

Hon. Cornelius R. Parsons, Mayor of the City of Rochester, N. Y.:

DEAR SIR: In response to your inquiry as to the authority of the Common Council to appoint a Milk Inspector of the city of Rochester, as provided by a resolution of said Council at the last meeting thereof, March 21st. 1882, upon the report of the Committee on Public Health, recommending the appointment of a person to such an office and designating J. M. Winslow Eq., who was at the same time declared appointed as such milk inspector: after making a careful examination of the provisions of the city charter relating to the appointment of the various city officers, I can find no authority therein given for such an officer. It is, therefore, my opinion that the appointment of J. M. Winslow, Esq., as milk inspector, is invalid and illegal.

In passing upon this question, I do not mean to be understood to hold that the Board of Health of this city may not designate a person to inspect milk offered for sale, as a sanitary measure.

One of the advantages of the system in this country is, that the whole population is made to take a direct personal interest in the business of education, and to carry it on in the way best suited to supply the general wants, to teach men from their earliest childhood, their duties and their rights. The law governing the latter body in the matter of the expenditure of money for school purposes, has always proved deficient I trust a proper solution of the difficulty is to be found in the amendments to the charter now before the legislature for adoption.

WATER WORKS DEPARTMENT.

The water works of the city bave been maintained in excellent condition during the past year, responding on all necessary occasions and generally meeting fully the wants of citisens.

There have been received for water rents about \$91,000. There should also be credited to the water works fund about \$64,000, for city uses of water, making a total revenue of \$155,000.

The number of service taps inserted is 1, 455. This does not represent the whole number of new services connected, as in many cases one tap supplies several services, each controlled

by a separate curb box.

The amount of water used from the Hemlock supply from April 1, 1881, to April 1, 1882, is 1,546,898,500 gallons, making a daily average of 4,238,078 gallons. This is a decrease of 103,000 gallons per day from the preceding year, although there was an increase of more than 1,500 new services and a great number of extensions. This decrease is due to the cutting off of waste by careful inspection and enforcement of the rules and the setting of meters on business blocks and places. The number of meters now in use is about 500.

The average daily consumption of water from the Holly system has not been so accurately determined, but I am informed that it was not less than 1, 500, 000 gallons.

The amount included in the tax levy of last year for water pipe extension was \$25,000. The common council also directed the raising of \$23, 150 by loan for the same purpose, which last amount will be raised in the tax levy for the present year.

The executive board has, with the consent of the commen council, acquired from the Rochester Water company, by commission, about eleven acres of land adjacent to the

foot of Hemlock lake, including both channels from the lake, and negotiations are now pending for the purchase of the balance of the property of that company by the city, the said company having greatly reduced the price demanded for the same.

The suit of Hiram P. Smith and others against the city for diversion of water from Hemlock lake has been argued in general term on an appeal, but no decision has vet been rendered by that tribunal.

A suit has been commenced against the city by Daniel Runkle as assignee of B. G. Clarke for the recovery of about \$22,000, principal and interest, alleged to be due from the city on account of pipe furnished during the construction of the water works. assured by those in charge of the water works that the city has a complete and perfect defense in this case.

The purity of the Hemlock water remains unchallenged. A very careful analysis of the waters of several American cities has recently been made by Professor Alfred R. Leeds of the Stevens Institue of Technology and his report indicates the relative order of purity of the waters as follows:

The city of Rochester may well be proud and grateful for water so abundant and pure.

On the first day of October, 1876, the commissioners under whose direction the water works had been constructed, surrendered the same to the executive board, and since that period the expense of operating and maintaining them has amounted in round numbers to two hundred and twenty-five (225) thousand dollars. The total receipts for the uses of water for the past six years are \$386, 744.85. Its average yearly expense for the space of six years has been a trifle over \$42,000—a wonderful exhibit, surely. The total number of fires during the same period was 578; the losses have amounted to \$672, -523 and the insurance paid was \$560, 370.

EXCISE. The falling off of revenue derived from licenses granted for the sale of liquors for the year ending May 1st next will be about \$5,000. This is owing to a change in the law which went into effect about a year ago, making all licenses expire on the first day of May in each year, instead of at the expiration of a year from the time they were granted, as was formerly the case. Under the previous law, the receipts, as I am informed, would have been several thousand dollars more than last year, because of a better system prevailing in Rochester (than had heretofore existed) of ascertaining the number of places selling ale, beer, &c. $_{\rm In}$ consequence ofοf the passage tha new act, there has been a gradual diminishing of the sum paid for license, the fee having been received on the pro rata principle as provided for in the law; and, to illustrate its workings, I need only say that for the four months ending April 3, 1881, for licenses granted during that time and expiring in one year from their several dates, the total amount received was \$3,746.33, against the sum received for licenses granted during the same months ofthis vear the 30th of April will have produced about \$1,100, at which time as I have stated, all permits or privileges granted become a matter of great necessity and is ex-

People are apt to forget that all persons, no matter what their reputation may be, or the amount they sell, are required under heavy and severe penalties to pay the government tax, and, because this is so, none fail to provide themselves with the stamp issued by the United States officials to those engaged in the business of selling liquor. To the credit of the commissioners it may be said that they have not, and do not knowingly grant licenses to the keepers of disorderly houses.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH.

Nothing should be more sacredly guarded by officials than the health of the community in which they dwell. The board of health during the past year has heard numerous complaints and remedied many evils. Its members have labored zealously in the field assigned them, and many of those now living

in one instance, at least. prompt and decisive action saved the city from epidemic. The common council has cheerfully and promptly responded to the demands made by the board of health, and both have worked harmoniously together for the people's welfare. In a great city like ours there are many things pertaining to the health of its inhabitants, and the same constantly engage the attention of the authorities. Everything requisite to suppress disease and enforce cleanliness should be placed at the disposal of the health board. One of the most important matters with which it has to deal is the collection and disposal of garbage. As evidence that this duty has been faithfully performed the following statement is furnished:

HEALTH OFFICE, April 1, 1882.

Hon. C. R. Parsons, Mayor:

Sin: In compliance with your request, we submit a brief statement of the work of the board, in the collection of garbage during the past nine months. The system adopted, has been to employ as many teams per day as the actual necessities of the work required. The old system of contract work has been discarded. In this way, work tract work has been discarded. In this way, work done was paid for, and no other outlay has occurred. The board commenced collection June 21st, 1881. The city was in a very filthy condition from the accumulation of garbage, which the executive board had failed to remove. Ten days were occupied with this work. Since that period labor in this department has proceeded in a regular and most satisfactory manner; even in the time of extreme heat of mid-summer. It has not been the experience of the health office to receive so few complaints in a number of years as during the complaints in a number of years, as during the nine months just past. The following summary of nine months just past. The local and the work done, and expense incurred, during the past nine months, will explain itself, and show the character and results of the the work done, and expense incurred, during the past nine months, will explain itself, and show the character and results of the work performed in this department:

From June 21, to 1881, to March 30, 1882, there were collected 30, 320 barrels. The weight of this

garbage was 3,032 tons

The cost of its collection and removal was \$9,191, or at a cost of 30 33-100 cents per barrel (the barrel filled weighs 200 pounds.) In the 235 working days included in this period, the

board has paid for 1,516 days' work for teams, which would make an average of about six teams per day employed to collect the garbage of the

city.

This statement shows the exact cost of the work and the satisfactory character of the system adopted. It should also serve as a correct guide to the board of common council in making estimates for the garbage collection for the coming

Pure milk, pure water, pure ice, and pure air, are among things requisite to perfect health. Ignorance of unsanitary conditions about the household, such as defective plumbing, broken and leaky gas mains, the bad location of cold air boxes supplying furnaces, and many other other things kindred to these, produce disease and death. A noted physician in a lecture recently delivered by him in New York, speaking of Sanitary, Science and the Public, Health made use of the following words:

"None but physicians are alive to the fact that $_{
m in}$

and expensive houses in this city are like the innabitants who dwell at the base of Mount Vesuvius, whose surroundings mask and hide the danger and desolation of the lava and ashes.'

Special reference was also made by another medical gentleman to an institution in which fifty cases of typhoid fever occurred, and by means of the chloride of lithium test it was found that the water used from an old well, although 500 feet away from the hospital, could be poisoned, and without doubt was the source of the contamination which caused the outbreak, for from it the water drank by the inmates of the institution was taken.

Many other similar cases might be cited did time permit, but I will close this branch of my message by adding: Let us do everything possible to preserve the public health.

POLICE.

Peace and good order and the prevention of crime add much to the reputation and prosperity of a city. During the past year the discipline of the force has been maintained, and, with but few exceptions, its members have been vigilant and faithful.

THE CONSTRUCTION OF ELEVATED TRACKS has been fairly commenced, and the entire work will doubtless be completed within the time specified. The dangerous crossings of some forty streets and alleys will be rendered perfectly safe by this improvement. had hoped that a solution of the difficulty would be found by extending the freight tracks around the city and thereby dispensing as well with the noise, dust and smoke, attendant upon running the locomotives through the heart of the town. But as this is not to be the case, we may be willing to "put up" with the latter inconvenience and possibly extract some comfort from the following article on

LOCOMOTIVES AND THEIR INFLUENCE ON MALARIA.

The editor of the Medical Record, a weekly Journal of medicine and surgery says:

Dr. William S. King, surgeon United States army, has written us a letter in which he claims that the arrival and departure of locomotives, with their attendant trains, in the vicinity of our towns and cities, may account for the non-occurrence of malarial effects in localities where all the necessary conditions for their development seem to be furnished. While selecting a place of residence for his family, his attention was called to West Philadelpnia, that portion of it adjacent to the Schuylkill river. On inquiry he ascertained that notwithstanding the nearness of the low lands, the residents enjoyed immunity from malarial affections. The theory he advances in support of the fact is as follows: the heated locomotives, by continually passing through the infected districts, rarefy the air, and create a constant atmospheric disturbance by inducing warm upward currents, such currents acting with the pure air which rushes in from all directions, as agents in the dispersion or annihilation of the miasmatic influence. As this is the first allusion made to the effect of such agencies on malaria, it is one which justly claims attention, in order that the theory given above may be verified or disproved according as the testimony of those who are favorably situated, proves to be in favor of or adverse to it.

Gentlemen—I return to you without approval, a resolution adopted at a meeting of your honorable body held on the evening of March 30th, and which reads as follows:

These latter form part of the amount embraced in the resolution to which I object.

On the Stn day of July, 1862, a further issue of bonds, to the amount of \$25,000, was also authorized, fifteen thousand of which was appropriated for the construction of a bridge over the Genesee river at Clarisa street, and the balance (\$10,000) was to be used for "the purpose of widening the bridge over the Genesee river at Clarisa street, and the balance (\$10,000) was to be used for "the purpose of widening the bridge over the Genesee river at Main street in said city of Rochester on the south side of said bridge, and of constructing the piers, abutments and appurtenances necessary to such addition." It was resolved that these bonds should bear date July ist. 1862, and be made payable twenty years from that time: and, they also form part of the amount embraced in the resolution to which I object. At a meeting of the Common Council held August 5th of that year a re-olution was adopted directing another issue of city bonds to the amount of fifteen thousand dollars, they to be devoted to the same purpose as that last mentioned, viz., "the widening of the bridge over the river at Mzinstreet." This makes a total of twenty five thousand dollars for an improvement which our generation is called upon to pay instead of being assessed at the time on a locality directly benefited, which, in my opinion, should have been the case, as in the widening or improvement of the city. Twenty years carries us back to a time "that tried men's souls." The civil war was upon us and republican institutions were threatened with destruction. Under these circumstances we should berhaps make no particular criticism on the policy then actuating these who controlled the affairs of this municipality. That they were governed by a desire that year we read "that bonds of the city of Rochester to the amount of \$12,930 shall be issued for the purpose of purchasing, or raising funds to purchase, two additional seam fir

other manner have been provided for than by the issue of bonds. I am fully aware of the fact that we shall be called upon to raise more money this year than ever before. A variety of circumstances exist to make this necessary, and with these circumstances I assume all are familiar. The policy pursued during the past six years in paying all bonds as they have matured is not without its good effects. We should continue to pay as we

go; rerbaps in some matters we should not go so fast, but these things you are to determine. In city affairs we should pursue the same course that should govern us in private matters.

One feature, however, in connection with the payment of our obligations this year is the fact that the times are somewhat prosperous, mcrchants and manufacturers are doing a large and profitable business, and mechanics and laborers are receiving good wages. Let us resolve that the credit and reputation of our city as a good paymaster shall be continued, to do this any require an unusual effort now, but we and those who are o come after us will sooner or later reap the benefit of our so doing. These are my reasons for disagreeing with the action taken by the Board at the meeting to which I have aluded; but before closing I desire to say that some of the extraordinary expenses which we are called upon to meet this viar will not soon, if ever, occur again. This is c-trainly true as regards the settlement of the Lord claim, amounting to over \$50,000. The debt contracted by the School Board and which has been accumulating will, I assume, be paid off, and there are other obligations to be discharged which when out of the way will cause no embarrassment hereafter. These facts should stimulate us to do out duty now.

It was important that the work of laying water pipe under the second contract should precede the work of

improvement progressing under the first to avoid the necessity for tearing up a newly made improvement. This work was authorized and duceted by your honorable body March 2d, 1881. As soon thereafter as was practicable a contract for the pipe was made with Drullard & Hayes of Buffalo. In consequence of the great demand made for water and gas pipe throughout the country considerable delay was experienced in procuring delivery of the pipe for this work.

In consequence work upon the improvement was brought to a stand, and in the meantime wages of men and teams advanced, and this claim is based upon the fact that had there been no delay to the improvement a large portion of the work would have been completed before such advance occurred, hence Messrs. Whitmore & Co. ack that they be reimbursed in the amount represented by such advance in wages. The opinion of the City Attorney in the premises is bereto attached.

While this Board does lot pretend to pass upon the legal aspect of the claim, it does not see its way clear (conceding the claim to be just and equitable) for its payment out of any fund in the control of this Board, and as it appears from the communication of the Attorney that some dout exists we respectfully refet the matter to your Honorable Body for adjustment.

Gentlement in repy to your laquity as to the city's liability to the contractors, Mess.rs. Whitmore. Rauber & Vicinus, for the loss and damage they allege to have sustained by reason of a delay at your request, in executing their contract for North Goodman street improvement, in order that a further contract might be let for laying water pipes in said street, before the completion of said improvement, the cost of labor became largely increased, in consequence of which the contractors were obliged to pay \$831.25 more than if they had not acceded to the request, as I understand this state of facts is conceded or substantialy so. It also seems that the contract for laying the water pipes, were let to the same contractors for the sum of about \$17.00 in excess of other bids for same work. The foregoing facts present a question not wholly free from doubt as to the city's liability for the alleged damages or loss, and therefore if the Board is satisfied of the loss to the contractors, and in view of the chances of success or defeat in an action therefor, and if the same be settled at the difference between the amount of loss claimed \$81.25 and the excess of the five Valer Works contract over that of other bids therefor, I would advise the payment thereof, as being for the set of the city.

§5 Said company shall put, keep, and maintain the surface of the streets inside the rails of its tracks and for one foot ourside of the rails thereof in good and thorough repair, under the direction of the Common Council or the Executive Board, and said tracks shall be laid in the center of the streets and avenues named, and shall consist of a single track, unless the Common Council or the face of the streets and avenues named, and shall consist of a single track, unless the Common Council shall otherwise direct; and whenever any of the streets or avenues in said city in which said company's tracks are laid shall be permanently im proved, repaired or repaved, by ordinance of the Common Council of said city, said company shall, whenever such improvement, repair or repavement is made, make or cause to made a similar improvement, repair or repavement between the rails of its tracks, turnouts, turntables, or switches, and for one foot outside of the rails of said tracks, turnouts, turntables, or switches, and the same shall be done under the direction of the Common Council or Executive Board, or the successors of either of them; and in case said company shall fall, neglect or refuse to make such improvement, repair or repavement to be made; and upon the refusal of said company to pay the costs and expenses thereof, an action may be brough! for the recovery of the costs and expenses thereof, in the name of the city; and wherever or whenever said company's tracks are laid outside of the curb of the roadways of any of the streets or avenues, it shall, upon a petition to the Common Council or to said railroad company of a majority of the residents of such streets or avenues, it shall, upon a petition to the ecompany refuse or neglect the same for a period of fifteen cays thereafter, the sa ntreen days thereaster, the same may be done and the costs and expenses thereof collected in the same manner as herein provided in relation to collecting the sost and expenses of improving, repairing or repavement; and the Common Council of said city is hereby authorized to fix a license fee of not less than five dollars per annum, to be paid into the city treasury for each and every parsenger car used or run upon the tracks of any street railroad company within the lim ts of said city.

§ 2. Section six of said chapter thirty-four is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 6. This act shall not be construed as in any way impairing the force or effect of the resolution or ordinance of the Common Council of the city of Rochester, entitled "An ordinance in relation to street railroads," passed and adopted November thirty, eighteen hundred and eighty, and the amendments thereto, except as herein specially provided.

§ 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

All licenses to milk dealers shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of the City Charter and for the term of one year, and shall expire on the 30th day or May in the year next succeeding their issuance, and shall contain the names and number of the dealer, and said dealers shall use in the sale and delivery of milk covered wagons or carriages, which wagons or carriages shall have in plain view, in figures and letters, the name of the dealer and number; and any person or corporation falling to comply with any of the provisions of this section shall be liable to a penalty of ten dollars for each offense.

§ 3. No person shall sell or deliver within the city of Rochester impure, adulterated or watered milk under a penalty of Ten Dollars for each offense, and any person or corporation falling to comply with any of the provisions of this section shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars for each offense, and any person or persons duly authorized by the Common Countil of said city to inspect or test the same and all milk in his possession, and for a refusal to permit sain inspection or test thereof, said dealer shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars for each offense. **GENTLEMEN: Wishing to communicate briefly with your reform in carrying on the milk business in our city, now well advanced, I take this method of doing so, instead of tresspassing upon your time separately.

I have been long aware that we were far behind most other cities, in regulating the sale of milk, so important in its purity to the health of both old and young. Fortunately the matter was presented directly to my notice by several leading milkmen, who were represented by one of their number well known to many as an honorable dealer for more than twentry years. This occurred in August last. He said the milk business was one of considerable magnitude and importance, and it was felt that the Common Council, as in other cities, might adopt some measure to relieve honest milkmen from the unfair competion to which they were subjected, and also to protect our citizens from the imposition practiced by many in the sale of diluted and adulterated milk. He said the regular milkmen numbered a little more than 200, and were about equally divided into wo classes. The customers of one class were chiefly among the wealthy part of the community, and generally served with new and nurse milk. That I saw only one way to secure the much needed reform. and that was for the milk men to consent to bear a share of the expense. If they would be willing to pay a license fee of say \$5 a year and use covered wagons as in other cities, I thought the object sought might be attained, although it might take six months to bring it about. The proposition was duit considered and generally approved. Under these citumstances I consented to undertake, and. If possible, to see this much needed reform effected, and it has, one way and sonder, taken most of my time for more than six months.

GENTLEMEN—Having been requested to make an examination of the Treasurer's report and books in his office, for the fis all year included in his report (viz.: from March 21st, 1881. to March 4th, 182) would herein resp-ctfully report the results of such investigation.

The cash receipts of the office from all sources, were carefully examined and added up in detail, and were found to be properly credited to the different funds. The amounts received from the annual tax levy for 1890, together with the land purchased by the City at the tax sale, were found to equal the amount of the tax levy for that year. Statements of payments made the Treasurer were cheerfully furnished us, at our request, by the Police Clerk and the Clerk of the Municipal Court, and the amounts entered on the Treasurer's books, as receipts from those sources, also the receipts given the Executive Board by the Treasurer on account of the water works were compared and found to agree with the amounts credited by the Treasurer in that acc unt.

The amounts unpaid upon all the assessment rolls in the office were carefully added up, and the total amount was found to be sufficient to cover the amount called for in the Treasurer's report in the account designated as "Assessments on Ordicances."

Vouchers were produced for all payments, and all the coupons in the office were counted and found to be correct. All sums charged as remitted the Union Trust Company, to pay interest on bonds, and notes of the city coming due, were found to have been duly acknowledged by them.

The following statement shows all the cash receipts and expenditures of the office from March 21st, 18st, to March 4th, 18s2, inclusive, and at the latter date there was a balance of cash in the office and on deposit of \$44,311.9t.

The undersigned to whom were referred certain communications from the Milk Dealers' Association and its counsel, with reference to the Penal Ordinance adopted by your honorable body. relating to the sale and delivery of milk, respectfully report:

We have heard the allegations and arguments of the committee appointed by said Association and its counsel, and carefully considered the same. It appears by the statements made by the representatives of said Association, that the milkmen as a class do not object to any portion of said ordinance, except the one providing for the use of covered wagons. The objections to this provision, briefly stated, are

1. The proper construction of a cevering in many cases would require the making of new wagon box by reason of the fact that many of the wagon boxes are not of sufficient strength and size to support atoo.

2. In this city milk is uniformly delivered by milk men ut the door of a residence, the can being taken from the wagon for that purpose. A top or a covering in order to be of any benefit must be enclosed on each side of the wagon, and much time would be lost in taking the cans from the rear instead of from the side of the wagon.

3. The only object of requiring covered wagons is to

taking the cans from the rear instead of from the side of the wagon.

3. The only object of requiring covered wagons is to keep the milk cans from the rays of the sun. This purpose can be much better accomplished by requiring simply the covering of the cans by canvas, or some other suitable nonconflucting material.

4. An unnecessary burden both of labor and expense

is imposed by the ordinance in this respect, with no corresponding benefit to the consumer.

We are of the opinion that there is much force in some of the arguments used, and, so far as this provision is concerned, we would recommend that section two of said ordinance be amended in accordance with the resolution herewith submittee.

It was also suggested on the hearing before us, that the resolution adopted by your honorable body fixing the license fee under said ordinance and exempting from the payment of the fee certain residents of this city was in one respect unjust. That is the provision as follows:

"And that any person living in the city and owning not more than two cows, be permitted to sell their milk without paying a license fee."

The milk men, by their counsel, claim that under this resolution any person therein specified may purchase milk of outside parties, and vend the same without any liability for license. We think it would be well to so amend the resolution, upon a reconsideration, as to exempt a resident from the payment of a license fee on account of the sale of milk from not more than two cows owned by such resident. We are of the opinion, also, that the purpose designed by the resolution would be gained without giving any just cause of offense to any person or class, by inserting insuch resolution the phrase "one cow" in place of the phrase "two cows."

Gentlemen: The Executive Board is in receipt of numerous complaints from owners and occupants of pronty which is drained into the Fourth, Seventh and Twelfth ward outlet sewer, and especially into Mount Hope and South arenue sewers. For the reason that the water backs into their cellurs, doing damage and creating a nuisance. The city Survey or, at the suggestion of the Executive Board, made an examination of ascertain the cause of 'he trouble, and he reports that the size of the outlet sewer is 3 by 4 feet, but because of the debris which has accumulated in the sewer and the back water, its actual drainage capacity is not more than six inches. The back water comes from the Genesee river at its present hight and does not vary a great deal at any time. The sewer is also surcharged sever al times during the day by taking the waste water from the weigh lock. One remedy is to cut out the rock in the channel between the end of the sewer and the river and along the river bed to a point near Court street bridge, and by constructing a wall outside thereof to keep the water from overflowing during a freshet. A better remedy, however, would be to construct a new outlet sewer in the bottom of the Krie Canai, extending from Dive culvert to a point near the acqueduct and thence to the Genesee river. This would on away with the Dive culvert which is more or less filled up, and affor an outlet for the purposes mentioned and answer the demands of the people of the locality named.

Your Committee gave a hearing to the licensed pawmbrokers of this city, and has a refully considered the merits of the proposed an endment, and has reached the conclusion that a license fee of fifty dollars is no mere than it should be. The other changes suggested, your committee is of the opinion, should not be made. The limitation of the rate of interest to be charged to 25 per cent. per annum, in view of the risks run by the pawmbroker, the smallness of the average loan and the nature of the business, is unfair. The only effect would be to drive out of the business the respectable men, and the business of loaning money on pawn would fall into the hands of men without responsibility who would take no license, but who would charge higher rates than are now paid, without any protection against loss being afforded to the borrower. The rate of interest should be left, in this business at least, to be regulated by competition between rival pawmbrokers and by the character of the security offered.

The retenuon of the property pawned, six months before being sold, does not seem to your committee as necessary or advisable. In many cases the value of the property may be largely depricated before the expiration of the time named.

Section 1. The Mayor may license so many persons as he may deem proper to exercise the vocation of pawnbroker, upon the payment into the city treasury of the sum of fitty dollars by each and every person asking license for that purpose, and the exercise to a pond with one or more sureries, to be sprouded of the faithful performance of the duties of a pawnbroker, as prescribed by statute, and the payment of all damages to which he shall become liable to any person as such pawnbroker.

Section 2 of an ordinance relating to pawnbrokers is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 2. Every heense granted in put shance of this ordinance shall designate the building in which the person thus licensed shall thereby be authorized to act as a pawnbroker: and the license year shall begin on the 1st day of July and terminate on the 30th day of the succeeding Jane, on which latter date such license shall expire, unless sooner revoked by the mayor. The shops or places of business of pawnbrokers shall not be opened earlier than 8 o'clock in the morning, and they shall be closed at or prior to 8 o'clock in the evening of each business day.

Your Charter amendment Committee, to which was referred the proposed amendment to section one of an ordinance relating to nulsances, does hereby report: The amendment as drafted, if adopted and enforced, would prevent the playing of any band in or upon any of the streets, public squares, etc., of the city, except while such band is on foot. It would also impose a penalty upon any person who should let a carriage or wagon to be used for such purpose, and it would also prevent the playing of a steam caliope or steam plano on the streets.

Your Committee is of the opinion that the adoption of such an ordinance is inadvisable. The only theory upon which such legislation as this can be justified is that it is necessary for the protection and safety of people passing along or being in the streets. While horses have been frightened by the playing of bands and accidents have resulted, the danger from this source is not so great as to call for this measure.

Your Committee, therefore, recommend that action upon the proposed amendment be indefinitely postponed.

GENTLEMEN: The experience of the past few weeks tends to confirm the conclusions at which we arrived and expressed in our report to your honorable body May 2d, 1882, in regard to the manner of running the wires of the Ecletric Light Companies. That there is danger to property to be apprenended from insufficient care being taken where the wires are attached to, or pass over buildings, has been fully demonstrated in at least two instances, where fires have originated from contact between the electric light wires and some portion of the building to which they were attached. An instance of the danger to which our Fire Alarm Telegraph system is a xposed at every point where it is possible for the wires of the two systems to come in contact, has lately been brought to our notice, in the destruction of a telegraph instrument. Should a similar accident occur to our system it would be almost certain to destroy more or less of the expensive apparatus located in the central office and upon which the whole system depends. We would therefore respectfully recommend that the several Electric Light Companies doing business in this city be prohibited from running their wires over or attaching them to any building within the city limits, except so far as may be necessary for the introduction of said system of lighting into business or other places, and also nast said companies be required to comply with such directions in regard to placing poles and running wires as the Superintendent of the Fire Alarm Telegraph shall give. Your Building Committee having completed their labors with reference to the erection of the building to be occupied by the Protectives, does hereby render a statement in detail of the matters condected there-

On April 20th, 1881, the Legislature of this State passed an act authorizing the Common Council to purchase of the Protectives Number One a lot on North Fitzhugh street and to erect thereon as speedily as might be a building, provided the purchase price of the lot and the cost of erecting the building should not exceed \$20,000, and the Common Council was thereby authorized and empowered to raise by tax to be included in the annual levy for the year 1881, such sum as in its judgment might be necessary for the purpose aforesaid, not exceeding \$20,000.

In pursuance of the power thus granted, the then Common Council appropriated \$13,000 for the purchase of the lot and the erection of said building, and that sum was placed in the general tax tevy of the year 1881. The Protectives, some time prior to the passage of the act aforesaid, had purchased said lot, paying therefor \$11,000 or thereabouts, and said property was encumbered by a mortgage some what in excess of \$3,000. Such arrangements were made by the thin Common Council and the Protectives that the city paid \$3,000 of said mortgage, the Protectives the ballance, and the latter conveyed to the city the said lot, in fee, for the nominal consideration of one dollar. The balance of the appropriation of \$13,000 it was thought would cover the expense of erecting the building in accordance with the plans and specifications then made.

Your building committee thereupon advertized for proposals f rerecting said building but the lowest of the proposals received exceeded \$12,000. The plans and specifications were then modified with the view of reducing the expense of construction, and again your comm ttee advertized-for proposals. The lowest biid-der was George W. Aldridge, but his bid was in excess of \$10,000. It was proposed, however, on the part of said Aldridge to take the contract for \$10,000 if the Proticitives would pay \$500, in addition. This the Protectives agreed to do and the contract was let to Mr. Aldridge at the sum named. The contract, which was entered i

The Legislature by an act passed May 2, 1882, and which took effect immediately, enacted "Section 83, an addition to other taxes directed by law to be assessed upon the property of the city, the Common Council shall, in the month of June in each year, as sess for the benefit of the Water Works fund, three cents on each lineal foot front of each eity lot located on any street in which the city water mains are laid and in use, in all cases in which no water rents have accrued or been paid to the city of Rochester, during the calendar year preceding the date of the assessment. As a basis for such assessment, the Executive Board or its successor in charge of the kochester Water Works, shall, on or before the first day of May in each year make and furnish to the City Assessors a complete statement" of such lots and frontage, &c. "The Common Council shall, during the month of June in each year, assess the city taxes, including those required to be assessed by the foregoing provisions of this section."

In as much as the act was not passed till May second, and it specifies that, as a basis of such assessment the Executive Board "shall on or before the first day of May in each year make and furnish to the City Assessors a statement," it is urged that as the time specified for the making of that statement had elapsed in the current year, before the law was passed, the act is not applieable to the current year.

Brown has recovered a judgment against the city, granting a permanent injunction to take effect in one year; and "Whereas, Said injunction produlets the city from discharging its sewage through Court and William street sewer and upon plaintiff's land; therefore, "Resolved, That the subject matter be and the same is hereby referred to the Law Committee and Executive Board, to report to this body with all convenient speed."

Your joint Committee would respectfully report that examination of the premises referred to has been made and a conference held with representatives of the plaintiff in the action referred to, with a view to procuring right of way across the lands in question and a settlement of the damages claimed to have accrued since the commencement of the action in which judement has been rendered. The accompanying communication from Mr. Oliver, plaintiff's attorney, is submitted to your honorable body as Mrs. Brown's proposition for the adjustment of her claim for damages since March, 1879; also for an easement over her premises for the discharge of the sewage from said sewer for a period of ten years Your committee, after due and careful consideration, doe- not see its way clear to recommend a settlement of the claim upon the basis contained in the proposition, and would respectfully represent that the only adequate and practical relief for this and numerous other cases of a like character is the construction of an intercepting sewer, which should be commenced at once, as it will require some three or four years for its construction.

This, however, is upon the conditions that the city enlarge the culvert of the outlet at Goodman st. and clean out and deepen the said outlet so as to carry off the contents of the sewer, and keep it open, and that the city pay the amount of the judgment heretofore recovered by Mrs. Brown against it, and that a stipulation be made that this agreement shall not prejudice her right to the injunction, but that the same shall be deferred only by the performance by the city of this agreement during the said time.

Since March, 1879, the overflow of the sewer has destroyed the crops on at least 15 acres of this farm yearly, and has now made the land sodden and almost worthless. The sewer running through the farm in the way that it does renders the operation of the farm in its neighborhood, uncertain and more laborious and expensive than ever before, owing to its overflow.

The annoyance and discomfort from the smell arising from the sewer in warm weather is very great. The sewer has become a nuisance. Although it may be cleaned out and deepened, its offensive character can never be entirely obviated.

Its very existence in its best form, with the right in the city to continue it will be a detriment to the land in several aspects: As a farm,—as a residence,—and as city property capable of development and sale for residences, and very detrimental as to the inter-

ests of Mrs. Brown. It will be likely to prevent the sale of any of the land during the existence of the

easement.
In view of all these things, the price demanded is

In view of all these things, the price demanded is believed to be reasonable.

Will you give the matter attention?
The agreement shall provide that the city shall indemnify Mrs. Brown against damages by reason of claims of others arising from overflow of lands of others; and this agreement shall not excuse the city from the overflow on Mrs. Brown's land hereafter. July 22, 1882.

Your special committee appointed to examine and report on the petition of the Rochester and Ontario Belt Railway Co. for permission to cross certain streets and avenues named therein and the resolution relating to the same now before the Common Council, respectfully report:

We have made personal inspection of the streets and avenues named in the petition at the points of the proposed crossings, and of the territory contiguous thereto and which will be in any way affected thereby, and also or that part of the city's north line adjacent to the proposed route of said railroad, and have heard the objections to the proposed crossing and the arguments favoring the same.

The principal grounds of objections are: 1st. That the Belt Road if permitted to construct its road to North St. Paul street at grade will probably afterwards cross that street at grade and possibly extend its road up the east bank of the river. 2nd. That a depot located temporararily or permanently on North St. Paul street will be an objectionable feature in a locality that is now the centre of many elegant private residences with extensive grounds, and now aquiet rural neighborhood.

The objectors frankly say they distrust the sincerity of the professions of the Directors, that they intend to cross the Genesee river and extend this road on the line as now located.

line as now located.

The remonstrants and those favoring the petition are prominent business men and large property own ers in both wards through which the route of this road runs, and interested in the growth and prosperity of this city.

For the intormation of the Council we submit the following facts:

For the information of the Council we submit the following facts:

The streets and avenues proposed to be crossed are now unimproved, and the portions of the two wards through which the line of the Belt road runs are sparsely populated are remote from he business centre of the city and now without railroad facilities. The railroad is graded to the city line and the company has commenced to lay iron at its intersection with the Rome. Watertown and Ogdensburg railroad, on the lake shore.

The belt road is of standard guaze; the rolling stock for passenger and freight traffic is to be uniform in capacity and style with that of first class standard gauge roads, and it forms a direct connection with the Rome. Watertown and Ogdensburg railroad, and when completed is to connect at grade with all the roads in the south and western part of this city.

Having carefully considered the foregoing facts and the arguments for and against the petition of the railway company we have reached the following conclusive.

sion:
The adoption by the company of the standard gauge with 56 pound rails and suitable rolling stock, seems to us to be a sufficient refutation of the idea that this road is not to be extended further than St. Paul st., is to be a mere picnic route.
For excursion or pleasure trains or traffic, a narrow gauge road with light rolling stock could be constructed and equipped at one-haff the expense of the

present road answer those purposes far better. It would seem to be folly and a useless expenditure of money for the company to adopt any other than a narrow guage and light equippments, if this road was

not to connect with other railroads and do a regular

freight and passenger business.

A railroad depot on North St. Paul street may be ob-As almost depot on North St. Paul street may be ob-dectionable personally to certain persons now residing in that vicinity, but in this as in every other railroad in which the residents of the whole city are interested the wishes of the few should be subservient to the in-terests, convenience and facilities for business of the many.

The policy of this city, which was adopted none too early, is to extend to railroads all reasonable and proper facilities for the economical, speedy and convenient transaction of business, and yet protecting private rights, and the mercanthe, mannfacturing, and shipping interests of our city demand that no unnecessary obstacles shall be put in the way of the construction of what promises to be important railroad projects, giving to our citizens additional railroad facilities.

The Belt Railroad makes a direct communication with the Rome, Waterrown & Ogdensburg Railroad, thus opening to the business and traveling public a direct connection with the counties bordering on Lake Onlario, to the northeastern and northwestern parts of our State and to the provinces of Ontario and Que-

bec.
Faculities for reaching those points from Rochester are now unsatisfactory and insufficient.
The completion of this road to Summerville will furnish another and much needed route to places of pleasant and healthful resort on Lake Ontario.

As to crossing North St. Paul street at grade the Directors assert they have no such intentions and as grade crossing on North St. Paul st. will necessitate a grade crossing on Lake avenue, we believe the Common Corneil can be safely trusted never to consent to either. GENTLEMEN: A communication from the Frecutive Board, together with a report thereto from the City Surveyor, relating to renumbering the various buildings in the city, having been referred to this committee at a meeting of the Common Council heid August 22d, 1882, the following report is respectfully submitted: mitted:

Mitted:
At a meeting of the Map and Survey Committee held. At a meeting of the Map and Survey Committee held. September 12th, 1882, the City Surveyor gave an outline of the work to be done, the necessity of doing it accurately, and the value of the records relating to such work, to the Surveyor's and Assessors' departments. The plan submitted to the committee for prosecuting the work rapidly, yet ensuring accuracy and economy, is briefly described as follows, viz: Divide the city into four sections, making the Gensee River the dividing line from north to south, and Main street and West avenue from east to west. One party of men is needed for each syation, and each party should be composed of three men. Two men should make all of the measurements, the statistics being kept by the third man, and under whose charge the party should be while in the field, and all of the parties to be directed and controlled by the City Surveyor. As many thousand frontages will have to be measured, the records relating to them

will be voluminous, and should be kept in books specially prepared for that purpose.

Each page therein should re a title giving the name of the street measured, and the place of beginning and the place of beginning and the place of beginning the street measured.

name of the street measured, and the place of begin-ning and ending.

Twelve columns should be ruled on each page, to be filled out by the surveying party, as follows: 1st column, with the name of the owner of the

2nd column, with the name of the occupant of the

2nd column, with the name of the occupant of the property.

3rd column, with number of feet frontage.

4th, 5th, 6th and 7th columns, with the present rumber of the buildings.

8th, 9th, 10th and 11th columns, to be hereinafter filled with the new numbers.

12th column to be used for remarks relating to the

A sample page of the proposed books is attached to this report.
It is absolutely necessary that the proposed work be

this report.

It is absolutely necessary that the proposed work be performed accurately in order to insure any benefits therefrom; and the chief of each party especially, should be a man of good judgment in relation to determining property lines, and be thoroughly acquainted with the various subdivisions of property in the section under his charge.

After the lengths of each individual frontage has been accurately ascertained, and the list, 2d, 3d, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th and 12th columns of the book of records have been filled out by the various surveying parties, it will then be necessary for some other authorities to adjust the proper numbers to the various lots of lands and buildings, and represent such numbers in columns 8, 9, 10 and 11 of the records. It will be seen that what appears at first sight to be of little labor to perform, really is of considerable magnitude, and will require no little care and good judgment to do the work accurately. As one of the benefits to be derived from these records, aside from their value in numbering buildings, may be mentioned their use to the assessors.

numbering buildings, may be mentioned their use to the assessors.

Column No. 3 will give the number of feet front owned or occupied by any individual, and as local assessments are mostly based on the frontage of a property, the assessors have only to examine that column to determine the accuracy of their Assessment Rolls. As no city map is in existence that gives the frontage of the various lots and parcels of land in the city, this reference will be of much value to them in preparing and adjusting various assessments.

The above estimate will probably be increased to \$5,000 by the time the field records are copied and the new numbers adjusted. A question having been raised as to the legality of performing the proposed work, the City Attorney being present, gave as his opinion that the late charter amendments relate merely to adjusting numbers to buildings at the expense of the individual owner, rather than to incur any expense of surveys, &c.

All of the redemption notices upon the tax of 1879 have now been served and the certificates provided for by the charter have been made to take no action as yet, however, towards the collection of any tax accruing suosequent to 1871. I have always given parties who have called in pursuance of the notice, such further time as they asked for, and in no case has a foreclosure been commenced except where I learned nothing, either from the party or by the return of the envelope, for more that twenty days from the time of mailing the notice. Me such cases foreclosures may be begun without notice, but the want of notice is not the fault of the City Attorney.

This work is, at the best, for the reasons above given, a disagreeable task, and in view of the fact that the language of the charter with reference to foreclosures is permissive, merely, and not mandatory, I shall not regard it as my duty hereafter to institute proceedings for the collection of past due taxes by action unless your honorable body shall by resolution instruct me so to do. In the event of such a resolution being adopted I would suggest, in order that no doubt may reasonably exist as to the title acquired by foreclosure, that you instruct me to bring all actions in the Supreme Court, but that the costs charged and collected in all cases where the taxes shall be paid before sale, shall not be in excess of the amount which is chargeable on foreclosur. GENTLEMEN—At the beginning of the fiscal year the Executive Board made as careful an estimate or the probable amount of funds required for the several departments under its charge, for the current year, at the nature of the case would admit. The increase in the number of miles or temproved streets, and particularly those streets built of inferior materials of ideadam and gravel, necessitates an increasing yearly expenditure for cleaning and repairs. The old Macadam and gravel improved streets from rapid disintegration of the surface by the joint action of fiost, water and heavy traffic (as in the case of Lake avenue), notwithstanding the large yearly increase of expenditure for repairs, have steadyly deteriorated until radical and extensive repairs were required. And this Board believing that true economy would best be subserved by making such revairs in the most tholough manner, and then by judicious care maintain them so, has been compelled to expend large amounts for material and labor to effect this object, It is also a notable fact that as streets have been improved tree cost of scraping, cleaning and removal of rubbish has also largely increased.

On unimproved streets accumulations of ashes are thrown upon and improve the roadway, while on improve streets these accumulations of sakes are thrown upon and improve the roadway, while on improved streets accumulations fogether with the scrapings and removal of dirt so scraped up, three or four times a year must be removed and conveyed long distances to find dumping ground therefor at great expense for teaming and labor.

The cost of this work fibus far the current year has amounted to upwards of \$25,000, varying from \$40,130 to \$164.15 per week, or an average of over \$500 per week. The estimate for the work for the entire year was \$25,000, and it is believed the full amount will be required, especially should there be much snow and ice to contend with the coming winte

GENTLEMEN ; GENTLEMEN:
Your lamp committee having devoted considerable time for the past mouth looking into the workings of the different electric light companies, for the purpose of devising some way of lighting some of our principal streets. We have met several times with representatives of the Rochester Electric company and the Brush Electric Light contric company and the Brush Electric Light company, and have received proposals from each company, the Brush Electric Light company becompany, the Brush Electric Light company being the lowest bidders. We also find upon inquiring that of the many cities now lighted with the
electric light none are being lighted as cheaply as
our city has been offered. This is owing to the
company getting such good water power here. Your committee have been over the following territory and counted the gas counted lowing territory and counted the gas samps which would be displaced if lighted by the electric light; Exchange street, from Erie depot to Main street; State street to Lyell ave.; Vincent place, from State st. to North St. Paul st.; North St. Paul st. from Vincent place to Court street; Court st from St. Paul street to Exchange street; Main street, from Genesee Valley canal to the liberty pole. We find at least 325 gas almps, as described, in this territory would be displaced if lighted by the electric light. The cost of territory

19
lighting these 325 gas lamps is \$6,500, and we figure that it takes at least \$500 per year to keep the 325 gas lamps in repair, such as new lamps, globes, burners, etc., making \$7,000 for lighting the said 325 gas lamps. We are informed, and believe it to be true, that the said territory can be lighted by the electric light with forty-eight lamps at forty-five cents per night, which would amount to \$7.884, and we would receive at least thirty per cent. better light. We have taken great deal of pains in ascertaining the opinion of tax-payers and business men, and they all unite with your committee in saying, as our city is growing very rapidly and the electric light has proved such a success in other cities, they hoped the Common-council would adopt it in our city, especially as the increase is so small, and the percentage of light so much greater. In conclusion, your committee would say forty-six lamps may be sufficient to light the territory named. If such is the case, the difference would be very small between electric light and gas light. Therefore your committee offer the following resolution: C. A. JEFFORDS, J. MILLEE KELLY, Lamp Committee.

party or corporation operating or controlling any rail road in the city of Rochester, upon which cars are drawn by iocononive engines, to erect and maintain suitable and substantial bars, doors or gates on each and either side of said railroad at every point in said city at which its main road or tracks cross any public road, street or avenue at the grade ther of. Such bars, doors or cares shall be kept well painted and in good repair, and be attended at all times during the approach or passage of trains by sober, careful and experienced men, whose duty it shall be to keep the tracks clear of all horses, cattle and vehicles; to properly warn all persons against crossirs said tracks during the approach of any train, locomotive or car, and to close said bars, doors or gates at least one minute before the passage of any iccomotive, engine or car over said public highway, street or avenue.

§ 2. It shall not be lawful for any person, company or corporatio. Operating or controlling any rnilroad in the city of Rochester to run, or allow to be run, any train, car, locomotive, or locomotive and tender without cars, on or along its main road or tracks, or across any public street, road or avenue in said city unless the bars, gates or doors at such sucet crossing are closed or down, or to permit any locomotive, or steam engine, car, carriage, wagon or vehicle of any kind wnaiever, to stand for a longer time than two minutes on the intersection caused by the crossing of the man line of any such railroad and any public street, road or avenue at the grade thereof.

§ 3. Every failure to comply with the provision of this ordinance on the part of the president, directors, superintendent or other officers or ary company or corporation, or on che part of the president, directors, superintendent or other officers or ary company or corporation, or on che part of any person or persons operating or controlling any such railroad, shall be declared a misdemeanor, and the person or persons superintendent or other officers or ary compa

The city has within the past three years made many and expensive local improvements and it is well known that where the number of allegators for or against local improvements would often fill the council chamber, ordinances are now passed for improvements of great expense without one single remonstrance. When the tax for the same comes to be collected there is not the same unanimity manifested in the payment. It is a fact that many taxpayers ask for improvements in front of many taxpayers ask for improvements in front of their propercy with the sole purpose that they may be better enabled to dispose of that property, and the city is obliged to wait until the transfer is made, when the tax is paid from the purchase money. The city undoubtedly gains largely in the increased value of such territory, but the treasurer submits that the city can reach a limit in its financial op-erations and should not go too extensively into the real estate business. real estate business.

There are at present 135 final ordinances passed for which no assessment rolls have been made out.

Perkins, Esq., as city Attorney. and the cause was afterwards tried and a judgment rendered for plaintiff in the sum of \$102.75 damages, besides costs, from which judgment the defeadant appealed to the Monroe County Court, where the case was again argued by Mr. Perkins and the judgment affirmed, and from the latter judgment defendant again appealed to the General Term of the Supreme Court, Sept. 15th, 1879, and the case upon the latter appeal was argued at Buffalo, N. Y., in June last by the judgment affirming said judgment was nauded down in October last, which opinion of said Supreme Court again affirming said judgment was nauded down in October last, which opinion I hereto annex as a part of this report.

V. 262) if the residence of the defendant, in the town of webster or in the city of Rochester, were doubtinl, a question of fact in respect thereto at the trial was properly passe I upon by the trial court, and we cannot disturb the finding then made unless we are prepared to say the result reached by the trial court, is against the weight of evidence.

Your committee is of the opinion that the removal of the said bridges on the streets between Plymouth avenue and Troup street and the crossing of five said railroad at the grade of said streets subject to the conditions above mentioned would be satisfying to the people of the city. Similar action has been taken as to Troup street and the first complaint in reference thereto has yet to be heard.

If there are any legal obstacles in the way of the suggested action being taker, the Legislature can and probably would grant the necessary relief at its coming session. Respectfully submitted,

SECTION 1 It shall be the duty of every person, company or corporation operating or controlling any railroad in the city of kochester, upon which cars are drawn by locomotive engines, to erect and maintain suitable and substantial bars, doors or gates on each and either side of said railroad at every point in said city at which its main road or tracks cross any public road, street or avenue at the grade thereof. Such bars, doors or gates shall be kept well painted and in good repair, and be attended at all times curing the approach and passage of trains by sober, careful and experienced men, whose duty it shall be to keep the tracks clear of all horses, cattle and vehicles; to properly warn all persons against crossing said tracks during the approach of any train, locomotive or car, and to close said bars, doors or gates at least one minute before the passage of any locomotive, engine or car over said public highway, street or avenue.

§2. It shall not be lawful for any person, company or corporation operating or controlling any railroad in the city of Rochester to run, or allow to be run, any train, car, locomotive, or locomotive and tender without cars, on or along its main road or tracks or across any public street, road or avenue as the atomic said city unless the bars, gates or doors at such street crossing are closed or lown, or to permit any locomotive, or steam engine, car, carriage, wagon, or vehicle of any kind whatever to stand for a longer time than two minutes on the intersection caused by the crossing of the main line of any such railroad and any public street, road or avenue at the grade thereof, § 3. Every failure to comply with the provision of this ordinance on the part of the president, directors, superintendent or other officers of any company or corporation, or on the part of the president, directors, superintendent or

Resolved, That the Genesee Valley Caual Railroad Company be permitted and they are hereby directed to remove the bridges across the abandoned Genessee Valley canal within the city of the State of the City of Plymouth avenue, upon said company and its lessee, the Buffalo. New York & Philadelphia Railway Company, entering into an agreement with the city of Rochester, to be approved by the City Attorney, which agreement shall provide that said companies shall, as conditions of this consent, remove the approaches to said bridges, grade and level the streets aforesaid be tween Troup street and Plymouth avenue, as far back as the approaches on either side of said canal now extend, gravet to the depth of six inches the space thus graded; construct plank walks at least five feet in width on eitner side of said streets thus graveled to the beginning of the approaches as they now are; fill up the bed of the said canal from Troup street to a point 400 feet south of Hunter street, so that the same shall be respectively at level with the streets between Troup street and Plymouth avenue, so that the same shall be respectively at level with the streets approaching said canal; and grave that sense to a depth of six inches, and forever maintain plank crossings in good and safe condition from the east and west lines of the Genese Valley Canal; and construct and forever maintain plank cross-walks on either side of all of said streets between the east and west lines of the Genese Valley Canal; and construct and forever maintain plate constituted for the tracks crossing said streets. t

On the 25th day of October last I objected to a similar resolution, basing my grounds of objection on its illegality and the omission of necessary conditions. Since that time there has been no change in the aspect of things. These are strong expressions and I am in duty bound to explain what I mean The resolution is dangerous because by them. it makes no provision for the retention of Plymouth avenue bridge, and I infer exacts no pledges that its removal will not hereafter be attempted or asked for, and no mention is made of the equally important question of crossing West avenue (a question we supposed was defi-nitely settled by the contract of August 22d, 1882, see page 140 C. C. proceedings), but a project which I am informed is again being agi-The resolution is ingenious in construction and dangerous, because of its failure to express in the fullest terms the uses to which the Genesee Valley Canal railroad company purpose putting the strip of land eighty-five (85) feet in width extending through the third and eighth wards, and especially that portion to be crossed by the streets at grade. Pre-sumably it is the intention of the company to cross the streets with not more than three tracks; and to construct no switch that will begin in or cross any of the streets mentioned; but our presumption is not sustained by the wording of the resolution. We are led to infer that the tracks of the said company are to that the tracks of the said company are to lead to the passenger and freight houses now custructed, or to be constructed on its lands adjoining West avenue and on the south side thereof; but we are also told that arrange-ments have been perfected, whereby its pas-senger trains are to run into the train-house of the New York Central and Hudson River railroad company. Should this prove to be the case, then, all the land north of "a point 400 feet south of Hunter street" will be devoted solely to freighting and storage purposes. this we should perhaps have no right to object, but it discloses the importance of regulating and specifying the number of tracks which should cross streets at grade, and particularly in view of the fact that the railroad company own land enough upon which to build and operate at least eight distinct and separate tracks. The resolution does not state how many tracks shall be permitted to be laid and nothing prevents the construction of the entire number above mentioned. I do not wish to be misunderstood in this matter, and shall continue te object to any resolution in which is manifested a failure to incorporate all essential features. A vote upon a measure of so much importance should not be pressed at the first meeting it is

offered. Opportunity should be given for amendment and discussion. In conclusion I desire to direct your attention to page thiriyeight of your proceedings, bearing date May 188., and on which page you well find the

Some years back I constructed a sewer along the north side of Mource street from Goedman to the sewer in front of Nichols park, under an ordinance of the Common Council at my own expense for the purpose of obviating this nulsance, and to release the ocpants of those lots from the danger of flooding their cellars and possible sickness. After the improvement of Monroe, Meigs and Rowley streets and the surface water from these streets turned into the sewer constructed by me at my cost, such sewer proved insufficient at times of heavy rain to carry all the water.

The Council or one of the Aldermen broke the sewer pipe which I had constructed under their permission and opened a ditch into my land, thus discharging all the filth of the sewer into and over my land, and into the cellar of my house on the premises, occasioning sickness of my tenants, and thus depriving me of the use of the house as well as preventing me from selling lots to others to build. Now, this state of things ought not to be continued another day. The health of our city is of the first importance, and my rights as a citizen ought not to be entirely overlooked.

I fully appreciate the difficulty you meet with in applying a remedy to abate this dangerous and disgraceful nuisance—I say disgraceful, because it is so to our esqueit city. But not intending any reproach or especial complaint against your honorabe board, I begt to suggest a plan which I think much better than he one you propose, which is this: Continue the stone sewer recently constructed by you along the north side of Monroe street east to the opening of the way and under their control forever, and could be more easily connected wi

Com. Cook, from the Fuel and Fire Fixture Committee, presented the following report: To the Board of Education:

Gentlemen—Your Committee on Fuel and Fire Fixtures, to whom was referred the communication from M. E. Wollf, agent of the Fidelity and Casualty Insurance Company, in reference to the insurance of steam heating boilers now in use in our public school buildings, would respectfully report that we carefully considered this matter in committee and came to the concusion that we should place all possible safeguards around our school buildings heated by steam, and that by the adoption of this measure a better feeling of security will be experienced by the numerous patrons whose children attend our public schools wherein these boilers are used.

This insurance company agrees to insure the ten beliers at present in use in our public schools and give them each four regular inspections as the Board of Education may desire, and to furnish a written report of each and every inspection for the sum of \$10 per year for each boiler.

The amount of insurance for each \$10 will be \$2.500, being \$1,000 upon the boiler and \$1,500 upon the building for loss from explosion, if any.

Your committee, in consideration of the above facts, respectfully offer the following:

Resolved That the steam boilers now in use in our public schools and free Academy be insured for one year in the Fidelity and Casualty Insurance Company at a premium of \$10 per year for each boiler.

A recent examination of the locality has developed serious obstacles detrimental to the construction of a bridge at that place, and they are herewith reported. The grade of the Eric tracks at that point is so low that they are frequently inundated to the depth of one foot or more during flood periods. For that reason no bridge should be constructed; the approach to which would be at the present grade of the railroad tracks. This necessitates the consurction of a bridge to span both river and railroad, and at such a height as will not interfere with the traffic of the road.

Mr. Chanute, the chief engineer, has informed me by letter, that the Company intend raising the grade of the tracks at that point two feet, and that they require 19 feet and 8 inches headway between the top of the iron rail, and the lowest portion of any bridge. This will necessitate for the approach to the bridge east of Exchange street, a grade of one foot rise in 7% feet, which is quite impracticable.

But there are other reasons why I should withhold my approval of said resolution. It is hardly necessary for me to enumerate the conditions of the act under which the Genesee Valley Canasi Railroad Company acquired the right to enter the city of Rochester, it sufflect for me to say, that the law was framed in the interest of the people of Hochester, and we have no right to permit its violation; and instead of destroying its effect we should lend ourselves to its enforcement. In my communication of two weeks ago I took occasion to say that I was aware of a strong sentiment prevailing in certain localities favorable to the removal of the bridges mentioned. I now be lieve that the citizens of Rochester, as a whole are aimost unanimously opposed to any such proposition, and in the particular locality to which I have reference, seven-tenths of the people. I likewise believe, are unaiterably opposed to the project. In my two previous communications renating to this subject, I made no allusion to the advisability of permitting any railroad company to hereafter cross any of our populous streets at grade. It matters not what our action may have been in the past, we should now be governed by a sense of duty and of right. I do not claim to possess in this matter any greater degree of intelligence than I am willing to accord to each of yeu. I believe you are as able as myself to judge between the right and the wrong. I cast no reflection when I suggest that you may sometimes act hastily, and perhaps thought-lessly, or that you may sometimes

GENTLEMEN: Your attention is respectfully called to the fact that during the very dry weather of the latter part of the season, the engineer of the Holly pumping machinery on Brown's race has been compelled to pump by steam power for a considerable portion of each day, and on occasions of large free has, by my direction, torn off the boards at our bulkheads and taken all the water which he could get turough a full opening to supply suction to his pumps, and on one or two occasions requiring other machinery on the race to be shut down. This has given rise to some fault-inding by other race owners, they claiming that the city, of all the owners, is best able to own a full water supply for all its necessities.

In view of these facts I deem it destrable that the city should own at least three more water rights at an early period. This would enable the pump house machinery to be run for a much longer period each year by water, thus saving a large amount in coal and giving enough water for suction, probably in the dryest times without trenening on the rights of other owners. I have no question about the propriety of the city purchasing more water rights on Brown's race, but as to whether the finances of the city at present warrant the expenditure, I am not prepared, and perhaps am not called upon to express an affirmative opinion.

First—The hose on the stage floor provided with a proper sized nozzie.

Second—On the stage artist gallery a new linen hose 50 feet long, with nozzie; also that the present standpipe shall be extended to the east side and provided with hose pipe and nozzie, or another stand-pipe may be put up on the east side.

Third—A new stand-pipe at least three inches in diameter with shut-off valve on the stage floor shall be extended up and over the rig loft with pipe preforated so as to flood the surroundings.

Fourth—A proper fire alarm box shall be placed on the stage wall in the most acceptable place connected with the fire circuit of the city and under the direction of the Superintendent of the Fire Alarm Telegraph.

Fifth—A door shall be cut through the west wall on the upper gallery near the northwest stairs with an extended platform and stairs leading to the roof of dressing rooms, and a ladder from thence to within ten feet of the ground.

Sixth—From the second window from the north corner of the building on St Paul street front there shall be constructed an iron platform and stairs leading from the balcony gallery to the present platform.

Seventh—An iron hand rail shall be placed in the centre of the wide stairs leading to the balcony gallery.

All the above work shall be done in the best and most substantial manner and under the direction of the Wooden Building Committee of the Common Council and the Fire Marshal,

Subsequently I had interviews with Mr. Fink, at which I endeavored to impress upon him the necessity of immediate compliance with the specifications in said notice. Some time last month, and while an audience was present at a matinee performance, but before the curtain arose, a fire occurred upon the stage, which fire was extinguished by cutting down the material Burning and throwing water upon it. At that time the water could not be forced through the pipes and nozzle in use a sufficient distance to extinguish the flames above the stage. This occurrence led me to make an investigation to see if the changes directed had been attended to. I find that the following only has been done, viz:

An iron platform and stairs leading to the roof of the dressing room, and the iron ladder leading to within ten feet of the ground, have been constructed.

I call special attention to the specifications contained in my notice to which no attention has been paid. I do not think that the Grand Opera House should be allowed to remain open until the improvements suggested have been made, and I recommend that until the improvements are made the said House should be ordered closed, as in the event of fire occurring when an audience is present, great loss of life would inevitably ensue.

Without attempting any argument as to the justice of the claim, a few facts may be briefly recounted in

reference thereto: First, It was well known that the action of Thomas Leighton against the ex-Water Commissioners, for \$25,000 and interest, was brought because the report of the Law Committee of July 26th, 1881, virtually recommending the payment of about \$82,0001 in settlement of the Lord claim, was not acceded to by the Common Council,—mainly, it is presumable, in consequence of a strong appeal against such action by the "Citizens' Committee," and other steps then taken to prevent settlement on the proposed basis.

Second—It was, also, equally well known at the

steps then taken to prevent settlement on the proposed basis.

Second—It was, also, equally well known at the
time the report referred to was made, that the sum
named included the so-called Leignton claim against
the ex Commissioners; and, therefore, had settlement been then made on the terms proposed, no action
would have been brought against them. When settlement was finally made, and at a greatly reduced sum
than above named, it was stipulated by the city,
as before stated, that the suit against the ex-Commissioners should be withdrawn, thus acknowledging
by a public act its liability, the report of the Law
Committee to the courtary notwithstanding.

Finally, the undersigned cannot doubt that, for reasons in part given above, they have a just claim
against the city for expenses incurred by them, and
that a further review of the law and facts in the case
will lead to the same conclusion by your hoorable
board.

To the Honorable the Common council: GENTLEMEN: Your special committee, appointed to meet in consultation with the representatives of the Rochester Belt railway company in relation to the construction of a combined highway and railthe construction of a combined highway and railway bridge across the Genesee river at the lower falls, herewith report that several meetings of the committee have been held, at each of which the subject was thoroughly discussed and a general interchange of opinions given relative to the merits of the proposed structure and other considerations relating thereto. It is proposed on the part of the railway company to construct a combined iron highway and single track railway bridge across the Genesee river, the east end thereof to be located about 120 feet north of Avenue B, in the fifth ward, and the west end to be located about 120 feet south of an extension of Rowe street, in the ninth ward. The use of the highway portion of said bridge is offered to the city of Rochester at an annual rental of \$10.000. Your committee have given the plans submitted a careful inspection,

aue consideration being given the subject generally, and they are convinced that the rental de-manded is not only exorbitant but that the construction of a bridge at the locality named and for the purpose mentioned is entirely imprac-ticable. The character of the structticable. ticable. The character of the structure includes many elements of danger, and to such an extent that people would avoid, rather than use it. With a locomotive and train of cars overhead, a roaring river underneath, an abj ss of 120 feet on the south side and 216 feet on the north side, a careful person would be deterred from crossing it. The location is equally unfortunate; being almost directly over the verge of the precipics, it will be constantly enveloped with the precipice, it will be constantly enveloped with the spray of the falls, and during the winter months will be loaded with ice. It will entail an expense of about \$1,800 to purchase the right of way to the east approach, and about \$5,000 to the west approach.

west approach.

It is conceded that a bridge is imperatively demanded in that locality, as a large territory on each side of the river, has no communication with each other, except by crossing Vincent Place bridge; but it is also submitted that a bridge of the character mentioned, with its approaches on each side of the river running about 6 to 800 feet parallel with the railroad tracks at a distance of about 120 feet from the sense then turning a light single. feet from the same, then turning a right angle to enter the bridge, would never meet the requirements of the people. It is not where they want it, nor what they want. As a general principle the city should build its own structures, own them and thus have general control over them, and this can be done ensuring a favorable location with none of the above objections, and at a cost much less than \$10,000 per year interest. For the above reasons your committee report adversely to the proposition submitted by the representatives of the Belt railroad company.

The amendment suggested with reference to the rhe amentant suggested with ferst et oline payment of expense of local improvements your committee believe to be inadvisable. The objection to the former plan is the trouble and annoyance caused by refunding to the tax-payers the small differences caused by the letting of contracts at the amount of the estimate. If the executive at the amount of the estimate. If the executive board and the assessors act promptly the present system is certainly better than the former plan. There should be, however, a strict compliance with the provisions of the charter, under which the Common-council has power only to borrow against any tax or assessment levied but not collective the common than the control of the country tax of the control of the co against any tax or assessment levied but not collected to an amount not exceeding the amount thereon uncollected. If this provision be carefully observed and the executive board determines at the earliest possible day the total expense of an improvement, and the assessors promptly report a roll for consideration, the system would be as nearly perfect in its working as any that can be devised. In this connection your committee would suggest that the assessors might with advantage, upon the adoption of an ordinance and the letting of a contract thereunder, make the assessment roll therefor, except as to carrying out the amounts assessed.
Upon the order for the assessment being adopted the assessors could in a very short time comparitively complete the roll.

Your committee does not think that any change should be made in the officers collecting the water . Under the present provisions the water collected are at the close of each day paid rates. rates collected are a wint controlled the city treasury. The executive board and its employes having charge of the water works, are supposed to be familiar with the rules and regulations adopted. Senate and Assembly, do enate as follows: SECTION I. The charter of the city of Rochester as amended and established by chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An

act to amend chapter one hundred and forty three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester, and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of said city," and by the sev ral acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, is hereby further amended in the following particulars: § 2. Section one nundred and thirty-seven of said chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty is hereby amended so as to read as follows:
§ 137. Your Law Committee, to which was referred the petition of H. M. S. Hutchinson, asking that an alleged erroneous assessment upon property owned by her be vacated, hereby reports:

The property upon which said assessment was laid consists of vacant lots Nos. 78, 79, 80, 81 and 82 in the Granger, Sibley and Field tract. It seems that in 1879 the Common Council directed the Street Superintendent to notify the owners of said lots, upon which was a quarry, to fill up the same and open the outlet within five days from the service of the notice; and in case of refusal or neglect on the part of owners to comply with the notice, that he cause the same to ne done and charge the owners. Subsequently, and in 1880, the assessment roll for the draining of the quarry on said lots was presented for confirmation, and confirmed by the Common Council. The assessment complained of is the one contained in the roll then presented.

There are some informalties in the steps that were taken with reference to said assessment. The owners of said lots have since the time of the levying of said assessment paid on said vacant lots ail other taxes amounting to nearly \$1,300. The owner now says that she intends to take legal proceedings to have said unfair assessment cancelled, unless she is able to make some settlement of the matter. The amount of the assessment, excusive of interest, is \$153,55. in view of all the facts your committee would recommend that the City Treasurer be directed to receive \$158.35 in full of said assessment.

Your charter amendment committee to which was referred the proposed amendment to sections eight and eighty-three, of the city charter, relat-ing to the creation of the office of assessors of personal property and relating to assessments, hereby reports. Your committee has considered said proposed amendment and gave to representatives of the Tax-Payers association a hearing. After a careful examination of the matter your committee is of the opinion that said proposed amendment is ill advised and should not be adopted. The reasons for this opinion among others are, briefly, as follows:

First—An additional expense would be made by reason of the increase in the number of assessors. Second-The proposed amendment would not

second—The proposed amendment would not harmonise with other provisions of the charter. Third—The creation of the office of assessor of personal property would not aid in the ob-taining of the relief sought, as it is not claimed but that the board of assessors as now constituted could accomplish the same result.

Fourth-The appointment of assessors of personal property is something which has, so far as your committee has been able to learn, never been done in any city or town of this state, and a change so radical should only be made after a full and careful consideration of the whole matter by the people. Such consideration the people have not given to the proposed legislation.

Your committee learns that said proposed amendments have been introduced into the assembly and ordered to a third reading. By your direction, the City Surveyor fixed the grade of Troup street crossing.

The elevation thus fixed by the City Surveyor made a very steep grade from Aikinson street to Troup street, and also required a large expenditure of money, to raise the surface of the depot grounds above referred to.

Your Honorable Body also authorized the Railroad Company to construct freight sheds on the same described depot grounds, for the accommodati not persons doing business with the railroad, and it was supposed that such permission carried with it the right to make such approaches for the accommodation of business as might be absolutely necessary.

For this purpose the sidewalk on the easterly side of the freight sheds has been raised, being governed by the grade of Troup street, as fixed by your City Surveyor, and proper wooden drains have been made to carry off the surface water from the street and grounds.

The railroad company own all the land on the westerly side of the sidewalk so raised, and in the opinion of all disinterested parties the work done has been an improvement rather than a deriment to the street; and this work was done only after the repeated solicitation of shippers residing in your city and its necesity made apparent by practical use. It seems to me that the interests of your citizens with the railroad company are mutual, and I cannot believe that the large majority of your people are hostile to improvements which must result to the benefit of both interests.

The undersigned is therefore surprised to learn that after all our care and endeavors to comply with your wishes a few persons, for reasons which need not be alluded to here, have asked that the sidewalk be lowered.

This cannot be done to advantage without also lowering the grade of Troun street.
I therefore respectfully ask that what we have done be still further confirmed by you, if any additional action is necessary.

Gentlemen—The Executive Board desires to call your attention to the serious results which are liable to ensue in case the stipulations of a certain agreement which was executed on the 8th day of November, 1882, oetween the Genesee Valley Canal railroad company of the first part and the State Engineer and Surveyor and the Superintendent of Public Works of the second part, are fully carried out.

This agreement provid a among other matters that the said Genesee Valley Canal railroad company shall concrete over and around the rubble arch of the Genesee Valley Canal outlet sewer between Ohio Basin and a point 495 feet south from said basin, and at said point to construct a bulkhead of masonry. ''To the end that that portion of said canal lying between the Erie Canal and said wall or bulkhead inclinding the said Ohio Basin may under the supervision and control of the Superintendent of Public Works, be retained in navigable condition as a part of the Erie Canal.''

In the opinion of this Board, no plan can be adoptice, which will render it safe to maintain a navigable canal over that part of said sewer, unless it involves the resonstruction of the same on a plan specifically designed for that purpose. This opinion is based upon the fact that the aren of the present sewer is constructed of rough rubble work and the bench walls are not of such dimensions as would have been designed for a sewer to resist the action and pressure of a canal did with water on the outside of it.

Also to relieve the Genesee Valley canal railroad company from the legal requirements of constructing its railroad substantially along the line of said canal to the Erie canal, said State officers by an act of supreme authority remove the Erie canal 1,100 feet south to meet the railroad, on the old principle that if the 'mountain will not go to Mahomet, then Mahomet must go to the mountain.' The following propositions may be regarded as a summary of the fole coing history:

First—The language of the first, second and third sections and a portion of the fourth section of chapter 323, Laws of 1830, is mar datory on the Commissioners of the Land Office to sell all of the Genesee Valley canal between the village of Millgrove and the Erie canal in the city of Rochester to the corporation or company which among other things should construct and thereafter maintain and operate a railroad substantially along the line of said canal between the points above nomed. That the latter part of the fourth section of said are provides that certain portions of said canal may be retained by the State, the fair legal inference from the whole of the laneuage being that no portion should be reserved from the sale except for the purpose of using it for connucting water from some feeder or reservoir to supply the Erie canal. Aside from its use for this purpose the law is mandatory that it shall be sold for the purpose of operating and maintaining a railroad to its intersection with the Erie canal at Rochester.

Second—The Genesee Valley Canal railroad company paid to the State \$11,400, being the full price required by law to be paid for 114 miles of canal at \$100 per mile, being the full length of said canal from the State to the railroad company excepting and reserving the full length of said canal afrom the point were Allen's creek feeder

point waere Allen's creek feeder enters it to the Eric canal,
Third—That the Superintendent of Public Works executed a permit to the said railroad company to use all the banks and prism of the Genesee Valley Canal between Ohio Basin and a point near the Rapids, 2.32 miles southerly from the Eric Canal, for its railroad; the principal condition for which permit being that said company would atits own expense convey the water of Allea's Creek feeder across the Genesee River near the Rapids and into the Genesee River feeder, by which route it would feed the Eric Canal, rendering unnecessary for that purpose the balance of the Genesee Valley Canal from the kapids to the Eric Canal. In this permit, however, the Superintendent of Public Works reserved from its operation that part of said canal from the Eric Canal to the south end of Ohio Basin, at which latter point a wail or bulknead of stone was to be constructed, with the avowed intended of maintaining a navigable canal between the points named; an act clearly in contravention of the mandatory provis ons of said chapter 326, laws of 1890.

Fourth—In assumed compliance with the provisions

Fourth—In assumed compliance with the provisions of chapter 666, laws of 1881, the State Engineer and Surveyor and Superintendent of Public Works entered into another agreement with the railroad company, containing not only similar provisions to those contained in the former permit from the Superintendent of Public Works alove, but also a provision that a bulkhead should be constructed at a point 495 feet southerly from Ohio Basin, with the intent to maintain a navigable canal as far south as that point.

Fifth—That in pursuance of section 5 of chapter 326, laws of 1880, the city of Rochester did construct a sewer in the bed of the said canal under the direction of the Superintendent of Public Works. The first section being a brick arch and extending to the south end of Ohio Basin and the balance southerly, being a rough arch of rubble work.

From all of the foregoing may rightfully be deduced the following propositions, which we believe may be maintained in a court of law:

First: That the Genesee Valley canal railroad company is bound to construct a railroad of Rachester and the village of Olean in the county of Cattaraugus substantially along the line of said canal.

Second: That neither the superintendent of public works or any other authority save the legislature of the state can arbitrarily select a section of the Genesee Valley or any other authority save the legislature of the state can arbitrarily select a section of the Genesee Valley or any other canal and by his sole flat make it answer the legal requirements of the words "Eric canal" as contained in a law of this state. He cannot by this sort of official jugglery relieve the railroad company of the requirement of the law that it shall maintain and operate its railroad to the Eric canal. Neither can be by a word extend the Eric canal to any point short of the Eric canal. That the law that the sailroad words.

Third: That the law is mandatory upon the state offi-

cers to sell all the right, title and interest the state may have in and to the Genesee Valley canal to a railroad company, except such portions of the same as are need-ed to conduct water from feeders and reservoirs to the

Eric canal.

Fourth: By virtue of the permit issued by the superintendent of public works, as well as by the contract executed by him in conjunction with the state engineer ecuted by him in conjunction with the state engineer and surveyor to the railroad company by which the water from Allen's creek feeder is carried across the Genesee river at the rapids and thence by way of the feeder into the Erie canal, as well as by their acts in granting the use of the whole canal from that point to the proposed bulkhead for the purposes of a railroad, they have in effect declared their opinion that that part of the Genesee Valley canal between the rapids and the Erie canal is not needed for feeder purposes, chapter 666 of the laws of 1881 being their, warrant therefor, and being itself also an acknowled_ment to the same purpose. Fifth—That, therefore, under the operation of section 326, laws of 1880, all the right, title and interest of the state in the said canal from the point where the waters of Allen's creek feeder are carried across the river and thence to the Erie canal, passes to the railroad company and said company is bound by its contract with the state to construct, maintain and operate its railroad substantially along the line of said canal to its junction with the Erie canal at Rochester.

Sixth—That the superintendent of public works has no

Sixth—That the superintendent of public works has no lawful authority to allow the said railroad company to maintain and operate the Genesee Vailey canal as a canal instead of as a railroad, as required by law, from the Erie canal to a point 495 feet southerly from the Ohio basin or in any other portion thereo; even though it may be maintained and operated as a canal under his control and direction. direction.

maintained and operated as a canal under his control and direction.

Seventh—The maintenance of a navigable canal between Ohio basin and the proposed bulkhead is in direct conflict with the letter and spirit of chapter 666 laws of 1881, under which the contract authorizing its maintenance was assumed to be made, as that act "authorizes and empowers" the said superintendent and state engineer and surveyor "to remove or cause to be removed the water from the Genesee Valley canal in the city of Rochester and territory adjacent thereto."

Eighth—The maintenance of a navigable canal between the Ohio basin and the proposed bulkhead over a rubble arch sewer constructed with the concurrence of the state authorities, with no intimation or expectation that it was to be submitted to the perils of a navigable canal over it, is an unwarrantable breach of faith on the part of the officers of the state which will imperil the persons and property of the citizens of Rochester.

Ninth—In view of the statute provisions the officers of the state are not warranted in maintaining through the

the state are not warranted in maintaining through the heart of a populous district of this city a stagnant canal 1,100 feet in length to the peril of the whole of its population

To the Hon. the Common Council of Rochester Gentlemen—An examination of the charter of this city discloses the fact, that its provisions in relation to the raising a Highway Fund by general tax on the property of the woole city, and the purposes for which it may be expended when raised, are exceedingly indefinite and obscure, and this vagueness has led to abuses in the past and will unquestionably in the future, unless measures are adopted to clearly define the powers and duties of the Common Council and the executive Board in relation thereto.

The authority of the Common Council to raise a Highway Fund by general tax is assumed to be given by the charter, but by inference rather than by direct enactment.

The following provisions of the charter seem to be all that or nearly or remotely bear upon this grant of

authority.
Section 46, Provides that the Common Council shail on the last Thursday in the month of March in each vear "make out a statement in detail of the receipts year "make out a statement in detail of the receipts and exp nditures of the corporation during the preceding year, in which statement shall be clearly and distinctly specified the several items of expenditure made by the Common Council, the objects and purposes for which the same were made, the amount of money expended under each; the amount raised for lighting the city, and for police; the amount of highway taxes and assessments; the amount of sasessments for paving, repairing and opening streets and for repairing and bullding bridges."

In the foregoing quotation from the Charter, a distinction seems to be made between "taxes" and "assessments," the former apparently being intended to designate a general city tax and the latter alocal one.

Section 81. "The Finance Committee shall prepare, and on or before the first regular meeting of the Com-

mon Council in May of each year, they shall present to said Council, a statement in detail of the several stums which will be needed for said tun's and meet the expenses of the year for all proper municipal purposes, and showing what sums will be in their opinion necessary to be raised for other specific purposes."

The same section gives the Common Council authority to alter the statement of the Finance Committee,

under certain restrictions and to raise the sums so de-termined, by general tax.

"In addition to the amount authorized to be raised in each year for the construction and repairs of highways, the Common Council are hereby authorized to raise by tax in said city annually, a sum not exceeding two thousand seven hundred dollars for the purpose of cleansing and keeping in repair the following avenues, or such of them as have been or may hereafter be permanently improved between the points indicated. North street, from East Main street to the railroad; East Main street, from East Main street to the city line; East avenue, from East Main street to the city line; Monroe avenue, from South Clinton street to Alexander street; Mt. Hope avenue; West avenue, from the Eric canal to the city line; Lyell street, from State street to the city line; Lyell street, from State street to the city line; Lake avenue, from Lyell street, from Conthe Genessee Valley Canal to the city line. But no more than three hundred dollars for each of said streets or avenues shall be raised in any one year; also a further su a not exceeding fifteen hundred dollars for the purpose of cleaning and keeping in repair North St. Paul street from Scratnom street to the city line; Mount Hope avenue from the Eric canal to the city line, but no more than five hundred dollars for each of said streets or avenues shall be raised in any one year. Section 81, heretofore quoted, "assumes" that some other part of the charter or other law, authorizes the raising of a fund for the "construction and repair of highways" and provides that in addition to the amount supposed to be authorized, there may be certain other specified amounts raised for the cleanma and repairs of certain specified improved streets ing and repairs of certain specified improved streets

The only moneys specifically directed to be raised

by this section for cleaning and repairs of streets, does not belong to, nor can it be properly designated as a general highway fund, but is a special fund raised for the repairs and cleaning of certain specially designated avenues. And the amount of the fund is also definitely limited. If it had been intended by the caster that there should be no limit to the amount to be expended from the highway fund for cleaning and repairs of streets, but the discretion of the Common Council or Executive Board, then why limit this special fund or indeed establish one at all co. cleaning and repairs of certain avenues, as in that case all that is needed to be expended could be taken from the highway fund.

Section 216 recites that whenever the Common Council shall deem it expectent to construct any sidewalk or p vement within the said city, they may require the owner to do it to the center of the street, or cause it to be done and assessed on the property adjacent. Also, "The Common Council may, in like manner, by ordinance or otherwise, under such penalty or penalties as they may prescribe, require the owners and occupants, or eitner, of land in said city, or in any specified part thereof, to repair maintain, and reconstruct sidewalks, pavements and street improvements adjoining their respective premises to the center of the street or alley in such manner as the Common Council by ordinance or otherwise may direct."

This section seems not only to contemplate that the original improvement shall be made as the expense of the adjacent owner, but that the subsequent repairs and maintenance, as well as the reconstruction of same when worn out, shall also be at the expense of the adjacent property and not at the expense of the adjacent property and not at the expense of the whole city.

SECTION 218. "It shall in all cases be the duty of the owner of every for or piece of land in said city, to keep the sidewarks adjoining his lot or piece of land, in good repair and also to remove and clean away all snow ice or other obstruction from such sidewalk and to keep half of the street or alley adjoining the same

snow ice or other obstruction from such sidewalk and to keep half of the street or alley adjoining the same free from obstruction or obstacle."

The true interpretation of the two last quoted sections seems to be, that the improvement, repairs, maintenance, cleaning and reconstruction of the streets and alleys is to be done at the expense of the adjacent preperty, thus limiting the expenditure from the higi way fund to such uses as will fulfil the obligation of the city under the general and other statutes to keep the streets in such condition as to render them at all times safe and convenient for public use, regard being had to their locality and uses, such repairs also being of such as unusual character as cannot fairly be required to be made by individuals.

From all the foregoing provisions of the city charter, the following propositions are deduced:

(1.) The Common Council under the charter may authorize a highway fund to be raised by tax on the property of the whole city, to be expended in making such ibcidental repairs from hour to hour and day to day as may be required by the needs and safety of public traffic, and also in making such repairs and removing such obstructions as under the Charter it is the duty of the adjacent owner to make and remove, but which duty is neglected by him and for which neglect the city becomes liable, if such neglect results in failury to person or property. The expenditures in the last mentioned case, however, are to be recovered from the adjacent owner and the highway fund reimbursed. The theory of the Charter provisions seems to be that those repairs of a general and comprehensive nature, which are required yearly as also those requiring the replacing of a worn-out improvement with a new one, or the grading of streets, or the removal of lee or snow when interfering with the safe and convenient use of the streets or the removal of any other obstruction to public traffic, or the general cleaning of the streets, shall be done at the expense of the adjacent owners. The only exception to this rule being such cleaning as ray be obligation to this rule being such cleaning as ray be obligating the control of the case of certain improved avenues.

2. The Common Council may exercise its discretion in the following specified cases: In determining what proportion, if any, the whole city ought to pay of the cost of opening, laying out and working of any new street and making any other improvement. And this discretion is evidently to be exercised with due regard to the spirit and intention of the other provisions of the charter.

3. This discretion is not given to the Executive Board, and expenditures can only be made for these purposes from the Highway Fund by a resolution or ordinate of the Common Council.

Assuming that the forecoing interpretation of the resent charter is correct, it would seem that such than the such as a small give definiteness to to its provisions in relation to expenditures from the Highway Fund, to carefully define the relations of

the city as a corporation and also the individual owaer to the repairs, cleaning, improvement and reconstruction of streets, and to more thoroughly adapt the provisions of the charter on these subjects to the needs of a large and growing city like our own.

The following mod fleations of the charter are respectfully submitted for your consideration:

1. That the common council may raise a highway fund by general tax on the property of the city, for the following purposes:

First—For opening and maintaining surface gutters or drains on all public city streets.

Second—For repairing and maintaining all surface lateral sewers, previously constructed by ordinance or otherwise.

Third—For furnishing and maintaining stand pipes for turnishing water for sprinking streets; also for street watering troughs and stand-pipes for men and animals and for public urinals.

Fourty—For cleaning and removing the obstructions

watering troughs and stand-plees for men and animals and for public urinals.

Foureu-For cleaning and removing the obstructions from the roadways of all public improved streets, avenues, places and alleys, except of rubbish, garbage and ashes placed thereon oy residents. Ashes may also be removed under this head from any street when in the opinion of the executive board the value of said ashes for other repairs is sufficient to reimburse the cost of their removal.

Fifth—For repairing, maintaining or reconstructing the pavements in the roadway of any public street, which has heretofore or may hereafter be carefully and thoroughly improved with a Medina or granite block stone pavement, under an ordinance of the common council, the cost of which was pald by local assessment on property adjacent and adjudge i benefitted thereby.

Sixth—For making such needed repairs from day to day to the roadways of public streets which have heretofore oeen or may hereafter be improved with other materials than a Medina or granite block stone pavement, sid repairs to include the furnishing of like materials for materials than a Medina or granite block stone pavement, sid repairs to include the furnishing of like materials for materials in large quantities to practically reconstruct the improvement when the same is worn out improved streets from day to day as the safety and convenience of public trailic may require, regard being had to the locality and uses of the said streets. And also for making such repairs of an unusual and exceptional character as could not in the judgment of the executive board be fairly required to be made by the individual property owner.

Twelfth—For procuring such animals, tools and machinery and keeping the same in proper order, as the executive board may deem neces ary to enable it to properly and economically perform the duties required of it in the management of the highway department of the city.

Thirteenth—For the paying of such proportion of the cost of grading new street, as the common council shall by resolution or ordinance adjudge, that the whole city shall justly pay as contemplated by section 1:0 of the present city charter.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LAW COMMITTEE.

Io the Honorable the Common Council of the City of

Rochester:
Your Law Committee hereby submits its annual report, regarding the actions in which the city of Rochester is a party and other matters under its charge during the past year:

1 The action brought by Richard Smith against James H. Kelly and others to recover \$10,000 for personal injuries, which was tried in October, 1880, is still pending on appeal, not having yet been reached for argument.

still pending on appeal, not having yet been reached for argument.

2. The case of Henry Bember, as receiver, against the city of Rochester, which resulted in a non-suit on the trial, was appealed to the general term of the Supreme Court. The general term in October last affirmed the judgment of non-suit and the plaintiff appealed to the Court of Appeals. The cause is on the present calendar of said last mentioned court and will be argued when reached.

3. The case of the city of Rochester against Samuel Pierce, which was an action brought to recover tuition fees for the education of plaintiff's children, was decided in January last by the general term of the supreme Court in favor of the plaintiff, and the damages awarded to the city have been paid and the cause ended.

4. The action brought by James G. McCartnev

ended.
4. The action brought by James G. McCartney against the City of Rochester, which was tried in Noromber, 1881, and resulted in a verdict of \$2,500 against the defendant, is now pending on appeal. A case involving similar questions is that of Susanna Schomer against the city, which was tried in January, 1882, a verdict of \$1,750 being rendered in favor of the plaintiff. This case is also pending before the appellate court. Both of these cases are likely to be reached at the next term of the court.

The City of Rochester to recover \$5.000 damages for injuries received by him while driving on East avenue in January. 13:9, has been three times tried. The first rial took place in October, 1831, before Judge Macomber, and the jury disagreed, standing eleven for the plaintiff and one for the defendant. The second trial, which occurred before Justice Dwight, in March, 1852, also resulted in a disagreement, the jury standing ten for the plaintiff and two for the defencant. The third trial came on before Justice Runsey in June last, and a third disagreement was the result, the jury standing four for the plaintiff and eight for the defendant. The case will probably be again tried at the next Circuit.

6. George Truesdale against the City, is an action brought to recover a balance alleged to be due the plaintiff as Police Justice. The action was tried in the Municipal Court and judgment was taken Januuary 8d, 1882, for 8226, 10. An appeal was taken by ex-City Attorney Fanning to the County Court and there argued by him on behalf of the city, the judgment being affirmed. Mr. Fanning proposed to your committee to take an appeal to the General Term and to make no charge against the city, except for actual disbursements on the appeal. In view of the importance of the questions involved, your committee accepted his proposition and the appeal is now pending undetermined.

7. The judgment in favor of the city entered on the decision of Justice David Rumsey in the case of Hiram Smith et al. against the City of Rochester was, by the General Term in June last, affirmed. The plaintiffs

have appealed to the Court of Appeals and the cause is likely to be reached soon. This action, it will be remembered, involves the right of the city to draw away the water of Hemlock Lake from its natural outlet through the conduit by which the city obtains its

The Nauloual Gas Light Company, of the city of New York, in July last brought an action against the city to recover a balance alleged to be owing them uncer the contract between the parties for lighting and care of naptha lamps. The amount a warded the plantiff in the case, The City of Kochesier vs. O'Grady and said company, hereinbefore referred to, the city claims, is the full amount unpaid under said contract, and an answer has been interposed on behalf of the city.

23. In July last an action was brought by Julia Dignin against the city to recover \$10.000 for injuries

In July last an action was brought by Julia Dignin against the city to recover \$10,000 for injuries received by reason of a fail upon a side walk on Gardner park in November, 1819. This case was tried at the March circuit and resulted in a verdict of \$500 in favor of the plaintiff. The plaintiff moved before the court that the verdict of the jury be set aside on the ground that the amount awarded was inadequate, which the court denied. A stay of sixty days as been grauted, within which time the question as to whether it is well to have the case reviewed in the higher cturts must be decided. The verdict is a very light one considering the nature of the injuries received, and it may be thought advisable to pay the amount.

24. In August last Elizabeth Holcomb brought an action against the city of Rochester to recover \$10,000 damages for alleged injuries sustained by her by reason of a fail on Brisbane street. This cause is at issue but has not yet been fried.

25. The action of Luther 6, Sheldon against the city was brought in the Monroe County Court, in September last to recover \$1,000 damages. The complaintalleges that the injuries complained of were caused by a

issue but has not yet been tried.

25. The action of Luther G, Sheldon against the city was brought in the Monroe County Court, in September last to recover \$1,000 damages. The complaint alleges that the injuries complained of were caused by a ditch or trench in the roadway of Lake avenue in the vicinity of Champion street on the night of September 6, 1882. The ditch in question was made by William McCormick for the purpose of constructing a lateral sewer. Mr. McCormick has been notified to defend. The cause is at issue and will probably be tried at the March term of the court.

26. An action against the City was brought in the County Court December 21st, 1882, by Walker 8, Lee, by the service of a summons. The City Attorney appeared and demanded a copy of the complaint, but no complaint was served. It is understood that the contractor, who was the cause of an injury suffered by the plaintiff has settled the claim.

27. On the 22d day of January, 1883, Amelia Groves brought an action against the City of Rochester to recover \$25,000 damages. The complaint alleges that the plaintiff while passing along North St. Paul street fell into a ditch or trench in said street and sustained the injuries complained of. An answer has been put in, the contractor has been notified and the cause will probably be tried at the June Circuit.

The action broughtty Gregor Frank against the city was tried by Mr Fanning in 1883 and the jury rendered a verdict for the plaintiff for \$8.00 A motion for a new trial is now pending.

There are a number of other cases which have been under the direction of your committee of minor importance, in all of which the city has been successful so far as they are disposed of.

The proceedings for the coping and extension of streets have been taken recently and are too familiar to need recapitulation. Large numbers of claims have been considered by your committee, their reference thereto being in the published proceeding of your honorable body.

Since the term of your law committee began, being a period of one year, but one action tried in a court of record has been decided adversely to the city, viz., the case of Julia Dignin against the city, in which the recovery was \$500 while the claim was \$10,000. Special effort has been made to collect taxes long in arrears, and a large amount of money in such matters has been paid into the city treasury, but no sale of property on foreclosure for unpaid taxes has been made in any action brought by the present city attorney. Your law committee deems it proper to present in this connection a statement in reference to the amount expended for searches, for recording papers and for service of papers by the sheriff in tax foreclosure matters. The total amount of bills rendered by ex-County-clerk Frost and the sheriff for services in connection with the tax foreclosures is \$600.43. The city attorney has received from the persons llable to pay these charges the sum of \$835.10. This amount has been duly paid by the city attorney to the treasurer and has been credited to the contingent fund. It may also be proper to say that the above sum of \$385.10 was paid to the city attorney through the year as cases were settled, in small amounts. It of course would make much extra work and trouble in the treasurer's office as well as in the city attorney's office if the small amounts as paid in were to be paid over day by day and an entry for each made and carried forward on the treasurer's books. It was therefore thought advisable by your committee that the city attorney should retain the amounts as paid in until the end of the year and day over to the treasurer the aggregate amount seelved. This course was adopted and the payment above referred to of \$385.10 comprises all the moneys coming into the hands of city attorney since his term of office began, belonging to the city of Rochester. No bill of County Clerk McNaughton has as yet been paid by the city. There is yet \$285.33 unpaid by the parties against whom foreclosures are pending or against whom searches have been ordered. It has been thought advisable to pursue a lenient course with those in arrears on taxes where investigation showed a desire but an inability to pay; while at the same time exacting a reasonably prompt settlement from such as could pay with proper effort.

The serious illness of Alderman Ransom, continuing through the year, has deprived your law committee of the benefit of his companionship and labors. Your Committee learns with sorrow that he is as yet not able to attend to active duties, and desires to hereby record the hishe esteem in which he is held and to express the earness wish hat he may soon be restored to his former vigor and health.

I think the speaker has over estimated me. This seems to be a very appropriate present and I shall look upon it as suggested by the Alderman, as a constant reminder of the friendly feelings of my associates in the Board. Again I thank you for this evidence of your friendship.

Ald. Hart moved that the thanks of the Board be tendered the retiring President for the courteous and able manner in which he has presided over the deliberations of the Council.

Adopted unanimously.

The President then delivered the following

validictory:

FELLOW ALDERMEN-The common council of 1882 and 1883 now assembles for the last time before its dissolution, and agreeable to custom it devolves upon your pre-siding officer to pronounce the valedictory. I assumed that office without experience but determined to familiarize myself with its requirements to the end that equal and exact justice in my rulings would be done to each member of the board. If my efforts in that direction were not realized the fault was unintentional and lask to be pardoned for any error I may have committed. The labors of the chairman were made pleasant and easy by the courtesy and forbearance of the several members of the board, for which I return my most sincere thanks. At an early period in the current year one of our associates, Alderman Ransom, was taken suddenly and dangerously ill, thereby leaving one chair vacant during the greater part of the year. Because of his many good qualities of head and heart Alderman Ransom was a good official and had the respect and confidence of his associates and the public in a marked degree. Let us hop that his health will be speedily restored and that his family and society may enjoy his presence for many vears to come.

During the past year our city has enjoyed the usual degree of good health and business prosperity—two features of the social system most to be desired and cultivated—to accomplish which every act of local legislation consistent with prudence and true economy should be directed. Mannfactures, railreads, business enterprises and whatever tends to increase the industrial population of the city should be encouraged. The legislative body of a rapidly growing city like ours has a perplexing duty when imposing taxes, general or local, to know the good of the city and the majority of the people are conserved. Every effort should be made to keep

taxation to the lowest point permissable by good faith to the city's creditors and the efficient working of the departments.

The annual tax levy is supposed to be an index to the fidelity of the common council, and by it the people frequently pass judgment regardless of cause. The increase of the tax levy of the fiscal year 1882 and 1883 was caused principally by the payment of deficit in the school board, payment of George D. Lord claim, payment for vaccination and other sums for which the common counsel was not responsible. The committees of the board having the disbursement of funds have been careful and judicious in their expenditures. A large proportion of assessments for improvements opening is caused by the this vear new street from Mill Water the to and the straightening and widening of St. Paul street, these improvements are deemed necessary on account of the elevation of the New York Central and Hudson River railroad company's tracks and are practically the city's contribution to that important work.

And now the time has come for our official separation, I am sure the retiring members will go back to their constituents conscious of having done their duty honestly and well. Those who remain to do the city's work for another year will persevere to the end in the faithful performance of their duties. In vacating the chair permit me to express the hope that the friendly intercourse we have enjoyed will be continuous, and that all will meet with a full measure of success in their various cailings in
