possible vigor the passage of the original enabling act.

Mr. Gray's report, which has been but recently presented to your committee, is hereby submitted to your honorable body for action. It bears evidence of careful research and most diligent study on the part of the author, and pays a high compliment to our talented engineer, whose views on the subject of the disposal of the sewage on the east side of the river, are fully concurred in by Mr. Gray.

Your committee endorses the report of Mr. Kuichling, supported, as it is, by such eminent authority, and recommends that the city surveyor be directed to, at once, prepare an ordinance, or ordiances, for the construction of the East side trunk sewer, in accordance with Mr. Kuichling's plans.

SIR: The undersigned having been appointed Six: The undersigned naving been appointed by your Committee under authority of a resolution of the Common Council dated December 2, 1890, to make an examination of the subject, as contained in the "Report on the proposed Trunk Sewer". For the East Side of the "City of Rochester" made by Emil Kuichling, Civil Engineer, and report thereon, respectfully presents the following: following:

In pursuance of the duties under this resolu-tion, I commenced a careful examination and study of Mr. Kuichling's report, December 9,

1890.

On the 16th of that month I visited Rochester for the purpose of looking over the ground, consulting with your Committee, and your engineer, Mr. Kuichling.

During my stay of four days in Rochester I examined plans, profiles and estimates; examined on the ground the proposed location of all works contemplated in said plans, inspected the Genesee River above the city, its course through and below the city, and particularly at the point where the proposed Trunk Sewer is to discharge into the river.

I also visited Lake Ontario and inspected the land lying between the Lake and Norton street,

land lying between the Lake and Norton street, together with possible locations of the proposed Precipitation Tanks. I likewise visited Irondequoit Bay, and carefully examined the territory between the Bay and Culver road.

The line of proposed marginal sewers were also gone over on the ground; the locations of the proposed overflows were visited, and many other points relating to the scheme were examined. On the evening of the 18th of December, at a meeting appointed for this purpose, I listened to views expressed by various citizens interested in the resident of the service of the control of the

views expressed by various chizens interested in the project.

Shortly after my return from Rochester, a large number of plans, profiles, estimates, etc., were sent me by your committee that I might give the subject further study and enter more minutely into the details of the data from which the plans were projected and report made.

Seldom if ever have I been called upon to ex-Seldom if ever have I been called upon to examine a proposed sewerage scheme where so call, comprehensive and accurate data have been collected and arranged for the consideration of the work in haad. The worth of this data will be more fully realized as the work of construction is carried on. It will be the means of preventing the waste of much money, for conclusions based on facts are valuable, while if based or assumption they may lead to grave mistakea.

sions based on facts are valuable, while if based on assumption they may lead to grave mistakes. Mr. Kuichling has so completely covered the whole ground, has so fully anticipated ail questions that might arise, and so exhaustively and fairly presented all the points at issue, and furthermore as this question has been so thoroughly discussed in your city, not only as relates to the present case in question, but to the subject in general, it cannot be expected that I will make new discoveries or present any fresh suggestions. tions.

In prosecuting this work my aim has been to ascertain the best possible means of collecting, conducting and disposing of the sewage of the district under consideration, (having in view also district under consideration, (naying in view also the future disposal of sewage from other parts of the city) at the least possible expense, in a thoroughly sanitary manner.

It may be well to state briefly the necessities of the proposed trunk sewer for the East Side, as well as the advantages to be gained by the construction of it.

struction of it.

First-Much of the sewage that is collected in the sewers now built, is discharged into the various creeks flowing into Irodequoit bay. It is alleged that the discharge of this sewage into is alleged that the discharge of this sewage into the creeks, has so contaminated them that they have become a nuisance to the abutters. I am informed that the city is frequently sued and that damages are collected by the riparian own-ers for thus discharging the sewage. It is also alleged that these streams have become so con-taminated as to interfere with the development of this property which would otherwise be

Second—Parts of the East Side cannot properly Second—Parts of the East Side cannot properly be sewered without one or more trunk sewers, into which lateral or district sewers may discharge; and as sections of the East Side are being rapidly built upon, suitable sewerage for these parts become an absolute necessity, for the proper development of the territory.

Third—Some of the sewers now built on the East Side are, it is alleged, during times of heavy rains, engorged, from which trouble they can best be relieved by means of some new outlet or outlets, which the proposed trunk sewer is intended to supply.

tended to supply.

Fourth—Much of the territory tributary to the trunk sewer will, as built upon, suffer in the future from surface water during heavy storms, unless some relief is furnished. The proposed trunk sewer is intended to meet this demand. Fifth—Genesse river, although not perhaps at

Fifth—Genesee river, although not perhaps at present polluted to an extent to render it obnoxious to the senses, will become more and more so as the quantity of sewage empties into it increases. The proposed trunk sewer is so designed that the sewage may in the future be taken to a precipitation works, and there be so treated that the effluent for all time can be safely discharged into the Genesee river at the point proposed, viz. below the lower fells.

discharged into the Genesee river at the point proposed, viz.: below the lower falls.

Mr. Kuichling has so fully entered into all the various points and necessities of the case, and has so completely and clearly described the various methods of sewage disposal that I can scarcely add anything new to his statement of the case or his description of disposal, and for me to repeat them would but result in the taxing of your patience and a waste of your time, and I will therefore content myself with enumerating the various inportant questions in connection with the case, and giving my own conclusions in rethe case, and giving my own conclusions in re-

I will, however, mention one very important fact which should not be overlooked in the consideration of land disposal of the sewage which s brought out by the contour map of the terri-

tory stretching from the river to the bay, and from Norton street to the lake, viz.; the irregularities of surface will render it necessarily expensive to put it in suitable condition for receiving sewage. An examination of the territory in question cannot fail to show this fact.

One of the first, and often one of the most important question that arises, in designing a Sewerage System, is: Whether it shall be upon the Combined, or the Separate system, which latter provides only for the dry weather flow of sewage, together with possibly a very limited amount of storm-water; while, the Combined system contemplates providing for the sewage together with the storm-water, varying in quantity depending upon the conditions of the territory to be drained.

tity depending upon the conditions of the territory to be drained.

The question of the system to be adopted is often largely dependent upon the disposal to be made of the sewage. I have closely considered the requirements of the "East Side" together with the possible methods of disposing of the sewage, and fully concur in the conclusions arrived at by Mr. Kuichling; that the Combined System is the one most worthy of our adoption. As sewers are designed to meet not only the present needs, but those resulting from future growth the question of the probable future non-

growth, the question of the probable future population becomes important. Mr. Kuichling's conclusions in regard to the probable future population of Rochester, I consider sound and prudent; my own estimates varying but slightly from his

#### DISPOSAL OF THE SEWAGE.

Among the different methods of disposal of sewage of the City of Bochester, may be mentioned: Disposal into Lake Ontario, or Genesee River, or into Irondequoit Buy, with or without chemical treatment, or the disposal of thesewage upon land by irrigation, or by intermittent filtration; and, as has before been stated these systems of disposal have been so fully and fairly set forth by Mr. Kuichling in his report that I will not go over the grounds again.

I have considered the estimated quantity of sewage to be disposed of, together with the existing condition and necessary attending expense of such disposal, and I reach the conclusion that the way to dispose of the sewage of Rochester is not by irrigation or intermittent filtration.

I am convinced, from observation abroad, as well as in this country, and from experienced as well as in this country, and from experienced gain in the construction and care, for several years, of the Sewarage Farm, upon which the sewage of the State Institutions of Rhode Island is deposed of, that the quantity of sewage assumed by Mr. Kuichling that can be safely applied per acre per day by "filtration through land" or by "sewage farming" is fully as much as practical experience will show is admissable. I am aware that many experiments have been

as practical experience will show is admissable. I am aware that many experiments have been made that would indicate a larger quantity could be applied, for instance those at Lawrence, Mass., so ably conducted by Hiram F. Mills, Civil Engineer, but it must be borne in mind that the filter-beds at Lawrence are small, being but a tew feet in diameter, and therefore every square inch of the surface of the filter can be reached in the application of sewage, and that the sewage applied to these beds is practically strained sewage, free from the more solid substances which would otherwise collect upon the surface of the filter and tend to prevent so free a soakage of the sewage tend to prevent so free a soakage of the sewage into the earth.

On the other hand, either in ent filtration or irrigation on al scale, it is not possible the area appropriately. tent tent filtration or irrigation on a practical scale, it is not possible to thus fully utilize the area appropriated; and furthermore, solids of almost every description, such as excrement, sticks, bottles, leaves, fruit skins, rags, dead animals, and a great variety of debris that find their way into the sewers are spread upon the surface of the ground, forming a crust, or sludge, which, unless removed, or dug into the soil, prevent the earth from continuing to readily absorb the sewage. a practiit is

In my opinion, the cost of applying the sewage to the land is under, rather than over-estimated by Mr. Kuiching.

An examination of Irondequoit Bay and its surroundings, and a full consideration of the sanitary difficulties in taking the sewage to that point, without the incurring of a very large expenditure together with the detriment that would probably result to property in that vicinity by the presence of sewage, convince me that this place of disposal is wholly out of the question

The existing condition, "the attendant physical difficulties," clearly set forth in Mr. Kuichling's report, of taking the sewage to Lake Ontario, will be fully realized by careful examination of the territory lying between Norton streat and the Lake

street and the Lake.

street and the Lake.

I fully agree with him in the conclusion he has reached in regard to thus disposing of, sewage into the Lake, for in my opinion it is by no means sure that preliminary clarification of the sewage will not be found necessary in the future, which as the report states "will increase the expediture to such an extent as to make

future, which as the report states "will increase the expenditure to such an extent as to make the project financially inexpedient."

In regard to the discharge of sewage into the Genesee River, I have carefully examined on the ground, the point proposed for such a discharge, and I have considered the relative flow of the and I have considered the relative flow of the river as compared with the quantity of sewage to be discharged, the peculiarities of the river as relates to the falls, velocity of flow, and mixed chemical character of the water, and I concur with Mr. Kuichling in the conclusions he has arrived at relative thereto.

arrived at relative thereto.

I consider the proposed point of discharge, as the one most desirable on sanitary and economical grounds. As has been intimated by Mr. Kuichling, no hard and fast rule can be adopted regarding the exact amount of crude sewage which may safely be discharged into a stream; so much depends upon the nature of the sewage, the conditions of the river, and the chemical constituents of the water. While I have no doubt the time will soon come, when the sewage, if discharged at this point, will need to be treated to a certain extent, during the Summer months, I am of the opinion that it may be safely discharged without treatment, during the Winter months of the year. The time when it will become necessary to treat the sewage, to prevent its so polluting the river as to form a nuisance, can more correctly and economically be determined upon, by trial than by theory or prediction.

The soundness of the recommendation, as contained in the report, of so planning the proposed trunk sewer for the "Bast Side," as well as all other projected main sewers in the city, as to admit of a future division of the sewage from the river during the warm season, without incurring unnecessary expense when such "measures will be demanded" is too apparent

to need comment.
When the time shall come that the river is contaminated by sewage so as to produce a nuisance. I believe that some form of precipitation will be the most practical and economical method of gining relief. I fully agree with Mr. Kuichling in the views he has given relating to precipitation. I further believe that his estimates of cost of treatment are high enough. I am aware that higher estimates have been made, but at the same time that most of such estimates but at the same time that most of such estimates were made when little or no data, of chemical treatment of sewage in this country was available. Of late years, however, as precipitation works have been in operation in this country, it has been found that many of the estimates are in excess of the actual cost of treatment. The Sewage Precipitation Works at Worcester, Mass., designed and now under the care of Charles A. Allen. City Engineer, for the treatment of a portion of the sewage at Worcester, demonstrate that not only may such works be operated almost entirely free from offensive odors, but even at a lower cost of treatment than

the figures given by Mr. Kuichling. The sewage at Worcester is, however, probable more dilute than of many cities.

I examined with your Engineer the route proposed for the Trunk Sewer, going over the ground the entire length. I also visited the places at which it is proposed to have storm outlets, and I am satisfied that the locations determined upon by Mr. Kuichling, both for the Trunk Sewer and storm outlets, cannot be improved upon, excepting by such slight modifications as may possibly become necessary, due to the further development and improvement of the territory before the sewer is built.

I have examined the principle upon which the sizes of the sewers have been determined upon, and am satisfied they are sufficient to meet the requirements.

requirements.

I have also checked over the estimates of cost far enough to satisfy myself that they were carefully and accurately made, and that they are

large enough to form a safe basis of action.

In conclusion I will say that I have critically examined the scheme as proposed, in all its parts, and I fail to find any points upon which I can disagree in the recommendations made by Mr. Kuichling in his report.

GENTLEMEN—The Executive Board begs leave to call your attention to the following communication transmitted to the Common Council last year, and to suggest a serious consideration of its recommendations in order that such speedy and suitable action shall be taken as the importance of the matter demands:

A section of Mill street has been added this year.

July 1, 1890.

The Executive Board respectfully suggests to your honorable body that there is urgent necessity to permanently improve State street from West Main to Platt street; to relay the pavement on State street from Platt street to Vincent Place; to permanently improve West and East Main streets from Fitzhugh street to University avenue, and Mill street from Central avenue to Brown street. The pavement of Main street, between the points named, and on State street to Platt street, is utterly worn out, as the general overhauling which it received in the relaying of the street railroad tracks makes evident to every observer. The continual tearing up and replacing of the pavement, together with the immense and increasing traffic of those important thoroughfares has so worn the pavement that it is nothing but a makeshift, to put it in place again. If those streets were properly paved they could be kept much cleaner than it is possible to keep them now with their irregular, uneven surfaces.

The Executive Board therefore earnestly recommends that the city surveyor be directed to compile the necessary ordinances for the above named improvements.

To the Finance Committee of the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—I have to report that I have made the usual careful examination of the city

made the usual careful examination of the city treasurer's books and accounts for the month of March, and, also, for the several days in April, during which the late treasurer performed the duties of the office, awaiting his successor's assumption of the same.

To be a little more explicit, in this closing report, I may state that I have, during the past twelve months, examined all matters appertaining to the business of the treasurer's office, from the morning of March 6, 1890, when Mr. Fleckenstein took charge of its duties and responsibilities, to the morning of April 7th inst. when his duties, etc., ceased, and all the funds in hand or

in banks were turned over to the custody and charge of his successor, Mr. Williams, and were duly receipted for by him—all being found to be in amounts exactly as called for by the ledger balances.

A trial balance brought down to date last named, which I have carefully examined, proves the accuracy of the books, all the items being correct transcripts from the same.

Since my last monthly report the Council has been presented with the Treasurer's report for the fiscal year, ending March 24, 1891. From recent and previous examinations of the contents of this report, I unreservably affirm that, in every respect, it can be relied upon as strictly accurate. accurate.

I have also examined the Treasurer's annual I have also examined the Treasurer's annual report, in regard to the condition and general affairs of Mt. Hope Cemetery, and I find that all the accounts have been properly and accurately kept, and that the funds have been disposed of strictly in accordance with law, and, evidently, a justicegard to the interests to be conserved and

The following brief, financial statement shows a very satisfactory condition of affairs in regard to this important trust:

A careful calculation, however, will disclose the fact, that these bonds are much more than simply "provided for," for the whole of the present amount of the fund, \$72,201.71, might be present amount of the fund, \$72,201.71, might be withdrawn from the banks and used at the discretion of the Council for any purpose of expenditure authorized by the charter; and by continuing to deposit the net receipts from the railroad title, 1,908, there would be sufficient in the sinking fund to pay the \$72,000, the last of the bonds, and leave a surplus of \$36,766.60. In the event that the fund remains as now, and is manged as in the past, then the result would be that

event that the fund remains as now, and is managed as in the past, then the result would be that after payment of the bonds named—that is, all the G. V. R. R. bonds—there would be a remaining surplus of \$152,898.28.

It may be well to state here, that the city is receiving from the "Erie" Railway Company \$18,000 per annum, payable semi-annually, and that from this amount the interest on the outstanding bonds (January 1, 1890 \$116,000) is paid; also \$4,000 per annum in liquidation of bonds, and the balance is placed in the sinking fund.

It will be observed above that in the contract with the "Erie" or New York, Lake Erie & Western railroad, whatever that may be, of which more hereafter, that the word "lease" is used, but as this term is generally understood it is a misnomer, as I have good reason to believe. It is a contract, in some form, by which the railway company bound itself to pay 6 per cent. per anum, semi-annually, on the city's Genesee Valley railroad stock of \$300,000, and is binding on the parties to the contract for ninety-nine years from the date of its execution. This fact I learn from two of the surviving members of the gentlemen, Samuel Wilder and John H. Brewster, who negotiated the contract. But more than this, in any definite form, these gentlemen have no distinct recollection, and it is a singular fact that nowhere in the published Common Council proceedings have I been able to find any record

that nowhere in the published Common Council proceedings have I been able to find any record of this particular and final transaction.

During the fiscal year of 1870-71 especially, we find resolutions and resolutions, drafts of contracts proposed, vetoes, references to enabling acts granting to the city the right to sell or negotiate its interests in the Genesee Valley Railroad stock, but nothing whatever in this or subsequent years, to give any definite idea of what the final (and existing) contract really was and is, as to particulars in detail.

In the Common Council proceedings of 1875-76, a resolution was passed for the appointing of a committee to ascertain where the Genesee Valley Railroad stock was, as "no one knew." The committee was appointed, but its report is not to be found; but attached to the City Treasurer's report of that year is this memorandum in a "schedule of securities, etc., belonging to the city aud in the Treasurer's office": "Certificate of 3,000 sharcs of Genesee Valley Railroad stock at \$100 each, and papers relating thereto. The certificate in the Mayor's possession." Presumably this stock may be now in the Mayor's safe, and the "papers relating thereto," but nothing has been published in recent years, to my recollection, to confirm this supposition.

On application to the Mayor to inspect the safe, in reference to this particular matter, his consent was freely granted, but, unfortunately for the object, the keys have been mislaid, and that search had to be postponed. It may be that the "papers relating thereto" above mentioned, contain the information which has thus far, apparently, never been published in the city's records. In conclusion I would respectfully suggest that the Council should, by a committee or otherwise, endeavor to get at fuller facts in this matter, and have the report of the findings in the case published in its proceedings, so that hereafter we and our successors may know where to find a reliable statement in relation to an important city interest.

It appears that she does not use this outlet, and the tax, having been paid, should be refunded.

GENTLEMEN:—Your Select Committee, appointed April 21st, to investigate the condition of the extension of Exchange street, southward from Clarissa street, visited the locality in question on Friday, May 1st.

Since the land covered by the street was obtained by the city, the W. N. Y. & P. R'y Co. has constructed a good and substantial iron highway bridge across their tracks in the line of the street. At a point about one hundred feet north of the bridge a track has been laid crossing the street. At a point about one nundred feet north of the bridge, a track has been laid crossing the street obliquely, running into the lumber yard of J. H. Foley & Co., on the westerly or northerly side of the street, and the track, being on a grade, renders the use of the street by the public dangerous. On the east side of the street, the Delaware & Lackawanna Coal Company , transact a wholesale coal business, and, as their only outlet from their yard is into this portion of the street it is advisable that their only outlet from their yard is into this portion of the street, it is advisable that the grade of the street be kept within such limits the grade of the street be kept within such limits as will allow said company to have free ingress and egress. On the west or north side of the street, a lumber business is transacted by Messrs. Foley & Co., their goods being received via the Western New York & Pennsylvania Railway Company and the New York, Lake Erie & Western Railway Company, the latter using said track crossing said street, as aforesaid. This railroad crossing in our opinion, should be abandoned and removed from the street, as its location and direction renders it extremely objectionable and dangerous to the traveling public.

public On July 11, 1888, the Delaware & Hudson Canal Company, then being the owners of the land covered by the street, entered into a contract On July 11, 1888, the Delaware & Hudson Canal Company, then being the owners of the land covered by the street, entered into a contract with the city to convey said land to the city, within four months after the confirmation of the assessment roll for the street opening or extension, which was recorded in the Monroe County Clerk's office on July 23, 1888, in Liber 435 of Deeds at page 492 and such deed of conveyance was given by said company to the city, which was recorded in said County Clerk's office on December 20, 1888, in Liber 447 of Deeds at page 260. On August 1, 1888, a portion of the company's lands, lying west and northerly of said street, and bounded by the street line, was conveyed by said company to John H. Foley, of the firm of said Foley & Co., and in the last mentioned deed was a direct reference to the rights of the city under said contract, and an agreement on the part of the grantee to pay, as part of the consideration therefor, the assessment that the city might make for said street opening against the said lands conveyed abuting upon the street, which deed was recorded in said Clerk's office on January 13, 1890, in Liber 464 of Deeds, at page 188, so that it clearly appears that Messrs. Foley & Co. had full notice of the contemplated, and subsequently acquired, rights of the city in and to the lands embraced within the street line aforesaid. While recognizing fully the advantage said crossing is for business purposes, and in no manner wishing to business purposes, and in no manner wishing to business purposes, and in no manner wishing to hundly deprive citizens of their legitimate business facilities, yet, in our opinion, the general public demand that this crossing be removed.

Your Committee might further remark, that it has ascertained that this branch can be removed and connected with the Western New York & Pennsylvania Railway at some point south of the railroad bridge, thereby giving nearly equal facilities for business to Messrs. Foley & Co., and at but slight increase in the cost t

Your Committee, therefore, recommends that said railroad track, crossing said street at grade aforesaid, be immediately removed, and hereafter prohibited from occupying any portion of the street; that the City Surveyor be directed to prepare an ordinance for the grading of said street, between the railroad and Clarissa street,

and the construction of a pine plank walk, except where crosswalks are needed, on each side of the street, between the each side of the street, between the limits above mentioned; that the grade of the center line of the street, at a point opposite the north line of Messrs. This board would respectfully represent, that during the past ten or more years, complaints from various points in the Second and Eighth wards have been made to this board, and to other departments, of offensive and deleterious odors prevailing or appearing in said parts of the city. That, in that time, several investigations to ascertain the cause were made by proper author-

tities, but without result.

That, in the month of March last, these complaints were referred to this Board by the Executive Board, for investigation, and action, to abate the nuisance, if found to exist. And,

thereupon, your Honorable body appropriated the sum of \$300 to this Board, upon its request, to pay the expenses attending such investiga-

This Board proceeded, at once, with the investigation to a satisfactory conclusion. That, as a result of such inspection and examination, we find that one cause emanates from the so-called find that one cause emanates from the so-called Trowbridge street sewer. Said sewer, according to the findings of the investigation, is a disused sewer, no longer required for public or private use. That said sewer is so filled and surcharged with gas and refuse, including "spent naptha," or other products of gas material, the accumulation of several years, that the nuisance emanating from it, can only be abated by the removal and entire obliteration of said sewer.

Therefore, this board respectfully recommends that said sewer be removed and obliterated, according to the accompanying resolution adopted

cording to the accompanying resolution adopted by this board, declaring said sewer to be a nui-sance, by reason of its being detrimental to the public health.

We find the water at present flowing through Deep Hollow polluted with a large amount of sewage; it is considerably colored by the filth it holds in suspension, and is characterized by an exceedingly offensive odor, notwithstanding the free dilution that it has at this season from the large amount of rain water derivage which there large amount of rain water drainage which flows through the Hollow. In the dry months of summer and autumn this flow would be of an entirely different character. At such times the sewage comes down the Hollow in a much more concentrated form and is then convergenced in the concentrated form and is then convergenced in the convergence of the concentration of the sewage convergence and the sewage convergence of the sewage convergenc sewage comes down the Hollow in a much more concentrated form and is then correspondingly perlicious in its character. Your Committee, standing at a considerable distance from the stream, were made very uncomfortable during their examination by the sickening stench pervading the air of the entire neighborhood. The outlet of this stream flows directly under the large furniture factory of Hayden & Crouch. In this factory at present, one hundred and fifty men are employed. It is evident from inspection, that the close proximity of this large open sewer is a serious menace to the health of all employed in this establishment. At times the oder from the current of filth flowing toward the building, and under, is quite overpowering, and the re-

the current of filth flowing toward the building, and under, is quite overpowering, and the results are said to be apparent at all times in the great amount of sickness which has prevailed among the workmen in the factory.

The condition of things, at present existing should no longer be allowed to continue. Your committee, therefore, respectfully insist that it is the duty of the Board of Health to declare the present condition of Deep Hollow at and near its outlet, a public nuisance. In view of the fact that there is no prospect of the construction of a closed sewer through Deep Hollow for some time

to come, it becomes necessary for the Board to take measures for abating this nuisance temporarily. We recommend, therefore, that the Common Council be requested to construct in a temporary form, a short length of closed sewer near the outlet of Deep Hollow, some two hundred feet long. This may be made of iron pipe somewhere about fifteen inches in diameter, terminating at a point near the river bank, and beginning at a distance of some two hundred feet above the furniture factory, in the bed of the present stream. It will be necessary, of course, to construct a small tempory dam of light timber work at this point, in order to collect the water and send it through the iron pipe. At the point where the proposed temporary sewer runs under the building, there might be constructed a swinging water gate, so that in times of flood relief would be given to the overflow, in case the small sewer should be taxed beyond its capacity.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO TEAMSTERS.

By Ald. Lewis (by request)— The Common Council of the city of Rochester

The Common Council of the city of Rochester do ordain as follows:
Section 1. The Mayor may from time to time license so many persons as he may deem proper to exercise the vocation of teamsters and such license shall entitle them to carry sand, earth, clay, ice, brick, stones, coal and iron, logs and umber for hire of wages. Such license shall be granted upon the payment into the City Treasury of the sum of \$5.00 by each and every person asking a license for that purpose who is a resident of this city and of the age of 21 years and either a citizen of the United States or else has declared his intention to become a citizen in conformity with the laws of the United States and who proves to the satisfaction of the Mayor that he is a man of integrity and sober habits and a team owner.

Section 2. No person shall act as a teamster

team owner.

Section 2. No person shall act as a teamster unless licensed as aforesaid, and each, teamster, as soon as he is licensed, shall cause his name and the number of his license to be legibly painted with black paint upon a white ground, so as to be easily seen, upon each side of his wagon and shall the property of the prope

easily seen, upon each side of his wagon and shall keep the same so painted thereon under a penalty of \$1 for every day he shall drive his wagon without his name and number so painted on the same. Section 3. No teamster shall transfer or assign his license and if he do so the same shall be forfetted, and no wagon or "vehicle shall be used within said city for the purposes aforesaid, except it be duly licensed and the person to whom license is granted shall for all the purposes of this ordinance be deemed the owner thereof and responsible for all property intrusted to, and for the conduct of the drivers thereof and liable for all forfeitures, penalties or punishments herein contained or provided. Every person licensed as aforesaid upon failing to renew the license for or disposing of or parting with his wagon or vehicle shall deface, remove or obliterate his name and the license number therefrom and a failure or neglect to do so. ber therefrom and a failure or neglect to do so, shall be deemed a violation of this ordinance. No person shall place or have any number for which he may have received a license on more than one wagon or vehicle.

Section 4. Every person upon receiving a license as teamster shall report his residence to the

dayor, or upon changing his residence shall in like manner report his new residence, and it shall be the duty of every person driving or having charge of a teamster's wagon, to give to any person requesting it his name and place of resi-

dence, and the number of the wagon or vehicle he is driving or in charge of, and the name and place of residence of the owner thereof, and the refusal to do so shall be deemed a violation of this ordinance.

Section 5. If any accident or injury shall happen to any person or carriage, vehicle or other thing, by reason of coming in contact with any teamster's wagon or vehicle, or the animal or animals attached thereto, or anything loaded thereon, while the same is moving, it shall be the duty of the person driving or having charge of the same to immediately stop and, if necessary, render his assistance and give his name and residence, and the name and residence of the owner thereof, under a penalty of \$50, to be recovered from the driver or owner of any such wagon or vehicle.

Section 6. It shall not be lawful for any

Section 6. It shall not be lawful for any teamster to drive or back any wagon on to the sidewalk of any of the streets of said city or to stop any such wagon or vehicle on any of the crosswalks or intersections of streets or to place any such wagon or vehicle crosswise of any street except to either load or unload, and in no case shall it be lawful to permit any such wagon.

street except to either load or unload, and in no case shall it be lawful to permit any such wagon or vehicle to remain crosswise of any street for any period to exceed five minutes.

Section 7. It shall not be lawful for any teamster's wagon or vehicle to be driven through any of the streets of the City of Rochester at a greater speed than six miles an hour, nor shall it be lawful for any such wagon to be driven around the forner of any of the streets of said city with \(\busepace \) a mimal or animals thereto traveling at a greater speed than three miles an hour city with t animal or animals thereto traveling at a greater speed than three miles an hour and all and every such wagon or vehicle when passing through or along any of the streets of said city shall when meeting any other wagon or vehicle be driven to the right hand side of the way so that such vehicles shall pass clear of each other.

Section 8. All licenses to teamsters shall expire on the first day of July in each and every year.
Section 9. The Mayor and the several officers and members of the police department and magistrates shall have power and authority to order the driver or any person having charge of any teamster's wagon or vehicle to remove such wagon or vehicle away from any place in any of the streets of said city which are improperly incumbering or obstructing or impeding the public travel and any and every such person refusing to comply with any such order shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this ordinance. Section 10. Any license granted to any teamster shall, upon the conviction of such owner or the triver of the wagon licensed, of a violation of the provisions of this ordinance, be deemed revoked and shall be void on and after the date of such conviction.

No teamster shall use or suffer to be used, any wagon or vehicle upon any of the paved, macadamized or improved streets, alleys, avenues, lanes, public squares or places in the city of Rochester for the purpose of drawing any of the articles of property permitted by his license unless the tires of his wagon or vehicle be at least four inches in width, under a penalty of \$25 for each offence; nor shall any teamster carry or tr nsport any sand, gravel, dirt, stone, ice, lumber, or other loose material in, across or over any of the streets, avenues, lanes, alleys, public squares or places in the City of Rochester in or upon any wagon or vehicle in such a manner that any portion of such sand, gravel, dirt, stones, ice, lumber, or other loose material shall or may be scattered, fall or thrown therefrom in or upon any such street, avenue, lane, alley, public square any such street, avenue, lane, alley, public square or place, under a penalty of \$5 for each offense. Section 12. Any person violating any of the provisions or sections of this ordinance shall for

In view of the fact that the Humane Society has established, or is about to establish, a shelter for animals, it would seem advisable to act in co-operation with this effort in order to secure the most efficient, economical and generally accept-

most efficient, economical and general, able results.

I heartily endorse the above suggestion, and would respectfully ask the Honorable the Common Council to appoint a special committee of three members to meet the executive committee of the Humane Society to take into consideration and adopt the best system possible to rid the city of the many vile curs and useless dogs. This can be done without incurring additional expense of employing men to perform the labor, as the Humane Society have sufficient help now in their employ.

DEAR SIR-In almost every community, whether large or small, annoyance occurs from worth-less dogs running at large. Some systematic ef-fort to eusure the proper care of animals, kept for use or as pets, is essential. To this end various ordinances have been enacted. In this city

our attention has been recently called to the ex-

our attention has been recently called to the existence of an ordinance requiring restraint upon dogs and forbidding their "running at large." This ordinance, in its purport and intent, is wholesome and should be regularly and systematically enforced, not by intermittent and excited efforts, but as any other ordinance looking to the good order and safety of society.

The recent purpose to enforce this ordinance by the employment of persons as "dog catchers," as suggested to many the importance of judgment as to the measures adopted.

Some agitation regarding hydrophobia and other conditions, largely imaginary, are considered, to some extent at least, as unwise and incorrect by those who view the matter in a conservative and practical way.

To no one more than to the owners of truly valuable animals would the enforcement of a proper ordinance be welcome. But, to all judiciously minded persons, a wholesale crusade against the canine species would be painful.

The undersigned would enter cordially into measures looking to the proper enforcement of the ordinance referred to, but must at the same time enter a protest against measures which provoke needless agitation or severity, for it has been the unvarving experience, in communities time enter a protest against measures which provoke needless agitation or severity, for it has been the unvarying experience, in communities where such measures have been unwisely pursued, that great cruelty has arisen, which has brought its perpetrators under the ban of the law of the state, and consequently a large number of prosecutions by societies for prevention of cruelty to animals. This has uniformly resulted in the suspension or repeal of the municipal ordinance under which such difficulties have arisen

It would also seem desirable to call attention to

It would also seem desirable to 'call attention to the necessity of avoiding any reference to the subject of hydrophobia, as the disease is slightly understood by the public and hence a cause of unnecessary mental disquiet. It is proper to say that experience shows that few cases of hydrophobia are caused by animals running at large. That the great majority occur from the bites of animals suffering from the mute" or quiet form of Rabies, and not from cases showing great nervous excitement. The muzzle, as usually applied, is a source of

cases showing great nervous excitement.

The muzzle, as usually applied, is a source of great discomfort and disturbance to an animal, otherwise quiet. It interferes with respiration, so active in a dog when exercising and also with drinking, which is imperative in hot weather. It is only when accustomed to it from puppyhood that the average dog can be made to bear it patiently. This view is not based upon sentimental considerations, but upon the observation of veterinarians and those best qualified to form an intelligent opinion in the matter.

That it appears from their statements, and from the statements of the chief engineer of the Water Works Department, that the Holly System now extends easterly to the corner of East Main and Windsor streets. That in the locality above mentioned are located must of the large lumber yards of the city, numerous factories and shops, constructed almost entirely of wood, and located as the are, along the tracts of the New York Central Railroad, are peculiarly exposed to fire.

Your committee has been informed that the residents of East avenue, receive their supply of Manufock water for domestic use through a visu

exposed to fire.

Your committee has been informed that the residents of East avenue, receive their supply of Hemlock water for domestic use, through a pipe but six inches in diameter. And it will be highly important to have a larger main laid in that avenue, for the purpose of supplying water for domestic use to the people living thereon.

The Chief Engineer of the Water Works Department, has informed your committee, that it is advisable to extend the Holly mains, by a twelve-inch pipe from the corner of East Main street and East avenue, through East avenue to Merriman street, thence north to University avenue, and with a branch extending through Anderson avenue and Goodman street to the corner of East Main and North Goodman streets. This pipe should in his opinion be used for the present for conducting Holly water, into the lumber yard district for fire protection, and when the street acquires an additional supply of water, this pipe will be available for domestic purposes.

Your committee is strongly of the opinion that steps should be taken at once to accomplish this desirable end. Especially as East avenue and Merriman street are about to be improved, by the laying of expensive pavements thereon.

The Holly Mains should also be extended through West avenue to St. Mary's Hospital, as requested by a petition, which was heretofore referred to this committee. Of these two sources, your committee, after mature deliberation, unanimously recommends that Canadice and Hemlock lakes shall be selected, and that the preliminary surveys shall be made with the said lakes as the objective point.

It is also proper to state that no funds for prosecuting these necessary surveys are now avail-

It is also proper to state that no funds for pros-ceuting these necessary surveys are now avail-able, and that the estimated expense of such work is about \$25,000. By performing as much as possible of this work during the remainder of the present season, in anticipation of the passage of an enabling act, it is believed that much valuable time will be saved during con-struction and that opportunity will also be af-forded thereby to make a more thorough study of plans and routes than will otherwise be possi-ble.

To the Assessment and Law Committees of the

Common Council: Gentlemen—The petition of the Rochester Social Turn-Verein to the Common Council, praying that a resolution be passed cancelling the taxes upon its real estate, and that the same be regarded as exempt from taxation under the Revised Statutes of the state, has been submitted to me, and I have carefully examined the question under consideration.

The Rochester Social Turn-Verein was incor-The Rochester Social Turn-verein was incorporated by a special act, passed in the year 1866, chapter 766. In the first section of this act seven persons are named as the incorporators of this society. In the second section the object of the society is stated, that it "shall be for the improvement and perfection of physical education; also to afford relief to members thereof in case of sickness or distress."

By the subsequent sections of the statute the

of sickness or distress."

By the subsequent sections of the statute, the corporation has the power to prescribe rules and orders for its government; to establish a day school for the education of such children as might apply, and to purchase and hold real and personal property for its benefit. It is also further provided that the general powers of the corporation are subject to title 3 of chapter 18 of the first part of the Revised Statutes.

From this analysis of the statute, it is quite clear that it does not come within the section of the revised statutes exempting property from taxation. Subdivision 3 of this section is as follows.

taxation. Subdivision 3 of this section is as follows.

"Every, building erected for the use of a college, incorporated academy, or other seminary of learning, and in actual use for either of such purposes; every building for public worship; every schoolhouse, court house and jail, used for either of such purposes, and the several lots whereon such buildings are situated, and the furniture belonging to each of them," shall be exempt from taxation.

The object of the statute incorporating the Rochester Social Turn-Verein as above quoted does not come within this subdivision. Their building was not erected for the use of a college.

does not come within this suburvision. Incombuilding was not erected for the use of a college, building was not erected for the use of a college, incorporated academy, or other seminary of learning, nor has it been in actual use for any such purposes. The statutes exempting property from taxation must be strictly construed. To this rule there may be an exception, providing the corporation is, essentially, of a public character. The act incorporating the Turn-Verein is of a private character, and the rules of law constructing the act, must come under the rule, rather than the exception.

rule, rather than the exception.

It is, however, claimed that under section 4 of the incorporating act, said Turn-Verein building is a school house under the exemption statute. Section 4 reads as follows: "The said corporation shall have power, on receiving its act of incorporation, to establish a day school for the education of such children as may apply for admission to the same." This position, however, cannot be maintained, as the words "school house" in the exemption statute mean a public common school. exemption statute mean a public common school,

the same." This position, however, cannot be maintained, as the words "school house" in the exemption statute mean a public common school, such as are provided for under chapter 13, part first of the revised statutes. The power which the incorporating act gives to the Turn-Verein to establish a day school for the education of such children as may apply for admission to the same, does not bring the building of the corporation within the term of "school house."

In the case of Chegaray vs. The Mayor, etc., of New York, 13 N. Y., 220, the court laid down the rule as follows: "The houses which the plaintiff occupies stand upon three lots, but were so constructed as to be used as one building, and may be said to have been erected for her school, and she became lessee, and has ever since kept a boarding and day school for girls. The property, however, is not exempt from the payment of taxes. Not as a "school house," for the use of that word is familiar in this state, and its meaning in our school laws cannot well be mistaken, and we cannot suppose it was here used in a different sense. It is a building provided for the uses of our public schools." This decision was approved in Association for Colored Orphans vs. Mayor, 104 N. Y., 581.

In this case the plaintiff was a corporation incorporated under Chapter 232 of Laws of 1838, for the purpose of providing and maintaining a place of refuge for colored orphans where they shall be boarded and suitably educated until an age to be bound or apprenticed. Though this was a corporation for the only purpose of maintaining and educating children, still it was held its property did not come within the meaning of "schoolhouse." Decisions of the same tenor have been since rendered by the Court of Appeals and it is therefore clear to me that the property of the Turn-Verein in the City of Rochester, incorporated under the Laws of 1866, Chapter 1766, does not come within the exemptions, provided by Section 4, of Title 1, Chapter 13, part second, of the Revised Statutes.

Gentlemen: The petitions of The Rochester & Honeoye Valley Railroad Company, referred to this Committee at the meeting of the Common Council, held on June 16th, have been considered at the several meetings of the Committee, and the several parties interested in the matter set forth therein have been heard. We find that said railroad company can amicably arrange with the abutting owners on Clarissa street for the damages which might arise by raising the grade of the street, and that said company is willing to pay all the expenses of raising the bridge necessary to permit the company to go under it, and construct the bridge to the satisfaction of the City Surveyor. We, therefore, recommend that the Common Council grant consent and permission to said railroad company to raise the Clarissa street bridge and its approach to such a height, and in such a manner, as may be deemed proper and satisfactory to the City Surveyor, not to exceed, however, three and one-half feet at the highest point, upon condition that said railroad company by to, and satisfy the abutting owners on said Clarissa street for such damages as may be caused

however, three and one-half feet at the highest point, upon condition that said railroad company pay to, and satisfy the abutting owners on said Clarissa street for such damages as may be caused by the change of the grade of said street.

of Rochester: GENTLEMEN: Your Assessment Committee begs leave to make the following report: In the matter of Joseph Traugott's application in regard to an error in the payment of the general city tax for 1881, we find that upon the 5th day of July, 1888, a clerk of the City Treasurer made out a tax bill for said Traugott, and made a mistake in the amount, placing upon said Traugott's bill \$14.74, when the book shows his tax to be \$37.67. We find that the amount so paid, was the amount immediately above said Traugott's tax in the assessment book, and that, thereafter, and on the 19th day of July, 1888, when the parties offered to pay the tax already paid by Mr. Traugott, the clerk, discovering his mistake, credited the amount of \$14.74 to Mr. Traugott's tax, and afterwards Mr. Traugott's property was sold for the balance of the city taxes, and the city bid in the property. We, therefore, recommend that Mr. Traugott be allowed to pay the balance of said tax, to wit: \$22.93 in full payment of said general tax of 1888, with interest and costs.

GENTLEMEN: Among the twenty-two sectional amendments made to the Ballot Reform Act of 1890, by Chapter 296 of the Laws of 1891, I desire

to call your attention particularly to the one relating to the division or alteration of election districts, which, when carried into effect, will reduce the present number of election districts in the city nearly one-third, and thus correspondingly decrease the number of election officers. Section 23 of the original act has been amended in this particular: "On or before the first day of August in the year 1891, (formerly September 1st), and in each year thereafter, the officers now charged by law with the division or alteration of election districts thall alter or divide the existing election districts, whenever necessary, in such election districts, whenever necessary, in such manner that each election district shall contain not more than four hundred voters," (formerly three hundred).

You are probably aware that a vast amount of You are probably aware that a vast amount or labor was involved in redistricting the wards last year, which work will have to be again repeated. As it will be necessary for me to be made acquainted with the number of election districts designated for the city, in order that the proper number of ballots be arranged for, redistricting of the city on or before the first of Aponet next. To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Your City Property Committee begs leave to make the following report:

The matter of additional room in the City Hall has recently been called to the attention of your Committee, and we have given a hearing to the parties interested in the matter at several meetings of the Committee.

We find that the present offices are inadequate for the work required by the different depart-ments and offices and we find that new offices have to be provided for additional departments.

To present the matter in detail; we find that the Executive Board, at the present time, is unable to do the business required in its department. At the meetings held by the Board there are continued interceptions by parties who are interested in contracts, and otherwise, so that it is almost impossible for the Board to do its work in the room it now occumies. in the room it now occupies.

In the Water Works Department, the space there occupied is insufficient for the convenience of the books used and the clerks employed, as of the books used and the clerks employed, as well as for citizens who have to call there to make payments of water rates. This same difficulty exists in the Street Department and the Water Works Construction Department, under the Executive Board. In both of these departments the room is not sufficient for the work that is required to be done at the present time.

The room occupied by the assessors is inadequate to accommodate the public, and the necessity of constantly handling the books by the clerks and assessors, on account of the cramped

clerks and assessors, on account of the cramped condition of their quarters, injures the books to such an extent that the city is at a continued expense to keep such books in a proper condition. The rooms of the city surveyor are also to small. The maps on file at that office cannot be kept in a proper condition for ready reference by the public and the city departments. The help in the city surveyor's office have not sufficient room to expedite the work.

The room occupied by the City Attorney is a disgrace to the corporation. The only parts of that room which are fit for occupation are the two small apartments now occupied by the City Attorney and his assistants. The outside room is so dark that it has to be continually lighted by electric lights. All the commissions for condemning property have to be held in this office, and while such commissions are in progress, there is such confusion that those who are not engaged in the taking of evidence, are unable to do any in the taking of evidence, are unable to do any work. The Law Committee, which has to meet in this office, is always interrupted during its sessions by the constant demands of the public

sessions by the constant demands of the public upon the employes in that department.

The Park Commission is now occupying rooms outside of the City Hall, and paying rent therefor, having been unable to secure rooms,

The East Side trunk sewer commission will have to have rooms, and, if no provision is made for room in the City Hall, outside quarters will have to be rented by the city for their convenience.

The additional work in the offices of the surveyor, assessors and city attorney on account of the East Side trunk sewer construction and the additional water supply construction, will necessitate an additional force and additional room, in

these departments.
We, therefore, recommend that this matter be investigated more fully by this Common Council, and that a special committee be appointed for that purpose.

GENTLEMEN: Your assessment committee makes the following report:

The matter of the erroneous assessment against Gussie B. Seager upon her property on the corner of Lake View Park and Pierpont avenue for Pierpont avenue sewer was considered by your committee, and we would recommend that a rebate on said assessment of \$31.24 be made, and that upon the payment of the balance of said assessment, being \$27.80, by her, said assessment should be cancelled.

The matter of George Schlight's in reference to an error in his city tax of 1885, in the city treasurer's office, was considered by your committee, and we recommend that upon his paying the sum of \$5, within sixty days from the date of this report, that the tax of 1885, upon his property be cancelled.

The matter of the Second Reformed Dutch Church of Rochester was considered, and we find that by an excusable inadvertance the second and third payments of an assessment against The matter of the erroneous assessment against

and that by an excusable madvertance the second and third payments of an assessment against said church for the Scio street McAdam improvement were not paid when due, We therefore recommend that upon said church paying the balance of said assessment, being the sum of \$200.55 cm; the nor cost interest to the data of \$240.55, with 6 per cent. interest, to the date of payment, said assessment be cancelled, if the same is paid within sixty days from the date of this report

The matter of the personal property tax against the Hassan estate was considered by your Committe, and we find that the executor of said estate had a final accounting thereon before the Surrogate before the city tax, amounting to \$23.95 was levied, and we therefore recommend

that the same be cancelled.

The matter of the erroneous assessment of Peter DeRoo has been considered by your Committee, and we find that a strip of land ten feet wide, in front of said De Roo's property facing upon North Joiner street, was deeded to the city on January 22, 1887, by a deed recorded in Liber 412 of Deeds, at page 462; that an assessment was placed upon De Roo's property for the grading and laying of sidewalks on North Joiner street, which said De Roo has refused to pay upon the ground that his property does not front on North Joiner street. He has, however, offered to pay the same if the city deed to him said strip of land, and we recommend, pursuant to these facts, that the Mayor of the City of Rochester be authorized to execute and deliver a deed to said facts, that the Mayor of the City of Rochester be authorized to execute and deliver a deed to said Peter De Roo, upon his paying to the city the sum of \$150, for a consideration thereof, and out of said consideration the assessment against his property for the improvement of North Joiner street to be deducted.

An application was made before this committee by George S. Riley that the time of the resolu-tion of this Common Council of March 26, 1891, giving him two months from the date of said giving him two months from the date of said resolution to pay the assessment for the East Main street improvement in 1880, and the tax to which said assessment was added, be extended to September 1, 1891. We have duly considered the same, and recommend that the time of said resolution be so extended to September 1, 1891.

The matter of the application of Helen E. Waters for a rebate of her city tax of 1887, was considered by your committee, and we would recommend that the same be denied.

The petition of Ellen Elsheimer for a rebate of an assessment for the Caledonia avenue and Atkinson street sewer, and the Glasgow street pipe

kinson street sewer, and the Glasgow street pipe sewer has been considered by your committee, and we recommend that the assessment for the

Glasgow street pipe sewer upon her property, amounting to \$41.19, be cancelled.

Your committee further reports that matters brought before this committee have been unac-Your committee further reports that matters brought before this committee have been unaccompanied by any petition or statements of the parties, so that it has become extremely difficult to intelligently pass upon them without a great waste of time, and it is frequently very difficult for the several departments to report intelligently to this committee concerning such matters. We, therefore, recommend that the resolution accompanying this report to the same be adopted. By a resolution of this Common Council, passed June 23, 1891, the City Treasurer was authorized to cancel the assessment under Final Ordinance No. 3,192, for the Hayward avenue outlet sewer on lots Nos. 124, 126, 128 and 130, on the north side of Garson avenue, assessed to Edwin S. Hayward. whom the communications and estimates of Sidney B. Roby, Esq., in relation to obtaining a permanent additional water supply from Lake Ontario, were referred, begs leave to present the
following report:
The subject of obtaining a large additional
water supply for this city from Lake Ontario has
been thoroughly discussed for the past three
years, both by the engineers of the water department, and by Messrs. Fanning and Fteley,
consulting engineers for the joint committee of
the Common Council and Chamber of Commerce
on Increase of Water Supply; and special reports
from these gentlemen have been duly published
in the Proceedings of the Common Council for
September 21, 1888. May 14, 1889, August 20, 1889,
and December 16, 1890, also in the Annual Reports
of the Executive Board for the years mentioned.
All of the engineers referred to are presumably
competent to make reasonably correct estimates

competent to make reasonably correct estimates of first cost and annual operating expenses of the necessary works indicated by them; and as there

is no evidence in Mr. Roby's communications that his estimates were prepared by any properly qualified specialist, the figures given in the reports of the several engineers are fairly entitled ports of the several engineers are fairly entitled to more weight and consideration than those of the latter. If, however, Mr. Roby has actually availed himself of expert counsel in the preparation of his estimates it is proper for him to name his authority, and to present his plans in sufficient detail to enable others to form an opinion as to their merit. While municipal officers owe due attention to the opinions of any citizen in regard to important public measures, yet it cannot be expected that the greater portion of their time shall be spent in refuting unsupported statement, which are widely different from the expressions of reputable professional men. men.

and the case presents itself, Mr. Roby wishes to obtain a supply of 20,000,000 gallons of water per day by pumping from Lake Ontario at an expense of \$1,718,000 for first cost, and \$47,298 per year for maintaining the pumping engines. Obviously only a single pumping station is implied in these estimates, and the water is to be lifted to a height of 450 feet, including the friction in eight miles of force-main. Passing over the estimate of first cost without comment, it will be seen that the pumping expenses named by Mr. Roby are exceedingly low, since, according to his figures, the cost of lifting 1,000,000 gallons of water to a height of 100 feet by steam power will be only \$1.44, which is very much less than the estimates of any of the engineers who have reported upon the subject. reported upon the subject.

The actual cost of this same work, however, The actual cost of this same work, nowever, may readily be deduced from the published reports of the water works authorities of many cities, and it is fair to presume that estimates based on the practical experience of numerous municipalities are more trustworthy than such as profounded were accurated labels or distinct. The are founded upon assumed ideal conditions. To ascertain what these costs are, we have caused a large number of water works reports relating to steam power pumping stations to be examined, and submit herewith the results obtained,

From the foregoing table it is found that the average cost of pumping one million gallons of water to a height of 100 feet is \$5.22 as deduced from the most recent available records of thirtyfrom the most recent available records of thirty-two stations in eighteen different cities. It should also be stated that the costs given in the table are in every instance merely for attendance, fuel, oil, lighting, heat and minor repairs and supplies to the machinery, and do not include any allowance whatever for interest on original cost, depreciation or extraordinary repairs, additions or renewals. In the majority of cases, moreover, the pumping engines are of the highest class with respect to economy of operation, so that the best practice is here represented. tion, so that the best practice is here represented.

By comparing these results, which are taken directly from the published statements of the respective authorities, with Mr. Roby's estimate, a very great discrepancy will be noticed; whereas the comparison with the engineer's estimate shows a substantial agreement.

It therefore follows that Mr. Roby's figures cannot represent all of the costs of maintaining a large pumping station unless it is assumed that a large pumping station times it is assumed that all of the various authorities cited employ extremely incompetent men either as steam engineers or as accountants. Obviously such an assumption would be absurd, and hence it is fair to presume that Mr. Boby's estimates should be carried with the control of considerably increased, since it is only about one-half as large as the lowest rate exhibited in the foregoing list, and less than one-third of the average rate.

The evidence presented in the above table is. The evidence presented in the above table is, in our opinion, altogether too strong to warrant the hope that any commission of business men of our city will be able, after conscientious investigation of the performance of steam 'nping engines of large capacity in other places, to accept Mr. Roby's estimate, and therefore we fail to recognize the expediency of appointing such a commission at the present time. The reports in question may easily be procured by anyone who is interested in the subject and their study can simply confirm the data here submitted. wno is interested in the subject and their study can simply confirm the data here submitted. Furthermore on the bases that, with first-class machinery and good fuel, 1,000,000 gallons of water can be lifted to a height of 100 feet for only \$3.50, the cost of lifting 20,000,000 gallons of water per day to a height of 450 feet will be \$114,974 per year.

The capitalization of this annual expenditure at 3½ per cent. gives .\$3,285,000, or nearly twice the estimated first cost of Mr. Roby's works, or of the proposed new conduit to Hemlock lake. The relative cost of the works suggested by Mr. Roby therefore becomes \$5,001,000, or nearly three times greater than the sum of \$1,750,000, three times greater than the sum of \$1,750,000, which, after much discussion, the joint committee of the Common Council and Chamber of Commerce recommend as a maximum to be appropriated for obtaining a permanent additional water supply. Under these circumstances any further consideration of Mr. Roby's scheme must lead to a reopening of the whole water question, which has been regarded as settled by this Board, and which it is not the province of your committee to discuss. Lewis, which asks the Board of Health of this city to remove Frank J. Hone, Esq., from his position as Acting Attorney

Hone, Esq., from his position as Acting Attorney of that board, and accept in place of his services, the services of the present officials of the City Attorney's office. My disapproval of the resolution is based upon the following grounds:

It is conceded by all persons familiar with the law, that the Hoard of Health is a body created by a general statute of the state, and that it is not answerable in any way to the Commou Council of the city for any of its acts nor is it dependent upon the Common Council for any of its powers.

its powers. By the resolution hereby returned the Common Council apparently seeks, through a resolution worded in the form of a request, to dictate to the Board of Health the manner in which the board shall perform its duties. If the resolution was intended as a simple request it seems to me to have been uncalled for. If it was intended as a direction to the Board of Health, it was beyond the power of the Common Council to

was beyond the power of the Common Council to take action upon. In either case the resolution cannot meet with my approval.

The Board of Health has for many years been accustomed to advise with the law department of the city of Rochester or all legal matters, this notwithstanding the board has the power to appoint an attorney of its own and if it please fix a salary for such attorney. It is desirable and point an attorney of its own and if it please in a salary for such attorney. It is desirable and most proper that the board should have its own attorney, and experience teaches that the board has been hampered, hindered impeded and delayed in its work in times past by reason of its not having its own attorney and other officers through and by whom it could present its through and by whom it could prosecute its

through and by whom it could prosecute its work.

The work which the Board of Health is expected to accomplish, renders it necessary at times for the public good, to adopt harsh and severe measures against individuals. It is a notorious fact that many resolutions and ordinances of the board have failed of the intended effect, simply because individuals against whom these resolutions were directed, through influence, have stopped the machinery of the board, after the board had instituted proceedings against them, and such stoppages have most often occurred through the intervention of their constituents. That such things could not be if the board exercised all the powers granted it by law is apparent. This of itself shows the wisdom and necessity of the law under and by virtue of which all boards of Health in this state are created and receive their power. are created and receive their power.

I am informed that the Board of Health of this city has, in times past, refrained from appointing its own attorney because, necessarily a part of the small appropriation given to the Health Department, to defray its expenses, would be required to pay for the services of such an attorney. During the past few months the Board has been enabled, by an arrangement with Mr. Hone, which, I learn, is satisfactry to him, to receive his services both at its meetings and in the prosecution of its work, without cost whatsoever to the city. That this arrangement is most advantageous to the Board of Health will be apparent to any disinterested person.

It therefore seems to me as I have said before I am informed that the Board of Health of

It, therefore, seems to me, as I have said before, that the resolution of Ald. Lewis, was uncalled for, or else was an attempt on the part of the Common Council to exercise direction or control over the Board of Health. Believing that the Common Council has acted in this matter, either frivously or else without power, I return this resolution without my opproval resolution without my opproval.

GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee begs leave to make the following report: In the matter of the first ordinance extending and improving the outlet of the Front street sewer, which was referred to this committee by this council, we have heard the parties interested and have found that the present Front street outlet sewer is exposed to the open air and creates odors which are offensive to its immediate vicinity. This can be avoided by sinking a shaft, tunnel or iron pipe connecting the present outlet tunnel with the tail race and this is the only feasible and practical way the covered outlet can be constructed. We therefore recommend that the ordinance as introduced be adopted. The petition of Helen M. Leggett and Alfred Leggett to this council, accompanied by a communication of the Assistant City Attorney has been considered by your committee and we recommend that the sum of \$42.96 be paid to Helen M. The communication of the first assistant attor-The communication of the first assistant attorney of July 24th, to this committee, and the communication of the city attorney referred to it by this Council at about the same time concerning the condition of the affairs of your law department, have been considered and after a very careful investigation and inquiry into its affairs, we find that on account of the increase of business relating to city matters, it becomes necessary to have careful and competent men in the employ of the city's law department and that the present city attorney, during his administration, has not conducted the law business of the city in such a manner and with such care as the interests has not conducted the law business of the eity in such a manner and with such care as the interests of this city demand. The volume of business in this office is very large and the several appointees therein should be active and energetic attorneys to avoid any detriment to the cases and legal business of the city.

We find that up to the first of June last, the present City Attorney has been negligent and unfaithful in the performance of the duties of

his office and has been guilty of official misconduct. In many instances the city has sustained great losses and injuries, and the work of its departments has been delayed and hindered on account thereof.

In the case of Avenell and another against the city an action was commenced on the 28th of February, 1891, for damages and for a perpetual injunction closing up one end of Ethel street. The City Attorney neglected to serve an answer in the case, though he had ample time to do so, and on the 9th day of April following he allowed a default, and judgment was entered against the city upon an inquest held recovering the sum of \$200 for damages with costs, and decreeing an injunction forever closing this end of Ethel street from public use. On the 22nd day of May following, the president of the Common Council was served with a writ of mandamus to compel this council to raise the money for the purpose of paying the judgment. When the new appointees entered upon their duties on the 1st of June, they discovered this state of affairs and at the June special term made a motion to set aside this judgment and open the default. This was only granted, however, by the court after censuring the present city attorney for his negligence and misconduct in the matter, and imposing upon the city the condition of paying to the plaintiff in the action costs to the amount of \$30.50. The city has thus been put to this expense for the privilege of serving an answer in this case, which, under the practice of the court, ought to have been served within twenty days after the city was sued.

By resolution of this Council passed May 15, 1888, the then City Attorney was directed to begin an action against the Western Union Telegraph Company, to recover a judgment which had been rendered in an action entitled Mary A. Graham, as executrix, against the city for the death of her daughter, Anna Graham, caused by the giving away of some of the trusses of the Court street bridge in 1887, by reason of overburdening the bridge with the poles and wires of the telegraph company. A proper notice had been served upo.1 the company before this action came to trial, to come in and defend by which the city's right of action over against the company was properly preserved. Pursuant to this notice and resolution, an action was commenced on the 11th day of June, 1888, by the service of the summons on the company. Extensions of time to serve the complaint were procured by the present City Attorney from time to time until the 8th day of December following, when a default was suffered by him, and since then no steps have been taken in the action. In his annual report for the fiscal year ending April 1, 1889, presented to this Council on the 28th day of March, 1889, no reference was made to this action. In his annual report of March 27, 1890, for the fiscal year ending April 1, 1891, he reported the action as still pending and undetermined; and in his annual report of March 26, 1891, for the year ending April 1, 1891, he reported the action as still pending and undetermined. This long and inexcusible delay will make it extremely difficult for the city to regain its standing in court, and the probabilities are, if an attempt were made the case would be ordered abandoned. We understand that the action has been abandoned by the City Attorney and insists that the city has now no cause of action against the company. A temporary injunction was procured against the city in the case of Bygraves et al, on the 7th day of June, 1890. The Executive Board, by virtue of the final ordinance of this council, were then constructing a sewer in this city and under the direction of the City Surveyor. Certain surface water courses and leakages from the canal were about to be directed into the sewer, so that certain tracts laid out into lots could be profitably improved. Upon the service of the papers the work was stopped and the matter left in the hands of the City Attorney to remove the injuction. Nothing has ever been done by him in this action, except to secure from time to time extensions of time to answer.

action, except to secure from time to time extensions of time to answer.

In the case of Hagg against the city, an injunction was procured and the summons and complaint served on the 9th day of November, 1890. The plaintiff in the action was encroaching upon a public alley in this city, by the erection of a brick building. The Executive Board proposed under the charter to remove that part of the wall which was an encroachment. This injunction was then procured to prevent the Executive Board from doing so, and the matter was put in the hands of the City Attorney to protect the city's interest. The complaint barely states a cause of action, and from the public records pertaining to the case it shows positively that the building encroaches upon the public alley between one and two feet. Nothing, however, was done by the City Attorney to remove this injunction and to prevent the plaintiff to erect his building and the same stands to-day completed, encroaching upon the highway. He never made a motion to set aside the injunction, as he ought to have done, and has never served an answer in the commencement of the action, extensions of time to answer.

time to answer.

On the 7th day of April last, an injunction was procured against the city by the M. D. Tarba. Mfg. Co., to restrain the Executive Board from tearing down the fence or inclosure which said company built under Main street bridge, for the purpose of storing charcoal under the road bed of the bridge. The Executive Board considered it dangerous to have such inflammable material under the road bed of the bridge, and proposed under the charter to remove the obstruction, for the reasen that the company was occupying a part of the highway of which the city held the fee. This injunction was procured to prevent the removal of this encroachment. The city attorney made no attempts to remove this injunction, and up to the 1st of June secured extensions of time to answer.

In the case of Thompson, et al. against the city, an action was brought on the 13th day of August, 1889, to set aside assessments against the property of the plaintiffs, amounting to the sum of \$4,179.39, and for a perpetual injunction restraining the collection of these assessments. The action was based principally on the fact that the assessments were excessive, and that the assessments were excessive, and that the assessments had made a mistake in naming the owner of the property. From that time down to the first of June no attempt was made to inquire into the merits of the case, and all that the City Attorney did during that period was to procure extensions of time to answer. It is the opinion of this committee that the city has a good defence, as the charter provides that it is immaterial whether the assessors have the name of the owner or not upon the assessment roll, and that the assessors, so long as they are not guilty of any fraud or misconduct, have the power to make assessments for improvements.

At a meeting of this council on the 24th day of February, 1891, the city attorney was directed to prepare and present for adoption the necessary resolution for the re-assessment of the costs and expenses, including the damages awarded with interest, for the opening of Church street. An assessment had been previously made under a final ordinance of this board, but the same was set aside by a judgment of the Supreme Court. The amount involved in this matter, including

interest up to the time he was so directed, was over two hundred thousand dollars. Under the charter the council has the power to order a reassessment in such a case, and it was a matter of assessment in such a case, and it was a matter of the greatest importance to the city that the di-rections should have been properly and dlilgent-ly followed. This was, however, delayed and neglected by him, contrary to the best interests of the city and the taxpayers directly concerned. It was not until your committee called the attention to the law department to this uncalled for delay that the present employes took up the matter which has been recently reported to this council.

have We also learned that pending there the cases which are now pending in the City Attorney's office there have been no preliminary preparations for trial, and no memoranda or statements to furnish inand no memoranda or statements to furnish in-formation of the necessary witnesses and ma-terial evidence. We regard this very gross neg-ligence on the part of the City Attorney, as most of the cases are actions for damages where the witnesses cannot be found after long delay. The employes of the different devartments of the city are subject to continued changes and where such memoranda and statements are not secured such memorana and statements are not secured in mediately after an accident has occurred, it is apparent how helpless the city is in successfully defending the case upon the merits. This condition of affairs exists in cases which are from two to three years old, and it can readily be seen seen how the city is liable to suffer by reason of this necligance. this negligence.

Besides the cases above set forth wherein the Besides the cases above set forth wherein the city has suffered great loss, and the injunctions now pending against the city which have materially hindered and interfered with the progress of the city's work in the several departments, the City Attorney has beet guilty of delays, inattention and negligence in the performance of the duties of his office. It is also clear that the matters in your law department have not only been carelessly and indifferently prosecuted and attended to, but that the present City attended to, but that the present City Attorney has been guilty of gross negligence and unfaithfullness in the performance of his official duties. We, therefore, recommend that a resolution be adopted by this Common Council, that Charles B. Ernst, Esq., the present city attorney, show cause at the next meeting of the Common Council why be should

meeting of the Common Council why he should not be removed from office for his official mis-conduct and for neglect and unfaithful performance of the duties of his office as set forth in this report. Dated August 28, 1891.

The Plumbly steel Booth Construction Co., further agrees that if desired by the said city of Rochester, it will for a period of ten years, take down, carefully store, insure, and when needed for the purposes of elections, reconstruct said buildings, for the sum of twenty dollars (20) and buildings, for the sum of twenty dollars (20) each per year.

These booths have already had a large sale in different states where the secret ballot laws are in operation. They can be very rapidly constructed and very readily taken down. They can be stored in very much less space than any wooden building of the same size, as the iron takes up but very little room, when piled together. One en building of the same size, as the iron takes up but very little room when piled together. One of these buildings when piled ready for storing will occupy about seventy cubic feet of spacesay a space twelve feet in length, three feet high and two feet wide. If the city after purchasing these buildings should wish to store them, and any vacant lot is available for the purpose, a few of these booths may be set up, and ten or twelve others may be stored in each one of them. As compared with wooden buildings there will be a great saving not only in the space required

be a great saving not only in the space required for storage, but also in the cost of insurance, as only a small portion of each booth is imflammable, and those portions can be stored by themselves.

The buildings are much neater in appearance than any wooden building can be made, and are much more durable, and every effort has been put forth to make them as perfect as possible for the purpose intended.

SPECIFICATIONS FOR THE PLUMBLY STEEL VOTING BUILDING.

ROCHESTER, Sept. 17, 1891.

The building is to be similar in design and The building is to be similar in design and equal in all respects to the booth erected by the Plumbly Steel Booth Co., in front of the Court House in the city of Rochester.

The building is to be twenty-four (24) feet long, twelve (12) feet wide, and seven feet high at the

tweive (12) feet wide, and seven feet mgm at one sides.

The foundation is to be of five 2x4 inch stringers and six 2x4 inch floor joists planed four sides and bolted together with ½ inch bolts.

The floor is to be made of ½ inch sound matched flooring, and to be made in eight sections—each section to have three hard wood cleats nailed on the under side of the section—the outer cleat to project ¾ inch beyond the floor to form

nailed on the under side of the section—the outer cleat to project ¾ inch beyond the floor to form a rest for the corrugated sides.

The studding is to be I aud ¾ inches by 2 and ¾ inches, Norway pine with molded edges, and are to contain a stud bolt in each end.

The door frames and window frames are to be made of I and ¾ inches by 3 and ¾ inches Norway pine with stud bolts in each frame.

The plate and cornice is to be of one piece of hardwood ½-inch thick by 5 inches wide; and two pieces of ¼-inch by 1 and ¼ inches pine, nailed on the under side of the 5-inch hardwood piece; and 1 and ½-inch band mold on the outer edge to form the cornice. They are to be made in seven sections and bolted together with stud in seven sections and bolted together with stud bolts.

GENTLEMEN—Pursuant to communications received from the Executive Board, the Chamber of Commerce and private individuals, complainof Commerce and private individuals, complaining of the pavements upon various streets in the central portion of the city, your improvement committee has made an extended examination covering the greater portion of the territory in question. The criticisms aimed at various street pavements are, to a great extent, true, said pavements having been laid many years, being of improper design, and almost entirely worn out through constant use during the past twenty-five years. Your committee respectfully recommends the beginning of the construction recommends the beginning of the construction of a system of new pavements for the central portion of the city, to be first-class in the quality of materials used and in the method of construction. We, therefore, suggest at this time, the paving of East and West Main streets from the Erie canal to the east line of Franklin street and Erre canal to the east line of Franklin street and East avenue respectively, and Exchange and State streets from the Eric canal to Platt street, with a Medina stone or granite block pavement laid on a concrete foundation. "To the Honorable, the Common Council: "Gentlemen—In a communication addressed to your body at a recent meeting, by Aldermen Lewis and Cook, I am charged with neglect, unfaithfulness and official misconduct.
"It is claimed that I have occasioned great losses and injuries to the city, and various matters are set forth in detail with the evident design of substantiating those charges.
"The charges are false and, in view of the explanations so fully and so truthfully made by my former associates, Messrs. Sullivan and Hone, it seems strange that any one should regard the matters as other than frivolous, or that any further attention should be paid to them.
"I have been told, however, by Aldermen and by persons high in the councils of the Republican party, that even though it should be found that there was no truth of foundation to the charges, steps would be taken, after a perfunctory hearing, through the instrumentality of caucuses called for that purpose, to remove me from office. Of course, I do not believe that the Republican majority would sanction such proceedings, and, if the report has been circulated for the purpose of intimidation, I beg leave to say that I shall pay no attention to threats, persuasives or other inducements, and that I shall not, if my health continues to improve, resign.
"If a fair and impartial examination is sin-

that I shall not, if my health continues to improve, resign.

"If a fair and impartial examination is sincerely desired, however, I respectfully submit that I should not be called upon to appear before a tribunal composed, in part, of the men who have instigated the attack, formulated the charges, and pre-judged the case against me. The investigation should be conducted by a non-partisan committee of reputable and high-minded citizens one, at least, of whom should be a lawyer of recognized ability and integrity. If this is done, no question will be raised as to the power of the Common Council to delegate, in any manner indicated, the raised as to the power of the common council to delegate, in any manner indicated, the authority given to it by the city charter. If this plan is not pursued, and the attempt should be made to carry out the avowed intention of my accusers. GENTLEMEN: About a year ago the Rochester Railway Company undertook to lay their tracks for the purpose of running thereon, electric cars, between the curb and sidewalk, on North St. Paul street in front of the premises owned

by me.

That on the proposed line of their tracks there That on the proposed line of their tracks there were numerous ornamental trees, about eighteen in number. Hearing of their intention to destroy these trees and cut them down that their track might be extended, I procured an injunction from the Supreme Court, restraining them from removing the trees, which injunction is still in existence and the action between me and the Rochester Railway Company is now pending. By some mistake or other, four of the trees were destroyed, for which they have settled. In order that the street car company could extend

were destroyed, for which they have settled. In order that the street car company could extend their tracks; the people on North St. Paul street, in order to accomplish their end, presented a petition to your Honorable Body, asking for an ordinance widening North St. Paul street at a point where the injunction order forbade the Street Car Company from going further. And I have been informed that their object was to so change the line of the street that the trees above mentioned would be thrown into she center of the street, as changed, so that they would ter of the street, as changed, so that they would

be an obstruction, and in that way the Executive Board of the city of Rochester would have the power to remove them. The ordinance was duly passed and the City Attorney under the ordinance, procured the appointment of a commission to condemn my land and assess the damages. The first commission was not satisfactory to some of the taxpayers, who by the ordinance were assessed for the improvement, consequently another commission was appointed by the Court who heard the testimony in the matter and after fourteen days attendance before them, they awarded me the sum of about \$1,000 as the damage that the proposed improvement would be to me. I was compelled to engage a lawyer and his bill for services is \$200 and in addition to that I lost my time, and paid witnesses fees, in order to protect time, and paid witnesses fees, in order to protect my property.

Now, after all this has been done, the same par-ties who signed the petition asking your body to pass the ordinance, have now signed a remonstrance against your body confirming the report of the commissioners.

of the commissioners.

If you can put me back in the same position I was before, I would not object to it; but I am informed by my lawyer that in the event of your not confirming the report of the commissioners that I cannot recover any sum whatever that I nave paid out for witnesses fees or for lawyer's bils. This expense has been forced upon me against my knowledge and consent and it is no more than justice that when people ask for something and receive what they ask for and by implied agreement, agree to pay for what they ask, that when the price is not satisfactory, they should not be allowed to say, we do not want it because it costs too much. because it costs too much.

I hope your board will confirm the report and relieve me from further annoyance in the mattet, as I am informed you can, in your discretion tet, as I am informed you can, in your discretion appoint another commissioner, and if that is not satisfactory, refuse to confirm their report and so on "ad infinitum;" and I further protest against your setting aside the report, on the grounds, that the charges paid by the city to commissioners will be a charge upon the city at large, when those parties who caused the commission to be appointed and the ordinance passed should nay the evenes of the same should pay the expense of the same.

Gentlemen: Your select committee appointed to consider the veto of His Honor, the Mayor, upon the resolution of Alderman Fox for chang-

ing the name of North avenue to North street, respectfully report as follows:

respectifully report as follows:
Your committee gave an extended notice of its meeting, which was held in the Common Council Chamber on Friday evening July 24th. At that time a large number of property owners were present and presented their views at length. It appears that there are a great many people who favor the proposed change, and, perhaps, just as many who are opposed. We have carefully looked over the territory, and have considered the statements made by all parties interested. We find that the street leading from fast Main street north, was originally known as East Main street north, was originally known as North street, and that that street was a continuous street, to a point some distance below the New York Central Railroad. That North avenue was originally a branch of this street, and led out was originally a branch of this street, and led out into the town of Irondequoit. We further find that about the time that the New York Central Railroad tracks were elevated, the people of that portion of the street leading from Main street north, procurred the name of that street to be changed from North street to North avenue. The result of that was, one street leading from Main street to a point just below the New York Central Railroad was known as North avenue and numbered from number one to the point of ternumbered from number one, to the point of termination. At that point just below the railroad, North street began, and was also numbered from North street began, and was also numbered from one northerly. At about the same point the original North avenue branched off to the right and lead down into the town of Irondequoit; and that street was also numbered from I to the city line. The result was confusion. Two streets bearing the same name and having the same numbers operated to confuse the public mind, and that condition has existed for several years. Merchants taking orders for goods real years. Merchants taking orders for goods to be delivered on North avenue have been greatly annoyed by the duplicate streets, with duplicate numbers. Mail matter for North ave-nue has been seriously delayed, and great embarnue has been seriously delayed, and great embar-rassment caused to the persons to whom it was addressed, by the fact that there were two streets of the same name, upon which there were build-ings of the same numbers. Newspaper offices have been compelled to exercise great care in taking orders for papers to be delivered on North avenue, in order that the papers should be deliv-ered to the right party. It has often occurred that a letter addressed to some person on one of avenue, in order that the papers should be derivered to the right party. It has often occurred that a letter addressed to some person on one of those streets would be placed in the pouch of the carrier who carried mail upon the other street. Not being able to find the party to whom the letter was addressed, that carrier was compelled letter was addressed, that carrier was compelled to return the letter to the office, where it would have to be re-sorted and placed in the pouch of the carrier who carried mail upon the other street. Many efforts have been made to satisfy property owners and arrange the names of those streets in such a way as to avoid this confusion, but all without success. Until recently this Council had no rule governing the changing of the names of the various streets of the city. Within the past two or three years this Council has adopted a rule, with which all of its members are now familiar and Within the past two or has adopted a rule, with as adopted a rule, with are now familiar which the operations of under the operations of which it is difficult to procure the name of a street to be changed. That rule, we think, works satisfactorily. But in this case it would be impossible to comply with its conditions, and succeed in the object which all concede should be attained. After careful consideration of all the arguments After careful consideration of all the arguments presented, both for and against a resolution, we are of the opinion that the resolution should stand. As we are convinced that the property owners on the lower part of the street, which was originally North avenue, are entitled to retain that name. And that, inasmuch as the upper part of the street was originally, and until the last few years, North street, no hardship can be experienced by the property owners upon that part of the street by calling the upper part, and that part of the lower part which is a continuation of the other part. Namely, from East Main street to Norton street, North street. We, therefore, recommend that the resolution of Ald. Fox be allowed to stand, notwithstanding the objections of his honor, the Mayor. A great many lives are endangered in factories

not leave their posts in the engine room. A great many lives are endangered in factories and work shops by this means, and, by having these men do plumbing, steam or gashtiting, thus depriving men who have spent the best part of their lives in making a study of the different branches of these trades of employment at the same time for want of experience by these engineers, frequently defective and dangerous work is done, placing the lives of many in great jeopardy.

We would surgest that some means be adopted

many in great jeopardy.

We would suggest that some means be adopted whereby factory inspectors, or some other authorized persons be instructed to report such violations of their licenses by engineers, and, upon conviction, some punishment be inflicted upon both engineer and employers, which will have the effect of stopping this very dangerous business.

GENTLEMEN: Your Electrical Committee begs leave to report that they have had several conferences with the Executive Board and the representatives of the electric light and telegraph companies in reference to underground conduits for the wires now suspended upon poles throughout the city. It is desirable that the unsightly poles and wires should come down, but opinions differ as to the practicability of the underground systems now in use in various cities. By some it is claimed that the plan is entirely feasible, by others, that it is unsatisfactory and imperfect. The Brush Electric Light Company has requested permission from the Executive Board to use one of the streets of the city for the purpose of experimenting with one of the under-

purpose of experimenting with one of the under-

purpose of experimenting with one of the underground systems.

Next year, in all probability, Main and State streets will be improved with a new pavement, and before that work is undertaken the wires should be buried, if possible, so that the streets may be left entire and unobstructed. And when it is determined to place the wires underground, provisions should be made that all the wires, electric, telephone, police patrol and fire alarm, be thus disposed of, at one and the same time.

Your committee is informed that the cities of Chicago, Pittshure, Philadalshis, and New York.

Chicago, Pittsburg, Philadelphia and New York

are using the respective underground systems now in operation; which is the best system, can only be determined, in the opinion of your committee, by a personal inspection. The Executive Board has, accordingly, suggested that a subcommittee of one from the Electrical Committee, together with one from the Executive Board and the Superintendent of Fire Alarm visit the several cities mentioned, for the purpose of making the desired investigation. We think the suggestion is a good one, and accordingly recommend the adoption of the appended resolution.

In regard to the petition of hackmen to have their license fees reduced to one dollar, your Committee, in view of the fact that the revenues of those gentlemen have been considerably reduced since the inauguration of the electric rapid transit street car system, which practically limits their income to the fees derived from their attendance upon funerals and christenings, recommend that their request be complied with and that the following amendment to the penal ordinance relating to backney coaches and carriages

be adopted.

The communication from the Committee of the Plumbers and Steam-fitters Local Union No. 13, your Committee thinks should be carefully considered by your Committee, with the help of the Committee appropriate to examine stationary or Committee appointed to examine stationary engineers, and we have made arrangements with the gentlemen representing the Local Union to meet with us as soon as a meeting with the Committee on stationary engineers can be arranged

meter with tas as on as a meeting with the Committee on stationary engineers can be arranged for that purpose.

The President of the Board appeared before your Committee in regard to the practice prevailing among farmers and hucksters of selling potatoes and other produce in baskets which contain but fifty or fifty-one pounds, whereas, the laws of the State require sixty pounds to the bushel. It has been found that a crate of 2,500 cubic inches contains exactly sixty pounds of potatoes, and this crate has been adopted by manufacturers throughout the country as the standard measure. In order, therefore to guard as effectively as possible against the deception, and to protect the people from further imposition by unprincipled venders, your Committee would recommend an amendment to the hucksters' ordinance whereby no sales of potatoes or other produce shall be permitted on our public streets by measure, except in crates, duly sealed by the City Sealer, the capacity of each of which shall be 2,500 cubic inches, or which shall hold, when filled level with the top thereof, sixty pounds.

Your Committee also considered matters connected with the street railway system, and agreed upon certain amendments to the street railroad ordinance, which, in our opinion, would provide against the constant danger to life and limb, and impose necessary restrictions upon the railroad company. We find, however, that the present ordinance, being one adapted solely to the old railroad system, should be revised and amended in many other respects, so as to meet the requirements which the change of motive power demands. We have, accordingly, requested the City Attorney to perfect a new ordinance, containing the amendments suggested by your Committee, and such other provisions as he, after consultation with your Committee, shall consider necessary and proper.

In the matter of the communication of the first assistant city attorney in respect to the costs recovered against the city by the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company in an action in the Supreme Court, we find that the action was brought against the city for a permanent injunction restraining the city from connecting additional sewers to the one which flows upon the lands of the railroad company. In the Equity Court the railroad company secured the Equity Court the railroad company secured a permanent injunction with costs amounting to 1835.50, which was entered on the 31st day of March, 1887. Upon an appeal by the city from the General Term from this decision the judgment in the Equity Court was affirmed with costs amounting to \$97, which was entered on the 7th day of July, 1888. The city appealed from this judgment to the Court of Appeals, in which court the judgment was modified in that the injunction should be dissolved, when the contents of the sewer in question ceased to flow on the railroad company's land and as modified the judgment was affirmed without cost against the city.

This ends the action and the city is bound by This ends the action and the city is bound by these judgments to pay the above costs with interest from the day of entering the judgments. To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Your Committee on GENTLEMEN: Wooden Buildings deem it proper to call your attention to several matters which have suggested them-

to several matters which have suggested themselves to us, as members of such Committee, and to recommend certain amendments to the ordinance relating to the erection and removal of buildings for your consideration and approval:

It is evident that, with the expansion of the city's limits, the multiplication of dwellings, manufactories and places of business, and the constant and rapid increase in the population of Rochester, great care should be exercised in the erection and location of wooden buildings, especially in the thickly populated and business sections of the city.

erection and location of wooden buildings, especially in the thickly populated and business sections of the city.

We have endeavored to exercise such care, but have been met with attempts of various kinds to evade the plain provisions of the ordinance. One such method, commonly employed, when objection is made to the construction of a wooden building, its to claim that the building does not come within the prohibition of the ordinance, inasmuch as it is to be covered with iron or brick, or some other metal or substance. And buildings constructed of wood, and then covered with sheet or corrugated iron, tin or other metal are frequently seen in all sections of the city. It is needless to say that such covering does not protect adjoining property from damage, in case of fire, to any appreciable extent,

Another source of trouble with which your committee have been confronted is the failure of applicants for the erection of wooden buildings to give the proper notice of their intended application to the owners. occupants or agents described in the ordinance, and of their neglect to furnish the required verified proof of the giving of such notice.

Your committee, would, therefore, recommend that the appended amendments to said ordinance be adopted, and that the Clerk be directed to to cause blank applications for the erection of wooden buildings, and affidavits of service of notices, to be printed, in conformity with those amendments.

By Ald. Bierbrauer—An ordinance to to amend an ordinance relating to the erection of and re-moval of buildings adopted October 4, 1887.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 1 of an ordinance relating to the erection of and removal of buildings, adopted October 4, 1887, is hereby amended by adding to the end thereof, the following:

Nothing herein contained shall be construed as

nothing herein contained shan be construed as permitting, or authorizing, the covering, inclosing or veneering of any wooden building, or of the frame work thereof, with galvanized, sheet or corrugated iron, or any other metal.

SECTION 2. Section 9 of said ordinance is hereby amended by adding to the end thereof, the following:

following:

Said proof shall state that such service has been Said proof shall state that such service has been made, either personally, by delivery to, and leaving with such owner, occupant or agent, a copy of such notice, at least, one week before such intended application, or by depositing in the post-office, at Rochester, N. Your Committee has given this matter a fair consideration, as to how much this increase will cost the city, and has received a statement from the City Hospital showing that during the past year they have had 174 patients, who have been cared for 5,079 days at \$4 per week, and 52 of them who were there longer than that three months, and were cared for 2,981 days at \$1.75 per week. Under the increase, the city would pay for 19 patients for \$37 days' or \$99.93 additional.

St. Mary's Hospital has had, in the past year, 100 patients 5,530 days, at \$4 per.week, and 19 patients 692 days, at \$1.75 per week. If the rate was changed, as requested, the city would pay them \$75.64 more.

The increase asked for would probably average \$250.00, or a little more per year, for the four hospitals. This is not a large amount and your Committee would cheerfully recommend that the request be granted, and that the following resolution be adopted.

GENTLEMEN: Pursuant to your request for an opinion in respect to the authority of the Common Council to reconsider a resolution ordering

an assessment, and direct a new assessment thereof, I submit the following: I find that by the laws of 1890, chapter 561, sec-I find that by the laws of 1890, chapter 561, section 205 of the revised city charter was amended so as to give the Common Council this authority. Prior to this amendment, every assessment for local improvements ratified by the Common Council was final and conclusive. But, by virtue of this amendment, any assessment which was confirmed by the Common Council, may, at any time, before or after the enactment of said amendment, be reconsidered at any time, and the same proceedings had thereon as provided for a confirmation of an assessment roll when first presented to the Common Council. This reconsideration can be made, though the parties assessed have paid their assessments. If such assessments have been paid, and the amount paid is greater than the assessment upon reconsideration, such excess must be paid to the party. If less has been paid than the assessment upon reconsideration, the person so paying it will be liable for the balance, with the same effect as if said balance was the amount of the original assessment.

Gentlemen: Your Law Committee begs leave to report as follows upon the claims referred to it of certain parties for damages alleged to have been sustained by reason of the pollution of creeks or streams flowing through their premises by sewage from the City of Rochester: Peter Braal, on June 11, 1887, began an action against the City for damages for the pollution of Thomas creek by city sewage. On February 13, 1890, he secured a verdict against the city for \$275. This judgment, inclusive of costs, amounting to \$431.52, was paid March 26, 1890. costs, an 26, 1890.

costs, amounting to \$431.52, was paid March 26, 1890.

He is entitled to commence another action for damages accruing subsequently to the first action. He has, however, offered to settle his claim upon the payment to him of a sum at the rate of \$60 per year, from the beginning of his first action to the present time, and the further sum of \$60 per year, until said sewage is diverted from said stream.

James Royle, on July 24, 1886, began a similar action for the pollution of the same stream. He secured a verdict on October 31, 1888, for \$185, which amount, together with costs amounting to \$160.63, was paid December 14, 1888.

14, 1888.

Another action commenced April 23, 1889, is now pending. This claim, we think, can be settled by the payment of \$50 per year, for

past and future damages, as proposed in the case of Braal.

Mary Shell served a summons and complaint for a similar cause of action, July 26, 1886. The action was, on May 7, 1889, compromised by payment to her of \$192.50. She offers to settle on the same basis as Peter Braal, on the payment of \$35per year for past and future degrees.

damages. Ignatz Seltenmeyer began an action arising from the same cause, July 28, 1886. On May 8, 1889, he received a verdict of \$135. The hudgment was affirmed by the General Term, and an appeal from the judgment of the latter court is now pending in the Court of Appeals. A new action for subsequent damages was begun March 9, 1889. A settlement can, we think, be made on the payment of \$50 per year for past and future damages.

Jacob Brower, on September 10, 1891, served a notice of claim for \$1,050, damages, for the pollution of Hobbic creek by city sewage. We believe this claim can be settled by the payment at the rate of \$75 per year for six years for past and a like sum per annum for future damages.

damages.

On September 21,1889, John Brower began an action for \$2,000 damages from the same cause, which we have reason to believe may be compromised by payment of \$90 per year, in settlement of past and future damages. He is entitled to recover in that action damages for six years prior to the commencement of the action.

Jacob B. Brosser as Administrator recover.

Jacob B. Brasser, as Administrator, recovered a judgment of \$635.80, in an action for the pollution of Hobbie creek, commenced July 17, 1889. This claim can be settled, we think, by the payment as above, of \$90 per year.

Your Committee has considered many other Your Committee has considered many other sewer cases, and has made propositions of settlement to various claimants. In most cases, the amounts demanded have, in the opinion of your Committee, been too large, and, in other instances, no final proposition has been left with your Committee. We believe that all of these cases should be settled on some just and equitable basis. While it is true that the City has no valid defense to these actions, it is also true that everything is being done now to abate the alleged nuisance, as soon as nossible. possible.

possible. If the claimants are somewhat modest in their demands, and will accept such sums as your Committee will propose in settlement of their claims, we have no doubt that in the course of a few weeks, all sewer litigation may be done away with, to the advantage of the city and the litigants as well.

Your Committee ask that they may be given more time to consider the remaining sewer cases, and that, in the meantime, the claimants be notified that, while the city is willing to give them a just compensation for whatever damages they may have suffered, and will sustain in the future, there is no disposition on the part of the Common Council to pay them extravagant or ridiculously large amounts.

For the purpose of making a beginning in the work assigned to us, and of showing that we are acting in good faith, we recommend the adoption of the appended resolution.

GENTLEMEN: Your Law Committee begs leave to submit the following as its report:

During the month of April, 1890, Harriet M.
Turner, M. D., and Minerva Palmer, M. D., were appointed by this Common Council as City Physicians for the term of one year, ending on the first Monday of April, 1891; that no appointment was made to take their places until the second Monday of April, 1891, and that during said first week of April, the above physicians held over, and were in the employ of the City as City Physicians; that the City is, therefore, indebted to each of said parties in the sum of \$8.33, for services rendered during said week. We, therefore, recommend that the applications of said physicians be granted, and that the Clerk be directed to draw orders upon the Treasurer in their favor for the above amounts.

In the matter of the communication of Walter S. Hubbell making a proposition of settlement in the case of David K. Bell, et al., as the Board of Health of the Town of Brighton, against the City we have carefully investigated the matter and find that the action was begun for an injunction by the Board of Health of Brighton, on the 19th day of September, 1888; that the case was tried at the Equity Term of the Supreme Court, in the month of March, 1889, and a judgment was rendered enjoining the City from emptying the sewers of the City of Rochester into

Thomas creek. From this decision an appeal was taken to the General Term, and the judgment was affirmed on this appeal on the 23d day of October, 1890.

On the 30th day of October, 1890, the City Attorney was served with a copy of the judgment, and notice of its entry, and from this judgment, and notice of its entry, and from this judgment there has never been an appeal taken to the Court of Appeals. The city had one year from the time of the service of the copy of judgment and the notice of entry to appeal, and, this time, having now expired, there is no alternative for the City but to obey the injunction. There was no stay of injunction granted by the court after the 30th day of October, 1890, and the City, not having turned the sewers out of Thomas creek, has been, and is yet, with its officers, in contempt of court, and can be prosecuted for such contempt at any time the plaintiffs, or their attorney, see fit so to do. We, therefore, recommend that, in addition to the regular costs entered in the action, to wit: The judgment of April 9, 1889, \$171.14, with interest, and the judgment of October 5, 1890, \$74.22, with interest, that the City pay to the plaintiffs' or their attorney, the sum of \$250, as counsel fees, upon condition that said plaintiffs vacate said injunction and release said City and its officers from any and all damages that said plaintiffs may be entitled to by reason of the violation of Richard junction.

credit is in the issuing of notes to be paid from next year's tax levy, authority for same being given in section 81 of the charter.

"This action makes the city a borrower for six months in the year, being obliged to pay 6 per cent. for the loans, while they received under the present contract, but 2 per cent. on their balance when in funds. when in funds.

"At this season of the year, just before the interest on bonded indebtedness is due—which will more than use up the cash balance on hand

The question of providing for the payment of the acceptance is a serious one.

"The amount of acceptances in round numbers to be paid, on or before July 1, 1892, is \$508,-000, add to this the amount required for expenses of the city for six months, and you will have a sum equal to three-fourths of next year's tax

Of course this amount will be reduced somewhat by the payment of city tax and collections of local improvements, still the principle is wrong. A corporation should be able to borrow money at cheaper rates of interest than a private individual, and if such is the case it is poor financial policy to pay 6 per cent. on the city's note when money can be had in any quantity on the city's bond at 4 per cent.

Said bonds, when issued, shall be signed by the Treasurer, sealed with the corporate seal of the city, countersigned by the Mayor and President of the Common Council and may be either, council or Common Council, and may be either coupon or registered bonds and shall be redeemable at any time after twenty years from the issue thereof, A complete record shall be made and kept by the said Treasurer of said bonds, including the dates, amounts and the dates of maturity thereof, and to whom issued, if registered, respectively. The proceeds of said bonds shall be applied to the payment of the costs of procuring said additional

payment of the costs of procuring san additional water supply.

§ 2. The bonds of the city of Rochester, which shall be issued by virtue of this act, shall as authorized by the Common Council be sold from time to time, by the City Treasurer, at public sale, to the highest bidder, after ten days' notice published in the official paper of said city, and in one or more newspapers in the city of New York, but said bonds shall not be sold at less than par, § 3. Gentlemen: I herewith return without approval Final Ordinance No. 4,558, adopted at your last meeting, for the construction of a flag walk on South St. Paul street, from Main street to Court street. Several of the large property owners on South St. Paul street have appeared before me in objection to the approval of this ordinance. It appears from their statements and from the remonstrance published in your proceedings, that no petition for the adoption of this ordinance has been presented to your honorable body and that none of the adoption of this ordinance has been presented to your honorable body and that none of the property owners on the street have asked for this improvement. The remonstrance represents nine-tenths of the frontage on South St. Paul street to be assessed for the proposed improvement. It also appears that the property owners on the street have, within a recent period, been obliged to pay heavy assessments

for pavement and sewers, both in front of their property and in the rear.

In view of the foregoing facts it is evident that this ordinance should not stand unless the public interest clearly requires it. It appears that the sidewalk as at present laid along the east side of South St. Paul street is, in places, constructed of flag the entire width, in other cases partly of flag and partly brick, and in still others entirely of brick. I am informed that that portion of the brick walk lying between Main street and Ely street has been receitly relaid under the direction of Mr. Moore, one of the sidewalk inspectors appointed by the Executive Board, and that it is now pronunced by him to be in good condition. As to this portion of the walk, therefore, there is clearly no public need of the proposed improvement at the present time.

As to that portion of the sidewalk lying between Ely and Court streets, I am convinced, from the statements made to me, that with a small expenditure for repairs where needed, the present sidewalk can be put in good condition and be made serviceable for some time to come. I understand, also, that negotiations are pending for the construction of a large block come. I understand, also, that hegotiations are pending for the construction of a large block upon a portion of the property to be assessed, and that if the block should be constructed it would necessitate the tearing up of the walk if laid under the proposed ordinance. For the foregoing reasons I return the said ordinance disapproved.

Although not authorized by your Board to ex-Although not authorized by your Board to examine into matters pertaining to the Central Library, the subject was discussed in committee, and it was deemed advisable to recommend to this Board that it also ask the Common Council to favor the passage of an amendment to the city charter providing for the raising of a sum of money not exceeding \$3,000 annually for library purposes. We do this with the knowledge of facts at hand and public showing the need of such a course if we will continue to allow the masses to utilize a library originally intended for the use of the teachers and scholars of our public schools, and which at present has over 15,000 patrons. The amount of money received for its maintenance is clearly inadequate to meet the demands of the public. public.

It is, therefore, that your committee has pre-pared the following: Resolved, That this Board requests the Common Council to favor the passage of charter amendments creating and continuing the office of a general City Auditor, and a purchasing de-partment in general for all the several city de-partments, and that section 126 of the present city charter be amended so as to read as fol-

Section 126—The Commissioners of common schools in said city shall constitute a board to be called "The Board of Education of the City of Rochester," which shall be a corporate body in relation to all the powers and duties conferred upon them by virtue of this act. They shall meet on the first Monday of each and every month and as much oftener as they shall from time to time appoint, and a majority of shall meet on the first Monday of each and every month and as much oftener as they shall from time to time appoint, and a majority of said board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The said board shall elect one of their number president, who shall when present, preside at all meetings of said board and shall have the power to call special meetings of the Common Council. In the absence of the president, the board shall appoint some other member to preside at such meetings and perform the duties of president. No member of said Board of Education shall, during the period he holds said office, be appointed to or be competent to hold any office of which the emoluments are paid from the city treasury by any act or ordinance of the Board of Education, or be directly or indirectly interested in any contract as principal, surety or otherwise, or the fur ishing of any materials or supplies or supplies for the city of Rochester, directly or by another person, the expenses or consideration whereof, are to be paid under any order, ordinance or resolution of the Board of Education. No member of said board shall vote for the payment of any such bill of materials or supplies after notice that any member of said board is interested therein, or in payment thereof. Any violation of this section shall be deemed a misdemeanor and punishable as such.

Also, that section 128 of said charter be amended so as to read as follows:

Section 128-The said commissioners may appoint a policeman who shall have the same powers as other policemen of said city, and who shall perform such duties as said Board of Education may impose. The said commissionwho shall perform such duties as said Board of Education may impose. The said commissioners may also appoint a purchasing age it, whose duty it shall be to superintend the construction of school buildings, and also superintend the repairs made to the different school-houses under the direction of said board. It shall be his duty to see that the various amounts of hard and charcoal contracted for by said board shall be delivered to the different school-houses, and he shall give his receipt therefor upon the delivery of the same. He shall purchase all supplies (other than those already provided for under section 131) used by the aforesaid Board of Education, and shall perform such other duties as the said board may from time to time direct. The aforesaid noliceman and purchasing agent shall hold their respective offices during the pleasure of said Board of Education, and their salaries shall be fixed and paid by the aforesaid board from the funds raised for its use for that purpose.

REPORT OF COMMITTEES

Com. Reynolds, Chairman of the Repair Committee, submitted the following report of the Repair Committee:

To the Board of Education:

To the Board of Education:

Gentlemen: Your Committee desires at this time to call your attention to the necessity of a larger appropriation annually for the purpose of repairing your school houses, buildings, appurtenances and their fixtures. As you know after the limit to this fund of \$15,000 is fixed by the Common Council each year, no other resources are available to keep in repair all your school buildings. The remedy must come by an amendment to the city charter, permitting more than that sum to be appropriated annually for those purposes; and we thus call early attention to the subject, that appropriate legislation may be taken in time. We have no doubt the Council will sanction this change if convinced of its necessity. The limited amount was fixed many years ago when you had many less buildings to repair than now, and at a time when most of our schools were comparatively new, and needed much less outlays than at present. To all persons at all familiar with the present condition of the public schools, it requires no argument to show that the present amount is entirely insufficient. For several years the resources of this Committee have been severely taxed, and the \$15,000 entirely exhausted in repairs long before the expiration of the fiscal year. Indeed, many old bills contracted by former committees must, under the present arrangement, be paid by succeeding boards. That of course, only cripples the succeeding year's fund. We have been careful to reserve a large proportion of the fund to meet unexpected repairs and outlays which will occur in spite of the most careful foresight. When closets are deranged, and the health authorities insist on proper sanitary precautions, or when roofs leak and floors utterly give out, then some expenses must be incurred whether there are available or not. You have the care and custody of thirty-four school buildings, many of them built twenty and thirty years ago with more than four hundred rooms. And if you are to keep those in respectable shape, you must have more mon GENTLEMEN: Your Committee desires at this

ation.

All the black-boarding, plumbing, ventilating, painting, whitewashing, roofing and repairing expenses, and the rental of annexes, should be met by the Repair Fund.

It is utterly impossible to do this and keep some of your buildings tenantable and clean as the patrons insist shall be done. The amount available this year for these purposes has been entirely inadequate; and this condition of affairs is growing worse every year. Several buildings are now suffering from lack of necessary painting, both inside and out; and it is ruinous economy to let them go without it. The walks in front of other school lots are in very bad condition, and notwithstanding notices

have been served by the Executive Board upon us to make necessary repairs, we have been

us to make necessary repairs, we have been unable to comply.

The amount of lumber required each year for the school carpenter's necessary repairing is chargeable to this committee fund, and yet we are unable to equip some new buildings with storm houses to protect from the severe storms and weather. That officer's disbursements and expenses for help and cartage necessarily required are a tax on the overburdened fund. The necessary repair of old desks and furniture involves quite an outlay, and yet economy requires it.

Two of our public school cellars are not drained and their damp and unwholesome condition is a disgrace to our school system. But

dition is a disgrace to our school system. But we are powerless to do these things and yet keep within the charter requirements.

The sum of \$10,000 could be well invested in ventilating some of the old buildings, which require it. These are public, well-known facts. The buildings are open to public inspection, and any citizen interested can easily verify these statements. Of course the buildings erected during the past few years are well ventilated; and, generally, are well equipped, but that does not relieve the unfortunate condition which to-day prevails in Districts 7, 9, 12, 16, 17, 21, 22, 23, 25 and 27. We invite public inspection of this matter.

We, therefore, recommend the adoption of the following:

We, therefore the following:

Resolved, That the Common Council request our representatives at Albany to urge the pas-sage of an amendment to Sub-division 6 of Section 120 of the present City Charter as amended in 1888, so that the same will read as

Section 129 of the present City Charter as amended in 1888, so that the same will read as follows:

"Section 129, Sub-division 6. The amount to be raised for teachers' wages and contingent expenses in any one year shall not be less than six dollars nor more than eighteen dollars per capita, based on the average number of resident pupils enrolled in the several public schools of this city, for the school year ending on the first day of May next preceding the levying of the general city taxes in each and every year. A sworm statement of such number of pupils so enrolled shall be made by the Superintendent of Schools according to the verified monthly reports of the Principals of said schools. Nor shall the amount to be raised in any one year to lease, alter, improve and repair school-houses and their out-houses and appurtenances, exceed thenty-five thousand dollars. Nor shall the amount raised in any one year to purchase and improve sites, and build or enlarge school-houses, exceed fifty thousand dollars; and the Common Council of said city are authorized and directed, when necessary, to raise by loan, in anticipation of the taxes, the amount to be raised, collected and levied as aforesaid."

The passage of the enabling act would not, necessarily, oblige the Council to give us the full amount. We think they would do so whenever convinced that it was necessary.

Since then the adoption of other means of street lighting has steadily reduced the number to about 500, most of which are in isolated and scattered locations. It is manifest that the expenses of care and maintenance are greatly increased by the above changes in conditions, and that, therefore, the present prices received are inadequate to the service now rendered. Thence southerly along the center line of the lands formerlu used for the Genesee Valley Canal to the south line of the Strong Tract. Thence easterly along said south line of the said Strong Tract to the center of the Genese river. Thence southerly along the center line of said Genesee river to the old south houndary line of the city line to the center of Bronson avenue. Thence easterly along the center line of Bronson arenue to the place of beginning, shall constitute the Eighteenth ward.

## NINETEENTH WARD,

All that part of the city of Rochester lying east of the Genesee river, and not included within any of the foregoing wards, shall constitute the Nineteenth word.

#### TWENTIETH WARD.

All that part of the city of Rochester lying west Au that part of the etay of Rochester typing west of the center of the Genesee river, and south of the Niagara Falls branch of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad, and not included in either of the above described wards, shall constitute the Twentieth ward.

Section 2. Section seven of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:
Section 7. An election shall be held in each ward annually on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in March, at such places as shall be designated by the Common Council, of which a notice shall be published by the City Clerk for at least six days next previous to

the election in all the daily newspapers of the City, at which election there shall be chosen by the electors of the city, voting in their respective wards as often as the terms of office of the then incumbents shall expire within the year after such election, one mayor, who shall hold his office for two years, one police justice, who shall hold his office for four years, one treasurer who shall hold his office for two years; and also by the electors of each ward, one supervisor, whose term of office shall be the same as that of the supervisors from the towns of Monroe County, and the terms of office of the supervisors now in office in said city shall end at the same time as the terms of the town's supervisors now in office; one content of the town's supervisors now in office; one conoffice of the supervisors now in office in said city shall end at the same time as the terms of the town's supervisors now in office; one constable who shall hold his office for one year; and at an election held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in March, 1892, there shall also be chosen by the electors of the First, Third, Fifth, Seventh, Ninth, Eleventh, Thirteenth, Fifteenth, Seventeenth and Nineteenth wards one alderman in each ward who shall hold his office for the term of two years; and by the electors of the Eighteenth and Twentieth wards one alderman from each who shall hold his office for the term of one year; and by the electors of the First. Third, Fifth, Seventh, Ninth, Eleventh, Twelfth, Thirteenth and Nineteenth wards one commissioner of common schools in each ward who shall hold his office for the term of two years, and by the electors of the Eighth, Seventeenth and Twentieth wards, or commissioner of common schools in each ward who shall hold his office for the term of one year; and thereafter aldermen and commissioners of common schools shall be elected for two years as the terms expire of those elected from their respective wards. The elected for two years as the terms expire or those elected from their respective wards. The city treasurer shall not be entitled to enter upon the duties of his office until he shall have executed and filed with the mayor a bond in the penal sum of fifty thousand dollars or such other sum as the Common Council may have other sum as the Common Council may have fixed with good and sufficient sureties approved by the mayor in writing thereon and conditioned for the faithful performance of all his duties as treasurer and of all the duties imposed upon him by law in respect to the money, property and affairs of said city. The execution of such bond by the treasurer and sureties shall be duly acknowledged or proved so as to entitle it to be read in evidence, and it shall be the duty of the mayor to cause such bond to be recorded in the Monroe County Clerk's office: and a copy of such bond as so Stein bold to be recorded in the Monroe County Clerk's office; and a copy of such bond as so recorded, certified by the said County Clerk, shall be as good evidence in all the Courts and places as the original bond which shall be safe-ly kept by the mayor after being recorded as aforesaid.

Section 3. This act shall take effect immedi-

Riley for certain taxes, your Committee find that the facts are as stated in said communication, and we would accordingly recommend that the sum of \$416.52, deposited with the Treasurer, be received in full for the assessments of the Weld and Scio streets and Sibley nursery sewers on part of lots 82, 83 and 84, Farm tract, on the east side of Scio street, and that \$230.13 of said amount he credited to lands sold, and the balance amount be credited to lands sold, and the balance to interest and assessments.

The treasurer desires to know whether the \$15,000 credited to the Parkway fund may be deosited in the Commercial Bank, as requested by the treasurer of the Park Commissioners, or whether said moneys should remain in the city

treasury.

Inasmuch as the fund in question was created after the resolution designating said bank as the depository of the park funds then existing went into effect, and inasmuch as the act creating the Parkway fund provides that all moneys raised in the city treasury, and shall not be withdrawn, except on orders drawn by the president and secretary, your committee recommended that the treasurer retain control of the said fund, until proper requisition for the same as provided by law.

notice of which was served upon the city in May last, for damages resulting from an injury to him caused by a fall upon a defective sidewalk, your committee had the matter thoroughly investigated by the City Attorney, and, upon his report, we find that due notice was served upon

the city of the defect in said sidewalk before the accident, and that the only defense that the city has to said claim is as to the amount of the dam-

accuent, and that the only defense that the city has to said claim is as to the amount of the damages. A proposition has been made by the attorneys of said Gleadell to settle the same for the sum of \$400.00, and we recommend that said claim be settled in full for said sum.

In the matter of the proposition of Abraham Farmen, Jr., to settle his claim for damages caused by the pollution of the creek running through his property, we find that, on the 15th day of June, 1888, a judgment was recovered by him against said city for the sum of \$175.00 for damages to said creek, covering a period of three years and a half. We further find that fifty dollars per annum for payment of said pollution is a fair and reasonable sum, and we, therefore, recommend that the city pay to him the sum of fifty dollars per year, beginning from July 20th, 1886, together with the costs of the action now pending.

In the matter of the proposition of George A. Weihs for the settlement of his claim for damages resulting from the pollution of ages resulting we find that a judgment was recovered by him against the city on June 16th, 1888, for the sum of \$428.75, for damages covering through land. 1888, for the sum of \$428.75, for damages covering a period of three years and a half. We consider that eighty dollars per year is a fair and proper settlement of the damages for said polution, and we, therefore, recommend that said sum be paid to him per year, beginning from July 20th, 1886, together with the costs of the action now pending, in settlement of said claim.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:
Section 1. Section three of chapter one hundred and nine-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, entitled "An act to authorize the selection, location and acquiring of certain grounds for public parks and parkays, in and near the city of Rochester, and to provide for the maintenance and embellishment thereof," as amended by three hundred and forty-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety, is hereby further amended to read as follows: follows:

Sec. 3. The said Park Commissioners shall have power to select and locate such grounds in and near the city of Rochester, as may in their opinion, be proper and desirable to be reserved, set apart or acquired for one or more public parks and parkways between such public parks and approaches thereto, and streets connecting the said parks: and, for this purpose, may take any part or parts of existing streets and change the lines thereof. The said park commissioners shall make such selection and location in view of the present condition, future growth and wants of said city, as they shall deem best, with a view to the general convenience and advantage of residents in every portion of said city. Within ten days after organization, as in the last section provided, the said park commissioners shall pro-Sec. 3. The said Park Commissioners shall have days after organization, as in the last section provided, the said park commissioners shall proceed to have surveys and plans made, and, as soon as practicable thereafter, enter into agreements of purchase, in the name of the city of Rochester, of lands within the location and boundaries by them fixed for said park, parks, parkways, streets and approaches, for which owners will make contracts of sale, and the same shall be paid for out of the park improvement fund, hereinafter provided, from the sale of Rochester park bonds. They shall report, in detail, such selection and location of lands purchased, to the Common Council of said city of Rochester, on or before the first day of January eighteen hundred and eightynine, and from time to time thereafter, when requested by the Common Council. In said reports, the said park commissioners shall state the boundaries of the grounds located by them for the park or parks, parkways, approaches and streets by them laid out; also the name or names of said park, or parks, parkways, approaches and streets, and portions thereof then acquired by gift or purchase. And the tracts, pieces and parcels of land which may be described in said report, are hereby declared to be public places; and shall be deemed to have been taken and acquired by said city of Rochester for public use, as and for a public park, or parks, parkways, public streets connecting the same, and approaches thereto. All parts of streets, avenues and highways now laid out as running through said lands are hereby closed and discontinued, so far as the same would run through, or intersect, any of said lands, except parkways and streets connecting parks. The said park commissioners, for the purpose of performing the duties imposed upon them by this section, shall have power to employ a surveyor and necessary assistants, at a yearly expense not exceeding five thousand dollars, and the same, when certified by said park commissioners, shall be a charged upon the city of Rochester, and shall be paid out of the moneys hereby authorized to be raised for the purposes of this act. Before any proceedings shall be had or taken for acquiring the title to any real estate, except by gift, or for a nominal consideration, or by agreement of purchase, as herein provided, the said commissioners shall cause to be made a map of the land which they shall determine to take for such park, parkways, streets connecting the same, and approaches t which they shall determine to take for such park, parkways, streets connecting the same, and approaches thereto, which shall be certified by the president and said surveyor, or a majority of the commissioners and the surveyor, and filed in the office of the clerk of Monroe County, and a cony thereof filed in the office of the clerk of the city of Rochester. But said judges, or either of them, in any action or proceeding upon a trial by jury before either of them, shall have a right, and it shall be their duty, or the duty of either of them, in a proper case, and of like cause, to direct the verdict of a jury, as to the manner of rendering the same, and as to the same effect, and subject to the like objections and exceptions, as the rerdicts of a jury in the courts of record of this state. record of this state.

But, neither of the trial fees above mentioned shall be allowed to the prevailing party, unless he appears by attorney, or by the clerk of any attorney; and the said judges, or either of them may direct that the pleadings on the joinder of any issue shall be in writing, and filed, and, when a judgment of non-suit, or no cause of action, is rendered on such trial, the defendant shall be entitled to have judgment entered against the plaintiff for the amount of fees, costs and disbursements allowed the defendant by law, and, also, the additional costs provided for in this act.

The said judges may appoint, and at pleasure remove, one, and if said judges shall deem it necessary, two stenographers for said court, each of whom shall be a deputy clerk of said court. The said judges shall file a certificate of the appointment or removal, so made by them, in the office of the clerk of Monroe county. Before executing the duties of this office, each stenographer, so appointed, shall take and subscribe the constitutional oath of office, and file the same with the clerk of said county, and shall give bail for the faithful performance of his duty, in such form, and for such sum, and with such sureties, as the judges of said court shall approve, and file the formance of his duty, in such form, and for such sum, and with such sureties, as the judges of said court shall approve, and file the same with the Treasurer of said city. It shall be the duty of such stenographer to take stenographic minutes of the testimony and other proceedings in all cases tried before the court. except when the judge sitting at the trial shall dispense with his services. He shall transcribe fully and at length the minutes of each case, so taken by him. in written or printed characters, when so directed by the court, and file the same with the Clerk, who shall cause the same to be preserved with other papers in the case. The said stenographer shall preserve the original minutes taken by him, which shall be filed in the office of the Clerk of said court. He shall deliver to his successor in office all the minutes taken by him which shall not have been filed with the clerk, and shall act in all other matters connected with his office in accordance with the direction of the judges, and he may, after he shall have filed his minutes, furnish to anyone applying therefore a transcript of said minutes, and may charge and receive therefor from the person to whom he shall furnish the same, the sum of three cents for each folio of one hundred words contained in said transcript. To the Honorable the Common Council of the City

of Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: In respect to the charter amendments proposed on behalf of the Municipal Court, the following reasons for their passage are respectfully submitted.

As to the first proposed amendment, the judges now have a right to non-suit the plaintiff, on behalf of the defendant, when the facts proven do not constitute a cause of action, and there is no reason why the judges should not have the right, on behalf of the plaintiff, to direct the verdict of the jury, when the facts proven by the defendant constitute no defense.

SECOND

As to the second proposed amendment, the judgments of the Municipal Court, when docketed in Monroe County Clerk's Office, should be put on a par with the judgments of a court of record. The bringing of actions in this court should not be discouraged by the fact that a six year's statute of limitation apply to the judgments thereof, as against a twenty year's statute of limitation to the judgments of a court of record, for the reason: Judgments can be recovered more expeditiously in this court, and with less expense to the litigants, and to the people at large.

As to the third proposed amendment: By the laws of 1890, the jurisdiction of the Municipal Court was increased from \$500 to \$1,000, and no provision made for the payment to attorneys, as an indemnity to the prevailing party, of any additional costs. An attorney will charge more to collect \$1,000 than he will \$500, and the purpose of the amendment is to meet this charge.

FOURTH.

As to the fourth amendment. The fees now paid into the court for the benefit of the city are very small, and just the same if the amount litigated is one dollar or \$1,000, or if the amount for which judgment is entered is for one dollar, or \$1,000. This does not seem just, and the purpose is to charge twenty-five cents more on each additional hundred, or part of one hundred dollars, over and above the first hundred dollars, over and above the first hundred dollars, for trying the cause, or for entering judgment, which will hardly be felt by the party in whose favor the judgment is rendered, and will increase the incoment for the court, in proportion to the increased expenses proposed by any and all of these several amendments. eral amendments.

## FIFTH.

As to the fifth proposed amendment: The

overcrowded condition of the daily calendar of this court requires it. It now frequently hap-pens that the parties have to wait from two to five weeks longer than they wish, before their cases can be reached and tried. The business of the court has more than doubled in the last ten years. The judges now have to write all the testimony in litigated cases in long hand, which is a slow and tedious way of taking testimony; a waste of time, in a sense, of the judges, the attorneys, the parties and their wit-nesses. With a stenographer, the business of judges, the attorneys, the parties and their witnesses. With a stenographer, the business of the court will be expedited and increased, by reason of the fact that it can be done more expeditiously and satisfactorily to the parties and their attorneys. Hence the income of the court will be increased, and such increased business can be done more rapidly and easily than it is to-day by the slow process of taking testimony in long hand.

As to the sixth proposed amendment: The business of the court has doubled within the last ten years. Hence the work to be done by

As to the sixus proposed amenument. The last ten years. Hence the work to be done by the judges has proportionately increased. This fact is shown, in that, while the fees paid into said court for the benefit of the city have not been changed, the amount paid annually into the treasury of the city has more than doubled, as the following figures will show:

These figures do not include any fees in actions for or on behalf of the city, or its officers, as such, which, if considered, would largely swell the above amounts.
But second. By chapter 561 of the laws of 1890, the jurisdiction of the Municipal Court was increased from \$500 to \$1,000, in other words, prior to 1890, an action could be brought in said court, and a judgment recovered therein, to the amount of \$500, and no more, thus largely increasing the duties and responsibilities of the judges, without any increased compensation therefor.
Third. The judges of the court are underpaid in fact, and by comparison with the salaries paid other officers and judges in this and other cities.

paid other officers and judges in this and other cities.

The Judge of the County Court, in which a judgment for damages cannot be rendered for any larger amount than in the Municipal Court, receives a salary of \$5,000 per annum. The Police Justice is paid an annual salary of \$3,700; the City Attorney, \$4,200; the Assistant City Attorney, \$3,500.

The Municipal Court of the City of Buffalo has a jurisdiction of \$500, but pays its judges \$4,000 each, per annum, \$8,000; its Clerk, \$1,300; its Deputy Clerk, \$1,100; its Stenographer, \$1,200. Total, \$11,600; and paid into the city treasury of the city of Buffalo last year, as certified by the clerk of that court, \$6,000. And the suggestion is ventured that there is not a city court in the State of New York, with a jurisdiction of \$1,000, that does not pay more salary to its judges than this amendment asks. amendment asks.

It must be remembered that the law requires that this court shall be held each day of the year, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, and that the judges are hereby practically debarred from the practice of law. That, at present, inclusive of the business done for the city, for which the city pays no fees, this court practically pays its own expenses, and does not cost the taxpayers anything. While its savings to the city and county are apparent, in that many cases are tried and disposed of in this It must be remembered that the law requires

court, that would otherwise be tried in the County Court, and every day saved the County Court is more than \$100 saved the county and city, as shown by the daily expense of the County Court, about as follows: Thirty-six Trial Jurors, at \$2 each per day, \$72; Stenographer, \$10; two side judges, sitting with County Court, and Court of Sessions, say \$8; County Court crier, \$3. This makes \$103 per day, exclusive of the salary of the Judge and the incidental expenses of that court, and it may be safely calculated in this way that this court saves the city far more than its total cost, if it paid nothing into the treasury, saying nothing of its benefits to the public, nor of the manner in which it subserves the business interests of in which it subserves the business interests of

in which it subserves the business interests of the city.

With the proposed increase in the fees to be paid into the city by the fourth amendment, it is believed by the judges that if all the proposed amendments are adopted, the court will be nearly, or quite, as self-sustaining as now, and that it will not practically cost the city anything. It is the only city office except city sealer that by its fees charged therein does practically pay its own expenses, and, in common justice to the judges thereof, ought they not to be paid as much as this amendment proposes to allow?

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City Rochester:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Support and Relief of the Poor begs leave to make the following report:

In the matter of the communication of Ald. Cleveland tendering his resignation as a member of this Committee and making contain Cleveland tendering his resignation as a member of this Committee, and making certain charges against its members in respect to the ordering of goods for the support of the poor, we find, after fully investigating the matter, the following facts:

His charge is that "goods are bought in large quantities by some one man, and the balance of the Committee not even consulted in regard to prices or quality." This is not true in any respect.

balance of the Committee not even consulted in regard to prices or quality." This is not true in any respect.

For many years prior to the administration of this Committee, it had been the custom to allow each one of its members, regardless of politics, to name one butcher and one baker from whom the Overseer of the Poor should order such meat and bread as were necessary for his department. At the first meeting of this Committee the matter of securing supplies was taken under consideration. There was a full attendance and it was thought best to receive bids to furnish meat to the Poor Department. Pursuant to this determination, the Committee received bids and at its next meeting the bids received were opened. The bid of O'Kane Brothers was one cent a pound lower than all the rest with the condition attached that they were to furnish all the pork and corn beef required during the ensuing year. Objections were made in the Committee and department to granting O'Kane Brothers the contract, upon the ground that this firm had at times heretofore furnished to the Poor Department meat which was so tainted and so unwholesome that it could not be used and had partment meat which was so tainted and unwholesome that it could not be used and had to be returned to them.

inwholesome that it could not be used and had to be returned to them.

After the fullest discussion of the matter, the Committee became fully convinced that it was not for the best interests of the poor to accept the bid of O'Kane Brothers, and it was unanimously decided that each member of the Committee should select a butcher from whom the Overseer of the Poor could order meat for the Department at the figure named by the next lowest bidder. It was also decided at this time that each member should name a baker to whom the Overseer could give his orders. At this meeting every member was present, and a resolution was passed by the Committee requesting each member thereof to hand in a name of a butcher and baker to Mr. Ritzenthaler, the Overseer of the Poor. Each member of the Committee did hand in such a name to whom the Overseer should give his orders without any interference, advice or further suggestion on the part of any member. The Overseer has been ordering meat and bread for the poor from the persons named according to his own judgment and the amount ordered has been as equally distributed among them as it was possible for the Overseer to do. Ald. Tracy handed in the name of O'Kane Brothers as his party from whom he wished the Overseer four order meat.

During the administration of this Committee, the Overseer has been obliged several times to return the meat to O'Kane Brothers furnished to the department on account of its being so badly tainted and so unwholesome as to be unfit for use. On one occasion it was so bad that the Overseer threatened to call in the meat inspector if this firm insisted upon sending such meat to the Poor Department.

Under this arrangement the Overseer continued to order his supplies until some time in the early part of December it was reported that Ald. Cleveland had assumed the responsibility of giving to the Overseer an additional name of a butcher and a baker. This was done by him without any authority or knowledge of the other members of the Committee. After it became known to them that Ald. Cleveland had assumed this responsibility, contrary to the resolution passed by the Committee, the Chairman called the Committee together, having notified every member, including Ald. Cleveland. At this meeting Ald. Cleveland was now measure. The matter of Ald. Cleveland's action

was discussed, and, he not having been present, it was finally resolved that the Chairman should call upon him for an explanation of his action, and learn from him whether he intended to have the butcher and baker named intended to have the butcher and baker named by him at the beginning of the year, viz. C. & L. P. Herzberger and Sister Hieronymo, respectively, continue to furnish goods to the department, or whether he desired to have the ones more recently named by him substituted in their place. At the following meeting of the Committee, which Ald. Cleveland did not attend, it was reported by the Chairman that the Alderman had suggested that the resolution originally adopted by the Committee should be changed so that each member should name two butchers and two bakers instead of one

originally adopted by the Committee should be changed so that each member should name two butchers and two bakers instead of one.

After a full and lengthy discussion of the matter, it was decided by this Committee in session that each member should have the privilege of naming but one butcher and baker from whom the Overseer could order goods, and that, inasmuch as Ald. Cleveland had suggested new names, the Overseer should take the new names instead of the old ones. This resolution was, however, in part reconsidered, in so far as to allow Sister Hieronymo to remain on the list instead off the one suggested by Ald. Cleveland in her stead.

Further than this, no member of the Committee has ever had anything to do with the ordering of supplies for the Poor Department. We annex the communication of the Overseer of the Poor, which substantiates this report, in that no member of the Committee has assumed any responsibility for ordering goods for the Poor Department, except as hereinbefore stated. Foor Department, except as a reference for stated. The matter of giving orders for supplies for that department has been left to the good judgment and discretion of the Overseer, and, so far as this Committee can ascertain, no one member of the Committee has ever attempted to dictate to the Overseer except Ald Cleveland himself.

We, therefore, recommend that inasmuch as Ald. Cleveland has misrepresented the facts in respect to the acts and transactions of the Poor Committee, and is desirous of resigning from such Committee, that his resignation be

accepted.

GENTLEMEN:—I learn that the bill amending chapter 347 of the laws of 1890 has received the Governor's approval and that steps are about to be taken for a prompt prosecution of the work on the East Side Trunk Sewer.

To the Electrical Committee of the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

GENTLEMEN: Your Sub-Committee, which was duly authorized to thoroughly investigate the subject of installing and operating electric wires in underground sub-ways or conduits, would respectfully submit the following re-

port:
We visited the cities of Chicago, St. Paul,
Minneapolis, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and
Washington, at all of which points we were
treated with extreme courtesy by the city
officials, and every facility was given us for
investigating the various types of conduits and
methods of insulation.

officials, and every facility was given us for investigating the various types of conduits and methods of insulation.

CHICAGO.

In Chicago, most of the pioneer underground work has been done, and there we found several systems of conduit in use, viz: Dorset, and the Johnson conduit, iron pipe, wooden boxes, creosted wood, and vitrified clay. These various systems are constructed in different ways: The Dorset system consists of blocks formed of a material, the ingredients of which are pitch, coal tar and fine gravel. The blocks were moulded with tubular openings, about two and one half inches in diameter from end to end, and are about four feet long and one foot cross section. These blocks are placed endto end in a trench, and are joined together by pouring between the ends a liquid compound composed of pitch and tar, which speedily hardens. This compound is prevented from entering the ducts by sleeves, which are placed in each duct, between the junction of every two blocks. This system is laid, in some cases, on a foundation of Portland cement, sand and limestone screenings, and, in other cases, this concrete is placed on all sides of the conduit, three inches in thickness. Wooden boxes, placed in a trench in which the wires are laid, and then filled in. This system was one of the early methods used for the burial of wires, but is not used, to any great extent, now, as no additions to, or repairs of, the wires can be made, without tearing up the pavement. In addition to this wooden conduit, creosote wooden planks, groved on the faces, so as to form circular ducts about two inches in diameter, when placed together, are used. The planks are, usually, about twelve inches wide, and about three inches thick, each being groved for three ducts. In laying the conduit, a foundation of cement concrete is formed on the bottom of the trench, and irregularities on the sides are filled out with the same material, so as to hold the planks securely in place latterally, the construction being, in all respects, the same as was

The iron pipe used for carrying underground wires are wrought iron tubes two and one-half inches bore, in some cases, coated with coal tar, or asphalt varnish, put together with a threaded sleeve. In some cases these tubes have been laid in the earth without any other protection, and have also been laid in a bed of concrete which entirely envelops the different layers of pipe. Manholes are provided for all of these systems, built of brick, rectangular in form, about 46 inches long by 40 inches wide, 41-2 to 9 feet deep, with double iron covers, one of which is below the grade, and made water-tight, by packing, and the other, set on a level with the street surface. These manholes are placed from 230 to 450 feet apart. Distribution of the wires to the street lamps and buildings are made from the manholes by lateral conduits to the lamp post, and into the cellars or areaways.

It may be of interest to your Committee to

It may be of interest to your Committee to quote some portions of an article bearing on the subject of underground wires in Chicago by John P. Barrett, City Electrician of that city, written about one year ago, in which he

"The inception of our underground system in Chicago occurred in 1878. The city electrical department erected a new pole line for fire alarm service through one of Chicago's select residence districts. The residents strenuously objected, and a committee of their number waited upon me in reference to the matter. I stated to them that the wires might be placed underground, but the city did not furnish the means for so placing them. They volunteered to defray the expenses, and the poles were removed, and \$40 feet of two inch wrought from pipe was laid, about three feet below the surface. In this pipe two Kerite wires were placed. These wires are in use today, and giving as good service as the day they were placed underground. From this date, the underground question was agitated, and in 1892 4th Common Council passed en ordinance. the underground question was agitated, and in 1883, the Common Council passed an ordinance 1883, the Common Council passed an ordinance requiring all electric conductors to be placed underground. In accordance with this ordinance, the various companies doing business in this city, after exhausting all means to avoid it, adopted various systems for placing the wires underground, viz: Dorset & Johnstone conduit, iron pipe, wooden boxes, conduits of creosoted wood, and vitrified sewer pipe. The city took the initial steps, and up to the present date, has placed underground 20,441 feet of conduit, 474,097 feet of iron pipe, 1,200 feet of wood trough, 126,443 feet of cable, from 5 to 40 conductors, 120 miles of electric light cable, 65 miles of single wire, with 263 manholes, 168 hand holes.

The various companies have placed under ground 65 miles of conduit and 5,000 miles of wire. The wires, so placed under ground, emwire. The wires, so placed under ground, embrace all branches of the service, viz: Telegraph, telephone, police, firealarm, electric light, etc. \* \* \* \* \* \* All electric light and power wires are subject to a rigid inspection, under city ordinance, the inspector being appointed by the superintendent of city telegraphs. All electric light wires in the city are underground. Telegraph, telephone and electric light wires are placed in the same telephone and are underground. Telegraph, telephone and electric light wires are placed in the same conduits. In 1883, a franchise was granted to the Sectional Electric Underground Company, to build underground conduits for comparcial purposes. This company built about seven miles of conduit in the business district of the city, and rent space in the same. \* \* \* \* \* \* \* The city being allowed the use of one duct, free of charge." free of charge.

The article then describes the electric light plants owned and operated by the city (Chicago being one of the cities that furnishes their own light for streets and municipal buildings), after which the article states:

"In support of the practicability and safety of wires underground, I wish to submit the

following facts: We have had in use, for the last twelve years, 840 feet of underground wire which has given us excellent service, in last twelve years, 540 leet of unucesseed wire which has given us excellent service, in the city telegraph department, and has not materially deterioriated. We have, in successful operation, for the last two years, a circuit, about five miles in length, carrying a current of 18 ampers, at a potential of 1,000 to 1,100 volts. We have had, in successful operation, for the past year, 58 miles of electric light cable, which has given us no trouble. In the various circuits used for city telegraph, telephone and electric lighting, we have wires and cables made by five different companies, over six miles of conduit, manholes, hand-holes, etc., and have not had a burnout, or gas explosion. In 1887, a company known as the Chicago Arc Light & Power Company was in corporated, and purchased all the plants then operating in the city, and also the franchise of the Sectional Electric Underground Company. This company does commercial lighting by means of underground wires exclusively, and is successively working currents at a pocorporated, and purchased all the plants then operating in the city, and also the franchise of the Sectional Electric Underground Company. This company does commercial lighting by means of underground wires exclusively, and is successively working currents at a potential of from 2,500 to 3,000 volts. The longest circuit used by that company is seven miles, carrying 2,500 volts. Two circuits have been connected by this company, and carrying 3,741 volts, have run all night, without injury. \* \* \* \* An electric light post, possessing some peculiar advantages, has been designed and adopted. It consists of a hollow iron base, extending from the sidewalk a height of seven feet. A hollow wooden pole extends through the iron base, to a heighth of nine feet above it. The wooden post is firmly secured to the top and bottom of the iron base. There are two doors on opposite sides of this base, at the height of five feet from the sidewalk, and a removable pannel is located near the bottom. In one of the doors is placed a wooden box, containing a double pole arc light switch. In the other, is a receptacle for a firealarm box. The advantages of this pole are many. First, and pre-eminent in importance, is the safety it offers to human life, as, in case of accident to the lamp, the workman can entirely disconnect it from the rest of the circuit, without a possibility of contact with the conductors, by throwing the switch near the base of the pole. The wooden pole is a semi-insulator, and much safer to work from than an iron one, should it be necessary to regulate the lamps while burning. We have ventilated our south side conduit by running a pipe from the mouth of the conduit to the chimney in the city hall. This has proved to be the most practical scheme for ventilating conduits that has come within my experience, and is one that can be readily and cheaply applied in any portion of the city. \*

In conclusion, Mr. Barrett says: "I consider it practical to place electric conductors underground, and consider it the only safe place for heavy conductors, such as are required for the transmission of light and power. Our experiments with the underground wires, commenced in the early stages of the art, and up to the present time, we have been very successful, and I have no hesitation in asserting that we can work them to as high a voltage as would be considered safe on aerial lines. The only objection that can be raised against underground wires, to my mind, is simply the matter of first cost. As an offset to this objection, the service is more reliable, being removed from atmospheric influence or interference, needs less repairing, and, consecuently, is cheaper in the end. I have found this to be true, after a long experience."

#### ST. PAUL

In the city of St. Paul, a large brick subway, about six feet high and four feet wide, for the reception of all electrical wires was found in process of construction. Its length, when completed, will be about one mile,

through one of the principal streets. Besides this, the telegraph and telephone companies are also commencing to build conduits in some of the main streets. The extent of the work hitherto completed, is, however, comparatively

MINNEAPOLIS.

The city of Minneapolis has, at present, several miles of underground conduits for telegraph and telephone purposes. The telegraph and telephone purposes. The telegraph and telephone wires and cables are placed in separate conduits, for the reason that no agreement between said companies as to joint construction has yet been reached. The Minnesota Brush Electric Light Company, of Minneapolis are now at work on an underground system, which, when completed, will be very extensive, comprising the whole business portion of the city, in the completion of which about 85 miles of cable will be used.

The system used by the Minneapolis street railroad company for the burial of its feeder wires, is the interior conduit system. The novelty of the system employed throughout, lies in the fact that there is not a railroad wire in sight in the heart of the city, except the trolley wire. The feeder mains and track feeders are contained in a conduit underground, the trolley wire connecting with the feeders by means of a sub-feeder through the hollow supporting poles. The conduit is located between the tracks, and is built as follows: Two inch plank, first treated by boiling in fernoline, is used for constructing a long trough of the desired size. This trough is so nailed together as to be continuous, and without joints from manhole to manhole, a distance of 408 feet. The trough is placed below the surface, at such a depth that the top is six inches below the paving blocks. The conduit proper consists of a number of heavy paper tubes of the Interior Conduit & Insulation Company's make. The tubes employed are one inch and one inch and a quarter in diameter, laid in the trough in ten foot lengths, and separated from each other, and the sides and bottom of the trough by rings or spacers. The tubes are made continuous from manhole to manhole, by use of a telescopic joint. After the tubes have been properly put in place,

# PITTSBURG.

In the City of Pittsburgh considerable underground work was found in process of construction. An ordinance was passed by the Common Council of this city compelling all companies operating wires for electrical purposes to place the same underground by July 1, 1891. Among other conditions imposed allowing companiesto place their wires underground, was the following: That all wires shall be three foot helow the surface and close to the ourse. the following: That all wires shall be three feet below the surface, and close to the curb; also, the city shall have the right to use the conduits for the wires of the Bureau of Electricity; the system shall always be under the supervision of the department of public safety, so far as the safety of the public, police and fire apparatus are concerned. Under this ordinance, the telegraph companies have done considerable work, and a large amount is now well under way, they using the iron pipe conduit. The telephone company, on the other hand, has adopted the terra-cotta conduits, which are formed of a number of vitrified or glazed earthenware pipe, 18 inches long, square in sections on the outside, with a round hole three inches in diameter, extending through their length. Several of these pipes are placed side by side upon a cement concrete foundation in the bottom of the trench, and are held in place laterally by concrete filling on the sides next to the earth, after which a layer of cement mortar about one-half inch thick is spread over the top to form a bed for the next layer of pipes, and so on until the required number of ducts has been attained. The ends of the separate pipes are merely butted together, and reliance for water tightness is placed entirely upon the enveloping concrete and the intermediate layers of mortar a layer of concrete a few inches thick is also placed over the uppermost layer of pipes. A special feature of the telephone company's conduits is the fact of there being laid from ten to twelve feet below the surface of the street, near one curb line in order to avoid their disturbance hereafter by any alterations or repairs to the gas and water pipe systems, and house services. The conduits are laid for the exclusive use of telephone wires and cables.

PHILADELPHIA.

In Philadelphia much underground conduit work has been done. From the report of the Municipal Electrical Bureau for the year 1890, it appears that a large number of electric light and power wires and telegraph and telephone wires and cables are being successfully operated in a great variety of underground conduits, and as a matter of general interest, the following statistics are submitted: 977 different conduits, having an aggregate of 117.4 miles, and a total of 4,858 ducts, aggregating 780.2 miles, carrying 130.9 miles of electric light and power wires, and 1,220.6 miles of telegraph and telephone wires. The city owns sixty-four of these conduits, which have a total length of 16.28 miles, and contain 173 ducts of an aggregate length of 49.25 miles. The remaining conduits are owned by numerous private companies. The first city conduit was laid in 1886, and was essentially of an experimental character, consisting of a rectangular wooden trough in which the cables were laid and embedded solidly in pitch. While it served the purpose of illustrating the practicability of sub-structures for electrical purposes, it was found inadequate, for the reason that no additions could be made to the number of cables, and that they could not be taken out for repairs. For their subsequent underground work, the city authorities then selected the McDonald conduit, which is composed of wood fibre saturated with some bituminous compound, and pressed in moulds into rectangular sections containing from four to six circular ducts. It also appears that a large amount of two and one-half inch wrought iron pipe and creosoted wooden tubes, four inches square outside, with a bore of two and one-half inches, has been laid for the use of the city. The private electrical corporations have constructed many similar conduits to those last described, as well as others of different design and more elaborate character. The trunk line conduits of the Bell Telephone Company in Market s

hole were used. The brick manholes for the trunk line v aryin size from 5 feet by 6 feet to 10 feet by 11 feet in internal dimensions, and have an average depth of 8 feet, with walls 13 inches thick. The street pavement over these holes, being supported on iron girders and brick arches. The American Telegraph & Telephone Company have also a large amount of creosoted wooden conduits, extending to all the thickly oppulated districts of the city. In general, it may be said, that the experience with underground conduits in Philadelphia has been very successful, since wires carrying various voltages, ranging from the battery current of the fire alarm to the 2,500 volt current of the arc circuit are in constant service in the conduits mentioned above.

WASHINGTON.

In the city of Washington, telegraph, telephone and electric light and power wires have been laid in conduits for some time past. They have given general satisfaction, and the authorities are now carrying out a plan for the laying of some 56 miles of conduits. The following is a brief description of the plan proposed: It will provide conduits with a minimum capacity of 4 duets to a maximum of 16 duets. For purpose of uniformity and economy, location of signaling and alarm stations, as far as practicable, are recommended to be placed at the corner of the conduit intersections, within reasonable distances apart. The plans intend the use of rectangular vitrified glazed clay conduits, to the exclusion of all other forms. The important features in the construction are, first, a permanent and uniform concrete base; second, the careful laying and allignment of the sections, so as to insure true lines and continuous duets; third, the proper bedding and increasing of each tier and sections in a uniform layer of small stone or gravel concrete; fourth, the proper construction of the manholes, with a good coating of cement mortar or concrete, from the base up to the top to render them, as far as possible impermeable both to moisture and gas; fifth, the efficient ventilation of the manholes through lamp connections; sixth, provisions for tight close fitting covers, and plug or valve sewer connection to manholes in the lower section of the city liable to overflow, or subject to beckwater, and ventilated covers with open trap sewer connections for manholes in the upper section of the city.

As a result of our investigation in these various cities, and after duly considering their experience, and our local conditions, we be leave to submit for your consideration the following suggestions and conclusions, viz:

First—That the wires carrying ordinary electric current, such as are in commercial use in this city, can be both successfully placed and

contingencies, as well as to accommodate all existing circuits.

Fourth—That the conduit should be of such material, and so constructed, that the necessity for tearing up the pavement in order to make repairs should be almost an impossibility during a reasonable term of years, and that, in their construction, provision should be made for the use of single ducts for any wire carrying a current of 500 volts or over.

Fifth—That an ordinance be passed governing the use and management of such conduits. The construction and operation of the conduit is a subject which demands the most careful consideration, in order that no unnecessary

burden may be placed upon the various existing, as well as the probable future, electric interests in this city. So far as we have been able to ascertain, but few cities own any portion of their conduit systems, although it is obvious that municipal ownership and control of all such constructions would be for the best interests of the community. To accomplish a similar end, certain cities have licensed a private corporation to construct large conduits for the concentration of the wires and cables of the various electrical companies, and to collect an equitable rental from the latter for the use of the ducts. In other cities, the electric corporations have been permitted to construct and operate conduits for their exclusive use and benefit. It will thus be seen that there are three methods of accomplishing the burial of electricalwire within the corporate limits, each of which has its advantages and disadvantages.

or electricalwire within the corporate limits, each of which has its advantages and disadvantages. In cities where the rate of taxation is low and the public debt is small, it would, no doubt, be wise for cities to construct and maintain their own subways, deriving therefrom a revenue, as well as protecting, in a proper manner, the various electrical interests operating within their limits. On the other hand, it is quite evident, from what we have seen and know of the licensed general conduit business, that good results can be obtained by granting a reasonable franchise to a reliable company, who shall construct, operate and maintain a general conduit, under the direction of the city authorities. As to the method of granting permits to the various individual corporations to construct and maintain separate conduits, your committee considers it unadvisable, it being evident, from the experience in other cities, that it creates a multiplicity of conduits, and never results in a uniform and satisfactory system of underground currents.

Our local conditions are such that to place

rents. Our local conditions are such that to place more than one couduit, containing the necessary number of ducts, on each side of the street, would seriously interfere with our gas and water mains. Furthermore, in this age of electrical development, it is altogether probable that additional telephone, light and power circuits will be inevitable, which strongly emphasises the necessity for having proper conduits constructed under one of the conditions first named named.

For the further information of your Commit-For the further information of your Committee, we would state, that to meet the present requirements for a conduit system in State and Exchange streets, from the Eric canal to Center street, and from East and West Main streets from University avenue, to Plymouth avenue, and North St. Paul street, from East Main street to Andrews street, and South St. Paul, from Main to Court street, an expenditure of about \$175,000 will be necessary, which contemplates the construction and completion of a proper conduit system, including manholes, distributing boxes and mains ready for service. In the matter of the claim of Jacob P. and Margaret B. Brasser for damages resulting from the flow of sewage in Hobbie creek running through their premises, we find that by a resolution of Lus Council, the sum of \$90.00 damages per annum, to begin July 17th, 1889, was awarded to Jacob P. Brasser, as administrator, and that instead of said Brasser, as administrator, the parties who are entitled to damages, if any, are the above named Jacop P. and Margaret B. Brasser, and we, therefore, recommend that so much of said resolution passed December 15th, 1891, which awards Jacob P. In the matter of the claim of Gertrude Schum, we find that an action was begun for a permanent injunction, in the Supreme Court, which is now pending in the Court of Appeals upon an appeal by the city from the judgment therein. In this action, the officers of the city have, in violation of the injunction, connected additional sewers to the then existing outlets, and have allowed the continuance of sewage to flow over her property. Her attorneys have offered to release the city and its officers from any damages, by reason of such violation of the injunction, upon the payment to said Gertrude Schum, the sum of \$225.00 per annum, as damages for said pollution, to begin August 19th, 1887, and to pay to her attorneys the sum of \$250.00 counsel fee, and all the taxable costs in the action. We consider this a fair offer, and recommend that the same be accepted.

In the matter of the claim of William H. Perrin, we find that an action was commenced March 29th, 1889, and that no trial has ever been had therein; that he claims damages for the pollution of Densmore creek, running through his property, and we consider that the sum of \$150.00 per annum, to begin March 29th, 1889, is a fair compensation for his damages, and we recommend that the same be paid to him for his past damages and that the same amount per annum be paid for his future damages.

In the matter of the claim of Jonathan Butts, for damages avased by the pollution of

In the matter of the claim of Jonathan Butts, for damages caused by the pollution of of Hobbie creek, running through his property, we find that no action has ever been begun by him for such damages, and that he has a claim for the same, and we recommend that the sum of \$500.00 be paid to him, for his damages during the last six years, and for all future damages that he be paid the sum of \$100.00 per year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF MAP AND SURYEY COMMITTEE.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., March 31, 1892.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

of Rochester:
Gentlemen—Your map and survey committee herewith presents its annual report of the present condition of the work known as "the survey of the first fourteen wards of the city," now being made by John C. Ryan, contractor therefor. The original contract for the above mentioned work is dated June 29, 1887. The said contract was entered into July 2, 1887, and recites that the work was to be entirely completed by June 29, 1889. The total area estimated to be surveyed was five thousand one hundred and thirty-eight (5,138) acres, and the contract price therefor being \$4 per acre, making the amount of the contract \$20,552. At the expiration of the original con-

tract June 29, 1889, there had been completed and accepted by the City Surveyor 1,074 and 11-100 acres; the contract was then extended two years from, and including the 2d day of July, 1889, which made it expire July 2, 1891. On June 23, 1891, application was made by the contractor to the Common Council for a further extension of two years' time in which to complete the remaining portion of the work. This extension has not been granted. The area surveyed to the present date and accepted by the City Surveyor amounts to 3.597.15 acres. The total amount of money paid to date amounts to \$14,320.57. The area surveyed complete, mapped, bound in book form and now in use in the office of the City Surveyor and City Assessors, comprises the old 1st, 3d, 4th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 10th, 12th, 13th and 14th wards. The survey of the 5th ward is partly finished.

From the above it will be seen that four years and nine months have already been spent on the work, being two years and nine monthas more time than allowed by the original contract. There still remains to be completed under said contract the old 2d, 9th and 11th wards and a portion of the 5th ward. It is the opinion of your Committee that this work has not been progressed as fast as it should have been and as the uncompleted work is needed at once in the offices of the City Surveyor and the City Assessors, we

An examination of table No. 5 forms an interesting study, showing at a glance the necessary increase in cost of lighting a city having a regular and healthy growth. This has increased during the past twenty-one years from \$31,841.06 in 1870 to \$160,285.19 in 1891-2, being an advance of \$128,444.13. This at first appears to be a greater outlay of money than the circumstances require, but upon considering this outlay in connection with the growth of the city, it seems an expense but justly commensurate with its area and population. The population of the city in 1870 was 62.386, in 1880 was 89,363 and at this time is 144.635.

The cost of public lighting during the past year has been \$13,390.86 in excess of the cost of the previous year. This increase is due principally to the extension of the electric light system, and it is plain to be seen that with the present cost of supplying electric and gas lights, coupled with an increased demand each year for said lights, the total annual expense will be still further increased.

Under the careful supervision of the City Surveyor, the official records relating to the public street lighting system have been materially improved, in fact, few municipal authorities have the work better in hand.

The great bulk of the expense this year amounting to \$160,285.19 has been paid to the electric light and gas companies, but \$600 having been paid for salary and \$318.40 for sundries.

either boundaries between wards or else the pipe laid therein extends across a ward boundary from one ward to another. All of the water pipe extensions authorized to be laid, both from funds raised by tax levy and from funds advanced by private individuals as tabulated below, have been completed, with the exception of a short distance in West avenue, where a pipe was laid temporarily to avoid blasting in front of premises in which a case of dangerous illness occnrred. This short section must be taken up and relaid permanently during the present season. Some of the final estimates have not yet been paid owing to lateness of completion of the work, but there is a sufficient balance in the fund to pay all these demands and still leave a small surplus.

The twelve (12) inch Holly main laid to East Rochester via East avenue, affording a fire protection to a portion of the city where property is so likely to suffer loss from fire; and the extension of the same system on West avenue from the City hospital to St. Marys hospital a part of the city where pressure from the domestic system is weak owing to the high elevation of the ground; are improvements your committee be lieves, which are regarded favorably by citizens interested in those localities.

As in former years parties desirous of having water mains laid in streets, for which no funds for such purpose were applicable, have, under the directions of the Council advanced amounts which have been used for water pipe extensions under the direction of the Executive Board, with the understanding that the moneys so advanced be returned to those advancing same without interest thereon, whenever funds become applicable therefor not otherwise appropriated. All mains thus laid are permanent constructions and do not include any wrought iron pipe.

Not as many petitions for extensions have been filed up to date as for the corresponding period last year, but as a large number were not then entertained and held over, the aggregated estimated value of extensions now on file and undisposed of, amounts to about \$101,000.00. ROCHESTER PARK COMMISSION.

To the Board of Park Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN: I herewith present the annual

Gentlemen: I herewith present the annual report of the work done on the parks for the year ending March 1, 1892:
The following described pieces of property have been purchased during the year. A strip of land containing about twenty-three acres lying on the west bank of the upper river, between the Western New York & Pennsylvania Railroad, on the west and the Genesee river on the east and extending from the park lands purchased from E. A. Frost on the north, 3,500 feet up the river to a piece of land lately owned by Samuel Moulson. This piece of land was purchased from the Chautauqua Ice Company for \$7,500 and comprises all the land lying between the river and the easterly boundary of the railroad except an acre sold by the Chautauqua Ice Company to Frank W. Ellison, on which he has erected chemical works. A strip of land containing 10 and 7-10 acres lying between the Western New York & Pennsylvania Railroad and the Genesee river, and extending from the southerly boundaries of the last described piece of land 2,000 feet up the river to the land owned by E. Chapin, was pur-

chased from Samuel Moulson for \$3,210. The Warrant property of 755-100 acres of land bounded on the north by Elmwood avenue, on the east by the New York, Lake Erie & Western Railroad, on the south by the park lands and on the west by the Genesee river has been condemned for park purposes. No land has been purchased for Highland Park during the year, but nearly three acres of the Stanley property will be required to complete the park as designed by the Landscape Architects. For Seneca Park on the west side of the river, lots 118 and 135 of the Maplewood Avenue Bulding Lot Association were purchased for \$565, and lots 107, 120, 137, 138 and 139, not being required for park purposes were sold at public auction for \$1,565. The lands of John Kelly, William Robinson, Michael Martin, Nathaniel Hall and unknown owners were acquired by commission.

The total price awarded for 39 and 815-1000 acres of land is \$13,821.71, twenty-four and 38-100 acres of land were awarded to unknown owners and the price \$592.61 was deposited in the Rochester Savings Bank to the order of the County Clerk. On the east side of the river, a piece of land containing 89-100 of an acre and fronting on Tower street was purchased from the Fee Brothers for \$5,000. A piece of land back of the Rochester Railway Company's car house on North St. Paul street, containing 1 and 1-2 acres of land was purchased from the Fee Brothers for \$5,000. A piece of land containing the trees in the groves. The trees were growing too closely so that there was to much shade, and the black oaks and chestnut trees were cut down, leaving the white oak, hickorys, and sugar maples. A temporary road from St. Paul street at Callister's south line was made on the east side of the park land, and running north several hundred feet crosses the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg Railroad at the most feasible point for a crossing.

ogdensburg Railroad at the most feasible point for a crossing.

On the west side of the railroad crossing, the temporary road joins the permanent driveway. Plans for the permanent driveway were cecived and the roads were partly graded. Trees that stood in the line of the permanent driveway were transplanted to the nursery. A large number of native shrubs and trees were collected and planted in the nursery, and many shrubs were collected for Highland and Genesee Valley Parks. 5,597 lineal feet of drain tile were laid on the east side of the park for the purpose of draining the wet land that is soaked with water from the numerous springs on the hillside. The water is conveyed to the place designed for an artificial pond. A tool house and a shelter house for visitors to the park were built.

On the west side of the river the grove on the

house and a shelter house for visitors to the park were built.

On the west side of the river the grove on the land acquired from Mr. Robinson, was cleared of dead trees and dead brush.

At Highland Park, the shrubs in the arboretum were cultivated and the roads were partly graded and graveled. Some sodding was done around the pavilion and a few trees and shrubs were planted. The Foreman's house on Highland avenue was repaired and painted.

At Genesee Valley Park, during the spring and fall, 391 trees from four to ten feet in height were planted outside the forest plantation, and are designed for fine specimen trees growing in an open space. The following is the list of the species: 4 basswood, or linden, 31 American beech, 12 European beech, 12 black birch, 6 red birch, 12 yellow birch, 7 buckeyes, 4 butternut, 16 cucumber, 29 American elm, 4 Scotch elms, 4 hickory, 16 liquidamber, 22 Norway maple, 12 red maple, 8 silver maple, 46 sugar maple, 1 striped maple, 7 white mulberry, 18 American nettle, 14 white oak, 16 red oak, 10 burr oak, 12 swamp white oak, and 62 tulip trees. Besides these, 200 small

European alder and a number of yellow locust trees were planted on the west bank of the river for the purpose of concealing the railroad and anything else objectionable that may be erected. 300 small sugar maples, 200 tulip trees, 300 cucumber trees and 100 white hickory trees were planted in the forest. A number of flowering and alternate-leaved dogwood, shad, sassafras and sumach trees were collected in the woods and planted on the edge of the forest. Among shrubs, witch hazel, common hazel, azaleas, black alder, spice bush, flowering raspberry, vivurnums of several species, New Jersey tea, American enonymous, and several species of cornels were planted on the edge of the forest. Willows and cornels taken from the park nursery, were planted on the from the park nursery, were planted on the river to hold the banks.

Several small tupeloe trees taken from Seneca Park were planted near the south end of the park on the banks of Red creek.

The unseeded portion of the meadows was sown to blue grass, red top and white clover. The meadows were mowed and the hay which was made was sold or stored in the barns. A flock of 107 sheep was purchased with a portion of the money derived from the sale of the hay. A base ball ground was prepared on the west side of the river and just north of Elmwood avenue bridge. Fifty-four permits to play ball on the ground were issued.

Arbor day was celebrated by the school children in planting memorial trees at Genesee
Valley Park. Three American elm trees were
planted and dedicated to the Genesee Valley
Forestry Association, the Chamber of Commerce and Superintendent S. A. Ellis.

Memorial trees were planted for the late Park
Commissioners, Alfred Wright, George W. Elliott and William See, who died during the
year. The small bridge across Red creek was
renaired

Fifty park seats were purchased and placed in the parks.

On Sundays and holidays large numbers of people visited the parks. The Western New York & Pennsylvania Railroad Company ran trains hourly to Genesee Valley Park on Sundays during the summer. The New York, Lake Erie & Western Railroad ran excursion trains whenever there was a large number of people who wished to visit the park. With the extension of the street cars to the parks, large numbers of people will visit them. No efforts are made to induce the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg Railroad to stop their trains at Seneca Park, as there was no shelter in case of a rain storm; but late in the summer a shelter was erected and the park will be a desirable place to visit during the coming summer. Material to the amount of \$1,677.06 was sold

Material to the amount of \$1,677.06 was sold from the parks and the money was deposited with the City Treasurer to the credit of the Maintenance Fund, except \$87.50 which was deposited at the Commercial Bank to the credit of the Secretary's petty cash account.

# MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS.

By Ald. Cleveland-

To the Honorable Common Council:
GENTLEMEN: Having been chairman of the most important committee of your honorable body for the past year, and in severing my connection with your body, I wish to make a few suggestions in regard to the finances of the city, especially in regard to the manner in which the city does its banking business. I believe the city should do its business in the same manner that a successful mercantile or banking business should be done. The first requisite for this is plenty of capital, even if it must be borrowed, but where it can be borrowed at less than 4 per cent. it is sheer folly to not have sufficient capital to do business with. The city of Rochester starts in to-morrow to do a business the coming year of at least two and a quarter million dollars Now in what shape do we start? Not a cent on hand and owing \$448,000 that we have borrowed since December 30, 1891 and before we get any money from the tax levy in July we must borrow at least \$300,000 more. I do not believe this to be the proper way to start in business. To do two and a quarter million of business. And owing three-quarters of a million dollars. Owing to this state of affairs we have been unable to get a decent rate of interest on our deposits in to this state of affairs we have been unable to get a decent rate of interest on our deposits in the banks for the reason that we have no large amount of money to give them and are borrowers seven months of the year. The first suggestion I will make is in regard to local improvements The city owes in time orders given for local improvements

about \$1,200,000 and has owing it from the tax-payers about \$1,400,000 My idea is to issue a ,000,000 of bonds to run thirty years and keep \$1,000,000 of bonds to run thirty years and keep this as a special fund to discount time orders with and pay the contractor cash as soon as his work is completed. This fund would be self-sustaining, and in about thirty years the difference of interest would pay the bonds, and the city would have the \$1,000,000 clear to continue to do business with. Another is that the fiscal city would have the \$1,000,000 clear to continue to do business with. Another is that the fiscal year be changed to come one month after taxes are due or the time for taxes to become due be changed to one month before the fiscal year ends, so that we could start in the year with clean accounts and owe nothing and have a large amount of money to place with our banks in case this could be brought about the banks would allow the city 4 per cent. interest on deposits, knowing that they could have the money to use for the best part of the year, as near as I can estimate the saving of interest by changing the method of doing busines from the old to my plans it will amount to the magnificent sum of one million, eight hundred and thirty thousand dollars of bonds issued for local improvements.

"FELLOW MEMBERS OF THE COMMON COUNCIL: The busy hand of time has brought us to the close of another fiscal year. It is proper at this time to give a short review of the work accomplished by this Board and the several departments of the city government.

"By far the most important work done has been the passage of the ordinance for the construction of the East Side Trunk Sewer. The contract for the first section of this work will be awarded in a few days, and the long looked for sewer will soon be a reality. The important bearing this sewer will have upon the growth of Rochester will be beyond our anticipations. The manner of payment is such that the burden will be light. The relief to the citizens generally, and to this Board and

its members particularly by the discontinuance

its members particularly by the confidence of sewer suits, will be very great.

"For nearly four years the Common Council, the press and citizens have been discussing the confidence of an additional water supply. A full the press and citizens have been discussing the question of an additional water supply. A full investigation of the subject has demonstrated to the satisfaction of every one that the present supply is inadequate. Successive Legislatures have failed to pass the necessary enabling act to allow us to proceed with this important work. It is a source of sincere regret that another year has drawn to a close and we are still unable to begin this work, so important and necessary to the future prosperity of our city. The bill empowering the city to issue its bonds for the construction of the conduit has passed the Senate and is in order of third reading in the Assembly with a prospect of its final passage, and we trust the same will soon become a law. become a law

final passage, and we trust the same will soon become a law.

"The rapidly growing section of this city lying east of Goodman street has received full share of your attention within the past year. The necessity of providing fire protection has been promptly met by laying through East avenue and other streets a large water main extending the Holly system to this part which will protect the large manufacturing establishments located there. The contract just awarded by the Executive Board for the construction of a bridge wide enough to accommodate the rapidly increasing travel over the tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, at East Main street, will more thoroughly cement the ties which bind the residents of this part with the older portion of the city. Scarcely six years ago this territory was farm land; now it is thickly settled, alive with the hum of industry. The growth here is truly phenomenal.

"The year just closed has witnessed also the completion of another bridge across the Genesee river at Platt street. It is to be hoped that during the coming year the bridge so long delayed at Alexander and Edinburgh streets will be built.

"Ordinances are pending for new pavements of the proper streets which will add ma-

"Ordinances are pending for new pavements on State and Main streets which will add materially to the comfort and cleanliness of the city. During the past year new pavements have been laid to the amount of \$449,568.84. have been laid to the amount of \$449,568.84. Sewers have been constructed at an expense of \$211,815.82. The sidewalks have been laid at an expense of \$10,332.06. The bridges so far built have been an expense of \$125,000. The miscellaneous expenditure for improvements amounts to \$3,498.91, making a total expense for improvements during the past year of \$800,215.63. This expenditure is the strongest evidence of the rapid and substantial growth of our city.

"In conclusion, gentlemen, permit me to thank you for your uniform kindness to me as your presiding officer, having over-looked my faults, having aided me with your kind counsel in facilitating the business of the Board, and having granted me the honor of presiding over your deliberations."




