester.

Rule 2 thus ordained defines the duty of the city of Rochester in the premises in substance as follows:

First—To furnish a metallic pail for the use of each privy situated within two hundred feet of the shore of Hemlock Lake.

Second—The city to cause the said pails to be placed under the privy seats and to be removed, emptied, cleaned and disinfected as often as is necessary.

Third—The city to cause the said pails to be made of certain form and dimensions.

Fourth—The service on the part of the city to be so conducted as not to cause inconvenience or annoyance to occupants of premises.

Fifth—The contents of the pails to be removed below the foot of Hemlock Lake, and so treated as to cause no nuisance or danger to public health.

A copy of the said law and of the rules and regulations of the State Board of Health, framed under the authority of said law are submitted herewith.

As soon as these rules and regulations become operative and binding upon the city, the Executive Board proceeded to make preliminary arrangements and to provide the necessary constructions and plant to enable it to perform the required service as follows:

First—The erection of a frame building on land owned by the city below the foot of Hemlock Lake to be used for purposes of storage and for washing and cleansing of pails.

Second—The erection of an elevated water tank, provided with a force pump for filling the water tank, and with hose, etc., for washing and cleansing pails.

Third—The construction of a landing dock on the shore of the lake.

Fourth—The construction of a road from the shore of the lake to the sanitary building.

Fifth—The purchase of and the fitting up of a carrying scow.

Sixth—The designing and construction of a large number of metallic sanitary pails.

As soon as the necessary arrangements could be perfected the collection of the sewage was commenced and proceeded with to the close of the season.

The cost of preliminary arrangements and construction was \$1,607 63
The cost of collection was 473 37

The total expenditure for the year 1885. \$2 081 00

Your Law Committee submits its report upon the reference to it of the report of the City Attorney, as to the case of Groves against the City of Rochester.

Your committee has given a careful consideration to the question as to whether an appeal should be taken to the Court of appeals, and present the following for your consideration:

The verdict was for.....	\$19,000 00
The amount of the claim, including interest.....	842 48
And costs.....	150 00

Is on the day of the date of this report... \$21,540 48

The Judge before whom the case was tried, in refusing to entertain a motion for a new trial on the minutes, said that the damages awarded were not excessive, and, indeed, that the jury would have been fully justified in giving the entire amount claimed, \$25,000; that the negligence of the city was gross and inexcusable, and that there was in fact no question for the jury except how much the plaintiff should have.

The Judge writing the opinion at General Term says that the damages are not excessive and he finds that no defence is made out by the city. His opinion is concurred in by the other judges that sat in the case.

If the judgment should be reversed by the Court of Appeals, the case would come back for a new trial, and upon a new trial the verdict, in the opinion of your committee, would be as large, and probably larger, than the one already given. If an appeal should be taken, the case would not be reached within a year, and the expenses incurred by reason of such an appeal would be approximately as follows:

One year's interest at 6 per cent.....	\$1,292 42
Costs of appeal.....	100 00
Total.....	\$1,392 42

From this total of \$1,392 42 deduct the interest which the city would have to pay for six months on money necessary to be borrowed to pay claim, if ordered paid, now estimating interest at 4 per cent., to wit, \$430 80; and the balance \$961.62 is the net cost to the city of an appeal.

There is, of course, a possibility of reversal of the judgment, if an appeal should be taken. But if a reversal must be followed by a new trial, with a probability of the same or increased damages the city's interest would not be served by an appeal.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Your special committee, to which was referred the resolution presented to your honorable body by Alderman Stein at your last meeting relating to the proposed special election, hereby reports: The sole object of holding a special election, at which the questions contained in said resolution are to be submitted to the people is to obtain an expression of opinion from the electors of this city as to the desirability of the proposed changes in the charter. Such questions could be submitted to the electors of this city at any election if suitable provisions for the receipt of ballots by the inspectors of election should be made. The object of procuring the passage of the act authorizing a special election, was to authorize the common council to incur the expense of such election and to have such election held sometime during the month of January last. The delay in the passage of the act by the legislature has, thus far, prevented the holding of a special election. If a special election should, under the provisions of the act, now be ordered, it could not take place more than a day or two previous to the regular charter election.

The only objection, so far as your committee had heard, to the holding of a special election at the same time with the charter election, is that, under the provisions of the act of the legislature, the polls are to open at nine o'clock in the morning and to remain open until nine o'clock in the evening. If it were necessary said provision contained in said act should be complied with, it would make the holding of the special and the charter elections on the same day difficult, if not impossible, in view of the provisions of the statute relating to elections. But, in view of the fact that the common council has undoubted power to make provision for the registration of the will of the people with reference to the proposed charter revision at the charter election, independent of the act, there would seem to be no reason why the two elections cannot be held during the same hours of the same day.

Your committee, therefore, recommends that the special election be held on Tuesday, March 2d;

that a box be provided for the receipt of ballots at each polling place in the city; and that the inspectors of election be directed to receive from each elector entitled to vote at said charter election, one ballot expressive of the opinion of such elector upon the questions to be submitted, and that the accompanying resolutions, containing all necessary provisions with reference to the matter, be adopted,

That having been attended by the said George A. Benton, in behalf of said owners, and by J. N. Beckley, Esq., City Attorney, on the evidence produced before us, the following facts appear:

In 1874, upon September 11th, the then Board of Public Works passed an ordinance for a plank walk on the east side of Conkey avenue between Scrantom street and Avenue D; on October 9, 1874, this ordinance was indefinitely postponed; subsequently, to wit: upon October 30th, 1874, another ordinance was passed for a plank walk on Conkey avenue upon both sides, covering the same ground upon the east side as the former ordinance.

That the laws of 1873, chapter 270, section 8, required that proposals for the walk should be published, at least ten days before the letting of the contract; that proposals for the Conkey avenue plank walk were only advertised three times in the Rochester daily *Union and Advertiser*, commencing October 18, 1875.

That on November 4, 1875, the contract for said plank walk was let to W. I. Hanford, and was, by the terms of the contract itself, let under the ordinance of September 11th, which had heretofore been indefinitely postponed; that there remains unpaid for said plank walk upon said ten lots \$89.30; that said lots were in the Davis and Leyden tract, and were assessed to George P. Davis, though owned by Davis and Leyden, and all of them have since been sold and transferred by said Davis and Leyden to purchasers, here represented by the said George A. Benton, who claims that, the assessment being invalid, if they pay the same they will have no remedy over Messrs. Davis and Leyden for such payment, and ask that the assessment be cancelled as a cloud upon their title.

Your Committee referred the matter to Mr.

Neville, who reported the facts substantially as herein given, and your Committee also took the opinion of the City Attorney upon the validity of said assessment, which was to the effect that the same was invalid and could not be enforced.

GENTLEMEN: Your Assessment Committee, to which was referred the petition of Susan H. Hooker, reports thereon as follows:

Mrs. Hooker is the owner of property on both sides of Mill street, which is a short street running from St. Paul street to the Genesee river. The lot owned by her on the south side of Mill street was assessed for the Clifford street outlet sewer the sum of \$737.

Your committee finds that the frontage of said lot is $19\frac{1}{2}$ feet less than the frontage given in the assessment roll, and that therefore said assessment of \$737 should be reduced by deducting therefrom \$39, being for $19\frac{1}{2}$ feet erroneously assessed at \$2 per foot, and also by deducting \$200, being for 100 feet at the west end of said lot running down to the river at \$2 per foot, and also by deducting the further sum of \$200 from the east end of said lot, by reason of the fact that a sewer had previously been constructed in St. Paul street by which said lot was drained.

The deductions above indicated of \$39, \$200 and \$200, being made from said bill would leave a balance of the assessment upon said lot which Mrs. Hooker ought to pay of \$298.

Your Committee further finds that upon the premises on the north said of said street Mrs. Hooker should have been assessed for $19\frac{1}{2}$ feet more than the assessment roll called for, and that, therefore, the sum of \$39, being for $19\frac{1}{2}$ feet at \$2 per foot should be added to \$698, the amount assessed against said lot for said Clifford street outlet sewer, making the sum of \$737.

Your Committee is of the opinion that from the sum of \$737, thus assessed against the said property on the north side of Mill street, there should be deducted the sum of \$200, being for \$100 feet on the west end of Mill street running down to the river, but not drained by the said sewer, at \$2 per foot. After making this deduction of \$200, there is left a balance of \$537, which in the judgment of your committee is the proper amount to be paid by the petitioner upon said assessment.

Your Committee, therefore, recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

GENTLEMEN: The undersigned, the Rochester Natural Gas Fuel Company, a corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the act of the Legislature of the State of New York entitled "An Act to authorize the formation of gaslight companies," passed February 16, 1848, respectfully asks the permission of your honorable body to lay, extend and maintain its mains, branches, pipes and conduits through the streets, avenues, squares and other public ways and places in the city of Rochester, and to take up, alter, change or repair the same from time to time, as occasion may require for its corporate use.

In making this application your petitioner begs leave to state that it proposes to supply the citizens of Rochester with natural gas for manufacturing and heating purposes. GENTLEMEN: Your Assessment Committee, to which was referred the petition of Marvin A. Culver, respectfully reports thereon as follows:

It appears that Mr Culver was formerly the owner of lots numbers twenty and twenty-two of the Culver subdivision on Zoe street, now Hawthorne street, in the Sixteenth Ward; that at one time Mr. Culver contracted to sell said lots to A. G. Northrup, but the said contract was subsequently cancelled; that on or about August 31, 1881, Mr. Culver obtained a City Treasurer's tax search on said lots and on or about that date paid into the City Treasury all of the unpaid city taxes appearing upon said search.

GENTLEMEN: Your Assessment Committee hereby makes report as follows upon the petition of various property owners upon McDonald avenue for the cancellation of assessments upon their property for the North Clinton street outlet sewer:

McDonald avenue is a street running easterly from Clinton street to St. Joseph street. Several years ago a private sewer was constructed in McDonald avenue from a point 269 feet west of St. Joseph street to the sewer in St. Joseph street. The St. Joseph street sewer runs southerly discharging into the railroad sewer. Subsequently an ordinance was passed for the construction of an outlet sewer in North Clinton street, and one tier of lots on each side of McDonald avenue from Clinton street to St. Joseph street was erroneously included in the territory ordered by the Common Council to be assessed for the said North Clinton street sewer.

The lots on McDonald avenue between St. Joseph street and a point 269 feet west do not drain into Clinton street sewer, but into St. Joseph street sewer. They having constructed a private sewer at their own expense, and are entitled to have the assessment levied upon their property for the Clinton street sewer cancelled.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Common Council held February 16, 1886, the following preamble and resolution was adopted:

By Alderman Weider—

Whereas, Prior to the sale by the city of Rochester of the property known as the Hoppough Mills, at Hemlock village, there was expended for a new dam at said mills the sum of (\$3,806.04) three thousand eight hundred and six dollars and four cents, which sum was paid out of the Contingent Expense Fund; therefore

Resolved, That the City Treasurer be, and hereby is, directed to credit the Contingent fund with

any money that has been or may be received from the sale of the Rochester Water Works property at Hemlock village."

The Executive Board herewith present certain facts in relation to the subject matter of the foregoing resolution for the consideration of the Common Council, believing that these facts will be regarded as of sufficient force to warrant the Council in reconsidering said action, or in taking further action as is hereinafter indicated.

The total sales of the Hoppough mill property amounted to \$8,607. The cash receipts from said sales to this date amounts to \$1,407; the balance being secured by mortgage. The expenditures made from Water Works Fund for examinations by committees of the Common Council for advertising sales and for recording mortgages, etc., amount to \$129.70; leaving as the net cash proceeds of said sales to date \$1,284.30. During the year 1885 there was paid out of the Water Works Fund about \$5,600 to defray the expenses of the Honeoye millers litigation.

These payments were made from the water works fund at the request of and under the advice of the Finance Committee of the Common Council. The Executive Board believes that under a strict construction of the provisions of Section 158 of the City Charter it is expressly prohibited from paying any of the expenses of these litigations from that portion of the water works fund resulting from the proceeds of the water rates. This being so, the only justification the Executive Board has for making any payment on account of said suits from said fund is the fact that the moneys resulting from the sale of said Hoppough property have been and are expected to be deposited to the credit of the water works fund and to what extent said fund can be properly charged with such payments. If, however, the Common Council shall insist on the transfer to the contingent fund of the moneys resulting from said sale, then by the terms of the following excerpt from the City Charter the contingent fund should refund to the water works fund the disbursements already made by it for the conduct of the said suits and all future expenditures on account thereof, must be paid out of the contingent fund. The following is the last clause of section 158, of the city charter above referred to:

"The proceeds of the water rates in whatsoever manner collected for the use and consumption of said water, and all penalties collected, shall be deposited with the Treasurer of said city, and be reserved and used exclusively for the payment of operating expenses, salaries, repairs, maintenance or extension of said works, of the interest upon the water bonds issued for construction of said works, or for further extension of the same, or for a sinking fund for payment of principal of said water bonds, but for no other purpose whatever."

The Executive Board also desires to call your attention to the further fact, that it will be very difficult for it to transfer from the receipts from water rents for the current year, the full sum of \$90,000 assigned to it by the Common Council, if you shall insist on transferring to the Contingent Fund the proceeds of the sale of the Hoppough property, unless you shall also repay to the water works the disbursements made by it toward the conduct of said suits.

The Executive Board would prefer, that as an adjustment of this whole matter that the contingent fund shall make good to the water works all disbursements made on account of the suits of the Honeoye millers, and to pay all future disbursements of like character from said fund

GENTLEMEN: At a meeting of the Board of Health held March 8th, the following action was taken:

By Commissioner Howe—

An act to secure the registration of plumbers, and the supervision of plumbing and draining in the city of Rochester.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. On or before the 1st day of April, 1886, every plumber, carrying on his trade in the City of Rochester, shall under such rules and regulations as the Board of Health of the said City of Rochester shall prescribe, register his name and address with the Clerk of the Board of Health of said city; and after the said date it shall not be lawful for any person to carry on the trade of plumber in said city unless his name is registered as above provided.

Section 2. A list of the registered plumbers in the City of Rochester shall be published, in the newspaper designated by the Common Council to publish the official proceedings of the Boards and Departments of the City of Rochester, at least, once in each year.

Section 3. The drainage and plumbing of all buildings, both public and private, erected in the City of Rochester, after the 1st day of April, 1886, shall be executed in accordance with plans previously approved, in writing, by the Board of Health of said city. Suitable drawings and descriptions of said plumbing and drainage shall, in each case, be submitted to the Board of Health of said city, and shall by said Board be placed on file in its office; said Board of Health is also authorized to receive and place on file drawings and descriptions of the

plumbing and drainage of buildings erected prior to the passage of this act in said city.

Section 4. The Supreme Court of the State of New York, and the County Court of the County of Monroe, or any judge or justice thereof, shall have power, at any time after the service of notice of violation of any of the provisions of this act, and upon affidavit of one of the members of the Board of Health of said city, to restrain, by injunction order, the further progress of any violation named in this act, or of any work upon or about the building or premises upon which, or with reference to which, said violation exists. Any civil action which may be brought under the provisions of this act shall be brought in the name of the city of Rochester as plaintiff, and it shall be the duty of the City Attorney of the said city to commence and prosecute any such civil action, upon being directed so to do by resolution of the Board of Health of said city.

Section 5. The Board of Health of the city of Rochester shall have power to adopt such rules and regulations for the registration of plumbers, and relating to plans and specifications for plumbing and drainage in the city of Rochester as such Board shall deem proper.

Section 6. Any person violating any of the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section 7. This act shall take effect immediately

By Commissioner Howe—

Resolved, That the public health of the City of Rochester demands that an act should be passed by the Legislature authorizing the Board of Health to adopt rules and regulations with reference to plumbing and drainage in said city.

And that the form of an act for the regulation of plumbing and drainage in said city, submitted to this Board be, and is hereby approved, and that the Clerk be directed to submit said proposed act to the Common Council of the City of Rochester, with a request that a resolution be adopted by the said Common Council requesting the representatives of the City of Rochester in the Legislature to procure the passage of the said proposed act by the Legislature.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, the Rochester Incandescent Gas Light and Fuel Company, a corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled "An act to authorize the formation of Gas Light Companies," passed February 16, 1848, respectfully ask permission of your Honorable Body to lay, extend, and maintain its mains, branches, pipes and conduits through the streets, avenues, squares, and other public ways and places in the city of Rochester, take up, alter, change, and repair the same from time to time as occasion may require for its corporate use and the public benefit. In making this application, your petitioner states that it purposes, by your permission, to supply the citizens of Rochester with a superior quality of gas for manufacturing, heating, and lighting purposes. Thorough investigation and successful experimenting, extending over a period of several years, have fully demonstrated the fact that gas may be supplied for these purposes at materially reduced expense from what it is now costing the consumer. These investigations and experiments have passed the period of uncertainty, and have placed the question of the production of gas at a greatly reduced expense, beyond any contingency. Professor T. S. C. Lowe is the patentee and inventor of all water gases now in use with their improvements, and the method operated by your petitioner is the latest achievement of this eminent scientist.

As consideration for the granting to your petitioner of the franchises herein solicited, your petitioner proposes to enter into a contract, and to bind itself with sufficient sureties, and in any reasonable sum, for the carrying out of the provisions of such agreement to furnish, not only to the city of Rochester as a corporation, but to all its citizens and institutions, within a reasonable time after the granting of said franchises, to be more explicitly set out in such contract, gas for the purposes aforesaid, at a rate not to exceed 50 cents per thousand cubic feet, and during a period of fifty years. At a public meeting of the people of South Rochester, held at the Baptist Church, to further consider the matter of the street railroad from Main to Genesee street, the following preamble and resolution was adopted unanimously:

Whereas, The city of Rochester granted a valuable franchise to the Rochester City and Brighton railroad company in the right to plant and operate its road within the corporate limits, for the benefit of all the inhabitants, the main object being to facilitate travel between the central and suburban parts; and

Whereas, All the great avenues leading to and from the center of the city with the exception of East avenue and Plymouth avenue, besides many short streets, have for a long time enjoyed the benefits of the road in cheap, quick and safe travel, besides the increase in building, in population and the appreciation of rents and values which always follow the road, thus giving the favored localities large advantages and making it impossible for others to fairly compete with them in the race of life; and,

Whereas, Plymouth avenue is one of the oldest and longest streets in the city and the most direct route to the center for a large population, almost wholly composed of those who earn their own living and have always contributed their share to the material welfare and prosperity of the city, and are entitled to a fair share of the benefits arising from the grant of the franchise aforesaid:

That upon the assurance that said railroad would be built as soon as the avenue was properly sewered and otherwise prepared for the work the people of the avenue and those of divers streets using the Avenue sewer for an outlet at great expense built the sewer, erected new buildings and made other improvements. Large plats have been laid out and wholly built up on the expectations that South Rochester would be accorded equal and impartial justice, but for lack of the railroad they are deprived of almost all the advantages of city residence and would be practically nearer the high schools, churches libraries, public offices and places of business if they lived in Fairport or Spencerport and employed the steam cars; and

Whereas, The railroad company has promised to build its road from Main to Genesee street as soon as the city gives its consent and the right of way is obtained; therefore

Resolved, That the Common Council is respectfully requested to grant the corporate consent aforesaid at once and that our Aldermen of the Eighth and Fifteenth wards bring the matter to the attention of the Council at its next meeting as the most important and urgent affair that now concerns the people of South Rochester, and that a copy of this preamble and resolution be presented to our Aldermen with request to present the same to the Council.

GENTLEMEN—Your Law Committee respectfully reports upon the judgment recovered against the city by Suttieff T. Seward, as follows:

In 1874 a contract was entered into between Mr. Seward and the Board of Water Commissioners of the city granting to said Water Commissioners the right to lay the pipe for the water works conduit across Mr. Seward's farm in Richmold, Ontario County.

In 1884, Mr. Seward began a suit against the city in Livingston County, claiming \$4,000 damages for injury to his dwelling house alleged to have been caused by the leakage of the water-pipe and the consequent overflow of the plaintiff's cellar.

The action was tried in November, 1884, before a Livingston County jury, and the plaintiff obtained a verdict of \$525. The city appealed to the General Term and the judgment has recently been affirmed.

As this is the first action of the kind that has been brought against the city, and there is a large number of Livingston and Ontario county property owners through whose farms the water works pipes are laid, many of whom may have claims of the same nature, your committee is of the opinion that the judgment should be appealed to the Court of Appeals, and therefore recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee, to which was referred the petition of James Gosnell, respectfully reports thereon as follows:

During the summer of 1884, Mr. Gosnell was instructed by Mr. S. E. Williams, at that time one of the members of the Executive Board, with the concurrence of Mr. Byron Holley, another member of the Executive Board, to make necessary repairs in

the way of painting upon the building owned by the city and occupied by the Protectives No 1. Mr. Gosnell presented his bill for the work aforesaid to the Executive Board. On account of the opposition of Mr. Aldridge, the third member of the Board, who had at that time charge of the Fire Department, the bill was not audited by the Executive Board.

Mr. Gosnell sued the city in the County Court, and was nonsuited upon the ground that the contract with Mr. Williams and Mr. Holley was not made while the Executive Board was in session.

Subsequently Mr. Gosnell sued Mr. Williams and Mr. Holley in the Municipal Court, and, since Mr. Gosnell's petition to the Common Council, judgment has been rendered against Messrs Williams and Holley personally for the amount of Mr. Gosnell's claim of \$262.90.

In view of the fact that the services rendered by Mr. Gosnell were necessary repairs to the building owned by the city; that the city had the entire benefit of the work, and that judgment has been recovered against Mr. Williams and Mr. Holley simply because of the informality of the action taken, the question has been laid before your committee whether the city ought not to pay Mr. Gosnell's claim.

Inasmuch as the claim arose out of a transaction with the members of the Executive Board, which board has full knowledge of all the facts, and as the payment of the claim should be made, if at all, out of the Fire Department Fund, which is under the control of that board, your committee is of the opinion that the entire matter should be referred to the Executive Board for such action as to a majority of said Board shall seem proper under the circumstances.

We find that there is enough men examined and duly qualified to fill all the offices in the gift of our City Government for many years to come. And in view of the fact that three decisions against the city involving \$245,000 are now pending, with the enormous burdens of taxation which are weighing heavily on our citizens, we would not feel justified in recommending the payment of such an amount as asked for. We therefore recommend that the sum of one hundred dollars be paid the Secretary for the services performed and to be performed in perfecting the results of past examination.

To the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—It is with no little satisfaction that the Executive Board reports, that it has been able to run the various departments under its charge, within the appropriations made by your Honorable Body at the beginning of the fiscal year; but prior to the adoption of the tax levy for 1886 it will be necessary to anticipate the funds that may be provided for the ensuing year, in order to meet the expenditure during the interim between the beginning of the year and date of the tax levy adoption.

The Spring cleaning of streets and alleys and the removal of the Winter's accumulations of dirt and ashes will be required to be done; some important street repairs will need to be made; navigation on the Canal will have opened and the lift bridges must be put in running order and manned; hence, it will be necessary to provide for and place to the credit of the Highway Fund as follows:

For street cleaning and removal of dirt and ashes	\$18,000
For repairs of river bridges and streets including materials	4,000
For cross and sidewalk repairs including material	2,000
For bridge-tending including supplies and repairs	1,000
Total	\$25,000

The Executive Board would therefore respectfully request your honorable body to authorize and direct the City Treasurer to issue the City's notes for the sum of \$25,000 under authority of section 81 of the City Charter, and get the same discounted and credit the avails thereof to the highway fund.

The budget of April 1st will practically exhaust the amount now to the credit of said fund.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: At a regular meeting of the Board of Education, held Monday evening, March 15th, the following report and resolution were unanimously adopted:

To the Honorable, the Board of Education.

GENTLEMEN: The special committee appointed to investigate the overcrowded condition of the public schools, would respectfully report, that after a thorough investigation of the matter and a detailed statement from each of the principals, we find that more school accommodations are absolutely required to accommodate the large number of scholars now in our schools, and the large increase which we must certainly have during the coming summer. No. 3 school is constantly full, No. 19 school is overcrowded and No. 4 school is more than crowded, one grade being now taught in No. 2 school and an annex near No. 4 taking part of the overflow. This is a very populous district, and we would recommend that a four-room school house be built somewhere, as near as possible, equally distant from schools Nos. 3, 4 and 19. We are of the opinion that such a building would relieve this district for a number of years. We estimate the cost of the building and site to be \$10,000. No. 7 school needs relief. The report of the principal states as follows:

"The first grade has been over full all the year, from seventy to eighty pupils in the room and seats for fifty-five. To make the matter worse we have no ventilation except from the windows. We have over 100 registered in the first grade with accessions every week, and although sickness and severe weather have reduced our number belonging the present month, the decrease is but temporary, and spring will add to our numbers. On the second floor the ninth and eighth grades are in one room, as are the seventh and sixth, and having no class rooms we are obliged to use the hall—through which the pupils from four rooms pass out and in continually—for recitations. It is difficult to do anything like good work under such disadvantages. Next year our sixth grade will be so large that the entire room will be filled by it, and the seventh, now numbering twenty-four, will have no accommodations in the building. In my opinion we should have an addition of at least two rooms, and, I think, we could fill four before the expiration of another year."

We recommend an addition of two rooms to the present school building—estimated cost, \$3,000.

The principal of No. 15 school reports in substance as follows: "No. 15 is overcrowded to the number of 250 or thereabouts; the whole number registered from beginning of year is 633. The number of close rooms in the building is eleven. The average number of pupils to each room is fifty-eight. Number of teachers employed, sixteen. The number of teachers employed, each having charge of a room, is eleven. The number of teachers conducting classes in halls and otherwise is five. The first, second and third grades are seated to accommodate fifty-five pupils. The fourth, fifth 'A,' fifth 'B,' sixth, seventh and eighth grades, each forty-eight desks. The ninth grade has fifty-four desks. Thirty-five pupils are enough for any one teacher to work successfully with. We are compelled to use each of the three hallways for recitation rooms, which is very inconvenient and in many cases detrimental to the health of the pupils, who are required to occupy the halls on account of the draught occasioned by the constant opening of the outside doors. Each grade teacher has an assistant, thus bringing each pupil under two teachers, which in many cases causes confusion and misunderstanding. The pupils of the first grade "A," numbering about fifty-five, attend school in the morning until 12 m. and do not return in the afternoon. The first grade "B," numbering fifty-one, come in the afternoon and occupy the room used in the forenoon by the first grade "A."

The first grades, therefore, attend only half a day. This arrangement is not satisfactory to those parents who wish their pupils to attend all day."

Number 20 school is always crowded, suffice it to say that we are obliged to rent three outside rooms to accommodate part of the number not able to be crowded into the school house. The condition of this is too well known to this Board to require further facts from this committee. We recommend that a four room building be erected on the rear of the school lot at an estimated cost of \$8,000.

Number 24 school is crowded and does not find the relief from No. 28 school which was expected. When the scholars are all present there are about fifty scholars more than there are seats for, and as a consequence the children in the first grade can only attend school for half a day, part in the forenoon and the balance in the afternoon. This state of affairs is very unsatisfactory to the patrons of the school, and should not exist. When the usual spring additions are received it will not be possible to accommodate them. We recommend a four-room addition to No. 24 school at an estimated cost of \$5,000.

Number 25 school is overcrowded, and we are obliged to rent outside rooms. In these rooms are packed fifty children. We would recommend an addition of two rooms to the present building at a cost estimated at \$2,500.

Number 27 school is situated in a thickly-settled section of the city and is constantly overcrowded. There are always more scholars in attendance than the building can accommodate, and every room two grades are crowded. This ought not to be the case, as it is almost impossible to teach two separate grades in one room at the same time. We would recommend that the present building be raised one story, which would give four additional rooms, and would, we think, meet the wants of the district for some time. This would make the building a two-story one, and in our opinion the proposed alteration would not cost to exceed \$5,000.

The annex now called No. 31 school has no building belonging to the city, and we are required to rent rooms for the accommodation of the scholars now in attendance. Children living in the immediate vicinity of the school, and not being able to gain admittance, are required to walk long distances to Nos. 14, 15 and 23. There are many children too small to go such distances, and as a consequence, they are obliged to stay at home, and are debarred from the privileges which they are entitled to. To meet the present needs of this vicinity there should be erected somewhere near the present annex a four-room school building, which, with the site required to be purchased, would probably cost \$14,000. Such a school building would, we are satisfied, be full before the close of the present summer. This is a rapidly growing district of the city, and it is our duty to provide suitable school accommodations for its needs.

We would recommend that an addition be built to No. 15 at a cost of \$8,000. This addition, with a new school somewhere near the annex, now called No. 31, would permanently relieve that district.

Number 17 school has fifteen full grades and only thirteen small rooms in the building. They are using every space in the building, in addition to which the Board is compelled to hire an annex to partly relieve the school. In many of the rooms two scholars are obliged to use the same seat, which is only large enough and only intended for one person. This is a very thickly settled district, and the school is constantly too crowded to arrive at satisfactory results. We could recommend an appropriation of \$3,000 for this school, either to build a two-room addition or to remodel the upper floor of the main building; that is, to run a hall through the center and to divide the space on each side into school rooms. This would give two additional rooms on the second floor, and a change of the stairway would give one more room on the ground floor.

It will be seen from these recommendations that this board will require \$58,500, as above stated, and the necessary outhouses and sidewalks would require at least \$1,500 in addition, making in all \$60,000, or \$45,000 more than the present city chart-

er allows for building purposes in any one year. We would recommend that proper measures be at once taken to authorize the Common Council to raise the required amount. The above may seem to be a large amount to be used in enlarging and building in one year, but after careful examination by your committee into the needs of the crowded schools, we are of the opinion that this amount is actually required this year, and without it this board will be seriously embarrassed for some time to come. The estimates as made by the committee are based upon the cost of similar structures during the preceding year and have been carefully made.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

By the Clerk—

ROCHESTER, N. Y. March 23, 1886.

To the Committee on Sewers of the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: The undersigned, to whom your committee referred the matter of the feasibility of constructing through Goodman street, from the open ditch of the Court and William street outlet sewer, about 1,000 feet north of Bay street to the south side of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R., a sewer which would serve not only to intercept the sewage of the Court and William street outlet sewer, but also that of the Upton park outlet sewer and of the Culver park sewer, respectfully submit the following report:

If the present ditch or natural water course now receiving the sewage of the Court and William streets outlet sewer, be suitably deepened and enlarged from Goodman street, opposite the lane called High street, to a point about 1,800 feet easterly and northerly, it will be entirely practicable and feasible to construct a new outlet sewer southerly through Goodman street from said High street, which is about 1,000 feet north of Bay street, to the south line of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. Co.'s property on the east side of Goodman street.

This new outlet sewer then would, by a branch sewer constructed westerly from Goodman street through the new street recently laid out along the division line between the Minges and Hayward properties to the present open ditch of the Court and William streets outlet sewer, fully intercept the discharge of the latter at a point about 400 feet north of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R.; and by another branch sewer constructed easterly from Goodman street through the low grounds adjacent to the south line of said Railroad company's property, to the prolongation of the center line of Beacon street and thence southerly to the intersection of Beacon street and Anderson avenue, it would fully intercept the entire discharge of the Upton Park outlet sewer. Furthermore, by constructing a series of properly proportioned subsidiary sewers from the junction of Beacon street and Anderson avenue, easterly through said Anderson avenue to Elk street, thence southerly through Elk street to University avenue, thence easterly through University avenue to Jersey street, thence

southerly through Jersey street to Culver park it will be possible to intercept and conduct through Goodman street the discharge of all private sewers now existing in Culver park, Port-mouth terrace, University avenue and other streets in that vicinity.

It may also be remarked that it will probably be found practicable, upon further examination and survey, to continue the aforesaid sewers through University avenue from Jersey street to the N. Y. C. R. R., and also through Culver park from Jersey street to the present eastern end of said park.

The grades of this system of trunk and tributary sewers can be made three inches per 100 feet, or one inch in 400 feet, whereby velocity enough can be obtained to render the m. fairly self-cleansing, if properly designed and built.

On this assumption the depths of the bottom of said sewers below the surface of the ground at various places will be about as follows:

In none of the streets named is there now any kind of proper public sewerage, although an urgent demand for such has for some time past existed.

Opportunity is also afforded thereby to improve the present defective drainage of Beacon street and Upton park, by enlarging and lowering the sewers therein, and thus allowing an improvement of the sewerage of other tributary streets.

In Schenck and Leighton avenues, also, sewers might then be constructed from Goodman street to points more than 2,000 feet easterly, although at relatively considerable expense on account of the depth necessary to excavate in order to obtain a proper grade.

With the same rate of fall as before, such a sewer in Schenck avenue would be about 23 feet deep at Goodman street, and about 8 feet deep at Henry street 2,800 feet east.

Similar work in Parsells and Grand avenues would give the benefits of sewerage to a large territory extending about 2,000 feet east of Goodman street.

Without specifying minutely it may be stated that in addition to the benefits resulting to the Court and William streets and the Upton park outlet sewer districts south of the N. Y. C. and H. R. R. R., the construction of the proposed trunk sewer through Goodman street will immediately make available for proper sewerage and drainage an area of more than 200 acres on the west side of Goodman street, extending northerly from the N. Y. C. and H. R. R. R. to the prolongation of Clifford street; also an area of about 200 acres on the east side of Goodman street, extending northerly from the said N. Y. C. R. R. to Bay street, and easterly in general to a line about half way between Goodman street and Culver street, and lastly, an area of about 20 acres in the Culver park district.

The exact limits of the territory east of Goodman street that should be assessed for the cost of the work have not yet been fully defined, since before this can be done additional surveys requiring considerable time must be made and the results carefully studied. Just here lies the most perplexing part of the problem. As a fact, the natural general slope of the land is from Goodman street toward Culver street, and if a suitable and conveniently located outfall for the sewage of the area between Culver park and Schanck avenue were immediately available the case would be greatly simplified. The more rational procedure would doubtless be to drain the whole territory east of Goodman street by another sewer running in general northerly in the vicinity of Culver street, between Culver

and Goodman streets, and north of East avenue; there is however, not a single public highway, lane or alley extending continually for any considerable distance in such a northerly direction.

An intercepting sewer for the territory would therefore have to be constructed largely, if not wholly, through private lands, whereby serious annoyances and contingent expenses for rights of way and damages are always certain to follow.

Before undertaking the construction of such a sewer, it would be advisable to cause a public thoroughfare along its route to be laid out and dedicated.

Now, since no such highway either exists, or is, within our knowledge, contemplated by any one, and also since no suitable outfall for the sewage of the area under consideration is available; furthermore, from the fact that a sewer through Goodman street is actually necessary for the drainage of the large districts west of said street, it accordingly follows, first, that the construction of another trunk sewer running northerly between Goodman street and Culver street, will doubtless be delayed for at least a few years more, since it must obviously form a section of the ultimate "belt sewer," and second, that if any premises east of Goodman street are in the immediate future, to be drained into the proposed Goodman street sewer, and thereby become profitable property for residences, the owners therefore should take measures to secure the right of such drainage and sewerage at once.

The only way to acquire such a right, however, is to submit to be directly taxed for the cost of the construction of the said Goodman street sewer.

To what extent this is desirable must be determined by the property owners themselves after careful deliberation. A sewer built at the sole expense of a certain territory cannot be made to receive the drainage of an adjacent territory which has borne no equitable share of that expense; and any party who attempts to construct a drain into such a sewer without having acquired a legal right so to do, can be promptly and successfully enjoined by any taxpayer of the district which alone paid for the construction of said sewer.

As these facts often lead to serious annoyances and legal complications, it is therefore only a matter of common prudence on the part of the land owners east of Goodman street to take this subject into consideration and reach an early definite conclusion, in order that the present final ordinance for the Pennsylvania avenue and Goodman street sewer may be properly amended, so as to give rights of drainage to a more extensive area than now contemplated.

Each property owner in that district should accordingly ask himself whether it will be to his advantage to acquire, in the aforesaid manner, the legal right to make immediate use of the proposed trunk sewer, and thereby render his property available at once for subdivision into city lots, upon which buildings can be erected and properly drained; or, on the other hand, whether the probable cost of such a privilege will be so great as to render it expedient to postpone the legitimate development of this property for a term of years until another trunk sewer somewhere between Goodman street and Culver street, has been constructed. The essence of the agitation which has occurred since the passage on December 15, 1885, of final ordinance No. 2850, for the Pennsylvania avenue and Goodman street sewer, and which has evoked this report, may also be formulated as follows: By terms of the ordinance, the dimensions of the sewer in question must be adjusted only to the needs of the Court and William streets outlet sewer district and the territory west of Goodman street laying between the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R. and Bay street, together with "only one tier" of lots on the east side of Goodman street from East Main street to the proposed terminus of the sewer about 500 feet north of Bay street, which described territory is called upon to bear the whole expense.

It has been pointed out, however, that both the Upton Park and Culver Park drainage can feasibly be directed into this Goodman street sewer if

its dimensions and grade be suitably modified as indicated above.

But, unless the existing ordinance is now amended, either the Upton Park and Culver Park districts must in equity be excluded from the privilege of making use of the Goodman street sewer, or else the latter will become too small to receive the additional drainage from those districts, and will require rebuilding at large expense.

If, therefore, the property owners in the said two districts not now included in the ordinance, wish to acquire the right to utilize the only outfall that may become available for, perhaps, several years, and thereby be enabled at once to improve and develop their lands at even a somewhat greater cost, than if another suitable outfall already existed, the opportunity to acquire such right should be given to them, upon their motion, by an amendment of said ordinance No. 2,850.

It is, accordingly incumbent upon all who are directly interested in this important matter, to give it careful attention, and make their wishes and opinions known to the Common Council without delay, since the time has arrived when the Executive Board must soon let the work in pursuance with the existing ordinance, unless directed otherwise by the Council.

With reference to the results, that will be attained by the Goodman street sewer, as herein proposed to be enlarged in saving to the city the payment of annual damages for the right of discharging sewage in open ditches or water courses, running through private lands, we beg to say that it has been impossible within the short time available, to obtain and compile in convenient form a complete statement of all the facts relating to the several open ditches affected by the problem.

The work is, however, in active progress, and the results will, if possible, be submitted for your consideration on the next meeting of your committee.

On motion of Mr. Holy the above report was adopted as embodying the opinion of the Board in this matter.

To the Common Council.

GENTLEMEN: In accordance with instructions of the Executive Board, at a meeting held this date, the Clerk was directed to transmit the following notice from James Shanahan, Superintendent of Public Works, together with an abstract of a report made upon the subject matter and accepted by the Executive Board.

"In pursuance of the requirements of the law, I hereby notify you to remove at once the encroachments you have made upon State premises by constructing an outlet for court street sewer into the Erie canal at Rochester. Should any permit have been granted heretofore by any competent authority, authorizing such occupation and use of the land, I do hereby revoke and annul such permit. In case of your neglect or failure to take measures to remove the obstruction, as herein required, within ten days from the service of this notice, the superintendent of section No. 9 of the Erie canal is directed at the expiration of that period to cause the immediate removal of all encroachments upon your part upon State land, at your expense.

By the terms of this notice, it is evident that the sewage of the Court street sewer will no longer be allowed by the state authorities to discharge into the Erie canal but must be directed into some other channel. An examination of the conditions of the problem shows:

First—That the upper end of the Court street sewer is 111 feet west of the west line of South Clinton street, and at a depth of about twelve feet below the surface; that the said sewer is of square cross section two feet by two feet in interior dimensions, and built of rubble masonry; that at the intersection of Court and South St. Paul street, its depth below the surface is about 14.6 feet; that in its course from the above-named beginning to the Erie canal it receives no contributions from any public sewer, although in that distance it is said that private sewers from buildings located on portions of both Stone street and South St. Paul street, northerly from Court street, have gained admission into it, together with the ordinary lateral sewers from the buildings abutting on Court street.

Second—That there is no public sewer whatever in South St. Paul street, between Court street and Ely street, and hence that the Court street sewer can not be immediately directed northerly into any existing channel.

Three—That the public sewer in South St. Paul street, between Court street and Griffith street, begins at a point 123 feet south of the south line of Court street, 12.3 feet below the surface, or at a level of about 1.2 feet higher than the Court street sewer at South St. Paul street, so that a diversion of the latter sewer in a southerly direction is impracticable, unless either the Court street sewer be raised or the South St. Paul street sewer be lowered.

Now in view of the fact that at the meeting of the Common Council on Nov 17, 1885, Final ordinance No 2,846 was passed for the construction of a 15-inch pipe sewer on South St. Paul street, from the sewer in East Main street to a point 10 feet north of the north line of the New Osborn house; also, that owing to the unfavorable weather the letting and construction of said pipe sewer has necessarily been delayed up to the present time; furthermore, that even if said sewer were now constructed as then planned it could not serve to receive the discharge of the Court street sewer on account of being both of insufficient size and upon a considerably higher level at its head than the Court street sewer at South St. Paul street; it therefore seems advisable to call the attention of the Common Council to the foregoing matters, and to point out to that body that compliance with the peremptory order of the Superintendent of Public Works of the State will be possible and practicable only by the construction of a sewer of suitable dimensions in South St. Paul street from the sewer in East Main street to and fully intercepting the sewer in Court street.

From the preliminary surveys and investigations on this subject, it is found that the bottom of the sewer in East Main street at the intersection of St. Paul street is about twelve feet below the surface and four feet lower than the bottom of the Court street sewer at the intersection of South St. Paul street, the distance between the two sewers being about 1,120 feet.

A straight grade for the proposed sewer from Court street to East Main street would thus give a fall of 1 in 280, with a maximum depth of cutting of about 18 feet in the vicinity of the New Osborn House.

The sewer, as projected, would accordingly have a sufficient grade to become fairly self-cleansing, and it would, moreover, not be excessive in depth. In the vicinity of East Main street a greater depth than only about 12 feet for the sewer would be desirable for the proper drainage of the cellars of the business blocks. Such an increase in the depth can, however, only be secured by sufficiently lowering the East Main street sewer between St. Paul and Water streets, which the construction of the East Main street drainage tunnel from Water street to the river has now rendered possible to an extent of fully 12 feet at St. Paul street, thus making it practicable to obtain a depth of fully 24 feet, for a new sewer at that point, and thereby to correspondingly increase the depth and grade of the proposed St. Paul street sewer.

This extreme depth is not advised but is mentioned merely to indicate to what extent proper

sewage in South St. Paul street can actually be obtained.

W. Seelye subdivision of the Lake View tract, situate westerly of Lake avenue and northerly of Driving Park avenue, on which map are laid out the several streets named in the communication of said D. W. Seelye, and which streets he proposes to dedicate to the city for public uses.

The records of the Water Department show that during the year 1885 Mr. Seelye, under direction of the Water Department, laid at his own expense a 2 inch wrought iron water pipe in Selye street extending 1,036 feet westerly from Lake avenue, in which are inserted 42 T's or openings intended for the supply of each city lot on said street for the distance so laid by him.

WEST AVENUE ASPHALTUM IMPROVEMENT.

By Alderman Kohlmetz—

Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a Trinidad asphaltum pavement in West avenue from the Erie canal to the produced east curb line of York street.

Adopted.

The surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$61,000.

By Alderman Kohlmetz—

Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, viz:

The improvement of West avenue from the Erie canal to the produced east curb line of York street, by removing the present Macadam roadway surface and so much of the stone foundation thereof as may be necessary, and replacing the thoroughly screened Macadam material, together with a sufficient quantity of broken stone or gravel to form a bed of concrete at least six (6) inches in thickness, to receive upon it a genuine Trinidad sheet asphaltum pavement from curb to curb, not less than two and one-half (2½) inches in thickness, and also the taking up and resetting of the present curb stones, when required, on the lines as now established, where such curb stones are of approved quality, and replacing such as are defective by those which are good; the cleaning of the main and surface sewers, with the necessary repairs; the construction of new man holes and surface sewers where needed, and the laying of water and gas service pipe where they are now required, or where their future use is contemplated.

And Whereas, The City Surveyor, under the direction of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at \$61,000, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, That the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and proper to be assessed for the whole expense thereof, viz:

One tier of lots on each side of West avenue, from the Erie canal to the produced east line of York street.

And further resolved, That the taxpayers to be assessed for making such improvements may pay their assessments in three equal payments, as follows: One-third of the amount assessed within thirty days after the advertisement of the assessment roll; one-third of the amount within one year from the confirmation of said roll, and the remaining one-third within two years from the confirmation of said roll. On all sums paid prior to the maturity of the said last installment, a discount will be allowed at 6 per cent. per annum.

And the Clerk is hereby directed to publish notice in pursuance of Title VII, Section 172 of the Revised Charter of 1880, of the City of Rochester, that

all persons interested in the subject matter of said improvement, are required to attend the Common Council on Tuesday evening April the 6th, 1886, at 7.30 o'clock, at the Common Council Chambers, when allegations will be heard.

Such consent of the city of Rochester will be sold at public auction on the steps of the City Hall in Rochester, on the 20th day of April, 1886, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, by the City Treasurer, to the person or corporation who shall then and there bid and give the largest percentage of gross receipts derived from the operation of said railroad as above recited, having previously deposited with the City Clerk of Rochester an undertaking under seal in a form approved by the City Attorney and Mayor in the penal sum of \$15,000 for the construction of said railroad within the period prescribed by law and for the payment annually of the percentage of gross receipts which shall be bid at such sale by such person or corporation, executed by two sureties who shall justify in the sum of \$50,000 each, before the deposit of such undertaking. Such undertaking shall contain a provision that the maintenance and operation of such railroad shall be in compliance with the statutes of the state of New York. It is further

NOTICE.

"The consent of the city of Rochester is hereby given to the person or corporation which shall give to the city of Rochester the largest percentage per annum of the gross receipts derived from the operation of a railroad under the general law of the State of New York known as chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, upon the streets herein prescribed, to wit: "A line of street railroad tracks commencing with the intersection of Sophia street and West Main street, thence a double track in the center of Sophia street to Church street, thence a single track in the center of Sophia street to Allen street thence a double track to Center street and westerly with a double curve in Center street to Jones street, thence a single track in and along Jones street to Jay street, thence a double track in the center of Jay street to Bolivar street, thence a single track in the center of Bolivar street to Lyell avenue with a double curve from Bolivar street to the present tracks of the Rochester City and Brighton Railroad Company on Lyell avenue, thence along the present tracks of said company on Lyell avenue to Saratoga avenue, with a double curve at Saratoga avenue from the present tracks of said Company; thence a single track along Saratoga avenue to Vernon street; thence along the center of Vernon street a double track, to and along the center of Backus avenue to the north end of Backus avenue, with the like consent for the construction of such switches, sidings, turn-outs and turn-tables, and suitable stands in connection with such tracks and branches, as may be necessary for the convenient working thereof.

From the foregoing statement it will be seen that the expense for the lighting, care, cleaning and repairing the public lamps of our city for the current

year, closing with the 31st day of this month is by comparison with the reports of preceding years greatly diminished.

This is owing to the judicious and economical measures adopted by your committee in conducting the affairs of this department.

Your committee have given their time and attention to investigating complaints of unlighted lamps in the different wards in the city, and have succeeded in correcting a great many faults existing in regard to the lighting of the public lamps.

While your committee are aware of the fact that a great many complaints have been made in regard to unlighted lamps, they have in a measure remedied the evil by deducting the unlighted lamps from the bills presented, and given the benefit of the same to the taxpayers. Your committee would also call the attention of the taxpayers to the fact that our city is always growing, new streets are being constantly opened and petitions for light being sent to this department daily, more especially in the outer wards, and while your committee were disposed to grant their request, they were obliged in a great many cases, owing to the smallness of the appropriation, to be compelled to refuse, much to their regret, the prayers of the petitioners.

Your committee recognized the fact of keeping within the bounds of the appropriation, and we point with pride to the fact that we have not asked for a single cent beyond the amount asked for in the annual appropriations, and still have money to our credit in the Lamp Fund.

ANNUAL REPORT OF WATER WORKS COMMITTEE.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—Your Water Works Committee respectfully submit the following report in relation to work done in the extension of the Water Works system of this city during the past fiscal year:

The following named amounts were included in the tax levy for 1885 for water pipe extensions:

For payment of City notes made to procure moneys for extensions of water mains during the year 1884	\$72,374 00
For payment of new work during year 1885	24,000 00

Total raised in tax levy for 1885 \$96,374 00

The amounts which were available for water pipe extensions during the year 1885 were as follows:

No money has been borrowed for this fund during the year 1885, and the obligations of the city have been strictly confined within the limit of the appropriation, and there is therefore no deficiency in the fund at the close of the fiscal year.

The appropriation made for the Water Pipe Extensions was, however, inadequate to meet the demands made for extensions by the citizens, and many owners of property found it necessary to advance the sums necessary to make water pipe extensions in streets where they desired to develop their property by the erection of dwellings and business places. These extensions were made under the direction of the Executive Board, and in accordance with plans provided by the Chief Engineer of the Water Works.

In a considerable number of these cases this Common Council, by resolution, have agreed to repay to the owners the cost of said extension out of moneys to be raised in the tax levy of 1886. In other cases the parties have advanced the money without such guaranty on the part of the city, but it is manifestly equitable and proper that these latter should also be reimbursed in like manner as in cases where the city has specifically bound itself so to do.

The amount of money thus advanced for water-pipe extensions by private parties, and which should be provided for in the next tax levy, is \$5,839 10.

A large number of petitions for water-pipe extensions have also been received by the Common Council which have been by it referred to your Water Works Committee and the Executive Board.

The cost of the work embraced in these petitions is estimated by the engineer at \$57,195.

The length of water mains extended during the past year was 8 45-100 miles.

The total length of water mains laid in the city to this date, 165 39-100 miles.

The number of fire hydrants set during the year was 71.

The total number of fire hydrants set in the city to date is 1,461.

The number of stop-gates set during the year was 66.

The total number of stop-gates set at this date in the city is 1,627.

The average cost of the water mains laid last year, per mile, was \$4 536.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LAW COMMITTEE.

By Alderman Kelly—
 To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:
 GENTLEMEN: By direction of the Law Committee I hereby submit an annual report regarding the actions, proceedings and matters under the charge of the Law Department of the city government for the past year.
 Two principal causes have operated to produce a great amount of the litigation to which the city is a party within the past two or three years. One cause is the decision of the Court of Appeals in the action brought by Hiram Smith and others against the City of Rochester to enjoin it from using the water of Hemlock and Canadice Lakes, except

upon the payment of damages to the owners of riparian rights upon the stream which are the outlets of said lakes. Another cause is the system, or rather want of system of sewerage which has grown up and exists in this city, more especially upon the east side of the river.

At the time of the presentation of the last annual report of the Law Committee proceedings for the condemnation of the rights of the riparian owners upon the outlets of Hemlock and Canadice Lakes and Honeoye Creek had been begun. Since then, the proceeding has, so far as the Commissioners appointed are concerned, been tried and disposed of. The report of the Commissioners of Appraisal was made last June. In accordance with the statute under which said proceedings were instituted, the report of the Commissioners was, on the third day of September last, pro forma confirmed, and soon thereafter, by direction of your honorable body, an appeal was taken from the order confirming said report to the general term.

The work of preparing the record on the appeal mentioned was at once begun, and has only within the past week been completed. The printed record on such appeal, outside of maps, tables, profiles and other exhibits, consists of over 1,300 pages, and its preparation has involved an enormous amount of labor. The appeal from said order will come on for argument at the next General Term of the Supreme Court, to be held in this city the 30th day of the present month.

In the preparation of the brief to be used on behalf of the city on that argument it has been necessary to carefully re-examine the vast mass of evidence taken before the Commissioners, and to collate the authorities upon the questions of law involved, a work which has now been substantially completed.

I feel that I should not fail to make mention of the value to the city of the great amount of labor bestowed upon this case by Mr. Tubbs, Mr. Kuichling and Mr. Radenurst, of the engineer's department. They have all rendered invaluable assistance to me in the preparation and trial of this most important proceeding. Indeed, without their intelligent and patient co-operation, it would have been impossible for me to have carried on the work as far as it has gone.

The following amounts of the damages claimed, as shown by the evidence of the witnesses produced on the part of the millers, giving first the highest estimate, and second, the average of the estimates made by all of the witnesses may be of interest. I also give in the third column the amounts awarded in each case:

The action brought by Hiram Smith and others against the city, to which reference has been made, and in which the decision of the Court of Appeals referred to was rendered, was in accordance with the judgment of said Court, retried by Mr. Justice Rumsey during the past year. No additional evidence was taken, but there was added to a statement of the evidence agreed upon a stipulation to the effect that, so far as that action was concerned, it was conceded that down to the time of its commencement, the plaintiffs had sustained no damage by reason of the taking of the water by the city. Judgment was rendered in favor of the plaintiffs by Judge Rumsey, and an appeal was taken from said judgment to the General Term. The appeal was argued at the General Term and decided in favor of the respondents, Justice Haight writing a dissenting opinion. Under the instructions of your Honorable Body, an appeal has been taken from the judgment of the General Term to the Court of Appeals.

The proceedings to acquire the water rights, to which reference has been made, were instituted for the purpose of determining all future damages for the perpetual right of taking water by the city. But soon after the decision of the Court of Appeals of the Smith case twenty-two of the owners of hydraulic rights upon Honeoye Creek brought actions against the city to recover past damages alleged to have been sustained by them. Under the act providing for the appointment of Commissioners to determine future damages on condemnation of the water rights and lands, no power was given for the consideration and determination of the question for past damages. Therefore the commissioners appointed did not consider or pass upon that question. In view of the fact that in most of the actions brought to recover past damages the place of trial was laid in either Ontario or Livingston Counties, the plaintiffs mainly residing in the Counties named, it was deemed advisable to obtain a reference of the various actions rather than proceed to trial before juries of those Counties. In accordance with such view twenty-one of the said actions were referred to the three men appointed by the Court as Commissioners in the other proceedings, to hear, try and determine. Since then four actions more have been brought, all of which have been referred to the same referees.

All of these actions, except the action brought by Cora J. Trimmer, were referred as aforesaid, and are now on trial. Six days have already been spent in taking the testimony, and a further hearing is to proceed during the week, beginning April 12th. It is expected that the evidence will all be submitted and the case summed up prior to May 15th next.

A large number of actions growing out of the fruitful cause for litigation above referred to, namely, the sewage system have been tried during the past year.

Attention is called to some of the more important of these actions, together with some that have not yet been tried:

George Chapman brought an action to recover \$10,000 damages by reason of the pollution of the water in Thomas creek, a stream crossing his premises in the town of Brighton. He also sought in the same case to obtain an injunction to restrain the city from using said stream as an outlet for the Nichols park and Monroe avenue outlet sewers. This cause was tried before Judge Rumsey and a decision was rendered adversely to the city, it being held that the plaintiff had sustained \$1,200 damages up to the time of the commencement of that action, and that the plaintiff was entitled to an injunction restraining the city from the further use of Thomas creek as an outlet for said sewers, such injunction to become operative six months after the decision. An appeal was taken from the said judgment to the General Term, and the argument of such appeal was had at Buffalo last January. No decision upon such appeal has, as yet, been rendered.

Another action growing out of the same facts was brought by the Board of Health of the town of Brighton against the city, to enjoin the defendant from the further pollution of the said stream. That action also was tried before Judge Rumsey, the decision thereon being in favor of the city, upon the ground that said Board of Health had no power to maintain the action.

Eliza B. Wing has also brought an action to enjoin the city from the further use of Thomas Creek as an outlet for said sewer.

Micajah W. Jackson has brought an action to enjoin the city from draining the North avenue outlet sewer into a stream crossing the premises of the plaintiff in the town of Irondequoit.

Martha Hussey and Mary Ann Frothingham have each brought actions to restrain the city from draining the Lyell and Saxton street sewers into the stream crossing the respective premises of the plaintiffs lying between the west bank of the river and Lake avenue.

Three actions have been brought by James H. Hooker to recover damages for the pollution of the stream crossing his premises in the town of Irondequoit by reason of there being conducted therein the sewage from the North avenue outlet sewer. In the first action said Hooker recovered a verdict of \$600. In the second, he recovered a verdict of \$110, which the city paid. The third action is, at the date of this report, on trial at the Monroe Circuit. In the first of the actions brought by Mr. Hooker an appeal was taken to the General Term, where the judgment was affirmed. An appeal was, thereupon, under the direction of your honorable body, taken to the Court of Appeals, where the case is now pending.

Micajah W. Jackson has brought, in addition to the case above mentioned as commenced by him, two other actions to recover damages by reason of the pollution of a stream, and consequent damage to his property, in one of which a verdict was rendered against the city, for \$300 and in the other of which no trial has as yet been had. After the rendition of the verdict last above mentioned the court ordered the exceptions to be heard in the first instance at the General Term, where the case is now pending.

Other actions growing out of the sewage system of the city are now pending, but the foregoing is sufficient to indicate the importance of some action being taken by the city looking to the remedying of the evils which exist.

I desire to impress upon your honorable body the supreme importance of doing something which shall cause the discontinuance of the grounds for complaint which undoubtedly exist. In the very near future injunctions will be operative against the city restraining it from a longer continuance of the present system of drainage.

The plan which has been adopted for the disposal of the sewage accumulating day by day throughout a large part of the city of Rochester, has been to construct a sewer running in any direction where a stream of water could be intercepted, and using that stream as the means of conveying the accumulated sewage away from the city. This has been done with full knowledge of the fact that the act was unlawful. As the necessary consequence of the doing of these unlawful acts intolerable nuisances have been created, and the city is now brought to the necessity of making some other adequate provision for sewage disposal.

So far as the nuisance caused by the Lyell and Saxton street sewer is concerned, it can be remedied by constructing an outlet sewer connected with the terminus of the present outlet and extending to the river. The nuisances complained of on the east side of the river could be remedied in two ways, namely: By acquiring the right of way for the building of one or more sewers from the city line to Irondequoit bay, or by constructing one outlet sewer sufficient in size to take in the sewage of the eastern, southern and northeastern portions of the city, and extending to the Genesee river. The latter plan is, undoubtedly, the better, but it may be, and probably would be, more expensive than the adoption of the other plan. But whatever may be the view which your honorable body shall take of the system to be adopted, an absolute necessity exists that something should be done, and done at once.

I give the following summary of some of the more important actions now pending:

The action brought by Richard Smith against James H. Kelly and others to recover \$10,000 for personal injuries, has been treated since its commencement practically as an action brought against the city in so far as the conduct of the defense is concerned. This action grew out of the Centennial celebration. The court upon the trial non-suited the plaintiff, except as to the defendants Gibson and Williams, as to whom the case was allowed to go to the jury. An appeal is now pending at the General Term from the order made at the Special Term denying the plaintiff's motion for a new trial.

The action brought by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and others against the city of Rochester for the purpose of obtaining a permanent injunction restraining the city from connecting the Upton Park outlet sewer with the East Avenue outlet sewer, has been noticed for trial at the next Equity Term of the Supreme Court appointed to be held on the 5th day of April next.

The action brought by Amelia Groves and another against the city of Rochester in which a verdict of \$19,000 was rendered in favor of the plaintiff, was, under the direction of your honorable body, taken to the General Term. A decision was handed down by said court at its January session, affirming the judgment, and the question as to whether an appeal shall be taken to the Court of Appeals is now before you for consideration.

The action brought by Ransom D. McCrossen and others against the City of Rochester, and the Aldermen of the City of Rochester, is at issue, but has not yet been tried. This action was brought for the purpose of obtaining a permanent injunction restraining the defendants from adopting any resolution or ordinance providing for the taking down of the bridges on the abandoned Genesee Valley canal at Atkinson street and other streets of the city. The determination of the issues involved in this cause would, so far as they are specifically concerned, be of little moment now, as it is supposed the railroad company and the property own-

ers who brought the action are no longer at variance, but the principle involved in this litigation is of considerable importance.

The action brought by William Kavanagh to recover \$1,000 in consequence of injuries received by the plaintiff at the locality of the Genesee Valley canal swing bridge, has been tried and resulted in a nonsuit. The motion of the plaintiff for a new trial is now pending. This action involves the question of the liability of the city by reason of the alleged defective construction of such bridge, said bridge having been built by the city.

The action brought to test the validity of the Church street assessment roll was referred to the Hon. E. A. Nash, County Judge of Livingston County, to hear, try and determine. The decision of the referee was adverse to the city, and an appeal was taken from the judgment entered on his report to the General Term where it is now pending.

The action brought by William Lusink against the city to recover \$1,400 damages for the destruction of property by reason of the overflow of the outlet of the East avenue outlet sewer, and the action brought by Albert J. Fisk, by his guardian, against the city, to recover \$1,400 damages by reason of the same overflow, have been referred to George F. Yeoman, and are now on trial.

The action brought by Emily Clark against the city to recover \$1,000 damages in consequence of the alleged negligence of the city in failing to provide drainage for the street on which her premises are located, and on account of the alleged improper grading of the street, when by the surface water was cast upon her premises, has been tried, and resulted in a verdict of \$300. Said action is now pending at the General Term on appeal from the order denying a motion for a new trial.

Several actions are pending between the City of Rochester and the Buffalo, New York and Philadelphia Railroad Company The Genesee Valley Canal Railroad Company and James Mahanah, as Superintendent of Public Works, growing out of the construction of a dam in the abandoned Genesee Valley Canal in such manner as to prevent the water of the Erie Canal from flowing south of the southerly end of the Ohio Basin. These actions present the question as to whether the City of Rochester, under the contracts made between it and the state, and the Genesee Valley Canal Railroad Company, has the legal right to prevent, by injunction, the flow of the water in that portion of the abandoned Genesee Valley Canal south of the southerly end of the Ohio Basin, and as to whether the city has the right to fill up so much of the abandoned Genesee Valley Canal at West Avenue at the place where it crosses the Genesee Valley Canal, and of the same width, and as to whether the city has the legal right to prevent the further use of said abandoned canal.

The long continued and disastrous litigation, growing out of the Oak street improvement and assessment and the vexed questions presented therein, have all been substantially settled and adjusted. The adoption by the Common Council of the re-assessment ordinance, and the confirmation of the assessment roll thereunder, seems to have, in the main, worked substantial justice to all parties concerned, and nearly all have accepted the proposition made by the City.

The action brought by Sutlier T. Seward against the city to recover \$6,375 damages on account of the bursting of the water pipes crossing his property in the town of Livonia, Livingston county, and which resulted in a verdict of \$525 at the Livingston circuit, has been before the General Term, where the judgment was affirmed. By direction of the Common Council an appeal has been taken to the Court of Appeals.

During the summer of 1884 the Common Council passed an ordinance providing for the construction of a plank walk on Jennings street. Previous to the letting by the Executive Board of the contract for the construction of such work under said ordinance, Jacob Spiegel, and other property owners on said street, brought an action against the city for the purpose of obtaining an injunction restraining the

defendant from executing the contract for the letting of said work. The cause was tried at the January Equity Term and resulted in a decision in favor of the city. Appeal was taken by the plaintiffs to the General Term, and the cause is to be argued during the coming month.

The action brought by Mary Ann Frothingham to recover \$10,000 damages to her property by reason of the drainage of the Lyell and Saxton street outlet sewer into a natural stream which crosses her premises, has been tried and resulted in a verdict in favor of the city. The jury found by such verdict that the plaintiff had not sustained any damage by reason of the drainage aforesaid. The plaintiff has, as above stated, since brought an action to obtain an injunction restraining the continuance of such drainage.

The General Term reversed the judgment in favor of the Board of Education of the city against Anthony Cooman, and that cause has been settled by the Board of Education.

Sarah P. Bull brought an action against the city to obtain a judgment vacating an alleged erroneous assessment. On the trial of the case the court held that the notice served upon the plaintiff by the sidewalk inspector was not sufficient to authorize the levying of the assessment, and, hence, held that assessment to be void. An appeal has been taken to the General Term.

The action brought by Warren B. Barge against the city to recover \$1,000 for injuries alleged to have been sustained by reason of the defective condition of a sidewalk has been tried, and resulted in a verdict in favor of the city.

The actions hereinafter named are the most important of those in which the city is a party, outside of those above enumerated; and are pending, either for trial, or on appeal:

Joseph P. Cromer, as administrator, against the city of Rochester, growing out of the Oak street assessment.

Charles Loveland against David Selting and George Long, an action against policemen to recover damages for false imprisonment.

James Campbell and Jane E. Campbell against the Rochester City and Brighton Railroad Company and Peter Sheridan, as City Clerk, involving the validity of a grant of right of way for the construction of a street car track in Plymouth avenue.

Elmer Murphy against George H. Kron and George Bletzer, policemen, to recover damages for false imprisonment.

George Z. Dockstader against the city of Rochester, an action to recover \$10,000 damages for injuries received in a sewer excavation.

Thomas H. Groves against the city of Rochester, an action to recover \$50,000 damages for loss of services to the plaintiff by reason of an accident to his wife.

Charles Woellert against the city of Rochester, an action to recover \$5,000 damages by reason of the pollution of a stream by sewage.

The Bell Telephone company of Buffalo against the Executive Board, an action for an injunction.

Maggie Doharty against Frederick Kipphut and Michael Zimmerman, policemen, an action to recover \$1,000 damages for false imprisonment.

The City of Rochester against The Rochester City and Brighton Railroad Company; an action for an injunction.

Amelia Barhydt against The City of Rochester; an action to recover \$1,000, for personal injuries.

George W. Van Ingen, by Guardian, against the City of Rochester; an action to recover \$5,000 damages for injuries caused by falling through Vincent place bridge.

Elizabeth Deverell against William Fuller, contractor of the Executive Board, involving the right to sell material excavated from streets of the city by contractors of the Executive Board.

Thomas Burke against Frederick Kipphut, a policeman; an action to recover damages for false imprisonment.

Fred. P. Wilcox against the city of Rochester; an action for vacating an assessment of \$50,000 upon personal property made in 1884.

Amanda Hamilton against The City of Rochester; an action to recover \$2,000 damages by reason of

the alleged wrongful removal of a building by the Fire Marshal.

Jonathan E. Pierpont and Lewis Hoyt, as assignees, against Ellsworth and Thompson, involving the title to a portion of the land upon which Central avenue bridge has been constructed.

The City of Rochester against the Baltimore and Ohio Telegraph Company; an action for an injunction.

Louis Klehammer against the city of Rochester; an action growing out of a sewer overflow.

In addition to the actions above named, a large number have, during the year, been brought and finally disposed of.

During the past year fifteen proceedings have been instituted for the acquisition of land for public use by the city, and carried to completion, except that in some cases appeals have been taken from the order confirming the report of the commissioners, which appeals are still pending.

During the past year the Law Committee has held forty-seven meetings, and investigated and passed upon two hundred and thirty-five matters presented to it, outside of the cases in the courts. In many of the matters before the Law Committee for investigation it has been necessary to hear the statements, under oath, of a number of witnesses, and to give careful and prolonged consideration to the questions presented.

I deem it to be my duty, as it is my pleasure, to state that the members of this committee have constantly, throughout the year, devoted themselves to the protection, in all possible ways, of the interests of the city, and by their intelligent and laborious efforts, conducted with the one end in view of guarding the city against loss, they have earned the approbation of the people. Comparatively few are aware of the great amount of time necessary to be devoted to the proper discharge of the duty devolving upon this committee. I have at all times found the members of the committee ready to give all needed time to an investigation of claims before them, and as ready to decide such claims upon their merits.

The following is a statement of the amounts paid on verdicts and decisions in actions brought against the city during the past four years:

April 3, 1883, paid Julia Dignin, on judgment, \$500 and costs; December 20, 1883, paid the National Gaslight Company, on judgment, \$1,200 and costs; May 19, 1885, paid James H. Hooker, on judgment, \$110 and costs.

Application of John Scott and associates for permission to furnish the City of Rochester with Natural Gas for heating and illuminating purposes:

To the Honorable Common Council of the City of Rochester

GENTLEMEN—In the year 1880, permission was granted me to build and operate gas works in this city. Previous to that time the price of gas had been \$3 per 1,000 cubic feet, and was reduced to \$2.50 per 1,000 feet, hoping to prevent competition. Consumers were obliged to pay for running service pipes to their houses, and make cash deposits with the gas company before receiving gas. This has all been done away with by competition.

For the past six years the price of gas has not exceeded \$2 per 1,000 cubic feet, and for one year and one-half of that period the price of gas was \$1 per 1,000 cubic feet.

The annual consumption of gas in Rochester is upward of 300,000,000 cubic feet. Figures will show that more than one and one-half million dollars has been saved to gas consumers during the past six years by the reduced price of gas.

In view of what has already been done, and with the certainty that the introduction of natural gas will effect a still greater reduction, and saving in the future, we feel warranted in asking your honorable body to grant us permission to lay, maintain and operate mains and pipes throughout the city for the purpose of supplying said gas to those who may wish to use it, and operate under and by virtue of an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled "An Act to authorize the formation of Gas Companies," passed February 16, 1848.

The laying of said mains and pipes to be governed by the same rules and regulations now governing and applying to the existing gas companies in Rochester.

In consideration of the right asked for, we will agree that the price of natural gas shall not exceed one dollar and one half per thousand cubic feet, for illuminating gas, and seventy-five cents per thousand cubic feet for heating and manufacturing purposes, and to furnish all the natural gas required to light and heat the city buildings, engine houses and City Hospital at a price not to exceed seventy five cents per thousand cubic feet for illuminating, and fifty cents per thousand cubic feet for heating gas, and to pay to the city five hundred dollars per mile for the first twenty miles of mains laid, and one hundred dollars per mile for one hundred additional miles of mains required to be laid to reach the different parts of the city.

As a guarantee of our ability and willingness to carry out the work we will deposit with the city a bond to that effect, approved by the Mayor and City Attorney. Very respectfully,

Southwick, respectfully represent to your board that they with others, are the owners of lots on Culver place, from University avenue, about 720 feet southward, in the Sixteenth Ward of this city; that we have constituted and are engaged in constructing a considerable number of residences on said street, into which we desire to introduce and use the city water immediately; that we have filed a majority petition for the extension of a water main in said street with your board, but are informed that there are no moneys now in the Water Pipe Extension Fund applicable to that purpose.

We, therefore make the following proffer to the Common Council: That we will, under the direction of the Executive Board, procure and lay iron water pipe of proper dimensions and character, in said Culver place, at our own expense, and the city may take possession of said pipe when so laid and control and use the same, to the same extent and in the same manner as it is entitled and authorized to control and use water mains laid at the expense of the city; that we will be governed in the use of the water from said pipe by the rules and regulations of the Executive Board, and by any and all laws in relation to the collection of revenue from the water works in any manner.

Provided, That the Common Council will cause to be repaid to us the cost of said Water Pipe Extension, without interest, out of any moneys which may be appropriated for Water Pipe Extension by the tax levy for the year 1886.

Your committee have carefully investigated the facts and circumstances of the claim, and find that the sum of \$100 was paid by Simpson to the Overseer about October last upon the compromise of a

prosecution against him on a charge of being the father of a bastard child, of which said Theresa was then alleged to be pregnant and was subsequently delivered; that the child died in February last; that the Overseer paid out \$66.75 for the support and care of the mother and child and burial of the child, and has paid the residue, amounting to \$33 25 into the city treasury to the credit of the Poor Fund.

It is provided by law in such cases that compromise moneys shall be paid to the mother, upon her giving security against the child becoming a public charge. This claimant offers to give the required security.

GENTLEMEN—Your Assessment Committee, to which was referred the petition of Lucien A. Rowe and Helen I. Proctor, executors, etc. of Abner Sherman, deceased, late of the town of Greece, respectfully reports thereon, as follows:

An affidavit has been filed with your Committee, from which it appears that the petitioners are the executors of the last will and testament of Abner Sherman, who died in 1878, being at the time of his death, and for many years prior thereto, a resident of the town of Greece; that said Abner Sherman was, at the time of his death, the owner of a large amount of personal property, which, thereafter, came into the hands of the petitioners, as executors of said will, and is now held by said petitioners in trust for a large number of legatees named in the will, many of whom have not yet arrived at the age of 21 years; that for each and every year, since said property came into the hands of said petitioners, they have been assessed, as executors, as aforesaid, upon said personal property in the town of Greece, and have paid, each and every year, including the year 1885, to the collector of the town of Greece, the personal property tax, assessed, as aforesaid; that the petitioner Rowe has, at all the times since he came into possession of said personal property, as executor, resided in the town of Greece aforesaid; that the petitioner, Helen I. Proctor, was the widow of said Abner Sherman, deceased, and for several years after his death resided in said town of Greece, but that some two or three years ago she became the wife of Truman A. There is no department of the city government where a keener sense of duty is necessary than in that of the Poor Department.

The disbursements of the various funds under the control of the Common Council have been kept strictly within the appropriations for the fiscal year which closes with the present meeting. In view of the fact, however, that the tax levy for 1886 will not be made until the month of June and that the assessment roll will not be placed in the hands of the City Treasurer for collection until the 1st of July, it becomes necessary, in the judgment of your committee, to anticipate the tax levy by borrowing a sufficient amount of money to continue the various departments of the city government from the present time until July 1st. Of course it will be understood that this is not a deficiency loan. The necessity for this action is caused by the fact that the fiscal year begins April 1st, while the year for the payment of taxes does not begin until July 1st, thus leaving an interim of three months for which no provision has been made in the previous tax levy.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Your Finance Committee, at the close of the fiscal year which terminates its labors and duties, deems it advisable to venture an innovation, new to our charter requirements or practice, and present a final report, giving, in brief, such facts, opinions or suggestions touching the financial concerns of the city and the general management of its business as have been acquired by experience or deduced by a rational or business-like consideration of principles which should apply alike to all departments of affairs, whether municipal or otherwise.

It must not be understood, however, that your committee has any other object in view, in this new departure, than to merely call attention to a few facts deemed worthy of notice and to lightly touch upon such topics by way of suggestion, as may serve some useful purpose in the future management of the city's business.

It is a source of satisfaction to your committee, and it must be equally so to taxpayers generally, that the closing fiscal year leaves the financial interest of the city in such a compact, improved and satisfactory condition—all of which is fully shown in the annual reports of the Treasurer, Boards of the city and Committees of the Common Council; and to these several reports special attention is called, in confirmation of this gratifying result.

Since the beginning of the fiscal year, your Finance Committee has constantly urged upon all departments and committees, the necessity of exercising judicious economy in expenditures; and, with their co-operation, the public demand for an economical and efficient administration of the city government has been reasonably and, no doubt on the whole, satisfactorily accomplished.

It is gratifying also to report, that for the first time in many years we have passed through a whole year's business without necessitating the

authorization of a single deficiency note, or the overdrawing of a single fund. On the contrary, there are a few handsome credit balances in some of the funds, applicable in reducing the amount of the next tax levy, amounting in the aggregate, to upwards of \$60 000.

It will be something entirely novel, in the schedule of the next tax levy, to miss the old familiar phrase, "For payment of notes authorized by the Common Council for deficiencies in the following funds," etc., amounting, for example, in the tax levies of "1883-84," and "1884-85," to over \$500,000.

It is entirely practicable, as the current fiscal years' results demonstrate, to make a pretty close estimate of the amount of funds necessary to carry on the City Government in nearly all of its departments.

Before making up the tax levy, itemized estimates of the amounts needed for the various funds for the year should be required from all departments and committees; and careful consideration and investigation should be given such estimates by those whose duty it is to recommend and impose the same. When so imposed by the Common Council, all entrusted with the expenditures of the City's funds should definitely understand that, excepting for any extraordinary or unforeseen contingency, the funds created for their several purposes must suffice for the fiscal year. The practice of former years of practically guessing at the sums required for the several departments and purposes—outside, say, of the definite figures for interest and deficiency notes—is a custom which encourages and fosters carelessness and extravagance and should never again be permitted. Indeed, it has not been all guess work, for it has often happened that sums have been placed in the tax levy for certain funds with a full knowledge that such amounts must be supplemented by borrowing large sums during the fiscal year, and the only excuse—if such it can be termed—offered for such practice, is the necessity or policy of making the tax levy as "light" as possible. This excuse may suffice as a blind for a single year, but the evil thereof is apparent; in the succeeding year, the deficiency must be provided for, and then to fairly show the actual cost of conducting the city government for said succeeding year, a like amount of deficiencies must be deliberately planned for, and in thus figuring it is more than probable that deficiencies will be augmented rather than decreased.

Your committee, in carefully making their estimates of appropriations required for the current fiscal year, determined to discard all considerations of the above nature, with the one object only of avoiding any necessity of providing for depleted funds, while, at the same time, neglecting no necessary provision for the economical and efficient performance of public duties and obligations.

This having been accomplished during the present year, there can be no reasonable excuse for not continuing the practice; on the contrary, there are cogent reasons, too patent to need argument, why, in future, it should be rigidly enforced. One advantage may be here incidentally mentioned: by the avoidance of the issuing of deficiency notes, a large amount of discount may be saved to the city, as has been the case during the past year. It may also be stated here that interest on city deposits has largely increased during the same period.

Our city finances are now in excellent condition and the new fiscal year will commence under more favorable circumstances than for many years past. The danger to be avoided in such case is, that the Council may assume unnecessary burdens, or indulge in extravagant expenditures. Surpluses in the treasury and continued economy in management should alike be used and employed to lighten the burdens of taxation, and for that purpose only.

Of other matters occurring to your Committee as worthy of special notice are the following:

The Excise Tax, as is well-known, is an item of revenue devoted wholly to the poor fund; but it does not contribute anything near the amount it should towards relieving taxation for this purpose

—the total amount this year being \$41,322.50; and while it is considerable, it is not half the sum many other cities are raising from this source, in proportion to their respective populations. Detroit, for instance, raised last year from this tax, \$157,550.38, and this is by no means an exceptional illustration of taxation for this purpose.

Much has been said recently, as you are aware, through the city press, of the justness of the request of the Executive Board for an equitable allowance for the use of water furnished by that department for public use, so that the Water Works may have the benefit of its just earnings and receive the treatment, in this regard, common to a great majority of cities owning their own works. The reasons advanced for such credit are many and forcible; while but little, if anything, can be reasonably or justly said against it. But, without dwelling on this question, it is deemed sufficient here to state that such allowance will not increase taxation by a single dollar. It is simply an operation requiring a few lines only of book-keeping entries. If, say, \$100,000 is inserted in the tax levy for use of water for public purposes, the same \$100,000 is therein deducted from the sum total to be raised for the payment of interest on bonded water debt (the law requiring that all net earnings from the Water Works shall be thus applied and for the payment of its bonds).

In view of all the facts in the case, your Committee believes that as an act of substantial justice, proper credits should be allowed, and inserted in the next levy. In the last tax levy an oversight occurred, excusable under the circumstances, in reference to the amount raised for the payment of certain bonds, which is explained as follows:

There was placed in the last tax levy, for the payment of bonds issued for flood damages, due January 1, 1886, \$60,000; but there was a credit on the books of \$30,205.64, received from the State December 27, 1873, applicable towards the payment of this loan. This credit was inadvertently omitted from the levy and the amount is, therefore, available to apply towards the payment of the \$50,000 Free Academy building bonds due January 1, 1887, the only bonds to be provided for in the next tax levy.

In conclusion your committee has pleasure in announcing that the collection of taxes has been unusually close and successful, and reflects great credit on the efficient officer who has had charge thereof. Your committee also desires to express its appreciation of the uniform courtesy all its communications and recommendations have received from your honorable body.

It appears that the location on which Mrs. Canfield desires to erect said building is in the line of a proposed street from Gardner park to Union park as shown by a petition for the opening of such street to be filed with this Board. It appearing that such petition is a majority petition your Committee reports progress and asks further time.

To the Honorable Common Council :

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee appointed to investigate the Police Patrol system, would respectfully report the following:

That having had a conference with the representative of the Gamewell Company, your committee on his invitation proceeded to Chicago for the purpose of investigating the system now in use by the Chicago Police Department. Your Committee were introduced to and shown the workings of the electrical department of the Telegraph system under the guidance of John P. Barrett, the efficient Superintendent of the Police and Fire Department, and your committee would say that in connection with this examination that in the estimation of your committee, it is the best arranged department that your committee ever had a opportunity of seeing. Through the courtesy of Superintendent of Police Abersold, Captain John Bosfield, Inspector of the Police Department, and John P. Barrett Superintendent of Fire Alarm Telegraph, your committee were treated to substantial illustrations of the workings of the system, including the pulling of a box to show the manner in which a patrol wagon can be summoned in case of necessity, or the massing of the force in a particular precinct in case of a riot. Your committee were particularly pleased with its workings, and in conversation with a number of business men they expressed the opinion that the expense was not to be compared with the usefulness of the system, and the immunity from danger, particularly in the outer wards. The system in use in Chicago is known as the Gamewell Police telephone and signal telegraph, which is described as follows:

At the police stations of the several districts of the city are placed the necessary instruments and batteries for receiving and recording telegraphic signals.

The register upon which the signals are received is self-starting; and, whenever a signal is transmitted from the street station the record is made whether the person at the station be in attendance or not. The batteries used are of the kind known as "gravity batteries;" are very steady, constant, and reliable in their working, and require but very little care. Telephones and transmitters are also placed in the central stations for use when the arbitrary signals of the telegraph are not sufficient to cover the information desired to be transmitted.

Radiating from each station are telegraph lines or circuits running through the entire districts, connected at the desirable localities with a small structure, in size and shape not unlike a common sentry-box. This sentry-box is octagonal in shape, with pointed top, two feet, eight inches in diameter, and about eight feet in height. The sides are covered with iron, and the top with glass. These sentry-boxes take the place of lamp-posts, and the gas or other lamp is placed upon the top. This

serv-s not only as a street-light, but to light the interior of the box at night. The doors of these stations are furnished with a patent trap-lock, so constructed that, whenever a key is used, it cannot be withdrawn until released by a master key. Every key is numbered, and the name of the holder kept on record. This establishes responsibility, and prevents the giving of needless alarms; for, when a key has been used, it can be returned to its owner only by the proper officer, who holds in his possession the master or release key.

Keys to the street-stations are given to responsible citizens and to the patrolmen of the district. Locks are uniform throughout the city, and one key will open any station.

Inside of each station is placed a small iron case with a door and lock, the case containing an automatic signal instrument, by means of which a key holder, by pulling a hook which protrudes signals the police station and calls for aid.

A patrolman, upon entering a street station, can immediately transmit a special signal, which will inform the officer on duty at headquarters of his presence. The telephone can then be used for the transmission of headquarters to the patrolman, or by the patrolman to indicate whatever may be his wants. At every central station one or more patrolmen are kept in reserve at all times of day and night; and in large cities a horse and wagon are always ready to respond to a call at a moment's notice.

Suppose trouble of any kind occurs, demanding the presence of a police force in any part of the district covered by this system, the door of a sentry box is opened, and the lever, protruding from the interior of the box, is pulled. The signal is instantly communicated to the district headquarters, and the reserve immediately hurry to the place whence the signal has come. Where horses are used, but a very short space of time elapses after the call before the aid required is at hand ready for any service.

Patrolmen, as they go their rounds, may be required to report at the several stations on their beats as frequently as it may be deemed advisable. This will go a long way towards securing faithfulness of the force.

The bells of the fire alarm telegraph may be utilized, where this system is in use by the Police Department, to summons, in cases of emergency, the entire force to rally at street and district stations, and then directions may be given them by telephone; so that, within a few minutes after the commission of any great crime, the fact and its details may be made known to every policeman in the city.

The patrol wagons generally used with this system are models of convenience and adaptability for the work. They combine lightness and strength, and are conspicuous by their blue body and bright red running gear. They are furnished with an alarm gong. Under the seats, which run lengthwise on each side of the box, are compartments for hand-cuffs, come-alongs, clubs, blankets, canvas stretcher, ropes, and other articles necessary and convenient.

The stretcher is an ingenious arrangement. When not in use it is rolled up on the poles and placed in one of the compartments under the seat. When required for use, the stretcher is suspended on hooks between the seats of the wagon in such a manner that the jolting of the wagon is not noticeable. The stretcher can be lifted in and out of the wagon without disturbing the patient.

For obstreperous persons there is a ring in the floor of the wagon, to which the belligerent party can be tied down and secured.

PRIVATE PROTECTION.

A small signal-box is specially constructed, to be placed in private residences, banks, hotels, or business offices, and connected directly with the system.

When a signal-box is placed in a private residence, a key of the house is left at the station under seal. In case the occupants of the house have occasion, at any time, to call for assistance of the police, they can do so by simply pulling the lever attached to

the box, and they can also indicate the nature of their wants by using any one of the ten different signals; that is they can indicate burglars, drunken servants, fire, etc. When a call is made, the occupants of the house can, if desirable, remain quietly in their bedrooms, while the policeman answering the call takes the key of their house from its place, breaking the seal, and having reached the house, steps quietly in at the front door to the utter surprise of the thieves or burglars, who find themselves absolutely trapped.

The owner of the alarm box can, each night, if he wishes, before retiring, give what is called the "test of the line" signal; and the answering ring on the bell shows that the line is in working order.

An important feature of the signal apparatus is, that, after transmission of the call, a small bell attached to the instrument is made to give one blow; this assures the party calling for help that his call has been heard, and is sure to be answered.

In banking houses the use of these signal-boxes have repeatedly proved of the utmost importance.

ADVANTAGES OF THE SYSTEM.

The experience of the Police Department of Chicago in the working of this telephone and signal-telegraph system has been such that new uses and advantages have been and are being constantly developed; but the following may be mentioned as among the principal and most important points of value:

It increases the certainty of punishment for crime, and must therefore exercise the most powerful influence for its prevention. It gives to every citizen, however remote from headquarters, the means of instantly summoning police assistance. It enables the force, whatever it may be, to work with the greatest efficiency, and to accomplish infinitely more in the preservation of peace and order than could be possible without this valuable aid.

By making a comparatively small force extremely efficient, and therefore a large force unnecessary, it saves a large annual expenditure for the maintenance of the department. This saving will in most cases pay for the construction of the system in a year or two, as well as its running expenses. Its introduction is therefore in the line of real economy. By promptly furnishing the means of dispersing crowds, checking disturbances or riots, arresting disorderly persons, it infinitely decreases the chance of serious outbreaks, which often end in murder, robbery, or arson.

It enables the patrolman to remain on his beat. If he arrests a party, or wishes assistance, he has only to go to the nearest box, and make his wants known at the station; and in a short time he is relieved of his prisoner, and assistance is at hand. An officer making an arrest is obliged at present to come to the station house, and leave his route entirely unprotected from between one and three hours,—which fact is oftentimes improved by thieves, who have one of their number arrested for a trivial matter, simply to get the officer off his post.

It makes every key-holder to a considerable extent a policeman; for he carries with him the power to summons the police to any point wherever he may see that their services are required.

It is the policeman's best friend. It increases his power, dignity and importance; for he need never feel that he is alone, or beyond the reach of support; and to a very great degree it will lessen the chances and necessity of personal encounters with the roughs, who frequently combine together for his injury or to drive him from his beat.

Finally, it establishes a thorough business-like way of handling a police department, securing, on the part of all, vigilance, efficiency and discipline, and the protection and support of every individual member of the force.

The telegraph is the one thing that the criminals dread. It circumvents all their skill and their cunning; and this application of it is certain to prove as valuable in municipalities as it has heretofore proved in securing arrests at distant points.

The urgent need of a public watchman or constable at any particular point in any American community is altogether exceptional; and the tendency

is therefore to give the policeman a long beat to traverse, and the chances are that he will be out of the way when an accident happens; and evil-doers will take advantage of his known absence to disturb the peace and invade the proper rights of citizens.

To provide against such exigencies by largely increasing the number of policemen is obviously much less economical than to quicken the working of the police system by putting every patrolman within the reach of instant communication to the sub-station to which he is attached, and, if need be, with the police station or headquarters, at the same time giving every orderly citizen, in case of need, the means of calling upon the same authorities with the least delay. This is just what this system does; and why should not responsible citizens have the same power to call policemen when needed, as they now have to call out the fire department in case of fire?

As our Police Commissioners have from time to time asked for additions to the police force, thus affording adequate police protection to the citizens of Rochester, we were unable to grant their request owing to the insufficiency of the tax levy, and as our city is no longer a large village but a large, populous, and thriving city, constantly growing and expanding. It becomes necessary to afford that police protection that a city like this is entitled to.

Hon. Carter H. Harrison, Mayor of Chicago thus refers to the system in his annual message, dated May 9, 1881.

"We began with its introduction in the West Twelfth street district, which was overrun with desperadoes, roughs and footpads, and finding it so useful in summoning police to apprehend this class, we have so extended the system to other portions of the city that districts hitherto comparatively unprotected are now very thoroughly under police surveillance. But for these changes the present police force would be entirely inadequate to meet the demands of the city. Our police force is the smallest of any large city in the country; but telephonic communication has rendered the force doubly serviceable, and aids in the very material and perceptible decrease in crime.

"The system contemplates connections with business houses and private residences; and already several have availed themselves of its benefit to be in a position to receive prompt police assistance in the case of an emergency. It has already proved itself of incalculable value to the department, and will be made to cover the city as rapidly as means will permit. I have directed superintendents of the police and fire departments to make as large savings as possible in their respective departments, and to apply the same to the introduction of the same."

Captain William McGargle, late Superintendent of Police, of Chicago, says:

"The Chicago police department, in an experimental manner, has endeavored to demonstrate the use of electricity in the prosecution of police business, and, after a trial of several months in the West Twelfth Street District, is enabled to announce the most gratifying success.

"In the absence of the new system, when the services of a policeman are required, it would be necessary for some person to seek an officer; and, in case an officer be engaged in making an arrest, attending a fire, or any other duty, the person needing his service would find it necessary to go to the station, perhaps a mile distant, to procure the required service; and it is not surprising that the cry, 'Where are the police?' is often heard."

"With the new system, any respectable citizen intrusted with a key of the street-station can call instantaneously one or more policemen."

The Police Commissioners estimate that at least fifteen more police is necessary for the police protection of our city, which would involve an annual expenditure of about \$14,000. We are satisfied that the adoption of the police telegraph system with a patrol wagon would add more to the efficiency of the department, at a cost of \$3,000 per year running expenses, than would fifteen men at \$14,000 per year. Your committee do not feel war-

ranted, owing to the expense in putting in the number of boxes necessary to cover the entire city as it should be, but would recommend the adoption of resolutions to purchase thirty boxes divided on four circuits with four sets of central office apparatus complete, with battery, etc., and one patrol wagon, horses, harnesses, etc., at a sum not to exceed \$12,000. Your Committee in conclusion extend their heartfelt thanks to the officials of the city of Chicago, and more especially to the Mayor, the Hon. Carter H. Harrison, Superintendent of Police Abersold, John P. Barrett, Superintendent of Fire and Police Telegraph and to Inspector of Police Captain John Bonfield for their kindness and courtesy extended to us during our stay in their city.

SUPPLEMENT TO REPORT ON THE PROPOSED GOODMAN STREET SEWER.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., March 31, 1886.

To the Committee on Sewers of the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: On the 23d inst., the Executive Board submitted to you a report on the practicability of constructing a trunk sewer through Goodman street from a point about 1,000 feet north of Bay street to the south line of the property owned by the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R. on the east side of said Goodman street; and in order to complete the investigation which you have requested, it now remains to present for your consideration such facts relating to rights of way and claims for damages for the flow of sewage from the Court and William street, the Upton park and the Culver park outlet sewers, in open ditches or water-courses running through private lands, as after diligent search we have been able to ascertain. There are four such open ditches to be considered in this investigation; viz.: First, that pertaining to the Court and William streets outlet sewer exclusively, which begins now on the north side of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R., about 900 feet west of Goodman street, and terminates at its junction with the Upton park outlet sewer ditch upon the lands of Gertrude Schum, near the northeastern corner of the city. Second—That

pertaining to the Upton park outlet sewer exclusively, which begins now on the north side of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R., in Leighton avenue, about 850 feet east of Goodman street, and terminates at its junction with the Court and William streets outlet sewer ditch upon the lands of Gertrude Schum, as aforesaid. Third—That pertaining to both the Court and William streets and the Upton park outlet sewers jointly, which begins at the junction of the two foregoing ditches upon the lands of Gertrude Schum, near the northeastern corner of the city, and terminates, after a course of about three miles, at Irondequoit Bay. Fourth—That pertaining to the Culver park sewer alone which begins on the south side of Culver park near Portsmouth Terrace, thence runs northeasterly to University avenue and the south side of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R., thence easterly along said railroad to the outlet ditch of the East avenue and Park avenue sewers at the crossing of Culver street and the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R.

To give a concise exhibit of the relations of the city toward the individual land-owners through whose premises the sewage from the above-named districts flows in open ditches, the information elicited by our examinations has been arranged in tabular form. In these statements will be found the names of the land-owners, so far as could be ascertained within the short time available, the approximate length of ditch upon their lands, and remarks relating to estimates for the flow of the sewage, etc.:

In the Wakelee Farm Tract claims for damages have been filed as follows: William Doenne for Lot No. 9, Section 9, east side of Seventh avenue, \$250; Mathias Dubelbeiss for Lot No. 14, Section 18, west side of Sixth avenue, \$200; Frederick Kreckmann, for Lots Nos 4 and 7, Section 9, south side of Bay street, and east side of Seventh avenue, respectively, \$700; J. P. Bainbridge, for Lots No. 16 and 26 on west side of Seventh, wants ditch covered.

No action, tending towards a settlement of these claims appears to have been taken by the Council. (See C. C. proceedings 1885-6, pp. 158 and 190).

The limited easements, mentioned in the above table, may be terminated at any time on the part of the city, and by the grantors at the expiration of two years from the time that written notice shall have been served upon the city authorities of a desire on their part to terminate the same. For other particulars relating to this ditch, we beg leave to refer to the joint report of your committee and the Executive Board, which was presented to the Com-

mon Council on September 8, 1885, and printed on pp. 189 and 190 of the Council Proceedings.

The form of contract for right of way or easement with a number of the parties will be found in a report from the Executive Board to the Common Council on May 12, 1883, and printed on pp. 63 and 64 of the Council Proceedings.

II—UPTON PARK OUTLET SEWER DITCH.

The following are the owners of land and the length of open ditch through which the Upton park outlet sewer ditch passes:

 No. 6. John and George Peeling, 900 ft.—Permanent easement for about 480 ft., of which 300 ft. has been covered. No easement for remainder. See C. C. proceedings 1885-6, p. 158
 No. 7. M. Moulton, 900 ft.—No easement and no record of claims.

On the line of this ditch claims for damages have already been filed by James and Joseph W. Palmer, as will be seen from the Council Proceedings for 1885-6, page 315. No other unsettled claims appear to be recorded.

Along the Webster plank road, or Main street, partial relief has been recently obtained by the completion of the pipe sewer through said highway from Grand avenue to Bay street, whereby the ordinary discharge of the ditch is intercepted. The freshet discharge from the Upton Park and the intermediate drainage areas must, however, still continue to find an outlet through the open ditch on the south or east side of said highway, since the pipe sewer has not sufficient capacity for this purpose.

The limited easements mentioned are of the same nature as above described.

III.—OPEN DITCH OR CREEK RECEIVING THE COMBINED DISCHARGE OF THE COURT AND WILLIAM STREETS AND THE UPTON PARK OUTLET SEWERS

The following are the owners of land and the length of open ditch through which Court and William streets and the Upton park outlet sewers pass:

- No. 1. Gertrude Schum, 600 ft.—limited easement; paid \$50 per year. See C. C. proceedings, 1883-4, p. 63.
 No. 2. Henry P. Ayres, 1,800 ft.—limited easement; paid \$175 per year. See C. C. proceedings, 1883-4, p. 63

The limited easements here referred to are exactly like those formerly mentioned.

IV. CULVER PARK SEWER DITCH.

This ditch, with the exception of a comparatively short section on the north side of University avenue, between Jersey street and the railroad, lies wholly in lands owned by Marvin S. Culver and the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. Co.

No easements for the privilege of using it for the discharge of sewage have been granted to the city. It should also be remembered that this ditch discharges into the East avenue street outlet ditch,

at Culver street, and the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. Co. has brought suit to restrain the city from discharging sewage into said East avenue sewer outlet from the Upton Park sewer district; and hence that a similar suit might be brought, if an attempt were made to add sewage thereto from any other district.

In regard to the amount of money which will annually be saved to the city for payments of rights of way or easements for the flow of sewage in open ditches through private lands, provided that the sewer, through Goodman street, were built as proposed in our former report, submitted on the 23d inst., little can be predicted, at present, by reason of the fact that we are unable to state when suits for damages will be commenced by parties not yet settled with, or what amount of such damages are likely to be awarded.

It may, however, be definitely stated that upon the completion of the Goodman street sewer, with its branch to intercept the Court and William streets outlet sewer, as proposed, the following payments will at once cease:

We are also informed that if a few hundred feet of the proposed new deep ditch, from Goodman street easterly through the lands of Hannah E. Brown, be properly walled and covered, no addition to the annual payment to Mrs. Brown for right of way for the Court and William streets sewage will be made, in case that the sewage from the Upton park district also is discharged into said new ditch.

This question is, however, not yet definitely settled.

Furthermore, in case the proposed Goodman street sewer with both of its branches is completed as aforesaid, claims for future damages, by the following named parties will be avoided:

Heirs of Conrad Ester, William Doehne, Mathias Dubelbeiss, Frederick Kreckmann, J. P. Bainridge, and all other lot owners in the Wakelee Farm Tract, whose premises are affected by the discharge from the Court and William streets outlet sewer; also James and Joseph W. Palmer, East Rochester Building Association lots Main street, or the Webster plank road, John and George Peeling and M. Moulton, all of which are affected, more or less, by the discharge of the Upton park outlet sewer.

Whether those of the above named parties, who have already filed claims for past damages, will cancel the same, if the Common Council should cause the Goodman street sewer to be built as heretofore proposed, is not known to us.

It may also be remarked that, with the single exception of Mrs. Brown, all of the other land owners along the open ditch or creek from Goodman street easterly to Irondequoit Bay will derive no benefit whatever from the construction of the sewer, as proposed, and hence will probably not make any reductions in their annual claims against the city. Expenditures for this purpose can doubtless never be avoided until the whole of the drainage from the eastern portions of the city is completely intercepted and diverted into the Genesee River, or until the sewage is properly purified before being discharged into small natural water courses which flow through private lands.

In conclusion, we deem it expedient to invite your attention to the serious problems and complications involved in any and all projects hitherto presented for the sewage of the eastern districts of the city, and to the urgent necessity of causing the indispensable preliminary investigations, surveys and studies to be made and submitted for general criticism, without much delay, owing to the rapid development of the city towards the east. The time is near at hand when a more comprehensive system of sewerage will be imperatively demanded, and in order to avoid the serious and costly errors which generally result from hastily prepared plans,

it will be wise to institute soon the necessary proceedings by which rational and economical projects for the sewerage of these large areas can be laid before the taxpayers who are directly concerned. Respectfully submitted,

ROWE STREET SEWER.

Whereas, The Common Council did upon the 14th day of July, 1885, enact an ordinance for a sewer in Rowe street.

And, Whereas, The City Treasurer has reported the actual expenses of said improvement to be the sum of \$16,591.64, including such interest as the city has paid or become liable for.

And the portion of said city which said Common Council deemed would be benefitted by said improvement is described as follows:

All the territory included and described by the following boundry lines, viz:

Beginning at a point on the east line of Lake avenue with the intersection of the produced north line of Lake View park, thence westerly including one tier of lots on the north side of Lake View park to the east line of the Boulevard, thence southerly along the east line of the Boulevard to the north line of McCracken street, thence westerly including one tier of lots on the north side of McCracken street to the west line of the city, thence southerly to the north line of Emerson street, thence easterly along the north line of Emerson street, excepting one tier of lots on the north side thereof to the east line of the Monroe Association tract, except one tier of lots on each side of Seventh and Eighth streets, from the north line of Emerson street to a point 300 feet northerly thereof; thence northerly along the east line of the Monroe Association tract to Glenwood avenue, thence westerly along the north line of Glenwood avenue, including one tier of lots on the north side thereof to the east line of Thrush street; thence northerly along the east line of Thrush street, including one tier of lots on the east side thereof to Rowe street; thence easterly along the south line of Rowe street, including one tier of lots on the south side thereof to the west line of Lake avenue; thence southerly to the west line of Lake avenue, including one tier of lots on the west side thereof to the center of Deep Hollow creek; thence easterly to the east line of Lake avenue; thence northerly on the east line of Lake avenue, including one tier of lots on the east side thereof to the place of beginning, including one lot on said east line north of the point of beginning.

Therefore, Resolved, That the sum of \$16,591.64, being the whole amount of the expenses aforesaid, shall be assessed on such lots and parcels of land.

And V. Fleckenstein, William Maher, and L. A. Pratt, the Assessors of said city, not interested in any of the property so benefitted, and not of kin to any person so interested, are hereby designated and directed to make an assessment upon all the lots and parcels of land and houses within the portion or part of said city so designated, of the said amount of expense, in proportion, as nearly as may be, to the advantage which each shall be deemed to acquire by the making of said improvement; and said Assessors are hereby notified to meet for this purpose on Saturday, the 3d day of April, 1885, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, at the office of the City Assessors, No. 15 City Hall.

From the intersection of Plymouth avenue and West Main street by a double curve from the tracks of the Rochester City and Brighton railroad company on West Main street into Plymouth avenue and by a double track thence southerly along Plymouth avenue to Spring street, thence by a single track through Plymouth avenue to Genesee street, with the necessary switches, sidings, turnouts and turntables, and suitable stands for the convenient working of said railroad.

The right, franchise and privilege of using the streets herein mentioned, so far as the City of Rochester has power to grant the same, for a route along said streets as herein described, will be sold at public auction on the steps of the City Hall in Rochester, on the 18th day of May, 1886, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, by the City Treasurer, to the person or corporation who shall then and there bid and give the largest percentage of gross receipts derived from the operation of said railroad as above recited, having previously deposited with the City Clerk of Rochester an undertaking under seal in a form approved by the City Attorney and Mayor in the penal sum of \$15,000 for the construction of said railroad within the period prescribed by law and for the payment annually of the percentage of gross receipts which shall be bid at such sale by such person or corporation, executed by two sureties who shall justify in the sum of \$50,000 each, before the deposit of such undertaking. Such undertaking shall contain a provision that the construction, use, maintenance and operation of such railroad shall be in compliance with the statutes of the state of New York, under chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884. It is further

Resolved, That the conditions and terms in the foregoing notice recited be the conditions and terms upon which the consent of the city of Rochester to the construction, operation, maintenance, use and extension of a line of railroad upon the streets therein mentioned is given and that the consent of the City of Rochester is hereby given to the use of said streets in the manner above described for the purpose above described of a railroad under Chapter 252 of the Laws of New York, of the year 1884, to the successful bidder in compliance with the foregoing provisions of these resolutions and the notice therein contained and upon the further express condition that such railroad shall be constructed, operated and maintained in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 252 of the Laws of New York of the year 1884.

The right, franchise and privilege of using the streets herein mentioned so far as the City of Rochester has power to grant the same for a route of railroad along said streets as herein described, will be sold at public auction on the steps of the City Hall in Rochester, on the 18th day of May, 1886, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, by the City Treasurer, to the person or corporation who shall then and there bid and give the largest percentage of gross receipts derived from the operation of said railroad as above recited, having previously deposited with the City Clerk of the City of Rochester an undertaking under seal in a form approved by the City Attorney and Mayor, in the penal sum of \$15,000 for the construction of said railroad within the period prescribed by law, and for the payment annually of the percentage of gross receipts which shall be bid at such sale by such person or corporation executed by two sureties who shall justify in the sum of \$50,000, each, before the deposit of such undertaking. Such undertaking shall contain a provision that the constructor, use, maintenance and operation of said railroad shall be in compliance with the Statutes of the State of New York, and of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884.

Resolved, That the Citizens Gas Light Company be and hereby is requested to lay a gas main in Weld street, from North avenue to North Union street, and the Lamp Committee be directed to locate the necessary public lamps on said street.

Adopted.

By Alderman Kelly—

Whereas, The Common Council did, November 17, 1885, pass an ordinance for a sewer in Thrush street, and

Whereas, The property owners interested are suffering for the want of proper drainage on said street; therefore,

Resolved, That the executive Board be directed to advertise for proposals for the construction of said sewer immediately.

Adopted.

Alderman Kelly gave notice that at the meeting of this Board to be held on April 20th next he would move the adoption of a penal ordinance providing in substance that all pawn brokers report daily to the Chief of Police an accurate list and description of all articles of personal property taken by them respectively in pawn on the previous day; which report shall be delivered to the said chief not later than 10 o'clock a. m., and for failure to so report a penalty to be imposed of not more than \$100.

Alderman Tracy presented petitions of R. L. Barrowclough and O. B. Webber for permission to erect wood buildings, and moved that permission be granted.

IN COMMON COUNCIL.

Final Meeting, April 5, 1886.

There being no further business before the Board the President addressed the Common Council as follows:

GENTLEMEN OF THE COMMON COUNCIL: We are brought again to the close of another official year. With the present meeting the record of the fifty-second Common Council of the city passes into history. For the first time in many years, the expenditures in every department of the city government under the control of the Common Council have been kept within the appropriation made at the beginning of the year. In view of the fact that a considerable portion of the tax levy for 1885 was to make up deficiencies in levies of previous years, this record is one in which this Common Council may be allowed to take a pardonable pride.

During the year just closed the common council and the citizens of Rochester have given much attention to the consideration of proposed changes in the organic law of the city. A joint committee of citizens and aldermen, together with a committee of the Municipal reform league, held a large number of meetings and agreed upon the outline of a new charter. The common council, recognizing that its members are elected to do the people's will, decided to make no recommendation to the legislature in reference to the proposed amendments, until an expression of opinion thereon could be had by submission to popular vote. Several of the leading amendments were submitted to the people at the recent charter election, and in every instance the vote was strongly adverse to the contemplated change.

It is believed, however, by the friends of the new charter that a more thorough examination of its merits, and more general discussion of its features in the daily press, and by public meetings, will, in the not distant future, convince a majority of our citizens of the wisdom and propriety of urging that a new charter containing the result of the best thoughts of the time as to the methods of municipal government, may be enacted.

For more than twenty years the successive common councils have had their attention occupied, and their patience exhausted by wearisome discussions of the various phases of the litigation over the assessments for the Oak street improvement. The present common council is to be congratulated upon the fact that it has provided for a settlement of all questions growing out of this matter, and that during the past year more than two-thirds of the claims of property owners on that street have been settled, and the balance is in a fair way of final adjustment.

The most important work before the common council at the present time, in my judgment, is the preparation of some plan for disposing of the sewage of the city. The matter has been agitated for years. Communications calling attention to the necessity of action have been received from the city surveyor, city attorney and executive board. Meantime judgments have been annually recovered for damages, and recently injunctions have been granted restraining the city from further emptying the contents of its sewers upon private property of citizens of the adjoining towns. Prompt action in the premises is imperatively demanded.

I was, at the beginning of the year, through your kindness, by a resolution of the board, made a member of several of the important committees. I have during the year taken but little part in the

deliberations of the committees, as I considered that they were so constituted that no additions could, in any way, add to their effectiveness. The compliment of the appointment was, however, duly appreciated, and my services, whenever required, have been always at your disposal.

And now the time for parting has come. In retiring from the duties of chairman of this board, I wish to express my gratitude to you, individually and collectively, for the kindly consideration which I have uniformly received at your hands. The duties of the chairman of a deliberative body, before which so many delicate and important questions are from time to time pending, must, in the nature of things, be arduous, and yet my labors in the chair have been comparatively light, a fact which is due, in a large measure, to your unflinching courtesy and prompt acceptance of the rulings of the chair.

I wish, also, to return my sincere thanks to the several city officials appointed by this board for kindness shown and assistance rendered on different occasions, and to here make public acknowledgment of the efficiency displayed by each in the discharge of their respective duties, and refer particularly to the City Attorney, City Clerk, City Surveyor and City Messenger.

In conclusion, gentlemen, allow me to again thank you for your kindness, and extend my sincere wish for your future happiness and prosperity.

Alderman Kohlmetz arose in his chair and addressed the president of the board as follows:

MR. PRESIDENT: I have been deputed by my associates to present you with a slight token as an evidence of our appreciation of your valuable services as the presiding officer of this board. I know of no duty to which I could be assigned to perform which to me is so pleasing, yet I regret that one better qualified was not designated.

During the past year we have had ample opportunities of judging of your action as the presiding officer of the legislative branch of our municipality. In the discharge of this important duty you would have been justified, in many instances, by discriminating against a political minority, but, sir, we have always found you upright, able and fair to your colleagues without regard to their affiliation.

It is fortunate to the people of this city that such citizens as yourself can be found who will sacrifice their personal interests for the public good. Among the characteristics we discover prominent in your career is prompt attention to duty, this together with intelligence exercised with an honest purpose, cannot fail to be appreciated by a discerning people, and, sir, we are not surprised to learn that you have been for the seventh time called upon to represent your neighbors in this Common Council.

The evidence of our friendship which your colleagues have selected to bestow upon you is not of any great intrinsic value, but the feeling that prompts the gift you will prize much greater. The ring is appropriate as an emblem of endearing value. The diamond attachment, while adorning the outer person, will, we trust, at all times, betoken the bright moral and intellectual light that will emanate from your inner man and adorn your character.

In future times, as you look upon this gift, it will remind you of your colleagues in this board, and we have reasonable expectations to believe that the recollections will personally be of a pleasing character.

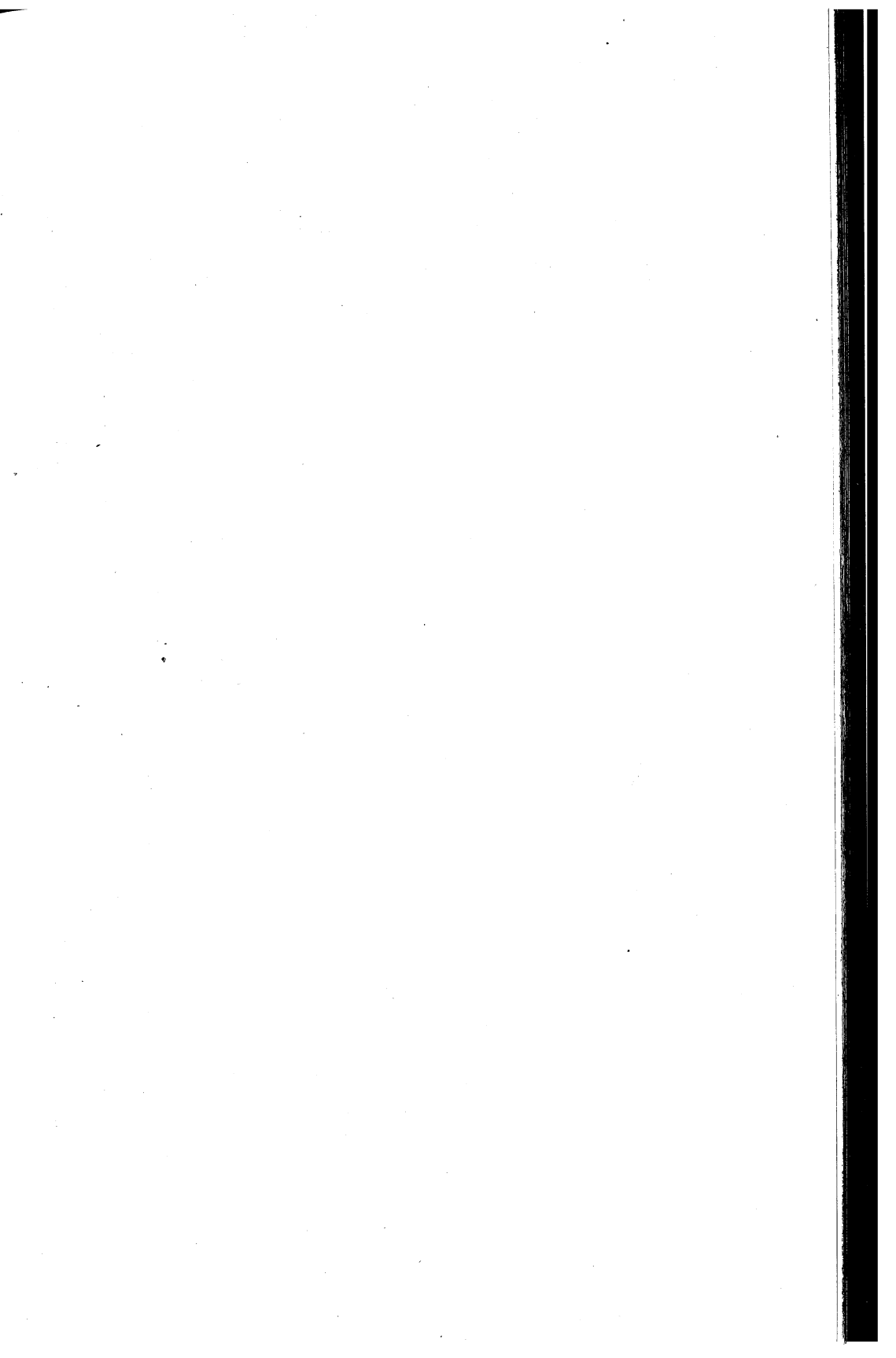
In conclusion, I tender to you the assurance of our most hearty wishes for your future happiness and prosperity.

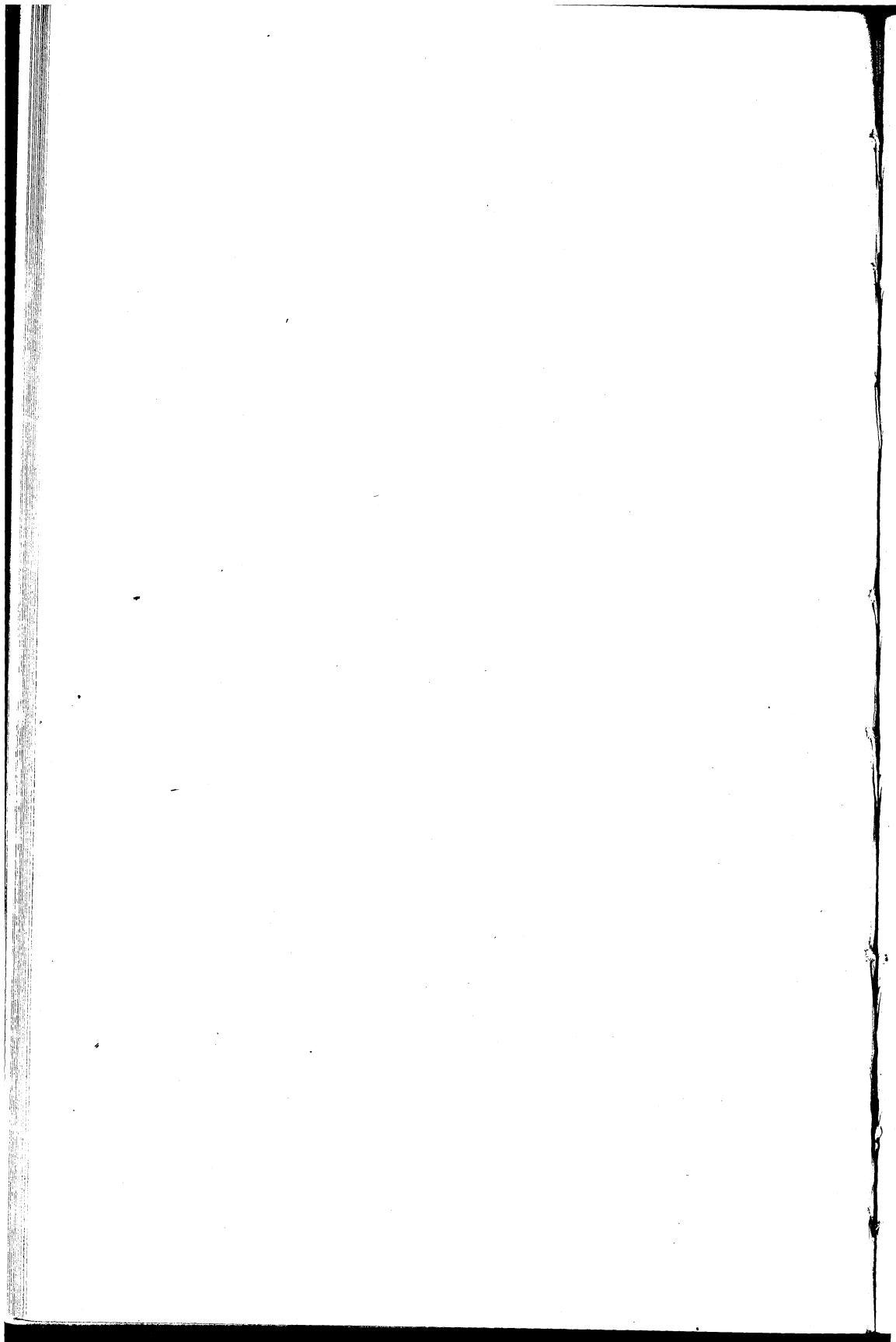
