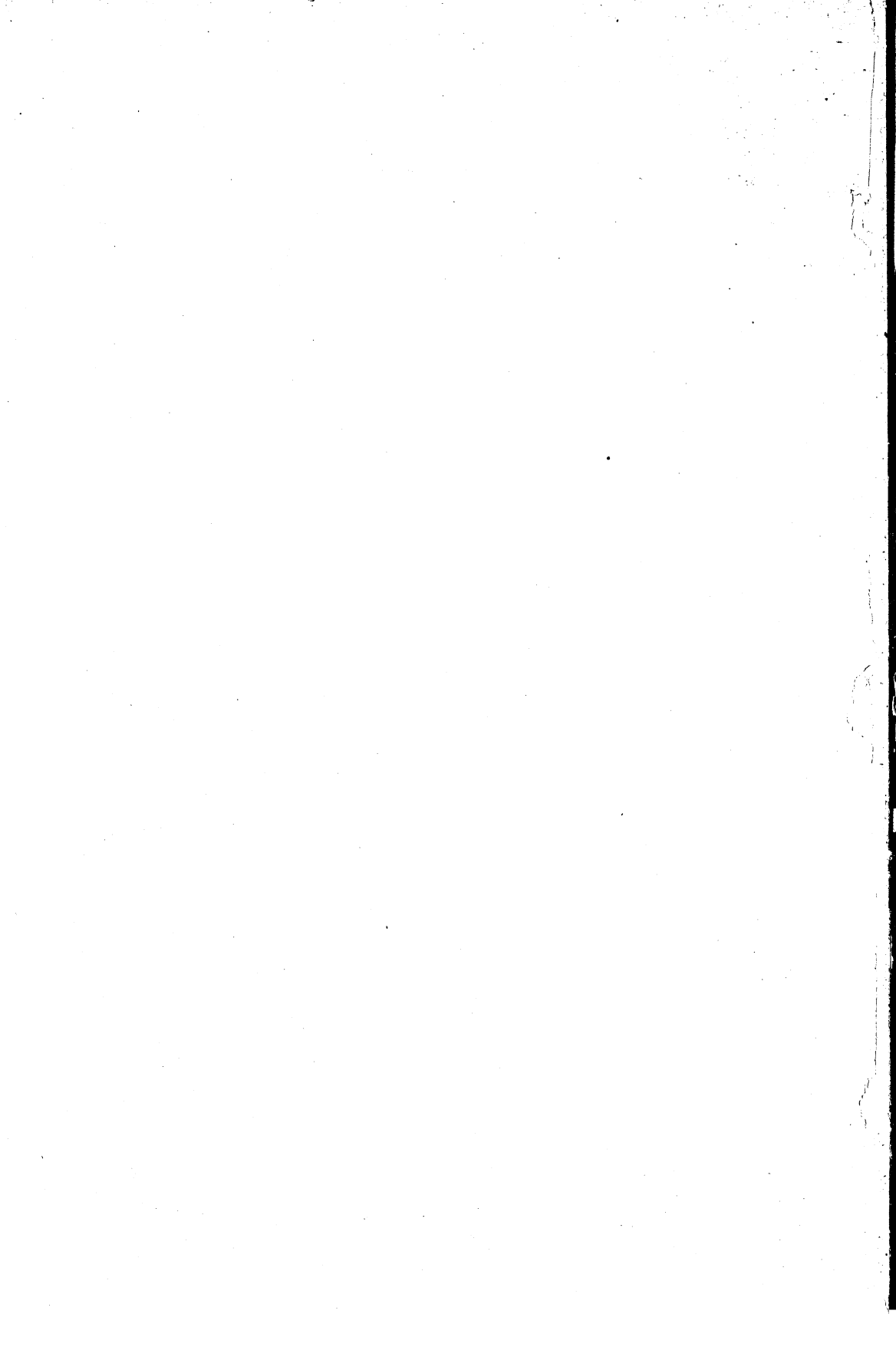

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE BOARD FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

CITY SURVEYOR'S OFFICE,
ROCHESTER, N. Y., April 2, 1895. }

To the Common Council:

Gentlemen: Under instruction of your Law Committee I beg leave to state that the nuisance complained of in an action for an injunction restraining the city from emptying sewage into the race at the foot of Central avenue, brought by the Rochester Power Company, can be abated in the manner set forth in a report made by the City Surveyor to the Executive Board dated July 21st, 1894, and transmitted by them to your honorable body and printed on page 178 of Council proceedings, 1894-5.

That report recommends the driving of a horizontal tunnel five feet square into the face of the cliff just east of the power house of the Rochester Power Company. This tunnel to be at the low water level in the river below the falls and will extend 150 feet to a point under the center of Central avenue and North Water street and at the end of the tunnel sink a vertical shaft five feet square from the surface. Into this shaft divert the flow of the sewers which now empty into said race.

The estimated cost of said tunnel, shaft and connection is \$3,000, not including anything for right of way under New York Central R. R. Very respectfully yours,

ROCHESTER PARK COMMISSION, }
March 25, 1895. }

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: At a meeting of the Park Commission held this day the following resolution was presented and action taken thereon:

"Whereas, It is necessary for the Park Commissioners to pay the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad two thousand dollars (\$2,000) on April 1st, on account of the removal of the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg Railroad tracks at Seneca Park, and further, that work on the roads and walks in the various parks should be commenced at once, and such planting done in the near future as cannot be postponed without losing a whole season;

"Resolved, That the Common Council be requested to advance at once to this Board the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to apply on the appropriation for the coming year.

Gentlemen: Since I assumed charge of the City Clerk's office, on January 23, 1895, there have been registered 920 dogs, receipts therefrom, \$920.00. In the same period there have been registered 375 bicycles at 35c each, yielding a revenue of \$131.25. With ten transfers recorded at 10c each and \$3.75 cash received from my predecessor the amount received by me to the credit of the Contingent Fund from this source is \$136. One hundred sixty-three persons have qualified as Commissioners of Deeds, the fee for which is \$25-100; receipts, \$40.75.

FIRST ORDINANCES.

WOODBURY STREET ASPHALT PAVEMENT.

By Alderman Edelman—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of improving Woodbury street.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$6,850.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary and should be made, viz: The improvement of Woodbury street from Hudson avenue to North street, by the construction of an asphalt pavement therein with a line of Medina stone curb on each side thereof, properly connected with all lateral streets, alleys and driveways; width of roadway between curbs to be 24 feet; also the necessary manholes, surface sewers, lot laterals, water and gas services and the cleaning of the main sewer if considered necessary; also the construction of a Portland cement walk 4-1-2 feet wide on each side of said street between the limits mentioned.

And, the City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, having made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reported the same at \$6,850, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, that the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all the following portion and part of the city, which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Woodbury street from Hudson avenue to North street.

Adopted.

SELLINGER STREET SPRINKLING.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of sprinkling Sellinger street.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$101.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, viz:

The sprinkling of Sellinger street from North Clinton street to St. Joseph street during the season of 1895.

And, whereas, the City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at \$101, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for the whole expense thereof, viz:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Sellinger street from North Clinton street to St. Joseph street in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom.

Adopted.

WADSWORTH SQUARE IMPROVEMENT.

By Alderman Edelman—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of improving Wadsworth square.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$1,425.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary and should be made, viz:

The improvement of Wadsworth square by the construction of suitable Portland cement walks through said square, its grading, manuring, seeding and setting the necessary shrubbery and electric lights.

And, the City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, having made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reported the same at \$1,425, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved, and the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be paid from the public treasury of the city by the City Treasurer, upon orders drawn pursuant to the future direction of this Common Council.

TERHAAR PARK PIPE SEWER.

By Alderman Edelman—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a sewer in Terhaar park.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$1,175.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary and should be made, viz:

The construction of a vitrified pipe sewer 12 inches in diameter in Terhaar park from a point 100 feet west of St. Joseph street to the sewer in North Joiner street; also, the necessary manholes, surface sewers, lot laterals, branches, roadway grading and gutter formations.

And, the City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, having made an esti-

mated of the whole expense thereof, and reported the same at \$1,175, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, that the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all of the following portion and part of the city, which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Terhaar park from North Joiner street to St. Joseph street.

Adopted.

NASSAU STREET SPRINKLING.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of sprinkling Nassau street.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$202.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, viz:

The sprinkling of Nassau street from Joiner street to Hudson avenue during the season of 1895.

And, whereas, the City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at \$202, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, that the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for the whole expense thereof, viz:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Nassau street from Joiner street to Hudson avenue in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom.

AN ACT to amend chapter one hundred ninety-three of the Laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, entitled "An Act to authorize the selection, location and acquiring of certain grounds for public parks and park ways in and near the city of Rochester, and to provide for the maintenance and embellishment thereof," and the several acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto.

The People of the State of New York represented in Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section twenty-four of said act as amended by chapter 393 of the Laws of 1894 is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 24. No plan for the laying out and improvement of the said park or parks, parkways, approaches thereto and streets connecting the same, shall be adopted or undertaken by the said Park Commissioners, of which the entire expense of maintenance shall be a greater sum than \$40,000 per annum, in addition to the interest on said sum of \$300,000 hereinbefore provided to be issued in bonds of the city of Rochester, and the one per cent. hereinbefore provided to be annually levied, and the income derived from rents or privileges granted by the said Park Commissioners. In addition to the powers hereinbefore conferred said Park Commissioners shall have the care, maintenance and control of all the public parks and public squares within the city of Rochester, and shall have the power to plant, set out, protect and preserve shade

trees in the streets, parks, squares, avenues and alleys of said city, and to cause such trees to be removed, pruned and trimmed whenever required for their protection, or for public convenience and comfort, or for necessary public improvements, and no person, corporation or any officer, department or agent of said city shall hereafter remove, trim, prune, cut down or in any way interfere with shade trees in the streets, parks, squares, avenues and alleys of said city without first procuring a written consent from said Park Commissioners, or such officer or committee as may be designated by them.

Sec. 2. Section twenty-five of said act as amended by section 4 of chapter 344 of the Laws of 1890 is hereby amended so as to read, as follows:

Sec. 25. The Common Council of said city shall every year grant to the said Park Commissioners such sum of money as they shall require, and as to said Common Council shall appear reasonable and just, for the government, maintenance and improvement of said park or parks, park ways, approaches thereto, and streets connecting the same, and for keeping in repair the improvements and structures therein, and for providing a suitable office for said Commissioners, and for providing necessary police protection, for the maintenance of small parks in said city and care of shade trees in said small parks and the streets, avenues and alleys of said city. The sum of money granted pursuant to this section shall be paid out of the general fund of said city, not exceeding in any year forty thousand dollars in the last section preceding limited.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

Gentlemen:—Your Assessment Committee would respectfully report as follows:

In the matter of the petition of George Gregory for cancellation of assessment for Glenwood avenue pipe sewer on the west side of Fourth street, we find that the assessors have recommended that this petition be granted upon the ground that Mr. Gregory's property drains into the Ravine avenue sewer and that he was assessed and paid for the privilege of drainage into said Ravine avenue sewer.

In the matter of the petition of Helen Bachmann for permission to redeem her premises known as lot S of the G. P. & C. A. Davis tract on Philander street from the sale of city taxes for the years 1885 and 1886 upon the payment of the face of said taxes with 6 per cent. interest and fees, we recommend that her petition be granted.

In the matter of the petition of Maria E. Gentlemen:—In accordance with a resolution of your honorable body passed on March 12 1895, I have examined into the subject of improving the sewerage of Richards street, and beg leave to report; that in my opinion a sewer should be built in Richards street from the East Side Trunk sewer to Meigs street, and in South Goodman street from Richards street to Pearl street, and in Meigs street from Richards street to Pearl street.

This will furnish an outlet to Broadway, Meigs street and Edmonds street, which now discharge into the Erie canal, and a suitable outlet for Pearl street, Beckley street and parts of Boardman avenue, Goodman street, Meigs street, Averill avenue, and Cobb street which now discharge through Monroe avenue. In order to bring the subject before your honorable body in a definite shape for consideration, I submit herewith a first ordinance.

The total cost of the sewer is estimated at \$11,000. The frontage included within the described assessment area is about 21,700 feet, of which about 5,700 feet is directly upon the line of the proposed sewer. If the territory should be assessed in the ordinary way the assessment will average about \$1.25 per foot front for lots directly fronting on the sewer and 25 cents per front foto for the balance of the territory.

AN ACT relating to the water works of the city of Rochester.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Executive Board of the city of Rochester, or its successor in office in charge of the Rochester water works, for and in behalf of the city of Rochester, is hereby authorized and empowered to supply water from the public water works mains, conduits or pipe lines of said city to the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company and to the Rochester and Honeoye Valley Railroad Company, the railroad of which latter company enters the city of Rochester, and is operated by the former company, at any point where either of said railroads crosses or is adjacent to the said water works mains, conduits or pipe lines, upon such terms and subject to such conditions and restrictions as to the said board shall seem just and equitable.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CENTRAL AVENUE TUNNEL.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a tunnel and shaft from Central avenue to the Genesee river.

The surveyor submitted as such estimate \$3,200.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary and should be made, viz.:

The construction of a tunnel 5 feet square, from the face of the cliff just east of the power house of the Rochester Power Co. to a point under the center of Central avenue and North Water street, and sinking a shaft 5 feet square from the surface of the street about 80 feet in depth, to the end of the proposed tunnel. Also the connection of the present sewers and the necessary manholes.

And the City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, having made an estimate of the whole expense thereof and reported the same at \$3,200, which being deemed reasonable is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, that the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all of the following portion and part of the city, which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

The Executive Board would respectfully state that if your honorable body deem it expedient to approve of the act, such conditions will be imposed as to ensure a better rate for the water than that paid by citizens of Rochester, as well as the expenses that may be incurred for the extra service required. The company should also pay such further sum as will be equivalent to the tax now imposed upon the taxpayers generally on the bonded debt for the Water Works, on the basis of just and equitable estimate of the value of that portion of the property of the corporation where the water is to be taken from the conduit. In a word it is proposed to place the railroad company on the same footing as every other water consumer within the city boundaries, in all respects as to taxation for benefits of the water supply, and with the privilege of discontinuing such supply at any time for justifiable causes after reasonable notice has been served upon the company by the city.

Gentlemen:—I beg leave respectfully to call your attention to the fact that the clerical work of this department, from the time of its organization, has increased annually in a nearly uniform ratio of about 25 per cent. over each preceding year. The number of claims, etc., registered and passed upon, year 1894-95, being upwards of 7,000, as compared with 4,800 for year ending April, 1893.

This increase of clerical work manifestly carries with it an equivalent increase of time demanded by the Auditor for the necessary personal examination of all claims presented, practically prohibiting him from any clerical work. In view of this, compared with the work done and force employed in other departments and compensation granted, I submit for your consideration, as proper that your committee may recommend an appropriation for the Auditor's clerk hire, exclusive of his own salary, an amount not exceeding \$450 per year, for the current year.

Rochester, N. Y., April 30, 1895.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen: At a meeting of the Common Council held April 16th, 1895, a resolution was adopted requesting the Superintendent of Plumbing to examine the plumbing and sanitary condition of the City Hall, and report at the next meeting.

I hereby make the following as a partial report of same: The tile drain in cellar has been uncovered, as far as accessible, and found to be in the most unsanitary condition. Some of the tile are broken and the joints are leaking badly. So much so that the ground is saturated and in a filthy condition. The stench coming from it is unbearable. The whole system of plumbing is defective. I found a six inch pipe from the stone sewer outside of building, connected with the smoke stack of one of the heating boilers. This pipe is used for ventilation; in fact, it ventilated the street sewer. When the boilers are in use it works all right, but when not in use the gases from the sewer escape through the flues and fire grates of boiler into the building.

The water supply to water closets and urinals should be changed from the Holley to the Hemlock system, as the dirty water from the Holley pipes discolors the fixtures and fills the tanks with mud, which is an injury to the working of the fixtures.

The twenty-four water closets in the prison cells should be thoroughly flushed and disconnected and sealed up. The water closets and urinal in basement used by the Police Department should be abandoned as they are located in a dark and unventilated room. I would also call your attention to the fact that there are no ladies' toilet rooms in the whole building, which is decidedly wrong, and some provision should be made for the accommodation of women.

The slop sinks used by the scrub women are located in the gentlemen's toilet rooms. They also should be located in some other place.

The blow-off from boilers connect directly with the main drain. They should be connected with a condenser, and discharge outside of main trap to sewer.

I procured from Mr. A. J. Warner the cellar plan of building thinking it might give me the plan of drainage, but I find it only gives part of it, as most of the drains have been laid since this plan was made. Therefore, I cannot make a specification of drainage till I know what is wanted. There yet remains quite a system of drainage which has not been uncovered, and until then I cannot make a specification for the cellar work. A new five inch stop gate has been put in connecting the drainage system with the canal. This gate was required to be put in before the water began to flow into the canal. The Water Department furnished the gate and I had the

plumbers working in the building put it in. The specifications for the work in the rest of the building, consisting of water closets, wash basins and urinal are nearly completed, and will be ready in a few days. As I am very busy with the Health Department work, my time is limited for other work.

I would suggest that the tile drain in cellar be removed and an extra heavy cast iron pipe be substituted in its place; that the change should be made in the water supply; that additional water closet accommodations should be provided for ladies; that the whole system of plumbing be reconstructed and made new and to conform with the rules of the Health Department.

I desire to call your attention to one of the conductors on the north side of the building, which has been disconnected from the sewer, and placed on the outside, discharging on the flag walk near the main entrance. This was done on account of a defect in the inside conductors which damaged the ceilings of the Surveyor's office. This should be repaired and connected with sewer again.

In reference to the ventilating of the building, a system of ventilation should be put in to bring the sanitary condition up to the modern standard of sanitary requirements. I am not prepared to make an estimate of the cost of this work and as it would have the benefit of the best experience in the line of ventilating engineering I would recommend that some person who has had successful experience in ventilating old buildings be employed to make the required plan and estimates.

Gentlemen: In the matter of the petition of Caroline B. Jones for cancellation of an assessment for Chestnut street sewer under final ordinance No. 5,237, we find that Mrs. Jones constructed a sewer through her premises a number of years since, connecting with Court street sewer, and that she really stood in no need of the Chestnut street sewer, but inasmuch as there are so many cases of this kind, it would not be proper for the city at large to pay Mrs. Jones' share of the Chestnut street sewer, into which she has the right to drain; owing, however, to the hardship of the case and to the fact that Mrs. Jones was not aware that she was to be assessed for this sewer, the Surveyor recommends that she be allowed to pay the face of the assessment without interest, and in this we concur.

In the matter of the petition of Sarah C. Shepard for cancellation of certain assessments made against her for the construction of the Monroe avenue pipe sewer, after a reconsideration of her petition, denied at a previous meeting, we find that the facts in Mrs. Shepard's case are the same as existed in the cases of T. B. Dempsey and the Monroe Avenue Homestead Association, acted upon at a meeting of the council held September 4, 1894, and inasmuch as Mrs. Shepard paid for the construction of the private sewer with T. B. Dempsey and the Monroe Avenue Homestead Association on her property on Shepard street, it is but proper that she should be released from the assessment on her property on Shepard street. We refer to and make a part of this report the report acted upon at the meeting held September 4, 1894.

In the matter of the petition of Harriet Brooks for refunding of certain taxes paid by her on a subdivision of lot 35 of the four thousand acre tract, we find that Mrs. Brooks is entitled to a rebate on lots 86-97 inclusive on Genesee, Paige and Marsh streets for general city taxes paid for the years 1888-1889. The city assessors reported to the Common Council in 1890, their communication being found at page 458 of the pro-

ceedings of 1889-90, that this relief should be granted to Mrs. Brooks; for some unexplained reason action has been deferred until recently, when the City Treasurer communicated with your committee and stated that this relief should be granted Mrs. Brooks. Her first petition, presented in 1888, could not be found, and a new petition was presented to the committee, and the Treasurer, in a communication dated March 19, 1895, again stated that this tax should be refunded. We therefore recommend that a rebate for the tax so paid by Mrs. Brooks be made to her.

In the matter of the petition of Lawrence Rogers for a rebate upon his assessment for the Big Ridge road sewer and grading improvement, the Executive Board have stated that inasmuch as Mr. Rogers did a portion of the work opposite his premises, he is entitled to deduction upon his assessment, and we therefore recommend that the Treasurer credit upon the assessment of Mr. Rogers for the Big Ridge road improvement, under final ordinance No. 4,211, the sum of \$30.00. To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee, in submitting the annual tax levy, desires to present a few explanatory statements in connection therewith as to the amounts of appropriations for the various funds.

The total amount, \$1,690,000, is \$50,000 less than last year's tax levy. Some talk has been indulged at one time or another, that the tax levy of this year would be a nine months' tax levy only, but a careful examination of the various funds will disclose the fact that in very few instances are the appropriations made for nine months only.

The interest account includes not only the interest on the bonded debt of the city, which will become due on the first of July and the first of January next, but includes in addition to that about \$50,000 of interest moneys which will fall due on the first of next February. Your committee, in providing for this interest, felt that inasmuch as five of the six months' interest would actually be earned during the present fiscal year, that it was advisable to provide for the whole interest payment on February bonds. Bonds were issued after the tax levy of last year was completed and for the purpose of completing the water conduit and water extension, to the amount of \$1,050,000. There bonds were all issued at 3 1-2 per cent. interest, and it is necessary in this tax levy to provide for the payment of about \$22,000 of interest on those bonds, upon which interest was paid on the first of last January out of the General Fund.

The amount of the appropriation for the School Board is \$392,000. This includes an item of \$242,000 for teachers' wages, and is sufficiently large, as is stated by the Teachers' Committee of the School Board, to provide for the increase in the salaries of grade teachers, so long agitated. An item of \$20,000 in round numbers, not included in the \$392,000, is provided for the payment of old bills of the school board, audited by the special auditing commission created under special statute passed last year. It will be observed that the full amount allowed by law for the full year, is provided in the building fund, and that the repair fund for the year is only \$2,000 less than the limit.

In the Executive Board, the total appropriation for Fire Department purposes is \$350,000. This item includes an appropriation of \$25,000 for the cost of the Belmont Park hose and truck house, built last year, and not otherwise provided for. It also includes an item of \$22,000 for the construction of a new double hose house in the western part of the city, also an item for the construction of a hose or truck house on Mon-

roe avenue, the lot for which was purchased last year.

The requisition for the payment of salaries of firemen as made by the Executive Board, called for an appropriation of \$116,676. To this we have added the sum of \$6,000, with which to enable the department to increase the salaries of firemen five dollars a month; thus putting them on an equality with the police department in the matter of salaries. Your committee feels that this recognition of faithful and dangerous work of the firemen is justified and that there is no good reason why a member of the police department should receive a larger salary than a member of the fire department.

For the past two years there has been no money appropriated for water pipe extension, because of the fact that the city has been forced to economize in the use of Hemlock water. This condition is now changed, and your committee has appropriated in the tax levy an item of \$37,000 for water pipe extensions for this year.

On the first day of next January, twenty thousand dollars worth of old 7 per cent. bonds, issued by the city for the construction of No. 5 School, will mature. Your committee has deemed it advisable to provide for the payment of these bonds, and has provided sufficient moneys therefor.

Your committee has, in making the tax levy, provided for all deficiencies that exist, and thinks it has provided sufficient moneys to carry every department until the beginning of the next fiscal year, if economically administered. By doing this, the new common council, which will come into office next year, will find, as it ought to find, a clean balance sheet, and no old deficiencies with which to struggle in making next year's tax levy.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your poor committee would respectfully report; that it has been necessary for the overseer of the poor to employ an extra city physician at different times during the year, and he has employed during such times Dr. J. W. Ready. He would respectfully recommend that in times of necessity the overseer of the poor be authorized to employ Dr. Ready at the same compensation as paid to the regularly appointed city physicians and to be paid only for the time he is actually employed at the rate paid the other city physicians.

Your committee after careful consideration of the matter have come to the conclusion that it is unwise for the city to longer rent rooms or houses for the benefit of its indigent poor and we recommend that on and after June 1, 1895, the overseer of the poor discontinue the practice of paying the rent for any of the indigent poor families of the city.

Under the direction of the poor committee the overseer of the poor has the proffer of between 40 and 50 acres of land for the purpose of having the same planted with potatoes by persons in indigent circumstances and it becomes necessary to employ a man to look after the proper staking and plowing of lots and planting potatoes thereon, and your committee recommend that the employment of James Kischler as superintendent of the potato lots or farms be confirmed and that he be employed until further directed by the overseer of the Poor at the rate of \$2 a day, commencing from the time of his appointment.

Whereas, The range of hills on the southern border of the city of Rochester, popularly known as the Pinnacle hills, constitute a natural feature of our landscape, remarkable alike for the pleasing diversity which their outline, rising boldly from the plain, gives to the environment of our city, and also for their wonderful geological formation, being in fact the unique relics and monuments of a period antedating by cycles the pyramids of Egypt and all other human structures, whose strange and instructive history is recorded in their strata of sand and gravel,

and of which the paper of Professor Fairchild constitutes so valuable an elucidation; and;

AN ACT to amend chapter 193 of the laws of 1888, entitled "An Act to authorize the selection and acquiring of certain grounds for public parks and parkways in and near the city of Rochester, and to provide for the maintenance and embellishment thereof."

The people of the state of New York, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section fifteen of said act is hereby amended so as read as follows:

Section 15. For the purpose of paying for the lands which may be taken or purchased under the provisions of this act, and for the purpose of laying out, improving or embellishing the park or parks, parkways, approaches thereto, and connecting streets created under the provisions of this act, and the expenses of acquiring title thereto under the provisions of this act, the bonds of the city of Rochester, to such an amount not exceeding three hundred sixty thousand dollars, as shall be necessary, shall be issued by the treasurer of said city, from time to time, as the same shall be required for the purposes aforesaid. Said bonds shall be known as the "Rochester Park Bonds" and shall be signed by the mayor and treasurer, and the seal of the city of Rochester affixed thereto; shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding four per centum per annum, interest and principal payable in the city of New York; interest payable half yearly on the first day of January and July in each year; and said bonds shall be payable at the option of said city after one year from the issue. And the proceeds of the sale of said bonds shall constitute the funds for paying the cost of the lands taken under the provisions of this act, and the expenses of acquiring title thereto, and for the laying out, improvement and embellishment thereof. And the treasurer of said city shall pay on the order of said park commissioners the sums which may be awarded as above provided, to the owner or owners or persons in any way interested in the lands which shall be taken pursuant to the provisions of this act, and the purchase price of lands obtained by agreement of purchase by said park commissioners. And as the said bonds are from time to time issued, the treasurer shall cause to be kept in his office, in a book to be provided for that purpose, a true and correct statement and an account of each and every bond issued under the provisions of this act, showing the number of each bond and the date and the amount thereof, and the time when due; and such

books shall be open for public inspection, and shall be delivered to his successor in office.

Section 2. This act shall not be construed to authorize the bonds of said city to be issued to an amount exceeding sixty thousand dollars in addition to the bonds already issued for park purposes in pursuance of the act above referred to, and the proceeds of the additional bonds authorized under the provisions of this act shall be used only in the purchase of such lands and interest therein for park purposes as the common council of said city may approve.

Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

McMillan—Resolved, That the act amending section 15 of chapter 193 of the laws of 1888 relating to parks presented at this meeting, be, and the same hereby is, approved, and the City Attorney is directed to forward the necessary copies to the honorable, the representatives of this district in the legislature, for introduction and passage. Adopted.

By Ald. Green—Resolved, That the consent of this Common Council be and it is hereby given to the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company to construct an additional track across North street as follows:

The center line of the new track to be 21.5 feet south of the intersection of the east line of North street with the south line of North avenue measured along said east line of North street and distant northerly along said east line of North street from the center line of the present north track 27.7 feet; at the west line of North street said new center line to be distant and north from center line of present north track 37.3 feet, measured on the west line of North street.

Said new track to be carried over North street on one clear span of bridge of solid plate girders, supported on east side of North street by stone abutments and on west side by stone piers; stone work to be clear of street, the bottom of said girders to be in same horizontal plane with bottom of existing bridge.

Said new track to be constructed so that the surface of the rails shall be horizontal across the street, and the surface of said new rails to be not to exceed 3 & 12 feet above the surface of rails of the main tracks.

Said new tracks to be floored with solid iron flooring and maintained so as to prevent dripping of oil or water upon the roadway or sidewalk underneath.

This consent is given upon the express condition that if required at any time by the common council, the space intervening between the main track and said new track shall be covered as may be required, and upon neglect or refusal to do so when required, said city may cause the same to be done and recover the expense thereof of said railroad company.

On the east side of North street, new track to be built on embankment held in place by stone retaining walls 13 feet in height from the sidewalk at the intersection of North avenue and North street and 10 feet in height at first angle in North avenue, and running from the east line of North street on the south side of North avenue a distance of 187.5 feet.

The additional track hereby permitted shall be regarded as one of the tracks which said company might have laid under the contract for elevating its tracks through the city.

Resolved, That the Clerk transmit to the Board of Education a certified copy of this resolution.

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee held a meeting this afternoon at which the question of guaranteeing future certificates of the West Side Sewer Commission, or issuing the bonds of the city with which to purchase such certificates, was considered. The committee was attended by members of the West Side Sewer Commission, who emphasized the delay that would be caused if assistance were not given by the city, and also the importance of providing proper drainage for the section of the city through which the sewer is proposed to be constructed. Your committee was informed that the commission has no means with which to prosecute the work and that no moneys can be collected until the re-assessment directed by the recent amendment to the act is perfected. In view of this fact and that the city lent its credit to the residents on the east side of the river to a like consideration, your committee is disposed to assist the commission in prosecuting the work at once, rather than to compel a further delay until the reassessment can be made and the assessments collected.

It is the opinion of your committee that it is wise to purchase the certificates of the commission outright rather than to guarantee their payment. With this view your committee recommends that the city purchase as provided by the act certificates to the extent of \$25,000, issued by the commission for work hereafter done within the limits of the city.

Commissioner Otis, chairman of the Finance Committee, submitted the following:

FINANCE ESTIMATE.

To the Board of Education:

Gentlemen:—The several committees having charge of expenditures have submitted the items comprising the necessities of our public schools. It must be borne in mind that the growth of the city of Rochester necessarily involves an increase in its schools and corresponding expenditures. There are now 23,063 pupils in our public schools who have been registered but once during the present school year. That is an increase of 1,848 over May, 1894. The increase in average daily attendance for the same time is 1,575 pupils.

The reports made March 25th last to your board fully set forth the wants of the school department in way of buildings, repairs, supplies, etc., etc. Those wants annually increase instead of diminish. Included in the estimate for teachers' wages is an item of \$20,000 for the purpose of increasing the salaries of teachers who have been in the service of the public schools a long time. The teachers' estimates are made on the basis of seven budgets, only, April to December. The contingent fund and library fund estimates are also based on expenditures to the end of the present fiscal year, December 31st next. The building and repair funds are asked to be granted in full because the entire outlays are contracted during the early part of every fiscal year.

Said bonds shall be signed by the Treasurer, sealed with the corporate seal of the city, countersigned by the acting mayor and by the Union Trust Company, of New York. Said Union Trust Company is hereby authorized and requested to countersign the same. Said bonds shall be due in twenty years. The proceeds of said bonds shall be invested in the certificates issued by the commissioners appointed pursuant to the statute above referred to and expended in the construction of said sewer entirely within the limits of the city of Rochester. Sealed proposals shall be invited by said Treasurer by public advertisement for not less than ten days, but no proposal shall be accepted for less than the par value of said bonds, and said proposals shall be publicly opened only by the Treasurer, or such other person as said Common Council shall designate in the presence of the Finance Committee of said Common Council, or such of them as shall attend at the time and place specified in said advertisement, and said Treasurer, with the approval of said Finance Committee, or such members thereof as may be present, shall determine what, if any, part of said proposals shall be accepted. But nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the rejection of any or all of said proposals.

Therefore be it

Resolved, That the common council of the city of Rochester do hereby condemn the action of the board of excise of said city in securing the passage of said proposed law; in disregard of and against the deliberate judgment of the said common council; and the governor of the state of New York, Hon. Levi P. Morton, is hereby requested by the board of aldermen of said city of Rochester to veto said act and thus recognize the principle of "Home Rule" in the government of municipalities. Gentlemen:—I deem it my duty to call your attention to the urgent necessity for the publication in book or pamphlet form of the Penal Ordinances of the city.

It is nearly twenty years since the ordinances were published in this way. Since that time nearly all the ordinances then in existence have been revised or amended and many new ordinances have been enacted. These revised and amended ordinances are scattered through twenty published volumes of Common Council proceedings. To ascertain what the penal ordinance provisions on any given subject are it is necessary to search through these twenty volumes and when the work is completed, it is possible, in the nature of things, to vouch for the accuracy of the findings.

On July 1 all the outstanding licenses expire and the labor of issuing new licenses, devolving upon this office, will begin. It would greatly facilitate this work if the Penal Ordinances were collated and published before July 1. It would seem advisable to make the edition sufficiently large that every person securing a license could be supplied with a copy. I also deem it of the highest importance that the members of the police force, who are charged with the enforcement of the ordinances, should be supplied with copies. I therefore recommend that immediate steps be taken to secure the publication of several thousand indexed copies of the revised and collated penal ordinances of the city.

Dear Sir:—The undersigned, members of a committee appointed by Hon. Merton E. Lewis, acting mayor, to inspect the new police station, would respectfully report; We have carefully examined the building to discover defects, if any exist, and we find:

First. The brick and stone walls have been constructed with the usual care and that they are plumb, straight and apparently well and solidly built.

Second. The plastering, except in a few places, is in good condition. Slight repairs will make the whole of this part of the work satisfactory.

Third. While no elaborate or costly system of ventilation has been adopted for this building, the matter of ventilation has not been neglected, especially in the two small rooms of the court room, in the passages leading to the cells, which are amply ventilated. In the court room itself there is one large ventilator and in many of the other rooms open fire places provide good ventilation.

Fourth. The interior wood finish of the building is, in our opinion, of good quality, excepting we find the wood floors, especially in the first and second stories, to be considerably warped; probably caused by their having been laid before the building was sufficiently dried to receive them; which defect, in our opinion, can be easily remedied.

Fifth. The asphalt floor in the patrol barn we believe to be of good quality. We found indentations made by chair legs in the asphalt floor of the small office room, resulting from the softening effects of a hot steam pipe that runs under the floor, and we think this floor should have been made of some material other than asphalt.

Sixth. The cause for criticism of the columns and girders, supporting the ceiling of the patrol barn, will be entirely removed when this part of the work is completed.

Seventh. The attention of the committee was called to the leakage of water through the north wall of the main building. All of the surface water from the adjoining lot on the north runs toward the new building over a brick pavement and the construction of a gutter, that we understand is contemplated, will prevent any recurrence of this trouble.

When the defects we have pointed out have been remedied and the building entirely completed, we believe it will not be discreditably to any concerned in its construction.

REPORT OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your select committee to which was referred the complaints regarding the pound on Genesee street would respectfully report:

Your committee gave a public hearing on the subject at the common council chamber which was attended by a numerous delegation of residents and taxpayers in the vicinity of the pound. The committee also inspected the premises and made personal observations of the surroundings.

The pound is located in a thickly populated district and in close proximity to two orphan asylums and a hospital. Public school No. 29 is only a short distance away on Moran street.

The objections to the pound arise from the howling of the dogs at night and the annoy-

ance resulting from the presence of children attracted to the place by operations there carried on. The authorities of St. Mary's Hospital complain that patients in that institution have been much disturbed by the howling of the dogs and the commotion created by the shooting of the animals three times a day. Every return of the wagon in which the employes convey the captured animals to the pound is an event with all the small boys for blocks around and the claim made by the objectors that the language and conduct of these street gamins have a demoralizing influence on the children of the neighborhood has quite as much foundation in fact as in sentiment.

On the occasion of the committee's visit to the pound the premises were found to be in as good condition as it would seem possible to keep a place devoted to such purposes. There is no doubt, however, that the pound constitutes a nuisance to the neighborhood for reasons already stated.

Your committee would therefore recommend that some more isolated location be designated for the purpose and from information which we have received we believe that it will not be a difficult matter to secure a location that will be free from all objections.

Gentlemen: I deem it my duty to call your attention to the condition of the asphalt pavement on Alexander street, between East avenue and Monroe avenue.

This is the oldest asphalt pavement in the city, and it has been laid ten years. It is a good street and has had but little if any repairs, but now it is such a condition that unless it is repaired in the gutters and along the railroad track it will be ruined.

There are 10,239 square yards of pavement on the street, of which 2,068 should be repaired, and of that 114 square yards are along the railroad track.

The estimated cost of the work is \$3,102.

I recommend that this work be done this year, and that at the same time the street railway company be required to rebuild the tracks with a concrete foundation.

While the cost should be paid by the city, yet, if it is not possible to do that, it would be well to pay for it by local assessment.

To the Honorable Executive Board:—

Gentlemen: It has been the experience of the members of your Board as well as myself, I know, that where ordinances have been passed for the building of sidewalks of the street, a length of time has been given to the property owners to lay their own walks and the result has been in almost every case unsatisfactory and disappointing.

I take this opportunity to bring the matter formally before you with the hope that you will see fit to bring it before the Common Council in such a way as to induce them to refrain from passing such delaying resolutions.

It is evident that an ordinance for new sidewalks is not passed until a general repairing of the sidewalks is necessary.

Now when the property owners are given time to lay their own walks, this office stakes out such walks, but we have no means of knowing whether the stakes are followed or not. In many cases we know that they are not followed through as to line and grade, and the only parties benefitted by the passage of such resolutions allowing property owners to build their own walks are the contractors for cement walks.

It is their custom to go through the streets and mislead the property owners into making a contract with them for laying their sidewalks on the ground that it will cost the property owners less, and that they will get a better sidewalk than if it was done by the city under contract. I do not believe there is any sound reason for giving property owners time to build their own walks after an ordinance is passed.

The Executive Board can only reiterate what it has often heretofore said that it believes it is not in the interest of the property owners nor for public advantage to grant the privilege to individual property owners to make private contracts for the construction of walks preceding the construction of walks under an ordinance. When the city builds a walk under an ordinance, uniformity in the quality of material, in the grade and in the alignment of the walk is obtained, conditions that are almost impossible under the methods pursued in the construction of walks by various contractors and at different times. The property owner has the advantage also of a guaranty for the restoration of the walk in case of any defect for a certain length of time, and also has time for payment of the tax, which cannot be obtained under any private contract.

It frequently happens also that after walks have been built by the great majority of property owners, under private contract, the work has to be completed under the ordinance, crosswalks constructed and grading done, for which a tax must be levied upon

all the people owning property within the territory fixed in the assessment. This assessment is often made for a very small sum, and invariably gives rise to disputes and annoyance to the people, who suppose they have complied with all the requirements by the construction of their own walks. There has rarely been an instance where walks were permitted to be constructed by individuals but what it was of disadvantage and an actual injury to the owner of the property. The City Engineer, therefore, is simply giving voice in condemnation of a custom which has been disapproved by this department for many years past.

It has had Mr. A. J. Warner, the architect who planned and built the City Hall, make detailed drawings and specifications for the construction of the necessary work, and the putting in of an elevator in the City Hall building. Upon the completion of the plans and specifications, your committee solicited from the Graves Elevator Company, and from the Otis Brothers Company, of New York, manufacturers of electric elevators, proposals for the furnishing of such elevator, and doing the necessary work to put it in proper running order.

Your committee has received proposals from both of said companies, which it submits herewith. It will be seen that the proposal of the Graves Elevator Company is about \$750 lower than that of the Otis Company, and your committee has, therefore, decided to recommend that the bid of the Graves Company be accepted.

At the time the elevator was ordered for the new police building on Exchange street, a 500-volt motor was furnished by the Graves Elevator Company. Gentlemen:—The attention of the Executive Board has been called many times, and it might be said for many years, to the uneven and dangerous condition of the walks on Mill street from Exchange place to the railroad, and on Front street from Main street to Central avenue.

Those walks are in the main constructed of Medina stone of large dimensions and are laid upon the area walls and piers which support them. By action of the frost and by the poor foundation on which they stand, as well as the generally bad mechanical work done in their construction these walks become frequently out of repair, and as before stated, there is imminent danger of some serious accident happening by the whole stonework tumbling into the areas over which they are now laid.

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE BOARD FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

Fire Marshal's Office,
Rochester, N. Y., June 28, 1895. }

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Having made a number of inspections, personally and in company with Ald. Simmellink of the Columbia apartment house, after the fire on said premises March 17th last, I came to the conclusion that the fire escapes and modes of exit in and on said house are insufficient and unsafe for the sixty or eighty people for which said house has accommodations. I deem it prudent, in my judgment for the safety of the inmates that said condition of things be remedied. I therefore sent Mr. J. V. Peacock an order to construct fire escapes and exits of sufficient capacity for the safety of the occupants of said building, and upon consultation with the Corporation Counsel he informs me that I have no authority under the provisions of the charter to have said fire escapes and exits constructed without specific authority from your honorable body. I would therefore respectfully request that you take the necessary action to have the same constructed or empower me to have the same done as said owner refuses so to do.

Resolved, That the Common Council deem that the construction of suitable fire escapes and means of egress in the said apartment house is necessary, and that the owner of said apartment house be required to construct at once such suitable fire escapes and means of egress in and upon the same as the fire marshal may specify, and the fire marshal is hereby authorized to superintend the construction of the same, and to specify the fire escapes and means of egress to be provided. Further

Resolved, That in default of the construction by the owner of such fire escapes and means of egress as above provided within two weeks from the approval of this resolution by the acting mayor, the fire marshal be authorized to cause suitable fire escapes and means of egress to be constructed thereon, the expense of which, with 10 per centum in addition, shall be collected from said owner.

Third—That your honorable body proceeded upon a wrong, illegal and erroneous rule or method of apportionment in designating the territory which should be made the subject of the assessment to raise the sum of \$5,000 for said improvement, in that the territory so designated by your said body will not be specially benefited by such improvement, and that other property within said city which will be specially benefited by such improvement, is not to be subjected to said assessment.

Fourth—That the action of your honorable body in designating the property in the possession of protestants as being subjected to said assessment is illegal and void in that said property will not be benefited by such improvement, and that other properties in said city which will be benefited by such improvement are not to be made the subject of assessment therefor.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen—Your special committee on the revision of the penal ordinances, begs leave to report upon the subject matter of the ordinance relating to hucksters, peddlers and vendors, that your committee has been attended by a large delegation of the hucksters of the city, and also by members of the grocers association and their counsel. It was represented on behalf of the grocers association that the license fee should be raised and that the penalties prescribed for violations of the provisions of the ordinance should in some cases be increased. It was contended on behalf of the hucksters that the license fee was only recently reduced from \$15 to \$5, and that the latter amount was all that they could afford to pay; that if the license fee was increased to any great extent, it would drive many of them out of business and that they had no objection to the enforcement of all of the provisions of the ordinance in question as it exists at present. After a careful consideration of the matter, your committee is inclined to agree with the hucksters that the license fee should be allowed to remain where it is, and believes also with the grocers association, that in some cases the penalties imposed should be increased.

We therefore recommend an increase in the penalties prescribed for a violation of some of the sections of the ordinance in accordance with the accompanying resolutions, and believe that by the enforcement of the ordinance as thus amended, the interests of all will be adequately subserved and protected.

No person shall at any time, huckster, hawk, peddle, sell, offer for sale, any potatoes, or other farm produce, by the bushel, except in square crates or boxes which have been duly sealed by the City Sealer, and each of which shall have a capacity of twenty-five hundred cubic inches, and contain, exclusive of its own weight, when filled with potatoes, level with the top thereof, sixty pounds, under penalty or fine of not less than \$10, nor more than fifty dollars, for each offense, and any ordinance, or any part of any ordinance, inconsistent with the provisions of this subdivision, is hereby repealed. To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your special committee on revision of the penal ordinances, to whom was referred the matter of amending the bicycle ordinances, would report as follows:

The committee has held several long sessions with the gentlemen representing the different bicycle organizations of our city, and have found the question submitted to them to be a most perplexing one. The wheelmen seem to be as anxious to protect the interests of the public as we are. Various restrictions were discussed pro and con, but the consensus of opinion was upon the following changes:

1. To restrict riding on all streets, lanes or alleys within the city limits to ten (10) miles per hour.
2. To prohibit riding with hands off the handle bars.
3. To prohibit coasting within the city limits.

A careful compilation of the accidents reported since April 1st shows that 97 per cent. of them were caused from fast riding on the streets, not on the walks, and for that reason it was thought advisable to place an absolute speed limit on the streets.

The question of refusing the privilege of the walks on streets not paved with asphalt, brick, cedar or Medina block was thoroughly discussed. It is evident that the wheelmen

as a body thoroughly appreciate this privilege, and do not abuse it. The fact, remains, however, that some accidents have happened on the walks, caused by reckless young riders. It would seem that the present restrictions, if stringently enforced, would regulate this. To refuse the use of the walks on unimproved streets at the present time would cripple the bicycle industry of our city materially, and work great injury to hundreds of people who daily use the wheel to and from business. That this is true, one has only to ride over many of our principal thoroughfares and be jostled and bumped around through the holes and worn out portions of the pavements to fully realize that they are totally impassable for bicycles. However, the era of good roads is at hand; the demand for improved thoroughfares is heard far and near; the disposition of the authorities is to improve the highways as fast as possible. With good roads the question will solve itself. We are convinced that no wheelman rides on the walks from choice. In many places it is the walks or nothing. Again, the wheelmen of the city are at last awake to the fact that a few reckless riders are imperiling the good name of all, and they are determined to put their shoulders to the wheel and stop it themselves. To that end they are perfecting an organization which has already over 2,000 members. With this help and a strict enforcement of the present ordinances, with the amendments suggested by your committee, we are of the opinion that the interests of the public are amply protected.

No person shall ride a cycle upon the public streets, avenues, alleys, lanes, parks, sidewalks or footpaths of the city at a greater rate of speed than ten miles per

hour; no person shall ride with hands off the handle bar or "coast" within the city upon any of its public streets, avenues, alleys, lanes, parks, sidewalks or footpaths. For a violation of any of the provisions of this section the offender shall be liable to a fine of \$5 for each offense.

Gentlemen:—I beg leave to make the following report upon the sewer in Mt. Hope avenue, in accordance with your resolution of June 25th.

The portion of the sewer south of Clarissa street is believed to be in good condition and sufficient for many years in the future.

The sewer from Clarissa street to the East Side Trunk sewer is a stone box sewer with plank bottom. It is for most of the distance within 6 feet from the east curb, and from Averill avenue to Comfort street, has very flat grades, being one in one thousand to Hamilton place, one in 2938 to Alexander street and one in 725 to Comfort street, and is not of sufficient capacity to carry off the storm water which comes to it now although all of the water coming down Mt. Hope avenue is diverted by a wooden bulkhead into the existing overflow through Clarissa street into the feeder, and the difficulty arising from this will increase rapidly as the territory including 120 acres south from Gregory street is further developed.

No pavement should be laid upon Mt. Hope avenue north of Clarissa street until something is done to relieve the sewer.

The simple way to do this would be to rebuild the sewer, making it large enough, except for the fact that the East Side Trunk Sewer and the new overflow being built under the Erie canal are not designed to receive so much water and are not large enough to carry it off, in addition to the flow from South Avenue and Griffith street districts. So that even if the sewer was rebuilt it will also be necessary to build an overflow for the storm water at Gregory street or Clarissa street.

While it would be undoubtedly better from a sanitary point of view to replace the existing sewer which with its square form and flat grades acts as a settling tank, by a vitrified pipe. I am fain to believe that the old sewer will fairly serve the purpose for many years provided the relief overflow is built, and I recommend that the sewer work be limited to building a storm overflow 54 inches in diameter in Sanford street, from Poplar to Mt. Hope avenue, and in Mt. Hope avenue, from Sanford to Clarissa, and 60 inches in diameter through Clarissa to the feeder.

The estimated cost of this overflow is \$11,000, and should be assessed upon all the territory draining into Mt. Hope avenue.

Gentlemen: Your special committee on the revision of the penal ordinances beg leave to say that it has caused a thorough revision of the penal ordinances of the city to be made. Some of the provisions we found were duplicated, others were inconsistent and some were obsolete. The work of re-arrangement has occupied much time, but your committee has felt that it would be useless to publish the ordinances in the form in which they existed. We have submitted the various ordinances to the departments particularly interested in them, and have before us their suggestions as to possible changes. The ordinances relating to streets, sidewalks etc., were submitted to Mr. Neville; those relating to cemeteries, to Mr. Morris; those relating to police and police department to Chief Cleary; those relating to meat and markets to Mr. Ellinger and Mr. Huber; those relating to sealer of weights and measures to Mr. Bohrer; those relating to the overseer of the poor to Mr. Gardiner; those relating to the board of health to Dr. Sibley; those relating to erection of buildings, etc., to Mr. Walters, and others of the ordinances were submitted to the parties who had special knowledge on the subjects to which they pertain.

This work has been very carefully done and the arrangement and revision is completed. Your committee is prepared from time to time to submit these ordinances to the council for action.

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE BOARD FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS OF THE CORPORATION AND THEIR REFERENCE.

By the Clerk—

Rochester, N. Y., July 10, 1895.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: I would respectfully report that I have issued by direction of your honorable body the city notes as per the annexed list the total amount now outstanding being \$1,475,320. All notes have been countersigned by the chairman of the finance committee.

(SEE SCHEDULE NEXT PAGE.)

In placing these loans at less than 6 per cent. (the amount formerly charged the city for discounts) I have saved the taxpayers the sum of \$28,431.36. While this is a large item the amount could be greatly increased if you would stop the issuing of time orders, or warrants, by the executive board. These orders are given the contractors in payment of their contracts for sewer and street improvements, and are issued for six months, one or two years time, the two latter carrying interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum.

The day is past when a city having the credit such as has Rochester, should continue to issue its obligations carrying 6 per cent. interest. I would earnestly recommend that the rates of interest on these warrants or orders be lowered, or what would be better yet, to issue a short term local improvement bond for five or ten years, and from the proceeds of the same pay the contractors cash when their work was accepted (less the guarantee fund to be withheld). All contractors would do their work at least 5 per cent. cheaper for cash, thus giving the property owners the benefit. Then, as the notes issued for the local improvements and local improvement bonds now outstanding mature, pay them from this fund. The amount of notes issued for this purpose are \$533,500 and are included in the \$1,475,320 named above. As the warrants or orders now outstanding come due, pay them also from this fund. These orders amount in round numbers to \$474,937.13.

I have recommended this action on former occasions but beyond your direction to separate the collections received for local improvements from that of the general city tax and to keep a separate account of the same, no further action has been taken. In my judgment, that is a subject which deserves your prompt attention and hearty co-operation, and I trust you will not blame me for once more calling your attention to the same. It is a duty we owe to the public whose servants we are.

Whereas, A portion of said street has (between certain intersecting streets) been provided with drainage; it is therefore,

Resolved, That the Common Council be respectfully requested to provide the necessary measures for the relief of the existing nuisance and evils which menace the health of the residents of said street, by passing an ordinance to construct a sewer or sewers in portions of said street which have not already been provided with drainage, and that a copy of the report of said medical inspector be forwarded with this resolution to the Common Council.

Medical Inspector Goler submitted the following report June 21, 1895:

Attention is respectfully called to the condition of the houses on Walnut street, between Jay and Orange streets. WEST AVENUE PORTLAND CEMENT WALKS

On motion of Ald. Ward, the Common Council proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the following ordinance, viz.:

Sec. 2. It shall not be lawful for any person except employes of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company who shall be specially permitted by said company so to do, to walk or be upon the elevated tracks of said railroad company between Union and Brown streets under a penalty and fine of \$5 for each offense.

Sec. 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your assessment committee beg leave to submit the following report:

That they have carefully examined the petition of Winifred Collins to have taxes upon lot No. 13 of the Bennett tract on the north side of Cady street cancelled for the assessment for Cady street widening made in 1867 and after hearing the allegations of Judge Lynn in favor of vacating the assessment, your committee have concluded to recommend that Mrs. Collins be permitted to redeem her premises from the sale of the same for said Cady street widening upon payment of the face of said assessment with 6 per cent. interest and fees.

In the matter of the petition of Helen F. Furman for rebate of an assessment paid for lateral sewer opposite her premises known by street number as 42 East Main street, corner of Front street amounting to \$180, we recommend that that amount be refunded as at the time of the construction of said lateral sewer Mrs. Furman had just completed a lateral sewer which was sufficient for all her needs.

In the matter of the petition of Elizabeth Morris for reduction of assessment for the Maple and Colvin street sewer under ordinance 4,195, against her premises known as lot 157, east side of Thurston road, we recommend that a rebate of \$31 upon her assessment be granted and that Charles E. Morris as executor and trustee be allowed a rebate on lot 181 on the north side of Sawyer street, and lot 156 on the east side of Thurston road, of \$11 each upon said lots by reason of the fact that said premises have been assessed improperly.

In the matter of the petition of John Gneadinger for reduction of assessment for Genesee street outlet sewer under final ordinance No. 3,814 on his lots 65 and 68 south side of Barton street, we find that the petitioner is not entitled to the relief prayed for and therefore recommend that the petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of W. T. Bradley for permission to redeem lots 71 and 73 on the east side of Bates street in the W. S. Little Commercial Nursery tract from the sale of general city taxes for year 1893, we find that the petitioner is entitled to redeem said premises upon payment of the face of the tax against said premises with 6 per cent. interest and fees.

In the matter of the petition of Mrs. Henry Benton for refund of taxes erroneously paid by her for sprinkling lot 81 on the west side of Fitzhugh street for the years 1893 and 1894, we find that her premises immediately adjoins the canal and that it is impossible to sprinkle the street opposite her premises, and the tax paid by her for such sprinkling should be refunded. We therefore recommend that there be refunded to Mrs. Benton the sum of \$1.53 for taxes so erroneously paid by her.

In the matter of the petition of William M. Bates for cancellation of assessment for Lyell avenue and Saxton street sewer, it appears that Mr. Bates claims that his premises are exempt from taxation by virtue of a certain agreement entered into by Samuel Moulson and others and the city of Rochester in 1854, but your committee are advised by the corporation counsel that such agreement does not affect the assessment for the section of the sewer for which Mr. Bates's premises are now assessed and for that reason he is not entitled to the relief asked. We therefore recommend that the petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Albert Will for cancellation of assessment for general city taxes for the year 1868 and 1869 upon the ground that the same had been paid by the grantor of the late Philip Will in his lifetime, we are satisfied after an examination of the matter that it does not clearly appear that the tax was paid by Mr. Will or by the person from whom he purchased the premises in question. We have, however, concluded to permit the estate of Philip Will to redeem said premises being lots 8, 9 and 10 of the Gorham tract on St. Paul street from the sale of general city taxes for the years 1868 and 1869 upon the payment of the face of said tax and 6 per cent. interest and expenses.

In the matter of the petition of Richard H. Dukelow and wife to pay the portion of taxes which they equitably ought to pay as owners of lots 11, 13, 15 and 17 in the Riley tract situated on the north side of Lewis street and which lots are assessed with other property as one tract to Charles F. Pond at the sum of \$22,000, we would recommend that the assessors apportion the taxes which Mr. Dukelow ought to pay upon said lots and certify the same to this council.

In the matter of the election districts, we are advised by the corporation counsel that chapter 810 of the laws of 1895, which amended section 8 of the election law, requires that the common council should fix the election districts for the city and we submit herewith a resolution fixing such districts.

Joiner street to the north line of Norton street; thence easterly along the north line of Norton street to the center line of North street; thence southerly along the center line of North street to the center line of Hudson terrace; thence westerly along the center line of Hudson terrace to the center line of Hudson avenue; thence northerly along the center line of Hudson avenue to the center line of Hayward park; thence westerly along the center line of Hayward park, to the place of beginning.

Fifth District. The fifth district will comprise all that portion of the seventeenth ward included within, and described by the following boundary lines, viz:

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee, to which was referred the communication of the Park Commissioners requesting an increased allowance for their maintenance fund, would respectfully report, that we have considered the communication carefully. When the tax levy was prepared for submission to the Common Council the total amount allowed by law was \$20,000 for maintenance fund. Since that time an amendment to the park law has been passed, authorizing the Common Council to grant \$40,000 annually. By reason of this the commissioners have proceeded upon the assumption that said amount of \$40,000 would be granted this year. Acting therefore upon this basis the total amount of \$20,000 has already been expended and much work planned has had to be abandoned. Your committee therefore feel that an extra allowance might in justice be given them to complete work laid out and would recommend the appropriation of \$10,000 in addition to the amount already given. This will be \$2,500 less than the amount allowed by law, inclusive of the amounts appropriated for police and small parks.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your special committee appointed to confer with the West Side Sewer Commission, beg leave to make the following report:

We had a meeting with the West Side Sewer Commission and considered the question of area upon which the cost of said sewer should be assessed.

At that meeting it was voted to have a report made by the City Engineer and the Engineer of the West Side Sewer Commission. These reports were received at a subsequent meeting of the West Side Sewer Commission and your committee. We attach hereto copies of said reports.

Your committee, while being advised by the Engineers, that the Lyell avenue and Saxton street sewer system would prove to be too small after a term of years and after a further development of the territory; and that relief can be furnished by a small additional cost in building the West Side sewer, so as to probably make unnecessary, a very large expense some years later, yet are of the opinion that it would be better not to assess the territory that has paid for the Lyell avenue and Saxton street sewer anything for the cost of the West Side Sewer.

CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT.

To the Honorable West Side Sewer Commissioners and Messrs. Ashton, Kelly, Decker, Powell and Harris, the Special Committee of the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—At your request of May 25, 1895, when a joint meeting was held, we have made an examination of the question of the relation of the West Side Sewer to that portion of the city of Rochester which is now served by, or which has been assessed for the Lyell avenue and Saxton street and the Maple and Colvin streets sewers.

It appears that according to the experience already obtained in Rochester, the Lyell avenue and Saxton street sewer and the Maple

and Colvin street sewer, will not be large enough to carry off the storm water flow from the territory which was assessed for its cost of construction, and which to a large extent now drains into it from a partially developed territory.

It is certain that with the development of the western part of the city, which is expected, trouble will be occasioned by water coming up into the cellars in many parts of this system of sewers within a few years.

While the trouble from the small dimensions of these sewers may not be experienced for some time, yet it will surely come, and it does seem advisable to consider how the West Side Sewer may be built so as by a small additional expense obviate the necessity of a very great expense some years later.

The cost of enlarging the Lyell avenue and Saxton street sewer sufficiently to serve the territory which they were designed to serve when it becomes more fully developed would be over \$200,000.

This expenditure can be entirely obviated and the Lyell avenue and Saxton street and the Maple and Colvin streets sewers be made sufficient for any future development by diverting the drainage from 241 acres of the territory assessed for the said Lyell avenue and Saxton and Maple and Colvin streets sewers.

This territory which can be advantageously diverted is in three parcels, located as follows:

First, 87 acres lying west of Carlton place on West avenue and Hancock street on Chili avenue.

Second, 79 acres lying between the Buffalo branch of the New York Central and the Niagara Falls branch and west of Child street and Colvin street.

Third, 75 acres lying north of the Niagara Falls branch and west of the Erie canal.

The drainage from this 241 acres when turned into the West Side Sewer will form about 10 per cent. of the expected discharge of the sewer, and on account of the steep grades in that sewer east of Sherman street, there will be no enlargement in that portion made necessary by it, and the only increase of cost to provide for this territory will be due to enlarging the size of the proposed sewer from West avenue to Sherman street, which will probably amount to \$20,000, or less.

If this enlargement is made it will be for the benefit of not only the said 241 acres to be diverted from the existing sewers but also to all of the territory using the Lyell avenue and Saxton street sewer, which would have to pay for an enlargement of said sewer.

The assessment rolls made for the Lyell avenue and Saxton street sewer show a taxable frontage of 227,018 feet; and \$20,000, spread over this frontage is \$.0881 per foot, which would mean an assessment of \$3.53 for a 40 foot lot.

It may be properly argued that this territory from which the sewer and storm water is to be diverted should pay a full proportionate share of the cost of the West Side Sewer, instead of the mere cost of enlargement made necessary.

If this was admitted, then the amount to be paid would be at least \$50,000, and the average assessment upon a 40 foot lot would be \$8.83.

ENGINEER THOMPSON'S REPORT.

To the Honorable West Side Sewer Commissioners and Messrs. Ashton, Kelly, Decker, Powell and Harris, the Special Committee of the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Pursuant to a resolution adopted at a joint meeting of the West Side Sewer Commissioners and the special committee duly appointed by the Common Council of the city of Rochester, held May 25, 1895, directing the City Engineer, and the Engineer of the commission, to examine into and determine upon the question of the permanent efficiency of the Saxton street outlet sewer system, with special reference to the proposition of reasonably insuring such efficiency by diverting the drainage of a portion of the territory now tributary to it, into the proposed West Side Sewer, the undersigned respectfully submits the following:

When a public improvement is projected it is the duty of those having the work in charge, to make such investigations of general conditions as to enable them to finally evolve a plan, that, when executed, will be reasonably certain to result in the most far reaching benefit to the entire community. With this end in view, a careful study has been made of such natural conditions as evidently determine the extent of territory that should drain into the present Saxton Street Outlet System. I find that a considerable portion of the territory now tributary to the Saxton street outlet sewer really lies outside of the natural drainage basin belonging to the system. As a consequence, with the ascending grades of the sewers meeting the reversed slope of the ground, many of the lateral sewers serving this portion of the territory are too near the surface and therefore fail to afford efficient drainage to adjacent dwellings. Indeed, it would seem that the projectors of some of these lateral sewers had it in mind to simply use them for temporary purposes, with the expectation of re-arranging them when better outlet facilities were offered. In this manner these laterals have been extended and by means of too light grades stretched out to serve territory far beyond the safe limit, thus in reality forming a repository for sewage instead of a conduit for the quick discharge of the offensive and dangerous flow.

With the reconstruction of the Saxton street outlet system, accomplished in 1890-91, somewhat better grades were made possible for these laterals. At the present rate of development of the territory in question, it can be but a short time when the conservation of public health in the outlying districts affected, will imperatively require a reconstruction of many of these laterals.

The construction of the proposed West Side Sewer being now assured, the question has arisen as to whether it would not be best to use it to serve, at least all the territory in the city that is naturally within its drainage basin, and to at this time, make provisions for such service in proportioning the sizes of the West Side Sewer, so that when necessity arises, a free and ample outlet may be had for the drainage of the territory aforesaid.

It was while making the investigations necessary to a determination of this question that the startling discovery was made, that the outlet sewers through Colvin, Maple and Saxton streets are not really of sufficient size to properly serve all the territory at present tributary to them, when the outlying districts are more fully developed, as in all probability they will be within the next decade.

It was this very important feature of the case that mainly gave rise to the request of the West Side Sewer Commissioners to the

Common Council that joint action be taken in the matter.

Careful calculations based upon the most approved and modern methods of sewer design have since been made and they demonstrate beyond all reasonable doubt the accuracy of the statement that the Saxton street outlet sewer system will not be sufficient to serve the whole territory now tributary to it, when the outlying districts are more fully developed. Further calculations were then made, to ascertain the full extent of territory that the present outlet sewer might be safely relied upon to serve, or in other words, how much of the territory at present tributary to these outlet sewers should be cut off, so that reasonable assurance could be given that the present sewers will amply serve the balance of the territory for all time to come.

It is not necessary that full details of these calculations be incorporated in this report, but as indicating in a general way how the results obtained were arrived at, I will state that, beginning with the outlet sewer at West avenue and Colvin streets, we find that the drainage from one hundred and ninety-one (191) acres will enter the sewer at that point. For this territory it is estimated that the rainfall from the farthest point will reach the sewer in twenty-three (23) minutes, that is to say, the whole area of one hundred and ninety-one (191) acres will be contributing to the flow into the sewer, if the storm lasts twenty-three (23) minutes. From an examination of the weather statistics of Rochester for many years past, it is found that an intensity, or rate of rainfall, of 1.63 inches per hour lasting twenty-three (23) minutes may be expected and should therefore be provided for. It is assumed that this one hundred and ninety-one (191) acres will eventually be developed and resemble the other built up resident portions of our city.

From such a class of territory, observation shows that about thirty-four per cent. of the storm water runs off into the sewers within the time of rainfall, the balance of the rainfall being taken up by absorption into the ground and evaporation, with the further explanation that the rate of rainfall in inches per hour, also represents the number of cubic feet of water per acre produced in one second of time, we would, under the above conditions, have a maximum flow of water into the sewer at West avenue and Colvin street of $101 \times 34 - 100 \times 1.63 =$ One hundred and six cubic feet per second. As a matter of fact, we find that the present sewer at this point is only proportioned to carry off sixty cubic feet per second. It therefore becomes evident that one of two things must be done, either the present sewer must be nearly doubled in capacity by reconstructing it, or so much of the one hundred and ninety-one (191) acres of land must be cut off so as to leave a balance of territory, the drainage from which will not overtax the capacity of the existing sewer, at West avenue and Colvin street.

It is thus found that if we cut off eighty-seven (87) acres of the one hundred and ninety-one (191) acres the present sewer will be ample to serve the balance of one hundred and four (104) acres for all time.

No engineering difficulties will be encountered in diverting the drainage of the eighty-seven (87) acres into the proposed West Side Sewer, for in reality all of this territory lies within the natural drainage basin of Deep Hollow creek.

Computations similar to the above indicate that of the seven hundred and fifty (750) acres served by the present Saxton street outlet sewers about two hundred and forty-one (241) acres should be cut off, and the drain-

age therefrom diverted to the West Side Sewer.

The location of the several tracts are shown on the accompanying map and briefly described, are as follows:

Eighty-seven acres lying adjacent to and south of Chili avenue, and east of the city line; eighteen acres adjacent to Maple street; sixty-one acres adjacent to Jay street and Bethlehem park and seventy-five acres adjacent to Lyell avenue.

It thus becomes evident that the West Side sewer can serve a triple purpose, if provision be made for such service now. Namely:

1. Drain such lands as are now unprovided for within the natural drainage basin of Deep Hollow Creek.

2. Furnish a free and ample outlet for many of the laterals within the city limits that are now practically useless because of light grades, and small depth below the surface of the ground.

3. Provide an outlet to drain such lands, the drainage from which, if not diverted from its present course will eventually so overtax the capacity of the Saxton street outlet sewer system, as to compel within the next decade, the expenditure of probably not less than two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) in its reconstruction.

The flow of storm water from the two hundred and forty-one (241) acres proposed to be diverted from the present Saxton street outlet sewer and discharged into the West Side Sewer would be about ten per cent. of the maximum volume of storm water for which the West Side Sewer should be proportioned to carry. Assuming the cost of the West Side Sewer to be five hundred thousand (\$500,000) dollars, then at least fifty thousand (\$50,000) dollars would be the amount that should be fairly chargeable to the territory to be benefited by the increased sewerage facilities afforded.

Therefore it is obvious that an expenditure of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) at the present time would accomplish all the results that could otherwise only be secured by the expenditure of, at least, two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) in the near future.

The location of the natural divide within the city limits between the water shed of Deep Hollow Creek and other drainage basins is shown on the accompanying map. No portion of this area of 362 acres was taxed under the first assessment.

All of the drainage of this territory, a portion of which is not yet seweraged, will without doubt eventually find an outlet through the West Side Sewer, which should therefore be constructed with this end in view.

In conclusion, your attention is particularly called to the general good that would result to the entire community, if the sewage of this section were restored to its original natural outlet and discharged into the river below the lower falls, rather than as at present unaturally emptied into the river in the heart of the city.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—I desire to call your attention to the Hemlock water supply for the city hall. I find it is not adequate for supplying the fixtures now being placed in the building. There is only a 3-4 tap and service for the entire plant. The old fixtures were supplied by the Holly system, which caused a great deal of trouble, the mud and sediment destroying the valves and clogging up the tank. I would recommend that a new two-inch service of galvanized iron be introduced in the building, in place of the old 3-4 inch, and the new service be extended to the different fixtures, with the proper stop cocks and connections for the same.

Also the conductor on the outside of the building should be connected with the sewer, and the conductor from the main porch be renewed, and trap placed on same. In changing the water closet room on the first floor, the stop sink was located in the cellar. The women who clean ask to have the sink located on the first floor under stairs, as it is very unhandy located in the cellar.

The expense of a new service will be two hundred ninety-three dollars (\$293). Connecting up two conductors seventy-eight (78) and changing the location of sink twenty-seven dollars (\$27). Total, \$398.

As the above work is very necessary, and should be completed as soon as possible, I hope your honorable body will give it an early and favorable consideration.

Gentlemen:—I deem it my duty to call your attention to that provision of the election laws which makes it obligatory upon the Common Council of this city to designate the

places in each election district in the city at which the meetings for the registry of voters and the elections shall be held.

The law provides that the registry places shall be designated on the first Tuesday of September, which will be the date for a regular meeting of this Council. There are certain provisions as to the size of rooms and other restrictions which it will be well for the members of your honorable body to bear in mind when selecting the registry places. I quote the following extract:

"Each room so designated shall be of reasonable size, sufficient to admit and comfortably accommodate at least twenty electors at a time outside the guard rails. No building or part of a building shall be so designated in any city, if within sixty days before such designation intoxicating liquors shall have been sold in such room, or a room adjoining thereto, with a door or other passageway between the two rooms."

And the City Engineer, under direction of this Council, having made and reported as an estimate of the expense thereof, the sum of \$65,000, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved, and the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all the following portion and part of the city which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for, and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Mt. Hope avenue, from South avenue to Elmwood avenue, including the frontage occupied by intersecting streets and also including the entire area of Mt. Hope cemetery.

Gentlemen:—Your Railroad Committee would report on matters which have recently occupied their attention as follows:

On July 23d this Council adopted an ordinance making it unlawful for any railroad company to run trains at grade crossings at a greater rate of speed than eight miles per hour unless such crossings are protected by gates.

The ordinance was to take effect August 15th. Prior to that time several of the railroad companies, through their local representatives, communicated to your committee their dissatisfaction with the ordinance and expressed a desire for a conference. Accordingly your committee held a meeting at which we were attended by representatives of two roads, the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad being the chief objector to the ordinance. The representatives of this company asserted that the erection of gates as required by the ordinance would entail a large expense and that the system would, at its best, afford inadequate protection at the most dangerous crossings.

In consideration of these facts and the expressed willingness of the New York Central's representatives to confer with the city with regard to University avenue and Maple streets for removal of the grade crossing nuisance at those points the committee has decided to recommend a suspension of the ordinance for a sufficient length of time to give the railroad company an opportunity to advance the improvements referred to.

Gentlemen: Your finance committee would respectfully report that we have had several conferences with the officers of the Myers Ballot Machine Company; that we believe the adoption of said machine would be for the best interest of the city of Rochester; that the saving to the city in the expense of holding elections would, in a short time, pay

the expense of the adoption of the same. And the great benefit to Rochester's manufacturing and laboring interests would more than counterbalance any expense attending their adoption.

By the adoption of this system of voting the number of election districts could be reduced about one-third, a saving of about \$180 for each district. The necessities under the present system of bi-partisan boards of election inspectors, ballot clerks, etc., tends to make elections very expensive, the aggregate for our city amounting to about \$16,000 for each election. Your committee would recommend the appointment of a special committee of three to confer further with the Myers company, to report terms, and that this board take an adjournment until Thursday afternoon of this week to receive the report of the special committee and to take action thereon.

Gentlemen:—The following is a copy of a letter which I have received from the Hemlock Lake commission:

"Rochester, N. Y., August 30, 1895.

"J. Y. McClintock, Esq., City Engineer:

"Dear Sir:—The Hemlock Lake commission finds themselves unable to proceed in the performance of their duties without a proper survey of all land within the purview of the act under which they were appointed—and therefore respectfully request that you, upon whom the law says they shall call for assistance, make such survey as may be necessary and have proper maps completed at the earliest possible date.

The maps and surveys of Hemlock lake which they require, will necessitate the employment of a surveying party for about one year, and will cost about \$7,000.

It will be impossible for me to do this with my existing force and, at the same time, properly attend to the ordinary work of this office. In order to determine the lines required by the commission with requisite accuracy, it will be necessary to cover with the survey and maps all of the territory included between the highways upon the top of the hills on each side of the lake, and will form an important portion of the topographical survey of the whole area from which water is collected for the use of the city of Rochester. Such a survey will be found to be absolutely necessary in the future, for a proper study of the question of preserving the existing condition of purity of the water supply, and ought to be made, even if it was not now needed by the Hemlock lake commission.

I have already detailed three men from this

office for nine days, to assist Mr. Skinner, who was detailed by Chief Engineer Kulshing to make a survey of one piece of property which the commission needed at once. We did this to save delay to them, but will be unable to go further unless proper provision for the continuance be made.

I submit the subject to your honorable body with the reminder that such a survey was suggested by your law committee on August 7, 1894, and printed on page 296 of the common council proceedings; and further that such survey might be advantageously made by the executive board as managers of the water works.

Gentlemen:—It has been the custom for me to order the necessary street railway tickets, for the use of this office, and the bills have been paid by the city.

I am informed that objection has been made in the Finance Committee to approving these bills without the expenditure being personally authorized by the Common Council. I therefore ask your honorable body to authorize the City Engineer to purchase the necessary railway tickets to transport the employees of this office, between the office and their work in all parts of the city.

For the year ending July 1, 1895, there were used by us 7,630 tickets, costing four and six-elevenths cents apiece, amounting to \$346.82.

This is a necessary expenditure for the reason that the men could not do the work required of them if they had to walk where the distances are so long.

I have a record kept of the number of tickets used by each man, and by which I can say they are not wasted. The number of tickets used in a month varied from 52 in February, when outside work is shut down, to 987 in June, when all work is in progress.

We, the undersigned, on behalf of the Davis voting machine, hereby request of the Common Council that before final action shall be taken upon the proposition to expend the sum of thirty thousand dollars in the purchase of Myers voting machines, a fair investigation be had of the merits of the Davis voting machine.

Claiming, as we do, the superiority of the Davis over the Myers machine, we respectfully suggest that it is for the interest of the city of Rochester and its voting population, to say nothing of its taxpayers, that for the thirty thousand dollars to be expended, the city should have the best machine obtainable.

If the Myers company sincerely claim their machine to be better than ours they cannot shrink from the test of an examination into the merits of both machines by your honorable body.

On our part we challenge such an investigation, and invite you not only to inspect our machine for yourselves, but to bring with you the best mechanical experts to be found in the country.

We believe that such an investigation would demonstrate that the Davis machine is superior to the Myers machine in every particular.

Unfortunately, for reasons well known to some at least of the stockholders of the Myers company, the bill which passed both branches of the last legislature legalizing the use of the Davis machine for election purposes, failed to receive the governor's signature, for which reason the Davis machine is not yet upon the market.

This situation has recently confronted the authorities of the city of Buffalo as it does those of the city of Rochester. A committee of the board of aldermen of the city of Buffalo visited Rochester, bringing with them mechanical experts with whose assistance they carefully examined the Davis machine as well as the Myers.

The result of that examination was a recommendation that the city of Buffalo wait for another year and until the Davis machine can be legalized before purchasing any voting machines for the city of Buffalo.

If it is an absolute necessity that the city of Rochester shall invest \$30,000 in voting machines this summer, then, of course, our request is useless; but if the city can afford to wait a year in the expectation of getting better results for the money to be invested, then we think our request should be granted.

By Ald. McMillan—

Resolved, That the city adopt and hereby determines to use the Myers automatic ballot machines at all elections to be held within the city, provided a suitable contract with the Myers American Ballot Machine Company for the purchase of its machines can be made and that the city purchase of said company seventy (70) Myers American ballot machines of the latest pattern upon the following terms:

Said company shall deliver said machines at such places as may hereafter be designated by said city on or before October 22, 1895. The city shall have the right to use said machines at all elections thereafter to be held within its limits authorized by law and in no other places and for no other purposes, except that in case of a voluntary abandonment of the use of said machines by said city or of any number thereof, said city may sell or dispose of the same as it deems proper. Said machines shall be delivered in perfect condition. Said company guarantees each of said machines to secure an honest count and a secret vote when operated according to law and also guarantees each of said machines to operate as required by law and to be suitable for any and all elections hereafter to be held in said city. Said company agrees to furnish with each machine complete instruction for its use in the proper conduct of elections and to supply without charge to said city sufficient competent men to superintend the erection of said machines for use at the election to be held on November 5th, 1895. Said company guarantees that if said machines are properly used and cared for they will remain in perfect condition for a period of ten (10) years, and during that time will operate as required by law, will secure an honest count and a secret vote when operated according to law and will be suitable for any and all elections in said city. Said company further agrees, that if during a period of ten years from the date of any contract made in pursuance of this resolution said company shall add improvements or become the owner of improvements to machines, of the kind above mentioned, said company agrees to apply such improvements to machines owned by the city on the request of the city without charge. Said city shall have the benefit of all improvements hereafter made or owned by said company to said machines without charge for royalty. If within four years from the date of any contract made in pursuance of this resolution it shall be unlawful for said city to use said machines at elections held in said city, said company agrees to refund to said city upon the return of said machines or any of them the sum paid for the same. In case the statutes authorizing the use of said machines shall be modified at any time during the ensuing four years so as to require changes in said machines, said company agrees to make such changes so as to make said machines conform in all respects to the law as modified without charge to said city. Said company agrees to furnish a bond of an approved surety company or of responsible individuals, freeholders of this state, indemnifying and saving harmless said city, its officers, servants and agents from any and all claims, damages, judgments, costs, expenses, suits, proceedings, decrees, made, incurred, brought or recovered for or on account of the use of said machines by said city, and the faithful performance of the contract made in accordance herewith. Said city agrees to pay for said machines as follows: \$7,875, on

December 2, 1895; \$8,583.75, on December 2, 1896; \$8,347.50, on December 2, 1897; \$8,111.25, on December 2, 1898. It is, however, agreed, that if in the judgment of the common council expressed on or before October 1, 1895, a fewer number than seventy machines will answer the requirements of the ensuing election, said city shall be obligated to purchase only such number as in the judgment of the common council may be sufficient, and at prices proportionate to the amounts above stated. Said company agrees that any additional machines that said city may desire for future elections may be purchased at the same prices herein stipulated. The sale to be of no effect unless said machines operate satisfactorily and unless the guarantees and covenants herein specified are fully performed by said company. Said company further agrees to lend to said city thirty machines of the same kind as those above specified for the use at said election to be held on November 5, 1895, without charge. This agreement is to bind the heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns of the respective parties.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Noticing the action of your honorable body on Thursday last in relation to the Myers voting machine, the idea came to me that you are very hasty in concluding to take the Myers machine without giving other machines a trial, as there are at least three others in the city, all claiming to be equal or superior to the Myers, and all gotten up by citizens of Rochester, and all equally entitled to be examined by you, and which, if of superior merit, should take the preference and be adopted by the city. There are many qualities to take into consideration, which should be combined, to render a machine desirable and acceptable.

First, and paramount. The action so as to give a true vote return, so there can be no question as to the result of an election.

Second. It should be so constructed that no repeating or twice-voting can be done.

Third. The machine should be durable, not liable to rust or breakage.

Fourth. Voting machines should be light to handle and move from place to place, as they must be at least twice a year, or twice at each election.

Fifth. So made that no one can possibly obstruct their action, and cause delay, or render an election void or to be re-held.

Sixth. The machine should be simple and cheap and easily understood, so that common mechanics can repair and put in order.

If all the before mentioned qualities are combined in any one of the machines, it is the one your honorable body should adopt, for the benefit of the voters and taxpayers of the city.

Would it not be good policy for you to postpone action in this matter to a time till the other machines may be examined by a commission of mechanical experts to be appointed by you as soon as the machines can be in readiness for such examination, not later than January 1st next, and all the qualities of each machine considered, as it will cost the city a large amount of money to equip itself with at least sixty or seventy machines. If your honorable body will allow me, I would name as such examiners, John Greenwood, William Gleason, Frank H. Clement, John Connell, of the Connell & Dengler Company, and Fred Erdle, five in all, and all manufac-

turers and taxpayers and mechanical experts, and that the machine they pronounce the best be adopted by the city.

If it should turn out that any of the said persons are personally interested in any voting machine, then some other suitable expert should be substituted.

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE BOARD FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

By the Clerk—

Rochester, N. Y., Sept. 15, 1895.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Having been delegated by your honorable body to attend a convention of the superintendents of poor, held at Ogdensburg, N. Y., also the congress of waif savers held at Detroit in August, I wish to submit

the sense of the conventions in relation to bettering the condition of the poor. The first problem which suggested itself was the care of children without homes or proper guardianship, which certainly is worthy of every consideration, as on the children depend the future welfare of society. A child taken from dissipated or immoral surroundings mean a great deal more than any of us have any idea of. For example, let a child remain in such surroundings and he will nine times out of ten, grow up and raise a family in exactly the same state. The conditions are such as to dishearten him and he finally calls on the public for assistance, which once done is the hardest rut in the world to get out of, while had he been taken at an early age and placed in a good and respectable family he and his family would be good and useful members of society. Too much cannot be said in relation to finding homes for those children as it seems to be the universal opinion of all connected with charitable work, that on them everything depends. There were a great number of delegates, in fact, the great majority of both conventions, were greatly opposed to placing children of any age in orphan asylums, except as stopping over places, or places to prepare them for their new homes, but under no circumstances to remain there permanently. There were numerous reasons given why they should be placed in families rather than in institutions. In the family there are persons of various ages and both sexes, who are daily coming in contact with new and business like ideas, which will in a very short time interest the child, and by the time he is thrown upon his own resources he will be fully able to maintain himself, while in the institutions the children have merely the same routine work, which gives them the idea that what they are told to do, or what is laid out for them to do, is all that is necessary. This has a tendency toward making them dependent and when the time arrives for them to leave the institutions, the training they have had in self reliance is not sufficient to enable them to properly care for themselves. Great care must be taken in finding homes for these children. In some cases a grand home will be found which, after the child has been placed in for two or three months, will turn out to be a misfit. The child should be taken out at once and placed elsewhere, for to carry on the work properly, it is necessary that the child should fit the home and the home the child. Another class of children who need some help are the newsboys and shoeblacks. As Col. R. S. Butler said, "All the American boy wants is a chance." In Detroit under Colonel Butler's supervision, is run a newsboy's association, carried on by private subscription, where all kinds of instruction are given during the day and evening. The gymnasium, of course, is the leading attraction. They also have two brass bands which give concerts at the parks nearly every evening, or whenever they are requested to. The instructions given is certainly a great benefit to them, and goes a great way toward changing their surroundings. A great deal of time is given to the idea of providing work for the men who, during the winter months, are thrown out of employment, and are in want. The majority of these men would suffer rather than allow their names to be placed on the poor book in the ordinary way, for relief. Their pride is satisfied, however, by being able to work for what they get.

It is a very difficult thing to sift the worthy from the unworthy poor. An investigation will show whether they are working or not, but it will not show whether they desire to

work, so that a labor test is a great benefit to both the worthy poor and the city, which I heartily endorse,

SAWYER STREET PLANK WALK.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That the City Engineer ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a plank walk on Sawyer street.

SIBLEY PLACE OPENING AND EXTENSION.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary and should be made, and we hereby judge that the public good requires the same to be done, viz.:

The opening and extension of Sibley place, from East avenue to Park avenue, and the land necessary to be taken therefor is described as follows:

Beginning at the southwest corner of Sibley place and East avenue; thence southerly along the west line of said Sibley place 792.0 feet to the south end of said Sibley place; thence on same straight line four feet to a point in the northerly line of lot of Lucy M. THOMPSON AVENUE GRADING AND WALKS.

On motion of Alderman Ward, the Common Council proceeded to hear allegations in re-

lation to the improvement described in the following ordinance, viz:

An ordinance to grade and construct cement walks on Thompson avenue from the east line of the J. B. Perkins sub-division of Thompson tract to Henry street and to lay a plank walk for 106 feet east of Henry street on the south side of Thompson avenue, and after hearing such allegations from all persons appearing,

Said company agrees to furnish with each machine complete instructions for its use in the proper conduct of elections and to supply without charge to said city sufficient competent men to superintend the erection of said machines for use at the election to be held on November 5, 1895. Said company guarantees that if said machines are properly used and cared for, they will remain in perfect condition for a period of ten (10) years, and during that time will operate as required by law, will secure an honest count, and a secret vote provided said machines are protected from unlawful interference, and will be suitable for any and all elections in said city. Said company further agrees, that if during a period of ten years from the date of any contract made in pursuance of this resolution said company shall add improvements or become the owner of improvements to machines, of the kind above mentioned, said company agrees to apply such improvements to machines owned by the city, on the request of the city, without charge. Said city shall have the benefit of all improvements hereafter made or owned by said company to said machines without charge for royalty. If, within four years from the date of any contract made in pursuance of this resolution, it shall become unlawful for said city to use said machines at elections held in said city, said city shall be relieved from the obligation to make any payments hereunder remaining unmaturred at the time such use shall become unlawful. In case the statutes authorizing the use of said machines shall be modified at any time during the ensuing four years so as to require changes in said machines, said company agrees to make such changes so as to make said machines conform in all respects to the law as modified, without charge

to said city. Said company agrees to furnish a bond in the penal sum of \$15,000, of an approved surety company or of responsible individuals, freeholders of this state, indemnifying and saving harmless said city, its officers, servants and agents from any and all claims, damages, judgments, costs, expenses, suits, proceedings, decrees, made, incurred, brought or recovered for or on account of the use of said machines by said city, and a bond in the same amount running for a period of ten years for the faithful performance of the contract made in accordance herewith. Said city agrees to pay for said machines as follows: \$7,875 on December 2, 1896; \$8,347.50 on December 2, 1897; \$8,111.25 on December 2, 1898. It is, however, agreed, that if in the judgment of the Common Council expressed on or before October 1, 1895, a fewer number than seventy machines will answer the requirements of the ensuing election, said city shall be obligated to purchase only such number as in the judgment of the Common Council may be sufficient, and at prices proportionate to the amounts above stated. Said company agrees that any additional machines that said city may desire for future elections may be purchased at the same prices herein stipulated. The sale to be of no effect unless said machines operate satisfactorily and unless the guarantees and covenants herein specified are fully performed by said company. Said company further agrees to lend to said city thirty machines, of the same kind as those above specified, for the use at said election to be held on November 5, 1895, without charge. This agreement is to bind the heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns of the respective parties.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Adams—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester :

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Support and Relief of the Poor would respectfully report, that they have had a conference with the managers of the City Hospital, with reference to the rates to be charged for poor patients, and would respectfully report the conclusions arrived at as the result of such conference as follows:

For several months past, owing to a disagreement between the hospital managers and your committee no patients have been sent to this institution by the poor department authorities. This has resulted in a serious inconvenience to the department as well as a serious loss to the institution. After listening to the arguments of the managers your committee has decided that a new schedule of rates should be adopted for the care of city patients at the hospitals and we therefore recommend that the following schedule of rates be adopted, to take effect October 1, 1895: For the first eight weeks, \$7 per week; for the succeeding eight weeks, \$5 per week; for the succeeding ten weeks, \$2.50 per week; for the remaining period of whatever duration, \$1.75 per week. Also an allowance of \$5 for every surgical operation and \$5 per week additional for contagious disease cases for the first four weeks of sickness.

In order that the city may be fully protected against any loss arising from a disposition on the part of the patients to remain longer than necessity requires we recommend that two physicians be detailed to visit the hospitals at least once every two months.

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Dewey—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your special committee on penal ordinances begs leave to submit the following report:

The collection of license fees imposed by the penal ordinances is considered by your committee to be a matter of importance. The amount of money collected from this source during past years has varied greatly, but, as will be seen, the total income the city can derive from this source is of consequence. Nearly all licenses issued under the penal ordinances expire on the succeeding July 1st. Since the first of July, 1895, a systematic attempt has been made to collect all licenses and to enforce the provisions of the said ordinances. As a result we are pleased to report that on this date all persons in the city of Rochester liable to pay licenses under the penal ordinances have so paid. This is the first time in the history of the city, we believe, that such a report could have been made. In the minutes of the regular meeting of the common council held June 17, 1890, (C. C. Proc. 1890-91, p. 144) we find a report of Mr. John Bower upon the affairs of the City Clerk's office made in accordance with resolution of common council passed at the regular meeting March 18, 1890. As to the penal ordinances relating to licenses, in his report, Mr. Bower says:

"In turning to the other duties imposed upon the clerk it would seem from certain facts I will proceed to narrate that these have not been performed in a manner required by the charter, nor in a manner to conserve the best interests of taxpayers. I allude here particularly to the non-collection of license fees imposed by penal ordinances. Indeed, this branch of the city's revenues, for the past few years, seems to have been left without supervision or care as to whether the ordinances were enforced or not. The City Clerk in answer to questions on this subject, explains or excuses the situation of affairs by charging it to defective ordinances or inefficient legislation or action on the part of the common council in relation thereto, etc. But wherever the fault may be whether it lies with one or more of the departments of the city government, it is evident that the city has suffered the loss of several thousand dollars by what now appears to be negligent disregard of duty, somewhere.

"The following schedule of license receipts for the years named, and for what purposes fees were paid, has been compiled from the clerk's license records, and speak more plainly than words, I am inclined to think, of the pertinency of the strictures above given:

As will be seen Mr. Bower's report covered sixteen classes. The ordinances relating to "milkmen," "hotels" and "undertakers" do not exist; "porters" and "baggage" are at present included with "cartmen," and "peddlers" with "hucksters." The fees from billiard and pool tables now go to the "police pension fund" by statute and are collected by the police department. The present ordinance relating to "stationary engineers" was not passed till January 27, 1891. Below we give a statement of the amounts collected during the current year, mainly since July 1, 1895. The report covers ten classes as against sixteen shown in the statement of Mr. Bower.

Besides the above, the city receives an income from the registration of bicycles and dogs required by the penal ordinances. Since January 1, 1895, there have been registered 6,265 bicycles and 200 transfers, netting \$2,212.75. Since the dog ordinance went into effect, September 1, 1894, there have been received \$3,545 in registration fees. Up to November 13, 1894, these fees were paid directly into the city treasury, since which date they have been turned over to the Humane Society under contract. The total amount received by the city from dog registration during the year is \$1,474. Adding the amount received from licensing bicycles and dogs to the total received from license fees in other classes, the entire amount collected under the penal ordinances, and paid into the city treasury, during the current year is as follows:

The total amount received from all sources in the last year shown in Mr. Bower's table is \$412 in sixteen classes, as against \$2,815 collected in ten similar classes during the current year, which is an increase of \$2,413. The total amount received from all sources during the entire seven years shown in Mr. Bower's table is \$6,492.50, as against \$6,501.75 collected from all sources during the current year, which is \$9.25 more collected during this one year than was collected during the entire seven years shown in the table.

At this time your committee desires to call attention to the penal ordinance relating to meat markets. The present license fee for the sale of fresh meats is \$1. The fee was formerly \$75, then was reduced to \$25, and afterwards to \$1. A majority of the dealers in fresh meats would be better satisfied to have the present license fee raised. The one dollar fee is neither a protection to the dealer nor a considerable source of income to the city. Some of the dealers ask that the fee be raised to \$100, some to \$50, and we believe a majority would be well satisfied with a \$25 fee. If the license were fixed at \$25 this class alone would bring into the city treasury from four to five thousand dollars per year. Your committee suggests that the income from this source might warrant the establishment of a public market and so solve a question long agitated.

We would further report that the penal ordinances have been revised and re-arranged by the Corporation Counsel and will be presented for adoption in the near future.

In closing this report, we feel it our pleasant duty heartily to commend the efficient and energetic manner that the penal ordinances have been enforced during the current year. The law department, the city clerk and the police department have worked in unison. The policy of the strict enforcement of the penal ordinances is that of Mr. A. J. Rodenbeck, the present Corporation Counsel, and the result of such enforcement reflects credit upon all the departments co-operating.

Gentlemen:—Permit me to call attention to the fact that our streets are cumbered for many hours of the night, unnecessarily, as it seems to me, by market gardeners who arrive in the city and take positions as early as one o'clock in the morning, in order that they may get desirable locations at which to sell their products. I can see no good reason why the slumbers of our citizens should be disturbed by the wagons and horses of those gardeners at such unreasonable hours. It seems to me wise to avoid this nuisance by providing an amendment to the ordinance relating to hucksters, in which the hours of marketing should be designated. I would suggest that the special committee on penal ordinances be directed to frame an amendment limiting the market hours from 5 o'clock in the morning until nine o'clock in the evening, or as the committee may deem just and reasonable, and prohibiting wagons standing at the curbs during all other hours.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Rochester, N. Y., October 15, 1895.

Gentlemen:—In the matter of the petition of Herman Lieberson for permission to redeem his premises, known as lot No. 14, on the west side of Zimmar street, eighteenth ward, from the sale of general city taxes and in the matter of the petition of the St. Stanislaus church society, to redeem their parsonage property from the sale of general city taxes for the year 1892, we find that both petitioners are entitled to redeem their premises from such sales upon the payment of the face of said taxes at the times of sale, with 6 per cent. interest and expenses.

In the matter of the petition of M. L. Lord for refund of moneys paid by him upon purchase of premises on St. Paul street, we

find that Dr. Lord purchased the premises with full knowledge of the fact that the same had been previously sold to other persons and the city of Rochester, and that knowing the condition of premises and the liens thereon, he cannot now equitably ask for relief from the city. We therefore recommend that his petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of F. S. Macomber for cancellation of personal property assessment for year 1895, against the estate of F. A. Macomber, deceased, we find that there was a judicial settlement of the estate of F. A. Macomber, prior to the first day of January, 1895, and a distribution of such estate, and that consequently the assessment against the personal property of said estate was erroneous. We therefore recommend that the petition be granted.

In the matter of the petition of D. B. Cook for exemption of property on Page street from assessment upon the ground that the same are exempt by reason of the fact that the petitioner is a clergyman, we find that the premises are not occupied by Mr. Cook, and under the statutes he is not entitled to the exemption allowed by law to clergymen. We therefore recommend that the petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of John Cunningham for a refund of water rates erroneously charged to him for the premises, No. 52 White street, by reason of the fact that said premises were destroyed by fire in 1892, we find that no water has been used by him on said premises and the Executive Board reports that the allegations in the petition are true and that petitioner is entitled to the relief demanded, we therefore recommend that the petition be granted.

In the matter of the petition of M. L. Julian for correction of an assessment against her premises in the fifth ward, east side of Martin street, we find that said premises have been assessed for several years for the sum of \$2,100, and that said sum is erroneous and inequitable, that said premises are not worth \$2,100, and are worth not to exceed \$1,800. We therefore recommend that Mrs. Julian be allowed a rebate upon the assessment of her premises of \$9.36, which will equal the amount erroneously assessed to her for the past two years.

In the matter of the petition of the trustees of the First Presbyterian Church to cancel an assessment against lot 142 on the west side of Plymouth avenue, upon which there formerly stood a parsonage connected with said church, but which parsonage was removed during the summer of 1895, and said lot now being used by said church as a part of the lot connected with said church, upon the report of the assessors, we recommend that the tax against said lot 142 for the year 1895 be cancelled and charged to erroneous assessments.

In the matter of the petition of John Grasperger for cancellation of an assessment against his premises by reason of the fact that the same is assessed too high, we recommend upon the report of the assessors that said petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Avery H. Gillette and another for cancellation of an assessment against the estate of George K. DeLaney by reason of the fact that the property mentioned in said petition being personal property, was not now located in the city of Rochester, we find from the face of the petition that such personal property was located in the city of Rochester at the time the assessment was levied and at the time the assessment rolls were placed in the

hands of the treasurer and consequently the petitioners are not entitled to the relief sought. We therefore recommend that the petition be denied.

Dear Sir:—At a regular meeting of the Board of Education of this city, held October 7th, inst., the following report was adopted.

Com. Otis, chairman of the Finance Committee, submitted the following:

To the Board of Education :

Gentlemen—The enforcement of the census act, as required by the state department of public instruction, will require an outlay of money not contemplated by your board. In the annual estimate for this year's expenses no provision was made for such outlays, as the said act had not then become a law. The short time in which the census must be taken (fifteen days) will require a larger force of enumerators than would otherwise be needed. It must be a house to house canvass and by wards, in order to secure information called for.

In the canvass, made by our five attendance officers, beginning January 8th and ending May 7th last, 32,000 houses, stores and factories were visited. The entire city was covered. It will thus be seen that the limited time set apart for the census work will require at least two enumerators in every ward. According to our statistics furnished the bureau of education last year there were 53,000 people between 5 and 21 years of age in the city. All persons between 4 and 16 must be enrolled, with the particulars required, and also those between 12 and 21 who are unable to read or write. We estimate that about 40,000 names will be enrolled. This will require 40 books, which must be purchased of the department at Albany by Superintendent Noyes at 30 cents each. In addition to this the services of two enumerators in

each ward for fifteen days' work, at \$3 per day, as the act requires, will cost about \$1,800. One clerk must be employed to tabulate the returns as soon as the work is well under way and the books filled with statistics are turned in. We therefore recommend that this board furnish the Common Council a copy of the said act, of the communication from the state superintendent and a copy of this report, with the request that said Common Council appropriate \$1,800 as a special fund to enforce the provisions of said act.

The money cannot be paid to enumerators until the certificate is received from the state superintendent that such census has been satisfactorily taken.

We further recommend that in pursuance of the requirements of the state superintendent that this board does now nominate forty enumerators (each commissioner nominating two in each ward), whose names shall be forwarded for approval to the state superintendent.

The West End Improvement Association, Committee on Public Nuisance report, September 3, 1895, by W. J. McPherson.

Gentlemen:—Your committee on nuisances beg leave to report that it has examined the stone quarry bounded on the south by Frost avenue and on the west by Summer street, and known as Pike's stone quarry. Upon examination we found that quarry was an excavation of several acres in extent and bounded on the south by Frost avenue and on the west by Summer street and from fifteen to twenty or more feet in depth.

We found blind sewers (at any rate we were informed that they were blind sewers) discharging their filth into the open quarry at several points, and we experienced the

fact that the stench arising from the quarry, we believe, caused by the deposits therein, was of a nauseating and sickening character—a stench of stinks. We believe that such condition has not been unknown to the proprietor or proprietors of said quarry, for we found deposits of lime at all the worst places in the quarry, and undoubtedly placed there to neutralize the odor and bad effects of the filth in said quarry.

We were, in our examination, informed of two cases of typhoid fever existing on the borders of the quarry, and that lately a young man who had been working in said quarry died of that disease. We are informed, and from such inspection believe, that a blind sewer with rough and half-open cover runs under several houses and discharges its foul and stinking contents into the northwest corner of said quarry. Notwithstanding the lime that had been deposited in that quarter of the quarry and the very heavy rain that preceded our examination of the quarry, we found a most disgusting smell there. The northeast part of the quarry was in a similar condition. We believe that the matter referred to and other matters connected with said quarry are a standing nuisance, and a breeder of disease.

That such a condition of affairs has been allowed to exist and exists on the border of the heart of the populous part of this city, is of itself condemnatory of the management of the Health Department of this city; a great wrong upon the rights of the residents of that part of the city, and injurious to the comfort and health of such residents, and a disgrace to the city of Rochester. Small vaults, family vaults and covered vaults and sinks have received great attention in this beautiful city, and all or nearly all of questionable offence, while this great sinkhole and pond of fever breeding filth and pouring out over a broad area its vile poisons, has received but little, if any, attention by the paid servants of the people whose business it is to look for and remove such nuisances. Your committee respectfully asks that you give forcible attention to the subject of this report and work for the removal of the evil reported by your committee. Your committee calls your respectful attention to the penal ordinances of this city in relation to quarries and requests that you take such action in aid of removing such nuisance that will cause to be applied and rigidly enforced, such ordinances.

The so-called quarry is a hole in the earth that has been made and exists in violation of the laws governing this city, and it will require an expenditure of not far from \$200,000 to fill such hole, probably on the part of this city and at the expense of its taxpayers; when a compliance with or due enforcement of the ordinances applicable to such matters would have avoided the nuisance on the one hand, and on the other any indirect expense to the city. We deem it almost needless to remind you that justice and duty alike demand, in the interest of and for a suffering and helpless part of the population of our city, as much from you and the government of this city. All of which is respectfully submitted.

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE BOARD FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

Rochester, N. Y., Oct. 29, 1895.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester :

Gentlemen:—Report has been made to me this afternoon at four o'clock, by the attending physician of the Deaf Mute Institute, of a cesspool in the river near that place, caused by the East Side Sewer emptying into the river below that point, and forming an eddy. The contents of the cesspool are very offensive, and Mr. Westervelt, the superintendent in charge, is very much exercised over the matter, as there are several cases of scarlet fever, and one of diphtheria in the institution, and he is fearful that an epidemic will result, unless something is done at once. I have not had an opportunity to examine the condition, but the physician reports that a channel can be cut in the river, and the water diverted from its present course through the cesspool, and thus abate the nuisance. I send you this communication hoping that you will take steps at once to remedy the evil.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen:—I beg leave to call your attention to the following statement:

A final ordinance has been passed for the paving of Mt. Hope avenue. Before that is done it will be necessary to put the sewer in better shape between Clarissa street and South avenue. The plan upon which the East Side trunk sewer has been built provides for or necessitates a storm overflow at Gregory street or in that neighborhood. If that overflow sewer be built it will not be necessary to rebuild the existing sewer in Mt. Hope avenue, but if it is not built it will be necessary to rebuild that sewer and make it very much larger than it now is.

If the storm overflow is not built in the neighborhood of Gregory street and the sewer in Mt. Hope avenue is made large enough to bring down the storm water to the East Side trunk sewer, then it will happen in a few years that water will occasionally set back into cellars in the lower part of the Griffith street territory and South avenue, as well as in the lower end of Mt. Hope avenue.

It is highly desirable that this matter be settled so as to avoid delay in the improvement of Mt. Hope avenue and I recommend that a committee be instructed to confer with the East Side sewer commission, city assessors, corporation counsel and chief engineer of the water works, who planned the East Side trunk sewer, and to present a plan for improving the sewer in Mt. Hope avenue and describing the territory which should be assessed for it.

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee begs leave to report upon the various subjects heretofore referred to it, as follows:

In the matter of the contract for the Myers ballot machine, the operation of which was suspended previous to election, by reason of the fact that the company was unable to furnish the necessary number of machines, your committee has decided to report the accompanying resolution, with favorable recommendations.

In the matter of the care of the small city parks, and the trimming of trees upon the city's streets, your committee recommends the importance of this work, and the prudent management of the fund by the committee of the Park Board having its expenditure under its control, and has decided to recommend a further appropriation to complete the necessary work, amounting to \$600.

Your committee also recommends that there be allowed to the Board of Education the sum of \$1,800, with which to meet the expenses incurred by that board in securing a census of the children of school age residing within the city. This work was not contemplated at the time the appropriations for the School Board were granted, and as the board was compelled by law to provide for the taking of such a census, your committee has deemed it but proper that the School Board should be reimbursed the sum which that board was forced to expend.

for use at the election held in November, 1895, by reason of insufficient time for manufacture subsequent to the execution of said contract, and having given notice to that effect to the city on October 22, 1895, in compliance with the provisions of said contract, now, therefore,

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE BOARD FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen—In accordance with your resolution I have had a survey and study made of the lines of Cortland street.

The city survey made by John C. Ryan fixed the width of said street at thirty-three feet, but the accompanying report of Charles L. Raymond shows that there are strong reasons for believing that the street is only 27 feet wide from Monroe avenue to the angle in Cortland street.

I do not see how the matter can be definitely determined except by the courts.

I believe it to be of considerable importance to all of the property on Cortland street and vicinity, that the width be made thirty-three feet, and that it should be done at once before a block which it is proposed to build on the northwest corner of Monroe avenue and Cortland street be completed. Therefore I recommend the passage of an ordinance for making Cortland street thirty-three feet wide, and assessing the cost thereof, if any, upon the whole length of Cortland street.

Dear Sir—I submit the following report in relation to the width of Cortland (Lancaster) street at Monroe avenue.

I have made a careful search of the old village records in the city clerk's office, maps and deeds in the county clerk's office, and also made a survey and map of the territory embraced by Monroe avenue, South Clinton Court and Chestnut streets, showing lot lines and some of the buildings.

In the village records, Vol. 1, page 156, at a meeting of trustees, May 29, 1827, D. Tinker and others presented a petition to open a street. June 12, 1827, the street commissioner reported in favor of their petition to lay out a street 33 feet in width from Main street to the State road (see sheet 1).

February 5, 1828, the street lines were altered and laid out, making the angle on the line of lot No. 28, Johnson and Seymour tract, thence from this point to intersect the State road at right angles, and to be 27 feet in width. see sheet 3).

On page 405 book of records "A", city of Rochester, at a meeting September 13, 1836, of the Common Council, they ordained and determined that Lancaster street be curved near its junction with Monroe street, also a resolution that the city superintendent negotiate with Price and McBride in relation to taking their lands. At a meeting September 27, 1836, the city superintendent made a report that he could not agree with the owners of land in Lancaster street which was accepted.

Council proceedings of 1868, page 44—Resolution to straighten Lancaster street from Court street to Monroe avenue. Estimate of city surveyor, \$10,000. Lost (see sheets 5 and 6).

I also found the following deeds bearing directly on the point in question:

1. Clark W. Stanton to Thomas Emerson, liber 23, page 39. October 13, 1831.

Being part of lot No. 23, bounded south by the state road, on the east and north by Lancaster street, on the west by lands owned by Messrs. Handy and Baker (see sheet 9) being about 17 feet in front on the said State road (sheet 12).

2. Thomas Emerson to Thomas C. Tate, liber 29, page 94. May 8, 1834.

Same as above, see sheet 15.

3. Thomas C. Tate to Joseph Sedgebeer, liber 99, page 423. October 37, 1851.

Same as above, see sheet 19.

4. Daniel Wood to Joseph Sedgebeer, liber 73, page 210. January 13, 1847.

Being the same as sheet 9. See above No. 1. See sheet 18.

5. Joseph Sedgebeer to Charles Ross, liber 99, page 352. October 3, 1851.

All of above 3 and 4. See sheet 19.

6. Charles Ross to James Kane, liber 123, page 432. May 1, 1854.

Being the west part of the above 5 and bounded on the east by a line commencing at a point in the north boundary line of Monroe street and situate 2 inches west of south-west brick corner foundation wall of the wood dwelling on the northwest corner of Lancaster street and Monroe street, etc. (see sheet 20.)

7. Charles Ross to Joseph Sedgebeer, liber 127, page 89. June 22, 1855.

Being the east part of the above 5, bounded on the south by Monroe street, on the east and north by Lancaster street, west by lands owned by James Kane. See sheet 19.

8. Joseph Sedgebeer to James Hunter, liber 212, page 340. July 3, 1867.

Being the same as No. 7. See sheet 19.

I find nothing in the records that show Cortland street to be more than 27 feet in width from Monroe avenue north to the angle, except the fact that the lot on the northwest corner of Monroe avenue and Cortland street was deeded in 1831, also in 1834 and 1851 as having a frontage of only 17 feet. If the building now standing on that corner was erected prior to 1851, and Lancaster street only 27 feet in width, the west line of this lot would strike about 6 feet into the west part of the house, which does not look reasonable.

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE BOARD FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS OF THE CORPORATION AND THEIR REFERENCE.

Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 26, 1895.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—In accordance with your resolution adopted on July 9, 1895, I beg leave to present the following plan for sewerage of Field street and that portion of the city east of Field street and south of the Erie canal.

The area to be considered comprises about 202 acres, a small part of which is outside of the existing city lines, including a tier of lots on the east side of Culver street and a portion of the northerly slope of Pinnacle hill.

I have followed the process, devised by Mr. Emil Kuichling for determining the necessary size of sewers, and which he applied to the designing of the East Side Trunk Sewer, and have assumed that the territory will be developed so as to have a population of twenty-five persons per acre and to have twenty-five per cent. of the surface, excluding a

part of the sandy slope of Pinnacle hill, fully impervious, and have assumed that the length of time necessary for the storm water to reach the outlet from the most distant part of the area will be nineteen minutes, and that the heaviest rainfall which may be expected to continue for that length of time is at the rate of two and seventy-eight hundredths inches in one hour.

Mr. Kuichling in designing the Trunk Sewer planned to admit the water from this territory at Culver street, but on account of the greater cost of crossing the canal along Culver street, and of the much greater length of large size sewer which would be made necessary by crossing it at that point I have concluded to enter it into the Trunk Sewer at a point about 1,400 feet above Culver street.

The propriety of doing this may be questioned, although the ill effect from it will not be noticeable for many years and will then probably be limited to putting this portion of the Trunk Sewer under pressure and surcharging it at times, less than one foot, and for a length not exceeding one thousand feet.

The sewers which I recommend are as follows:

First.—Beginning in Field street at the city line, thence northerly along Field street, being 12-inches in diameter to Cornelia street, 15 inches in diameter to Newport park, 18 inches in diameter to Henrietta avenue, 24 inches in diameter to Monroe avenue, and 27 inches in diameter along Monroe avenue to Laburnum crescent, thence 36 inches in diameter through Laburnum crescent to Keller street and through Keller street and across lots to Bates street, 54 inches in diameter along Bates street to Hinsdale street; thence northeasterly across the Erie canal and across lots with a diameter of 66 inches to the East Side Trunk Sewer. The whole length of said sewer being about 5,300 feet.

Second.—Beginning at the center of Monroe avenue and South Culver street, thence northerly along Culver street about 1,150 feet, beginning with diameter of 15 inches and increasing to 20 inches; thence northwesterly across lots with a diameter of 27 inches to the northerly end of Werner park, and with a diameter of 30 inches from there to Klink street across lots; thence through Hinsdale street with a diameter of 34 inches to Avondale street and 36 inches in diameter to the first described sewer. The whole length of said sewer being about 2,450 feet.

Third.—Beginning on the south side of Monroe avenue in the center of Rosedale avenue, thence northerly with a diameter of 40 inches through Bates street, about 450 feet to the sewer first described.

If it is desired to build any of this system during the following year, it will be necessary to hasten action so as to secure the necessary right of way and build the section across the canal before navigation opens next spring; therefore I submit for your consideration here-with a first ordinance for the Outlet Section across the canal.

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The city engineer states that some part of the additional expense was incurred on account of extra concrete under railroad tracks, the cost of which was \$750.00, and \$166.99 expended for cut stones along the street railway tracks.

It may be stated also that six inches of concrete was laid in the roadway instead of four inches as originally specified, with the like understanding that the cost would come within the estimate.

In the construction of the Lake avenue walks the City Engineer states that the excess in great part grew out of the constructions of the driveways to Seneca Park, which cost \$530.70: but the difference between the contract price and the estimate left \$1,264.50 for this extra work, inspection, etc. This amount was expended and \$736.34 additional above the estimate to complete the improvement.

The City Engineer suggests to the Executive Board that this excess should be paid from the Contingent Fund as an equitable matter, and the Executive Board respectfully refers the City Engineer's suggestion to your honorable body.

No communication has been received from the City Engineer respecting Driving Park avenue cement walks, but as this account must be closed, it is referred to your honorable body as one of the deficiency improvements.

There was a margin of \$1,185.30 between the estimate and contract price in this improvement, leaving ample scope for incidental or necessary expenses. This margin was exhausted with \$155.76 above the estimate.

The explanation of the City Engineer is that he authorized the construction of stone cross walks instead of oak lumber cross walks upon which bids were received; and this change of material from what was contemplated in the specifications and bidding sheet was the principle cause of the excessive expenditure.

Section 172 of the city charter, as you are aware, says, "no contract shall be let for any improvement at a greater price than the estimate thereof," and the charter also makes provision for the passage of a supplementary ordinance when the expenditure, for some unforseen cause, exceeds the estimate of the City Engineer.

Therefore, any expenditure beyond the estimate is in violation of the spirit of this provision. It may be further stated that the price at which a contract is let is supposed to be approximately the amount which will be collected in the assessment for the improvement; and, when that amount runs into a thousand or two thousand dollars beyond the sum as published as the contract price, the property owners demand of the Executive Board a satisfactory explanation of the additional cost of the work.

The expense of any improvement should approximate the price for which it is proposed to do the work; and the only apparent reason why the above named improvements did not cost in the neighborhood of the contract price or something below the estimate, is that a large number of the items of work were added after the contract was let, and alterations and additions were made which were not contemplated in the specifications and on which no prices were taken in receiving the proposals for the improvement.

With this explanation of the above deficiencies the Board submits the matter for your consideration, with the statement that no return of the cost of any improvement has been made to the Treasurer for one penny in excess of the estimate of the cost of such improvements as made by the City Engineer, as it believes such act would be irregular, if not illegal.

All of the territory included within the following described lines: Beginning in the center of Field street, at the city line; thence northerly along said Field street, including one tier of lots on the west side thereof, and along said street extended to the northerly boundary of the Erie canal lands; thence northeasterly along said north line of said canal lands to the east line of the city of Rochester; thence northerly and westerly along said city line to the place of beginning.

Adopted.

TYLER STREET WIDENING.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary, should be made, and we hereby judge that the public good requires the same to be done, viz.:

The opening and widening of Tyler street, and the lands necessary to be taken therefor is described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the north line of Tyler street with the west line of subdivision lot No. 17, of the Davis tract; thence southerly along the west line of said lot 25 feet to the center of Tyler street; thence easterly along the center of Tyler street 80 feet to the west line of lands now owned or supposed to be owned by E. YORK STREET ASPHALT PAVEMENT.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That the City Engineer ascertain and report to this Council the expense of improving York street.

The Engineer submitted as such estimate, \$21,500.

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of York street, from West avenue to Maple street.

ARNETT AVENUE MACADAM PAVEMENT.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That the City Engineer ascertain and report to this Council the expense of constructing a macadam pavement on Arnett avenue.

The Engineer submitted as such estimate, \$5,350.

CHILD STREET ASPHALT PAVEMENT.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That the City Engineer ascertain and report to this Council the expense of improving Child street.

The Engineer submitted as such estimate, \$30,000.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary and should be made, viz.:

The improvement of Child street, from Thomas park to Jay street, by the construction of a Pitch Lake Trinidad or Sicilian and German Rock sheet asphalt pavement therein, except where Child street crosses already constructed asphalt pavements, and also at the railroad crossings. Resolved, further, that the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all of the following portion and part of the city, which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Child street, from Thomas park to Jay street.

Adopted.

DARTMOUTH STREET EXTENSION.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary and should be made, and we hereby judge that the public good requires the same to be done, viz.:

The extension of Dartmouth street, from Thayer street to Park avenue, formerly known as Crescent avenue, the west line being described as follows:

Beginning at the southeast corner of lot No. 7 of the White, Gibbs and Thayer subdivision of town lot No. 51, Brighton, now in the city of Rochester, N. Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee begs leave to make the following report upon the various matters heretofore referred to it.

In relation to the communication of the executive board, in reference to the excess in the cost of the various improvements authorized under final ordinances, your committee has carefully considered the matter and has reached the conclusion that supplemental ordinances should be passed for the purpose of collecting the excess in the cost upon these various improvements, but that there should be deducted from these various amounts the cost of repairing water mains, wherever such items appear, and that the excess to be col-

lected should not include such items for the repair of water works. A resolution is submitted directing the corporation counsel and city engineer to prepare such ordinances and submit them at an early date, which resolution your committee recommends be adopted.

Your committee would further recommend that the sum of \$1,500 be transferred from the poor fund to the fund for the care and relief of indigent veterans, known as the G. A. R. relief fund.

Your committee further recommends that the note or notes of the city be issued for the sum of \$182,570 for the payment of interest on the public debt, and for the payment of bonds, as recommended in the tax levy, falling due on the 1st day of January. These amounts are represented by taxes levied, but uncollected.

Your committee has decided to approve of the request of the park commissioners for the purpose of additional lands for Genesee Valley park, for the purpose of protecting the park approaches, and would recommend that the resolution carrying into effect such determination be passed by your honorable body.

Gentlemen:—Your City Property Committee would report on matters that have been considered by it as follows:

The elevator recently placed in the building is ready for operation and we recommend the employment of B. L. Gibb as elevator conductor at a salary of \$40 per month from date.

Your committee has given consideration to the re-arrangement of the offices in the city hall building. Nearly every department and official in the building has complained of insufficient room. As is well known, several departments are now provided with quarters in rented offices outside of the building. Your committee has determined upon a plan that will not only provide more room for the departments now occupying the hall but will make it possible to put all the departments for which offices are now rented back into the city hall and thereby effect a saving to the city of several thousand dollars annually in rents.

Plans for re-arranging the offices were prepared by the city engineer, and heads of departments were consulted by the committee. As a result of this investigation and conference it became apparent that the only feasible plan for providing adequate room for all departments now in the building and those outside as well involved the utilization of the large hall on the fourth floor for office purposes. It was demonstrated to the satisfaction of the committee that if the large hall were divided into offices there would be ample room in the building to accommodate all the departments now located there, as well as those of the corporation counsel, water works engineer, park commission, plumbing board, excise board, and East Side trunk sewer commission.

Your committee would therefore recommend that Architect Charles F. Crandall be employed to revise the plans and specifications

prepared three years ago by him for the re-arrangement of the offices and the division of the large hall.

Gentlemen:—Your Assessment Committee beg leave to report as follows:

In the matter of the petition of Elizabeth C. and William T. Bacon for cancellation of a certain assessment against lots 4, 5, 7, 15, 16 and 17 in the old 5th ward in the city of Rochester, your committee are unable to recommend that the assessment be cancelled but feel that it would be but just to Mr. and Mrs. Bacon to be allowed to redeem these premises from the sale of the same for such assessment with 6 per cent. interest and fees. We therefore make such recommendation.

By Ald. Calihan—

Gentlemen:—As directed by resolution of your honorable body your City Property Committee employed Architect Charles F. Crandall to revise plans for the re-arrangement of offices in the city hall building and the utilization of the large hall on the fourth floor, prepared by him three years ago. The plans, as revised, provide for the following arrangement of offices:

First floor—Mayor's office to remain as at present, also the Mayor's public audience room. The City Treasurer will remove to the rooms formerly occupied by the Police Department, occupying the entire east side of the first floor. The City Treasurer will have his private office in the Police Court Judge's former chamber. The search department will occupy the old Police Court

room proper. In the old Police Headquarters, the partitions have been taken out and here will be the City Treasury proper. A counter similar to that in a bank will enclose the southwest part of the room, leaving the remainder for a lobby. The Health Department will occupy the rooms vacated by the City Treasury, with the exception that the Fire Marshall will occupy an office in the east end of the room. In the West end of the Health Department office there will be a laboratory for the use of Prof. Dodge, City Bacteriologist.

Second floor—In the southwest corner of this floor will be an office for the Water Department and Registrar. In this office there will be a lobby for the waiting public, also three private offices through which a connection is formed with the Executive Board office. The Executive Board members will have the benefit at times of one or two of the private offices. The Executive Board will retain the offices it has at present. Connected with the Executive Board on the east and in the room now occupied by the Health Department, the Street Department will be located. The West Side Sewer Commissioners will occupy the rooms now used by the City Engineer and assistants. The department will be divided into three rooms, one of which will be occupied by the Commissioners as a meeting room. The Assessors will occupy their present office for clerical work, having a private office on the north end of the room. The Assessors themselves will occupy the room to be vacated by the Street Department.

Third floor—The Common Council Chamber will be undisturbed, except that the temporary partition on the south side will be taken out. There will be three committee rooms on the same floor, the old rooms of the Police Matron and the former room of the Police Commissioners to be made over for this purpose. The City Clerk will occupy pleasant quarters in the rooms to be vacated by the Water Works Construction Department. This will give the Clerk two large rooms and bring him in close touch with the Council Chamber. There will also be a private office for the City Clerk. The Municipal Court will have its present office and the one next west created by the removal of the west stairway. There will also be a private chamber for the Municipal Court Judges. By this arrangement the west end of the lobby will be closed the same as is the east end.

Fourth floor—The City Law Department will occupy the west end of this floor. In the center there will be a good sized room for the City Law Library. On the southwest corner will be the Coporation Counsel's private office, with the office of the First Assistant in a similar room on the northwest corner. The Second Assistant will have a room back of the First Assistant. There will be a lobby east of the entrance to the Library. There will be a room for the several stenographers on the south side, also a room for the investigating clerk and messenger. There will be a stairway cut on the south side of the building to correspond with the stairways on the floor below. The elevator will be continued to the fifth floor and provision has been made for a second elevator if the time ever comes when a second car is needed. East of the stairway there will be toilet rooms for men and women. Occupying the southeast corner of this floor will be the Excise Board, with a private office. The hall on the east end of this floor will be closed in order to make room for the Examining Board of Plumbers. The northeast room will be used by the Water Works Recording Department; the three

other rooms to the west on the north of the building will be occupied respectively by the draughting department, the Assistant Engineer of the Water Works Department and the Chief Engineer of the Water Works Department.

Fifth floor—On this floor the Park Board will have pleasant quarters in the west end. There will be a meeting room for the Commissioners. In the room facing south and west will be the Secretary's office; there will be an entrance room into the Secretary's office from the hall and also a lobby for visitors. The daughting room will be in the northwest corner. To the east of this room the East Side Trunk Sewer Commission will have its office. The draughting room of the Park Commission will be used by the Sewer Commission. The City Auditor will have a commodious office east of the Sewer Commission's room. The Auditor will also have a private office. The City Engineer and assistants will have the entire east end of the fifth floor. On the north side and next to the office of the City Auditor will be a private office for the City Engineer. Two other private offices connect with this room. The clerical room is east and faces north. Occupying a large room on the northeast corner will be the draughting room, and another room just south will be used for the same purpose. A recording room will occupy the southeast corner room. Just west of the recording room will be a good sized room for the posting of bulletins and maps and specifications for the benefit of contractors. Still farther south will be two rooms, one for the blue print department, and one for a dark room. Lockers will be just outside the dark room.

The following communication from Mr. Crandall is herewith submitted as a part of this report:

"Rochester, Dec. 23, 1895.

"M. J. Calihan, Esq., Chairman City Property Committee:

"Dear Sir:—I herewith submit my plans and estimate for the alteration of the City Hall, for your consideration.

"The general arrangement of the rooms, and the work to be done, are shown on the drawings; the character of which will conform to the present work except that the wood finish in fourth and fifth stories will be constructed of oak, and the ceilings of the rooms in the fifth story will be pressed steel. As shown on the plans it is intended to extend the present main staircase to the top story and discard the present west one.

"The work included in this estimate, is for the mason and carpenter work, steel and cast iron construction, all painting, together with the cleaning of all walls and ceilings and kalsomining same; all necessary repairs to the gutters on roofs, and the sub-gravel roof in attic, all marble work, steam heating and plumbing, and the extension of the elevator to the top story.

"My approximate estimate for this work is \$43,260. While these figures are conservative, still in all repair work contingencies often arise which increase the estimated cost, and I would advise an appropriation of \$45,000 to cover this work. I would further add that this estimate covers more work than was contemplated in that made by me in 1893. In that estimate we only completed one-half of the floor area of fifth story and the total number of rooms were much less than those embraced in this plan.

Your committee has examined the plans and are unanimously of the opinion that they provide for the best arrangement of offices that could be devised. We therefore recommend

their adoption and ask that the committee, through its chairman, be authorized to advertise for bids on the proposed work under the direction of the architect.

FOR HIGHLAND PARK.

Smith Property.

All that tract of land lying at the corner of South avenue and Alpine street and adjoining Highland park, consisting of about nine acres of land and known as the Smith property, for which the Highland Park Committee was authorized to offer \$13,500.

ANNUAL REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

To the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee begs me to submit the following as its annual report:

The city's financial affairs have been carefully administered during the year now drawing to a close by the City Treasurer and his reliable and trustworthy assistants. All obligations of interest have been met at maturity, and the city's financial matters have been so managed as to produce excellent results. The various matters of importance referred to your Finance Committee during the past year, have been reported upon in detail from time to time, and your committee begs leave to call attention to the various reports submitted throughout the year for accurate and detailed information thereupon. The present temporary stringency in the money market has made it somewhat difficult for the city to meet the various drafts upon the City Treasury, but your committee expects to be able to negotiate before the first of January, a sufficiently large loan to enable it to meet its interest payments, due on January 1st, and such other obligations as may mature, either at or before that time. It will be understood, of course, that these loans are loans made in anticipation of taxes levied but which have not been, as yet, collected; and the loans heretofore made and now necessary, will be repaid by taxes which are past due, and which still remain unpaid, as soon as these taxes are received by the City Treasurer.

Under the city charter it devolves upon the Common Council to fix the amount of the City Treasurer's bond for the ensuing term. Your committee has considered this matter, and have decided to recommend that the amount of that bond be fixed as heretofore, at one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), with sureties to be approved by the mayor, and form of bond to be approved by the Common Council.

ANNUAL REPORT OF LAMP COMMITTEE.

By Ald. Dewey—

Rochester, N. Y., December 31, 1895.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen: Your Lamp and Electric Committee submits the following review of the work done and the receipts and expenditures of this department during the nine months ending December 31, 1895:

During this period there has been no extension of the incandescent arc system in the central or business streets. This system which is in use on Main and State streets continues to give the best results and it is a pleasure for your committee to assure you that we hear nothing but commendation in relation to the lighting of these streets. The extra expenditure made by your honorable board for this purpose meets the approval of the tax payers generally. This system gives such universal satisfaction that the people on a number of our residence streets and avenues are contemplating requesting your honorable board to extend this lighting system through these streets. To do this would make a very material increase in the appropriation for this department, and as there is a large territory on the outlying districts of the city which must be provided with lights and which will increase the expenses of the lamp department, your committee is of the opinion that while they were justified in lighting the business streets of the city with this ornamental system as this was a benefit to the city at large, they would not be justified in the expenditure necessary to light these residence streets in this manner. We would be pleased to see this system of lighting extended and would recommend that where the residents of any street or avenue wish this kind of lighting that the lamp committee be authorized to pay the amount necessary to properly light such street or avenue with the ordinary arc lights and the property owners pay the extra cost of such lighting.

We renew our recommendation of last year that the conduit system be extended on

State street to Lyell avenue, on Central avenue from State to Clinton, and Exchange from Erie canal to Court street. As the placing of the incandescent arcs on Main street from East avenue to University avenue necessitated the discontinuance of some arc lights and the changing of others, for the purpose of making our map and records correspond with the proceedings of your honorable board, we would recommend the adoption of the resolution following, (authorizing the hiring of a competent person to make an re-count). The records and maps of the department have been in charge of three different persons since the record map was first made, and while we are sure the greatest care possible has been taken to keep the maps and records correct, errors may have been made. The last count was made in 1888, and it will readily be seen that exercising the greatest care in placing lamps, errors will creep in. It is most essential to the city as well as to this department that the records and the lamps should tally, and for this reason we recommend the employment of a competent man to make an actual count of the lamps of the city.

Owing to the short fiscal year just closed it is almost impossible to make any comparison between this and previous years, from the fact that the next three months, namely January, February and March, are always our busiest months, for during those months mechanics as well as the laborers are thrown out of employment. We opened the city stone yard December 11th, and already have 222 men at work and expect to be able to furnish three days' work for all who apply during the winter months.

We had some difficulty in disposing to the Executive Board of less than one-quarter of the whole amount of stone we broke last winter, and we hope that in the coming spring when the ordinances for local improvements are passed upon, some arrangement may be made whereby this macadam will be given the preference, as it is broken at the market price during the dullest season of the year, and by men who wish work and not public relief. The fact alone that they are willing to break stone in an open field during the winter season shows that what they want is work, and if the above arrangements are made for disposing of the macadam, this plan of providing work instead of relief will enable the worthy to maintain their independence.

It will be seen by reference to the report that the number of appeals for relief during the year were 1,174, the number of cases carried from the books last year and re-investigated were 504, making a total number of investigations 1,678.

A personal investigation at the home of each applicant was made and we feel satisfied that none but deserving poor received help during the year. The number of families furnished out-door relief were 1,024, a number much smaller than was on our book in December, 1894; this is caused partially by the rigid investigations and our work, plan,

We made a rule which is generally lived up to whereby the head of the family must apply for, and also come to office for such relief as he may need.

The number of patients sent to the various hospitals, excepting the County Hospital, was 201, all of which were examined and hospital treatment recommended by the city physicians. The number of children sent to the asylums was 84, of which 12 were committed. Number in asylums at present time, 261. We have found quite a number of good homes for children during the year and hope that during the coming year, with the assistance of the Children's Aid Society, we will be able to find homes for the greater part of the city's wards, who are without proper home and proper guardianship.

The number of old men and old women, families with sickness and widows with dependent children assisted was 802. Nearly every one of those families are being helped by the charity organizations, church societies or private charities, so that they are doubly investigated, and we are confident that there has been no fraud practiced. The system of bookkeeping in the department, we find by experience, to be somewhat old-fashioned, and we have overhauled and changed it to a more modern and simple system.

The manner in which the records of the department are now kept, we think, commends itself, although extra clerical help is needed, the result of which will be a benefit to the future working of the department.

The foregoing is merely a synopsis of the work of the law department during the past nine months, since April 1, 1895. Many other important matters, too numerous to detail, have been transacted in this department. Statutes have been prepared for the legislature; the city charter has been entirely re-arranged and many portions of it re-written; the penal ordinances of the city have been entirely re-arranged and revised and are ready for adoption. The present corporation counsel has inaugurated the policy of the strict enforcement of the penal ordinances relating to licenses, and as a result of his efficient and energetic methods all persons in the city of Rochester liable to pay licenses under the penal ordinances have so paid during the past year; this is the first time in the history of the city, we believe, that such a report could have been made. In the enforcement of said ordinances the police department, the city clerk and the law department have worked in unison. Enough money has been realized from this source during the past year, over and above what usually has been collected to pay over one-half of the entire expenses of operating the law department. In addition to the disposition of litigated business the corporation counsel and his staff act as advisors to the various officials and departments of the city with the exception of the board of health and excise board; during the past year many consultations have been had and numerous opinions both oral and written have been given.

With reference to the estimate of expenses required for the law department for the coming year, we beg leave to say that a small appropriation should be made for incidental expenses in addition to the moneys required to meet the salaries of the office. All of which is respectfully submitted.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WATER WORKS COMMITTEE.

Rochester, Dec. 26, 1895.

To the Common Council:

Gentlemen: Your Water Works Committee herewith submits the following report for the new fiscal year which embraces the nine months ending December 31, 1895.

Many petitions for the extension of mains were on file at the commencement of the year, the estimated cost of complying with the same being about \$140,000, but in view of the large amount of work to be done in laying the remainder of the distributing mains, funds for which were provided by the issue of bonds, it was thought prudent to limit the expenditure for extending small mains only to imperative cases.

The following statement shows the funds applicable to the work, also amounts advanced by private parties for extension of mains:

able for the performance of the work contemplated.

The streets in which water mains were directed to be laid and paid for out of items Nos. 1 and 2 of the above statement, are set forth in the following table No. 1, which also indicates the length of such mains actually laid, and the ward in which the street is contained. As the work is not yet fully completed, a detailed report of the work is now impracticable, but it may suffice to state that after the payment of all charges there will be a fair balance left over.

It should also be remarked that no work has been done on Albermarle street and the "Alameda," constituting item No. 3 of the above statement owing to the fact that the season was so far advanced before the money became available, as to render it expedient to postpone said work until next season. No hardships will thereby result to any one, since there are few, if any, residences yet built on said streets.

The description, length and cost of the water mains which have been laid in 1895 at the expense of private parties in anticipation of being reimbursed by the common council for such outlay at some future time, are given in full in the following table No. 2, and as a large number of similar cases have occurred during the past six years from April 1, 1889, to April 1, 1895, for which no reimbursement has yet been made by the city, a statement thereof is submitted in table No. 3.

It should also be mentioned that better facilities for the suppression of fire in the group of buildings constituting the Rochester State Hospital were imperative and permission to surround the same with a line of

From the amount stated, there should be deducted the sum of \$152.80 paid to William Fuller for money advanced by him May 31, 1892, for laying a water pipe in Fuller's park and ordered by resolution of common council June 25, 1895, to be paid to him. Also the sum of \$204.58 paid to Kondolf & Ely, by order of executive board, July 31, 1895, the same being the difference between the actual cost of the work as set forth in table No. 2 below, and the estimated cost thereof as set forth in sub-division "b" of item No. 4 of the foregoing statement. These two payments aggregating \$357.38, accordingly left a balance of \$46,137.65 in the fund avail-

8-inch water pipe with eight large 6-inch hydrants attached thereto; connecting with the old conduit, was accordingly granted. All of this work was done under the direction of the water department, but was paid for separately by the hospital authorities. The length of pipe thus laid is 1,657.87 lineal feet, which will be included in the regular statistical tables printed in the annual report of the executive board.

The 36-inch and 30-inch cast-iron mains, appurtenances and connections have been laid as far as was allowed by the expenditure of the \$250,000 raised by issue of bonds. The water was admitted into the West Side

line on May 3, 1895, and into the East Side line on August 26, 1895; and after payment of all contract claims a balance of about \$3,750 will be left.

Table No. 4 shows the length of large new pipes laid this season, the different wards in which they are laid and locations of same.

The number of miles of mains laid this season, large and small, including a small amount of galvanized iron piping, aggregated a little over ten miles, and the total mileage within the city limits after deducting cast-iron mains, removed and replaced by larger ones, amounts to 264.925 miles of which 246.397 miles is on the domestic system and 18.528 miles is on the Holly system.

There are 2,578 hydrants set and in use; 2,284 on the Domestic and 294 on the Holly system.

Quite a number of stop valves or gates were set, 36-inch to 3-1/2 inch in diameter, in all 119 in number, and these are set in all pipes regarded as mains, 2,623 of which 2,385 were inserted in the Domestic mains and 236 in those of the Holly.

There are 445 gates in large services; 17 being set this year.

There are at the date of this report on file in the water department about fifty-one petitions not complied with, the estimated cost of compliance being about \$97,000.

ANNUAL REPORT CITY ENGINEER.

To the Honorable Common Council:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor of presenting the following report of the work of this office for the nine months ending December 31, 1895, and again take pleasure in acknowledging the valuable assistance and encouragement given to me by the members of this Council and the members of the Executive Board and its employes, and the increasing earnest and friendly help of my assistants and office force.

The total cost of the office has been \$17,019.53, of which \$15,805 was for salaries and \$1,214.53 for expenses.

Seventy public improvements were completed, costing \$355,566.93. Of the expenditures for improvements \$219,826.42 was for pavements and grading; \$63,336.54 for sewers; \$26,510.47 for sidewalks; \$17,489.46 for bridges, half being paid by the state, and \$23,404.04 for miscellaneous.

There were four miles of streets paved with 67,354 square yards of pavement, of which the character was as follows:

Asphalt, 24,293 square yards, average price \$2.52.

Asphalt blocks, 518 square yards, average price \$2.70.

Medina blocks, 7,872 square yards, average price \$2.85.

Medina stone on sand, 9,550 square yards, average price \$1.58.

Medina stone on concrete, 819 square yards, average price \$1.95.

Brick, 10,158 square yards, average price \$1.85.

Trap rock macadam, 14,143.6 square yards, average price \$1.09.

There were 10.685 miles of new sidewalk built under contract, of which 1.677 miles were plank; 8.835 miles of artificial stone and .173 of asphalt.

There were 242,368 square feet of artificial stone sidewalk laid at an average price per square foot of 10.8 cents. The cost of the asphalt sidewalk was 23.8 cents per square foot.

The most important new features introduced during the year, were setting curb-stones in concrete and laying drain tile beneath; substituting for Medina stone cross-walks wherever it is possible, either asphalt blocks or bricks or sheet asphalt; laying the courses of brick pavements at an angle of sixty degrees with the curb instead of at right angles; substituting round brick man-holes in place of square stone manholes; increasing the thickness of cement sidewalk stones where they are of greater dimensions than four feet, or where they are under unusually heavy traffic as on West Main street and also in making the intersections of cement walks in artistic manner with suitable curves and properly shaped stones; also in building a street (North Race) with ordinary Medina stone set upon a concrete foundation six inches thick.

Besides making the usual number of surveys and maps for the city assessors, executive board and corporation counsel, and for establishing grades and lines for work done by private citizens, several extensive and important surveys were made to establish doubtful street lines.

Work upon the city survey has been continuously prosecuted but it has been done under great disadvantage, because of lack of space in the draughting room, and because for the past few months the office has been deprived of the assistance of Mr. Allen, who was engaged in copying deeds in the county clerk's office, and because the council has seen fit to deny to the employes of the office transportation to and from their work.

The department has been able during this winter to use the whole office force to better advantage than ever before, because the necessity of an accurate survey of Hemlock lake for the use of the Hemlock lake commission, makes it possible to detail a party of five men, who, in charge of Assistant W. B. Sackett, have been at work at the lake since the middle of November and will be employed there during the balance of the winter. The expenses of that party outside of salaries are paid by the Hemlock lake commission.

I submit herewith nine tables showing in detail the characteristics of the work of the year:

In conclusion I beg leave to make the following recommendations:

"First. The employment of men in the office should be in the control of the city engineer instead of a committee of the Common Council.

"Second. More room should be provided so as to save a large amount of time wasted on account of the crowded condition, and so that records may be used readily without being destroyed in handling.

"Third. A fire-proof vault should be provided for original note books and sheets of city survey.

"Fourth. Record maps of underground construction should be required from the gas and electric companies.

"Fifth. Two men should be added to the office for special work to hasten the progress of the city survey.

"Sixth. The appropriation for the expense of the office for the next year should be \$25,000."

Gentlemen:—As secretary of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of the commission during the preceding year.

For the purpose of obtaining an eligible list for the police and fire department, the first

section held two general examinations, namely: On the 15th day of February, 1895, for all applicants for positions in the police department, for which 229 persons filed applications, 100 of whom were found to possess the necessary mental and physical qualifications, and placed upon the eligible list. On the 1st day of March, 1895, the board held an examination for applicants for positions in the fire department; 310 applications were filed, and 112 passed the fireman's, and 51 the driver's examination.

The second section has held three general examinations, as follows: February 1, 1895, when 58 applicants were examined for 11 different positions; June 24, 1895, with 29 applicants for 12 positions; December 19, 1895, with 180 applicants for 36 positions, and one special examination for inspectors of street improvements on the 23d day of September, 1895.

It is almost impossible to give an estimate of the amount necessary to meet the expenses of the board during the coming year, as the expenditures are largely for printing notices of examination and examination papers, and, therefore, depend upon the number of examinations. It seems to me, however, that \$200.00 will cover all expenses for the coming year, exclusive of the salaries of the examiners.

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

By Ald. McMillan—

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Your special committee on central police station would respectfully report as follows: The Rochester police department, which for so many years was located in the city hall in quarters totally inadequate for the needs of

a large and flourishing city, with damp and illy ventilated basement cells, with a police matron located in one small room, two floors above the main office, without any accommodations for the detention of unfortunate women, is at last pleasantly located in the new building, situated on Exchange street, nearly opposite the Monroe county jail.

The building is built of brick and iron, with Medina cut stone trimmings, is four stories in height, with a commodious barn in the rear for the police patrol and ambulance service.

On the first floor are located the offices of the captain, night lieutenants, police patrol operators, general assembly room and cells for male prisoners. On the second floor are the offices of the Chief of Police, assistant chief, stenographer, detective, police clerk, police justice and police court.

The third floor is entirely devoted to women and children. Pleasant rooms for detained witnesses, separate room for children and a suite of rooms for the Police Matron—all well ventilated and lighted. On the fourth floor are located the drill room and gymnasium. The total cost of the building, according to architect's figures, including cell work, steam heating, plumbing, elevator, electrical apparatus, mantels, etc., is \$61,233.23. This, with the cost of site and architect's fees, makes the total cost of building and site \$76,124.77. Forty-one thousand two hundred and seventy dollars of this amount has been paid mostly from surplus receipts from the Excise Board over requirements of Poor Department. The East Side sewer has practically been completed, and so also has the new conduit to Hemlock lake. A large new police building has been provided by the Common Council, without either issuing bonds or raising the money with which to pay for it by taxation. The work of the Common Council has progressed

smoothly and harmoniously and I doubt if any legislative body has ever attended more closely to its duties than has the Common Council which is now about to expire.

Great care has been exercised by every committee having charge of the expenditures for public purposes, and it is a fact worthy of note that none of the Common Council's committees has been called upon to report deficiencies at the end of the year.

In saying good-by to the Common Council, I wish to thank the members individually and collectively for the uniform courtesy with which they have always treated me, and for the forbearance which they have shown to-

ward me. I have endeavored to perform my duties impartially, and with the interests of the city ever in mind. I believe the future will demonstrate the wisdom of the action of the Common Council during the past two years in many of its conclusions.

Once more, gentlemen, I thank you, and wish you all a farewell.

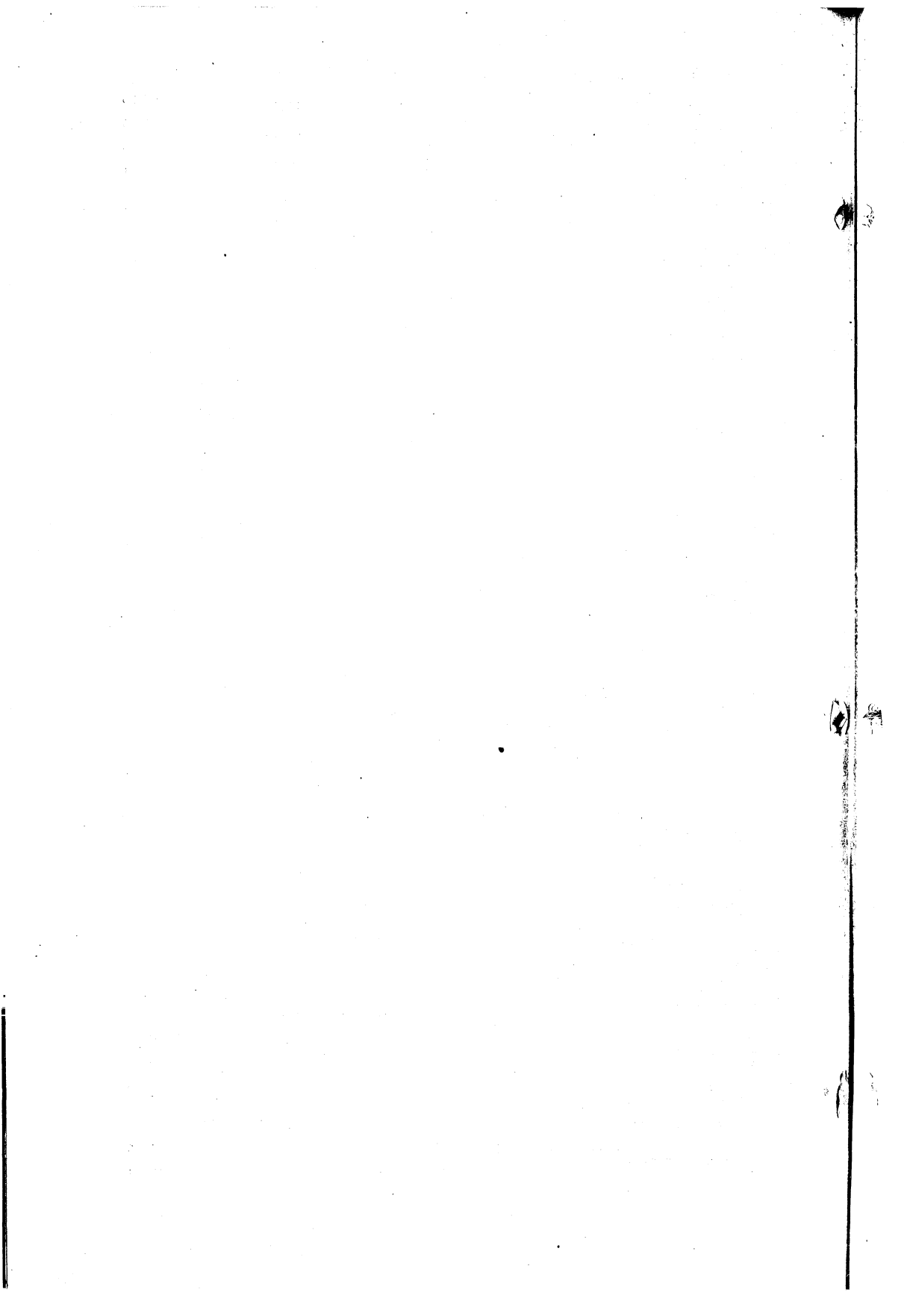
