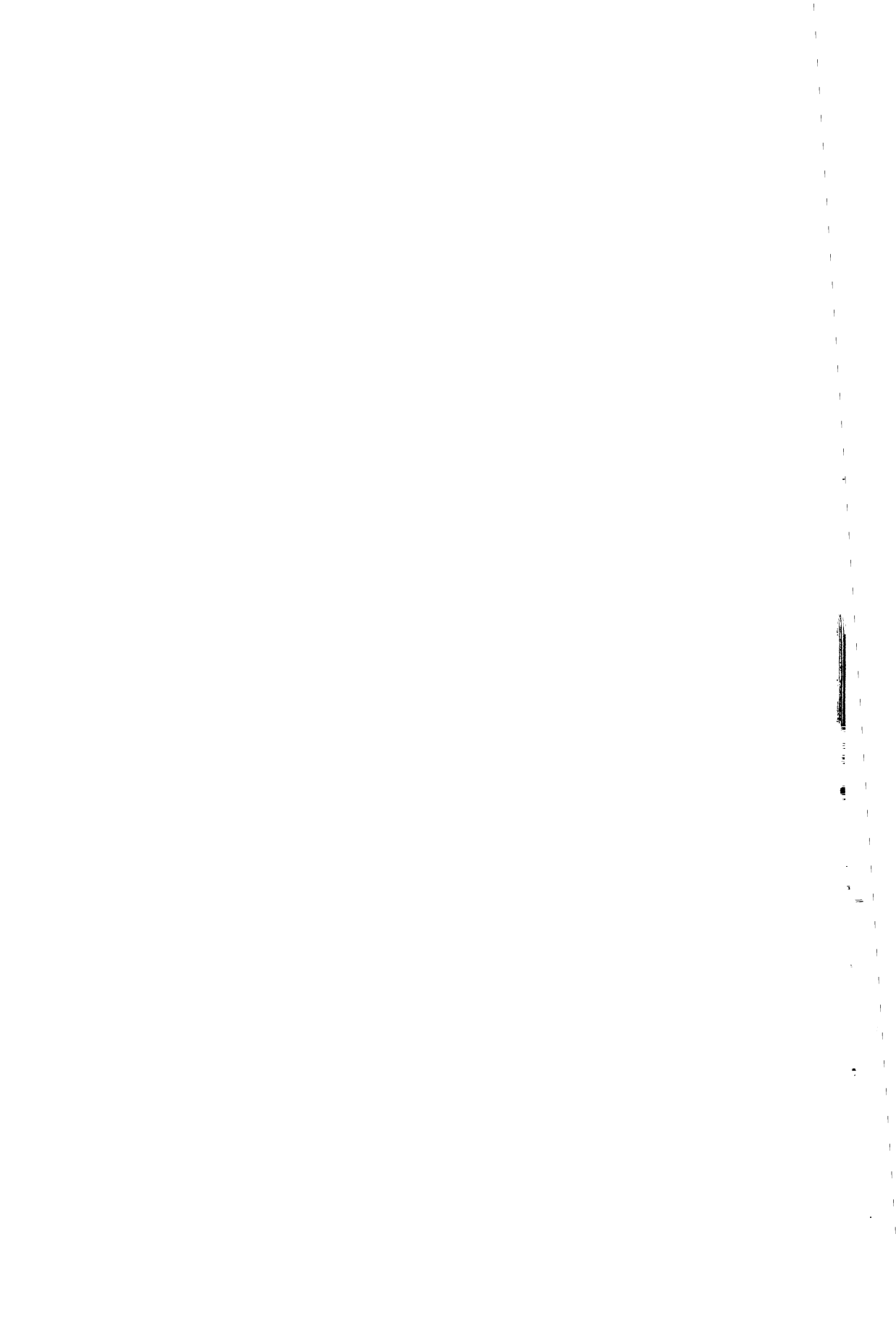

In Common Council—April 4, 1892.

CHARTER MEETING.

The Clerk called the meeting to order.

Present—Alds. Tracy, McMillan, C. S. Cook, Calihan, Zimmer, Adams, Lempert, Fox, Wurtz, Ward, Dewey, H. G. Cook, Pauckner, Kelly, Aikenhead, Simmellink, Lewis, Forsyth, Bierbrauer—19.

Absent—Ald. Johnston.

Ald. Calihan moved that Ald. Adams act as temporary Chairman.

Adopted.

Ald. Adams upon taking the chair thanked the aldermen for the honor conferred and asked the pleasure of the Board.

Ald. Calihan moved that the Board proceed to appoint a President of the Board.

Adopted.

Ald. Calihan nominated Ald. Thomas McMillan.

Ald. Thomas McMillan was named by

Alds. Tracy, C. S. Cook, Calihan, Zimmer, Adams, Lempert, Fox, Wurtz, Ward, Dewey, H. G. Cook, Pauckner, Kelly, Aikenhead, Simmellink, Lewis, Forsyth, Bierbrauer—19.

Ald. Thomas McMillan was declared duly elected President of the Board for the ensuing year.

Ald. Tracy moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort the President to the chair.

Adopted.

The Chairman pro. tem. appointed as such committee, Alds. Tracy and Calihan.

Ald. McMillan thanked the members of the Board for the honor conferred and asked the further pleasure of the Board.

Ald. Calihan moved that the Board proceed to appoint a City Clerk.

Adopted.

Ald. Calihan nominated Henry W. Gregg for City Clerk.

Henry W. Gregg was named by

Alds. Tracy, McMillan, C. S. Cook, Calihan, Zimmer, Adams, Lempert, Fox, Wurtz, Ward, Dewey, H. G. Cook, Pauckner, Kelly, Aikenhead, Simmellink, Lewis, Forsyth, Bierbrauer—19.

Henry W. Gregg having received the required number of votes was declared duly appointed City Clerk.

Ald. Calihan moved that a committee of three be appointed to inform the Mayor that this Board is now ready to receive any communication that he may wish to present.

Adopted.

The Chair appointed as such committee, Alds. Calihan, Aikenhead and Ward.

Ald. McMillan then introduced His Honor the Mayor, Richard Curran, who spoke as follows:

Gentlemen of the Common Council:

A more than ordinary measure of responsibility devolves upon the municipal administration, this day inaugurated. Unusual expectation waits upon an orderly, prudent and economical administration of public affairs. Individual rights are to be maintained, the laws are to be enforced in their integrity, and the burden of taxation is to rest as lightly upon

the citizen, as may be consistent with the weal and safety of the community.

Our city is under a charter, which originally granted in 1834, has by amendments, revisions and consolidations been so changed that at the present time it presents much of incongruity between its parts and causes confusion in its interpretation; but such as it is it is the law to be sustained and obeyed. Under this charter, the city is governed by a legislative body, the Common Council, an executive body, the Executive board and a Mayor, having power of supervision over the acts of the Common Council, and a number of administrative officials and boards. In your body is vested the law-making power. Some of you have had legislative experience and all of you are freshly accredited by your constituents, understanding their desires and appreciating their needs. Nevertheless, I desire to call your attention to the importance of the trust you have assumed, and to prefer the hope that when you have served your respective terms, you may receive the approval of the people for the things that you have done and make explanation of the things that you have left undone.

Premising that it will be my duty, from time to time, to address you upon specific matters requiring your attention. I shall now content myself with referring in a general way to a few topics which seem to me especially pertinent to consider. Among the urgent needs of an expanding city are improved streets, good sewers and pure water. During the ensuing year, as it has been in past years, questions of improvements in the outer and developing wards will constantly confront you. The only safe course to pursue in relation to these is to determine whether the proper petition has been presented for an improvement, whether that improvement is necessary, and whether a majority of the people to be benefited and taxed desire it.

Governments cannot be conducted without expense, and this expense is met by levying contribution on the people for whatever amount may be necessary to conduct the government. Under the charter it is the duty of the Common Council to estimate and declare the amount necessary to be raised for the expenses of the city, and to levy the same on its assessable property.

The method by which the Common Council arrives at a knowledge of the amount of money necessary to be raised is prescribed by the charter which requires the Finance Committee to request from the chairman of each of the several committees of the Council, an estimate of the amount of money needed by the various boards and departments in their charge, and especially for lighting the city, and the support of the Police Department, for the support and relief of the poor, for the maintenance and improvement of public parks, for the expenses of the Board of Health, for general contingent expenses and for all other expenses during the fiscal year. The Finance Committee after ascertaining through the estimates furnished them, and through statements made by heads of departments and citizens generally interested in the matters, makes its report to the Common Council, showing what sums will be

necessary to be raised for expenses during the fiscal year. The Common Council then takes action upon such report, making such changes as may seem necessary or expedient, and such sum of money as is declared necessary, is then directed to be raised by an assessment on all the real and personal estate in the city.

It will thus be seen that the Finance Committee is the most important committee of the Council, as both the property and personal rights of the citizens are to a large extent placed within its power. If through incapacity, ignorance, carelessness, or neglect, sums of money in excess of the actual requirements of the government, should be reported as necessary to be raised, property becomes tax-ridden, and the citizen is defrauded; if on the contrary through a mistaken and false idea of economy, sums insufficient for the various departments are reported to be raised, the people are deprived of their just and proper rights of comfort, convenience and protection.

It is the duty of the Council to practice economy, but by economy I do not mean that penny-wise and pound-foolish policy that saves money by crippling the usefulness of the departments, depriving the city and people of their just rights. The economy to be practiced is the economy of the true business man; the economy that foresees the things necessary to be done, does those things at the proper time and in the proper way, and that makes the dollars of the people return to them the benefits they are entitled to receive at the lowest reasonable cost. I do not preach extravagance when I say that the people should have the best improvements the times afford, provided the city does not go beyond its means in securing those improvements. The test of good government is, how much of comfort and convenience is being given to the people and at how small a cost. Does the benefit warrant the expense, is the problem solved. Money honestly and judiciously expended in adding to the comfort and convenience of the people, is in conformity with good government.

Before leaving the subject of the tax levy, there is one question of importance to which I deem it my duty to call your attention, a question that may require considerable study and thought before the proper solution shall be reached. It has been the custom for many years past, to borrow during the year, large sums of money on the notes of the city, drawing interest. The amounts of money so raised have increased rapidly during the last few years. There is something radically wrong in the practice, which either permits, or compels the borrowing of money, on notes, in such large amounts, year after year, and I suggest that proper measures be taken to forego, so far as possible, such practice in the future.

Another question which may come before you is one to which much thought has already been devoted. It is that of a new charter for the city. Municipal government is a theme which has occupied the attention of political scientists for many years in all parts of the land, and upon which many theories have been advanced and many experiments tried. The conditions obtaining in a comparatively new country have changed so rapidly and the marvelous and unprecedented growths of municipalities have been so marked that their best government is one of the most vital issues of the day. That our charter is defective in many particulars is obvious, and it is to be hoped that during the year, your body will, after due consultation with our citizens, perfect and recommend to the legislature the passage of a new charter which will respond to the demands of the age, and will guarantee the wisest government. It will be my pleasure to co-operate with you in this, in all reasonable ways. Meanwhile I suggest that the present charter be reprinted, as but few copies are available, and that a compilation of existing by-laws and ordinances be made.

While the city has, for a number of years been supplied with an abundance of pure water, it nevertheless has become apparent that by reason of its rapid growth and the prospects of still greater growth it becomes necessary to provide for the wants of the people an additional supply of pure water. The inauguration of the existing system of supplying the city with water, and the completion of that system some twenty years ago was the first of a series of improvements, made on a large scale, which induced manufacturing and other industrial enterprises from abroad to locate here, and which was the commencement of the progress and prosperity which has since attended our city. The supply of water for a city of the character of Rochester should at all times be abundant and should be such as to give to our business and manufacturing concerns and the people generally, all of the water that they can use for their business or personal convenience or comfort, without permitting extravagant waste.

The near prospect of legislation adequate to this end is a matter for the sincere gratulations of our citizens.

The construction of the East Side Trunk Sewer is a work that has been made necessary by reason of the rapid growth of the territory added to the city some six years ago, and lately known as the Sixteenth Ward. When that part of the city was but sparsely populated, the sewers were so constructed as to empty their contents into the small streams, which, having their origin in the city, flow east and north into Irondequoit Bay. When these sewers were first constructed, the amount of sewage emptied into the streams was so small that it was easily carried away without offense to the people living upon the banks. But as time passed and this territory became built up, the contents of the sewers and the amount of drainage became so large that complaints were heard from the residents of the towns adjoining the city, and from the people living on the banks of these streams. The results of these complaints were that numerous actions at law were brought to obtain injunctions to restrain the city from longer continuing in the practice of emptying sewers into these streams, and for damages on account of the pollution of the streams and the consequent effect upon the neighboring lands. The parties bringing suits were successful in their actions and one of the great sources of litigation against the city in the last fifteen years has been occasioned by sewage pollution to these streams. The courts have uniformly sustained the actions, and the city has been compelled to pay the damages. The solution of the question was finally arrived at in the determination to build an intersecting trunk sewer which, commencing at the extreme south of the city, should skirt its southeast and northerly boundaries and finally empty into the Genesee river below the falls.

Legislation was obtained for the purpose of prosecuting the work, and this great improvement is about to be begun. The contracts for the letting of the work have been advertised and it is unnecessary to say that as soon as the nature of the work will permit, the East Side Trunk Sewer will be an accomplished fact, and the eastern section of the city will be well drained with the consequent results of improved sanitary conditions and increased values.

The Park Commission has been since its inauguration one of the most efficient and active public bodies. Its work may not as yet have fully impressed itself upon the community because on account of its nature results can only show after many years of labor and care. The work of the Commission, however, embraces the promise that in a few years Rochester will be possessed of a system of parks unsurpassed anywhere. I trust, while due safeguards shall

be established in the expenditures for this work that no unnecessary obstacles to its prosecution will be interposed.

I am assured that the various administrative departments of the city are prudently and efficiently managed. Appropriations for these should be without extravagance, and yet without parsimony, so that the best results in health, in policing, and in the various branches of the Executive Board may ensue.

Rochester has rounded more than a half-century of existence, and is well onward in its progress towards its hundredth year. While at its incorporation in 1834, it was but a thriving village of 15,000 souls it is to-day a populous city of over 140,000 inhabitants. Its growth in population, in wealth, and in commercial importance, has been so rapid, so steady and so substantial as to make it pre-eminent among the inland cities of this great country. It is among the first twenty cities of the nation in population, and the fourth city in size and importance in this great Empire State. It is known throughout the broad extent of the nation, for its beauty, for its enterprise, for its progress, and for the intelligence, industry and thrift of its inhabitants.

Of such a city we may well be proud, and I trust, that through us, it may take no backward step; and I may in conclusion express the hope that when our terms of office shall end we may return to the people, able to say that we have done our duty, as we understand it, and that our sole aim has been to meet the wishes of our constituents, and to advance the interests of the community.

John A. P. Walters having received the required number of votes was declared duly appointed Fire Marshal.

Ald. Calihan moved to adopt rules of the old Board until further amended.

Adopted.

Ald. Calihan moved that old committees hold over until new ones are appointed.

Adopted.

By Ald. Calihan—Resolved, That the Democrat and Chronicle be and hereby is declared

the official paper of the City of Rochester; that the proceedings, resolutions and ordinances of this Board and of the Executive Board, and the list of lands sold for taxes; also the publication of the official nominations for office, be published in said paper at the uniform price of 30 cents per inch solid Nonpareil type; that all notices and advertisements of any and all officers of this city, be published at the uniform rate of 25 cents per inch solid Nonpareil type each insertion. Said Democrat and Chronicle to furnish without charge 150 copies of the Treasurer's detailed report in book form, bound in paper, and at the expiration of the year to furnish, free of charge in book form 200 copies of the official proceedings of the Common Council, bound in muslin, and 150 copies of the proceedings of the Executive Board, including indexes of each. Also to furnish free of charge, copies of its daily issue as follows: One copy to each of the following departments, viz: Mayor's office, City Clerk's office, City Attorney's office, Poor office, Police office, City Surveyor's office, Treasurer's office, Municipal Court and Executive Board, and the City Clerk's office the necessary copies containing the proceedings of the Common Council. The Mayor is hereby directed to enter into a contract with the proprietors of the Democrat and Chronicle in accordance with the terms of this resolution and in case the nominations for office be published but once, then the price for such publication shall be 60 cents per inch solid Nonpareil type.

FIRST ORDINANCES.

PIPE SEWER IN FINTRAY PLACE.

By Ald. Rauber—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a pipe sewer in Fintray place.

 AN ACT to amend chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act to further amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled 'An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester,' and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of said city," and the several acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, and as amended by chapter five hundred and sixty-one of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Sec. two hundred and forty-six of chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act to further amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled 'An act to amend and consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester,' and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of said city, and as amended by chapter five hundred and sixty-one of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety," is hereby amended adding to the end thereof the following: But said judges, or either of them, in any action or proceeding upon a trial by jury before either of them, shall have a right, and it shall be their duty, or the duty of either of them, in the proper case and for like cause, to direct the verdict of a jury to the manner of rendering the same, and as to the amount thereof, in the same manner, and to the same effect, and subject to the like objections and exceptions, as the verdicts of a jury in the courts of record of this state.

Sec. 2. Section two hundred and forty-nine of said chapter fourteen, is hereby amended, by adding to the end thereof, the following: Whenever any judgment shall, at any time hereafter, be rendered in and by said court, and shall be, at any time hereafter, filed and docketed in the office of the clerk of Monroe county, the said judgment shall become a judgment of the county court of Monroe county, and any suit, action or proceeding thereto may be had, taken or instituted, at any time within twenty years of the time of the rendition of said judgment by said municipal court, the same as if said judgment had been rendered by said county court.

Sec. 3. Section two hundred and fifty, of said chapter fourteen, is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

Sec. 250. In all actions brought in this court, there shall be allowed by way of indemnity to the prevailing party, and included in the judgment the following sums, as costs:

1. When the damages recovered amount to twenty-five dollars, but do not amount to one hundred dollars, the sum of three dollars.

2. When the damages recovered amount to one hundred dollars, and do not amount to three hundred dollars, the sum of five dollars.

3. When the damages recovered amount to three hundred dollars, and do not amount to five hundred dollars, the sum of seven dollars.

4. When the damages recovered amount to five hundred dollars, and do not amount to seven hundred dollars, the sum of ten dollars.

5. When the damages recovered amount to seven hundred dollars, or over, the sum of fifteen dollars.

6. When issue has been joined, and an actual trial had, upon a question of fact, there shall be allowed to the plaintiff, in addition to the sum hereinbefore specified, where the damages recovered do not amount to the sum of two hundred dollars, the sum of five dollars.

7. When the damages recovered amount to two hundred dollars, and do not amount to the sum of four hundred dollars, the sum of seven dollars.

8. When the damages recovered amount to four hundred dollars, and do not amount to seven hundred dollars, the sum of ten dollars.

9. When the damages recovered amount to seven hundred dollars, and over, the sum of fifteen dollars.

10. And, if on such trial, the defendant prevails, he shall be entitled to have judgment against the plaintiff for the amount of the fees and disbursements allowed the defendant by law, and, also, additional costs, as follows:

11. When the plaintiff shall have demanded in his complaint, or sought to obtain upon the trial, judgment against the defendant for any amount under two hundred dollars, the sum of five dollars, and when two hundred dollars, and less than four hundred dollars, the sum of seven dollars; and when four hundred dollars, and less than seven hundred dollars, ten dollars; and when over seven hundred dollars, fifteen dollars.

12. For the actual trial of an issue of fact, joined in a summary proceeding, the sum of five dollars. But neither of the trial fees above mentioned shall be allowed to the prevailing party, unless he appears by attorney, or by the clerk of an attorney; and the said judges, or either of them, may direct that the pleadings on the joinder of an issue shall be in writing and filed, and when a judgment of nonsuit, or no cause of action is rendered on such trial, the defendant shall be entitled to have judgment entered against the plaintiff for the amount of fees, costs and disbursements allowed the defendant by law, and also the additional costs provided for in this act.

13. In all actions and proceedings within the jurisdiction of a justices' court of the cities and towns of this state, the said city may charge and collect, and there shall be paid into said court the same fees and costs as provided by law for justices' courts, as provided in and by this act, except as herein otherwise provided, and in addition thereto said clerk or deputy clerk shall be entitled to demand, and there shall be paid into said court, for the use and benefit of the city, the following fees and costs: For the actual trial of an issue of fact, when the amount demanded by either of the parties in their respective pleadings is over one hundred dollars, to be paid by the party or parties demanding the same, twenty-five cents for each additional hundred or part thereof, so in excess of one hundred dollars.

14. And, for entry of judgment by default, for any sum less than one hundred dollars, the same fees as are now allowed by law in justices' court, and the sum of twenty-five cents for each additional hundred dollars, or part of a hundred dollars.

Sec. 4. Section two hundred and fifty-two of said chapter fourteen is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 252. The said court may have a clerk, to be appointed by said judges, such appointment to be in writing and filed with the clerk

of Monroe county. He shall take the usual oath of office, and file the same in the said clerk's office, and shall hold said office during the pleasure of said judges, and shall give bail for the faithful performance of his duty, in such form, and for such sum, and with such sureties, as shall be approved by said judges, and file the same with the treasurer of said city. It shall be the duty of said clerk to keep the docket of said court, a complete and accurate record of all process issued and returned to said court, of all proceedings in any action or proceeding brought in said court, and to enter in said docket the judgments and decisions of said court. And said docket shall be evidence in the courts of this state to the same extent as the docket of a justice of peace. It shall also be the duty of said clerk, and the deputy or deputies hereinafter mentioned, to keep a record and account of all moneys paid into said court, or received by said clerk or deputy clerk. The said clerk, being the custodian of the moneys coming into said court, to whom the deputies hereinafter mentioned shall report and account for the moneys coming into their hands as deputy clerk or clerks of said court. The said judges may appoint, and at pleasure remove, one, and if said judges shall deem it necessary, two stenographers for said court, each of whom shall be a deputy clerk of said court. The said judges shall file a certificate of the appointment or removal so made by them in the office of the clerk of Monroe county. Before executing the duties of this office each stenographer so appointed shall take and subscribe the constitutional oath of office and file the same with the clerk of said county, and shall give bail for the faithful performance of his duty in such form, and for such sum, and with such sureties as the judges of said court shall approve, and file the same with the treasurer of said city. It shall be the duty of such stenographer to take stenographic minutes of the testimony and other proceedings in all cases tried before the court, except when the judge sitting at the trial shall dispense with his services. He shall transcribe fully, and at length, the minutes of each case so taken by him, in written or printed characters when so desired by the court, and file the same with the clerk, who shall cause the same to be preserved with other papers in the state. The said stenographer shall preserve the original minutes taken by him, which shall be filed in the office of the clerk of said court. He shall deliver to his successor in office all the minutes taken by him which shall not have been filed with the clerk, and shall act in all matters connected with his office in accordance with the direction of the judges, and he may, after he shall have filed his minutes, furnish to any one applying therefor a transcript of said minutes, and may charge and receive therefor from the person to whom he shall furnish the same, the sum of three cents for each folio of one hundred words contained in said transcript. It shall also be the duty of the stenographer, or clerk, or deputy, to make the file in Monroe county clerk's office all returns on appeal in cases in which the minutes of testimony are taken by said stenographer, such return to be made in type or ordinary writing and certified by the judge who tried the cause. It shall also be the duty of said stenographer or stenographers to act as deputy clerks in the absence or inability of said clerk, or when the exigencies of the business of such court requires, or upon the request of either of the judges of said court; and, when acting as such deputy clerk he shall be clothed with the same powers as provided in and by this act for the clerk of said court, and to perform such other duties pertaining to the business of said court, as said judges may require. Said judges, clerk, deputy clerk and stenographers shall have

power to administer oaths and take acknowledgments, the same as justices of the peace of towns.

Sec. 5. Section two hundred and fifty-three of said chapter fourteen is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 253. In all actions and proceedings brought in said court, the said clerk or deputy clerk, shall demand and receive payment of all such fees for process making, making out and filing bonds, undertakings, affidavits, together with such fees or trial, judgment and other fees as are allowed by law in justices' courts; also, fees for jurors, when a jury trial is demanded, from the party demanding. And, in addition thereto, such other costs, fees and disbursements as are allowed by this act. And said clerk, or deputy clerk, shall keep an accurate minute in such case or proceeding upon the docket of said court, and a daily itemized account of the same, and, at the end of each month, shall deposit the amount thereof with the treasurer of said city. The statement thereof to be verified by said clerk, or, in his absence, or inability to act, by said deputy clerk, to be a true and correct account, and that the same embraces all the moneys paid into said court during the period covered by said statement.

Sec. 6. Section two hundred and fifty-four of said chapter fourteen is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 254. Said judges shall each be paid, in monthly payments, from and after the time this act takes effect, an annual salary of not less than thirty-five hundred dollars, to be fixed by the common council of said city, as other salaries are fixed, and shall receive to their own use no fees or other compensation for services as judges for said court. The said clerk shall be paid, in monthly payments, an annual salary of not less than twelve hundred dollars, to be fixed by said Common Council, and said stenographers or deputy clerk shall each be paid, in monthly payments, an annual salary of not less than eight hundred dollars, to be fixed by said common council.

Sec. 7. This act shall take immediately. By Ald. Lewis—Resolved, That the Hon. Members of the Senate and Assembly from this City, be and each is respectfully requested to secure the immediate passage of the Act amending the Charter of this city, relative to the Municipal Court of the city of Rochester, known as printed Assembly Bill No. 1391, with the following amendments thereto:

First:—By striking out the whole of the amendment to Sec. 249 of said Charter, and known as Sec. 2 of said Act found at page 2 of said printed bill.

Second:—By inserting on line 39 of page 5 of said printed bill the word "shall" in place of the word "may by striking out on lines 40 and 41, pages 5 and 6 the words and may charge and receive therefor from the person to whom he shall furnish the same sum" and inserting in place thereof the words, "for which a charge shall be made," and on line 42 after the word "transcript" by inserting the words "to be paid into said Court for the benefit of said city."

Third:—By striking out the whole of lines 3 to 11 inclusive on page 7, and inserting in place thereof the following: "Section 254. Said judges shall each be paid in monthly payments, from and after the time this act takes effect, an annual salary of not less than twenty-four hundred dollars nor more than thirty-five hundred dollars, and shall receive to their use no fees or other compensation for services as judges of said court, said clerk shall be paid, in monthly payments, an annual salary of not less than twelve hundred dollars nor more than eighteen hundred dollars, and said stenographers or deputy clerks shall each be paid, in monthly payments, an annual salary of not less than eight hundred dollars nor more than twelve

hundred dollars, all of said salaries to be fixed by the common council of the city of Rochester within thirty days after this act takes effect, and thereafter annually as other salaries are fixed by said common council.

To the Finance Committee of the Common Council:
 GENTLEMEN: I have to report that I have made the usual careful examination of the City

Treasurer's books and the general business of the office, in all its several departments, for the month of March, and that I find everything pertaining thereto in excellent working order and condition, and accurate in all particulars. This being the last month of the fiscal year, I have also carefully examined the Treasurer's annual report, recently presented to the Board, and I find that all the items therein presented are correct transcripts from the Treasurer's books, and that said report is unquestionably accurate and reliable in all its statements. The same general remarks will apply to the annual report of the finances of Mt. Hope Cemetery, which I have carefully reviewed and compared with the reports emanating from the Cemetery Department.

It is pleasant to remark, in this connection, that the management of this important trust is in excellent financial condition, as the following facts, taken from the report show: Receipts over expenditures for the past fiscal year, \$10,608.60. Total cash on hand, all deposited in city savings banks, \$76,891.68.

The cash on hand in the City Treasurer's office on the morning of April 6th, counted by me, was \$6,433.06, and was the exact sum called for by the ledger balance. At the same time and date, the balances called for as on deposit in the Central, Traders and German-American Banks, were \$21,288.78 in each of said banks, and on inquiry at the several banks named their credits to the city were as above stated.

In closing the financial and business examination of the City Treasurer's office for the fiscal year, it may not be considered out of place to refer to a matter of financial management in a certain direction—that relating to local assessments—which is certainly capable of great improvement, in regard to facilitating the collections of said assessments. Whatever the cause may be, there is altogether too much delay in placing the assessment rolls in the hands of the Treasurer for collection, and a remedy should be supplied to correct the remissness, as this is a matter of easy accomplishment. By the system in vogue, of having but one general fund, consisting of cash collected from the tax levy and amounts collected for the various improvements, it is essential, in order to avoid borrowing so heavily to meet the acceptances as they become due, that the assessment rolls be furnished the Treasurer at as early a date as possible, after the work is completed, and the cost of same certified to the Common Council.

In case this is done promptly, many parties are ready and willing, as experience shows, to pay their assessments just as soon as the bills are made out, and, in such cases the city would have the benefit of these payments; but if there is any delay in the Common Council as to confirming the rolls and ordering assessments to be made, or in the Assessors' Office in making the assessments, then it becomes necessary to borrow money on the city's notes to meet the payments due contractors.

The city, I find, has advanced on improvements thus made, for which no assessment rolls have been furnished the Treasurer for collection, the sum of \$451,148.62. Among the larger assessments are these:

cost of improvements to the amount of \$354,312.35, previous to January 1st, and since January 1st to the amount of \$96,836.27.

Now, if the assessment rolls above referred to, had been furnished the office for collection, the discount required to meet the city's obligations to contractors would have been very materially reduced, as must be very evident, and it is equally evident that many of said rolls ought to have been furnished long ago.

Upon the presentation of a petition, duly verified by five or more freeholders in the Tenth, Fifteenth and Twentieth wards of the City of Rochester, or in the Town of Gates, in the County of Monroe, to the County Court of Monroe County, praying for the appointment of a commission to ascertain and report whether a sewer, upon substantially the following route, namely, beginning at the intersection of the Buffalo road and Field street; thence running east on said Buffalo road and West avenue to Kossuth street; thence north to Maple street; thence to Deep Hollow creek; thence through and along Deep Hollow creek to, and into the Genesee river is necessary for the protection of the public health, the said County Court shall appoint a commission of three persons, who shall be residents and freeholders in said county, to hear and determine whether it is necessary for the public health that such sewer be constructed.

Sec. 2. The said commissioners shall, before they enter upon the duties of their office, make and file an oath with the clerk of said county, that they will faithfully discharge the duties of their office, according to the best of their knowledge and ability. A majority of the commissioners present at any meeting, of which all have had notice, may exercise the power of the commission. The said commissioners shall proceed, by personal view of the land and otherwise, to determine whether it is necessary for the public health that such sewer shall be con-

structed. They shall appoint a time and place for the first hearing of proofs and taking of evidence, touching the necessity for such sewer, and of which public notice shall be given, for at least ten days, in two of the daily newspapers published in the City of Rochester. Such hearing may be adjourned from time to time as is necessary, and at any of such hearings any person interested may appear and give evidence bearing upon the question, whether said sewer is necessary for the protection of the public health. After having heard the proofs and allegations produced before them, the said commissioners shall with all convenient speed, file in the office of the county clerk of said county, their determination, signed by them, or by a majority of them, if they do not all concur, as to the necessity of such sewer for the protection of the public health, together with the proofs, or evidence taken by them. Notice of their determination, and the time of filing of the same, shall be published in at least two of the daily newspapers of the City of Rochester.

Sec. 3. Anybody feeling aggrieved by the determination of the commissioners, that said sewer is necessary for the protection of the public health, if such shall be their determination, may appeal from such determination to the County Court, by giving written notice of such appeal to said commissioners within ten days after such determination shall have been filed in the office of the clerk of said county, and notice thereof published as aforesaid. In case an appeal is taken from such determination, the said court shall, upon motion of any party, on at least ten days notice given in writing to the party appealing, or by the party appealing to said commissioners, proceed to hear said appeal upon the report of said commissioners, and the proofs and evidence filed by them. If no appeal is taken from the determination of said commissioners, as herein provided, or if an appeal is taken and the decision of said commissioners is sustained by said court an order shall be entered in said court confirming said report, and a certified copy thereof attached to said report, which shall be filed and preserved as a judgment-roll in the matter of such proceeding. If the commissioners shall report that such sewer is not necessary for the public health, no further proceedings shall be had thereon. The attendance of witnesses in such proceeding, before such commissioners, may be compelled as in civil actions in the County Court, with like fees. The commissioners shall be entitled to five dollars a day for the time necessarily spent in the hearing and determination of such matter.

Sec. 4. If said commissioners shall report that such sewer is necessary for the public health, and such report shall be confirmed by the County Court of said county, said court shall thereupon, upon the application of the City Attorney of the City of Rochester or of any other person to have an interest in the matter of said sewer, appoint three persons, residents within the County of Monroe, residing in the City of Rochester, or in the Town of Gates, one of whom shall be an attorney at law, as commissioners of sewerage under this act; and the persons so appointed are authorized and empowered to lay out and construct a sewer of such dimensions and of such material, and in such manner, as in their judgment, shall be proper, between the points and upon, substantially, the route above specified. Said commissioners shall be known as commissioners of sewerage for the Tenth, Fifteenth and Twentieth wards in the City of Rochester, and the Town of Gates. They shall, before they enter upon the duties of their office, make and file an oath of office, with the county clerk of the County of Monroe, that they will faithfully discharge the duties of their office to the best of their knowledge and ability. A majority of the commissioners present at any meeting, of which all shall have notice, may exercise the

powers of the commission. They shall with all convenient speed, after qualifying as herein provided, meet and organize by appointing one of their members chairman, and treasurer and one secretary of the commission. Any two of the said offices may be held by the same person. The treasurer shall, during the continuance of said commission, collect and be the custodian of all moneys to be collected or received by the commissioners under the provisions of this act, and he shall pay out the moneys so received only upon the orders of the commissioners, signed by at least two of their number. The treasurer shall before he proceeds to collect any of the moneys, give a bond to the people of the state of New York in such an amount and in such sureties as shall be approved by a justice of the Supreme Court in the seventh judicial district, or by the county judge of Monroe county, conditioned for the faithful performance of the duties of his office, and file the same in said clerk's office. Any person may apply to any justice of the Supreme Court of said district, or to the judge of Monroe county, upon an affidavit showing the necessity therefor, for an order requiring said treasurer to show cause why an additional bond should not be filed, and upon the service of such order on said treasurer he shall not collect any more money until said justice or judge shall determine upon such application. Said judge or justice shall have the right to require such additional bond as to him shall seem necessary. Said justice or judge may accept a bond, guaranteed by some duly incorporated guarantee company, as a compliance with this statute. Said county judge of Monroe county may, at any time, upon application of the City Attorney of said city, or any person interested in the matter, remove said commissioners, or either of them, or any of their successors, for cause shown, after an opportunity shall have been afforded to the commissioner or commissioners sought to be removed, to answer such charges; and may also, at any time supply any vacancy in such commission, occasioned by death, resignation or otherwise.

Sec. 5. Said commissioners shall proceed, by personal review of the lands and otherwise, to determine the exact course of said sewer; and the lands through which the same shall be constructed; and the several parcels of land to be benefited thereby; and they shall cause an accurate survey of all such lands, and a map thereof shall be made, showing the course and extent of said sewer, as determined by them; and showing the several parcels of land that are proposed to be drained, and the several parcels or tracts determined by them to be benefited by such drainage, together with the names of the owners or occupants thereof, so far as the same with reasonable diligence can be ascertained by them; and the size of said sewer proposed to be constructed, and which they shall determine to be necessary for the drainage and sewerage of such lands; and are hereby authorized and empowered to employ a competent civil engineer with such assistants as shall be deemed necessary to act as such in such determination, and said commissioners and said civil engineer and his assistants are authorized and empowered to enter upon any and all of the lands deemed necessary by said commissioners, and to survey the same and take levels thereof, and to do all things necessary for the construction of such sewer, as they shall deem necessary for the drainage and sewerage of the land so surveyed by them.

Sec. 6. The said commissioners shall, upon the completion of said survey, and before the construction of said sewer, cause said map to be certified by them, with a statement written thereon, signed by them, or a majority of them, that they have determined that the sewer laid out upon said map, is necessary to drain and sewer the lands specified thereon, and should be constructed in or through such lands as necessary for the public health, to be

filed in the office of the clerk of the county of Monroe; and all lands, easements, rights of way, in, through or over the same, acquired under the terms of this act, shall be deemed and taken for public use, and for the benefit of the public health; said map, or a certified copy thereof, may be used in evidence in any suit or proceeding in this state. For the purpose of this act said commissioners may use and occupy any of the streets, highways, alleys, or other public places in said wards or town, and they may take and appropriate such lands and such real estate as they may deem proper for such purpose. In case said commissioners shall be unable to agree with the owner or owners of any lands or real estate taken by them for the purposes aforesaid, or any right or easement therein upon the compensation or damage to be paid therefor, they may apply to the Supreme Court, under the condemnation law, for the acquirement of such lands, easements or rights of way.

Sec. 7. Said commissioners shall, before entering upon the construction of said sewer, ascertain and determine, as nearly as may be, the cost and expense thereof, including damages and compensation to be made for lands or right of way taken, which statement shall be verified by said commissioners, or a majority of them, and shall apportion the cost so ascertained upon the several tracts or parcels of land included in said map, situate and being within the wards of the City of Rochester, or the Town of Gates, in the County of Monroe, and the owners or occupants thereof, if ascertained, as they shall deem to be benefited by such sewer, in proportion to the amount of benefit which each shall be deemed by said commissioners to receive therefrom. Such apportionment shall be in the usual form of an assessment-roll, and shall specify the names of the owners or occupants of the lots or parcels of land intended to be assessed, if known, or shall describe said lots and parcels of land by any description that shall fairly distinguish the same, without reference to the owners or occupants. After such assessment shall have been completed, the said commissioners shall meet at some place designated by them in the City of Rochester, to hear the allegations and objections of all persons interested in the assessment, of which at least ten days previous notice shall be given, in at least two daily newspapers published in said city. The said commissioners shall, at the time and place specified in said notice, and for a period of one week from such time, hear the allegations and objections of said persons interested in said lands as shall appear before them. Said assessment-roll shall there be open to the examination and inspection of all persons interested, between the hours of nine and twelve in the morning and two and four in the afternoon, from and after the first publication of said notice until the last day for hearing allegations in reference thereto. After such allegations are closed said commissioners shall proceed to review said assessment, and are hereby authorized to make such corrections therein as they may deem proper, and may decrease, or increase any assessment made by them to such an amount as to them shall seem fair and equitable; and when said review shall be completed by said commission, the same shall be verified by the oath of the commissioners by whom it is made, to the effect that the same is in all respects just and true to the best of their judgment and belief. When such assessment-roll shall be completed as revised, the same, or a copy thereof shall be filed with the county clerk of Monroe county, and from the time of such filing, shall be and remain a lien and charge upon the lands against which it is made until fully paid, or otherwise discharged; and shall also create a personal obligation or liability against the person assessed, and who is the owner of any lot, to pay said commissioners the amount of such assessment for the collection of which, together with interest, cost and

expenses, said commissioners may maintain in their name as commissioners, an action in court of competent jurisdiction, in addition to any other remedies herein provided for the collection thereof. Such assessment shall be made payable in three equal payments; one-third within thirty days, one-third within one year, and one-third within two years from the time when said roll shall be filed with said clerk as aforesaid, and notice thereof given as hereinbefore provided. Notice of the filing of such completed assessment-roll, and of the place where the assessments levied therein are payable, shall be published at least five times in two of the daily newspapers of the City of Rochester, immediately after the filing of such roll. Any person who is assessed, as hereinbefore provided, may, within the thirty days, before any installment shall become due, pay the amount of said installment without any fees for the collection thereof; and any person may within the thirty days before the first installment becomes due, pay the whole amount of such assessment, and upon such payment shall be entitled to a rebate or discount of the second and third installments at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, for the period between the date of payment and the date of maturity of such installment. At the expiration of the said thirty days from the time of filing such revised assessment-roll, the said commissioners may issue their warrant for the collection of any installment of such assessment then remaining unpaid and due, together with interest thereon, at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, together with five per cent. as fees for the collection of the same, which warrant may be issued to any collector or collectors appointed by said commissioners to collect such assessment, and shall be returned in not less than thirty days from the date of the issue of the same. Such collector or collectors shall proceed to collect such assessments in the manner provided by law for the collection of taxes in the City of Rochester, and shall, upon the return day of said warrant, return the same to said commissioners, with their proceedings thereon.

Sec. 8. In case any assessment is returned by said collector or collectors, as uncollected, the said commissioners shall proceed to make a proper description of the land on which such unpaid assessments are laid, and cause a notice of such assessments and description of the several parcels of land upon which the same are laid, to be published twice a week for six successive weeks, in two or more of the daily newspapers published in said city of Rochester, together with a notice that if the said assessments, the interest and fees thereon, are not paid, with the expense of advertising, on or before a day to be named therein, which shall not be less than six weeks from the first publication thereof, the lands so described will be sold at public auction on the day and hour and at the place named in said notice, to the person or persons who will take them for the shortest period of time and pay the assessment and expense incurred thereon, respectively, with interest. On the day designated, or such other day to which the said sale may be adjourned, the said premises shall be so sold, and the said commissioners on receiving the amount of said assessment, fees, interest and expense, shall give to the purchaser or purchasers thereof, a certificate of such sale, duly acknowledged, which certificate shall be presumptive evidence of all the facts stated therein, and may be recorded in the clerk's office of Monroe County, as the evidence of mortgaged sales, is authorized to be recorded. If at such sale, no bid to the amount of the assessment thereon and expense of sale shall be made for any such parcel of land, the same shall be struck off to said commissioners as such, and they shall make a memorandum of the fact that the land was so struck off, in a book to be kept by them for that purpose,

and wherever any such lands have been struck off to such commissioners, they shall as such commissioners, acquire a title to such lands in fee, clear of claim or demand from any owner thereof, or any person having any lien thereon, or interest therein, except the county of Monroe and the City of Rochester, for any unpaid tax or assessment, unless the same shall be redeemed as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 9. The owner, mortgagee, occupant, or any other person interested in and entitled to redeem lands sold on execution, may at any time within one year from the date of such sale, redeem the land so sold, as provided for in this act, by paying to the purchaser at such sale, or to the treasurer of said commission, for his or their use, the said purchase money, with ten per cent. in addition thereto; and a certificate of said treasurer stating the payment and showing what land the payment is intended to redeem, shall be evidence of such redemption, and may be filed in the county clerk's office of Monroe county. The same proceedings may be had upon the coming due of any installment of said assessment, after the first, as herein provided for, in case of such first installment.

Sec. 10. Said sewer shall be constructed by contract, and said commissioners are hereby authorized and empowered to make all necessary contracts therefor; and a contract for the construction of the same in such sections or parts as they shall determine. All contracts where the price or amount shall exceed one hundred dollars shall be made only after advertising for and receiving proposals as hereinafter specified. Such advertisement shall be published for ten days in at least two daily newspapers published in the City of Rochester. Said commissioners shall have the power to reject all bids or proposals, if, in their judgment, it is expedient so to do, and may further advertise for proposals as often as they shall deem necessary. They shall require any and all persons with whom they contract, as aforesaid, for the construction of said sewer, or any part thereof, to give sufficient security, to be approved by said commissioners in double the amount of the contract price, conditioned for the faithful performance of the said contract, and with the further condition that the said contractor will pay all damages and expenses incurred by any person, association or corporation, by reason of the default, or wrongful or negligent act of said contractor, his agents or servants, in or about the execution of his contract; and promptly restore to its former condition the surface of any highway, street or other place necessarily excavated or obstructed in the execution of his contract; and pay or cause to be paid the wages and compensation of all laborers who shall be employed in working on or about the improvements mentioned in said contract. Actions on such bond or undertaking may be brought by or in the name of a laborer or laborers claiming to be secured thereby, or his or their assignee; and separate actions may be brought by each and any number of such laborers or their assignees. No action or proceedings, however, shall be commenced upon such bond or undertaking after six months from the date when the cause of action accrued.

Sec. 11. Such commissioners are hereby authorized and empowered to issue, as such commissioners, certificates of evidence of indebtedness, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, in payment of any lands, easements, rights of way, work, materials, or other expenses which shall have been incurred in or about the construction of said sewer, which certificates or evidence of indebtedness shall be receivable in payment of such assessments at their face value with accrued interest.

Sec. 12. In case the said commissioners shall at any time determine that the amount levied and collected by the assessment hereinbefore provided for, is insufficient to defray the ex-

pense of completing said sewer, and said commissioners record in their proceedings a resolution to that effect, specifying the amount, in their opinion, of such deficiency, the said commissioners are authorized to levy a further assessment or assessments from time to time, as shall be necessary to defray such expenses, the proceedings in reference to which shall be in all respects, as far as practicable, the same as hereinbefore provided for in the first or original assessment.

Sec. 13. In case such commissioners shall deem it necessary to raise funds for the construction of said sewer, before the assessment hereinbefore provided for can be made and collected, the said commissioners are hereby empowered from time to time to borrow so much money as, in their opinion, may be necessary therefor, and to issue evidence of indebtedness in such sums and form as they may deem proper, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, the principal thereof payable in not more than ten years. Such certificates of indebtedness shall be negotiable by delivery, and shall be receivable in payment of any assessment levied by such commissioners; and the interest thereon shall be assessed as a part of the expense, in the construction of said sewer.

Sec. 14. Said commissioners shall keep a record of their proceedings in a book or books to be provided for that purpose, and shall also keep an account in proper account books, of all moneys collected or disbursed by them.

Sec. 15. Neither of the commissioners appointed by or under the provisions of this act, shall be liable personally upon any contract made, or certificate of indebtedness issued by him or them, as such commissioner or commissioners, nor for any act done by him or them, under the provisions of this act, unless such act shall be willful and intentional wrong on his part.

Sec. 16. The commissioners appointed by, and under this act, shall for each day actually and necessarily spent by them in the performance of their duties as such commissioners, receive the following compensation; the commissioner who is a lawyer ten dollars, and the others five dollars; and in no case shall the annual compensation of any commissioner exceed, for the commissioner who is a lawyer, two thousand four hundred dollars, and the commissioners who are not, one thousand two hundred dollars each. No commissioner shall be directly or indirectly interested in any contract with reference to the construction of said sewer, as principal, surety or otherwise, except as such commissioner.

Sec. 17. In case any assessment shall remain unpaid on account of any irregularity, omission or error in any of the proceedings relating thereto, or in case of error in the description of the lands, or the designation of the owner or occupants said commissioners shall proceed to correct such irregularity, omission or error in such assessment-roll when discovered, and such correction shall have the same effect as if the assessment had originally been properly made.

Sec. 18. The commissioners in this act first provided for, shall be entitled to receive five dollars per day for each day spent in the discharge of their duties, which shall be paid by the party taking up their report, and if their report is, that such sewer is necessary for the public health, their fees and the expenses of the witnesses attending before them, shall be reported by them to the commissioners secondly provided for herein, and shall be levied and collected as a part of the expense of constructing the sewer herein provided for.

Sec. 19. The compensation of the commissioners herein secondly provided for; of the engineers and their assistants employed to make the surveys and maps; all expenses for necessary clerical force and stationery; for advertising and all other expenses necessarily in-

curring in carrying into effect the provisions of this act, shall be deemed a part of the expense for the construction of said sewer, and shall be collected by assessment, as hereinbefore provided.

Sec. 20. Upon the completion of said sewer, the said commissioners shall file with the clerk of the City of Rochester, the record of their proceedings, together with their books of account, and all contracts and other papers relating thereto, which shall be kept by said clerk as a part of the records of said City of Rochester; and copies of the same certified by said clerk shall be prima facie evidence thereof in all courts and places. They shall turn over to the Treasurer of the City of Rochester, all moneys on hand and uncollected assessments, and he shall from and after that time discharge all duties and possess all powers imposed upon or vested in the treasurer of said commission by virtue of the provisions of this act.

Sec. 21. The sewer provided for by this act, after its completion shall, as to the portion thereof within the limits of the city of Rochester, be under the charge of the Executive Board of said city, or its successor, and the portion in the town aforesaid, shall be under the charge of the supervisor and commissioner of highways thereof; and it shall be lawful for such Executive Board, or said supervisor and commissioner to authorize the introduction into said sewer of lateral sewers and drains, for the purpose of draining any part of said city or town. While the work of constructing said sewer is in progress, the said commissioners may allow lateral sewers or drains to be constructed therewith, upon such terms and subject to such regulations as they shall provide.

Sec. 22. Chapter one hundred and fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-one, entitled "An act to authorize and provide for the construction of a sewer, drain and ditch in the Ninth and Fifteenth wards of the City of Rochester, and in the Towns of Gates and Chili, in the County of Monroe," is hereby repealed.

Sec. 23. This act shall take effect immediately.

The committee is led to this conclusion by the conviction that a larger portion of the expense of the construction of such bridges should be borne by local assessment upon the territory immediately adjacent to said bridges.

It would seem to the members of the committee that bridges must be constructed at once, and while not committing themselves to any plan or theory of assessment, at this time,

they are of opinion that the necessary authority should be procured at once, and therefore respectfully recommend the approval of the said bill amended as heretofore indicated.

AN ACT to authorize the City of Rochester to issue bonds for the purpose of repairing, reconstructing or constructing bridges across the Genesee river in the city of Rochester.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Common Council of the city of Rochester may, from time to time hereafter, whenever deemed necessary by it for the purpose of repairing, reconstructing or constructing the bridges commonly known as the Clarissa street bridge, Andrews street bridge and Court street bridge over the Genesee river within said city, or any one or more of them, authorize the city treasurer to issue the bonds of the said city to the amount, not exceeding, in the aggregate, the sum of \$150,000, running for a period not exceeding thirty years, and bearing a rate of interest not greater than will be sufficient to effect a sale of such bonds at par. Said bonds, when issued, shall be countersigned by the mayor and the president of the Common Council, and may be made redeemable at any time after fifteen years from the issue thereof, as may be determined by the Common Council at or before the time of the issue of the same, and a complete record shall be made and kept by said treasurer of said bonds, including the dates and amounts, and the respective dates of maturity thereof, and to whom issued, if registered.

Section 2. The several banks of the city of Rochester, including the savings banks and the Rochester Trust and Safe Deposit Company, are hereby authorized to receive and keep on deposit any moneys raised by the sale, or for the payment, of said bonds, and to pay on such deposit the same rate of interest as that of the bonds of which such deposits are the proceeds respectively, and each and every bank receiving such deposits, as aforesaid, shall execute and give to said city a bond, with sufficient sureties, conditioned to save said city, harmless of and from any loss by reason of such deposits: said bonds to be approved by the mayor as to their amount and sufficiency, and by the city attorney as to the form thereof.

Section 3. Said Common Council may, for the purpose of paying any of the bonds issued under the provisions of this act, in addition to any sum or sums of money now or hereafter permitted to be raised by law, with the general taxes of said city, raise annually a sum of money, not exceeding six thousand dollars, for the creation of a sinking fund for the payment of said bonds, which sum shall, on the first day of September next after the addition of the same to any city tax, be deposited by said treasurer in one or more of the above named banking institutions within said city, in proportion as may be determined by said Common Council, and such sums, after being so deposited, shall not be withdrawn, except by resolution of said Common Council, approved by the mayor, and then only for the purposes of the payment of any of said bonds.

Section 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

PIPE SEWER IN STEWART STREET.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a sewer in Stewart street.

To the Honorable, the Common Council, of the City of Rochester:
 GENTLEMEN:—Your Law Committee begs leave to submit the following report:

In the matter of the claim of Julia A. Wichman for damages caused by the discharge of sewage upon her premises from the sewers

of the city since August 20th, 1887, has been considered by your Committee, and inasmuch as the claimant purchased the property a long period after such sewage flowed through the premises, and she bought the same with full knowledge thereof, we recommend that her claim be denied.

On the 29th day of February, 1892, a judgment was entered against the city for \$373.50, damages and costs in the case of Hugh Kelly against the city. The time for an appeal has expired, and we are advised by the City Attorney that there are no questions of law involved in the case which would warrant an appeal to the courts above, and we, therefore, recommend that said judgment be paid.

In the matter of the application of A. H. Baumer for appointment as Commissioner of Deeds, we recommend that his application be denied, upon the ground that the same does not comply with the rules of this Board.

In the matter of the claim of Anna M. Camp for damages caused by the pollution of Thomas Creek running through her premises, we find that she has begun an action against the city, asking damages from April 7th, 1886, and that she is entitled to such damages and can recover the same against the city; that a proposition of settlement has been made by her attorneys to settle the claim at the rate of sixty dollars per year, to begin on said April 7th, 1886, and we recommend that the same be accepted.

The claim of Lewis Herman for similar damage caused by the pollution of Densmore creek running through his premises, has been also considered by your Committee, and we find that he also has an action pending against the city for damages from January 11th, 1889. He has made a proposition through his attorneys, to settle said claim at the rate of one hundred dollars per year, to begin on said January 11th, 1889, and we recommend that the same be accepted.

The claim of H. C. Livingston for similar damages caused by the pollution of Densmore creek flowing through his premises, has also been considered by your Committee, and we find that an action is pending against the city for damages from January 8th, 1889, and that he is entitled to the same, and a proposition having been made to your Committee to settle the same at the rate of sixty dollars per year, we recommend that the same be accepted.

In the matter of the applications of H. L. Hilgendorf, Della A. Dugan, Jacob Spahn, J. J. Schueler, James M. Aikenhead, J. Hasweick, Charles F. Shroeder, H. J. Forrester, Henry N. Brayer, Henry V. Clark, S. D. Raynor, Robert Averill, J. F. Wilbur, H. Ethel Perrine, Dougal Bubyyear, and David W. Bruce, for appointment as Commissioners of Deeds, we recommend that the same be granted.

It has been brought to the attention of this Committee, in settling the several claims for damages caused by sewage pollution, that the present North avenue sewer empties into a ditch running from North avenue to Norton street, where the proposed East Side Trunk Sewer is to be constructed; that the contracts which have been let by the Sewer Commission cover that part of Norton street through which this ditch runs. In order to have these damages discontinued, it is necessary to extend the North avenue outlet sewer to the East Side Trunk Sewer on Norton street. This extension ought to be constructed immediately after the East Side Trunk Sewer, west of North avenue is completed. The Committee has been informed by the City Surveyor that the construction of the extension of North avenue outlet sewer can be begun immediately after the East Side Trunk sewer, west of North avenue, is completed. We, therefore, recommend that the City Surveyor

be instructed to prepare an ordinance for the construction of the extension of the North avenue outlet sewer to the East Side Trunk Sewer on Norton street.

In the matter of the revision or the rules of this Common Council, referred to this Committee, we recommend that Section 1 of the ordinance in relation to the meetings of the Common Council, passed April 3, 1884, be amended so that the meetings held by the Common Council during the months of May, June, July, August and September convene at the hour of 7:30 P. M., instead of 7 P. M.

We also recommend that Rule 44 be amended so as to require the vote of fifteen members in the affirmative to pass a resolution to change the name of a street, etc.

We also recommend that Rule 46 shall be the rule as adopted by this Common Council November 6, 1890, as set forth in the Common Council proceedings of that year.

We also recommend that Rule 47 shall read as follows:

"All applications for Commissioners of Deeds of the City of Rochester must be in writing, signed by the applicant, and said application shall set forth the residence, age, occupation and citizenship of the applicant; such application must also be accompanied by a written recommendation and certificate of the good moral character of the applicant, signed by two known and reputable citizens of the City of Rochester. All applications shall be referred to the Law Committee, and laid over two weeks before the same can be acted upon. No person shall be appointed a Commissioner of Deeds unless he is of the age of twenty-one years, and a citizen of the United States."

We also recommend that Rule 48 shall read as follows:

"All matters to be presented and referred to the Assessment Committee must be in writing, signed and verified by the applicant or aggrieved party, or his agent, setting forth in a concise way the facts and grounds for complaint, the residence and postoffice address of the party or his agent, and the relief desired.

We also recommend that present Rule 46 shall hereafter be designated as Rule 49.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Your Assessment Committee to whom was referred the petition of certain property owners who are to be assessed for the construction of the East Main street sewer, beg leave to submit the following as their report:

Your committee held a special meeting on Friday of last week to consider the prayer of said petitioners, at which arguments for and against the confirmation of the re-assessment roll for said sewer were made by the parties interested therein. The demand for the construction of said sewer, so far as your honorable body is concerned, dates back to the 15th day of July, 1890, when a petition was presented praying for the construction of a suitable stone sewer in East Main street from University avenue to East avenue, which petition was referred to the City Surveyor to prepare an ordinance. The City Surveyor was directed to ascertain and report the expense of constructing said sewer. On August 12, 1890, an ordinance was adopted for the construction of said sewer from a point 20 feet east from the northeast corner of Franklin and East Main streets, measured on the north line of East Main street to the center of University avenue, and describing one tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of East Main street, from Franklin street to University avenue as the property deemed benefited and properly to be assessed for the expense thereof, according to benefits received. At the following meeting a majority remonstrance was presented protesting against the construction of said sewer as contemplated by said ordinance on the ground that when a sewer should be constructed, it should be built from Gibbs street to the Liberty Pole, and because the present sewer east of Gibbs street was adequate to all public demands. At the same meeting a communication was received from the City Surveyor recommending that said ordinance be amended so as to call for the construction of said sewer from the point near Franklin street designated in the ordinance to the center of Alexander street, instead of University avenue. The said ordinance was thereupon amended as recommended. A special committee was appointed to consider the question involved in the remonstrance to the construction of said sewer, which makes its report, and recommended the passage of the ordinance then pending, and in accordance with such recommendation, your honorable body passed the Final Ordinance for the construction of said sewer from the point mentioned on Main street to the center of Alexander street, and provided for an assessment of the property from Franklin street to Alexander street. Said sewer was constructed as called for by said ordinance, and the City Treasurer reported the total expense thereof and an assessment was ordered. The assessment roll was prepared and presented to the Council and confirmed. This assessment imposed upon the property owners to be assessed a uniform rate of \$5.21 per foot front. A majority remonstrance was presented against the confirmation of this roll, which was referred to the Assessment Committee, and on the 15th day of December, 1891, the resolution of July 14, 1891, directing an assessment for said sewer was re-considered and a re-assessment was ordered. The re-assessment as presented by the Clerk was confirmed, but action on the same, later at the same meeting, was postponed for one week. Said re-assessment imposed upon the property situated between

Franklin and Gibbs street, a uniform rate of \$8.10 per foot front. From Gibbs street to University avenue; \$5.50 per foot front. From University avenue to Union street, \$4.21 per foot front. From Union street to Alexander street, \$2.55 per foot front. At the meeting held the following week, the confirmation of said re-assessment was again postponed for one week while the petition above mentioned asking for a re-hearing for said re-assessment was referred to your committee.

We have considered carefully the arguments presented by the respective parties for and against the confirmation of said roll, and have informed ourselves from all available sources with reference to the equity of said re-assessment. We find that there was no public sewer from Gibbs street to Franklin street in that portion of the territory through which said new sewer extended, and that from Gibbs street east along said territory, there was in existence a public sewer which answered in some degree the requirements of the territory drained by it. We find that at the east end of said territory, the new sewer is but little, if any, deeper than the old. We find that the demand for said new sewer came principally from persons owning property on that portion where there was no sewer, and that the objections thereto, came from persons owning property along the line of said old sewer. We find that the remonstrance to the old assessment which imposed a uniform rate upon all of the territory to be assessed, came principally from those persons owning property along the line of said old sewer, and that the objection to the confirmation of the re-assessment comes principally from persons owning property along the west end of said new sewer where the assessment has been increased. We find that the re-assessment increases the assessment on territory between Franklin and Gibbs streets, \$2.99 a foot front, and from Gibbs street to University avenue, 29c per foot front, and decreases the assessment from University avenue to Union street, \$1 per foot front, and decreases it from Union street to Alexander street, \$2.66 per foot front.

In view of all these facts, after a thorough consideration of the matter, and considering the difficulty of making an assessment which will be entirely equitable and satisfactory in the opinion of those persons who are assessed, we have concluded to recommend the confirmation of the assessment roll now before the Council, and do recommend the confirmation thereof.

GENTLEMEN:—The undersigned City Assessors beg leave to submit to your Honorable Body the following as their report in the matter of the Lyell avenue and Saxton street outlet sewer, pursuant to the resolution passed April 19th, 1892, as to what steps are necessary to be taken to procure the preparation of an assessment for the Lyell avenue and Saxton street outlet sewer:

On the 21st day of April, 1891, your Honorable Body confirmed the assessment for the construction of said sewer under Ordinance No. 3,537, which was designated as Section 1, and under Ordinance No. 3,538, which was designated as Section 2, the total amount of said assessments being \$22,880.78. We find that the city treasurer certified on the 10th day of March, 1891, that he had received from the State Treasurer the sum of \$23,212.94, as the amount appropriated for the expense of said sewer by the State, leaving the sum of \$20,637.84, to be assessed upon the territory included within said ordinance for the expense of the construction of said sewer.

At the same meeting of your Honorable Body Messrs. Martin Joiner and Dwight Knapp were appointed Special Commissioners for Section 1 of said sewer, to act with L. A. Pratt, one of the City Assessors, and the only City Assessor qualified to act in said matter, and Richard H. Schooley and John A. Bernhard, for Section 2 of said sewer, to act with Mr. Pratt. We find that these Special Commissioners have duly qualified, but have not performed any duties under appointment, and, inasmuch as the term of office of Mr. Pratt as City Assessor, has expired, and his successor has been appointed, it will be necessary to designate some person to act with these Special Commissioners in making said assessments. The only one of the City Assessors who is qualified to act is Henry C. Munn, but the work devolving upon the City Assessor is such that if your Honorable Body should designate him to act in the matter, it would be impossible for him to take part in the preparation of said assessments until about the first of next July.

We understand that the city charter permits the appointment of one or more Special Commissioners to act with the Assessors who are not disqualified, in making an assessment, or the selection of three Special Commissioners to act independently of said Assessors. As this sewer was constructed under two ordinances, it would seem proper to appoint some competent person to act with the Commissioners already appointed to make the assessments.

GENTLEMEN:—Your Map and Survey Committee begs leave to make the following report:

In the matter of the recent action of the East Side Trunk Sewer Commission in appointing a Superintending Engineer in and about the construction of the East Side Trunk Sewer, we learn that such a Superintending Engineer was appointed to take the exclusive charge and control of the construction of said sewer. The plans of the lower portion of said sewer were drawn by the Surveyor of the city, and pursuant to such plans the recent contracts were let. The Commission, however, has for some reason seen fit to substitute for the further services of the City Surveyor by the terms of the contract, the services of a so-called Superintending Engineer.

We are of the opinion that under the statute creating the East Side Trunk Sewer Commission, it has no power to appoint a surveyor or engineer to take independent and sole charge of such work. By said statute the Commission has no greater power than the present Executive Board in relation to the construction of sewers. All sewers constructed in this city by the Executive Board are under the supervision of the City Surveyor.

We cannot see by what authority or power this Commission can employ an independent surveyor and engineer to construct this sewer, and we would respectfully recommend that

this matter be referred to the Law Committee and they be requested to submit their opinion as to the legality of such appointment to the Common Council at its next meeting.

To the Honorable, the Common Council,

GENTLEMEN:—Your Finance Committee in submitting the annual tax levy for the year, begs leave to make the following explanations in reference to such of the items therein, as are hereinafter mentioned: The item for support of the Police Department, is increased by the sum of \$5,000. This is made necessary by the increase of twenty-five men in the Police force made last year. It is also believed that the appropriation provided in the levy will enable the department to place their patrol wires under-ground.

Owing to the careful management of the Poor Department during the past year, the appro-

priation for that department is reduced \$5,000 from last year's amount.

The appropriation for lighting the city has been reduced \$15,000 from last year's figures.

Contingent Fund deficiency notes during the last fiscal year amounted to but \$75,000, as against \$92,000 during the preceding year.

The Board of Health Fund is increased \$2,000 over last year's appropriation, by reason of the extension of the system of garbage collection.

The Water Pipe Extension Fund is increased from \$50,000 to \$60,000, with the intention of repaying to citizens some portion of the moneys advanced by them for water extension during the past three years.

An item of \$40,000 is also included in the tax levy to provide for the deficiency note issued to pay for the extension of the Holley system to East Rochester.

The Highway Fund of the Executive Board is reduced from \$180,000 to \$175,000. This committee is of the opinion that too much money has heretofore been expended out of this fund in repairs on worn out pavements, and that ordinances should be prepared for repairing such streets as are worn out, and that the Highway Fund should be relieved from the maintenance of such streets.

The amount included in the tax levy for the support of the public schools is \$326,500 as against \$367,000 appropriated in last year's tax levy.

The item of \$40,000 for the Building Fund of the Board of Education will be increased by the proceeds of the sale of old No. 10 school building and site, which will probably amount to at least \$15,000, making a total of \$55,000.

It will be remembered that an item of \$40,000 was included in the levy last year for the construction of the new No. 10 School. It will thus be seen that the appropriation is within \$500 of last year's amount.

There is also included in the above amount \$1,500 for Library purposes under the recent amendment to the City Charter.

In connection with the appropriation for the Board of Education, your Finance Committee feels that duty requires it to say, that it is unwilling to make any provision in this tax levy, for deficiencies left over by the various committees of former Boards of Education. This committee does not recognize the right of any committee of the Board of Education to exceed the amount set apart for its purposes during any year. The appropriations made last year by the Common Council for the use of the Board of Education, were understood to be sufficient to meet its requirements, and to provide for the deficiencies which they had at that time to meet. An item was also included last year of \$40,000 for the erection of the new No. 10 School, and it was supposed that that would meet the entire expense of purchasing a site, and erecting that school house. We are informed, however, that the Board of Education has expended upwards of \$62,000 on No. 10 School, and that there are over \$3,000 of unpaid bills still to be met. It has seemed to your Finance Committee, that the amount allowed to the Board of Education this year, is ample for all its requirements, and that there can be no excuse at the end of the year for any deficiencies.

The Finance Committee is compelled this year to face the deficiency caused by the settlement of the liabilities of the John A. Davis bonds. The entire deficiency amounted to \$62,751.74; of this amount the City has received \$36,050, and the balance \$26,701.74 is included in the present tax levy.

The sum of \$15,000 is for the erection of one new hose house, to be located either in the Tenth Ward or the Eighteenth Ward, as may be hereafter determined. This house is made necessary by the rapid growth of these wards, and the large manufacturing interests located therein, and it is believed that the time has

arrived when they should be more fully protected than heretofore.

In the examination of the City's finances, the attention of the committee has been called to an amount of \$81,000 belonging to the City on deposit with the various Savings Banks of the City. This sum has accumulated during the past twenty years, and is the excess of receipts of interest on the Rochester & Genesee Valley Railroad Company stock owned by the City, over and above the amount the City has been required to pay in interest upon the bonds issued in aid of the construction of that Railroad after paying off four bonds amounting to \$4,000 each year.

It has seemed to the committee that instead of leaving that amount in the Banks, where it is drawing but four per cent. interest, it would be better to use that money in reducing the annual tax levy, but it is not deemed advisable at this time, and in no event until after mature deliberation, and full discussion to make any recommendation in reference thereto.

If, upon the final adoption of the tax levy by this Council, it should appear to be for the best interests of the city that that amount should be used in reducing it, a resolution can be presented to that effect at that time.

In conclusion the committee deems it but proper to say, that in fixing the appropriations for the various departments, the committee has tried to be fair, and it believed that the amounts granted are sufficient, with prudent management, to meet the expense of carrying on the City's business. And in the event that the departments and committees will commence the year's business with the full understanding that the year's appropriation must pay for the year's expenses, it will not be necessary to issue the City's notes to prevent deficiencies.

"To the Law Committee of the Common Council."

"GENTLEMEN: In the question which you have submitted to me whether the East Side Trunk Sewer Commission has power to appoint an Engineer or Surveyor to take independent and sole control of the engineering work on the improvement, in charge, I have assumed that the Trunk Sewer Commission has employed a person under the title of Superintending Engineer to make all surveys, and prepare all plans for the execution of the work by the Commission.

The powers and duties of the East Side Trunk Sewer Commission are defined in Section 18 of the Trunk Sewer act, as amended by the laws of 1892, in the following language: "They, (the Commission), shall have the same powers, and be subject to the same duties and responsibilities in reference to all matters pertaining to said trunk sewer as the said members of said Executive Board." The Commission may also "let all contracts, or do any other act in reference to said sewer which may be done by the Executive Board in regard to any improvement." By this section the Commission has no greater or different powers in the construction of the trunk sewer than the Executive Board has in the construction of sewers and improvements in the City of Rochester.

It will be necessary to give the history of the laws creating the present Executive Board, in order to fully understand the powers with which the Board is clothed:

Title 7 of chapter 143 of the laws of 1861 was devoted to streets and public improvements

in the City of Rochester. In this title, the Common Council was designated as the Commissioners of Highways, it having the sole care and superintendence of all improvements, as well as the power to determine and make improvements, and order assessments therefor.

In the year 1872, section 155 of this title was amended by chapter 771 of the laws of that year, so as to create what was known as the Board of Commissioners of Public Works of the City of Rochester, to whom was delegated the exclusive care and superintendence of all improvements in the city, together with the power of determining and making such improvements, and ordering assessments therefor.

Section 16 of this amendatory act reads as follows: "The City Surveyor and City Attorney shall perform such duties for said Commissioners as they may require, as it is now the duty of said officers respectively to perform under the direction or at the request of the Common Council, or any committee thereof, without compensation beyond their salaries as now provided by law."

This amendatory act remained in force until the year 1876, when said section 155 of title 7 was again amended by chapter 83 of the laws of 1876. By this amendment, the Board of Commissioners of Public Works was abolished, and the Executive Board was created, whose duty was defined to have sole power to let all contracts to be made by said city in pursuance of any ordinance, except such as were by law directed to be otherwise made, and superintend the execution of the same, and have the superintendence and control of all work or improvements ordered by the Common Council, and of paying the same. By this amendment the Executive Board was also empowered to "employ such assistants, and establish such by-laws for its meetings and proceedings as it may see fit." The power conferred by the laws of 1872 upon the Commissioners of Public Works to determine and make improvements, and order assessments therefor, was by this amendment again placed in the Common Council.

Chapter 190 of the laws of 1879, again amended section 155, title 7, which diminished the number of the members of the Executive Board, but left the powers of the Board defined in the identical language of the laws of 1876 creating it. The language empowering the Board to employ assistants also remained unchanged.

By chapter 14 of the laws of 1880, the Legislature amended the original charter of the City of Rochester enacted in 1861, and consolidated therewith the several acts in relation thereto. Title 7 of the original act was designated in this consolidation act as referring to "The Executive Board, Streets and Improvements." The power of the Executive Board relating to improvements was defined in the laws of 1880, as having "the sole power to let all contracts to be made by said city in pursuance of an ordinance, except as are by law directed to be otherwise made, and shall superintend the execution of the same, and shall have the superintendence and control of all work or improvements ordered by the Common Council." In this title, the Executive Board is authorized to appoint a Street Superintendent and Clerk of the Board. No other authority is given to the Board to make any appointment, except by section 152 of this title, which states: "The Executive Board may employ such assistants and establish such by-laws for its meetings and proceedings as it may see fit, provided they be not in conflict with any provisions of this charter or other law."

Section 8 of the City Charter gives to the Common Council the power to appoint a City Surveyor. The above are the only provisions relating to the appointment of a surveyor or engineer, and to the officers to be appointed by the Executive Board.

Section 290 of the charter provides that all acts and parts of acts, so far as inconsistent

with, or repugnant to, this act or charter, hereby amended, are repealed, or declared inapplicable to the City of Rochester.

The first question which naturally arises is whether section 16 of said laws of 1872, which created the Board of Commissioners of Public Works, is still in force. This section, as above stated, gave a discretion to the Commissioners of Public Works to employ a Surveyor or City Attorney. If this section is still in force, and the Executive Board has the same powers in respect to the execution of the work of the city as the Commissioners of Public Works, the Board can, undoubtedly, employ a Surveyor or Engineer independent of the City Surveyor or Attorney appointed by the Common Council. But, I am of the opinion that this section was repealed by chapter 86 of the laws of 1876, as well as by chapter 14 of the laws of 1880. It is an established rule in the construction of statutes that by the abolition or repeal of the leading part or parts of a statute, those sections which are conditional or ancillary to the main parts are also abolished and repealed.

Section 6 of said laws of 1872, amended section 155 of the original charter of 1861, so as to create the Board of Commissioners of Public Works, and sections 11 to 23 inclusive, of the same act, were additional sections, giving the Commissioners the power to determine improvements and defining their duties.

Chapter 86 of the laws of 1876 again amended section 155 of the original charter of 1861, so as to abolish the Board of Commissioners of Public Works, and created the Executive Board of said city, stripped, however, of the power to determine and order improvements. The abolishing of the Board of Commissioners of Public Works repealed all the laws relating or ancillary to said Board, including section 16, referred to above. In addition to this, the present City Charter contains a positive repealing clause, which removes all doubt upon the subject. It is, therefore, clear that this section leaving it discretionary for the Board of Commissioners of Public Works to appoint a City Surveyor or City Attorney has been repealed, and the Executive Board is governed by the provisions of the charter in the letting and superintending of contracts for improvements ordered by the Common Council.

It is also a well established principle of law that the powers granted to municipal corporations, or its officers, must be clearly stated in the statute. Any ambiguity or doubt arising out of the terms used by the Legislature must be resolved in favor of the public. The Executive Board by the charter has the right to appoint a Street Superintendent and Clerk of the Board. These are the only officers which the Executive Board has power to appoint. The question resolves itself then as to whether the Executive Board can appoint an Engineer or Surveyor to perform the duties of the City Surveyor, by virtue of the power given to it in section 152 of the charter. By this section, the Board may employ "assistants," but such employment must not be in conflict with any provisions of the charter or other law. The Common Council is alone empowered by the charter to employ a City Surveyor. It has also the power to order all improvements, and, by the ordinance passed for the construction of the East Side Trunk Sewer, it directed the City Surveyor to ascertain and report the expense of such improvement. To enable the City Surveyor to do this, it became necessary to map out the plan for the work, which was embodied in the ordinance in general language. It is not practicable to give the specifications for the work in detail, but the indorsement and adoption of the plan by the Common Council necessarily implies the specifications in detail for the execution of the work to be prepared by the City Surveyor. This is the extent of the duty of the Common Council, and its officer, the City Surveyor. When this is done, the charter provides that the Executive Board

shall let the contract, pursuant to the ordinance and the specifications made by the City Surveyor, as directed therein, and, after the contract is let, the Executive Board shall have the superintendence and control of the work thereon.

The charter thus defines the duty of the Common Council and Executive Board, and the Council, in the performance of its duty, directs and defines the duty of the City Surveyor. It follows that in the ordering of an improvement, the making of the necessary surveys, plans and specifications preparatory to the letting of the contract must be done by the City Surveyor, in obedience to the ordinance passed by the Common Council, and the Executive Board must let the contract in accordance with such plans and specifications, and superintend and control the work thereunder.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that the East Side Trunk Sewer Commission, having no greater powers than the Executive Board, cannot employ a superintending engineer to work independently of the City Surveyor, and perform any of his duties, in and about the construction of the East Side Trunk Sewer. It does not necessarily follow that inasmuch as the duties of the City Surveyor and the East Side Trunk Sewer Commission have been definitely defined that each one should go on with the work of constructing this important improvement without mutual consultation and comparison of views. If the Commission required an engineer to superintend and control the executive work of this Commission, there can be no question of its power to appoint such a person, if the execution of the work is done in accordance with the survey, plans and specifications of the City Surveyor, as ordered and adopted by the Common Council under the Trunk Sewer ordinance.

To the Honorable, the Common Council, of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN:—Your Law Committee begs leave to submit the following report:

In the matter of the applications of George B. Schoeffel, Walter H. Tobey, Henry Kleindienst, Reuben E. Jones, Albert W. Golder, E. L. Anstett, C. H. Potter, Michael H. Weismiller, John H. Schmidt, Amelia Klein, J. P. F. McSweeney, John G. McElroy, William A. Hubbard, jr., James S. Taylor and Alois G. Waldert, for appointment as Commissioners of Deeds of the city, your Committee recommends that the same be granted.

In the matter of the report of the Map and Survey Committee, which has been referred to this Committee, we have secured the opinion of the First Assistant City Attorney in respect to the law involved in the matter, which opinion is attached to this report, and made a part thereof, and we respectfully recommend that the conclusions arrived at in the opinion shall be adopted as the conclusions of the Common Council.

By the provisions of the charter as recently amended, this Council is authorized to direct what clerical force is to be appointed in the law department of this city. This Committee having taken under consideration and having thoroughly investigated and carefully familiarized itself with the conditions of the office, finds that the business of this department is so rapidly increasing and extending by the continued additions of departments, boards and commissions of the city, and in the volume of litigation, that the clerical force as it now exists, does not secure the best service to the city. At every session of the Common Council claims are presented against the city for damages resulting from different causes, and as soon as the same are presented an immediate and thorough investigation

should be had under the control and supervision of this department. It is safe to say that large amounts of damages have been recovered against the city because such an investigation had never been made. Every railroad corporation and large municipal corporation of this state have in their employ a person to investigate and secure for the corporation the facts involved in the claims of damages presented against them. We regard this of paramount importance to the City of Rochester and recommend that a clerkship in this department to be designated as investigating clerk, should be created and established. The Committee is also of the opinion that one stenographer is not sufficient to properly do the work required in this department. By a resolution of this Council the stenographer is obliged to attend and take minutes of all the meetings of the Common Council. This involves the necessity of assisting the City Clerk to prepare the minutes for publication on the subsequent day, and after the same are printed to read the proofs for correction. This consumes the time of the stenographer from one to two days after each meeting of the Council, while the time of the stenographer is almost entirely consumed for one to two days before each Council meeting in preparing resolutions and reports for the several departments and officers of the city to be introduced at such meeting. Consequently, during the week a meeting of the Common Council is had, from one to three days' time of the stenographer is consumed for this work. During this time additional services must be secured for the litigated or routine business of the office or the business is delayed. As it is of the highest importance to the city that sufficient clerical force should be secured to avoid unnecessary and detrimental delays we recommend that the office of assistant stenographer should also be created and established.

In view of the above recommendations for an increase in the clerical force of this department a change in the salaries should also be made. The Committee is credibly informed that in the largest law offices in this city where stenographers are employed and do not act as managing clerks, twelve dollars per week is the highest rate paid for such services, while the majority of stenographers who are capable of taking notes for any work in a law office do not receive more than eight dollars per week. There can be no reason why the City of Rochester should pay any more for stenographic services in its law office than is paid by the law firms and lawyers of this city, and the Committee, therefore, recommends that the stenographer of this department shall receive the sum of sixty dollars per month, and shall attend at each and every Common Council meeting and take minutes for the City Clerk, and that the assistant stenographer shall receive the sum of forty dollars per month. The Committee is also of the opinion that inasmuch as a new clerkship is to be created, the Second Assistant City Attorney should perform part of the duties of the managing clerk in the office, and the salary of the law clerk should be reduced to eight hundred dollars. The duties of an investigating clerk will require a man of experience and intelligence, and we recommend that the sum of nine hundred dollars be fixed as the salary of this office.

In the year 1888 the salary of the First Assistant City Attorney was increased by this Council from twenty-five hundred dollars to thirty-five hundred dollars. For the reason, as then given by the Law Committee, that the then Assistant City Attorney had such an extensive experience in the office and had conducted the litigation of the office to such successful results that such an increase was justifiable. We are of the opinion that this

department should be under the management and control of the City Attorney instead of one of his assistants, and we consider that the appointment made by this Council will enable it to have the policy and conduct of the office in the charge of the City Attorney. We therefore recommend that the salary of the First Assistant City Attorney be reduced to twenty-five hundred dollars the amount paid by the city for that office before the Council placed the conduct of the business and policy of the office into the hands of the First Assistant. Last year this Committee reduced the salary of the Second Assistant City Attorney the sum of four hundred dollars, leaving the same at eight hundred dollars which we consider ample consideration for the position and recommend that the salary be fixed at that sum. Though the business of this department has greatly increased and the duties thereof have become much more responsible since 1884, when the salary of the City Attorney was fixed at forty-two hundred dollars, there has been no increase in the salary, but as already stated the increase was made in the salary of the First Assistant in the year 1888. The newly appointed City Attorney has been faithfully and satisfactorily performing the duties of this department during the past year and has become conversant with the work therein and we recommend that the salary of the City Attorney be fixed at forty-five hundred dollars for the ensuing year. The above changes have placed the expenses of this department at a sum five hundred dollars less than under the old policy, and we consider that this change after a thorough consideration, will secure better results therein.

We, therefore, recommend that the resolution accompanying this report relating to this department be adopted.

FINANCE ESTIMATE.

To the Board of Education:

GENTLEMEN:—Your finance committee has made the necessary estimates of money to be raised by the Common Council for the support of the public schools for the current fiscal year, ending March 31st, 1893, and hereby submit the same for your action.

The chairman of the various committees have submitted in detail the items comprising these amounts.

During the ensuing year your board will absolutely need all the money that is asked for, and even more could be used to advantage in the economical management of the public schools. The total amount asked for is less by (\$10,000) ten thousand dollars than was appropriated last year, notwithstanding a large increase (over 1200) of pupils.

The estimates are based on very careful and conservative calculations of our actual necessities for the year.

The several committees having charge of these funds, and their expenditure have expressed a determination to enforce strict business principles in all their outlays and liabilities.

The public is not unmindful of the annual growth of school system which naturally demands increased expenses from year to year. We have, in making the following estimate taken into consideration the balances now on hand, the amounts which will probably be received from the state, and probable receipts from all other sources. The following amounts are required from the city:

To the Honorable, the Common Council.

GENTLEMEN:—Your Finance Committee begs leave to make the following report, upon various matters which have come before it for consideration:

The Committee has received proposals for the city's bank account for the ensuing year, from the Commercial, Central, German American and Traders National banks. These banks are all willing to pay interest upon the city's deposits at the rate of four per cent. per annum, to be computed upon the daily balances, and are further willing to enter into an agreement to loan to the city at any time on the city's notes, such sums of money as the city may need. During the past year the city has received but two per cent. per annum for its money, and your committee feels that

in accepting these propositions, the city is making the best possible arrangements in reference to its funds, which are required to be deposited in banks, and, therefore, recommend that the resolution designating such banks, herewith annexed, be adopted.

In the matter of the communication of the City Assessors calling the attention of the Common Council to the necessity for additional help in their office, the committee has carefully considered the existing condition of affairs in the Assessors' office, and has heard Mr. Henry C. Munn, one of the Assessors, upon the necessity for more help. The committee finds that owing to the increased work put upon the City Assessors' office, numerous local assessment rolls, which should properly have been in the Treasurer's hands for collection, are still unfinished in the Assessors' office. That the work of the Assessors has been, and will continue to be very arduous, and that the amount of help employed in the office is inadequate to meet the requirements of the office. The City Assessors have been compelled to give a large amount of their time to office work, which could quite as properly have been done by clerks, and had a larger force of clerks been employed, the Assessors might have been able to go over the territory in making up the assessment roll more carefully, and would undoubtedly have been able to increase the assessed valuation of the city very materially. It is probable that the City Assessors would have discovered and put upon the tax rolls a larger amount of personal property than the rolls now contain. In making up the roll it is necessary that the Assessors go through every street in the city and also necessary for them to carry with them the large assessment rolls, upon which to make the entries and changes. This requires the use of a horse and wagon to get about. The Assessor's salary has already been fixed at three thousand dollars, which included clerk hire. Your committee is convinced that this is not sufficient to employ the necessary help in the office, and is not sufficient to enable the Assessors to pay for the use of a horse and wagon.

After the adoption of the act creating twenty wards, a large amount of work was compelled to be done a second time, and it seems that an arrangement was made with the clerical force, by which they should work over time. The Assessors are now indebted to the clerks in the office to the amount of about three hundred dollars. For the purpose of meeting that indebtedness, and for the purpose of providing an additional clerk in the office, and paying the expense of hiring a horse and wagon with which to drive about the city in making the assessments, your committee has decided to recommend an allowance to the City Assessors of eighteen hundred dollars. It is believed that with this additional allowance for clerk hire, and to hire a horse and carriage, the work of the City Assessors' office can be expedited, and the local assessment rolls in arrears can be completed at an early day.

Your committee, therefore, recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution, providing for the payment of eighteen hundred dollars for an additional clerk, horse and carriage hire and compensation to the present clerical force for working over time.

Your committee has been informed that Mr. John Bower, who has heretofore made monthly examinations of the condition of the City Treasurer's office, has notified the City Treasurer that his contract with the city has expired. Your committee recommends that it be empowered to enter into a new contract, either with Mr. Bower or some other suitable and competent person to make monthly examinations of the City Treasurer's office, and reports thereon to the Common Council, at an annual expense not to exceed two hundred

and fifty dollars, the amount heretofore paid to Mr. Bower, and recommends that the accompanying resolution to that effect be adopted.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN:—Your assessment committee begs leave to report upon the various matters referred to it, as follows:

The petition of Jabez H. Peterson shows that he is the owner of lot No. 2 of F. G. Worcester's subdivision of a portion of the Kelsey flats, so-called, and that the same has been assessed for sometime past with the adjoining lot, No. 22, as one piece of property, and to F. G. Worcester as owner. The petition further shows that both of said lots were sold together for unpaid taxes for the years 1881 to 1890, inclusive, and prays that an apportionment of said taxes and assessments against lot No. 2 be made, and that the petitioner be allowed to redeem said lot by paying the amount of the taxes and assessments against said lot No. 2 with interest at six per cent. We, recommend that the petitioner be allowed to pay the taxes and assessments against said lot owned by him with interest at six per cent. as is provided in the accompanying resolution.

In the matter of the Hargous Memorial Hahnemann Hospital praying for the cancellation of the city taxes for 1891 against the property of said hospital on Oakland street, we find that said hospital was incorporated in the year 1889 under chapter 95 of the laws of 1889; that the conveyance of the property to the hospital was made January 28, 1891. By section 4 of the act under which the hospital is incorporated, it is exempt from taxes upon its real and personal property, upon complying with the provisions therein specified. Your committee has received proof that said hospital comes within the provisions of said section, so as to entitle it to the exemption, and, therefore, recommends that the petition be granted.

The petition of George Neun asking to be relieved from an assessment for St. Joseph street improvement against lot 36, on the west side of said street, has been considered by your committee, and we find that the improvement referred to did not extend in front of lot 36, and that said lot should not be assessed therefor, and we, accordingly, recommend that the assessment against said lot 36 be cancelled.

In the matter of the petition of Ann J. Motley, as executrix of the estate of George Motley, deceased, praying for the cancellation of an assessment for a personal tax for the year 1891 amounting to \$67.45 against the said estate, we find that all of the personal property left by said George Motley was divided among the persons entitled to the same in April, 1888, and therefore, recommend that the petition be granted.

The petition of Joseph Miller shows that he is the owner of property on the corner of Campbell and Orchard streets, against which there appears to be an unpaid city tax for the year 1865, amounting to \$9.70. After hearing the parties interested, we have concluded to recommend that the petitioner be allowed to pay the sum of \$9.70 in full of said unpaid tax.

In the matter of the petition of John H. Foley, praying that certain taxes, assessments and water rates against property on the west side of Henion place be remitted, upon the ground that the same were paid by mistake, we find, that the time within which said property might be sold for said taxes has passed, and, therefore, recommend that the petition be denied.

The petition of E. A. Woodward, by George A. Lent, his agent, asks to have set aside a sale of certain premises owned by the petitioner, and known as lot F. & E., on the south side of Fremont street, which was sold for the city tax for 1888, upon the ground that said tax had been paid previous to said sale by the petitioner, and, as evidence of such payment, the petitioner presents an alleged receipt for said taxes, purporting to be signed by the city treasurer. Upon an examination of the matter, we find that there is no evidence of the payment of said taxes upon the books of the city treasurer, and

that said alleged receipt was not signed by any person in the employ of the city, and was not signed with the official stamp, as is the practice in receipting for taxes, etc., and we, therefore, recommend that the petition be denied.

The petition of Toby Meyer prays for a rebate of \$19.64 on an assessment for Goodman street sewer, paid by the petitioner, upon the ground that, being about to purchase property on the north side of Goodman street, at the corner of East avenue, the petitioner called upon the city assessors and received a certificate apportioning the amount of the assessment on that portion of the property which the petitioner was expecting to purchase, and that said certificate apportioned \$30.36 as the amount to be paid by the petitioner. The city treasurer's receipt shows that the petitioner paid the sum of \$50.00 on account of said improvement. Upon an examination, however, we find that said certificate was not filed with the city treasurer and that the city treasurer divided the property into three parts, the portion purchased by the petitioner being charged with \$50.00 of the total assessment, and each of the other parts being charged with \$25.57. We, therefore, recommend that the petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Frank Ritter praying for the correction of an assessment for the Medina stone improvement, we find that an allowance has been made for all of the old material on said street, and, therefore, recommend that the petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Samuel Moulson praying for a rebate of \$17.75 for water rates paid against property situated at No. 3 Weeger street, we find that said water rates were erroneously paid by the petitioner, and we recommend that he be allowed a rebate of \$15.58 on account thereof.

In a matter of the confirmation of the assessment roll for the opening of a street from Meigs street to Averill avenue, your committee begs leave to say that it has heard the parties interested for and against said confirmation, and has thoroughly considered the matter, and recommend that a new assessment be made.

GENTLEMEN:—The Executive Board would respectfully call your attention to the necessity of permanently improving Franklin street, from East Main street to St. Paul; Central avenue, from North St. Paul to North street, and Andrews street, from North St. Paul to North street. The roadways of Franklin and Andrews streets were constructed of Macadam spread upon the earth without any foundation or means of sustaining the pavement of small stone, and the result has been that both streets have had to be re-surfaced every year and sometimes those repairs were made very extensive as well as expensive, in order to render them suitable for travel or public use; and this expense has been paid from the general fund and consequently a tax upon the whole property of the city. In the matter of the judgment of Berintha Hooper against the City of Rochester, referred to this committee, we find that on May 15th, 1892, a judgment was recovered against the city for the sum of \$900.00 damages, and \$139.84 costs,

making a total of \$1,039.84, and that no appeal has been taken from said judgment; that the damages recovered are for sewage pollution, and no questions of law arise in the case, and we, therefore, recommend that said judgment, with interest from April 15th, 1892 be paid.

In the matter of the judgment of James H. Hooker against the City of Rochester, recovered on the 16th day of February, 1892, for damages suffered by sewer pollution, amounting to \$950.00 damages, and costs \$132.16, making a total of \$1,082.16, we find that no questions of law are in the case to warrant an appeal, and, therefore, recommend that the judgment be paid.

In the matter of the judgment against the city for \$128.57 costs in the action of Avenell vs. the city, we find that the city attorney has not recommended an appeal within the time given by the code to do so, and as the only alternative for the city is to pay the costs, we recommend that the same be paid.

"Gentlemen: Pursuant to the recent amendment of section sixty of the charter, your honorable body is authorized to direct what stenographers and clerks shall be appointed in the law department, and the city attorney is authorized to make the appointments of such stenographers and clerks as well as the assistant city attorney's named in the charter. The retiring city attorney has presumed to name the assistants provided for under this section of the charter.

"I have taken the trouble of securing the opinions hereto annexed as to the meaning of this section, which I will submit as a part of this communication.

"Your council not having passed a resolution directing what stenographers and clerks shall be in the law department for the ensuing year, I am unable to make any appointments, and the responsibility rests with your body if the service is crippled thereby. I shall, however, on the morning of the 1st of June, appoint the first and second city attorneys as the incumbents of this office during the term provided for by the charter, and as soon as you may deem it proper to designate the clerks and stenographers, I will appoint them for such a term.

"The charter of Rochester as amended in 1888 (Chapter 86 of 1888) declares as follows: 'In the month of April on or after the first Monday thereof in the year 1888 and in every second year thereafter the common council shall appoint one city attorney who shall hold his office for two years from and including the first day of June next after his appointment in April and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified.' Section 8.

"It was made the duty of the city attorney to prosecute and defend all actions in which the city was a party and render such other professional services as in connection with city affairs as the same might be required by law or by the Common Council. (Section 60 of

the charter as arranged by City Attorney Fanning in 1880.)

"No special provision was made by statute for any assistant city attorney but prior to 1888 the common council had found it necessary in its care of public affairs and the great increase of litigation in which the city was interested to appoint an assistant city attorney at a fixed salary and for a term of one year beginning with June 1st in each year. In 1888 for the same reasons the common council found it necessary to appoint a second assistant city attorney at a fixed salary and for the term of one year beginning June 1, 1888. This practice was continued each year and from that time in the year 1888, the city has had the city attorney specified in the charter and also a 'first assistant city attorney' and also a 'second assistant city attorney.' The term of office of each of whom commenced in June, the city attorney's running for two years from that date and that of the assistant city attorneys running one year from that date, so that the term of each of those officers terminated on the last day of May.

"In 1890, (Laws of that year, chapter 561, section 60) section sixty above quoted, was amended so as to read as follows: 'The attorney of said city or in case of his absence, or inability to act from any cause, the first or second assistant city attorney, shall prosecute and defend any and all actions, suits and proceedings brought or instituted against said city,' and in substance, render to the city, the common council and other officers and boards of the said city such professional services as they may require.'

"In 1892, laws of that year, chapter 190, section sixty above quoted, was on the 24th day of March so amended as to declare that 'The attorney of said city on or before the 1st day of June of each year shall appoint a first and second assistant city attorney and as many stenographers and clerks as said council may direct whose term of office shall be for one year or until their respective successors are appointed. Said attorney or in case of his absence or inability to act from any cause the first or second assistant city attorney shall prosecute and defend any and all actions, suits and proceedings brought or instituted by or against said city and render to the common council and the other officers and boards of said city such other professional services connected with the affairs of said city as may at any time be required of him by law or by the common council.'

"At the time of the passage of this act Mr. Ernst was city attorney under appointment made April, 1890, and his term would end on the last (31) day of May, 1892. Mr. Kiehel was appointed his successor in April, 1892.

"On the 26th day of May, instant, there being no vacancy in either of those offices nor any direction having been given concerning them by the common council, Mr. Ernst appointed certain persons first and second assistant city attorneys respectively, and also appointed for the office of city attorney a clerk and a stenographer, each for the term of one year.

"The question presented to me is 'Whether the appointments so made are valid appointments so as to entitle the appointees to the several offices for which they have been named.

"Answer. I am of the opinion that the proceeding by Mr. Ernst was irregular and the appointments at the time they were made void.

"First, none of the offices are vacant. They will not be vacant until the 1st day of June, 1892.

"Mr. Ernst's term expires before that time on May 31, 1892. The expiration of his term dissolves his authority. He can do no official act on the 1st day of June. The authority given by statute is conferred upon an officer

whose term shall include the period named for its exercise, including therefore the 1st day of June.

"Second, had there been a vacancy a different question would arise. The appointments actually made are by anticipation and it is plain, have no other basis than expediency and convenience. Their binding force and effect could be derived only from the supposition that there would be no change of person and consequently no change of will on the part of the appointing power between the date of the exercise of that power by anticipation and the necessity for the exercise of such power either by vacancy of office or the limitation of time within which the power must be exercised.

The statute gives no authority to Mr. Ernst to forestall the action of his successor in office upon appointments to other offices which would only become vacant at the moment when his own term expired, and when he himself had no power.

"The statute does not create new offices, nor remove then then incumbents. It merely changes the mode of appointment of the assistant city attorneys, takes the power away from the common council and gives it to the city attorney.

"If Mr. Ernst's appointment is valid, the city will have two 'first assistant city attorneys' and two 'second assistant city attorneys.' The present incumbents to those offices and his appointees, until June 1st, and a vacancy then existing it will be filled by the act of an officer whose term has also expired, a result not required by any fair construction of the act of 1892.

"Third. No power exists to designate or appoint a clerk or stenographer until the common council directs as to the number.

"The question is submitted to me whether the city attorney, whose term of office expires on June 1st, can appoint assistants, stenographers and clerks, who shall hold their office against the wishes of the person taking office on that day, or, in other words, whether such appointments will bind his successor in office.

"I think clearly not. Without stopping to critically examine the statute to see whether the outgoing attorney could make such appointments, I have no doubt that the incoming attorney can remove such appointees by appointing their successors.

"The statute provides that the term of office of such assistants, stenographers, etc., shall be for one year, or until their respective successors are appointed. I have no doubt that the city attorney has power to remove any appointee, whether appointed by himself or a predecessor, whenever he thinks it necessary or proper.

GENTLEMEN:—Your Assessment Committee begs leave to make the following report:

In the matter of the petition of Esther A. Johnson to be relieved from paying the extra charge for relaying the sidewalk on Nieser street, and praying that the City Treasurer be directed to cancel the tax against said property, on the payment of the proper proportion of the expense of the crosswalk on said street, we recommend that the same be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Frank Bowly, residing at Northport, L. I., the owner of premises 296 University avenue at the east corner of Arlington street, asking to have the assessment against said property for the asphalt improvement on Arlington street corrected we recommend that the same be denied.

In the matter of the petition of the Immaculate Conception Church, praying to be relieved from a sprinkling tax for 1891, against lots 51 and 52 on Plymouth avenue, on the ground that said lots have no frontage on Plymouth avenue roadway, and also, requesting that your honorable body restrain the board of assessors from imposing any further tax upon said lots for future assessments on Plymouth avenue, between Edinburgh street and the north line of lot 59, we submit, that we have thoroughly discussed the same, and recommend that a rebate of the sprinkling tax for 1891, against said lots 51 and 52 amounting to \$9.30 be allowed to the petitioner, and that the remainder of the relief sought by the petitioner as above stated, be denied, upon the ground that it would not be advisable to anticipate assessments for future improvements.

In the matter of the petition of J. Z. Culver asking to be allowed to pay an assessment of

\$262.98 without interest, against lot No. 18, fronting on Oak street, for the Oak street improvement, we recommend that the petitioner be allowed to pay the amount of said assessment, to wit: \$262.98, with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent. from October 20th, 1887, down to the time of payment upon the ground that most of the property owners assessed for said improvement have paid their assessments, with interest from the time above stated, and your committee knows of no reason why any discrimination should be made in this case.

Mr. Edwin S. Hayward was represented before your committee, and asked to have corrected the resolution passed by your honorable body on August 11th, 1891, published at page 207, proceedings of the Common Council, for 1891-2, so that the Clerk be directed to draw an order for the rebate upon lots 124 and 128 on the north side of Garson avenue, for the Hayward avenue outlet sewer, under Ordinance No. 3,192. We recommend that the amendment of said resolution be made, as requested by him, and herewith submit the proper resolution for adoption.

In the matter of Elmer L. Cronk praying to be allowed to pay the face of the city tax for 1884, with interest at the rate of six per cent. against lot eleven of the Evergreen Tract, on Conkey avenue, which was sold to the city on March 26, 1885, we find that, at the time that he purchased said property, he procured from the City Treasurer's office a tax search, which showed the property to be free from the tax referred to, and, that, subsequently, the petitioner discovered this unpaid tax, upon making an application for a loan upon said premises. We recommend that the petitioner be allowed to redeem said property by paying the face of said tax, to wit, the sum of \$38.73, within thirty days from the passage of the resolution with the interest and fees thereon, as provided by the city charter, down to the date of sale, March 26, 1885, and at the rate of six per cent. per annum from said last mentioned date, down to the date of payment, and that the charges, fees and expenses of sale be cancelled.

In the matter of the petition of Charles H. Wiltzie asking to be allowed to pay the face of the city tax for 1891, and assessments, against lot two, on the east side of Plymouth avenue, formerly assessed to Edson L. Cory, but now owned by the petitioner, we recommend that the petitioner be allowed to redeem said property by paying the face of said tax, with interest at 6 per cent. per annum, and that the fees, costs and expenses of sale and other interest be charged to erroneous assessments.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN:—Pursuant to notice given at the last regular meeting, your Committee on Charter Amendments would report the following ordinance to regulate bill posting and bill distributing in our city for your approval and adoption:

AN ORDINANCE to regulate bill posting and bill distributing.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester hereby ordains and enacts as follows:

Section 1. The Mayor or acting Mayor of the City of Rochester may grant to any person or persons who shall apply to him therefor in writing a license to engage in and carry on in the City of Rochester, the business of bill posting, bill distributing and sign advertising, which license shall expire at the end of one year from the date of its issue.

Sec. 2. Every person or persons to whom a license may be granted under the provisions of this ordinance shall pay therefor to the City Treasurer, on the delivery of said license to the party to whom such license is granted, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100).

Sec. 3. Every applicant for a license under the provision of this ordinance shall present to the Mayor at the time of making the application of such license a bond in the penal sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), executed by the party making the application, with at least two sureties, residents of Monroe County, to be approved by the Mayor, and conditioned for the faithful observance of this ordinance and the faithful performance of the duties and obligations imposed upon the said Licensee.

Sec. 4. Said Licensee, his officers, agents or employes while engaged in the act of posting, painting, writing, engraving, or distributing any bills, cards, signs, pamphlets, circulars, advertisements or notices, in said city, shall wear a badge with the following words conspicuously placed thereon "Licensed Advertiser."

Sec. 5. From and after the passage of this ordinance no person or persons shall engage in and carry on the business of bill posting, bill distributing and sign advertising in the City of Rochester, and no person shall go upon any of the streets, sidewalks or alleys of said city for the purpose of distributing or circulating posters, circulars, hand bills, samples, printed or engraved notices, or advertisements of any kind to or among the pedestrians or travelers on said streets, sidewalks or alleys, or to any offices, stores, places of business or residences in said city, for the purpose of posting or distributing posters, circulars, hand bills, samples, printed or engraved notices or advertisements of any kind; nor shall any person post, circulate, engrave, write, paint or distribute in said city any posters, circulars, hand bills, pamphlets, samples, printed or engraved notices or advertisements of any kind whatever, without previously having obtained a license as specified in this ordinance and complied with the requirements of the preceding sections, or without being an officer, agent or employe of any person or persons having such license and complying with the ordinance aforesaid.

Sec. 6. No person shall scatter or throw upon the streets, sidewalks or alleys in said city, posters, hand bills, advertisements or paper, and nothing herein shall be construed to authorize any person or persons to obstruct the streets, sidewalks, and alleys of said city, or create any nuisance therein, or prevent the posting of notices required by law to be posted.

Sec. 7. Nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to prevent any person, firm, association, or corporation residing and transacting business in the City of Rochester, from distributing circulars or hand bills, advertising the business in which such person, firm, association or corporation is directly engaged.

Sec. 8. Any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and any person upon conviction thereof shall be punishable by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100), and in default of the payment of such fine such person so convicted shall be imprisoned in the Monroe County Penitentiary for a term not to exceed one hun-

dred days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 9. All ordinances and resolutions of this Common Council inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Resolved, That said Rochester Railway Company be, and it hereby is authorized to grade South avenue in case the abutting property owners consent from a point 700 feet north of Alpine street to Reservoir avenue, according to plans filed by said Railway Company in the City Surveyor's office, it being expressly understood that in case these resolutions are adopted by this Council that the grading and widening of said South avenue shall be done at the sole expense of said Railway Company, and under the direction of the Executive Board.

To the Honorable, the Common Council, of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN:—Your Law Committee begs leave to submit the following report:

The claim of George and Josepha Zwerger for damages caused by sewage pollution of Densmore and Hobbie creeks through their premises was considered by your committee, and we find that an action is pending against the city for damages from February 1st, 1887. A proposition through their attorneys, has been made to settle said claim at the rate of \$175 per year, and, inasmuch as there is no defense in these actions for sewage pollution, we recommend that the offer be accepted.

The communication of the City Attorney in respect to an appeal in the case of Anna Grosser against the city, was considered by your committee and we find that this action has been sent back by the general term for a new trial, and that a question arises in said

action as to the construction of the charter, which ought to be determined by the Court of Appeals, and we, therefore, recommend that an appeal be taken to the General Term and Court of Appeals for the determination of this question, and that the City Attorney be instructed to take such appeal.

In the matter of the applications of William H. Vianco, Anna S. Emley, Fred B. Lyddon, L. N. Verrill, Kate M. Granger, Ina M. Bantel Mary E. Erbler and Howard B. Mills for appointment as Commissioners of Deeds, we recommend that the same be granted.

In the matter of the judgment rendered in the case of Emory B. Chace against the City of Rochester and others, we find that a judgment was entered in favor of John J. Hereron & Company, one of the defendants, against the city, for the sum of \$3,448.82, damages and costs, and that the interest thereon amounts to \$344.98, making a total of \$3,794.80 We also find that the city at the beginning of the action, deposited with the County Treasurer the sum of \$2,577.92, towards the payment of the judgment, but that the court found that there was due from said city to said John J. Heveron & Company the above amount, leaving a balance of the judgment, \$1,216.88, which the city is bound to pay. We, therefore, recommend, that said balance be paid to said John J. Heveron & Company, or their attorney, James M. E. O. Grady, Esq.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN:—Your Lamp Committee, to whom has been referred the subject of lighting the city with electricity, has had the matter under consideration since such reference, and we respectfully report:

That we have had a number of meetings, to which we invited bids from several electric light companies located and doing business in this city, and that we, at first, received a bid from said companies at substantially the same rate that the city paid for such lighting under the old contract. We, however, were of the opinion that the electric lighting of the city of Rochester, by virtue of the facilities for power and other favorable circumstances, could be done at a less figure and refused to recommend a contract at the old figure. We subsequently submitted the matter to the representatives of the several companies and, after repeated meetings, we succeeded in securing the prices hereinafter named, which are, so far as we have been able to determine, lower than any other city in the United States, except the city of Cincinnati.

We, therefore, recommend that contracts, in the form and substance of the proposed contract and specifications hereto annexed, for such lighting, be awarded as follows, viz:

To the Brush Electric Light Company, the furnishing and maintaining of— or more arc electric lights, of two thousand candle power; the contract price to be twenty-five cents for each light, each and every night, and the period of said contract to be for five years from July 1st, 1892.

To the Rochester Electric Light Company the furnishing and maintaining of— or more arc electric lights, of two thousand candle power; the contract price to be twenty-five cents for each light, each and every night, and the period of said contract to be for five years from July 1st, 1892.

To the Edison Illuminating Company, the furnishing and maintaining of— or more arc electric lights of two thousand candle power, and of— more or less, incandescent lights of twenty candle power; the contract price for the arc electric lights to be 25 cents for each and every night, and for the incandescent lights to be five cents, for each light, each and every night, and the period of said contract to be for five years from July 1, 1892; the form, sufficiency and execution of said contract to be approved of by the City Attorney.

A contract, made this first day of July, 1892, between— located and doing business in the city of Rochester, N. Y., of the first part, and the city of Rochester, a municipal corporation, of the second part, covenanting with each other to faithfully observe and perform each and every of the covenants which each agrees to perform by the terms of this contract, hereinafter expressed.

The party of the first part is herein designated for brevity, as "said company," and the party of the second part as "said city."

Witnesseth as follows: First—Said company shall furnish for the use of said city, its boards officers and agents, electric lamps, lamp-posts, wires and accessories, of the kind and quality hereinafter specified, and lay, construct, operate and maintain the same, in such place or places, street or streets, in said city, and in such numbers, as the said city, by its common council, may from time to time direct, during the life of this contract, provided, however, that the number of lamps to be operated and maintained by said company shall not be at any one time not less than—

Second—This contract shall begin at 12 o'clock noon, on the day of the date thereof, and continue for and during a period ending at 12 o'clock, noon, on the 1st day of July, 1890.

Third—Said company shall furnish, repair and paint the lamp poles or posts, lamps, hoods and supports of said lamps and accessories erected, or to be erected and furnished by said company; clean, and keep cleaned and properly attend, light and keep lighted all of said lamps, and all new or additional lamps furnished and erected, or to be furnished and erected, under this contract, during the period hereinafter named.

Fourth—Said company shall furnish all material, or materials, and do all work and labor necessary for the performance of this contract, of the best quality and skill, in each and every particular and in strict conformity with the terms and conditions and requirements of the specifications hereto annexed as a part of this contract.

Fifth—Said company shall put up and operate each additional lamp, or lamps, required under the terms of this contract, within thirty days after the date of the order and direction of said Common Council.

Sixth—Said company shall keep each and every of its lamps lighted, and in full operation continuously each and every night, during the life of this contract, and said lamps shall be lighted at sunset, and kept lighted, and in full operation, until sunrise, and for such other or further time or occasion as said city by its Lamp Committee or Common Council, shall by written notice require, and for such length of time as may be specified in said notice. In the event that any lamps of said company shall not be lighted and continued lighted and in operation, as provided in this contract, and the specifications hereto attached said city shall have the right to deduct from the price hereinafter named, a sum equal to that which said company would otherwise be entitled to receive for the lamp or lamps for each and every night during which the same shall not be lighted; if, however, said company shall willfully fail or refuse at any time to light, and keep lighted, any or all of its lamps furnished and provided for by this contract, said company shall pay as liquidated damages to said city, for the period said lamp or lamps remain unlighted, a sum double in amount said company would be entitled to receive for the lighting of said lamp or lamps under the contract.

Seventh—Said company shall furnish and apply, at its own cost and expense, all switches, cut-outs and other apparatus which may be necessary to prevent fire or danger of any kind or nature to a person or persons, property or properties, and which may be necessary and required for the proper operation of said lamps.

Eighth—In the event that any dispute or controversy shall arise between the parties hereto as to the terms, agreements and meaning of this contract and specifications, the same shall be submitted to, and determined by an arbitration of three competent persons, one of whom to be selected by each party, and a third one, or umpire, to be chosen by the two selected. The decision of such arbitrators, or a majority of them, shall be final and binding upon the parties hereto.

Ninth—Said company shall use any and all devices and improvements the effect of which shall be to increase the relative amount of light produced and improve the kind, quantity and power thereof during the life of this contract; and when the right and privilege thereof shall not be owned or controlled by said company, it shall be obtained and utilized by it, when directed so to do by said city, through its Common Council, provided, however, in no event shall the amount covenanted to be paid by said city, as hereinafter provided, be increased by any such change.

Tenth—Nothing contained in this contract shall prevent said city from obtaining additional electric lights for its streets, avenues, public squares, parks or places from other companies or parties at any time during the term of this contract, and upon such terms, and upon such conditions as said city, by its Common Council, may deem proper.

Eleventh—Said company shall enter into an arrangement with other existing companies in said city using poles of electric wires, to remove from the streets of said city, such poles as may be necessary so as to maintain only one line of poles for electric wires on any one street. The terms as to the compensation and conditions of removal of the poles and the use of the poles left standing upon the streets, shall be agreed upon by said companies respectively, but, if they are unable to agree upon such terms as to the compensation and conditions of the removal and use by each company of the remaining poles, the same shall be determined, and finally adjusted by the electrical committee of the Common Council, and said company agrees to abide thereby. Any of the aforesaid companies using, or hereafter to use, electric wires upon the streets of

said city may at any time use said remaining poles, upon consent of the Common Council, as to the compensation and use agreed upon, upon compliance with the terms and conditions by them, or determined by said electrical committee; any new company, or individual, on application to the Common Council, may make use of said poles, or any of them, in any street or streets, on making compensation for such use to said companies respectively; said company (party to this agreement) agrees to submit the terms and conditions of such use to the arbitration of three competent persons, to be selected and appointed by the Supreme Court in the county of Monroe, upon application of the company or individual so desiring the use of said poles, and such arbitration shall be made and conducted in all respects, according to the terms, conditions and requirements of the code of civil procedure on the subject of arbitration; and in case of an appeal, the decision of the general term in the fifth judicial department shall be conclusive.

Twelfth—Said city shall pay for each and every lamp placed and actually lighted and in operation, the sum of —cents per lamp per night during the life of this contract, or until directed to be discontinued by said city, and shall pay to said company for the extra lighting hereinbefore provided for, a pro-rata sum per hour for each and every lamp directed to be lighted, as aforesaid, provided, however, that no payment shall be made by said city for the lighting of any lamp or lamps which are not lighted and operated pursuant to the terms of this contract, and the specifications hereto attached. All claims and demands, pursuant to the terms of this contract, must be presented to the Common Council, as required by the provisions of the charter in such case made and provided.

Thirteenth—Said company covenants and agrees to indemnify and save harmless the said city, its boards, officers, agents and servants, and each and every of them, against and from all suits and actions of every name and description, brought against it, them, or any of them, and from all damages and costs to which it, they, or any of them may be put, by reason of injury to person or persons, or property of any nature resulting from any accident, negligence or carelessness in the performance of said work of constructing, operating and maintaining said lamps and all the appliances and accessories thereto, as provided in this contract and specifications or from any improper or defective material, machinery, instrument or appliance used in performing the same, or from any act or omission of said company; said company further agrees that, after final judgment, so much of the moneys that may be due or to become due, to said company, under and by virtue of this contract, shall be retained by said city until said judgment shall have been paid and evidence to that effect furnished to the satisfaction of said Lamp Committee.

Fourteenth—Said company further agrees to indemnify and save harmless said city against any and all claims which may be brought for the infringement of any patent right in use in said lamps, dynamos or other article, apparatus or process which may be used in operating the lamps under this contract.

Fifteenth—It is mutually agreed between the parties hereto that after a lamp pole has been located by said city, and furnished and erected by said company in such location, the same shall, without delay, be removed by said company, on request of the city, the expense of such removal to be borne by said city, but nothing contained in this clause shall modify or change the agreement entered into in clause eleventh of this contract. The successors and assigns of the parties hereto are bound by this contract.

This contract is entered into by said company, subject to all ordinances, rules or regulations enacted, or to be enacted, by the Common Council of said city, by virtue of the authority given to it under the charter.

Sixteenth—Said company shall place all of its wires on Main street, from Plymouth avenue to University avenue; on Exchange and State streets, from the Erie canal to Allen street, and on North and South St. Paul streets from Court street to Andrews street, into a conduit, to be constructed by said city or by a company organized to construct and maintain such conduit to which said city may grant such a franchise; said company hereby agrees to place all of its said wires in the conduit above described within sixty days after notice in writing, from the Common Council of said city, so to do, and to place and put in operation and maintain all the wires supplying and furnishing an electric current to each and every lamp and motor on the streets, and in the buildings, upon which the aforesaid conduit is constructed and maintained. The entire rental to be charged to all of the companies using said conduit shall be 10 per cent. per annum, in the total cost of its construction. The Common Council shall apportion the amount to be paid for the use of said conduit by each company if all or said companies cannot agree upon the apportionment thereof, and said company hereby agrees to pay its proportion of said rental. In witness whereof the parties hereto have hereunto affixed their hands and corporate seals, the day and year first above written.

SPECIFICATIONS.

Lamps.

The lamps to be furnished are to be of the kind known as "Arc Electric Lamps" of the latest and most approved and improved pattern.

Luminous Intensity.

Each lamp shall give a light of two thousand nominal candle power, or of such candle power as will be obtained, when each light in the circuit shall pass 9.5 to 10 amperes of current, at a voltage or electric pressure of 45 to 50 volts, or the equivalent of the same, with the best quality and size of carbons adapted to said lamp and the length of arc to be used in said lamps, shall be such as said Lamp Committee may approve. All lamps furnished shall give a steady and uniform light without undue flickering or hissing, and to the satisfaction of said Lamp Committee. Said Lamp Committee or its authorized agent, shall have proper facilities for testing the candle power of the lamps furnished and operated under the contract, and to that end a conductor or wire from a street lamp circuit shall by said company be permanently run and carried into a building to be designated by said Lamp committee and said company shall furnish, erect and place for such testing, such lamps, globes and carbons as are used for lighting the streets under the contract and such as are required by said committee; at two different points outside of said building on each street light circuit, said company shall permanently place such switches or other appliances as the Lamp Committee may direct and think proper, for applying instruments to measure the quantity and pressure of the current. Said city shall also have free access to the central station or stations of said company for the purpose of inspecting and making tests and measurements and every facility shall be given to said city, its officers or agents therefor.

Lamps, Posts, Supports, Etc.

All wooden poles erected and used to support lamp wires shall be of such length, size, quality and shape, and shall be painted, set and guyed and all cross arms shall be of such kind, size and be painted, as shall be directed

by said Lamp Committee of said city. Said Lamp Committee shall also have the power to direct and authorize the kind, number and quality of cranes for supporting lamps or any other support necessary for them; to direct and authorize the use of combination iron and wooden poles for the support of lamps in any street or place where the wires are underground to be of the kind, shape and set as said committee may direct. No signs, advertisements, bills, defacements or unnecessary attachments of any kind or nature whatever shall be placed, put or attached to any of the poles, supports and cross-arms, and all necessary attachments are to be painted as often, and of the color and style required by said committee.

All poles, supports, cross-arms, attachments, wires, lamps, and every necessary appliance of said lighting system or any part thereof of said company shall be changed or removed whenever in the judgment of the Common Council the public safety or convenience demands the same.

Wires, Currents, Circuits, &c.

All wires used by said company, pursuant to this contract, shall be first-class insulated wire of such conductivity and insulation as shall be approved by said Lamp Committee. Wires to be put on poles to be securely fastened and in a first-class manner. All joints to be taped so as to insulate the joint as perfectly as any other portion of the wire. Said company shall make and give a report describing each circuit for furnishing street lights, including the size of the wires used, the kind of insulation, the number of miles and fractions thereof and the route of such circuit, the number of lamps on each circuit to said Lamp Committee immediately upon the execution of this contract and any construction or erection of a new circuit or circuits or any changes made in old circuits in the number of lamps, wires or route of said circuit shall be immediately reported and given to said Lamp Committee. All the circuits erected and used under this contract, shall be tested by said company for grounds and escapes each and every day during the life of this contract, not less than one half hour before the time of lighting said lamps. Once a month during the life of this contract, an insulation and resistance test shall be made on said circuits; a certified report in writing of said daily and monthly tests shall be made and delivered to said lamp committee each and every month during the life of this contract. It is, however, expressly understood between the parties to this contract, that no lamp or lamps, motor or motors or any other appliances or device of any kind whatsoever, shall be attached, connected or made a part of a circuit delivering the current to the lamps of said city, without the consent of said Lamp Committee or its authorized agent. The current to be used for the lighting of the lamps under this contract shall be the current known and designated as the "continuous current," and none other and the voltage of said current in any circuit shall not exceed 3,500 volts; the kind of current and voltage to be changed only by resolution of the Common Council.

Globes.

The globes to be used for the lamps under this contract shall be of clear or one-quarter ground glass, (unless otherwise ordered) of uniform thickness, and proper shape to avoid casting rings or streaks of light and shadow; cracked or broken globes must be replaced at once by sound ones. Clear glass globes must not absorb or abstract more than twelve per cent. of the light of the lamp. It shall remain optional with said city to require globes partly clear and partly ground for the use of said lamps. Globes shall be cleaned daily, inside and outside and all dirt and carbon dust shall be removed before the time the lamps must be lighted under the contract.

Apparatus.

The lamp-posts, poles, wires, conductors, lamps, globes, carbons and each and every article, apparatus or device which may be necessary for the electric lighting under this contract, shall be furnished and maintained by said company, at its own cost and expense. The lamps, wires, and all and every conductor must be thoroughly insulated and placed in such locations, and in such manner, as to prevent them from being tampered with, or handled by any unauthorized person or persons.

Ald. Callihan moved that when the Board adjourn it be to Thursday evening and that the report of the Lamp Committee lay on the table until that time.

Ald. Adams moved as an amendment that the report be received, filed and published and that when the Board adjourn it be until Thursday afternoon next at 4 P. M. when report be made special order of business.

To the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN:—The question of providing more room for several of the departments in the city hall has been canvassed and discussed, by committees of the common council and the heads of departments for many months; and, while everyone familiar with the crowded condition of the rooms occupied by some members of the official family admits the necessity of obtaining more space to transact the public business, yet as you are aware, the proposed relief has not got far beyond the stage of general discussion and indefinite plans.

The departments occupied by the executive board suffer the greatest inconvenience for the want of room. The water department organized in 1873-4, is still in the same quarters although the population of the city has nearly doubled, and the accounts have reached about 30,000 in number, requiring the constant use of twenty large books. There is no longer desk room for the business of the office and no room for more desks. It should be understood that there is, perhaps, no city office that so many persons or property owners have business with during the year because paying water rents and applications for new services and alterations render necessary frequent visits of taxpayers. The room for such purpose is now encroached upon so that not more than one-half a dozen persons can reach the counter to transact business at any one time.

In the session room or what should be such, during business hours the board is unable to do more than walk around the room and endeavor to attend to the requests and the general business of the office.

No order can be maintained when meetings are being held because of the overcrowded condition of the room. It resembles the scene one witnesses on the streets, when some incident attracts a miscellaneous crowd to a certain point. It is a well with a wall of humanity around it, and every individual in the crowd trying to get the central point to see what is in the well or pit. No public body which is called upon to perform very important duties should be subjected to such disorder and to the necessity of so unbusiness-like means of attending to their duties. This is not an over-drawn picture but one that many aldermen have looked upon. There is no place to transact or consult on the many matters of importance which daily require prompt and prudent action on the part of the executive board, and, I am directed to state that it is imperatively necessary that better facilities be provided for this department without further delay or this board will have to seek means elsewhere to perform its duties and meet the necessities of the public business.

The said easement was granted twenty feet wide without considering its possible effect on the lots through which it runs, I find, however, that the extreme width of the easement is working to considerable disadvantage to the purchasers of these lots in that the said easement takes up so large a portion of the said lots that it leaves a very narrow strip to build upon, and it is also a hardship in that it prevents the said purchasers from obtaining a loan on that portion of the lots covered by the easement.

By consulting with competent engineers I find that a ten-foot easement would be sufficient for the maintenance of the said sewer, I beg, therefore, to ask your honorable body to take such action in the matter as is necessary to grant a release of ten feet of the said easement. We, therefore, recommend that the Mayor be authorized to release the east half of said easement, the description thereof to be approved by the City Surveyor.

The matter of the resolution to amend the Penal Ordinance to regulate bill posting and bill distributing, having been referred to this Committee by the Common Council, we find that the license fee named in section two of said ordinance is larger than the amount specified in the charter for the purposes of said ordinance.

The limit by the charter is fifty dollars. We, therefore, recommend that said section two be amended by changing the sum of one hundred dollars to the sum of fifty dollars. We also recommend that section five be amended, as set forth in the accompanying resolution, viz: Change the word "sample" therein to "sample advertisements," to avoid a possible conflict between the ordinance which gives peddlers in the city a license.

In the matter of the communication of Messrs. J. and Q. Van Voorhis in respect to the judgment recovered by Theresa Wannamaker, as administratrix, etc., against the city, we are advised by the city attorney that important legal questions have been raised in the matter, which ought to be finally determined by the court of appeals, and we, therefore, recommend that said action be appealed to the court of appeals.

In the matter of the communication of Elbridge L. Adams in respect to a balance due him for costs in the action of Hugh Kelly against the city, we learn, upon examination into the facts in the case, that a balance of \$29 is due said Adams for costs, and we, therefore, recommend that the same be paid to him out of the contingent fund.

In the matter of the claim for damages of Mrs. Mary Short and William Short for injuries resulting from a fall on the sidewalk on Sanford street, we find that William Short made a claim for damages for \$100, and Mary Short for the same amount; that we also learn that said Mary Short was quite seriously injured by reason of said fall, and that sidewalk was out of repair at the time. Through the parties' attorneys, an offer has been made to settle the claim of both parties, and a release of all damages to the city, for the sum of \$25, and we recommend that the same be paid.

In the matter of the applications for appointment of Commissioners of Deeds of William B. Carman, George H. Barnett, George H. Young, George Albert Bowman, George W. Fraley, Jr., and Frank Cummings, we recommend that the same be granted.

DEAR SIR—In 1890 James Gorsline et al deeded to the City of Rochester a right of way for the Maplewood Avenue sewer, from Riverside Avenue to Flower City Park. The deed is recorded with Monroe County deeds L. 480 P. 80. The consideration was \$1, and the strip of land covered is twenty feet wide, lying easterly of, and adjacent to the westerly lines of lots 15 and 16 between Riverside Avenue and Gorsline Park, and lots 58 and 59 between Gorsline Park and Flower City Park.

The Present owners of said lots find that the above easement largely reduces the value of said lots for the purpose of borrowing money upon, and ask that the easement be released so as to cover a strip ten (10) feet wide.

I have examined into the matter, and recommend that the eastern moiety of said easement be released, and that a strip ten (10) feet wide be retained, lying easterly of, and adjacent to the westerly line of lots numbers 15 and 16 and lot 59, and of a width sufficient, not less than ten (10) feet, to cover the sewer as built in the lot number 58.

The width thus retained will be amply sufficient to maintain the sewer upon.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen—I have this day received from the State Treasurer the sum of \$1,117.74, this being the amount allowed on claim presented to the state controller for taxes against state property, that have been assessed for local improvement.

The total amount of claims presented was \$5,063.64, for improvements confirmed by the Common Council in the years 1856, (omitted from former settlement), 1883, 1884, 1885, and January, 1886.

I was obliged, by order of the controller, to erase from the list all fees and interest that have been added for non-payment, and still further reduce the list to all assessments made previous to May 25, 1886, as the requirement of section 1, chapter 435, laws of 1886, had not been complied with.

This section makes it the duty of the assessors to notify the state controller three weeks previous to the confirmation of any assessment roll, that affects any property owned by the state.

This action reduced the claim \$3,754.29, and from the balance \$1,309.35, I was obliged to deduct \$191.61 for interest and fees, that had been added to original amount.

Great credit should be given Senator Parsons, who has worked hard to secure the whole amount of claim, and it is on account of his earnest efforts, that the city is able to realize anything at this time.

I would respectfully suggest that in future the assessors be instructed to comply with the requirements of this law, and also record date of their notice to the Comptroller on the assessment rolls, so that on future claims against the State of like nature, the Treasurer can make the required affidavit, that the provisions of the law have been complied with.

In order to balance the accounts settled at this time I would ask the privilege of charging the amount deducted, \$191.61 to "interest on assessments."

In regard to balance of claim disallowed \$3,754.29, Senator Parsons is of the opinion that some special law can be enacted that will reimburse the city for amount advanced and expended, for the benefit of State property.

In the matter of the account of Joseph M. Wamsley for serving redemption notices, referred to this committee by the Contingent Expense Committee, we recommend that said account be paid, and to that effect, offer the accompanying resolution.

In the matter of the account of James R. P. Goodman, referred to this committee by the Contingent Expense Committee, we find that said Goodman was employed by the special commissioners appointed by this Common Council to make an assessment for the Lyell avenue and Saxton street outlet sewer; that said commissioners were appointed pursuant to the provisions of the city charter, and that each special commissioner, by the terms of the charter, shall receive as compensation for his services, not to exceed two dollars for each day. The matter of taking charge of the public street lamps has been under consideration by your Committee, and we find that a majority of the public lamps used by the city to-day are electric lights, and that they are under the direct and personal supervision of the city electrician, whose duties are, as defined in the lamp contract, to take charge of said lamps, and see that the companies furnishing the

lights perform the covenants they have entered into.

Pursuant to a resolution adopted by this Common Council on October 30th, 1888, the matter of the public street lighting was placed in the charge of the City Surveyor, and, since that time, the duties pertaining to public street lamps have been performed by him.

The City Surveyor has duties to perform in his line of work sufficient to occupy the attention of himself and his assistants, and we are of the opinion the control of the public street lamps should be placed in the charge of the city electrician, and for this reason we think that all petitions and resolutions for the erection or placing of all future lamps for public street lighting should be referred to the Lamp Committee and City Electrician to examine into the same, and report to this Common Council.

We, therefore, recommend that the present map showing the location of the public street lamps, and the records concerning the same should be transferred from the city surveyor to the city electrician, and that all future matters pertaining to street lamps should be filed in the city electrician's office, and we, therefore, recommend the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

Gentlemen:—Your Improvement Committee, to whom was referred at the last regular meeting of the Common Council, the subject of the improvement of Genesee street, from Brooks avenue southerly to the city line, do respectfully beg leave to submit the following report:

First—In our opinion some sort of a substantial improvement should be laid upon the street above referred to.

Second—It appears that an asphalt improvement has been laid upon Genesee street to Brooks avenue, and while it seems to be the most natural thing that an asphalt improvement should be continued the whole length of Genesee street, yet as it is the manifest wish of the majority of the taxpayers on Genesee street, from Brooks avenue to the city line that there should be laid thereon what is known as a trap rock macadam improvement, it being represented to us that such an improvement will be a first-class one, and compare favorably, so far as utility and durability is concerned, with any other first-class improvement.

We do therefore recommend that the said trap rock macadam be laid upon Genesee street from Brooks avenue to the city line.

It appearing, however, that there is not at this time any such improvement upon any of the streets of the city of Rochester, and therefore such an improvement, so far as this city is concerned, is largely experimental, we also recommend that at least a seven (7) years' guarantee be exacted from the builders of such improvement to the effect that such improvement shall be, or be maintained in first-class repair for the period of _____ years after it shall have been laid, without additional expense to the City of Rochester or its taxpayers.

One arc light on Emerson street west of Deep Hollow. One arc light on Wait street between Scio street and Hebbard place. One arc light on Plymouth avenue, between Plymouth Park and Clarissa street.

That Edison arc lights be placed as follows:

One arc light corner Silver and Wilkins streets. One arc light corner Moulson and Wecher streets. One arc light corner Lime and Saxton streets. One arc light corner Murray and Brayer streets.

That Rochester arc lights be placed as follows:

One arc light on Henrietta avenue, between Nelson and Field streets. One arc light on Henrietta Park, between Henrietta avenue and Erie canal. One arc light on Saburnam crescent south of Monroe avenue.

That Brush arc lights be moved as follows:

Move light on Emerson street near Backus avenue to Emerson street opposite Backus avenue.

Move arc light on Plymouth avenue, between Plymouth Park and Clarissa street to half way between the present location and Plymouth park. Move arc light corner Hudson and Kelly streets to the corner of Hudson and Webster streets.

That the Rochester arc light on Field street, near Henrietta avenue be moved to Field street opposite Henrietta avenue.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee begs leave to make the following, as its report upon the various matters heretofore submitted to it for consideration.

In the matter of providing funds for the construction of the new conduit to Hemlock Lake, the Committee has been over the subject carefully, has conferred with the members of the Executive Board, and is satisfied that the time has arrived, when money should be provided by the sale of the city's bonds, for the construction of the conduit. Your Committee is informed that the plans and specifications are so far completed that the contracts can be advertised in thirty days. Immediately upon the letting of the contract, the city will be called upon to pay about \$60,000 to the various owners of the water privileges, from whom it has been thought desirable to obtain options.

The schedule of the various items of expenditure to be made within the next twelve months, prepared by Mr. Emil Kuichling, chief engineer of the Water Works Department, is hereto annexed, and shows in detail just what moneys will be required, and for what purposes. Your Committee believes that the present is the best time for the sale of bonds, as the condition of the money market is such, that your Committee hopes to be able to place these bonds at a rate of interest not exceeding three and one-half per cent., and it is entirely possible that an even lower rate may be secured. Your Committee has, therefore, deemed it advisable, in view of the fact, that the money market will, in all probability, become stronger, and the usual scarcity of money will prevail during the fall and winter months, to sell sufficient of the bonds of the city, to commence the work of building the conduit, and carry it through until easy money shall again prevail. Your Committee, therefore, recommends that the City Treasurer be authorized to sell, under the direction of the Finance Committee, and in accordance with the Enabling Act passed April, 1892, so many of the city's bonds, as to the said committee shall seem advisable, but in no event to exceed the amount of one million dollars.

Your Committee has also taken into consideration the fact that upon the completion of the Platt street bridge across the Genesee river, it was necessary to pay from the Contingent Fund a sum of money amounting to about twenty-five thousand dollars. This twenty-five thousand dollars was taken from the Contingent Fund, and placed to the credit of the Bridge Fund. The Contingent Fund should be re-imbursed for this amount, and the city should provide at once for the expense of constructing the Clarissa street bridge, already commenced. The legislation heretofore had authorizing the City of Rochester to issue bonds known as the Rochester City Bridge Bonds, to the amount of three hundred thousand dollars; two hundred thousand dollars of that amount have already been issued, and the other one hundred thousand dollars, can be issued at any time. It seems that the present, is the most favorable time for selling the additional one hundred thousand dollars worth of bridge bonds, and your Committee, therefore, recommends that the City Treasurer be authorized to sell one hundred thousand dollars worth of Rochester Bridge Bonds, under the direction of the Finance Committee, said bonds bearing a rate of interest not exceeding three and one-half per cent., reserving the right to the city to redeem the said bonds at any time, after ten years from the date of their issue.

In the year 1882, the city issued one hundred thousand dollars worth of bonds, known as the Consolidated Loan, which bonds will be due August 1, 1912, with the right reserved to the city to redeem said bonds at any time after the first day of August, 1 1892. The said bonds were issued at four per cent. interest, and your Committee has been of the opinion that that rate was greater than was advisable for the city to pay. These bonds are held as follows: Seventy-five thousand dollars worth, by the Emigrant Industrial Savings Bank of New York City, and twenty-five thousand dollars worth by the Albany Savings Bank of Albany, N. Y. After considerable correspondence with this bank, your Committee is enabled to report, that these banks have agreed to reduce the rate of interest from August 1, 1892, from four to three and one-half per cent., and your Committee recommends that such reduction be accepted by the Common Council. In order to carry this agreement into effect, it will be necessary to have written, or stamped upon the face of each bond, a statement that the rate of interest upon said bond, has been reduced from four to three and one-half per cent., which statement, your committee is advised, should be signed by the holders of the bonds, and also by a representative of the city. Your Committee, therefore, recommends, that the accompanying resolution, authorizing the chairman of the Finance Committee to go to New York, and sign the said statement on behalf of the city, be adopted. And that the chairman be authorized, if necessary, to procure a suitable stamp, for the purpose of stamping such statement upon said bonds, and also to execute, on behalf of the city, a contract to be prepared by the City Attorney, for the purpose of carrying such agreement into effect.

The resolution of Alderman McMillan presented at the meeting of this Council, held on July 14th, in reference to re-imbursing the Contingent Fund, for the amount expended from that fund, for the benefit of the East Side Trunk Sewer, and the expense of preparing the plans, surveys, etc., has been duly considered by your Committee. Your Committee finds, that the amount so expended is fourteen thousand one hundred and thirty-nine dollars and sixty-two cents. A detailed statement of such expenditures is hereto annexed, and made a part of this report. These expenditures were made before the East Side Trunk Sewer Fund was created, and the several resolutions authorizing the expenditure of these various items, contained direction to the City Treasurer to charge and carry the same to the East Side Trunk Sewer Fund, when created. Your Committee, therefore, recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution, directing the City Treasurer to transfer said amount from the East Side Trunk Sewer Fund to the Contingent Fund. Your Committee further reports, that on the 8th day of August, in the presence of the Mayor, City Treasurer and each member of the Finance Committee, there were burned three hundred and eighty-five coupons, clipped from the bonds known as the City Hall Commissioners Loan, said coupons being of the value of thirty-five dollars each. A certificate of such burning, duly authenticated by the witnesses thereto, is hereto annexed, and made a part of this report.

Gentlemen:—This Board having ordered an inspection and examination on a complaint made of the unsanitary state of the several premises situated on Allen street, between Kent and Oak streets in this city, the following condition was found:

The several premises are in an unsanitary state in consequence of the accumulation of filth to the extent of being a menace to the health and lives of the inmates and to the

people of the immediate vicinity, by reason of the insufficient capacity of the sewer in said street.

This Board therefore presents the finding of the inspection and examination of said premises and sewer, with its action taken at its meeting, in declaring the sewer to be a public nuisance; and further, that upon a complaint made to this Board of said premises and sewer in 1891, an examination was then made and the matter referred to the Executive Board, upon which no action was taken by the said Board for the reason that no temporary measures could avail in affording the required relief.

Gentlemen:—I have examined the books of the City Treasurer, from and including June 29th last, to and including August 3rd, inst.

Each item of receipt has received my careful attention and I find they are all properly entered and they are at the credit of their respective accounts upon the ledger. I have checked each voucher of expenditure made during the period and find every thing charged correctly. The amount of cash on hand at the close of the business of August 3d, inst., was \$882,387.76, of which \$43,229.25 was upon deposit with the Traders' National Bank, \$95,103.91 with the German-American Bank, \$131,385.47 with the Central Bank, \$118,613.29 with the Commercial Bank.

The following amounts were upon deposit as a special deposit for account of East Side Trunk Sewer:

- \$119,969.63 with the Traders' National Bank.
- \$125,000.00 with the German-American Bank.
- \$131,000.00 with The Central Bank.
- \$109,770.42 with The Commercial Bank.

These balances with the banks I verified by personally asking for amount at credit of the city at each bank and by having the pass books written up and balanced August 4, before the beginning of business. \$7,460.46 was money in hands of Treasurer which I counted August 4th before opening of business. \$10.63 is a cash item, to wit: expense book. \$175.00 police orders on hand as cash. \$107.00, East Side Trunk Sewer orders on hand as cash. \$562.70. Park orders on hand as cash. Total, \$882,387.76.

The general ledger was in balance at end of day (August 3), as shown by the trial balance then taken, and which I have verified item per item.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—You will doubtless be surprised to learn from my report submitted this evening, that the total amount of cash on hand, and to the credit of the city in the several banks of deposit from collection of present tax levy and assessments is but \$291,927.90. This is especially noticeable when the amount of general city tax collected in July was \$1,228,184.45, and the total amount to date, \$1,249,025.69.

You will naturally ask what has become of this large sum?

The monthly statements rendered do not show amount of expenditures, neither for what purpose expended. I would respectfully report that the largest item of expense has been the payment of the city's notes, issued by your directions, the same being countersigned by the chairman of the Finance Committee.

These notes, now all paid, amounted to \$849,465, the cost of discount being \$18,990.29.

I would suggest that the question of how to manage the city's finances, for the best interest of the taxpayers, as noted below be submitted to your Finance Committee, with the request that they report back to your Honorable Body their recommendations in the matter.

First—The best way of paying expenses of city government from commencement of fiscal year to the time when the tax levy is available.

Second—The payment of interest on the bonded debt is at a time when the city has no funds. Will it be advisable to change the date of collecting city tax to June 1st? And in the issuing of new bonds shall the interest be payable August 1st and February 1st, instead of July 1st and January 1st.

Third—Will it not be better to separate the general city tax from local improvements and keep the funds separate?

Fourth—In case this separation is made, will it not be cheaper for the city to issue bonds for the payment of contractors in cash, instead of giving them time orders bearing interest at 6 per cent. The expense of interest on those time orders for year ending August 1st, was \$31,952.28. The total amount of outstanding acceptances due contractors is \$836,662.73.

FIRST ORDINANCES.

STONE ARCH BRIDGE AND APPROACHES AT ANDREWS STREET.

By Ald. Simmelink—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a stone arch bridge at Andrews street and building the approaches thereto.

Adopted.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$75,000.

By Ald. Simmelink—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary:

The construction of a bridge to carry Andrews street over the Genesee river in place of the existing iron bridge; said bridge shall be of stone 60 feet wide, with a roadway 40 feet wide, and sidewalks 10 feet wide; with seven arches of 36.46 feet span each, and six piers five feet wide each. The roadway shall be paved with Medina block pavement, and the sidewalks with flagstone. In order to allow of the construction of said bridge with the proper water way the grade of Andrews street and Mumford street shall be changed as follows: Beginning at Front street at the existing grade, thence easterly on an ascending straight grade to a point over the center of the west

arch of said bridge four feet above the surface of the present bridge, thence easterly on a straight grade to the present surface of the street at the east end of said bridge. And twenty-five thousand dollars of the expense thereof shall be defrayed by an assessment upon the real estate benefited thereby.

And Whereas, The City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at \$75,000, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, that the following portion of said City is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for the said twenty-five thousand dollars of the expense thereof, viz:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of said bridge from the wall on the west line of the Genesee river to the wall on the east line of said river, in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom.

And further resolved, That the balance of the whole expense of said improvement shall be paid from the public treasury of the city of Rochester.

OPENING OF A STREET FROM THE CULVER ROAD TO BOWEN STREET.

By Ald. Simmelink—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, and we hereby judge that the public good requires the same to be done, viz:

The consent hereby given is given upon the expressed condition that the provisions of Article 4 of an act in relation to railroads constituting chapter 39 of the general laws of the State of New York of the year 1890, as amended by chapter 676 of the laws of 1892, pertained to this consent shall be complied with.

Gentlemen:—The Rochester Railway Company has completed the Bronson and Jefferson avenue line and except for the structural weakness of the bridge over the Western New York & Pennsylvania Railroad tracks, in Bronson avenue, would now be operating the same by electricity in connection with the North Clinton street line. We have had an examination of the bridge made by competent engineers and it has been pronounced unsafe even for the ordinary purposes of public travel. We cannot run electric cars over the bridge mentioned. It is our understanding that the railroad company operating its road in the bed of the abandoned canal is under statutory obligation to provide a suitable and safe bridge over the tracks at the place named. However, this may be, it is a fact that the large population west and south of the Bronson avenue bridge cannot be provided with suitable and efficient street care service until the bridge referred to is made safe for public travel and therefore safe for the passage of the cars of the Rochester Railway Company.

Gentlemen:—Your Assessment Committee begs leave to make the following report:

In the matter of the petition of Philip Madler, Jr., praying for relief from an erroneous assessment against lot No. 6 on Welder place, we find that said lot was erroneously assessed upon a valuation of \$1,200, instead of \$400, and said Madler, having paid the taxes, etc., against said lot on the basis of \$400 to the City Treasurer for the present year, we recommend that the balance of the general city tax against said lot be cancelled on the books of the City Treasurer.

In the matter of the petition of Margaret Walter, we find that the petitioner is the owner of one-half of a double house, which was assessed in 1891 at \$1,200, but, by some error, the petitioner's half of said house was increased in 1892 to \$1,100, while the other half, which is of the same value, was left at \$600, and we therefore, recommend that the petitioner be allowed a remittance of \$7.49 of the amount paid by her to the City Treasurer.

In the matter of the petition of Gottlieb Renshler, we find that the petitioner has paid water rates against his property on Ashland street for the years 1885 to 1891, inclusive, while there is no water pipes in said street, and we, therefore, recommend that the water rates erroneously paid by the petitioner be remitted, with interest from the dates when they were paid, and that the water rate charges against said property since that time be cancelled.

In the matter of the petition of Clara O. To the Electrical Committee of the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—From the verbal communication of your chairman, I understand the question submitted to me to be what right and power the Rochester Gas & Electric Company of this city has under its franchises and contracts, to construct conduits in the streets named in its communication of August 9, 1892, to the Common Council.

The Rochester Gas & Electric Company is a consolidation of the Brush, Rochester and Edison Electric Companies and the Rochester Gas Company, and any rights of property, privileges, franchises or interest any of these companies enjoyed, is held and enjoyed by the consolidated company.

The claim made by the consolidated company is that, under the Edison franchises and contracts with the city, the new company has the power to build a conduit in the streets named. It is important for the decision of this question, to know the history of the transactions between the Common Council and the several companies, and I briefly call your attention to the same:

On the 20th day of April, 1886, a petition was presented to the Common Council by the Edison Company, praying for a franchise to lay wires and conduits underground, and erect poles and place wires along the same in the streets and alleys of the city mentioned in said petition. The petition and accompanying resolution were referred to the Committee on Opening and Alteration of Streets and the Executive Board, and they, on the 4th day of May following made a report thereon and offered, and the Common Council passed a resolution which, among other things, provided that the Edison Company has "the right and authority, upon the execution by them of the contract hereinafter provided for, and upon the giving and approval of the bond hereinafter provided for, to install, operate and lay underground conduits for conducting electricity in and through" the streets which are therein named. It was also further provided that the Mayor be "empowered to execute a contract on behalf of the city with said illuminating company (which contract shall be subject to the approval of the City Attorney), carrying into effect the prayers of the petition of said company, together with the recommendations of the Committee on the Opening and Alteration of Streets this evening presented, and such

other recommendations as may be made by the Executive Board, Mayor or City Attorney before the execution of the contract."

The resolution further provided for a bond of \$50,000.00, conditioned for the faithful performance of this contract, and for damages, and, also, "that the execution of said contract, and the delivery and approval of said bond, be conditions precedent to the granting of the above mentioned franchises which franchises shall, upon such execution, delivery and approval immediately take effect."

On the 10th day of May, following, the mayor entered into a contract with the Edison Company, in which among other things, the company was authorized to install, operate and lay underground conduits for conducting electricity in the streets named therein, but by the fifteenth clause of the contract it was provided that the company should "have the right, authority, privilege and franchise subject to the conditions and restrictions of this agreement to construct electric wires and conduits underground, and to erect poles and place wires on the same in and through said streets and alleys and to maintain and operate the same for the purpose of electric lighting according to the Edison system."

On November 12, 1889, a resolution was passed by the Common Council granting to the Edison Company "to lay, construct and maintain conductors and wires within the lines of the streets, avenues and public places of the city of Rochester, with such connections as may be necessary, for the purpose of supplying electric light to the city, and the inhabitants thereof," etc. This franchise is an exact copy of the franchise given by the Common Council to the Brush Company on the 12th day of July, 1881, and to the Rochester Company a short time thereafter.

The above are the only resolutions or contracts which any of the companies hold, except the contracts made the first day of July, last, between the three electric light companies and the city for the lighting of the streets. In this last contract it was provided that each of said companies should "place all of its wires on the streets mentioned therein into a conduit to be constructed either by the city or by a company organized to construct and maintain such conduit, to which said city may grant such a franchise," and each of the companies agreed to place its wires into this conduit within sixty days after notice in writing from the Common Council so to do, and to place and put in operation and maintain all the wires supplying and furnishing an electric current to all lamps and motors on the streets and in the buildings upon which the conduit was to be maintained.

In this clause of the Edison contract there is a provision that the Edison Company's incandescent light wires shall not be required to be put into such conduit, until their use in such conduit shall be practicable.

The resolution of July 12th, 1881, giving the franchise to the Brush Company and of November 12, 1889, to the Edison Company, did not confer any right upon those companies to build any conduit whatever. The language of the resolution is, "to lay, construct and maintain conductors and wires x x with such connections as may be necessary for the purpose of supplying electric light to the city, and the inhabitants thereof." The franchise is limited to the laying constructing and maintaining of the conductors and wires. A conductor, according to the highest authorities on electrical words, terms and phrases is "a substance which will permit the passage of an electric current through it," and the term is opposed to a non-conductor.

A conduit is defined by the leading lexicographers as well as the highest authorities on electrical words and phrases as a space

or place for the reception or passage of a liquid or substance. The original meaning of the word "conduit" was confined to an underground subway for the passage of water. Electricians have since electric wires and cables have been used, extended the definition to a space or place for the reception of electric wires and cables. A conduit and a conductor are separate and distinct things, the latter, a substance which will permit the passage of an electric current through it, and the other, a receptacle to place therein a conductor.

It is, therefore, clear that the franchise of 1886 to the Edison Company was not enlarged or extended by the resolution of 1889. The question then is, what franchise was given to the Edison Company by the resolution and contract of 1886. It is a settled principle of law that the power over the streets belongs to the legislature, and not to the municipality. The authority of a municipal corporation over the streets is derived, like all other powers, from the legislature, through a charter or statute. No franchise for any special use of the streets can be obtained without the permission of the legislature, or the municipality, if the power is conferred upon it by the legislature.

It is also well settled that a municipal corporation possesses and can only exercise a power which is granted to it in express words, or one necessarily or fairly implied or incident to the power expressly granted, or one essential to the declared objects and purposes of the corporation.

I assume, for the purposes of this opinion, that the Common Council has the power to confer upon any company the right to construct and maintain a conduit in the public streets of this city. If the Common Council has this power, we are confined to the resolution and contract of May 4th and 10th, 1886. The resolution provides for the execution of a contract, as a condition precedent to the grant of the franchise to the company, and the contract is made a part of, and in connection with, the resolution.

In the fifteenth clause of the contract above quoted, the franchise of the company is set forth, and for the first time the purpose of the franchise is expressed, which is "of electric lighting according to the Edison system." The resolution gives the right and authority to lay an underground conduit for conducting electricity, but it does not say for what purpose the electricity shall be used. It provides for a contract, however, in which the purpose is set forth, which is "electric lighting according to the Edison system."

A franchise given by a municipal corporation to an individual or corporation when acted upon, becomes a binding contract, in so far as it affects any vested property of the individual or corporation by reason of the franchise.

In this case, however, the Edison Company was not satisfied with a franchise to be acted upon by it thereafter, but entered into a contract, so that its rights might become more definite and secure.

I am of the opinion that the contract and resolution must be construed together, and whatever limitation of the franchise may be in the contract, the resolution is limited accordingly. This seems to me to be clear, for if in the contract the franchise had been limited to a number of years, could it be said that the company could under the resolution, claim a franchise for an indefinite period? Or, if the resolution had stated the streets in the city of Rochester, without naming them, and the contract had specifically named the streets in which a conduit was to be laid, could it be claimed that the company would have the right to lay a conduit in all the streets of the city? Clearly not. The same

rule applies to the interpretation of this resolution and contract that applies to statutes, viz: That the intent of an act as to its purposes is not extended beyond the immediate and specific purposes therein expressed. The purposes for which this franchise was given to the Edison Company was for the electric lighting according to the Edison system, and to that, the company is confined. That such was the interpretation of this contract and resolution by the parties interested is evidenced from the provisions put in the contract of July 1st, 1892. In that contract it provides that the Edison Company shall put all of its wires into a conduit to be constructed either by the city, or by a company organized to construct and maintain such a conduit, provided that the Edison company's incandescent light wires shall not be required to be put into such conduit until their use in such conduit shall be practicable. The company has agreed to put all of its wires into this proposed conduit, and has only excepted the wires furnishing electricity to incandescent lights, and they are only to be excepted until the placing of them into the conduit shall prove practicable.

There is no conflict between the contract of 1892 and the one of 1886. The 1892 contract excepts the wires for which the conduit has been provided in the contract of 1886.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that the consolidated company has only a franchise to place wires into a conduit which are used for the purpose of lighting according to the Edison system, and can be compelled, within sixty days after a notice served upon it by the Common Council, to place all its wires into a conduit, as proposed in the contract of 1892.

Gentlemen:—In pursuance to resolution adopted at the last meeting of the Council, your Police Committee respectfully report that a sub-committee of this committee, with the Superintendent of Police, visited the cities of Cleveland, Detroit and Buffalo, for the purpose of looking into the management and workings of the police departments and precinct stations in those cities.

The full report of our Superintendent of Police who was authorized by this Council to accompany the committee is presented herewith and the same is hereby indorsed by your committee and made a part of this report.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., August 22, 1892.

To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners and Police Committee of the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to report to your committee the result of our visit and inspection of the police departments of the

cities of Cleveland, Detroit and Buffalo. The following named gentlemen representing the Police Committee of the Common Council and the Police Department, were his honor Richard Curran, Mayor, Aldermen Thomas McMillan, C. S. Cook, William Pauckner and Superintendent of Police, Joseph P. Cleary, left Rochester at 9.45 Saturday evening, August 13th, arriving in Cleveland Sunday morning at 7.30. We were met at the depot by Lieutenant Burns of the police department of that city, and escorted in carriages to the Forest City Hotel where we took breakfast, and at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, the Director of Police Col. Gibbon and J. W. Schmitt, Superintendent of Police and Detectives John Reeves and Charles McHannan, called on us and escorted us to police headquarters. The object of our visit was explained to them. The workings of their department was explained to us in all its details. There are 300 men all told in this department and the city is laid out in three police districts. A captain in command of each district. In the first district is the first and second precincts and 2 patrol houses. The headquarters of the department is in the first precinct, where the heads of the departments are located, director of police, superintendent of police, deputy superintendent, 2 captains, 10 detectives, 3 lieutenants, 5 sergeants, 1 acting sergeant, 64 patrolmen, 1 secretary of board of police, 1 police surgeon, 3 janitors, 1 fireman, 1 matron, telephone superintendent, operators and linemen, 5. There is a lieutenant and one sergeant at each precinct station and so many patrolmen and one janitor. There is also at each patrol house one acting sergeant and so many patrolmen and two drivers of patrol wagons. In some districts there is from two to six precincts besides the patrol houses, where only the patrol wagons are located. There is four patrol wagons in all. There is no police ambulance connected with the departments. Each undertaker in the city has an ambulance and answers all calls from the police departments, and it seems to give good satisfaction to the departments and the public. Any cases of accidents are brought in the patrol wagons. After inspecting the headquarters, the patrol wagon was called in front of headquarters and the director, Col. Gibbon, Superintendent of Police Schmitt, Detectives Reeves and McHannan, Mayor Curran, Aldermen McMillan, Cook, Pauckner and myself were driven to the west side precinct station No. 8. This is a new building and cost \$65,000. It is the most perfect police station I ever saw. Cuts of the building and captain's office and lock. I present for you to see. We then drove over to the central police station. It is an old building, but the department is about to erect a new building on the same ground at a cost of \$20,000, specifications of which are in my possession. We then drove back to the hotel and had a late dinner. In the afternoon carriages were provided and the same party proceeded to Mayor Rose's residence and we were driven to the cemetery where we were shown Garfield's monument from there to Wade Park and Gordon Park back by the lake shore front after a hot and dusty ride. We arrived at our hotel at 6.30 P. M. This ended our visit. We were treated with the greatest courtesy and kindness by these officials giving us all the information we wanted in regard to the police department of Cleveland. The director and Detectives Reeves and McHannan escorted us to the steam boat for Detroit at 10.30 Sunday.

The Committee is of the opinion that the new west side station No. 8 would be just the size of a building for police headquarters in this city. The plans of this building will be sent to me by the director of the police department of Cleveland.

Sunday evening our party took the steam

boat for Detroit, arriving there at 7 o'clock Monday morning, where we proceeded to the Russia House, and made that our headquarters. I at once telephoned to the superintendent of police where we were and at 10 o'clock he called on us and escorted us to police headquarters and showed us all through the different departments in that building. Their police patrol system is as perfect as can be, with a private telegraph system attached, all in charge of a superintendent of signal service and telephone lines, also a clerk and stenographer in the superintendent's office, also assistant clerk, 4 operators, 4 time-keepers in signal office, 1 janitor and 2 matrons at police headquarters. There are 368 on the force all told. 1 superintendent of police, 1 deputy superintendent, 3 captains, 14 sergeants, 27 roundsmen 307 patrolmen, 13 doormen, 2 hostlers. The city is divided into three precincts, with so many patrol stations in each precinct at the central police precinct, 1 captain, 2 sergeants, and 6 roundsmen, 96 patrolmen, 3 doormen and 1 hostler at headquarters barn. There is a sergeant in charge of station houses at night and a roundsman in day time. 12 stations in all. Also a new one in course of construction on Belle Isle Park. There are 6 patrol wagons on duty all the time, they are lighter wagons than ours, but they have a few heavier wagons on the reserve in case of riots or other serious trouble. The station houses are mostly located on side streets and nicely kept, and gives general satisfaction to the people. There is no police ambulance in Detroit. The sick or any accidents are brought in on the patrol wagon. The patrol system is very good in that city.

In the afternoon the superintendent and the electrician and our committee went in a carriage to the different station houses and to Belle Isle Park station, and all were highly pleased with the system of precinct station houses and the way they were managed in Detroit. We were treated with a great deal of courtesy by the officials.

Monday evening we left Detroit at 10.40 for Buffalo, arriving in that city on Tuesday morning at 7 o'clock. We put up at the Broezel House and I communicated with the superintendent at police headquarters. After breakfast the assistant superintendent of police, McCusack, called on us at the hotel and invited the committee to police headquarters, where we were introduced to superintendent of police Mosgenstem and the police commissioners. The superintendent showed our committee through the building which is used only by the police departments. No. 1 station is on the first floor as is also the cells. On the second floor is the superintendent's and assistant superintendent's office, police commissioners rooms, police court, on the 3rd floor is the detectives' headquarters, rogues' gallery, sleeping apartments for the men and the police matron's room, and lock-up for women and detectives' room for women witnesses. There is also on the second floor headquarters of the police patrol and telegraph system centralized from all of the precinct station houses. It is the most complete system I ever saw for a police department. There is also in the assistant superintendent's office a clerk who does the office work and telegraphing for the department. There is 1 superintendent of police, 1 surgeon, 1 clerk of board of police, 1 clerk of board of police, 1 surgeon, 1 clerk of board of excise commissioners, 2 assistant clerks, clerk to superintendent of police, clerk and operator, assistant operator, 8 regular detectives at headquarters, also several patrolmen detailed as special detectives. The facilities at police headquarters are adequate for all purposes. There are 12 police stations or precinct houses with patrol barns attached to same. There is also 2 sub-police stations, with a sergeant in com-

mand of each sub-station. There are captains in charge of the larger stations and lieutenants in charge of the other. There are also 6 patrol wagons, all kept in perfect shape and fully manned. There is a woman at each station as janitress. There is a new police station in course of construction in the northwestern part of the city near Black Rock. In a few of the outside stations there is mounted policemen. I have a map of the city of Buffalo showing the location of the several stations houses. The station houses are built of brick and the accommodations for the men are perfect and the system gives good satisfaction. The departments are increasing the number of police stations every year. The police and excise board are one. The amount collected for dog tax during the year and turned into the police pension fund was over \$1,100. The Committee visited several station houses and found them properly located and the whole police system of Buffalo I should judge was as perfect as can be found anywhere. They have a fine police department and under good discipline. The superintendent and assistant superintendent the mayor and police commissioners and all the officials we came in contact with treated us with the utmost kindness. Tuesday evening your committee and myself returned to Rochester, well satisfied with our visits, and with all the information we required towards the perfection of our police system.

It is obvious to all that the present quarters occupied by the police department is certainly inadequate for the purpose for which it is used, and it is also conceded that the police department should be removed from its present location, and that a central police station should be erected upon some suitable site to be used as a permanent headquarters for the police department and police court, the same to be arranged and constructed in a manner that will add strength and efficiency to the entire department, therefore, we recommend that your Police Committee be instructed to select a suitable site for a central police station and headquarters for the police department.

By making this change the rooms now used by the police department can be used to a good advantage by other municipal departments and an expenditure of \$15,000 or more in remodeling the city hall can be avoided.

The subject of "precinct stations" is a matter of great importance to the people of this city and their establishment as a part of our police system is only a question of time, therefore, we recommend this matter be referred to the Police Committee of this Board and Police Commissioners to ascertain and report to the Council plans for establishing and maintaining precinct stations in this city, All of which is respectfully submitted.

Although the number of arrests during the year has been large and some very important arrests made the city has been comparatively free from the higher grades of crime, taking into consideration the rapid growth of our city. I take great pleasure in stating that, through the efficiency of our department and through the able management of our Board of Police

Commissioners, in discipline the department ranks among the first class departments of the country. The Police Commissioners and the citizens of Rochester have good reason to feel proud of the police force of this city, as the efficiency of the department was fully demonstrated on Memorial Day, May 30, 1892, in managing and controlling such a large assemblage of people in our city. A day long to be remembered in the history of our city. Law and order on that day prevailed in every part of the city.

The Detective Department, under the able and efficient management of Chief of Detectives John C. Hayden, is in a healthy and increasing state of discipline, and the zeal manifested by this branch of the department and the unflinching desire to perform their duties, day or night, in seeking out and bringing criminals to justice, and recovering stolen property of our citizens, have gained for the Rochester Police Department the name of being one of the best managed departments of its size in the country.

The discipline of the uniform departments will compare favorably with that of any other well-regulated force of its size in the country. This is due to a great extent to the untiring energy of Captain Charles McCormick and his assistant, Captain Keith, and all the five Lieutenants. Complaints against members of the force for violations of rules and misconduct are not as frequent as in past years, owing to the untiring effort of their superior officers. Since my report to your Honorable Body a year ago, there has been an increase to our force of twenty-four additional men, and also twelve new men to fill vacancies.

The records of the Police Court and Board of Police Commissioners and of the Police Department in general are well kept, through the careful and untiring energy of B. Frank Enos, Police Clerk. The general health of the department is good. There have been two officers placed on the retired list, drawing pay from the Police Pension Fund.

After a long service on the force for faithful services performed. This act of the Police Commissioners is to be highly commended, as it will be an incentive to the members of the department to faithfully perform their duties and work for the best interests of the people. In conclusion I wish to express my gratitude to your honorable board for the continued courtesies extended to me.

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Zimmer—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: Your Special Committee, appointed to inquire into the matter of the construction of a new bridge across the Genesee river at Court street, and to report back to this Common Council, respectfully reports:

That since the appointment of this Committee, a number of meetings have been held, in conjunction with the city officials and citizens interested in this improvement, and, after care-

fully inquiring into and considering the views presented by the parties in interest, and all the circumstances connected with the matter, we are of the opinion that the demands of the public, and the rights of all persons interested in the improvement, as well as the City of Rochester, require that a part of the expense of the construction of said bridge should be assessed upon the adjoining owners of property in the river bed and the Johnson and Seymour race, and the other part to be paid by the city at large, and that the proportion should be 25 per cent. for the local assessment, and the balance of the expense upon the city at large.

We are also of the opinion that the bridge should be a stone arch bridge, having a forty foot roadway, and of a total width of sixty-four feet which is the width of the street, and, we therefore recommend that the bridge be constructed of the style known as a stone arch bridge of a width of sixty-four feet, with a roadway of forty feet, the roadway to be paved with a Medina block pavement, and the sidewalk to be a flagstone walk.

We also recommend that 25 per cent. of the total expense of the construction of such bridge be paid by a local assessment upon the lots and parcels of land on each side of the proposed bridge between the west bank of the Genesee river and the west Blue Line of the Erie canal, and that the balance of the total expense, be assessed upon the city at large, and be paid out of the public treasury of the City of Rochester.

We also recommend the preparation by the city surveyor of a suitable ordinance to carry out the recommendations contained in this report.

Gentlemen—A complaint has been made of the unsanitary condition of the dwellings on Loomis street.

I made an inspection of the drainage in the houses on this street, and found the cellars wet, the conductors from the roofs discharging on the ground, the waste water from sinks also discharging in the rear of lots and the vaults are filled with water from this cause. Some of the vaults drain into the gutter in the street, there being no sewer to receive any drainage or surface water that may collect. The gutter is in a filthy condition, and pools of stagnant water are in many places.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Forsyth—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Law Committee begs leave to make the following report:

The applications for appointment as Commissioners of Deeds of H. Ward Kelly, Frank W. Bristow, Charlotte I. Clark and Gottilieb H. Flad, have been duly considered, and your committee recommends that the applications be granted.

The petition of Fannie Garson for the correction of a deed of the premises located at No. 243 East Main street, bearing date February 11, 1862, made by the City of Rochester to one Nathan H. Selgman, was under consideration by your committee, and we find that, in the above year, John C. Nash, then Mayor of the

City of Rochester, executed a deed to said Selgman of said premises, and in acknowledging the execution thereof, we find, that the officer before whom the acknowledgment was taken, did not take the proper acknowledgment required under the statutes of this state, and that the deed then executed by said Nash was not properly executed, and does not give a proper title to Fannie Garson, the present owner of the premises. We, therefore, recommend that the accompanying resolution be adopted, authorizing the Mayor of this city to execute and deliver a deed of said premises, for the purpose of correcting the aforesaid deed, and perfecting the title to said premises.

The claim of A. S. Winston, amounting to \$106, for services rendered as clerk to the special commissioners of the Lyell avenue and Saxton street sewer, which has been referred to this committee, has been duly considered, and we find that this Common Council has no power to authorize the payment of such services, and we, therefore, recommend that the claim be denied.

The claim of J. R. P. Goodman, amounting to \$30, for similar services, has also been duly considered, and, upon the same grounds, we recommend that the same be denied.

In the matter of the claim of Charles Horn for extra labor performed in connection with the Medina stone improvement on Mill street, we find that, under the ordinance directing said improvement, the contractor was directed to construct the lateral sewers for the lots, as well as for surface drainage, to connect with the Mill street sewer tunnel. The City Surveyor assumed, in making the plans and specification for this improvement, that said tunnel had been made in the middle of said Mill street, but, when the contractor began to construct the laterals, it was discovered that instead of said tunnel having been constructed in the middle line of said street, it was constructed in an irregular line, and it became necessary for the contractor to excavate 175 cubic yards of rock and 33 cubic yards of earth to connect with the irregular lines of said tunnel; that the full value for the excavation of rock is \$4 per cubic foot, and of earth, thirty cents per cubic foot, making the total amount of Mr. Horn's extra labor \$709.90. The City Attorney has given his opinion to this committee that the City of Rochester is legally bound to pay for such extra excavation, and we, therefore, recommend that a resolution be adopted directing the payment of the aforesaid claim out of the Contingent Fund.

Inasmuch as it is provided by the New Election Code that proper places for meetings of the board of registry and for holding elections be designated on the first Tuesday of September of each year, your committee recommends that a resolution be adopted that each member of this Common Council immediately report to the chairman of the Law Committee the places for the meeting of such boards of registry and for holding elections and report such booths as may be required in his ward for the purpose of the coming election.

Your committee further recommends that a resolution be adopted authorizing and empowering the chairman of the Law Committee to enter into a contract with the Buffalo Portable Steel House Company to secure such election booths as may be required by the several aldermen in their election districts of this city, at a cost not to exceed \$200 for each booth, and at an expense for the erection, removal and storage of such booths not to exceed \$ for each booth, and that said chairman be further authorized and empowered to remove or change the location of all wooden booths heretofore erected by this Common Council for election purposes.

In the matter of the communication in regard to the re-districting of the wards of this

city into election districts, referred to this committee, we submit, after a careful examination of the New Election Code by the City Attorney, that this council can only redistrict the wards within at least thirty days before the charter election, unless the creation or alteration of a ward renders it necessary. No creation or alteration of any ward having been made since the last redistricting, the Common Council has no power to redistrict the wards at this time for the coming election.

Gentlemen:—Your Electrical Committee begs leave to make the following report:

Pursuant to the resolution adopted at the last meeting of the Common Council, empowering this committee to enter into a contract with the Rochester Gas and Electric Company for the construction and maintenance of a sub-way or conduit for electrical conductors, we caused a contract to be drawn by the City Attorney and the City Electrician, which has been accepted by the electric company, and approved by this committee, and was by order of this committee executed by the Mayor, and delivered on the 5th day of September, 1892, a copy of which we present with this report.

We also recommend that the accompanying resolution be adopted, approving of and ratifying the execution of the contract by the Mayor.

This agreement, made this 5th day of September, 1892, between the City of Rochester, a municipal corporation, through and by the Mayor of said city, of the first part, and the Rochester Gas and Electric Company, a private corporation, duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of New York in said city of Rochester, of the second part.

The party of the first part is designated hereinafter, for brevity, as "said city," and the party of the second part as "said company."

Whereas, Said company by virtue of its corporate franchises, has the power to provide, build, equip, maintain and operate conduits or subways for electrical conductors;

Whereas, It is important and necessary for the public benefit and safety that all electrical conductors in the thoroughfares hereinafter named be placed in subways or conduits; and

Whereas, Contracts were made July 1st, 1892, between said city and the three electric light companies now forming part of or operated by said company, in the sixteenth clause of which contract it was provided that the wires of those companies within the territory hereinafter named were to be placed underground; said three companies being the Brush, the Rochester Electric Light companies and the Edison Electric Illuminating company.

Now therefore, this agreement witnesseth, that in consideration of the premises and in consideration of the mutual premises and agreements hereinafter contained, and of the sum of one dollar paid, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

First. Said city hereby grants to said company the right, and said company hereby agrees, to provide, build, equip, maintain and operate subways or conduits, as hereinafter provided, on Main street from Plymouth avenue to University avenue; on Exchange and State streets from the Erie canal to Allen street, and on North and South St. Paul streets from Court street to Andrews street; said subways or conduits shall be provided with the necessary manholes and other means of distribution, and shall be built of the kind and material in accordance with the plans and specifications to be furnished by said company and to be approved of by the electrical committee of the Common Council; and

shall be completed within six months after the execution and delivery of this contract (weather permitting and strikes not interfering). Said subways or conduits shall be located immediately at the curb stone on each side of said streets and there shall be no less than six, nor more than ten ducts as directed by said electrical committee, when said subways or conduits are constructed in said subways or conduits on each side of said streets, in addition to the ducts necessary for the use of said company in its individual business; and said subways or conduits shall be provided, built, equipped, maintained, operated and kept in good repair by, and at the cost of said company, which will, upon the reasonable demand of said electrical committee, adopt any and all necessary improvements that will increase the usefulness and efficiency of the system contemplated by this contract. Said electrical committee shall have the right at any time to direct said company to make such modifications, changes and variations as may be reasonable and necessary in said subways or conduits, or any of them or the construction, plans, material, or any other matter connected with them or any of them, or of the construction, maintenance or operation of them, or any of them, and said company shall conform to, and carry out any changes, modifications or variations so directed. Said company may, by extra subways or conduits constructed under direction of the electrical committee, make connection between said subways or conduits and its existing central station.

Second. Said company shall not open any street surface, or make any excavation, without first obtaining a permit therefor from the executive board of said city, or other officer or department vested by law with the control of said streets, and shall re-fill such excavation and replace all pavements and roadways of every character, in as good a condition as before the excavation, and keep the same in repair for one year after the same has been so replaced or restored, and the time to be consumed in performing such work, together with the length of time that the trench or trenches may be open at any one time, shall also be determined and regulated by said executive board. Said company shall pay all reasonable expenses, upon demand, incurred by said city for the appointment of an inspector or inspectors, by the executive board to superintend and inspect such excavating and relaying of pavements and roadways and for the appointment of an inspector or inspectors by said electrical committee to superintend and inspect the construction of said subways or conduits.

Third. Said company shall at its own cost furnish to said city any and all maps, working or other plans, profiles, surveys and drawings made to a scale or otherwise and all accessible data, figures and information that may be requested by said electrical committee and necessary or deemed to be necessary for any purpose relating to or in connection with said subways or conduits.

Fourth. The aforesaid additional ducts or parts thereof in said subways or conduits shall be leased by said company to any corporation or corporations that may apply for the same, having lawful power and the consent of said Common Council to operate electrical conductors or to manufacture use and supply electricity in said city.

Said company shall without charge supply to said city all the ducts in said subways or conduits necessary for its electrical conductors and the electrical conductors of each separate department of said city that may now or hereafter be required except electric lighting or transmitting power. If at any time the aforesaid additional ducts in said subways or conduits shall not be sufficient for all the corporations applying for the same, for said city,

or for any of its departments, the additional ducts needed may be provided by said company at its own cost by the construction, maintenance equipment and operation of the additional subways or conduits sufficient therefor and subject, however, to the same conditions and the same control by said city, said electrical committee and said Executive Board as the original subways or conduits are by the terms of this contract and by law.

Fifth. The location of said additional ducts in said subways or conduits and the location and occupancy of the electrical conductors in additional ducts shall be under the control and direction of the electrical committee.

Sixth. Said company hereby agrees that said city and all corporations leasing and occupying ducts or parts thereof in said subways or conduits shall have full management and control of their electrical conductors and shall have at all time free access to and the use of all manholes or distributing facilities connected with said subways or conduits, subject to the approval and direction of said electrical committee, provided, however, that manholes shall not be opened and entered except after application to and under the supervision of said company, and should said company unreasonably refuse such application, the same may be granted by the City Electrician.

Seventh. Said company shall fix a fair scale of rents to be paid by said corporations according to the kind of conductors and the number of ducts or the amount of space required, the total amount of which rental shall not at any time exceed ten per cent. per annum on the entire cost of providing, building, equipping, maintaining and operating the aforesaid additional ducts. In case said company is unable to agree with any corporation or corporations applying to it for the use of any of the aforesaid additional ducts or parts thereof on the question of its right to use or the amount of rental to be charged therefor, the question of such right or rental, or both shall be determined by arbitrators consisting of three citizens of Rochester, one of whom shall be chosen by the corporation or corporations so applying for such use, one by said company, and the third by said Electrical Committee any member of said Electrical Committee may act as such third arbitrator, and the decision of such arbitrators or a majority of them shall be rendered in writing and shall be final and conclusive.

Eighth. Said company, shall at all time, keep just, full and true records and books of account, which shall show in detail the transactions had by it in and concerning said subways or conduits, with whom the same are had, the nature thereof and especially:

First. The number of ducts or portions thereof in said subways or conduits, occupied with the names of the occupants thereof and the respective number of such ducts or portions thereof occupied by each occupant, including said company.

Second. The number and kind of electrical conductors therein with the names of the owners or users thereof.

Third. The gross and net amount, in detail, of the rentals, charges and moneys of all kinds, collected or received by said company for the use of said subways or conduits and from whom and for what the same were received or collected specifying the names of those paying such moneys and the cause and consideration of such payment, in detail.

Fourth. All payments of every kind made by said company on account of said subways or conduits, specifying in detail, and separately, each payment and to whom the same was made and the cause and consideration thereof, so that it may be determined whether the same is chargeable to the cost of construction and maintenance.

Said records, books and accounts of said company shall at all times be open to the inspection and examination of said Electrical Committee or its duly authorized representative and they, or he, may copy the whole or any part thereof.

Ninth. Said company shall and will, on the last Thursday of March, of each and every year, make and return a statement to the Common Council, duly verified by an officer of said company, of such form as may set forth the substance of the proceedings and transactions in respect to said subways or conduits kept in their records or books as required in this contract.

Tenth. Said company, shall, at any time hereafter, upon the demand of the Common Council, by a proper instrument or instruments of conveyance or transfer, in due form, duly acknowledged, sell, assign, transfer and set over to said city the aforesaid subways or conduits, constructed or to be constructed by it, as aforesaid, and any and all contracts or other property of every kind or nature held or owned by said company, pertaining or relating to said subways or conduits, upon the payment by said city to said company of the actual cost of the construction of said subways or conduits and if said company shall not have earned the legal rate of interest per annum on the actual cost of said subways or conduits, during the term of this contract, said city shall pay an additional sum to make up the legal interest upon the actual cost thereof, provided, however, that said company shall be charged a proportionate rental for the use and occupancy of all the ducts of said subways or conduits in its individual business, in computing such cost.

Eleventh. Said company hereby agrees to reconstruct the present Edison underground system in said city, with all the latest improvements, devices and manner of operation, which will increase the usefulness and efficiency of said system, and said Edison system, so reconstructed, shall be laid on top of or adjacent to the aforesaid subways or conduits as directed by the Electrical Committee in the streets and territory described in the first paragraph herein, in such manner as not to interfere with or obstruct the operation and maintenance of said subways or conduits. It is, however, expressly understood that said Edison underground system shall not be extended or enlarged in its scope beyond the present use of the Edison incandescent system in said city and said system shall be placed by said company in the aforesaid subways or conduits as soon as practicable, provided, however, that the existing rights of said company shall not be diminished.

Twelfth. Said company covenants and agrees to indemnify and save harmless said city, its boards, officers, agents and servants, and each and every of them, against and from all suits and actions of every name and description brought against it or them, or any of them and from all damages and costs to which it, they, or any of them, may be put while said subways or conduits are owned by said company by reason of injury to person or persons, or property of any nature resulting from any accident, negligence or carelessness in the performance of said work of providing building equipping and maintaining operating and repairing said subways or conduits and all man-holes, means of distribution, appliances and accessories thereto, as provided in the contract or from any improper or defective material, machinery, instrument or appliance used in performing the same, or from any act or omission of said company. Said company also agrees to indemnify and save harmless said city against any and all claims, suits and actions which may be brought for the infringement of any patent or right thereto in use in

said subways or conduits, man-holes, means of distribution, appliances or accessories in use under and by virtue of this contract while said subways or conduits are owned by said company. Said company further agrees that after final judgment and after expiration of time to appeal against said city, by reason of the aforesaid premises, said company shall pay to said city, upon demand, the full amount of said judgment; said company shall have notice of all suits and the right to defend upon substitution as party defendant.

Thirteenth. Said company shall give a bond to said city as a condition precedent to this contract, in the penal sum of one hundred thousand dollars, with good and sufficient sureties, satisfactory to said Electrical Committee, securing the just and full performance of all the covenants and agreements of this contract and the building, providing and maintaining of said subways and conduits as herein provided, and securing said city, well and safely against all claims, suits and actions as hereinbefore provided, and in case of the insolvency or death of any of the sureties upon said bond, the said company, upon request of the Electrical Committee, shall give a new bond of the same tenor and effect and subject to the same approval as the bond originally to be given.

Fourteenth. This contract is entered into by said company subject to all ordinances of the Common Council and police rules and regulations enacted, or to be enacted, by said Common Council or said Electrical Committee, by virtue of the authority given to them under the charter.

Fifteenth. If, at any time, in the opinion of said Common Council there shall be a substantial failure by said company to fully carry out the provisions of this contract and it is so adjudged by competent judicial authority, said city, its departments, boards, officers, agents and servants, may enter into the possession of said subway or conduits upon such terms as the court may direct, and said company shall forfeit its interest in said subways or conduits and will quietly and peaceably surrender the possession thereof to said city, its officers, agents, departments and servants, who shall, thereupon, and thereafter hold and own the same as the property of said city.

Sixteenth. The word "duct" as used in this contract is defined as one of the spaces or pipes in the subway or conduit connecting one man-hole with another in which electrical conductors are placed. The words "subway" and "conduit" as used in this contract are defined as a series of ducts, man-holes, means of distribution, and all appliances and appurtenances necessary to the operation and maintenance for electrical wires underground, except the Edison underground system. The term "additional duct" as used in this contract is defined as the duct or ducts to be rented only and not to be used by said company in its individual business.

The successors and assigns of the parties hereto are bound by this contract.

In witness whereof, the said parties have caused their respective corporate seals to be hereunto affixed and these presents to be signed by their president and mayor the day and year first above written.

The bonds are dated September 1, 1892, and will be due September 1, 1922, with the privilege of redemption after 10 years.

As this fund is to be used for the building of bridges, I shall include same in my report to you in the monthly statements rendered.

Gentlemen:—I would say to the Board that there is a squad of four officers detailed from both day squads, four from the morning squad and four from the afternoon squad, to attend all fires during the daytime with the Lieutenant in charge. These men attend every fire. Of course they can't be expected to reach the fire as quick as the fire department, but as I am informed by Lieutenant McDermott, they reach the fire in good time to keep good order. The night lieutenant takes charge of all fires in the night time and details a squad of men to keep good order and protect property. Each lieutenant does the same thing during his hours of duty, so that I think as far as fire duty is concerned, everything is done that can be done under the circumstances.

Gentlemen:—Some time ago I caused to be erected in front of my place of business wooden post having on top sign about two and one-half feet square. Said post was about seven feet high and was placed at outer edge of sidewalk. Said post and sign I have been com-

pelled to remove by Executive Board. Yet there are now on East Main and West Main streets, over sixteen signs on wooden posts similar to post I erected. There are also on said streets several signs on iron posts that were I believe formerly lamp posts. There are also on said streets several signs attached to posts supporting overhead wires. Several signs and posts on streets above mentioned obstructed sidewalk far more than did my post and sign. There are also on other streets and within three blocks of East Main street several signs on posts. ROCHESTER, N. Y., July 20, 1892. }

The undersigned, a committee appointed at a meeting held on the 6th, inst., to investigate the cause of complaint made to this Board on the above date of a nuisance existing on the premises situated on Allen street between Kent and Oak streets, respectfully report:

That they have made a careful examination of the said premises and present the following as their findings thereon:

That the premises No. 168 Kent street, owned by J. H. Campbell, are in a complete unsanitary condition and a menace to the health and lives of the inmates and to the people of the immediate vicinity for the following existing conditions: That the cellar on said premises shows evidence that there is no drainage to the public sewer; that the cellar bottom is thoroughly saturated to the depth of one or more feet; that upon the surface there exists at least to the depth of six inches, slime and filth; that this building and the adjoining building, namely: No. 166 of the same street, have either no water conductors, or those which exist are deficient, and that the rainfall is discharged from the buildings of both premises into the said yard of No. 163. That the premises No. 166 are owned by the New York Central & Hudson River R. R. Co. In time of rainfall the said yard or premises of No. 163, is flooded to the depth of several inches in consequence of the defective water conductors from the aforesaid premises. The depth of the cellar on premises No. 163 is about six feet.

Premises No. 177, owned by J. H. Campbell. The cellar is six feet deep from the surface of the street. Cellar bottom is saturated and filthy as that in No. 163. There is evidence of an insufficient fall between the said cellar and the street sewer.

These premises also suffer from the discharge of rainfall upon the surface of the ground in rear of the building. No means of ventilation exist in this cellar. The floor of said cellar is covered with rotten planks and with slimy filth to the depth of several inches.

Premises No. 178. Owner J. H. Campbell. These premises are occupied as Italian tenements. The conductor pipes from these buildings are disconnected and water fall flows on surface of the ground.

The privies on said premises are old and very offensive, and cannot be improved, but should be abolished. The cellar on these premises is dry and clean, in obedience with an order heretofore made by this Board, which provided a special drain pipe for the conveyance of house drainage outside of the building and which was necessarily raised above the surface of the lot.

No. 180, corner of Kent and Oak streets, owned by J. G. Cook. Insufficient drainage by reason of little or no fall from the premises to the street sewer. House drainage carried to sewer by elevated pipes above the cellar floor. Cellar five feet ten and one-half inches deep. Concerning the sewer in said street the following memoranda is here given: The origin of the sewer is on Allen street at or about the crossing of the Central railway, and extends to the Platt street sewer. It is a stone sewer one and one-half feet wide by two feet

deep, built in 1859, length 969 feet. The depth as shown on the map of the City Surveyor, is between 7 and 8 feet between Kent and Oak streets.

We also report that on a similar complaint made to this Board the matter was referred November 12, 1891, to the Executive Board for relief. That upon this reference said Board had several pits dug to the sewer to ascertain its condition. It was ascertained that it was obstructed by solid earth and matter to the depth of one foot and more, and that no further measures have been adopted.

Upon the facts and the findings ascertained in this investigation we can come to no other conclusion than that the sewer in said street between Kent and Oak streets is of insufficient depth and capacity for the purpose of draining the property in said locality, and that no relief can be given until a new sewer of adequate capacity and depth is constructed. That the sanitary condition of the several premises named is such as to demand immediate and prompt measures on the part of this Board to abate the nuisances here described, and which endanger the health and lives of the residents on said street in an imminent degree.

We, therefore, recommend that this Board declare the Allen street sewer to be a public nuisance, and that the Common Council be requested to pass an ordinance, with the least possible delay, for the construction in said street of a sewer of sufficient depth and capacity to remove the impending danger heretofore described in this report of findings and the adoption of the accompanying orders for the immediate but temporary improvement of the premises heretofore named.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City
of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—For some months past a number of complaints have been received by the Board of Health of this city in reference to the condition of the premises situate on Allen street, between Kent and Oak streets. A committee of this Board was appointed to investigate the matters complained of and report back to this Board with such recommendations as in their judgment should seem proper. The result of their investigation showed the premises examined to be in a very unsanitary condition and a menace to the health and lives of the people living on that street, and in the immediate vicinity. The conclusions of the committee were that the chief cause of the conditions found was a lack of proper sewerage facilities and they recommended that the Allen street sewer as it then existed and still exists be declared by the Board of Health a public nuisance. Thereafter and on the coming in of the report of this committee, the Board of Health, at a regular meeting held on the — day of — 1892, duly declared the Allen street sewer a public nuisance and a resolution was passed directing the Clerk of the Board to communicate with your honorable body, acquainting you with the action taken by your Board in the way of providing for a new sewer in Allen street, and thus abating the nuisance.

Such a communication was sent to your Board and was, according to the published reports of the proceedings of your Board, ordered received, and filed. One or more meetings have been held by your Board since the communication referred to was received by your Board, and still no action has been taken in reference to the matter of the proposed sewer.

At the last meeting of the Board of Health, that Board adopted a resolution that the Board of Health under and by virtue of the power

and authority conferred upon it by law should take such proceedings as may be necessary to accomplish the construction of a sewer in Allen street of sufficient size and depth to provide proper sewerage and drainage for the people and premises on that street, and if the same be done by the Board of Health that the cost of the construction of such a sewer be made a charge upon the city at large. Of the right and power of the Board of Health to take such action as specified in their resolution there can be no question, as the same is explicitly given to them in the act of the legislature chapter 270 of the laws of 1885, entitled "An act for the preservation of public health and the registration of vital statistics."

The action, however, of the Board of Health is one which the Board feels should only be taken in extreme cases and when the Board cannot induce the proper legislative and executive officers of the city to give the relief sought, in the usual and customary way in which city improvements are made.

The Board of Health believing that this is a matter that should be very carefully considered before final action, desire to once more bring the matter to the attention of your honorable body and to the individual members of your Board, with the hope that this sewer of which there is urgent necessity, shall be constructed by and through the legislation of your Board, and in the ordinary and customary way in which local improvements of this city are made. Then, if after due deliberation, your Board in its judgment sees fit to take no action whatsoever in the premises, it becomes incumbent upon the Board of Health to make the proposed improvement and give the desired relief.

A copy of the report of the committee hereinabove referred to, as well as a copy of an opinion as to the powers of Boards of Health in cities, given by Charles F. Tabor the Attorney-General of this state on September 24, 1890, is herewith submitted.

Dear Sir:—In reply to your verbal request for my opinion as to the power of a local Board of Health to lay a drain or sewer in a public street, which is the only means of abating a nuisance which is dangerous and a menace to the public health, after having duly requested the authorities of such village to abate such notice, and a refusal upon their part so to do, I beg leave to state as follows:

By Chapter 270 of the Laws of 1885, the organization of local Boards of Health is provided for, and when organized they have the power (Section 4), "to receive and examine into the nature of complaints made by any of the inhabitants, concerning nuisances, or causes of danger, or injury to life and health, within the limits of its jurisdiction; to enter upon or within any place or premises where nuisances or conditions dangerous to life and health are known, or believed to exist, and by appointed members or persons, to inspect and examine the same; and every such Board of Health shall have the power, and it shall be its duty to order the suppression and removal of nuisances and conditions, detrimental to life and health, found to exist within the limits of its jurisdiction;" and (by Section 6); "to make, and from time to time publish, in such manner, as to secure early and full publicity thereto, all such orders and regulations as they think necessary and proper for the preservation of life and health, and the successful op-

eration of this law; and to make, without publication thereof, such orders and regulations in special or individual cases, not of general application, as they may see fit, concerning the suppression and removal of nuisances, and concerning all other matters, in their judgment, detrimental to public health, and to serve copies thereof upon any occupant, or occupants, and the owner or owners of any premises whereon any such nuisances, or other matters aforesaid, shall exist, or to post the same in some conspicuous place on such premises."

Subdivision 8.—"To employ all such persons as shall be necessary to enable them to carry into effect the orders and regulations they shall have adopted, and the powers vested in them by this act, and to fix their compensation."

Section 44.—"And in case of non-compliance with any order or regulation which shall have been served or posted, as provided in subdivision 6, of Section 3, of this act, the said board, or its servants, or employees, may lawfully enter upon any premises to which such order or regulation relates, and suppress or remove the nuisance, or other matters, in the judgment of said board, detrimental to the public health mentioned in such order or regulation, and any other nuisance or matter of the description aforesaid found there existing; and the expense thereof shall be a charge upon the occupant or any or all of the occupants of said premises, or upon the person or persons who have caused or maintained the nuisance or other matter of the description aforesaid, and may be sued for and recover with costs by said board, in the name of such board in any court having jurisdiction."

Section 5.—"All expenses incurred by the several Boards of Health in the execution and performance of the duties imposed by this act shall be a charge only on their respective cities, villages, and towns; and shall be audited, levied, collected and paid in the same manner as other city, village and town charges are audited, levied, collected and paid."

These provisions it seems to me give local Boards of Health ample power to abate nuisances, and if there is an existing nuisance dangerous to health in a street, and the city or village authorities refuse to abate the same, it is the duty of the Board of Health to abate it, and I am of the opinion that, if the authorities of the city or village, after having been properly served with an order to abate the nuisance, refuse or neglect to do so, the Board of Health may abate it, and if the laying of a sewer be the only safe and proper means of abating such nuisance, they may lay such a sewer, and may charge the expenses thereof to the city or village, the city or village being the occupant of the street, within the meaning of the word as used in the act above referred to.

The expenses of the Board of Health in laying such sewer should be audited, levied, collected and paid in the same manner as other city or village charges are audited, levied, collected and paid.

WEST STREET EXTENSION.

By Ald. Simmelink—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, and we hereby judge that the public good requires the same to be done, viz:

The extension of West street, from its present terminus at the south line of the property occupied by the State Industrial School, northerly to Thrush street, and the property to be taken therefore, is a strip of land sixty (60) feet wide, of which the following described line is the eastern boundary. Beginning at a point where the east line of West street intersects the south line of the State Industrial School property; thence northerly in a straight line, deflecting 0 degrees, 38 minutes and 43 seconds west from the line of West street, prolonged, to a point in the east line of Thrush street, 102 1-2 feet north from the north line of Emerson street.

Resolved, further, that the following portion of said City is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for the whole expense thereof, viz:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of the proposed extension of West street, from Thrush street to the south line of the State Industrial School lands, in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom.

Adopted.

PIPE SEWER IN CHESTER AVENUE.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a sewer in Chester avenue.

Adopted.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$2,900.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, viz:

The construction of a vitrified pipe sewer, 15 inches in diameter in Chester avenue, from the sewer in Genesee street to the center of Birch street; and 12 inches in diameter from the center of Birch street to the center of Pioneer street. Also the construction of the necessary manholes, surface sewers, lot laterals, branches, roadway grading and gutter formations.

And Whereas, the City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at \$2,900, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, that the following portion of said City is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for the whole expense thereof, viz:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Chester avenue, from Pioneer street to Genesee street, in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom.

Adopted.

PORTLAND CEMENT WALK IN SANFORD STREET.

By Ald. Pauckner—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a walk on Sanford street.

Adopted.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$650.

By Ald. Pauckner—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, viz:

The construction of a Portland cement walk 4 1-2 feet wide on the south side of Sanford street, from Mt. Hope avenue to Poplar street. Also the necessary sidewalk grading.

And Whereas, The City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at \$650, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, that the following portion of said City is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for the whole expense thereof, viz:

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your attention is respectfully called to the extremely unsanitary condition of what is known as Simpson's quarry on Genesee street.

This quarry is simply an excavation containing a pool of stagnant water, from which arise odors of the most noxious kind, and which pervade the entire vicinity of the pool, and within a short distance and in the neighborhood are no less than twelve cases of typhoid and malarial fevers, and also some cases of diphtheria, so that there is but very little doubt but what this stagnant water is the direct cause of all this sickness, and the dangerous character of the diseases named renders it imperative that some action be taken without delay, on account of the many who are thus exposed to sickness and death.

The Executive Board of the city should be instructed to at once fill up the excavation, or the water in the pool should be pumped out into the sewer, and disinfectants in sufficient quantities be applied to purify the excavation. We are informed that the waters in this pool could be pumped out in four hours, and that the whole unsanitary condition could be corrected in 24 hours time. If this is the case, there is no sufficient reason why people in this neighborhood should be exposed to such ter-

rible consequences. We believe that the action so far taken by the Board of Health has been in the nature of temporizing with the difficulty, while what is required is the adoption of a more radical policy.

And further it seems to have been the practice in times past in this city, to permit individuals to make large excavations for the purposes of getting out stone, the earth removed is sold and carried away, the rock is then removed, having been sold, and the result is a large excavation which fills in with water, which in turn becomes stagnant, then the city is called upon through its Board of Health to pay a large amount of money to fill up the excavation. So it is easy enough to see that the city is a serious loser in the operation, and by way of preventing in future the mistakes of the past, it seems proper that no further permissions be granted for excavating within the city limits, similar to that referred to as Simpson's quarry.

On August 23, 1892, your committee presented its report to your honorable body recommending among other things that the petition of George E. Flad with reference to an alleged erroneous assessment against lot No. 4 of the Elias Subdivision of the Rohr Tract for Bay street sewer under final ordinance No. 4,510 be denied; subsequently the assessors appeared before this committee and from their statements this committee is satisfied that a rebate should have been allowed the petitioner in the above matter, and we therefore recommend that the resolution above referred to be reconsidered and that the petitioner be allowed to pay the sum of \$45, in full for his assessment for said sewer.

In the matter of the assessment for Locust street culvert improvement under final ordinance No. 4,169, the roll for which was presented to your honorable body August 9, 1892, and on motion of Ald. Wurtz, referred to this committee, in view of the fact that at the last meeting of the Common Council the petition of certain property owners to have said assessment reconsidered was denied; we recommend that the roll for said improvement be confirmed.

Gentlemen:—In the matter of the petition for fixing the width of Jennings street at 57 feet which was referred to me.

I am advised that there is no power in the Common Council to alter by resolution the lines of any existing public street and that a public street can be acquired for street purposes only pursuant to statutes provided therefor.

If Jennings street has a width of 66 feet established by dedication or eminent domain, as I believe to be the case, then the Common Council has no authority to alter the same to a width of 57 feet or to any other width, except by observing the provisions of law applicable thereto.

In my opinion the street should be cleared of obstructions for its full width of 66 feet. Therefore I recommend that your Honorable Body deny the petition.

To the Honorable, the Common Council :

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee begs leave to make the following report:

On September 22, a letter was received at the City Treasurer's office, from Messrs. Clark & Sedgwick, attorneys of New York City, acting for W. I. Quintard, who at the recent sale of water bonds purchased \$300,000 worth of them, in which they took the position that the act under which said bonds were to be issued, was unconstitutional, and therefore, that the bonds would be void. A copy of the letter follows:

ROCHESTER CITY ADDITIONAL WATER SUPPLY BONDS, LAWS 1892, CHAPTER 358.

NEW YORK, Sept. 21, 1892.

S. B. Williams, Esq., City Treasurer, Rochester, N. Y.:

Dear Sir:—We beg to acknowledge your favor of the 20th inst, with enclosures.

From examination of the papers submitted we find that the law of 1892, chapter 358 is

unconstitutional, and consequently that the bonds issued or attempted to be issued thereunder would be illegal, for the following reasons:

Article 8, section 11 of the state constitution provides that "The term of the bond issued to provide for the supply of water shall not exceed twenty years. Section 1, chapter 358 laws of 1892, provides that the water bonds shall run "For a period not exceeding fifty years."

That the above constitutional provision applies to cities of over 100,000 population see Sweet vs. the City of Syracuse. This constitutes the first objection as to constitutionality.

The second objection is made under the same article and section of the constitution and arises from the fact that the laws of 1892 (chapter 358 does not provide for the creation of a sinking fund to provide for the redemption of the bonds as see said article 8, section 11, state constitution, to wit: "A sinking fund shall be created on the issuing of said bonds for the redemption by raising annually a sum which will procure an amount equal to the sum of the principal and interest of said bonds at their maturity.

For the above reasons we have advised our client, Mr. Quintard, to refuse to take up the bonds.

In the absence of the City Treasurer, the letter was handed to the chairman of the Finance Committee, who immediately took steps to investigate the subject, and consulted with other members of the committee, who had served upon the special committees in former councils which had in charge the preparation of the bill. The recollection of these members, Aldermen McMillan and Kelly, was to the effect that the bill was prepared after due deliberation and full consultation and that eminent constitutional lawyers had passed upon the bill, and believed it to be constitutional. It was, however, thought best that the subject matter of the letter from Clarke & Sedgwick should be submitted to the Hon. George F. Danforth, and to William F. Cogswell for their opinion, and accordingly the questions raised in the communication of Clarke & Sedgwick were submitted to those gentlemen with a request for their written opinions thereon. Copies of the opinion of these gentlemen follow:

MR. COGSWELL'S OPINION.

To the Finance Committee of the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

You ask my opinion upon two questions which, as formulated by you, are as follows:

First. Does the fact that the bonds issued under chapter 358 of the laws of 1892 are to run fifty years render said act unconstitutional?

Second. Does the fact that said act contains no provision for the creation of a sinking fund render it unconstitutional?

And you state that in the consideration of these questions I am to assume as a fact that the bonded indebtedness of the City of Rochester together with the proposed issue of water bonds will not exceed 10 per cent. of the assessed valuation of the real estate of the city of Rochester.

I regard these questions, although stated in form as two, as really one, and as dependent upon the same consideration. The amendment to section 11 of article 8 of the constitution, adopted in 1884, omitting a paragraph which has no bearing upon the question under consideration is as follows:

No county containing a city of over one hundred thousand inhabitants, or any such city, shall be allowed to become indebted for any purpose or in any manner to an amount

which, including existing indebtedness, shall exceed ten per centum of the assessed valuation of the real estate of such county or city subject to taxation as it appeared by the assessment rolls of said county or city on the last assessment for state or county taxes prior to the incurring of such indebtedness; and all indebtedness in excess of such limitation, except such as may now exist, shall be absolutely void, except as herein otherwise provided. * * * * *

Nor shall this section be construed to prevent the issue of bonds to provide for the supply of water shall not exceed twenty years, and a sinking fund shall be created on the issuing of said bonds for their redemption, by raising annually a sum which will produce an amount equal to the sum of the principal and interest of said bonds at their maturity."

The city of Rochester is a city of over one hundred thousand inhabitants, and its present indebtedness, including the bonds provided for by this chapter 358 of the laws of 1892, does not exceed 10 per centum of its assessed valuation, as you inform me. The question then resolves itself into this: Does the last paragraph of the section of the constitution above quoted apply where the bonds to be issued for the supply of water do not increase the indebtedness beyond the 10 per centum limitation, or does it apply to all bonds issued to secure a supply of water, no matter what the condition of the indebtedness of the city is? I have no hesitation in the opinion that it applies only where the bonds sought to be issued are in excess of the 10 per centum limit. The purpose of the amendment seems quite clear, and it is this: To prohibit the incurring of indebtedness beyond the 10 per centum limit as the general rule, but in view of the necessity for the provision for a water supply an exception is introduced into the constitution that for such purpose the limitation may be exceeded, and bonds issued shall be payable in not less than twenty years, and a sinking fund shall be created for their redemption. Except upon this construction, the last paragraph referred to has no meaning.

Under the first quoted paragraph of the section it was competent for the legislature to authorize the city to incur indebtedness up to the 10 per centum limit, and there was no occasion for the introduction of the exception in relation to water bonds; nor was there, apparently any more reason for providing for a sinking fund to pay off water bonds than for the bonds issued for the building of a bridge or a city hall.

The true meaning of the paragraph last quoted, I have no doubt, the meaning which would be given to it by the courts, would be better expressed in the following language:

"Nor shall this section be construed to prevent the issue of the bonds in excess of 10 per centum to provide for the supply of water, but the terms of the bonds so issued shall not exceed twenty years, and a sinking fund shall be created, etc."

The meaning is the same which ever form of expression is adopted.

I therefore answer both of your questions in the negative.

JUDGE DANFORTH'S OPINION.
STATEMENT.

On the 30th of August, 1892, the Common Council of the City of Rochester directed the issue of the City's bonds to an amount not exceeding One Million Dollars, for the purpose of providing an additional water supply for that city,—declared that they should "be due in fifty years from the date" of issue and "be redeemable at any time after twenty years" from that date. No sinking fund was created for their redemption.

The city at the time of this action by the Common Council contained over one hundred thousand inhabitants, but its indebtedness, including that provided for as above stated or the larger amount authorized by the statute under which the Common Council acted (Laws of 1892, Chapter 358), did not then exceed and has not since exceeded ten per cent. of the assessed valuation of its real estate subject to taxation as it appeared by the assessment rolls of said city on the last assessment for State or County taxes prior to the action of the Common Council. The bonds are within the purview of the act of the Legislature above referred to and conform to its provisions.

The question submitted to me is, whether under these circumstances the bonds in question are authorized by law and will, when issued, constitute a valid indebtedness against the City of Rochester.

OPINION.

In the absence of constitutional restriction the Legislature, undoubtedly, may determine what monies a municipal corporation may raise and expend, how those monies shall be raised and what taxation for municipal purposes may be imposed. There was no constitutional restraint upon its exercise of this power prior to 1874. In that year, however, the discretion of the Legislature was limited by a constitutional provision that no city "be allowed to incur any indebtedness except for city purposes" (Art. 8, Sec. 11 of the constitution as adopted November 3, 1874). To supply a city with water is a "city purpose," and it is for that purpose the indebtedness in question is to be created. The authority of the Legislature is, therefore, in this instance unaffected. But its discretion was further limited by a constitutional amendment (to Sec. 11 of Art. 8) adopted November 4, 1884, by which it was provided that no city containing one hundred thousand inhabitants "shall be allowed to become indebted for any purpose or in any manner to an amount, which including existing indebtedness shall exceed ten per centum of the assessed valuation of the real estate of such — city subject to taxation as it appeared by the assessment rolls of said — city on the last assessment for State or County taxes prior to the incurring of such indebtedness."

The general power of the Legislature to enable a city of over one hundred thousand inhabitants to contract debts is not interfered with by these words nor do they have any effect until a city having that population is either already indebted to an amount equal to ten per cent. of the assessed valuation of its real estate subject to taxation or will become so by the new indebtedness. This is apparent from the literal reading of the amendment and also from the consequence imposed upon its violation. The indebtedness contracted or allowed, so it be under the proportion of per cent. specified, is not rendered invalid, but only the "indebtedness in excess of such limitation" — is declared to "be absolutely void except as "in said amendment" is otherwise provided. Referring to, as excepted from this penalty, certain certificates and water bonds afterwards mentioned. The then succeeding clause enforces this interpretation: It reads, "No such city" (that is, no city of over one hundred thousand inhabitants) "whose present indebtedness exceeds the percentage before named, shall be allowed to become indebted in any further amount until such indebtedness shall be reduced within such limit."

Two conditions, therefore, must combine to bring a city within the constitutional prohibition. First. It must have a population exceeding one hundred thousand persons. Second. Its indebtedness must be in excess of the limitation of ten per cent. prescribed therein. Until these conditions concur, any city may enjoy the favor of the Legislature within the

limit designated precisely in the same way as if the constitution had not been amended. The prohibition is against allowing, by legislation, a city of over one hundred thousand inhabitants to become indebted in amount exceeding ten per cent. of the assessed value of its real estate estimated as prescribed in the constitution, and against that only.

The City of Rochester, although possessing a population of over one hundred thousand persons, was not so indebted at the time the Legislature enabled it to issue bonds, nor at any subsequent time. The constitutional amendment, therefore, has no application to that city.

Again: The amendment is directed against the allowance of an indebtedness which is declared to be excessive, because exceeding the limit of ten per cent., but it is even then provided, that "this section," that is, this prohibition against an indebtedness beyond the fixed limit, "shall not be construed to prevent the issuing of certificates or bonds in anticipation of the collection of taxes to be collected in the same year. To that extent and in that way the limit may be exceeded with impunity. There is also this declaration,—“nor shall this section be construed to prevent the issue of bonds to provide for the supply of water, but the term of bonds issued to provide for the supply of water shall not exceed twenty years, and a sinking fund shall be created on the issuing of said bonds for their redemption.” as therein prescribed. This also permits and anticipates the issue of water bonds by a city where condition, as regards indebtedness, renders the action of the Legislature impossible because the limit of legislative allowance has been reached.

These are the classes of indebtedness which have been referred to as expressly excepted from the penalty imposed upon excessive indebtedness otherwise contracted.

In my view, therefore, of the constitutional provision, (1) a city of 100,000 inhabitants may be allowed by the Legislature to incur debts for city purposes, including, of course debts contracted for a supply of water, in such manner as it may prescribe and to any amount, so that its whole indebtedness does not exceed the ten per cent. as defined in the constitution. (2) An indebtedness beyond that limit is void as to excess, unless that excess includes certificates of indebtedness or revenue bonds or water bonds in the form and with the terms prescribed by the constitution, in which case, also, the indebtedness so represented is valid, although in excess of the limitation. (3) The City of Rochester not being indebted beyond the constitutional limit is not affected by or included in the constitutional prohibition and the bonds in question are not affected by it.

It follows also that the act of the Legislature (Chapter 358, Laws of 1892) is free from constitutional objection. The Legislature was dealing with a city whose debts were less than the constitutional limit and it was competent for the Legislature to confer upon it such privilege as it thought proper, so that such limit was not exceeded.

It is my opinion, therefore, that the issue of the bonds in question was authorized by law; that they are not of that class of bonds which the constitution declares shall be made payable at a time not exceeding twenty years and for the redemption of which a sinking fund shall be created, but, on the contrary, are of opinion that they do in their present form and by virtue of the act of 1892 (Chap. 358) constitute a valid indebtedness against the City of Rochester.

Upon the receipt on Saturday of these opinions it was believed by such members of the Finance Committee as could be reached, that a consultation with Clark & Sedgwick would

be advisable, and, therefore, that its chairman and the president of the Common Council who had entire familiarity with the subject, should go to New York, for that purpose. It was also thought advisable to ask the Hon. Donald McNaughton, who represented this senatorial district in the legislature at the time the formation of the enabling act was agreed upon, and who had had numerous conferences with Professor Collin and Governor Hill in reference to it, to also go to New York. Senator McNaughton very kindly offered to assist in the matter and the chairman of the Finance Committee and the president of the Common Council immediately left for New York. Before going they received a letter from the secretary of the Franklin Savings Bank, of New York City, a copy of which follows:

NEW YORK, Sept. 22, 1892.

S. B. Williams, Esq., City Treasurer:

Dear Sir:—Our counsel informs me this morning that the bonds that I bid on September 13th, and which were awarded to the bank at 101.95 are not legally issued; inasmuch as the enactment under which they have been made is unconstitutional.

Kindly inform me if you have any way of making them so that we can legally hold them.

On their arrival in New York city, they called upon Mr. Conklin of the Franklin Savings Bank, and ascertained from him that his bank was entirely willing, and indeed anxious for the bonds, providing the constitutional objections could be overcome. Together with Senator McNaughton, and C. D. Kiehel, who was also in New York, they called upon Mr. Quintard, and also upon Clark & Sedgwick. Mr. Quintard expressed himself as entirely satisfied with his purchase, and anxious for the delivery of the bonds, but as his attorneys have advised him that the question of their constitutionality is a serious one, he does not feel like expending the sum of upwards of \$300,000 for them, until the matter has been definitely determined by the courts.

The necessity for procuring this money is very great, as the Executive Board has completed the plans for the new conduit, and is only awaiting the receipt of the money before advertising and letting the contracts for its construction. A long litigation would be disastrous in the extreme, as no work could be done until its conclusion. Your Committee is aware of the careful considerations that this matter has received from former committees, and fortified with the opinions of Messrs. Danforth and Cogswell believes that an action could be commenced, after proper tender had been made on October 1st, and that the purchasers of those bonds could be compelled to take them and pay for them. In the event of serious opposition, however, a final determination might not be reached for several months, and it was therefore thought advisable in conference with Clark & Sedgwick, to suggest to them that a case be agreed upon and submitted to the general term of this department which will begin its October sitting on Tuesday, October 4th.

Messrs. Clark & Sedgwick very readily consented to this proposition, and offered to do anything in their power to aid in procuring a final determination of the questions.

Your Committee, therefore, recommends that the City Attorney, if in the judgment of the Finance Committee, it shall be deemed advisable, be authorized to prepare and agree upon a case with those gentlemen, and submit the same to the general term upon argument, at the earliest possible day. In view of the vast disadvantages to which the city would be put in the event of an adverse decision being reached by the general term or the court of

appeals, it has been thought advisable by the Committee to recommend the employment of either George F. Danforth or W. F. Cogswell to assist the City Attorney upon the argument thereof, and your Committee therefore, recommends that the Finance Committee be empowered to retain which ever of those gentlemen it shall seem most advisable for that purpose. It may also become necessary to make a formal tender on October 1st, to the purchasers of those bonds, W. I. Quintard, of New York, The Franklin Savings Bank, of New York, and D. W. Powers of Rochester, of the amount of bonds purchased by them at that sale and in that event, it would be necessary to authorize the proper parties to go to New York, for the purpose.

Your Committee, therefore, recommends that it be empowered to authorize and direct the City Treasurer and such other person as may be necessary to go to New York on October 1st, and make the proper tender to the purchasers of the bonds purchased by them.

Your Committee is profoundly impressed with the importance of the present situation, and is desirous of speedily bringing about a decision of the highest court, which will sustain this council in the steps it has heretofore taken toward the procuring of an additional supply of the much needed Hemlock water for the use of the city and its citizens. The Committee is very grateful to Senator McNaughton for the assistance which he has so readily and cheerfully rendered to its sub-committee on the occasion of its visit to New York.

The following resolutions are submitted with the hope that they will meet the approval of this Council, and be passed at once, in order that no unnecessary delay may occur.

Dear Sir:—I desire to make a suggestion, which, if adopted, may entitle the Rochester Railway Company to commence early operation of its cars by electricity throughout the entire length of the Bronson and Jefferson avenue line.

It is of course necessary that false work be constructed before a new iron bridge can be placed in position. If the city and the Western

New York & Pennsylvania R. R. Co. shall consent, the Rochester Railway Company will build a trestle across said tracks at Bronson avenue, in place of the old bridge, which cannot be used such trestle to be constructed wide enough and strong enough to allow the passage of cars across the same, and to allow teams to pass a car crossing such trestle. When the question has been settled as to whether the Railroad Company is liable for the construction of a bridge, the trestle referred to can be used as false work in the construction of the new bridge. The Rochester Railway Company will if permission be obtained, at once commence this work and have the cars operating throughout the entire length of the line by electricity within a few days after such construction is commenced.

I would respectfully suggest that much time might be saved, in case my suggestion strikes the members of the Board favorably, by the Common Council conferring power upon your committee to consent to the foregoing, in case the Western New York & Pennsylvania R. R. Co. will also consent.

Gentlemen:—Section 426 of the Penal Code of this state contains the following provision:
"A person who willfully obstructs, hinders or delays the passage of any car lawfully running upon any steam or horse or street railway, is guilty of a misdemeanor."

As a rule the people who have charge of vehicles upon our streets are careful and accommodating with reference to the movement of cars upon the tracks throughout the various lines. There are, however, some drivers of teams drawing heavy loads who are habitually unmindful of the fact, that whoever persists in driving in or on the tracks in such manner as to unreasonably impede the progress of a car, they are thereby working an injury not simply to the Rochester Railway Company, but to the large number of people who are being transported in the cars of said company.

The Rochester Railway Company is about to establish a rule, of which the following is the substance:

"On State and Exchange streets, between Central avenue and the Erie canal bridge, and on East and West Main streets between Elm and Sophia streets, each car must be brought to a full stop, whenever a car headed in the opposite direction is standing at a crosswalk, and held until such standing car has started and the crosswalk is clear."

It must be evident to any person familiar with the operation of a street railroad, that the enforcement of this rule will inevitably delay to a considerable extent the movement of the cars, and therefore make the time somewhat longer from the center of the city to the outskirts. It would seem to be more than right that the inevitable delay caused by the enforcement of the above rule should be at least in a measure compensated for by a strict enforcement on the part of the city authorities of the provision of the Penal Code prohibiting persons from hindering or delaying the passage of any car of this company running on any of its lines.

This company is glad to co-operate with the city government in any way it can with the purpose of rendering the movement of its cars more safe and its service more efficient.

I would respectfully suggest that the Common Council take action upon this matter of the unreasonable delay of cars by the drivers of teams drawing heavy wagons, and that an ordinance properly framed be adopted, which shall impose a fine upon any person who is guilty of unreasonably obstructing the passage of the cars; and that such ordinance also impose upon the officers of the city government having the streets in charge, and upon the police department the obligation of enforcing such ordinance.

I am sure that your honorable body will understand that the only object I have in making the above suggestion, is the improvement of the service which the Rochester Railway Company provides.

PIPE SEWER IN ALLEN STREET.

On motion of Ald. Ward, the Common Council proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the following ordinance, viz:

An ordinance to construct a pipe sewer in Allen street from Oak street to Elizabeth street.

And after hearing such allegations from all persons appearing,

Gentlemen:—Your City Property Committee begs leave to make the following report:

It has been apparent for a long time that it was necessary to have placed in operation in the City Hall Building, an elevator of sufficient size to accommodate the large number of people who are constantly going to and from the upper floors of the building; and it has seemed to your committee that the present was, perhaps, as feasible and proper a time to make this improvement as could be suggested. Your committee, therefore, through its chairman, solicited from the Graves Elevator Company, an estimate as to the cost of putting in a suitable elevator and received in reply a letter which is hereto annexed. It seems to your committee that it would be advisable before undertaking to let any contracts, or authorizing this work to be done, that an architect should be employed to prepare plans and specifications, and that an exact estimate should be furnished by the architect, and bids should be received for the work to be done. Your committee, therefore, recommends that it be empowered to employ an architect to prepare the necessary plans and specifications and the estimate, and that after such plans and specifications are prepared that it be authorized the solicit bids for doing the work.

In reference to the necessity for additional room for the City Clerk's office it has seemed to your committee that if an elevator is to be put into the building, that it would be entirely satisfactory to all concerned, for the City Clerk's office to be located on the floor above its present location. The Water Works Department which now occupies the room formerly used by the City Clerk, is seriously crowded, and their valuable books and rolls are piled upon the table and shelves to the great disadvantage of the clerks and assistants. The City Clerk and the City Messenger are unable to transact the city's business in their present quarters; but a proposition has been made, and it seems advisable to your committee that it be adopted. To build a temporary partition of wood and glass across the south end of the Common Council Chamber. The Common Council Chamber is really very much larger than is required, and a partition could be put up at a trifling expense, running east and west across the chamber, in such a way that the City Clerk, City Messenger and City Auditor would have all the room that they might need, and still be sufficient room left in the chamber for the Council's requirements.

Your committee, therefore, recommends that the City Property Committee be authorized to procure the constitution of a suitable partition, as described and set forth herein.

Your committee also submits a letter received from A. J. Warner, as to the cost of rebuilding the present Front street building for Police, Fire and Poor Departments, and asks for further time for its consideration.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Forsyth—

*To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City
of Rochester :*

Gentlemen:—Your Law Committee begs leave
to make the following report:

In the matter of the claim of J. J. A.
Burke for services rendered as an expert witness
in the case of Bell vs. the City of Roch-
ester, for fifty dollars, we report that the
same was referred by this committee to the
City Auditor, who has recommended that the
same be paid, and we, therefore, recommend
that a resolution be adopted authorizing the
payment of said claim.

In the matter of the claim of the James
Field Company for decorating the city hall
on Decoration Day, upon the order of his
honor, the Mayor, we also referred said claim
to the City Auditor, who has recommended
that the claim be settled at \$100, and we,
therefore, recommend that a resolution be
adopted paying said claim in full, at the sum
of one hundred dollars.

In the matter of the claim of Peter Sheridan
for postage stamps during the tenure of his
office as city clerk, we also referred the same
to the City Auditor, who has recommended the
same paid, and we, therefore, recommend that
a resolution be adopted ordering the same
paid.

In the matter of a deed of George G. Clark-
son for a certain lot in Mount Hope Cemetery,
we find that on the 13th day of June, 1873,
a deed was delivered to said Clarkson of lot
No. 197 in section C, of said cemetery, which
was never executed by the then mayor, but
that the seal of the city was attached to the
deed, and the same then countersigned by the
then city clerk. Mr. Clarkson has occupied
and been in possession of said property, but,
as the charter provides that the deed must
be executed by the mayor, we recommend that
the mayor be authorized and instructed to
execute a deed to said Clarkson of the above
named lot, for the purpose of correcting the
deed delivered to him improperly executed.

In the matter of the claim of Albert C.
Hobbie for damages caused by the pollution of
Hobbie creek, running through his premises,
we find that a judgment has been recovered
by him against the city, fixing the liability
for damages in his case, and that there is
now an action pending, which is on the present
circuit calendar, for damages occurring after
the judgment was recovered. A demand has
been made by him for \$3,000 damages, occa-
sioned by such pollution, until the East Side
Trunk Sewer would be completed, and, after
considerable negotiation, we have agreed with
him to settle all his damages occasioned by
such pollution, for \$2,000, and we, therefore,
recommend that his damages be settled at that
sum, and that releases be secured from him in
the matter.

In the matter of the claim of Martha E.
Dickinson for damages caused by the pollu-
tion of the same creek running through her
premises, we find that she has begun an
action, which is now pending in the Supreme
Court. Judgments in several actions against
the city for the pollution of the same creek
having established the liability of the city,

and a recovery having been had by Martha
E. Dickinson for the pollution of the stream
down to March 29th, 1880, we have regarded
it to the best interests of the city to secure a
settlement, if a reasonable sum could be agreed
upon. The farm of Mrs. Dickinson contains
over fifty acres, and the stream polluted by
the sewers of the city runs directly through
the center of it, and along the road right in
front of her premises. A demand has been
made upon the city for the sum of \$6,000, for
the damages subsequent to the judgment re-
covered herein, and we have been negotiating
with her, and have finally agreed that the
sum of \$400 per year be paid her for her
damages, and we recommend that the same be
approved by this board.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Police Committee, to which has been referred a resolution passed August 23, 1892, to investigate and report to this Common Council plans and suggestions for suitable precinct stations in this city, we submit that after a careful and full investigation thereof, we are of the opinion, that precinct stations ought to be established. The city has been growing so rapidly for the last ten years, that the services of the police force cannot be effectually rendered by having one central police station in the City Hall. The inconvenience of transferring prisoners from the outskirts of the city to the central station and the long time required for patrolmen to go from the station to their beats and return to the station have been a source of constant annoyance and inconvenience for a number of years. We have learned that patrolmen in the outer wards consume from half an hour to an hour each way from the central station to their beats. The city is still growing as much as it has for past years and we regard that four precinct stations two on each side of the river are necessary for the convenience of the patrolmen and of the security of the citizens.

The people in the outer wards are demanding this protection and it is, we consider, the

duty of this Common Council to give the same service and protection to the residents of the outer wards which are now received and rendered to the people who live in the inner wards.

We, therefore, recommend, that four precinct stations two on each side of the river be established and that the accompanying resolution be adopted authorizing this committee to select suitable sites for the location of said precinct stations hereafter to be erected.

At a meeting of the Board of Health of the City of Rochester, held October 13th, 1892, the following report was received and action taken thereon:

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Oct 12, 1892.

To the Honorable Board of Health,
Gentlemen:—Your committee which was appointed at the last meeting of the Board, to examine the sanitary conditions of the City Hall, beg to report as follows:

In the cellar we found two sinks and one urinal not connected with the sewer, but discharging the waste under cellar bottom. Also two cellar traps unsealed by evaporation. The two heating boilers in the cellar are connected with the sewer, for the purpose of emptying for cleaning. Sometimes the blow-off cocks are opened to discharge a surplus of water, which is caused by the automatic feed not working properly, when this is done the contents of the drain is blown through the cellar trap on the cellar bottom.

In taking up the hot ashes from the boilers water is thrown on them to keep down the dust, in consequence of this the steam and foul gases fill the cellar and ascend through the channels in the walls constructed for the steam pipes, and permeate the building.

In the Police department there are 24 cells, each containing an old style cast iron Hopper water closet, with automatic seat flush, which is not sufficient to keep them in a sanitary condition. The cellar traps in this department are kept closed by being plugged with a cork to keep out the sewer gas.

The wash basins throughout the building are the old style patent overflow pattern, with the Bower trap, which has a rubber ball inside, this ball becomes rotten and very offensive, and the basin overflow cannot be cleaned. In consequence of this the odor arising from the fixtures is very offensive. Under some of the wash stands are swing urinals which are always in an unsanitary condition and should be abolished. None of these fixtures are ventilated.

Under the main stairway on the ground floor are five plunger water closets. The soil pipe from these closets does not extend through the roof, and there is no back vent to them. In consequence of this when one closet is used it unseals the traps of the others and allows the gas to escape in the room. There are two tread urinals and a slop sink in this room, with no ventilation. The wooden racks to urinals are broken and saturated with urine and very offensive, sometimes the closets overflow and flood the apparatus on the floor beneath.

On the top floor there is a broken wash basin and a urinal, the supply to them has been shut off on account of broken basin, the seal of the traps of both have evaporated and allows the gas to escape in room.

The group of water closets off of Council Chamber which were condemned two years

ago, and remodeled and ventilated, and flush urinals constructed are in good sanitary condition.

The main drain and laterals are 12 inch tile, we could find no indications of trap or fresh air inlet on same.

The whole system throughout the building except the water closets and urinals off the Council Chamber is in very unsanitary condition, and should receive immediate attention.

We would recommend that the soil pipes be extended up through the roof, and tank water closets be substituted for the ones now in use. That sanitary wash basins with standing waste with slabs set on brackets, and left open underneath, be substituted for those now in use.

That tip earthen urinals with automatic flush tanks, with slate stalls and floors be used in place of those now in use, and those fixtures not connected with sewer be connected with same. And all fixtures be separately and effectively trapped and ventilated. That the heating boilers be disconnected from sewer and the blowoff be discharged in a condenser before entering drain. That proper sewer traps be constructed for draining the cellar. That a fresh air inlet be constructed, and trap placed on main drain if there is none and the whole system of plumbing be made to comply with the rules of this Board. And the channels for steam pipes be effectually closed to prevent the passage of air from the cellar to rooms above.

In reference to the 24 water closets in the police department, we would recommend that nothing be done with them at present, as there is a probability of the removal of this department to other quarters at an early date.

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee, to which was referred the matter of the application of the Civil Service Commissioners, in which they request the payment to them of salaries proportioned to the work which they do; your committee has considered the matter, and believes that said commissioners are entitled to compensation for the amount of work which they are called upon to perform. The commissioners who have charge of the examination of applicants for positions in the public service, other than the Police and Fire Departments, were on their application about a year and a half ago allowed a sum of one hundred and eighty dollars per annum each. These salaries were supposed to be upon the basis of fifteen dollars for each commissioner for each examination, including the preparation of the questions in the examination of the candidates and their papers. It was believed that each commissioner would hold on an it was thought that fifteen dollars for each average twelve examinations per annum, and it was thought that fifteen dollars for each commissioner for his services in conducting

such examination, would be perhaps satisfactory. The commissioners who have the examination of applicants for Police and Fire Departments have, perhaps, a larger number of people before them, and possibly are compelled to spend more time in the preparation and inspection of the papers connected with such examination than are the commissioners in the other branch, and that being so, it is fair perhaps that they should receive a larger compensation for each examination; but, on the other hand, it is probably also true that the examinations of the candidates for Police and Fire Department positions are very much less frequent than those of the other departments. It is believed that on an average, the commissioners for the examination of policemen and firemen have not been and will not be compelled to hold more than two examinations per year.

In view of all the foregoing, and believing that the city, like an individual, should pay for whatever service is rendered to it, and at a fair price, your committee has concluded to recommend that there be paid in like manner as other salaries of other city officials, to each of the Civil Service Commissioners, having charge of the examination of applicants for Police and Fire Department positions, the sum of fifty dollars per year.

Gentlemen:—Sealed proposals were received by the Executive Board on October 10th, for the construction of a stone arch bridge over the Genesee river at Court street, and upon being canvassed it was found that the lowest bid of the four tenders made was about \$26,000 in excess of the estimate of the City Surveyor,

and, as the charter prohibits the letting of any public work, the prices for which exceeds the estimate, no award was made.

Advertisements for proposals were again published and on the day designated for receiving the proffers for the work, it was learned that the specifications had been altered in a material particular without the concurrence of the Executive Board, and, therefore, proposals for the bridge were declined.

The judgment of the Executive Board is that the present estimate is not large enough to permit the construction of a bridge at Court street on the original plan and specifications, and according to which this board is of the opinion it should be built. Therefore it is recommended that your honorable body cause a new ordinance to be presented and adopted, in which the estimated cost of the Court street viaduct shall not be less than \$160,000.

The sewage from this locality now finds an outlet into small streams, in the town of Brighton, and on account of this litigation has resulted. The county of Monroe has been mulcted in damages and now the City of Rochester is threatened with litigation by reason of the pollution of the Brighton streams.

The state of New York now provides for the maintenance of the Rochester State Hospital, one of the three institutions now located in this territory, and if a proper mode for caring for the sewage of this locality can be devised, undoubtedly an equitable understanding may be reached, whereby the County of Monroe, the state of New York and the residents of fourteenth ward, interested, may bear their proper proportions of the expense for constructing such a sewer.

Your honorable body is therefore requested to have a preliminary survey made, looking toward the construction of a sewer for the relief of this locality, in order that the probable expense and the most feasible route, of such a sewer may be determined.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester :

Gentlemen:—Your Law Committee begs leave to make the following report:

In the matter of the claim of Micajah W. Jackson for damages caused by sewage pollution in the creek running through his property, we find that the courts, in an action heretofore brought by him against the city, allowed him for damages at the rate of \$150 per year, and we, therefore, recommend that this sum be paid to him, upon his executing a release of all damages to the city, to run from

In the matter of the claim of John W. Schrader for damages caused by sewage pollution in the creek running through the premises occupied by him, we find that an action is pending in the Supreme Court for such damages, which is upon the present calendar of the Circuit Court, and that the courts have heretofore in properties similarly situated, rendered judgments for damages at the rate of \$50 per year, and we, therefore, recommend that his claim for damages be adjusted by the payment to him at the rate of \$50 per year, for the six years last past.

In the matter of the claim of Anna Schrader for damages caused by sewage pollution in the creek running through her premises, we have ascertained that a judgment has been recovered against the city for damages to the same property at the rate of about \$100 per year, and that the liability of the city is conclusively established. A second action is pending against the city for damages since the commencement of the first action, and we, therefore, recommend that the sum of \$100 per year for such damages be paid to her, to run from October 3, 1886.

In the matter of the communication of Charles E. Morris, as Executor and Trustee under the will of George H. Thompson, deceased, in regard to assessments upon property belonging to said estate, the City Attorney reports that an action is pending against the city for vacating such assessments, upon the ground that the same are irregular and void, which action is now pending, and has referred to a referee to hear, try and determine, and that the property belonging to such estate is so situated that the assessments for the improvements are very large, and the grounds alleged in the complaint in the action for vacating said assessments are that the assessments are oppressive and that errors were made by the assessors in making such assessments. Upon the recommendation of the City Attorney, we recommend that the payment of all these assessments be accepted, without interest, upon the plaintiff paying, up to date, all claims for taxes or otherwise by the city against the property, and discontinuing the action against the city, with costs to the defendant.

An offer has been made to the Law Committee to procure for the City Attorney's office a complete set of the Common Council proceedings, at a sum not to exceed fifty dollars. The Attorney's office has no copy of the

proceedings, and, as the proceedings of some of the years are out of print, and very scarce, and as it is important that this office have a complete set, we recommend that this Common Council authorize the City Attorney to procure a complete set of the proceedings, at a sum not to exceed fifty dollars.

To the Common Council.

Gentlemen:—I call your attention to the present status of the matter of the proposed Bronson avenue bridge over the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad.

At the solicitation of the Rochester Railway Company, an examination of the safety of the present Bronson avenue bridge for a suitable over-crossing has been made by the Engineer of the Rochester Railway Company, and the bridge engineer of the Western New York & Pennsylvania Railroad Company. Reports have been made by both of these engineers to the effect that the general construction of the present bridge is very poor, and that it is not a suitable over-crossing to meet the demands of the public of this city.

I submit herewith a communication from the President of the Rochester Railway Company, to me, which gives the history of the efforts of your special committee to construct a bridge for a suitable over-crossing.

As I have been advised by the City Attorney the railroad company is obliged by chapter 326 of the laws of 1880, to provide a suitable over-crossing at Bronson avenue, under the direction of the City Surveyor. The steam railroad company, has, thus far, failed to comply with the requirements of this statute, and I suggest that some action be taken by this Common Council to compel a compliance with the state by the steam railroad company.

Dear Sir:—In response to your inquiry over the telephone this forenoon, I beg to submit the following:

About June 1st, 1892, I directed the engineer of this company to examine the Bronson avenue bridge over the Western New York & Pennsylvania Railroad for the purpose of deciding whether such bridge would be safe for passage thereon of our electric cars. Mr. Barnard, said engineer, reported to me that in his opinion such bridge was not safe for the purpose mentioned. I thereupon directed Mr. Barnard to obtain from W. F. Jordan, the bridge engineer of the Buffalo, Rochester and Pittsburgh Railway Company, an opinion as to the strength of said bridge.

On July 7th I received the following letter from Mr. Jordan:

In accordance with your request I have examined the bridge on Bronson avenue over the W. N. Y. & P. railway and calculated the stresses caused by a car weighing fifteen

tions followed by a trailer weighing eight and one half tons. I find the bottom chord has ample section, the maximum stress being 6,750 pounds per square inch, which is high for cast iron although not dangerous. The verticals have 10,000 per square inch, a very high stress for rods so poorly connected. Some of the diagonals have poor welds, which would increase the danger from failure. The floor beams are strained to 29,300 pounds per square inch and would surely fail if a fifteen ton car was run over them many times. The general construction of the bridge is very poor, there being almost no bracing. The details are very bad and would be likely to fail under the heavy cars.

I consider it impracticable to strengthen the bridge to carry the loads mentioned above."

It certainly did not seem prudent for this company to attempt to operate any electric cars over said bridge in the face of the opinions of the engineers. Since the time of the receipt of said letter, I have been endeavoring for some time to effect some arrangements which would enable this company to operate its cars over the bridge in question. As you perhaps know, I sent a communication to the Common Council upon this subject, and subsequently stated to the committee to whom my communication was referred, that the Rochester Railway Company, while claiming that no obligation rested upon it to build or strengthen any bridges within the city; nevertheless, for the purpose of getting a strong bridge built at the location mentioned, would contribute \$1,000 toward the expense of such bridge.

At the said meeting of the committee representative of the W. N. Y. & P. R. R. Co., were present, and the subject of the rights and obligations of that company, and of the city were discussed at some length.

As nothing resulted from said conference, I made a proposition to the Common Council, on behalf of Rochester Railway Company, to the effect that said company would, if the city and the W. N. Y. & P. R. R. Co., consented, take down the present bridge and construct in its place a wooden trestle which would be abundantly strong for the passage of cars and teams thereon. The Common Council, as I understand, gave its consent to such construction. I thereupon directed the engineer of this company to prepare a plan of the proposed structure for submission to the W. N. Y. & P. R. R. Co. Such plan was prepared and delivered to the engineer of said company; but up to this time I have not had any response from said engineer or any officer of that company with reference to the matter.

The Rochester Railway Company is extremely desirous of having a bridge constructed at the location indicated, which shall be of sufficient strength to allow its use for the ordinary purposes of public travel, and stands ready to co-operate in any reasonable way with the city authorities and the W. N. Y. & P. R. R. Company in that regard.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen:—It seems proper that at a meeting of your Board held during the present month, your attention should be called to the obligations assumed by the Rochester Railway Company in its relations to the city and that a brief summary of the present condition of things should be made.

The franchise which was granted to this company provide among other things, that from and after the first day of November, 1892, said company should pay annually into the treasury of the city of Rochester for fifteen years one per cent. of its gross receipts and annually thereafter two per cent. of its gross receipts. It is safe to state that the amount which will be received by the city under the terms of this contract by way of percentage upon gross receipts for the year commencing November 1st, 1892, will be \$8,000, as it is expected that the receipts of the company will be as much as \$800,000 for the year.

Since the franchise was granted this Company has been occupied, as is well known, in constructing and equipping its lines with reference to operation with electricity as motive power. Over seventy miles of track within the city has been built. 140 motor cars have been placed in operation, and no horse cars whatever are now in service except on the ends of two lines, which temporarily the company is not able to reach with electric cars by reason of the construction of a sewer in one case and a weak bridge in the other.

Under the terms of the franchise granted, the company was required to put a transfer system into effect prior to November 1st, 1892. As is well known the transfer system

was in fact introduced in October, 1891. The company has endeavored faithfully and honestly to carry out its contract with the city, and is not aware of any instance where it has failed to perform the obligations which it assumed.

The franchise which was granted conferred upon the company the right to construct, maintain and operate its railroad upon certain streets which the company has not yet been able to construct its lines upon. It would seem to be fair that your honorable body should pass a resolution formally extending the time within which the company may construct its lines upon such streets as were covered by the franchise granted, but upon which it has not yet been able to complete its lines.

If there were any question of lack of diligence on the part of this company in the prosecution of the work which it proposes to do, the company would not presume to ask for an extension. We apprehend, however, that no citizen of Rochester will for a moment claim that the company has been dilatory in doing the work which it started out to accomplish.

The Rochester Railway Company therefore asks your honorable body to pass a resolution extending the time, within which the company may construct its additional line, until November, 1893.

To the Honorable, the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Rochester, N. Y.:

Gentlemen:—I transmit herewith one copy each of final estimates for construction of Driving Park avenue and Platt street bridges.

In these estimates there are some items which require explanation.

For the estimate on Driving Park avenue bridge there are the following:

1st. Four large granite skewbuck blocks. These stone blocks are the caps of the main arch foundations, which I required to be in single blocks for each pedestal. There were no stone of the required size in neighboring quarries unless it might be Medina stone. The importance of these caps appeared to me to call for the best material, and believing that granite was the most certain to give satisfactory results, I ordered granite. The price given in the estimate is the amount that the stones cost the contractor in excess of what the regular masonry would cost, as nearly as I could determine it.

2nd. The item for extra drilling. On getting a short distance into the shale with skewbuck or main foundation pits it was ascertained that it would be necessary to resort to blasting to remove the rock to the depth it would be necessary to go. If the shale outside or surrounding the pits was shattered so that the air could get into it, it would disintegrate rapidly. It was necessary to prevent this. To do so, I directed the contractor to drill rows of holes along the boundaries of the pits to their full depth, and as close together as they could be drilled. This was to prevent the blasting cracks from extending outside. The \$1,500.00 is for this drilling. In the estimate for Platt street bridge, there are several extra items to consider, requiring a brief account of the conditions under which the work was done.

The profile furnished me by the city and on which my plans and estimate were based, indicated rock at about the level of the bottom of the water of the river. This proved to be the case at the sites of piers I and II (numbering from the west side of the river toward the east). But when excavation for pier III began it was ascertained that solid rock was very considerably below the bottom of the water channel. Indeed it was never ascertained to what depth it would be necessary to go to reach it.

This condition necessitated an entire change of plan of foundation. It was necessary to excavate to about 14 feet below the bottom and prepare foundations of piles surmounted by timber platforms in the bottom of the pits on which to rest the masonry. The same was true of a large part of pier IV. No provision had been made for such conditions. While material and plant to meet the new conditions were being obtained a freshet came and destroyed much of the work that had been done, and nearly filled the excavations. Cofferdams had to be constructed around the pits of piers III and IV, to keep the earth from caving into the pits and strong pumping machinery employed to keep them drained. These pumps had to be kept constantly at work till the excavations were done, piles driven and platforms made and masonry built above the water. This work would have added largely to the expense in any event, but occurring as it did without the contractor's expectation, it was still more expensive. Everything considered, it appears to me that the contractor is entitled to the extra item of \$4,000.00.

Had the actual condition been known to me, it is probable that my plan would have been made to span the entire gully.

The contractor makes a claim for hand railing for both bridges, which does not appear in the estimates. In preparing the specifications, it was my intention to have it understood that the cost of the railings should be included in the total tender for the work as was the case with the painting. Mr. J. F.

Alden, claims that he inquired at the City Surveyor's office where the bidders examined the plans, and where the bids were received, and that he was informed that they would be paid for at the same price per pound as other iron work in the structures considered.

If the specifications are examined I do not think they would be so interpreted, but if he and others who were tendering for the work were so informed and he based his tender on such information, it appears to me he is equitably entitled to the same price per pound as for them as for the other iron work in the respective bridges, though perhaps not strictly legally.

I have no note of the weight of these railings.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen:—Your Electrical Committee, to which was referred the application of the Citizens' Light & Power Company, for the consent of the Common Council to construct, operate and maintain electric wires and poles within the limits of the City of Rochester, would respectfully report, as follows:

Your Committee has held numerous meetings, and conferred on several occasions with the representatives of the company.

Your Committee believes that previous franchises have been granted without the consideration which they should have received, and that, in granting a franchise to erect poles and string wires, your Committee should impose all such reasonable regulations and conditions as would serve to properly protect the city's interests. The danger of overhead wires has become more and more apparent, and will continually increase as time goes on. Your Committee has felt that it was necessary to make some provisions for the construction of underground conduits, within which the wires of all companies will eventually be placed, and, for that purpose, has decided that it was advisable to propose as a condition for the granting of the consent that said Citizens' Light & Power Company should construct conduits, as may hereafter be directed by the Common Council, of not to exceed one mile of streets.

Your Committee has also insisted that said company should use the poles heretofore erected and now in existence, owned by the other electric companies, to the end that duplicate lines of poles shall not be permitted on any streets.

The proposed consent, as agreed upon by the Committee, is hereto annexed, and made a part of this report. A communication from the Rochester Gas & Electric Company, by which said company undertakes to put its wires into a conduit which may hereafter be constructed, is also attached, and made a part of this report.

Whereas, The Citizens' Light & Power Company has been duly incorporated under and in pursuance of article six of chapter 566 of the laws of 1890, and the acts amendatory thereof, for the purpose of using electricity for light heat or power, and to carry on the business of lighting by electricity, or using it for heat or power in the city of Rochester, and the streets, avenues, public parks and places thereof, and in public and private buildings therein; to generate and supply electricity for the purposes of such business, and to make, sell or lease all machines, instruments, apparatus and other equipment thereof, and to lay and construct suitable wires or other conductors, with the necessary poles, pipes or other fixtures in, on, over and under the streets, avenues, public parks and places of said city, for conducting and distributing electricity, with the consent of the municipal authorities therefor, and in such manner and under such reasonable regulations as they may prescribe; be it

Resolved, That the consent of the Common Council of the City of Rochester be, and the same is hereby, given to said Citizens' Light & Power Company to lay, erect and construct suitable wires or other conductors, with the necessary poles, pipes or other fixtures in, on, over and under the streets, avenues, public parks and places of the City of Rochester for conducting and distributing electricity for the purposes of the corporation of said company, subject to the provisions, restrictions, conditions, rules and regulations hereinafter set forth, and subject to any future penal regulations, ordinances or resolutions which may be adopted by said Common Council; be it, further

Resolved, That this consent be, and hereby is, granted to the said Citizens' Light & Power Company to lay, erect, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other conductors, with the necessary connections, pipes or other fixtures for its business in a conduit or conduits built, or to be built, in the streets, avenues, public parks, places and alleys, or other highways of said city, in which conduits the city or said company has, or may have, the right to require space for such purpose, or which it has, or may have, control. And no conductors, wires, poles or fixtures shall, without the special consent of the Common Council, be placed or when placed, shall be continued in use on or above any street, avenue, public park, place, alley or other highway in said city where there now exists, or shall hereafter exist, a conduit or subway fitted for the conduct of electricity by said company, and in which said company shall have the opportunity to acquire the right to conduct electricity, it being expressly agreed by said company that the city of Rochester, or its officers, have the right and power to remove any such conductors, wires,

poles or fixtures after the expiration of sixty days from the date of service of notice in writing upon said company to remove the same. It also being the design of said city to permit no overhead wires to be constructed or maintained after the construction of subways or conduits designed and suited for and doing the same services as is done by means of overhead wires; be it, further

Resolved, That, except with the special permission of the Common Council, said company shall not have the right to erect or maintain poles on the streets or other highways already containing poles, upon which said company has the opportunity to secure the right to place conductors, wires or other fixtures thereon. Said company shall have the right to place and operate its wires, conductors or other fixtures on poles existing, or which may hereafter exist, in the highways of said city, belonging to other companies, on complying with the terms and conditions of the contracts made by the city with such companies. All poles which may be erected by said company shall be of such kind and dimensions, and shall be erected in such manner, as may be directed by the Electrical Committee of the Common Council, and shall be subject to the right of all other companies in said city whose business requires the use of electric wires, to operate wires on such poles, upon such terms as to compensation, use, responsibility and conditions of removal as may be fixed by said Electrical Committee, in case of the inability of said company and the company applying for the use of said poles to agree on terms. And, by complying with the terms so agreed on with said company, or so fixed by said Electrical Committee, such company so applying for the use of such poles shall, forthwith, have the right to use and operate said poles. Said city shall have the free use of all conduits or poles built or erected, or to be built or erected, by said company for all wires, conductors, fixtures and connections necessary for municipal purposes. Before disturbing the pavement of any street, avenue, public park, place, alley or other highway, for the erection of any pole or poles, or the stringing of any wires or other conductors, or the construction of any conduit or conduits, said company shall execute and deliver to the City of Rochester a bond, the form and conditions to be approved by the City Attorney and the City Electrician, in the penalty of twenty thousand dollars, with sufficient sureties, to be approved of by the Mayor, conditioned that said company, whenever it may disturb the pavement of any of said streets, avenues, parks, places, alleys or other highways, shall restore the same to as good a condition as the same were found, and said company shall pay the necessary cost of any inspector or inspectors for such work, to be appointed by the Executive Board; said company shall and will, at all times, indemnify and save harmless said city from all damages and liabilities on account of any excavations or obstructions that may be made by said company in said streets, avenues, parks, places, alleys or other highways, from any damage to persons or property caused by the conduits, poles, wires, conductors or currents of said company, or the use of the same, and from all and any damages caused by said conduits, poles, wires, conductors or currents having been, or to be erected on private property. In the event of the failure of said company to complete within nine months the construction of its permanent plant, the Common Council shall have the power to revoke this consent, and said company shall, forthwith, upon such revocation, take down and remove any poles or wires theretofore erected by it.

It is further agreed between said city and the Citizens' Light & Power Company that said company will, at its own expense, construct conduits in one mile of streets, as may

be designated by the Common Council, whenever the said company shall enter upon said streets. Said conduit to be built under the direction of the Common Council, and the first one-half mile of said street conduit shall be built during the year 1894, and the balance of said one mile of conduit shall be built during the year 1895.

The Common Council shall have the power to revoke this consent, in case said company fails to comply with the conditions thereof; said company shall not have the right to place any poles or overhead wires or fixtures on State street and Exchange street, from the Erie canal to Allen street; on Main street, from Plymouth avenue to University avenue, and on North and South St. Paul streets, from Court street to Andrews street.

The words "said company" throughout this resolution refer in every case to said Citizens' Light & Power Company.

 To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City
 of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee begs
 leave to make the following report upon the
 various matters heretofore referred to it for
 consideration.

In reference to the communication of the
 Board of Health calling attention to the fact
 that the funds heretofore placed at its dis-
 posal had been expended, and requesting the
 additional appropriation be made for the pur-
 pose of paying the running expenses of that
 Board for the balance of the fiscal year, your
 committee would report that the appropria-
 tion allowed to the Board of Health
 for the year was but \$28,000. At the end of
 the year they had a deficiency amounting to
 two thousand dollars. The Finance Committee
 in its various meetings for the preparation of
 the tax levy, was not called upon by any
 representative of the Board of Health, and
 was not furnished with any information by
 that Board as to the amount of money it
 would require for the current year's expendi-
 tures. Without any knowledge as to the
 amount that Board might require, the Finance
 Committee reported the sum of thirty thous-
 and dollars, being the amount large enough
 to provide for the deficiency then existing,
 and also equal the appropriation for the year
 1891-1892. The amount allowed to wit:
 twenty-eight thousand dollars, was supposed
 to be sufficient for the needs of the depart-
 ment for the year 1892-93, and except for the
 fact that the Board of Health deemed it wise
 and expedient in view of the threatening
 approach of cholera, to make extraordinary
 expenditures for the purpose of putting the
 city into as perfect a sanitary condition as
 possible, would probably have been enough
 to last throughout the year. The approach
 of cholera in August, and the probability that
 it might secure a footing in New York, from
 which place it might reasonably be expected
 to extend to this city, led the Board of Health
 to make unusual expenditures for the purpose
 of thoroughly cleaning the city, its streets and
 alleys. This expenditure was made and
 probably in a wise and careful manner. The
 amount expended for that purpose was some-
 where between ten and twelve thousand dol-
 lars. The Board of Health has made careful
 estimates of the amount required to continue
 their business through the balance of the
 fiscal year, and has fixed the sum necessary
 at fifteen thousand dollars. The amount in
 the treasury to the credit of the Board is
 now about seventeen hundred dollars, for
 which an allowance has been made in pre-
 paring the estimates.

Your Committee, therefore, recommends that
 the sum of fifteen thousand dollars be placed
 to the credit of the Board of Health and that
 the accompanying resolution for that purpose
 be adopted.

In the matter of the Rochester State Line
 and Pennsylvania Railroad bonds, and the
 Rochester, Nunda & Pennsylvania Railroad
 bonds, which debt amounts to the sum of
 seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars which
 will become due on the 1st of February 1893.
 Your committee has deemed it advisable that
 an effort be made to refund these bonds by
 the issuing of bonds to take their place.
 These bonds are bearing interest at the rate
 of seven per cent. per annum, and it is be-
 lieved that they can be refunded at three
 and one-half per cent. The annual saving in
 interest by such a course will amount to
 twenty-six thousand two hundred and fifty
 dollars. The necessary legislation to author-
 ize the refunding of these bonds was pro-
 cured from the Legislature at its last ses-
 sion. Under that legislation the Common
 Council is authorized to advertise on or before
 the 20th day of December, that the sale of

said bonds will be made to the highest bidder on a date to be therein named.

Your committee, therefore, recommends that the City Treasurer be authorized to sell the bonds of the city of Rochester to the amount of seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, under the direction of the Finance Committee of this Council. Said bonds to run for twenty years, with the right to redeem the same at the end of ten years, to bear interest at the rate of three and one-half per cent. per annum, payable on the first days of February and August of each year, the proceeds of said bonds to be used in the payment of the bonds heretofore issued by the city, and known as the Rochester State Line & Pennsylvania Railroad bonds, and the Rochester, Nunda & Pennsylvania Railroad bonds, which bonds will mature on the 1st day of February, 1893.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen—In compliance with the following resolution of your honorable body passed on October 4, 1892:

Resolved, That the City Surveyor be, and he is hereby instructed to investigate and report to this Council at his earliest convenience, that, if any, sewers heretofore constructed in territory contiguous to the East Side Trunk Sewer should be reconstructed, enlarged or re-

paired to the end that the greatest possible benefit may be derived from the construction of said East Side Trunk Sewer.

I will make the following partial report covering the territory north of the Erie canal:

Avenue E district—No changes seem to be necessary.

Hollenbeck street district—When an outlet sewer shall have been built through Hollenbeck street, the following changes in existing sewers may be made to advantage:

In Avenue B the present sewer between Hollenbeck street, and a point 450 feet west therefrom, may be relaid at a lower grade, and turned so as to run into Hollenbeck street.

In Hollenbeck street the present sewer between Avenue B and Baetzel park may be relaid at a lower grade and turned so as to run to the north.

North Clinton street district—A first ordinance is presented to-night for a new sewer in North Clinton street, from Morrill street to Norton street.

Joiner street district—When an outlet shall have been built through Joiner street the following changes may be made to advantage:

In Joiner street, the present sewer from a point 100 feet north of Clifford street to Carl park may be relaid at a lower grade so as to run north.

In Morrill street, the easterly half of the present sewer may be relaid at a lower grade to run east.

In Ketchum street, the east half of the present sewer may be relaid at a lower grade to run north.

In Vernon park, the east half of present sewer may be relaid at a lower grade to run east.

In Carl park, the east half of the present sewer may be relaid to run east.

Hudson avenue district—An outlet sewer should be built, beginning at the intersection of Thomas street and Alphonsus avenue; thence north through Thomas street to Wilkin avenue; thence east through Wilkin avenue about 200 feet; thence northerly across lots in line with Hoff street to Hayward park; thence easterly in Hayward park to Bauman park; thence north through Bauman park to Laser street; thence north in same straight line across lots to Wilson avenue; thence east in Wilson avenue to Hudson avenue; thence north in Hudson avenue to Norton street.

When the above outlet shall have been built, the following changes in existing sewers may be advantageously made in St. Joseph street, the present sewer between Clifford and Langham streets may be relaid at a lower grade and run north.

In Maria street, the present sewer between Alphonsus avenue and Bernard street, may be relaid at a lower grade and run north.

Alphonsus avenue sewer, between Thomas street and Hudson avenue, may be relaid at a lower grade, and will run north in Thomas street.

North avenue district—The North avenue outlet sewer should be extended from a point about 600 feet north of Jennings street to Norton street, through streets that could be laid out through the low ground adjacent to the present outlet ditch.

Clifford street outlet may be lowered to advantage from 150 feet east of Hosford street to connection with Goodman street outlet.

North Goodman street, should be extended from its present terminus in Seneca street, between Hebard avenue and Cummings street, through Seneca street easterly to Morton street; thence northerly through Morton street to Clifford street; thence easterly taking in the Clifford street outlet to the East Side Sewer.

East Main street district—The sewer in the easterly end of this street, from Henry street east, may be relaid at a lower grade whenever it is deemed advisable.

East avenue district—The efficiency of the East avenue sewer will be increased by reason of the fact that about 1,500 feet will be cut off from the lower end by the construction of the East Side Sewer, and yet in order to get the best results, the present sewer in East avenue between Granger place and Culver street, may be relaid at a lower grade.

Monroe avenue district—This district lies between Alexander street and Rutger street and park avenue and the Erie canal.

In order to fully realize the benefits from building the East Side sewer the following work may be done:

First—Build an outlet sewer in Rutger street, from the East Side sewer to intercept the present Monroe avenue outlet, 600 feet long and 27-10 feet by 2 feet in size, and rebuild the present Monroe avenue outlet from Rutger street to Oxford street, 350 feet long and 22-10 feet by 2 feet in size.

This will serve as an outlet for 80 acres, including the following streets: Goodman street, from Park avenue to Monroe avenue; Brighton avenue, from Oxford street to Rowley street; Oxford street, from Park avenue to Nichols park; Harvard street, from Oxford street to Rowley street; also all of the following streets: Cornell street, Wilmer street, Nichols park, Harper street, Rutger street, Harlem street and Cambridge street.

Second—Build a new sewer in Oxford street, from outlet to within 100 feet of Park avenue, about 900 feet of 20-inch pipe to Brighton avenue, and from there about 530 feet of 12-inch pipe.

This will serve as an outlet for 28 acres, including the following streets: Harvard street, east of Goodman street; Brighton avenue, east of Goodman street; Oxford street, from Park avenue to Nichols park; also, all of Cambridge and Harlem streets.

Third—The present sewer in Brighton avenue should be relaid at a lower grade from Oxford street to about 200 feet west of Cambridge street, and be enlarged from 12 inches to 15 inches in size, from Oxford street to Cambridge street, a distance of about 375 feet.

Fourth—Cambridge street sewer should be lowered, and enlarged from 9 inches to 12 inches in size, for a length of 500 feet. Monroe avenue between Rutger and Meigs streets.

Two plans are suggested for this street, one is to build the sewer in the middle of the street, and it would require to be 30 inches in diameter at Rutger street, reducing to 15 inches at Meigs street, and would be 2,230 feet long; but as the street has recently been improved with an asphalt pavement, and building the sewer in the center with necessary laterals, will practically destroy it, it will probably be advisable to build a sewer on each side of the street, from Rutger street to Goodman street.

Fifth—Build a new sewer on the north side of Monroe avenue, from Rutger street to Meigs street.

This sewer would drain 34 acres, including the following streets: Meigs street, from Park avenue to Monroe avenue; Rowley street, from Brighton avenue to Monroe avenue; also all of Maple place and the north side of Monroe avenue, between Meigs street and Rutger street.

From Rutger street to Goodman street it would be 24 inches in diameter, and 1,450 feet long from Goodman street to Rowley street 400 feet of 20-inch pipe, and from Rowley street to Meigs street 380 feet of 18-inch pipe.

Sixth—Build a new sewer on the south side of Monroe avenue, from Rutger street to Edmonds street.

This sewer will drain 32 1-4 acres including the following streets: Edwards street between Monroe avenue and Pearl street; Goodman street, between Monroe avenue and Pearl street; Pearl park, between Monroe avenue and Pearl street; Boardman avenue, between Mon-

roe avenue and Pearl street; also all of Sumner park, Wilcox street, and the south side of Monroe avenue between Edmonds street and Rutger street.

It will require to be 500 feet of 24 inch-pipe to Sumner park, 300 feet of 20-inch pipe to Boardman avenue, and 650 feet of 18-inch pipe to Goodman street.

Seventh—Build a new sewer from the East Side Trunk Sewer at Wilcox street, through Richards street, Meigs street and Broadway to the corner of Averill avenue, with a branch sewer in Meigs street, and a branch through Goodman street to intercept the Pearl street sewer, and drain it through Richards street instead of, as it now goes through Monroe avenue.

This sewer would serve 59 acres, including the following streets: Richards street, from Wilcox street to Meigs street; Broadway, from Meigs street to Alexander street; Pearl street, from Boardman avenue to Averill avenue; Averill avenue, from Erie canal to Monroe avenue; Meigs street, from Erie canal to Monroe avenue; Edmonds street, from Erie canal to Pearl street; Goodman street, from Erie canal to Pearl street; Boardman avenue, from Erie canal to Pearl street; and all of Beckley street.

The dimensions will be required as follows: From Wilcox street to Boardman avenue 800 feet, should be 27 inches in diameter; from Boardman avenue to Goodman street, 400 feet, should be 25 inches in diameter; from Goodman street to corner of Meigs street, and down Meigs street to Broadway, 1,000 feet, should be 20-inch pipe; in Broadway, from Meigs street to Averill avenue, 950 feet, should be 15-inch pipe, in Goodman street, from Richards street to Pearl street, 650 feet, should be 18-inch pipe.

To the Mayor, Common Council and Executive Board of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—We respectfully invite your attention to the following plan for furnishing the city of Rochester with a temporary supply of water, ample in quantity, and absolutely pure in quality.

For some time past we have been engaged, through our engineers, chemists, and other employes, in an examination of the sources from which Rochester can obtain a temporary supply of pure and wholesome water.

The upper river source seems to us open to two very serious objections. First and most serious is the character of the water. If the river water could be utilized solely for flushing sewers, the case would be very different; but it would have to go directly into the mains, and thence into the houses for the domestic use of the citizens of your city. No process of filtration will remove germs of disease. Your citizens will be drinking river water, and the spread of any pestilence or epidemic accelerated instead of diminished by the employment of river water for domestic purposes.

The second objection to the river water is the great expense which would follow its use. While it would not cost the city, or a company organized to deliver this water into the city, a large amount of money to convey water from the Genesee river to Mt. Hope reservoir, yet the experience your city has had with the few and comparative small mills on the outlet of Hemlock lake points conclusively to the immense claims for damages which would be successfully maintained by the large number of water-right owners in the city of Rochester.

Lake Ontario, as a source of supply, has also been carefully considered by the subscribers, and we find it open to two serious objections. First, lake Ontario receives the sewerage of so many large cities, including the city of Rochester, that it would be practically impossible to obtain unpolluted water from that source. The experience of the city of Toronto warns the citizens of Rochester.

A second and equally serious objection is the length of time it would take to bring water

from Lake Ontario to Rochester. Our engineers assure us that a suitable plant could not be put into operation so as to commence the delivery of water from Lake Ontario to the city of Rochester before the first day of next October and probably not until the first of November.

Of course the probability that cholera will find its way to America next year furnishes the strongest reason for an immediate increase of the water supply of Rochester. It is absolutely essential that the water be had this coming spring to avail anything as a guard against the perils of cholera, scarlet fever, diphtheria, or other epidemic or pestilential evils.

As the analysis made some time ago by Professor Latimore and published in the Rochester papers has shown the water at Bushnell Basin is the purest water in the state of New York. We hold the control of that water supply, and are prepared to deliver four millions of gallons daily of as pure water as can be found on the globe into the Mt. Hope reservoir, commencing not later than May 15th next.

We do not depend upon filtration to render the water pure. It is pure already. If for any reason the waters of Irondequoit creek would need to be utilized, we would guarantee to remove from the lands adjacent to that stream everything which could possibly lead to its contamination, if any such thing exists. In addition to this, we will, if desired, filter the water before it reaches Mt. Hope reservoir with any filter the city authorities may desire us to use. In addition to this, we will, if requested, filter the water before it enters the pipe at Bushnell Basin, thus making a double filtration.

We do not offer to filter the water thinking thereby to render it more pure, but only because of the general and well-founded demand that in the presence of the impending danger of cholera public fear be allayed as much as possible. Some people think that filterers will purify water. Those people would be better satisfied with the supply in case of double or even a single filtration.

THE EXPENSE.

A careful estimate made by conservative and experienced engineers shows that the plant, including the necessary dredging and other work to be done at Bushnell Basin, the purchase of water rights, etc., would be somewhat expensive. Notwithstanding the expense, however, we can furnish water at less than the Hemlock water is now costing the city of Rochester.

We offer to furnish this water, four million gallons daily, for the term of five years, commencing the delivery on or before May 15th next, at the price of ten cents per thousand and gallons.

The assessed valuation of the city of Rochester is \$103,141,603. It will be seen therefore that the taxpayer would pay annually for five years the sum of \$1.38 per thousand dollars of valuation for this absolutely pure and abundant supply of water.

We venture the suggestion that the poor people of the city; the small taxpayers who usually feel the burdens of taxation more keenly than the wealthier class, would much prefer to pay this small sum per annum in return for the benefits arising from an early and abundant supply of absolutely pure water than to receive river water at any cost to-day, even if no prolonged litigation over the consequential damages to mill owners were not inevitable.

We think the parents of the children who are attending the public schools, where more water is so urgently needed; the house wives, who are carrying water in pails to the upper stories; the people who wish the sewers flushed, the streets cleaned, and pure water only used for domestic purposes throughout the city of

Rochester, will endorse your action in levying a tax of \$1.38 per thousand for so prompt and abundant supply of pure water.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Charter Amendments begs leave to submit the following as its report:

The matter of the license fee charged hucksters, etc., under an ordinance adopted August 26, 1890, and amended October 21, 1890, entitled, "An ordinance relating to hawkers, hucksters, peddlers, and vendors, and licenses for the same," was considered by your committee at a meeting held at the City Attorney's office last week, at which there was in attendance a number of hucksters, all of whom advocated a reduction of the fee, which is now fixed by said ordinance at \$15.00. We are informed that there are other provisions of the ordinance like that relating to the license fee, which are systematically disregarded by those persons pursuing that occupation, such, for instance, as the provision requiring the vehicles used for huckstering, etc., to have painted thereon, in legible characters, in a conspicuous place on the side thereof, in plain and durable letters, the name or names and business address and number of the owner thereof, and also requiring persons engaged in that occupation to wear on their left breast a badge bearing the word "vendor" engraved thereon.

After a careful consideration of all the requirements advanced for and against a reduction of the license fee, we are inclined to think that if the whole ordinance was regu-

larly enforced, a license fee of five dollars would be a sufficient charge for the privilege of operating under the ordinance, and, therefore, recommend that the fee be reduced to that amount.

In relation to the communication of the Rochester Railway Company suggesting the passage of an ordinance regulating the use of the company's tracks by the public, so as to prevent any unnecessary delay in the operation of its road, we desire to say, that, while we indorse the wisdom of the rule referred to in the communication requiring cars to be brought to a full stop, whenever a car headed in an opposite direction is standing at a crosswaik, as a means of protection to the public from accidents, we are of the opinion that the section of the Penal Code, also referred to in the communication, is an ample remedy for the evil complained of, and we can see no reason for duplicating it in the ordinances of the city, and, therefore, recommend that the request be denied.

This committee was directed to prepare and report at this meeting of the Common Council a penal ordinance relating to the discharge of blasts or explosions within the city limits between the hours of 7 o'clock P. M. and 7 o'clock A. M. Upon looking over the penal ordinance of the city, we find that on October 26th, 1860, this Common Council adopted a penal ordinance relating to the storage of gun powder, &c., which provides in its 5th section that no person shall fire or set off or explode any gun powder, preparation, cracker, squib, rocket or firework or fire any pistol, gun or cannon or throw any fire ball or make any bon-fire, or aid or abet therein in any part of the city of Rochester under a penalty and fine of \$5.00 for each offense, section 5 also provides, that it may be suspended in any particular, and as to any person, in the discretion of the Mayor of said city. This section seems to be broad enough to cover the subject referred to in the resolution produced by the Common Council at the last meeting, but to save any question we have prepared an amendment to the ordinance which we submit herewith for adoption.

In the matter of the preparation of a penal ordinance requiring all trains of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad to come to a full stop before crossing University avenue and prohibiting the crossing of said street by such trains at a rate of speed exceeding three miles an hour, we desire to say that the preparation of such an ordinance was discussed and it was decided to ask for further time.

 REPORT OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

 To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Special Committee appointed to consider the advisability of procuring an additional temporary supply of water for domestic use, begs leave to make the following report:

Your committee has held several public meetings at which the discussion of the proposition to obtain a temporary supply of water from the upper river, was open to all persons who desired to express their views thereon. At one of these meetings the attendance was fairly large, and certainly representative. Several of Rochester's most prominent citizens appeared before the committee, and unhesitatingly expressed their belief that a temporary supply of water could be procured from the upper river, without detriment to the public health, and at a cost which would not render it burdensome.

Your committee has listened patiently to every suggestion that has been made, and has conferred with large numbers of prominent citizens who did not trouble themselves to attend to the meetings of the committee. It is perhaps fair to say that at least one-half of all the citizens consulted in reference to the matter, have expressed themselves as decidedly opposed to the proposition to procure water from the upper river. As one gentleman very forcibly suggested, that in his opinion it was like "forcing sewer gas into a room filled with fresh air." Many other citizens have stated that in their judgment, it was advisable to endeavor to economize in the use of water for another year, when, as your committee is advised by the chairman of the Executive Board, the prospects now indicate that additional water will be received from Hemlock Lake in the Rush reservoir. From the discussion that has been had, and from all the information which your committee has been able to obtain from the citizens with whom its members have consulted, it is certainly fair to say, that a large part of the population of the city of Rochester is utterly opposed to the proposition outlined above.

It is conceded that the conduit from Hemlock lake to Rush reservoir can convey less water by about two million gallons per day, than can pass through the conduit from Rush reservoir to Mt. Hope reservoir. If within the coming twelve months the conduit can be constructed from Hemlock Lake to Rush reservoir, and a large amount of water can be delivered at Rush reservoir in excess of the amount now delivered, the conduit from Rush reservoir to Mt. Hope reservoir would be able to convey about two million gallons per day more than is now being received at Mt. Hope reservoir, and it is only to provide for the period during which we are deprived of the additional conduit from Hemlock lake to Rush reservoir, that it is proposed to provide a temporary supply from the river.

The water works system originally established, was designed for the use of domestic consumers, and for the extinguishment of fires, and it was never contemplated by the authors of the water works system, that the waters of Hemlock lake should be diverted to the use of manufacturers to the detriment

of private consumers, and the danger of having an insufficient supply for fire protection. And probably in no city of its size in the country is the water supply of the city so largely diverted to the use of manufacturers as in this city.

In the opinion of your committee, the waters provided by the city from Hemlock lake belong primarily to the domestic consumers, and only the surplus, after the needs of such consumers have been fully supplied, should be diverted to manufacture.

It has been proposed to establish a filtration plant, and filter the water of the Genesee river, thereby making such waters suitable for domestic use, and available for manufacturing purposes, but it is believed that the present supply is entirely sufficient for domestic use, and if water is needed only for manufacturing purposes, it is, in the judgment of your committee, better for the city's interest that the manufacturers who need water shall establish and maintain their own filtration plant, than that the city should expend a large sum of money that they may be saved the necessity of investing their own funds.

It has been urged by many that the city in providing a supply of two million gallons of water from the Genesee river, would be making a profit of the water thus obtained by selling it to the manufacturers. The answer to that argument is this: That the city should not go into any undertaking for the mere purpose of profit. If an undertaking required by the city can be made profitable, in addition to furnishing the city with what the city requires, then it is perfectly proper that those profits should be secured; but, in the judgment of your committee, the city should not undertake any enterprise simply because a profit could be made by the management of that enterprise.

If we now have all the water which the city needs for domestic uses, then we are not justified in providing water to be sold for manufacturing purposes, where the manufacturers themselves could as well supply their own needs and save the city the necessity of investing its money in expensive plants, but in the opinion of your committee, it is not true that the acquisition of two million gallons of water a day from the upper river could be made profitable.

Probably the best reason for the lack of pressure in some parts of the city at the present time and during the past few months is that the distributing mains throughout the city, and especially the mains leading from Mt. Hope reservoir directly into the city, and from which all parts of the city are now supplied, is inadequate.

Mr. Emil Kuichling, Chief Engineer of the Water Works Department, has made the assertion that "with the Atlantic ocean at one end of the distributing mains, and the present mains in existence, no more pressure could be secured in the city than is now being secured, simply because all of the water that those distributing mains can possibly carry, is now being carried." And if that be true, the pumping of two million gallons of water per day into Mt. Hope reservoir would have little, if any, effect upon the pressure in the higher parts of the city, until the distributing mains from Mt. Hope reservoir shall be enlarged and made available for carrying more water than they are now carrying. The city can take its choice of customers, and sell the water which it now has to sell either to the private consumers, living in the outside wards, where its use will tend to cleanse the sewers, or it can sell to manufacturers located largely in the center of the city where the water after being used will run directly to the river, and have no beneficial effect upon the sewer system. It is a mere matter as to whether private consumers or the manufacturers shall have the

water and pay the price. If the manufacturer has it, then the private consumer must go without it, and this is true whether an additional supply be obtained from the upper river or not, on account very largely of the lack of facilities for distribution.

Your committee is informed by the Executive Board that the New York Central railroad, for instance, uses on an average each month of very nearly seven million gallons of water. It will be seen that if that statement is true, that one-thirteenth of the total supply of the city of Rochester of potable water is diverted to the uses of that corporation, and the small householders scattered through the city, are deprived of just that amount. It is impossible to believe that the New York Central could not, by the expenditure of a comparatively small amount of money, erect a pumping station and provide itself with a filtration plant, by the use of which it could employ the river water for its various uses in this city, except for drinking purposes.

The Rochester Railway Company, as your committee is informed by the Executive Board, uses an average of two and one-fourth million gallons of water per month, and at the request of the Executive Board it has decided to discontinue the use of the Hemlock water and employ river water properly purified, for all its needs. The Rochester Car Wheel Works, using a very large amount of water each month, has, as your committee is informed, undertaken voluntarily to discontinue the use of Hemlock water in its business, and to provide itself with water from other sources and what is true of those large corporations, can without question be made to be true with other corporations and manufacturing institutions similarly situated.

It is believed that with proper effort on the part of the large users of Hemlock water, a supply of water can be secured and filtered at their own expense from the Genesee river or from wells to be driven by them, so that the reduction in the consumption of Hemlock water by them will amount to from one and one-half to two million gallons per day, leaving that amount of Hemlock water in the reservoir to be sold by the Executive Board to those of our citizens who have the first and best right to the use of it—the householders and domestic consumers. And as only a given amount can be forced through the distributing mains in any event, and as it is believed that the consumption by such consumers will be equal to that given amount, it must be apparent that the city will suffer no loss of revenue by following that course of procedure.

The Executive Board has already advertised for bids for the construction of the new conduit to Hemlock lake, and shows a commendable desire to hasten the work of completing the conduit as rapidly as possible.

Your committee is convinced that there has been no unnecessary delay in the preparation of those plans and the preliminary work of letting the contracts, and it is hoped that with proper effort the city of Rochester will within two years at the very most, be provided with a plentiful supply of water for all purposes from Hemlock lake. In the meantime, if manufacturing concerns and large corporations can provide themselves with water suitable for their purposes at their own expense, and save to the city the necessity of investing a large amount of money in a plant for pumping and filtering water, which would be practically of no use at the expiration of two years, then it is better to permit them to do so, and by careful use of the water which we have and a judicious management of its distribution, avoid the necessity of investing that money.

The communication of the Pure Water Supply Company, which proposed to furnish

a supply of potable water, four million gallons per day from Bushnell's basin and Irondequoit creek, at an expense of ten cents per thousand gallons, has been carefully considered and your committee respectfully recommends that the proposition be declined. At the end of two years the city will have all of the water that it can possibly use, and for the city to continue for three years thereafter to pay at the rate of four hundred dollars per day for water which it will have no use for, and could not sell or even give away, and which would be a source of expense in providing reservoirs to store it, would be an extravagance that the city's present necessities would not justify.

Your committee, therefore, recommends that the Executive Board be requested to confer with the New York Central Railroad Company, and with the various other large consumers of Hemlock water to the end that such consumers be prevailed upon to seek the water necessary for use in their enterprises from other than the present sources, and that the Executive Board be requested to adopt such stringent measures as may in their judgment be expedient to prevent the waste of water now available, and that they be urged to use every effort to secure the early completion of the conduit already projected from Hemlock lake to Mt. Hope reservoir.

Gentlemen:—Your Law Committee begs leave to make the following report:

In the matter of the communications respecting the judgments of Benjamin Wing and Charles E. Evans against the city for damages for sewer pollution on Thomas creek, we find that at the recent trial in the Benjamin Wing case a judgment of \$800 damages was recovered, with costs, \$159.75, making a total of \$959.75, on the 3d of November, 1892, and that in the case of Charles E. Evans against the city, a judgment of \$400 for damages and \$146.59 costs, making a total of \$546.59 was recovered on the 28th day of November, 1892. In both these actions the only question litigated was the amount of damages to which the parties were entitled. The question of the nuisance has been frequently decided against the city in cases which were finally determined by the court of appeals. There are no grounds for an appeal, and we therefore recommend that these judgments be paid to the plaintiffs or their attorneys, and that a resolution be adopted accordingly.

In the matter of the appointment of commissioners of deeds, we are advised that, by section 86 of chapter 683 of the laws of 1892, the common council of this city is directed to determine on or before the first of January, 1893, and at the end of every two years thereafter by a resolution of the board, the number of commissioners of deeds to be appointed for this city. We therefore recommend that the accompanying resolution be adopted by the board, fixing the number of commissioners of deeds at fifteen hundred.

In the matter of the claim of John Swanton for damages resulting from an injury to his person by falling on a sidewalk on Davis street, we ascertained that Mr. Swanton was very seriously injured by reason of a fall, and that the executive board had due notice of a defect in the sidewalk upon which said Swanton fell, and, under all the circumstances, your committee offered to said Swanton the sum of \$250 in settlement of his claim. Since the offer of the committee said Swanton has accepted the same, and we recommend that a resolution be adopted paying him the sum of \$250 in full settlement of his claim.

Gentlemen: Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Board of Education December 5th inst.,

this committee respectfully requests that you cause to be furnished an additional appropriation to several of the funds of that board for use during the remainder of the fiscal year as follows:

Building fund.....	\$10,000 00
Library fund.....	1,000 00
Contingent fund.....	15,829 00

Total \$26,829 00

The amount for the contingent fund, if granted, to be credited \$6,525, to the supply fund and \$9,304 to the Fuel and Fire Fixtures Fund of said Board.

These estimates are the amounts which were originally embraced in the Board's annual estimate to you of May 2, last and not then granted.

Inasmuch as the total estimate then made was not appropriated within \$30,414 it will be seen that the foregoing, if granted, would not equal our original estimate within \$3,585, the difference being in the amounts then requested for teachers, printing, salaries text books for indigent pupils, miscellaneous fund and Free Academy Fund, for which funds we do not now ask an appropriation.

Our original estimates were carefully made and certified as being necessary to meet the expenses of the public schools for the then coming year.

Respecting the Building Fund, it is proper to say that the amount of \$40,000 appropriated instead of \$50,000, the charter limit, was based on the expectation that the site of old number 10 school building would during the year, be sold and the proceeds available to our Board. Inasmuch as that has not been sold the Board of Education has not been able to do all the building necessary to properly provide for school children in attendance.

We are now obliged to rent annexes in districts Nos. 3, 4, 8, 12, 17, 21, 22, 27, 31, Laburnam street, May street, Lake avenue and Phelps avenue. In addition to these, school buildings 9, 11, 18, 24, 29 and 30 are overcrowded, the halls and cloak rooms of some of which are used as recitation rooms, while two recitations and classes in one room are of common occurrence.

In regard to the other funds above named we would say the expenses have not increased beyond our original statements to you nor out of proportion to the increase in the schools which is nearly one thousand pupils during the past year.

In all our funds the Board has so far kept within its appropriations but as you can readily see, the Fuel and Fire Fixtures committee not receiving within \$9,304 of its former estimate and the Supply Committee receiving \$6,525 less than it first asked for, why it will be impossible to finish the fiscal year free from debt unless further amounts be furnished.

The funds now on hand to the credit of those committees will just about enable us to reach the month of January next.

We therefore respectfully request your attention in order that these amounts may be granted and the Board finish the fiscal year free from obligations.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen:—About three years ago the Cross-town Street Railroad Company, which has been succeeded by the Rochester Railway Company, constructed a double track through Central Park from Goodman street to Alexander street. The purpose at the time of such construction was to continue the Central Park line down German street to Scio; thence along Scio street, University avenue and other streets to the central portion of the city. The consolidation of all of the street railroad companies of this city made it unwise and inexpedient to construct the Central Park line on the streets originally intended, and no way has as yet been provided for the completion of said line. Recently a large number of property owners residing in the northeastern portion of the city have urged upon this company the completion of said line.

As is well known, that portion of the city north of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad, and extending from North avenue to East Main street, is without any adequate street railroad facilities. The population of that section has been rapidly increasing for the last few years, and it seems necessary that the lines of the Rochester Railway Company should be extended in said section so as to furnish the people who reside there with means of ready communication with every part of the city of Rochester. The Central Park line, if connection could be made with the center of the city, could readily be extended through

Goodman street to Clifford street, thereby accommodating a great number of people who live in that section of Rochester north of Pennsylvania avenue. If the East Main street line were extended from the intersection of East Main street and Goodman street to Parsells avenue, and thence eastwardly on Parsells avenue to the city line it would seem that the section of the city before mentioned would be amply provided with street cars.

It does not seem feasible to construct the Central Park line from its present westerly terminus at Alexander street through German street because of the fact that said German street is so extremely narrow. The suggestion which has been made by property owners residing in the vicinity of the Central Park line, and which has met with the approval of this company, is that the Central Park line be extended from the present westerly terminus at Alexander street, along Alexander street to Bay street, and thence by the route as hereinafter set forth.

There is a rapidly growing section of the city which is contiguous to and connected by cross streets with Clifford street. The Rochester Railway Company has a franchise on Clifford street from North St. Paul street to the city line. It would not be expected that said company should build at once throughout the whole length of said Clifford street, but it seems desirable that that portion of Clifford street from Goodman street to Thomas street should be built at once. If such portion be built, it is necessary that the proposed Clifford street line should be brought into communication with the central portion of the city by the construction of the line which is hereinafter described.

As is well known, the Rochester Railway Company has, during the past three years, rebuilt and re-equipped not only all of the lines formerly operated by the Rochester City & Brighton Railroad Company, but that the number of miles of track now under electric operation in this city is more than twice the number of miles which were under operation when the work of making the changes mentioned was begun. It is the purpose of this company to complete the extensions of its lines covered by franchises granted during the coming season, and in that connection it is desirable that the company should know at the earliest possible date exactly what lines it will be required to build and place in operation in addition to those already covered by grants made.

It is the purpose of the Rochester Railway Company to extend its lines as rapidly as the public shall reasonably require, and at all times to keep abreast of the demand of the people for a well equipped and efficient street railroad. This company is not aware of any city of the size of Rochester, except Rochester, in which the people can, for a single fare of five cents, travel from any part of the city to any other part of the city. In many cases people residing five miles from their place of business are able, by taking a transfer, to get to their business by expending the sum of five cents. It is the purpose of the company by the extension of its lines and by the improvement of its service, to give the people who reside in every part of the city the benefit of cheap transportation, efficient and regular service and rapid transit.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee, to which was referred the application of the Board of Education for a further appropriation with which to pay the expenses of conducting the public schools in the city for the balance of the fiscal year, submits the following as its report thereon:

In reference to the application for a further allowance of \$10,000 for the Building Fund of that Board, your committee deems it unwise at this time, to grant the request. The requisition of the Board of Education at the beginning of the fiscal year, was for \$50,000, and the full amount allowed by law to be granted by the Council. Your committee at that time reported that an appropriation of \$40,000 be granted, and in connection with the report advised that old No. 10 school site be sold and the proceeds of such sale be turned over to the Building Fund. Shortly thereafter the Board of Education passed a resolution, in which they took the position that it was unwise at that time to sell that site, and nothing was done by the

Common Council toward making a sale. The property is very favorably situated for business purposes, and it is believed could be sold for at least \$15,000, and possibly more. As it stands to-day it is of no use to the city, produces no income, and simply represents that amount of money, from which the city derives no benefit.

Your committee believes that the time has arrived when a sale of such property should be made, and, therefore, recommends that the Law Committee be instructed to advertise the property and sell it for the best price obtainable.

In reference to the application for an allowance of \$1,000 to the Library Fund of the Board of Education, your committee has carefully investigated the matter, and finds that a large portion of the \$2,000 granted in the annual tax levy for that fund, has been expended in the re-cataloguing of the library, now nearly completed. By reason of the fact that so large a portion of the appropriation was diverted to this expense, the Library has been unable to purchase new books for the library as they have been required. Your committee believes that the expense incurred in re-cataloguing the library has been a wise one, and that it will tend to preserve the books belonging to the city, and secure their return to the library much more certainly than was formerly the case, and your committee further believes that some provision should be made for the purchasing of the new books now required, and in that belief, your committee has deemed it wise to recommend the further appropriation of \$750.

In reference to the application for \$15,829 to the Contingent Fund, your committee has decided to recommend an appropriation of \$7,250, which amount it is believed will be sufficient to provide the necessary coal for the several schools for the balance of the year, and any other supplies necessary for the Supply Committee.

It was intended by the committee at the time the tax levy was made up in May last, that the Fuel and Fire Fixture Committee should receive the amount asked for by that committee, and that the other committees drawing their moneys from the Contingent Fund, should get along with less money than their requisitions called for.

Under the system adopted by the Board of Education several years ago, and which the present Board of Education has continued, the amount which it was not deemed wise to grant, was deducted pro rata from the amount provided for the several committees, and having charge of the Contingent Fund, and in that way the Fuel and Fire Fixture Committee was compelled to accept a sum considerably less than was believed to be necessary for its use. The higher prices paid for coal during the present year have operated to exhaust the funds at this time, and unless this committee is granted more money, the several schools of the city will be compelled to close on account of a lack of coal, or the committee will be compelled to become indebted for it.

Your Finance Committee, therefore, recommends that there be granted to the Contingent Fund of the Board of Education the sum of \$7,250 as above specified.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen:—In accordance with a resolution of your honorable body passed on November 15, 1892, directing the City Surveyor to report upon the most feasible route for a sewer and the kind of sewer best adapted for the relief of that portion of the city of Rochester lying south of the Pinnacle range of hills, and also the probable expense thereof, I beg leave to report.

The portion of the city to be considered, comprises about 244 acres, of which about two-thirds are from fifty to one-hundred and twenty feet above the Erie canal, and the lowest portion at the south-east corner of the city is only about ten feet above.

In a study of the question of sewage for this area it is evident that it should be considered in connection with the whole district, comprising about 800 acres lying between the top of Mount Hope range, Elmwood avenue and Monroe avenue.

It is apparent that this will be included within the city limits at no very distant day, and the elevations of Mount Hope and Pinnacle range of hills will furnish picturesque and suitable sites for the most magnificent houses.

Highland avenue will become a most beautiful street, while the broad level area between it and Elmwood avenue will furnish living room to tens of thousands, brought near to the city by short extensions of the electric lines on Monroe, Pinnacle and South avenues, and by new lines to be built on Goodman street and Culver road when they shall have been extended south over the hill.

The flat area is not now available for dwellings because it is so wet, but it is possible to arrange a system of sewerage and subsoil drainage at a not unreasonable cost which would make it as desirable as any part of Rochester.

In order to do this it would be necessary to establish intermittent filtration beds to purify the sewage, as it would naturally run into Allen's creek.

While the soil and subsoil, being clay, are not well adapted to such use, yet because of the location near unlimited gravel beds, and in the proper position and elevation it is an advantageous place to introduce and operate the most modern and most successful plan of sewage treatment.

I am convinced that the scientific, and probably the best plan in the long run, would be to devise a system of sewage disposal upon the south side of Mount Hope range, and yet because of the fact that it will apparently by many years before the great portion of this territory is actually occupied, and in the meantime the cost of the works would be an insufferable burden upon the property, I have determined to follow the directions of your

resolution explicitly and confine our attention to the limited area within the present city limits.

Efforts have been made for years to treat the sewage from the country, and what is now the state institutions, so that the effluent would not be a nuisance.

These efforts have been unsuccessful. The reasons for this are obvious, but it is also evident that to secure better results, a considerable expenditure is necessary for preparing the land, and an increased annual expense for attendance and care.

There is no possible outlet for unpurified sewage, except in two directions, one of these is into the Genesee river at Elmwood avenue. This would be unjustifiable for three good reasons, viz:

First; It would add to the pollution of the river, through the whole length of the city.

Second; It would be very expensive, on account of its great depth below the surface, and would be a tunnel over a mile long.

Third; Even then it would not be low enough to drain a considerable portion of the area.

Suppose we start a sewer from the Genesee river, to go east along Elmwood avenue, and give it the proper grade of one foot in four hundred. The west end would be at level of low water, and the sewer would be thirty-four feet deep at the crossing of the N. Y., L. E. & W. R. R.; from 34 to 59 feet deep from there to Mount Hope avenue, and at South avenue, 4,750 feet east from the river, 44.6 feet deep, while at the east line of the state asylum land, 1,500 feet further east, it would be only five feet below the surface, and the city line is about 1,550 feet east of that point, and 11 feet lower.

The second possible outlet for untreated sewage is into the East Side Trunk Sewer. If this plan is followed it will be necessary to confine ourselves to delivering nothing but sewage.

It will be remembered that all of our present sewers take storm water as well as sewage, and that the volume of storm water usually exceeds that of sewage twenty (20) or more times, and further the East Side Trunk Sewer was not designed to take any sewage from the south of the summit of Mount Hope range. We will return to this point again.

Three plans were considered for delivering sewage only from the 244 acres under consideration, into the East Side Trunk Sewer.

First; Beginning at the intersection of Elmwood avenue and South avenue; thence easterly along Elmwood avenue with a pipe 15 inches in diameter, for 2,750 feet to a point where the center line of Goodman street extended would intersect, thence northerly along the line of Goodman street extended, and along Goodman street itself 6,200 feet to the East Side Trunk Sewer.

The grade of this pipe can be made one foot in 300. In Elmwood avenue it will be from seven to twelve feet deep, from Elmwood avenue to the south end of tunnel under hill, 1,600 feet, from 7 to 25 feet deep.

The tunnel will be 2,800 feet long, egg shape, six feet by four feet; the sewer for 1,800 feet from north end of tunnel will have to be made larger and at a lower grade than would be necessary for local drainage.

The total cost of this line is estimated at \$70,000.

Second; Lay a fifteen-inch pipe in Elmwood avenue, from intersection of South avenue east 5,000 feet, thence still east in Elmwood avenue, with 3,950 feet of egg-shaped pipe, one foot two inches by one foot nine inches to a point 3,250 feet east of Pinnacle avenue, thence northerly parallel to line between land of James D. Cobb and Ellwanger & Barry, about 3,100 feet of egg-shaped pipe one foot two inches by one foot nine inches to south end of tunnel under hill, thence north with a

tunnel 2,000 feet long, six feet by four feet, to a point in the Culver road, thence northerly 1,900 feet along the Culver road, and under the Erie canal to the East Side Trunk Sewer.

The cost of this line is estimated at \$65,000.

It has the advantage over the first plan of being somewhat cheaper and of entering the East Side Trunk Sewer about one and one-quarter miles nearer to an overflow in said sewer.

A plan was considered for establishing a pumping plant upon the lowest part of the lot now owned by the city south of Highland avenue, and after collecting the sewage into a receiving tank pumping it over the hill to save the cost of a tunnel, but after taking into account the cost of operating I could see no advantage in this.

Having thus outlined the manner in which we have looked at the question, I will now state the conclusion at which I have arrived.

We should only attempt at present to give an outlet to that portion of the territory which is naturally suitable for or is now occupied by buildings, and leave out the lower portion which would require the extensive system of subsoil drainage after we should have furnished the sewage outlet. This would result in leaving out nearly all of the Ellwanger & Barry lot lying east of the county and state property, and also the lot owned by the city south of Highland avenue.

Then the plan I would recommend is as follows:

Lay an eighteen-inch vitrified pipe, beginning at intersection of Elmwood avenue and South avenue, thence easterly along Elmwood avenue 400 feet; thence northerly parallel with South avenue, and through lands of the State Hospital and county almshouse about 730 feet, thence northeasterly following the contour of the hill, and diagonally across lands of the county almshouse, county penitentiary, Ellwanger & Barry and lot owned by the city to Highland avenue, about 2,260 feet, thence continuing in about the same direction still following the contour of the hills and through land owned by the city about 950 feet to a point in the line of Goodman street produced, about 360 feet northerly from the center of Highland avenue, measured on said line produced; thence northerly along said line of Goodman street produced to the center of Oakland street about 1,500 feet.

The pipe will be laid on a grade of one foot in four hundred, and will be in general from six to twelve feet deep, except through the summit of Mount Hope range, where there will be about 700 feet of cutting 25 feet deep, and a tunnel 500 feet long.

The estimated cost of said sewer is \$16,000.

This sewer will carry 323 cubic feet per minute, equal to 1,162,000 gallons in eight hours, and would serve for carrying the sewage for probably 15,000 people, while the population which may be expected upon the 130 acres outside of reservoir and park is about 4,000.

It is deemed advisable to make the sewer somewhat larger than is absolutely necessary to allow for the admission of a certain amount of storm water to thoroughly flush it. In addition to the above estimated cost, the territory benefited should pay a proportion of the cost of the sewer which will be built in Goodman street from Oakland street to the East Side Trunk Sewer, and also their proportion of the cost of the East Side Trunk Sewer itself.

As to the advisability of putting this amount of sewage into the East Side Trunk Sewer from a district outside of the area which it is designed to serve, it may be said that great skill was exercised in working out the plans for that sewer, that it is designed to serve the whole area north of the summit of Mount

Hope range when it shall be at some future time completely built up and improved, that this will evidently not occur until a time considerably distant, that not until that time comes can it make any appreciable difference in the sewage of the big sewer, and that if storm water is completely excluded from the proposed sewer, it will not take but a little over one-half of one per cent. of the capacity of the East Side Trunk Sewer, even when the whole area to be served is completely built upon.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS.

By Ald. Lewis—

Gentlemen:—The Rochester Railway Company presented to your honorable body at the meeting held December 13th, an application for the right to construct, maintain and operate extensions and branches of its railroad in the city of Rochester on Parsells and Webster avenues, North Goodman street, Alexander street, Bay street, Herman street, Thomas street, Hanover street, and Baden street.

Since the time when such application was presented this company has conferred with many property owners owning property on or in the vicinity of the streets named with reference to the best routes to be selected for the purpose of furnishing additional street railroad facilities in the northeastern portion of the city of Rochester. This company has also canvassed among the property owners on several of the streets above named for the purpose of obtaining the necessary consent of a majority in interest to the construction and operation of its proposed extensions.

It has been found that an overwhelming majority of the property owners on Chatham street are opposed to the construction through that street of a street surface railroad. Indeed, a remonstrance against the grant of a franchise to construct and operate a railroad on such street has as we are informed received the signature of all but five persons who own property on such street.

Some objection has been made by the residents of that portion of the city contiguous to the proposed Central park line to the construction of said line through Alexander, Bay, Cleveland and Herman streets as described in the application of this company.

It is the purpose of the Rochester Railway Company to accede to the wishes, so far as it is possible, of the people on the streets through which its road runs, or on which the right to operate is asked from the Common Council. As the result of the conferences held with property owners as above outlined, and because the property owners on Chatham street oppose the grant of a franchise for a street railroad on such street, the Rochester Railway Company hereby withdraws the application above referred to made to the Common Council of the city of Rochester on the 13th day of December, 1892.

To meet suggestions which have been made and to enable the Rochester Railway Company to construct extensions of its lines through sections of the city where the people require such extensions to be made, the Rochester Railway Company hereby makes application for the right, privilege and franchise of constructing, maintaining, operating and using a street surface railroad in connection with the present lines of said company; and for the right, privilege and franchise of constructing, erecting, setting and maintaining the necessary poles, wires and appliances to enable such extensions to be operated with electricity as motive power by the single trolley electric system, in, through, along and upon the following named streets and avenues, to wit:

Commencing at the present tracks of the Rochester Railway Company at the intersection of East Main street and North Goodman street and running a double track thence along North Goodman street to Webster avenue; thence a double track along Parsells avenue to the city line of the city of Rochester.

Also, commencing at the easterly end of Central park and running thence northwardly a double track along North Goodman street to Clifford street.

Also commencing at the westerly end of Central park and running thence with single track and necessary turn-outs along German street to North avenue; thence southwardly a single track with necessary turn-outs along North avenue to the present tracks of the Rochester Railway Company on North street.

Also, commencing at the westerly end of German street and running thence with single track northwardly along North avenue to the present track of the Rochester Railway Company on North avenue to its intersection with Draper street.

Also, commencing at the intersection of Clifford street with Thomas street and thence with single track and necessary turn-outs southwardly along Thomas street to Herman street; thence with single track and necessary turn-outs along Herman street to Hanover street; thence along Hanover street with single track and necessary turn-outs to Baden street; thence along Baden street with single track and necessary turn-outs to the present track of the Rochester Railway Company on St. Joseph street.

It will be observed that application is made for the right to run from the westerly end of German street both up to Draper street as well as down North avenue to North street. It is not of course expected that a grant would be made both northwardly from German street to Draper as well as southwardly along North avenue to North street. The purpose is simply to place before the Common Council the proposition of the company to run the Central park line in either direction to a connection with the North avenue tracks as the Common Council shall deem best.

If the applications above outlined shall be granted, the company will connect the Parsells, Webster and North Goodman street line with the East Main street line, thus running cars to the center of the city; it will connect the North Goodman street and Central park line through German street with the North avenue line over which cars will run to the center of the city; it will connect the Clifford street line from Goodman street through Thomas, Herman, Hanover and Baden streets with the St. Joseph line and thence to the central portion of the city.

This company is entirely willing that the grant which it asks for shall be upon its terms made void unless the company shall construct the proposed extensions and have the same in operation prior to November 1, 1893.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Forsyth—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen—Your law committee begs leave to make the following report.

On the 28th day of December, 1891, an agreement was entered into between the city of Rochester and Mary Shiel, to pay the sum of \$35.00, per annum, for the right, privilege and easement to continue the discharge of sewage over her property, and another payment was due on the 28th December, 1892, we therefore recommend that an order be drawn in favor of said Mary Shiel, pursuant to said agreement for the year 1892.

In the matter of the application of W. O. Rice, asking for compensation as poll clerk in district No. 1, 2nd Ward, from the city of Rochester, your committee find upon examination, that it has been customary for a number of years for the city to pay each inspector of election \$25.00 for his services, which sum included compensation for any clerks of the poll employed by said inspector, we further find, that by a resolution of the Common Council, adopted November 15th, 1892, found at page 330, Current Proceedings, that a resolution to the same effect was then adopted. In the opinion of your committee therefore the claim of Mr. Rice is not valid, and his application should be denied.

Your Committee have examined into the application of Charles Elitson and A. Dingman, hucksters, who paid a license fee for the year ending July 1st, 1893, of \$15.00; since the first of July, and on December 6th, 1892, the ordinance relative to hucksters licenses, has been amended so that now th e license fee is \$5.00 per annum, instead of \$15.00 per annum. We therefore recommend that the sum of \$5.84 each, be refunded to Mr. Elitson and Mr. Dingman, to make their licenses conform to the present ordinance, that sum making their license fee \$15.00 per annum to December 6th, and \$5.00 per annum from December 6th, 1892.

In the matter of the division of the several wards into election districts, your committee beg leave to submit to the council as boundaries of the several election districts for the several wards, which have been completed as follows:

THIRD WARD ELECTION DISTRICTS.

First district. The first district will comprise all that portion of the third ward included within, and described by, the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Main and North Clinton streets; thence northerly along the center line of North Clinton street, to the center line of Marietta street; thence westerly along the center line of Marietta street, and said line produced to the center of the Genesee river, thence southerly, along the center of the Genesee river, to the center line of Main street; thence easterly along the center line of Main street to the place of beginning.

Third district. The third district will comprise all that portion of the third ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of North Clinton and Gorham street; thence westerly, along the center line of Gorham street, to the center line of North St. Paul street; thence northwesterly, across North St. Paul street, to the center line of Livingston street; thence westerly along the center line of Livingston street, and said line produced, to the center of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the center of the Genesee river to the center line of the R. W. & O. R. R.; thence easterly along the center line of the R. W. & O. R. R., to the center line of North St. Paul st.; thence southerly along the center line of North St. Paul st., to the center line of Lowell st.; thence easterly along the center line of Lowell st., to the center line of North Clinton street; thence southerly, along the center line of North Clinton street to the place of beginning.

Fourth district. The fourth district will comprise all that portion of the third ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center line of Lowell and North Clinton street; thence northerly along the center line of North Clinton street, to the center line of Oakman street; thence westerly, along the center line of Oakman street, to the center line of Hawkins street; thence northerly along the center line of Hawkins street, to the center line of Scrantom street; thence westerly, along the center line of Scrantom street; to the center line of Conkey avenue; thence northerly along the center line of Conkey avenue, to the center line of Evergreen street; thence westerly along the center line of Evergreen street, and said line produced, to the center line of the Genesee river; thence southerly, along the center of the Genesee river to the center line of the R. W. & O. R. R.; thence easterly along the center line of the R. W. & O. R. R., to the center line of North St. Paul st.; thence southerly along the center line of North St. Paul st., to the center line of Lowell street; thence easterly along the center line of Lowell street, to the place of beginning.

Fifth district. The fifth district will comprise all that portion of the third ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

By Ald. Lewis—Resolved, That the matter of providing a method by which the city will be saved the necessity of borrowing large amounts of money each year in anticipation of the tax levy, be referred to the finance committee.

Adopted.

By Ald. Lewis—Whereas, It is reported in the daily papers that a proposition has been made by one or more individuals for the purchase of the site on which the court house now stands, and

Whereas, The sale of the entire site would operate adversely to the interests of the city by reason of the fact that if a building were to be erected to cover the entire site, light and air would be cut off from the front of the building, therefore,

Resolved, That the city property committee be, and it is hereby, instructed to ascertain and report to this council what steps, if any should be taken to protect the city's interests in the matter.

Adopted.

Ald. Forsyth presented the following proposed act and moved its reference to the police committee and city attorney:

AN ACT to amend section 265 of the Revised Charter of the City of Rochester.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1—Section 265 of the Revised Charter of the City of Rochester, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 265—Police Justice's Jurisdiction, trial by jury, Municipal Court jurisdiction upon ordinances.

The police justice of said city shall have jurisdiction in any suit brought for penalty or forfeiture, given for a violation of any city ordinance, or of the laws concerning the internal police of the state, and is hereby empowered to hold courts of special sessions for the trial of all offenses, triable in a court of special sessions.

Every court of special sessions held by said police justice, or by one of the judges of the Municipal Court of said city, or the mayor, or one of the police commissioners or aldermen, in the place of said police justice, as provided by section 267 of this act, shall, subject to the power of removal, provided for in chapter 1 of title 6 of part 1 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, have exclusive jurisdiction to hear, try and determine all charges of misdemeanor, and other offenses or crimes, punishable as such, as are defined by sections 5 and 6 of the Penal Code, or other statute now, or hereafter passed, where the offense has been committed within the city of Rochester, and of petit larceny, committed as a second offense within said city. And the complaint has been made to said police justice, or one of the officers acting in his place, or one of the judges of the Municipal Court, and the said police justice, or other officer acting in his place, shall have power to impose any sentence, punishment, fine, imprisonment, or both, as is provided in such cases by the provisions of the Penal Code, or by the special statutes of this state.

The board of police commissioners shall have power to appoint, from time to time, a stenographer, who shall perform such duties as they shall, from time to time, require of him. The police magistrate, or person acting in his stead, shall have power to require such stenographer to take the evidence in all criminal cases, or proceedings, pending before him; and shall have power to require such stenographer

to transcribe his shorthand notes and deliver to the district attorney of the county of Monroe a copy of such transcript; and shall have power to require such stenographer to transcribe his notes and deliver a copy thereof to the defendant in any action, upon the payment to the clerk of such police court, of the sum of 10 cents per folio, for each folio of such transcript.

The salary of said stenographer shall be fixed by said board of police commissioners, and shall be paid in the same manner in which the salary of the police clerk is now paid.

In any action brought for the violation of any ordinance, or of the laws concerning the internal police of the state, as aforesaid, a trial by jury may be had, upon the demand of either party, made before the actual commencement of such trial, and such trial shall be conducted in the manner provided for trials by jury in justice's courts by the code of civil procedure, and the jurors summoned, as well as those acting or sitting upon the trial, and the officer executing the venire and attending the jury, which officer may be one of the members of the police force of said city, to be nominated by said police justice, shall be entitled to the fees allowed by law, to jurors and constables for similar services in trials by jury before justices of the peace or justices' courts, and which fees shall be paid to the said police justice for the purposes aforesaid, by the party demanding such jury trial, at the time such demand is made, and upon the failure to pay the same, such demand for a trial by jury shall be disregarded, but the fees allowed to said officer, if he be one of the members of said police force of said city, for summoning or attending upon such jury, shall be retained by the police clerk and be paid by him to the treasurer of said city, to the credit of the contingent fund.

The Municipal Court of said city shall also have jurisdiction of all suits brought for violation of any regulation, by-law or ordinance, passed, enacted or adopted by the Common Council, Board of Health or Executive Board, of said city, where the sum for which judgment is demanded in the complaint, does not exceed five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, exclusive of costs, provided the same be instituted by or under the direction of the city attorney, or said Common Council, Board of Health or Executive Board.

Sec. 2—This act shall take effect immediately.

The president handed down the names of Aids. Aikenhead, Adams, Fox, Lempert and Lewis as the special committee ordered appointed by the motion of Ald. Aikenhead.

Ald. Lewis moved that when the board adjourn it be for one week. Carried.

Upon motion of Ald. Lewis the board then adjourned.

Gentlemen:—In the matter of the further division of the several wards of the city into election districts, your committee begs leave to submit as supplemental report, the boundaries of the several districts as follows:

FIRST WARD.

First District—The First District will comprise all that portion of the First Ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Montgomery alley and Allen street; thence easterly, along the center line of Allen street, to the center line of State street; thence southerly, along the center line of State street to the center line of Mumford street; thence easterly, along the center lines of Mumford and Andrews streets, to the center of the Genesee river; thence southerly, along the center of the Genesee river, to the center of the Erie canal; thence westerly, along the center of the Erie canal, to the center line of Montgomery alley, thence northerly along the center line of Montgomery alley, to the place of beginning.

Second District—The Second District will comprise all that portion of the First Ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Flint and Genesee streets; thence southerly, along the center line of Genesee street to the center line of Magnolia street; thence easterly, along the center line of Magnolia street, to the center line of Jefferson avenue; thence southerly, along the center line of Jefferson avenue to the center line of Cottage street; thence easterly, along the center line of Cottage street, and said line produced to the center of the Genesee river; thence southerly, along the center of the Genesee river, to the southerly boundary line of the city, thence westerly and northerly, along said boundary line, to the westerly produced center line of Flint street; thence easterly, on said produced center line of Flint street to the place of beginning.

Third District—The third district will comprise all that portion of the nineteenth ward included within, and described by, the following boundary lines viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Seward street and Columbia avenue; thence easterly, along the center line of Columbia avenue, to the center line of Plymouth avenue; thence southerly, along the center line of Plymouth avenue, to the center line of Ethel street; thence easterly, along the center line of Ethel street, to the center line of Flora street; thence southerly, along the center line of Flora street, to the center line of Violetta street; thence easterly, along the center line of Violetta street, and said line produced, to the center of the Genesee river; thence south-westerly, along the center of the Genesee river, to the produced center line of Cottage street; thence northwesterly, along said produced center line and the center line of Cottage street, to the center line of Jefferson avenue; thence northerly, along the center line of Jefferson avenue, to the center line of Magnolia street; thence easterly along the center line of Magnolia street, to the center line of Seward street; thence northeasterly along the center line of Seward street to the place of beginning.

Fourth District. The fourth district will comprise all that portion of the nineteenth ward included within and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Magnolia and Genesee streets; thence northerly along the center line of Genesee street to the center line of Columbia avenue; thence easterly along the center line of Columbia avenue to the center line of Snyder street; thence northerly, along the center line of Snyder street, to the center line of Whittlesey alley; thence easterly, along the center line of Whittlesey alley, to the center line of Seward street; thence southerly, along the center line of Seward street, to the center line of Magnolia street; thence westerly, along the center line of Magnolia street, to the place of beginning.

Fifth District. The fifth district will comprise all that portion of the nineteenth ward included within, and described by, the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Whittlesey alley and Snyder street; thence northerly, along the center line of Snyder street, to the center line of Bronson avenue; thence easterly, along the center line

of Bronson avenue, to the center line of Seward street; thence southerly along the center line of Seward street, to the center line of Whittlesey alley; thence westerly, along the center line of Whittlesey alley, to the place of beginning.

Sixth District. The sixth district will comprise all that portion of the nineteenth ward included within, and described by, the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Seward street and Columbia avenue; thence easterly, along the center line of Columbia avenue, to the center line of Plymouth avenue; thence southerly along the center line of Plymouth avenue, to the center line of Ethel street; thence easterly, along the center line of Ethel street, to the center line of Flora street; thence southerly, along the center line of Flora street, to the center line of Violetta street; thence easterly, along the center line of Violetta street, and said line produced, to the easterly boundary line of the nineteenth ward; thence northerly, westerly and again northerly, along said boundary line, to the center line of Bronson avenue; thence westerly, along the center line of Bronson avenue, to the center line of Seward street; thence southerly, along the center line of Seward street to the place of beginning.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen—Your Police Committee to which was referred the proposed amendment to section 265 of the revised charter, begs leave to make the following report. At the meeting held by the Committee, the district attorney, police justice and city attorney were in attendance, and after a full and thorough consideration of the amendment proposed by the committee and the persons present, we are of the opinion that the amendment proposed is commendable and proper, and we recommend that the same be amended to read as follows:

AN ACT to further amend chapter 143 of the laws of 1861, entitled, "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the Charter of the city of Rochester."

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1.—Section 265 of the Revised Charter of the City of Rochester, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 265—Police Justice Jurisdiction, trial by Jury, Municipal court jurisdiction upon ordinances.

The police justice of said city shall have jurisdiction in any suit brought for penalty or forfeiture, given for a violation of any city ordinance, or of the laws concerning the internal police of the state, and is hereby empowered to hold Courts of Special Sessions for the trial of all offenses, triable in a Court of Special Sessions.

Every Court of Special Sessions held by said police justice or by one of the judges of the Municipal court of said city, or the Mayor, or one of the Police Commissioners or

Alderman, in the place of said Police Justice, as provided by section 267 of this act, shall subject to the power of removal, provided for in chapter 1 of title 6, of part 1 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, have exclusive jurisdiction to hear, try, and determine all charges of misdemeanor, and other offenses for crimes punishable as such, as are defined by sections 5 and 6 of the penal code, or other statute now, or hereafter passed, where the offense has been committed within the city of Rochester, and of petit larceny, committed as a second offense within said city. And the complaint has been made to said Police Justice, or one of the officers acting in his place, or one of the Judges of the Municipal Court, and the said Police Justice, or other officer acting in his place, shall have power to impose any sentence, punishment, fine, imprisonment, or both, as is provided in such cases by the provisions of the Penal code, or by special statutes of this state.

The Board of Police Commissioners shall have power to appoint from time to time, a stenographer who shall perform such duties as they shall from time to time require of him. The police magistrate or person acting in his stead, shall have power to require such stenographer to take the evidence in all criminal cases or proceedings pending before him; and shall have power to require such stenographer to transcribe his short hand notes and deliver to the District Attorney of the County of Monroe, a copy of such transcript; and shall have power to require such stenographer to transcribe his notes, and deliver a copy thereof to the defendant in any action, upon the payment to the clerk of such police court of the sum of 10 cents per folio for each folio of such transcript.

The salary of said stenographer shall be fixed by said Board of Police Commissioners, and shall be paid in the same manner in which the salary of the police clerk is now paid.

In any action brought for the violation of any ordinance, or of the laws concerning the internal police of the state, as aforesaid, a trial by jury may be had, upon the demand of either party, made before the actual commencement of such trial, and such trial shall be conducted in the manner provided for trials by jury in Justice's courts by the Code of Civil Procedure, and the jurors summoned, as well as those acting or sitting upon the trial, and the officer attending the venire and attending the jury, which officer may be one of the members of the police force of said City, to be nominated by said police justice, shall be entitled to the fees allowed by law to jurors and constables for similar services in trials by jury before justices of the peace, or Justice's courts, and which fees shall be paid by the said police justice for the purposes aforesaid, by the party demanding such jury trial, at the time such demand is made, and upon the failure to pay the same, such demand for a trial by jury shall be disregarded, but the fees allowed to said officer, if he be one of the members of the police force of said City, for summoning or attending upon such jury, shall be retained by the police clerk, and shall be paid by him to the Treasurer of said City, to the credit of the contingent fund.

The Municipal court of said city shall also have jurisdiction of all suits brought for violation of any regulation, bylaw, or ordinance, passed, enacted, or adopted by the Common Council, Board of Health, or Executive Board of said City, where the sum for which judgment is demanded in the complaint, does not exceed five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, exclusive of costs, provided the same be instituted by or under the direction of the City Attorney, or said Common Council, Board of Health, or Executive Board.

Section 2—This act shall take effect immediately.

And that a resolution be adopted that a certified copy of said amendment be forwarded to the City's representative in the State Legislature with the request to urge the passage and enactment of said amendment at the earliest day.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your lamp committee, to which was referred the proposition to discontinue the incandescent system now in use in the western part of the city, and substitute therefor the arc system, submits the following as its report thereon:

Your committee has investigated the subject, and conferred with the City Electrician, and from its investigation it appears that the incandescent lights have been gradually reduced in number from time to time, until now there are but a comparatively few in use, and those are scattered over quite a large territory. It has been suggested that they be entirely abandoned, and the arc system be substituted. In conferring with the Rochester Gas and Electric Company in relation to the change, it was at first suggested that the company under its contract with the city, would be entitled to compensation for taking down and removing the system, but your committee by insisting that the number of lights would be somewhat increased proportionately, and that the expense of maintaining them would be slightly increased, has succeeded in prevailing upon the company to abandon its claim for remuneration for making the change and to agree to make the change without expense.

Your committee, therefore, recommends that the Rochester Gas and Electric Company be authorized to discontinue the incandescent lighting system wherever the same is now in public use, and to substitute therefor the arc system, upon the express condition that no charge be made for making such change.

The increase in the expense of lighting the territory now lit by the incandescent system, will be four dollars and five cents per night, but as the incandescent system has not been giving satisfaction at any time since its introduction, and especially since the number of incandescent lights have been so materially reduced, it is believed that the city will get very much better returns from the money paid out by the use of the arc system.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

By the Clerk.—

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Jan. 17, 1893.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Permit me to call the attention of your honorable body to the inadequate room which is now occupied by the appointees of your law department with the hope that it may receive your immediate consideration.

There are in the regular employ of this department, three attorneys, two stenographers and one clerk. In addition to these I have found it necessary to provide desk room for a person who serves the papers in condemnation proceedings, which makes it necessary to have desk room for seven persons. This number of persons is crowded into one room, the dimensions of which are 23 3-4 by 33 1-2 feet. This is divided by a thin board and glass partition into three compartments; one of which is occupied by my two assistants and one stenographer; the other by the other stenographer and myself and the third or outside by the clerks. In which all the commissions in condemnation proceedings have also to meet. This outside compartment is so dark during the entire day that it is necessary to keep the electric lights burning continuously. If any commission is in session the desks used by the clerks have to be occupied by the commissioners and the attorneys appearing therein, and the clerks have to retire to await the adjournment of the commission before they can continue with their work. If one of the assistants requires a conference with any witnesses or parties interested in any matter in charge of such assistant, it becomes necessary for the stenographer and the other assistant to retire until such work is completed. If I am called upon by any official or other person who desires to see me privately it is necessary to have the stenographer in my compartment retire and suspend work until such consultation is ended.

You can therefore see that it is impossible to do the assigned duties with any satisfaction and dispatch, for during more than one half of the time one or more of the employees of this department have to suspend the work assigned to them on account of such interference. The legal business of the city has lately increased to such proportions as to become necessary for all the employees to be continually at work during office hours to keep up with the demands upon the office and we have been obliged to retire to private offices outside of the city hall to do our work or postpone the same and do it in the evening on account of these continued and unavoidable interruptions.

I had hopes that when the question of more room was agitated provisions could be made for this department, but it is evident, that nothing definite has been decided upon and probable that it will require considerable time before more room will be made in the city hall.

I regard it as an absolute necessity both for the best interests of the legal business of the city and the health of your appointees to temporarily provide more room, and I would respectfully suggest, that provisions be made for the same outside of the city hall, and that this matter be referred to the city property committee with power to act.

Dewey—Whereas, The said Standard Electric Signal Company has made application for consent to place upon the streets of the city of Rochester, the necessary wires for the introduction of its automatic fire alarm system, in such a manner, and under such conditions and regulations as said common council may prescribe; be it

Resolved, That the consent of the common council of the city of Rochester be, and the same is hereby given to said Standard Electric Signal Company to place and maintain upon the streets of said city the necessary wires and appurtenances thereto for the introduction of its automatic fire alarm system, subject to the provisions, restrictions, conditions, rules and regulations hereinafter set forth, and subject to any future penal regulation, ordinance or resolution which may be adopted by said common council. The conditions upon which this consent is granted are, that said company shall not string or place any wires

in any of the streets, avenues, public parks, places, alleys, or other highways of said city where electric conduits are now built or maintained, over which the city of Rochester now has control, and in which said company shall have the opportunity to acquire the right to use any duct or ducts thereof, it being expressly agreed by said company that the city of Rochester, or its officers, have the right and power to remove any wires, or appurtenances thereto, after the expiration of sixty days from the date of the service of notice, in writing, upon said company to remove the same, it being the purpose of said city not to permit any overhead wires to be constructed or maintained after the construction of subways or conduits designed and suited for doing the same services as is done by means of overhead wires. A further condition of this consent is, that, except with special permission of the common council, said company shall not have the right to erect or maintain any poles on the streets, avenues, public parks, places, alleys or other highways of said city.

Said company further agrees to comply with all the requirements, conditions and agreements, so far as they may be applicable, with the terms of the contracts and permits heretofore granted to all of the electric lightning and power companies.

Said company further agrees not to disturb the surface or pavement of any streets, avenues, public parks, places, alleys or other highways of said city, or in any way interfere with the public use of the same.

Said company shall execute and deliver to the city of Rochester a bond, the form and conditions to be approved of by the city attorney and city electrician, in the penal sum of _____ dollars, with sufficient sureties, to be approved of by the mayor, conditioned that said company shall not disturb the surface or pavements of any streets, avenues, public parks, places, alleys or other highways of said city, or in any way interfere with the public use of the same.

Said company shall, and will, at all times, save harmless said city from any damages or liabilities on account of the placing and maintaining of its wires, as aforesaid, and from any damages to person or property caused by said wires, or the use of the same, and from all and any damages caused by the same having been, or to be, erected on private property.

The Common Council shall also have the power to revoke said consent, in case said company fails to comply with the conditions thereof.

The said bridge to be as wide as the avenue and to have two plate iron girders in line with the curbstones stringers, and planking to be of wood.

Ward—Whereas, It has been ascertained by competent engineers, that the general construction of the present bridge over the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad at Bronson avenue is defective and improper, and that said bridge does not provide a suitable over-crossing there as is required by the laws of the State of New York; and

Whereas, This Common Council has heretofore by a proper resolution condemned said bridge as not being a suitable crossing over said railroad at said avenue to answer their acquirements and meet the demands of public travel in this city.

Be it resolved, That the following improvement is necessary namely: The building of a wrought iron or steel bridge over the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad property at Bronson avenue, in place of the existing cast iron arch bridge, said bridge to have only two plate iron girders, placed on line of the curbs and sidewalks supported upon brackets extending to the lines of the street. Floor to be of plank or wooden stringers, stone work to be extended and the approaches to be graded to full width of avenue, and

Whereas, The City Surveyor, under the directions of the council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at \$6,700, which is hereby approved.

Resolved, Further, that the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for the whole expense thereof, viz:

All of the land included between the easterly line of the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad and the westerly line of the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad, and West avenue and the south line of the city, in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom.

That upon the 12th day of June, 1891, as such administrator, she recovered a judgment against the city of Rochester for the sum of \$5,402.75. The city of Rochester appealed from that judgment to the general term of the supreme court, and the general term of the supreme court affirmed the said judgment and for \$92.50 costs, on the 27th day of January, 1892.

The city of Rochester appealed from that judgment to the court of appeals, and the court of appeals affirmed the judgment appealed from, and the judgment of affirmance and for \$107.80 costs was entered on the 19th day of January, 1893. The city has exhausted its resources in the matter of appeals, and your petitioner therefore asks that the city treasurer be directed to pay to her or her attorneys, the said judgments with the interest which has accrued thereon.

Whereas, The Executive Board of the City of Rochester have finally awarded a contract for the building of a stone bridge across the Genesee river on Court street in said city; and

Whereas, The plans and specifications on which said contract is based contemplate the building of a stone pier in the middle of the Johnson & Seymour raceway; therefore be it

Resolved, That the construction of such a pier would be a great and irreparable injury to the rights of the owners of the water rights in said race by obstructing the flow of water, by creating a perpetual source of danger in time of ice and freshet by the probable depriving of said owners of all water power whatsoever during the building and subsequent repairing of said pier and in many other ways,

and further that in as much as it appears that the sole purpose of erecting such a pier is because it is alleged to be slightly cheaper than to span said raceway with an arch; be it

Resolved, That it is unjust and arbitrary to inflict permanent injury on the water right owners who reap no corresponding benefit in order to lower the contract price to those for whose benefit the said bridge is to be built; and be it further

Resolved, That the said water right owners as represented in this meeting do hereby place the conduct of this matter in the hands of Messrs. Edward Harris and William W. Mumford as their attorneys with instructions to protect by every legal means in the power, including proceedings at law the rights of these water right owners in accordance with the spirit of these resolutions.

AN ACT to amend Chapter 193, of the laws of 1888, entitled "An act to authorize the selection, location and acquiring of certain grounds for public parks and parkways in and near the city of Rochester, and to provide for the maintenance and embellishment thereof."

The people of the state of New York, represented in senate and assembly do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section six of chapter 193, of the laws of 1888, entitled "an act to authorize the selection, location and acquiring of certain grounds for public parks, and parkways in and near the city of Rochester, and to provide for the maintenance and embellishment thereof" is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 6. On the opening of such court on the day designated in the notice mentioned in the next preceding section, or as soon there after as he can be heard, the city attorney of said city or a person designated by him for that purpose on behalf thereof shall, upon a copy of said resolutions certified by the city clerk and upon proof of due publication of said notices apply to said court to appoint such commissioners. Said court shall hear such application and shall appoint three (3) commissioners for the purposes as aforesaid. If any commissioners, so appointed shall die, be disqualified or decline to serve, the said court may, upon application of said city attorney or person designated by him for that purpose upon like notice appoint another in his place. Each of said commissioners, from the park fund herein provided shall be paid

five dollars (\$5) for each day employed as such commissioners. Section 2. Section twenty-four of said act is hereby amended, so as to read as follows.

Sec. 24. No plan for laying out and improvement of the said park, parkways, approaches thereto and streets connecting the same shall be adopted or undertaken by the said Park Commissioners, of which the entire expense of maintenance shall be a greater sum than forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) per annum, in addition to the interest on such sum of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000) hereinbefore provided to be issued in bonds of the city of Rochester, and the one per cent, hereinbefore provided to be annually levied and the income derived from the rents or privileges granted by said Park Commissioners.

Ordered received, filed and published and referred to Charter Amendment Committee.

By Aid. Pauckner—Whereas, There has long existed on Mount Hope avenue, opposite Mount Hope cemetery, what is known as the Brighton cemetery, the grounds of which are in a delapidated condition, the fences have fallen down, the head stones broken and crumbled, and the residents of this portion of the city have for a long time endeavored in vain to remove this unsightly cemetery.

And Whereas, What was known as the Friends cemetery, lying directly east of the Brighton cemetery, has recently been removed, now therefore,

Resolved, That the proposed act accompanying this resolution be referred to the law committee, and the commissioners of Mount Hope, and if approved by them to be by them presented to the honorable senator from the county of Monroe and the member of assembly from the first district in which said cemetery lands are located, for introduction and passage by the legislature, and further,

Resolved, That if said law committee and said commissioners of Mount Hope agree thereto, that a certified copy of said proposed act and of these resolutions be sent to the said senator and member of assembly, and that said senator and the several members of assembly from the county of Monroe, be and they hereby are, requested to use all honorable means to procure the passage of said proposed act, to the end that said cemetery be removed.

Adopted.

By Aid. Pauckner—

An Act to authorize the removal of the remains of all persons interred in the Brighton cemetery, so-called, in the city of Rochester, to Mount Hope cemetery or other cemeteries in said city, and the taking of lands included within the bounds of said Brighton cemetery by the city of Rochester for public school or other purposes, and to defray the expenses thereof.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The city of Rochester is hereby authorized and empowered to take possession of the grounds known and distinguished as the Brighton cemetery so-called in said city, and appropriate the same to the purposes of a public school lot or other purposes, upon complying with the terms and provisions hereinafter set forth.

Sec. 2. Whenever the common council of said city shall by resolution declare it expedient and for the public good, to take the above mentioned lands, for the purposes herein set forth, the mayor of said city shall give notice by ten days' publication in the official papers of said city, of the time when and place where he will, upon such resolution of the common council and his petition, make application to the county court of Monroe county, for the appointment of three commissioners to ap-

praise the damages for taking said lands; also to determine what damages, if any will accrue to owners of lots arising from the cost of the removal of the remains of persons interred therein, and to any person or persons holding any interest direct or contingent in the fee of said cemetery lands; also to superintend such removal.

Sec. 3. Upon the presentation of such petition and resolution, with due proof of publication of notice as hereinbefore provided, the court before which such application shall be made shall hear and determine as to the expediency and propriety of granting such application. If he shall deem the taking of said lands by said city to be for the public good, he shall appoint three reputable freeholders, residents of said county, and not interested in the lands to be taken, who shall inquire into and determine what damage, if any, the several owners of lots in said cemetery lands, also to inquire into and determine what damage, if any, any person or persons owning any interest in the fee, reversion or remainder of any estate in said cemetery lands direct or contingent, will be entitled by reason of the taking of the said lands, and also the damages for or probable cost of removing the remains of persons exhumed, and the monuments, slabs, stones or other marks designating their place of burial; but the damages for taking lands in every case shall be considered and reported apart from that of removal of remains and monuments. Said commissioners shall also award to persons entitled to the same such damages for taking and removal, separately.

Sec. 4. Before proceeding to execute the duties of their office, the said commissioners shall take and subscribe an oath that they will honestly and faithfully discharge the duties of their office according to the best of their ability, which oath shall be filed in the office of the Monroe county clerk. Upon filing such oath of office the said commissioners shall proceed in all respects as required by law in case of commissioners for widening or opening streets in the city of Rochester.

Sec. 5. If, upon the presentation of the report of said commissioners, the county court shall confirm the same, then the said commissioners shall proceed to direct or cause the removal of the remains of all persons buried in said cemetery, and all monuments, slabs, stones, or other marks of burial places, and as the same are removed shall pay to the several owners of lots therein the amount of damages theretofore awarded to such persons, and also to the owner or owners of any interest in the fee of said cemetery lands such sum or sums as shall have been awarded them for damages.

Sec. 6. In case the owners of any lots in said cemetery shall neglect or refuse to remove the remains of persons buried thereon, or in case such owners shall authorize the commissioners to superintend or direct such removal, then said commissioners shall not pay over to such owners the amount by them awarded as damages for, or probable cost of, removal, but shall retain the same to defray their expenses in removing such remains. Said commissioners shall not, however, proceed to remove any such remains, or monuments, until they shall have given five days' notice by publication in all the official papers of said city, of their intention so to proceed.

Sec. 7. In case the owners of any lots in said cemetery cannot, after due diligence, be ascertained or found, the said commissioners shall proceed to remove all remains as in the last section provided, and any balance, after deducting the actual cost of removal from the amount of damages awarded for taking such lot and removing said remains, shall be paid to the city treasurer of said city, who shall deposit the same to the credit of such

fund, as is or may be created for the purpose of caring for and preserving the grounds on which such remains may be re-interred. Such fund shall be deposited in some reliable savings bank in said city, and only the interest thereon accruing, or so much thereof as may be deemed necessary and expedient, shall be annually expended in protecting and caring for said grounds. The provisions of this section are hereby made applicable to section six so far as the same relates to any damages awarded by said commissioners as probable cost of removal.

Sec. 8. All remains removed by said commissioners, as hereinbefore provided, shall be reinterred on such grounds or lots or parts of lots in Mount Hope Cemetery as the commissioners thereof may direct, and shall be separately reinterred, and all monuments, slabs, stones or other marks of their burial place shall be well reset in their proper place so as to preserve the identity of each, and in case there is no present mark distinguishing the person buried, said commissioners shall, at the place of reinterment, put a wooden slab on which shall be marked the number of the lot in the Brighton cemetery from which the body or bodies were exhumed.

Sec. 9. Upon the completion of the work of such removal, said commissioners shall report the same to the Common Council of said city, with a statement of the actual cost thereof, setting forth the amount of damages paid to each person or persons to whom damages were for any reason awarded, and the amount of the balances paid over to the city treasurer, which report shall be filed with the city clerk, whereupon said commissioners shall be discharged and the commissioners of Mount Hope Cemetery shall have the future care and supervision of the grounds where such reinterments have been made.

Sec. 10. For the purpose of paying such damages as may be awarded and such expenses as may be incurred under the provisions of this act; the said Common Council is hereby authorized to defray such damage and expenses by orders drawn on the Contingent fund of said city, not exceeding however the sum of \$1,500. Such orders shall be drawn by the City Clerk, upon the certificate of said commissioners from time to time as they shall certify to be actually necessary in order to defray the expenses thereof.

Sec. 11. In case the said city of Rochester does not require said lands for school or other municipal purposes, the said Common Council may at any time by resolution authorize the sale of the same and the proceeds arising from such sale shall be deposited with the Treasurer of said city of Rochester to the credit of the Contingent fund.

Sec. 12. This act shall take effect immediately.

In the matter of the claim of Frank X. H. Erbland for damages caused by sewage pollution of Densmore creek, running through his premises, we find that two judgments have been recovered against the city, in the last of which said Erbland recovered damages at the rate of \$200 per annum. An offer has been made by him to settle said claim at the rate of \$150 per year, and we recommend that the same be settled at that rate per annum, from the 14th day of May, 1889.

In the matter of the claim of H. M. Goodhue for damages caused by the stopping up of the sewer in the Loring building, at the corner of State and Platt street, we are advised by the City Attorney that there is no liability incurred by the city by reason of the same, and, therefore, recommend that said claim be denied.

In the matter of the claim of Sebastian Zwerger for damages caused by sewage pollution of Densmore creek, running through his premises, we recommend that the same be denied.

In the matter of the communication of L. L. Ruck, the engineer on Driving Park avenue bridge, we find that the actual expense, as certified by said engineer, over the estimate is \$109.35, and that in regard to the claim for the hand railing referred to by said engineer, we find that the understanding of the contractors with the city officials was that the hand rails should be included in the iron of said bridge, and be charged for under that item of work. This was omitted by the engineer in his estimate. We find that the total amount for said hand railing is the sum of \$1,499.46, which with the total amount over the estimate, \$109.35, makes a total of \$1,608.81, to which the contractor is equitably entitled over the estimate in the ordinance, and we, therefore, recommend that the same be paid to him out of the Contingent Fund.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester :

Gentlemen:—I deem it to be my duty to call your attention to the improvement of Plymouth avenue, recently completed, from Spring street to the bridge over the Western New York & Pennsylvania railroad.

The Final Ordinance No. 4,562, under which the work was done, was passed on December 15, 1891 and provided for the improvement of Plymouth park as well as Plymouth avenue, and the assessment was directed to be made upon one tier of lots upon each side of Plymouth avenue, from Spring street to the Western New York & Pennsylvania Railroad, leaving out the lots fronting upon the east and west sides of Plymouth square.

We find the record to be that Plymouth avenue extends in a direct line through the oval shaped park known as Plymouth park, and that it is only few rods wide, and that the lots pointing upon the east and west sides of Plymouth square do not front upon Plymouth avenue, and consequently cannot be assessed under the existing ordinance.

This is evidently not what was intended by the ordinance, and would be unjust to the other abutters upon Plymouth avenue or the city at large.

It would seem proper to have the matter considered by a Committee of your Honorable Body.

estimate of the expense thereof, the sum of \$11,600, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved, and the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon the following portion and part of the City which the Council deems proper to be so assessed for, and will be benefited by and derive an advantage from such improvement, to wit:

Alderman Adams:

Dear Sir:—In relation to Merriman street between Culver park and University avenue.

When the improvement was begun there was no sidewalk in front of lot of J. B. Bloss, and a plank walk in front of lots of I. M. Rowley, and plank walk in front of school house lot on west side of street.

The walk on west side of street was in general .49-.39-.59-.65-.02-.37 above the center of street as it then existed, while the walk on the east side of street was .49-.60-.77-.85-.120— below the center of the street as then existed.

It was deemed good policy to level up the street, as it was better to have it level across where possible, but in order to conform to existing conditions, without having the street tipped up too much sidewise, the curb on the east side at Culver park, was laid .24 below the curb on the west side opposite.

While the profile made by Horace Jones proposes to lower the curb at that point .45 below where it now is which would make it .18 below the sidewalk as it existed at that point before the improvement, and 1.16 below the sidewalk on the west side opposite as it existed before the improvement.

The new sidewalk on the east side is above the present curb, as follows: .29-.41-.42-.41-.38-.43-.47-.42-.49. The width between curb and sidewalk being 12 feet and the ordinary practice being to give sidewalks a slope of 3-8 inch per foot, the walk should be 3-8x12 equal 36-8 equal 41-2 inches equal .38.

The profile of Jones, proposes to make this sidewalk above the proposed curb as follows: .36-.36-.36-.47-.36-.36-.36-.36. In my opinion the street would not be improved by the change suggested.

To the Executive Board of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned residents and property owners of the city of Rochester appreciate fully the great importance to the health of the people of Rochester and to the business interests of such people, of obtaining at the earliest possible moment a supply of pure water for domestic use. We long since recognized the fact that the people of this city were not willing to take the temporary supply of water from the Genesee river. We therefore determined to ascertain whether a supply of pure water could not be obtained from other source. We have for some months been engaged in investigating this question. We have employed experts and made tests in various localities, and the result has been that we have discovered a supply of pure and wholesome water which we believe to be sufficient in amount for the use of the people of this city until such time as the new conduit shall be ready for use. We have incurred large expenses in this investigation, and we are prepared to enter into a contract with the city to supply one million of gallons a day, or more, of this water, commencing the delivery of the same in the Mt. Hope reservoir not later than May 1, 1893.

We have sunk artesian wells upon a tract of land acquired by us about a mile south of Mt. Hope reservoir, and our proposition is to install a pumping station at the location of such wells, and to construct therefrom a pipe line across lands acquired by us to the said reservoir and to pump the water required by the city into such reservoir as above stated. The expense of the installation of this plant will of course be heavy. We do not expect that the city would require water from this source for more than two years, as by that time, at the latest, the new conduit should be completed. The city charges for metered water sold to consumers fourteen cents per thousand gallons. We feel that if our proposition be accepted a sufficient amount should be paid by the city to not only compensate us

for the expense which we have paid and must incur, but that a reasonable profit should be received by us on account of the risk taken and the investment made.

We propose to deliver to the city into its reservoir at Mt. Hope one million gallons a day or upwards of the water mentioned for two years or longer if the city shall require it at ten cents per thousand gallons. The city to be to no expense whatever, and to take no risk.

The water referred to has been analyzed by Professor Latimore, and his analysis is hereto annexed.

Gentlemen: Your Law Committee begs leave to submit the following as its report:

In the matter of the claim of Urban Nabor for sewer damages, caused by the pollution of Hobbie creek, running through his lands and premises, we find that an action was begun on the 3rd day of August, 1891, for the damages for the six years then last past, which action is now on the calendar of the Circuit Court, and has been postponed for the purpose of a settlement thereof. We have carefully examined into the facts of the case, and we are of the opinion that the sum of one hundred and twenty-five dollars per year is a fair settlement of the damages sustained by said Nabor, and we, therefore, recommend that he be paid said sum of \$125.00 per year, from August 3, 1885.

In the matter of the petition of Peter W. Amy, for a rebate of a fine of fifty dollars, imposed by the Police Justice of this city, upon a judgment which was thereafter reversed by the Monroe County Court, we find that the facts set forth in the petition are, substantially true, and, upon the advice of the City Attorney, we recommend that said sum be repaid to said Peter W. Amy, and the same be charged to the Police Fund, there being no defense to an action for the recovery of said fine, after the reversal of the judgment.

In the matter of the claim of Martin P. Brasser for sewer damages, caused by the pollution of Hobbie creek, running through his premises, we find that the property owned by Mr. Brasser is situated on said Hobbie creek, and that the same is polluted by the sewers of the city of Rochester, and, after a careful examination, we have recommended a settlement of said claim from the 15th day of February, 1890, at the rate of fifty dollars per year, and we recommend that said claim be settled at that rate.

In the matter of the claim of Marenus Estbrook for damages caused by sewage pollution of Thomas creek, running through his premises, we find that said Estbrook is the owner of four houses situated on said Thomas creek, and that he has suffered damages by reason of the pollution of said creek in all of the houses located on said creek. We have been enabled to secure a settlement in full of all past and future damages as to said property for the sum of nine hundred dollars, and we, there-

fore, recommend that said Estbrook be paid said sum, in full settlement of all damages to his property.

In the matter of the communication of the City Surveyor, referred to this committee, concerning the building of several outlet sewers to connect with the East Side Trunk Sewer, we find that the East Side Trunk Sewer is about completed to the point where the North Avenue Outlet Sewer is to connect with the same, and we recommend that the City Surveyor be instructed to prepare an ordinance for the construction of a sewer in North avenue, to begin in the vicinity of Jennings street, to connect with and run to, Norton street, at which place the same is to connect with the East Side Trunk Sewer.

In the matter of the same communication of the City Surveyor, referred to this Committee, we find that the East Side Trunk Sewer is about completed in the vicinity of North Goodman street, and we recommend that the City Surveyor be instructed to prepare an ordinance for the construction of an outlet sewer on North Goodman street, to extend from its present terminus in Seneca street, between Hebard avenue and Cummings street; through Seneca street, easterly to Morton street; thence northerly, through Morton street, to Clifford street; thence easterly, taking in Clifford street outlet, to the East Side Trunk Sewer.

In the matter of the applications for appointment as Commissioners of Deeds, we recommend that the applications of the following named persons be granted:

Gentlemen:—On January 19, 1893, a judgment on appeal in the Court of Appeals was entered against the city in the case of Theresa Wannamaker, as administratrix, against The City of Rochester. This is a case in which the plaintiff recovered a verdict against the city for five thousand dollars, at the June Circuit of 1891, and in which an appeal has been taken to the General Term and Court of Appeals. The judgment entered on June 12, 1891, is for \$5,402.75, and the judgment for costs in the General Term was entered January 27, 1892, for \$92.50, and on January 19, 1893, for costs in the Court of Appeals, \$107.80.

The judgment of the Court of Appeals is final, and the city is indebted in this action to the sum above named.

On the 6th day of January, 1893, a judgment was also recovered against the city for \$631.65, damages and costs, for sewage pollution, in the case of Sopherine Case against the city, in which action no questions of law arise that would warrant an appeal to a higher court.

A similar judgment was also rendered in the case of William A. Lyon against the city for \$312.52, damages and costs, on the 23d day of January, 1893.

I would, therefore, recommend that these matters be referred to the Law Committee, to report to this Council at its earliest convenience. Respectfully submitted,

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—We present herewith for your commendation a proposed amendment to the charter of this city relating to the Department of Health, and that you may not mistake the attitude of the medical profession. We beg leave to briefly present the salient features of the proposed amendment, together with the reasons which in the opinion of the physicians of the city justify such proposed changes in the administration of the Sanitary Department.

It has been known for a long time, to the Board of Health at least, that the efficiency of the Department of Health has not met the reasonable expectations of the medical profession. The cause of this failure is not to be found in the character of the Board which for the past year certainly has included among its members the most distinguished physicians of the city, together with others equally eminent for special learning and business capacity. The inefficiency of the department has been due rather to the legacy of crude ideas which obtained at the time of its formation and early conduct, as to the organization and character of its service. The old and popular idea of a health board is that of a body organized to abate nuisances and to provide against small pox or other equally dread and rare diseases.

The modern idea and that contemplated by the statute is that of municipal protection to the community from all local conditions which may expose the individual to disease of any kind, as well as infections and pestilential disease. During the past few years the knowledge of the causes and course of infectious disease has increased, so that practical application may be made of this knowledge to materially reduce the possibilities of epidemic disease, and thus increase the possibility of life, not to speak of the comfort, convenience and happiness of the community. The successful conduct therefore of the Department of Health requires an intelligent and skillful service. It also requires the application of accepted business principles, viz: One responsible head to the department with authority to maintain a satisfactory standard of efficiency, also knowledge and experience in the employes.

In illustration of the necessity for an efficient Health Department we call your attention to the fact that in the year 1892, 663 deaths, or one in every thirteen hours, occurred in this city from infectious or contagious disease alone, a large percentage of which is preventable. This means untold expense and suffering, for only a fractional portion of such cases die. Human life is of not less value than property, yet to protect property, intelligent and trained service is regarded as necessary and no one questions the wisdom of adequate expenditure to perfect the service of, for example, the Fire or Police Department.

In order to increase the efficiency of the Department of Health, the medical profession, regardless of school, have agreed with signifi-

cant unanimity upon certain essential principles:

First. That the Board of Health should be chiefly a legislative and judicial body.

Second. That the executive work of the Department shall be placed under the management of a competent physician of large experience and especial fitness, who shall devote his time and energy to the most perfect realization of the possibilities of the health service. To this end he should have power to appoint and remove the working force of the department and to make declarations, subject to the approval of the Board of Health, of nuisances.

Third. That the city should be divided into districts; and a competent physician, familiar with the city, shall be Health Physician for each district. The proposed amendment, which we ask you to unite with the medical profession in commending to the legislature, is based upon these principles. Upon our present charter, the most capable and intelligent body of men can neither establish nor maintain an effective administration. And in order that the city may be saved the expense of another class of officials, it seems feasible that the proposed health physicians shall do the work of both the hitherto Health Inspectors and City Physicians.

This system of service proposed for our city is not experimental. It has been put to the test and proved most efficient and satisfactory in Buffalo, which is conceded to have the best health service of any city in the state. In view of the fact that our legislature will soon complete its work and the necessity for an effective department to meet the threatened pestilence of the coming summer, we urge prompt as well as careful consideration of the necessities of the public health. Of the suggestions contained in the accompanying papers, and of the copies of extracts of the last message of the Mayor of Buffalo, and a letter from the Health Officer of that city relative to the Health Department, under its revised charter.

AN ACT to further amend chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act to further amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one entitled 'An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the City of Rochester,' and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of said city," and the several acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section forty of chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act to further amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled 'An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the City of Rochester, and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of the City of Rochester,'" as amended by chapter five hundred and sixty-one of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof.

33. The Common Council shall have power to pass all such ordinances as they shall think proper and necessary, to preserve the Genesee river, and all canals, slips and basins in the city; to prevent and punish the casting or depositing therein, or on the banks thereof, any earth, ashes or other heavy substances, filth, logs or floating matter; to prevent and remove all obstructions and accumulations of filth or rubbish therein, and to punish the authors thereof, regulate and prescribe the mode and speed of coming to and departing from the wharves and streets of the city, by steamboats, canal boats and other crafts and vessels, and the disposition of the sails, yards, anchors, and appurtenances thereof, while entering, leaving or abiding in the said city, and to regulate and prescribe by such ordinance, or through

their officers, such a location of every canal boat, steamboat or other craft or vessel, or float, and such changes of station in and use of the same, as may be proper, in order to promote order therein, and the safety and equal convenience, as near as may be, of all such boats, vessels, crafts and floats, and may impose penalties, not exceeding one hundred dollars, for any offense against any such ordinance, and may, by such ordinance, charge any such penalty upon the steamboat, canal boat, or other vessel, craft or float, the captain, master, owner, consignee or person in charge of which is thereby liable therefor. Nothing in this section contained shall be construed to authorize the Common Council, or any of its officers to interfere with any of the laws of this state, now or hereafter to be enacted, or with the acts and regulations of the canal board, in relation to the Erie canal, or any other canal being the property of the State of New York.

Sec. 2. Title Eleven of said chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

TITLE XI.

THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

Sec. 268. The Board of Health of said city, authorized under chapter 270 of the Laws of 1885, shall consist of six persons besides the Mayor, of whom at least three shall be qualified physicians of at least five years' practice. The members of the Board shall be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the Common Council; two of such persons shall be appointed for the term of one year, two for two years, and two for three years. At the expiration of each of said terms, the Mayor shall appoint two persons for the term of three years. In case of a vacancy in said Board, the appointment shall be for the balance of the unexpired term. The Mayor of the city shall be ex officio a member of said Board.

Sec. 269. The Board of Health shall have power to take such measures as they shall deem effectual to prevent the entrance of any pestilential or dangerous infectious disease into the city; to stop, detain and examine, for that purpose, every person coming from any place infected, or believed to be infected, with such a disease; to establish, maintain and regulate a pest house or hospital at some place within the city, or not exceeding three miles beyond its bounds; to cause any person who shall be, or be suspected of being infected with any such disease, to be quarantined; to cause any person infected with any such disease, to be removed to such pest-house or hospital, if the Health Officer and two other physicians of the city shall certify that the removal of such resident is necessary for the preservation of the public health, and that such removal will not jeopardize the life of such infected person; to remove from the city, or destroy any furniture, wearing apparel, or goods, wares or merchandise, or other articles of property of any kind, which shall be suspected of being tainted or infected with any pestilence, or which shall be likely to pass into such a state as to generate or propagate disease; to direct the location of all slaughter-houses, tallow chandler shops, soap factories, tanneries, stables, privies, hog pens, or other offensive or unwholesome houses or places, and the location, size and kind of all receptacles for the keeping of every kind, and to compel the owner or occupant of any of the houses, buildings or places aforesaid to cleanse, remove or abate the same whenever it deems necessary for the health of the inhabitants of said city; to prevent the sale or exposure for sale of unwholesome, diseased, impure or adulterated meats, vegetables, fruit, fish, poultry, milk and food and provisions of all kinds; to prohibit any person from bringing or de-

positing, within the limits of said city, and dead carcass or any other unwholesome or offensive substance, or any putrid meats, fish, hides or skins of any kind, by any person who shall have the same on his premises, and on his default, to authorize the removal or destruction thereof by some officer of the city; to license and regulate funeral directors and undertakers; to provide for the care, removal and burial of the dead, the registration of births, marriages and deaths; to make such rules and regulations for the registration of plumbers and for drainage in said city as such Board shall deem proper; to pass and enact such by-laws and ordinances as they shall from time to time deem necessary and proper for the filling up, draining, cleansing, cleaning and regulating any buildings, grounds, yards, basins, slips or cellars within the said city, that shall be sunken, damp, foul, incumbered with filth and rubbish, or unwholesome, and for filling or altering, mending and abating all sinks, privies and wells, the water of which may be unwholesome, within the city, and for directing the mode of constructing them in the future; to abate and remove all nuisances of every description which are or may be injurious to the public health, in any way and in any manner they may deem expedient; to do from time to time, all acts, make all regulations and pass all ordinances which they shall deem necessary or expedient for the preservation of health and the suppression of disease in the city, and to carry into effect and execute the powers hereby granted; and to cause all such work as may be necessary for the purpose aforesaid, and for the preservation of the public health and cleanliness of the city, to be executed and done at the expense of the city corporation on account of the persons, respectively, upon whom the same may be assessed; and for that purpose, to cause the expenses thereof to be estimated, assessed and collected, and the lands charged therewith, to be sold in case of non-payment, in the same manner as is provided by law with respect to other public improvements within said city; and in all cases where the said by-laws or ordinances shall require anything to be done in respect to the property of several persons, the expenses thereof may be included in one assessment, and the several houses and lots, in respect to which such expense shall have been incurred shall be briefly described in the manner required by law in the assessment roll for the general expenses of the city, and the sum of money assessed to each owner or occupant of any such house or lot shall be the amount of money expended in making such improvements upon such premises, together with a ratable proportion of the expenses of assessing and collecting the moneys expended in making such improvements.

Section 270. The Board of Health shall have power, from time to time, to appoint and remove at pleasure, a clerk, whose duty it shall be to attend the meetings of said board, and keep a record of its proceedings, and such record, or a duly certified copy of the same, or any part thereof, shall be prima facie evidence of the facts therein contained in any court, or before any officer.

Section 271. The Board of Health shall be an advisory board as to the proper ventilation and drainage of public city buildings, and in case any public school or other public city building is in process of erection, without proper facilities for ventilation and drainage in the opinion of such board, it shall have power to stop the erection of such buildings, to direct proper facilities for ventilation and drainage to be furnished, and to restrain further work until such facilities are furnished.

Section 272. The Board of Health shall appoint a health officer, and may remove him at any time. Such officer must be not less

than thirty years of age, a qualified physician of at least five years' practice in said city, he shall devote his entire time to the duties of his office, and his powers and duties shall be as follows:

1. He shall have charge and control of the executive work of the department of health; he shall have full power to enforce and carry out and it shall be his duty to enforce and carry out all ordinances, rules and regulations, which have been, or which may be hereafter adopted by the Board of Health; in case any business or practice is dangerous or detrimental to the public health or any building, grounds, yard, basin, slip, cellar or other place is unwholesome or injurious to health, he shall have power to declare the same to be a nuisance and upon such declaration he shall have power to abate and remove the same in such manner as he may deem expedient, the expense thereof to be assessed as provided in section 269 of this title; but no business or rights to property of any person shall be interfered with or prohibited until such person shall have been duly summoned by a notice of not less than one day, to appear before said health officer to show cause why such declaration shall not be made, nor until the said person or persons interested in the premises shall have opportunity to be heard in person or by counsel. The said party or parties or the persons interested in the said premises may appeal to the Board of Health from the said declaration or order of prohibition by giving immediate notice of such appeal to the health officer. Upon receiving notice of such appeal, the health officer shall cause the Board of Health to assemble, and said Board of Health shall determine whether or not the said declaration or order of prohibition shall be maintained.

2. He shall, as soon as may be, after entering upon the duties of his office, divide the city into seven districts to be known as health districts, and shall file with the clerk of the Board of Health a written designation of such districts with a description of the same sufficient for identification, and may from time to time alter the said health districts by filing with the clerk of the Board of Health a written designation of such alterations.

3. He shall, from time to time, appoint for each of said districts a health physician who shall be a duly qualified physician of at least two years' practice in said city, and shall also in addition thereto from time to time appoint two female health physicians of like qualifications for the city at large; such health physician shall hold office during the pleasure of the health officer and shall perform such duties, and make such investigations and reports as to any matters affecting the public health in his district as shall be required by the health officer or the Board of Health. In addition to such duties each health physician shall perform such other professional duties in any part of said city as shall be required by the health officer. It shall also be the duty of such health physicians to render medical service to indigent sick persons under the direction of the overseer of the poor, and shall prescribe therefor upon blanks to be furnished by the overseer of the poor.

4. He shall have power to appoint from time to time and pleasure remove, a registrar of vital statistics, an inspector of plumbing and drainage, who must be a qualified and practical plumber or sanitary engineer, an inspector of food supplies, a keeper of Hope hospital, a keeper of each other hospital which may at any time be erected under the direction of the Board of Health, and such other officers and employes as may be authorized by the Board of Health for the purpose of carrying into practical effect the rules,

regulations and ordinances of said Board of Health.

5. He is authorized in his name of office to maintain an action to restrain the threatened performance of any act contrary to the rules, regulations and ordinance of the Board of Health which shall, after due notice, as in this title prescribed, have been declared a nuisance and forbidden by the health officer; for the purpose of obtaining a temporary injunction in such action, no bond shall be required; and in such action costs shall not be awarded against the health officer, but where they are awarded to the defendant they must be awarded against the city of Rochester.

6. He shall have power, by an order in writing for that purpose, to be served on the master, captain, or person in charge of any canal boat, steamboat, or other vessel or craft, or any owner or consignee thereof, if such boat, craft or vessel be by him known or suspected to have on board any infected or diseased person or property, to require such boat or vessel not to enter the city, or to remove to some certain distance not exceeding three miles from the city; and every such master, captain, person in charge, consignee or owner, who shall be served with such order shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable with fine or imprisonment, or both, if such a boat, vessel or craft shall enter the city, in violation of such order, or shall not be removed according to the tenor of such order, within a reasonable time, not exceeding three hours after service of such notice.

Section 273. The Board of Health shall determine the salaries, to be paid out of the health fund, of the clerk of the board, the health officer, the registrar of vital statistics, the inspector of plumbing and drainage, the inspector of food supplies, the keeper of Hope hospital, and such other officer and employes as may be connected with the department of health.

Section 274. The Board of Health shall not have power to make any expenditure, or to contract any debt or liability in any year beyond the amount raised and appropriated for the Board of Health of that year. But in the presence of great and imminent peril to the public health of the city, by reason of impending pestilence, it shall be the duty of the health officer to take such measures and do, order and cause to be done such acts and make such expenditures (beyond those duly estimated for as herein provided) for the preservation of the public health from such impending pestilence as he may, in good faith, deem the public safety and health to demand; and the Board of Health shall approve; and such peril shall not be deemed to exist except when and for such period as the Board of Health shall by proclamation declare.

Section 275. The health officer, health physicians, and inspectors of the department of health shall have the same power as is conferred upon the police force of this city, for the purpose of investigating any suspected violation of any provision of this title, or of the ordinances, rules and regulations adopted under the powers adopted by it; the said health officer, health physicians and inspectors in the performance of their duties may enter upon any premises or into any building or house, during reasonable hours, and no person shall molest or resist any officer of the department of health, or their assistants, in the discharge of their duties and it shall be the duty of the police department, when requested by the health officer, to detail one or more policemen to protect the officers and employes of the department of health in the discharge of their duties.

Section 276. The captain, master or person in charge of any canal boat, steamboat, or other craft or vessel, which shall enter the city, having on board thereof any person

sick of malignant fever, or other pestilential or infectious disease, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine or imprisonment, unless the person so diseased become so on the way and could not be left. It shall be the duty of such captain, master or person in charge, within two hours after his arrival, to report, in writing, to the health officer, or one of the health physicians the fact of such sick person's being on board, and the name, description and location of his craft; and he shall not permit such sick person to land or be landed, until the health officer shall give permission for that purpose; and any neglect or violation of these provisions, or of any or either of them, shall be a misdemeanor punishable with fine, or imprisonment, or both.

Section 277. The owner, driver, conductor or person in charge of any stage, railroad car, or other public conveyance, which shall enter the city, having on board any person sick of malignant fever, or pestilential or infectious disease, shall within two hours after the arrival of such sick person, report in writing the fact, with the name of such person, and the house or place where he was put down in the city, to the health officer or one of the health physicians; and any and every neglect to comply with these provisions, or any of them, shall be a misdemeanor, punishable with fine or imprisonment, or both.

Section 278. Any person who shall, knowingly, bring or procure or cause to be brought into the city, any property of any kind, tainted or infected with any malignant fever, or pestilential or infectious disease, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by fine or imprisonment, or both.

Section 279. Any person violating any of the provisions of this title or any of the ordinances, rules and regulations adopted under the powers granted by it, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor of which the police court of the city of Rochester shall have in the first instance exclusive jurisdiction to hear and determine and all fines imposed under this title shall belong to the city, and when collected shall be paid into the city treasury, and be devoted to the maintenance and support of the pest-house, or of any hospital that may hereafter be established by the Board of Health.

Section 280. The provisions of the act entitled "An act for the preservation of public health and the registration of vital statistics," passed May twelfth, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, and the acts amendatory thereof not in conflict with this charter, shall be applicable to the Board of Health of the city of Rochester.

Section 3. Section nine of said chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty as amended by chapter five hundred sixty-one of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety is hereby repealed.

Section 4. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Special Committee on an additional temporary supply of water, submit herewith a communication from the Special Committee of the Board of Health, appointed to consider the advisability of using the

water from wells known as the "Brighton Wells" from a sanitary point of view. The communication is accompanied by the analysis of Professor S. A. Lattimore made under the direction of the Board of Health. Your committee did not deem it advisable to take any steps toward procuring the additional supply of water from that source, until after the Board of Health had presented its conclusions. The accompanying communication was received at a late hour this afternoon, and has been considered by your committee. The limited amount of time since the receipt of the communication has rendered it impossible for your committee to prepare a final report upon the subject. Your committee respectfully requests that it be authorized to negotiate with the company owning those wells, with a view to procuring as favorable terms as may be possible for the purchase of the water which it has for sale, and if such authority be granted, your committee will endeavor to be prepared with a final report upon the subject at the next regular meeting of this council. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Alderman Merton E. Lewis, Chairman Special Water Supply Committee of Common Council, Rochester, N. Y.:

Sir:—Complying with your request the Board of Health has examined the artesian wells in the Town of Brighton as a possible source of a temporary additional water supply for this city. The Board has also caused a chemical analysis of a sample of the water to be made by Professor S. A. Lattimore, the result of which as embodied in his report, you will find herewith inclosed.

As the result of personal examination of the wells and their immediate surroundings by several of its members this Board states its belief that the water in said wells is not now and present conditions remaining, cannot possibly become contaminated by sewage from the county buildings. The stream that carries the sewage from these buildings is at least two thousand feet from the wells, eastward, and the surface dip from the wells to this sewage stream is about seven feet. The soil in the immediate neighborhood of the wells is almost impervious, consisting as it does of heavy clay and the surface water is shut off from the wells by a pipe driven down to the rock and by a plug placed about the casing in the rock itself. Further, the porous rock in which the water is found is covered by at least twenty-five feet of dense limestone. The water as it comes from the wells is clear, cold and sparkling, with a slight odor and taste of sulphuretted hydrogen that quickly disappears on exposure to the air.

A consideration of the foregoing facts, together with the results of the chemical analysis made by Prof. Lattimore, lead this Board unhesitatingly to recommend the water in question as good potable water, perfectly safe, just as it comes from the wells, for domestic use.

As to the quantity of water that can be furnished by these wells, or as to the permanency of the supply, this Board offers no opinion.

Believing that the best interests of the city demand a temporary additional supply of pure, wholesome water, this Board urgently advises that prompt action be taken by the proper authorities to furnish such supply.

Dear Sir:—At your request on the 18th inst. I visited the artesian well in the town of Brighton, about three-quarters of a mile south of Mount Hope reservoir, and took a sample of the water, which I have analyzed with the following results. The figures express the number of grains of each substance contained in one gallon of water.

This water as it flows from the wells possesses a perceptible odor of hydrogen sulphide gas. This odor however vanishes as soon as the water comes in contact with the air. This was demonstrated by allowing it to flow directly into a bottle containing a reagent highly sensitive to sulphur compounds, but not the slightest discoloration was produced. Neither did any trace of this gas exist in the water when brought to the laboratory.

This water belongs to the class technically known as hard waters, as it contains a considerable quantity of mineral substances in solution, mainly calcium carbonate and sulphate, with a little magnesium carbonate. These substances are common, in varying quantities, to all springs and wells of this region and are derived from the underlying lime-stone strata through which the water percolates.

The total absence of ammonia, nitrates, and nitrites shows that this water is entirely free from organic matter and is therefore uncontaminated by surface water or drainage.

Resolved, That a copy of said ordinance with this resolution, together with a copy of the map showing thereon the rights, tracts, parcels of land and right of way which are deemed necessary to be taken and the commencement, course and termination of said proposed sewer to be laid out through said property be filed in the office of the city clerk and of the county clerk of Monroe county, according to the provisions of section 174, of the city charter, and that the city attorney be and he hereby is instructed to take and institute such proceedings from time to time as may be necessary to secure such lands and rights of way as is provided by the city charter.

Gentlemen:—On January 10th, 1893, and February 7th, 1893, there were confirmed by your honorable body rolls for Genesee street outlet sewer Ord. 3,814, and Caroline street sewer Ord. 4,356, respectively. The former for \$42,870.55 and the latter for \$976.55. By reference to pages 429 and 430, Common Council proceedings of 1889-90, I find awards to the amount of \$730 were made. Of this amount \$125 (the amount awarded to John Drew) was paid him March 12th, 1891. According to a resolution passed July 15th, 1890, the City Treasurer was directed to deposit in the Rochester Savings Bank the amount to the credit of the several persons to whom said awards were made upon the certificate of the city attorney.

The first certificate we have received of such awards was presented at this office February 25th, 1893, by Mrs. Henrietta Witzel for \$146 which led to the discovery that none of the money awarded has been charged to the account.

If a new roll has to be made for this ordinance it will be three of four months before we can commence collections on it as the required time for hearing allegations, (10 days), the time it will take to figure up and make a new roll, binding, etc. in the Assessors' office, having new bills ordered from this office and rewriting same will undoubtedly take some time to say nothing of the additional expense to incur, and losing the use of the money for so long a time and when it is so much needed. To the original cost of the roll 12 per cent. interest was added to make a three payment roll of it. The added interest is deducted according to the date of payment of assessment, the discount decreasing at the rate of 1-2 per cent. a month.

Would it not be as satisfactory all around to make good the \$605 left out of the original cost by decreasing the discount proportionately.

In the case of Caroline street sewer Ord. 4,356 two awards were made, \$75 to Henry Almeroth and \$150 to August Pappert for taking of lands, etc. The former amount was paid and figured to the cost of work. Nothing has ever been done with the \$150. I would therefore recommend that the roll be reconsidered

and assessors be instructed to make a roll on the correct total cost.

Your immediate action on these matters will save considerable work.

Commissioner Reynolds submitted the following:
 Resolved, That the Common Council be requested to ask our representatives in the state legislature to favor the passage of an act amending subdivision six of section 129 of the city charter, increasing the limit which may be granted by them to \$25,000 to the repair fund annually. The reasons for such a change were set forth in a communication from this board to the Common Council January 4, 1892.

AN ACT to amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of 1861, entitled "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the city of Rochester" as amended by chapter 190 of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-two.
 The people of the state of New York represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision six of section one hundred and twenty-nine, of chapter 143, of the laws of 1861, as amended by section ten, of chapter 190, of the laws of 1892, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

6. The amount to be raised for teachers' wages and contingent expenses in any one year shall not be less than six dollars nor more than eighteen dollars per capita, based on the average number of resident pupils enrolled in the several public schools of said city, for the school year ending on the first day of May next preceding the levying of the general city taxes in each and every year. A sworn statement of such number of pupils so enrolled shall be made by the superintendent of schools according to the verified monthly reports of the principals of said schools. Nor shall the amount to be raised in any one year to lease, alter, improve and repair school houses and their outhouses and appurtenances, exceed twenty-five thousand dollars, or to purchase and improve sites and build or enlarge school houses exceed fifty thousand dollars, or for library purposes exceed three thousand dollars; and the Common Council of said city are authorized and directed, when necessary, to raise by loan, in anticipation of the taxes, the amount to be raised, collected and levied as aforesaid.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Com. Reynolds, chairman of the repair committee, submitted the following report of the To the Board of Education :

repair committee.
 Gentlemen:—Your committee desires at this time to call your attention to the necessity of a larger appropriation annually for the purpose of repairing your school houses, buildings, appurtenances and their fixtures. As you know after the limit to this fund of \$15,000 is fixed by the Common Council each year, no other resources are available to keep in repairs all your school buildings. The remedy must come by an amendment to the city charter, permitting more than that sum to be appropriated annually for those purposes; and we thus call early attention to the subject, that appropriate legislation may be taken in time. We have no doubt the Council will sanction this change if convinced of its necessity. The limited amount was fixed many years ago when you had many less buildings to repair than now, and at a time when most of our schools were comparatively new, and needed much less outlays than at present. To all persons at all familiar with the present condition of the public schools, it requires no argument to show that the present amount is entirely insufficient. For several years the resources of this committee have been severely taxed, and the \$15,000 entirely exhausted in repairs long before the expiration of the fiscal year. Indeed, many old bills contracted by former committees must, under

the present arrangement, be paid by succeeding boards. That, of course, only cripples the succeeding year's fund. We have been careful to reserve a large proportion of the fund to meet unexpected repairs and outlays which will occur in spite of the most careful foresight. When closets are deranged, and the health authorities insist on proper sanitary precautions, or when roofs leak and floors utterly give out, then some expenses must be incurred whether there are funds available or not. You have the care and custody of thirty-four school buildings, many of them built twenty and thirty years ago with more than four hundred rooms. And if you are to keep these in respectable shape, you must have more money to do it with. Some years the necessary enlargement of buildings to accommodate increase of pupils will almost exhaust the year's entire appropriation.

All the blackboarding, plumbing, ventilating, painting, whitewashing, roofing and repairing expenses, and the rental of annexes, should be met by the repair fund.

It is utterly impossible to do all this and keep some of your buildings tenable and clean as the patrons insist shall be done. The amount available this year for these purposes has been entirely inadequate; and this condition of affairs is growing worse every year. Several buildings are now suffering from lack of necessary painting, both inside and out; and it is ruinous economy to let them go without it. The walks in front of other school lots are in very bad condition, and notwithstanding notices have been served by the Executive Board upon us to make necessary repairs, we have been unable to comply.

The amount of lumber required each year for the school carpenter's necessary repairing is chargeable to this committee's fund, and yet we are unable to equip some new buildings with storm houses to protect from the severe storms and weather. That officer's disbursements and expenses for help and cartage necessarily required are a tax on the overburdened fund. The necessary repair of old school desks and furniture involves quite an outlay, and yet economy requires it.

Two of our public school cellars are not drained and their damp and unwholesome condition is a disgrace to our school system. But we are powerless to do these things and yet keep within the charter requirements.

The sum of \$10,000 could be well invested in ventilating some of the old buildings, which require it. These are public, well-known facts. The buildings are open to public inspection, and any citizen interested can easily verify these statements. Of course the buildings erected during the past few years are well ventilated; and, generally, are well equipped, but that does not relieve the unfortunate condition which to-day prevails in districts 7, 9, 12, 17, 21, 22, 23, 25 and 27. We invite public inspection of this matter.

We, therefore, recommend the adoption of the following:

Resolved, That the Common Council request our representatives at Albany to urge the passage of an amendment to subdivision six of section 129 of the present city charter as amended in 1888, so that the same will read as follows:

Section 129, subdivision 6. The amount to be raised for teachers' wages and contingent expenses in any one year shall not be less than six dollars nor more than eighteen dollars per capita, based on the average number of resident pupils enrolled in the several public schools of the city, for the school year ending on the first day of May next preceding the levying of the general city taxes in each and every year. A sworn statement of such number of pupils so enrolled shall be made by the superintendent of schools according to the

verified monthly reports of the principals of said schools. Nor shall the amount to be raised in one year to lease, alter, improve and repair school houses and their outhouses and appurtenances, exceed twenty-five thousand dollars. Nor shall the amount to be raised in any one year to purchase and improve sites, and build or enlarge school houses, exceed fifty thousand dollars; and the Common Council of said city are authorized and directed, when necessary, to raise by loan, in anticipation of the taxes, the amount to be raised, collected and levied as aforesaid."

The passage of this enabling act would not, necessarily, oblige the council to give us the full amount. We think they would do so whenever convinced that it was necessary.

LAWTON STREET IMPROVEMENT.

By Ald. Pauckner—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of improving Lawton street.

Adopted.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$1,700.

By Ald. Pauckner—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, viz:

The improvement of Lawton street from the east end thereof to Meigs street, by the construction of a gravel roadway therein, with a line of Medina stone curb and gutter on each side thereof, properly connected with all lateral streets, alleys and driveways. Width of roadway to be from 12 to 14 feet between curbs. Also the construction of a Portland cement walk on each side of the street between the limits mentioned, except on the south side for a distance of 100 feet. Walk to be 4 feet wide. Also the construction of the necessary crosswalks, surface sewers, manholes, lot laterals, water and gas services.

And Whereas, The City Surveyor under the directions of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at \$1,700, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, that the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for the whole expense thereof, viz:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Lawton street from the east end thereof to Meigs street, in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom.

OUTLET SEWER IN GOODMAN AND CLIFFORD STREETS.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved that the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing an outlet sewer through a portion of Clifford street and Seneca and Morton streets.

All the territory included within and described by the following boundary lines, viz.: Beginning in Clifford street, at a point 150 feet west of the east line of lot No. 61 of assessors subdivision, supposed to belong to Harriet M. Davis, thence southerly in a direct line parallel with, and 150 feet distant from said line, and line produced to Webster avenue, thence westerly along Webster avenue, excluding one tier of lots on the north side thereof, for a depth of not more than 150 feet to the east line of lot No. 20 of a subdivision of part of a south part of town lot No. 49 by John A. The sewer flushing and street sprinkling are done by the Holly water and this water is also used for fire purposes. Out of the 210 fire alarms last year, the Hemlock water was only used in 86 and at fully one half of these, not more than one stream of Hemlock was used, so that the allowance of 75,000 gallons daily for fire purposes seems an ample supply. To meet this by a sale of 7,000,000 gallons daily, the price per thousand gallons should be at least 15c and from the above statements we think it fair to assume that the 10,484 services using three and one half million gallons daily at a cost of 9.8c per thousand gallons should be required to pay their full ratable share of water income. Should, however, the need of more water be imperative and an additional 2,000,000 gallons daily supply be will be increased \$70,000 and the price of 15c per thousand gallons will still be needed secured, the aggregate annual expenditures to meet them.

TOTAL COST OF WATER SYSTEM.

The total outlay and cost of the water works system March 30, 1892, was \$5,132,000, for which bonds of \$3,592,000 were issued and the balance of \$1,540,000 has been paid through

the tax levies. For this latter amount, the only direct compensation the city has ever received is the frontage tax, averaging \$10,000 a year and the use of the Holly water; and in view of the city's waiving any charge for interest on this \$1,540,000, it seems unreasonable and unbusinesslike to ask the people at large for an annual contribution of \$100,000 through the tax levy to protect a shortage that should be borne by the water consumers. The payment of this amount by the water consumers will work no hardship to them, as their general city taxes will be reduced in the same proportion that their water rates are increased.

By Ald. Johnston—

Whereas, The executive board records show that the total income from consumers for the use of Hemlock water during the year ending April 30, 1892 was \$297,892; and

Whereas, The said records show that the operating expenses for the same time were \$135,986, and the annual interest on the water bonds \$251,440, making the annual water works expenditures \$387,426, and

Whereas, the said records also show that the water works system has never been self-supporting without the city's annual contribution through the tax levy of \$100,000, therefore,

Resolved, That the executive board be, and it is hereby requested to revise the charges for water rents, so that the annual water income will at least equal the annual water works expenditures and interest on the water bonds without any contribution from the tax levy. In making this revision, neither the expenditures made through the water pipe fund nor the income from the frontage tax should be recognized nor included, as they both offset and supplement each other and should be kept separate from the water works fund.

In the matter of the proposed amendment to Subdivision 6, of section one hundred and twenty-nine of the City Charter increasing the limit which may be appropriated by the Common Council for the repair fund of the Board of Education from \$15,000 to \$25,000, your committee deems it advisable to recommend such increase.

In the matter of the petition of Bridget French praying that certain monies paid by her for city taxes for the year 1890, against property owned by the heirs of David Clarke, and known as lots Nos. 125 and 126 on the east side of Chatham street, be remitted to her we recommend that the petition be granted, in accordance with the accompanying resolution.

In the matter of the petition of Minnie J. Bessunger praying to have remitted to her certain moneys paid to the City Treasurer for the city tax for the years 1889-1890, against lot 69 on the north side of Hudson park, and assessed to Benjamin H. REPORT OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen: Your special committee on an additional temporary supply of water begs leave to report as follows: Your committee has had under consideration for some time the proposition of the gentlemen to furnish water from the artesian wells located in the town of Brighton. That proposition, it will be remembered, was to deliver into Mt. Hope reservoir water at the rate of 10 cents per thousand gallons. Your committee has visited the wells and is satisfied of the purity of the water, and that it would be desirable to procure some water from that source. Any large increase in the water supply at the present time is not desirable, because of the lack of facilities for distributing it through the distributing mains now in existence, but it is believed that a million gallons a day delivered into Mt. Hope reservoir would be of benefit by enabling the water works department to do away very largely with the pressure reduction system, so that all parts of the city would have full pressure at all times of the day. This would not necessarily mean that all parts of the city would have all the water they required at all times of the day, because more water is drawn from the reservoir during some portions of the day than is received into the reservoir, and during the periods when the large quantities of water are used, houses on the higher parts of the city would not receive very much benefit from the doing away of the pressure reduction system.

Your committee, however, has been convinced of the fact that the price at which the gentlemen making the offer propose to furnish the water is excessive. The estimate of the expense necessary to establish the pumping plant is \$40,000; the cost of maintaining the pumping plant after the plant is established, your committee is advised by the chief engineer, would be not to exceed \$5,000 or \$6,000 per year. The interest upon the investment, allowing 10 per cent., which is a large return for the money, would be \$4,000 per year.

It is claimed by the company that it runs a considerable risk in establishing the plant, inasmuch as they may not be able to furnish the water continuously, and may succeed in pumping the wells dry after a little time. Probably an additional 10 per cent. would be a fair premium to pay for the risk which they run, which would amount to \$4,000. The in-

terest upon the investment and the premium upon the risk would therefore amount to \$8,000, and the cost of doing the work and pumping the water say at \$10,000, allowing for all possible contingencies, would make a total of \$18,000 per year. Assuming that the city were to take a million gallons a day on an average, it would seem to your committee that the gentlemen making the offer could afford to sell the water to the city at a price considerably lower than the price they have named.

It is probable that they may not choose to reduce the price named in their offer, and as the city has on hand now a large pump and engine purchased at the time of the Gates wells experiments. It is probable that the city could better afford to establish its own plant and pump the water into the reservoir, using its own servants and machinery, rather than to buy the water at the price named. Your committee has, therefore, decided to recommend that the proposition of the several gentlemen be declined, and that the executive board be requested to negotiate with the owners of the land upon which those wells are located for the right to draw the water from them, and in the event that satisfactory arrangements cannot be made for that purpose or for the purchase of the water at a reasonable price, then that the city attorney be instructed to begin proceedings at once for the purpose of acquiring the right to the city to secure the water from those wells.

Gentlemen,—In the matter of a petition of taxpayers for an ordinance for an asphalt pavement upon Nassau street, I beg leave to say:

The existing stone sewer in Nassau street from Hudson avenue to St. Joseph street has a fall of only one foot in eleven hundred, and twenty-four, so that it is to a large extent filled with sediment, besides that it is too small to carry off the storm water during heavy showers.

It has been a source of danger to health, and damage to property, for a number of years.

After a careful examination of the question I have reached the conclusion that, before a permanent improvement is placed upon the street it is best for all interests, that the sewer should be rebuilt between Hudson avenue and St. Joseph street.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: Your Law Committee begs leave to make the following report:

In the matter of the claim of Mrs. Emma G. Densmore, individually and as executrix, for sewer damages caused by the pollution of Densmore creek running through her lands and premises, we find that a claim has been presented, and an action begun, claiming damages from March 22, 1887, and that heretofore a judgment has been recovered against the city for the damages to said premises at the rate of about \$125 per year. An offer has been made by her attorney to settle the same at the rate of \$200, in full of all past and

future damages, and we recommend that said offer be accepted.

In the matter of the claim of the Point Lookout Club for Sewage Pollution of the creek running through its premises, we have had a full examination and investigation as to the damages claimed by the club, and have had a number of interviews with its representatives, and we consider that a settlement of the same at \$700, for all past and future damages sustained by the club by reason of the nuisance caused by the sewer, is a fair settlement, and we recommend that the same be made.

In the matter of the injunction order against the city in the case of McMillan against The City of Rochester and others, enjoining the city from building a pier in the Johnson and Seymour race to sustain the arches of the proposed Court street bridge, we have ascertained that a motion has been made at the Monroe special term by the city attorney to dissolve the injunction procured against the city, and that the motion has been denied. A question of law has arisen in the case which involves the construction of a section of the charter, and other questions of great importance to the city, which ought to be determined by the appellate courts, and we recommend that an appeal be taken to the appellate courts, to a final determination, and that the city attorney be authorized to take such appeals.

On the 29th day of March, 1892, an agreement was entered into between the City of Rochester and Frederick Roesch to pay to said Roesch the sum of \$150 per annum for the right, privilege and easement to continue the discharge of sewerage over his property and a payment became due on the 29th day of March 1893. We therefore recommend that an order be drawn in favor of said Roesch for \$150 pursuant to said agreement for the year aforesaid.

On the 16th day of March, 1892, an agreement was entered into between the City of Rochester and Jacob Brower to pay to said Brower the sum of \$75 per annum for the right, privilege and easement to continue the discharge of the sewerage over his property and a payment was due on the 16th day of March, 1893. We therefore recommend that an order be drawn for \$75 in favor of said Brower pursuant to said agreement for the year aforesaid.

On the 15th day of March, 1892, an agreement was entered into between the City of Rochester and Jacob Lindsay to pay to said Lindsay the sum of \$75 per annum for the right, privilege and easement to continue the discharge of sewerage over his property and a payment was due on the 15th day of March, 1893. We therefore recommend that an order be drawn for \$75 in favor of said Jacob Lindsay, pursuant to said agreement, for the year aforesaid.

On the 9th day of March, 1892, an agreement was entered into between the City of Rochester and George A. Weihs, to pay to said Weihs the sum of \$80 per annum for the right, privilege and easement to continue the discharge of sewerage over his property, and a payment was due on the 9th day of March, 1893. We therefore recommend that an order be drawn for \$80 in favor of said George A. Weihs pursuant to said agreement for the year aforesaid.

On the 21st day of September, 1892, an agreement was entered into between the City of Rochester and Ralph Royle, to pay to said Royle the sum of \$50 per annum for the right, privilege and easement to continue the discharge over his property, and a payment became due on the 24th day of January, 1893.

We therefore recommend that an order be drawn in favor of said Royle for \$50 pursuant to said agreement for the year aforesaid.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your committee on public improvements, to whom was referred the communications from the executive board in regard to the improvement of Mortimer, Division, Oakman and Scrantom streets, and published at pages 316, current proceedings, would respectfully report.

We find, upon a careful examination, that the above named streets are in a very bad condition, and, being centrally located, their improvement at an early day is a public necessity.

We find that the sewer on Scrantom street is filled up, and, at present, is of little use to residents upon that street, and, in our opinion, before any permanent improvement is made upon this street, the sewer should be thoroughly cleaned and necessary manholes constructed. Therefore, we respectfully recommend that ordinances be prepared by the city surveyor for improving these streets, as follows:

The improvement of Division street, from North Clinton street to the east line of property owned by Sibley, Lindsay & Curr on said street, by constructing an asphalt pavement on said street; also taking up and resetting the existing curb stones, when found suitable for such purpose, substituting for those which are defective new Medina curb stones of approved quality and dimensions.

The improvement of Mortimer street, from North Clinton street to North St. Paul street, by constructing an asphalt pavement on said street; also taking up and resetting the existing curb stones, when found suitable, substituting for those which are defective new Medina curb stones of approved quality and dimensions.

The improvement of Mortimer street, from

North St. Paul street to North Water street, by constructing a Medina pavement and curb stones on said street.

The improvement of Oakman street, from North Clinton street to Galusha street, by constructing a Medina stone pavement and curb; also a Portland cement walk, five feet in width, on both sides of said street; the roadway to be 28 feet from curb to curb.

The improvement of Scrantom street, from North Clinton street to R. W. & O. R. R., by opening up and thoroughly cleaning the sewer in said street, and the construction of all necessary manholes to said sewer.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester :

Gentlemen:—I deem it my duty to call your attention to the subject of the west side sewer.

The whole city of Rochester has as great an interest in this subject as does the tenth, fifteenth and twentieth wards, because by the plan adopted, the sewage not only from a large portion of the city of Rochester upon the west side of the Genesee river, but in addition the sewage from nearly all of the town of Gates will be discharged into the Genesee river just below or at the lower falls. No experienced man or engineer has studied the problem of disposal of the sewage of this city without coming to the conclusion that it will be necessary at a not distant time, to either retain the sewage discharging into the lower river or subject it to some treatment before it is so discharged. While it may possibly be claimed that it is just as proper to discharge the sewage from the great territory outside of the city of Rochester and in the town of Gates, into the Genesee, as it is to so discharge the east side trunk sewer, it must be said that such a disposal was not determined upon, until an elaborate and scientific consideration of all other possible plans, had been made by an accomplished engineer, and then the plan was carried out in such a manner as to largely increase the cost, but with the result of leaving it possible in the future, to dispose of the sewage without discharging it into the river, or to treat it properly before such discharge.

Now the west side sewer is so designed that it will have to be rebuilt or an equivalent expense incurred, before any other disposition of the sewage can be made except to discharge directly into the river.

The west side sewer scheme has never been as far as we know, studied or reported upon by any engineer. Its route was determined upon without regard to the interests of the whole city. Mr. Crane, the engineer of the west side sewer commission speaks as follows in his report, which by the way, was made nearly three months ago, but has never been given out to the public: "It differs from most other sewerage systems in that it allows no choice of routes. The alignment is designated by law and such is the topography of the route no variation can be made."

The commissioners have lately been advertising the fact that they are preparing specifications and that the plans have been endorsed by that competent engineer Mr. Frederick P. Stearns, of Massachusetts, and it has also come out that the cost will largely exceed the amount originally considered necessary and further it is beginning to appear necessary to loan the credit of the city of Rochester in order to lighten the burden of assessment.

Now the report of Mr. Stearns was merely upon the details of construction and when here he insisted that the letter of instruction to him from the commission should be printed with his report, although this was in part omitted from his report which was published in the Post-Express of yesterday. The following is a copy of the letter of instructions to him:

Rochester, N. Y., Mch. 7, 1893.

The Commissioners of Sewerage of the tenth fifteenth and twentieth wards in the city of Rochester and the town of Gates submit to you for examination the proposed plans of the sewer to be constructed by said commissioner and request an examination thereof, having special reference to the capacity, design and material of the proposed sewer.

Now I assert to your honorable body that the whole question of a west side sewer has not been properly considered and reported upon by competent engineers. I further assert that the place adopted is not right, whether considered from an engineering or common sense standpoint, and that if that plan is carried out a great injustice will be done to the city of Rochester.

Leaving a balance in the treasury after paying all claims against the department of \$11,338.56.

The above expenditures include the entire indebtedness against the police department to date, and embrace those on the Finance Budget of March 28, 1893, excepting the sum of about \$3,700 now under contract for putting the police patrol wires under ground.

We have heretofore called the attention of your honorable body to the subject of "precinct stations" as a matter of great importance to the people of this city, and that such stations should be established to expedite the work of the police department. The city is growing in territory as well as population, and at least five precinct stations ought to be established for the relief of officers who are on duty in the outskirts of the city, and we recommend that steps be taken by this council to establish these stations at the earliest possible period. The continued extension and opening of streets, the rapid growth of our population, and the increased demands from the police force in business centers have become so large, that the present force is not sufficient to give effective protection to the

people of this city. We regard that the increase of our force will be a source of safety to the citizens of this city, and that the expenditure in this direction will be a matter of economy to the citizens of this city.

We therefore recommend, that the police force be increased by at least twenty-five (25) additional patrolmen.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LAMP COMMITTEE.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., March 31, 1893.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester :

Gentlemen:—Your Lamp Committee respectfully presents the following report of the public lighting of the city for the year ending March 31, 1893. June 30, 1892, the five year contract between the city and the various electric light companies for lighting the streets of the city, expired. The rate per night paid for lighting under this contract was 27 and 28 1-2 cents.

Your committee after many meetings with the representatives of the various companies extending over a period of two months, were able to submit to your honorable board a contract running five years at the low figure of 25 cents per night for each arc light, and also an agreement of the company to put their wires underground, a result very much desired, and a great concession on the part of the company as no power is vested in the Common Council to compel them to place them underground. The city of Rochester is to be congratulated on the favorable terms of the new contract. As a comparison of the prices paid in this and other cities for lighting, may be of interest, a few cases are cited showing that this city is paying less per light per year than any in the country which is a fact with possibly one or two exceptions.

The city of Atlanta, Ga., pays \$100 per year per light.

The city of Albany, N. Y., pays \$156.66 per year per light.

The city of Buffalo, N. Y., pays \$127.75 per year per light.

The city of Dayton, Ohio, pays \$125 per year per light.

The city of Denver, Col., pays \$150 per year per light.

The city of Indianapolis, Ind., pays \$95 per year per light.

The city of Kansas City pays \$119.50 per year per light.

The city of Minneapolis pays \$150 per year per light.

The city of Pittsburg, Pa., pays \$96 per year per light.

The city of Syracuse, N. Y., pays \$109.50 per year per light.

The city of New York pays \$127.75 per year per light.

The city of Rochester pays \$91.25 per year per light.

During the year your honorable board, acting on the recommendations of your Lamp Committee, transferred the maps, records and property of the lamp department of the city from the custody of the city surveyor to the city electrician; this change was made not because of any fault to be found with the manner in which the records were kept, but because of the fact that the city electrician is of necessity more intimately connected with matters pertaining to the lamp department than the city surveyor, and your committee takes this opportunity to thank the present city surveyor and his able assistants for the efficient manner in which the books and maps of the committee have been kept in the past.

Serious complaint has been made by citizens generally, of the quantity and quality of light furnished by the incandescent lamp on the street, and by resolution of your board, your committee was authorized to substitute arc lights in place of the incandescent which change is now under way.

In accordance with the terms of the new contract testing stations are now being placed on all the street light circuits by the means of which your committee will be able to ascertain if the city is receiving the amount of light from each lamp called for in the contract.

The applications for light in the outside districts of the city are continually increasing, and will so continue to increase for some years; to meet these just requests for additional lights and keep the expenditures of the department within the appropriation of your honorable board requires the constant attention and exercise of the best judgment of your committee. With the large increase of the number of lights during the year, your committee takes great pleasure in presenting the following tables which show the condition of the public lighting in detail and also a surplus on hand to the credit of your committee.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MAP AND SURVEY COMMITTEE.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., March 31, 1893.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—We beg leave to make the following annual report and recommendations:

The business of the Surveyor's office has been increased during the year by an unusual number of important projects, which have necessitated a great amount of work and study.

Among these may be mentioned Clarissa street iron bridge, Court street stone and iron bridge, Andrews street stone bridge and Bronson avenue iron bridge, all of which are under contract or completed according to detailed plans made in the Surveyor's office.

The expensive improvement of building an iron bridge over the tracks of the New York Central R. R. at East Main street, has taken a great deal of attention and was increased by the effort of the Surveyor to secure a change in its design so as to make it more durable and slightly.

In street improvements the work has been large, including the paving of Plymouth avenue throughout its whole length with cedar blocks and asphalt.

Genesee street with asphalt to Brooks avenue, and from there to Elmwood avenue with macadam, the top layers of which are of trap rock brought from the Hudson river opposite New York.

Opening and widening Clinton park, and paving with asphalt, also the paving of East Main street, from University avenue to East avenue with Medina blocks on a concrete foundation, which is now under contract, and which it is claimed will make as splendid a piece of street as there is in the world.

In building sewers the work has been unusually important. Besides a large number of sewers built; the East Main street sewer, from Elm street to Water street, and 20 feet deep is under way, and studies, specifications and reports on ordinances have been made for nearly every sewerage district upon the east side of the river, in relation to utilizing the East Side Trunk Sewer to the greatest possible extent.

A survey and report was made upon the subject of sewerage of that portion of the city lying south of Mount Hope range of hills, necessitating a topographical survey and preparation of a large map of all the territory between Mt. Hope avenue and Monroe avenue and the summit of Pinnacle and Mt. Hope ranges and the road one mile south of Elmwood avenue.

Surveys, plans and estimates were made for a new bridge over the New York Central R. R., at Prince street.

Designs and drawings were made for a splendid stone bridge across the Genesee river at Alexander street, which the Surveyor asserts can be built of beton or concrete at about the cost of an iron bridge.

A report accompanied with plan and estimate for public baths was made, and submitted to the Board of Health.

The large amount of work coming to the office in the way of preparing ordinances for the Common Council, estimates and plans for work in progress, street openings, assessments encroachments, and surveys, and plans for use in trials of cases against the city, for the Executive Board, Assessors, and City Attorney was regularly attended to.

At the present time a model has been made and detailed plans are being prepared for a new design of lift bridge which promises to be of great importance in improving the appearance of the city, by doing away with the ungainly barn frame structures now in use for such bridges.

The preparation of record maps of all work done, which has become so important by reason of the modern practice of putting in sewer and water connections to all lots before a street is improved, has been well kept up.

A system of photographing work in progress, and of making photographs of existing structures as a matter of record has been introduced with good result.

A new process of making copies of plans with black lines on white paper instead of the ordinary blue print process has been put in use,

much to the satisfaction of all the departments who use plans.

The system of indexing the records, and maps, which number thousands and whose value demands upon their being readily accessible, was very incomplete and unsatisfactory.

Under the advice of your committee a system of card catalogue, the same as is used in large libraries and by the great insurance and banking companies, has been introduced. This is tedious work as it will require the writing upon from 10,000 to 20,000 reference cards, after inspection of every plan and document in the office.

All of the assistants have been employed upon this work during the winter, when there was time to spare from other work. This catalogue is already of service, and when completed will be of great benefit to all of the city departments. The survey of old words 1 to 14 inclusive which has been in progress since June 29th, 1887, under contract with John C. Ryan, is approaching completion and it is believed that it will be finished during the summer. All of this is checked over in the Surveyors office.

The work done by Mr. Ryan is undoubtedly accurate, but the length of time taken has been absurdly long, and demonstrates the advisability of having such work done directly by the City Surveyor. There is absolute necessity for an accurate survey of the old fifteenth and sixteenth wards. It is the portion of the city in which the greatest amount of street improvements and sewerage work will be done, during the coming years, and an accurate survey is necessary not only for the proper carrying out of improvements, but to make local assessments right, and thereby reduce the amount paid by the city at large for erroneous assessments.

The area covered by the old fourteen wards is about 5,138 acres and this is covered by Ryan's survey. The area of the city outside of these wards is about 6,847 acres. This survey should be as perfect as can be made and should be commenced this year, and should be directly in charge of the City Surveyor.

The Surveyor states, and your committee believes that the whole work can be properly done in two years' time. In order to accomplish it he will require the assistance of five additional men, one assistant, one transit man two chainmen and one draughtsman and the expense will not exceed six thousand dollars per year.

Your committee would call your attention to the crowded condition of the Surveyor's office, and the necessity for more room for the proper conduct of business there.

A detailed statement of work done by the office is included in the report of the City Surveyor which will be published with the report of the Executive Board.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ELECTRICAL COMMITTEE.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Apr. 1, 1893.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Electrical Committee begs leave to submit the following report:

During the past year your committee caused an agreement to be entered into by the Rochester Gas & Electric Company to the effect

that said company shall, at its own expense construct and maintain a conduit of sufficient capacity to accommodate all wires now in use and to provide for the probable future use of wires this conduit to be open to the use of any company or individual securing the right to occupy it from the Common Council, and upon the payment of a reasonable rental for the use of the same, also an agreement by which the poles owned by said company can be occupied by any person or company, in the same manner and under the same conditions the company agrees to place all their wires under ground on the streets in which the conduit is built or to be built.

The Common Council is to be congratulated on the result of this agreement which will in a short time relieve our principal streets of the unsightly and dangerous wires and poles, considering that the city has no legal right to compel their removal. The streets in which conduits are to be built by the terms of this agreement are State and Exchange streets, from the Erie canal to Allen street; East and West Main street, from Plymouth avenue to University avenue; North and South St. Paul street, from Andrews street to Court street; the company have already completed the conduit from East avenue to University avenue, on one side of the street, and nearly the whole of the other side, this work was discontinued during the winter to be commenced as soon as the weather permits this spring, and pushed to completion.

Your committee is confident that next fall not a wire or pole will be left on Main street, between the Erie canal and University avenue, except the wires of the street railroad company, which wires cannot be at present placed in a conduit. Upon the recommendation of your committee your honorable board has granted permission to a new electric light company, the Citizen's Light & Power Company, to do business and string the necessary wires and set poles in the city, this permission was granted under restrictions which will allow no poles being set on any street where a line of poles now exist, and that they are to place their wires in any conduit now built or to be built, and as a further condition of the grant they are under agreement to build conduits in not less than one mile of streets which will be quite an addition to the underground system in the city.

The Bell Telephone Company have constructed conduits and laid wires in them on Main and State streets, and have conduits in course of construction in several others.

Acting on the report of your committee your honorable board has granted the Standard Electric Signal Company the necessary permit to conduct an auxiliary fire alarm business in the city, the permission was granted with all the necessary restrictions in regard to stringing wires and using the conduits for the same.

Stone street; Culver block, University avenue and Culver park; Homestead hotel, South St. Paul street; Spiehler block, Court street; County alms house; Ocumpangh block, East Main street; Osburn block, East Main street, (under contract); Masonic Temple, Exchange and Irving streets.

In addition thereto I have examined into the causes of all fires as far as my other duties have allowed me and have employed such means as were at my command to prevent a repetition of the same.

I have also attended to such matters as have been assigned me by your Wooden Building Committee, his honor the mayor, and the various members of your honorable body in the interest of the city.

In conclusion I wish to thank the members of your Wooden Building Committee for the assistance given me in the performance of the duties of this office, in particular are my thanks due to the chairman of said committee who has been always ready and has given me much of his time in looking after

the interests of our municipality which has been conducted during the past year at an expense of less than twenty dollars aside from the salary of the office.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee at the close of the fiscal year 1892-93, has deemed it but proper in submitting an annual report to review briefly the work of that committee during the past twelve months.

The fiscal year now ending will be a memorable one in the history of the city of Rochester, by reason of the many substantial and much needed improvements begun and carried on under the direction of this Common Council and the Executive Board. First among these, is the long agitated additional water supply. This council and the public generally are familiar with the long discussion relative to the sources of procuring such supply, and the means by which it should be procured. The settlement of that question was made before the present council was organized, but the means of carrying on the work had been provided and the work commenced during the existence of the present board. In connection with that undertaking the principal matter of importance with which this council has had to deal, is the issuing of the city's bonds for the payment of the expense of doing the work. Thus far, during the year the city has sold five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) of its water bonds, bearing three and one-half per cent. interest. Those bonds were issued for twenty years, with the right to redeem at any time after the expiration of ten years; thus enabling the city, if the opportunity should arise, to take advantage of a still more favorable rate of interest. The credit of the city of Rochester is so good that the city treasurer was enabled upon this sale to secure in premiums upon the bonds the sum of nine thousand dollars, representing a clear profit to the city.

Another undertaking begun during the fiscal year, now about expiring, is the construction of the East Side Trunk Sewer; an improvement designed to greatly benefit a very large section of the city, the completion of which will undoubtedly be of great value to a large number of people. The moneys with which to commence and carry on this large work were procured from the sale of the city's bonds, five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) worth of which were sold on terms extremely satisfactory to the city in the early part of the year. The rate of interest upon those bonds is three and one-half per cent., and the premium realized from their sale amounts to fourteen thousand dollars. Those bonds will mature in sums of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) annually after the expiration of ten years from the date of their issue.

Perhaps the most satisfactory bond sale negotiated during the present fiscal year was the re-funding of the city's bonds, known as the Rochester & State Line Railroad bonds, amounting to six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000), and the Rochester, Nunda & Pennsylvania Railroad bonds, amounting to one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000). Those bonds had been for many years bearing interest at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, and were re-funded on February 1st, at three and one-half per cent. per annum, the premium received upon the sale of the re-funded bonds amounted to \$8,093.75, a clear profit to the city of that amount.

The annual interest charge upon the city has also been reduced, through the efforts of your committee, by an agreement entered into with the holders of the bonds of the city known as the consolidated bonds, amounting to \$100,000, whereby the interest upon those bonds was reduced from four per cent. to three and one-half per cent. per annum. Your committee decided to take advantage of the option reserved in the bonds to redeem on August 1st, last, and pay the bonds off, unless the holders thereof should agree to reduce the interest thereon. The total saving on this item alone will amount in the twenty years which the bonds have yet to run, to \$10,000, an amount not large, but worth saving.

The city has also benefited very largely during the past year by the favorable terms it has been able to make with the banks in which the city's money has been deposited. The contract under which the city's moneys are now held by the various banks provides for the payment by them of four per cent. per annum on daily balances. Until this year the rate had never been greater than two per cent. per annum. During a large portion of the fiscal year the city has had on deposit in the several banks a very large amount of money, and the increase in the interest from two to four per cent. amounts to \$3,824.47. Much of this large amount of money on deposit was received from the sale of the various bonds sold, upon which the city was paying three and one-half per cent., so that for all the time that this money was held on deposit in the bank it not only was not costing the city anything in the way of interest, but was actually earning for the city one half of one per cent. per annum.

One of the matters to which your committee has given a great deal of careful attention is the matter of providing moneys with which to meet the short time acceptances issued to contractors upon public improvements. Those acceptances are issued as the work of making the improvements progresses, and have to be met by the city treasurer at their maturity. For that purpose much of the moneys raised in the annual tax levy is diverted from the sources for which it was intended, and the city is forced to discount its notes for periods ranging from a few days to several months. Upon those short time loans the city is compelled to pay six per cent. interest per annum. The credit of the city being in the satisfactory condition evidenced by the able terms upon which its bonds have been sold, it would seem that for the purpose of meeting those acceptances, moneys could be secured at a much lower rate of interest by issuing under the provision of section 81 of the city charter, short time bonds for the purpose of creating a fund from which the contract price of local improvements could be paid in cash. The assessments from such improvements when collected to be turned into such fund, together with whatever interest might be received upon such assessments not paid within a reasonable time from their maturity. In that way the necessity of borrowing from the banks of deposit would be avoided, and the city would undoubtedly make a profit by the difference between three and one-half and four per cent. interest which the bonds might bear, and the six or more per cent. which the taxpayers would pay. The contract would also undoubtedly be let at lower figures if it were understood that the contractors were to have the contract price in cash upon the completion of the work. While not preparing to recommend its adoption at the present time, your committee believes that it is worth the serious consideration of the city's authorities and that such a course would be of great benefit to the city. Your committee would recommend that further consideration be given

to this subject by the city treasurer, and the finance committee soon to be appointed.

Another matter to which your committee has given considerable attention, is the subject of sales for unpaid city taxes. The average amount of unpaid city taxes each year which the city has to take at the tax sale and carry, is \$100,000. Many of the pieces of property upon which those taxes are levied have been abandoned or neglected by their owners, and the tax has been struck off to the city year after year for a very long time. The amount now owing to the city upon some of those pieces of property is equal to their entire value. The charter provides a method by which the equity of redemption may be cut off. Your committee has taken steps to have a list of such pieces of property made with the amounts due thereon, together with the names of the owners thereof, for the purpose of taking steps toward the commencement of foreclosure actions and absolute sales of such property. Such a list will soon be completed, and it is probable that by instructing the city attorney to begin foreclosure actions thereon, that a very large amount of money might be realized at once.

Your committee would, therefore, recommend that the city treasurer be requested to complete such a list at as early a date as possible, and that upon the completion thereof, the city attorney be requested to commence foreclosure actions in accordance with the foregoing suggestions.

In connection with the sale of the city's bonds hereafter to be authorized, your committee would recommend that in securing legislation to authorize the sale of bonds, provision should be made therein for the payment of such bonds in series, and that after a specified time a certain amount thereof should be paid each year by raising moneys therefor in the annual tax levy, a plan similar to that adopted at the time the East Side trunk sewer bonds were authorized would, your committee believes, be most satisfactory. Unless some such course shall be taken, it will be necessary at some future time to provide for the creation of a sinking fund for the redemption of the city's outstanding bonded indebtedness.

In conclusion your committee desires to testify to the very careful and judicious management of the city's financial matters by the present city treasurer. Your committee has given very careful attention to the details of the city treasurer's work, and has always found him extremely careful, accurate and painstaking.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester :

Gentlemen: In presenting my annual report, showing receipts and disbursements for the past year in the treasurer's office, I beg to call your special attention to several matters pertaining to the finances of the city, in the hope that such action may be taken as will serve the best interests of the taxpayers, whose servants we are. It is not my purpose to impute blame or discredit to any department of the city government, but rather to suggest certain changes in our financial policy which, in my opinion, would materially strengthen the city's credit and bring Rochester nearer the ideal municipality where full value is received by the people for the taxes paid.

I. UNPAID GENERAL CITY TAXES.

According to the charter, all unpaid items of the general city tax must be sold on the last Thursday in March of each year. Many persons buy these taxes for an investment, the rate of interest upon them being 12 per cent. per annum, they paying into the city treasury the amount of the tax, and receiving a tax certificate of sale. The taxes remaining unsold are taken for the city of Rochester by the treasurer. The amount of such taxes purchased by the city and remaining unpaid from 1850 to 1889, inclusive, is \$49,558.18.

The books are now being examined to ascertain who are the present owners of the property liable for the payment of these taxes. In many cases the parties have purchased the property without having a tax search made, and do not know of the existence of unpaid taxes. In other cases the owners know of the taxes but say "what are you going to do about it?" Should they make a sale of their property and the parties purchasing require a tax search, these taxes would then of course appear. Some years ago the common council passed a resolution directing the treasurer to receive past due taxes purchased by the city prior to 1880, with 7 per cent. added for interest, instead of 12 per cent. I think there should also have been a proviso made that they should be paid within a certain time. It appears no more than right that parties who are able to pay should be forced to pay within a reasonable time, or, in case of failure, should then forfeit their property to the city. It is with the hope that some plan may be devised (which may require legislative action), that will bring about the desired result, that I call your attention to the facts in the case. I shall soon have the list completed, showing to the best of my knowledge, who are the persons liable for these unpaid taxes, and will then submit the same to your honorable body for consideration, together with the list of unpaid personal taxes.

II. TRANSFERS OF REAL ESTATE.

It is a well known fact that the assessment books furnished the city treasurer by the assessors for the collection of the general city tax, while they describe the property correctly, do not in many cases give the names of the present owners. In proof of this assertion I will state that previous to the publication of the list of unpaid taxes on the 20th inst. I mailed a special card, inclosed in an envelope, to 500 of the persons in arrears whose taxes

exceeded \$50 each, hoping by this means to collect a large part of the amount outstanding. Nearly one-half of these cards have been returned from the postoffice, indorsed "party cannot be found," or, "name not in the directory." As the assessors furnish the county treasurer the books for the collection of the county and state tax on city property, the county should be equally interested with the city authorities in having a correct assessment roll. Perhaps a sufficient remedy would be a resolution from the board of supervisors, directing the county clerk that he must not record any deed for the conveyance of real estate until it receives the indorsement of the city assessors that the proper change has been made upon their books. The importance of the subject is sufficient to warrant an effort to obtain the necessary authority from the legislature, providing the action of the board of supervisors should prove insufficient.

III. COMMENCEMENT OF THE FISCAL YEAR.

It has, I believe, become apparent that the fiscal year of the city should begin on July 1st, when the proceeds of the annual tax levy become available, or else the finance committee should provide for the raising of an amount sufficient to meet the current expenses for the year. Under the present plan provision is made for three months in arrears, April, May and June, and for nine months in advance. There is naturally objection to any plan that will cause an increase in the tax levy, but is it not wise to provide at the commencement of the year for the payment of inevitable expenses, and thus avoid the making of notes which bear 6 per cent. interest? It would cause no increase in the tax levy after the first year, and the city would make a large saving every year in the item of interest. There would be great economy in making the general city tax become due on June 1st, instead of July 1st, as the city could thereby avoid borrowing money to pay the interest on the bonded debt, the bulk of which is payable January 1st and July 1st.

IV. BONDS FOR LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

I respectfully suggest the propriety of issuing bonds for the payment of local improvements, keeping the proceeds in the several banks of deposit separate from the general fund, and providing in the tax levy for the expenses of the year in the different departments. From the funds obtained from the sale of such bonds the treasurer could pay the acceptances of the executive board as they become due, and could also pay the contractors cash for their work, retaining, of course, the guarantee fund required. The contractors would do the work for cash at least 5 per cent. cheaper than at present, and the people would derive the benefit. There are outstanding to-day in round numbers, acceptances to the amount of \$700,000, two-thirds of which are bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent.

The bonds for ten or twenty years could be floated at 3 1-2 per cent., and the city would be the gainer 2 1-2 per cent. by the transaction, besides the saving above noted in the first cost of the work. The bulk of the notes now issued every year by the city are for the payment of these acceptances, excepting, of course, those made for the expenses of the departments in the months of April, May and June, and the deficiency notes for the relief of funds that have been drawn upon in excess of their appropriations in the tax levy.

V. GENESEE VALLEY RAILROAD SINKING FUND.

The sinking fund now deposited in the several savings banks of the city, for the purpose of paying the bonds of the Genesee Valley Railroad when they become due, now amounts to \$90,499.01. Why not use it in the purchase of some of the city's bonds that are bearing interest at the rate of 7 per cent? We shall

receive enough interest from the Erie Railway Company to take care of the bonds when they become due, as well as to retire \$4,000 worth of the bonds the 1st of January every year until 1903, when the balance, \$72,000, will be payable. The amount outstanding of these bonds at present is \$108,000.

VI. TAXES ON LANDS CONDEMNED FOR CITY PURPOSES.

I would respectfully recommend that all commissions on lands to be taken for the city have tax searches made, in order to ascertain whether the property is free and clear from past due taxes, and if not, the amount of the owners equity in the premises. Such searches will be promptly made by this office. After the award is made and the owner receives his money, experience teaches us that the taxes will remain unpaid.

VII. LOCAL ASSESSMENTS ON STATE PROPERTY.

The state treasurer has decided that local assessments upon property owned by the state will not be paid unless the state controller is notified before the assessment is made. There is a considerable amount of such taxes on the books of the treasurer's office payment of which has been refused upon the ground of failure to comply with the above regulation.

VIII. ASSESSMENTS FOR STREET SWEEPING AND CLEANING.

Of all the taxes collected in the treasurer's office, none cause such pronounced dissatisfaction as those for street sweeping and cleaning. These assessments are made for work done on streets improved with asphalt pavements. There are thirty-five of such streets, and until a recent date it was customary to make a certain allowance or credit towards the expense of cleaning the same from the highway fund, the balance being paid by the owners of the property fronting on the improvement. This appears to have been an equitable arrangement, but for the past two years no credit from the highway fund has been made. It seems scarcely fair to tax such property for its proportion of the highway fund, and then burden it with the whole cost of the sweeping and cleaning, allowing nothing for the care of a permanent improvement. If, in place of asphalt, such streets had been improved in an inferior manner with macadam pavement, the city would have kept it in repair from the general fund created for highway purposes. I trust that your honorable body may devise a fair adjustment of the matter which will satisfy all parties concerned.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.
 ROCHESTER, N. Y., March 1, 1893.

To the Board of Park Commissioners:
 Gentlemen: I herewith present the annual report of the work done on the parks for the year just ended.

The following-described pieces of property have been acquired during the year:

The land known as the Warrant property, bounded on the north by Elmwood avenue, on the east by the New York, Lake Erie & Western railroad, on the south by park property formerly owned by Horace Boughton and others, and on the west by the Genesee river, containing 7 55-100 acres of land, on which are a large brick house, a small frame house and a frame barn. This property was condemned and the commission awarded eleven thousand dollars for it.

Including this piece of land the boundaries of the Genesee Valley Park are as follows: On the west side of the river all the land lying between the center of the Genesee river and the Western New York and Pennsylvania railroad, and bounded on the north by the state dam and on the south by E. G. Chapin's fertilizer works, containing 60 62-100 acres. On the east side all the land lying between the New York, Lake Erie & Western railroad on the east and the center of the Genesee river and bounded on the north by Elmwood avenue and on the south by the center of the Westfall road and containing 248

66-100 acres. The whole acreage is 309 28-100 acres of land, and the river within the park boundaries contains 60 acres of water.

At Highland Park a triangular piece of land containing 2 58-100 acres of land was purchased from the Stanley estate for \$2,900.00, making the total number of acres purchased for Highland Park 16 66-100 acres, and with the 19 63-100 acres given by Ellwanger and Barry and the 39 44-100 acres turned over to the Park Commission by the Water Works Department, 75 73-100 acres of land for park purposes at Highland Park. A strip of land 260 feet long north and south and 52 feet wide east and west, at the north east corner of the Stanley property has been turned over to the Water Works Department on which will be erected a double dwelling house and barns for the gate-keepers. In consideration of turning this property over to the Water Works Department the land on the south side of the reservoir now occupied by the gate-keepers will be turned over to the Park Commission for park purposes.

No land has been acquired for park purposes during the year at Seneca Park. The acreage is 187 52-100. The acreage of all the parks exclusive of the water in the river is 572 53-100.

At Seneca Park, on the east side, a few men and teams were employed early in the summer grading the permanent roadways and excavating for the proposed lake. During the latter part of the summer all the force was withdrawn on account of the lack of funds.

At Highland Park a small force was kept at work during the whole summer caring for the shrubs in the shrub collection and grading walks. A large number of shrubs were imported from England, France and Germany, and a choice collection of all the species and varieties of shrubs raised by Ellwanger & Barry were presented to the park by those gentlemen. They also presented a large number of bulbs of tulips and hyacinths, the flowers of which made a fine display at Highland Park during the summer. The shrubs that were procured were planted in a nursery until another year.

At Genesee Valley Park during spring and fall a few trees were planted to take the place of those that died the year before. About ten thousand trees and shrubs were purchased to plant on the west side of the river, but as the land could not be ploughed in time to plant them they were planted in nursery rows on the east side of the river, and seven thousand trees and shrubs were purchased to plant on the river banks and in the forest, and upon spaces on the east side of the river. The meadows were mowed and the 82 tons of hay not required for the horses and sheep were sold at the barns for \$758.48. Of the 108 sheep owned by the Park Commission last year, one was killed by a dog and five died, and seven were sold at \$6.00 each, leaving 95 sheep. During the summer of 1892, 109 lambs were raised, 63 of which were sold for \$4.00 each and 46 were kept. Seven new sheep were bought in the fall making the flock number 148, the present number of grown sheep. From 103 sheep the number on hand at shearing time 836 pounds of wool were sold at 20 cents a pound. In addition to the grown sheep on February 28th, 1893, there were 62 young lambs. A valuable Scotch colley pup, which helped guard the sheep during the summer, was presented to the Park Commission by Dr. B. G. Saunders of this city.

The Rochester Athletic Club built a fine club house on the west bank of the Genesee river at their own expense. The Canoe Club house formerly located on the west bank of the river near the entrance to the park, was moved to a place just north of Elmwood avenue bridge and then sold to the Genesee Canoe Club for \$750.00.

The athletic grounds on the west side of the

river were graded and a one-third mile bicycle track laid out. A picket fence was laid around the track and cinders and gravel were drawn during the fall and winter for the purpose of ballasting the track.

The white house on the east side of the river was used as a refreshment stand during the summer season and general satisfaction was given by the person in charge. Fifty additional park seats were purchased and placed in the picnic grounds. The Plymouth avenue street cars were extended to the park in the fall and large numbers of people visited the parks. The route will be extended to Elmwood avenue bridge early in the spring.

A road roller was purchased early in the summer and with the road scraper the roads were kept in good condition. Permission to collect rare shrubs from his forest was kindly given to me by Mr. S. P. Howard of Fairport, N. Y.

Materials were sold from the parks to the amount of \$2,119.30 which was deposited with the City Treasurer to the credit of the maintenance fund.

In October the contract was let for the sewers and grading of the Lake avenue parkway that extends from Lake avenue westerly to the New York Central & Hudson River railroad on the line of Lake Avenue Park. The total width of the Lake avenue parkway is 158 feet, consisting of a grass plot in the center of 58 feet, two roadways 25 feet wide on each side of which is a planting space of 16 feet, a walk of 5 feet and a space for trees of 4 feet. The sewers were built during the winter and the grading so nearly finished that it can be completed early in the spring.

With the recent extension of the street car line to the gate of the new grounds all parts of Mt. Hope are as easy of access as it is possible to arrange for so extensive a cemetery.

Gentlemen:—Your Water Works Committee respectfully presents their report for the year ending April 3, 1893.

The funds available for water pipe extensions were as follows:

1. Amount to the credit of the water pipe extension fund at the close of the preceding fiscal year after deducting for final estimates for work performed and incidentals..\$ 2,300 00
2. Amount included in the tax levy and placed to the credit of the water pipe fund for 1892..... 60,000 00
3. Amount voted by the Common council for laying mains in streets requested by the Board of Health, and which is to be charged in the tax levy for the coming fiscal year 2,500 00

The work of laying permanent mains authorized by the Common Council and paid for under the available appropriation has been practically completed, and funds are in hand for meeting the balances due on final estimates which will be paid when trimming up and repairs have been made to the water trenches in the spring.

Besides the mains laid as detailed above, the following permanent constructions for supplying districts opened up by associations, and streets laid out by private individuals have been laid; the funds for this purpose having as heretofore been advanced by such associations and individuals to be repaid at the pleasure of this Council without interest.

(See table No. 2.)

Up to April 4, 1892 there were within the city limits 219,251 miles of mains fed from the domestic supply and 16,786 miles of mains fed from the Holly supply. Adding the amounts laid during the past season, viz.: 10,389-1000 miles domestic and 89-100 miles Holly, there are in all 229,640 miles on the domestic system and 17,676 miles on the Holly system. In all 247,316 miles.

This extensive mileage is spread over the whole city, and in view of the recognized want of potable water your committee needs scarcely recommend the absolute necessity for husbanding this supply and restricting as far as possible the further extension of domestic mains.

Quite a number of petitions for such extensions are on file in the water works office principally to supply outlying districts opened up by various associations. If all were laid it would mean about fifteen additional miles to the present 230 miles of pipe now fed from the limited domestic supply, and the estimated expense of laying such additions is about \$100,000.

133 new hydrants have been set, making in all 2,245; and 121 new stop gates, a total of 2,786, including those set on large services.

The president of the board then delivered his valedictory address as follows:

Gentlemen: The year just closing has been one of the most important in the history of our city, in the magnitude and extent of the public work. More important contracts are under way than ever before. First the contract for additional water supply. Probably nothing has done more to retard the growth of our beautiful city than the scarcity of pure water. This subject has been before this board for nearly five years, and the fact that it is settled and the work in progress is a relief to every citizen. In connection with this the question of temporary supply, just settled with the Brighton well owners, has been another source of vexation. We hope the water question will not again rise to haunt us, and that in the near future the scheme of restricting the flow may be abandoned and our citizens be allowed to use what water they need.

Next in importance to the water question has been the building of the East Side trunk sewer. Three sections of this great sewer are finished and the balance in process of construction. Ordinances have been passed by this board for sewers to connect with the trunk sewer. The drain upon the treasury for damages for the pollution of Thomas and Densmore creeks will

soon cease. Another cause for congratulations.

During the year ordinances have been passed for three new bridges across the Genesee river. One of these, the handsome iron bridge at Clarissa street, is finished. Court street stone arch bridge is in process of construction, and the contract let for the stone bridge at Andrews street. I sincerely hope the present year will see the long promised bridge at Alexander and Edinburgh streets built.

Favorable contracts were made with the electric lighting companies also. You will see by the report of the lamp committee that Rochester is especially favored over the other cities of the country in the price of arc lights. Much credit is due the lamp committee for this work.

The electrical committee has also made contracts for placing all wires (except trolley wires) under ground on Main street, State and St. Paul streets. This will relieve our business streets from the unsightly and dangerous poles now standing.

Eight hundred and fifty thousand dollars worth of the bonded debt has been refunded during the year. The saving of interest amounting to \$26,750 yearly. I respectfully refer to the excellent report of the finance committee, showing the very favorable condition of the city finances.

In conclusion I desire to compliment the several committees for the general excellence of the work done during the year, and to return to the board my heartfelt thanks for their uniform kindness to me during the term I have been its presiding officer.

Ald. Lewis moved that the address be received, filed and published.

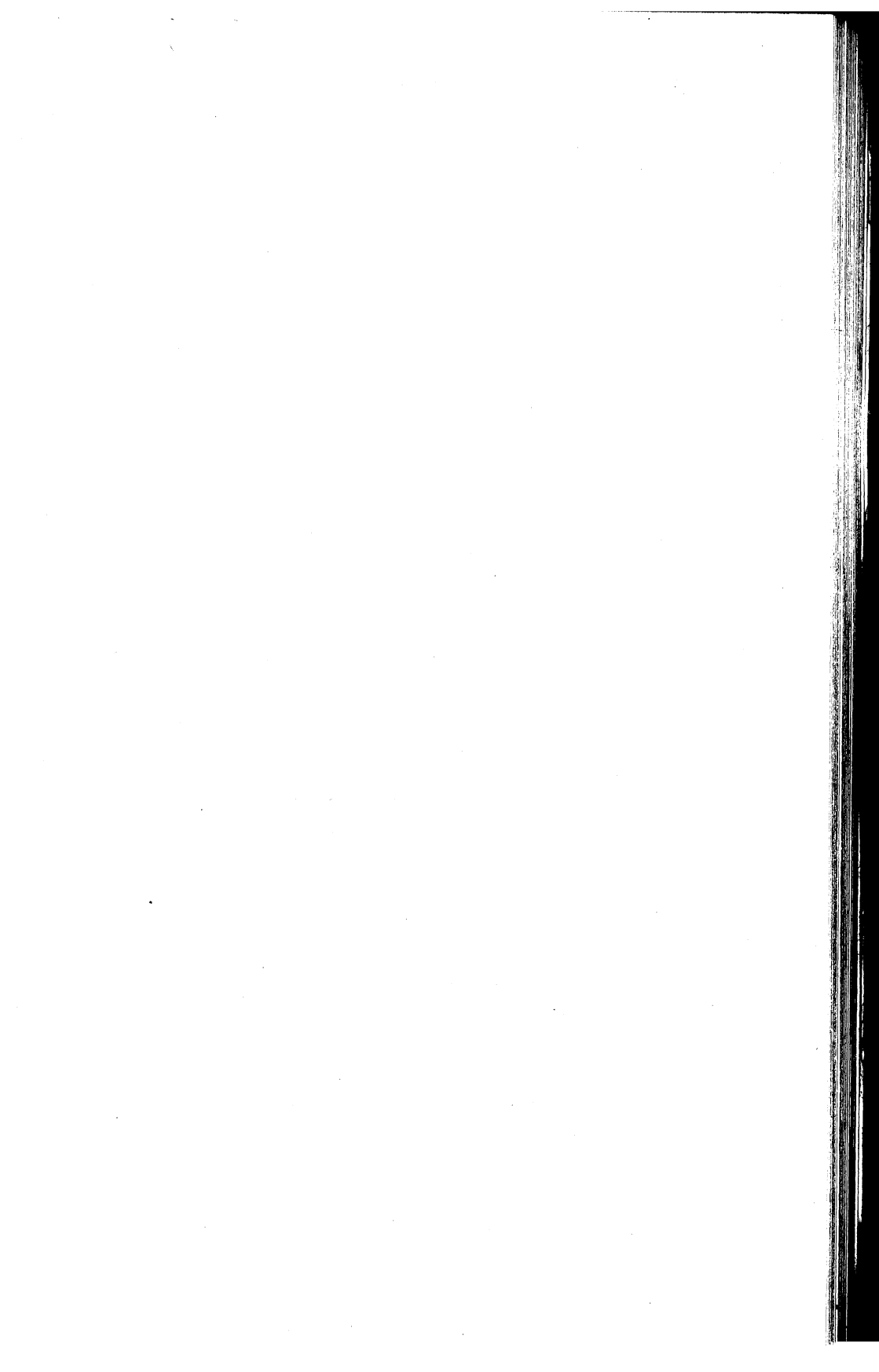

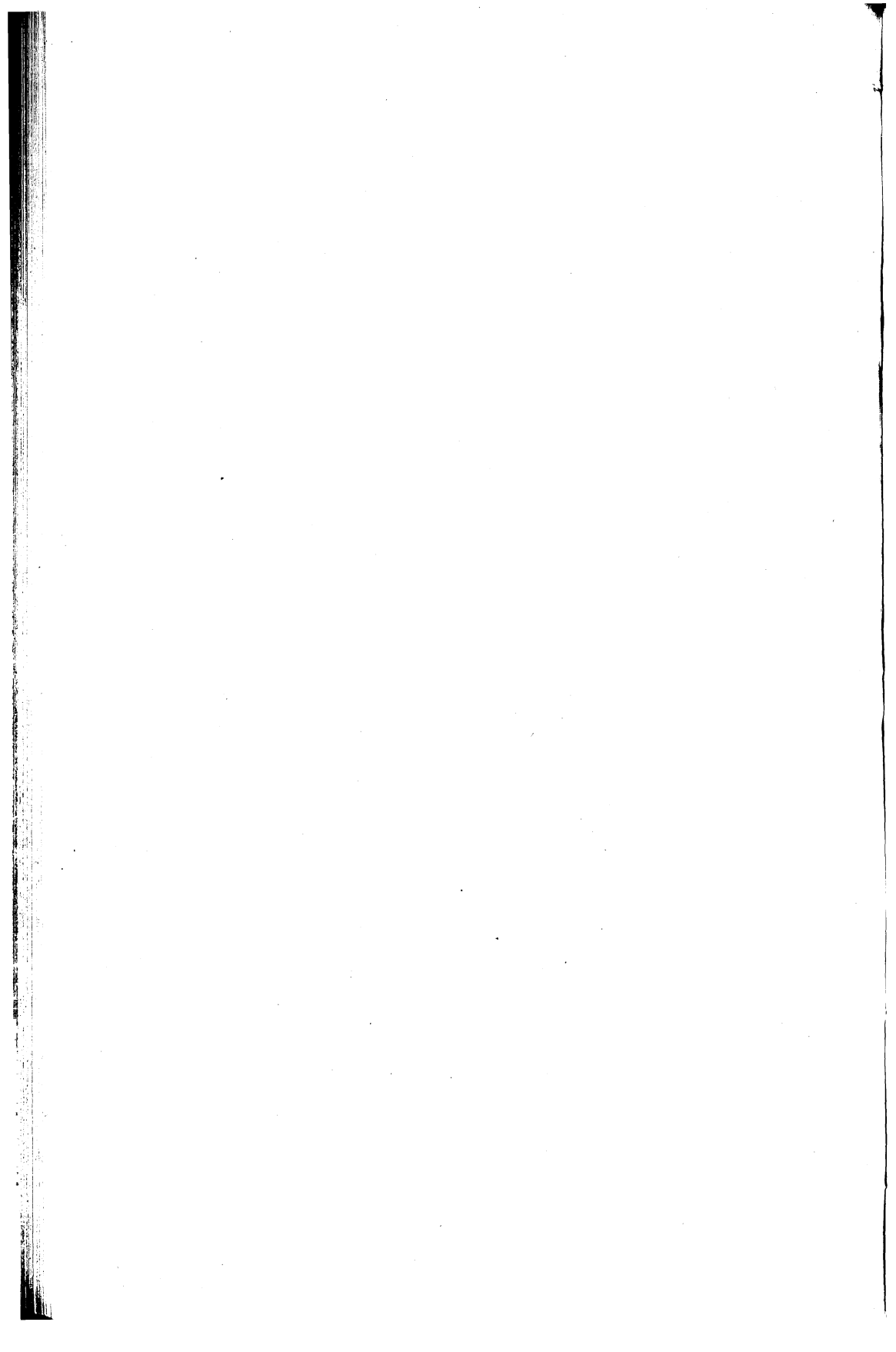
