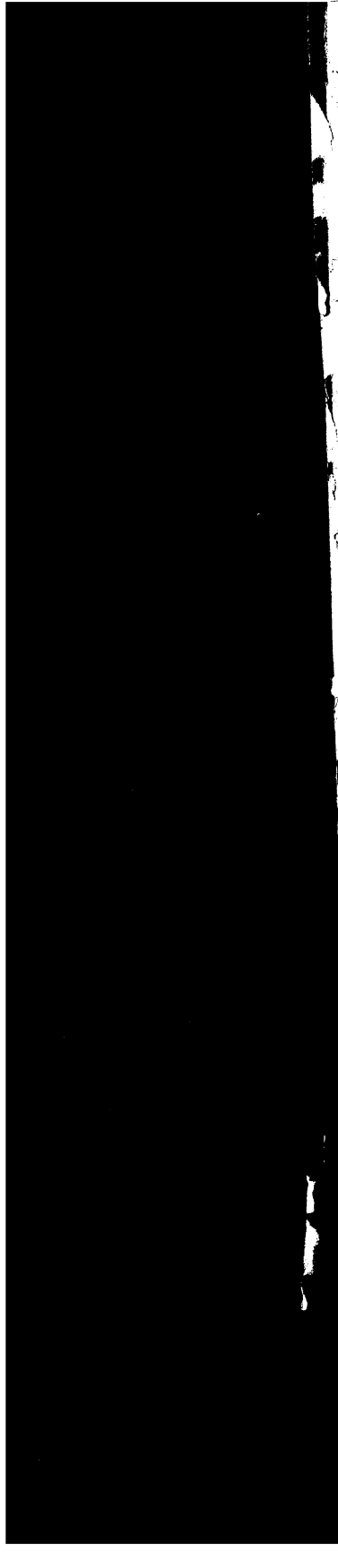

In Common Council, April 3, 1893.

CHARTER MEETING.

The clerk called the Board to order. Present—Ald. Tracy, McMillan, C. S. Cook, Callahan, Zimmer, Adams, Lempert, Fox, Johnston, Ashton, Ward, Dewey, H. G. Cook, Pauckner, Kelly, Aikenhead, Simmelink, Lewis, Forsyth, Bierbrauer.—20.

Ald. Fox moved that Ald. Lewis act as temporary chairman. Carried.

Ald. Lewis upon taking the chair thanked the board for the honor conferred upon him and asked its further pleasure.

Ald. McMillan moved that a committee of three be appointed to wait upon the mayor. Carried.

The chair appointed as such committee, Ald. McMillan, Dewey, and Ward.

Ald. Fox moved to proceed to the election of permanent chairman. Carried.

Ald. Fox nominated Ald. Adams for permanent chairman for the ensuing year.

Ald. Adams was named by Ayes.—Ald. Tracy, McMillan, C. S. Cook, Callahan, Zimmer, Adams, Lempert, Fox, Johnston, Ashton, Ward, Dewey, H. G. Cook, Pauckner, Kelly, Aikenhead, Simmelink, Lewis, Forsyth, Bierbrauer.—20.

Ald. Adams was declared duly elected chairman for the ensuing year.

Ald. Fox moved that a committee of three be appointed to escort the president to the chair. Carried.

The chair appointed as such committee Ald. Fox, Callahan and Kelly.

Ald. Adams thanked the Board for the honor conferred upon him and asked its further pleasure.

Ald. McMillan then introduced his Honor, the mayor, who spoke as follows:

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: In entering upon a new year of the city's political existence, it is customary for the mayor of the city to transmit to the Common Council what is styled as his annual message. In obedience to that custom I herewith submit briefly a synopsis of our city's financial condition and some observations on other subjects which I think are timely and worthy of your consideration during the coming fiscal year.

The finances of the city are in a better condition than people generally suppose. It is true we are in debt and getting deeper in debt, but when the East and West Side sewers are completed, when the new conduit to Hemlock lake is laid, when the bridges are built and certain street improvements are accomplished, the city will have something to show for its enormous outlay. These improvements must certainly give a great impetus to the growth of the city, and greater than all, will add to the health, comfort and happiness of all our citizens. From the figures given below it will

be seen that the actual burden of our debt is, after all, a light one. The annual interest to be paid on that portion of the bonded debt, which properly belongs to the city (\$8,040,000) is \$352,040. From this deduct the average water rent, or for example, the water rent of 1892, \$303,000, and we have only \$48,000 to be provided for in the tax levy. In other words, it costs each individual in the city about 33 cents a year to meet the interest on the present debt. The bonded debt of the city at 7 per cent. is \$4,130,000; at 3 1-2 per cent. \$1,950,000; at 3 1-4 per cent., \$1,000,000; at 3 per cent., \$550,000, making in all \$6,730,000. Of this amount the following is provided for: East Side sewer, \$500,000; Genesee Valley Railroad loan, \$108,000; sinking fund in savings bank, \$82,000; making a total of \$690,000, which deducted from the above leaves the city debt proper \$6,040,000. The additional amount authorized by law but not yet issued is \$1,900,000; of this the East Side sewer assessment will take care of \$500,000, leaving a balance to be added to the city debt proper of \$1,400,000. In other words, if all the bonds are issued, which are now authorized by law, the city debt will reach the sum of \$7,400,000. In 1903 the 7 per cent. water bonds will become due, amounting to \$3,182,000. If a new issue is made at half the present interest, the city will realize an annual saving of over \$111,000. If the taxpayer will study carefully the situation, nothing alarming will be discovered in our financial condition, compared with the great good which must necessarily come from the outlay already made and at present contemplated.

FREE PUBLIC BATHS.

As a result of the resolutions of the Common Council, August 23d last, referring the matter of public baths to the Board of Health and City Surveyor, the latter prepared plans and offered suggestions concerning the same which were presented to your honorable body.

Chapter 473, laws of 1892, says, "Any city, village or town may loan its credit or make appropriations of its funds for the purpose of establishing free public baths." Mr. McClintock estimates that two establishments would be adequate for all purposes, one to be located near Clarissa street bridge, on the west side of the river and the other near Vincent place bridge, on the east side of the river, and that the total cost be \$11,000. As the warm season is approaching, I would suggest that action be taken in this matter at an early day.

CITY HALL PLUMBING.

Some months ago a committee appointed by the Board of Health reported upon the unsanitary and dangerous condition of the plumbing in the city hall. Your attention was called to this report and the importance of remedying the defect pointed out. The matter was referred to the City Property Committee, but in the absence of the necessary funds, nothing was done. I trust provision may be made for these needed repairs at once.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The police department is considerably crippled in its work because of the limited number of men at its command. It is impossible to cover the ground well and give that protection and security to the lives and property of citizens which is required without an early increase of the force. I would recommend that the police commissioners be empowered to add to the present force at least twenty-five men. The subject of establishing precinct stations has occupied the attention of the Police Committee and the commissioners during the past year. No time should be lost in bringing about this much needed improvement, the necessity of which is, I believe, conceded by all.

CHOLERA.

The sudden appearance of a fatal type of Asiatic cholera at several of the large cities of Europe last year was the cause of much anxiety and alarm on this side of the Atlantic. It was quite naturally feared, in view of the extensive communication between the affected districts abroad and this country, that the germs of the dreaded scourge would find their way hither, and this calamity, it must be conceded, was only prevented by the prompt and decisive quarantine established by the authorities.

Cholera finds its way and spreads from along the channels of immigration and can only be confined or restricted by the most rigid methods of quarantine. It prevails most and is vastly more fatal where the conditions are favorable. The best authorities agree that in cities where the population is dense, especially in low, damp and filthy sections, where poverty, vice and intemperance exist, or where from any cause the vitality of the system is impaired or made feeble, the cholera poison, if introduced, would produce the greatest havoc.

On the other hand it is noted that the disease rarely prevails in localities where cleanliness and well ventilated dwellings are found and where the ordinary rules of sanitation are understood and practiced. Cholera generally enters the system through the agency of impure drinking water. The cholera bacillus is an animal poison and animal poisons are known to multiply with amazing rapidity when the conditions of heat, moisture, filth, etc., are present. In warm weather should a single bacillus of cholera find its way into one of our reservoirs through hemlock lake or its tributaries, the lives of all our citizens would be endangered. The experience of the people of Hamburg where the discharges from a single patient suffering from cholera had entered the river above the city, must not be forgotten in any community where the drinking water comes from a single source.

All rivulets and streams entering Hemlock Lake should be examined to their source and if outhouses, pig-pens or other causes of pollution be found on, or near any of them, provision should be made at once for their removal. Water can only be partially purified by filtration. To remove or destroy the microbes of typhoid fever, cholera, etc., it must be boiled. No filtering, however perfect, could render pure the water from the river or Bushnell's basin. The water from the Brighton wells is absolutely free from animal poison, and if sufficient can be had from this source for temporary use, the city is to be congratulated.

Last year the fear of an invasion of cholera quickened the vigor of the health authorities and nothing was left undone that could be done to place the city in a good sanitary condition. Before the exertion put forth to clean the city, Rochester was probably in as good a sanitary condition as any city in the country. Yet thousands of loads of filthy matter were gathered up from cellars, alleys and back yards and properly disposed of. The

present Board of Health is one of the most capable the city has ever had. At the beginning of the warm season it had a greater task confronting it than confronted any previous board. It did its work well and is competent to grapple with all future emergencies. The varied and peculiar work coming before the board for judgment and settlement requires the assistance of intelligent and capable subordinates. It will be the aim to improve in this direction in the future, and citizens can aid in the work by reporting all cases of failure or incivility on the part of the employes coming to their notice.

The existence of cholera in Marseilles and other places abroad at present makes it reasonable to apprehend that a dangerous and extended outbreak may take place at the incoming warm weather and possibly our own country may suffer from an invasion of the disease. In view of this, I deem it pardonable at this time to offer to house-holders a few suggestions, which, if observed, will be valuable at all times.

Cellars should be kept as dry and as free as possible from decomposing vegetable matter. Rubbish and material liable to putrefaction should not be allowed to accumulate in yards, sheds or out-houses. Once a week or once in two weeks a pound or half a pound of concentrated lye, dissolved in a pail of hot water and poured the last thing in the night into the sinks and closets and followed in the morning by a solution of chloride of lime or some other good disinfectant, will be found to answer a good purpose in keeping the pipes clean and pure. If citizens will observe these simple measures, or be guided by their physician in the observance of sanitary rules, little need be dreaded in Rochester should cholera reach our shores.

Although an unusual number of cases of scarlet fever, diphtheria and typhoid fever were reported during the year just ended, yet the mortality was comparatively light and the city was surprisingly free from the other ailments which usually prevail. The total number of deaths from all causes during the year was 2,650, while the year previous the number of deaths was 2,722.

Said Democrat and Chronicle to furnish without charge 150 copies of the Treasurer's detailed report in book form, bound in paper, and at the expiration of the year to furnish free of charge, in book form 200 copies of the official proceedings of the Common Council, bound in muslin, and 150 copies of the proceedings of the Executive Board, including indexes of each. Also to furnish free of charge copies of its daily issues as follows: One copy to each of the following departments viz: Mayor's office, Auditor's office, City Clerk's office, City Attorney's office, Poor office, Police office, City Surveyor's office, Treasurer's office, Municipal Court and Executive Board, and the city clerk's office the necessary copies containing the proceedings of the Common Council. The Mayor is hereby directed to enter into a contract with the proprietors of the Democrat and Chronicle in accordance with the terms of this resolution and in case the nominations for office be published but once, then the price for such publication shall be 60 cents per inch solid Nonpareil type.

Gentlemen:—I beg leave to call the attention of your honorable body to requirements for the proper administration of the affairs of this office, suggested by the experience of the past year in its work.

It is probably fair to assume that when this department was established, the act authorizing it, in placing the limit upon the auditor's salary, did not contemplate including necessary permanent or other help in performance of its duties.

It is my experience that the actual duties of the auditor in examination and investigating as to the validity of the large number of claims presented for audit, require his attention in the office and often outside, to a degree

allowing simply supervision of the recording and other clerical work.

The latter necessarily devolves upon and takes the time of a responsible and competent assistant, qualified to record, examine and prepare for the auditor's examination to pass upon, more than 5,000 claims of various kinds annually, against the city or the different bodies of our city government, and requiring an itemized monthly report of the same to each of these bodies.

It is evident that when the office was created in 1892, its actual requirements could not be anticipated, as they have now been practically demonstrated. I deem it proper therefore in view of the foregoing to suggest to your honorable body an examination into the methods, manner and amount of work now done and required in this office.

Its efficiency must necessarily be largely supplemented by competent assistance in aid of properly guarding and protecting the interests of all taxpayers. I would therefore respectfully ask your honorable body to consider the adoption of measures providing for such assistant or clerk with reasonable compensation to be paid exclusive of the auditor's salary, for the present fiscal year.

Whereas, Number three school building, situate on Tremont street in the second ward of said city, was built in the year 1854, and has been in constant service since, and much moneys having been expended for repairs and alterations thereon, until said building is now in such a worn out condition that further repairs or alterations would be false economy; and owing to the overcrowded condition of said school and the fact that an annex has become necessary for the accommodation of its pupils; and in consequence of the defective sewerage, water closets, poor ventilation and general unsanitary condition of said building, the good health of the pupils is endangered, and,

Whereas, The building committee of this board in its last annual report called attention to the unfitness and insufficiency of said building, and recommended that a special appropriation be sought, for the purpose of erecting, finishing and furnishing a new building; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Common Council be requested to unite with this board in the recommendation that special legislation be secured, authorizing the Common Council to levy a tax of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) in the general tax levy for the year 1893, in addition to the amount provided for by subdivision six of section 129 of the city charter, for the purpose of erecting, finishing and furnishing a new school building during the year 1893, upon the present site of number three, located on Tremont street in the second ward, of the said city of Rochester.

Resolved further, That the clerk of this board be instructed to transmit to the Common Council a copy of this preamble and resolution.

AN ACT to authorize the city of Rochester to levy a tax for the purpose of erecting a new school building.

The people of the state of New York, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Common Council of the city of Rochester is hereby authorized and empowered to levy a tax of thirty thousand dollars in the general tax levy for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-three, in addition to the amount provided for by subdivision six of section one hundred and twenty-nine of the charter of said city, for the purpose of erecting, heating and furnishing a new school building during the year eighteen hundred and ninety-three.

Section 2. Said amount of thirty thousand dollars shall be used for the construction, furnishing and finishing of a school building in district number three of the second ward of the said city of Rochester, upon the site of the one now located upon Tremont street in said city, and said additional building fund shall be used for no other purpose than as specified in this act.

Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT.

The street mileage in our city April 1, 1892, was 270 miles; 86 miles improved and 184 unimproved; of the former 24 miles were Medina stone, 15 asphalt, 3 brick, 24 macadam and 20 gravel. The expenditures for cleaning the 18 miles of asphalt and brick were \$13,766, or

an average of \$765 each mile. These were raised by local assessment, and in addition the property owners paying them were obliged to pay their full share of the general highway fund without receiving any direct benefit from it. The expenditures through the general highway fund were \$216,328, or 13 per cent. of the entire city tax. The cost of the sprinkling done was \$35,429, making the total expenditures for cleaning, repairing and sprinkling our streets, \$265,523. These expenditures have been steadily increasing during the last twelve years, in gross amount, amount per mile, amount per capita and percentage to real estate valuation; and in view of these facts, the adoption of the following resolution is urged:

Resolved, That the executive board be requested to advise this council at an early day in reply to the following queries:

First. Will it be practicable to clean and repair our streets by general contract in addition to sprinkling them?

Second. A.—What will be the probable cost per mile of cleaning the Medina stone pavements?

B.—The asphalt?

C.—The brick?

D.—The macadam and gravel?

E.—The probable cost per mile of repairing each of said pavements?

F.—The approximate outlay per mile upon unimproved streets?

Third. Why should not the expense of cleaning the asphalt and brick pavements be paid out of the general highway fund?

Fourth. If said work, in whole or in part, be done under contract, will any city interests be affected adversely, and if so, which and how?

Gentlemen:—The Executive Board has been requested by your honorable body to cause encroachments on Court street, at the approach to the proposed new bridge, between St. Paul street and the Erie canal, to be removed. Action in the matter has been delayed because of failure to find any representative of the property upon whom a notice, as required by the charter could be served with any legal effect. The owners or their representative are non-residents. It may, however, be stated, that the charter in such cases provides other methods of carrying out the proceedings; but, as in this instance it involves the removal of the entire end wall of the brick building on the south side of the street the expense of which will be quite large, the Board, therefore deems it prudent to proceed with care in a matter of this importance.

On the north side of the street a building of wood is located which is of primeval architecture; and, which if left standing in its dilapidated condition at the very gate to the proposed river bridge, a structure of magnificent proportions and beauty, and at a point of view of extraordinary interest, it would be a public shame and an impeachment of the intelligence and common sense of every public official who had granted any clemency to its longer existence.

It is therefore urged by the Executive Board

that your honorable body take proceedings to acquire this point of land that sweeps around South St. Paul street overlooking the aqueduct, to the end that the approach to your new Court street bridge may be attractive, and the thousands of dollars expended may result in mental as well as physical pleasure and delight.

We have taken under consideration the communication of the City Attorney, referred to this committee in respect to the inadequacy of the offices occupied by the law department and after a careful and thorough investigation of the matter, we are of the opinion that the one room now occupied is not sufficient for the men employed and the business done. The room is so small that when commissions or committees meet therein, it necessitates some of the employees to leave their desks and discontinue work until such meetings are ended

and the eight persons now attending to this department are so crowded as to hazard the necessary business in the office and the health of the employees. The business has greatly increased within the last few years and provision ought to be made to give each one of the attorneys a room to avoid interference in the work assigned to them.

We recognize the importance of having more room for all of the departments of the city and immediate steps ought to be taken by this council to remodel and enlarge the city hall to accommodate them within the building. In the prosecution of such work the room occupied by the law department will naturally be taken for elevator purposes and as available room outside can be best secured at this season of the year, we recommend that relief be at once given to this department by providing rooms outside of the city hall.

To justify this recommendation, we have made inquiries of the officials of some of the leading cities throughout the state and have learned that, in the city of New York, where the law department is divided into three bureaus, every bureau has quarters in a different building and all are outside of the city hall. In the city of Albany, the city attorney has his office outside of the city hall, which is also the case in the cities of Syracuse and Utica. We also find that the practical working of this department in these cities is not interfered with in any material manner whatever.

We have made inquiry as to a suitable location for such offices for the City Attorney, and have been able to secure the same in the Wilder building for the temporary occupancy of this department until action will be taken by this body looking towards a permanent enlargement of the city hall. We would, therefore, recommend that temporary provision for room for the law department be made immediately and that rooms be secured for it by the City Property Committee at a monthly rent of not to exceed \$120, and we recommend that the following resolution be adopted.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen:—Your Law Committee begs leave to submit the following report:

In the matter of the balance due upon Platt street bridge improvement, referred to this committee we, after a careful investigation, have learned that the actual expense of the bridge and its approaches over the estimate in the ordinance amounts to thirty-seven thousand and eight hundred and sixty-five dollars and fifty-two cents. There has been no provision for the payment of this amount, and we, therefore, recommend that this deficiency be paid by a local assessment, and that the City Surveyor be directed to prepare an ordinance for the payment of the same, pursuant to the provisions of the charter.

In the matter of the Church street assessment, referred to this committee, we report that we have had several meetings with the citizens' committee having the matter of this assessment in charge, and learn that in the computation of the interest by the City Treasurer errors were made which, in the opinion of the City Attorney, would invalidate the assessment now before this board. The expense as directed in the order for the reassessment is in excess of the true computation about \$75,000. A proposition has been made by the citizens assessed to order a reassessment for this improvement at the sum of one hundred and eighty-five thousand dollars with which the citizens are satisfied and the assessment will be paid after its confirmation. We, therefore, recommend that the order of reassessment heretofore adopted by this board be reconsidered and indefinitely postponed, and that a new order and resolution be adopted directing a reassessment at the sum of one hundred and eighty-five thousand dollars.

In the matter of the applications for appointment as Commissioners of Deeds, we recommend that the applications of the following named persons be granted: William H. Caldwell, George W. Davison, C. V. Grohs, William O'Kane, Edward Schaefer, J. E. Swanker, William S. Smith, Jr., Thomas W. Tait.

Statement of the Expenditures and Receipts Through its Different Funds, Summarized From the City Treasurer's Annual Reports.

BOARD OF EDUCATION STATISTICS.

By Ald. Johnston—Whereas, An analysis of the Board of Education expenditures and receipts through its different funds summarized from the city treasurer's annual reports shows

First, that the total expenditures of the board have increased from \$241,200 in 1882 to \$432,354 in 1892 or an increase per capita from \$2.42 in 1882 to \$2.98 in 1892.

Second, that while the expenditures, through the repair fund have increased from \$9,500 in 1882 to \$13,697 in 1892, there has been no increase in the per capita amount, and this fund appears to have been controlled remarkably well.

Third, the expenditures through the contingent fund have increased from \$29,663 in 1882 to \$100,140 in 1892 or from 29c per capita in 1882 to 69c in 1892.

Fourth, the expenditures through the teachers' fund have increased from \$106,534 in 1882 to \$274,860 in 1892, or from \$1.06 per capita in 1882 to \$1.90 in 1892.

Fifth, the receipts were \$63,720 in 1882, or 64c per capita. In 1890 they were \$99,693, or 74c per capita; in 1891 they were \$105,346, or 74c per capita, while last year, 1892, they were only \$63,204, or 44c per capita.

Sixth, the average number of pupils in attendance each year was 9,423 in June 1882; 10,546 in June 1884; 14,846 in June 1892, or an average running remarkably uniform through the series of years, of one to each ten of population.

Seventh, the number of teachers has increased from 275 in 1882 to 515 in 1892, and the average number of pupils to each has decreased from 34 in 1882 to 29 in 1892.

Eighth, the average salary of the teachers has increased from \$387 in 1882 to \$534 in 1892.

Therefore, Resolved, That the Finance Committee take under consideration the statistics in the accompanying table, confer with representatives of the Board of Education regarding them and furnish this council at an early day, information in reply to the following queries and any others that may suggest themselves:

First. What are the principal items and amounts included in the Contingent Fund of \$100,000?

Second. Will it be practicable to change the methods or system governing said expenditures whereby equally good service may be secured and said expenditures reduced?

Third. How are the salaries of the teachers graded, and if the salaries of the female teachers in service five years or more were made \$500 per year or upwards, how much of an increase would be needed for the teachers' fund?

Fourth. Is the number of teachers employed any larger than it should be to secure the best results and maintain a high standard of efficiency?

Fifth. What are the principal sources of the board's income and what is the reason for its being \$42,000 less last year than it was in 1891?

Gentlemen:—In the matter of the claim of Joseph W. Palmer, and James Palmer, Jr. for sewer damages to their property, we find, that an action has been begun against the city for such damages, and that the property owned by such parties has been materially damaged in several ways by reason of sewer pollution; the claim originally made by the parties was \$9,000.00; but after negotiations covering a period for a year or more we have finally been able to agree with said parties at the sum of \$1,500.00 in full settlement of all claims, we therefore recommend that their claim be settled at said sum of \$1,500.00.

In the matter of the claim of Drew, Allis & Co. for publishing the city ordinances in the city directory for the year 1892, we recommend that the sum agreed upon by the contingent expense committee for that year, namely \$100.00 be paid by this Common Council.

In the cases of Margaret Eaton, Anna Grosser, George Werner, Percilla Hunter and Arthur P. Crandall, architect to prepare a plan and furnish an estimate of the expenses of the remodeling of the city hall building, in order to provide roomier and more suitable accommodations for the various city depart-

departments of the city government, that are obliged to seek accommodations elsewhere, owing to the over-crowded condition of said building.

Your committee would submit herewith Mr. Crandall's statement of the proposed changes and estimate of their cost, and state that a copy of the plans will be left with the City Clerk for inspection during the coming week, and suggestions regarding room and occupations will be invited from the different departments.

Your committee would recommend the adoption of the plan in general as submitted, so that we may the more intelligently arrange for its execution in detail.

Concerning the exact arrangement and placing of the different offices and departments, your committee will consider them fully at the end of the ensuing week, after all parties interested have had an opportunity to inspect them, and they will report their further recommendations to this Council at its next regular meeting.

Regarding the method of paying for the work, your committee deems it advisable to recommend the issue of the city's bonds for the proposed expense in the amount of \$50,000, said bonds to be payable in ten years, and \$5,000 of them to be redeemed each year. Your committee also presents for adoption the accompanying resolutions.

Dear Sir:—I herewith present my estimate for the alterations of the city hall building. The extent and character of which are as follows:

To put in two first-class hydraulic elevators extending from basement to top floor; to divide the present city hall into two stories, by constructing one new fire-proof floor, supported on iron columns; to continue the present main stair-case to new upper stories and abandon the present stair-case to hall in fourth story, thus making two additional stories, 13'-6" and 13'-0" high, respectively. The alterations made on the present floors and the arrangements of rooms on the new upper floors are all represented on the accompanying plans. This estimate also contemplates the reconstructing of present plumbing and adding such new furniture as is indicated on the plans. It also provides for heating by steam, the two upper stories.

The proposed alterations are estimated as follows:

Two hydraulic elevators.....	\$12,000 00
Plumbing and heating.....	5,700 00
Iron work.....	7,500 00
Carpenter work and painting.....	8,200 00
Mason work.....	10,200 00
Marble work.....	3,472 00

Total\$47,072 00

In conclusion let me add, that while these figures are full and liberal, that in all repair work contingencies often arise which increase the estimated cost, and I would advise an appropriation of at least \$50,000 to do this work.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee, in submitting the annual tax levy for the year 1893 and 1894, begs leave to call the attention of the Council to the various items therein included.

The interest account for the year amounts to \$385,206.66, being \$28,666.66 greater than last year. This increase is caused by the sale of the water bonds to the amount of \$500,000, and sewer bonds for the East Side sewer to the same amount, and also by the sale of \$100,000 worth of Rochester bridge bonds. The interest item would have been very much larger but for the refunding of the bonds of

the city issued in aid of the construction of the Rochester and State Line railroad and the Rochester, Nunda and Pennsylvania railroad. The refunding of those bonds produced a saving to the city of about \$26,000. It will thus be seen, that though the bonded indebtedness of the city has been increased to the amount of \$1,100,000 within the past year, that the interest account has been increased but very slightly in proportion.

The park maintenance fund has been fixed at the sum of \$20,000 as usual. Your committee believes that this amount is absolutely required for the decent care and support of the parks already in existence. The item of \$2,457.31 for erroneous assessments is a material reduction over last year's appropriation for that purpose. Considerable credit is due the Assessment Committee of the last Board for the satisfactory condition of this fund. The item of \$1,374.98 for local assessments on city property is also a substantial reduction over last year's appropriation.

Your Committee, in considering the needs of the Police Department for the ensuing year has taken cognizance of the universal sentiment that the Police Department should be increased by the addition of new men. The amount needed for the maintenance of the Police Department, as now existing, was certified to your Committee as being the sum of \$145,000. An item of \$2,500 has been granted in addition to that, for the purpose of enabling the Department to place its patrol wires in the conduits heretofore constructed for that purpose, and the sum of \$5,000 has been added for the purpose of enabling the Department to increase the force. This amount, it is believed, will enable the police commissioners to add at least ten men to the patrol force of the city, and in that way to very much better provide for the police protection of the outside districts. In the judgment of your Committee, it is advisable that this additional appropriation be used for the purpose of increasing the number of night policemen, as the numerous complaints of lack of police protection have reference to the portion of the city in which no day force is maintained. It is to be hoped that the police commissioners will take this view of the situation and provide more night men for the force.

For the support of the Poor Department the appropriation has been reduced from \$17,000 to \$15,000 for this year. This amount, together with the receipts of the city from licenses, will undoubtedly be sufficient for that purpose for the ensuing year.

It will be noticed that the amount appropriated for the Contingent Fund deficiency is but \$55,000, as against \$75,000 appropriated last year for that purpose, and \$92,000 two years ago. This reduction indicates the care that has been exercised over the Contingent Fund, and speaks well for the vigilance of last year's committees.

Owing to the material reduction in the price of electric lights, secured by the lamp committee of last year, your committee has succeeded in reducing the appropriation from \$165,000 to \$160,000. This reduction is made, notwithstanding the substantial increase in the number of lights already made and contemplated for this year, together with the abolition of the incandescent lighting of the streets, and the substitution therefor of the arc system.

For the Board of Health your committee has decided to include an item of \$50,000. This increase is made necessary for the extension of the garbage collection districts, and the consequent increasing of the collecting force. The general public is unanimous in the desire to have the garbage promptly and thoroughly collected from all districts, and the Board of Health has recognized that sentiment, and has already employed a sufficient number of col-

lectors to properly do the work. It is believed that this amount will be ample for the year for that purpose, and that no deficiency notes will be required.

The increase in the City Property Fund from \$7,500 to \$11,000 this year, was made necessary by the fact that insurance policies on the various public school buildings of the city will expire on July 1st, and will have to be renewed. The premium on those policies amount to the difference between last year's appropriation and the appropriation allowed this year.

A substantial increase was made in the appropriation for the support of the Fire Department for the ensuing year. The amount appropriated last year was \$200,000. This year it is believed that \$232,500 will be necessary to maintain that department, and provide for the additional apparatus and engine houses that seem to be required. The erection of two new engine houses, as provided for in last year's tax levy, required the purchase of two new engines at a cost of \$8,000. In addition to that, the Executive Board has deemed it necessary to provide for the expense of two new trucks; one similar to the large Hayes truck, to be located on the east side of the river in a house to be erected, to take the place of the truck now on Belmont park, which has become inadequate for the uses for which it is required, on account of the widening of that street and the cutting off of several feet of the front of the building. The widening of that street, and the consequent destruction of the truck house thereon, necessitated an appropriation of \$20,000 for the purchase of a site and the erection of a suitable building to take its place.

It has also been deemed advisable to purchase sites for engine houses to be erected hereafter in the twelfth and sixteenth wards, localities which are not now sufficiently protected from fire.

An item of \$2,500 is also included for placing of the fire alarm wires in conduits already prepared for their reception. It is believed that these appropriations are justified by the growth of the city, and the tendency on the part of insurance companies to increase the rate of insurance, unless better fire protection is afforded. And it is with this fact in view that this increase in the appropriation is made. These items have been recommended very strenuously by the board of underwriters and the business men of the city.

The item of \$200,000 for Highway Fund it is believed will be sufficient for the year, and will enable the Executive Board to make the needed repairs upon the various streets, and also to properly clean the streets, and collect the ashes from the entire city. Heretofore the ashes have not been collected from the outlying districts, and many complaints have been caused on that account. Last year on account of the unusually heavy fall of snow and the dangerous condition of the streets it was necessary to make deficiency notes to the amount of \$50,000, to enable the department to promptly remove the snow and accumulations of ice. Unless some unforeseen circumstances should arise, and unless there should be another severe winter, your committee is of the opinion that the amount allowed in this year's tax levy will be ample for the purpose for which it is intended. It will be noticed that no item is inserted in the tax levy for the extension of water mains. The charter provides that surplus receipts from the Water Department, over and above the expenditures of that department should be used only for paying interest on the water debt, the extension of water mains and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption of the water bonds at maturity. The amount as estimated from this source by the Executive Board will be \$325,000. \$251,440 of this sum, as above stated,

has been applied upon the payment of the interest of the water debt. The balance, \$74,560, will be available for water extensions, and also if necessary, for the payment of the expense of procuring a temporary additional supply of water from the Brighton wells. An item of \$5,000 is also included in the tax levy to enable the Park Commissioners to begin the construction, at an early day, of a park boulevard, extending from Highland Park entirely around the east and north sides of the city to Seneca Park.

Various large property owners outside of the city, in the towns of Brighton and Irondequoit, expressed a willingness to donate sufficient land for the construction of a boulevard, 200 feet in width, just across the city line on the east, and the amount of \$5,000 is deemed sufficient, together with the moneys already in the fund heretofore appropriated, to do the work necessary within the city limits, to make the connection from Highland Park to the boulevard soon to be laid out by private parties. The advantages of such a boulevard will be apparent to every one, and the terms upon which the city is able to secure it are believed to be extremely advantageous.

Your committee has given very careful attention to the requisition furnished by the Board of Education for the support of the common schools of the city for the ensuing year. Public sentiment has seemed to indicate that the salaries paid to the teachers of the city are insufficient, and that an increase in those salaries is desirable. From the investigation which your committee has made, it appears that upon the last pay-roll of the Board of Education are the names of six hundred and nine teachers, including principals, Free Academy teachers, and teachers in the kindergartens. The Board of Education admits that there are five hundred and eighty-nine teachers upon the pay-roll. The average number of pupils enrolled is 18,258. It will thus appear that the average number of pupils to each teacher employed is very low, and while the salaries paid to teachers are also low, it is believed by your committee that the insufficiency of the salaries is caused to a very large extent by the employment of so many teachers. It is admitted by some of the commissioners in private conversation that there are about fifty to seventy-five more teachers on the pay-roll than are necessary, and if the number should be reduced by striking from the list all teachers not absolutely needed, your committee is confident that the saving thus caused would be sufficient to warrant a sufficient increase in salaries to the teachers. Notwithstanding this fact, and notwithstanding the fact that there may be a difference of opinion upon this subject, your committee has felt that it was bound to appropriate for the support of the teachers and the contingent expenses of the Board of Education only so much money as the charter itself permits. The maximum appropriation for those purposes is \$14 per capita, based upon the average number of pupils, and that amount is \$225,612. Your committee has allowed for those purposes the sum of \$255,612, and has divided that sum so that the amount available for teachers' wages for the ensuing year will be the same as was granted for that purpose last year, \$182,500. This leaves but \$73,112 available for the contingent expenses for the Board of Education for the ensuing year, and out of this money must be paid the expenditures for coal and other fuel, repairs to furnaces and stoves and salaries of officers and janitors, text books, supplies and printing; also expenses of the Free Academy. The claim is made by the committees of the Board of Education that this amount will be insufficient for their needs, and as an argument in support of that claim, they refer to the fact that there are large

numbers of unpaid bills left over by the Fuel and Fire Fixture Committee of last year. Your Finance Committee has been able to discover no good reason why the Board of Education should assume the expenditures of last year's Fuel and Fire Fixture Committee. The charter expressly provides that no committee shall under any circumstances contract a debt in excess of the amount of money at its disposal, and any bills contracted in excess thereof cannot be a valid claim against the Board of Education of this year. The charter also provides that the Board of Education shall at all times have in mind in its expenditures the amount of money available for the then current year. It seems to your Finance Committee that the Board of Education should pay heed to this provision of the charter, and should constantly have in mind the amount of money available for the expenditures of its various committees. If such attention were given, other boards would not have the disagreeable task of dealing with funds mortgaged by their predecessors. Various processes have been suggested, in the newspapers and otherwise, by which the provisions of the charter, relating to the maximum amount to be appropriated for teachers and contingent expenses, could be evaded. Your committee has seen no good reason why it should attempt to evade the law. The Council is not responsible for the provisions of law now existing, and your committee has not cared to put it into a position where it could be successfully assailed in the courts. At the same time, your committee has felt that the subject is of sufficient importance to warrant a careful investigation of the provisions of the charter upon the subject, and has called upon the City Attorney for his opinion thereon. The City Attorney has rendered such an opinion in writing, which is annexed and made a part of this report, and is it upon this opinion that the action of your Finance Committee is based.

There has seemed to be considerable difference of opinion in the Board of Education as to the necessities of the Building Committee for the fiscal year, and your committee has believed it necessary to carefully investigate for itself. It seems to be admitted very generally that a new building should be erected, or that substantial alterations and improvements should be made on the present site of No. 3 school. A special act of the legislature authorizes the Council to appropriate \$30,000 for the purpose of erecting such a building as may be needed at that location, and that amount has been included in the tax levy. In addition to that sum, your committee has allowed the sum of \$35,000 for additions to various schools, and for the purchase of sites. Your committee was impressed on its recent visit to No. 22 school with the necessity for a substantial addition to that building. An annex is now maintained, with an attendance of nearly two hundred pupils, and the expense for that purpose, for rent, and a separate janitor, amounts to about \$700 per year, which amount can be saved and the efficiency of the school can be promoted by the erection of the addition proposed. \$16,000 is the estimate for that addition, and should be expended for that purpose. The item of \$3,000 is allowed for the completion of the unfinished rooms of No. 10 school, and an addition of four rooms to No. 4 school, an expense of \$4,500, is believed to be advisable. An addition should also be erected at No. 21 school, the estimated cost of which is \$8,000. Some slight improvements are also required at some of the other schools, and a sufficient sum is included to cover the expense of making them.

In conclusion, your committee desires to express the conviction that the amounts al-

lowed for the various departments of the city government and committees of the Council will be ample, provided proper care is exercised over the expenditures. The practice of exhausting funds before the expiration of the fiscal year and coming to the Common Council for a deficiency appropriation, is a vicious one, and should not be encouraged. Expenditures will sometimes arise where these deficiency appropriations are absolutely necessary, but these expenditures should be of a rare occurrence.

Your committee desires to congratulate the citizens of Rochester upon the fact that although many substantial improvements have been made, and are now under way, the benefits of which the city has already begun to receive, and will undoubtedly experience to a very much greater extent in the near future, the tax levy is increased in gross by but \$58,000, and the tax rate, on account of the increase in the assessed valuation of the city will not be materially greater than last year. Of this increase, \$28,000 is in the nature of a loan to the east side of the river, in payments of interest on the East Side sewer bonds, which amount will be refunded to the city out of the first moneys collected from the territory benefited by the construction of the East Side sewer.

It will also be observed that the increase in the expenditures is in no way chargeable to the Common Council or its committees, a substantial decrease appearing in all of the funds of which the Council or its committees has control. With the refunding of the city's debt, which is now under way, and will progress from time to time as bonds mature, the interest account will begin to decrease very materially in the near future. When that refunding shall have been accomplished with the necessary increase in assessed valuation caused by the great improvements, which will at that time have been completed, your committee believes that the tax rate of the city will be very materially reduced from the present figures.

To the Finance Committee of the Common Council.

Gentlemen:—The questions submitted to me by your chairman are, as I understand them;

First, Whether the Common Council can certify to the Board of Education an appropriation for teachers' wages and contingent expenses in excess of the limitation, provided for by subdivision 6, section 129, of the city charter.

Second, Whether the Common Council is authorized by the charter to raise by loan during the current year an amount over and above such appropriation.

My answer to both questions must be in the negative. Sub. 6 of section 129, provides, that "the amount to be raised for teachers' wages and contingent expenses in any one year shall not be less than \$6, nor more than \$14, per capita, based on the average number of resident pupils enrolled in the several public schools of the city for the school year ending on the first day of May next preceding the levying of the general city taxes in each year." The superintendent of schools must furnish a sworn statement of such number of pupils, upon which your appropriation must be based. In your appropriation for repairing, building or enlarging the school houses, you are also limited to a fixed sum by the same subdivis-

ion. There is no ambiguity in the language fixing the limit of these appropriations. Section 133, of the charter, prohibits the Board of Education from expending or contracting for any amount beyond the above limited appropriation in the following language: "It shall be the duty of said board in all their expenditures and contracts to have reference to the amount of moneys which shall be subject to their order during the then current year for the particular expenditure in question and not to exceed that amount." I am therefore clearly of the opinion that it was the intention of the legislature to limit the appropriations for the Board of Education, and that no money shall be expended by the Board of Education beyond such limit.

The reason for my answer to the second question is that the charter gives the Common Council the power to raise money by loan in anticipation of the tax to be raised, collected and levied for the above limited appropriation. The language of the charter upon this point is that "the Common Council of said city is authorized and directed when necessary, to raise by loan, in anticipation of the taxes, the amount to be raised, collected and levied as aforesaid." This is added to the above subdivision. It does not give the Common Council authority to borrow money for an amount in excess of the amounts provided for in the same subdivision. It simply gives the Council power to borrow money, in the event that the taxes be raised, collected or levied for such appropriation have not yet come into the hands of the City Treasurer. The provision in section 81 of the charter does not give the Common Council authority to exceed the limit of the appropriation in subdivision 6 of section 129. Section 81 provides that "the Common Council has power to borrow money in the event that the amounts certified to by the Finance Committee to the Common Council shall prove insufficient to pay the expenditures of the several funds of the Common Council. The charter does not limit the amounts to be so certified and placed in the tax levy, but in the case of the appropriations of the Board of Education the charter expressly limits the amount and prohibits the Board of Education from making expenditures beyond the same.

Gentlemen: In compliance with your resolution of April 23th I have prepared and submit herewith an ordinance for the payment of the balance due on Platt street bridge and its approaches. The amount as found by your Law Committee is \$37,865.52 and, in the absence of more definite instructions I have made the accessible area all of the territory within the limits of the city excepting the lots and parcels of land lying south of Elmwood avenue, because I believe that to be the only just and equitable plan. When the original ordinance was under consideration the city undertook to determine what the cost of the improvement should be and upon that basis it was decided that the territory which was considered to be peculiarly benefited should pay a local assessment not exceeding \$10,284. Now the cost has been largely exceeded not because of building a better bridge, but as stated by your engineer, Mr. Buck in his letter published on page 328 of your Proceedings for 1892-93, because your agents designed and partly completed the bridge before doing what was their first duty to do, that is find out where the foundations could be placed. This could have been done most easily, and if it had been so done, it is not probable that the cost would have exceeded the estimate. Under the circumstances it seems obvious that the original ordinances should be looked upon as guaranteeing the local territory from any larger assessment than the amount named, and when one tries to fix the limits of a larger territory for a local assessment he is driven to the conclusion that the city limits form the proper limits.

To meet the suggestion that this amount might be paid from the fund created by the sale of bonds, it may be said that the following seems to be the condition of that fund.

ASPHALT PAVEMENT ON WILDER STREET.

By Ald. Zimmer—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of improving Wilder street.

Adopted.
 The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$24,000.

By Ald. Zimmer—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, viz:

The improvement of Wilder street, from Colvin street to Saxton street, by the construction of an asphalt pavement therein with a line of medina stone curb on each side thereof, properly connected with all lateral streets, alleys and driveways. Width of main roadway between curbs to be 28 feet. Also the construction of the necessary crosswalks, manholes, surface sewers, lot laterals, water and gas services, the extension westerly of the present main sewer and cleaning of the same.

And Whereas, The City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at \$24,000, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, that the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for the whole expense thereof, viz:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Wilder street, from Colvin street to Saxton street, in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom.

PLATT STREET BRIDGE.

Excess of actual cost above estimate in Final Ordinance No. 3,574

Whereas, Said bridge has been completed, and the Law Committee of this Council did report on April 28, 1893, that after careful investigation they had learned that the actual expense of the bridge and its approaches over the estimate in the ordinance amounts to thirty-seven thousand eight hundred and sixty-five dollars and fifty-two cents (\$37,865.52) which said amount of excess above estimate is

hereby approved and is hereby directed to be assessed upon the following portion and part of the city, which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for, and will be benefited by and derive an advantage from such bridge, to wit:

The entire area within the limits of the city as now existing, excepting the lots and parcels of land lying south of Ellwood avenue. On which above described lots and parcels of land the whole expense of said improvement above the estimate is hereby ordered assessed, the assessment upon each lot or parcel of land to be in proportion to the benefit which each derives therefrom.

And the Clerk is hereby directed to publish notice in pursuance to Title VII, Section 172, of the revised charter of the city of Rochester. Adopted.

The improvement of Kirk street, from North street to Scio street, by the construction of a medina stone pavement therein, with a line of medina stone curb and gutter on each side thereof properly connected with all lateral streets, alleys and driveways. Width of main roadway between curbs to be 24 feet. Also the construction of the necessary manholes, surface sewers, lot laterals, water and gas services, crosswalks and crosswalk extensions and main sewers. Also the construction of a 5-foot Portland cement walk on each side of the street between the limits mentioned, except where good flag or cement walks now exist, which walks shall be relaid if not conforming to the proper grade and alignment. Also the cleaning of the main sewers in the street if found to be necessary.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Education of this city, held on the 15th day of May instant the following report, estimate and certificate were adopted.

To the Board of Education:

Gentlemen: Your Finance Committee in connection with the several members of the Apportionment Committee, has made the necessary estimate of money to be raised by the Common Council for the support of the public schools for the current fiscal year ending March 31, 1894, and we hereby submit the same for your action.

The committees having in charge expenditures payable from the Contingent Fund have submitted in detail the items comprising that account. The estimates in all funds are based upon a careful calculation of the necessities of the schools for the year.

The extended and continuing growth of our city naturally involves increased school expenses. In making the following estimate we have taken into consideration the balances now on hand, and the amounts which will probably be received from the state and all other sources.

We ask only for the payment of the expenses incurred between April 1, 1893 and March 31, 1894. We do not include the payment of obligations incurred by former boards or committees or members of former boards.

There is included in the estimate for Teachers' Fund the sum of \$19,300 for the purpose of increasing the rate of wages \$100 per year to those who have taught more than ten years in our public schools, and \$50 per year to those who have so taught more than five and less than ten years.

Your committee takes this occasion to say we believe every member of this board is in favor of increasing the compensation paid our instructors, but before this can be done to any large extent an amendment to the provisions of the city charter will be necessary.

Of the sum \$223,627, the Council has already anticipated and passed to our credit \$78,000. In case we cannot meet the total increase of wages above mentioned it is to be hoped that the Council may grant sufficient to increase the 275 teachers who have taught or will have taught within the year five or more years at least \$5 per month.

In regard to the amount asked for in the Library and Repair Funds, but little need be said. These necessities are self-evident.

As to the Building Fund we beg to remind you that we are now renting 15 annexes to accommodate pupils in over-crowded districts, paying about \$3,700 for the same. Every consideration requires a different policy. We have therefore concluded to ask for an appropriation of \$74,000 for building purposes to be expended as follows:

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: The undersigned President of the Union Market Company of Rochester respectfully represents and states to your honorable body that the Market Company has secured about three acres of land on the northerly side of East Main street near North Union street for the purpose of opening and establishing thereon a public market for the use and accommodation of market gardeners, florists, fruit producers and farmers who have hitherto resorted and at present resort for the sale of their products to the streets of the city in the vicinity of East Main and North streets and East avenue. The recent action of the Common Council or of the city officials in excluding all market transactions from East avenue, and the fact that East Main street is soon to be torn up for the construction of the East Main street sewer and for the re-pavement of the street, so that while the improvements are being made it will be impossible for market transactions to be continued there, these and other circumstances combine to make an absolute necessity for a new market place where at least the early morning market business between the hundreds of gardeners and fruit producers and farmers and the like hundreds of grocers and other city dealers can be transacted; and the property owners in the locality is called, say that as soon as the street improvements mentioned above are completed they the property owners will be combined to prevent the return of the market wagons and market business to the streets in front of their properties. The Union Market Company is willing to take the financial risks of furnishing a new place for these transactions if the proper favor of the City Council and City Officials is extended to the company in the matter and the undersigned requests and petitions your honorable body to take such action in the matter as may be deemed advisable. The company will conform to all

reasonable regulations as to the proper conduct of the market which the Common Council may make and the undersigned respectfully suggests that your appointment of a committee to confer with the company will assure results that will be satisfactory to the Common Council, to the gardeners and farmers and to the citizens of Rochester.

 To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: In compliance with your resolution of May 2d, I beg leave to submit the following report upon the feasibility of constructing an outlet sewer through Vincent place, from North St. Paul street to the Genesee river, with a view to the relief of the North St. Paul street, Lowell street, and other sewers in that vicinity.

The present sewer in North St. Paul street, from Lowell street northerly to Scrantom street is a stone stone box sewer 2 feet wide by 3 feet high, with a fall of three inches per 100 feet, from Lowell street to the manhole, 34 feet south of the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg railroad. The capacity of this sewer when running full does not exceed 23 cubic feet per second.

When there is a heavy rainfall, the sewer is not large enough to carry the water without becoming surcharged, with the result that water backs up into the cellars of the Bausch & Lomb Optical Company, Brinkers block and some of the houses on Lowell street.

While this does not occur very often as yet, it will become more troublesome as the area drained by the sewer is to a greater extent covered with impervious roofs and pavements.

The following appears to be an absolute demonstration that the St. Paul street sewer should set the water back into neighboring cellars and that the trouble will be greater.

Mr. Knichling in his report on the East Side Trunk Sewer, gives the observed discharge from three districts, as follows:

North avenue district with an area of 129 acres gave a discharge of 71.26 cubic feet per second, which is equal to 0.55 cubic feet per second per acre, at this rate the area drained by the North St. Paul street sewer, which is about 87 acres south of the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg railroad, would discharge 48 cubic feet per second, which is more than double the capacity of the sewer.

The East Main street district with an area of 25 acres gave a flow of 0.84 cubic feet per second per acre, and at this rate the St. Paul street district would discharge 73 cubic feet per second, or more than three times the capacity of the sewer.

The Griffith district of 92 acres which is similar in character and extent to the St. Paul street district, discharged 27 cubic feet per second, and then the sewer became surcharged so that the additional amount which was considerable, could not be measured.

My conclusion is that the cheapest plan for improving the North St. Paul street sewer is to carry a storm overflow to the river through Vincent place, and that the cost would be about \$4,000.

It would be necessary to acquire an easement across the land of the Gas Company, from the east abutment of Vincent place bridge to the river, because the right of way which the city holds for the bridge is bounded by lines drawn by the north and south ends of the piers.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Action upon the ordering of an assessment for the opening of a street from State street to Sophia street came up.

Ald. Lewis presented the following:
By Ald. Lewis—Whereas, The Common Council upon the 22nd day of March, 1881, did duly enact an ordinance for the opening of a street from State street to Sophia street in said city, and,

Whereas, The amount of the damages for the taking of the lands and premises necessary for said street has been ascertained to be the sum of \$145,656.13, and the sum of \$1,415 has been received for material sold and credited to the fund for the opening of said street, leaving the amount necessary to be assessed for the same, the sum of \$144,241.13, and

Whereas, The portion of said city which said Common Council deemed would be benefited, and should be assessed for said improvement, is described as follows:

Namely, The entire first ward; also all that portion of the second ward bounded on the east by the Genesee river, on the west by Sophia street, lying south of the south line of Centre street, and,

Whereas, The said Common Council did on the 23d day of January, 1883, duly assess said last mentioned amount upon the lots and parcels of land within the territory above described, and did designate John Lutes, E. J. Gallentine and E. L. Pottle special assessors to make an assessment upon the lots and par-

cells of land as required, and in the manner required by the charter of the city of Rochester, and,

Whereas, The said special assessors duly filed the assessment roll for said improvement, and after hearing of the allegations and proofs of all persons complaining of said assessment who appeared, the said assessment roll was by said Common Council duly confirmed, and,

Whereas, By a judgment of the supreme court, affirmed by the court of appeals, in an action in which Frank W. Elwood was plaintiff and the city of Rochester and Ambrose C. McGachlin, as treasurer of said city, were defendants, said assessment imposed as aforesaid was vacated and set aside and the same declared illegal and void for want of jurisdiction in making the assessment, and,

Whereas, The City Treasurer has ascertained and reported the entire and aggregate expense of and connected with said improvement, including the interest on said assessment to the date of this re-assessment, and any and all interest that the city has paid, or has or shall become liable to pay on account of any or all orders, notes or bonds issued by the city to pay the expenses of said improvement, to be the sum of at least \$185,000, now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That a re-assessment for said improvement for said sum of \$185,000 be made. Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee, begs leave to file the following report on the matters heretofore referred to it.

In reference to the application of the park commissioners for the appointment of special policemen for preserving order in the public parks, your committee has given careful consideration of the matter, and has concluded that under the provisions of the existing law, the Common Council has no power in the matter. The statute under which the park commission is created gives to the commission full power to appoint special officers for park purposes. Your committee has been impressed with the necessity of providing special policemen for the parks and for the purpose of enabling the commissioners to appoint the suitable officers, has determined to recommend that the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) be placed to the credit of the Park Commissioners out of the Contingent Fund, for the purpose of meeting the expenses of the employment of such special officers.

Your committee has recommended that the sum of \$8,600 be fixed as the amount necessary for the employment of clerks in the City Treasurer's office; last year the amount expended for that purpose was \$8,870, but it is believed that the sum above mentioned will be sufficient for the coming year.

The condition of the Bridge Fund requires that bonds be sold in the immediate future for the purpose of meeting the payment of the several bridges now under construction, and for that purpose the City Treasurer is authorized to sell \$150,000 worth of Rochester bridge bonds or so much thereof as your Finance Committee shall determine to be necessary. In accordance with the provisions of the statute authorizing such sale.

With regard to the communication of his honor the Mayor, in reference to the compensation to be paid the members and clerk of the Civil Service Board of Examiners, Schedule B, part 2nd, your committee have given the matter careful investigation and believe that the great amount of work done by the board and its clerk entitle them to greater compensation than they are now receiving and would therefore recommend that the increase be granted.

The city at first paid \$3.50 per week for the keeping of this child, but since about February, 1892, the city has been compelled to pay \$4.50 per week, but your committee believing that this child could be kept for less money, at a previous meeting submitted the matter to the Overseer of the Poor to report back, the overseer reports that the city can make arrangements with St. Mary's Orphan Asylum of this city to keep this child, together with another child who is also an imbecile, and who is being kept in the city at an expense of \$3 per week, at an expense for both children of \$5 a week, that is to say \$2.50 per week each.

Your committee therefore recommends that the said Edwin Summers be removed from the said Brunswick Home for Idiots to this city, and that a contract be made with the St. Mary's Orphan Asylum for his care and maintenance at an expense not to exceed \$2.50 per week, and that the Overseer of the Poor be authorized to incur the necessary expense in the removal of said Edwin Summers to the City of Rochester.

My Dear Sir—During the past current year of the Common Council I called the attention of the chairman of the Finance Committee and the City Treasurer to Section 4 of the East Side Trunk Sewer Act, relating to the assessments for the payment of the interest on the bonds, and the bonds themselves, for the construction of the East Side Trunk Sewer.

Whereas, The number of dogs in the city of Rochester has greatly increased, and cases are reported at the office of the Humane Society of children attacked on the street by stray dogs, and there is now no authorized method for the destruction of unmuzzled dogs found on the streets.

The Humane Society respectfully submits the following proposition:

If the city of Rochester will designate a proper place for a dog pound the Humane Society offers to take all supervision of the city dogs and the apprehension of the dogs, feeding same and the apprehension of the dogs, charging and killing them in a humane manner, charging the city only the actual cost thereof.

During the month of May, 36 dogs were killed at the shelter and the number will increase. It is not the proper place for this work and arrangements ought to be made at once for the proper detention and killing of dogs outside of the thickly settled portion of the city.

We further certify that there has been set durable stone monuments so located as to actually define each and every angle of said street, by placing the same in the sidewalk thereof at the intersection of the lines parallel with and four (4) feet distant from the lines of said street, forming said angles; said monument is four (4) feet in length, eight (8) inches square at the bottom and four (4) feet in square at the top, and carefully dressed at top and for nine inches down from top on all sides, the said stones is so set in the ground that the top surfaces thereof conform to and the flush with the established grade of the sidewalk at the point where said stone is set; the point where said intersection of lines shall occur is definitely marked by a tapering hole in the top surface of said stones one-half inch in diameter at top and not less than one-half inch in depth. We further certify that we are the owners of said Warwick avenue, so called, and that the premises above dedicated, are free from all incumbrances of every name and nature.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your City Property Committee would submit the following statements and report upon the city hall building:

The building was built in 1873, twenty years ago, at a cost of \$335,000, and paid for by issuing the city's bonds for that amount, bearing interest at seven per cent. The city hall, in the fourth story, occupies forty per cent. of the area surface in the building, and, during the past ten years, or since the time that elevators have come into general use, it has been seldom used, and is now practically abandoned by the people generally, because of its inaccessibility. It is sadly in need of repairs, none of which have been made in years, and its condition is not at all creditable to our city. The other sixty per cent. of area surface is distributed equally over the three lower stories, and the present apportionment of the offices is nearly identical with the one made when the building was first occupied. Meanwhile, the city's population has increased from 75,000 to 145,000, and the volume of business through the different city departments has grown correspondingly. To illustrate and show the need of the different offices for more room and better accommodations, we would cite the following facts:

In 1873 we had no board of health. Now the health department occupies the entire lobby room of the mayor's office and is still crowded for room. The treasurer continues to occupy the original office, although the business of his department and clerical force have more than doubled. The police department occupies its original quarters, and its membership has increased from sixty officers and six detectives, in 1873, to 140 officers and eight detectives now. Superintendent Cleary and Chief Hayden have for the transaction of their official duties, only a twelve by fifteen foot room, and the detectives have, for their quarters, another room of the same size, so located that it is impossible for the sun to shine in it, or to see in it by daylight—a veritable disgrace to our city. The present executive board offices are comfortable. The water department needs more room badly. The street department has recently transferred considerable of its business to the new Pinnacle avenue quarters, and its present office accommodations are ample. The assessors continue in their original office, while their business and clerical force has doubled. It is a single room, 22 by 32 feet, and is all the space they have for their clerical force of five lady assistants, themselves, and the callers that continually visit their office. The need of more room and better accommodations for this department is apparent. The surveyor's office remains unchanged also. It is crowded, and inadequate to the demands of a constantly increasing public service, and the need of more room and better accommodations is urgent. The city attorney's office was so inadequate for the increased force and service of the department that it recently had to be abandoned. The offices occupied by the city clerk, messenger, fire marshal and auditor are the ones formerly used by the executive board. There is not a single redeeming feature about them, excepting their location. They are crowded, inadequate and lacking entirely in the desk room and other accommodations necessary to the proper transaction of the business of their departments.

The third story is fully occupied by the common council chamber, the municipal court and water engineering department.

This accounts for all available space in the building in its present condition. In addition, the following departments occupy offices elsewhere: The law department, in the Wilder building; the East Side Trunk Sewer commissioners, the engineering department for the new water conduit, and the park commissioners, in the German Insurance Company building; the West Side Sewer commissioners, in the Ellwanger & Barry building; the board of inspectors of plumbing, in the Durand building, and the Civil Service commissioners wherever they may be invited.

The monthly rental paid for these rooms is as follows:

Or \$3,855 a year, the latter being sufficiently large to be the equivalent of five per cent. interest upon an investment of \$77,000.

The need of more room for our city officials is imperative, and admitted by every intelligent observer. How to best secure it is the problem?

Two general places have been proposed. First the one embodied in your committee's original report, under date of May 16, 1893, recommending the remodeling of the present building; and, second, to let the city hall remain undisturbed and build two wings, say 50 by

80 feet, each, and a corridor across the present area, connecting with the new court house; said wings to conform in building material and architecture to the proposed new building.

In support of the first, or original committee plan, it may be said, that the dimensions of the building are 85 by 140 feet, and the making of two stories out of the city hall will add nearly 24,000 square feet of floor surface, which, with the assistance of elevators, will be available for office purposes.

Your committee has already conferred with all the department officials, and secured their written approval of offices assigned, as follows:

FIRST STORY.

Northwest quarter section—Water rent office.
Southwest quarter section—Treasurer's office.
(This to be rearranged so as to afford better accommodations and a little more room.)

Northeast quarter section—Police assembly room.

Southeast quarter section—Police court room.

SECOND STORY.

Northwest quarter section—Executive board rooms.

Southwest quarter section—City clerk, messenger and auditor.

Northeast quarter section—Mayor and Board of Health officials.

Southeast quarter section—Superintendent of police and detectives.

Northwest quarter section—Water engineer's office.

THIRD STORY.

Southwest quarter section—Municipal court and judges' rooms.

East section, entire—Common Council and police matron's rooms.

FOURTH STORY.

Northwest quarter section—Street department.

Southwest quarter section—Assessors' office.

Northeast quarter section—Surveyor's office.

Southeast quarter section—Surveyor's office and police commissioners.

FIFTH STORY.

Northwest quarter section—New water conduit and engineer's office.

Southwest quarter section—City Attorney's office.

Northeast quarter section—Park commissioners' rooms.

Southeast quarter section—West Side Sewer Commissioners; the Civil Service Commissioners and Board of Plumbing Inspectors.

This assignment of offices provides enlarged and ample accommodations for every department of our city's government. No provision is made for the East Side Trunk Sewer Commissioners, as it is expected that their work will be nearly, if not entirely, finished by the time our building will be remodeled and completed. Neither the West Side Sewer, or the New Water Conduit offices will be permanent, and their release will afford additional room.

Under this re-arrangement, the building will fully provide room for all city purposes during the next ten or fifteen years, and, by that time, arrangements will, undoubtedly, be made to provide the police department with a separate building, and, if so, the present city building will then be adequate for many years.

The remodeling proposed, including elevators, furniture, new plumbing, heating apparatus and other needed repairs, can be consummated for \$50,000, and with it the building will be as good as new, and the city will save the annual rental of \$3,855 that it is now paying for outside offices.

The other plan is to build two wings at either end of the city hall building, across,

and to connect with the proposed new county building. The distance between the city hall building and the new county building is estimated at 80 feet, and it has been suggested that the wings should be at least 50 feet wide, with a corridor or passageway between, and a court area overhead. These dimensions will add 32,000 square feet of surface area, while the additional area surface to be secured through the adoption of the former plan is 23,800 square feet.

This plan may have its advantages, but it also has serious disadvantages. We see very few of the former, for, with wings only fifty feet wide, the rooms, after making allowance for hallways, will be long and narrow, not exceeding say eighteen or nineteen feet in width, while those in the lower stories will be poorly lighted and ventilated. Its disadvantages are numerous, and many of them of such a nature as to appear insurmountable. Some of them are as follows: They will seriously interfere with the light to the two tiers of offices at either side of the city hall corridor, such, for instance, as the present board of health office, the executive board's general office, the water engineer's office and the draughting room in the surveyor's office. The connecting hallways will compel a radical rearrangement of the present city building offices, they will make necessary a complete rearrangement of the common council chamber, and destroy entirely the present police assembly room. This latter will be equivalent to ejecting the police department out of the city building, and should not be lost sight of.

The floors of the two buildings cannot connect on the same level, and if the supervisors insist upon their being even at the county end of the wings, and they naturally will, the levels will then have to be adjusted by steps or stairways through the city building, and this fact alone ought to demonstrate the impracticability of the plan.

It may be urged that the wings should be either narrower or wider than the fifty feet proposed, but a moment's reflection will show that, if narrower, say 40 or 45 feet, they will not add any more floor surface than will be gained by utilizing the city hall, and much of what they would add will be unavailable for practical use. Should they be made wider—say 55 or 60 feet, a correspondingly additional amount of floor surface in the present building would be rendered useless, for want of light, and, consequently, there would not be anything gained.

These may be termed some of its architectural disadvantages. Should, however, the plan still be deemed a wise one, it will be found very expensive. The estimated cost of the land is \$45,000. Of the two wings and corridors, computed ratably by area surface upon the estimated cost of the new court house, \$175,000; for new heating apparatus, \$2,500; for new halls, stairways and remodeling the old building, \$5,000; for repairs to city hall, including new ceiling, painting and repairs to roof and ventilating flues, \$5,000; plumbing repairs, \$5,000; for furnishing the new wings, \$5,000; aggregating the sum of \$242,500. This does not include any charge for elevators, and the old hall will still remain unused, and inaccessible, excepting only the times when the court house elevators may be placed at the city's disposal, through the courtesy of the supervisors.

The other items in addition to land and building are recognized, because they are included in the architect's estimate of \$50,000 for remodeling the old building, according to the committee's original report, and should properly be considered in comparing the cost of the two plans.

In concluding, we may say, that the questions at issue narrow themselves down to the disposition of the city hall, for it is shown

conclusively that fully as much floor surface will be made available by utilizing it for office purposes as can be secured by wing additions. Architecturally, the present building is a fine one, creditable to its builders, and our city. Its location for outward appearance is not the best, but for light and air it is excellent. The proposed wings are sure to spoil its looks, obstruct its light, and interfere with its ventilation. It cost, twenty years ago, without elevators, \$335,000, and, as yet, not one penny of this amount has been paid. Meanwhile, the upper portion of the building has been neglected, and but very little money spent in general repairs.

Shall we, by the expenditure of not exceeding \$50,000, repair, remodel and utilize the entire building, which is amply large, and retain it distinctively as our city hall building, in a better condition than it has ever been, or shall we co-operate with the county, build wings, at an expense of \$243,500, and, in so doing, make our city hall building a mere annex and leave it irretrievably ruined?

Your committee prefers the former plan.

MONROE COUNTY COURT—In the matter of removing the remains of all persons interred in the Brighton Cemetery, so-called, in The City of Rochester, to Mount Hope Cemetery, or other cemeteries in said city.

The undersigned, who were appointed by an order of the Monroe County Court, duly granted and entered on the 17th day of April, 1893, commissioners to inquire into and determine what damage, if any, the several owners of lots in said cemetery and lands would be entitled; also, to inquire into and determine what damage, if any, any person or persons owning or having interest in fee, reversion or remainder in any estate in said cemetery lands, direct or contingent, would be entitled by reason of the taking of said lands; and, also, the damages for or probable cost of, the removal of the bodies exhumed, and the monuments, stones or other marks designating their place of burial, would be entitled by reason of the removal of the remains of all persons interred in the Brighton Cemetery, so-called, to Mount Hope Cemetery, or other cemeteries in said city, pursuant to the provision of chapter 223 of the laws of 1893, and the resolution of the Common Council of the city of Rochester, duly adopted on the 28th day of March, 1893, respectfully report and certify their award of damages, as incident to the removal of the remains of all persons interred in the Brighton Cemetery, so-called, as aforesaid, and the acquirement of the lands heretofore used and occupied by said Brighton Cemetery by the city of Rochester for public school or other purposes, as hereinafter set forth, the awards for damages for taking said lands being made separately and apart from the awards made for removing the remains, and the names of the persons to whom said awards are payable being set forth in each instance, and the amount of the award being specified in each instance.

Gentlemen:—Under your directions we devised a plan for disposing of the sewage from the county buildings, state hospital and the portion of the city south of the summit of Mt. Hope. The state officials have approved of the plan and have secured an appropriation of \$8,500 toward paying their share of the expense. The Board of Supervisors have approved of the plan and have voted to give a right of way for the sewer through the land of the county.

In order to build the sewer it will be necessary to secure a right of way through land of Ellwanger & Barry, lying south of Highland avenue and also north of said avenue; also through Highland park and land of Charles Barton. It seems probable that a right of way will be given by Messrs. Ellwanger & Barry and Barton, provided it will be graded so as to form an extension of South Goodman street south to Highland avenue.

As the proposed sewer is designed to carry sewage only and not storm water, it is evident that the county should pay a large proportion of the whole cost on account of the number of people occupying its buildings.

As it is a case where it is difficult to prepare an ordinance which will properly apportion the cost of sewer and right of way, I recommend that your honorable body appoint a committee of three members and invite the Board of Supervisors to appoint a similar committee from their body, to meet together and with the City Surveyor to prepare a plan of assessment and submit an ordinance for the building of said sewer.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: Your City Property Committee would submit the following statements concerning their previous recommendations for the remodeling of the City Hall building.

The Mayor, Police Commissioners and Superintendent Cleary are unanimously opposed to the idea of removing the Police Department to the old No. 10 school-house site. They are all exceedingly well pleased with the arrangements proposed in the remodeling plans and testify that they will afford the Police Departments better accommodations than it has ever experienced. Your committee has examined carefully the reports made by former committees and would state that in each and every instance, the estimates of expense furnished by Architect Crandall are, for work of similar quality and quantity, as reasonable as those reported by our predecessors.

As the comparative expense of elevators has been the item commented upon the most, we submit herewith the written statements of The Graves Elevator Co., and they ought to put a complete estoppel upon all further adverse criticism on these points. The only opposition remaining against the remodeling plan that your committee knows of, is based on a desire to retain the present hall for assembly purposes. It is not used by the public, as it was originally expected it would be, its use is diminishing each year and it now is practically abandoned, excepting only its occasional use by nominating conventions. These latter could be held equally as well in the Council Chamber; and it is a well-known fact, that in proportion as a city's population increases and it is supplied with active, intelligent newspapers, its need of a public hall decreases. The principal reasons that led to the voluntary abandonment of the hall, are its lack of modern accommodations and its inaccessibility. The former might be overcome with money; the latter cannot be and your committee are firmly convinced that the old hall has outlived its usefulness and should be re-modeled and utilized for other purposes. The financial side of the question is important and will be briefly stated.

The city is paying \$3,700 rent for outside offices, not including the amount paid by the West Side Sewer Commission. This is equivalent to 5 per cent. upon an investment of \$74,000. The cost of a new central police station will be at least \$50,000, and the removal of the Police Department will only reduce the amount of outside rent, \$1,440; so that even with the Police Department removed, the city will still be paying \$2,260 rent, or 5 per cent. upon an investment of \$45,000.

Again, the cost of making needed repairs to the present building, with or without the removal of the Police Department, will approximate \$10,000; so that the expense in-

involved in the different propositions may be summarized as follows:

Plan to connect with the Court House, \$242,500.

Plan involving Police Department removal—New Police headquarters, \$50,000; amount represented by rent of outside offices, rental \$2,260, interest 5 per cent. on \$45,000; needed repairs to City Hall building, \$10,000. Aggregating, \$105,000.

Plan permitting building to remain unchanged—Amount represented by rent of outside offices, rental \$3,700, interest 5 per cent., \$74,000; needed repairs, \$10,000. Aggregating \$84,000.

Plan for re-modeling, recommended by committee, including all needed repairs, two first-class elevators, ventilating fans for police cells, enlarged and ample facilities for every city department, complete, \$50,000.

Many objections can be made against the first three plans in addition to the financial ones; but inasmuch as the only known objections to the latter plan are its cost and the sentiment in favor of retaining the old hall, your committee feel that they are recognizing the truest and best interests of their constituents in continuing to recommend their original re-modeling plan and they feel thoroughly justified in doing so.

Dear Sir: As regards the elevator for the City Hall, permit me to say I have just seen what purports to be a copy of my letter to Mr. Calihan September 17, 1892, in the printed report of the Common Council '91 and '92.

By a mistake either in copying or printing, this letter makes us to say that "we would do all carpenter and mason work, enclosing elevator hatchway, or any alterations in the City Hall," which we did not say.

I have furnished your architect, Mr. Charles Crandall, with a correct copy taken from our water print of this letter. This print of the original letter we have in our office and will be pleased to show to any one interested.

Early this spring in conversation with your architect, Mr. Crandall, I gave him an approximate estimate on two elevators for the City Hall, for a travel of five stories, including iron guideways, iron over-head construction, ornamental iron cars, all pumps, tanks and appliances complete. I mentioned an approximate price of about \$10,000 for the elevators proper. I also said that for \$12,000 we would include a good substantial, ornamental iron casing for the elevator hatchway, which I now confirm.

I will say in addition to this that two good substantial, safe elevators can be put up in the City Hall, with all the pumping appliances, for \$8,000, according to the kind of pumps, cars, guides and details and including plain wire screen outside for probably \$9,500.

But a first-class job, with ornamental iron cars with heavy ornamental casing to match, would not cost much less than \$12,000, and we could put in a class of ornamental casing which would bring them up to \$13,000 or \$14,000. We guarantee as low prices for the same quality of work as any elevator builders in the country.

The basis of our prices given in conversation with Mr. Crandall are exactly in accordance with our letter to Mr. Calihan.

Would further state that we are willing to show interested parties prices on elevators which we have erected in this city or different parts of the country, including elevators in the

City Hall, Fall River, Mass., City Hall, Lowell, Mass., Court House, Hartford, Conn., and many others. Respectfully,

Ald. Lewis presented a minority report of the City Property Committee as follows:

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: The undersigned, members of your City Property Committee, to whom has been referred all propositions looking toward the remodeling of the city hall building, find themselves unable to agree with the other members of the committee in the report submitted at this meeting. We deem it unadvisable at the present time to remodel the city hall building in accordance with the plans submitted by the committee, and prepared by Mr. Charles F. Crandall. These plans make no provisions for increased accommodations for the city treasury, one of the most important and over-crowded departments of the city government, and but inadequate provisions for the police department. Whether or not it would be advisable to occupy the No. 10 school site for the police headquarters, or whether some other site should be selected and a building erected thereon for such headquarters, it is certainly conceded by all that the police department should be removed from the city building. The removal of the police department to other quarters, and the transfer of the municipal court to the new court house, when erected, which it is believed by every member of the committee would be advisable, would furnish a considerable space for the use of the other departments of the city government. The expense of a few thousand dollars would provide an elevator in the city hall, which would carry passengers to the second floor, from which they could readily walk to the city hall on the top floor, and re-arrangement of departments could be made so that temporarily no department would suffer.

The term of office of the East Side Sewer Commissioners will soon expire, and the necessity for providing quarters for the chief engineer of the water works construction department outside of the city hall building will be obviated upon the completion of the new conduit. The only departments then occupying rented quarters will be the city attorney's office and the park commissioners, and the expense of providing quarters for the park commissioners could be reduced by that commission holding its meetings in the Common Council chamber.

It has been proposed to meet the expense of making the alterations in accordance with Mr. Crandall's plans by issuing the city's bonds for \$50,000 payable in ten equal annual installments of five thousand dollars each; but in view of the present condition of the money market, it is believed that the city would be unable to sell such bonds upon any favorable terms, and as there is no other method of providing for such expense, the undersigned, members of the committee, believe that it would be part of wisdom to postpone action upon the proposition until a later date; certainly until money could be procured on much more favorable terms than at present. In the mean time, the construction of the new court house will have been begun, and the matter of providing a headquarters for the police department can be more thoroughly discussed, and we believe that a better and more satisfactory plan will be perfected.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: Your Law Committee would respectfully report that in April, 1892, a final judgment was entered in the Oak Hill Cemetery proceeding and costs were entered against the city for the sum of \$146.41. A motion was made for a re-taxation of the costs by the cemetery association, and Judge Davy granted the re-taxation of costs, allowing the association \$308.65. An appeal was taken from said decision to the general term of the supreme court, and the court reversed the special term ruling, and affirmed the taxation of the clerk at \$146.41. From that decision, the association appealed to the court of appeals, and that court has just affirmed that decision, so that all the city now pays is the sum first taxed by the clerk, viz: \$146.41. This was in proceeding No. 1. In proceeding No. 2, a stipulation was made in April, 1892, directing that judgment be entered in favor of the cemetery association with \$50 costs. The city attorney recommends that these amounts should now be paid, as the matter has been determined.

J. Sebastian Zwerger on May 11, 1893, recovered a judgment against the city of Rochester for damages for sewer pollution for 100 damages and \$148.48 costs. In view of the fact that the recovery in this judgment was so small, it has been deemed advisable not to take any appeal therefrom, and the city attorney recommends that this judgment be paid.

On June 14, 1892, Margaret Eagan recovered a judgment against the city for \$322.50 damages and \$165.76 costs. An appeal is now pending from that judgment, and there was also an appeal taken by the city from that part of the judgment awarding costs to Mrs. Eagan. Mrs. Eagan is now willing to settle the judgment for the amount of the damages, without costs, and, in view of the small amount of the judgment, and the fact that there is little ground for an appeal, the city attorney recommends, and your committee believes, that this judgment should be paid.

On June 27, 1893, judgment was entered against the city in the case of H. Austin Brewster against the city. The issues involved in the action are at present being litigated in the action of Michael Slack against the city, a motion was made to set aside the judgment, and the county court staid the proceedings in the first mentioned action, upon the payment of the costs of the same and ten dollars motion costs. It is advisable that an adjudication be had in the Slack action without trying the Brewster action, and the City Attorney recommends that these costs, amounting to \$27.60 be paid, in order that Mr. Brewster's action be staid, as aforesaid; and your committee therefore recommends that an order be drawn for that amount.

In the matter of the application of the following named persons for appointment as Commissioners of Deeds, we recommend that the same be granted: J. Stewart Bamber, Louis Englert, Arthur A. Reeves, Walter Savage, Philip F. Chubmehl, John Wehle.

In the matter of the investigating clerk, your

committee has decided to fix Mr. Foreman's salary for the ensuing year at fifty dollars per month to date from June 1, 1893.

Gentlemen:—I am directed by the Executive Board to request that, as early a date as practicable, the ordinances for the improvement of Main and State Streets be put upon their passage. It is desirable that this important work should be well considered, in order that improvements of so much importance should be

commenced right, and progressed and completed without any delay arising from unforeseen obstacles or other causes. It is also important that the ordinances should be passed at as early a date as possible, so that the contracts can be awarded and the material prepared during the autumn and winter seasons, and that in the early spring everything will be in readiness to at once commence laying the pavements. To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: There is now awaiting disposition in my office an order for a tax search upon the property assessed to the Oak Hill Cemetery Association, comprising about 45 acres of land situated on the east side of Mt. Hope avenue. Under the peculiar circumstances of the case, I deem it my duty to withhold delivery of the search until advised by your honorable body whether the city claims to hold any lien upon the property in question on account of taxes due and unpaid. In order that you may possess the information requisite to an intelligent consideration of the subject, I beg leave to call your attention to the following statement of facts:

For a number of years prior to and including 1888 the lands in question were assessed upon the tax rolls of the city to the heirs of H. G. Warner. On march 19, 1889, the Oak Hill Cemetery Association was incorporated and on the same date your honorable body, by amendment of the penal ordinance

relating to the burial of the dead, gave the association permission to use its grounds for burial purposes. Such permission was afterwards revoked, on May 2d of the same year, in obedience to the manifest will of the people, who were opposed to the establishment of another large cemetery within the city limits.

It is unnecessary to recite the history of the subsequent litigation, which terminated in a decision by the court of appeals upholding the right of the Common Council to reconsider its vote granting the privilege of burial in the proposed Oak Hill cemetery, but declaring the lands exempt from taxation while they were owned by the cemetery association. Pursuant to the ruling of the court upon the question of taxation I have been served with orders directing me to cancel the taxes which appear upon the books of my office against this property. I am informed that the principle object of the pending application for a search is to ascertain whether I have complied with the orders of the court, and I have been notified that I will incur the penalty of contempt of court if I fail to cancel the taxes as directed. The taxes which appear upon my books against this property are as follows:

Upon receipt of the orders of the court directing the cancellation of these taxes I handed the same to the city attorney. The last one I received, relating to the taxes for the year 1891, was served upon me on the 5th inst., and I delivered it to him on the same day. When the pending search upon the property was ordered I visited his office and asked for instructions how to proceed under the orders of the court. The following is a copy of his reply, received by me on the 22d inst.:

S. B. Williams, Esq.:

My Dear Sir: The taxes and assessments against the Oak Hill cemetery property will have to be cancelled, pursuant to the judgment served on you.

Without presuming to dispute the opinion of the city's legal adviser, I fell unwilling to make any alteration in the books of my office except in pursuance of explicit instructions from your honorable body. It is evident from the decision of the court of appeals that the city has no valid claim against the Oak Hill cemetery property for the general city taxes of the years 1890 and 1891. From the foregoing communication of the city attorney it appears that the land was also exempt from assessment under local improvement ordinances and from water rents while it was the property of the cemetery association.

I cannot escape the conviction, however, that the order of the court should not apply to the large assessment for the improvement of Mt. Hope avenue. Final ordinance No. 3,181, under the provisions of which the improvement was made, was passed by the Common Council on April 19, 1887, and the assessment roll was confirmed by your honorable body on June 26, 1888. The property afterwards purchased by the cemetery association was then owned by the Warner heirs, and was not sold to the association until the spring of the following year. The original tax against the Warner property for the Mt. Hope avenue improvement was \$22,339. At the meeting of your honorable body held on July 10, 1888, Ald. Kelly presented a petition from J. B. Y. Warner for relief from a portion of this assessment. The petition was referred to the assessment committee, which at your next subsequent meeting held on July 24, 1888, presented its report containing the following recommendation upon the subject:

In reference to the petition of the heirs of H. G. Warner to have relief afforded them upon account of the assessment made against their property on the east side of Mt. Hope avenue for the Mt. Hope avenue improvement, under final ordinance No. 3,181, your committee, after a careful investigation, finds that, by reason of the exception of the property owned by Mount Hope Cemetery upon the westerly side of said avenue, opposite to said Warner property, from assessment for local improvements, under the terms of the charter the whole expense of said improvement, with but a slight exception, was assessed upon said Warner property, which was contrary to the spirit of the ordinance, the ordinance requiring the assessment to be made upon the tier of lots upon each side of the avenue so improved, although in strict accordance with the terms of the charter. The Warner property ought not, in the opinion of your committee, be assessed for said improvement more than its equitable proportion, providing said cemetery property was not exempt, the amount of which is stated in the accompanying communication of a majority of the city assessors, their judgment or conclusion being concurred in by your committee.

The communication of the city assessors referred to by the committee was as follows:

Ald. Kohlmetz, Chairman Assessment Committee:

Dear Sir: In reply to the communication of First Assistant City Attorney Sullivan, acting clerk for your committee, asking us to state what the assessment for the improvement of Mt. Hope avenue would have been on the property of the heirs of H. G. Warner, had the property of Mt. Hope Cemetery been included and assessed in the assessment roll for said improvement. We would say that in our judgment had the Mt. Hope Cemetery been assessable the property of the heirs of H. G. Warner would have paid the sum of \$11,272.31, the balance of their bill should be paid by the city of Rochester; or, in other words, they should be allowed to pay their bill, less \$11,066.69.

In accordance with the recommendation of the Assessment Committee your honorable body at the same meeting adopted the following resolution:

By Ald. Kohlmetz—Resolved, That the City Treasurer be, and he hereby is, directed to receive from the heirs of H. G. Warner the sum of eleven thousand and two hundred and seventy-two dollars and thirty-one cents, in full of the assessment against their property upon the easterly side of Mount Hope avenue for Mount Hope avenue improvement, under

final ordinance No. 3,181, and that the charge the remainder of said assessment to erroneous assessments; interest to be added to said reduced amount in case of non-payment, as provided by the City Charter, as if said reduced amount was the amount of said assessment.

Adopted.
The assessment roll was amended as directed in the foregoing resolution, the sum of 11,272.31 assessed against the Warner property being divided into three payments. On August 8, 1888, the owners of the property paid upon this assessment the sum of \$3,255.03, being the first payment less the discount computed at the usual rate. They thus recognized the validity of the assessment and had full knowledge that the two remaining payments were a lien upon the property when they sold it to the cemetery association in the following year. The purchasers, also, unless they neglected the usual precaution of procuring a tax search, received notice of the existence of the lien.

The second and third payments under the assessment roll were not paid, and the last payment having become due on June 26, 1890, the sum of \$8,266.35 was charged against the property on the general city tax roll for 1891, this being the amount of the unpaid portion of the assessment with interest from June 26, 1890, to July 1, 1891, at ten per cent. per annum, as directed by section 209 of the charter. I am unable to believe that the mere fact that this assessment was finally placed on the general city tax rolls, after the property had become exempt from taxation, would operate to discharge a lien that had existed and the validity of which had been fully recognized several months before the incorporation of the cemetery association and its purchase of the property. If this were the case any man might let the taxes accumulate upon his property for an indefinite period, and finally escape payment by selling his land to a graveyard company, buying it back relieved from all incumbrances after the lapse of two or three years. This, indeed, is precisely such a case. The former owners are again in possession of the property. It has escaped taxation for general purposes for four years, during which its value has been greatly enhanced by the rapid growth of the city in that direction. It is impossible to believe that it has also been relieved of this lien which rested upon it five years ago and which has never been discharged by payment. If such be the effect of the order of the court directing me to cancel the tax of 1891, that order must have been granted without knowledge of the facts, and upon their proper presentation to the court a modification excepting from its operation the assessment for the Mt. Hope avenue improvement could undoubtedly be secured.

If in this communication I have seemed to trespass upon the prerogative of another department of the city government, my double excuse is the desire to save the city treasury the large sum involved and to protect my bondsmen and myself from possible liability.

The amount added to the tax of 1891 upon the cemetery property for the Mt. Hope avenue improvement was \$8,266.35. If this were then the only valid lien of the city upon the property it would have amounted with interest and expenses to the date of sale, March 31, 1892, to \$9,011.79. Add to this the interest at the rate fixed by the charter from the date of sale to the present time and the lien now amounts to \$10,453.68, a sum too great to be erased by me from the books of the city treasury without my calling the special attention of your honorable body thereto. In view of the facts hereinbefore stated, I respectfully request your honorable body to direct me by resolution what taxes against the lands assessed to the Oak Hill Cemetery Association are to be canceled by me in obedi-

ence to the orders of the court, and what taxes, if any, are still to be held as valid liens upon the property.

Gentlemen:—In accordance with your resolution of the 11th inst., I beg leave to say in relation to the bridges of the New York Central and Hudson River road, over Smith, Kent, Oak and Orchard streets, that they are old wooden bridges which should be replaced with more substantial structures, to insure the safety of the people in the streets; that the bridge at Smith street in particular has been

so charred by fire that its immediate condemnation would be proper, both for the safety of the railroad as well as the public; that all four of the bridges have been apparently properly condemned by the railroad officials and are only made usable by the help of most ungainly temporary wooden trestle bents which are placed under them upon the sidewalks.

It appears that permission was given by the Executive Board in October, 1892, for the erection of these temporary supports, which obstruct the sidewalks, upon the distinct understanding that the wooden bridges would be replaced by substantial iron structures by February 1, 1893.

It would be no hardship to the railroad for the city to order the removal of the posts which are an obstruction to the sidewalk, and to call the attention of the railroad commission to the unsafe condition the bridges will then be in.

In presenting these estimates the author must not be understood as favoring or opposing any of the interests affected by them, but simply as recognizing certain expenditures that have already been contracted for, some that are inevitable and others that appear to have such strong public sentiment in their favor as to compel a recognition. Some of the items may be considered excessive, and if so, they will right themselves; while on the other hand, no provision has been made for contingencies that are almost certain to arise when least expected, and the statements submitted are intended to be conservative, rather than otherwise. Many taxpayers are complaining about the heavy taxes and increasing city indebtedness and these statements are made solely for the purpose of calling attention to the financial affairs of our city, present and prospective, so that they may be the more intelligently considered and acted upon.

They, together with the records for previous years, show conclusively several facts, viz:

First. The conduct of our municipal affairs is steadily growing more expensive, both per capita and in proportion to its real estate values.

Second. The bonded indebtedness of the city is excessive and within one per cent. of the legal limit, without any adequate provision for its payment.

Third. The need of different and improved methods whereby expenditures can be reduced or income increased, or both.

I will have suggestions to make at future meetings, bearing upon the following topics:

Need of changing the present method of assessing real estate values.

Need of changing date of financial year to July 1st.

Street department.

Water department.

Revenues from licenses.

Need of a sinking fund.

Gentlemen: The Executive Board instructs
 me to direct your attention to the extremely
 bad condition of the roadway of Elizabeth
 street, from West avenue to Allen street. It
 is perhaps unnecessary to call your attention
 to the fact that this street is paved with the
 primitive pavements laid in Rochester in its
 early history as a municipality, namely, cob-
 ble-stone. It has been repaired from year to
 year with like material, or the holes or de-
 pressions filled with Macadam. The repair
 was necessarily of the most temporary charac-
 ter; and the roadway has been avoided as an
 avenue of travel because of its wretched con-
 dition, and has only been used when the neces-
 sities of business demanded. The time has
 come, in fact it arrived many years ago, when
 the general interests of the business of the
 city, as well as for the benefits that may ac-
 crue to the property abutting on the street,
 demand that this roadway or street should
 be permanently and thoroughly improved by
 the laying down of a modern improvement.

To the Common Council:

Gentlemen: The Executive Board has been
 called upon from time to time in the perform-
 ance of its duty, as required by the city char-
 ter, to notify the people owning property along
 the line of Plymouth avenue, from Clarissa
 street or the bridge crossing the old Genesee
 Valley canal, to repair their plank walks
 because of their dangerous condition. In a
 great majority of cases the walks are so
 badly worn, and the stringers so rotted out,
 that a repair of any durable character is
 impracticable, and it might be said to be a
 waste of money.

The same fact can equally apply to Genesee
 street, from West avenue to its terminus.
 A like condition of things, so far as it relates
 to sidewalks, has existed upon this street for
 many years, and it would be almost criminal
 to make repairs, which would necessarily be
 very expensive, upon this street, at the present
 time.

Both Plymouth avenue and Genesee street
 are now two of the most handsome and attrac-
 tive thoroughfares in the city of Rochester,
 and, leading as they do to the new parks in
 the southern portion of the city, over which
 thousands of our residents from other parts
 of the city drive. It would be unwise to mar
 such boulevards by the construction of un-
 sightly and temporary wooden walks. It is
 therefore recommended by the Executive Board
 that your honorable body cause the city sur-
 veyor to prepare ordinances for the laying

It is possible to lower it about four feet, and have proper outlet. As the pipe is small, and the street flat, it would seem to be good policy to rebuild the sewer at as low a grade as possible, and make it a twelve inch pipe, thereby insuring dry collars.

And the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon the following portion and part of the City which the Council deems proper to be so assessed for, and will be benefited by and derive an advantage from such improvement, to wit:

All the territory included within and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of North avenue and German streets; thence easterly along German street, including one tier of lots and parcels of land on the south side thereof to Scio street, excepting the lot on the southeast corner of German street and North avenue; thence southerly along Scio street, including one tier of lots and parcels of land on the west side thereof to Wait street; thence easterly along Wait street, including one tier of lots and parcels of land on the south side thereof to Hebard street; thence northerly along Hebard street, including one tier of lots and parcels of land on the east side thereof to German street; thence easterly along German street, including one tier of lots and parcels of land on the south side thereof to North Union street; thence southerly along North Union street, including one tier of lots and parcels of land on the west side thereof to Pennsylvania avenue; thence easterly along Pennsylvania avenue, excluding one tier of lots and parcels of land on the north side thereof to Sixth avenue; thence northerly along Sixth avenue, to Central park; thence easterly along Central park to Seventh avenue; thence northerly along Seventh avenue to Bay street; thence westerly along Bay street, including one tier of lots and parcels of land on the north side thereof to Hebard street; thence southerly along Hebard street, including one tier of lots and parcels of land on the west side thereof to German street; thence westerly along German street, including one tier of lots and parcels of land on the north side thereof to the place of beginning, as they exist at the date of the passage of this ordinance.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Assessment Committee begs leave to report upon the matters submitted to it as follows:

In the matter of the petition of Mathias Dubelbeis, we find that the petitioner is the owner of lot No. 74 on the west side of Dubelbeis park, and that said lot is vacant, but that the assessors, in preparing the general assessment roll, inadvertently assessed said lot

upon the basis of a house and lot, and we, therefore, recommend in accordance with a calculation made by the city assessors, that the assessment be reduced from the sum of \$15.44 to the sum of \$2.28.

In the matter of the petition of L. J. Woolsey, we find that the petitioner is the owner of lot No. 113 in Flower City park, through which a right of way was acquired for the construction of the Boulevard outlet sewer, under final ordinance No. 4,397, and that said lot is now assessed the sum of \$99.85 for the construction of said sewer. The matter was referred by your committee to the City Assessors, and they reported that the assessment should be reduced to the sum of \$20, in accordance with an understanding had when the easement was acquired that the lot should only bear a nominal assessment for the construction of the sewer and we therefore recommend that the assessment be reduced to that amount.

In the matter of the petition of Ferdinand and Edward Schaefer, we find that the petitioners are the owners of premises situated on the corner of Bay and Ackerman streets, formerly owned by Salomia Wiebel; that the petitioners purchased said premises recently, with the understanding that said property was subject to an assessment for the Bay and Ackerman street, Webster avenue and Meng park sewer, which had been erroneously assessed at the sum of \$302.68, but which had been reduced by resolution of the Common Council, adopted June 23, 1891, to \$116.10, with the condition that the latter amount should be paid within two months from the date of the passage of the resolution. This provision, the petitioners claim, they were ignorant of, and have allowed the time to lapse, and therefore request that the time be extended. In view of all the facts, we recommend that the petitioners be allowed to pay the said sum of \$116.10, with legal interest from June 23, 1891, provided the same be paid within thirty days from the passage of this resolution.

In the matter of the petition of Luther A. Pratt, as chairman of the special commissioners for the Lyell avenue and Saxton street outlet sewer, sections one and two, we find that the persons named in the annexed resolution were erroneously assessed for said sewer. We reached this conclusion after having referred the petition to the City Surveyor and the City Assessors, and the special commissioners who made the assessment roll. All of them concur in the statement made by Mr. Pratt that the assessments are erroneous to the extent of the amounts named, and we recommend that the assessments be corrected, as provided in the annexed resolution.

In the matter of the petition of Frank Sherer, praying for the correction of an assessment against lot No. 88, Flower City Park, for the construction of a sewer under final ordinance No. 4,397, being the Boulevard outlet sewer, we recommend that the petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Thomas S. Johnston, praying for the correction of an assessment against property owned by him fronting upon the east side of Arnold park, we recommend that action on the petition be indefinitely postponed.

In the matter of the petition of Mary J. McLean, and another, praying that the taxes and assessments against property owned by her be apportioned and that she may be relieved from the burden of the additional interest imposed because of the non-payment of certain taxes and assessments upon said property and that said interest be reduced from 12 per cent. to 6 per cent., we find that the petitioner is the owner of certain premises situated in the city, being a portion of property formerly owned by George S. Riley, upon which there are certain unpaid taxes and as-

assessments, and we recommend that said apportionment be made, and that the City Treasurer be directed to receive the amounts, so apportioned, as provided in the attached resolution.

Gentlemen:—Your Charter Amendment Committee begs leave to make the following report:

In the matter of the petition of D. Thompson William H. Hassan and others, asking for the repeal of the penal ordinance relative to the regulation, qualification and licensing of stationary engineers, we have carefully considered the facts set forth in the petition, and in order to become more familiar with the entire subject matter, we called a meeting of the committee on the 14th of August, to which meeting we invited the parties whose names appeared upon the petition, and all other interested parties. A very large number of persons attended this meeting, among whom were the most prominent and capable engineers of this city. Every one desiring to be heard was given an opportunity to state his grievances against, or give his reasons in support of, the ordinance in question.

We are of the opinion after carefully considering all the facts and statements made before our Committee that this penal ordinance is one which ought to remain in force.

We learn that in all of the large cities of this state, similar ordinance have been enacted, and remain in force, and that experience has taught that the safety of citizens is in a great measure depending upon a strict compliance with the spirit of the ordinance.

No evidence was produced which reflected any discredit upon the present board of examiners, and we feel bound to report that our best engineers of this city are anxious to keep this ordinance in force, and the safety of citizens and property is in a great measure dependent upon the regulation, qualifications and licensing of stationary engineers as required by this ordinance.

We, therefore, recommend that this penal ordinance remain in force.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen:—I deem it my duty as chief fiscal officer of the city to give you a report at this time as to the condition of the city funds. Every business man, in times like these, examines closely as to his available assets and resources, and why should not the city do likewise? The question of conducting our municipal business in the future according to the system in use at present and in the past I leave to your honorable body. I will at this time simply report the facts in the case, with two suggestions for temporary relief.

As the public prints have circulated the report that the treasurer has no funds on hand to pay the current expenses of the present month, or the bills to be passed in the August budget of your honorable body, a statement of what has become of the large amount of the general city tax collected during the month of July will be first in order. The amount received for general city taxes in the month of July was \$1,157,298.24, as against \$1,228,718.45 during the same month last year, the difference being \$71,420.21. The total amount received to and including August 21st has been \$1,193,144.24, as against \$1,294,483.02 received up to same date in 1892, a difference of \$91,338.78. The difference in proportion is even greater than this, the tax levy for 1893, including unpaid water rents, froutage tax and unpaid local improvements, amounting to \$1,862,968.54, while for 1892 the total amount to be collected was but \$1,733,615.85. The present condition of the city treasury is due principally to the fact that notes to the large amount of \$979,700 were issued previous to July 1st to meet deficiencies in several funds, to pay the time orders or acceptances of the executive board and to defray the expenses of the several municipal departments for the months of April, May and June. The cost of discounting these notes was \$17,203.43. They were issued by direction of your honorable body, and countersigned by the chairman of your finance committee. Owing to the fact that the banks refused to discount notes authorized by you during the latter part of June it became necessary to stop payment of the June budget until I had collected enough of the general city tax to meet the orders. The remainder of the money collected during July was paid out almost as fast as received, to meet the notes previously issued. I was also obliged to issue the city's note for ten days for \$25,000 to pay the last of the notes issued previous to July 1st. This note I have paid to-day, leaving a balance to the credit of the city in the several banks of deposit of \$63.03, as against \$296,815 the corresponding date last year. There yet remains unpaid of the July budgets of your honorable body, the executive board and the board of education, \$6,500.83. The cash on hand is \$10,735.61. There are also past due, acceptances of the executive board, which are liable to be presented at any time, amounting to \$1,975.42.

The amount paid on acceptances of time orders of the executive board from August 1, 1892, to August 1, 1893, was \$575,672.36, and the amount paid in interest on these acceptances was \$37,410.52. The city has now outstanding acceptances to the amount of \$641,269.89, most of which are carrying interest at the rate of 6 per cent. The city has also advanced money for local improvements to the amount of \$340,120.25, the rolls for which are not yet in the hands of the treasurer for collection. Such improvements or rolls number

61. There is also unpaid upon the rolls in the office in process of collection \$400,584.07, the number of such rolls being 111. There yet remains unpaid of the general city tax, to and including August 21st, \$587,948.84.

The amount I shall be able to collect during the remainder of the month is an unknown quantity. The cash requirements of the August budget for the regular pay rolls will be \$51,418.65, to which must be added an unknown amount for the bills incurred by the various departments.

The condition of the city's finances exclusive of the bonded indebtedness, may be briefly stated as follows:

The interest and fees accrued on delinquent taxes would offset the difference in the above totals.

As the banks of this city, and the larger banks in New York, with which I have been in correspondence, decline to discount the city's note at present, I have two suggestions to make that will afford temporary relief:

First, I would suggest that authority be given me to withdraw from the savings banks the \$90,000 now on deposit to the credit of the Genesee Valley sinking fund, and use the same to protect the city's credit. The money can be returned to the banks later, or could be used, if thought best, in building the Alexander street bridge, or for such other purposes as your honorable body may determine.

As before reported, the amount received annually from the Erie Railway company will be sufficient to retire the outstanding bonds when they become due, without the \$90,000 now on hand for that purpose. Should such action be deemed advisable, partial payments could be received by the treasurer so as not to inconvenience the banks.

Second: Should the foregoing suggestion not meet your approval, I would advise that the treasurer be given authority to issue the city's notes or certificates of indebtedness dated September 1st for one year, with interest at 6 per cent, per annum for an amount sufficient to meet the requirements of the August budget. These notes could be issued in small amounts of \$100 and upward and would be readily taken by parties who are now hoarding their resources and looking for a safe investment. Such action would in my judgment put a large amount of money in circulation, and the city would only pay the rate of interest charged by the banks of deposit. Why not give the people the benefit, and also protect the credit of the city by prompt payment of its obligations?

I think it is generally conceded that our present financial policy does not serve the best interests of the city. How to improve it is a question of vital importance. I would again ask whether it would not be best to separate the general city tax from local improvement

assessments, and keep the funds separate, letting the amount raised in the tax levy be sufficient to pay the expense of the several departments for the current year, and providing by the issue of bonds from time to time for the payment of contractors for local improvements. I know that this is a poor time to negotiate bonds of any kind, but by a careful investigation, some plan might be devised which would save the city a portion of the large amount of interest it now pays. If some relief cannot be secured it will soon be necessary to call a halt on local improvements, except where they are absolutely necessary, at least until the improvements now being made are completed, the cost of the same certified to the assessors, and the rolls delivered to the treasurer for collection. The amount of notes issued increases year by year, and the time is not far distant, if we continue to follow the present system, when the total amount collectable of the tax levy will be required to pay the notes—and what then? Among the larger improvements upon which the city has advanced money during the year are the following, the tax rolls for which are not yet in the hands of the treasurer for collection, with the exception of the Colvin and Maple streets sewer, the roll for which has just been received:

In conclusion, I beg leave to call your attention to the fact that the proceeds of the bonds thus far issued under the enabling acts for the East Side trunk sewer and the additional water supply have nearly all been expended. The balance in the East Side trunk sewer fund is \$64,934.49, and the engineer in charge informs me that the requirements in the present budget will be at least \$40,000. The balance in the additional water supply fund is \$211,272.86, and the next budget will require at least \$120,000. The city has authority to issue bonds to the amount of \$500,000 more for the East Side trunk sewer, and \$1,250,000 more for the additional water supply. In view of the existing financial conditions, which are unfavorable to the negotiation of bonds at short notice, I would suggest that the commissioners in charge of these improvements be requested to report to your honorable body as soon as possible, their requirements for the future, so that authority can promptly be given to issue the necessary amount of bonds to continue or complete the work, as it would be a public calamity if lack of funds should delay these important improvements.

I trust you will consider the subjects referred to herein of such importance as to merit your earnest consideration.

To the Common Council:

Gentlemen: The Executive Board respectfully directs your attention to the condition to that section of South avenue south of and from the end of the present Medina stone pavement to Highland avenue, as you perhaps all have observed, together with thousands of other citizens, that the roadway on that thoroughfare is rendered almost impassible both in summer as well as in winter by reason of its unimproved state, being merely an open cut through a sand-hill most of its way, for vehicles of almost any description or weight are likely to be stalled by reason of the depth of the sand at the points named.

The changed condition of this section of the city by reason of the improvements about Mt. Hope Reservoir and the creation of what is known as reservoir park, which has become a resort for the general public for pastime or pleasure, especially from early spring to late in autumn, makes it a matter of necessity to improve both roadway and walks in a permanent and substantial manner. As a further reason for such improvement, it will form an addition to the pleasure drives now leading to the South Park; and in uniting with Mt. Hope avenue will complete the second outlet to this section of the city on the east side of the river, and compare favorably with the two now on the west side already completed. This work can be finished this fall if an ordinance be immediately passed for it; and the Executive Board deem it unnecessary to give any extended reasons or to make any lengthy argument on the immediate need of a public work of so much importance and of so great a benefit to the general public.

Sixteen (16) feet for the northwest corner of Front street, eight (8) feet for Irving place and six (6) feet for Liberty alley, the laying of crosswalks across each side street and alley and across Main street, on each side of North and South Fitzhugh streets, State and Exchange streets North and South St. Paul streets and North and South Clinton streets, consisting of 5 lines of flag stones eighteen (18) inches wide, spaced six (6) inches apart, and the laying of crosswalks across Main street, where there are existing crosswalks, consisting of three (3) lines of flagstones eighteen (18) inches wide, and spaced six (6) inches apart, and the laying of a Medina block stone pavement on a concrete foundation and with a line of gutter stones, sixteen (16) inches wide in front of the curb, together with the grading and unspecified work necessary to make a complete roadway, and all the old material to be removed from the street, will be the property of the contractor and may be so considered in their proposals.

By Ald. Johnston:—Statement The deficiency in the city's current expenses April 1, 1893, was \$320,000, comprising \$195,000 unpaid taxes and \$125,000 deficiency notes, and the net current expenses of the city for the three months of April, May, and June, prior to levying the annual city tax in July, were at least \$150,000, a month, making \$450,000 and aggregating an indebtedness for current expenses alone on June 30th, of \$770,000 before a single dollar of tax had been collected to meet it. This amount of money and enough additional to pay the semi-annual interest on the city bonds had to be borrowed and paid for by interest at six per cent.

This is the city's customary annual experience, and is the inevitable result of its present methods of financing.

In addition, the City Treasurer's records show that the Treasurer has accepted under the date of August 15th, 1893, contractors orders, for work done and to be paid for by local assessment, amounting to \$1,082,776.74, a large part of which viz: \$315,345.64 has been paid before the assessment rolls have been confirmed by the Council.

All these orders bear interest at six per cent, and the money that has been advanced on them had to be borrowed and paid for at the same rate.

It is apparent that the local assessment fund for the payment of contractors should be kept separate from the general fund that arrangements should be made to borrow the money needed for it at less than six per cent, and that the assessment rolls should be completed and confirmed more promptly.

The city is paying about \$30,000 a year for interest on contractors acceptances and if an arrangement could be made to borrow at say, 4 per cent, and collect the assessments promptly, it would affect a saving in interest expenditures of from ten to twenty thousand dollars a year. Also the city is paying about \$15,000 a year for interest on the annual deficiency notes and the amounts borrowed to pay current expenses from April to July, and if the city's financial year was changed to July 1st, every dollar of this amount could be saved and several thousand dollars additional earned from the interests receipts upon bank balances. Surely, the city of Rochester, should not waste so much money for interest and its credit is not aided when it is obliged to continuously borrow the money needed to pay the interest on its already large and increasing bonded indebtedness.

Therefore, Resolved, That the Charter Amendment Committee be requested to prepare an amendment to the charter changing the date of the city's financial year to July 1st, providing for the complete separation of the local assessment and current expense funds, the raising of the necessary money to pay contractors acceptances and the prompt prepara-

tion and confirmation of local assessment rolls and report its conclusions to this Council at an early day for its approval.

Upon motion of Ald. Johnston, action thereon was postponed two weeks.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

By Ald. McMillan—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee, to which was referred the communication of the City Treasurer, in relation to the city's financial condition, begs leave to make the following report:

We find that the fund from which payments are to be made for the construction of the Court and Andrew street bridges has been exhausted, and that moneys have been transferred to that fund from the Contingent Fund, thereby exhausting the Contingent Fund; and that thus early in the fiscal year it has become necessary to discount the city's note for the purpose of reimbursing the Contingent Fund. This course would not have been necessary, had it seemed advisable to the committee to sell the bridge bonds heretofore authorized by the Council, but in view of the severe stringency in the money market, and the unwillingness of investors to invest their money within the past few months, your committee has been unable to make a satisfactory sale of those

bonds. Negotiations have been in progress for a long time with New York bankers, and your committee, upon the visit of its sub-committee to New York, recently received an offer to take those bonds at par, providing the rate of interest was fixed at 4-1-2 per cent. In view of the fact that the city is now forced to pay a high rate of interest upon upwards of three and one-half million dollars of bonds, because of the fact that they were issued in a period of financial stringency, your committee has deemed it unwise to still further obligate the city on long time bonds, at even as high a rate of interest as 4-1-2 per cent, and has, therefore, decided to recommend that the offer be rejected.

The city has at its disposal \$98,462 in the savings banks. This money has been accumulating during the past few years from the receipts of dividends on the stock of the Rochester & Genesee Valley Railroad Company owned by the city. The city is now the owner of \$300,000 worth of that stock, and there are outstanding bonds of the said issue in exchange for that stock amounting to \$108,000. \$4,000 worth of those bonds will be redeemed annually until 1903, when the balance of the bonds will mature. In the meantime, the receipts from the stock will be more than sufficient to pay the balance of bonds then outstanding, and the moneys now on hand may be used for any purpose which the Council may deem proper. Your committee has at all times resisted the various propositions made to use this money for other purposes, but the time has now arrived when it would seem wise to make use of it; and, therefore, your committee has decided to recommend that the City Treasurer be authorized to purchase, on behalf of the city, bonds known as the Rochester Bridge Bonds, to the amount of \$100,000. That said bonds bear a rate of interest of 3-1-2 per cent. per annum, and for the purpose of paying for such bonds to withdraw the moneys on deposit in the savings banks, and use the same for that purpose. By this course the city will be saved the necessity of issuing bonds to run for at least twenty years, bearing a rate of interest of 4-1-2 per cent., and in the judgment of your committee, it will be possible within a very few months for the city to dispose of those bonds, when the money thus withdrawn from the savings banks, if deemed advisable, can be returned. With the moneys thus obtained, the Contingent Fund will be reimbursed, and the bridge fund will be protected so that the payments for partial estimates upon the Court and Andrews street bridges can be promptly met.

Your committee has also very carefully considered the proposition of the Treasurer to issue the city's notes in small amounts to any person desiring to loan money to the city at a rate of interest not greater than 6 per cent. per annum, and has decided to recommend that that course be adopted. The necessity for the adoption of this course arises from the fact, that largely on account of the financial stringency the payment of taxes have been very much less thus far since the first of July, than has been the case in other years, and the necessity exists of providing money with which to meet the ordinary expenditures of the city. These notes should be issued under the direction of the Finance Committee, and the money should be placed in the Contingent Fund, so that expenditures heretofore authorized and now due can be paid without unnecessary delay. It is believed \$100,000 borrowed in this way will be sufficient for present needs, and a resolution is hereto annexed providing for carrying out this recommendation.

It appears from the communication of the City Treasurer submitted at the last meeting, and referred to this committee, that cash has already been advanced for local improvements, the rolls for which are not yet in the hands

of the City Treasurer, to the amount of \$340,120.25, and that \$14,053.01 has been advanced on sprinkling contracts, the rolls for which will not be completed for some months; in addition, time orders issued by the Executive Board have been accepted, as stated by the City Treasurer, to the amount of \$111,000, which time orders are payable during the present fiscal year. Thus nearly \$500,000 has either been advanced, or is to be advanced for local improvements. The sum of \$276,631.75 has already been paid from the General Fund for such purposes, as appears by the Treasurer's communication. The withdrawal of this large amount of money from the fund raised in the annual tax levy, will necessitate the borrowing of a large amount from the banks of discount, or other sources during the present fiscal year. It is believed by your committee that by issuing the city bonds, in the nature of revenue bonds, money can be obtained to meet these acceptances, and reimburse the General Fund for moneys already advanced, at a lower rate of interest than has been heretofore paid, and that a large saving can thus be made in interest charges from which the city would derive the benefit. Those bonds should be issued for one year, and should be paid from receipts for local assessments, and, in the opinion of your committee, such amendments to the charter should be prepared and presented to the Legislature at its next session as will authorize the separation of the General Fund of the city from the Local Improvement Fund. Your committee has, therefore, decided to recommend that the City Treasurer be authorized to prepare and issue, under the direction of the Finance Committee, bonds to the amount of \$250,000, to be known as the Rochester City Revenue Bonds, to bear a rate of interest not greater than will be necessary to effect their sale at par. Said bonds to run for not more than one year from their date, to be signed by the Mayor and the City Treasurer, and countersigned by the President of the Common Council. The amount of those bonds is fixed at \$250,000 under the belief that that sum will be sufficient for present needs, although it is more than probable that if satisfactory arrangements can be made for their sale, and the saving of interest be thereby effected, an additional issue will be recommended later in the year.

The foregoing are the only recommendations which your committee has to make at the present time, but it is believed by your committee that the present is the proper time to call attention to the necessity of adopting a more conservative method in relation to local improvements throughout the city. Heretofore it has been customary to adopt ordinances for local improvements, as your committee believes, without proper consideration, and in some instances where property owners were not prepared to meet the expenses incident thereto. In that way, and by that course the city has been involved in large expenditures, and has not been able to procure the repayment of the moneys thus advanced. In the judgment of your committee, a different method for making the local assessments with which to meet the cost of improvements should be adopted. It is probable that an amendment to the charter will be necessary in order to carry out the ideas of your committee, and if so, the committee should be authorized to prepare such amendments. Those ideas are in brief as follows: that when a local improvement is deemed necessary, and the ordinance is adopted therefor, an assessment should be at once prepared, and a portion of the assessment should be collected and in the hands of the Treasurer before the work should be begun. Further installments should be collected when the work is partially completed, and the balance should be collected upon the completion of the work, or within a very short time thereafter. By the adoption of some such plan as this the city

would be saved the necessity of advancing large sums of money to pay for improvements, and awaiting the pleasure of property owners in repaying those sums. In fact it is believed that the present condition of the city's finances would have been avoided had some plan similar to the foregoing been adopted years ago. Your committee would, therefore recommend that the matter of the preparation of such amendments to the city charter as are mentioned in the foregoing report, be referred to the Finance Committee with instructions to prepare the same, and have them ready for introduction prior to the annual session of the Legislature. It is probable that the committee in considering these matters, may find it necessary to recommend a change, either in the date of the commencement of the fiscal year, or a change in the date of the collection of the city's taxes; and this matter should also be referred to the Finance Committee for consideration.

Gentlemen:—I beg leave to report that I have on hand sufficient funds to meet the August budget of your honorable body, without recourse to the expedient of borrowing from private individuals upon the city's notes, which was recommended by me, and approved at your last meeting.

The collections of taxes and assessments during the last days of August were somewhat larger than I had anticipated, and the temporary relief afforded by withdrawing the Genesee Valley R. R. sinking fund from the savings banks and investing the same in the Rochester Bridge Bonds is all that is absolutely required for the present. These facts are reported for your guidance in directing me, whether or not to borrow any money at present under the terms of the resolution adopted at your last meeting.

It is scarcely probable that the receipts of the present month will be sufficient to meet the September budget, and in case of inability to sell the East Side Trunk Sewer and additional Water Supply bonds, large sums will be required in the near future.

I have already received offers for nearly the entire amount of notes authorized by your honorable body. The sums offered range from \$100

to \$20,000, and are nearly all conditioned upon the notes being issued for one year at six (6) per cent. interest.

In view of the fact that there has been no advertisement of the matter, except what appeared in the newspaper reports of your proceedings, the large number of offers already received affords assurance of the success of this method of raising funds whenever, in your judgment, it shall become necessary.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester :

At a meeting of the joint committee of the Common Council and Board of Supervisors appointed to consider the question of sewerage for county and state buildings and property lying north and south of Pinnacle range of

hills would respectfully report that they have carefully examined the plans, maps and profiles of the City Surveyor and your committees are unanimous in approving the plans submitted by him. A statement of the cost of said proposed sewer prepared by the surveyor was also presented and is made a part of this report. It is unnecessary to refer to the great need for this sewer. The necessity for its construction is conceded by all.

Your committee are unanimously of the opinion that in order to properly construct said sewer it will be necessary to secure a right of way or easement for the sewer through private property and also more or less grading. The total estimated cost of securing easements, constructing sewer and grading is \$36,645.

Your committee are of the opinion, that if the cost of such sewer with such grading and such easements is \$36,645, the expense should be borne in the following proportions.

State property occupied by Rochester: State Hospital, 28 per cent.

County property occupied by Monroe: County Alms House and Penitentiary, 41 per cent.; territory north of range of hills, 2 1/2 per cent.; territory south of range of hills, 9 1/2 per cent.

And that an assessment should be made by the proper municipal authorities upon such basis.

The property on Goodman street proper to be assessed should be from the summit of the hill to South Clinton street.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—For the purpose of trying an experiment in pavements, which will be of interest to all taxpayers, I venture to recommend to your honorable body the passage of an ordinance providing for the re-surfacing of the existing macadam pavement on South Fitzhugh street, from Main street to the Erie canal.

This pavement has been down many years, and was made of granite from the St. Lawrence river. It is so worn away that unless repaired soon, it will need to be replaced.

I desire to see the surface loosened with picks along the sides, and a layer of broken trap rock, brought from the Hudson river, placed on top from 2 to 6 inches thick, then to be thoroughly rolled with the heavy steam roller, and a grout, or thin mortar, composed of one and one-half volumes of sand to one of Portland cement, to be brushed into the stone so as to fill all voids between stones, and make a substantial surface. It seems to me possible that such a pavement, while being cheap, may be as clean as asphalt, and durable as the hardest rock, and so be well adopted to many streets where the cost of more expensive pavements would be burdensome. As it is so late in the season I suggest the passage of the first ordinance to-night.

SEWER IN HOLLENBECK STREET AND AVENUE D.

By Ald. Aikenhead—Resolved That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a sewer in Hollenbeck street and Avenue D.
 Adopted.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$14,000.

By Ald. Aikenhead—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, viz:

The construction of a suitable sewer in Hollenbeck street and Avenue D of the following form and dimensions: A vitrified pipe sewer fifteen inches in diameter in Avenue D, from a point twenty feet east of the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg railroad property, to Hollenbeck street south of Avenue D, and twenty inches in diameter from this last point to the center of Hollenbeck street north of Avenue D; also twenty inches in diameter in Hollenbeck street to a point about 1,450 feet south of Norton street; also a stone sewer 2x2 feet with cover and invert in Hollenbeck street, from a point about 1,450 feet south of Norton street to the trunk sewer in Norton street. Also the necessary manholes, surface sewers, lot laterals, branches, roadway grading and gutter formations.

And Whereas, The City Surveyor under the directions of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at \$14,000, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, that the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for the whole expense thereof, viz:

All the territory included within and described by the following boundary lines, viz.: Beginning at the intersection of Norton and Hollenbeck streets, thence easterly along Norton street, excluding one tier of lots on the south side thereof, for a depth not exceeding 150 feet to North Clinton street, thence south-

Beginning at a point in the center of South avenue and Elmwood avenue, thence north 84 degrees, 20 minutes and 35 seconds, east along the center line of Elmwood avenue 564 feet, thence north 26 degrees, 3 4minutes and 25 seconds east 695.41 feet through lands of the state of New York, and the county of Monroe, thence north 49 degrees, 18 minutes, and 43 seconds east still through lands of the county of Monroe 768.43 feet, thence north 64 degrees, 59 minutes and 42 seconds east through lands of the county of Monroe and lands of Ellwanger & Barry 483.76 feet, thence north 59 degrees, 3 minutes and 45 seconds east through lands of Ellwanger & Barry, across Highland avenue, and through lands of the City of Rochester 1,318.38 feet, thence north 70 degrees, 5 4minutes and 5 seconds east through lands of the City of Rochester 545.08 feet to a point in the center of a proposed street 63 feet wide forming an extension of Goodman street, thence north 3 degrees, 21 minutes, 29 seconds east 339.41 feet to a point in the center line of Goodman street produced, thence north 22 degrees, 49 minutes, 45 seconds east along said center line produced, and along the center line of Goodman street 3,236 feet to the East Side trunk sewer, and said sewer shall be of the fol-

lowing dimensions to-wit: From the intersection of South and Glenwood avenues to the first point described as being in the center line of South Goodman street produced, a distance of 4,714.52 feet, it will be an 18-inch vitrified pipe without any inlets for surface water. Gentlemen:—Your Assessment Committee begs leave to make the following report:

In the matter of the petition of Mary J. Fry, as executrix of the last will and testament of James Wells Fry, to have cancelled the personal tax against said estate, upon the ground that the estate was distributed before the assessment was levied, we find that the facts set forth in the petition are true, and recommend that the petition be granted.

In the matter of the petition of Rosianna Kenny asking to have a portion of the city tax for the current year refunded to her, assessed against her property, being lot No. 5, on the south side of the Vernon street, upon grounds that the assessed valuation was erroneously increased from \$1,600 to \$2,150, under the mistake that a new dwelling house had been erected upon said lot, we recommend that the sum of \$8.75 be remitted.

In the matter of the petition of James M. Whitney praying for the cancellation of a tax upon certain property near Central avenue and North Water street, assessed for North Water street improvement, we recommend that the petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of E. Knickerbocker and the heirs of Mary J. Knickerbocker to have corrected an alleged erroneous assessment, we recommend that the petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Francis M. Husten and Patrick Curran and wife to have remitted certain taxes, upon the ground that the property upon which they were assessed was purchased with pension money, and was exempt from taxation, we recommend that the same be denied, without passing upon the merits of the petitioners, but because your committee deems that exemptions of property purchased with pension money should be passed upon by the courts.

In the matter of the petition of Andrew McDade praying for the cancellation of the sprinkling taxes for 1891 and 1892 in front of his property on Vincent Place, we recommend that the same be granted.

In the matter of the petition of Catherine Zimmer praying to be allowed to pay the assessments for North street opening and North street grading at the legal rate of interest, we find that said assessments have remained unpaid through no fault of the petitioner and, therefore, recommend that the petition be granted.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—The matter of the extension of West street, along the rear of the property used by the State Industrial School, was referred by your honorable body to the Executive Board for the purpose of obtaining prices on the land proposed to be taken. On an examination of the subject, it was ascertained that by Chapter 471, of the Laws of 1889, the Commissioners of the Land Office were authorized and empowered to grant and release by letters patent to the city of Rochester a right of way for a public street through the lands of the state of New York appurtenant to the State Industrial School, upon such terms, conditions and restrictions as the Commissioner of the Land Office and the Managers of the State Industrial School shall deem just and proper.

The law also provided that the terms, conditions and restrictions shall be reduced to agreement in writing and signed in duplicate on behalf of said Managers by their President and Secretary, and under their seal, and by said city by its Mayor with the seal of said city. It therefore would seem that under this law the Executive Board has no power or authority to act in the premises; and the subject matter of such resolution is referred back to your honorable body for such action as may be deemed expedient.

By Ald. Lewis—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—In obedience to the duty imposed upon me of reporting at this meeting my opinion as to the liability of the city for the salary of E. R. Foreman, investigating clerk in the City Attorney's office, I beg leave to say that by the provisions of the city charter, the City Attorney is authorized on or before the 1st day of June of each year to appoint among the other subordinates in his office as many clerks and stenographers as your honorable body might direct whose term of office should be for one year or until their respective successors are appointed. (City Charter, Section 60.) Pursuant to the authority conferred upon him by the city charter and the action of your honorable body in adding an investigating clerk to the clerical force in the law department, the City Attorney, by a

certificate filed with the City Clerk, appointed E. R. Foreman, investigating clerk in his office for the term provided by the city charter, to begin June 1, 1893.

Your inquiry involves an examination of the regularity of such appointment and eligibility of the appointee.

I have carefully gone over the records evidencing the appointment of the investigating clerk and I find nothing informal or irregular in the resolutions creating the clerkship referred to, in the application for examination filed by the incumbent with the Civil Service Board as such clerk, in the certificate of his competency presented to the City Attorney by said Board, or in the appointment filed by the City Attorney. So far as the records referred to are concerned the appointment is unassailable.

As to the eligibility of the incumbent it has been attacked, so far as I know, upon the ground that he was not a resident of this city at the time of his application and appointment, and upon the further ground that two of the statements contained in his application blank, "I have resided in the city of Rochester, N. Y., continually for over four years," and "I have not been arrested upon a criminal charge" are false, thus vitiating, it is claimed, his examination and subsequent appointment.

The latter ground involves disputed questions of fact and as such I do not deem it my duty to pass upon them, but so far as the present inquiry is concerned it is immaterial whether they are true or false as neither the Civil Service law nor the local rules and regulations promulgated in accordance therewith require any tests of eligibility which would give force to any of the grounds mentioned.

If the statements referred to are false it simply gives the appointing power the right to remove the appointee during the latter's probationary term which in this case has already expired, and does not necessarily render the candidate ineligible. (Civil Service Rules, XVI, XX).

I am, therefore, of the opinion, that Mr. Foreman was, and is, eligible to the office of investigating clerk, that he was legally appointed and that the city is liable for such services as he has already performed, and such further services as he may perform until the expiration of his term, or his prior removal by the City Attorney.

Gentlemen:—On or about November 21, 1892, a contract was let to R. S. McMahon & Co for the construction of Ford street improve-ment. Before the contract was completed, Michael Slack and others filed mechanics' liens against the funds in the hands of the city coming to the contractor on account of said improvement, and H. Austin Brewster filed an assignment of the moneys to grow due to the contractor under said contract. There-after, an action was commenced by Michael Slack, in which all the parties who had filed liens, and Mr. Brewster, were made parties and brought into court. Thereafter, Mr. Brewster commenced an action on the two orders which had been delivered to him in pursuance of his assignment, one of which was for \$300, and the other for \$250, each payable six months after September 15, 1892. Thereafter, the attorneys for all the parties in said action stipulated a discontinuance of said action and the same was discontinued, which disposed of all the liens which had been filed against said fund.

No person, persons, association or corporation shall at any time hereafter temporarily expose either at a public or private sale any lots or quantities of clothing, boots, shoes, and other commodities within the city of Rochester without first procuring a license as hereinafter provided, under a penalty or fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$150.

Sec. 2. The mayor of the city of Rochester shall from time to time license any proper person, persons, association or corporation to temporarily expose either at a public or private sale any lots or quantities of clothing, boots, shoes or other commodities within the city of Rochester upon the payment to the treasurer of said city the sum of \$150 for each place, stand or station where such sale is to be conducted.

Sec. 3. It shall be within the discretion of the mayor to designate the period of time every license issued under the terms of this ordinance shall be in force and effect.

Sec. 4. No license issued under any provision of this ordinance shall be transferred by any person, persons, association or corporation without the permission of the mayor endorsed thereon, under a penalty of \$25 for each offense. And every such license shall upon such assignment being made without the consent of the mayor, terminate and be at an end.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Gentlemen:—In obedience to your request for my opinion in regard to the ordinance to construct a bridge over the New York Central & Hudson River railroad at Prince street, I assume the question submitted to me is, whether under the existing statutes the railroad company can be compelled to carry the proposed extension of Prince street across its tracks in the manner provided for in the ordinance.

I am of the opinion that, under the laws of 1853, chapter 62, after the city has continued Prince street across the tracks of the railroad, the railroad company is bound within thirty days after notice has been served upon it by the city to cause the extension of the street to be taken across its tracks, as shall be most convenient and useful for public travel,

and to do the work necessary to be done for that purpose. If in the judgment of the common council, the most convenient and useful way for public travel to carry the extension of said street across the tracks is by a bridge, the railroad company under the statute to which I have referred, is bound to do the work for that purpose.

Gentlemen:—Your Assessment Committee begs leave to report as follows:

In the matter of the petition of Sarah C. Skinner, to correct an erroneous assessment for the Clinton Park widening against lots 22, 24 and 26, Nicholson park, we find, that the assessment was made as if the lots were 33 feet, 36 feet and 67 feet each, whereas said lots are each 33 feet front, we therefore recommend, that the assessment be reduced from \$35.93 to \$26.16.

In the matter of the petition of Frederick B. Gentlemen:—Your Lamp and Electrical Committee beg leave to submit the following report:

In relation to the application of the Western Union Telegraph Company to lay conduit on Exchange street from Court to Main street, your committee has carefully investigated the same and would respectfully recommend that it be denied.

The Rochester Gas & Electric Company, under a franchise granted by your honorable body, have expended large sums of money in the construction of conduits for the occupancy of all overhead wires. It would be manifestly unjust to this company to allow a small conduit to be laid which would only accommodate the company building it, and deprive the Rochester Gas & Electric Company from an occupant of their conduit to which they are justly entitled under their franchise.

In the matter of the application of the Citizens' Light & Power Company for permission to run temporary wires for lighting, without the erection of any additional poles, your committee have held several meetings and have investigated the matter thoroughly.

The conduit is nearing completion. There remains to be laid sections on North St. Paul street, State street and West Main street, together with the twenty-three additional man-holes ordered by your honorable body at its last meeting. Thus you will see that the days of unsightly poles and mass of overhead wires on our streets are numbered, being all removed in from three to four months.

In the meantime it seems to your committee to be only just and equitable that the Citizens' Light & Power Company be allowed to run a few temporary wires, under the direction of the City Electrician.

This company has several large orders for lighting, their plant is completed and they are prepared to give service. While your committee is strenuously opposed to laying any additional wires in the conduit territory, yet it would be manifestly unjust to the Citizens' Light & Power Company to arbitrarily prohibit them from getting temporary service. All wires which they may be allowed to run in the conduit territory, will be removed when so di-

rected by the Common Council or the City Electrician. In view of the fact that such permission is customary by the Subway Commission of New York city, and for the other reasons as above stated, your committee would recommend that the petition be granted.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—I am of the opinion that in order to secure the results which are expected from the paving of Main street, it will be necessary for your honorable body to establish

the grade of said street between Fitzhugh and Franklin streets by resolution; and that the grade so fixed shall be for the north rail of the north track and south rail of the south track of the street railway; and that the top of curb stone on each side of the street shall be upon grade lines two inches below and parallel to the described grade line; and that all sidewalks shall be made to conform to a grade of three-eighths (3/8) of an inch rise per foot from the curb lines so established.

If this is done, not only will many places, now dangerous as well as unsightly, be improved, but the street will be made worthy of Rochester, and will compare favorably with the great business streets of the world.

After careful study and mature reflection I venture to recommend to your honorable body the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

This grade will necessitate the following changes of existing curb lines:

At crosswalk east side of Fitzhugh street, raise north side 4 inches; raise south side 3 inches.

At crosswalk in front of entrance to Powers Hotel, raise north side 2 inches, leave south side as it is.

At crosswalk on west side of Irving place, raise north side 3 inches; raise south side 1 inch.

At east line of Irving place, raise north side 4 inches and lower south side 2 inches.

At crosswalk near center of Powers block, raise north side 2 inches; lower south side 2 inches.

At crosswalk west side of State street, lower both north and south sides one inch.

At crosswalk east side of State street, lower both north and south sides 2 inches.

At crosswalk opposite Reynolds Arcade, leave north side as it is and raise south side 2 inches.

At crosswalk west side of Aqueduct street, lower north side 2 inches; raise south side 2 inches.

At crosswalk east side of Aqueduct street, lower north side 2 inches; leave south side as it is.

At crosswalk midway from Aqueduct to Front street, raise north side 2 inches; raise south side 3 inches.

At west line of Graves street, raise south side 15 inches.

At west line of Front street, raise north side 12 inches.

At east line of Graves street, raise south side 12 inches.

At crosswalk on east side of Front street, raise north side 1 1/2 inches; leave south side as it is.

At first crosswalk east of Front street, raise north side 3 inches; lower south side 3 inches.

At second crosswalk east of Front street, raise north side 3 inches; lower south side 4 1/2 inches.

At third crosswalk east of Front street, raise north side 3 1/2 inches; lower south side 4 1/2 inches.

At east end of river bridge, raise north side 4 1/2 inches; lower south side 4 1/2 inches.

At west line of Water street, raise north side 5 1/2 inches; lower south side 6 inches.

At east line of Water street, raise north side 1 1/2 inches; lower south side 5 inches.

At crosswalk east of Liberty alley, leave north side as it is; lower south side 9 inches.

At wet line of St. Paul streets; lower south side 4 inches and leave north side as it is.

At east line of St. Paul streets, lower north side 6 inches and lower south side 6 inches.

At crosswalk east of St. Paul street, lower north side one inch and lower south side 6 inches.

At east line of Minerva place, raise north side one inch, lower south side 7 inches.

At crosswalk midway from Minerva place to Stone street, raise north side 1 1/2 inches; lower south side 6 inches.

At wet line of Stone street, raise north side 1-2 inch; lower south side 6 inches.

At east line of Stone street, leave north side as it is and lower south side 10 inches.

At a point 74 feet east of Stone street, lower north side 1 1/2 inches; lower south side 5 inches.

At crosswalk between Stone and Clinton streets, lower north side 4 inches; lower south side 5 1/2 inches.

At a point 90 feet west of Clinton street, lower north side 4 inches; lower south side 5 1/2 inches.

At west line of Clinton street, lower north side 6 inches; leave south side as it is.

At east line of Clinton street, lower north side 2 inches; leave south side as it is.

At half way between Clinton and Cortland street, leave both sides as they are.

At west line of Cortland street, leave north side as it is; lower south side one inch.

At a point 10 feet east of Cortland street, raise north side one inch; lower south side 1 1/2 inches.

At crosswalk west side of North avenue, raise north side 2 inches; leave south side as it is.

At west line of Elm street, lower north side one inch; leave south side as it is.

At east line of Elm street, lower north side 3 inches; leave south side as it is.

ACTION ON ORDINANCES.

FIRST ORDINANCES.

SEWER FROM THE CORNER OF SOUTH AVENUE AND ELMWOOD AVENUE TO SOUTH CLINTON AND GOODMAN STREET.

By Ald. Aikenhead—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a sewer from the corner of South avenue and Elmwood avenue to South Clinton street and Goodman street.

Adopted.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$87,000.

By Ald. Aikenhead—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, viz:

The construction of an outlet sewer in the following location, and to be of the required dimensions, viz:

Beginning at a point in the center of South avenue and Elmwood avenue, thence north 87 degrees, 15 minutes and 44 seconds, east along the center line of Elmwood avenue 564 feet, thence north 29 degrees, 29 minutes and 24 seconds east 695.57 feet through lands of the state of New York, and the county of Monroe, thence north 51 degrees, 39 minutes and 18 seconds east still through lands of the county of Monroe 774.59 feet, thence north 67 degrees, 54 minutes and 53 seconds east through lands of Ellwanger & Barry 483.77 feet, thence north 58 degrees, 56 minutes and 52 seconds east through lands of Ellwanger & Barry, across Highland avenue, and through lands of the city of Rochester 1,320.66 feet, thence north 70 degrees, 54 minutes and 5 seconds east through lands of the city of Rochester 545.08 feet to a point in the center of a proposed street 66 feet wide forming an extension of Goodman street, thence north 3 degrees, 21 minutes, 29 seconds east 539.41 feet to a point in the center line of Goodman street produced, thence north 22 degrees, 49 minutes, 45 seconds, east along said center line produced, and along the center line of Goodman street 3,236 feet to the East Side trunk sewer, and said sewer shall be of the following dimensions to wit: From the intersection of South and Elmwood avenues to the first point described as being in the center line of South Goodman street produced, a distance of 4,714.52 feet, it will be an 18-inch vitrified pipe without any inlets for surface water. From the point last mentioned for a distance of 600 feet it will be an egg-shaped brick tunnel four feet high by two feet eight and one-half inches wide, and from the end of the tunnel to the center of Warren street, a distance of 900 feet, it will be an 18-inch vitrified pipe, and from the center of Warren street to the East Side Trunk Sewer, a distance of 1,716 feet, it will be a stone sewer 2x2 feet, with arch and invert. Also the grading of the right of way necessary for said sewer between Highland avenue and the south end of South Goodman street in such a manner that said right of way shall form a continuation of South Goodman street, 66 feet wide, with slopes 1 1/2 to 1 from the end of South Goodman street to Highland avenue.

And Whereas, The City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at \$37,000, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, That the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for the whole expense thereof, viz:

All the property included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning on the east line of Goodman street at South Clinton street, thence southerly along South Goodman street, including one tier of lots on the east side thereof, but excluding the lot on the southeast corner of South Clinton street to the southwest corner of town lot No. 52; thence easterly on the south line of said lot No. 52 to the city boundary line; thence southerly along the said city boundary line to Highland avenue; thence westerly along Highland avenue to the easterly boundary line of lands of the county of Monroe; thence southerly along said east line of Monroe county lands, and state hospital lands to Elmwood avenue; thence westerly along Elmwood avenue to Mt. Hope avenue; thence northerly along Mt. Mr. A. H. Dewey, Chairman Electrical Committee of the Common Council:

My Dear Sir: Having been appointed by your committee superintendent of construction of the new electric conduit, I offer the following report:

The conduits are now completed and ready for service. Indeed, in some of them conductors are already in operation. The number of ducts laid in each street is shown in the accompanying list.

As you ask me for some expression of personal opinion of the practical features of the conduit from an electrical engineer's standpoint, I will freely give it.

The contract drawn up by your committee,

assisted by the City Electrician, is, in many ways, a model. Although the work was to be done by a company already in the business of supplying light and power, it provided for future competing companies by the payment of a fair rental. Since the work has been commenced, such companies have begun work, and one of them is already giving service.

The system adopted by the Rochester Gas & Electric Company is a system of vitrified tile duct, cylindrical in their inner section and rectangular outside. These are laid in a bed of concrete, end to end, and proper means employed to clean out any cement which may have found its way into the ducts. When the concrete once sets the whole forms a rigid mass, pierced with holes, which cannot readily be injured, and, so far as mechanical considerations go, quite a perfect arrangement. At the street corners, bends and in some cases elsewhere, the ducts are taken into manholes of brick, from which cross-over connection or near-by service wires may be readily connected. Three of the top ducts are also let into smaller subsidiary manholes for service wires of the R. G. & E. Co. These manholes are for their own private use, and were the cause of a remonstrance from the Citizen's Company at the outset. Your committee has settled this matter very properly by having many additional manholes into which all of the ducts run, so placed that any of the tenants of the sub-way may have proper opportunities for connecting service wires. If this had not been done, any company other than the R. G. & E. Co. would have been compelled to distribute as best it could from the street corners.

The work, as a whole, has been extremely well done. The company has spared neither time nor expense to make the conduits perfectly satisfactory to any competent engineer who may have occasion for their use. I am familiar, to some extent, with the systems in use in other cities, and have no hesitation in saying that for the purposes contemplated, the conduits now laid in Rochester are not only the best built, but the most practically adapted. In my opinion, the idea of your committee in putting the work into the hands of the Gas Company, was a far better plan than to have had a special conduit company. This is because of the large number of changes of location in gas mains, made necessary as the work progressed. No doubt many people have been greatly annoyed at the tearing up of the streets for this work, and it is possible that at some points there was some unnecessary delay, but I am sure if the people looked into the ditch and saw the strange assortment of odds and ends, of dead pipes, sewer laterals and the like, which had to be disposed of as the work proceeded, they would have wondered how any headway was made at all.

It seems to me that some sort of restriction must eventually be placed on the kind of tenants which the conduit is to have. As the tenants become more numerous the man-holes will necessarily be more filled up with wires and cables. If these wires carry high tension currents the insulation must be kept at a very high standard to make it safe for workmen, whose duties may take them into the man-holes.

I would say finally, that the entire work has my heartiest commendation. It has been executed under the personal supervision of engineers, Charles N. Munger and C. N. Pratt. To these gentlemen, and also to the superintendent, G. A. Redman, the writer is indebted for uniform courtesy and good-will. I remain,

Gentlemen:—Your Special Committee appointed to investigate a new system of lighting for Main street would respectfully submit the following report:

We visited New York city and thoroughly investigated the Fifth avenue system, and called upon all the large manufacturers of poles and electrical apparatus for lighting. We were so well satisfied with what we found, that it was considered advisable not to extend our trip to any other cities.

The system now in use on Fifth avenue consists of an ornamental iron lamp post, about 18 feet high with cross-arm about two feet from top of pole. To this cross-arm are attached two (2) Edison Incandescent Arc lamps of 1,000 candle power each. The effect thus derived is very handsome and the light is more thoroughly distributed than by the single lamp plan. Your committee also visited the well-known factory of the General Incandescent Arc Light Company, and were very favorably impressed with a new pole and lamps, which this company are about to put upon the market. The pole is neat and symmetrical, and the lamp and hood as near perfect as possible.

Your committee has secured one of these poles complete with the lamps, at no expense to the city, and it will be forwarded as soon as it can be made, probably in ten days. It is the intention of your committee to have this pole erected on Main street where the public can see it and judge better of the advisability of substituting it for the ungainly wooden poles now in use.

It is of course expected that the expense of changing the poles and present system of lighting will be borne by the company now having the contract for the city lighting, and your committee would recommend that the Lamp and Electrical Committee be authorized to enter into negotiations with the Rochester Gas & Electric Company with this end in view.

Perhaps in this connection it would not be out of place to call the attention of your honorable body to the fact that no arrangement has as yet been made to relieve Main and State streets from the trolley poles, and to that end it would seem advisable that your Lamp & Electrical Committee be authorized to enter

into negotiations with the Rochester Railway Company with that end in view.

Your committee is impressed with the necessity of a change from our present system on Main and State street, and if once tried the result will be so satisfactory that in a few years, at most, all our main thoroughfares will be lighted in this modern manner, and the unsightly wooden poles become a relic of the dim past.

Gentlemen:—The Lawyers Co-Operative Publishing Company, a corporation of the city of Rochester, N. Y., owner of the original lots fifteen (15) and sixteen (16), of that part of the "Thousand Acre Tract" so called, afterward designated as the "Lake View Tract" in the northern part of the city of Rochester, N. Cook—Whereas, Andrews street bridge is being built under Final Ordinance, No. 4,864, which provides for building a stone arch bridge and approaches, and provides for raising the west end of said bridge so as to necessitate rebuilding Mumford street from Front street to the end of the bridge, and

Whereas, The estimate in said ordinance provides for merely relaying the old pavement and curbs, and

Whereas, The width of the street between curbs both at the west and east ends will be but 32 feet while the width of street between curbs on the bridge will be 40 feet, and

Whereas, In the opinion of this Council the requirements of the traffic on the street will make it necessary to have th roadway full forty feet wide from Water street to Front street.

Resolved, That the Executive Board be requested to make the roadway of Andrews street forty feet wide from the west end of

the new stone arch bridge to Front street and from the east end of said bridge to Water street, and set six-inch curb stones on each side and with a radius of ten feet at the corner of Front street and Water street and relay the sidewalk flag on south side of Andrews street between east end of bridge and Water street to a straight grade, level with grade established for curb on north side opposite, and pave the roadway with Medina stone with joints filled with cement grout, and the extra cost of said work above the amount estimated for in the ordinance, which is estimated at \$3,000, shall be paid from the treasury of the city of Rochester, from the proceeds of bonds issued or to be issued for the purpose of building bridges as authorized by the laws of the state of New York as may hereafter from time to time be directed by this Common Council.

SEWER FROM THE CORNER OF SOUTH AVENUE AND ELMWOOD AVENUE TO SOUTH CLINTON AND GOODMAN STREET.

On motion of Ald. Aikenhead, the Common Council proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the following ordinance, viz:

An ordinance to construct a sewer from the corner of South avenue and Elmwood avenue to South Clinton street and Goodman street.

And after hearing such allegations from all persons appearing.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester, do ordain and determine that the following improvement is necessary, and should be made, to wit:

The construction of an outlet sewer in the following location, and to be of the required dimensions, viz:

Beginning at a point in the center of South avenue and Elmwood avenue, thence north 87 degrees, 15 minutes and 44 seconds, east along the center line of Elmwood avenue 564 feet, thence north 29 degrees, 29 minutes and 24 seconds east 695.67 feet through lands of the state of New York, and the county of Monroe, thence north 51 degrees, 39 minutes and 18 seconds east still through lands of the county of Monroe 774.59 feet, thence north 67 degrees, 54 minutes and 53 seconds east through lands of the County of Monroe, and lands of Ellwanger & Barry 483.77 feet, thence north 55 degrees, 56 minutes and 52 seconds east through lands of Ellwanger & Barry, across Highland avenue, and through lands of the city of Rochester 1,320.66 feet, thence north 70 degrees, 54 minutes and 5 seconds east through lands of the city of Rochester 545.08 feet to a point in the center of a proposed street 66 feet wide forming an extension of Goodman street, thence north 3 degrees, 21 minutes, 29 seconds east 339.41 feet to a point in the center line of Goodman street produced, thence north 22 degrees, 49 minutes, 45 seconds, east along said

center line produced, and along the center line of Goodman street 3,236 feet to the East Side trunk sewer, and said sewer shall be of the following dimensions to wit: From the intersection of South and Elmwood avenues to the first point described as being in the center line of South Goodman street produced, a distance of 4,714.52 feet, it will be an 18-inch vitrified pipe without any inlets for surface water. From the point last mentioned for a distance of 600 feet it will be an egg-shaped brick tunnel four feet high by two feet eight and one-half inches wide, and from the end of the tunnel to the center of Warren street, a distance of 900 feet, it will be an 18-inch vitrified pipe, and from the center of Warren street to the East Side Trunk Sewer, a distance of 1,716 feet, it will be a stone sewer 2x2 feet with arch and invert. Also the grading of the right of way necessary for said sewer between Highland avenue and the south end of South Goodman street in such a manner that said right of way shall form a continuation of South Goodman street, 66 feet wide, with slopes 1.12 to 1 from the end of South Goodman street to Highland avenue.

And the City Surveyor, under direction of this Council, having made and reported as an estimate of the expense thereof, the sum of \$37,000, which being deemed reasonable is hereby approved, and the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon the following portion and part of the city an advantage from such improvement, to wit:

All the property included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning on the east line of Goodman street at South Clinton street, thence southerly along South Goodman street, including one tier of lots on the east side thereof, but excluding the lot on the southeast corner of South Clinton street to the southwest corner of town lot No. 52; thence easterly on the south line of said lot No. 52 to the city boundary line; thence southerly along the said city boundary line to Highland avenue; thence westerly along Highland avenue to the easterly boundary line of lands of the county of Monroe; thence southerly along said east line of Monroe county lands, and state hospital lands to Elmwood avenue; thence westerly along Elmwood avenue to Mt. Hope avenue; thence northerly along Mt. Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee begs leave to present the following report:

In pursuance of a resolution of this Common Council heretofore duly adopted, the City Treasurer advertised a sale for October 18th, of one million dollars worth of the city's water and East Side Sewer bonds. At that sale no bidders appeared, and the sale was held open for two weeks. A meeting of your Finance Committee was held on October 23rd, at which representatives from all of the banks of Rochester were present, and the city's financial situation was thoroughly discussed. Estimates had been procured from the various departments as to the amount of money which would be necessary to meet the October budget, to be presented at this meeting. These estimates amount, in round numbers, to nearly

\$400,000, including nearly \$200,000 for payment on account of new water conduit. At that time the cash on hand in the City Treasurer's office was less than \$50,000, and the receipts of the office were averaging about \$2,000 per day; so that it was apparent that by the time the money would be needed, there would be on hand, available for the purpose of meeting the budget, not to exceed sixty or seventy thousand dollars. All of the banks were canvassed for the purpose of procuring a loan, but in the present condition of finances, none of them seemed willing to lend the city any money. Your committee, therefore, deemed it advisable that a sub-committee should go to New York for the purpose of negotiating a temporary loan, and the chairman of the Finance committee, together with Aldermen Dewey and Lewis, were selected as members of the Finance Committee's sub-committee. It was also thought advisable that the City Treasurer and Mr. H. C. Brewster of the Traders Bank, should accompany the sub-committee, which they did. Upon their visit to New York, the committee called upon various banks and trust companies, and also upon dealers in municipal bonds. They were able to negotiate with the Union Trust Company, of New York, for a temporary loan of \$200,000, to be secured by the note of the city, to be signed by the treasurer and countersigned by the chairman of the Finance Committee, and to be payable on the first day of August next, with interest at 6 per cent., payable on the first day of August. This note to be issued in anticipation of taxes levied and not yet collected. In the judgment of your committee, it is advisable that this loan be consummated and the proceeds placed to the credit of the contingent fund, and sufficient moneys transferred from that fund to the additional water supply fund to meet the estimates included in the October budget.

Your committee was also able to negotiate with the Union Trust Company, of New York, for the sale of \$200,000 worth of local assessment bonds, heretofore authorized by this council, said bonds to mature on October 1, 1894, interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, payable May 1st, and October 1, 1894. The proceeds of such sale of bonds should be placed in the contingent fund, so as to be available for whatever purposes may be required, and can be transferred to whatever fund may need it. Your committee has been convinced of the fact that it will probably be impossible to secure an immediate sale for the city's water and sewer bonds at a rate of interest less than 4 per cent. per annum. It was the judgment of the members of the conference representing the several banks of the city, that if the bonds could be negotiated at four per cent. per annum, a sufficient quantity should be sold to carry the work along for at least a year, but on their visit to New York, the members of the sub-committee of your Finance Committee were convinced, after careful investigation, that if a small amount of bonds could be sold immediately, even at 4 per cent., it would be well to effect such sale, and the balance of the bonds should be reserved to be sold at such time as the moneys should be absolutely required, as your committee believes that within the next few months such bonds can be sold bearing 3 1-2 per cent. interest.

Your committee, therefore, recommends that the resolution heretofore adopted, directing the sale of the city's water and sewer bonds be reconsidered, and that such resolution shall be amended by striking out the words "3 1-2 per cent. per annum" and inserting the words "4 per cent. per annum." and that the treasurer shall be directed to sell such amount of bonds as may be deemed advisable, at a rate of interest not to exceed 4 per cent. per annum.

Your committee further recommends that the City Treasurer be authorized to make the city's note for \$200,000, payable to the order of the Union Trust Company, of New York, interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, payable on the first day of August. That said note be signed by the treasurer and countersigned by the chairman of the Finance Committee. Your committee further asks that the action of the committee in sending a sub-committee to New York to negotiate required loans, be ratified and approved.

Gentlemen—Your Law Committee, begs leave to make the following report:

In the matter of the claim of John C. Howard, for damages occasioned by an accident on the 16th day of July, 1893, on North Clinton street, we have caused the same to be thoroughly investigated, and we learn from such investigation, that said Howard while driving with his horse and buggy on North Clinton street, broke through a crust of earth which covered a newly constructed sewer on that street and injuring his horse, breaking his buggy harness and doing injury to himself and members of the family who were in the buggy. From the investigation made by the City Attorney, we recommend that a settlement be secured, for the reason, that some damages could be recovered from the city, if the claim were sued. The proposition to settle the claim for one hundred dollars (\$100) has been made to the committee, and we recommend that this proposition be accepted.

In the matter of the claim of Catherine Lewis, for damages occasioned by a fall on a sidewalk on Hawley street, we caused the city attorney to make a careful investigation of the matter and learned from the investigation that the woman is 88 years of age and while walking tripped on a loose plank and dislocated her elbow, from which she has suffered great pain and has been partially disabled since then. She claims \$2,500, for damages and we have offered to settle her claim for the sum of \$250, which she has accepted, and we therefore recommend that the claim be settled at the sum of \$250.

The account of the Rochester Printing Company of \$20.75, for printing the constitution and by-laws of the board of Plumbers and plumbing, having been referred to this committee by this council to determine whether the city is liable for this account, we are of the opinion, that under the statute creating the board the city is liable for reasonable expenses accrued by it and therefore recommend that said account be paid.

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Dewey—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your special committee on amendments to the bicycle ordinance would respectfully submit the following report:

Your committee held a public meeting to hear complaints from the public at large and suggestions from the Rochester Wheelman's League. The latter organization was represented by a committee of five business men, but much to the surprise of your committee, no person appeared to prefer complaints or charges against the wheelmen, although a special invitation had been sent to a number of gentlemen who had voiced their complaints through the public press and otherwise.

The position taken by the Rochester Wheelman's League, representing a good many hundred of our business and professional men, seems to be a fair one. They seem to fully

realize that they are allowed on the walks through the courtesy of your honorable body, and they are desirous of doing all in their power to enforce the present existing ordinance, and any others which your honorable body may enact. Your committee has deemed it advisable to include the following communication presented to your special committee by the Rochester Wheelman's League, as the same shows their position in the matter:

"The Rochester Wheelman's League fully appreciate the fact that sidewalk riding is a privilege granted us by the common council, and that it is not a right. The league does hereby pledge itself to continue to use every endeavor to have the ordinance lived up to by the wheelmen of Rochester, and does hereby request the proper authorities to have the policemen arrest any and all violators of the ordinance, and that such persons upon conviction shall be fined in every instance. We would also request that the policemen be given special instructions to watch the bridges at the hours of seven, twelve, one and six o'clock, especially Vincent, Platt, Mumford, Court and Clarissa streets. The league has mailed a copy of the ordinance to all persons whose names appear on the city clerk's registry, so that no person has cause to say that violation occurred through ignorance. We have also furnished the entire police force with a copy of the same, and have kindly agreed with the city clerk, who has kindly agreed to give one to each person upon registering his wheel. We would request that the present ordinance relating to sidewalk riding and registration be rigidly enforced. That no person shall be allowed to rent unregistered wheels under a penalty of \$10 for each offense, and that all persons renting wheels shall be responsible for all damage done by parties renting such wheels. That a person selling or trading a wheel shall be obliged to go to the city clerk and have such wheel transferred, and if such transfer is not made, the city shall hold him liable for any damage done by a wheel having that number on. That the present ordinance be amended so as to include all streets having asphalt, brick, cedar block or Medina block pavements. That we respectfully ask this committee to see if some means cannot be provided to stop the flooding of the streets which have been so improved, so that they may be used without danger to wheelmen. This would be a benefit not only to the wheelmen, but all persons owning carriages and who use them either for pleasure or business. We would also call attention to the fact, that while realizing that the use of the sidewalk is a privilege, still supposing that this would be continued to us, a large amount of money has been invested, and if we are deprived of these privileges, fully \$300,000 will have to be sacrificed. The 6,000 wheels in use in the city of Rochester are ridden almost entirely for business purposes and scarcely a business house of any size but would be directly or indirectly effected if the privilege granted us should be withdrawn. These wheels are used by all classes of citizens, from the highest to the lowest; laborers, mechanics, collectors, mail carriers, clerks, tradesmen, architects, lawyers, doctors, ministers, school teachers, typewriters and our daughters attending the schools and academies throughout the city. They are a necessity to the business man, a boon to the mechanic, allowing him to live in the suburbs of the city where rents are low, and thus enabling him to bring up his family surrounded by fresh air, instead of being driven into a tenement house in the center of the city; a means of health to the invalid who cannot afford to hire or own a carriage. Gentlemen, the bicycle has become a necessity to all classes and conditions of men. It has come to stay, and we hope and

trust and believe that you will do nothing to cripple its use in the city of Rochester."

Your committee has carefully weighed all suggestions made by the Rochester Wheelman's League and the public generally for and against the use of the wheel, and is of the opinion that the privilege now enjoyed should be continued, but that the present ordinance should be more rigidly enforced, and such new ones adopted as will serve to lessen the danger of accidents.

There seems to be no excuse for a wheelman using the walks of a street that is well paved, and your committee would recommend that an ordinance be adopted prohibiting all wheelmen from riding on the walks of any street that is now paved or hereafter may be paved with asphalt, brick, cedar block or Medina block pavement. Your committee would further suggest that no wheelman be allowed to use the sidewalk on East avenue within the city limits.

It is evident that the larger percentage of accidents are caused by too rapid riding. This fast riding on our public streets has increased wonderfully of late, and is particularly noticeable among the younger wheelmen, many of whom do not carry brakes, and so cannot control the speed of their wheel when approaching a sharp corner or in danger of collision. It seems to your committee that the proper place for fast riding is on the race track or some country road, and they would recommend that an ordinance be adopted which shall provide that any person who shall ride or propel any cycle or other vehicle upon the sidewalk, between the hours of 6 A. M. and 11 P. M., at a greater rate of speed than seven miles per hour, shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$25, or more than \$50 for each offense.

In conclusion your committee have only to add, that they are convinced that if the above suggestions are adopted, and the ordinances strictly enforced by the police department, the danger from bicycle riding will be very materially lessened, if not stopped entirely. All of which is respectfully submitted.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—The matter of the Plymouth avenue improvement having been referred to me by this council, I have carefully inquired into the facts and find that the ordinance for the improvement assesses the property on both sides of Plymouth avenue, from Spring street to the W. N. Y. & P. R. R. Co. The original surveys of Plymouth avenue continue the street through the center of what is now known as Plymouth park. The roadway around the east and west side of this park is not a part of Plymouth avenue according to these surveys. It was assumed by the Common Council that the roadways around the park were properly Plymouth avenue, and the improvement has been made on the two road-

ways around the park, but no improvement has been made under the ordinance on Plymouth avenue proper, running through the park. Any assessment for the improvement upon the roadway around the parks cannot be included under the ordinance including Plymouth avenue proper. It is my opinion, that should the assessment for Plymouth avenue improvement include the costs for the roadway around the park it would make the assessment void. The cost of the improvement for the roadways around Plymouth park must be deducted from the total cost of the improvement of Plymouth avenue, and the balance can only be assessed upon the territory described in the ordinance as provided in the charter. The Council has the power and authority under the charter to enact a supplemental ordinance for the payment of the cost of the improvement around the roadways of the park and assess such territory as may be described in this ordinance, or can pay this amount from the contingent fund.

Gentlemen:—Your Law Committee begs leave to make the following report:

The matter of the claim of Elizabeth Collins for damages caused by the discharge of sewage upon her premises has been carefully considered by your committee and we learn that her property has been considerably damaged by reason of such pollution since the 27th of October, 1890. She has made a claim against the city for \$750 damages, but has finally accepted an offer made by the committee for \$250 for all past and future damages. Inasmuch as we consider this a very reasonable settlement for the damages sustained we recommend that a resolution be adopted settling the claim at this figure.

In the matter of the resolution passed October 17, 1893, directing the settlement of the claim of Joseph Schrader for sewage damages, we have since learned that the interest of Joseph Schrader in said property has been transferred and that he is unable to settle the claim for future damages to the premises in question. We learn that the transfer of this property was made about one year ago and that the amount offered to Schrader is more, in the opinion of the committee, than he has sustained as damages. We recommend that said resolution be reconsidered and that the resolution be adopted recommending the payment of \$250 in settlement of all damages sustained by Schrader upon his property.

In the matter of the amount due Martha Dickinson upon the contract entered into between her and the city of Rochester, we have been advised by the City Attorney that she is entitled to the sum of \$400 under the provisions of the contract, November 8, 1893. We therefore recommend that an order be drawn by the City Clerk in her favor for said amount.

In the matter of the application for the appointment of commissioners of deeds, your

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City
 of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Support and Relief of the Poor reports as follows:

The stringency of the times and the lack of employment among the laboring classes who depend upon their daily labor for the support of themselves and their families, is particularly observed and felt in the poor department of our city.

November 1, 1892, the undrawn balance of the Poor Fund was \$47,489.11, while this year the balance undrawn November 1st was \$36,380.15, showing that the fund on November 1st is less \$11,108.06 than it was a year ago. At this time there are in round numbers 100 families on the list as receiving aid from the city more than there was at the corresponding time a year ago, and with the prospect that as the winter closes in there will be urgent and increasing demands made upon the city to aid many worthy people who through no fault of theirs are compelled by force of circumstances to seek it—many of whom never before were compelled to seek such relief.

This condition of things has been to a certain extent anticipated by the poor department, and every effort has been made to protect its fund—claims for aid have been closely scrutinized to the end that none but those in actual need would receive consideration—and all expenditures which have been a charge upon this fund have been very carefully examined. But, notwithstanding, it seems altogether probable that before the end of this fiscal year the Common Council will be called upon to meet a deficiency in the Poor Fund due to hard times and lack of employment.

The City and St. Mary's Hospitals, by their representatives, appeared before your committee urging among other things that an allowance be made of five dollars (\$5) for each charity surgical operation, claiming that about that expense is necessarily incurred in every surgical operation, and for which no provision is made by the city, and which they, the hospitals, of course, have to stand. It was also urged upon your committee that the city pay eight dollars (\$8) per week instead of five dollars (\$5) per week as is now the arrangement in the case of surgical patients until sufficiently recovered, that special care and nursing is not required. The hospitals of this city though justly credited with a great amount of charity, are not self-sustaining themselves, there is always a deficiency which is made up by donations from those of our citizens who are not only public-spirited but charitably inclined, and your committee is disposed to co-operate with these institutions as far as possible, but before taking action your committee determined to visit the hospitals with a view of becoming more fully satisfied as to what course to pursue, and at a time in the near future take the matter up and make some recommendation with reference to the appropriations asked for.

The hospitals also complain that oftentimes there are charity cases which are brought directly to the hospital, the exigencies of the case requiring that course to be pursued, leaving no opportunity for the department to examine into the case before they are received into the hospital. And if the examination which the city makes will not warrant the city to assume the expenses of the case, the hospital often fails to get compensation for services rendered, then again a patient may be brought to the hospital upon an order from the overseer of the poor directing the care for such patient for a specified time, when oftentimes at the expiration of the time mentioned the case has not recovered and must still be kept in the hospital, the order is not renewed and the hospital is called upon to pay the expenses of the patient from the expiration of the time mentioned in the order, for obvious reasons, no hospital could turn out upon the street a sick patient—humane considerations are a sufficient bar to such a course.

Your committee therefore recommend that the rule in emergency cases be relaxed to the extent that matters arising by reason of such

cases shall be fairly and equitably adjusted as between the city and the hospitals, and that the overseer of the poor furnish with each order to the hospital a brief statement of the facts in each case so that the hospitals by such information may be able to protect themselves against impositions upon them by unworthy seekers after charity.

Another matter which your committee discussed was the fact that there were now at the hospitals in this city and have been for many years a number of charity patients consisting for the most part of old men and women who are suffering more or less from the infirmities of age, and require as such cases do, more or less medical treatment. There are now 55 of such cases in the hospitals in this city, and for each case is drawn \$1.75 per week. For a year for the care of this number of patients it does amount to over \$5,000. Your committee believes that a large majority of such persons should be supported by the county, and our poor fund saved that expenditure, and as a matter of fact at the present rates for county poor the people who pay the taxes would have about \$1,200 less to pay every year for the support of these 55 cases if the county instead of the city had charge of them.

We therefore recommend that the overseer of the poor be especially careful with reference to granting orders upon the hospitals to this class of cases, and that no further orders be given to persons where it may appear that it is the intention to make the hospital a home. The hospitals themselves will certainly in this connection be willing to co-operate with the city for it was claimed before your committee on their part that as a business proposition persons could not be supported in the hospitals at \$1.75 per week without financial loss.

Gentlemen:—Two partial or approximate estimates in favor of the Carroll-Porter Boiler & Tank Company, of Pittsburg, Pa., and the Central Bridge & Engineering Company, of Peterboro, Ont., respectively, for 60-inch steel intake pipe and flexible joints furnished by said parties for the new conduit, were duly presented by the Chief Engineer of the Water Works, and audited by this Board, on October 27, 1893.

In consequence of the requirement that all such estimates be sworn to by the contractors, before presentation to your Finance Committee for audit, these two estimates were immediately after their audit by the Executive Board, on the date mentioned, sent to the said contractors at Pittsburg, Pa., and Peterboro, Ont., respectively, with the request for their immediate return after proper acknowledgment before a notary public. Both of the parties maintain that they complied with the request immediately on receipt of said estimates, and immediately mailed them back to the Executive Board. Through some delay in the mails, however, neither of these two estimates reached the

Executive Board in time for presentation to the Council on October 31, but appear to have arrived by the night trains on that day, since they came to hand on the following morning. Both of the contractors mentioned have written contracts with the city stipulating for payment of their estimates on or before the 15th of the month following that in which the estimate was made, and both of said parties allege that they are in urgent need of the amounts respectively due them under said contracts, and will be greatly embarrassed if such payment is deferred. FIRST ORDINANCES.

RIGHT OF WAY FOR STATE HOSPITAL OUTLET SEWER.

By Ald. Aikenhead—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary and we hereby judge that the public good requires the same to be done, viz:

The acquirement of the necessary easements in and rights of way for the construction and maintenance of the State Hospital and South Goodman street sewer, as described in Ord. No. 5,252. The land to be taken for said easement is described as follows: A strip of land sixty-six feet wide, extending from the southerly end of Goodman street to Highland avenue and the center line of said strip is described as follows: Beginning at a point in the center of Goodman street at its south end, thence south 22 degrees 49 minutes and 45 seconds west on prolongation of the center line of said Goodman street, 681.40 feet; thence on a curve to the left with a radius of 81,065 feet to a point which is 15.17 feet easterly from said center line of Goodman street prolonged, and measured at right angles therefrom, from a point in said line 179.11 feet from the last aforesaid point in said line; thence on a curve to the right with a radius of 800 feet to a point which is 5.07 feet easterly from the aforementioned prolongation of the center line of Goodman street, and measured at right angles therefrom, from a point in said line which is 318.79 feet from the last aforementioned point in said line; thence on a curve to the left with a radius of 399 feet to a point which is 48.42 feet easterly from the aforementioned prolongation of the center line of Goodman street, and measured at right angles therefrom, from a point in said line which is 292.45 feet from the last mentioned point in said line; thence on a curve to the right with a radius of 498.5 feet to a point which is 112.87 feet easterly from the aforementioned prolongation of the center line of Goodman street, and measured at right angles therefrom, from a point in said line which is 305.98 feet from the last mentioned point in said line; thence southerly in a straight line 105.04 feet to a point in the northerly line of Highland avenue, which is 101.24 feet easterly from the aforementioned prolongation of the center line of Goodman street and measured at right angles therefrom, from a point which is 104.39 feet from the last aforementioned point in said line.

Also a strip of land twenty feet wide, extending from the above described parcel to Elmwood avenue, the center line of which is described as follows: Beginning at a point in the center line of the above described 66 foot strip, said point being 113.14 feet easterly from the center line of the aforementioned prolongation of the center line of Goodman street, said distance being measured at right angles to said prolonged line at a point in said line which is 281.2 feet northerly from the point where said line prolonged intersects the north line of Highland avenue, thence south 70 degrees 54 minutes 5 seconds west

545.08 feet to an angle; thence south 58 degrees 57 minutes 9 seconds west 1,320.87 feet to an angle; thence south 67 degrees 54 minutes 53 seconds west, 483.77 feet to an angle; thence south 52 degrees 14 minutes 15 seconds west 768.45 feet to an angle; thence south 29 degrees 29 minutes 24 seconds west 659.65 feet to the north line of Elmwood avenue.

Resolved, further, that the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for the whole expense thereof, viz:

All the property included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz.:

Beginning on the east line of Goodman street at South Clinton street, thence southerly along South Goodman street, including one tier of lots on the east side thereof, but excluding the lot on the southeast corner of South Clinton street to the southwest corner of town lot No. 52; thence easterly on the south line of said lot No. 52 to the city boundary line; thence southerly along the said city boundary line to Highland avenue; thence westerly along Highland avenue to the easterly boundary line of lands of the county of Monroe; thence southerly along said east line of Monroe county lands, and state hospital lands to Elmwood avenue; thence westerly along Elmwood avenue to Mt. Hope avenue; thence northerly along Mt. Hope avenue to Highland avenue; thence easterly along Highland avenue, including one tier of lots on the north side thereof, excepting the lot on the northeast corner of Mt. Hope avenue to South avenue; thence northerly along South avenue to Reservoir avenue, including one tier of lots on the west side thereof; thence easterly along Reservoir avenue, and along the line of said avenue produced to a point 650 feet westerly from and measured at right angles from the center line of South Goodman street produced; thence northerly parallel to and 650 feet distant from the center line of South Goodman street produced, and South Goodman street to a point in the south line of Whitmore park produced easterly, excepting one tier of lots on each side of Benton street, west of Seager street, and also one tier of lots on each side of Yale street, west to a point 250 feet east of Meigs street; thence easterly parallel to Caroline street, to South Goodman street and point of beginning, in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom.

One tier of lots and parcels of land on the south side of St. Joseph park, in front of which the proposed work shall be performed, in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom.

First ordinance for relaying the walks on Union street came up and upon motion of Ald. Dewey action thereon was indefinitely postponed.

First ordinance for a bridge over the Carroll and Fitzhugh race at Court street, came up.

Ald. McMillan moved that it be referred to the Public Improvement Committee.

Ald. Dewey moved as an amendment that the matter be referred to the Special Committee on Court street bridge. Carried.

Original resolution as amended carried.

By Ald. One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Orchard street, from Jay street to Smith street.

By Ald. Johnston—

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen: I present herewith charges against the Executive Board and its members and ask that they be investigated and reported upon.

They are made free from all malice and with the sincere belief that they will be productive of good to all concerned, and especially so to the large number of property owners and taxpayers in our city.

The city charter gives the Executive Board control of the Street, Fire and Water Departments of our city and provides in section 149 that "the members of the said board shall give their entire time to the duties of the office."

Said charter also provides in section 147 for a maximum salary of \$3,500 and each of the members of said board receives that amount.

Section 153 of the charter provides as follows: "The said Executive Board shall make monthly reports to the Common Council of their expenditures and the condition of the funds under their control." also that, "they shall keep a record of their proceedings and of all receipts and expenditures, which shall be published in at least one daily paper in said city."

Section 148 provides that "all lawful expenses of the Executive Board and all the accounts and demands lawfully contracted by that board, shall be by it examined, audited and settled and then certified to the Common Council for approval, and after the same shall be approved by the Common Council, the clerk of said Executive Board shall draw orders upon the Treasurer, payable from the proper funds set apart by the Common Council for

said Executive Board, as provided herein, excepting only that moneys to be disbursed for labor, to the amount of not more than five thousand dollars in any one week, may be drawn by orders or warrants made by the Executive Board directly upon the City Treasurer, who shall pay the same when there are funds for the purpose."

This latter clause being undoubtedly intended to provide for the prompt payment of the small sums due the numerous street laborers and not to provide for the payment of the regular salaried officials connected with the department. The custom of the Executive Board is and has been to include all salaries for street department employes, such as the street superintendent and assistants, foremen, inspectors, special policemen and office clerks in the weekly labor budget and not report them in any manner, either itemized or general for the approval of the Common Council, unless the budget exceeds \$5,000, and then report the excess amount only.

Under this condition of affairs the expenditures through the Street Department have increased from \$45,451 in 1880, to \$216,328 in 1892, an amount beyond all proportion to the city's growth in population and real estate valuation, and the expenditures in 1892 do not include the cost of cleaning the asphalt and brick paved streets, amounting to \$13,766.

The Executive Board furnishes an itemized monthly statement of all disbursements for materials and supplies through the Street Department for the approval of the council, but does not furnish for this council's approval any statement, either itemized or general, of the amounts expended for labor and salaries. Therefore in omitting to furnish a general statement of the expenditures for labor and an itemized statement of the salaried employes in said department, it is charged, first, with being inconsistent, irregular and with violating both the letter and spirit of the charter.

The Executive Board controls all the Fire Department expenditures and they have increased from \$32,442 in 1880, to \$182,042 in 1892.

It furnishes for the approval of this council an itemized monthly statement of all disbursements for material and supplies and while its members are permitted to employ whomsoever they desire, there is no provision in the charter authorizing them to withhold a similar statement of the salaries of their employes in this department, and in omitting to furnish said statement they are charged, second, with being inconsistent, irregular and with violating both the letter and the spirit of the charter.

The said Executive Board also controls all Water Works receipts and expenditures and while its control of this department is more full and complete than its control of the other two, there is no provision in the charter authorizing them to withhold an itemized monthly statement of their expenditures through it, but on the contrary the charter distinctly says that such statement shall be made. The operating expenses of the water system alone, not including any expenditures for water pipe extension, have increased from \$39,156 in 1880, to \$155,648 in 1892.

The said board furnishes for the approval of this council an itemized monthly statement of all expenditures for water works materials and supplies, but fails to furnish a similar itemized statement showing the salaries of the employes in this department, and in omitting to furnish this latter statement, it is charged, third, with being inconsistent, irregular and with violating both the letter and spirit of the charter.

Under date of April 18, 1893, this Common Council adopted unanimously a resolution calling the Executive Board's attention to its

large and constantly increasing expenditures through the highway fund, and asking for information about the cost of cleaning our different classes of streets. Not receiving any reply, this council again, under date of August 8, 1893, adopted unanimously a second resolution asking the said board for the information referred to, but as yet no reply has been received. The said Executive Board is therefore charged, fourth, with being disrespectful to this council, negligent in its official duties, and indifferent in its management of the street department, to the property owning and tax-paying interests in our city.

These charges may be summarized as follows:

VIOLATIONS OF THE CHARTER.

First (A)—In not reporting for this council's approval any statement, either itemized or general, of the Street Department officials and their salaries.

(B)—In not reporting for this council's approval any statement, either itemized or general, of the Street Department expenditures for labor.

Second—In not reporting for this council's approval any itemized statement of the Fire Department officials and employes and their salaries.

Third—In not reporting for this council's approval any itemized statement of the Water Works Department officials and employes and their salaries.

Fourth—Disrespect to this council, negligence in their official duties and indifference to the interests of the tax-payers and property owners.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your finance committee, to which was referred charges preferred by Alderman James Johnston of the ninth ward, against the Executive Board, begs leave to present the following report:

As soon as was possible after the presentation of those charges, your committee held a meeting, and requested the presence of Alderman Johnston and the members of the Executive Board. At that meeting the charges were duly read by the chairman, and the Executive Board was asked as to what it might have to say in reply thereto. To all of the charges the Executive Board pleaded "not guilty." Ald. Johnston was asked by the committee to present whatever proofs he might have, and your committee offered to furnish to him subpoenas for any persons who might have knowledge bearing upon the subject matter of the

charges. Alderman Johnston stated that he had no proofs to offer, and argued that the charges were of such a character that they needed no proofs. In reference to charge 1, subdivisions "A" and "B", your committee requested the opinion of the City Attorney, as to whether the charter required the Executive Board to certify for its approval any statements, either itemized or general, of the street department officials, their salaries and the expenditures of that department for labor. The City Attorney in reply to such request, prepared a written opinion, which is hereto annexed, and made a part of this report. From that opinion it appears that the charter does not require any such statement, unless the expenditures in that department exceed the sum of \$5,000 in any one week; in which event, the excess expenditures over and above said sum of \$5,000 per week is required to be certified to the Common Council. It appears from the opinion of the City Attorney that he has examined the reports and certified statements of the Executive Board as presented to the Common Council and its finance committee monthly, and is of the opinion that such statements constitute a substantial compliance with both the letter and spirit of the charter.

In respect to charge 2, it appears that an itemized statement of the fire department officials and employes and their salaries is furnished monthly to the finance committee, and that the finance committee has always followed the custom of placing the aggregate amount of the pay-roll upon the finance budget, instead of setting out that pay-roll with names, dates, numbers of days employed, and amounts of salaries paid in detail. The same state of facts exists in the water works department, and the same custom has been followed by the finance committee with reference to the expenditures of that department. So that it appears from the evidence presented, and from the papers on file, that the Executive Board has complied strictly with the charter requiring such certificates, and Alderman Johnston publicly stated that had he known the facts as they existed, and that these certified pay-rolls were delivered monthly, and a monthly report made to the Common Council, charges two and three would not have been made.

As to charge 4, Alderman Johnston conceded that this charge was based entirely upon the neglect of the Executive Board to reply to the resolution of this council, presented by him, and adopted on the 18th day of April last, and that he knew of no negligence on the part of the Executive Board or any member thereof, and knew of no specific act of indifference to the interest of the tax-payers and property owners, except the neglect and indifference shown by the Executive Board in not replying to that resolution. In answer to that charge the Executive Board disclaimed any intention of showing disrespect to this council, or of being negligent or indifferent in the matter, and stated that the only reason why the resolution had not been complied with was, that the time of the members of the board had been so occupied with the large number of improvement matters in which it was engaged, that they had been unable to prepare such information as was requested by such resolution. Your committee, aware of the great public improvements, the large number of contracts and the great mass of public business which have engaged the attention of the Executive Board during the past few months, is of the opinion that the charge has not been sustained.

In reference to the charge that there had been a great increase in the expenditures of the various departments under the control of the Executive Board during the years from

1880 to 1892-93, your committee deemed it advisable to require of the Executive Board some explanation as to the necessity for such increase. At the request of your committee, the Executive Board has prepared a detailed statement for each year since 1880, showing fully the cost of maintaining each department, and the cost of doing the several branches of the work connected with that department. Such detailed statement, together with the explanatory matter accompanying it, is hereto annexed and made a part of this report.

Your committee, in view of the foregoing, recommends that each and every of the charges preferred by Alderman Johnston be dismissed. But in view of the fact that the pay-rolls of the water and fire departments are certified to the finance committee monthly, your committee is of the opinion that in the future it would be advisable to have these pay-rolls spread upon the records in detail. It is possible that the expenditure of a sum sufficient to have them printed in full in the proceedings of the Common Council, will be justified by the satisfaction which it will afford, in view of the publicity which has been given to the matter. There appears to be no good reason why it has not been done in the past, except the charter does not require it, and it is also recommended that the Executive Board be requested, that in the future it cause to be published in its official proceedings the weekly pay-roll of its employes, other than those employed at common labor.

Throughout the entire investigation your committee has been animated by the desire to secure a thorough knowledge of any and all facts which might bear upon the charges as presented by Alderman Johnston, and for the purpose of procuring any information which he, or any other person, might have to furnish upon this subject, your committee adopted a resolution which was published in the several daily papers, expressing its desire to issue its subpoena and require the attendance of any person who might have information upon such subject. Your committee has been unable to learn of such persons, and at each of its meetings has called upon any person present who might desire to present any facts, to do so openly to the committee.

In conclusion your committee desires to express its conviction that the affairs of the Executive Board are properly conducted. That its members have shown every disposition to faithfully guard the public interests and to obey the law in every particular. The members of the Executive Board and its clerk have shown every disposition to aid the committee in its investigation, and have cheerfully furnished all the information which your committee has called upon them to furnish. The charges preferred by Alderman Johnston were grave ones, and had they been sustained, the consequences to the members of the Executive Board might, under the law, have been serious. As it is, no particular harm has been done, and it may be that by this investigation, the criticisms of the public may be allayed. Your committee, however, does not feel that it should leave this subject without suggesting that in the future persons desiring to present charges against any branch of the city government, should take care to inform themselves more thoroughly as to the facts before making such charges, than was done in this case.

Alderman Thomas McMillan, Chairman Finance Committee:

Dear Sir:—I present herewith my protest against the city attorney's opinion, and as charges one, two and three all refer to charter violations and depend upon the interpretation of the charter provisions, I ask that your committee give the protest thoughtful consideration and the same publicity that the city attorney's opinion receives.

The attorney makes these statements: "I have taken the liberty of ascertaining from the records in the several city offices the exact facts respecting this matter." "I learn that the executive board does monthly certify to the council, statements of all its expenditures." "These statements contain the names of all the persons on the monthly pay rolls, their time employed, the amount of salary received and all the items for material purchased by the board." "They are then delivered to the finance committee of the common council at its meeting immediately before the passage of the finance budget." The executive board officials have testified that they do not certify to the finance committee any of the street department expenditures for salaries or labor, excepting only when they exceed \$5,000 a week, and then only the excess amount. The attorney's statements therefore must be in error and may be misleading.

The city attorney also says: "The executive board has authority under section 148 to expend a sum not to exceed \$5,000 in any one week for labor and that a statement of these expenditures is not required to be certified to the common council." These clauses of the opinion are intended to justify the executive board's action in withholding any statement of its expenditures through the street department from the council.

I differ from the city attorney on the proposition in this latter clause and my reasons for so doing are: Section 153 says that the board shall make monthly reports to the council of their expenditures, and Section 148 says that all their expenditures shall be certified to the council for approval before orders upon the treasurer for their payment shall be made, excepting only that the said board may expend not exceeding \$5,000 a week for labor and pay the same by orders drawn directly upon the treasurer. In other words, all accounts, salaries and expenditures must be presented to the council monthly and approved by it before they can be paid, but in case of the laborers, provision is made for their prompt payment before the council's approval, but not without it.

The reasonableness of this provision for the payment of labor is apparent when it is understood that the number of laborers in the street department ranges from 400 to 900, and their weekly wages from 75 cents to \$0. It is absurd to think that a charter section for a city like Rochester should be drawn so loosely as to permit the possible expenditure of \$250,000 a year for labor through the street department without the council's approval, and I am sure your committee will agree with me that the city attorney is also in error in this part of his opinion. If not he should lose no time in preparing a charter amendment for the protection of the property-owning, tax-paying interests in our city. Again, it seems that it is the custom of the executive board to include all street department employes, such of superintendent, assistants, office clerks, overseers, special police, inspectors and foremen in the weekly labor pay roll and not certify their names or salaries to the council for its approval. These employes receive salaries ranging from ten to thirty-eight dollars a week and they number from 85 to 120, the number in the roll published in September

being 85 and the number in the week ending March 8, 1893, being 120. There is nothing in the charter that defines "labor" but in all dictionaries there is, and it seems incredible that the executive board will claim, or your committee permit, the classes of employes referred to, to be classed as laborers and not have their names and salaries certified to and approved by the council, the same as is done with all other city employes and officials. If your committee decide that any or all of the said classes of employes are not laborers, I think it will then be apparent that the charter requirements are not being complied with; also, if your committee find that there is no provision in the charter directing the withholding of the street department expenditures from the council's approval, or that the city attorney is in error in his opinion, I ask that the charges be sustained.

There is no controversy over the statement of expenditures after they reach the finance committee and no disposition to blame the executive board for the shortcomings, if any, of said committee, but the executive board officials have also testified that they have never printed a statement of their expenditures for salaries and labor and that no list of their employes has ever been printed, excepting the one published by this council in September last. How is this testimony to be harmonized with the clause in section 153 of the charter requiring the publication of all executive board expenditures in at least one daily paper? If it cannot be done I ask that charges two and three be sustained also.

To the Finance Committee of the Common Council.

Gentlemen:—The question submitted to me at your meeting last evening, is as I understand it, is whether the Executive Board is violating the provisions of the charter in not reporting for the Council's approval an itemized statement of the different department officials and their salaries. I have taken the liberty of ascertaining from the records in the several city offices the exact facts respecting this matter. I learn, that the Executive Board does monthly certify to the Council statements of all its expenditures. These statements contain the names of all the persons on the monthly pay-rolls, their time employed, the amount of salary received and all the items for material purchased by the Board. As soon as these statements are examined and certified to by the Board they are delivered to the Auditor who examines and audits the same in detail. They are then delivered to the Finance Committee of the Common Council at its meeting immediately before the passage of the finance budget. This committee also examines and certifies to the same, but in making up its finance budget it omits the detailed statement of the persons employed and salaries paid in the several departments, and inserts instead the total amount of salaries for each department. Section 148 of the Charter, provides that the Executive Board shall certify to the Common Council all its lawful expenses and all accounts and demands lawfully contracted after the same shall have been examined, audited and settled. I assume the question to be, whether the Executive Board in delivering the settled detailed statements of all its expenditures to the Common Council in the manner above specified is a substantial compliance of this section. I am of the opinion that it is. The Common Council has a right to accept the auditing and settling of these

accounts by its Finance Committee and under the charter the detailed statements need not be published in its proceedings. The Executive Board has also authority under section 148, to expend a sum not to exceed five thousand dollars in any one week for labor. A statement of these expenditures is not required to be certified to the Common Council. The charter, provides that the Auditor must audit these expenditures and when so audited, the Executive Board has the power to pay the same.

To the Finance Committee of the Common Council.

Gentlemen:—In accordance with your request, the Executive Board herewith transmits to you a tabulated statement of the yearly expenditures of the Executive Board in the highway, fire and water departments from 1880 down to April, 1893, covering the period which Alderman Johnston charges that it has been "inconsistent, irregular and with violating both letter and spirit of the charter," the investigation of which has been referred to your committee by the Common Council:

The above expenditures from the highway fund from April, 1880, to April, 1893, shows the amounts disbursed in the work of the street department, exclusive of the purchase of machines, tools, general supplies, and payment of salaries and other contingent expenses. In the year 1885 the cost of ashes removal was included in the general expense of street cleaning, but since that year the cost of doing this work has been ascertained and made a matter of record, and printed in the annual reports of the Executive Board.

From the year 1880 to 1893 the number of improved streets and alleys increased from about 42 to over 86 miles, or 100 per cent., and while, in the short time allowed for preparation of this statement, the number of miles of improved streets and alleys which were laid out in 1880 is not ascertained, it is found that in 1893 there were nearly 208 miles embraced within the city limits, every one of which required more or less expense for care and maintenance. And it is stated as a matter of common knowledge that the percentage of unimproved streets laid out within the last twelve years of the city's life is largely in excess of that of improved streets, every one of which demanded a portion of the highway fund. Exclusive of the asphalt and brick pavements, there were over 274 miles of streets and alleys, the surfaces of which had to be maintained and cleaned exclusive of the care of crosswalks, main and lateral sewers.

On examination of the approximate list of streets dedicated to public use, which is included in this statement, it will be readily seen that they are located in the main, in wards forming the boundaries of the city, and because of the long distance which it is necessary to haul material for repairs and to remove the accumulations of ashes and rubbish from these districts over (which) are scattered some thousands of houses of our citizens, the expense of the work of the highway department must necessarily be greatly increased.

Prior to 1880 there was very little work done or required in the outside wards and the collection of ashes and rubbish was seldom or ever made; but the increase of population in the latter number of years and the erection of handsome residences and the improvements made by property owners, it became necessary, and it was justly demanded, that the same service be given to those distant streets as was rendered to the more densely populated and central parts of the city.

If time were afforded to enter into particulars it might be shown that there are many justifiable causes for increased expenditures in this department during the period named. By way of illustration a few particulars may be stated:

An examination of the records of this department shows that the prevailing prices for common labor in the year 1880, was from \$1 to \$1.25 per day; for teamsters, \$3 per day; pavers, carpenters and masons, from \$1.25 to \$1.75 per day. The wages for this class of labor was paid at the above-named rates down to the year 1886, and in the month of July of that year, wages were increased for all common labor to the sum of \$1.50 per day; and teamsters to the sum of \$3.50 per day; and a corresponding increase was made in the other classes of labor employed.

The maintenance and care of the lift bridges over the canal cost the city in the year, 1892, \$7,462, which sum was paid from the highway fund.

Another cause for extraordinary outlay in some years, has been the maintenance of the river bridges, Vincent place bridge alone requiring 65,000 feet of white oak plank ranging in price from \$25 to \$30 per thousand feet.

Over five miles of outlet ditches lie within the city limits which have been cleaned at large expense, and in fact those ditches, to save the city from suits for damages, have had to be kept free from obstructions for considerable distance into the towns through which the water courses flow.

There was expended for plank crosswalks in 1893, \$6,893 on unimproved streets, and the annual expenditures for this item increases as new streets are dedicated to public use.

As a matter of comparison it may be stated that in the year 1885-86, there were nearly 94 miles of improved streets swept and the sweepings removed at an expense of about \$2,200, an average cost per mile of \$23.48. There were 1,269 loads of sweepings removed which cost for labor and removal \$1.73 per load.

In 1892 there were 478 miles of streets swept at a cost of \$10,591.95, the average expense per mile being \$22.15, and there were 7,434 loads of sweepings removed at an average cost of \$1.42 per load, inclusive of labor. In the year 1885-86 also, 49,300 loads of ashes were removed at a cost of about 47 cents per load.

In 1892-93 there were 127,373 loads of ashes and snow removed at an approximate cost of 56 cents per load.

In the year 1891-92 there were 15,663 loads of dirt removed at a cost of \$1.13 for labor in scraping and removal. The change of the location of the dumping-grounds from near-by points to the outlying parts of the city has materially increased the cost of this branch of the street service on account of the long haul and the consequent less number loads of material that can be removed in any one day. The points therefore where rubbish and dirt being now located on the outskirts of the city; in order that these accumulations may be quickly removed, a larger force have to be employed to expedite the work, and an increased expense is thereby incurred, as may be seen by the following approximate list of streets which have been added to the city since the year 1882:

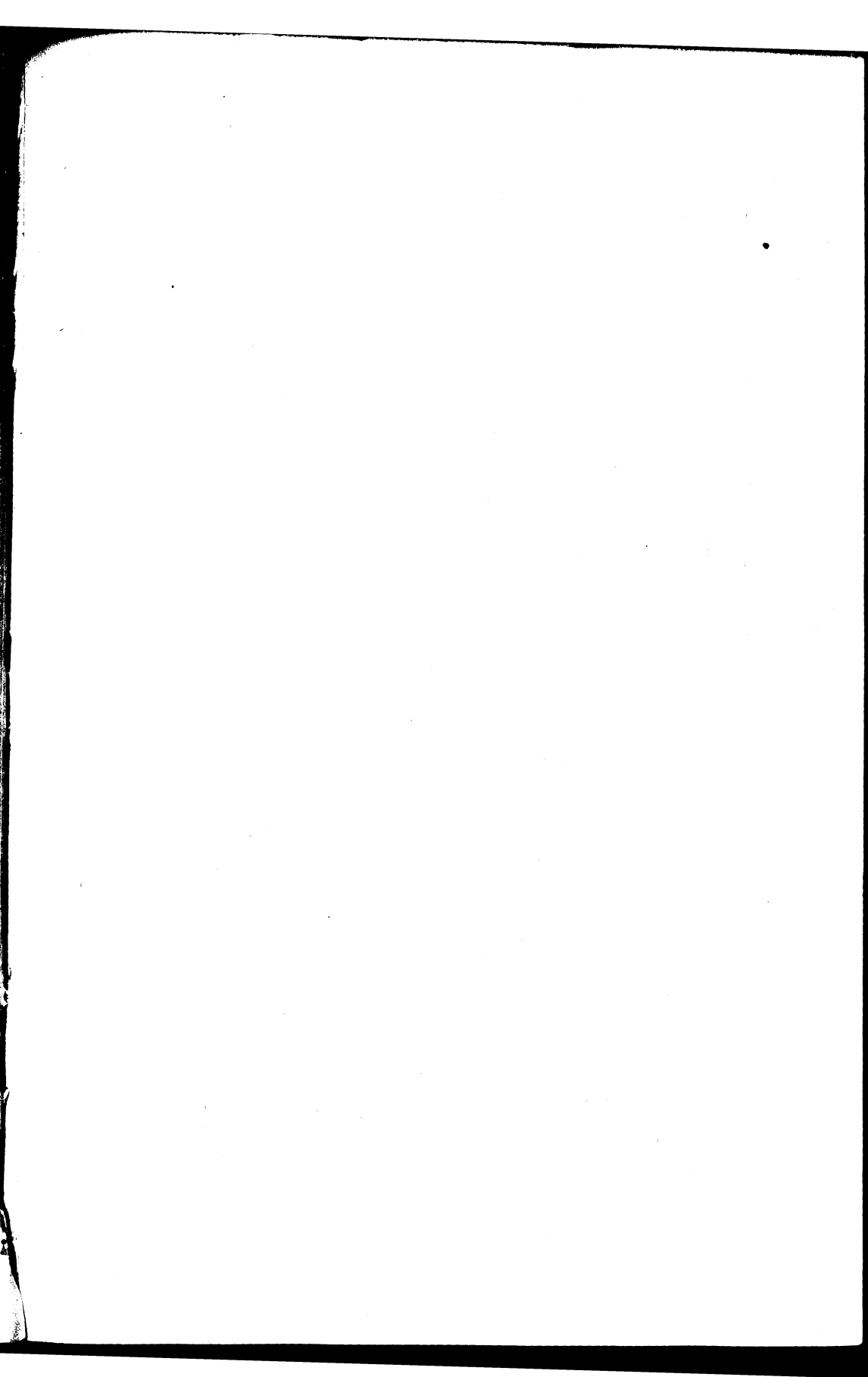

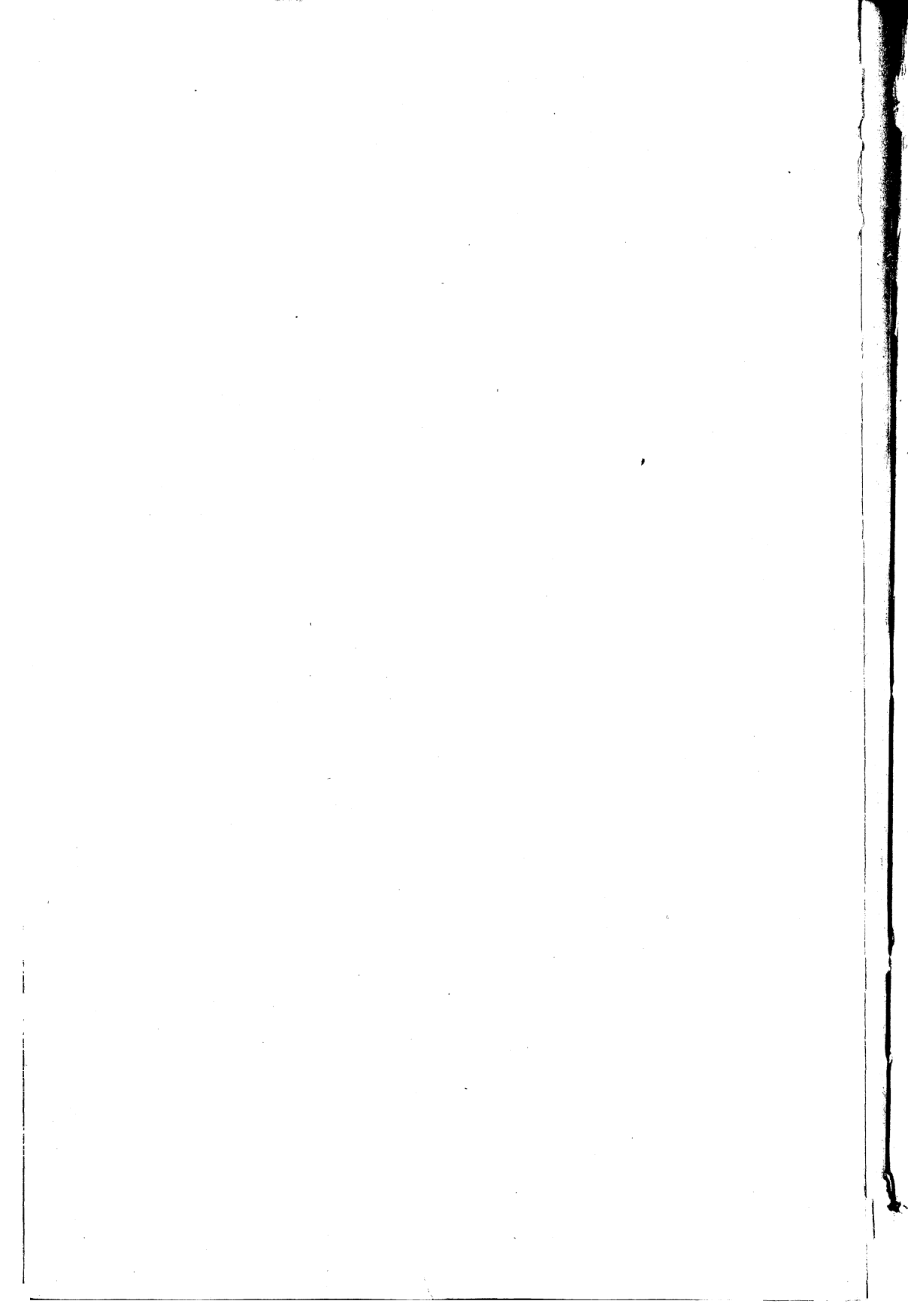

The expense of cleaning and repairing sidewalks is charged to the highway fund, and the amount so expended each year is in part restored to the fund as is shown by the amounts credited from that and other sources on the above table.

The following table shows the amount expended from 1880 to 1893 in the months of February, March and April for the cleaning of streets and the removal of dirt. An examination of this table will disclose the fact that the cost of this class of work in any of those three months is governed largely by the condition of the weather and the opportunities afforded for properly doing the work.

The following table shows the amounts disbursed from highway fund, by months, from 1880 to 1893, inclusive, during the season of scraping and cleaning streets:

Finally it may be said that the economical management in the care and maintenance of streets is a problem that every city in the state and union is seeking to solve, and the commissioners or officials in charge of such departments have to contend with the factor of inefficient labor, which must be employed or pauperized.

The constant and unremitting importuning of our best citizens in behalf of the comparatively helpless men for such employment on the one hand, and the criticism and denunciation of property owners and taxpayers on the other, because such class of labor is given work upon the streets, constitutes the upper and nether millstones between which the officials of a street department are pulverized.

No observing man will contend that with first-class labor and independence from appeals for aid from the members of any community, the expense of doing the work of any street department in any city cannot be largely reduced.

The city that has undertaken and successfully carried out this policy has as yet not

been incorporated, and officials under our system of government who have been able to conduct this branch of the public service are unknown, and those persons who believe it can be, are dealing with a theory and not a condition.

The above table shows the expenditures in the fire department from the year 1879-80 to the year 1892-93. The large increase in the years 1883-84, 1887-88, 1888-89, 1889-90, 1891-92, is chargeable to the purchase of lands and the erection of new houses on Lyell avenue, Clinton street, Plymouth avenue, Culver park, Grand street, Webster avenue, Driving Park avenue and Scio street. In the year 1890-91 an expenditure of \$5,164 was made for new apparatus for the fire-alarm telegraph office, and in 1892-93 the sum of \$7,598.68 was disbursed for the laying of an underground cable. Half of this sum for underground cable is chargeable to the police department, and will in due time be credited to the fire department fund.

In the year 1888, owing to the general scarcity of water, and the consequent inability of the department to get fire streams from the hydrants, the Executive Board put the engines, owned by the city, in commission, entailing an additional expense in the cost of maintenance of the department.

This was a necessary undertaking for the protection of property, and the sums expended in this direction, as well as in others, has earned for the department, in its manual force, its equipment and buildings, the reputation of being equal to any in the state.

The two statements given below show, first, the annual water works statistics and, second, the disbursements from the water works fund from April 1, 1890, to April 1, 1893. They are compiled from the published yearly reports of the executive board:

Gentlemen:—I deem it my duty to call your attention to the fact that it is becoming frequent incident for parties who are re-building, or making alterations in buildings, fronting on the Genesee river between the Aqueduct and Andrews street, to throw into the river bed large quantities of stone and plaster.

This was the case in re-building the Moulson building; and at the present time workmen are depositing large quantities of stone behind the Montgomery building.

These deposits in the river will endanger a large amount of property in case of high water and will endanger the public health by formation of pools at the time of low water in which sewage will fester.

The whole bed of the river between the Aqueduct and Central avenue dam should be cleaned out next year, including the west arch of the aqueduct.

**BRIDGE OVER THE CARROLL AND FITZHUGH RACE
COURT STREET.**

By Ald. Zimmer—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a suitable bridge over the Carroll & Fitzhugh race, in Court street.

Adopted.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$15,000.

The acquirement of the necessary easements in and rights of way for the construction and maintenance of the State Hospital and South Goodman street sewer, as described in Ord. No. 5,252. By Ald. Dewey—Resolved, That the ordinance relating to the use of sidewalks, footpaths, etc., by cycles and other vehicles, adopted August 11, 1891, and published at pages 195 and 196 of the proceedings of the Common Council for 1891 and 1892, be, and the same hereby is amended so as to read as follows:

Section 1. Section two of said ordinance is hereby amended so as to read as follows:
Sec. 2. Any person may ride a cycle, registered and numbered as hereinafter provided, upon any sidewalk of this city, except that between the hours of 6 A. M. and 11 P. M. no person shall ride a cycle upon the sidewalks of the streets described as fol-

fows: Main street, from East avenue to the Erie canal; State street, south of the New York Central & Hudson River railroad; Exchange street, north of the Erie canal; St. Paul street, south of the New York Central & Hudson River railroad to Court street; Front and Clinton streets, between the New York Central & Hudson River railroad and East Main street; Mumford street, Market street and Exchange place; Central avenue, from Clinton street to State street; East avenue; or upon the foot-paths of any and all bridges, under a penalty of \$5 for each offense. And no person shall ride a cycle between the hours above stated, under a like penalty, upon the sidewalks of any street that it now paved or may hereafter be paved with asphalt, brick, cedar block or Medina block pavement, except during the months of December, January and February.

Sec. 2. Section three of said ordinance is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 3. Any person who shall ride or propel any cycle upon any sidewalk or foot-path between the hours of 6 A. M. and 11 P. M. at a greater rate of speed than seven miles per hour, or while riding a cycle at any rate of speed upon any sidewalk or foot-path in said city shall collide with or run against any person walking or standing upon such sidewalk or foot-path, shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$50 for each offense.

Sec. 3. These amendments shall take effect immediately.

Ald Adams moved as an amendment that the clause in Sec. 2, excepting the months of December, January and February from the action of such section, be stricken out.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Lewis—

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—During the past several months various matters have been referred to your finance committee, upon which no report has been made, but which your committee has had under consideration, and upon which it desires to submit the following report:

It was suggested some time ago, by City Treasurer Williams, that a conference of the fiscal officers of the several cities, together with such other members of the city government as might seem interested, be held at some suitable time and place prior to the meeting of the constitutional convention in May next, and the matter of the holding of such conference or convention was heretofore referred to this committee. Your committee has had the matter under discussion, and has reached the conclusion that such a conference may be of benefit, and has decided to recommend that one be held. It is thought that by a meeting and exchanging of views at some convenient time and place something may be accomplished in the direction of a uniform method of financing for the cities of the state. Your committee, therefore, recommends that the matter of issuing a call for the holding of such a conference, be referred to the mayor, the city treasurer and the finance committee. They to agree upon the time when such conference shall be held, and it is believed that Rochester will be as satisfactory a meeting place as can be found.

In the matter of separating the funds of the city in such a way as to keep the moneys received upon the local assessment rolls from the general fund, your committee is of the opinion, that no legislation is required, and that by the adoption of the accompanying resolution the separation of such funds will be accomplished. Section 58 of the city charter provides that the city treasurer shall receive the moneys belonging to the city, and deposit and keep the same as directed by the common council, and shall keep an account of all receipts and expenditures in such manner as the common council shall direct. The city now has due to it from local assessment rolls, either in the hands of the city treasurer or in other departments, and soon to be placed in the city treasurer's hands, an amount approximating one million dollars. As these moneys are paid in, they should be kept separate and distinct from moneys received on general city taxes, and should be used only for the purpose of paying the city's acceptances issued on account of local improvements. It is probable that these moneys will not be received rapidly enough to meet these acceptances as they fall due, and for the purpose of replenishing the local improvement fund, the common council should have authority granted by the legislature to authorize the issuing of short time local improvement bonds. It is believed that these bonds can be negotiated at a rate of interest not exceeding 5 per cent., to mature in not more than five years. The city should have the right to collect interest on all assessments not paid within the time specified in the order for the assessment, at the rate of 6 per cent., and it is thought that the difference between the 5 per cent., which the city will probably have to pay, and the 6 per cent, which it may receive, will be sufficient to meet the loss caused by the delay which is necessary while the assessment rolls are being prepared. In New York city this plan is followed, and it has been found to work with the utmost success.

It is probable that an amendment to the charter will be necessary to enable the city to issue such bonds, and your committee before making any recommendation upon that subject, desires further time in which to consider the matter. If an amendment is found necessary, it can be prepared and made ready to submit to the legislature at its session beginning in January.

One of the chief difficulties with which the city treasurer and the finance committee of the common council has to contend, is the failure of citizens to promptly pay their taxes and meet their local assessments. This failure is, in many instances, not because of inability, but is intentional, and payment is neglected and delayed by design. In fact there are taxpayers who have boasted that they would not pay their taxes, and so long as they did not care to sell or mortgage their property, that the city could not force them to pay, and if they should care to sell or mortgage, they could readily arrange to pay, and have the interest fixed at 6 per cent. instead of the rate fixed by the charter.

It is for the purpose of meeting this class of persons, and forcing them to make their payments to the city, in some instances now long delayed, that your committee has given careful consideration to this subject. Two methods are available, the adoption of which would probably result in the collection of a large sum of money now long past due. One is the method that is provided for in the city charter in section 82, known as "supplementary proceedings." That section provides that whenever any tax or assessment exceeding ten dollars in amount, has been levied or assessed against any person, firm, estate or corporation, and has been, or is returned by a collector as uncollectible for want of goods and chattels out of which to collect the same, the mayor or city attorney of said city may apply to the county judge, or special county judge, upon an affidavit stating the facts, and obtain an order requiring such person, firm, estate or corporation to appear before the said judge, or before a referee named in such order, and answer concerning his, their or its property, and the same proceedings shall thereupon be had, as are provided for in the code of civil procedure in cases of proceedings supplementary to an execution.

By an amendment to the charter of 1890, this method of collecting taxes was given to the city, but it has not been used until now. By adopting it, it is probable that the collection of many thousands of dollars of uncollected taxes might be hastened, and your committee recommends that the city treasurer be instructed to prepare and furnish to the city attorney a list of persons against whom this process should be put in operation, and that the city attorney be instructed to begin such proceedings without delay.

The other method is the process of foreclosing the equity of redemption, provided for in sections 101 to 104, both inclusive, of the city charter.

Some months ago a list of lands upon which a large amount of taxes remained uncollected, was prepared in the city treasurer's office, with a view of instructing the city attorney to begin foreclosure actions under these sections, and it is recommended by your committee that the city attorney be directed to begin and prosecute such actions without delay.

The city treasurer has prepared a statement showing the amount of money due the city on account of local assessment rolls now in his hands, and also showing the amount due to the city, the assessment rolls for which

have not yet been completed. Such statement is hereto annexed and made a part of this report.

Gentlemen:—Your lamp and electrical committee begs leave to make a special and separate report upon the matter of the petitions of the taxpayers of Cady, Champlain, Olean, Hawley and Barton streets and Frost and Columbia avenues and Doran park.

We learn that two electric light companies entered into competition to replace the present gas lamps on the above streets by arc lights and at the instance of each company a petition was circulated and signed and submitted to the council and referred to this committee as an inducement for the council to grant such right to the company which furnished the strongest petition. Inasmuch as a number of the same names appear on both petitions it is difficult for the committee to say which petition represents the largest number of taxpayers. But it is clear that the taxpayers on these streets are desirous of having the gas lamps replaced by arc electric lights. The streets in the city are at present lighted by the Rochester Gas & Electric Light Company which is a consolidation of the three old companies. At the time that the present contract for lighting the streets of the city was made there was open competition between the three companies, and the committee is of the opinion that by such competition the city secured as low a rate for lighting as any city in the country. Since the consolidation, new electric light companies have received franchises from the city and it is the opinion of this committee that some street lighting ought to be given to the new companies to encourage such competition as will prove a benefit to the city and public at large. The Citizens' Light & Power Company having requested the privilege of replacing the gas lamps by electric arc lights on the streets above named and there being but a slight increase of expense, we recommend that a contract be entered into between the city and said company for the lighting of the streets above named and such other territory

as may hereafter be designated by this common council, the conditions and covenants of said contract to be the same as that of the Rochester Gas & Electric Light Company and such other covenants and agreements as may in the judgment of the chairman of the electrical committee, city electrician and city attorney be advisable as promoting the best interests of the city; the expense of such lighting per lamp not to exceed the price now paid under the contract with the Rochester Gas & Electric Light Company, and the contract with the Citizens' Company to expire at the time that the contract with the Rochester Gas & Electric Light Company expires.

To the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—In the matter of a petition for the abatement of a nuisance caused by the incapacity of Court and William street outlet sewer in Prince street, and under the New York Central railroad to carry off storm water, which was referred to the Committee on Streets and the City Surveyor at your meeting of August 8th, 1893.

I beg leave to report that the portion of

the sewer from Prince street to the north side of the New York Central railroad has a capacity to discharge when running full of about 50 cubic feet per second, and that often the territory discharges as much as 120 cubic feet per second, with the result that the water backs up until the head is increased sufficiently to force it through the present sewer.

In thus backing up, the water rises into the existing cellars on Prince street and the lower end of Weld street and on Main street as far west as Alexander street. This portion of the sewer should have a capacity of discharge of 169 cubic feet per second. The existing sewer in Prince street and in Main street, as far south as Alexander street has a capacity of about 60 cubic feet per second, while it should have a capacity of 132 cubic feet in the Prince street portion, and 108 cubic feet per second in the Main street portion.

The existing Weld street sewer has a capacity of 64 cubic feet per second.

I recommend that a new sewer be built from the north side of the railroad to Prince street 58 inches in diameter. From this sewer through Prince street to Main street, 48 inches in diameter, and in Main street from Prince street to Alexander street, 48 inches in diameter, and in Prince street, from outlet to Weld street, 2 feet by 2-1-2 feet with arch and invert.

At the request of Alderman Adams and Alderman Aikenhead, the ordinance was made leaving off the portion in Main street from Prince street to Alexander street, although I deem it my duty to say that I think it would be the better policy to rebuild as far as Alexander street at this time.

By Ald. Lewis—

AN ORDINANCE to prohibit, restrain and regulate all sports, exhibitions of natural or artificial curiosities, caravans of animals, theatrical exhibitions, circuses, or other public performances and exhibitions for money.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Section 1. No person, or company of persons, shall exhibit or perform for gain, or profit, any theatrical representation, exhibition or performance, in any unlicensed theater, hall or auditorium, or any paintings, animal or animals, or other natural or artificial curiosities, or any puppet show, wire or rope dance or any other show, acts or feats, which common showmen, mountebanks or jugglers usually practice or perform, in any such unlicensed theater, hall or auditorium under a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each offense.

Section 2. No person, firm or corporation, being the owner or lessee of any theater, hall or auditorium, shall furnish or allow the same to be used for the purpose of such exhibition, representation or performance without having first obtained a license therefor as hereinafter provided, under a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each offense.

Section 3. The mayor of the city of Rochester may from time to time grant and issue such licenses to such owners, occupants or lessees as he shall deem proper upon a written application and upon the payment by such owner, occupant or lessee to the city treasurer of the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100). Such written application therefor to be filed with the mayor and the notice of such filing shall be published in the official paper for at least three days before such license shall be granted.

Section 4. Every license issued under the provisions of this ordinance shall terminate and be inoperative on and after the first day of July next after the same shall have been granted, but no such license shall be construed to permit any theatrical exhibitions, representations or performances on the first day of the week commonly called Sunday.

Section 5. The mayor is further authorized and permitted to issue from time to time temporary licenses for the exhibition of circuses and menageries, upon the payment to the city treasurer of such sum as the said mayor shall direct, not to exceed the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) per day.

Section 6. Any judgment of conviction of a violation of any of the aforesaid provisions shall operate as a revocation of any license granted under the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 7. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with the foregoing ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—At a regular meeting of the Rochester Wheelmen's League, held at its headquarters No. 11 Durand Building, on December 11, 1893, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted, and the undersigned were appointed a committee to bring the same to the attention of your honorable body:

Resolved, That the Common Council be requested to so amend the bicycle ordinance, as to permit sidewalk riding on East avenue, east of Goodman street.

Resolved, That the Common Council be requested to suspend the operation of said ordinance in regard to riding on all streets paved with asphalt, brick, cedar block and Medina block, during the months of December, January and February.

Resolved, That the Common Council be requested to amend said ordinance, so that violations thereof may be punished by a fine "not less than \$5 nor more than \$25."

Taking the resolutions seriatim, the reasons for urging the amendments are as follows:

East avenue, east of Goodman street, is paved with macadam and when wet from rain or excessive sprinkling, is practically unridable. There are so few pedestrians using the walk in that section that the League is of the opinion that the permitting of sidewalk riding on that portion of East avenue, would prove scarcely any annoyance to the public.

The prevention of sidewalk riding on the sidewalks of the streets referred to in the second resolution, during the months when snow is prevalent, works to the disadvantage of many who use their wheels for business purposes, notably in the northern and western

sections of the city. Wheelmen living down Lake avenue and in that section, are precluded from using their wheels during the winter, as they have no possible way of coming up town, except on streets so paved. St. Paul street is a similar one in regard to this difficulty. There are so few wheels ridden in the winter that the suspension of that part of the ordinance would not be infringing the rights of the pedestrian to any extent.

In regard to the third resolution; many of the wheelmen think that the penalty as now fixed is too great. The idea was to deter the willful violators from violating the ordinance, not those who do so from inadvertence or ignorance. Therefore, it was considered wise that there should be a minimum, as well as a maximum, limit fixed to the penalty in order to give the police some latitude in imposing the fine.

More could be said in support of the resolutions, but this committee do not desire to occupy the valuable time of your honorable body to any greater extent than necessary.

A CONTRACT

Made this 12th day of December, 1893, between the Central Light & Power Company located and doing business in the city of Rochester, N. Y., of the first part, and the city of Rochester, a municipal corporation, of the second part, covenanting with each other to faithfully observe and perform each and every of the covenants which each agrees to perform by the terms of this contract hereinafter expressed. The party of the first part is designated herein for brevity as "said company" and the party of the second part as "said city."

Whereas, said company has been duly incorporated under and in pursuance of article six of chapter 566 of the laws of 1890, and the acts amendatory thereof, for the purpose of using electricity for light, heat or power, and to carry on the business of lighting by electricity, or using it for heat or power in the city of Rochester and in the streets, avenues, public parks, alleys and places thereof, and in public and private buildings therein; to generate and supply electricity for the purposes of such business and to make sell or lease all machines, instruments apparatus and other equipment thereof and to lay and construct suitable wires or other conductors with the necessary poles, pipes or other conductors in, over or under the streets, avenues, public parks and places in said city for conducting and distributing electricity with the consent of the municipal authorities therefore and in such a manner and with such reasonable regulations as they may prescribe; and

Whereas, The Common Council did by a resolution passed August 8, 1893, grant permission to said company to carry on its said business in said city and authorize the execution of this contract.

NOW, THEREFORE, THIS AGREEMENT
WITNESSETH:

First. Said city hereby grants to said company the right and said company hereby agrees to lay, erect and construct suitable wires or conductors with the necessary poles, pipes or other fixtures in, over or under the streets, avenues, public parks and places of said city for conducting and distributing electricity for the purposes of the corporation of said company, subject to the provisions, restrictions, conditions, rules and regulations hereinafter set forth, and subject to any future penal regulations, ordinances or resolutions which may be adopted by said Common Council.

Said company hereby agrees to lay, erect, construct, maintain and operate suitably wires or other conductors with the necessary connections, pipes or other fixtures for its business in a conduit or conduits built or to be built in the streets, avenues, public parks, places or alleys or other highways of said city in which conduit or conduits the city or said company has or may have the right to require space for such purposes or of which it has or may have control; and said company shall place, put in operation and maintain in such conduits all the wires supplying and furnishing an electric current to each and every lamp and motor on the streets and in the buildings upon which such conduit is constructed and maintained excepting, however, that said company shall have the right to erect poles and string wires on _____ street, east from the east line of Graves street and continue said wires to and along the rear of the buildings which front upon the south side of East Main street bridge, but no further. No conductors, wires, pipes, poles or fixtures shall without the special consent of the Common Council be placed or when placed shall be continued in use on, upon or above any street, avenue, public park, place, alley or other highway in said city where there now exists or shall hereafter exist a conduit or subway fitted for the conduct of electricity by said company and in which said company shall have the opportunity to acquire a right to conduct electricity. It being expressly agreed by said company that the city and its officers shall have the right and power to remove such conductors, wires, pipes, poles or fixtures, after the expiration of sixty days from the date of service of a notice in writing upon said company to remove the same. It also being the design of said city to permit no overhead wires to be constructed or maintained after the construction of the subways or conduits designed and suited for and doing the same services as is done by means of overhead wires. Except with the special permission of said Common Council said company shall not have the right to erect or maintain poles on the streets or other highways already containing poles upon which said company has the opportunity to secure the right to place conductors, wires or other fixtures thereon. Said company shall have the right to place and operate its wires, conductors or other fixtures on poles existing or which may hereafter exist in the highways of said city belonging to other companies on complying with the terms and conditions of the contracts made by the city with such companies. All poles which may be erected by said company shall be of such kind and dimensions and shall be erected in such manner as may be directed by the Electrical Committee of the said Common Council and shall be subject to the right of all other companies in said city whose business requires the use of electric wires to operate wires upon such poles upon such terms as to compensation, use, responsibility and conditions of removal as may be fixed by said

Electrical Committee in case of the inability of said company and the company applying for the use of said poles to agree on terms. And by complying with the terms so agreed upon with said company or so fixed by said Electrical Committee such company so applying for the use of such poles shall forthwith have the right to use and operate such poles. Said city shall have the free use of all conduits, pipes or poles, built or erected or to be built or erected by said company for all wires, conductors, fixtures and connections necessary for municipal purposes. Before disturbing the pavement of any street, avenue, public park, place, alley or other highway for the erection of any pole or poles or the stringing of any wires or other conductors or the construction of any conduits or pipes said company shall execute and deliver to the city of Rochester a bond, the form and conditions to be approved of by the City Attorney and the City Electrician in the penal sum of twenty thousand dollars with sufficient sureties to be approved of by the Mayor, conditioned that said company whenever it may disturb the pavement of such streets, avenues, parks, alleys, places or other highways shall restore the same to as good a condition as the same were found and said company shall pay the necessary cost of any inspector or inspectors for such work to be appointed by the Executive Board. Said company shall and will at all times indemnify and save harmless said city from all damages and liabilities on account of any excavation or obstruction that may be made by said company in said streets, avenues, parks, places, alleys or other highways from any damage to persons or property caused by the poles, pipes, wires, conductors, or currents of said company or the use of the same and from all and any damage caused by said pipes, poles, wires, conductors or currents have been or to be erected on private property. In the event of the failure of said company to complete within nine months the construction of this contract the Common Council shall have the power to revoke this contract and the grant given by such resolution and said company shall forthwith upon such revocation take down and remove all conduits, pipes, poles, conductors, wires and fixtures therefore erected by it. Said company shall not have the right to place any poles or overhead wires or fixtures on State and Exchange streets from the Erie canal to Allen street; on Main street, from Plymouth avenue to University avenue, and on North and South St. Paul streets, from Court street to Andrews street. Said company will at its own expense construct a conduit or conduits in Graves and Aqueduct streets of said city as may be designated by the Common Council whenever the said company shall enter upon said streets and such conduit to be built under the direction of Common Council, and in addition to the inspector or inspectors to be appointed by the Executive Board hereinbefore provided for, said company shall pay the necessary cost of an inspector to be appointed by the Electrical Committee. Said company shall also have the right of building such additional conduit or conduits in such public streets, avenues, alleys or public places as may be hereafter designated and determined by the Common Council. The successors and assigns of the parties hereto are bound by this contract.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City
of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Assessment Committee begs leave to report as follows:

In the matter of the petition of St. John's Protestant Episcopal Church and the North M. E. Church asking for a correction of an assessment against parsonage property, we recommend that the same be denied.

In the matter of the petition of T. B. Dempsey, praying that the assessment against his property for the Monroe avenue outlet sewer, amounting to \$7.70, be canceled, we recommend after an examination of the facts that the petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Peter Sheridan praying for a rebate of interest on the unpaid taxes for 1887 against parts of lots 126 and 127 situated on the east side of Sophia street in the 100-Acre Tract, we recommend that the petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Peter Weber and wife praying for a refund of an assessment paid for Clifford street outlet sewer, under assessment No. 2,225, against his property, being lot No. 13 on the west side of Hudson street, we recommend that the petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Jacob Brown, praying for a refund of the moneys paid towards an assessment against his property on the west side of Hudson street for the Clifford street outlet sewer, we recommend that the same be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Andrew A. Shearer, asking to have canceled an assessment against his property situated on the corner of Flora and Ethel streets for the Flora street pipe sewer, under ordinance No. 5,150, on the ground that he was assessed for the pipe sewer in Ethel street in 1891, we find that the petitioner is erroneously charged with the expense of the construction for the Flora street pipe sewer and therefore recommend that the assessment of \$46.17, for said Flora street pipe sewer against the petitioner's property be canceled.

In the matter of the petition of Stephen Rogers praying for a correction of an assessment for Church street opening, we find that the petitioner is erroneously assessed in the sum of \$40 and recommend that that amount be credited on his assessment.

In the matter of the petition of Sarah C. Skinner, we find that the City Treasurer in computing the interest under the resolution adopted by this Council, October 2, 1893, computed the same upon the basis of the old and erroneous assessment instead upon the corrected amount, and we recommend therefore that \$1.66 interest as erroneously charged and paid be refunded.

In the matter of the petition of George Meyer praying to have refunded certain interest paid by him upon the unpaid taxes against the south part of lot H on the east side of Colvin street on the ground that the City Treasurer's office made a mistake in omitting said lot from his tax bill, we recommend that the petition be denied.

In the matter of the Oakman street Medina stone pavement, under final ordinance, No. 5,129, for which an assessment roll was prepared upon a five-payment basis, we find that the contract for said improvement provided for the payment of the expense thereof to the contractors in three payments and for this and other reasons we deem it advisable to recommend that a new roll be prepared upon the three-payment basis.

In the matter of the Bronson avenue bridge

assessment your committee has heard the arguments of the counsel for the W. N. Y. & P. R. R., and after a consideration of the objections raised to the roll, we can see no reason why it should not be confirmed, and therefore recommend such confirmation.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your finance committee begs leave to make the following report upon the matter of furnishing employment to the large number of unemployed in the city, as requested by the petition presented at the last meeting of your honorable body, and very numerously signed.

Your committee has given public hearing to all persons desiring to be heard. A committee of the Young Men's Christian Association appeared and recommended the appropriation by the Common Council of a sum of money to enable the employment of laborers for the purpose of breaking stone, to be hereafter used on the public streets. This project has been earnestly advocated by a large number of people, but upon consultation with the Executive Board, it is learned that comparative small quantities of broken stones are now used by the city in making repairs. Last year the total amount used was but about eighteen hundred cubic yards, and inasmuch as it has been the policy of the city for several years to discourage the construction of McAdam roadways, in which crushed stone is one of the principal materials used, it has now become necessary to use crushed stone only for the purpose of repairs upon such McAdam roadways as now exist. It may be that the Executive Board can profitably employ some labor in breaking stones, but it will of necessity, engage the time of but few men for a short period.

Your committee has also listened to the propositions of the Board of Park Commissioners, in which they suggest that labor can be employed as well during the present winter months as at any time later. Among other things, they propose that a large sheep shed be erected in the South, or Genesee Valley park, at a cost of about one thousand dollars. They have on hand, as appears from their statement, all the material necessary for the construction of such a shed, and lack only the money to pay for the necessary labor in erecting it. They also propose to use some money in building other small structures which they need in the park, and the cost of which will not be great. They also suggest that some money can be profitably expended in widening, grading and graveling the roadway in Elmwood avenue, from the Western New York and Pennsylvania railroad crossing to the Elmwood avenue bridge. Elmwood avenue, at this point, is bounded on both sides by land owned by the city. The ordinary method of doing this work would be by ordinance and contract, and to be paid for by local assessment; but in view of the

fact that the city owns all the land which would be locally assessed, it is believed that a saving would be effected by doing the work directly, inasmuch as the assessment would have to be collected by the city from the city through the general tax levy for the coming fiscal year. The same condition of things exists on lower North St. Paul street. It is probable that several hundred men can be employed profitably in the construction of the buildings, and the grading, improving and graveling of these roadways. But the Park Commissioners are out of funds with which to meet the expense, and have requested that for the purpose of paying for this work, the Council authorize the Treasurer to advance moneys therefor.

Your committee is met with the provisions of the "Park Act," which provides that not more than \$20,000 shall be expended in any one year for improving and caring for the public parks, and as that sum has already been exhausted, it will be necessary to secure from the Legislature authority to grant an additional amount.

An enabling act has, therefore, been prepared for the approval of the Council and submission to the Legislature, by the terms of which the Council is authorized to place to the credit of the Park Commissioners the sum of \$10,000, for doing the work hereinbefore set forth. If this money should be granted to the park commissioners, it will be granted with the express understanding and upon the express assurance from the park commissioners that it shall be used exclusively for the employment of labor, and it shall be so expended as to give employment to the greatest number possible. Your committee submits herewith a copy of the proposed enabling act, with a recommendation that it be approved by your Honorable Body without delay, and that the senator and assemblymen from this district be requested to hasten its passage by the Legislature.

Your committee has also decided to submit at this time an amendment to section 170 of the city charter, for the purpose of carrying into effect the recommendation heretofore made by your committee in relation to the separation of the Local Improvement Fund from the general fund of the city. This amendment has been carefully considered by your committee, and prepared by the City Attorney, under its direction, and it is believed that its adoption will prove of the utmost advantage to the city's financial interests.

Other proposed enabling acts are herewith submitted, at the request of the Board of Education, for the purpose of placing to the credit of that Board, sufficient moneys to enable them to continue the maintenance of the school through the balance of the school year. Your committee has given careful attention to every detail of these bills, and it is thought that the moneys therein proposed to be provided will be sufficient to maintain the school system for the balance of the school year, and leave the Board of Education at that time free from debt.

Your committee, therefore, recommends that these several bills be approved by the Council, and that the senator and assemblymen from this district be requested to secure their early passage by the Legislature.

In meeting of Board of Education.

Com. Durand submitted the following:

Gentlemen:—Your special committee heretofore appointed to confer with a committee of the Common Council, do report that they had a conference with the finance committee of the Council on Tuesday last, at which time they presented in detail to them the present condition of the finances of this board.

Your committee first called attention to the condition of the fund for the payment of teachers' salaries. There is now about \$4,000 in that fund after the payment of salaries for the first half of December. There will be no moneys available for this fund until the state appropriation is received in February, which it is expected, will amount to \$77,000 or \$78,000. There are three months and a half to be provided for and, taking the November budget as a basis, the total amount required will be \$102,000 to carry this fund over to the commencement of the new fiscal year, beginning April 1st. Allowing for the amount on hand and the amount to be received from the state, there will remain a shortage of \$22,000 or \$23,000 to be provided for. Unless immediate relief is given, no further payments can be made to the teachers until the state money becomes available, some time in February next.

This condition of affairs was foreseen and announced at the time the annual appropriation was made in the spring. The amount appropriated by the Council for teachers' salaries was \$182,500, which, with the amount on hand at the end of last year, after the payment of the March budget (\$7,483.68) and the amount to be received from the state, made the total amount available \$266,983.68. It was known that the amount expended last year for teachers' salaries was \$274,625.74, and that a larger amount would be required this year, with large additions to the school buildings and an increased enrollment of nearly 900 pupils. A deficiency in the fund of \$23,000 was then figured out and it is about this amount that we now ask for.

It is, of course, well known by this board that the Common Council was limited by the provisions of the city charter in the amount of money that they could appropriate for this fund and for the contingent expenses of the schools to the sum of \$14 per capita of the number of pupils enrolled in the schools. The same reason required also the cutting down of the estimates submitted by the committees of this board having in charge expenditures from the contingent fund, about \$30,000. This has left the funds of several of those committees in a crippled condition. The chairmen of those committees appeared before the finance committee of the Council with this committee and made known to them their wants, as follows:

The Fuel and Fire Fixtures Committee asked an additional appropriation of \$6,000. The committee received last year \$31,345.35, while its appropriation this year was \$24,912.

The Supply Committee asked for \$8,000 additional, which will make the appropriation this year \$725 less than the amount received last year.

The Printing and Text Book Committees asked for \$1,000 and \$800, respectively.

The Finance Committee asked that the sum of \$3,027.62 be placed in the miscellaneous fund or the repair fund for the purpose of paying the rent of annexes for the balance of the year.

The foregoing amounts aggregate \$41,827.62, and seem to be actually required to conduct

the schools for the remainder of the fiscal year.

There was some discussion also with the Council committee in regard to the proposed increase of the salaries of the assistant teachers. While it was generally conceded that this was an inopportune time to bring this subject up, on account of the great depression in the business world, yet this board is so thoroughly committed in favor of such increase and has so often assured the teachers that the subject would be presented by it to the Council at this time, that it would seem like a breach of good faith on our part not to speak most earnestly in their behalf. When the subject was under discussion last spring, public opinion was clearly on the side of the teachers in their demand for a more adequate compensation. It was then shown that their salaries were much smaller than those paid in other cities and that they were the poorest paid of any of our city's employes. While conditions have materially changed since then, it is not right that a plea of hard times should be permitted to relegate this subject to the indefinite future. Now, at least, is the time to procure the necessary legislation on the subject in order that no legal obstacles shall stand in the way of future action. But we are in favor of making a start at this time and renew the conservative recommendation made by the Finance Committee of this board in the spring to increase the salaries of those who have taught over ten years \$10 per month, and of those who have taught five years and less than ten years \$5 per month, making their salaries \$55 and \$50 per month, respectively. The amount necessary for this purpose for the three months commencing January 2nd, is about \$6,000.

In order to make this increase effective hereafter an amendment to subdivision 6 of section 129 of the city charter is necessary. By that subdivision the amount that can be raised for teachers' wages and contingent expenses is limited to not more than fourteen dollars per capita, based on the average number of resident pupils enrolled in the several public schools of the city. This amount is insufficient even to pay the present salaries and defray the contingent expenses of the schools. Appropriations in excess of \$14 per capita have been made for the past three years. While the sum of \$14 per capita would, perhaps, be sufficient if the city was stationary in population and all the school buildings were in a finished state, the rapid growth since 1882, when this provision of the charter was adopted, has required the erection of many new buildings in all parts of the city, and the remodeling of old ones to make them conform to modern ideas of what a school building should be. The demands upon the Supply and Fuel and Fire Fixtures funds to furnish these new buildings, and to equip the old buildings with modern heating and ventilating apparatus, in place of stoves, have been very great and account in large part for the increase in the contingent fund expenses. The change in the method of heating from stoves to steam, or other systems, requires more skill and work upon the part of janitors, and their pay has been increased in proportion. When the above provision was adopted in 1882, but four of the school buildings were heated by steam. At the present time twenty-eight of the thirty-four school buildings are heated and ventilated by steam or other improved methods.

It has been suggested that the teachers' fund be entirely separated from the contingent fund in the amended section. Under this present provision of the charter, the moneys for these funds when placed to the

credit of this board are entirely distinct and cannot be mingled by us, but the proposed amendment would provide against the possibility of the requirements for one fund being so great as to cause the cutting down of the other, and would leave more liberty of action to the Common Council in making the annual appropriations. We would favor the removal of all limitations in this section, as has been done in other cities, and in respect to most other departments of the city government, and the granting to the council of power to raise such sums as in their opinion are necessary upon the requisition of this board, but the limitations in the present provision have stood so long that it would probably be injudicious to ask for so radical a change. This amendment, which we recommend, therefore consists in separating the two funds and placing the limitation on this amount to be raised for teachers' wages at \$14 per capita. We also recommend that the Repair fund be relieved from the payment of the rents of annexes. There seems to be no good reason why that fund should be burdened with this provision, as it has been demonstrated that the sum of \$15,000 is none too large to keep our thirty-four school buildings in proper repairs.

This board, at the beginning of the present fiscal year, was confronted with the unpaid bills of previous boards, amounting to between \$21,000 and \$22,000. A number of these bills, amounting to several thousand dollars, are open to serious objections on account of violations of the charter and rules of the board in contracting them and overcharges in some of the bills, and have heretofore been refused audit by this board. The chairman of the Finance Committee informs us that \$14,387.92 of the above amount represent bills about which there is no question, distributed among the various committees as follows:

The board of 1892-3 is not entirely responsible for this state of affairs. Each board since 1885 has left to its successor a legacy of unpaid bills, generally increasing in amount from year to year. The board of 1892-3 paid such bills to the amount of \$22,665.21, but this year, on account of the cutting down of the funds as hereinbefore stated and the opinion of the City Attorney that this board had no authority to pay bills contracted by its predecessors, these bills have remained unpaid and, in the opinion of your committee, it will require special legislation before any money can be appropriated by the Council for their payment. Most of them represent actual labor performed and materials furnished for the benefit of the city, and just demands that all honest claimants, many of whom dealt with the board in ignorance of the charter provision, should be paid. As to the bills about which question has arisen, the enabling act, in our opinion, should give power to the Council to provide money for the payment of such sums as shall be found justly owing upon them after being subjected to a rigid scrutiny by this board and the City Auditor.

We therefore recommend and urge that the representatives of the city in the legislature be requested to procure the passage of two enabling acts and an amendment to the city charter, as follows:

AN ACT to authorize the Common Council of the city of Rochester to raise money to provide for deficiencies in the funds for the support of the public schools of said city.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Common Council of the city of Rochester is hereby authorized and empowered to raise, in addition to the amount heretofore raised by taxes, not exceeding the sum of thirty-six thousand dollars to pay teachers' wages and contingent expenses, of the public schools and of the Board of Education of said city and the sum of three thousand dollars to be credited to the Repair Fund of said Board, for the purpose of paying certain bills for rents to and including the thirty-first day of March, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, and for that purpose may issue the note or notes or other obligation of said city. Said amount shall be placed to the credit of said Board of Education, and shall be used for no other purposes than as specified in this section.

Section 2. Said amount of not exceeding thirty-nine thousand dollars shall be assessed and collected together with the other general city taxes for the next ensuing year.

Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

AN ACT to authorize the Common Council of the city of Rochester, to raise money to pay certain claims against the Board of Education of said city.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Common Council of the city of Rochester is hereby authorized and empowered to raise, by issuing the note or notes or other obligation of said city, not exceeding the sum of thirteen thousand dollars, to pay all outstanding claims against the Board of Education of said city which are payable from the Contingent Fund of said Board, and the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars to pay outstanding claims against said Board which are payable from the Repair Fund of said Board, which were unpaid at the commencement of the current fiscal year, when said claims, or any of them, shall be audited by the Auditor of said city, and approved by said Board of Education, as in the case of other claims against said Board, but no such claim shall be rejected by said Auditor or said Board because the same was ordered or contracted in violation of the charter of said city, or the rules and regulations of said Board of Education, provided it shall appear that the items of said claims were actually furnished to and used by said Board of Education. Said amount, or so much thereof as shall be found necessary, shall be placed to the credit of said Board of Education and shall be used for no other purposes than as specified in this section.

Section 2. Said amount of not exceeding fifteen thousand five hundred dollars shall be assessed and collected together with the other general city taxes for the next ensuing fiscal year.

Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

AN ACT to amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled, "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester," as amended and established by chapter fourteen, laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, and the several acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Sub-division six of section one hundred and twenty-nine of the charter of the city of Rochester, as amended and established by chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act to further amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled 'An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester,' and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of said city," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

6. The amount to be raised for teachers' wages in any one year shall not be less than six dollars, nor more than fourteen dollars per capita, based on the average number of resident pupils registered but once, in the several public schools of said city, for the school year ending on the first day of May next preceding the levying of the general city taxes in each year. A sworn statement of such number of pupils so enrolled shall be made by the superintendent of schools, according to the verified monthly reports of the principals of said schools. Nor shall the amount to be raised in any one year to alter, improve and repair school houses and their out-houses and appurtenances, exceed fifteen thousand dollars, or to purchase and improve sites, and to build or enlarge school houses, exceed fifty thousand dollars, or for library purposes, exceed three thousand dollars; and the Common Council of said city is authorized and directed, when necessary, to raise by loan, in anticipation of the taxes, the amount to be raised, collected and levied as aforesaid.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Therefore, Resolved, That the recommendations contained in the foregoing report be, and the same hereby are, adopted, and that the clerk of this board transmit a certified copy thereof to the Common Council.

ROCHESTER PARK COMMISSION, {
Monday, January 8, 1893. {

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—At a special meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners held on January 2d, called for the purpose of devising ways and means for employing immediately on the parks, men in need of work, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the superintendent report at once such work as he regards practicable on the parks and approaches thereto.

That the Executive Board be and is hereby requested to improve the streets and approaches to the parks. And also that the Common Council are hereby requested to procure the passage of an act, enabling the Council to appropriate such sums as they may think proper to enable this commission to erect buildings, and make such other improvements as the weather may permit.

The undersigned were appointed a committee to present this to your honorable body, and urge that the city authorities do such work as would properly come under their jurisdiction, and that they furnish such money to the commissioners as may be necessary to carry on the work within the parks.

We attach hereto a statement of our engineer, giving in detail such work as is deemed necessary and that can be carried on during the winter and early spring. All this work will eventually have to be done and paid for by the city.

We wish the city authorities to widen, fill in and grade Elmwood avenue from the bridge over the river, west, to the Western New York & Pennsylvania Railroad crossing. This portion of the avenue is entirely within the park, is now in a dangerous condition, entirely too narrow and inadequate for the comfort and safety of the crowds frequenting the parks. When athletic and ball games are in progress it is blocked with vehicles so as to make it almost impassable.

We would also recommend that they grade and put in proper condition that portion of North St. Paul street, north of the Ridge road as far as the proposed new crossing of the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg Railroad, which it is intended to use as a park road, and also the new road directly east, the land for which has been purchased and which the city must put in proper condition before it can close the present St. Paul street for heavy teaming.

We also recommend that a proper entrance and roadway be made from South avenue to Highland Park.

The money allowed to the commissioners for the current year is about exhausted. We employ but one man on each of the parks, which is necessary in order to properly guard and protect the city property—one of the men is required in addition thereto, to look after the flock of 250 sheep, and another one, who is a practical carpenter, is engaged in making tables, benches, and seats for the use of the public in the parks the coming season. The employment of three additional men at \$1.50 per day from April 1st to July 1st, will absorb all our funds and leave a small deficiency.

In regard to the proposed work thought practicable and desirable within the parks, we refer you to the accompanying report of the engineer.

In order to furnish money to do this work the Board has directed the City Attorney to draw up an act to be sent at once to the Legislature, enabling the Common Council to put at the disposal of the commissioners such funds as the Council may deem sufficient and proper to carry on the work specified, and we request you to urge its immediate passage.

We herewith attach a draft of the proposed act.

We would add that substantially every cent of the money advanced will be used for labor, for the employment of carpenters, masons and other skilled workmen, as well as teamster and day laborers.

AN ACT to authorize the Common Council of the city of Rochester to raise money for the temporary and immediate wants and necessities of the Board of Park Commissioners of said city.

The People of the State of New York represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Common Council of the city of Rochester is hereby authorized and empowered to appropriate to the use of the Park Commissioners a sum not to exceed ten thousand dollars in addition to the moneys appropriated for the fiscal year for 1893 as provided by law for the purpose of relieving the immediate necessities and wants of said board, and said Common Council is hereby

authorized and empowered to borrow such amount appropriated as provided by the city charter and levy a tax therefor in the general tax levy for the year 1894.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Lamp and Electric Committee to which was referred the matter of lighting Main and State streets from the underground conduit systems would respectfully submit the following report:

That Main street should be lighted by the new system as soon as possible so that the wires and poles can be removed. That State street should be lighted the same as Main street in the next fiscal year. Your committee has agreed upon a style of pole with double lights practically the same as the one erected on the corner of Main and St. Paul streets, except that the pole adopted by your committee will be one foot higher. Your committee would recommend its adoption by your honorable Board as the standard pole to be used on all streets where the electric light wires are underground.

After conference with the Rochester Gas & Electric Co., your committee are able to submit the following propositions which we believe is a fair and reasonable one in which the interests of the city are well taken care of. The Rochester Gas & Electric Co. agree to make a contract to light Main and State streets with double incandescent arc lights, to furnish and set the necessary poles and furnish light for 40 cents per double incandescent arc light per night, poles to be of the kind and pattern approved by the Lamp and Electric Committee and to be and remain the property of the Rochester Gas & Electric Co., except in case the city lights the streets on which these poles are set by its own plant or

by contract with some other company or corporation in which case poles to be sold to city or other company or corporation at cost price of poles including setting; lamps to be and remain the property of the Rochester Gas & Electric Company.

The energy to be consumed in such double arc lights to be not less than 340 watts for each single lamp with carbon and length of arc to be approved by the City Electrician. The kind of lamp and globe to be used to be approved by the Lamp and Electric Committee. Contracts to expire at same date as contract now in force between the city and said company for lighting the streets of the city.

Your committee is able to submit the above price and conditions after several conferences with the Rochester Gas & Electric Company and is of the opinion that 40 cents per pole of two lights per night is a very favorable price for the city taking the price paid for arc lights, 25 cents per night, as a basis. Main and State streets are at present very poorly lighted. We are largely depending on the store lights to light the streets, which makes the streets very dark when the store lights are out on Sunday and holiday nights. Your committee have located as few lights as possible to properly light the streets and find that 26 double lights are necessary to light Main street which makes an increase of \$6.15 per night for lighting this street; and your committee is of the opinion that after the change is made and the street lighted with these lamps and all the poles and wires are removed, the citizens will agree with your Honorable Board that the additional money was well expended.

Dear Sir:—It has been reported at this office that the sewer on Tremont place is wholly inadequate for present needs, and that for this reason two of the cellars upon the street are, at intervals, flooded by sewage. Upon investigation those facts are found to be substantially true. The present sewer is a ten-inch private pipe sewer of unknown depth, and runs but half the length of the street. The outlet conjoined with the sewer from Edinburgh court, is across a vacant lot into the Genesee Valley sewer.

At the instance of property holders, a first ordinance was passed for the construction of a good sewer, but when the ordinance came up for final passage, October 17th, it was indefinitely postponed.

Dear Sir:—The following report and recommendations were adopted by the Board of Education of this city at a regular session of said Board held January 2d inst.

Com. Durand submitted the following:

To the Board of Education:

Gentlemen:—Your special committee heretofore appointed to confer with a committee of the Common Council, do report that they had a conference with the finance committee of the council on Tuesday last, at which time they presented in detail to them the present condition of the finances of this board.

Your committee first called attention to the condition of the fund for the payment of teachers' salaries. There is now about \$4,000 in that fund after the payment of salaries for the first half of December. There will be no moneys available for this fund until the state appropriation is received in February, which, it is expected, will amount to \$77,600 or \$78,000. There are three months and a half to be provided for and, taking the November budget as a basis, the total amount required will be \$102,000 to carry this fund over to the commencement of the new fiscal year, beginning April 1st. Allowing for the amount on hand and the amount to be received from the state, there will remain a shortage of \$22,000 or \$23,000 to be provided for. Unless immediate relief is given, no further payments can be made to the teachers until the state money becomes available, some time in February next.

This condition of affairs was foreseen and announced at the time the annual appropriation was made in the spring. The amount appropriated by the council for teachers' salaries was \$182,500, which, with the amount on hand at the end of last year, after the payment of the March budget (\$7,483.68) and the amount to be received from the state, made the total amount available \$266,983.68. It was known that the amount expended last year for teachers' salaries was \$274,625.74, and that a larger amount would be required this year, with large additions to the school buildings and an increased enrollment of nearly 900 pupils. A deficiency in the fund of \$23,000 was then figured out and it is about this amount that we now ask for.

It is, of course, well known by this board that the Common Council was limited by the provisions of the city charter in the amount of money that they could appropriate for this fund and for the contingent expenses of the schools to the sum of \$14 per capita of the number of pupils enrolled in the schools. The same reason required also the cutting down of the estimates submitted by the committees of this board having in charge expenditures from the contingent fund, about \$30,000. This has left the funds of several of those committees in a crippled condition. The chairman of those committees appeared before the finance committee of the council with this committee and made known to them their wants as follows:

The Fuel and Fire Fixtures Committee asked an additional appropriation of \$6,000. The committee received last year \$31,345.35, while its appropriation this year was \$24,912.

The Supply Committee asked for \$3,000 additional, which will make the appropriation this year \$725 less than the amount received last year.

The Printing and Text Book Committees asked for \$1,000 and \$800 respectively.

The Finance Committee asked that the sum of \$5,627.62 be placed in the miscellaneous fund or the repair fund for the purpose of paying the rent of annexes for the balance of the year.

The foregoing amounts aggregate \$41,827.62, and seem to be actually required to conduct

the schools for the remainder of the fiscal year.

There was some discussion also with the Council committee in regard to the proposed increase of the salaries of the assistant teachers. While it was generally conceded that this was an inopportune time to bring this subject up, on account of the great depression in the business world, yet this board is so thoroughly committed in favor of such increase and has so often assured the teachers that the subject would be presented by it to the Council at this time, that it would seem like a breach of good faith on our part not to speak most earnestly in their behalf. When the subject was under discussion last spring, public opinion was clearly on the side of the teachers in their demand for a more adequate compensation. It was then shown that their salaries were much smaller than those paid in other cities and that they were the poorest paid of any of our city's employes. While conditions have materially changed since then, it is not right that a plea of hard times should be permitted to relegate this subject to the indefinite future. Now, at least, is the time to procure the necessary legislation on the subject in order that no legal obstacles shall stand in the way of future action. But we are in favor of making a start at this time and renew the conservative recommendation made by the Finance Committee of this board in the spring to increase the salaries of those who have taught over ten years \$10 per month, and of those who have taught five years and less than ten years \$5 per month, making their salaries \$55 and \$50 per month respectively. The amount necessary for this purpose for the three months commencing January 2nd is about \$6,000.

In order to make this increase effective hereafter an amendment to subdivision 6 of section 129 of the city charter is necessary. By that subdivision the amount that can be raised for teachers' wages and contingent expenses is limited to not more than fourteen dollars per capita, based on the average number of resident pupils enrolled in the several public schools of the city. This amount is insufficient even to pay the present salaries and defray the contingent expenses of the schools. Appropriations in excess of \$14 per capita have been made for the past three years. While the sum of \$14 per capita would, perhaps, be sufficient if the city was stationary in population and all the school buildings were in a finished state, the rapid growth since 1882, when this provision of the charter was adopted, has required the erection of many new buildings in all parts of the city and the remodeling of old ones to make them conform to modern ideas of what a school building should be. The demands upon the Supply and Fuel and Fire Fixture funds to furnish these new buildings, and to equip the old buildings with modern heating and ventilating apparatus, in place of stoves, have been very great and account in large part for the increase in the contingent fund expenses. The change in the method of heating from stoves to steam, or other systems, requires more skill and work upon the part of janitors, and their pay has been increased in proportion. When the above provision was adopted in 1882, but four of the school buildings were heated by steam. At the present time twenty-eight of the thirty-four school buildings are heated and ventilated by steam or other improved methods.

It has been suggested that the teachers' fund be entirely separated from the contingent fund in the amended section. Under the present provision of the charter the moneys for these funds when placed to the

credit of this board are entirely distinct and cannot be mingled by us, but the proposed amendment would provide against the possibility of the requirements for one fund being so great as to cause the cutting down of the other, and would leave more liberty of action to the Common Council in making the annual appropriations. We would favor the removal of all limitations in this section, as has been done in other cities and in respect to most other departments of the city government, and the granting to the Council of power to raise such sums as in their opinion are necessary upon the requisition of this board, but the limitations in the present provision have stood so long that it would probably be injudicious to ask for so radical a change. This amendment, which we recommend, therefore consists in separating the two funds and placing the limitation on this amount to be raised for teachers' wages at \$14 per capita. We also recommend that the Repair Fund be relieved from the payment of the rents of annexes. There seems to be no good reason why that fund should be burdened with this provision, as it has been demonstrated that the sum of \$15,000 is none too large to keep ~~our~~ thirty-four school buildings in proper repairs.

This board, at the beginning of the present fiscal year, was confronted with the unpaid bills of previous boards, amounting to between \$21,000 and \$22,000. A number of these bills, amounting to several thousand dollars, are open to serious objections on account of violations of the charter and rules of the board in contracting them and overcharges in some of the bills, and have heretofore been refused audit by this board. The chairman of the Finance Committee informs us that \$14,387.92 of the above amount represent bills about which there is no question, distributed among the various committees as follows:

The board of 1892-3 is not entirely responsible for this state of affairs. Each board since 1885 has left to its successor a legacy of unpaid bills, generally increasing in amount from year to year. The board of 1892-3 paid such bills to the amount of \$22,365.21, but this year, on account of the cutting down of the funds as hereinbefore stated and the opinion of the City Attorney that this board had no authority to pay bills contracted by its predecessors, these bills have remained unpaid and, in the opinion of your committee, it will require special legislation before any money can be appropriated by the Council for their payment. Most of them represent actual labor performed and materials furnished for the benefit of the city, and justice demands that all honest claimants, many of whom dealt with the board in ignorance of the charter provision, should be paid. As to the bills about which question has arisen, the enabling act, in our opinion, should give power to our Council to provide money for the payment of such sums as shall be found justly owing upon them after being subjected to a rigid scrutiny by this board and the City Auditor.

We therefore recommend and urge that the representatives of the city in the legislature be requested to procure the passage of two

enabling acts and an amendment to the city charter, as follows:

AN ACT to authorize the Common Council of the city of Rochester to raise money to provide for deficiencies in the funds for the support of the public schools of said city.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Common Council of the city of Rochester is hereby authorized and empowered to raise, in addition to the amount heretofore raised by taxes, not exceeding the sum of forty-eight thousand dollars to pay teachers' wages and contingent expenses of the public schools and of the Board of Education of said city and including the thirty-first day of March, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, and for that purpose may issue the note or notes or other obligation of said city. Said amount shall be placed to the credit of said Board of Education and shall be used for no other purposes than as specified in this section.

Section 2. Said amount of not exceeding forty-eight thousand dollars shall be assessed and collected together with the other general city taxes for the next ensuing year.

Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

AN ACT to authorize the Common Council of the city of Rochester, to raise money to pay certain claims against the Board of Education of said city.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Common Council of the city of Rochester is hereby authorized and empowered to raise, by issuing the note or notes or other obligation of said city, not exceeding the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, to pay all outstanding claims against the Board of Education of said city which were unpaid at the commencement of the current fiscal year, when said claims, or any of them, shall be audited by the Auditor of said city, and approved by said Board of Education, as in the case of other claims against said Board, but no such claim shall be rejected by said Auditor or said Board because the same was ordered or contracted in violation of the charter of said city, or the rules and regulations of said Board of Education, provided it shall appear that the items of said claims were actually furnished to and used by said Board of Education. Said amount, or so much thereof as shall be found necessary, shall be placed to the credit of said Board of Education and shall be used for no other purposes than as specified in this section.

Section 2. Said amount of not exceeding twenty-five thousand dollars shall be assessed and collected together with the other general city taxes for the next ensuing fiscal year.

Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

AN ACT to amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester," as amended and established by chapter fourteen, laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, and the several acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Sub-division six of section one hundred and twenty-nine of the charter of the city of Rochester, as amended and established by chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act to further amend chapter one hundred

and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester," and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of said city," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

6. The amount to be raised for teachers' wages in any one year shall not be less than six dollars, nor more than fourteen dollars per capita, based on the average number of resident pupils registered but once, in the several public schools of said city, for the school year ending on the first day of May next preceding the levying of the general city taxes in each year. A sworn statement of such number of pupils so enrolled shall be made by the superintendent of schools according to the verified monthly reports of the principals of said schools. Nor shall the amount to be raised in any one year to alter, improve and repair school houses and their out-houses and appurtenances, exceed fifteen thousand dollars, or to purchase and improve sites, and build or enlarge school houses, exceed fifty thousand dollars, or for library purposes, exceed three thousand dollars; and the Common Council of said city are authorized and directed, when necessary, to raise by loan, in anticipation of the taxes, the amount to be raised, collected and levied as aforesaid.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Therefore Resolved, that the recommendations contained in the foregoing report be, and the same hereby are, adopted, and that the clerk of this board transmit a certified copy thereof to the Common Council.

To the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, police commissioners of the city of Rochester, respectfully petition your honorable body to provide a suitable central headquarters for the use of this department. Such headquarters should have cells above ground with a separate division for women prisoners. It should have rooms for the use of the matron and for the detention of witnesses. It should have a sufficiently large assembly room for the patrol force. It should have separate offices for the superintendent, for the assistant superintendent and for the detectives. It should have a roomy and well-equipped gymnasium. It should, finally have a dormitory for the use of such part of the force as it may at any time be necessary to hold at headquarters in emergencies. The present city hall building quarters are deficient, if not wholly lacking, in all these respects.

Some of the requirements above set forth are urgent particularly that in relation to a gymnasium. Therefore, the undersigned respectfully ask your Honorable Body to take early action in the case. We feel that delay would imperil the best interests of the important department entrusted to our charge.

JUNK DEALERS.

Section 1. The Mayor of the city of Rochester is hereby authorized to issue licenses to persons desiring to carry on the business of buying, selling and dealing in junk, rags, old rope, old iron, brass, copper, tin, lead or other old metals, old bottles, old glass, old bones, old tinware or any second-hand articles, excepting second-hand books and furniture, upon payment, annually, to the city of Rochester, of the sum of twenty-five dollars as a license fee for each and every license so issued.

Sec. 2. No person shall be licensed as provided in the foregoing section unless he shall be a citizen of the United States.

Sec. 3. Every person to whom a license shall be granted authorizing such person to purchase, sell or deal in any of the articles mentioned or described in the first section of the ordinance, shall enter into a bond to the city of Rochester in the penal sum of two hundred and fifty dollars, and with good and sufficient sureties to be approved by the Mayor of said city, conditioned for the due observance of all such ordinances of the city of Rochester, as may be enacted respecting persons buying, selling or dealing in any such articles during the continuance of such license.

Sec. 4. Every license which shall be granted in pursuance of section 1 of this ordinance shall designate the house or place in which the person receiving such license shall be authorized to carry on said business, and it shall be lawful for any such person so licensed as aforesaid, to keep, use and drive a cart or carts, wagon or wagons in the city of Rochester, for the purchase and sale of any or all the articles mentioned and described in said section 1, provided that each cart or wagon so kept, used and driven by him shall be duly and separately licensed, and that every such cart or wagon shall be marked with his name, at length, the street and number of his place of business, and the number of his license in plain letters and figures at least two inches in length.

Sec. 5. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to carry on the business of buying, selling or dealing in any of the articles or things mentioned and described in section 1 of this ordinance or procure to be used or driven any cart, wagon or other vehicle for the purchase or sale of either of said articles, without being first licensed so to do as provided in and by section 1 aforesaid.

Sec. 6. No person licensed as aforesaid shall receive, in the line of his business, any article or thing by way of pledge or pawn, nor shall he loan or advance any sum of money on the security of any such article or thing; nor shall any such person receive or purchase any goods, article or thing whatever from any person under the age of eighteen years, or from any person or persons whomsoever, between the setting of the sun and the hour of seven o'clock in the morning.

Sec. 7. Every person carrying on or conducting the business of buying, selling or dealing in any of the articles or things mentioned and described in section 1, within the city of Rochester, is hereby required to keep a record of every article or thing aforesaid bought, except such as are purchased at the houses of permanent residents by their own collector, to keep the name and a full description of every stranger from whom any article or thing is bought and to report daily, in writing to the Chief of Police, in such form as said Chief may prescribe, all articles received by him within twenty-four hours immediately preceding the delivery of such report; but the contents of such report shall not be communicated to any person for the purpose of publication, but shall be used expressly for the purpose of protecting the public. Any person licensed as aforesaid who shall refuse or neglect to make the reports hereby required, or who shall make any false entry in such report, or who shall omit to make a full and complete report, shall incur and be liable to pay a penalty of ten dollars for each offense.

Sec. 8. No person or persons licensed to carry on business under the provisions of this ordinance shall (during the continuance of such license) use, exercise or carry on the business or trade of a pawnbroker, nor shall any pawn broker receive a license under the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 9. No person licensed pursuant to this ordinance shall carry on any such business at any other house or place than the one designated in such license, nor shall continue to carry on such business after such license may have been revoked.

Sec. 10. Every person licensed under the provisions of this ordinance shall have and keep a sign on the outside and in front of his shop or other place used for carrying on such business, on which shall be plainly set forth in conspicuous letters and figures his name, his licensed business and the number of his said license; and in case any person so licensed, as aforesaid, shall remove his shop or place of business from the place designated in said license, he or she shall immediately thereupon give notice to the Mayor, and have the same indorsed upon such license, and the number of his shop or place of business shall thereupon be changed upon the sides of the cart or wagon used by such licensed person, and made to correspond with such change of shop or place of business.

Sec. 11. Every person licensed under the provisions of this ordinance shall, when engaged in the business described in section 1 hereof, or in soliciting, purchasing or receiving any of the articles mentioned herein, wear on the breast of his coat in a conspicuous place, a metallic badge, which shall contain in legible, large-sized letters and figures, the words "Licensed Junk Dealer," and the number of his license.

Sec. 12. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the city of Rochester relating to Junk dealers, or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 13. Every person who shall violate any of the provisions of this chapter shall for each offense be subject to a fine or penalty not exceeding \$150 in amount to be imposed by the police justice, or judge, or court be-

fore whom a suit for such fine or penalty is brought in the discretion of such justice, judge, or court, and on failure to pay such fine or penalty when recovered shall be imprisoned in the Monroe County Penitentiary for a term not exceeding 150 days to be determined by such justice, judge or court, in his or its discretion at the time the judgment is entered.

Sec. 14. Every execution upon a judgment recovered for any fine or penalty or forfeiture imposed for the violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be issued immediately on the rendition of the judgment and shall command the amount to be made out of the personal property of the defendant within the city not exempt from levy and sale under an execution, if such can be found, and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentiary for such time as shall have been directed by the justice, judge or court rendering such judgment and may be issued to and enforced by any member of the police department of said city. Such execution may be issued by the police justice or police clerk of said city, where the judgment was rendered by the police justice of said city.

Sec. 16. All license fees and fines or penalties, or other moneys paid to or received by said city under any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be applied to the police pension fund.

Sec. 17. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate \$15,000.

The construction of a substantial iron bridge over the Carroll & Fitzhugh race at Court street 64 feet wide, with Medina block stone pavement and 6-inch curb-stones. Sidewalks to be of asphalt. Also the construction of a suitable pier in the center of the race and the rebuilding of the present abutments as far as may be necessary, together with the acquirement of an easement if necessary for said piers in said race. Beginning at the south-east corner of East Main street and Exchange street; thence southerly along Exchange street to the south line of the freight station grounds of the New York, Lake Erie & Western R. R.; thence easterly along the said south line of said station grounds to the west bank of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the west bank of the Genesee river to the south line of East Main street; thence westerly along the south line of East Main street to the place of beginning, excepting the lots fronting on East Main street, lying east of the lot on the south-east corner of Exchange street and East Main street. Your Law Committee would respectfully report in the matter of the applications of the executors of the estate of Charles G. Staud for a refund of certain moneys erroneously paid to the city, that on or about March 15, 1893, an action was commenced by the city of Rochester to recover of the executors of Charles G. Staud the sum of \$2,000, due the city for the board of Barbara and Anthony Lerch at the Monroe County Insane Asylum and the Rochester State Hospital, and by virtue of a certain mortgage executed by one John Lerch to Anthony Lerch June 11, 1881. That proceedings were thereafter had by virtue of which the city recovered a judgment against the executors of the said Charles G. Staud for \$2,000, but after the recovery of the judgment certain receipts were discovered, which reduced the recovery to \$1,768. and the judgment was so modified. That the executors of said Charles G. Staud estate thereupon paid said judgment, and about two months after the same had been paid, discovered a number of other receipts among the papers of Charles G. Staud, showing that besides the payment of \$232, the said Charles G. Staud had paid \$236.61 for such board. That said executors have petitioned the Common Council to return to them said \$366.61, moneys so paid by said Charles G. Staud for the support and maintenance of Anthony and Barbara Lerch.

That while it was the duty of said executors to present said receipts upon the trial of this action, they could in a court of equity recover back any sums that they had paid by mistake. Your committee have caused an examination to be made and they are satisfied that the said executors of the estate of said Charles G. Staud have a valid claim against the city for \$336.61. The City Attorney has examined said receipts, and Nathaniel Thompson, overseer of the poor during the greater portion of the time when these payments were made, and is satisfied that the money was in good faith paid by said Charles G. Staud, as the receipts would indicate. Some of the receipts were signed by John Lutes, who was overseer of the poor at the time these payments were made; some of the receipts were in the handwriting of Mr. Lutes, and some of them in the handwriting of his deputy, Mr. Eagan. Those who are familiar with Mr. Lutes' signature say they are his genuine signatures, and Mr. Eagan also states that the receipts which are in his handwriting, and to which he signed Mr. Lutes' name, are genuine, and he remembers the circumstance of said moneys having been paid. Your committee are, therefore, of the opinion that nothing remains to be done but return to said executors of said estate of Charles G. Staud the sum of \$336.61, so paid by them by mistake.

That on the 28th day of December, 1891, an agreement was entered into between the

city of Rochester and Mary Shiel to pay the sum of \$55 per annum for the right, privilege and easement to continue the discharge of sewage over her property, and another payment was due on the 28th of December, 1893, we therefore recommend that an order be drawn in favor of said Mary Shiel, pursuant to said agreement, for the year 1893.

That on the 13th day of January, 1892, an agreement was entered into between the city of Rochester and Peter Braal, to pay the sum of \$60 per annum for the right, privilege and easement to continue the discharge of sewage over his property, and another payment was due on the 13th day of January, 1894; we therefore recommend that an order be drawn in favor of said Peter Braal, pursuant to said agreement for the year 1893.

In the matter of the applications of Sarah Boylen and Matilda Hartman for appointment as commissioners of deeds, we recommend the granting of the same.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: The undersigned, occupants of the Municipal Court, respectfully call your attention to the condition of the rooms occupied by them, in so far as the same relates to the unhealthy condition thereof.

For a number of years past the court rooms have been almost daily filled with bad odors, stench and sewer gas coming into the rooms from the ventilators, shafts and wash bowls therein.

During the last few years a number of persons employed in said building have been sick with fever, which was undoubtedly caused wholly or in part by said odor and sewer gas.

Yesterday the occupants of the Municipal Court room were compelled, on account of the stench and sewer gas therein, to leave the same, and were unable to work any longer therein. This had also happened a number of other times.

There can be no doubt but the condition of the plumbing in said building makes it dangerous to the health of the employes and

occupants of said rooms. The plumbing in said building has been condemned by them.

We respectfully ask your honorable body to take such steps as will render the said rooms fit for occupancy, and so as not to endanger the health of the occupants thereof.

AN ACT to amend chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act to further amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled 'An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester' and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation into the charter of said city, and the several acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section two of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 2. The boundaries of said city shall be as follows: Beginning at a point in the present northerly line of said city of Rochester, which said point is in the middle of the Ridge road eight chains and seventy-five links distant easterly from the top of the east high bank of the Genesee river; thence south, fifteen minutes east, to the north line of Norton street; thence easterly on the said north line of Norton street to a point two hundred feet easterly from the east line of lot number forty-eight, in the town of Irondequoit; thence southerly on a line parallel with the said east line of said lot number forty-eight, and at a distance of two hundred feet easterly therefrom, to the south line of the highway called Waring street; thence southeasterly along the south line of said Waring street, and the said line continued to a point which would be the intersection of the said line with the east line of the highway known as Culver road; thence southwesterly on said line of said Culver road to the north line of lot number thirty-seven, in the town of Brighton; thence westerly on the north line of said lot number thirty-seven, and on the north line of lots forty-five and fifty-three, in the said town of Brighton, to a point in the north line of said lot fifty-three, two hundred and ninety feet easterly from the northeast corner of lot number sixty-one in said town; thence southerly, on a line parallel with the

east line of said lot number sixty-one, to the northerly line of a road known as Elmwood avenue; thence westerly along the northerly line of said road known as Elmwood avenue to a point, which said point is at the intersection of the northerly line of said Elmwood avenue with the westerly line of the lands now owned by the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company; thence southerly on the westerly line of the said lands now owned by said railroad company, to a point in the center of the Westfall road, so called; thence westerly along the center of the Westfall road to a point in the center of the said Westfall road, where the said road makes an angle to the north; thence southwestwardly in a straight line twenty-four hundred feet through lands now owned by, or known as the Harmon farm, and the Baker farm, to a point where the east bank of the Genesee river intersects the west line of the Wolcott road, so called; thence northeasterly along the east shore of the Genesee river, about eight hundred and fifty feet to a point where the northerly line extended of a road running between the lands of E. Chapin and Matthias Kondolf, on the west side of said river, would intersect said east bank of said river; thence westerly along said line so extended and continuing along the said line to a point where the said line intersects the easterly line of lands now owned by the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad Company; thence northeasterly along the east line of said lands owned by said company, to a point where the east line of said railroad, would be intersected by the center line of Genesee street produced southwestwardly; thence northeasterly through the center of a road, which is the continuation of Genesee street, to a point where the center line of said Genesee street intersects the present southerly line of said city, which is the north line of lot seven and south line of lot forty-six of the town of Gates; thence westerly along the said line to a point where the said line would be intersected by the east line of lots seventy-five, seventy-six and one hundred sixty-eight in said town of Gates produced southerly; thence northerly along the said produced line to the south line of lot number twenty-two of said town of Gates; thence westerly on the south line of said lot twenty-two to the east line of the highway known as Thurston road; thence northerly along the east line of said highway to the north line of said lot twenty-two; thence easterly on the north line of said lot twenty-two to the above mentioned produced east line of lot one hundred and sixty-eight of the town of Gates; thence northerly along said produced line to the east line of said lot one hundred sixty-eight, and along the east line of said lot one hundred sixty-eight to the northerly line of the highway known as Chili road; thence westerly along the northerly line of said Chili road, to the west line of a street known as Gardiner avenue; thence northerly along the west line of said Gardiner avenue sixty feet; thence westerly at right angles with Gardiner avenue, seventy-five feet; thence southerly, parallel with the said Gardiner avenue, to the aforesaid northerly line of Chili road; thence westerly along the northerly line of said Chili road to the easterly line of a highway called Lincoln avenue; thence northerly along the easterly line of said Lincoln avenue, to the south line of a highway called the Buffalo road; thence easterly along the southerly boundaries of the said Buffalo road to the east line of lot one hundred sixty-eight of the town of Gates; thence northerly along the east line of lots one hundred sixty-eight, seventy-six, seventy-five, seventy-four and seventy-three of the

town of Gates, continued on the east line of lots seventy-two, seventy-one and seventy of the town of Greece, to a point twenty rods north of the center of the highway known as the Big Ridge road; thence easterly parallel with the center line of said road and twenty rods distant northerly therefrom and on said line produced easterly to a point twelve hundred feet easterly from the east line of Lake avenue; thence northerly on a line parallel with Lake avenue ten hundred and eleven feet, to a point; thence north, thirty-six degrees and twenty-six minutes, west eight hundred and eighty-eight feet to a point; thence north twelve degrees and four minutes, west, to the center of a road leading to Hanford's Landing thence easterly along the center of said road leading to Hanford's Landing to a point fifty feet, westerly, from the west high bank of the Genesee river; thence northerly, parallel with the top of the west high bank of the Genesee river, and fifty feet distant, westerly therefrom, to the south line of Holy Sepulchre cemetery, which is the north line of the lands of William Merrill; thence easterly along said line and said line produced easterly to the east bank of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the east bank of the Genesee river in its various courses, to the north line of lot fourteen, in township fourteen, in the seventh range of township, in the town of Irondequoit; thence easterly along the north line of said lot fourteen, to the west line of the lands owned by the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railroad Company; thence southerly along the west line of the lands owned by the said Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railroad Company to a point at which the south line of the lands owned by Hosea Rogers, produced westerly, would intersect the boundaries of the lands of the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railroad Company; thence easterly along the said south line of the lands owned by Hosea Rogers, produced to the eastern boundaries of the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railroad Company; thence southerly along the eastern boundaries of said Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railroad Company's lands to a point on the east line of lands recently purchased from Charles Howard by the city of Rochester; thence southerly along the easterly line of lands recently purchased from Charles Howard, W. G. Culross, Emma D. Culross, Elbert G. Callister, John D. Callister and Elizabeth Callister, to the south line of said lands recently purchased by the city of Rochester from Elizabeth Callister; thence easterly along the south line of said Elizabeth Callister's land to the east side of a road which said road is in continuation of North Saint Paul street in the city of Rochester; thence seventeen degrees and forty minutes, southeast, to the middle of the Ridge road; thence westerly along the middle of the Ridge road to the place of beginning.

Sec. 2. Section four of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 4. The said city shall be divided into twenty wards, as follows:

First ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of the Genesee river, and of the Erie canal; thence running westerly along the center of the Erie canal to the center of Allen street; thence easterly along the center of Allen street to the center of State street; thence southerly along the center of State street to the center of Mumford street; thence easterly along the center of Mumford street to the center of the Genesee river; thence southerly along the center of

the Genesee river to the place of beginning, shall constitute the first ward.

Second ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at the center of the Genesee river and Mumford street; thence running westerly along the center of Mumford street to the center of State street thence northerly along the center of State street to the center of Allen street; thence westerly along the center of Allen street to the center of the Erie canal; thence northerly along the center of the Erie canal to Jay street; thence easterly along the center of Jay street, and the center line thereof continued easterly, to the center of the Genesee river; thence southerly along the center of the Genesee river to the place of beginning, shall constitute the second ward.

Third ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of the Genesee river and of the Erie canal; thence running westerly along the center of the Erie canal to the center of lands formerly used for the Genesee Valley canal; thence southerly along the center of the said lands formerly used for the Genesee Valley canal to the south line of the Strong tract; thence along the south line of Strong tract; thence along the south line of the Strong tract to the center of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the center of the Genesee river, to the place of beginning, shall constitute the third ward.

Fourth ward—All that part of said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of the Genesee river and of East Main street; thence running easterly along the center of East Main street to the center of East avenue; thence along the center of East avenue to the center of William street; thence southerly along the center of William street to the center of Monroe avenue; thence southeasterly along the center of Monroe avenue to the center of Alexander street; thence southerly along the center of Alexander street to an angle in said street; thence southwesterly continuing in the center of said Alexander street to the center of the Erie canal; thence northerly in the center of the Erie canal to a point where the center line of Howell street extended westerly, would intersect said center of the Erie canal; thence westerly on said center line of Howell street, extended, to the center of the Genesee river; thence northerly in the center of the Genesee river to the place of beginning, shall constitute the fourth ward.

Fifth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of East Main street and of the Genesee river; thence running northerly along the center of the Genesee river to a point where a line extended southwestwardly through the center of Evergreen street would intersect a line drawn through the center of said Genesee river; thence northeasterly along the said extended line and along the center of Evergreen street, and thence continuing easterly along the center of said Evergreen street to a point in the center of Conkey avenue; thence northerly along the center line of Conkey avenue to the center of Clifford street; thence easterly along the center of Clifford street to the center of North Clinton street; thence southerly along the center of said North Clinton street to the center of East Main street; thence westerly along the center of East Main street to the place of beginning, shall constitute the fifth ward.

Sixth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at the center of East Main street and North avenue; thence northerly in the center of North

avenue to the center of University avenue; thence easterly in the center of University avenue to the center of East Main street; thence easterly in the center of East Main street to the center of the tracks of the main line of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company; thence southeasterly in the center of said company's tracks to the east boundary line of the city; thence southerly along the east boundary line of the city to the center of East avenue; thence westerly in the center of East avenue to the center of East Main street; thence westerly in the center of East Main street to the place of beginning, shall constitute the sixth ward.

Seventh ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point at the center of East Main street and North Clinton street; thence running northerly along the center of North Clinton street to a point which would be the intersection of the center line of Nassau street, extended westerly to the center of said North Clinton street; thence easterly on said extended line and continuing easterly in the center of Nassau street to the center of Saint Joseph street; thence northerly along the center of Saint Joseph street to the center of Baden street; thence easterly along the center of Baden street to the center of Hudson street; thence northerly in the center of Hudson street to the center of Wilson street; thence easterly along the center of Wilson street to the center of North street; thence southerly in the center of North street to a point which would be the intersection of the center of North street with the center of North avenue; thence continuing southerly in the center of North avenue to the center of East Main street; thence westerly in the center of East Main street to the place of beginning, shall constitute the seventh ward.

Eighth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of North Clinton street where a line extended westerly through the center of Nassau street would intersect the center line of said North Clinton street; thence northerly along the center of N. Clinton street to the center of Clifford street; thence easterly along the center of Clifford street to the center of North avenue; thence southerly along the center of North avenue to an angle in said avenue at or near Syracuse street; thence continuing southeasterly along the center of North avenue to a point where the center line of North avenue would intersect the center line of North street to the center line of Wilson street; thence westerly in the center of Wilson street to the center of Hudson street; thence southerly in the center of Hudson street to the center of Baden street; thence westerly along the center of Baden street to the center of St. Joseph street; thence southerly along the center of Saint Joseph street to the center of Nassau street, thence westerly along the center line of Nassau street, and along said line continued westerly to the place of beginning, shall constitute the eighth ward.

Ninth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of Jay street and the Erie canal, and running thence easterly along the center of Jay street, and Jay street continued, to the center of the Genesee river; thence northerly in the center of the Genesee river to a point where a line extended northeasterly through the center of Lorimer street would intersect the said center line of the Genesee river; thence southwesterly on said extended line, and through the center of Lorimer street to the center of Fulton avenue; thence northerly along the center of Fulton avenue to the center of Bloss street; thence westerly along

the center of Bloss street to the lands used for the State Industrial School; thence southerly along the easterly line of said lands to the south line thereof; thence westerly along the south line of said lands of said State Industrial School, and along said line continued, to the center of the Erie canal; thence southeasterly along the center of the Erie canal to the place of beginning, shall constitute the ninth ward.

Tenth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where a line extended northeasterly through the center of Lorimer street would intersect the center line of the Genesee river; thence northerly in the center of the Genesee river to a point where the northerly line of the city crosses the Genesee river; thence westerly on the said northerly line of the city, and continuing southerly on the said city line, and continuing westerly on the said city line, to a point where the northerly line of the city intersects the westerly line of the city; thence southerly on the westerly line of the city to a point where a line extended westerly through the center of Otis street would intersect the said westerly line of said city; thence easterly along said extended line and along the center of Otis street to the center of Sherman street; thence northerly in the center of Sherman street to a point where a line drawn through the center of Sherman street would intersect a line extended westerly from the south boundary line of the lands of the State Industrial School; thence easterly along the said extended line and along the south boundary line of the said lands of the State Industrial School to the southeast corner of the said lands; thence northerly along the east line of the said lands to the center of Bloss street; thence easterly along the center of Bloss street to the center of Fulton avenue; thence southerly along the center of Fulton avenue to the center of Lorimer street; thence northeasterly along the center of Lorimer street and continuing on a line extended north easterly through the center of said Lorimer street to the place of beginning, shall constitute the tenth ward.

Eleventh ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where the center of Bronson avenue would intersect a line drawn through the center of the lands now owned and occupied by the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad Company, being the land formerly used and occupied for the Genesee Valley canal; thence westerly along the center of Bronson avenue to the center of Genesee street; thence northerly along the center of Genesee street to the center of Brown street; thence northeasterly along the center of Brown street to a point where a line extended southerly through the center of Saxton street would intersect a line drawn through the center of Brown street; thence northerly on said extended line, and continuing northerly along the center of Saxton street to the center of Jay street; thence easterly along the center of Jay street to a point where said Jay street makes an angle to the northeast; thence northeasterly along the center of Jay street to the center of the Erie canal; thence southerly along the center of the Erie canal to a point where the old Genesee Valley canal formerly connected with said Erie canal; thence southerly along the center of the lands formerly used and occupied by the Genesee Valley canal to the place of beginning shall constitute the eleventh ward.

Twelfth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where a line drawn through the center

of East avenue would intersect a line drawn through the center of William street; thence southerly along the center of William street to the center of Monroe avenue; thence southeasterly along the center of Monroe avenue to the center of Alexander street; thence southerly along the center of Alexander street to an angle at or near Cobb street; thence continuing southwestwardly along the center of Alexander street to the center of the Erie canal; thence southerly and easterly along the center of the Erie canal to the easterly line of the city; thence northerly along the easterly line of the city to the center of East avenue; thence westerly along the center of East avenue to the place of beginning, shall constitute the twelfth ward.

Thirteenth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of the Genesee river where a line drawn through the center of the Genesee river would intersect a line extended westerly through the center of Howell street; thence easterly on said extended line to the center of the Erie canal; thence southerly and easterly along the center of the Erie canal to the center of Goodman street; thence southerly along the center of Goodman street to the center of Caroline street; thence westerly along the center of Caroline street to the center of South avenue; thence northerly along the center of South avenue to the center of Averill avenue; thence westerly along the center of Averill avenue, and continuing on a line extending westerly through the center of Averill avenue, to the center of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the center of the Genesee river to the place of beginning, shall constitute the thirteenth ward.

Fourteenth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of the Genesee river, where a line drawn through the center of said river would intersect a line extended westerly through the center of Averill avenue; thence easterly on said extended line and along the center of Averill avenue to the center of South avenue; thence southerly along the center of South avenue to the center of Caroline street; thence easterly along the center of Caroline street to the center of Goodman street; thence northerly along the center of Goodman street to the center of the Erie canal; thence easterly along the center of the Erie canal to the easterly line of the city; thence southerly and westerly along the east and south boundary lines of the city, following the various courses of said line, to the center of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the center of the Genesee river to the place of beginning, shall constitute the fourteenth ward.

Fifteenth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where the center of Jay street intersects the center of the Erie canal; thence southwestwardly along the center of Jay street to a point at or near the center of Magne street; thence continuing westerly along the center of Jay street to the west boundary line of the city; thence northerly along the west boundary line of the city to a point where a line extended westerly through the center of Otis street would intersect the said west boundary line of said city; thence easterly, on said extended line, and along the center of Otis street to the center of Sherman street; thence northerly along the center of Sherman street to a point where a line drawn through the center of

Sherman street would intersect the south boundary line of the lands of the State Industrial School extended westerly; thence easterly along said extended line to the center of the Erie canal; thence southeasterly along the center of the Erie canal to the place of beginning, shall constitute the fifteenth ward.

Sixteenth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where a line drawn through the center of North avenue would intersect a line drawn through the center of University avenue; thence northerly along the center of North avenue to the center of Bay street; thence easterly along the center of Bay street to the center of Hebard street; thence southerly along the center of Hebard street to the center of the tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company; thence southeasterly along the center of the tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to the center of East Main street; thence westerly along the center of East Main street to the corner of University avenue; thence northwesterly along the center of University avenue to the place of beginning, shall constitute the sixteenth ward.

Seventeenth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of the Genesee river, where a line drawn through the center of the Genesee river would intersect a line extended southeasterly through the center of Evergreen street; thence northerly along the center of the Genesee river to where the north line of the city crosses the Genesee river; thence following the boundary line of the said city northerly to the north boundary point of the said city; thence southerly along the east boundary line of said city to a point where said boundary line intersects said north boundary line at Norton street; thence easterly along the north boundary line of said city to a point where the northerly boundary line of the city intersects the east boundary line of the city; thence southerly and southeasterly along the easterly boundary line of the city to the center of Clifford street; thence westerly along the center of Clifford street to the center of Conkey avenue; thence southerly along the center of Conkey avenue to the center of Evergreen street; thence westerly along the center of Evergreen street, and continuing southwesterly along said center line, and continuing on a line extended southwesterly through the center of said Evergreen street to the place of beginning, shall constitute the seventeenth ward.

Eighteenth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where a line drawn through the center of North avenue would intersect a line drawn through the center of Clifford street; thence easterly along the center of Clifford street to the easterly boundary line of the city; thence southerly along the easterly boundary line of the city to the center of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company's tracks; thence northwesterly along the center of said company's tracks to the center of Hebard street; thence northerly along the center of Hebard street to the center of Bay street; thence westerly along the center of Bay street to the center of North avenue; thence northerly along the center of North avenue to the place of beginning, shall constitute the eighteenth ward.

Nineteenth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where the center of Bronson avenue

would intersect a line drawn through the center of the lands now owned and occupied by the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad Company, being the land formerly used and occupied by the Genesee Valley canal; thence westerly along the center line of Bronson avenue to the center of Genesee street; thence northerly along the center of Genesee street to the center of West avenue; thence westerly along the center of West avenue to the center of Chili avenue; thence southwesterly along the center of Chili avenue to the westerly boundary line of the city; thence southerly on the westerly city line, in its various courses, to a point where the said westerly line of the city intersects the southerly line of the city; thence easterly and southerly, following the said city line, in its various courses, until the said line intersects a line drawn through the center of the Genesee river; thence northerly, in the center of the Genesee river, in its various courses, to a point where a line drawn through the center of the said Genesee river would intersect the south line of the Strong tract; thence northwesterly along the south line of the Strong tract to the center of the tracks of the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad Company; thence northerly, along the center of the tracks of said railroad company, to the place of beginning, shall constitute the nineteenth ward.

Twentieth ward—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where a line drawn through the center of Genesee street would intersect a line drawn through the center of West avenue; thence westerly along the center of West avenue to the center of Chili avenue; thence southwesterly along the center of Chili avenue, and continuing southwesterly along the center of a road formerly known as the Chili road to the easterly line of a highway called Lincoln avenue; thence northerly along the easterly line of said Lincoln avenue to the south line of the highway called the Buffalo road; thence easterly along the southerly boundaries of said Buffalo road to the present westerly city line; thence northerly along the present westerly city line to the center of Jay street; thence easterly along the center of Jay street to the center of Saxton street; thence southerly along the center of Saxton street, and on a line extended through the center of Saxton street to the center of Brown street; thence southerly along the center of Brown street to the place of beginning; the said westerly boundary lines being a part of the present westerly boundary line of the city; and the said part of the said city included within said lines, shall constitute the twentieth ward.

Sec. 3. Section seven of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 7. An election shall be held in each ward annually on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in March at such places as shall be designated by the common council, of which a notice shall be published by the city clerk for at least six days previous to the election, in all the daily newspapers of the city, at which election there shall be chosen by the electors of the city, voting in their respective wards, as often as the terms of office of the then incumbent shall expire, within the year after such election, one mayor, who shall hold his office for two years; one police justice, who shall hold his office for four years; one treasurer, who shall hold his office for two years; and also, by the electors of each ward, one supervisor, whose term of office shall be the same as that of the supervisors from the towns of Monroe

county, and the terms of office of the supervisors now in office in said city shall end at the same time as the terms of town supervisors now in office; one constable, who shall hold his office for one year; and at the election held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in March, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, there shall also be chosen by the electors of the fourth ward and of all the odd wards, except the third ward, one alderman and one commissioner of public schools, from each of said wards, and at the election held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in March, eighteen hundred and ninety-five, one alderman and one commissioner from the third ward and all the even wards, except the fourth ward; each of which shall hold his office for two years, and thereafter aldermen and commissioners of common schools shall be elected for two years as the terms expire of those elected from the respective wards. The aldermen and the commissioners of common schools now in office shall continue to hold office as representing the territory from which they were elected, notwithstanding the change of ward numbers until their terms of office shall severally expire. The city treasurer shall not be entitled to enter upon his office until he shall have executed and filed with the mayor a bond in the penal sum of fifty thousand dollars, or such other sum as the common council may have fixed, with good and sufficient sureties, approved by the mayor, in writing, thereon, and conditioned for the faithful performance of all his duties as treasurer, and of all the duties imposed upon him by law, in respect to the money, property and affairs of the said city. The execution of such a bond by the treasurer and sureties, shall be duly acknowledged or approved, so as to entitle it to be read in evidence, and it shall be the duty of the mayor to cause such bond to be recorded in the Monroe county clerk's office, and a copy of such bond, as so recorded, certified by the said county clerk, shall be as good evidence in all courts and places as the original bond, which shall be safely kept by the mayor, after being recorded as aforesaid. Not less than thirty days after the passage of this act, and in every second year thereafter, the mayor shall appoint an auditor, whose term of office shall be for two years, or until his successor shall have been duly appointed and qualified. The said auditor shall enter upon his duties on the first Monday in May after his appointment. The said auditor shall not be entitled to enter upon his office until he shall have executed and filed with the mayor of said city a bond in the penal sum of five thousand dollars, or such other sum as the common council shall fix with sufficient sureties, approved by the mayor, in writing, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties, as such auditor, and the duties imposed upon him by law. The said auditor shall receive a salary not to exceed three thousand dollars per annum, payable monthly, as other city officers are paid, such salary to be fixed by the common council annually, as other salaries are fixed. It shall be his duty to examine and pass upon all debts, demands and claims against said city, and each and every of its boards, officers and agents, including the board of education and the executive board of said city, before the same shall be ordered paid, and he shall keep a book, in which shall be recorded an account of each debt, demand and claim presented to him, and the sum allowed upon each, and he shall render to the common council, the board of education or executive board, detailed monthly reports of all such debts, demands and claims presented to, and allowed by him,

as aforesaid, and all bills, dues and demands contracted or incurred during the preceding months, which have been presented to him for audit aforesaid, and except as otherwise provided by law, and except the fixed salaries of officers paid by the city, no debt, demand or claim payable from the city treasury, shall be paid, except the same is passed upon by said auditor and certified by him to the body, board or officer whose duty it shall be to pay the same, and if he objects to any debt, demand or claim, in whole or in part, such objection shall be by him presented in writing to said bodies, officers and boards, respectively, whose duty it shall be to investigate the grounds of such objection before finally auditing or determining the manner of disposal thereof. Provided, however, that said auditor may weekly examine and pass upon by items any statement of claims, dues or demands for labor performed, which shall be certified to him for audit by said executive board, and upon such audit by the auditor, certified by him, under his hand, to such board, a sum or sums not exceeding, in the aggregate, five thousand dollars in any one week, may be drawn by the clerk of said board by orders or warrants made directly upon the city treasurer, who shall pay the same, when there are funds for the purpose, as is provided by section one hundred and forty-eight of this charter, as amended in eighteen hundred and ninety. Said auditor may examine, on oath, to be administered by him, any person, firm or corporation who presents an account, claim, due or demand, touching the validity of such account, claim, due or demand, and false swearing during such examination, shall be deemed willful perjury, and punishable as such, and said auditor shall not audit such account, claim, due, or demand where such person, firm or corporation, or the duly authorized agent or officer thereof, presenting the same shall refuse to submit to such an examination and oath. The said auditor shall make to the mayor and common council of said city, at the last meeting thereof in each fiscal year, a report, in writing, embracing a summary of the business transacted in his office during the preceding year.

Sec. 4. Section fourteen of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 14. Three inspectors of election for each ward or election district in said city shall be elected at each annual charter election. The electors of each election district in said city shall be entitled to vote by ballot on the same ticket with other charter officers, for two electors residing in such election district to be inspectors of election for said district, and the two persons in each district receiving the greatest number of votes shall be two of the inspectors of election for such district at all elections to be held therein during the ensuing year. The board of inspectors of election in each of said election districts shall, immediately after the votes of such charter election shall be canvassed, appoint in writing, subscribed by a majority of said board, another inspector of election for each election district, to be associated with said two inspectors so elected, and who shall thereupon be one of the inspectors of election of such district. Such inspector shall be selected from the two persons in such election district who shall have the highest number of votes next to the two inspectors so elected. And no ballot for inspector shall be counted upon which more than two names shall appear. Not more than two inspectors for one district shall belong to the same political party. The poll clerks and ballot clerks in each election district shall be ap-

pointed by the inspectors of election as provided for in the new election code, and the several amendments thereto, the provisions of which are hereby declared to be applicable to said city.

Sec. 5. Section fifteen of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 15. In case any such inspector of election in said city shall not be chosen or appointed as provided for in the preceding section, or in case of the death, inability or refusal of any such inspectors to act or of his ceasing to be a resident of the election district for which he was appointed or elected, the common council must thereafter appoint another in his or their place by viva voce vote, and the person or persons thus appointed shall be inspector or inspectors of the election district for which he or they was or were so appointed.

Sec. 6. Section sixteen of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 16. The conduct of elections, the duties of inspectors of elections, poll clerks and ballot clerks in and of said city shall be the same as provided for by the election code of the state of New York and the several amendments thereto, the provisions of which in respect thereto are hereby declared applicable to said city.

Sec. 7. Section seventeen of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 17. The ballots and ballot-boxes to be used at the charter elections of said city shall be the same as provided for by the election code of the state of New York and the amendments thereto, the provisions of which in respect thereto, are hereby declared to be applicable to said city. The common council shall provide such ballot-boxes for each ward or election district, with locks and keys, as are required by the provisions of the election code and the amendments thereto.

Sec. 8. Subdivision seven of section forty of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

To regulate and prevent the use and encumbering of streets, avenues, walks, public squares, lanes, alleys, bridges, aqueducts, wharves, basins or slips in any manner whatever; to regulate the opening of street surfaces and connections with sewers, and the laying of gas, water pipes and mains and sewer connections; to regulate and control the erection, construction, laying, stringing, maintaining and removing of all wires, cables, poles, conduits and subways, upon, over and under the streets, avenues, lanes, squares, parks, bridges, aqueducts, and public places within said city; to prevent injury to public and private property and premises within said city and to cause all buildings, dwellings and business places to be numbered or renumbered on any and all streets, squares, avenues, parks, places, courts and alleys in said city at the cost and expense of the owner thereof; to regulate the exhibition and distribution of advertisements or handbills within said city.

Sec. 9. Subdivision twenty-one of section forty of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

To license, regulate and control scavengers, chimney sweeps, expressman, cartmen, porters, hack, cab, truck, omnibus and stage owners and drivers, and the owners and drivers of all vehicles used for hire in the city of Rochester, for the transportation of passengers and merchandise, goods or articles of any kind, and to require the owners of all such carts, carriages and vehicles, to mark the same in such manner as the common council may designate, and fix the rates of compensation to be taken by them; to license and regulate sextons and undertakers for burying the dead; to license and regulate butchers,

hawkers, peddlers, common criers, (bill posters) and runners for stages, railroads, taverns or other houses, junk shop dealers, pawnbrokers and dealers in second-hand articles, and the business of pawnbrokerage; to prescribe the terms and conditions upon which any such license shall be granted, and to prohibit all unlicensed persons from acting in such capacities, and to exact a license fee aforesaid, in such an amount as the common council shall deem reasonable, not exceeding, however, five-hundred dollars per year from any pawnbroker, and not exceeding fifty dollars a year from any other of the persons above enumerated, except that a fee, of, not exceeding ten dollars, for each wagon, carriage or vehicle used in any of the business aforesaid may be charged for any one year; to license and regulate bill posters and bill distributors, and sign advertising, and to prescribe the terms and conditions upon which any such license shall be granted, and to prohibit all unlicensed persons from acting in such capacity, and to exact a license fee aforesaid, in such an amount as the said common council shall deem reasonable, not exceeding, however, three hundred dollars per year.

Sec. 10. Section onehundred and sixty-four of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 104. In every case where a street in said city has been or shall be encroached upon by any fence, building or otherwise the executive board may cause the same to be surveyed and the extent of such encroachment ascertained and may, by resolution, specifying the nature of such encroachment and the extent thereof, require the owner or owners, if known, and if unknown, the occupant or occupants of the premises so encroaching or adjoining such encroachment, to remove the same within such time as shall be specified in such resolution which time shall not be less than ten days from the service of such resolution as hereinafter provided. A copy of such resolution shall be served on the owner or owners of the premises so encroaching or adjoining such encroachment, if he or they live in said city, personally or by leaving a copy of such resolution at his or their residence with some person of suitable age and discretion; if such owner or owners do not live in said city, but have an agent living in said city, whose appointment is in writing and whose name is entered in a book to be kept by the city clerk for that purpose, then a copy of such resolution shall be served on such agent personally, or at his residence, by leaving the same with some person of suitable age and discretion; if such non-resident owner does not have such an agent then a copy of such resolution may be served on any tenant in possession of said premises, and a copy thereof shall also be sent by mail addressed to such owner or owners at his or their residence, if the same is known or can be ascertained with reasonable diligence; and if there be no such tenant, service by mail alone, as aforesaid, shall be sufficient; if there be no tenant in possession and the owner or owners of such lands, or his or their residence, be unknown and can not be ascertained with reasonable diligence, then such service may be made by posting a copy of such resolution in a conspicuous place upon the premises encroaching or adjoining such encroachment. The service aforesaid shall be made by such person as said board may direct. If such removal shall not be made within the time specified in such resolution the owner or occupants of said premises shall forfeit and pay to said city the sum of five dollars for each and every day that such encroachment shall continue unremoved after the time mentioned in said resolution for removing the same. And the

said board may remove, or cause to be removed, such encroachments, and may collect of such owner or occupant all reasonable charges therefor, with costs, in any court having jurisdiction of civil actions, and upon a judgment rendered in such action execution may issue against the person of the defendant in said action. No encroachment upon any street, alley or lane of said city, however long continued, shall constitute an adverse possession to or confer any rights upon the person or persons claiming thereunder as against said city. This section and the last preceding section shall apply to alleys as well as streets.

Sec. 11. Section one hundred and seventy is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 170. Whenever by order of the common council any new street or alley shall be laid out, opened or worked in said city, or any sewer, tunnel, drain, vault or bridge shall be extended to and beyond the city limits, or any other public improvement is to be made, it shall be the duty of the common council to determine what portion, if any, of the expense ought to be paid from the public treasury, and what portion, if any, ought to be paid by a local assessment, and to direct that the whole expense to be paid by a local assessment be assessed upon all the lots and parcels of land to be benefited thereby, in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom. The common council may maintain, improve, embellish and protect any public park, square or area in said city, and grade, sewer and pave the streets and alleys, and make, grade and improve sidewalks about the same, or any part thereof. And they may cause the whole expense thereof to be assessed upon all the lots and parcels of land where the parks, squares or areas are situated in proportion to the benefit which each lot or parcel will derive therefrom. It shall be lawful for the common council to borrow, from time to time, by the issue of bonds bearing such rates of interest as it may deem proper to effect a sale thereof, not exceeding six per centum per annum, at not less than par, for such period as said common council may determine, not exceeding ten years, such sums as may be necessary to pay all costs, disbursements and other expenses incurred or to be incurred on account of work, labor, materials and local improvements heretofore or hereafter performed or furnished, or constructed, not in conflict with the provisions of any contract, however, therefor, under and by virtue of ordinances duly adopted as provided in this charter, the expense whereof is to be afterwards collected wholly or in part by assessment from the property benefited by such improvement, but no moneys shall be paid out of the proceeds of said bonds except upon a certificate in writing from the head of the department having charge of such work stating that a payment is due and the amount of such payment. All assessments heretofore or hereafter made or collected for local improvements shall be paid into a fund to be known as the "local improvement fund" to be applied toward the redemption of the bonds issued in pursuance of this section and the payment of any orders that may be issued in pursuance of any contracts heretofore entered into for any local improvements.

Sec. 12. Section two hundred and forty-five is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 245. It shall be the duty of each of said judges to hold a court in and for the city of Rochester, to be called the municipal court of the city of Rochester. Each of said judges may hold a separate court at the same time. Said court shall be open for business each day (Sundays and legal holidays except-

ed), at nine o'clock in the forenoon and continue open during reasonable hours for the transaction of business, and shall have jurisdiction in civil action and proceedings, and criminal proceedings, as follows:

1. In all civil actions and proceedings cognizable by law, by justices of the peace or justices' courts of towns or formerly of said city.

2. In actions arising on contracts, express or implied, including any order, decision or judgment of any court of record, or a judge thereof, granting or directing the payment of any sum of money to any party or person for the recovery of money only, if the amount for which judgment is claimed, does not exceed one thousand dollars, exclusive of costs and also in actions for breach of contracts express or implied, where the damages claimed and for which judgment is demanded in the complaint do not exceed one thousand dollars, exclusive of costs.

3. In a matter of account, when the sum total of the accounts of both parties, proved to the satisfaction of the court, does not exceed one thousand dollars.

4. In actions for damages for injury to rights pertaining to the person or to personal or real property, or for the conversion of personal property, if the amount for which judgment is demanded in the complaint, exclusive of costs, does not exceed one thousand dollars besides costs.

5. In an action for a penalty or penalties where the amount for which judgment is demanded in the complaint, exclusive of costs, does not exceed the sum of one thousand dollars besides costs.

6. In an action upon a bond or undertaking conditioned for the payment of money, where the amount for which judgment is demanded in the complaint, exclusive of costs, does not exceed one thousand dollars, though the penalty exceed that sum, the judgment to be given for the sum actually due. Where payments are to be made by installments, an action may be brought for each installment as it becomes due.

7. In an action upon a surety bond or undertaking taken by said court, or one of the judges thereof, or a justice's court or a justice of the peace or any other court, or judge, or justice, except where it is otherwise specially provided by law, when the amount for which judgment is demanded in the complaint, exclusive of costs, does not exceed the sum of one thousand dollars.

8. In an action upon a judgment rendered in a court of record, or not of record, including said municipal court, a justice of the peace or the police justice of said city, where such action is not prohibited by the code of civil procedure.

9. To take and enter a judgment on the confession of a defendant, when the amount confessed, exclusive of costs, shall not exceed one thousand dollars. Such confession to be in the manner prescribed by section three thousand and eleven of the code of civil procedure, and to have the same effect as is provided by section three thousand and twelve of said code.

10. In an action for damages for fraud in the sale, purchase or exchange of real or personal property, if the amount for which judgment is demanded in the complaint, exclusive of costs, does not exceed one thousand dollars.

11. In an action commenced by an attachment of property, as now provided by statute, if the amount for which judgment is demanded in the complaint, if one be served with the summons, exclusive of costs, or the debt or damage claimed in the affidavit does not exceed the sum of one thousand dollars.

12. In an action to recover the possession of personal property claimed, the value of which as stated in the affidavit by or on behalf of the plaintiff where a requisition is issued in the action, or in other case in the complaint, shall not exceed the sum of one thousand dollars, the same proceedings to be had as are provided for justices' courts by article fifth of title two of chapter nineteen of the code of civil procedure, except as is otherwise specified in this act.

13. In summary proceedings under title two of chapter seventeen of the code of civil procedure, to recover, the possession of real property, and to remove tenants and others, the process to be made returnable and proceedings and judgment to be had and given before and by said court by its proper title.

14. In actions or proceedings under the code of civil procedure, or any statute as now existing, or that may hereafter be amended or passed, for the protection or enforcement of the liens of mechanics and others, including article second of title two of chapter fourteen of said code, where the amount of the lien does not exceed the sum of one thousand dollars; the same proceedings to be had as are or may be provided by said code or statutes.

15. In proceedings in cases of bastardy, brought or instituted by the overseer of the poor or acting overseer, or the mayor, or one of the aldermen of said city of Rochester. The court in such bastardy proceedings and at any stage thereof, except during the final examination and determination, may be held by one of the judges of said court, and said judges may alternate in such proceedings, except during the final examination and determination, when the said court shall be held by both judges, or in case of the absence or inability to act, by reason of being occupied with other official duties, or other cause, of either of said judges, by the other judge and the police justice of said city, or one of the justices of the peace of a town within the county of Monroe. In case of any adjournment being had in said proceedings, and the defendant failing to give an undertaking or security for such adjournment, as provided by section eight hundred and forty-nine of the code of criminal procedure, he shall be committed to the county jail of Monroe county during such adjournment, by a commitment signed by the judge or judges then holding said court, and he may be taken therefrom at or before said adjourned time by any peace officer, by an order issued by one of the judges of said court, directed to the keeper of the said jail, and produced before said court for the purposes of examination or further adjournment, as may then be had. Any number of adjournments may be had in said proceedings, and the same may be for any length of time. The undertaking or security to be given upon an adjournment, shall be signed by two sufficient sureties and shall be to the effect that the defendant will appear before the said court at the adjourned time and such other time or times to which adjournments may be had for the purposes of the examination and determination, and will render himself amenable to any process, order or commitment that may be issued or made in such proceedings. In case the defendant be adjudged to be the father of any bastard child or children, in any such bastardy proceedings, and he shall fail to pay the costs and give an undertaking for the support of such child or children, and its or their mother, or said defendant's appearance at the next court of sessions of Monroe county, as provided by section eight hundred and fifty-one of said code of criminal procedure, the magistrates composing the court, or

either of them, must, by warrant, commit such defendant to the Monroe county penitentiary, there to remain until he be discharged by the said court of sessions, or deliver an undertaking for the support of said child or mother as aforesaid. In all other respects, the proceedings to be had or taken in any such bastardy proceedings, instituted in said court, shall conform to the provisions of the said code of criminal procedure relating to proceedings respecting bastardy. Every warrant or commitment issued after this section as amended takes effect shall, instead of committing the defendant to the county jail, commit him to said Monroe county penitentiary, where it is issued by any judge or justice aforesaid, or out of or by virtue of the order or judgment of the court of sessions of Monroe county, upon any appeal taken thereto in any proceedings respecting bastardy instituted by the overseer of the poor of said city.

16. The judges of said court shall have power to remove any constable of any ward of said city upon the same complaint as is provided by law for the removal of any constable of a town. The said judges shall associate together to hear and determine the same, except that where one of the judges is absent, or unable to act from any cause, the police justice of said city, or one of the justices of a town within the county of Monroe, may be associated with said remaining judge for said purpose, and the same proceedings shall be had by and before them as are provided by law to be had by and before three justices of the peace of town for the removal of a constable.

17. The judges of said court are hereby respectively authorized and empowered to solemnize the rites of marriage.

Sec. 13. Section two hundred sixty-five is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 265. The police justice of said city shall have jurisdiction in any suit brought for a penalty or forfeiture given for a violation of any city ordinance, or of the laws concerning the internal police of the state, and is hereby empowered to hold courts of special sessions for the trial of all offenses triable in a court of special sessions. Every court of special sessions held by said police justice, or by one of the judges of the municipal court of said city, or the mayor, or one of the police commissioners or aldermen in the place of said police justice, as is provided by section two hundred and sixty-seven of this act, shall, subject to the power of removal, provided for in chapter one, of title six, of part one, of the code of criminal procedure, have exclusive jurisdiction to hear, try and determine all charges of misdemeanor and other offenses or crimes punishable as such, as are defined by section fifty-six of the code of criminal procedure, or other statute now or hereafter passed, where the offense has been committed within the city of Rochester, and of petit larceny committed as a second offense within said city, and the complaint has been made to said police justice, or one of the officers acting in his place, or one of the judges of the municipal court; and the said police justice, or other officer acting in his place, shall have power to impose any sentence, punishment, fine, imprisonment, or both, as is provided in such cases by the provisions of the penal code or by the special statutes of this state. The board of police commissioners shall have power to appoint, from time to time, a stenographer, who shall perform such duties as they shall, from time to time, require of him. The police magistrate, or person acting in his stead, shall

have power to require such stenographer to take evidence in all criminal cases or proceedings pending before him; and shall have power to require such stenographer to transcribe his short-hand notes, and deliver to the district attorney of the county of Monroe a copy of such transcript; and shall have power to require such stenographer to transcribe his notes and deliver a copy thereof to the defendant in any action, upon the payment to the clerk of such police court of the sum of ten cents per folio for each folio of such transcript. The salary of such stenographer shall be fixed by said board of police commissioners, and shall be paid in the same manner in which the salary of the police clerk is now paid. In any action brought for the violation of any ordinance, or of the laws concerning the internal police of the state as aforesaid, a trial by jury may be had upon the demand of either party, made before the actual commencement of such trial, and such trial shall be conducted in the manner provided for trials by jury in justices' courts by the code of civil procedure, and the jurors summoned, as well as those acting or sitting upon the trial, and the officer executing the venire and attending the jury, which officer may be one of the members of the police force of said city, to be nominated by said police justice, shall be entitled to the fees allowed by law to jurors and constables for similar services in trials by jury before justices of the peace or justices' courts, and which fees shall be paid to the said police justice for the purposes aforesaid by the party demanding such jury trial, at the time such demand is made, and upon the failure to pay the same, such demand for a trial by jury shall be disregarded, but the fees allowed to said officer, if he be one of the members of said police force of said city, for summoning or attending upon such jury, shall be retained by the police clerk and be paid by him to the treasurer of said city to the credit of the contingent fund. The municipal court of said city shall also have jurisdiction of all suits brought for a violation of any regulation, by-law or ordinance passed, enacted or adopted by the common council, board of health, or executive board of said city, where the sum for which judgment is demanded in the complaint does not exceed five hundred dollars, exclusive of costs; provided the same be instituted by or under the direction of the city attorney, or said common council, board of health or executive board.

Sec. 14. This act shall take effect immediately.

AN ACT to amend chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act to further amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled 'An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester,'" and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of said city," and the several acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto.

The people of the state of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 19 of section forty of chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one entitled "An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester" and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of said city" and the several acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

To establish, order and regulate markets; to regulate the vending of wood, coal and other fuel, meats, vegetables, fruits, fish, poultry, milk and provisions of all kinds, and to prescribe the time and place for selling the same, and for ascertaining the weight or other quality thereof, and to prescribe the fees to be paid for licenses for the sale of the aforesaid commodities; such license fees not to exceed fifty dollars from any person so licensed, except that a license fee not exceeding thirty dollars for a wagon drawn by two horses, and not exceeding twenty-five dollars for a wagon drawn by one horse, may be exacted, and to prevent the sale or exposure for sale of unwholesome, diseased, impure or adulterated meats, vegetables, fruit, fish, poultry, milk and food provisions of all kinds, and the board of health may appoint from time to time, and at pleasure remove, a competent person and fix his salary, to be paid out of the health fund, whose duty it shall be to test and inspect all meats, vegetables, fruit, fish, poultry, milk, food and provisions of all kinds, sold, or offered for sale, whenever the sale thereof is regulated by ordinance, for the purpose, and to prevent the sale or exposure for sale of all the aforesaid unwholesome, diseased, impure or adulterated commodities, and any of such commodities not of the standard or character fixed by any statute now or hereafter passed, before being offered or exposed for sale, but provided that nothing herein contained shall authorize the Common Council to prevent the sale of fresh and wholesome meats by the quarter, within the limits of said city, by farmers who have raised and fattened the same upon their own farms.

To regulate and license the sale of clothing, boots, shoes and all other commodities not hereinbefore mentioned, to prescribe the terms and conditions upon which such license shall be granted, to prohibit all unlicensed

persons from engaging in the sale of such last mentioned commodities and to prescribe such license fees to be paid for the sale of any of the aforesaid last mentioned articles as in their judgment said common council shall deem reasonable, not exceeding, however, the sum of five hundred dollars a year.

PETITION.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester :

The undersigned, representing twenty-seven (27) organizations, with a total membership of three thousand two hundred and sixty-seven (3,267), beg leave to lay before your honorable body the following facts regarding the unemployed of this city.

As the result of a careful investigation, we find that of eight hundred (800) masons in the city, five hundred and sixty-five (565) are unemployed; of one thousand six hundred (1,600) carpenters in the city, one thousand one hundred and seventy-five (1,175) are unemployed. In addition to those entirely out

of employment, many are working on such short time that they are unable to earn enough to support themselves and their families.

The figures above cited show that fully seventy-five per cent of these men in the building trades are not working. It is true that a large number of this class of workmen are usually out of employment at this season of the year, but the number unprovided with work is very much greater this year than in ordinary seasons. It must be borne in mind that the members of these trades can only work part of the year, and by the earnings of these months must make provision for the usual winter idleness. Last year, owing to the business depression, the amount of work was exceptionally small and few mechanics were able to make their customary provision for the winter. A large proportion of them are already out of money and dependent upon credit for their daily supplies. Many have been compelled to receive assistance from the organizations to which they belong, but the funds of these organizations are insufficient to support their needy members for any length of time, and unless work of some kind can soon be obtained many of the men will be obliged to ask assistance from the city, which they have not hitherto done. If there were a prospect of early employment from the ordinary channels of private enterprises the situation would be much improved, but the usual amount of building is not being projected. The authorities in many cities are endeavoring to relieve the distress by undertaking needed public works, beginning them soon that they would otherwise have done so that immediate employment may be furnished.

In view of the existing conditions as above stated, we earnestly recommend to the consideration of your honorable body the advisability of beginning at as early a date as possible any public works which in your opinion are needed by the city. By so doing you will promote the city's interest and aid the unemployed.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Aikenhead—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your map and survey committee have had under consideration for some weeks the surveying of the old fifteenth and sixteenth wards, as suggested by the City Surveyor. In the opinion of your committee, this work is very important and should be done at once. The problem that presented itself for our solution was the best way to do the work for the interests of the city, as well as from a financial standpoint. The City Surveyor holds that the work can best be done in his office, but after many meetings your committee is of the opinion that this is not wise, and is not an advisable way to do the work.

It is a self-evident fact that the office of the City Surveyor is over-crowded with work and that more room is urgently needed to properly perform the present work of the office, without any additional burden being added. To survey the old fifteenth and sixteenth wards with the present working force of the office is an impossibility. To do it at all from this office would require much additional help, more room and extra office

rent at a high figure. Again, the Surveyor has all the work he ought to be asked to perform in properly looking after the general work of his office; preparing ordinances for opening and improving of streets, building new sewers, bridges, etc., and the general supervision of all the multitude of work intrusted to his care. From the standpoint of your committee, it would be fatal to the interests of our city to add new burdens to this office.

Work of this nature, so great in its importance to every citizen and taxpayer, should be let by contract to competent men, upon competitive bids based upon specifications prepared by the City Surveyor, for the same general reasons that all public work is let in this way.

The work, however done, should be done by a competent land surveyor of experience in Rochester city work.

Your committee has consulted with many competent surveyors and civil engineers upon the matter intrusted to its care, and would recommend that the map and survey committee be instructed to advertise for bids for the survey of the old fifteenth and sixteenth wards, upon specifications to be prepared by the City Surveyor, and that the contract for said work be let to the lowest bidder, providing said bidder is a competent land surveyor, is prepared to furnish the necessary bonds and perform the work as specified in the contract.

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Flint and Genesee streets; thence southerly, along the center line of Genesee street to the center line of Magnolia street; thence easterly, along the center line of Magnolia street, to the center line of Jefferson avenue; thence southerly, along the center line of Jefferson avenue, to the center line of Cottage street; thence easterly, along the center line of Cottage street, and said line produced, to the center of the Genesee river; thence southerly, along the center of the Genesee river, to the southerly boundary line of the city; thence westerly and northerly, along said boundary line, to the westerly produced center line of Flint street; thence easterly, on said produced center line of Flint street, to the place of beginning.

Third District. The third district will comprise all that portion of the nineteenth ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Seward street and Columbia avenue; thence easterly, along the center line of Columbia avenue, to the center line of Plymouth avenue; thence southerly, along the center line of Plymouth avenue, to the center line of Ethel street; thence easterly, along the center line of Ethel street, to the center line of Flora street; thence southerly, along the center line of Flora street, to the center line of Violetta street; thence easterly, along the center line of Violetta street, and said line produced, to the center of the Genesee river; thence southwesterly, along the center of the Genesee river, to the produced center line of Cottage street; thence northwesterly, along said produced center line and the center line of Cottage street, to the center line of Jefferson avenue; thence northerly, along the center line of Jefferson avenue, to the center line of Magnolia street; thence easterly along the center line of Magnolia street, to the center line of Seward street; thence northeasterly along the center line of Seward street to the place of beginning.

Fourth District. The fourth district will comprise all that portion of the nineteenth ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Magnolia and Genesee streets; thence northerly along the center line of Genesee street, to the center line of Columbia avenue; thence easterly along the center line of Columbia avenue to the center line of Snyder street; thence northerly, along the center line of Snyder street, to the center line of Whittlesey alley; thence easterly, along the center line of Whittlesey alley, to the center line of Seward street; thence southerly, along the center line of Seward street, to the center line of Magnolia street; thence westerly, along the center of Magnolia street, to the place of beginning.

Fifth District. The fifth district will comprise all that portion of the nineteenth ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Whittlesey alley and Snyder street; thence northerly, along the center line of Snyder street, to the center line of Bronson avenue; thence easterly, along the center line of Bronson avenue, to the center line of Sew-

ard street; thence southerly along the center line of Seward street, to the center line of Whittlesey alley; thence westerly, along the center line of Whittlesey alley, to the place of beginning.

Sixth District. The sixth district will comprise all that portion of the nineteenth ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Seward street and Columbia avenue; thence easterly, along the center line of Columbia avenue, to the center line of Plymouth avenue; thence southerly along the center line of Plymouth avenue, to the center line of Ethel street; thence easterly, along the center line of Ethel street, to the center line of Flora street; thence southerly, along the center line of Flora street, to the center line of Violetta street; thence easterly, along the center line of Violetta street, and said line produced, to the easterly boundary line of the nineteenth ward; thence northerly, westerly and again northerly, along said boundary line, to the center line of Bronson avenue; thence westerly, along the center line of Bronson avenue, to the center line of Seward street; thence southerly, along the center line of Seward street, to the place of beginning.

TWENTIETH WARD.

First District. The first district will comprise all that portion of the twentieth ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of West avenue and Brown street; thence northeasterly along the center line of Brown street to the produced center line of Saxton street; thence northerly along said produced center line and the center line of Saxton street, to the center line of Maple street; thence westerly along the center line of Maple street to the center line of Childs street; thence southerly along the center line of Childs street and said line produced to the center line of Chili avenue; thence northeasterly along the center lines of Chili and West avenues to the place of beginning.

Second District. The second district will comprise all that portion of the twentieth ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Maple and Childs streets; thence northerly along the center line of Child street to the center line of Jay street; thence easterly along the center line of Jay street to the center line of Saxton street; thence southerly along the center line of Saxton street to the center line of Maple street; thence westerly along the center line of Maple street, to the place of beginning.

Third District. The third district will comprise all that portion of the twentieth ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Maple and Child streets; thence southerly along the center line of Childs street and said line produced to Chili avenue; thence westerly along Chili avenue to the east line of Lincoln avenue; thence northerly along the east line of Lincoln avenue to the south line of West avenue; thence easterly along the east line of West avenue to the westerly boundary line of the city; thence northerly along said boundary line to the center line of Maple street; thence easterly along the center line of Maple street, to the place of beginning.

Fourth District. The fourth district will comprise all that portion of the twentieth ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Maple and Child streets; thence northerly along the center line of Child street to the center line of Jay street; thence westerly along the center line of Jay street to the westerly boundary line of the city; thence southerly along said boundary line to the center line of Maple street; thence easterly along the center line of Maple street to the place of beginning.

In the matter of the amendments to the city charter which have been referred to this committee, we recommend that the following amendments be approved and forwarded to our representatives of the legislature and that said representatives be urged to secure the passage of said bills at the earliest date possible.

In the matter of the judgment of Thomas Baker vs. the city, we report in favor of payment of the same.

AN ACT to amend chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act to further amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled, 'An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester' and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of said city," and the several acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section two of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 2. The boundaries of said city of Rochester, which said point is in the middle of the Ridge road eight chains and seventy-five links distant easterly from the top of the east high bank of the Genesee river; thence south, fifteen minutes east, to the north line of Norton street; thence easterly on the said north line of Norton street to a point two hundred feet easterly from the east line of lot number forty-eight, in the town of Irondequoit; thence southerly on a line parallel with the said east line of said lot number forty-eight, and at a distance of two hundred feet easterly therefrom, to the south line of the highway called Waring street; thence southeasterly along the south line of Waring street, and the said line continued to a point which would be the intersection of the said line with the east line of the highway known as Culver road; thence southwesterly on said line of said Culver road to the north line of lot number thirty-seven, in the town of Brighton; thence westerly on the north line of said lot number thirty-seven, and on the north line of lots forty-five and fifty-three, in the said town of Brighton, to a point in the north line of said lot fifty-three, two hundred and ninety feet easterly from the northeast corner of lot number sixty-one in said town; thence southerly, on a line parallel with the east line of said lot number sixty-one, to the northerly line of a road known as Elmwood avenue to a point, which said point is at the intersection of the northerly line of said Elmwood avenue with the westerly line of the lands now owned by the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company; thence

southerly on the westerly line of the said lands now owned by said railroad company, to a point in the center of the Westfall road, so called; thence westerly along the center of the Westfall road to a point in the center of the said Westfall road, where the said road makes an angle to the north; thence southwesterly in a straight line twenty-four hundred feet through lands now owned by, or known as the Harmon farm, and the Baker farm, to a point where the east bank of the Genesee river intersects the west line of the Wolcott road, so called; thence northeasterly along the east shore of the Genesee river, about eight hundred and fifty feet to a point where the northerly line extended of a road running between the lands of E. Chapin and Matthias Kondolf, on the west side of said river; thence westerly along said line so extended and continuing along the said line to a point where the said line intersects the easterly line of lands now owned by the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad Company; thence northeasterly along the east line of said lands owned by said company, to a point where the east line of said railroad, would be intersected by the center line of Genesee street produced southwesterly; thence northeasterly through the center of a road, which is the continuation to Genesee street, to a point where the center line of said Genesee street intersects the present southerly line of said city, which is the north line of lot seven and south line of lot forty-six of the town of Gates; thence westerly along the said line to a point where the said line would be intersected by the east line of lots seventy-five, seventy-six and one hundred sixty-eight in said town of Gates produced southerly; thence northerly along the said produced line to the south line of lot number twenty-two of said town of Gates; thence westerly on the south line of said lot twenty-two to the east line of the highway known as Thurston road; thence northerly along the east line of said highway to the north line of said lot twenty-two to the above mentioned produced east line of lot one hundred and sixty-eight of the town of Gates; thence northerly along said produced line to the east line of said lot one hundred sixty-eight, and along the east line of said lot one hundred sixty-eight to the northerly line of the highway known as Chili road; thence westerly along the northerly line of said Chili road; thence westerly along the northerly line of said Chili road, to the west line of a street known as Gardiner avenue; thence northerly along the west line of said Gardiner avenue sixty feet; thence westerly at right angles with Gardiner avenue, seventy-five feet; thence southerly, parallel with the said Gardiner avenue, to the aforesaid northerly line of Chili road; thence westerly along the northerly line of said Chili road to the easterly line of a highway called Lincoln avenue; thence northerly along the easterly line of said Lincoln avenue, to the south line of a highway called the Buffalo road; thence easterly along the southerly boundaries of the said Buffalo road to the east line of lot one hundred sixty-eight of the town of Gates; thence northerly along the east line of lots one hundred sixty-eight, seventy-six, seventh-five, seventh-four and seventy-three of the town of Gates, continued on the east line of lots seventy-two, seventy-one and seventy of the town of Greece, to a point twenty rods north of the center of the highway known as the Big Ridge road; thence easterly parallel with the center line of said road and twenty rods distant northerly therefrom and on said line produced easterly to a point twelve hundred feet easterly from the east line of Lake avenue; thence northerly on a line parallel with Lake avenue ten hundred and eleven feet, to

a point; thence north, thirty-six degrees and twenty-six minutes, west eight hundred and eighty-eight feet to a point; thence north twelve degrees and four minutes, west, to the center of a road leading to Hanford's Landing; thence easterly along the center of said road leading to Hanford's Landing to a point fifty feet, westerly, from the west high bank of the Genesee river; thence northerly, parallel with the top of the west high bank of the Genesee river, and fifty feet distant, westerly therefrom, to the south line of Holy Sepulchre cemetery, which is the north line of the lands of William Merrill; thence easterly along said line and said line produced easterly to the east bank of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the east bank of the Genesee river in its various courses, to the north line of lot fourteen, in the township fourteen, in the seventh range of township, in the town of Irondequoit; thence easterly along the north line of said lot fourteen lands owned by Hosea Rogers, produced to the eastern boundaries of the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railroad Company; thence southerly along the eastern boundaries of said Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railroad Company's lands to a point on the east line of lands recently purchased from to the west line of the lands owned by the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railroad Company; thence southerly along the west line of the lands owned by the said Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railroad Company to a point at which the south line of the lands owned by Hosea Rogers, produced westerly, would intersect the western boundaries of the lands of the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railroad Company; thence easterly along the said south line of the Charles Howard by the city of Rochester; thence southerly along the easterly line of lands recently purchased from Charles Howard, W. G. Curloss, Emma D. Culross, Elbert G. Callister, John D. Callister and Elizabeth Callister, to the south line of said lands recently purchased by the city of Rochester from Elizabeth Callister; thence easterly along the south line of said Elizabeth Callister's land to the east side of a road, which said road is in continuation of North Saint Paul street in the city of Rochester; thence seventeen degrees and forty minutes, southeast, to the middle of the Ridge road; thence westerly along the middle of the Ridge road to the place of beginning.

Sec. 2. Section four of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 4. The said city shall be divided into twenty wards, as follows;

First ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of the Genesee river, and of the Erie canal; thence running westerly along the center of the Erie canal to the center of Allen street; thence easterly along the center of Allen street to the center of State street; thence southerly along the center of State street to the center of Mumford street; thence easterly along the center of Mumford street to the center of the Genesee river; thence southerly along the center of the Genesee river to the place of beginning shall constitute the first ward.

Second ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at the center of the Genesee river and Mumford street; thence running westerly along the center of Mumford street to the center of State street; thence northerly along the center of State street to the center of Allen street; thence westerly along the center of Allen street to the center of the Erie canal; thence northerly along the center of the Erie canal to Jay

street; thence easterly along the center of Jay street, and the center line thereof continued easterly, to the center of the Genesee river; thence southerly along the center of the Genesee river to the place of beginning, shall constitute the second ward.

Third ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of the Genesee river and of the Erie canal; thence running westerly along the center of the Erie canal to the center of lands formerly used for the Genesee Valley canal; thence southerly along the center of the said lands formerly used for the Genesee Valley canal to the south line of the Strong tract; thence along the south line of the Strong tract to the center of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the center of the Genesee river, to the place of beginning, shall constitute the third ward.

Fourth ward.—All that part of said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of the Genesee river and of East Main street; thence running easterly along the center of East Main street to the center of East avenue; thence along the center of East avenue to the center of William street; thence southerly along the center of William street to the center of Monroe avenue; thence southeasterly along the center of Monroe avenue to the center of Alexander street; thence southerly along the center of Alexander street to an angle in said street; thence southwesterly continuing in the center of said Alexander street to the Erie canal; thence northerly in the center of the Erie canal to a point where the center line of Howell street, extended westerly, would intersect said center of the Erie canal; thence westerly on said center line of Howell street, extended, to the center of the Genesee river; thence northerly in the center of the Genesee river to the place of beginning, shall constitute the fourth ward.

Fifth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of East Main street and of the Genesee river; thence running northerly along the center of the Genesee river to a point where a line extended southwesterly through the center of Evergreen street would intersect a line drawn through the center of said Genesee river; thence northeasterly along the said extended line and along the center of Evergreen street, to an angle in said street, and thence continuing easterly along the center of said Evergreen street to a point in the center of Conkey avenue; thence northerly along the center line of Conkey avenue to the center of Clifford street; thence easterly along the center of Clifford street to the center of North Clinton street; thence southerly along the center of North Clinton street to the center of East Main street; thence westerly along the center of East Main street to the place of beginning, shall constitute the fifth ward.

Sixth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at the center of East Main street and North street; thence northerly in the center of North street to the center of University avenue; thence easterly in the center of University avenue to the center of East Main street; thence easterly in the center of East Main street to the center of the tracks of the main line of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company; thence southeasterly in the center of said company's railroad tracks to the east boundary line of the city; thence southerly along the east boundary line of the city to the center of East avenue; thence westerly in the center of East avenue to the center of East Main street; thence westerly in the center of East

Main street to the place of beginning, shall constitute the sixth ward.

Seventh ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point at the center of East Main street and North Clinton street; thence running northerly along the center of North Clinton street to a point which would be the intersection of the center line of Nassau street, extended westerly to the center of said North Clinton street; thence easterly on said extended line and continuing easterly in the center of Nassau street to the center of Saint Joseph street; thence northerly along the center of Saint Joseph street to the center of Baden street; thence easterly along the center of Baden street to the center of Hudson avenue; thence northerly in the center of Hudson avenue to the center of Wilson street; thence easterly along the center of Wilson street to the center of North street thence southerly in the center of North street to the center of East Main street; thence westerly in the center of East Main street to the place of beginning, shall constitute the seventh ward.

Eighth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of North Clinton street where a line extended westerly through the center of Nassau street would intersect the center line of said North Clinton street; thence northerly along the center of North Clinton street to the center of Clifford street; thence easterly along the center of Clifford street to the center of North avenue; thence southerly along the center of North avenue to an angle in said avenue at or near Syracuse street; thence continuing southeasterly along the center of North avenue to a point where the center line of North avenue would intersect the center line of North street; thence northerly in the center line of North street to the center line of Wilson street; thence westerly in the center of Wilson street to the center of Hudson avenue; thence southerly in the center of Hudson avenue to the center of Baden street; thence westerly along the center of Baden street to the center of Saint Joseph street; thence southerly along the center of Saint Joseph street to the center of Nassau street; thence westerly along the center line of Nassau street, and along said line continued westerly to the place of beginning, shall constitute the eighth ward.

Ninth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of Jay street and the Erie canal, and running thence easterly along the center of Jay street, and Jay street continued, to the center of the Genesee river; thence northerly in the center of the Genesee river to a point where a line extended northeasterly through the center of Lorimer street would intersect the said center line of the Genesee river; thence southwesterly on said extended line, and through the center of Lorimer street to the center of Fulton avenue; thence northerly along the center of Fulton avenue to the center of Bloss street; thence westerly along the center of Bloss street to the lands used for the State Industrial School; thence southerly along the easterly line of said lands to the south line thereof; thence westerly along the south line of said lands of said State Industrial School, and along said line continued, to the center of the Erie canal; thence southeasterly along the center of the Erie canal to the place of beginning, shall constitute the ninth ward.

Tenth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where a line extended northeasterly through

the center of Lorimer street would intersect the center line of the Genesee river; thence northerly in the center of the Genesee river to a point where the northerly line of the city crosses the Genesee river; thence westerly on the said northerly line of the city, and continuing southerly on the said city line, and continuing westerly on the said city line, to a point where the northerly line of the city intersects the westerly line of the city; thence southerly on the westerly line of the city to a point where a line extended westerly through the center of Otis street would intersect the said westerly line of said city; thence easterly along said extended line and along the center of Otis street to the center of Sherman street; thence northerly in the center of Sherman street to a point where a line drawn through the center of Sherman street would intersect a line extended westerly from the south boundary line of the lands of the State Industrial School; thence easterly along the said extended line and along the south boundary line of the said lands of the State Industrial School to the southeast corner of the said lands; thence northerly along the east line of the said land; to the center of Bloss street; thence easterly along the center of Bloss street to the center of Fulton avenue; thence southerly along the center of Fulton avenue to the center of Lorimer street; thence northeasterly along the center of Lorimer street and continuing on a line extended northeasterly through the center of said Lorimer street to the place of beginning, shall constitute the tenth ward.

Eleventh ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where the center of Bronson avenue would intersect a line drawn through the center of the lands now owned and occupied by the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad Company, being the land formerly used and occupied for the Genesee Valley canal; thence westerly along the center of Bronson avenue to the center of Genesee street; thence northerly along the center of Genesee street to the center of Brown street; thence northeasterly along the center of Brown street to a point where a line extended southerly through the center of Saxton street would intersect a line drawn through the center of Brown street; thence northerly on said extended line, and continuing northerly along the center of Saxton street to the center of Jay street; thence easterly along the center of Jay street to a point where said Jay street makes an angle to the northeast; thence northeasterly along the center of Jay street to the center of the Erie canal; thence southerly along the center of the Erie canal to a point where the old Genesee Valley canal formerly connected with said Erie canal; thence southerly along the center of the lands formerly used and occupied by the Genesee Valley canal to the place of beginning, shall constitute the eleventh ward.

Twelfth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where a line drawn through the center of William street; thence southerly along the center of William street to the center of Monroe avenue; thence southeasterly along the center of Monroe avenue to the center of Alexander street; thence southerly along the center of Alexander street to an angle at or near Cobb street; thence continuing southwesterly along the center of Alexander street to the center of the Erie canal; thence southerly and easterly along the center of the Erie canal to the easterly line of the city; thence northerly along the easterly line of the city to the center of East avenue;

thence westerly along the center of East avenue to the place of beginning, shall constitute the twelfth ward.

Thirteenth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of the Genesee river where a line drawn through the center of the Genesee river would intersect a line extended westerly through the center of Howell street; thence easterly on said extended line to the center of the Erie canal; thence southerly and easterly along the center of the Erie canal to the center of Goodman street thence southerly along the center of Goodman street to the center of Caroline street; thence westerly along the center of Caroline street to the center of South avenue; thence northerly along the center of South avenue to the center of Averill avenue; thence westerly along the center of Averill avenue, and continuing on a line extending westerly through the center of Averill avenue, to the center of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the center of the Genesee river to the place of beginning, shall constitute the thirteenth ward.

Fourteenth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of the Genesee river, where a line drawn through the center of said river would intersect a line extended westerly through the center of Averill avenue; thence easterly on said extended line and along the center of Averill avenue to the center of South avenue; thence southerly along the center of South avenue to the center of Caroline street; thence easterly along the center of Caroline street to the center of Goodman street; thence northerly along the center of Goodman street to the center of the Erie canal; thence easterly along the center of the Erie canal to the easterly line of the city; thence southerly and westerly along the east and south boundary lines of the city, following the various courses of said line, to the center of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the center of the Genesee river to the place of beginning, shall constitute the fourteenth ward.

Fifteenth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where the center of Jay street intersects the center of the Erie canal; thence southwesterly along the center of Jay street to a point at or near the center of Magne street; thence continuing westerly along the center of Jay street to the west boundary line of the city; thence northerly along the west boundary line of the city to a point where a line extended westerly through the center of Otis street would intersect the said west boundary line of said city; thence easterly, on said extended line and along the center of Otis street to the center of Sherman street; thence northerly along the center of Sherman street to a point where a line drawn through the center of Sherman street would intersect the south boundary line of the lands of the State Industrial School extended westerly; thence easterly along said extended line to the center line of the Erie canal; thence southeasterly along the center of the Erie canal to the place of beginning, shall constitute the fifteenth ward.

Sixteenth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where a line drawn through the center of North street would intersect a line drawn through the center of University avenue; thence northerly along the center of North street to a point, which is the intersection of the center lines of North street and North avenue; thence northeasterly

along the center of North avenue to the center of Pay street; thence easterly along the center of Bay street to the center of Hebard street; thence southerly along the center of Hebard street to the center of the tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company thence southeasterly along the center of the tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to the center of East Main street; thence westerly along the center of East Main street to the center of University avenue; thence northwesterly along the center of University avenue to the place of beginning, shall constitute the sixteenth ward.

Seventeenth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point in the center of the Genesee river, where a line drawn through the center of the Genesee river would intersect a line extended southeasterly through the center of Evergreen street; thence northerly along the center of the Genesee river to where the north line of the city crosses the Genesee river; thence following the boundary line of the said city northerly to the north boundary point of the said city; thence southerly along the east boundary line of said city to a point where said boundary line intersects said north boundary line at Norton street; thence easterly along the north boundary line of said city to a point where the northerly boundary line of the city intersects the east boundary line of the city; thence southerly and southeasterly along the easterly boundary line of the city to the center of Clifford street; thence westerly along the center of Clifford street to the center of Conkey avenue; thence southerly along the center of Conkey avenue to the center of Evergreen street; thence westerly along the center of Evergreen street, and continuing southwestwardly along said center line, and continuing on a line extended southwestwardly through the center of said Evergreen street to the place of beginning, shall constitute the seventeenth ward.

Eighteenth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where a line drawn through the center of North avenue would intersect a line drawn through the center of Clifford street; thence easterly along the center of Clifford street to the easterly boundary line of the city; thence southerly along the easterly boundary line of the city to the center of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad company's tracks; thence northwesterly along the center of said company's tracks to the center of Hebard street; thence northerly along the center of Hebard street to the center of Bay street; thence westerly along the center of Bay street to the center of North avenue; thence northerly along the center of North avenue to the place of beginning, shall constitute the eighteenth ward.

Nineteenth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where the center of Bronson avenue would intersect a line drawn through the center of the lands now owned and occupied by the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad Company, being the land formerly used and occupied by the Genesee Valley canal; thence westerly along the center line of Bronson avenue to the center of Genesee street; thence northerly along the center of Genesee street to the center of West avenue; thence westerly along the center of West avenue to the center of Chili avenue; thence southwestwardly along the center of Chili avenue to the westerly boundary line of the city; thence southerly on the westerly city line, in its various courses, to a point where the said westerly line of the city intersects the southerly line of the city; thence east-

erly and southerly, following the said city line, in its various courses, until the said line intersects a line drawn through the center of the Genesee river; thence northerly, in the center of the Genesee river, in its various courses, to a point where a line drawn through the center of the said river would intersect the south line of the Strong tract; thence northwesterly along the south line of the Strong tract to the center of the tracks of the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad Company; thence northerly, along the center of the tracks of said railroad company, to the place of beginning, shall constitute the nineteenth ward.

Twentieth ward.—All that part of the said city included within a line beginning at a point where a line drawn through the center of Genesee street would intersect a line drawn through the center of West avenue; thence westerly along the center of West avenue to the center of Chili avenue; thence southwesterly along the center of Chili avenue, and continuing southwesterly along the center of a road formerly known as the Chili road to the easterly line of of a highway called Lincoln avenue; thence northerly along the easterly line of said Lincoln avenue to the south line of the highway called the Buffalo road; thence easterly along the southerly boundaries of said Buffalo road to the present westerly city line; thence northerly along the present westerly city line to the center of Jay street; thence easterly along the center of Jay street to the center of Saxton street; thence southerly along the center of Saxton street, and on a line extended through the center of Saxton street, to the center of Brown street; thence southerly along the center of Brown street to the place of beginning; the said westerly boundary lines being a part of the present westerly boundary line of the city; and the said part of the said city included within said lines shall constitute the twentieth ward.

Sec. 3. Section seven of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 7. An election shall be held in each ward annually on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in March at such places as shall be designated by the common council, of which a notice shall be published by the city clerk for at least six days previous to the election, in all the daily newspapers of the city, at which election there shall be chosen by the electors of the city, voting in their respective wards, as often as the terms of office of the then incumbent shall expire, within the year after such election, one mayor, who shall hold his office for two years; one police justice, who shall hold his office for four years; one treasurer, who shall hold his office for two years; and also, by the electors of each ward, one supervisor, whose term of office shall be the same as that of the supervisors from the towns of Monroe county, and the terms of office of the supervisors now in office in said city shall end at the same time as the terms of town supervisors now in office; one constable, who shall hold his office for one year; and at the election held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in March, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, there shall also be chosen by the electors of the fourth ward and of all the odd wards, except the third ward, one alderman and one commissioner of public schools, from each of said wards, and at the election held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in March, eighteen hundred and ninety-five, one alderman and one commissioner from the third ward and all the even wards, except the fourth ward; each of which shall hold his office for two years, and thereafter aldermen and commissioners of common schools

shall be elected for two years as the terms expire of those elected from the respective wards. The aldermen and commissioners of common schools now in office shall continue to hold office as representing the territory from which they were elected, notwithstanding the change of ward numbers until their terms of office shall severally expire. The city treasurer shall not be entitled to enter upon his office until he shall have executed and filed with the mayor, a bond in the penal sum of fifty thousand dollars, or such other sum as the common council may have fixed, with good and sufficient sureties, approved by the mayor, in writing, thereon, and conditioned for the faithful performance of all his duties as treasurer, and of all the duties imposed upon him by law, in respect to the money, property and affairs of the said city. The execution of such a bond by the treasurer and sureties, shall be duly acknowledged or approved, so as to entitle it to be read in evidence, and it shall be the duty of the mayor to cause such bond to be recorded in the Monroe county clerk's office, and a copy of such bond, as so recorded, certified by the said county clerk, shall be as good evidence in all courts and places as the original bond, which shall be safely kept by the mayor, after being recorded as aforesaid. Not less than thirty days after the passage of this act, and in every second year thereafter, the mayor shall appoint an auditor, whose term of office shall be for two years, or until his successor shall have been duly appointed and qualified. The said auditor shall enter upon his duties on the first Monday in May after his appointment. The said auditor shall not be entitled to enter upon his office until he shall have executed and filed with the mayor of said city a bond in the penal sum of five thousand dollars, or such other sum as the common council shall fix with sufficient sureties, approved by the mayor, in writing, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties, as such auditor, and the duties imposed upon him by law. The said auditor shall receive a salary not to exceed three thousand dollars per annum, payable monthly, as other city officers are paid, such salary to be fixed by the common council annually, as other salaries are fixed. In shall be his duty to examine and pass upon all debts, demands and claims against said city, and each and every of its boards, officers and agents, including the board of education and the executive board of said city, before the same shall be ordered paid, and he shall keep a book, in which shall be recorded an account of each debt, demand and claim presented to him, and the sum allowed upon each, and he shall render to the common council, the board of education or executive board, detailed monthly reports of all such debts, demands and claims presented to, and allowed by him, as aforesaid, and all bills, dues and demands contracted or incurred during the preceding months, which have been presented to him for audit aforesaid, and except as otherwise provided by law, and except the fixed salaries of officers paid by the city, no debt, demand or claim payable from the city treasury, shall be paid, except the same is passed upon by said auditor and certified by him to the body, board or officer whose duty it shall be to pay the same, and if he objects to any debt, demand or claim, in whole or in part, such objection shall be by him presented in writing to said bodies, officers and boards, respectively, whose duty it shall be to investigate the grounds of such objection before finally auditing or determining the matter of disposal thereof. Provided, however, that said auditor may weekly examine and pass upon by items any state-

ment of claims, dues or demands for labor performed, which shall be certified to him for audit by said executive board, and upon such audit by the auditor, certified by him, under his hand, to such board, a sum or sums not exceeding, in the aggregate, five thousand dollars in any one week, may be drawn by the clerk of said board by orders or warrants made directly upon the city treasurer, who shall pay the same, when there are funds for the purpose, as is provided by section one hundred and forty-eight of this charter, as amended in eighteen hundred and ninety. Said auditor may examine on oath, to be administered by him, any person, firm or corporation who presents an account, claim, due or demand, touching the validity of such account, claim, due or demand, and false swearing during such examination, shall be deemed willful perjury, and punishable as such, and said auditor shall not audit such account, claim, due or demand where such person, firm or corporation, or the duly authorized agent or officer thereof, presenting the same shall refuse to submit to such an examination and oath. The said auditor shall make to the mayor and common council of said city, at the last meeting thereof in each fiscal year, a report, in writing, embracing a summary of the business transacted in his office during the preceding year.

Sec. 4. Section fourteen of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 14. Three inspectors of election for each ward or election district in said city shall be elected at each annual charter election. The electors of each election district in said city shall be entitled to vote by ballot on the same ticket with other charter officers, for two electors residing in such election district to be inspectors of election for said district, and the two persons in each district receiving the greatest number of votes shall be two of the inspectors of election for such district at all elections to be held therein during the ensuing year. The board of inspectors of election in each of said election districts shall, immediately after the votes of such charter election shall be canvassed, appoint in writing, subscribed by a majority of said board, another inspector of election for each election district, to be associated with said two inspectors so elected, and who shall thereupon be one of the inspectors of election of such district. Such inspector shall be selected from the two persons in such election district who shall have the highest number of votes next to the two inspectors so elected. And no ballot for inspector shall be counted upon which more than two names shall appear. Not more than two inspectors for one district shall belong to the same political party. The poll clerks and ballot clerks in each election district shall be appointed by the inspectors of election as provided for in the new election code, and the several amendments thereto, the provisions of which are hereby declared to be applicable to said city.

Sec. 5. Section fifteen of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 15. In case any such inspector of election in said city shall not be chosen or appointed as provided for in the preceding section, or in case of the death, inability or refusal of any such inspectors to act or of his forsaking to be a resident of the election district for which he was appointed or elected, the common council must thereafter appoint another in his or their place by viva voce vote, and the person or persons thus appointed shall be inspector or inspectors of

the election district for which he or they was or were so appointed.

Sec. 6. Section sixteen of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 16. The conduct of elections, the duties of inspectors of elections, poll clerks and ballot clerks in and of said city shall be the same as provided for by the election code of the state of New York, and the several amendments thereto, the provisions of which in respect thereto are hereby declared applicable to said city.

Sec. 7. Section seventeen of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 17. The ballots and ballot-boxes to be used at the charter elections of said city shall be the same as provided for by the election code of the state of New York and the amendments thereto, the provisions of which in respect thereto, are hereby declared to be applicable to said city. The common council shall provide such ballot-boxes for each ward or election district, with locks and keys, as are required by the provisions of the election code and the amendments thereto.

Sec. 8. Subdivision seven of section forty of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

To regulate and prevent the use and encumbering of streets, avenues, walks, public squares, lanes, alleys, bridges, aqueducts, wharves, basins or slips in any manner whatever; to regulate the opening of street surfaces and connections with sewers, and the laying of gas, water pipes and mains and sewer connections; to regulate and control the erection, construction, laying, stringing, maintaining and removing of all wires, cables, poles, conduits and subways, upon, over and under the streets, avenues, lanes, squares, parks, bridges, aqueducts, and public places within said city; to prevent injury to public and private property and premises within said city and to cause all buildings, dwellings and business places to be numbered or renumbered on any and all streets, squares, avenues, parks, places, courts and alleys in said city at the cost and expense of the owner thereof; to regulate the exhibition and distribution of advertisements or handbills within said city.

Sec. 9. Subdivision twenty-one of section forty of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

To license, regulate and control scavengers, chimney sweeps, expressmen, cartmen, porters, hack, cab, truck, omnibus and stage owners and drivers, and the owners and drivers of all vehicles used for hire in the city of Rochester, for the transportation of passengers and merchandise, goods or articles of any kind, and to require the owners of all such carts, carriages and vehicles, to mark the same in such manner as the common council may designate, and fix the rates of compensation to be taken by them; to license and regulate sextons and undertakers for burying the dead; to license and regulate butchers, hawkers, peddlers, common criers, (bill posters) and runners for stages, railroads, taverns or other houses, junk shop dealers, pawnbrokers and dealers in second-hand articles, and the business of pawnbrokerage; to prescribe the terms and conditions upon which any such license shall be granted, and to prohibit all unlicensed persons from acting in such capacities, and to exact a license fee aforesaid, in such an amount as the said common council shall deem reasonable, not exceeding, however, five hundred dollars per year from any pawnbroker, and not exceeding fifty dollars a year from any other of the persons above enumerated, except that a fee of, not exceeding ten dollars, for each wagon, carriage or vehicle used in

any of the business aforesaid may be charged for any one year; to license and regulate bill posters and bill distributors, and sign advertising, and to prescribe the terms and conditions upon which any such license shall be granted, and to prohibit all unlicensed persons from acting in such capacity, and to exact a license fee aforesaid, in such an amount as the said common council shall deem reasonable, not exceeding, however, one hundred dollars per year.

Sec. 10. Section seventy-six of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 76. The city treasurer shall receive and deposit in one or more of the savings banks, or the trust and safe deposit companies in the city, of good standing, all moneys from the sale of lots and other sources, and also all penalties collected for violations of city ordinances in relation to Mount Hope, and shall pay all expenses incurred at Mount Hope, by making his check upon such savings banks, or the trust and safe deposit companies, which check in all cases shall be countersigned by two or more commissioners. The city treasurer may, under the direction and with the consent of said board of commissioners invest any of said moneys in bonds of the city of Rochester, county of Monroe, or state of New York.

Sec. 11. Section one hundred and sixty-four of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 164. In every case where a street in said city has been or shall be encroached upon by any fence, building or otherwise the executive board may cause the same to be surveyed and the extent of such encroachment ascertained and may, by resolution, specifying the nature of such encroachment and the extent thereof, require the owner or owners, if known, and if unknown, the occupant or occupants of the premises so encroaching or adjoining such encroachment, to remove the same within such time as shall be specified in such resolution which time shall not be less than ten days from the service of such resolution as hereinafter provided. A copy of such resolution shall be served on the owner or owners of the premises so encroaching or adjoining such encroachment, if he or they live in said city, personally or by leaving a copy of such resolution at his or their residence with some person of suitable age and discretion; if such owner or owners do not live in said city, but have an agent living in said city, whose appointment is in writing and whose name is entered in a book to be kept by the city clerk for that purpose, then a copy of such resolution shall be served on such agent personally, or at his residence, by leaving the same with some person of suitable age and discretion; if such non-resident owner does not have such an agent then a copy of such resolution may be served on any tenant in possession of said premises, and a copy thereof shall also be sent by mail addressed to such owner or owners at his or their residence, if the same is known or can be ascertained with reasonable diligence; and if there be no such tenant, service by mail alone, as aforesaid, shall be sufficient; if there be no tenant in possession and the owner or owners of such lands, or his or their residence, be unknown and can not be ascertained with reasonable diligence, then such service may be made by posting a copy of such resolution in a conspicuous place upon the premises encroaching or adjoining such encroachment. The service aforesaid shall be made by such person as said board may direct. If such removal shall not be made within the time specified in such resolution the owner or occupants of said premises

shall forfeit and pay to said city the sum of five dollars for each and every day that such encroachment shall continue unremoved after the time mentioned in said resolution for removing the same. And the said board may remove, or cause to be removed, such encroachments, and may collect or such owner or occupant all reasonable charges therefor, with costs, in any court having jurisdiction of civil actions, and upon a judgment rendered in such action execution may issue against the person of the defendant in said action. No encroachment upon any street, alley or lane of said city, however long continued, shall constitute an adverse possession to or confer any rights upon the person or persons claiming thereunder as against said city. This section and the last preceding section shall apply to alleys as well as streets.

Sec. 12. Section one hundred and seventy of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 170. Whenever by order of the common council any new street or alley shall be laid out, opened or worked in said city, or any sewer, tunnel, drain, vault or bridge shall be extended to and beyond the city limits, or any other public improvement is to be made, it shall be the duty of the common council to determine what portion, if any, of the expense thereof, ought to be paid from the public treasury, and what portion, if any, ought to be paid by a local assessment, and to direct that the whole expense to be paid by a local assessment be assessed upon all the lots and parcels of land to be benefited thereby, in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom. The common council may maintain, improve, embellish and protect any public park, square or area in said city, and grade, sewer and pave the streets and alleys, and make, grade and improve sidewalks about the same, or any part thereof. And they may cause the whole expense thereof to be assessed upon all the lots and parcels of land where the parks, squares or areas are situated in proportion to the benefit which each lot or parcel will derive therefrom. It shall be lawful for the common council to borrow, from time to time, by the issue of bonds bearing such rates of interest as it may deem proper to effect a sale thereof, not exceeding six per centum per annum, at not less than par, for such period as said common council may determine, not exceeding ten years, such sums as may be necessary to pay all costs, disbursements and other expenses incurred or to be incurred on account of work, labor, materials, and local improvements heretofore or hereafter performed or furnished, or constructed, not in conflict with the provisions of any contract, however, therefor, under and by virtue of ordinances duly adopted as provided in this charter, the expense whereof is to be afterwards collected wholly or in part by assessment from the property benefited by such improvement, but no moneys shall be paid out of the proceeds of said bonds except upon a certificate in writing from the head of the department having charge of such work stating that a payment is due and the amount of such payment. All assessments heretofore or hereafter made or collected for local improvements shall be paid into a fund to be known as the "local improvement fund" to be applied toward the redemption of the bonds issued in pursuance of this section and the payment of any orders that may be issued in pursuance of any contracts heretofore entered into for any local improvements.

Sec. 13. Section two hundred and forty-one of said act hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 241. A court of civil jurisdiction, to be known as the "municipal court of the

city of Rochester," is continued and established in and for said city, with the jurisdiction and powers hereinafter provided, and the further jurisdiction and powers to have any and all process or papers issued by the clerk, deputy clerk, or one of the judges, executed and served anywhere within the county of Monroe, and all process and papers issued may be directed to and served by any constable of any ward within said city, or any town within said county, or by the sheriff of said county, or any of his deputies. The two judges of the said court now in office shall hold the said court in the said city as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 14. Section two hundred and forty-five of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 245. It shall be the duty of each of said judges to hold a court in and for said city of Rochester, to be called the municipal court of the city of Rochester. Each of said judges may hold a separate court at the same time. Said court shall be open for business each day (Sundays and legal holidays excepted), at nine o'clock in the forenoon and continue open during reasonable hours for the transaction of business, and shall have jurisdiction in civil actions and proceedings and criminal proceedings, as follows:

1. In all civil actions and proceedings cognizable by law, by justices of the peace or justices' courts of towns or formerly of said city.

2. In actions arising on contracts, express or implied, including any order, decision or judgment of any court of record, or a judge thereof, granting or directing the payment of any sum of money to any party or person for the recovery of money only, if the amount for which judgment is claimed, does not exceed one thousand dollars, exclusive of costs; and also in actions for breach of contracts, express or implied, where the damages claimed and for which judgment is demanded in the complaint do not exceed one thousand dollars, exclusive of costs.

3. In a matter of account, when the sum total of the accounts of both parties, proved to the satisfaction of the court, does not exceed one thousand dollars.

4. In actions for damages for injury to rights pertaining to the person or to personal or real property, or for the conversion of personal property, if the amount for which judgment is demanded in the complaint, exclusive of costs, does not exceed one thousand dollars besides costs.

5. In an action for a penalty or penalties where the amount for which judgment is demanded in the complaint exclusive of costs, does not exceed the sum of one thousand dollars besides costs.

6. In an action upon a bond or undertaking unconditioned for the payment of money, where the amount for which judgment is demanded in the complaint, exclusive of costs, does not exceed one thousand dollars, though the penalty exceed that sum, the judgment to be given for the sum actually due. Where payments are to be made by installments, an action may be brought for each installment as it becomes due.

7. In an action upon a surety bond or undertaking taken by said court, or one of the judges thereof, or a justice' court or a justice of the peace or any other court, or judge, or justice, except where it is otherwise specially provided by law, when the amount for which judgment is demanded in the complaint, exclusive of costs, does not exceed the sum of one thousand dollars.

8. In an action upon a judgment rendered in a court of record, or not of record, including said municipal court, a justice of the

peace or the police justice of said city, where such action is not prohibited by the code of civil procedure.

9. To take and enter judgment on the confession of a defendant, when the amount confessed, exclusive of costs, shall not exceed one thousand dollars. Such confession to be in the manner prescribed by section three thousand and eleven of the code of civil procedure, and to have the same effect as is provided by section three thousand and twelve of said code.

10. In an action for damages for fraud in the sale, purchase or exchange of real or personal property, if the amount for which judgment is demanded in the complaint, exclusive of costs, does not exceed one thousand dollars.

11. In an action commenced by an attachment of property, as now provided by statute, if the amount for which judgment is demanded in the complaint, if one be served with the summons, exclusive of costs, or the debt or damage claimed in the affidavit does not exceed the sum of one thousand dollars.

12. In an action to recover the possession of personal property claimed, the value of which as stated in the affidavit by or on behalf of the plaintiff where a requisition is issued in the action, or in other case in the complaint, shall not exceed the sum of one thousand dollars, the same proceedings to be had as are provided for justices' courts by article fifth of title two of chapter nineteen of the code of civil procedure, except as is otherwise specified in this act.

13. In summary proceedings under title two of chapter seventeen of the code of civil procedure, to recover the possession of real property, and to remove tenants and others, the process to be made returnable and proceedings and judgment to be had and given before and by said court by its proper title.

14. In actions or proceedings under the code of civil procedure, or any statute as now existing, or that may hereafter be amended or passed, for the protection or enforcement of the liens of mechanics and others, including article second of title two of chapter fourteen of said code, where the amount of the lien does not exceed the sum of one thousand dollars; the same proceedings to be had as are or may be provided by said code or statutes.

15. In proceedings in cases of bastardy, brought or instituted by the overseer of the poor, or acting overseer, or the mayor, or one of the aldermen of said city of Rochester. The court in such bastardy proceedings and at any stage thereof, except during the final examination and determination, may be held by one of the judges of said court, and said judges may alternate in such proceedings, except during the final examination and determination, when the said court shall be held by both judges, or in case of the absence or inability to act, by reason of being occupied with other official duties, or other cause, or either of said judges, by the other judge and the police justice of said city, or one of the justices of the peace of a town within the county of Monroe. In case of any adjournment being had in said proceedings, and the defendant failing to give an undertaking or security for such adjournment, as provided by section eight hundred and forty-nine of the code of criminal procedure, he shall be committed to the county jail of Monroe county during such adjournment, by a commitment signed by the judge or judges then holding said court, and he may be taken therefrom at or before said adjourned time by any peace officer, by an order issued by one of the judges of said court, directed to the keeper of the said jail,

and proceed before said court for the purposes of examination or further adjournment, as may then be had. Any number of adjournments may be had in said proceedings, and the same may be for any length of time. The undertaking or security to be given upon an adjournment, shall be signed by two sufficient sureties and shall be to the effect that the defendant will appear before the said court at the adjourned time and such other time or times to which adjournments may be had for the purposes of the examination and determination, and will render himself amenable to any process, order or commitment that may be issued or made in such proceedings. In case the defendant be adjudged to be the father of any bastard child or children, in any such bastardy proceedings, and he shall fail to pay the costs and give an undertaking for the support of such child or children, and its or their mother, or said defendant's appearance at the next court of sessions of Monroe county, as provided by section eight hundred and fifty-one of said code of criminal procedure, the magistrates composing the court, or either of them, must, by warrant, commit such defendant to the Monroe county penitentiary, there to remain until he be discharged by the said court of sessions, or deliver an undertaking for the support of said child or mother as aforesaid. In all other respects, the proceedings to be had or taken in such bastardy proceedings, instituted in said court, shall conform to the provisions of the said code of criminal procedure relating to proceedings respecting bastardy. Every warrant or commitment issued after this section as amended takes effect shall, instead of committing the defendant to the county jail, commit him to said Monroe county penitentiary, where it is issued by any judge or justice aforesaid, or out of or by virtue of the order or judgment of the court of sessions of Monroe county, upon any appeal taken thereon in any proceedings respecting bastardy instituted by the overseer of the poor of said city.

16. The judges of said court shall have power to remove any constable of any ward of said city upon the same complaint as is provided by law for the removal of any constable of a town. The said judges shall associate together to hear and determine the same, except that where one of the judges is absent, or unable to act from any cause, the police justice of said city, or one of the justices of a town within the county of Monroe, may be associated with said remaining judge for said purpose, and the same proceedings shall be had by and before them as are provided by law to be had by and before three justices of the peace of a town for the removal of a constable.

17. The judges of said court are hereby respectively authorized and empowered to solemnize the rites of marriage.

Sec. 15. Section two hundred sixty-five of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 265. The police justice of said city shall have jurisdiction in any suit brought for a penalty or forfeiture given for a violation of any city ordinance, or of the laws concerning the internal police of the state, and is hereby empowered to hold courts of special sessions for the trial of all offenses triable in a court of special sessions. Every court of special sessions held by said police justice, or by one of the judges of the municipal court of said city, or the mayor, or one of the police commissioners or aldermen in the place of said police justice, as is provided by section two hundred and sixty-seven of this act, shall, subject to the power of removal, provided for in chapter one, of title six, of part one, of the code of crim-

inal procedure, have exclusive jurisdiction to hear, try and determine all charges of misdemeanor and such other offenses or crimes punishable as such, as are defined by section fifty-two of the code of criminal procedure, or other statute now or hereafter passed, where the offense has been committed within the city of Rochester, and of petit larceny committed as a second offense within said city, and the complaint has been made to said police justice, or one of the officers acting in his place, or one of the judges of the municipal court; and the said police justice, or other officer acting in his place, shall have power to impose any sentence, punishment, fine, imprisonment, or both, as is provided in such cases by the provisions of the penal code or by the special statutes of this state. The board of police commissioners shall have power to appoint, from time to time, a stenographer, who shall perform such duties as they shall, from time to time, require of him. The police magistrate, or person acting in his stead, shall have power to require such stenographer to take the evidence in all criminal cases or proceedings pending before him; and shall have power to require such stenographer to transcribe his short-hand notes, and deliver to the district attorney of the county of Monroe a copy of such transcript; and shall have power to require such stenographer to transcribe his notes and deliver a copy thereof to the defendant in any action, upon the payment to the clerk of such police court of the sum of ten cents per folio for each folio of such transcript. The salary of such stenographer shall be fixed by said board of police commissioners, and shall be paid in the same manner in which the salary of the clerk is now paid. In any action brought for the violation of any ordinance, or of the laws concerning the internal police of the state as aforesaid, a trial by jury may be had upon the demand of either party, made before the actual commencement of such trial, and such trial shall be conducted in the manner provided for trials by jury in justices' courts by the code of civil procedure, and the jurors summoned, as well as those acting or sitting upon the trial, and the officer executing the venire and attending the jury, which officer may be one of the members of the police force of said city, to be nominated by said police justice, shall be entitled to the fees allowed by law to jurors and constables for similar services in trials by jury before justices of the peace or justices' courts, and which fees shall be paid to the said police justice for the purposes aforesaid by the party demanding such jury trial, at the time such demand is made, and upon the failure to pay the same, such demand for a trial by jury shall be disregarded, but the fees allowed to said officer, if he be one of the members of said police force of said city, for summoning or attending upon said jury, shall be retained by the police clerk and be paid by him to the treasurer of said city to the credit of the contingent fund. The municipal court of said city shall also have jurisdiction of all suits brought for a violation of any regulation, by-law or ordinance passed, enacted or adopted by the common council, board of health or executive board of said city, where the sum for which judgment is demanded in the complaint does not exceed five hundred dollars, exclusive of costs; provided the same be instituted by or under the direction of the city attorney, or said common council, board of health or executive board.

Sec. 16. This act shall take effect immediately.

By Ald. Johnston—
I have been strongly impressed by two statements recently made regarding the condition of our city's finances, one by the Republican leader of this council and the other by a prominent city official, in which they claim that the natural tendency of municipalities is to increase their expenditures for city government out of proportion to their growth in population and real estate valuation and they both quote Professor Bryce, author of the American Commonwealth, as their authority.

The standpoint from which they were made recognizes the fact that our city has fully emerged from what are called village customs and must now adjust itself to modern city ideas and these carry with them the increased expenditures referred to. The present tax rate and bonded indebtedness of our city are larger than those in the majority of the large cities in the country, and if the theoretical ideas advanced are to be maintained where will they lead us to?

For the purpose of having this subject considered, I wish to submit briefly a few statements and make some inquiries.

The last tax levy was collectable in July and beginning with September the finance committee has had to borrow each and every month since to pay the ordinary, current running expenses of the city and will have to continue doing so until next July. The expenditures for the last nine months are considerably more than during the corresponding time one year ago and are sufficiently large to show that the estimate for next year, submitted to this Council under date of August 8, 1893, was lower than it should have been. The amount needed in the next tax levy to pay next year's expenses and this year's deficiencies will be at least \$2,100,000, and it means a real estate tax rate of at least 2 per cent. According to a statement recently compiled from official records there is only one large city in the country whose relative tax rate is higher than ours, viz., Providence, R. I., and only two whose relative amount of bonded indebtedness is greater than ours, viz., Louisville, Ky., and Providence, R. I.

Our annual expenditures have been steadily and abnormally increasing during the last twelve years. Shall we accept the theories advanced, and permit the situation to grow worse, or shall we discuss the subject farther and see if our city's financial condition cannot be improved; see if we cannot have a better administration of affairs generally, at a less expense.

Rochester, for an inland city, has exceptionally good advantages. It is a manufacturing city with many different interests. Its educational facilities are unsurpassed. In addition to its public schools it has a well developed parochial school system, several seminaries, a university and a large number of well equipped churches. It has a larger number of better edited and more influential newspapers than any city of its size in the country. It is preeminently a city of dwellings. It contains 22,000 dwelling houses, exclusive of the buildings occupied in part for business purposes. From 80 to 90 per cent.

of our voting population live in their own houses and pay taxes, either through direct ownership or rental. These are some of the advantages that have helped make our city prosperous and beautiful, and the intelligence, local pride and self-interest represented by them are surely sufficient to prove that government of, by and for the people should not bankrupt our city or be a failure in Rochester.

The problem of municipal government under modern conditions and ideas is already receiving serious consideration in other cities and should receive here the thoughtful attention of every one interested in the welfare of our city.

To prevent any wrong impression it is proper to say that no official dishonesty is apparent or suspected and that the cause of our unfortunate condition is believed to be partly due to the carelessness and indifference of our people and largely to the fact that they have been and are ignorant of the actual state of city affairs generally. Considerable educational work is needed, which our newspapers could do nicely if they were so inclined, and in addition to the conscientious satisfaction of having done their duty they would place property owners and tax-payers, who are almost invariably their patrons, under special obligation. There can be no doubt about the desire and ability of our people to have a better condition of affairs, and the following questions are asked in the belief that their discussion will create a public sentiment that will be potent for good and make improvement in municipal government a comparatively easy matter.

EXPENDITURES.

1. Why should the cost of maintaining the city government be steadily increasing both in amount per capita and in percentage to real estate valuation?
2. Why should the cost of cleaning and repairing our streets be steadily and so rapidly increasing?
3. Why should the cost of maintaining our public schools increase so largely while the assistant teachers are so poorly paid?
4. Why should our water system be a continual source of expense and increasing indebtedness?

INCOME.

5. Why should the city income from all sources, except taxes and water rents, be so small in amount per capita and in percentage to real estate valuation?
6. Why should the city's income from licenses be less than in any of the large cities of the state?
7. Why should not the income from water be sufficient to pay operating expenses and interest on the cost of the water system? We certainly would have to pay on that basis, if the water system was owned by individuals or a private corporation, and should any excess income be produced it could be placed in a sinking fund to help redeem water bonds.

ASSESSABLE VALUES.

8. Why should the per capita real estate valuation of our city be steadily diminishing?
9. Why should it be less than that of most of the large cities?
10. Why should not the value of land and buildings be recorded separately upon the assessors' records?

LICENSES.

11. Why should so many licenses be granted, one for every twenty-seven families?
12. Why should low grade saloons and other disreputable places be able to secure and

maintain licenses? Is the relation they bear to the cost of maintaining the police system and poor fund ever considered, or the incalculable evil to the morals of their respective neighborhood?

FINANCIAL.

13. Why should our city finances be so adjusted that the expenditures for maintaining the city's government invariably exceeds the amount of the tax levy?

14. Why should the city be obliged to borrow \$450,000 to \$500,000 every year to pay its current expenses during the three months interim, of April, May and June, between its fiscal and financial years?

15. Why should not the record of the relative expenditures through the different boards and funds be kept in, say the treasurer's office and published each year so that services rendered to the property owning and tax paying interests could be made the test of official merit?

16. Why should not a system of records be kept so that the doings of the majority party controlling the city's government, in the interests of the property owning, tax paying and moral elements of our city, should be made the basis of party approval and continuance in power?

Alderman McMillan stated publicly at the last meeting of this council that the usefulness of the board of education was hopelessly impaired because of the school commissioners' greed for patronage—a humiliating admission that should bring a blush of shame to every honest citizen.

Is it not equally true that the greed for and abuse of patronage and favor on the part of other officials is the principal reason for the wretched condition of our city's finances? Is it not also true that greed for patronage, official spoils and abuse of authority are the principal sources of evil in municipal politics and government?

Is it not true that officials generally cater relatively a great deal more to the welfare of a few political and personal friends than to the interests of the large mass of property owners and tax payers who pay the bills without asking or expecting any favors, in the belief that "public office is a public trust," and should be treated as such?

In the matter of the claim of George Hickey for damages to his horse whose foot was

caught in the grating on Mumford street at the corner of Front street, which was referred to this committee has been under consideration and been investigated by the City Attorney's office, and we find that the horse sustained the injuries complained of without any fault on the part of Hickey, and that the injuries were so severe as to make the horse useless. The opinions of witnesses whose statements the City Attorney has secured are that the horse was worth from \$35 to \$50. And it also appears that Mr. Hickey has been to some expense for the treatment of the injuries. We regard this claim as a just one and recommend that the claim be settled for the sum of \$50.

In the matter of the claim of William McDowell for injuries to his son by falling in an insecurely covered well on the corner of Jennings and New Union street we have inquired into the matter and find that the city of Rochester has undertaken to cover a well which has heretofore existed at this place, but in the attempt to do so did it insecurely, and while the claimant's son was walking thereon the ground gave way and he fell into the well and was injured. The claim is for \$1,000, and we recommend that the same be settled at the sum of \$100.

There was due on December 6, 1893, to James Palmer for damages for sewage pollution of Thomas Creel the sum of \$300, being the annual payment under the contract between Mr. Palmer and the city. We recommend that a resolution be adopted directing the City Clerk to pay the same.

REPORT OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

By Ald. McMillan—

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen:—Your special committee appointed at the last meeting, to which was referred the matter of investigating and reporting upon a suitable suite for a central station for the police department, begs leave to make the following report:

It is evident that the present quarters for the police department are inadequate and inconvenient as they are now located in the city hall. It is also desirable that the police department should be separate and distinct from the other departments of the city, and inasmuch as the room in the city hall is not sufficient for the accommodation of the different departments and rents are being paid by the city for the accommodation of several departments outside of the city hall, it would undoubtedly save expense to provide a central station for the police department and use the room vacated by the police department in the city hall for the offices for which the city now pays rent. We have had under consideration different localities for such a central station. The most available site, however, in the opinion of the committee is that located on the west side of Exchange street, for the reason that it is near the court house and city hall and nearer to the county jail than the present police office. There are two pieces of property which are available for this purpose. One is owned by Mrs. Proctor and Nettleton, provided twenty feet front adjoining thereto can be procured from the heirs of Patrick McMahon. The other piece is a lot of about 104 feet front, owned by the heirs

of Patrick McMahon. Either one of these is in the opinion of the committee a proper location.

We have had no definite proposition for either one of these premises. We are of the opinion that if the city could purchase the property owned by Mrs. Proctor and Nettleton for the sum of \$10,000 and twenty feet adjoining thereto from the McMahon heirs at the same rate per foot front, it would be a desirable and advantageous purchase for the city. If this can not be purchased, we consider that 104 feet front of the McMahon property at the same rate would be equally desirable, and we therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the mayor to enter into a contract for either one of these premises at the figures stated, within five days after the adoption of this resolution.

1893-94, the City Treasurer was duly authorized to issue of the said bonds an amount not to exceed one million dollars, and under said authority but three hundred thousand dollars' worth of said bonds were issued, making in all of the bonds heretofore issued, but eight hundred thousand dollars' worth, and whereas, by virtue of the authority conferred upon the city by chapter 358 of the laws of 1892, the city was permitted to sell bonds to the amount of one million seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars' worth, and but eight hundred thousand dollars' worth of said bonds have been issued, leaving a balance still to be issued, under the provisions of said act, of nine hundred and fifty thousand dollars' worth, therefore,

Resolved, That the City Treasurer be, and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue bonds of the city of Rochester to an amount not to exceed \$950,000, to be known as the "Rochester Additional Water Works Bonds." Said moneys to be used for the purpose of paying the cost and expense of constructing an additional water conduit from Hemlock lake. Said bonds to be of the denomination of one thousand dollars each. Each bond to be registered and bear a rate of interest not greater than 3-1-2 per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of February and August of each year thereafter. Which bonds shall be signed by the Treasurer, sealed with the corporate seal of the city, countersigned by the Mayor and the President of the Common Council, and by the Union Trust Company of New York. And the said Union Trust Company is hereby authorized and requested to countersign the same. Said bonds shall mature in fifty years from the date of the issue thereof, and shall be redeemable at any time after the expiration of twenty years from the date of issue, and the said Treasurer shall make and keep a complete record of said bonds, including the dates thereof, the amounts and the dates of maturity thereof, the number of each bond and to whom issued, as provided by chapter 358 of the laws of 1892, entitled "An act to authorize the issue of bonds of the city of Rochester to pay for an additional water supply."

Gentlemen:—On August 30th, 1865; October 20, 1865, and April 19, 1866, there was paid into this office respectively, \$164, \$52.48, and \$164, for Oak street improvement assessment against lots w. part 343 and 344—132 feet frontage. On the new roll for the assessment, which was confirmed October 20, 1885, these lots were assessed for \$525.97.

The amounts on the old roll, which was declared void, were never credited in this instance. Had this been done when the new roll was made the amounts paid in 1865 and 1866, with accumulated interest, would have been more than sufficient to cancel the new assessment.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Forsyth—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your committee on support and relief of the poor respectfully submit the following report:

There will probably be a small deficiency in the Poor Fund at the close of the fiscal year, but not nearly the amount which was anticipated earlier in the year.

The fiscal year ends March 22nd, and the balance now on hand of the fund is \$16,336.22, which amount will be supplemented by whatever sum is received from the excise board which last year for February and March was \$5,332.50, which makes a total of \$21,668.72, assuming that the receipts from the excise will be as much this year as last.

Now the bills we paid this month amount to \$4,275.38, and the salaries for February and March amount to \$2,436.68, in addition to the payment of this amount and the \$4,275.38 it will probably require \$17,000 to meet the requirements on the fund for February and March, or a statement of the matter would be something like this.

According to this computation it will be seen that we must expect a deficiency in the Poor Fund of about \$2,000.

In view of the fact which is conceded by everyone that the past year has been without parallel in the history of our city, so far as suffering among the poor is concerned, and a consequent increased demand for aid from the unemployed and suffering, your committee heartily commend the efficient service of the Overseer of the Poor and his assistants for the extremely creditable showing which they have made in the conservation of the fund of which they have had the distribution.

At the same time we must concede that were it not for the efforts of organized charities in the city and the many contributions of charitably inclined citizens who carried into practice their inclinations, a much larger draft would have been made upon the Poor Fund, this Common Council would have been called upon to meet a much larger deficiency.

With reference to the requests made by the various hospitals in the city for an increased allowance from five dollars to eight dollars in surgical cases and an allowance of five dollars for surgical operations, your committee has up to this time delayed action although unanimously in favor of granting the very reasonable request for these allowances, on account of the almost certain prospect of a deficiency in the fund and together with the fact that such allowances were not taken in consideration at the time of the making of the appropriation for last year.

We recommend that the matter of these allowances be referred to the Finance Com-

mittee at the beginning of the next fiscal year and taken into consideration by that committee in the making up of the annual appropriation, all of which is respectfully submitted.

Gentlemen:—Your Law Committee begs leave to make the following report:

There was due on January 19, 1894, the sum of \$200 to Anna Gould upon her contract with the city for damages for sewer pollution. We recommend that a resolution be adopted directing the city clerk to pay the same.

There was also due on February 6, 1894, to Ignatz Seltenmeyer the sum of \$50 upon his contract with the city for damages for sewage pollution; we recommend that a resolution be adopted directing the City Clerk to pay the same.

In the matter of the judgments recovered against the city by Percilla Hunter, we learn that the judgments were affirmed by the general term upon an appeal taken by the city from the judgment in the circuit court. The amount recovered in the circuit court having been less than the amount for which the statute permits an appeal to be taken to the court of appeals, and the city attorney having advised the committee that no such question of law exists in the case as will secure a permission from the general term to appeal to the court of appeals, we recommend that the two judgments recovered in the case be paid, one entered on the 6th day of July, 1893, for \$483.48, with interest from that date, and the other entered on the 22nd day of January, 1894, for \$79.05, with interest from that date.

In the matter of securing the passage of an act for relief to the board of education to pay the deficiency incurred by said board, we have learned that the bill approved by this Common Council having been in the hands of the governor met with his objections and that unless withdrawn he would veto the same. That Assemblyman O'Grady by a resolution passed by the assembly, has caused the bill to be withdrawn from the governor and as we are advised the governor will approve of a bill in the following form: AN ACT to provide for the payment of certain claims against the board of education of the city of Rochester.

The people of the state of New York, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Sec. 1. All outstanding claims against the board of education of the city of Rochester which were unpaid at the commencement of the current fiscal year, the same having been contracted without specific authority of law, shall be examined and audited by a commission hereby created for that purpose to consist of the auditor, treasurer and president of the common council, of said city, which commission for the purposes of this act is hereby vested with all the powers and made subject to all the duties and liabilities conferred and imposed by existing laws and ordinances upon the auditor of said city, except that no member of said commission shall be required to furnish any bond for the performance of his duties under this act. The examination and concurrent audit of said commission shall be final as to the financial liability of said city

oa such claims, and all claims so examined and so audited shall be lawful expenditures of said board of education to the amount allowed by such audit. Any criminal liability which may exist for or on account of the expenditures so allowed, shall not be affected by this act.

Sec. 2. The Common Council of said city is hereby authorized and empowered to raise the amounts of any claims as audited by said commission, by its note or notes, or other obligation, to be executed as provided by the city charter, and to apply the amounts so raised toward the payment of said claims when audited as aforesaid. The amounts expended under this act shall be assessed and collected by said city as provided by said charter for the collection of general city taxes.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
We therefore recommend that the above proposed bill be approved by this council and forwarded to the representatives of this district to introduce and secure the passage of the same.

SHELTER AVENUE PIPE SEWER.

By Ald. Aikenhead—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a sewer in Shelter avenue.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$5,775.

By Ald. Aikenhead—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, viz:

AN ACT for the relief of certain firemen in the city of Rochester.

The People of the state of New York represented in Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Mayor of the city of Rochester is hereby authorized and empowered to grant certificates of exemption to members of the late Alert Hose Company of said city who were duly enrolled and in good standing in said company on the 1st day of November, 1893, in like manner and with the same effect as though they had served the full term of five years without pay as volunteer firemen.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

By Ald. McMillan—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—At a recent meeting of this council, a communication was presented by the alderman of the ninth, in which he took occasion to make certain statements regarding the finances and bonded indebtedness of the city, and discussed the various interests and conditions in which the city is interested, and by which they are affected.

That communication also contained a number of questions by which he sought for certain information. Those questions were of such a character that unless they were capable of being satisfactorily answered, they might lead the average citizen to the conclusion that the city's affairs were being badly administered, and that its financial policy should be placed in other hands. By reason of that fact, it was believed to be proper to have the communication referred to the finance committee, and that course was adopted.

Your committee has given to all of these questions the consideration to which they seemed to be entitled. It does not desire to question the good taste of the alderman of the ninth ward in agitating these matters. This common council has nothing to conceal, and has no fear of the result of any examination of the city's financial conditions, which the tax-payers may institute.

The only suggestion which the committee has to make to the alderman of the ninth ward, in relation to this matter is, that if the city's financial condition is so bad as he seems to believe it is, why has he not met with the committee, pointed out its mistakes and sought to correct the abuses which he seems to think exist?

He has been more than once invited to do this, and at a meeting of the common council held but a few weeks ago, the chairman of the finance committee publicly requested the alderman of the ninth ward to attend any or all of its meetings, and give to the committee the benefit of his experience and knowledge of financial affairs. This he has not seen fit to do, but has preferred rather to attack the committee and the council publicly, without offering any suggestion which might tend to the improvement in the city's affairs.

In relation to the questions, your committee has decided to take them up and answer them specifically, and in their regular order.

His first question is, Why should the cost of maintaining the city government be steadily increasing both in amount per capita, and in percentage to real estate valuation? The answer is one with which every thoughtful man is familiar. It is common experience, both in every-day life and in public affairs, that it costs more in modern times than it did formerly to maintain either an individual, a family or a community of families. The reason of this is that individuals, families and communities are not satisfied in these days with what answered every purpose in days gone by.

There was a time when dirt roads answered every requirement of traffic and travel. To-day the best quality of street pavement is demanded. There was a time when log school houses and brick fire-places were in vogue. To-day modern necessities require the erection of substantial, handsome and convenient school buildings, heated by steam and supplied with most modern conveniences to meet every want. There was a time when communities paid but little attention to the support of the class of people who are unable to support themselves. To-day a poor fund is maintained, from which any person, unable by reason of sickness or lack of employment, can secure his sustenance. As the city has grown in area and population, the cost of policing the city has increased, and that cost has increased out of proportion to the increase in population because of the crowded conditions which exist in certain quarters of the city. People familiar with the social and economic questions teach us that crime increases in any locality as the population in that locality becomes more and more dense. Every one will agree that it would be cheaper to properly police 100 villages of 1,000 inhabitants each than it is to police one city of 100,000 inhabitants. One reason for this is, that criminal characters and persons most likely to be led into criminal actions frequent the larger cities and avoid the smaller towns. Again, the great aggregation of individuals constituting a city requires vastly more attention in sanitary matters than small communities. The expenditures of the health department of the city of Rochester have increased more rapidly than either the population or the per capita wealth would seem to require.

Expenditures from protection of fire are always greater in proportion to the population in a large and crowded community than in a small city less densely populated. All these various channels for the expenditure of money have required larger expenditures in the past ten years than ever before in the history of the city.

The second question propounded by the alderman of the ninth is as follows: Why should the cost of cleaning and repairing our streets be steadily and so rapidly increasing? In reply to this question, your committee desires to submit a communication from the executive board to this committee, giving the facts in reference to the increase in this and the highway fund during the past few years, and showing more clearly than your committee could, how the money has been expended, and what the cause of such expenditure has been. This communication is attached to, and made a part of this report.

In reference to the increase of the cost in maintaining schools, as set forth in the third question of the alderman's communication, it is safe to say in answer to that question that better methods have been provided; kindergartens have been established, larger purchases of books have been required for indigent pupils, better school houses have been erected, old school houses have needed more repairs, better heating and ventilating appliances have been introduced, and, therefore, more moneys have been expended.

It is perhaps proper to say, that in the judgment of your committee, not all of the expenditures of the board of education have been justified; and perhaps it is true that more teachers have been employed than were required, but if so, steps are already being taken looking toward a reform in school methods and school management, and if retrenchment be possible, and if money can be saved in the management of the schools of the city, the adoption of the measures

instituted by this council for such reforms will hasten them.

The fourth question of the communication relates to the water supply of the city, and seems to embrace two subjects—first, the expense of maintaining the present system, and second, the additional indebtedness now being incurred to provide an additional supply. With the second part, your committee has no desire to waste time upon a discussion. The policy of the city has been settled, and an additional supply has been provided for, and public sentiment generally concedes that the delay in securing that additional supply has already been too great. So far as the expense of maintaining the present system is concerned, it is sufficient to say that the records of the executive board show that the board covered into the city treasurer the sum of \$285,000 in round numbers after the payment of all the expenses of maintaining the present system during the fiscal year of 1892 and 1893, and that the estimated amount to be covered into the treasury during the year 1893-4, submitted by the executive board, was the sum of \$325,000. When it is remembered that the interest upon the city's water debt created for the present supply is but \$251,440, it is apparent that there is a net profit to the city of \$30,000 in the year 1892-3, and approximately \$75,000 in the year 1893-4.

The fifth question relates to the city's income from all sources, except taxes and water rates, and the reason why the city has no large income from sources other than taxes and water rents is, that the city has no large investments to produce an income. It is possible that a different policy should be adopted, and that license fees should more generally be imposed and be larger in amount. If so, the matter is easily remedied, and the fees to be collected from hackmen, cabmen, theaters, etc., might be easily increased. There may, however, be a difference of opinion as to the advisability of extending this method of indirect taxation.

The sixth question seems to be covered by the fifth question, and the answer to the fifth, is, perhaps, a sufficient answer to the sixth.

In reply to the seventh question, as to why the income from water should not be sufficient to pay operating expenses, and the interest on the cost of the water system, the reply of your committee is to the effect that the income is sufficient for both purposes. There is annually included in the tax levy the sum of \$100,000, which sum is collected and paid over to the executive board for the water consumed by the city, for all purposes, including extinguishment of fires, street sprinkling, consumption in public buildings, schools, etc., etc. It is certainly fair that this amount should be paid by the city as a consumer, to the city as a producer; and including the item of \$100,000 there is an annual profit to the city after the payment of the cost of maintenance and interest on the water debt. But even if there were no profit, and if the amount included in the tax levy for water consumed by the city were double or treble the sum heretofore included, the raising of such a sum is justifiable and proper. The city at large has the benefit of the consumption of that water, and the city at large should pay for it in proportion to the amount of benefit which every individual composing the city receives.

The eighth question in the communication of the alderman of the ninth is as follows: Why should the per capita real estate of our city be steadily diminishing? The answer is, that it is not diminishing as certified by the city assessors. In 1890 the assessed valuation of the city's real estate per capita was

\$656.20, and in 1892 the amount per capita was \$668.05.

In reply to the ninth question in the communication of Alderman Johnston, why is it lower than most of the large cities of the country, your committee has been curious to see whether the implied statement therein contained was supported by facts, and has therefore carefully examined the statement of the alderman of the ninth, and published at page 372 of the proceedings of 1892-3 of the Common Council. This statement contains a list of twenty-six cities, of which Rochester is one; but the list, as compiled by the alderman of the ninth, does not contain the names of many of the large cities of the country, and the statement made in his communication that Rochester's assessed valuation per capita is lower than that of most cities of the country is not borne out by his own figures. The following are some of the cities which he has omitted from his list: Washington, New Orleans, San Francisco, Indianapolis, Jersey City, Galveston, Richmond, Atlanta, Toledo, Portland, Oregon, and Springfield, Mass., cities equally entitled to be considered with those contained in his published list. And your committee ventures to say that if the figures of these cities were at hand, it would be found that Rochester's assessed valuation per capita would compare favorably with the assessed valuation of a majority of the cities of the country of similar size and circumstances.

Question ten, as contained in the communication referred to by this committee, asks why the value of lands and buildings should not be set out separately on the assessors' books. This question is old straw which needs no more threshing. It might be of benefit to insurance adjusters in determining the value of homes destroyed by fire.

Question eleven is, why should so many licenses be granted? One for every twenty-seven families? This is a question for the excise commissioners, and not this Common Council to deal with.

Question twelve treats of the saloon question, and asks whether the cost of maintaining the police system and poor fund are ever considered in the relation they bear to the license question? The answer is, that the alderman of the ninth has the same opportunity as an individual, that any citizen has, to discuss this question, and if he should see fit, he might suggest measures of reform to the legislature, which has the sole power to deal with the question; this Common Council has no authority whatever in the premises.

Question thirteen relates to the city's finances once more, and asks why the expenditures for maintaining the city government invariably exceeds the amount of the tax levy. To begin with, the implied statement that they do invariably exceed the tax levy has no foundation in fact. For the fiscal year 1892-93 every fund under control of the Common Council, except the contingent fund, was sufficient to pay the expenses of conducting every department of the city government, under the council's control, and leave a satisfactory balance at the close of the fiscal year.

The contingent fund, at the time the Common Council became Republican in its majority, had a deficiency of \$92,000. That deficiency has been steadily reduced year by year, and it is believed that for the present year it will not exceed \$50,000. Notwithstanding the fact, the increased election expenses made necessary by the adoption of the ballot reform law have enormously increased the drain upon this fund. The character of the fund is such that its necessities

cannot be definitely known in advance. And as the city is now able to borrow money for those necessities, as they arise, at a rate of interest not greater than 3 1/2 per cent. or 3 3/4 per cent. which moneys it carries in the local banks, and upon which it receives 4 per cent. per annum on daily balances, it is not thought that the city suffers seriously from that course of action.

Question fourteen asks why the city should be obliged to borrow \$450,000 to \$500,000 every year to pay its current expenses during the months of April, May and June. The answer is familiar to every one having the slightest knowledge of the provisions of the city charter. The fiscal year commences on April 1st, at which time the Common Council proceeds at once with the work of making up its estimates for the year, and putting these estimates in shape for collection, and the money thus to be collected is not available until July, when the collection of taxes begins. The only remedy for this would be by an amendment of the charter to provide that the outgoing Common Council should, during the month of January, make up the estimates, and provide for the collection of the taxes during the month of April. If this were to be done, it would bring the tax levies but nine months apart, instead of twelve months as is now the case. It may be that this course should be adopted; but if adopted, it would result in a certain amount of hardship by bringing the tax levies for two years so close together, and the only loss which the city suffers by the present method is the loss by interest upon the money which it borrows, less the amount which the city receives upon its deposits for the same period.

Your committee knows of no good reason why the records suggested in question fifteen, should be kept, so long as there is no deficiency or misappropriation of the fund, as is conceded by the alderman of the ninth to be the case at the present time. It matters but little to the average tax-payer what the increase in expenditures may be in relation to the several funds from year to year.

In answer to the sixteenth question, your committee would call the attention of the alderman of the ninth to the fact that every transaction of the city government is only recorded in the proceedings of either the common council, executive board, or board of education, and monthly reports are made by the executive board which are regularly published, and all departments and committees make an annual report at the end of the fiscal year, which are always published in the official proceedings.

In conclusion, it is proper to state that large amounts of money have been borrowed by the city since September last, on short time paper, and an explanation of such borrowing may be due to those citizens and tax-payers who have not kept themselves familiar with the reasons which made such loans necessary.

It will be remembered that the city is now engaged in the construction of a new conduit at Hemlock lake. \$500,000 worth of bonds were sold in the summer of '92 and the proceeds thereof were used in paying for the work as it progressed. The same amount of sewer bonds were sold at the same time for the purpose of paying for the cost of the construction of the East Side trunk sewer. It was intended at that time to sell additional bonds in July or August, 1893, but on account of the stringency in the money market it was found impossible to sell these bonds during the summer of 1893, at any price at all satisfactory to the city authorities. The finance committee and treasurer having in charge the negotiations of such

bonds were unwilling to sell them, running as they may for fifty years, at a rate of interest greater than 3-1-2 per cent. per annum, and this they have been unable to accomplish. They did, however, sell \$300,000 worth of water bonds and \$150,000 worth of sewer bonds, which were delivered on December 1st, and bear interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum. A satisfactory premium of about 2 per cent. was received on this sale.

With the moneys thus secured, and other moneys which the city has been able to borrow on short time notes at low rates of interest, the work of continuing the conduit and sewer has been carried on, and the time is rapidly approaching when the balance of the bonds needed for these two great undertakings will undoubtedly be floated, bearing a rate of interest at 3 per cent., and certainly not greater than 3-1-2 per cent. per annum. When such sales shall be effected, the notes heretofore given will be paid out of the moneys to be provided, and the city will find itself with its debt, incurred for water and sewer purposes, bearing 3 or 3-1-2 per cent. per annum, instead of 4, 4-1-2 or even a higher rate, as might have been the case had a sale of the bonds been forced during the period of depression.

Your committee, therefore, believes that when the citizens generally understand the causes which have led to the action which has been taken, and the motives which have inspired the finance committee and the treasurer throughout the entire year, that criticism of its actions will cease.

To the Finance Committee of the Common Council:

To the question "Why should the cost of cleaning and repairing our streets be so steadily and so rapidly increasing," which was submitted to the common council, referred to your committee and finally transmitted to the executive board for information, the following reply is respectfully made:

An answer to this brief but broad and general question in all that it implies would involve a presentation of the details of expenditure in the street department for several years past, and the causes and reasons for such outlay, which would be voluminous enough to form a pamphlet of very fair proportions. These details are on file, together with all records of moneys expended, in the office of the executive board, and accessible to any inquiring citizen or taxpayer, where an explanation of all items of outlay is always freely and frankly given.

A somewhat detailed statement, however, of expenditures of the street department has been made for some years past in the annual reports of the executive board, which are compiled and published for the information of the public, and any more elaborate statement would merely confuse, and not convince, those seeking such information.

Therefore any reply must necessarily be of a most general character, leaving to those who wish to go deeper into the subject the alternative of examining the office records for itemized proof bearing upon the subject matter in question.

In a table submitted to your committee on the occasion of your investigation of Alderman Johnston's charges, three of the principal lines of expenditures were given as follows: Repairs and maintenances of streets, alleys,

places and sewers; removal of ashes, rubbish and snow; cleaning streets and removal of dirt. Now from that date it appears that repairs and maintenance cost as follows: In 1880-1, \$25,261.53; in 1892-3, \$50,739.35.

In 1885-6 (at which time a separate record began to be kept of ashes and snow removal) the cost was \$23,356.63; in 1892-3, \$71,213.88. Cleaning and removal of dirt from streets cost as follows: In 1880-81, \$25,635.44; in 1892-3, \$65,482.93.

This addition to the expenditures in a period of ten years is pronounced extraordinary and unwarrantable, but an examination of the table referred to will show that the increase has been gradual and natural.

It is a matter of record that the added population of the city of Rochester in the period above given was over 56,000 and this increase was not in the business or the older residential parts of the city, but in the suburban districts.

In 1880 and down to the middle of the last few years, repairs, ash collection and dirt removal were confined almost entirely to the central wards and the main streets of the old wards from the eighth up to the fourteenth ward. The fifteenth and sixteenth wards and parts of the old twelfth, thirteenth and fourteenth wards were to a large extent, farm lands or unimproved tracts of property, which within this time have been built up with houses and residences by the laborer, mechanic, merchant and millionaire, comprising a large percentage of the increase of population who either settled in the city or who moved from the central wards to the outlying districts to make room for the influx of workers or artisans who located among us and benefited by the era of prosperity which our city has been enjoying. Investors and capitalists took advantage of this boom and laid out parcels of land, hitherto unimproved, into streets, parks and avenues, erected houses and blocks, equipped them with all modern conveniences, and demanded, as they had a right to do, their share of the public moneys, so that their property on which they were called to pay large taxes, because of its improved condition, and on which they had invested large sums of money, might be made suitable for occupancy, rental or sale. All of the general funds had to contribute to this purpose, and none more so than the highway fund.

The fifteenth and sixteenth wards have an area of nearly 7,000 acres, while the old fourteen wards cover only 5,065 acres. The two first named wards border the city on the east and west, and extend from its southern to its northern boundaries, a distance of about five miles. This large area of the city is but sparsely populated, and the expense of the removal of ashes, rubbish and the care and maintenance of streets is greatly augmented and far in excess of what it would cost for the same service and work in districts which are compactly built up instead of being so scattered. It is an error, therefore, to make comparison between the expenditure and the population of a city, for it can be proven beyond reasonable doubt that a city closely built up and thickly populated will not require any such outlay for street purposes as the same number of people occupying houses scattered over a large area of territory.

The time required to do the same amount of work is the element involved, and which adds to the expense. Within a few years past the executive board has sent its laborers, teams and carts into this new territory, and extended to it the same service as it had previously given in the old fourteen wards. Such service means removal of ashes and rubbish, grading and turnpiking streets, sewer

repairs, construction of crosswalks and the expenditure of funds for divers purposes which owners of property claim is their right to have and enjoy. All this means expenditures out of proportion to the population in those districts, because of the long distances the men and teams have to travel both in gathering rubbish and hauling it to dumping grounds a mile or more from the place of work. Such extension of service has called for more men, carts, tools and material, all of which demands on the highway fund constitute one of the many causes for the rapid increase of expenditures in this department within a few years.

Another cause is that the demand for cleaner streets, the purchase of sweeping machines which, instead of working one night or so a week on Main or State streets, are now kept going every night of the week on nearly every improved street or avenue, except the asphalt or wood pavements, and instead of one or two being so employed, as formerly, there are seven or more engaged nightly in this service. The sweeping must be followed with hand labor and teams for the removing of the sweepings so that during the spring, summer and fall seasons, a night and day force have been constantly at work on the streets. This class of work has only been done for a few years past and a large amount of money has been expended on it. This was in accord with public sentiment and the demands of the press.

Again, ten years, or even five years ago, the scraping of paved streets was chiefly done in the spring of the year, and occasionally in the fall, but for a few years past such streets have been scraped and the dirt removed from them many times between March and December. This frequent removal of the dirt from the improved roadways has been made necessary by the increase of traffic and the vast number of houses and buildings erected in the last few years; and the hauling of material to and from such property, as everybody may have observed, littered the streets with dirt and debris, and left them in such a condition as to render their frequent scraping and cleaning an absolute necessity. Clean streets and alleys are demanded by the people both for the health and appearance of the city, but the work cannot be done for any meager appropriation, or for any such as was set apart for this purpose many years ago.

The improvement of roadways and walks which has kept pace with the rapid growth of the city required a large addition to the force of common laborers, mechanics and foremen. In the old wards, especially from the tenth to the sixteenth inclusive, there are miles of plank walks that need constant inspection to keep in regular and safe condition.

Notice, according to law, must be served owners, and failure on their part to do the work must be followed by repairs made by the city, and a large force of men must be constantly unemployed on this branch of the service to save the city suits for damages. Notwithstanding the efforts of the board in this direction, a large number of claims are yearly filed against the city for accidents arising out of defective walks and roadways. Where repairs are made or snow removed from premises, the actual cost of labor and material is collected from the property owner; but this sum is but a small percentage of the amount paid for this kind of labor because the inspection must be maintained, although a large number of the citizens notified repair their own walks after notice has been served.

Perhaps the following table, showing the extraordinary increase in miles of streets and alleys improved, and the cost of the same,

will establish the fact that the additional area of streets and the miles of sewers within a few years afford some reason or cause for the growth in the amount of the highway fund, when it is understood that every new street and alley improved, as well as every new street opened and dedicated to public use, at once becomes a source of expense for care and maintenance.

Referring again to the old outside wards (fifteenth and sixteenth) the records show that there are now laid in this territory over five miles of asphalt and brick paved streets, and over thirteen miles of Medina, McAdam and gravel improved roadways.

Those improvements to a large extent have been made in the past five years, and while the asphalt and brick paved streets are in many instances taken care of by local tax, the thirteen miles of other pavements have to be maintained, swept and cleaned by expenditure from the highway fund.

In the year 1892-3 alone there were almost five miles of sewers added to the sewer system of the city, and over five miles of sidewalks. Every additional mile of sewer, street and sidewalk means additional expense to the highway fund.

The increase of the work of sweeping and scraping of streets is shown by the following statement.

These are some of the principal lines of work for which money has to be expended from the highway fund: Removal of ashes; cleaning crosswalks; removing snow and ice; scraping streets and removal of dirt; repairing of unimproved roadways; care of stationary bridges and repairs; care and maintenance of lift bridges; repairs of sidewalks; sweeping, and removal of sweepplugs; repairing of improved roadways; building and repairing stone sidewalks; building and repairing wood crosswalks, main sewers, laterals, culverts and ditches; repairs of surface sewers, gutters, etc.

Now to take proper care of the above larger number of miles of streets, exclusive of the main sewers, laterals and sidewalks, in this growing city, demands time, labor and expenditure of money; and if the city prospers and grows as it has during the last six years the highway expenditure will go on increasing in a natural and proper way, unless a policy of neglect and indifference to the wants and interests of the people is inaugurated, crippling and hindering its advancement on some shallow pretense of reform. Prudent methods and wise discretion may not always be exercised, nor is it claimed that the administration of municipal affairs is always an exhibition of ideal economy; but it can be safely asserted that it is reasonably just, equitable and prudent, according to the conflicting interests which exist in any community, and with the means and class of labor which every city must employ. Rochester will grow under liberal treatment in its public expenditures, and stagnate under false economy, as surely as effect follows cause.

Finally, the highway department will, doubtless, come under public criticism for political purposes next year or three years from now for the large expenditures during the present winter, when the cause, which gave rise to such outlay, viz.: the amelioration of the general distress of the working classes and suffering of the poor, shall have been forgotten.

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE BOARD FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

By Ald. H. G. Cook, by request of Ald. Pauckner—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City Rochester.

Gentlemen:—In the matter of the removal of remains from, and settlement of claims of lot owners of West Brighton Rural Cemetery, as provided in chapter 228 of the laws of 1893, we would respectfully submit the following report, showing that all bodies have been removed as directed and reinterred in Mt. Hope cemetery or other cemeteries and all claims properly proven, settled and deeds executed to the city of Rochester as approved by the City Attorney.

The balance of the \$1,500 appropriated by the above act, amounting to \$413.30 is by said act directed to be paid into the Perpetual Care Fund of Mt. Hope Cemetery for the benefit of lot purchased for reinterments.

Out of a total of 82 lots in said cemetery,

as shown by the only detailed map which this commission has been able to obtain, only 10 (for which proof of ownership was submitted and title given) were paid for at the rate of eight dollars each.

One hundred and thirty-seven (137) removals of remains were made, out of which 130 were taken to Mt. Hope, and an accurate map made showing the name and location of every body so removed, and the balance to other cemeteries.

The lot thus acquired by the city has a frontage of 107 feet on Mt. Hope avenue and is 204 feet in depth.

M., due notice of sale being given in the official paper of the city, as well as in three papers published in New York city, \$950,000 worth of additional water supply bonds, and \$250,000 worth of East Side trunk sewer bonds. These bonds were offered at par, rate of interest, 3 1-2 per cent. per annum.

I received no bids for the sewer bonds but sold \$100,000 of additional water supply bonds at par, rate of interest, 3 1-2 per cent., bonds to be dated March 1, 1894, fifty years time, with privilege of redemption by the city after twenty years. The Monroe County Savings Bank purchased \$50,000 worth of these bonds; the Security Trust Co., \$40,000; and B. D. McAlpine, Esq., \$10,000.

By advice of the chairman of Finance Committee and the City Attorney I adjourned sale to March 20, 1894.

AN ACT To amend chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled, "An act to further amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled 'An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester,' and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of said city," and the several acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto.

The people of the state of New York, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section one hundred and eleven of chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act to further amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled 'An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester, and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of said city,'" is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 3. The treasurer of the city of Rochester shall place to the credit of a fund known as the "sinking fund of the city of Rochester for the redemption of the city's bonded debt," such sums of money raised pursuant to section 18 of chapter 193 of the laws of 1888, and the amendments thereto as may remain after the payment of the interest upon the bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of said act; the difference between the amount received from the New York, Lake Erie & Western Railroad Company and the amount necessary to pay any bonds of the Genesee Valley railroad and the interest thereon; the amount received as rent for the arsenal site; the percentage of the gross receipts of the Rochester Railway Company contracted to be paid to the city, all surplus receipts for water rents and any moneys now in his possession received from any of the above sources not otherwise appropriated and the amount so credited and the additions and accretions thereto shall constitute a fund for the redemption of the city's bonded debt

and for that purpose only. The common council of said city shall on or before the 1st day of June, 1894, and every third year thereafter, appoint a citizen of said city, other than a city officer or employe, who with the mayor, treasurer and president of the common council of said city shall constitute the board of trustees of said sinking fund, which shall be a body corporate, and shall have the care and direction of said sinking fund, subject to the ordinances of the common council. Said trustees are hereby authorized and empowered to call in, pay and redeem any portion of the bonded debt now or hereafter a charge upon said city (for redemption of which no special provision of law exists except the bonds issued pursuant to chapter 193 of the laws of 1888) whenever they may deem it to be advantageous for the interest of said city so to do. Said sinking fund shall be used solely in the redemption and payment of the city's bonded debt and when there are no such city obligations falling due upon which the same can be applied, they may be used in the purchase of any of the city's bonds, not due, or any city bonds to be issued, or may be invested in such other manner as such board of trustees may elect, or may be deposited in such banks at the highest rate of interest obtainable, as shall be selected by said trustees, until such bonds may fall due to the payment to which they can be applied, and whenever any of the bonds of said city are about to be issued, the trustees of said sinking fund shall, at their option, be permitted to purchase so much or so many of them as they may desire at their par value for investment in said sinking fund, and shall hold the same as a part of said sinking fund. Said trustees shall each year at the last meeting in March present to the common council a detailed statement of the receipts, disbursements and investments made during the then past year, pursuant to the provisions of this act; the several securities and investments held (whether cancelled or not) stating the law under and the purpose for which the same were respectively issued, giving their respective amounts, date of issue, and maturity and the numbers of bonds or securities and the rate of interest payable thereon, together with any other proper description of the same; the amount of interest paid on such deposit; what city bonds maturing during the then past year have been paid out of said sinking fund; the several amounts in which city bonds have been issued, the dates of their issue, the rate of interest payable, the times when the interest and principal of the respective bonds fall due, and also the authority under and the object or purpose for which they were respectively issued. When, by any act authorizing the creation of any part of the present funded debts, any property or revenues of the city were pledged or appropriated to the payment of any such funded debt, such property or revenues shall continue to be so pledged and appropriated to the payment of the bonds or certificates which shall, by virtue of this act, be substituted for such part or parts of such funded debt.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

AN ACT to amend chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled, "An act to further amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled 'An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester' and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of said city," and the several acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section six of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 6. The officers of said city shall be one mayor, one treasurer, three members of the executive board, two judges of the municipal court, one police justice, one supervisor for each ward, one alderman for each ward, one constable for each ward, and five members of the board of education, all to be elected by the electors of the city, by ballot, as hereinafter provided; one city clerk, one auditor, one city attorney, one overseer of the poor, three assessors, one sealer of weights and measures, one city surveyor, two police commissioners and one police clerk, to be appointed as hereinafter provided, and such other officers as are, by this charter or other law, to be elected or appointed.

Sec. 2. Section seven of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 7. An election shall be held in each ward annually on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in March, at such places as shall be designated by the Common Council, of which a notice shall be published by the city clerk for at least six days previous to the election, in all the daily newspapers of the city, at which election there shall be chosen by the electors of the city, voting in their respective wards, as often as the term of office of the then incumbent shall expire, within the year after such election, one mayor, who shall hold his office for two years; one police justice, who shall hold his office for four years; one treasurer, who shall hold his office for two years; and also, by the electors of each ward, one supervisor, whose term of office shall be the same as that of the supervisors from the towns of Monroe county, and the terms of office of the supervisors now in office in said city shall end at the same time as the terms of town supervisors now in office; and also one constable, who shall hold his office for one year; and at the election held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in March, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, there shall also be chosen by the electors of the fourth and of all the odd wards, except the third ward, one alderman from each of said wards, and at the election held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in March, eighteen hundred and ninety-five, one alderman, from the third ward and all the even wards, except the fourth ward; each of whom shall hold his office for two years, and thereafter aldermen shall be elected for two years as the terms expire of those elected from the respective wards. The aldermen now in office shall continue to hold office as representing the territory from which they were elected, notwithstanding the change of ward numbers until their terms of office shall severally expire. Also at the

election held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in March, eighteen hundred and ninety-five, there shall be elected by the electors of the whole city, five members of the board of education who shall hold their office for the following terms: The one having the highest number of votes, for five years, the one having second highest number of votes, for four years; the one third highest, three years; the one fourth highest, two years, and the one fifth highest, one year; should any two or more members so voted for have an equal number of votes the term of such members shall be determined by the Common Council. At every annual charter election thereafter there shall be elected by the electors of the whole city one member of the board of education who shall hold his office for the term of five years. The city treasurer shall not be entitled to enter upon his office until he shall have executed and filed with the mayor a bond in the penal sum of fifty thousand dollars, or such other sum as the Common Council may have fixed, with good and sufficient sureties, approved by the mayor, in writing thereon, and conditioned for the faithful performance of all his duties as treasurer, and of all the duties imposed upon him by law, in respect to the money, property and affairs of the said city. The execution of such bond by the treasurer and sureties shall be duly acknowledged or approved so as to entitle it to be read in evidence, and it shall be the duty of the mayor to cause such bond to be recorded in the Monroe county clerk's office and a copy of such bond, as so recorded, certified by the said county clerk, shall be as good evidence in all courts and places as his original bond, which shall be safely kept by the mayor, after being recorded as aforesaid. Not less than thirty days after the passage of this act, and in every second year thereafter, the mayor shall appoint an auditor, whose term of office shall be for two years, or until his successor shall have been duly appointed and qualified. The said auditor shall enter upon his duties on the first Monday in May after his appointment. The said auditor shall not be entitled to enter upon his office until he shall have executed and filed with the mayor of said city a bond in the penal sum of five thousand dollars, or such other sum as the Common Council shall fix with sufficient sureties, approved by the mayor, in writing, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties as such auditor, and the duties imposed upon him by law. The said auditor shall receive a salary not to exceed three thousand dollars per annum, payable monthly, as other city officers are paid, such salary to be fixed by the Common Council, annually, as other salaries are fixed. It shall be his duty to examine and pass upon all debts, demands and claims against said city, and each and every of its boards, officers and agents, including the board of education and the executive board of said city, before the same shall be ordered paid, and he shall keep a book, in which shall be recorded an account of each debt, demand and claim presented to him, and the sum allowed upon each, and he shall render to the Common Council, the board of education or executive board, detailed monthly reports of all such debts, demands and claims presented to, and allowed by him, as aforesaid, and all bills, dues and demands contracted or incurred during the preceding months, which have been presented to him for audit aforesaid, and except as otherwise provided by law, and except the fixed salaries of officers paid by the city, no debt, demand or claim payable from the city treasury, shall be paid, except the same be passed upon by said auditor and cer-

tified by him to the body, board or officer whose duty it shall be to pay the same, and if he objects to any debt, demand or claim, in whole or in part, such objection shall be by him presented in writing to said bodies, officers and boards, respectively, whose duty it shall be to investigate the grounds of such objection before finally auditing or determining the manner of disposal thereof. Provided, however, that said auditor may weekly examine and pass upon by items any statement of claims, dues or demands for labor performed, which shall be certified to him for audit by said executive board, and upon such audit by the auditor, certified by him, under his hand, to such board, a sum of sums not exceeding, in the aggregate, five thousand dollars in any one week, may be drawn by the clerk of said board by orders or warrants made directly upon the city treasurer, who shall pay the same, when there are funds for the purpose, as is provided by section one hundred and forty-eight of this charter, as amended in eighteen hundred and ninety. Said auditor may examine, on oath, to be administered by him, any person, firm or corporation who presents an account, claim, due or demand, touching the validity of such account, claim, due or demand, and false swearing during such examination, shall be deemed willful perjury, and punishable as such, and said auditor shall not audit such account, claim, due or demand where such person, firm or corporation, or the duly authorized agent or officer thereof, presenting the same shall refuse to submit to such an examination and oath. The said auditor shall make to the mayor and common council of said city, at the last meeting thereof in each fiscal year, a report in writing, embracing a summary of the business transacted in his office during the preceding year.

Sec. 3. Section one hundred twenty-three of said act is hereby amended so as read as follows:

Sec. 123. On and after the first Monday of April, eighteen hundred and ninety-five, the board of education of said city of Rochester, shall consist of five members. If any vacancy in said board is caused by the death, resignation, removal from the city as a member, or occurs from any other cause, the common council shall appoint a person to fill such vacancy until the ensuing charter election. At such election a member shall be elected by the electors of the whole city for the unexpired term, if any existed. No person shall be eligible to the office of member of said board who is not an elector and free holder of said city. The commissioners of common schools now in office in said city, shall continue to hold office as representing the territory from which they are elected until the first Monday of April, 1895, when their terms of office shall severally expire. The board of education of said city of Rochester as heretofore constituted is hereby abolished from and after the first Monday of April, 1895.

Sec. 4. Section one hundred twenty-four of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 124. Said members when so elected, and after they shall have qualified as required by the provisions of this act, shall constitute a board, to be known and designated as "The Board of Education of the City of Rochester." Said board shall be a corporate body in relation to all the powers and duties conferred upon it by virtue of this act, and by the general statutes of this state respecting common schools and shall be vested with all the power and authority which were vested in or pertained to the

board of education of said city, as constituted at the time of the passage of this act. The said board of education shall possess all the powers and be subject to all the duties and responsibilities of trustees of common schools in the towns of this state, in respect to the schools mentioned in this title, so far as the same are applicable, and are not inconsistent with this act, and shall pay the compensation of the teachers of the said schools, and all other expenses thereof, out of the moneys raised by tax, under this act, or received from the state, for the support of the common schools.

Sec. 5. Section one hundred twenty-five of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 125. Said board shall have in all respects the superintendence, supervision and management of the common schools in said city, and from time to time adopt, alter, modify and repeal, as they may deem expedient, rules and regulations for their organization, government, visitation and instruction, for the reception of pupils and their transfer from one school to another, and generally for the promotion of their good order, prosperity and public utility. It shall have authority to make and enforce necessary rules, regulations and by-laws for the transaction of the business, and establish the qualifications necessary for the teachers of said public schools, their employment, rate and manner of compensation. It shall appoint and employ a superintendent, clerks, assistants, janitors and employes, and pay their compensation.

The said board shall have power, and it shall be their duty,

1. To establish and organize in the several wards of said city, such, and so many schools, including common schools now existing therein, as they shall deem requisite and expedient, and to alter and discontinue the same.

2. To establish and maintain a school for the discipline of incorrigible pupils.

3. To hire school houses and rooms and improve them as they may deem proper.

4. To alter, enlarge, improve and repair school houses and appurtenances as they may deem advisable. Whenever such board shall build, enlarge, repair or furnish a school house or school houses, or make any improvements or repairs, the cost of which shall exceed two hundred and fifty dollars, the board shall proceed as follows:

(a). It shall advertise for bids for the period of two weeks, at least twice in each week, in two newspapers published in the city of Rochester, and which resolution providing for the same shall be entered in full by the clerk on the record of the proceedings of said board.

(b). The bids, duly sealed up, shall be filed with the clerk by twelve o'clock noon of the last day, as stated in the advertisement.

(c). The bids shall be opened at the next meeting of the board and publicly read by the clerk.

(d). Each bid shall contain the name of every person interested in the same, and shall be accompanied by a sufficient guarantee of some disinterested person, that if the bid is accepted a contract will be entered into and the performance of it properly secured by bonds duly approved.

(e). If the work bid for embraces both labor and materials, each must be separately stated with the price therefor. The board may, in its discretion, accept any bid for either labor or material or both which shall

be most advantageous to the city, or it may reject any and all bids as the interest of the city may require.

5. To purchase exchange or improve and repair school apparatus, furniture and appendages and to defray their contingent expenses.

6. To have the custody and safe keeping of the school houses, out-houses, fences, books, furniture and appendages and to see that the ordinances of the common council in relation thereto be observed.

7. To pay the wages of all teachers out of the moneys appropriated and provided by law for the support of schools in said city, so far as the same shall be sufficient, and the residue thereof, from the money authorized by this charter to be raised for that purpose by tax upon said city.

8. To defray the necessary contingent expenses of the board, including an annual salary to the superintendent and members of said board.

9. Whenever, in the opinion of the board, it may be advisable to sell any of the school houses, lots or sites, or any of the school property now or hereafter belonging to the city, to report the same to the common council.

10. To prepare and report to the common council such ordinances, regulations and resolutions as may be necessary or proper for the protection, safe keeping and preservation of the school houses, lots and sites and appurtenances, and all the property belonging to the city connected with or appertaining to the schools, and to suggest proper penalties for the violation of such ordinances, regulations and resolutions.

Section 6. Section one hundred twenty-six of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 126. The several wards of the city of Rochester shall constitute one school district for all purposes, except as herein otherwise provided, and the schools therein shall be free to all children between the ages of five and twenty-one years residing in such wards.

Section 7. Section one hundred twenty-seven of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 127. The title of the school houses, sites, lots, furniture, books, apparatus and appurtenances, and all other school property in this act mentioned, shall remain and continue to be in the said city of Rochester. The common council of said city may, upon the recommendation of the board of education hereinbefore mentioned, sell any of the school houses, lots or sites, or any other school property now or hereafter belonging to said city, upon such terms as the said common council may deem reasonable. The proceeds of such sales shall be paid to the treasurer of the city, and shall be by the said common council again expended in the purchase, repairs or improvements of other school houses, lots, sites or school furniture, apparatus or appurtenances.

Section 8. Section one hundred twenty-eight of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 128. The said board of education shall have power to allow the children of persons not resident within the city to attend any of the schools of said city, under the care and control of said board, upon such terms as said board shall, by resolution, prescribe, fixing the tuition which shall be paid therefor. Children of school age whose parents or guardians reside out of the city of Rochester, shall not be admitted to any public school therein, until the receipt of the city treasurer is presented to the board showing that tuition for such schooling has been paid

into the city treasury, each term in advance, according to the rates established by said board.

Section 9. Section one hundred twenty-nine of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 129. No member of the board of education shall vote for the payment of any money out of any of the funds authorized to be raised by this title of the city charter, knowing that such fund is without money to pay the same, or by vote or otherwise create any debt or liability beyond the amount of any particular fund, for the then current fiscal year. And any person violating this provision shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or be imprisoned in the Monroe county penitentiary for the period of ten days. And the district attorney of the county of Monroe is hereby specially directed and it shall be his duty, to prosecute all persons violating this provision, upon the complaint of any taxpayer of said city.

Section 10. Section one hundred thirty of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 130. Said board shall meet on Monday of each and every week and as much oftener as they shall from time to time appoint, and a majority of said board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The said board shall elect one of their number president, who shall, when present, preside at all meetings of said board, and shall have power to call special meetings of the board upon the request of a majority of the members of said board. In the absence of the president, the board shall elect some other member to preside at such meetings and perform the duties of the president during such absence. No member of said board of education shall, during the period he holds said office, be appointed to, or be competent to hold any other office of which the emoluments are paid by the city treasury, or be directly or indirectly interested in any contract as principal, surety or otherwise, the performance of any work, or the furnishing of any materials or supplies for the city of Rochester, directly or by another person, the expense or consideration thereof are to be paid under any ordinance, resolution or order of the board of education. No member of said board shall vote for the payment of any such bill for materials or supplies after notice that any member of said board is interested therein, or in the payment thereof. Any violation of this section shall be deemed a misdemeanor and punishable as such.

Section 11. Section one hundred thirty-one of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 131. It shall be the duty of said board, in all its expenditures and contracts, to have reference to the amount of moneys which shall be subject to their order during the then current year for the particular expenditure in question, and not to exceed that amount; and they shall apply the moneys raised and received by them for the support of common schools in said city, in such a manner as shall secure equal educational advantages to all the children over five and under twenty-one years of age, by continuing the schools in each district an equal period, as near as may be.

Section 12. Section one hundred thirty-two of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 132. The said board shall be trustees of the school library or libraries in said city, and all the provisions of the law which are

now or hereafter may be passed relative to the district school libraries, shall apply to the said commissioners. They shall also be vested with the same discretion as to the disposition of all moneys appropriated by any laws of this state for the purchase of libraries which is therein conferred upon the inhabitants of school districts. It shall be their duty to provide for the safe keeping of the library or libraries. The superintendent of schools shall be the general librarian, who shall have the care of the books and supervise the letting out and return thereof, and the said board, or the general librarian under the direction or by the resolution of said board, may make all purchases of books and exchange, have bound, or cause to be repaired, the damaged books belonging thereto, and to sell any books which may be deemed useless, applying the proceeds as ordered by resolution of the board.

Section 13. Section one hundred thirty-three of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 133. The common council of the said city shall have the power to pass such ordinances and regulations as the said board of education may report as necessary or proper for the protection, safe keeping, care and preservation of the school houses, lots, sites, appurtenances and appendages, libraries, and all necessary property belonging to or connected with the schools in said city, and to impose proper penalties for the violation thereof, subject to the restrictions and limitations contained in this charter; and all such penalties shall be collected in the same manner that the penalties for the violation of city ordinances are by law collected, and when collected shall be paid to the treasurer of the city, and be subject to the order of the board of education, in the same manner as other moneys raised pursuant to this charter.

Section 14. Section one hundred thirty-four of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 134. Said board shall appoint a clerk at an annual salary of not to exceed twelve hundred dollars, who shall keep a record of all proceedings of the board; and perform such other service and duty as the board shall from time to time direct. The said record or transcript thereof, certified by the president and clerk, shall be received in all courts as prima facie evidence of the facts therein set forth, and such records and all the books, accounts, vouchers and papers of said board shall at all times be subject to the inspection of the common council or of any committee thereof.

Section 15. Section one hundred thirty-five of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 135. Any of the clerks, assistants, janitors or employes hereinbefore mentioned shall be subject to removal at the pleasure of the board for any cause.

Section 16. Section one hundred thirty-six of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 136. The said board shall appoint a city superintendent of common schools, in the month of June in the year eighteen hundred and ninety-five, and in every third year thereafter, who shall be competent to instruct in any and all of the grades of the city schools, who shall hold his office for three years from and including the fifteenth day of July next after his appointment, and whose compensation shall be fixed and paid by said board. Said superintendent shall appoint all teachers and instructors necessary for the several public schools in said city provided that the number of teachers so ap-

pointed shall not at any time exceed the ratio of one teacher for every thirty-two pupils actually belonging in said schools. He shall also have the power and authority to suspend teachers and instructors for incompetency or inefficiency, and to remove and dismiss teachers and instructors for cause, subject to the approval of the board. He shall also have charge of the school system and methods of instruction. The superintendent now in office shall continue to hold office until July 15, eighteen hundred and ninety-five.

Section 17. Section one hundred thirty-seven of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 137. The fiscal year of said board shall begin on the first day of April annually. It shall be the duty of said board annually, on or before the sixteenth day of May in each year, to determine and certify to the common council the sums, in their opinion, necessary or proper to be raised for the several purposes hereinafter mentioned, specifying the sums required, for the year commencing on the first Monday of the previous April, for each of the said purposes and the reasons therefor.

Section 18. Section one hundred thirty-eight of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 138. The amount to be raised for teachers' wages in any one year shall not be less than six dollars, nor more than fourteen dollars per capita, based on the average number of resident pupils enrolled but once in the several public schools of said city, for the school year ending on the first day of May next preceding the levying the general city taxes in each year. A sworn statement of such number of pupils so enrolled shall be made by the clerk of said board according to the verified monthly reports of the principals of said schools. Nor shall the amount to be raised in any one year to alter, improve and repair school houses and their out-houses and appurtenances exceed fifteen thousand dollars, or to purchase and improve sites, and build or enlarge school houses, exceed fifty thousand dollars, or for library purposes, exceed three thousand dollars; and the common council of said city are authorized and directed, when necessary, to raise by loan, in anticipation of the taxes, the amount to be raised, collected and levied as aforesaid. It shall be the duty of the common council within fifteen days after receiving the certificate of the board of education hereinbefore required, of the sum necessary or proper to be raised for school purposes, to determine and certify to said board of education the amount that will be raised by them for the year commencing on the first Monday of the previous April, for the purposes mentioned in said certificate, distinguishing between the amount to be raised for teachers' wages, contingent expenses, for the building of school houses, repairs of school houses, and library purposes. The amount raised for school purposes shall constitute five separate and distinct funds, namely: teachers' fund, contingent fund, building fund, repair fund and library fund; and in case the said common council shall neglect or fail to certify to the board of education as above specified the amount that will be raised by them, within thirty days, then the said common council shall raise the several amounts embraced in the certificate of the board of education, as specified therein, which amounts shall be subject to the disposal of the board of education. All moneys required to be raised by virtue of this act, or received by the said city for or on account of the common schools, shall be de-

posited for the safe keeping thereof with the city treasurer of said city to the credit of the board of education, and shall be drawn out in pursuance of a resolution or resolutions of said board, by draft drawn by the president and countersigned by the clerk of said board, payable to the order of the person or persons entitled to receive such money, and every draft so drawn shall designate the particular fund from which it shall be paid, and said city treasurer shall keep the funds authorized by this title to be received by him separate and distinct from any other fund which he is or may be authorized to receive. All moneys to be raised pursuant to the provisions of this act and all school moneys by law appropriated to or provided for said city, shall be paid to the city treasurer thereof, who together with the sureties upon his official bond, shall be accountable therefor in the same manner as for other moneys of said city. The said treasurer shall be liable to the same penalties for any official misconduct in relation to the said moneys as for any similar misconduct in relation to other moneys of said city.

Section 19. Section one hundred thirty-nine of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 139. The common council of said city shall have the power, and it shall be their duty, to raise from time to time by tax, to be levied equally upon all the real and personal estate in said city, which shall be liable to taxation for the ordinary city taxes, or for city or county charges, such sum or sums of money, as may be necessary for any or all of the following purposes:

1. To purchase, lease or improve sites for school houses.
2. To build, purchase, lease, enlarge, improve, alter and repair school houses and their out houses and appurtenances.
3. To purchase, improve, exchange and repair school apparatus, books, furniture and appendages.
4. To defray the contingent expenses of the common schools.
5. To pay the wages of teachers, instructors, employes, assistants, janitors, superintendent of schools and members of said board of education. The salary of each member of said board shall be at the rate of \$1,000 per year, payable monthly from the city treasury, in the same manner that salaries of other city officials are paid.

Section 20. Section one hundred forty of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 140. It shall be the duty of said board to publish the record of its official proceedings in at least one daily newspaper published in said city, and shall publish the name of every person in its employ, and the amount of money received by each at least once each month. Said board shall at the close of each fiscal year make and publish an annual report of the finances of said board, which report shall embrace the following information:

- a. The number of school houses in said city, and an account and description of all the common schools kept in said city during the preceding year, and the time they have been severally taught.
- b. The number of children taught in said schools respectively.
- c. The whole amount of school moneys received by the city treasurer of said city during the year preceding, distinguishing the amount received from the county treasurer, from the city tax, and from any other source.
- d. The manner in which said moneys have been expended, and whether any, and what

part, remain unexpended, and for what cause.
 e. The amount of money received for tuition fees from foreign pupils during the year, and the amount paid for teachers' wages, building purposes, repairs, library purposes and contingent expenses.

f. The amount of money raised for school purposes by the common council under the provision of this title during the then current fiscal year.

g. All moneys received by the city treasurer, subject to the order of the board, specifying the same and sources.

h. The manner in which such sums of money shall have been expended, specifying the amount paid under each head of expenditure.

i. A statement of the several balances on hand to the credit of each of said five funds at the time of making said report.

Section 21. Section one hundred forty-one is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 141. Whenever said board of education shall have established, in connection with the public schools of said city, a high school for the accommodation of pupils pursuing the branches of education usually taught in academies, the regents of the University of the state of New York may, upon the application of said board of education, acknowledge and declare said high school to be an academy, and it shall thereafter be an academy, subject to such rules and regulations as said regents may prescribe; provided, however, that nothing in this section shall affect the rights and duties of said board of education granted or imposed by this act, or the statutes of the state, relating to common schools.

Section 22. This act shall take effect January first, eighteen hundred and ninety-five.

Ordered received, filed and published and sent to Albany for introduction and printing.

Upon motion of Ald. Lewis the board then adjourned.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

By Ald. McMillan—

Rochester, N. Y., March 20, 1894.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee for the purpose of providing moneys for the payment of the cost of the construction of the additional water supply line, and the cost of the East Side Sewer, and pursuant to the resolutions of your honorable body, heretofore caused the City Treasurer to advertise a sale of \$950,000 worth of water supply bonds, and \$250,000 of East Side Trunk Sewer bonds. Said sale was advertised for February 23rd, bonds to be issued at 3 1-2 per cent. At that time the Treasurer sold to the Monroe County Savings Bank \$50,000 worth of the water bonds, to the Security Trust Company, \$40,000 worth of water bonds, and to B. D. McAlpine \$10,000 worth. No out-of-town bidders were present, and the sale was thereupon adjourned to this date, March 20th, and the Treasurer was directed to re-advertise for bids. To-day the Treasurer received an offer of par for \$50,000 of such bonds, and they were duly struck off to L. W. Morrison & Co., of New York city. There now remains of water bonds to be sold, \$800,000 worth, and no bids have been secured for the sewer bonds.

In view of these facts your committee has been forced to the conclusion that the method of selling the city's bonds provided by the legislation authorizing such sale is unsatisfactory. It is believed that had the Treasurer been authorized to advertise for sealed proposals, he would have received bids for larger amounts and perhaps a better rate. It is thought that outside bidders living at a distance of several hundred miles from Rochester do not care to spend the two days' time necessary to get here, and bear the expenses of such a trip, and find themselves forced to compete at public auction for the bonds they may desire. It might happen that an individual would want \$50,000 worth of bonds, and he might come to Rochester prepared to bid par for such amount, and find some persons here bidding a small premium and taking but \$100,000 worth, thereupon forcing him to pay a premium for such bonds as he might desire.

It is also believed that a sale can be conducted by the sealed proposal method at less expense to the city, and in view of that fact, your committee has decided to submit herewith an amendment to the "Enabling Acts," and recommends that this Council approve the same without delay, to the end that they may be sent to Albany and incorporated into the law at as early a day as possible.

In reference to the amendment to the charter proposed by the Board of Education, raising the limit of appropriation per capita from \$14 to \$18, your committee has conferred with the School Board and has given the matter careful attention. After such conference your committee has decided to recommend that the charter be amended by fixing the per capita allowance for teachers' wages and contingent expenses at \$16, based upon the

average number of resident pupils enrolled, and recommends that the act now pending in the Legislature be so amended, and as so amended adopted.

In reference to the assessment roll for the Wilder street asphalt pavement, heretofore referred to this committee for consideration, your committee has given a public hearing to all persons interested, and has decided that the roll should be confirmed upon a three-payment basis, as presented, and so recommends.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section two of chapter 347 of the laws of 1890, entitled "An act to provide for the construction of a trunk sewer on the east side of the Genesee river in the city of Rochester, by the issue of bonds of said city, and providing for the payment of said bonds by local assessments," as amended by chapter 74 of the laws of 1892, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Whenever the issue of any bonds by virtue of this act shall be authorized by said Common Council, said Treasurer shall invite sealed proposals therefor by public advertisement for not less than ten (10) days and may award the same to the highest bidder therefor, provided that no proposals shall be accepted for less than the par value of said bonds; and said proposals shall be publicly opened only by the Treasurer, or such other person as said Common Council may designate, in the presence of the finance committee of said Common Council or such of them as shall attend at the time and place specified in said advertisement, and said Treasurer, with the approval of said finance committee or such members thereof as may be present, shall determine what, if any, part of said proposals shall be accepted; but nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the rejection of any or all of said proposals; and said Common Council is further authorized for the purpose of paying for the cost and expenses of carrying on the construction of any work now being done pending the sale of any of said bonds, to borrow by a vote of three-fourths of all of the members elected, subject to the approval of the Mayor, upon the credit of the city, by its promissory note or notes, payable in not more than a year after their date, so much money as may be deemed necessary, and the amount so borrowed shall be placed to the credit of the East Side Trunk Sewer Fund to be refunded with interest from the proceeds of the sale of said bonds.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

AN ACT to amend chapter 358 of the laws of 1892, entitled "An act to authorize the issue of bonds of the city of Rochester to pay for an additional water supply."

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section two of chapter 358 of the laws of 1892, entitled "An act to authorize the issue of bonds of the city of Rochester to pay for an additional water supply," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Whenever the issue of any bonds by virtue of this act shall be authorized by said Common Council, said Treasurer shall invite sealed proposals therefor by public advertisement for not less than ten (10) days, and may award the same to the highest bidder therefor, provided that no proposals shall be accepted for less than the par value of said bonds; and said proposals shall be publicly opened only by the Treasurer or such other person as said Common Council may designate in the presence of the finance committee of said Common Council or such of them as shall attend at the time and place specified in said advertisement, and said Treasurer, with the approval of said finance committee or such members thereof as may be present, shall determine what, if any, part of said proposals shall be accepted, but nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the rejection of any or all of said proposals; and said Common Council is further authorized for the purpose of paying for the cost and expenses of carrying on the construction of any work now being done, pending the sale of any of said bonds, to borrow by a vote of three-fourths of all of the members elected, subject to the approval of the Mayor, upon the credit of the city by its promissory note or notes, payable in not more than a year after their date, so much money as may be deemed necessary and the amount so borrowed shall be placed to the credit of the additional water supply fund, to be refunded with interest from the proceeds of the sale of said bonds.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Gentlemen:—Your law committee beg leave to report as follows:

In the matter of the claims of Michael Mulqueen, James W. Casey, Philip Zurn, Owen O'Neil and Anthony Knope for services as bridge tenders upon a basis of 25 cents an hour, for work rendered the city of Rochester and upon which claims the city has already paid said claimants at the rate of \$50 per month, we report that such bridge tenders were employed by the city and during the time of their employment a statute was passed giving to all day laborers employed on the state or on state property the sum of \$2 per day for their services, and it has been held in an action brought in Onondaga county that for such extra services any laborers thus employed can recover the difference between the amount paid them and the amount fixed by the statute of \$2 a day. The same holding was also made in the case of Mathew Cloonin brought before Hon.

William H. Adams, March 19, 1894, and a verdict directed for the plaintiff of \$75.08. The amount of the claims made by Mr. Cloonin and the above-named persons was \$3,066; by virtue of the decision of Judge Adams they can recover but \$541.53, which includes interest to March 20, 1894, we would therefore recommend that the executive board pay the following named claimants the amounts set opposite their names from the highway fund.

Your law committee have considered the question of appointment of commissioner of deeds in this city and in view of the fact that there have been so many applications made for appointment for this office, after deliberation we have deemed it advisable to take steps to defray the expense caused to the city by the appointment, notification and qualification of commissioners of deeds, we therefore recommend that hereafter all persons appointed to the office of commissioner of deeds, pay the City Clerk a fee of twenty-five (25) cents each upon their qualifying as commissioner of deeds, and that the City Clerk procure a suitable book in which shall be entered the constitutional oath of office required to be taken by all the employes of the city, the names of each person appointed or elected to office in the city of Rochester, the date of his appointment or election, date of qualification, term of office, the date of expiration of office, and that the City Clerk turn over all fees received by him for fees received from commissioner of deeds to the City Treasurer, and take his receipt therefor, and such moneys shall be credited by the treasurer to the contingent fund.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen:—It has long been known that the capacity of the distributing mains from Mt. Hope reservoir has been inadequate for

the needs of the present city. When the system was originally designed in 1873, the population was about 70,000 upon a municipal area of 4,800 acres; at the present time the population is at least 150,000 upon an area of about 11,000 acres. The main pipes which were ample fifteen years ago are now too small to furnish the required largely increased quantity of water for domestic, manufacturing and fire purposes, without incurring enormous losses of head by friction. Abundant proof of this is afforded by the fact that during the hours of greatest water consumption, comparatively little pressure is available in the high districts of the city, without any throttling of the outlet valves whatever.

During the past few years, it has been necessary to enforce a rigid economy in the use of water, in order to make the consumption equal to the supply from Hemlock Lake. Much hardship and inconvenience to many persons, especially to those owning property in the high districts of the city, has thus been entailed. With the completion of the new conduit, however, it is reasonable to anticipate that the numerous irksome restrictions upon the use of the water will be removed, and hence that a much larger per capita consumption will be established. In view of this circumstance, the effort to use larger quantities of water than heretofore, will inevitably result in correspondingly greater losses of head by friction in the present small mains, and the annoyance previously experienced from lack of pressure in the high districts will be sure to return in much aggravated degree.

The only remedy for this unfortunate condition is a copious reinforcement of the distributing system of pipes, and the engineer of the water department was directed to prepare plans and estimates of this much needed work. A report from him on the subject has been received, which is herewith submitted for your consideration. The plans and estimates accompanying said report have been thoroughly examined and approved by the Executive Board; and the matter of deciding upon the expediency of the work and providing the necessary funds for carrying it out is therefore laid before you. The estimated cost of all the new distributing mains which have been recommended by the Chief Engineer is \$488,000; and as a large amount of extra work in connection with rock excavation, house and surface sewers, gas pipes, electric conduits, railroads, street railway tracks, and canal, race and river crossings, is expected, for which it is almost impossible to make proper allowance in an estimate, without a much larger expenditure of time than seemed justifiable at present, it is urged by him that this sum shall not be reduced.

The large expenditure necessary to carry out all of the recommendations of the engineer, the great extent of the work, and the improbability of obtaining the requisite quantity of heavy pipe and performing the work of laying the same within the period of a single year, have induced the Executive Board to divide the extent of the work recommended by the engineer into two nearly equal parts; the first embracing those portions of the new distributing mains which should be laid during the present season, if possible, and the second embracing extensions of such mains, which may properly be carried out in the year following the completion of the first part. The estimated cost of this first part is \$250,000, and its extent is as follows:

1. For the west side: 36-inch pipe—Beginning at Mt. Hope reservoir, and extending through park lands and Alpine street to South avenue; thence along South avenue northerly to a point near Oakland street; thence westerly across private lands in the line of a future street to Mt. Hope avenue at McLean place; thence westerly through McLean place across the feeder, river, Lehigh Valley railroad, Erie railroad, W. N. Y. & P. railroad to Flint street; thence through Flint street to Mansion street; thence northerly through Mansion and Exchange streets to Clarissa and Greig streets; northerly through Greig street to Thorn alley; westerly through Thorn alley to Caledonia avenue; northerly in Caledonia avenue from Thorn alley to Bronson avenue; a total length of 11,300 feet. 12-inch pipe—From Jefferson avenue through Penn and Summer streets to Bronson avenue; and in Bronson avenue from Summer to Genesee streets; also Center street from State to Mill streets, a total of 2,350 feet. 10-inch, 8-inch and 6-inch pipes—In Mill street from Center street to Exchange place, a total of 1,800 feet. Total for west side, 15,450 feet.

2. For the east side: 36-inch pipe—Beginning at Mt. Hope reservoir; thence northerly across park and private lands to the intersection of Oakland and Meigs streets; thence northerly through Meigs street, crossing under the Erie canal, to Pearl street; thence northwesterly through Pearl street to Union street, and northerly through Union street to East Main street; a total of 11,600 feet. 30-inch pipe—From the intersection of East Main and Union streets through Union street to Central avenue, and westerly through Central avenue to St. Joseph street; a total of 3,700 feet. 16-inch pipe—In Central avenue from St. Joseph to North Clinton street, 450 feet. Total for east side, 15,750 feet.

The estimated cost of the above described work for the east and west sides together is \$250,000. It is the opinion of the Executive Board that this is the least sum of money which should be available during the coming year for the purpose named. The performance of the work indicated is sure to afford a very substantial increase in the water pressure in the high districts of the southwestern quarter of the city and the central portion of the east side.

The Executive Board also approves of the proposition to secure the site of the proposed new reservoir on Cobb's Hill near the southeastern corner of the city, and to defer the construction of this reservoir for a few years. During the past year several efforts were made to negotiate for the purchase of the necessary land with the owners, but the prices demanded were largely in excess of what the board considered would be justified by the public, and it is therefore probable that resort must be had to a commission for the purpose of establishing a proper value of the territory sought. Should the owners succeed in convincing such a commission that their valuation is not excessive, then at least \$110,000 will be needed to pay for the site. It may, however, be possible that on payment of a substantial consideration, the further excavation of sand from the pits may be controlled by the city for a few years. As the Executive Board has not been authorized to negotiate for such control of the excavation of material, a report on the price therefor cannot now be made.

The Executive Board has also been informed by the Chief Engineer of the Water Works in a previous communication that there will probably be a deficiency of about \$40,000

in the fund for the construction of the new conduit, unless the penalty of \$90,000 is collected which is due from the bondsmen of the Moffett, Hodgkins & Clarke Company by reason of the failure of said company to execute contract No. 2 for the additional conduit after its formal award to them. As this matter is now in litigation in the supreme court of the United States, it is very probable that the said deficiency will have to be met before a final decision from the courts can be secured; and hence this matter is also brought to your notice herewith, in order that provision for the payment of the present contractors for the new conduit may be made.

In order to carry out the recommendations above made in reference to the reinforcement of the city distributing mains and the purchase of the site for the proposed Cobb's Hill reservoir, as well as to complete the new conduit to Mt. Hope reservoir, the sum of about \$400,000 should be available.

To the Honorable, the Executive Board of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—In accordance with your request, I submit herewith preliminary plans and estimates of the cost of a new distributing reservoir on Cobb's Hill, at the southeastern corner of the city, and of the necessary enlargement of the capacity of the water distribution system of pipes in the city itself.

A new distributing reservoir is considered necessary in the near future, both in order to provide a larger storage capacity for water directly in the city in case of accident to the conduits, and in order to make any needed repairs to the existing reservoir at Mt. Hope. The site selected is the most desirable one of the several which have been examined, as it affords room for a basin of about 70,000,000 gallons capacity at a depth of 20 feet, without making embankments of much greater height than 25 feet. By means of a division wall or bank this basin may be divided into two equal compartments, of which only one need be built, reserving the construction of the other until some future period.

The capacity of Mt. Hope reservoir is only about 22,500,000 gallons, and its enlargement is impracticable, owing to its position on a ridge and the absence of a sufficient area of land at the necessary elevation. As it is reasonable to anticipate that the present restricted consumption of about 7,000,000 gallons per day of Hemlock Lake water in the city will be considerably increased after the completion of the new conduit, it becomes evident that Mt. Hope reservoir will soon contain little more than two days' supply, and that any accident to the conduits between Mt. Hope and Rush reservoirs which may require more than two days to repair, will result in serious annoyance or damage by a lack of water in the city. While such an accident is not anticipated, yet it is entirely conceivable, and hence provision should soon be made for increasing the storage of water at the city.

It should be noted that the site of the proposed reservoir on Cobb's Hill is being damaged more and more every year by large excavations on both sides of the hill for ob-

taining sand and gravel for building purposes. On the other hand, the preliminary plans of the new reservoir indicate that there will be a large excess of excavated material from the interior of the area over the amount required for making the banks; and as much of this surplus will doubtless be sand of good quality, any further undermining of the site should be prevented, and the excavations for sand restricted to those portions of the hill which are to be removed in forming the new basin. The hill, however, is private property; hence the destructive operations can be stopped only by making proper stipulations with the owners, or by the direct purchase of the land by the city.

From the foregoing considerations, I deem it of great importance that proper measures for the preservation of the reservoir site be taken by the city as soon as possible. In view of the fact that the discharge of the new conduit will, for the next few years, be greater than the maximum hourly consumption in the city, the construction of the proposed new reservoir may perhaps be postponed until an equality between the rates of supply and greatest demand is established; meanwhile the site should not be ruined by continuing the present excavations. If a cessation of this work cannot be secured otherwise than by the purchase of the land, such purchase should be made at once. The excavation of the surplus material above mentioned may then be done under the control and direction of the Water Works Department, and be made a source of revenue, in case it proves to be sand of saleable quality. All of the said surplus which can be disposed of in this manner will be a two-fold gain, since no expense will be entailed by its removal when the construction of the reservoir is finally undertaken.

In considering the expedience of the immediate construction of the proposed new reservoir, it must be remembered that somewhat extensive additions to both the new conduit and the city distributing mains will thereby be required. The plans for the new conduit contemplate its termination at Mt. Hope reservoir, but it has been so located between Rush and Mt. Hope reservoirs as to afford the shortest practicable distance to Cobb's Hill, while its length between the two existing reservoirs will be about the same as that of the present conduit.

The route selected is parallel to the present conduit from Rush reservoir to an angle in the East Henrietta road about half way to Mt. Hope reservoir; thence northerly across farming lands for about one mile to the highway forming the continuation of Pinnacle avenue; thence northerly along said highway to a point about 400 feet north of Elmwood avenue, where the conduit will divide into two branches, one running northwesterly across private and park lands to the east end of Mt. Hope reservoir, while the other branch continues northeasterly through the prolongation of Pinnacle avenue to Highland avenue, and thence easterly through Highland avenue to the proposed Cobb's Hill reservoir. The length of this latter branch is 7,730 feet. It is not included in the contract for the new conduit, and its estimated cost of \$70,000 must therefore be included in the appropriation for the new reservoir.

Provision must likewise be made for delivering the water from said new reservoir into the city mains; and as the existing distribution pipes in this locality are all too small, at least one line of 36-inch pipe must be laid to connect with the set of new mains which will be required from Mt. Hope reservoir. The route of this large main is through

Monroe avenue under the street railway track on the south side, from Cobb's Hill to Sumner park; thence through Sumner park and Pearl street to Meigs street; its length is about 8,250 feet; and its estimated cost of about \$77,000 must also be included in that of the new reservoir.

As to the proposed reservoir itself, it has been assumed that, in view of its large ultimate dimensions and cost, only the eastern half would be constructed in the near future, with a capacity of about 32,000,000 gallons. Several different methods of construction have been considered and the corresponding estimates of cost made. In consequence of the permeable character of the soil, it will be necessary to take the utmost care to make the sides and bottom of the reservoir thoroughly water tight. The materials commonly used for this purpose are puddled clay, cement concrete and asphalt, all of which are expensive, and if used singly, they must be applied in layers of considerable thickness to avoid future leakage. A single course or layer of such impervious material, however, is often unreliable, unless made very thick, owing to unavoidable imperfections of composition and methods of application; furthermore, in consequence of the length of time required by the magnitude of the work before its completion, changes in the structure of such materials are induced by the large variations of temperature and conditions of moisture to which they must necessarily be exposed, after having been put in place. It therefore becomes expedient to make use of at least two such comparatively impervious layers of moderate thickness, instead of a single layer of great thickness, both for reasons of economy and to secure a greater degree of water-tightness, the latter on the presumption that the unavoidable cracks or defects in one layer will not coincide with those of the other.

The estimates for the new reservoir, on the above-named assumptions, range from \$240,000 to \$260,000, according to the nature of the impervious lining material and whether one or two of such layers are used. These figures, moreover, do not include the cost of the necessary land, or that of the contingent amount of conduit and discharge pipe previously mentioned. As the further study of the subject will probably lead to the adoption of a double water-tight lining for the work, it will be expedient to consider that the larger of the two sums just named shall be available for the performance of the work, and the total cost of the proposed reservoir will therefore embrace the following items and amounts:

1. For the construction of the eastern half of the reservoir with capacity of about 32,000,000 gallons	\$260,000 00
2. For 7,730 lin. ft. of 38-inch steel conduit pipe	70,000 00
3. For 8,250 lin. ft. of 36-inch cast-iron distributing pipe, inclusive canal crossing	77,000 00
4. For land and contingencies	103,000 00
Total	\$510,000 00

The general route and dimensions of the new mains from Mt. Hope reservoir for reinforcing the system of distributing pipes in the city are shown on the accompanying map, also in the appended tables. Two sets of such new mains have been indicated, one for present needs and the other for piecemeal construction in the future, according to the rapidity of development of the various existing suburban areas. The work which I deem it necessary to undertake as soon as practicable is exhibited in Table No. 1,

and by the hatched lines on the map. The dimensions for the pipes have been computed on the basis that with the present population of 150,000, using the water at the rate of 150 gallons per head per day during the hours of greatest consumption, or at an average rate of 100 gallons per head during the twenty-four hours of the day) together with the discharge of twenty-five fire-streams, each of 225 gallons per minute, the loss of head in the new mains will be such as to still leave a pressure of from eighteen to twenty-five pounds per square inch at the highest points in the city, except in the immediate vicinity of the reservoirs.

It is to be understood that this large number of fire streams cannot all be drawn in any single small locality from the distributing pipes, but that they are available for use at the same time in different districts, or along the line of the principal mains; also, that when a number of such fire streams are drawn from the ordinary distributing pipes in a small area of high elevation, the pressure in that vicinity will fall somewhat below the limits just mentioned. This circumstance is unavoidable unless the entire system of pipes is enlarged; but as occurrences of this kind are rare, and generally happen at night, when the demand for water for household or manufacturing purposes is small, little inconvenience from this source is to be anticipated.

The general course of the new mains has been selected with the view of avoiding streets in which expensive permanent roadway improvements of wood, asphalt and brick have been made. For this reason, the routes are somewhat irregular and more or less devious in reaching objective points. Attention has also been given to planning the work so as to secure efficient discharge and pressure along the course of the Erie canal and the various lines of railway, where factories and warehouses already exist, and may be expected to increase in number hereafter. In the central districts comparatively few alterations are made now, as these portions are well served for fire purposes by the Holly system, and the existing mains of the domestic system have ample capacity. It is also proper to state, however, that the 4-inch pipes in many streets will gradually have to be taken up and replaced by larger ones, and that most of such desirable alterations have been left out of consideration in the present estimates, inasmuch as this work does not appear to be imperative, and may be done in the future without burdensome expense, in advance of permanent roadway improvements.

It should also be remarked that the existing distribution pipes along the route of the new mains are in general not to be taken up, except where such new mains are 24 inches and less in diameter, the plan being to lay all new pipes of larger diameter than 24 inches on the opposite side of the street, wherever practicable, and to retain all house connections and fire hydrants on the existing smaller mains. The new large mains, moreover, are to be laid at sufficient depth below the surface to pass under the existing pipes, and be connected therewith only at street intersections, provision for disconnection being made by means of stop-valves at these points. In this manner the new mains will be interfered with as little as possible, and districts of the regular distributing system may be shut off without interrupting the supply of water to other localities.

From Table No. 1, it will be seen that the contemplated new mains from Mt. Hope reservoir for the west side of the city will cost about \$274,000 and about \$214,000 for the

east side. These sums take into account the value of existing pipes which may be taken up and relaid elsewhere as a part of the proposed general plan. For the entire city the total cost of this work will accordingly be about \$488,000. This sum may be reduced somewhat, if deemed expedient, by diminishing the extent of the new pipes into the outlying districts of the city, but their diameters should not, in my opinion, be lessened.

It is therefore apparent that a very large expenditure is needed in order to render the water distributing system of the city as efficient as desirable; and in view of the circumstance that it may be possible to dispense with a new distributing reservoir for a few years, while there is an urgent necessity for enlarging the city mains, I would

recommend that as much of the latter work as your board may deem expedient be done during the coming season, so as to enable a proper use to be made of the additional conduit after its completion next fall. The preservation of the site for the proposed new reservoir should also be insured, since serious inroads are made upon it every year by the excavations already mentioned. As it is not probable that these operations can be checked otherwise than by the purchase of the property, the recommendation for such purchase is therefore also made herewith, thus making the total amount which will be needed this year for the purposes above described, the sum of about \$600,000.

By Com. Decker:

In view of the facts that the board of health complained of the condition of No. 17 school June 19th last, and again in August, and on November 14th sent to this Board another communication complaining of its sanitary condition and defective light and heating apparatus in which said Board expressed their judgment that "there can be no remedy except to rebuild the entire structure and any effort at remodeling the old building would cost more than the benefits derived would warrant." And, further, it should be remembered that the greater part of said building was erected in 1858, and four rooms added in 1878, since which it has been subject to constant use and wear and is now insufficient to accommodate all pupils belonging in that district, and an annex is, and for several years has been necessary. And it is impracticable to remodel the structure. And a new building of at least eighteen rooms is necessary, costing at least \$30,000 to \$35,000, and

Whereas, it would not be possible to erect such building out of the usual sum appropriated by the Common Council for building purposes, and at the same time provide for other districts requiring buildings or additions, particularly 14, 31 and 35, Field street, besides some relief demanded between 9, 18 and 26 districts, and

Whereas, the Board is now hiring in all thirteen annexes to accommodate over 900 registered pupils, now, therefore, in order to provide for such a building in No. 17 district without impairing the wants of other districts, be it

Resolved, That the Common Council be requested to favor the passage of an act enabling them to create a special fund of \$35,000 for the sole purpose of erecting, furnishing and finishing a new school building during the year 1894, upon the present site of No. 17 school, located on Orange street in this city.

Resolved, That the Clerk of this Board be instructed to transmit to the Common Council a copy of these resolutions and of the following draft of an act appropriate to the purpose.

AN ACT to authorize the city of Rochester to levy a tax for the purpose of erecting a new school building.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Common Council of the city of Rochester is hereby authorized and empowered to levy a tax of thirty-five thousand dollars in the general tax levy for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-four, in addition to the amount provided for by sub-division six of section one hundred and twenty-nine of the charter of said city, for the purpose of erecting, finishing, heating and furnishing a new public school building, during the year 1894, upon the present site of district school number seventeen, located at the corner of Orange and Saxton streets, in the twentieth ward of said city of Rochester. This additional appropriation shall be used only for the purposes specified in this act.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

This old material will be the property of the contractors and may be so considered by contractors who make proposals for the work.

And the City Surveyor, under direction of this Council, having made and reported as an estimate of the expense thereof, the sum of \$57,000, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved, and the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon the following portion and part of the city, which the Council deems proper to be so assessed for, and will be benefited

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of State street, from Main street to Center street.

I received no favorable replies for sale of bonds on a 3 1-2 per cent. basis.

Several of the bankers of New York city, in reply to my dispatches to-day asking if

they would not take some of the bonds, replied, "Prefer not to purchase any bonds until the Bland bill is disposed of." We made sale of \$50,000 water bonds to L. W. Morrison of New York city, at par rate 3 1-2 per cent. and then by advice of Finance Committee and City Attorney, adjourned sale to Tuesday A. M., March 27th, at 11 o'clock.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section one hundred and eleven of chapter fourteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act to further amend chapter one hundred and forty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, entitled 'An act to amend and consolidate the several acts in relation to the charter of the city of Rochester, and to consolidate therewith the several acts in relation to the charter of said city,'" is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 111. The treasurer of the city of Rochester shall place to the credit of a fund to be known as the "General Sinking Fund" the one per centum of the total amount of park bonds directed to be raised pursuant to section eighteen of chapter one hundred and ninety-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-eight; the difference between the amount received from the New York, Lake Erie and Western railroad company, and the amount necessary to pay any bonds of the Genesee Valley railroad and the interest thereon; the amount received as rent for the arsenal site; the percentage of the gross receipts of the Rochester railway company contracted to be paid to the city; all surplus receipts for water rents after the payment of operating expenses, salaries, repairs, maintenance or extension of said work, interest upon the water bonds issued for the construction of said works or for the further exten-

sion of the sale; also such penalties as may be collected for violations of the regulations of the Executive Board governing the rest of the city's water supply, and any moneys now in his possession received from any of the above sources not otherwise appropriated, and the amount so credited and the additions and accretions thereto shall constitute a fund for the redemption of the city's bonded debt and for that purpose only. The common council of said city shall, on or before the first day of June, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, and every third year thereafter appoint a citizen or said city, other than a city officer or employe, who, with the mayor, treasurer and president of the common council of said city, shall constitute the board of trustees of said sinking fund, which shall be a body corporate, and shall have the care and direction of said sinking fund, subject to the ordinances of the common council. Said trustees are hereby authorized and empowered to pay and redeem any portion of the bonded debt now or hereafter a charge upon said city as it may mature (for the redemption of which no special provision of law exists except the bonds issued pursuant to chapter one hundred and ninety-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-eight) and also such bonds as may be surrendered by the holders thereof before maturity, whenever they may deem it to be for the interest of said city so to do. Said sinking fund shall be used solely in the redemption and payment of the city's bonded debt, and when there are no such city obligations falling due upon which the same can be applied, they may be used in the purchase of any of the city's bonds, not due, or any city bonds to be issued, or may be invested in such other manner as such board of trustees may elect, or may be deposited in such banks, at the highest rate of interest obtainable, as shall be selected by said trustees, until such bonds may fall due, to the payment of which they can be applied, and whenever any of the bonds of said city are about to be issued, the trustees of said sinking fund shall, at their option, be permitted to purchase so much or so many of them as they may desire at their par value, and shall hold the same as a part of said sinking fund. Said trustees shall, at its last meeting in each fiscal year, present to the common council a detailed statement of the receipts, disbursements and investments made during the fiscal year then ending pursuant to the provisions of this act; the several securities and investments held (whether cancelled or not, stating the law under and the purpose for which the same were respectfully issued, giving their respective amounts, date of issue, and maturity, and the numbers of the bonds or securities and the rate of interest payable thereon, together with any other proper description of the same; the amount of interest received on such deposit; what city bonds maturing during the year then ending have been paid out of said sinking fund; the several amounts in which city bonds have been issued; the date of their issue; the rate of interest payable; the times when the interest and principal of the respective bonds fall due, and also the authority under which and the object or purpose for which they were respectively issued. When, by any act authorizing the creation of any part of the present funded debts, any property or revenues of the said city were pledged or appropriated to the payment of any such funded debt, such property or revenues shall continue to be so pledged and appropriated to the payment of the bonds or certificates which shall, by virtue of this act, be substituted for such part or parts of such funded debt.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Section 1. Section two of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 2. Whenever said park commissioners shall determine to lay out any park boulevards they shall, at a regular meeting of said commissioners by resolution declare such determination, and shall cause an estimate of the cost and expense of such improvement to be made and they shall describe and declare the portion or parts of the city of Rochester, which they deem proper to be assessed for the expense of such improvement, and if in the judgment of said commissioners a part of such expense shall be paid by the city at large, they shall declare what part or portion of such expense shall be paid from the "Park Boulevard Fund," hereinafter created, and what part or portion thereof shall be assessed on the territory declared by them to be benefited. Where the taking of land or the acquirement of a right or easement therein is necessary it shall not be necessary to include the damage and charges therefor in the estimated expense.

Sec. 2. Section three or said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 3. As soon as practicable after the adoption by said commissioners of a resolution as in section two herein provided, said commissioners shall certify to the Common Council of the city of Rochester, a copy of such resolution with a minute of all the proceedings relating thereto, containing a description of the proposed improvement, the estimated expense of the same, the proportion, if any, of the cost of such improvement to be paid out of the "Park Boulevard Fund" and the portion or part of the city to be assessed.

Sec. 3. Section ten of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 10. For the purpose of paying such part or portions of the expense of any improvement authorized by this act, which shall be declared payable out of the "Park Boulevard Fund," the common council shall raise annually such sums as shall be certified to it by said Board of Park Commissioners and reported by the finance committee of said council as necessary for that purpose. The said finance committee shall ascertain and report the amount of money necessary for this purpose in the same manner and at the same time that said committee ascertains and reports the sums necessary to be raised in each year for the various funds and departments of said city; and the common council shall raise the sum or sums necessary to be raised for the purposes of this act in the same manner and at the same time as are raised the various sums of money for the various funds and departments of said city, and such moneys when raised shall be set apart by the treasurer of the city of Rochester and credited to a fund to be known as the "Park Boulevard Fund" and said treasurer shall hold all such moneys on account of and for the purposes herein authorized, and shall pay them out on order of the park commissioners, and not otherwise. The park commissioners shall draw drafts as may be necessary from time to time for the purposes of this act upon the said city treasurer, signed by the president and secretary, specifying the purpose for which they are drawn, and the name of the fund from which they shall be paid, and the said city treasurer shall pay the same out of said fund.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, who were appointed by an order of the Monroe county court, duly granted and entered January 18, 1894, commissioners to inquire into and determine what damages and compensation the owner or owners, tenants or occupants of the lands and buildings to be taken for the opening of a street from Central avenue to Granger street, in said city, pursuant to a final ordinance duly adopted therefor, being final ordinance No. 5,226, adopted August 22, 1893, will be entitled to for the same, respectfully report and certify in accordance with the provisions of the city charter, the piece and parcel of land to be taken for such improvement, the name and residence of the owner thereof, and the name and residence of all other persons having any interest in said premises by lease or otherwise, and their award of damages as incident to said street opening, as follows:

The piece or parcel of land required for such opening is described as follows: Beginning at a point in the south line of Central avenue where the west line of lot No. 7 of the Atwater and Andrews tract intersects the same; thence southerly along the west line of said lot No. 7 to a point where said west line intersects the north line of Granger street; thence easterly along the north line of Granger street to a point where the east line of lot No. 8 of said tract intersects the north line of Granger street; thence north along the east line of said lot No. 8 to a point where said east line intersects the south line of Central avenue to the place of beginning, being lots 7 and 8 of said tract, a map of which is filed in Monroe county clerk's office, reference being had to a map of said proposed opening filed in these proceedings in said clerk's office.

These premises are owned by Matilda Schneider, who resides in Chicago, Ill., and are subject to the leasehold interest of John C. Fee and James Fee, hereinafter referred to.

We also find that James Fee and John C. Fee, both of Rochester, N. Y., have a leasehold interest in the premises above described but inasmuch as said James Fee and John C. Fee make no claim for damages or compensation for the taking of said leasehold interest by said city in these proceedings, but expressly waive all damages, we deem it unnecessary to further describe their interest and have made them no award.

We also find that John Danihy, who claims an interest in some of the buildings upon said premises under a lease which has expired, is by the terms of said lease entitled to remove his said buildings and that they are of such a temporary character that the same may be removed without injury to the freehold and are not a subject for any award and are not property which the city has any right to condemn and take in these proceedings and we therefore make no award to said Danihy.

Therefore, we, the subscribers, the commissioners, having been duly sworn as required by the statute in such cases made and provided, and having all met and acted upon the matters submitted to us at the City Attorney's office, in the Wilder building, pursuant to a notice of at least ten days published according to law, and having all taken a view of every part of the respective premi-

ses and having inquired into and heard the allegations and proofs of the respective parties in interest, do determine and appraise the damages and compensation to the owner of the premises above described at the sum of \$40,000, which award is payable to Matilda Schneider, aforesaid, after deducting all taxes and assessments which have become a lien upon the lands heretofore described.

It will be seen that the excise receipts for the year just ending is \$49,492, while last year the receipts were \$51,565.50, that is to say, the city received less from the excise receipts last year than the year before, to wit: \$2,073.50, and while the annual appropriation for 1893, was \$17,000, the appropriation for 1894, was \$15,000, but the difference in the receipts from the excise and the difference between the annual appropriations are compensated for by the handsome balance carried over from 1893.

It will be seen that the aggregate amount which was placed at the disposal of your committee, is \$82,521.53, and that the total expenditures to this date for the support and relief of the poor is \$82,828.02, leaving a balance of \$1,793.51 against this balance, however, is to be charged a bill presented by the City Hospital for \$1,209, which your committee at its last meeting refused to audit upon the ground that items were charged in the bill in excess of the usual rate, but even if this City Hospital bill has to be paid in full, there will still be a balance of \$584.51 to be carried over to next year's fund.

The total expenditures for the support and relief of the poor for 1893, was \$77,327.34, and this sum deducted from \$80,828.02 shows that there was about \$2,500 more expended during the last year than the year before.

In view of the fact, which is conceded by everyone, that the last year was an unusually hard year for poor people on account of the inability of large numbers of laboring men and women to secure employment at all and the consequent increased application by very many of them for aid from the city, we respectfully submit that your committee, Overseer of the Poor and his assistants should be commended for the efficiency and economy displayed in the performance of their duties and the conservation of the fund at their disposal, all of which is respectfully submitted.

Extensions were authorized to be made at an estimated cost of \$52,000; but it was deemed advisable, owing to the insufficient supply of potable water, to do only work that was imperative, such as laying mains in streets that were under construction requiring concrete foundations, for surface roadways of asphalt, brick and Medina block; laying sufficient cast iron pipes across the new stone bridges over the Genesee river at Court and Andrews streets to ensure proper future connections from the east to the west side of the river, for both distribution systems, and the taking up of cast and wrought iron pipes of inadequate size for the duty required of them, replacing same by permanent constructions of sufficient capacity to

help the present demand on them, and be ample to distribute efficiently the future additional supply of water when the conduit under construction is completed and the proposed large feed mains are laid.

These items recognize all obligations that the City Property Fund is liable for so far as your committee knows including bills carried over from last year, amounting to \$519.65.

Your committee have had several unusual and extraordinary expenditures to meet, such as furnishing the City Attorney's new offices, renovating and furnishing the Auditor's and Fire Marshal's offices, repairing boilers and stack, the architect's charge for city hall remodeling plans and the premiums for the insuring the school houses during the ensuing three years.

These five items aggregate \$5,383.73, and if they and the bills left over from last year, amounting to \$516.65, are eliminated, the current expenditures of your committee during

the full fiscal year will only amount to \$6,922.65, and this sum compares favorably with the routine expenditures of past years.

In view of the extraordinary expenditures referred to there will be a deficiency of about \$190 in the fund, and your committee would recommend that the council make a special appropriation of \$200, and direct the City Treasurer to place that amount to the credit of the City Property Fund.

In addition to the necessary work connected with the actions and proceedings above mentioned, the City Attorney acts as a legal adviser for all of the city departments, excepting the Board of Health. This work during the past year has been unusual in amount owing to the construction of the East Side Trunk Sewer and the construction of the conduits for the additional water supply. In the construction of the East Side Trunk Sewer it became necessary to acquire title by condemnation proceedings of a large

number of parcels of land, and this involved the examination of very many complicated titles of property in Rochester and the towns of Brighton and Irondequoit. For the additional water supply in addition to the examination of titles where proceedings were had it was necessary for the City Attorney to pass upon the complicated titles to the premises of the Honeoye Mills from whom water rights were acquired, and the title of every person conveying land to the city for water work purposes from Hemlock Lake to the city. The examinations of these titles alone have consumed much time, but the city will probably be the gainer thereby.

In submitting the foregoing report, your committee feels that it is but due to the City Attorney and his very competent and able staff, to say that it is probably true that the law department of the city of Rochester has never been in better condition than at present. The City Attorney's office is a model of order, completeness and efficiency. To the City Attorney great credit is due for the very excellent condition of the city's legal affairs, and your committee feels that the public in general should understand that the city's legal interests have never been better protected than during the past year.

BOARD OF PARK COMMISSIONERS.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., March 1st, 1894.

To the Board of Park Commissioners:

Gentlemen:—I herewith present the annual report of the work done on the parks, for the year ending February 28, 1894:

The following described pieces of property have been purchased during the year: Five plots of land from the Hiram Sibley estate, designated on a map made in the office of the Park Commission, as plots A, B, C, D and E, and containing 7 42-100 acres of land. A copy of the map is also filed in the county clerk's office. Plot A contains 82-100 acres, and extends from the easterly boundary line of the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railroad where it crosses North St. Paul street, at grade, northerly to the south line of Benjamin Simpson's land. Plot B. contains 1 78-100 acres of land, and extends from the westerly boundary of the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg Railroad Company's land, where it crosses North St. Paul street at grade, southerly to the Ridge road. These two plots of land were purchased for the purpose of moving the line of North St. Paul street easterly to admit a park road along the top of the high bank of the river, thereby occupying the present line of North St. Paul street. Plot C contains 2 20-100 acres of land and extends from the ice pond on the west side of North St. Paul street, northerly to the south line of a piece of land, opposite the Ridge road, purchased from Edwin L. Harris by the Park Commission. Plot D contains 1 12-100 acres of land, and extends from the north line of a piece of land purchased from James Requa by the Park Commission, northerly between the west line of North St. Paul street and the top of the high bank of the river, to a point at which the said west line of North St. Paul street and the said top of the high bank of the river intersect each other. Plot E contains 1 1-2 acres of land and comprises all the land formerly owned by the Hiram Sibley estate, lying west of the land of the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railroad Company, and south of the property formerly owned by Elizabeth Callister, and now by the Park Commission. A quit-claim deed of all the land (about 15 1-2 acres) belonging to the Sibley estate, adjacent to plots C, D and E, lying between the top of the high bank of the river and the water's edge, has been given to the Park Commission. A plot of land marked Plot 3, and containing about three acres, lying west of North St. Paul street and south of the land formally owned by Elizabeth Callister and now by the Park Commission, has been purchased from the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg Railroad Company for three thousand dollars. No land has been acquired for park purposes at either Highland or Genesee Valley parks during the year.

At Seneca Park, on the east, the principal work was the excavation for the miniature lake, containing three acres, and the grading of the road which forms the embankment at the foot of the lake. A well to provide for the overflow of the lake was built near the embankment. At Seneca park, on the west, the grading of two roads was done from Riverside avenue northerly to the junction of the two roads, near the north end of the park, and the grading of a single road from the junction of the two roads northerly to the road that leads to Hanford's landing. Paine street, an entrance to Seneca Park on the west, was graded from Lake avenue 650 feet easterly to the park lands and the spaces on each side of the two driveways, were fertilized, sown to grass seed and planted

with four rows of American elm trees, 42 feet apart, at right angles to the street and about 50 feet apart on the line of the street. One-half of the cost of the grading and the planting was paid by the estate of Dr. Jonas Jones, as his land adjoins Paine street.

At Highland park, the children's pavilion was revarnished with spar composition. A small force was kept at work during the summer grading walks, sodding banks and caring for the flowers and shrubs in the fine collection of foreign and native shrubs in the shrub collection.

At Genesee Valley park a few trees and shrubs, taken from the overcrowded young forest and the nursery on the east side, were planted on the west side of the river, to conceal the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad. The land on the west side of the river was plowed and harrowed ready for tree planting, but on account of the lack of funds the trees were not planted. Five wells were dug on the park, two in the picnic grove, one in the large meadow west of Red creek, one at the new sheep sheds and one on the Athletic grounds; these with the five that were there when the property was bought will probably supply water to the visitors. All the houses and barns not required were torn down and the material that was of use saved. A new tool house was built near the foreman's house, along the line of the New York, Lake Erie & Western Railroad.

William H. Jesserer, a citizen of Rochester, built at his own expense, at a cost of about \$1,800, a building known as the Refectory, in the picnic grove. In consideration of the exclusive privilege of selling refreshments for three years he agreed to transfer the building to the Park Commission at the expiration of his lease. During the summer the refectory was open to the public and refreshments were sold, but the building was not large enough to accommodate the requirements of the park visitors. At the close of the season, in consideration of enlarging the building at a cost of about \$700, Mr. Jesserer surrendered his old lease and was given a new one for three years from February 13, 1894, and the additional privilege of erecting, running and maintaining a merry-go-round at such places and under such conditions and regulations as the Genesee Valley Park Committee may direct.

The Rochester Railway Company was permitted to lay the tracks of the railroad and run the cars of the Monroe and Plymouth avenue routes through the park lands on the west side of the river from the state dam southerly along the line of the Western New York & Pennsylvania Railroad and the north side of Elmwood avenue to the west end of Elmwood avenue bridge. For this privilege the Rochester Railway Company agreed to run every car on the route mentioned from April 15th to November 1st, and from November 1st to April 15th, as the demands of the public shall require; the fare from any point in the city to any point in the park to be five cents and the agreement to extend ten years.

With the extension of the cars to Elmwood avenue bridge large numbers of people visited the parks and the ball grounds, athletic grounds and the picnic groves were in great demand during pleasant weather. William V. Long was permitted to rent boats to the public at a boat house on the west side of the river a few rods north of Elmwood avenue bridge. No charge was made for the privilege of renting boats, but the charges for the use of boats was limited to 25 cents an hour or 50 cents per day for single oared boats and 50 cents for two hours or less or \$1 per day for large double oared boats.

Before the privilege of renting boats was granted to Mr. Long, the Park Commission advertised for bids for the privilege of renting boats to the public, requiring the grantee to build at his own expense a boat house to cost not less than \$1,500, as the consideration for a three years lease, but no answers were received from the advertisement.

During the fall the spaces on each side of the drives of the Seneca Parkway, extending from Lake avenue opposite Paine street, westerly about one mile were planted, fertilized and sown to grass seed. Four rows of American elm trees, 42 feet apart measured at right angles with the parkway and about 50 feet apart on the street line, were planted the whole length of the parkway.

At the request of the Common Council the work of planting Washington square and Plymouth park was done by the employes of the Park Commission, at the expense of the city, paid by an appropriation made by the Common Council. The designs for the improvements of the squares and the parks were made by Messrs. Olmsted, Olmsted & Elliot, of Boston, Mass.

One thousand dollars was voted by the Common Council to enable the Park Commission to employ policemen to protect the parks during the summer. The Park Commission employed the Protective Police and Fire Patrol Company to furnish policemen at \$50 per month, and \$2 per day for extra men. Two policemen were employed at Genesee Valley park and one each at Seneca and Highland parks. An extra man was employed at each of the parks on Sundays and holidays. \$993.38 was paid for the policemen. Several arrests were made for swimming in the river, clubbing and climbing into trees during the nutting season, and fines were imposed by Police Justice Ernst. Several pistols were taken from boys and men who were shooting them in the parks. Generally the behavior in the parks was good, the presence of the police only being required to hold in check a few inconsiderate people, and to prevent the picking of wild flowers and beautiful leaves in the parks. It is a sad fact that even some of our people from whom we expect the best behavior are thoughtless or regardless of the injury they do by picking flowers and leaves which if left alone would be objects of beauty to many people for days and even weeks.

In January, at the request of the Common Council, a bill was introduced into the legislature by Senator Parsons and Assemblyman O'Grady to authorize the Common Council to vote the sum of ten thousand dollars for the immediate use of the Park Commission. The bill passed the legislature without delay and being signed by Governor Flower, became a law. At the meeting of the Common Council on January 23, 1894, the following resolution was introduced by Alderman McMillan and passed:

"Resolved, That the City Treasurer be, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to issue the city's note for not exceeding six months, for the sum of ten thousand dollars, under authority of section 81 of the city charter, said note to be negotiated under the direction of the Finance Committee, to be countersigned by the chairman of the Finance Committee, the interest or discount thereon to be charged to the contingent fund and the proceeds thereof to be credited to the commissioners' park fund."

The resolution was approved by Mayor Curran.

At a meeting of the Park Commissioners on January 29th, it was decided to commence the erection of the sheep sheds and

the gymnasium at Genesee Valley park, the administration building at Highland park and a shelter at Seneca park. Work was commenced at once and on February 28th, about \$2,300 had been paid to laborers, masons and carpenters and teamsters at the three parks. About one hundred and sixty men had been employed at carpenter work, seven at mason work and one hundred and thirty at laboring work, six at painting and twelve as teamsters.

The right to leave the ice house on the west side of the river at Genesee Valley park was granted to Edwin I. Tripp until October 15, 1894, for \$100.

Material, including hay, wood, wool, sheep pelts, lambs, fruit, old bricks and turnips to the amount of \$752.29 was sold and the money received was placed to the credit of the maintenance fund.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee in submitting its annual report deems it proper to review briefly the financial history of the city for the past twelve months.

The year now drawing to a close has, perhaps, been the most disastrous year financially that the city of Rochester, and the country itself have ever passed through; and the city has reason to congratulate itself that during this great stringency in money matters not a single financial institution has been forced to suspend payment. While the Finance Committee has no disposition to claim any particular credit for itself, still your committee is proud of the fact that not a single obligation of the city has had to be extended. And when it is considered that the city has been under unusually heavy burdens by reason of the great amount of public work under contract, it seems especially fortunate that the city has been able to pay every debt which it had incurred at maturity.

Your committee has throughout the entire year been embarrassed by the depression in the bond market. During the year 1892, bonds were sold for water and sewer purposes sufficient to carry the work of the new water line and the East Side Trunk Sewer, until about the first of August, 1893. At that time, on account of the absolute impossibility of floating municipal bonds at any rate of interest, your committee was forced to adopt the policy of making temporary loans at the legal rates of interest, and with the moneys thus secured reimbursing the water and sewer funds, in order to prevent the stoppage of work upon those two great undertakings.

In October your committee after due deliberation, decided to offer bonds for sale at 3 1-2 per cent. per annum, and was unable to secure any bids therefor, and subsequently a resolution authorizing such sale was amended by this Council, and the interest on such bonds was fixed at 4 per cent. per annum. \$450,000 worth of water and sewer bonds were sold and delivered on December 1st, and that money has also been used in carrying on the work of construction. Since the first of December your committee has attempted on several occasions to sell 3 1-2 per cent. bonds but with the exception of a sale of \$100,000 worth in February, and \$50,000 on March 20th, has been unsuccessful. The reason offered by investors for their hesitation in bidding upon 3 1-2 per cent. bonds

was, that on account of pending legislation both in Washington and Albany, investors are unwilling to place their money until conditions become more fixed and permanent.

To meet the large estimates accruing monthly upon these various contracts, your committee has deemed it wise, rather than to issue long time bonds at 4 per cent., to borrow money on short time notes at low rates of interest, in some cases not greater than 3 1-2 per cent. per annum, and in one case a trifle less, and postponed the attempt to sell permanent bonds until a more favorable occasion should arise.

The money now owing to the General Fund by the East Side Trunk Sewer Fund and the Additional Water Supply Fund amounts to \$129,700, and this amount will be refunded to the General Fund whenever bonds shall be sold, or in the event of a failure to sell, by issuing the city's note in accordance with the provision of the amendment now pending in the legislature, to the water bill and the trunk sewer bill, authorizing the issuing of such notes, and out of the moneys thus secured, the notes heretofore issued, and now outstanding will be paid.

Another reason why the city has been forced to issue its promissory notes from time to time is found in the fact that prior to the first of January, all orders for the payment of money on account of local improvements were payable from the general cash in the treasury. Your committee, it will be remembered, recommended that on and after the first day of January, a change should be inaugurated, and the local improvement moneys should be separated from the general cash, and all acceptances for work done on local improvements should be paid from the local improvement fund. This method was adopted, and your committee has recommended and secured the adoption of an amendment to the charter to carry out its policy in this matter, which will result in the complete separation of moneys collected from the general city taxes, and moneys collected for local improvements. The balance of cash on hand in the General Fund in the city treasury to-day, as shown by the City Treasurer's reports submitted at this meeting has proven the wisdom of this policy, and this separation will also show at a glance where the responsibility for the necessity of issuing notes rests, and will relieve the Contingent Fund from enormous drafts for interest.

The adoption of this policy will, however, necessitate the granting of authority to the City Treasurer to issue as may be needed, local improvement bonds to run for a period not exceeding five years and to bear a rate of interest not greater than 5 per cent. per annum, payable in equal annual installments. This is done to relieve the general tax receipts from the obligation to pay all of the notes now outstanding.

There are now in the City Treasurer's office in process of collection, local assessment rolls amounting to about one million dollars, and the outstanding acceptances issued by the Executive Board in payment of local improvements amount to about \$600,000. These bonds will be issued from time to time as they may be needed. In the event that sufficient moneys shall not be received from these local assessments to meet these acceptances, then bonds will be issued to such an amount as may be required, but if the receipts shall be sufficient to meet the acceptances, no bonds will be issued.

Probably \$500,000 will be necessary to carry out the plan as contemplated, and your com-

mittee respectfully recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution authorizing such issue.

Your committee has at all times been impressed with the desirability of making provisions for the payment of the city's bonded debt, and under its direction the City Attorney has prepared an act creating a sinking fund commission. That act is now pending in the legislature and will undoubtedly become a law at an early day. This sinking fund bill as outlined will not result in the increase of taxation to the city by a single dollar. The moneys to be paid into that sinking fund are moneys that have never been used for general city purposes, with the exception of \$1,500 received from the County of Monroe, for the rent of the Arsenal site, and the regular annual appropriation authorized by the provision of the "Park Act" to be raised and set aside for the redemption of those bonds. Your committee has also deemed it expedient to pay into that fund the moneys hereafter to be received from the Rochester Railway Company as a percentage upon its gross receipts. This fund will undoubtedly prove a source of much benefit to the city in years to come.

In conclusion your committee desires to call attention to the faithfulness and efficiency exhibited by the City Treasurer throughout the entire year. It is proper to say that undoubtedly much of the credit for the very satisfactory condition of the city's finances is due to his excellent management and untiring zeal.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester :

Gentlemen:—Your Lamp and Electric Committee submits the following annual report for the year ending March 31st, 1894:

Your honorable board last year consolidated the Lamp and Electric Committees into one, called the "Lamp and Electricity." The result of this change has been a more systematic method of disposing of matters referred to this committee. Heretofore the subjects considered by the Lamp and Electric Committee were so closely connected as to cause some friction in the work of the two committees.

Acting under the authority of resolutions passed by your honorable board, your committee has during the year discontinued all the incandescent street lights and replaced them by arc lights. While this change has somewhat increased the expense of the public lighting the benefit to the territory so lighted justified such action.

Your committee is of the opinion that the best and cheapest method of street lighting at present prices paid by the city is by the arc light. Therefore we wish to call your attention to the fact that the city has in use on the streets, and is paying for, four hundred and twenty-six (426) gas lamps. We would suggest that during the coming year these be replaced by arc lights.

There is considerable territory in the outside section of the city which has been recently built up, and for which provisions will have to be made for lighting in the near future. The requests for lights have been so large that your committee could not recommend the granting of all, and keep the expenses of the Street Lighting Department inside of the amount appropriated by your honorable board for this purpose. For this reason a large number of applications for lights, which, in the opinion of your committee were needed, were laid over for future action. In placing lights your committee have been guided wholly by the necessities of the localities in which lights were asked for.

Washington Square and Plymouth Park, which have been improved the past year, have been lighted by means of arc lights placed on ornamented park poles which were bought by your honorable board for that purpose. The wires leading to these poles are underground, doing away with the overhead wires for these lights. Poles and lights put up in this manner add greatly to the appearance of the parks.

With the completion of the underground conduit system, and the placing therein of the wires and cables of the electric light companies, some provisions had to be made for lighting the streets in which such conduits were laid from the underground wires, so that the poles carrying the overhead wires could be removed. The chairman of your Lamp and Electricity Committee, with the City Electrician, were authorized to investigate the subject, and on their recommendation your board adopted for street lighting purposes on the streets in which a conduit is, or shall be laid, and the wires place therein, a pole similar to the one now in use on Fifth avenue in New York city, and ordered Main street from Plymouth avenue to East avenue, lighted with double incandescent arc lights placed on the new style of poles, at an expense of forty (40) cents per night for each pole of two lights. This part of Main street which will take twenty-six (26) of these poles and double lights would now be lighted in this manner, and the unsightly wooden poles and all wires removed, but for the fact that the street is being improved, and in place a new curb line will be established and your committee did not think it advisable to set these poles until the new curb was in place.

Provisions should be made the coming year to extend this system of lighting on Main street from East avenue to University avenue, also on State and Exchange streets, from the Erie canal to Allen street. This method of lighting will increase the total cost of street lighting somewhat because of the fact that these streets are now very poorly lighted. On Sunday and holiday nights, and every night after the store lights are out, Main and State streets are very dark, and your committee have received a large number of complaints in regard to the lighting of these streets. The price of forty (40) cents per double light your committee considers a very low one, as the city of New York pays fifty (50) cents for the same lights. We are of the opinion that when these streets are lighted by this system with ground glass shades, giving a soft mellow light, placed on ornamental poles, and all the other poles and wires removed, the appearance of the streets will be such that the citizens will agree that the extra expenditure for this purpose was money well invested.

by the company. The report of the Rochester Gas & Electric Company showing the cost of construction, and other information called for in the contract between the city and the company in relation to building conduits, is herewith submitted.

As shown by this report, the construction of the underground conduit system laid by this company has cost \$94,371.11.

The work of clearing the streets, in which conduits are laid, of overhead poles and wires should be carried to completion as soon as possible.

The Bell Telephone Company has a conduit system for its exclusive use, and the overhead wires owned by it have been taken down and placed in its conduit in the following streets:

East and West Main streets from Erie canal to North Goodman street. (East of N. Y. C bridge); North and South St. Paul streets, from Mt. Hope avenue to Vincent place bridge; Monroe place from South St. Paul street to Monroe avenue; Monroe avenue from Monroe place to South Goodman street; East avenue from East Main street to Portsmouth terrace; North street from East Main street to Webster; State and Exchange streets from Clarissa street bridge to Lyell avenue; Lyell avenue from State to Frank street; North Clinton street from East Main to Marietta street; making 8.5 miles of conduit and 52.25 miles of single ducts owned by this company under the streets of the city. Total amount of underground conduits of all kinds, 12 miles; total miles of ducts in such conduits, 111.45.

The city has removed the overhead wires of the Fire Alarm, Police Patrol and Water Works Department on East and West Main streets from Erie canal to Scio street; North and South St. Paul streets from Mt. Hope avenue to Marietta street; State and Exchange streets from Erie canal to Lyell avenue; Lyell avenue from State to Frank street.

During the past year the State Board of Fire Insurance Underwriters has inaugurated a system of inspection of all electrical appliances used in buildings in every city in the state, and ratings are made of a risk with reference to a set of rules adopted by it governing the running of wires, etc. While these rules are in some particulars very strict and the insurance men may in some cases be rather arbitrary in the enforcement of them, in general the precautions asked for by the State Board are a benefit to the property interests of the city, and if complied with greatly lessen the chance of fire caused by the electric current. The various electric industries have grown to such proportions as to place them in the front rank of business interests of the city.

Some statistics of this industry which has sprung up in the last ten years may be of interest to your honorable board. There are today 3,975.25 miles of wire used by all companies doing a business in which the electric current is used, divided among the companies as follows:

2,686.5 miles are used by the Telephone Company.

302 miles by the Western Union and Postal Telegraph Companies.

502 miles by the Rochester Gas & Electric Company, the Citizens Power Company and the Central Light and Power Company.

196.5 miles by the Rochester Railroad Company.

252 miles by the city for municipal purposes and a number of lines owned by private parties for telephone and telegraph purposes. Of this amount 1,990.75 miles are underground and 1,984.75 miles overhead. The number of poles on the streets of the city are 8,584, of

which the Western Union Telegraph Company owns 310, the Postal Telegraph Company 190, The Rochester Gas & Electric and Brush Companies, 4,334, Citizen's Light & Power Company, 40, Rochester Railroad Company, 1,820.

The Western Union and Postal Telegraph Companies have each one main office; in addition to these there are seventeen branch offices located in different parts of the city for the accommodation of their patrons. Connected with the telegraph business there are 1,002 call-boxes for the purpose of calling message boys.

The Telephone Company operates 1,282 telephones in this city, 166 of which are connected to the central office by metallic circuits with no other instrument on the line. There are thirty-six (36) metallic combination lines, more than one instrument on same line; 857 are connected by grounded circuits direct line. There are 63 grounded circuits combination line. There are 58 long distance and 1,224 ordinary telephones in use. There are 39,958 incandescent and 3,131 arc lights, including street lights, used in the city, of which the lighting companies furnish 28,493 incandescent and 3,659 arc lights; 472 arc and 1,465 incandescent lights are operated by parties owning their own plants. The average amount of power used for motor purposes, exclusive of the street railroad use, is 1,663.5 H. P.; this amount being delivered to 1,257 motors. Of this amount of power the light and power companies furnish 633.5 H. P.; 430 H. P. being furnished by private parties. The Rochester Railroad Company operates 73.63 miles of track; 105 is the average number of cars run using an average of 2,600 H. P. This company has a plant of 3,000 E. H. P. capacity. The total amount of electrical energy used in this city for light and power purposes is 10,487 E. H. P. There are seven firms doing an electrical contracting business in the city. These firms do all classes of electrical work from putting in an electric door-bell to installing the largest electric plants. There are 1,034 persons directly connected with, and earning a livelihood in the different branches of the electric business in the city. These are divided into the following classes:

Engineers, 48.

Firemen, 17.

Dynamo men, 37.

Bookkeepers and clerks, 30.

Telegraph operators, 47.

Telephone operators, 28.

Inspectors, 7.

Motor men and conductors, 377.

Trimmers, 41.

Drivers, helpers, etc., 107.

Message boys, 70.

Members of electrical contracting firms and men employed by them, 95.

The construction and maintenance of the electric lines and appliances in this city is fully as good, if not better, than the same class of work done in other cities. Hoping the same high standard will be maintained for work done in the future, your committee congratulates the various companies and firms who have done the electrical work in the past on the quality of such work, it being done in such a manner that fatal accidents are very few, and the losses from fire caused by the electric current small.

As the manner in which the electric work in the city is done is of great importance to the citizens generally, and in order to confine the business to parties who are competent to do such work, your committee would

recommend to your honorable board that action be taken which will result in the appointment of an examining board, composed of electricians vested with power to examine applicants, and to grant permits to do electric work, and making it a misdemeanor for any person to do work of this kind without a permit from this examining board.

Electrolysis, the result of which is the eating away of any metal conductor of electricity which is underground, such as water and gas pipes, the lead covering of electric cables, etc., is a new element of danger to property caused by the use of the electric current, which has developed since the introduction of the street railroad system with the large amount of current necessary for its operation. This trouble has been quite serious, and is general throughout the country. Plans are now being carried out in this city which will remedy the evil.

The president of the board then delivered his valedictory address as follows:

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

"We have reached the end of another fiscal year in the life of this municipality, and permit me, on retiring from the position which I have occupied by your favor during the past year, to address you briefly on topics suggested by the occasion.

From the standpoint of municipal progress, the year now closing has been an eventful one in the history of our beautiful city, because of the several important and extensive improvements undertaken or completed. It is significant, and it should be a source of satisfaction to every resident of Rochester, that our city has made a distinctly forward movement during that year, and that, too, in the face of the widespread business depression, the blighting influence of which we were not altogether able to escape.

If now we are requested to give an account of our stewardship we may point to better paved streets, an improved financial system and an honest and economical management of every department of the city government.

The record of this body for the year 1893 and 1894 shows that you have been faithful to your trust and watchful of the vast interests committed to your care. The ability and fidelity shown by your different committees and the individual members of this body entitle you to the thanks of your constituents. Every member of this council who sought re-election was returned by a handsome majority. The fact is significant and speaks for itself.

I have referred already in a general way to an innovation in the financial system of the city, introduced during the past year. Under the supervision of your able finance committee a remedy for the embarrassment arising from the mingling of general and local improvement taxes has been applied with the result that embarrassment from this source will be avoided in the future. Our city has passed safely through the financial crisis of last summer, and much credit therefor is due to the able management of your finance committee and efficient city treasurer.

Since April 1, 1893, pavements, sewers and other street improvements have been completed representing in the grand total an aggregate expense of over \$500,000 to the property owners of Rochester. During the same period we have seen the completion of two substantial stone arch structures over the Genesee river and the iron bridge over the Central railroad tracks at East Main street. These last named improvements, the need of which was so long recognized by our citizens, and especially by the business interests of the city, will long remain as evidence of the good judgment displayed by this council in the matter of local improvements. Discarding the narrow policy that takes heed only of present necessities, we have legislated not only for ourselves but for posterity. This is the application of sound business methods in the management of municipal affairs. It is true economy and our successors will do well to continue along the same lines.

In this connection it is proper that notice

be taken of the criticism expressed in some quarters that we are proceeding too fast in the matter of local improvements, thereby creating a burden of taxation which in many instances is onerous to bear, especially in times of commercial and business stagnation, such as have been experienced during the past year. In the twelve months that I have had the honor to preside over your deliberations, pavements, sewers and bridges, costing over \$1,000,000, have been completed in this city. While I believe that under ordinary conditions a liberal policy should be pursued in regard to local improvements, it does seem just and reasonable that in a matter of this kind the capacity of the people to pay should be taken into consideration and their wishes, as in all things, respected.

In my judgment a conservative policy in respect to local improvements should be adopted by this common council, at least, until such time as a revival of trade and business shall bring greater prosperity to those from whose incomes the cost of these improvements must be defrayed.

Since we met one year ago, satisfactory progress has been made with the new water conduit and the East Side trunk sewer. We are assured that before another year rolls around the pipe line will be completed, and there will then be available a supply of water sufficient for all demands for years to come.

The trunk sewer is now rapidly nearing completion, less than 1,200 feet remaining to be finished. It is to be regretted that legal complications have retarded progress with the West Side sewer, postponing the day when the large territory which it is intended to benefit will also be supplied with adequate drainage facilities.

With the addition of two new fire houses and improved apparatus our fire department has come to be the pride of the city.

Provision has already been made for the erection of a new central police station. Rochester has one of the most efficient police departments to be found in the United States, and it is proper that it should be provided with accommodation commensurate with its needs and importance. In other cities the precinct station plan has been tried and found satisfactory. As the growth of our city may create the necessity the plan will undoubtedly be adopted here. For the present, however, it would seem that good results may be secured without the additional outlay which this system involves.

In conclusion, gentlemen, let me thank you for the uniform courtesy extended to me as your presiding officer."

Ald. McMillan moved that the address be received, filed and published. Carried.

Ald. Forsyth, on behalf of the board, in recognition of the services of the president and as an expression of the good will and esteem of the board, presented the president with a diamond stud.

President Adams, in well chosen language, expressed his appreciation of the kindness of his colleagues.

The president then declared the board adjourned sine die.
