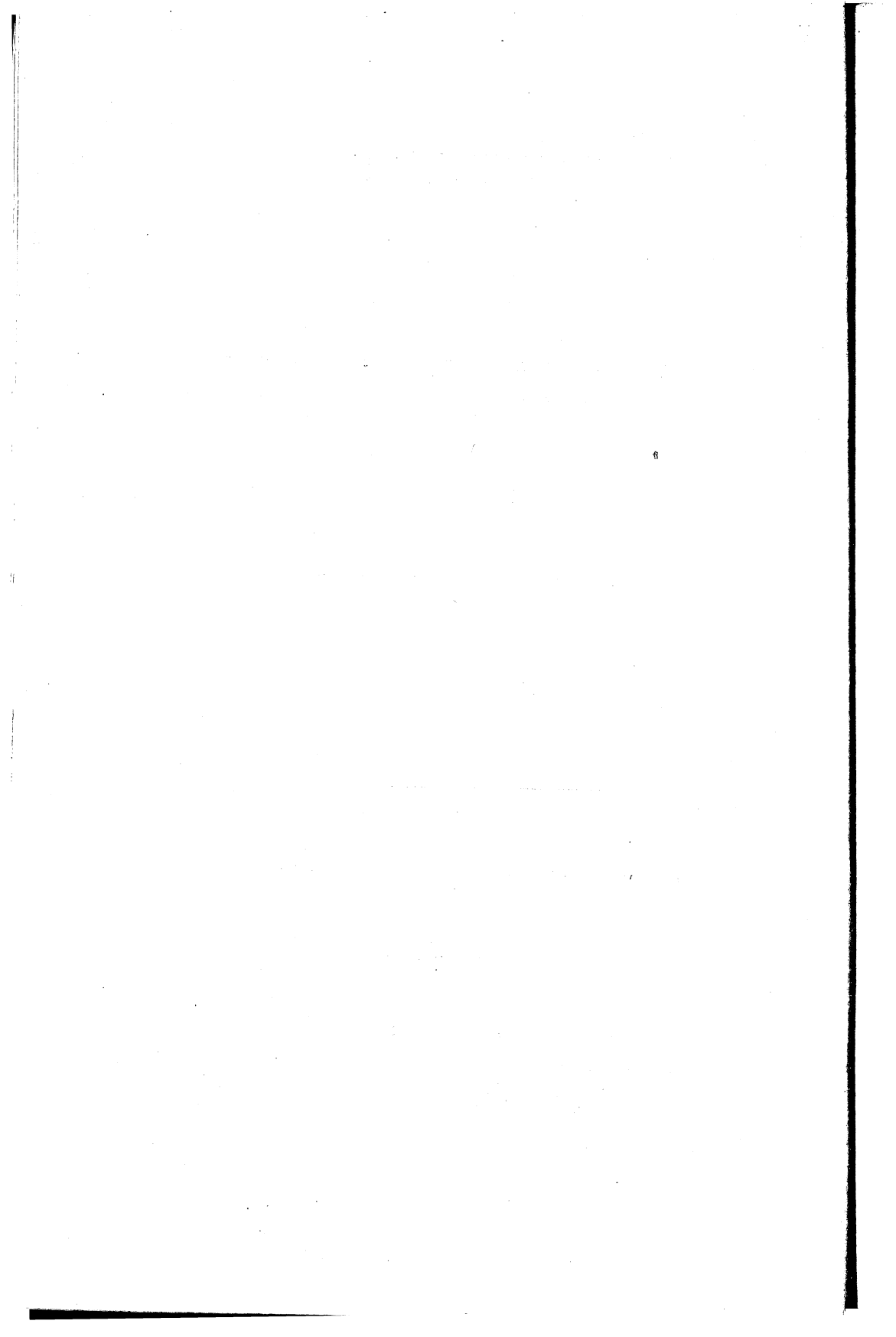

In Common Council—April 2, 1894.

CHARTER MEETING.

The Clerk called the Board to order.

Present—Alds. Tracy, Calihan, McMillan, Green, Rauber, Adams, Edelman, Fox, Powell, Ashton, Ward, Dewey, Cook, Pauckner, Kelly, Aikenhead, Simmelink, Lewis, Harris, Bierbrauer.—20.

Ald. Dewey moved that Ald. Calihan act as temporary chairman. Carried.

Ald. Calihan upon taking the chair thanked the aldermen for the honor conferred and asked the pleasure of the board.

Ald. Dewey moved that the board proceed to appoint a President. Carried.

Ald. Dewey nominated Ald. Merton E. Lewis.

Ald. Merton E. Lewis was named by:

Alds. Tracy, Calihan, McMillan, Green, Rauber, Adams, Edelman, Fox, Powell, Ashton, Ward, Dewey, Cook, Pauckner, Kelly, Aikenhead, Simmelink, Harris, Bierbrauer—19.

Ald. Merton E. Lewis was declared duly elected President for the ensuing year.

Ald. Dewey moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort the president to the chair. Carried.

The chairman appointed as such committee Alds. Dewey and McMillan.

The President then addressed the Board as follows:

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

"Gentlemen of the council: I am not unappreciative of the honor which you have conferred upon me by this election, and in return I extend my sincere thanks.

In assuming the duties of the position of presiding officer of this council for the year now beginning, I desire to say that I appreciate fully the responsibilities of the position, and am determined to perform my duties impartially, and with a desire solely for the welfare of the city and the good opinion of my fellow members.

The present is an era of progress in the city of Rochester. Splendid improvements, involving great payments of public money, are in course of construction, and the majority of this council can hardly avoid the burden of responsibility for the expenditures which we shall be called upon to make. The system of government under which we are operating is such that not one dollar can be raised by taxation for public purposes, without the consent of the representatives of the people elected to this council; and we may be sure that, in these times of general financial depression, the people will carefully watch and closely scrutinize every item of expense which may be decided upon throughout the year. It therefore behooves this council and the city government in all its branches

to exercise the most careful and painstaking economy in matters of finance. The city is in excellent financial condition. Its credit is high both at home and abroad. Rochester bonds are eagerly sought for permanent investments, and it is to be hoped that the management of the city's affairs will continue to be, as it has been in the past, dominated by a wise and conservative policy.

The city is rapidly acquiring metropolitan features, and if good judgment shall be exercised and care shall be taken to so legislate for the city that its progress shall not be retarded, its future will continue to be full of promise.

Great public works involve large expenditures of public money. A water supply cannot be had without the issuing of the city's bonds. Trunk sewers cannot be built unless the city's credit is pledged for the payment of their cost. Massive stone bridges spanning the river, furnishing the needed accommodations for public travel, and at the same time pleasing the eye, cannot be built without the cash with which to pay for the labor and material. All these have been during the past year, or are now being constructed, and in my judgment so long as the public is assured that there has been and will be no extravagance in such expenditures, the public will be satisfied. Thanks to the credit of the city, the money for these various purposes has been secured, thus far, at extremely low rates of interest, and the benefits which will accrue to our citizens from the completion of these great undertakings will redound to the future prosperity of our entire municipality.

There is one matter to which, at this time, I desire to call your attention, and that is in relation to local improvements. I would not, under any circumstances, postpone the construction of sewers required for sanitary purposes. Wherever a street is without a sewer, there a sewer should be built. But in the matter of passing ordinances for expensive pavements in residence streets, I am convinced that great care should be exercised.

The history of Rochester for the past five years is a history of home building. Many miles of new streets have been surveyed, and hundreds of comfortable and attractive houses have been erected. A disposition has manifested itself, at times, in this council, to hasten, prematurely, as it seems to me, the construction of asphalt, brick and Medina pavements upon such streets. Business streets, of course, should be properly paved, but we should bear in mind that the general city taxes of our home-builders are oftentimes burdensome; and when to this regular and absolutely necessary charge upon real estate are added assessments made necessary by expensive improvements, it sometimes happens that the burden of taxation becomes

greater than can be borne. I would, therefore, suggest that during the coming year, ordinances for the construction of such pavements shall be closely investigated, and whenever possible their passage should be postponed until a more prosperous period shall have arrived. I believe the adoption of a general rule on the part of members of this council, as individuals, not to pass such ordinances, in their several wards, until a majority of the property owners upon the various streets have signified their desire therefor, would be beneficial. I would not desire to check the growth, or in any way retard the development of the city's residence districts, but in times of financial depression people should not be forced to pay for luxuries and by so doing deprive themselves of necessities.

I trust that the deliberations of this council throughout the year will be marked by harmony, and by a desire on the part of every member to legislate for the general welfare, to the end that membership in this body during the year 1894-95, may, in the future, be looked back upon by every member with pride and gratification.

Once more, gentlemen, I thank you for this evidence of your favor."

Ald. McMillan moved that the address be received, filed and published. Carried.

The clerk called the roll upon each of the above names separately and they were thereupon declared duly appointed, each having received the following vote:

The chair then introduced his honor, the mayor, who spoke as follows:

MAYOR'S ADDRESS.

"Gentlemen of the Common Council: Our city to-day enters upon the municipal year of 1894-5, and in compliance with the provisions of the charter you, as the representatives of the twenty constituencies which together make up our local government, meet for organization.

I take the occasion as a proper one, and pursuant to the custom of my predecessors, to make some general observations upon the subject of the responsibilities and the trusts we are about to assume as the executive and legislative departments of the city. It is not my intention at this time to enter into any review of the management of our city's affairs in the past, as detailed statements have been presented already, and the result of the administration of several departments submitted for your consideration and study.

Nor do I intend to make any wise after-thought comments upon what might have been done or left undone by the city's servants in the public interest; but suggest that we profit by the experience of the year just closed, approving only that which has been for the general welfare.

The history of the past is made, the future awaits us with its pages blank and its record unwritten. Shall that record be made to our honor or dishonor? Shall it be one of prudent and discriminating expenditures or careless waste of the revenue derived from taxing the property of our citizens? A year hence answers to these questions will be read in the record.

As framers of our municipal laws and regulations, you, as well as the mayor, who has the responsibility and authority of approving or disapproving your action, have to deal with and perform many and delicate duties.

Every official act affects the interests of the citizen, and those interests may be furthered or seriously impaired by careless or hasty action, or by want of promptness in the performance of our public services. You hold the key to the city treasury. By your votes taxation may be increased or held a check. Appropriations—their amount and purposes—are determined by you; and the several departmental requisitions may be prodigal or frugal as your judgment dictates.

Appropriations should not be enlarged or curtailed on personal or partisan grounds, but should be granted according to the actual requirements and necessities and for the advancement of the interests of the community. "A city, like a nation, must always recede if it be not actually advancing," are the words written by one whose memory is dear to me, and they are as true to-day as they were twenty years ago when he wrote them as mayor of this city.

To this end those having the management of the several departments and the expenditure of moneys should be given a full hearing and opportunity to show the necessity or needs for the appropriation which they ask, and every item should be granted or refused on its merits. Those among you who have held office know the desire and pardonable pride which the committees or boards have, to extend their usefulness and enlarge the field of their respective departments. Money is an important factor in achieving this end, and therefore strenuous efforts are made for liberal allowances. On this point I wish to say that every dollar which adds increasing efficiency and usefulness to any branch of the public service, secures greater conveniences and advantages to the people, protects life and property, preserves the public health, and promotes the condition of the children of our citizens, will meet with my support and approval. We know that among the fundamental elements which help to advance, make prosperous and build up a great city, are an abundant supply of pure and wholesome water, clean and well paved streets, an efficient fire department, a police force sufficiently strong in numbers to protect life and property, educational advantages for every

child in the community, and finally a department conducted on the most approved modern sanitary methods for the preservation of public health. Every dollar necessary for the support and proper maintenance of the above named objects should be allowed, and then prudently and wisely expended.

There are, however, outlays of public money which, while well enough in times of prosperity, should not be made in periods of financial distress. Great care and discrimination is necessary at the present time in imposing any additional burden upon property already embarrassed by taxation. The working people, in fact, the masses, are without employment and the prospects for industrial improvement in the near future are not bright. The homes and lands of thousands of citizens are burdened with incumbrances which threaten to wrest them from the possession of their owners, and, therefore, I urge that no work or undertaking be entered upon except that which the public welfare demands, until we are blessed with more favorable conditions. What I have said herein, I propose, as the chief executive of this city, to apply to myself as far as it may be applied to any public act of mine, and to perform all the responsible and delicate duties of my office without narrow prejudice or partisan purposes, to the end that I may attain the approval and be sustained by the judgment of every fair-minded man. Honesty, economy and impartiality shall guide my actions and purposes in the conduct of the prudential affairs of our city and the protection of every interest shall be my aim and ambition.

Taking this as my official text, I will only state that from time to time I shall communicate my wishes to you upon such subjects as concern the public good, and I cordially invite your hearty co-operation as officials and as citizens.

To this end I ask you to confer with me freely on all subjects of importance, so that, thoroughly understanding one another, we may, by concurrent action, fulfill the duties imposed upon us to the satisfaction of every citizen."

Ald. Adams moved that the address be received, filed and published. Carried.

By Ald. Kelly—Resolved, That this council disapproves of the act introduced in the legislature providing for an extension of the boundaries of the city, and that the city clerk be directed to transmit a copy of this resolution to the representatives of this district in the senate and assembly. Adopted.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen—Your Finance Committee presents the enabling act for the purpose of authorizing the city to issue its bonds and secure money with which to meet the costs of re-inforcing the water distribution service of the city, and thus make available the additional water supply soon to be delivered in Mount Hope reservoir, as recommended by Emil Kufchling and the Executive Board. The Chief Engineer assures the committee that it will be impossible for the city to avail itself of this additional water supply soon to be ready for distribution, until large pipes shall be laid throughout the western, northern and eastern parts of the city. This amount of money will be sufficient for the needs of the department during the current year, and the work of extending this can be carried on while the new conduit line is being completed. This will be ready when the new conduit shall have been completed.

Your committee therefore asks that unanimous consent of this council shall be granted, and that the enabling act submitted at this meeting be approved at once, to the effect that it may be speedily enacted into law.

Your committee desires to refer more especially to the communications of the Chief Engineer of the Water Works Department submitted to this council at the meeting held on March 20th, and referred to this committee.

By Ald. McMillan—
AN ACT to authorize the city of Rochester to issue bonds to pay for a water distributing system.

The people of the state of New York, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Sec. 1. The city of Rochester is hereby authorized to borrow money for the purposes, to the amount, and in the manner hereinafter stated, and the Common Council of the city of Rochester may from time to time hereafter for the purposes of providing said city with additional water distributing mains in connection with the water works system of said city by a three-fourths vote of the members of said Common Council, authorize the City Treasurer to issue the bonds of said city to an amount not to exceed in the aggregate the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars running for a period not exceeding twenty years and bearing a rate of interest not exceeding four per cent. per annum, payable at such places as the common council shall designate. Said bonds when issued shall be signed by the Treasurer, sealed with the corporate seal of the city, countersigned by the Mayor and President of the Common Council and be either coupon or registered bonds. A complete record shall be made and kept by the City Treasurer of the said bonds including the dates, amounts and date of maturity thereof, and to whom issued if registered respectively. The proceeds of said bonds shall be applied to the payment of the cost of constructing said distributing mains.

Sec. 2. Whenever the issue of any bonds by virtue of this act shall be authorized by said Common Council said Treasurer shall invite sealed proposals therefor by advertisement in the official paper for not less than ten days and may award the same to the highest bidder therefor, provided that no proposal shall be accepted for less than the par value of said bonds, and said proposals shall be publicly opened only by the Treasurer, or such other person as said common council may designate in the presence of the Finance Committee of said Common Council or such of them as shall attend at the time and place specified in said advertisement and said treasurer with the approval of said Finance Committee or such members thereof as may be present, shall determine what, if any, part of said proposals shall be accepted, but nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the rejection of any or all of said proposals. And said common council is further authorized for the purpose of paying for the costs and expenses of carrying on the construction of any work pursuant to this statute pending the sale of any of said bonds to borrow by vote of three-fourths of all of the members elected subject to the approval of the mayor upon the credit of the city by its promissory note or notes payable in not more than a year after their date so much money as may deemed necessary and the amount so borrowed shall be placed to the credit of the funds for the purposes of this statute to be refunded with interest from the proceeds of the sale of said bonds.

Sec. 3. The several banks including the savings banks within said city, and the Rochester Trust and Safe Deposit Company and Security Trust Company of Rochester are hereby authorized to receive and keep on deposit any moneys raised by the sale or for the payment of said bonds by the notes of said city pursuant to this act, and to pay on such deposits such rate of interest as agreed upon by said Finance Committee and each and every bank and company receiving such deposits as aforesaid shall execute and give to said city a bond with sufficient sureties con-

ditioned to save said city harmless in any event of and from any loss by reason of such deposits, said bond to be approved by the Mayor and chairman of the Finance Committee.

Sec. 4. In order to provide for the payment of interest of the bonds hereby authorized to be issued by said city, there shall be added to the general city taxes of the city at large in the year when the first issue of bonds hereby authorized shall be made and each year thereafter, such sum of money in each of said years as shall be required to pay the interest upon the bonds which shall have been issued pursuant to the provisions of this act. To provide for the payment of the principal of said bonds it shall be the duty of the Treasurer of said city to estimate and ascertain the amounts required to be added to the general city taxes of said city by virtue of this act and to transmit a statement each year to said common council in time to have such amount included in the general city tax of said city for that year, and it shall be the duty of said common council to cause such amount to be included in such general city tax and to provide annually by tax for the payment of the principal and interest of the bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of this act.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—The Central Light & Power Company have some cables stretched across Main street, from building to building, and the company has been trying to devise some plan by which they can be taken down to conform to your rules in this department. The company is running a low pressure system, on account of its safety to life and property, and this system requires the use of large cables.

To bury the said cables in the conduits now constructed, the length of the cable would have to be considerably increased, on account of the comparatively circuitous route, which would have to be followed and such increased length would result in such a drop of voltage, as to render the entire plant useless. We might run our dynamos at a higher voltage, say 125 volts, and provide for the drop, but the Edison Electric Company claim patents in this method and have refused to deal with us in any way.

Now the plan we have to suggest as our only way out of the difficulty, is to get your consent to bury the wires directly under where they are now strung. Of course such work to be done without disturbing any existing right in the street which you have heretofore granted.

The Central Light & Power Company, on account of its facilities for doing business cheaply, has reduced the price of electric lighting 50 and even 75 per cent. where its lines run, and so makes claim to your favorable consideration of its business. As the contractor will begin work of laying new

pavement on Main street from the four corners, as he states his plans, we urge that you take action in this matter, so that the new pavement may not be in the way of doing this work.

Gentlemen:—Your Assessment Committee begs leave to submit the following report:

In the matter of the application of William Knight for the cancellation of an assessment for Front street outlet sewer, the City Surveyor has reported that Mr. Knight was assessed and did pay for the building of the Genesee Valley outlet sewer, under final ordinance No. 2,263, and your committee therefore believe, that he should not be taxed for the Front street outlet sewer, and your committee therefore recommend that his petition be granted.

In the matter of the petition of Mrs. C. M. Lutes and others for the reduction of an assessment for water rents, on the ground that the premises for which said rents were assessed were vacant during a portion of the time for which they are assessed, your committee are of the opinion that the relief asked for is just and the petition should be granted.

In the matter of the petition of L. B. Oot-

hout, for the cancellation of an assessment for lateral sewers on Main street, your committee would recommend that the petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Lincoln B. In the matter of the petition of the Rochester Gas & Electric Company for rebate of interest paid on taxes, your committee report that said company asked for their tax bills in July, 1893, supposed that they had received all of the same, paid their taxes as they supposed on all their property, but not until taxes were advertised for sale in March last, did they discover that the taxes on their property in the first ward were unpaid and that the same had been advertised for sale; they immediately paid said taxes, and have petitioned that the interest which they were compelled to pay upon said taxes be remitted. They have been assessed the same as all

other persons assessed for the improvement at the rate of \$14.64323 per foot, and your committee is of the opinion, that such an assessment is erroneous and unequal and we have concluded that injustice to the petitioners has been done, and they ought to be rebated the sum of \$175.72, and we therefore recommend that such rebate be granted.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—I beg leave to report that in accordance with your resolution passed on April 19, 1893, I have made a somewhat careful study for a new bridge across the Genesee river in extension of Mortimer street, and having prepared plans and estimates, I hereby request that a committee be selected to assist in the preparation of the required ordinance.

The plan which I submit herewith calls for: First. The extension of Mortimer street in a straight line with existing street, from North Water street to Front street, 62 feet wide, opening into Front street midway between Exchange place and Market street.

Second. Erection of a stone arch bridge across the river.

Third. Making the grade of Mortimer street straight from St. Paul street to Front street with a fall of four feet per one hundred.

Fourth. Raising the surface of North Water street four feet at Mortimer street, running down in a four per cent. grade to present surface of street at a point 90 feet south of Mortimer and on a four per cent. grade down to a point 140 feet north of Mortimer street.

Fifth. Raising the surface of Front street as follows: Beginning at the present surface on line with south curb of Market street, thence southerly on a grade of 4 feet per 100, to a point midway between Market street and Exchange place, where the new surface will be 5-1-2 feet above the existing pavement; thence on a straight grade rising 1-2 foot per 100, to Main street, which will make the new grade of Front street about 4-1-2 feet above existing surface at Exchange place.

Sixth. Raising the grade of Exchange place beginning at east line of Mill street at present surface; thence rising 2.13 feet per 100, to 4-1-2 feet above present surface at west line of Front street.

Among the reasons for adopting this plan are the following:

First. Making the street straight from St. Paul street to Front street will give it a better appearance than if it had an angle, and in ending midway between Market street and Exchange place, it will best serve the various lines of traffic going north on Front, Mill and State streets, west through Market and Church streets and Exchange place and south onto Main street. It will also be nearly parallel with Main street and 350 feet distant therefrom.

Second. The grade is limited to four feet per 100 because it seemed essential that the proposed street should not be any steeper than the part of Main street between Water and St. Paul street, and also because with this grade we are able to build a bridge leaving sufficient water way for high water in the river.

Third. The surface of Front street is raised because it is necessary in order to permit of a four per cent. grade on Mortimer street, and also because it will permit of extending the buildings on the east side of Front street out over a part of the river with ample water way beneath, so that instead of being limited to from 20 to 33 feet deep as they are now, they may be from 70 to 100 feet deep, and also because it will make Front street property very much more desirable for business purposes.

I estimate the cost of the improvement as follows:

Probable cost of real estate.....	30,000 00

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Your Finance Committee submits herewith the annual tax levy for the year 1894-95. The amount deemed necessary for the ensuing year has been fixed by your committee at \$1,740,000. In this amount is included, not only sufficient moneys, in the judgment of your committee, for the purposes of the various departments for the entire year, but also the sum of \$184,000 for deficiencies incurred by reason of extraordinary expenditures during the past year. The severity of the winter season, and the large number of men out of employment for several months, seemed to require the employment of those men by the city in various departments. The Executive Board has certified a deficiency of \$60,000, largely incurred in aiding this class of persons; \$10,000 was also appropriated under a special act of the legislature to the Park Commission, to enable them to do work which could properly be done during the winter months, and thereby assist many deserving mechanics.

In the tax levy of 1893-94 was included as large a sum as the law permitted for the payment of teachers' wages and contingent expenses by the Board of Education. That sum was insufficient, and your committee prepared, and this Council approved, of an enabling act authorizing a further appropriation of \$39,000 for these two funds, and this amount of deficiency is also taken care of in this tax levy.

In anticipation of the signing of the proposed amendment to the charter, authorizing the raising of a larger sum for those funds this year than formerly, your committee has included an item of \$230,000 for teachers' salaries. It is believed that this sum, being \$17,000 more than last year's appropriation, will be ample for the payment of teachers' wages, and will also permit a moderate increase in their yearly compensation, should the Board of Education so determine. The sum of \$90,000, being \$17,000 more than last year's appropriation, is also included for contingent expenses of the Board of Education, and your committee has no doubt but that this sum will be sufficient for all proper expenditures for the coming year.

The Police Fund is slightly increased over last year's amount, by reason of the additional number in the force.

The cost of lighting the city will also be somewhat augmented on account of the increase in the total number of public lamps.

On account of the anticipated increase in the assessed valuation on the city's real and personal property, it is believed by your committee, that notwithstanding the considerable increase in the amount of the tax levy, the tax rate will not be materially greater than that of last year.

In submitting this tax levy, your committee desires to place itself upon record to the effect that the amount appropriated will be all the moneys which the various departments will be permitted to expend during the twelve months of the fiscal year.

His honor, the mayor, in delivering his inaugural address to this Council, called attention to the fact that this Council is solely responsible for the amount of the tax levy, and for the appropriation of all moneys expended by every department. These sentiments were concurred in by the retiring president, and also by the present president of this Council at the time of his election. Your committee feels that in view of this fact, and in view of the fact that there is a disposition on the part of the public generally to hold this Common Council responsible for such expenditures, the most rigid economy must be observed by every department. The members of this Council cannot afford to permit extravagance to exist in any department, and when it has determined the amount of money to be appropriated for the various departments, those departments must make those sums answer their requirements for the full fiscal year. The provisions of the city charter are explicit upon this subject, and it is made the duty of every department throughout the year to have constantly in mind the appropriations therefor, and to so manage their funds that they shall last throughout the entire year. By the provisions of section 140 of the city charter, it is made the duty of the District Attorney of the county of Monroe to prosecute all persons violating these provisions of the charter, upon the complaint of any tax-payer of said city, and your committee calls attention to this provision for the purpose of reminding the members of the various boards and departments that these constantly occurring deficiencies must cease.

A copy of that memorandum is herewith submitted, and made a part of this report. Your special committee desires the approval of this Council to the terms of said memorandum, and to that end has prepared and submits herewith the resolution therefor.

MEMORANDUM—CROSSING OF UNIVERSITY AVENUE, ROCHESTER.

The New York Central Railroad proposes to build a tunnel under the tracks of the New York Central at University avenue crossing.

Tunnel to be 49 feet wide, roadway 34 feet and sidewalks approximately 8 feet. Headroom for driveway 13 feet, sidewalks, 4 feet above grade of driveway. Columns at curb lines.

Grade excavations for tunnel not to exceed 5 feet in 100.

All to be done at the expense of the New York Central R. R. The city to provide drainage for tunnel. The assessment for this drainage the railroad company to be exempted from.

The city is to adopt the necessary ordinance for the change of the grade of University avenue to enable the railroad company to construct the tunnel.

The change of grade and the construction of the tunnel to be made substantially in conformity to the preliminary plan made by Mr. Van Hoessen, engineer, now exhibited, as hereinbefore modified, subject to such changes as may be found necessary by the railroad company to carry its tracks over the said tunnel.

Gentlemen:—I beg leave to call your attention to the increased business of this department, the duties of which now require the constant attention of a competent assistant for clerical work, of which much besides now devolves upon the Auditor personally, in order to facilitate the business of the department and avoid unreasonable delays.

A proper examination of all matters presented for audit, necessary reference to records of claims already passed upon, and constant attention to and familiarity with the published proceedings of the several bodies of our city government, demand time and application on the part of the Auditor that should relieve him of the greater part, if not all of the purely clerical work of the office.

The records of the office show that over 6,000 claims have the past year been received, registered and passed upon, an increase of over 1,300 above the previous year or more than 25 per cent. These are received at greatly irregular intervals, which tends to still further tax the working ability to dispose of them as promptly as the interests involved demand, or as, if presented in orderly succession, were it practicable.

In view of this I would therefore respectfully submit that the city make provision for a capable clerk for this office with proper compensation, independent of the salary of the Auditor for the current year.

Hon. A. H. Dewey, Chairman Electrical Committee of the Common Council:

Dear Sir:—Some two weeks ago the Central Light and Power Company filed an application with the Common Council for leave to lay a pipe across Main street from Wilder's Arcade to the Elwood Building.

This request was duly referred to your Committee and the said company since that time has made like request of the Executive Board.

It is the opinion of the City Attorney that the Executive Board has not the power to grant this request, for which reason and because Main street is now torn up, the Central Light and Power Company suggests prompt action by the Common Council.

Enclosed you will please find copies of the communications recently addressed to the Executive Board, which show that the Central Light and Power Company has done all in its power in that direction.

The present appeal to the Common Council does not involve simply a question of a few dollars. It involves the question of whether the Rochester Gas and Electric Company shall enjoy the absolute monopoly of furnishing light and power to the citizens of Rochester. Their rates for the few feet the Central Light and Power Company desires to use are prohibitory in their character and amount virtually to the declaration that the Central Light and Power Company shall not distribute light or power, because that company cannot cross the line of the conduit of the Rochester Gas and Electric Company.

The citizens of Rochester are greatly interested in the project of water storage. The central idea in this project is that more water in the Genesee river will mean more power to turn our wheels. This power, it is claimed, may be distributed to manufactories, which it is expected will be located in various parts of the city of Rochester. Time and money have been expended in the attempt to induce the Legislature to give to Rochester this great advantage. The Central Light and Power Company now has a surplus of 300 horse power, which it cannot utilize because of the circle drawn around its power house by the conduit lines of the Rochester Gas and Electric Company. The Central Light and Power Company therefore believes that it is contending for the future interests of the city of Rochester in endeavoring to obtain an outlet through which it can supply light and power to the citizens of Rochester. In view of the desirability of prompt action, I respectfully request that your Committee take up this matter and make a report to the Common Council at its meeting this evening.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—In reference to the matter of lighting Cady street, Champlain street, Olean street, Hawley street, Barton street, Frost avenue and Columbia avenue with arc lights, which was referred to this committee by resolution of Alderman Harris at your last meeting, we beg to make the following report:

The matter was brought before the Common Council of last year by petitions signed by the taxpayers on the streets and avenues named. One set of petitions favored the lights of the Citizens' Light & Power Company, and another set favored the lights of the Rochester Gas & Electric Company.

The whole matter was referred to the Lamp and Electricity Committee and said committee made a report which was received and filed and ordered published. A resolution accompanying the report was laid on the table until the first meeting in May, 1894.

Your committee after carefully investigating the subject are convinced that by carrying out the recommendations contained in the report of the Lamp and Electricity Committee of last year the best interests of the city will be protected, and for that reason we embody in this report the report of the committee of last year, which is as follows:

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Lamp and Electrical Committee begs leave to make a special and separate report upon the matter of the petitions of the taxpayers of Cady, Champlain, Olean, Hawley and Barton streets and Frost and Columbia avenues and Doran park.

We learn that two electric light companies entered into competition to replace the present gas lamps on the above streets by arc lights and at the instance of each company a petition was circulated and signed and submitted to the council and referred to this committee as an inducement for the council to grant such right to the company which furnished the strongest petition. Inasmuch as a number of the same names appear on both petitions it is difficult for the committee to say which petition represents the largest number of taxpayers. But it is clear that the taxpayers on these streets are desirous of having the gas lamps replaced by arc electric lights. The streets in the city are at present lighted by the Rochester Gas & Electric Light Company which is a consolidation of the three old companies. At the time that the present contract for lighting the streets of the city was made there was open competition between the three companies, and the committee is of the opinion that by such competi-

tion the city secured as low a rate for lighting as any city in the country. Since the consolidation, new electric light companies have received franchises from the city and it is the opinion of this committee that some street lighting ought to be given to the new companies to encourage such competition as will prove a benefit to the city and public at large. FINANCE ESTIMATE.

To the Board of Education:

Gentlemen:—We are required to make the necessary estimates of money to be raised by the Common Council for the support of our public schools for the current fiscal year and report the same for your action.

The committees having charge of expenditures payable from your contingent fund have submitted the items comprising that amount. The estimate has in fact already been submitted informally to the Finance Committee of the Council in view of the early preparation of the tax levy.

These estimates are based on the necessities of our schools. The reports submitted at the session of the board March 30th, last, contain not only a financial review of that closing year but also they disclose the wants of our several school departments for the present year. The present registry of school pupils is greater than ever before, viz, 21,215, an increase of 1,110 pupils over April, 1893.

The wants of the various districts in way of buildings and additions have been fully set forth. There are thirteen districts where annexes are now maintained, to accommodate 900 children unable to secure seats in the older buildings. It is true that some of the central schools have decreased in attendance but this difference is more than made up in the outer wards. We have asked for the sale of Nos. 10 and 16 buildings, and if possible for a sale of No. 8, that the latter may be replaced by a new structure more centrally located. This board can use to good advantage every dollar it has asked for. In fact such an amount will be required administered with the greatest economy in order to get through the year to March, 1895. No money is asked for to pay old accounts.

We already need to have about forty set on New Boulevard, Lake avenue, Seneca parkway, Bid Ridge road, Clifford street and Jennings street; also on South Goodman street, Highland avenue, Elmwood avenue and South

avenue. We shall use about 200 monuments this year.

I recommend that the Executive Board be authorized to purchase 200 stone monuments and set the same under our direction and charge expense thereof to contingent fund.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—I am directed by the Genesee Valley Park Committee of the Board of Park Commissioners, to present to your honorable body, the following resolutions adopted by them, and request immediate and favorable action thereon:

Resolved, That the Common Council be requested to instruct the Wooden Building Committee and the Fire Marshal not to grant permits for the erection of wooden buildings on Elmwood avenue, within 200 feet of the park lands, or on Plymouth avenue within 200 feet north of the state dam (which is the park boundary) or on any lands within 200 feet of the park, except for the erection of legitimate dwelling houses, not to be used by hucksters, dance houses, or for other objectionable purposes.

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to call the attention of the Fire Marshal to present violations of the ordinances within such boundaries.

Resolved, That the Common Council be further requested to amend the "building ordinance," so as not to allow the erection of any structures of brick, stone or iron, within the above boundaries, unless such structure is to be at least two stories in height.

Resolved, That they be also requested to pass an ordinance giving the Park police jurisdiction for 1,000 feet from any of the park lands.

This committee were ordered by the Board to see that all ordinances and laws were enforced "on said park, the approaches thereto and the streets connecting the same," as authorized by amended section 19 of the park law, of which the following is a copy:

"Section 3. Section 19 of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 19. A majority of the Board of Park Commissioners shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The said Board shall have full and exclusive control to make rules and by-laws for the orderly transaction of their business; to govern, manage, direct, lay out and regulate the said park or parks, parkways, the approaches thereto, and the streets connecting the same; to appoint such engineers, clerks, police and other officers as may be necessary; to prescribe and define their respective duties, and to fix the amount of their compensation and generally, in regard to the said park or parks, parkways, the approaches thereto, and the streets connecting the same, they shall possess all the power and authority now by law conferred on, or possessed by the Common Council of said city, in respect to the public squares and places in said city."

The committee directed me to say further, that at the present time there has been erected on Elmwood avenue opposite to and within 51 feet of the park entrance, and in violation of the city ordinances, two small, un-

sightly wooden buildings to be occupied by hucksters, and it has come to the direct knowledge of the Board that many other such structures are about to go up if the requisite permission can be obtained from you.

The Commissioners are constantly receiving protests from all classes of citizens against these and similar buildings being allowed. The experience of last year demonstrates that they draw a class of people dangerous to the comfort and safety of visitors to the park, particularly to young children and girls; that they are entirely unnecessary for the public convenience, are unsightly and detract from and destroy the beauty of the park entrance, and that being light and inflammable, are at any time liable to create a fire which would quickly spread to all of them, prevent access to or exit by the main entrance of the park, cause great confusion, in case of east wind endanger Elmwood avenue bridge, and the heat would unquestionably destroy many rare and valuable young trees and shrubs now growing and about to be planted at or near the park entrance directly opposite.

Gentlemen:—The Executive Board directs me to inform you that pursuant to a resolution adopted by your honorable body, they held a conference with the property owners on Plymouth avenue, respecting their claim that errors were made in the items of charges for the asphalt improvement.

A full hearing was given the committee representing the property owners, and each item discussed fully in detail, and after such discussion the Board adjourned to the street and inspected it in company with the property owners, the City Surveyor and the general inspector of the work.

After this examination and hearing the Board is of the opinion that there is no reasonable foundation for the claims made so far as the methods pursued in the con-

Now, therefore, in consideration of the sum of one dollar (\$1) paid by the party of the second part to the party of the first part, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, and the faithful performance of said agreement of September 27, 1888, the party of the first part hereby agrees, at any time on or prior to the 18th day of June, 1900, to cause to be executed and delivered to the party of the second part, a deed sufficient in fee to convey all the right, title and interest which said party of the first part had at the date of said agreement of September 27, 1888, in and to the real estate mentioned in said agreement upon the payment to the party of the first part, by the party of the second part of the sum of fifteen thousand four hundred fifty dollars and seventy cents (\$15,450.70), and the faithful performance by the party of the second part of all the terms of said agreement of September 27, 1888, which terms are hereby continued in force, except so far as the period of redemption of said premises is concerned, and said agreement and this agreement are to be construed as one agreement and read together.

It is further agreed by the party of the second part, that if at any time the party of the first part or its executive board or common Council or their successors in office should elect to discontinue the services of the party of the second part as a part of the fire department of said city, said party of the second part shall redeem said premises within one year after receiving notice of such election to discontinue or abandon said premises, and in case of a failure to redeem within said period of one year, the party of the second part will immediately abandon said premises and surrender possession thereof to the party of the first part.

In the matter of the application of William J. McPherson, E. E. Shutt and others interested in the assessment for the Plymouth avenue asphalt pavement, your committee report that in their opinion, the roll should be confirmed. This opinion is based upon a personal inspection of the work, and after hearing in full the allegations of the petitioners, the roll was by your committee referred to the assessors as to the inequality of the assessment, and the assessors reported, that the assessment was properly made in all respects just and correct. Your committee therefore present said roll to the council and recommend that the roll be confirmed.

In the matter of the application of H. C. Cohn & Co., for the reduction of an assessment for the Medina stone pavement on Andrews street, your committee reported that by further investigation of the petition of Messrs. Cohn & Co., that it appears that the petition ought to be granted. We recommend that the resolution be amended in that particular.

In the matter of the application of the trustees of the Industrial School for permission to pay taxes upon certain property purchased by them under foreclosure, your committee would say, that they have investigated the allegations of the petition and the City Treasurer has reported that the taxes for the South Union street improvement might be of somewhat doubtful validity and that they should be permitted to redeem the property upon the payment of 4 per cent. interest and such other fees as exist in the case. And with reference to the request for the payment of the assessment for the general city taxes for 1892, we recommend that the Industrial School be allowed to redeem said property upon payment of the legal rate and expenses of sale, etc., and we make this report upon the recommendation of the City Treasurer.

In the matter of the application of William H. Marson, for the cancellation of an assessment for Front street sewer, the Surveyor reports that the application should be denied for the reason that Mr. Marson is mistaken with reference to the allegations in his petition.

In the matter of the application of Mrs. H. E. Schank and others residing on Windsor street, who petition for the reassessment for the asphalt improvement on the above street, on the ground that property owners on Grove place have not been included in the list of the persons assessed, although Grove place is still a private street. The City Attorney reports that after investigation of the allegations of the petition, that it is true and

the petition should be granted and a reassessment ordered, Grove place being a private street.

In the matter of the application of Frank J. Leidecker, praying that the assessors apportion the taxes paid by said Leidecker for widening Clifford street be remitted, the assessors report, and on their statements we recommend, that the taxes assessed to Mr. Leidecker on his premises known as lot 23, west side of Clinton street, be apportioned in accordance with the request of his petition, and that he be remitted the sum of \$9.35, erroneously assessed to him.

In the matter of the petition of J. F. Probst for reduction of an assessment for the sprinkling of James street, the Surveyor reports that through an inadvertence, a portion of the street, which is a public square, was assessed to Mr. Probst under the ordinance for the sprinkling of James street and that the city should in fact have paid the costs of sprinkling opposite this square, whereas in fact it was assessed to Mr. Probst, and the Surveyor recommends that Mr. Probst be allowed to pay his sprinkling tax at \$2.68, and that the balance of the tax be cancelled.

In the matter of the application of Royal G. Saxton, for a refund of an erroneous assessment your committee would report, that the surveyor states that Mr. Saxton was charged for 46 33-100 feet of cement walk, when only 41 6-100 feet were laid in front of his lot, 48, on Lexington avenue, and the surveyor recommends that the sum of \$3.03 be refunded to Mr. Saxton.

In the matter of the application of the Monroe Avenue M. E. Church, for the cancellation of an assessment for city taxes for the year 1893, your committee report that the assessors recommend, that such church owns the property on the corner of Alexander and Cobb streets, and that it has been used during the past year for religious services and should not have been assessed, and your committee recommend that the tax for the year 1893 be cancelled.

THEIR REFERENCE.

COUNTY COURT—Monroe County.—In the matter of the widening of German street from North avenue to Hebard street in the city of Rochester, N. Y.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: The undersigned, who were appointed by an order of the Monroe county court, duly granted on the 8th day of January, 1894, and entered in Monroe county clerk's office January 10th, 1894, commissioners to inquire into and determine what damages and compensation the owner or owners, tenants or occupants of the lands and buildings to be taken for the widening of German street from North avenue to Hebard street in said city will be entitled to for the same, respectfully report and certify the several pieces and parcels of land to be taken for such improvement, the names and residences, and the rights of the owners thereof, and their award of damages, as incident to the widening of said street as follows:

The several pieces and parcels of land required for such purpose, and necessary for the widening of said street, are described as follows: Reference being had to the map of said street as proposed to be widened, filed in the city and county clerk's office.

PARCEL NO. 1.

Gentlemen: An application has been made to the East Side Trunk Sewer Commission for permission to connect the house drain on the premises of George W. Crouch, Jr., on Culver street, in the town of Brighton, to the East Side trunk sewer.

After duly considering the subject matter of the petition, the commission arrived at the conclusion that it had no legal authority to authorize such connection with the trunk sewer to be made.

The commission, however, desires to state that along the line of the sewer bordering on the towns of Brighton and Irondequoit a number of residents who live in these towns, so situated, have asked for the privilege applied for by Mr. Crouch. It may also be said that in consequence of the construction of this sewer, the wells belonging to the residents of the towns have been drained and they are deprived of the supply of water. They have appeared before the commission and asked that some relief be given them, by permitting them to either connect on to our water mains or take water from the hydrants.

In view of the above state of things the commission would recommend that your honorable body take such steps as will afford relief to those people by legislative enactment or otherwise, if it can be legally done.

road bridge over Red creek, on the line of the town of Brighton and the city of Rochester. The provisions of this section shall not take effect until January 1, 1895. All penalties collected under this section shall be placed to the credit of the highway fund of said city.

Gentlemen:—Your Map and Survey Committee beg leave to make the following report and recommendations, relative to the efficient conduct of the City Surveyor's office. Mr. J. W. Simms, draughtsman, one of the most industrious and able men on the force, has become temporarily unfitted for duty by inflammatory rheumatism. It is not expected that he will be able to attend to duty for about two months, and as the business of the office requires the full force of draughtsmen at this time, your committee recommends that his pay be continued for two months and that the City Surveyor be authorized to employ an additional draughtsman for two months at \$60 per month.

One of the transit instruments has become so worn that it is necessary to replace it with a new one; and we recommend that the Surveyor be authorized to buy one at an expense of \$150, besides giving the old Heller & Brightley transit.

Gentlemen:—Your Lamp and Electrical Committee would respectfully submit the following report:

Acting under a resolution passed at a recent meeting of your honorable body, we advertised for bids for lamps located in different parts of the city, which were referred to this committee for its consideration. As a result of this competition we received two bids, one from the Rochester Gas & Electric Company and one from the Citizens' Light & Power Company. The latter company only bidding on the lamps located in the nineteenth ward. The bid of the Rochester Gas & Electric Company for lamps on Arnold park, was at the usual price now being paid of 25 cents per night per light. We would recommend that this bid be accepted. The bid of the Citizens Light and Power Company for the eighteen (18) lights, located in the nineteenth ward was 19 1-2 cents per lamp per night, and that of the Rochester Gas & Electric Company ten cents (10) per light per night. Your committee would therefore respectfully recommend that these lamps be awarded to the Rochester Gas & Electric Company as the lowest bidders.

The wisdom of the action of your honorable body in deciding to have bids on all lamps to be placed, is sustained by the result of the first call for competitive bids. As will be seen from the figures above, the Rochester Gas & Electric Company offer to place 18 lamps at 10 cents per lamp per night, or 9 1-2 cents per lamp less than the bid of the Citizens' Light & Power Company and 15 cents per lamp less than they are now receiving for all electric lights in this city.

This shows a saving to the city on the 18 lights above mentioned of \$985.50 per year, or a total of \$2,956.50, for the unexpired term of the contract with the city.

Your committee would therefore recommend the adoption of the resolution which follows the report.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: I deem it my duty to call your attention to one of the city's greatest needs at the present time—a system of free public baths.

This question is not a new one. The agitation began some years ago when the city was not so large as it is now and when the necessities for such improvement was not nearly so urgent. For years the city authorities have attempted to enforce the city ordinances against bathing in the river and canal within the city limits, and much of the time they have had little success. There are few cities of the size of Rochester that are not provided with public baths. On the other hand, there are few cities that have better natural facilities for supplying baths than has our city.

As a means of providing against sickness, and inducing cleanliness on the part of that great population that would find a boon in free baths, there is no other source in which an equal amount of money could be expended with as good results.

The legislature of 1892, recognizing the need of such institutions in populous cities and towns, passed a law authorizing cities and villages to make appropriations for such purposes. Thus there is nothing standing in the way of your body taking immediate steps to provide what I believe has come to be recognized by all our citizens as an absolute necessity.

I am informed that recently when the subject was up for discussion, and was referred to the city surveyor for his opinion, that official, after making a study of the matter, rendered a report, embodying the results of his observation, together with recommendations. If these recommendations meet the requirements of the city, and accord with your approval, I believe the tax-payers of our city will commend you for making the expenditures necessary for carrying out those plans. I am impelled to call your attention to this subject at the present time by the numerous complaints that have come to me of violations of the bathing ordinance. Until some substitute for the river and canal is provided, the greatest vigilance on the part of the police cannot prevent such violations. If anything is to be done to give relief during the present heated term, prompt action on your part will be necessary.

Whereas, Public opinion clearly demands that an honest effort be made by this board to secure an increase in the wages of the assistant teachers in the public schools, and it is the opinion of this board, frequently expressed, that said assistant teachers are entitled to increased pay; and

Whereas, The total amount of funds at the disposal of the board for teachers' wages, estimating the amount to be received from the state the same as last year, viz., \$76,300, is \$306,300, against which is to be charged the following amounts, viz: Ten budgets, from April 1, 1894, to April 1, 1895, \$296,464, taking the April budget as a basis; for night schools, \$4,000; for natural increase in salaries by reason of length of service, \$2,000, and for deficiency in the March budget, \$1,581.13, leaving a surplus of \$2,254.87, which is clearly insufficient to provide for such increase; and

Whereas, Section 133 of the city charter provides that it shall be the duty of the board of education in all their expenditures and contracts to have reference to the amount of moneys which shall be subject to their order during the then current year for the particular expenditure in question, and not to exceed that amount; therefore,

Resolved, That the Finance Committee of the Common Council be, and hereby is, requested to confer with the salary committee of this board and to take such action as may be deemed advisable to provide funds for a reasonable increase in the salaries of the assistant teachers.

Gentlemen: In view of what has been said in the newspapers from time to time upon the question of an increase of teachers' wages I desire to submit as a privileged communication, certain facts and figures prepared entirely from the reports of the superintendent of public instruction, bearing upon all the expenditures of the board of education for teachers' wages since 1884.

Table A shows the appropriations for teachers by the common council from 1884 to 1894, inclusive.

Table B shows the total expenditures for teachers as appears by the annual reports of the teachers' committee, including the amount appropriated by the state.

Table C shows the total number of pupils registered each year according to the sworn statements of the superintendent of public instruction.

Table D shows the total number of teachers employed each year and average number of pupils per teacher.

From the foregoing tables it appears that the increase in the appropriations for teachers' wages in ten years has been 127 per cent. Total expenditures, including state appropriations, have increased 104 per cent in ten years.

The number of teachers employed has increased 79 per cent. in ten years, while the attendance during the same ten years has increased but 56 per cent.

Figuring upon the basis of last year's appropriation, your Finance Committee has added to this year's appropriation the sum of \$24,500, believing that sum sufficient to make an increase in the wages of the lady teachers, if the board of education deem such increase advisable.

This statement is made in justification of the action taken by the Finance Committee and for the purpose of showing at a glance that the problem of teachers' salaries is one for the board of education itself to solve. That the Common Council has been niggardly in their appropriations for the last ten years no one can claim. The increase from year to year has been much greater than the registration of pupils as the sworn statements by the superintendent shows. The average number pupils per teacher last year was thirty, while the reports show that the average number of pupils belonging is about 20 per cent. less than the number registered. It seems that the policy of the Board of Education in the past has been rather to increase the teaching force than to provide adequate compensation to a proper number. However, it is not to find fault with the policy of that board in respect to the number of teachers that this statement is made. In making the appropriations for this year an amount was added to the liberal estimate of last year that it was believed would provide without question for such increase as the lady teachers

were entitled to and with which I am in sympathy.

Again in the able report of the superintendent of public instruction for 1893, Mr. Noyes places the per capita cost of instruction and supervision at \$13.84. The allowance this year including the estimate made for state appropriation is over \$16 per pupil for teaching alone. However, if any error has been made in these calculations the Finance Committee are ready and willing to meet a committee of the board of education as suggested by Commissioner Durand at the meeting of the board of education last evening.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—I deem it my duty to present to you the following observations upon the Genesee river:

During this month there has been a freshet in the river so that the height of water has exceeded any other flood of which we have a record, except the disastrous flood of 1865 and the one of 1873.

As we observed this flood rise hour after hour and day after day and approach the danger limit, and as I was appealed to by merchants to give an opinion whether they should begin to move their goods out of reach of the rising water, I realized fully the smallness of the margin of safety, and our inability to predict with any certainty because of lack of knowledge of the habits of the river in the past. It was in our favor that the flood was clean. There was no ice and but few trees. The trees which did pass down were all subjects for anxious observation, because they were not mere trunks, but whole trees, with projecting roots and branches, and of such shape as to be most likely to catch upon the piers of the bridge and in the aqueduct arches. It was evident to all careful observers that if many such trees came there would be a jam, and it was also evident that if the flow of this flood should be held back by any serious jam, there must necessarily occur immense damage to property in this city. It was also evident that with ice coming down with such a flood, bearing trees, then the chances for a jam would be very much greater. Happily, it was evident that a very considerably larger volume of water could pass without doing damage, provided no jam occurred.

Immediately after the water began to diminish in volume at Rochester, I took advantage of the courteous offer of the Rochester Canoe Club to spend two whole days afloat upon the river, and to make a careful examination of it between Mt. Morris and Rochester.

The river bottom is a rich alluvial flat, varying from one to three miles wide, over which the flood passed at a depth sometimes of several feet, and at a considerable velocity. Through this flat the river channel meanders in a very circuitous course, with a width of 200 to 300 feet, and a depth of 25 feet and more.

The banks of this channel are fringed with

large trees throughout a greater part of the distance. The older trees nearest to the river are generally scarred, sometimes nearly girdled, at heights from five to twenty feet above their roots, by the ice which has shoved against them in past years.

The recent flood has caused considerable change in this channel, by the erosion of the swift current into the banks, which consist of oozing clays and deep black loam. In some cases a new channel has been cut across a loop. At one place, about one-quarter of a mile from Mt. Morris dam, a fine piece of tillable land and woods of perhaps fifty acres has been so cut off from the farm to which it belongs.

By this erosion of the banks many trees have been undermined and tumbled into the channel, but are still held by the roots, which are green. In the course of a few years these roots will be dead and will allow the tree to float away, or the ice will tear the tree free and carry it along.

There are at this time several thousand, I should judge, of such trees lying in the channel of the river between Mt. Morris and Rochester, and such a flood as this one, occurring when there is ice, would undoubtedly bring a great number of them along to Rochester.

I advance the proposition that the city of Rochester has an insurable, if not a vital interest in this subject, and that it should make an effort immediately to have the river put in a safe condition, to the extent of having these trees cut up and removed, and that if no other way can be found it had better pay the cost of such removal than take the risk of leaving them.

But it may be said, I think reasonably, that as long as the state of New York has made the river a part of the water supply of the Erie canal, and has declared this whole portion of the river a navigable river, it should see to it that it does not become a menace to the city of Rochester and to the Erie canal itself, through possible damage to the aqueduct carrying the canal across said river.

I recommend that a committee of your honorable body be appointed to examine the river and report.

LIVINGSTON STREET PAVEMENT.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of improving Livingston street. The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$1,400.

AMBROSE STREET BRICK PAVEMENT.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of improving Ambrose street. The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$11,000.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary and should be made, viz:

The improvement of Ambrose street, from Saratoga avenue to Lake avenue, by the construction of a brick pavement therein with a line of Medina stone curb on each side thereof properly connected with all lateral streets, alleys and driveways. Width of main roadway between curbs to be 28 feet. Also the construction of the necessary crosswalks, surface sewers, manholes, lot laterals, water and gas services and the cleaning of the main sewer in the street if found to be necessary. Also relaying so much of the pipe sewer as may be found necessary. Also the construction of a Portland cement walk, 5 feet wide, on each side of the street, between the limits mentioned, except where good flag or cement walks now exist, which walks shall be relaid if not conforming to the proper grade and alignment.

CHESTNUT STREET BRICK PAVEMENT.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of improving Chestnut street. The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$11,900.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary and should be made, viz:

The improvement of Chestnut street, from East avenue to Court street, by the construction of a brick pavement therein, with a line of Medina stone curb on each side thereof, properly connected with all lateral streets, alleys and driveways. Dear Sir:—We respectfully request that you use your influence to obtain such an amendment to the bicycle ordinance as will permit wheelmen to ride on the foot path of the bridge over the New York Central tracks at East Main street.

The ordinance, as it now stands on the books, regarding the riding on foot paths of bridges, was doubtlessly enacted for the purpose of preventing abuse by wheelmen in the more central portion of the city, where the traffic of both foot passers and wheelmen is very large, and where in many instances the foot paths are very narrow.

The propriety of this ordinance no one can question as applied to these localities. The East Main street railroad bridge, however, is provided with a foot path 15 feet and 3 inches in width, and there is no good reason why wheelmen should be forced to dismount when they are permitted to ride on a 4 foot walk, especially in view of the fact that the number of people passing over this bridge at any hour of the day is very limited.

As a matter of fact, the majority of wheelmen do not dismount and there is no good reason why the law-respecting ones should be discriminated against as they practically are.

that they have carefully examined the bids received for the construction of same, and would recommend that the contract for the cut stone work be awarded to Gilbert Brady and Co. for the amount of their bid, \$2,850, they being the lowest bidders.

When the plan for a new building was first brought to the attention of this board it was understood that the benefit was to accrue to Rochester workmen. The lowest Rochester bidders for iron work is F. L. Heughes & Co., \$10,960. Although there are two lower bidders, they are both residents of other cities, and your committee feels that it would be to the best interest of this city if the contract was awarded to Rochester parties, with the express understanding that the work, so far as is consistent, be done by Rochester workmen, and with that understanding and agreement by the bidders, would recommend that the contract be awarded to Messrs. F. L. Heughes & Co.

Sixteen bids, all from Rochester builders, were received for the mason and carpenter work. Messrs. Bruif, Horn & Co. being the lowest bidders, your committee have decided to report a recommendation that the mason and carpenter work be awarded to them. Your committee has decided to recommend that the contractors be required to furnish good and sufficient bonds, with two sureties, conditioned for the faithful performance of the contract, with a penalty equal to the full contract price.

Your committee therefore recommends that his honor, the Mayor, be requested to execute a contract with the above named contractors for the work upon such building. Said contract to be approved as to form by the City Attorney, and the bond to be furnished to be approved by the members of the special committee.

Gentlemen:—Your attention is respectfully called to the condition of the sidewalk on Lake avenue, from the boundary line of the old ninth ward to the city line. The plank walks within the boundaries spoken of are out of repair to such an extent that they can not be put in a thoroughly safe condition without considerable expense; and the Board thought it expedient under such circumstances to suggest that your honorable body authorize the City Surveyor to introduce an ordinance for the building of new walks of cement or stone to correspond with the walks already laid to the south line of this section of Lake avenue.

Gentlemen:—Your Assessment Committee would respectfully report:

That they have considered the application of George Metcalf and others and of Dr. T.

A. O'Hare for cancellation of certain assessments for the Maple and Colvin street sewer; and as your committee understands the situation these petitioners will be satisfied to pay the assessment for this sewer, providing their premises can be suitably drained. It seems feasible to drain the premises in question through a sewer which now extends through the Gardiner tract; suitable action should be taken by the proper authorities providing for the drainage of the property in question, as there was standing upon the land when your committee viewed the same a large pond of water. Your committee therefore recommend that these petitions be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Asbury Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, of Rochester, that certain taxes erroneously paid in the year 1892 be refunded, we find that under the provisions of chapter 585 of the laws of 1892, parsonages are exempted to the amount of \$2,000, and the property in question is assessed for \$5,400; the tax paid was \$33.50, and the rate \$15.97. Your committee therefore recommend that they be granted a rebate of \$31.94.

In the matter of the petition of the Flour City National Bank for permission to redeem premises sold for taxes, and purchased by them, and known as lots numbers 58 to 69 in section C of the Manhattan Meadow tract, at less than the charter rate of interest, your committee recommend, that said bank be allowed to redeem said property from the sale of said premises for Savannah street sewer improvement, and for which said premises were sold June 10, 1874, and also for the general city tax of 1892, for which said premises were sold, upon the payment of the amount due on said assessments and taxes at the date of sale, together with legal fees on the same and interest at 6 per cent.

In the matter of the petition of Mary J. Swanton for cancellation of tax sales, it appears that the premises which she now owns were sold for taxes June 5, 1885, the amount being \$2.28. In August, 1883, she obtained from the then City Treasurer, a tax search showing that said premises were free and clear of all taxes, and relying upon said search she purchased said premises, but has now learned that said tax of 1854 was unpaid, as aforesaid. We recommend that said tax sale for June 5, 1885, be cancelled. Mrs. Swanton also requests that a certificate of the tax sale, dated April 7, 1881, and recorded the same day in 340 of deeds at page 220, for \$18.88 for sale of said premises for local improvement, be discharged of record, as the tax has been paid. Your committee recommend that the petition of Mrs. Swanton be granted.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: Your Finance Committee beg leave to make the following report upon the Genesee river and the danger of damage to property from trees lying in said river in position to be borne along by the next flood, attention to which was called by the City Surveyor in a communication to your honorable body, which was referred to us.

We determined to make a personal examination of a portion of the river, and because of the importance of the subject, and the unusual character of the problem presented to us, and the direct relation to the subject of the project for controlling the flow of the river by water storage, we decided to invite the water storage committee of the Chamber of Commerce and Senator Parsons and Assemblyman O'Grady to go with us.

On account of the many rapids it is impossible to navigate the upper river at low water except in the lightest boats, and your committee is under great obligation to the members of the Rochester Canoe Club and other canoeists who furnished their canoes, and while paddling, the committee and their guests, enlivened the trip by their enjoyable companionship, and enlightened us from their long experience on the river. The party stopped over night at Mt. Morris and paddled from there to Genesee on the river, occupying fourteen canoes. Although the portion examined is but a small part of that referred to by the City Surveyor, yet we saw enough to fully justify his statements. Many trees lie in the bed of the river, while many others are partly undermined by the current, and many stand close to the edge of steep clayey banks which wear rapidly away at

times of high water. At one place, not far below Mt. Morris dam, the river has made at the last flood a direct channel across two bends, overturning great trees in its course, doing great injury to the farms and making the length of the new channel about one-half a mile where the length of the main channel is fully four miles.

Your committee have thus seen many trees which will evidently be brought down to Rochester by the first flood, and have seen the serious obstructions formed at Main street bridge and Andrews street bridge by the small number of trees lodged by the recent flood, and have in mind the well known fact that immense damage done by the river in 1865 was due to the arches of the Erie canal aqueduct and Main street bridge being choked by driftwood and lumber, and realize that another extreme flood may come within a year. Therefore, we urge upon you the necessity of having these trees, lying in the river and those which are just ready to fall, removed. We do not know to whom these trees belong, and in order that intelligent action can be taken at this time, and that we may be prepared to act upon a recurrence of the same conditions in the future, we recommend that the necessary surveys be made and a map be prepared, showing the river and flats and trees and farm lines with names of owners between Rochester and Mt. Morris and Dansville, utilizing as far as possible existing maps. We believe that such survey and map could be made by the City Surveyor for a sum not exceeding \$1,500, and that the cost of removing all trees now fallen would not exceed \$2,000. It seems to us that because the existing condition is a source of danger to the Erie canal as well as the city of Rochester, and because the river itself is made by law a part of the canal system, and because this portion of the river is made by law a public highway, that the state of New York should have the trees removed and the river put in a safe condition.

Therefore, we recommend that the state of New York be requested to remove the source of danger, and that further action upon your part be deferred until communication can be had with the proper state officials, and we recommend the adoption of the following:

street begins at Cottage street and runs west to Genesee street, a distance of about 3,500 feet. At its eastern end, between Cottage street and Plymouth avenue, there is a good sewer. At its western end, for a distance of about 2,700 feet, only 200 feet of sewer has been laid. Near the western end of the street the ground is six to seven feet lower than at other portions of the street. The houses in this section are badly drained.

While there has been no demand for a sewer on the part of the residents, it is imperative that provision be made for the disposal of house waste and surface water.

It shall not be lawful for any person to drive or cause to be driven or permit his or her servant to drive upon any of the paved, macadamized or improved streets, avenues, alleys, lanes, public places or squares in the city of Rochester, any wagon or other vehicle having upon it a weight, which together with the weight of the wagon or vehicle shall exceed 2,000 pounds, unless the tires upon such wagon or vehicle shall be at least three inches in width; nor shall any wagon or vehicle having upon it a weight, which together with the weight of the wagon or vehicle shall exceed 4,000 pounds be so driven in or upon any such paved, macadamized or improved streets, avenues, alleys, lanes, public squares or places in said city unless such tires shall be at least four inches in width; nor shall any wagon or vehicle having upon it a weight, which together with the weight of the wagon or vehicle shall exceed 6,000 pounds be so driven in or upon any such paved, macadamized or improved street, avenue, alley, lane or public square in said city, unless such tires shall be at least six inches in width under a penalty of not less than \$5 nor more than \$25 for each and every offense. But this section shall not apply to vehicles used by farmers coming into the city with produce or fuel. The provisions of this section shall not take effect until January 1, 1895. All penalties collected under this section shall be placed to the credit of the highway fund of said city.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester.

Gentlemen:—The resolution of your body adopted at the meeting held on July 10th, awarding the contract for lighting the city hall to the Rochester Gas & Electric Company, is hereby returned unapproved.

It is only after long and earnest consideration of the whole subject involved that I have decided to take this action. There are two reasons for my withholding approval of this resolution. The first is that the contract was not awarded to the lowest bidder.

While I recognize there are times when the lowest bid for public work may be ignored, I believe this is not one of them. In this instance, the amount at stake being exceedingly insignificant, your action might go unquestioned, were it not that more serious consideration is involved—that of the principle of competition.

It is in the latter fact that I find the second and main reason for asking a reconsideration of your action on your part.

In response to a request for proposals made by your committee on city property two proposals were received. One came from the Rochester Gas & Electric Company, and the other from the Citizens' Light & Power Company; the bid of the former being \$800, and that of the latter \$769, for furnishing light for the city hall building for one year. By accepting either of these bids the city would secure most favorable terms, inasmuch as, heretofore, the city has been paying to the Rochester Gas & Electric Company \$1,700 per year for the same service. But it is only by reason of the fact that there was competition in the bidding this reduced rate could be secured.

Though I do not question the motives of your body in this matter, I believe the judgment of the council from a business standpoint is open to criticism; indeed it has already been criticised by the public. It is your duty as the legislative body of the city, as it is also my duty as its executive officer, to conduct the public business in such a manner as shall bring the best results to the citizens, not alone as taxpayers but as individuals entirely independent of their relations to the municipality. Since this is so, it is your duty to encourage competition in every line of business and trade which can affect the municipality or its residents and citizens.

In this instance the bid of the Citizens' Light and Power Company, which has entered the field as a competitor of the Rochester Gas and Electric Company, a corporation which has for a long time enjoyed a monopoly of public lighting, was lower than that of the older company.

By awarding the contract to this company the council would not only exercise economy

and show good business judgment, but it would at the same time encourage honest competition. Such action would be in line with what the public now, more than ever before, is demanding. No one can suppose for a moment that had it not been for the presence of this new company in the field, the corporation which has enjoyed the contract for five years at \$1,700, would have dropped to \$500, less than half its former rate. The good effect of the presence of the new company has been shown in other instances, for by reason of its desire to gain a foothold, and the desire of the old corporation to shut out all competition at the start, the council has been able to contract for lights in some parts of the city at the rate of 10 cents per light per night, where heretofore it has paid 25 cents per night.

I come now to the reason as given by the members of your body for ignoring the lower of the two bids and voting to award the contract to the Rochester Gas and Electric Company, viz.: That the wires in the city hall are the private property of the Rochester Gas and Electric Company, and that therefore it is economy to award the contract to this company, since any other action would involve their purchase by the city.

I do not believe this is a sufficient reason for discouraging competition, for in the first place this city ought, by all means, to own the wires.

Would there be justification in allowing a company or corporation dealing in coal to own the boilers in the basement of the city hall and the heating apparatus throughout the building, and on this account, deny itself the right to secure its coal from the lowest bidder, confining itself to the proposal of the firm or corporation owning the boilers and heating apparatus?

The Rochester Gas and Electric Company has offered to sell its wires to the city for the sum of \$900, and this offer I would recommend to be accepted, were it not for the fact that an examination of them which I have caused to be made by an expert representing the Board of Fire Underwriters, as well as by City Electrician C. R. Barnes, has revealed the fact that the system as it now exists is crude and defective and does not come up to the requirements of the Board of Fire Underwriters.

Among the many defects which have been pointed out by the fire underwriters' expert, and with whose opinion Mr. Barnes coincides, may be mentioned the improper insulation of the wires, the improper installation of cords, lack of switch protection, defective cutouts, back-numbered switch bases and ceiling blocks, improper wiring of fixtures, improper insulation of fixture joints, lack of lightning arresters and fuse, besides many others which are deemed serious in the eyes of an electrician and the insurance companies. While it may be claimed that the fire-proof condition of the city hall would offset some of these defects, I am assured that the surrounding property, in the eyes of the insurance companies, suffers therefrom and must pay the penalty for these defects. Moreover, aside from the result of such defective system in its bearing on insurance, the city can ill afford to endanger its valuable documents, maps, charts and records to be found in the offices of the city surveyor, city assessors, treasurer, water works and other departments to the possibility of destruction by fire, for experience has taught that even in so-called fire-proof buildings too great an individual would be allowed, if he so desired, to maintain such a defective system,

and certainly the city ought not to place itself in the position of doing what would not be tolerated if done by one of its citizens.

Another matter which, when the subject of lighting the city hall is considered, becomes a serious one, is the insufficient carrying capacity of the wires now in use, they not being so-called "standard" wires. The present system of wires was put in when the demands were not nearly so great as now. Lights have been added from time to time until the wires are no longer sufficient for carrying the current needed to give proper results from the lights.

The city is in no wise bound to purchase these wires, even if it reject the bid of the owners, for in the contract with the Edison company, which company became a part of the so-called consolidated company, I find this very wise provision:

"Said party of the first part shall also, if required by the common council, immediately remove any and all its wires, fastenings, attachments, lamps and appurtenances after their use have been discontinued under the terms thereof."

In view of the facts to which I have just referred, it would be quite improper for the city to consider for a moment any offer made by the Rochester Gas and Electric Company looking to the purchase of its wires and fixtures. The city should not buy what it cannot use.

It can, however, work no hardship to the Rochester Gas and Electric Company for the city to act under the clause of the contract quoted above, and order the removal of the wires, etc., since under the contract just expired the wires must have been paid for many times over. As I understand, proposals for the re-wiring of the city hall in a manner meeting the needs of the city and requirements of the Board of Fire Underwriters have already been received by the proper committee. It is your duty, in view of all the facts, to at once authorize the acceptance of the lowest proposal for doing this work. The city will then be the owner of all fixtures, as it ought to be, and will be independent of any and all companies, having the privilege of securing its current where it pleases and on the most favorable terms. The city, at no distant date, either independently or in conjunction with the county, must maintain its own plant for lighting the city buildings. The acquiring of the ownership of its wires and fixtures will be one step in this direction.

Though it has been urged that the contract awarded under the resolution to which this communication has reference is to run for one year only, and that therefore the city can afford to delay taking steps herein indicated, I believe the present is the time for your board to act, thereby helping to secure to the city and to citizens free and honest competition in the matter of public and private lighting.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—I submit an ordinance for a sewer in Lozier park and across lots, at the request of the Board of Health.

At the end of Lozier park and northerly therefrom there exists a stagnant pond of water, constituting a menace to the health of the neighborhood. This territory was assessed for building the Lyell avenue and Saxton street sewer and the Maple and Colvin streets sewer, and is entitled to drainage in that direction. This can be secured, but in order to do so it would be necessary to rebuild the sewer in Chili avenue for a length of 1,800 feet under an asphalt pavement, at a cost of \$7,000.

On account of this large cost it seems advisable to build a 12-inch pipe sewer across lots into the sewer in Merton street, which will afford the required relief and will not cost more than \$150, besides the cost of necessary right of way.

The lots on Chili avenue have been included within the assessment area because by the building of this little sewer they are relieved from the far greater expense of rebuilding the sewer in Chili avenue.

Gentlemen:—The Executive Board is in receipt of the following communication from the City Surveyor relating to the abatement of a nuisance alleged to be occasioned by the discharge of sewage into the race of the Rochester Power Company:

To the Executive Board.

Gentlemen:—For many years that portion of the Genesee river from the Johnson & Seymour dam to Central avenue dam has been in a most unsanitary condition during the times of low water and it is believed to have been the source of much sickness. The cause of this has been the discharge of several sewers into the upper river. It is now possible to discharge it into the East Side Trunk Sewer all that is delivered by the old Twelfth ward outlet so that the trouble is reduced to that arising from the sewers in East Main street and Andrews street, and from buildings along the river and upon Main street bridge. North Water street, upon which many thousands of people are employed in manufactories is in a very unsanitary condition, not only because all of the buildings on the west side of the street face the river, but because there is no sewer in the street and the buildings upon the east side of the street have no suitable drainage.

The comprehensive plan which I recommend is: Drive a horizontal tunnel five feet square into the face of the cliff just east of the power house of the Rochester Power Company. This tunnel to be at the low water level of the water in the river below the falls and will extend 150 feet to a point under the center of Central avenue, and North Water street. Sink a vertical shaft five feet square from the surface about eighty feet to the end of the tunnel. In this shaft discharge Central avenue sewer and from it build a brick circular shaped sewer three feet nine inches in

diameter through the whole length of North Water street to the center of Main street. Into this sewer discharge the existing sewers in River street, Andrews street, Mortimer street and Main street and from it put laterals into the buildings upon both sides of Water street. Then having caused all of the buildings upon the east side of Front street and Graves street to be drained into existing sewers instead of into the river, the river will be maintained in good sanitary condition.

The Johnson & Seymour race occupies North Water street for a distance of about 400 feet north of Main street. The proposed sewer in this part of the street would be laid in the bottom of said race and be made thoroughly tight by the liberal use of Portland concrete, and would be connected with the Main street sewer by tunneling through the east abutment of the arch which carries Main street over said race, thus obviating the disturbance of the new pavement on Main street, or, in fact, Water street between Main and Mortimer streets.

I estimate the cost of such work as follows:
 140 lineal feet tunnel, at \$15. \$ 2,100 00
 80 lineal feet shaft, at \$8. 640 00
 1,470 lineal feet sewer, at \$10. 14,700 00
 460 lineal feet sewer, at \$15. 6,900 00
 Three manholes, at \$50. 150 00
 Sixty lot laterals, at \$50. 3,000 00
 Damage to race owners. 1,500 00
 Contingencies 980 00

Total \$30,000 00

It would seem to be proper to assess the cost of such improvement upon all of the territory draining into the sewers. The area covers 285.34 acres, extending to Marietta street, on North St. Paul street, nearly to Hand street, on North Clinton street; to Catherine street on St. Joseph street; to Hudson park on Hudson avenue; nearly to North avenue on Central avenue; Clinton place, Andrews street and Franklin street; to Chestnut street on East avenue; to Court street on South Clinton street and South St. Paul street.

The Executive Board recommends that if the contamination of the water of this race be as great as reported the plan of relief submitted by the City Surveyor be approved.

To the Honorable, the Executive Board of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—In the matter of the overflow of water on the property of the Rochester Gas & Electric Company, at Vincent place, which was referred to Mr. Friedel and myself, I beg leave to report that we have examined the locality and recommend that a sewer be built in Vincent place, from the sewer in St. Paul street to the stone box sewer on the flats just south of the bridge. This sewer should consist of 24-inch vitrified pipe from St. Paul street to the end of the bridge, and wrought iron pipe fifteen inches in diameter down over the bank to the existing stone sewer.

This will cost about \$2,500, and will prevent

the damage complained of and will be a benefit to all the property draining into the St. Paul street sewer.

In view of the fact that the surface improvement of this section of Vincent place is contemplated, the Executive Board suggest that it would be expedient to postpone such improvement until such a sewer as referred to in the above communication from the City Surveyor be constructed. The old sewer that now takes away the sewage of Vincent place has been the cause of considerable expense every year since its construction; and probably there is no remedy that will save such continuous outlay as well as avoid the damage which has been caused to adjacent property, except the one proposed by the City Surveyor.

The board therefore recommends that an ordinance be introduced for the construction of the sewer spoken of in the communication above given.

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Chestnut street, from East avenue to Monroe avenue.

Adopted.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That all persons interested in the subject matter of any and all improvements contemplated to be made in or by any order, ordinance or resolution adopted, or passed or amended at this or any subsequent meeting, and the expense whereof in whole or in part is contemplated to be

paid by a local assessment, are hereby directed to attend the Common Council at the next regular meeting after the passage or adoption of any such resolution, order or ordinance, or amendment thereto, unless otherwise specially provided in an order, resolution or ordinance, at 7:30 P. NORTH ST. PAUL STREET (SEC. 2) SPRINKLING.

On motion of Ald. Ward, the Common Council proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the following ordinance, viz.:

An ordinance to sprinkle (Sec. 2) North St. Paul street, from Avenue E to the Ridge road,

And after hearing such allegations from all persons appearing,

The Common Council of the city of Rochester, do ordain and determine that the following improvement is necessary and should be made, to wit:

The sprinkling of (Sec. 2) North St. Paul street, from Avenue E to the Ridge road, during the season of 1894.

And the City Surveyor, under direction of this Council, having made and reported as an estimate of the expense thereof, the sum of \$432, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved, and the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all the following portion and part of the city which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for, and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of North St. Paul street, from Avenue E to the Ridge road.

An ordinance to construct a pine plank walk on Smith street, from State street to Frankfort street.

And after hearing such allegations from all persons appearing,

The Common Council of the city of Rochester, do ordain and determine that the following improvement is necessary and should be made, to wit:

The construction of a pine plank walk, 5 feet 4 inches wide, on the north side of Smith street, from State street to Frankfort street, except where good flag, cement or plank walks now exist.

FINAL ORDINANCE NO. 5,579.

GENESSEE STREET PORTLAND CEMENT WALK.

On motion of Ald. Edelman, the Common Council proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the following ordinance, viz.:

An ordinance to construct cement walks on Genesee street, from West avenue to Brooks avenue.

And after hearing such allegations from all persons appearing.

The Common Council of the city of Rochester, do ordain and determine that the following improvement is necessary and should be made, to wit:

The construction of a Portland cement walk, 5 feet wide, on each side of Genesee street, from West avenue to Brooks avenue, except that where good flag, cement or plank walks now exist they shall be relaid where necessary to conform to the proper grade and alignment. Also the necessary sidewalk grading, crosswalk extensions, and resetting of manurements.

And the City Surveyor, under direction of this Council, having made and reported as an estimate of the expense thereof, the sum of \$9,900, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved, and the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all the following portion and part of the city which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for, and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Genesee street, from West avenue to Brooks avenue.

Adopted by the following vote:

Final ordinance for Exchange street Medina block pavement came up, and after hearing allegations, upon motion of Ald. Tracy action thereon was postponed until the first regular meeting in June, 1895.

WALK, CURB AND GUTTER ON GORHAM PARK.

On motion of Ald. Edelman, the Common Council proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the following ordinance, viz.:

An ordinance to construct a cement walk and set curb and gutter on Gorham park, from Gorham street to Hand street.

And after hearing such allegations from all persons appearing.

The Common Council of the city of Rochester, do ordain and determine that the following improvement is necessary and should be made, to wit:

The construction of a Portland cement walk, 4 feet wide, and setting a line of Medina stone curb and gutter on each side of Gorham park, from Gorham street to Hand street. Width of roadway between curbs to be 20 feet, and to be properly connected with all lateral streets, alleys and driveways. Also the construction of the necessary manholes and surface sewers.

And the City Surveyor, under direction of this Council, having made and reported as an estimate of the expense thereof, the sum of \$1,575, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved, and the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all the following portion and part of the city which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for, and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Gorham park, from Gorham street to Hand street.

Adopted by the following vote:

FINAL ORDINANCE NO. 5,581.

AMBROSE STREET BRICK PAVEMENT.

On motion of Ald. Edelman, the Common Council proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the following ordinance, viz.:

An ordinance to construct a brick pavement on Ambrose street, from Saratoga avenue to Lake avenue.

And after hearing such allegations from all persons appearing.

The Common Council of the city of Rochester, do ordain and determine that the following improvement is necessary and should be made, to wit:

The improvement of Ambrose street, from Saratoga avenue to Lake avenue, by the construction of a brick pavement therein with a line of Medina stone curb on each side thereof properly connected with all lateral streets, alleys and driveways. Width of main roadway between curbs to be 25 feet. Also the construction of the necessary crosswalks, surface sewers, manholes, lot laterals, water and gas services and the cleaning of the main sewer in the street if found to be necessary. Also relaying so much of the pipe sewer as may be found necessary. Also the construction of a Portland cement walk, 5 feet wide, on each side of the street, between the limits mentioned, except where good flag or cement walks now exist, which walks shall be relaid if not conforming to the proper grade and alignment.

And the City Surveyor, under direction of this Council, having made and reported as an estimate of the expense thereof, the sum of \$11,000, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved, and the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all the following portion and part of the city which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for, and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Ambrose street, from Saratoga avenue to Lake avenue.

Adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Ald. Tracy, Callhan, McMillan, Green, Rauber, Adams, Edelman, Fox, Powell, Ashton, Ward, Dewey, Cook, Pauckner, Kelly, Aikenhead, Simmelink, Harris—18.

Ald. Powell moved that the Executive Board be requested to defer the letting of the contract for the foregoing improvement until June, 1895. Carried.

FINAL ORDINANCE NO. 5,582.

SOUTH CULVER STREET MACADAM IMPROVEMENT.

On motion of Ald. Edelman, the Common Council proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the following ordinance, viz.:

An ordinance to construct a macadam pavement on South Culver street, from East avenue to the Erie canal bridge.

And after hearing such allegations from all persons appearing.

The Common Council of the city of Rochester, do ordain and determine that the following improvement is necessary and should be made, to wit:

The improvement of South Culver street, from East avenue to the Erie canal bridge, by the construction of a macadam pavement therein, with a line of Medina stone curb and gutter on each side thereof, properly connected with all lateral streets, alleys and

driveways. Width of roadway between curbs to be 30 feet. Also the necessary crosswalks, surface sewers, manholes, lot laterals, water and gas services. Also a five-foot Portland cement walk on each side of said street, between the limits mentioned, and manuring and seeding the parking between said walks and curbstone.

And the City Surveyor, under direction of this Council, having made and reported as an estimate of the expense thereof, the sum of \$23,000, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved, and the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all the following portion and part of the city which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for, and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on the west side of South Culver street, from East avenue to the Erie canal bridge.

Adopted by the following vote:
Ayes—Ald. Tracy, Callihan, McMillan, Green, Rauber, Adams, Edelman, Fox, Powell, Ashton, Ward, Dewey, Cook, Pauckner, Kelly, Aikenhead, Simmelink, Harris—18.

FINAL ORDINANCE NO. 5,583.

GLENWOOD AVENUE PIPE SEWER.

On motion of Ald. Edelman, the Common Council proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the following ordinance, viz.:

An ordinance to construct a pipe sewer in Glenwood avenue, from near the west line of First street to the shaft in the West Side Trunk Sewer near the east line of Champion street.

And after hearing such allegations from all persons appearing.

The Common Council of the city of Rochester, do ordain and determine that the following improvement is necessary and should be made, to wit:

The connection of the present Glenwood avenue sewer with the West Side Trunk Sewer by the construction of a vitrified pipe sewer 20 inches in diameter, in Glenwood avenue, from a point near the west line of First street to the shaft near the east line of Champion street. Also a vitrified pipe sewer, 12 inches in diameter, from a point 25 feet west of Fulton avenue to said shaft. Also the connection of First street and Glenwood avenue sewers. Also the necessary manholes, surface sewers, lot laterals, branches, roadway grading and gutter formations.

And the City Surveyor, under direction of this Council, having made and reported as an estimate of the expense thereof, the sum of \$1,800, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved, and the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all the following portion and part of the city which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for, and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Glenwood avenue, from a point 147 feet east of Thrush street to Fulton avenue; also one tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of First street, from Lexington avenue to Glenwood avenue; also one tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Fourth street, from Ravine avenue to the north lines of lots Nos. 99 and 100 of the Glenwood Mutual Homestead Association tract.

Adopted by the following vote:
Ayes—Ald. Tracy, Callihan, McMillan, Green, Rauber, Adams, Edelman, Fox, Powell, Ashton, Ward, Dewey, Cook, Pauckner, Kelly, Aikenhead, Simmelink, Harris—18.

FINAL ORDINANCE NO. 5,584.

OXFORD STREET EXTENSION.

On motion of Ald. Edelman, the Common Council proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the following ordinance, viz.:

An ordinance to extend Oxford street from its present southerly terminus to Monroe avenue.

And after hearing such allegations from all persons appearing.

The Common Council of the city of Rochester, do ordain and determine that the following improvement is necessary and should be made, to wit:

The extension of Oxford street, from its present southerly terminus to Monroe avenue. And the land to be taken for said extension is bounded and described as follows:

A strip of land 80 feet wide, extending from the present southerly end of Oxford street to the northerly side of lots numbered 5 and 25 of the Nichols park subdivision, and a strip of land 50 feet wide, extending from the aforesaid northerly lines of lots 5 and 25 to Monroe avenue. All of which land is included within the lines of what is known as Nichols park, as shown on a map of Nichols park, made by John Crosman, surveyor, and filed in the Monroe county clerk's office January 2, 1874, in liber 2, page 34, of maps.

And the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all the following portion and part of the city which this Council deems proper to be so assessed, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of the proposed extension of Oxford street, from the south end of Oxford street to Monroe avenue, as they exist at the date of the passage of this ordinance.

Ald. Dewey presented a remonstrance against same. Ordered received and filed.

Adopted by the following vote:
Ayes—Ald. Tracy, Callihan, McMillan, Green, Rauber, Adams, Edelman, Fox, Powell, Ashton, Ward, Dewey, Cook, Pauckner, Kelly, Aikenhead, Simmelink, Harris—18.

Final ordinance for University avenue sewer came up. Ald. Adams presented the following amendment.

By Ald. Adams—Resolved, That the ordinance for University avenue sewer be amended to read as follows:

UNIVERSITY AVENUE SEWER.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of building a sewer in University avenue, from the west side of the crossing of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad to the East Side Trunk Sewer in Culver street.

The Surveyor submitted as such estimate, \$13,000.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the following improvement is necessary and should be made, viz.:

Building a sewer in University avenue, from the west side of the crossing of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad to the East Side Trunk Sewer in Culver street, together with the necessary manholes, laterals and surface sewers.

And the City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, having made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reported the same at \$13,000, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved.

Resolved, further, that the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all of the following portion and part of the city, which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

All the territory included within the following described lines:

Beginning at the corner of North Goodman street and Anderson avenue, thence easterly along Anderson avenue, including one tier of lots on the north side thereof, excepting the lot at the northeast corner of Anderson avenue and North Goodman street, to the southerly line of lands of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad; thence easterly and southerly along the boundary lines of said N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R. to University avenue; thence easterly along University avenue to Henry street; thence northerly along Henry street, including one tier of lots on the west side thereof, excepting such lots as are owned by the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R. to Leighton avenue; thence easterly along Leighton avenue, including one tier of lots on the north side thereof and also including the lot at the northwest corner of Leighton avenue and Henry street, to Culver street; thence southerly along Culver street to the northerly line of lands of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R.; thence westerly and northerly along the line of said N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R. to University avenue; thence westerly along the southerly line of University avenue to the southerly line of lands of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R.; thence easterly along said southerly line of said lands of said railroad to the easterly line of land owned by M. A. Culver; thence southerly along said easterly line of Culver's land and along the east line of land of the Rochester Plow Company to Culver park; thence westerly along Culver park to the center of Jersey street, excluding one tier of lots on the north side of said Culver park; thence westerly along Culver park and University avenue to North Goodman street, including one tier of lots on the south side of said Culver park and University avenue and excluding the lot at the southeast corner of said University avenue and North Goodman street; thence northerly along North Goodman street, excluding one tier of lots on the east side thereof to Anderson avenue, the place of beginning.

Adopted.

Ordinance laid over under the rules.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Ald. Dewey having at a previous meeting given notice of an amendment to the dog ordinance, introduced the following:

By Ald. Dewey—

DOG ORDINANCE.

Sec. 1. No dog or animal of the dog kind shall be permitted to run at large in the city of Rochester unless muzzled when required as hereinafter provided nor unless said dog shall wear a collar of metal or leather bearing a tag or plate such as is prescribed in this ordinance; and any dog found running at large without said tag or without being properly muzzled when required, may be caught by any member of the police force, or any other person, and taken into his custody and possession.

Sec. 2. Every owner or keeper of a dog, or animal of the dog kind, within the city of Rochester, shall cause the same to be registered, numbered and described in the office of the city clerk of said city under a penalty of not more than \$10 for each offence. The City Clerk shall keep a complete registry of all dogs, in a book to be kept for that purpose, describing the same by name, breed, color and sex, and shall also enter the name and address of the owner or keeper as given, and the number of the city license tag; he shall provide such number of metal tags, of not less than three-fourths of an inch in width, as may be necessary, bearing on the face serial numbers; and such tag shall be furnished by the City Clerk to each owner of a dog at the time of registering said dog and shall be attached to the collar of such animal. It is hereby declared a misdemeanor,

punishable by a fine of five dollars (\$5) to counterfeit, or use any other tag than that furnished by the City Clerk. The fee for registering each dog shall be twenty-five (25) cents, and for furnishing the metal tag seventy-five cents, and all monies and fines collected under this ordinance shall be placed to the credit of the police pension fund.

Sec. 3. Notice shall be given the owner by publication in the official paper of the city of Rochester of the seizure and impounding of any dog in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance; and said dog shall be kept with proper food and water for forty-eight (48) hours after the publication of such notice, during which time the owner may redeem such dog by the payment of the expense of such publication and the expense of his keeping, not exceeding the sum of \$1, to be paid to the person caring for such dog, and the further payment to the City Clerk of one dollar (\$1) for registration fee and tag; if said dog is not redeemed within forty-eight (48) hours after the publication of the above mentioned notice, the superintendent of police may direct that such animal be killed; and in case no owner appears to redeem said dog, the person by whom such animal was kept shall be paid a sum not to exceed fifty cents by said superintendent of police, which sum shall be a charge upon that part of the police pension fund credited with the fees and fines collected for registering and tagging dogs.

Sec. 4. If any dog shall be found running at large in the streets of the city of Rochester, or in any public place, or upon the private premises of any other person than the owner or keeper of the dog, and shall there endanger or annoy any person, the owner or keeper thereof shall, upon conviction, be liable to a fine of a sum not exceeding ten dollars (\$10) for the first offence for permitting such dog to be at large; and upon a second and further conviction for a similar offence, the said owner or keeper shall be liable to a fine of a sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars (\$25), and it may be a part of the sentence or the second conviction that such dog immediately be killed; and this sentence forthwith shall be executed by the superintendent of police, or any police officer, for which killing the owner or keeper shall pay the further sum of one dollar (\$1), which sum shall be included in the said judgment; and any owner or keeper of any fierce, dangerous or unmuzzled dog who refuses to deliver up the same to any police officer for the purpose of being killed in compliance with said judgment, shall be liable to an additional fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100). It shall be lawful for any person attacked by any dog to kill such animal forthwith in self defense.

Sec. 5. No person shall keep or suffer to be kept, on his premises, or the premises occupied by him, within the city of Rochester, nor suffer to run at large in said city, any dog of ferocious and dangerous character, habit or disposition; nor any dog in the habit of howling or whining at night, or barking at, or in any manner annoying, any person passing along, or using, a street, or streets, of said city; and any person who owns or harbors such dog or dogs above mentioned shall be subject to a fine of not less than five dollars (\$5) nor more than twenty-five dollars (\$25).

Sec. 6. No female dog in time of heat shall be allowed to run at large within the city limits, and it shall be lawful for any police officer to kill such animal when caught outside of her owner's enclosed premises, or to kill any male dog offending public decency on account of said female dog; and it shall be lawful for any police officer to kill any dog or dogs found fighting in the streets.

Sec. 7. Whenever the mayor of the city of Rochester shall deem it necessary, he shall

issue an order prohibiting, for a certain time therein specified, any and all dogs from running at large in any street, alley or other public place in said city unless such dogs be securely muzzled, or led by a line or chain, so as effectually to prevent them from biting any person or animal; which order shall be published in the official newspaper of the said city.

Sec. 8. No action to recover damages for the killing of a dog can be maintained within the city of Rochester unless it is shown that the said dog was registered in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 9. Every execution upon a judgment recovered for any fine or penalty or forfeiture imposed for the violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be issued immediately on the rendition of the judgment and shall command the amount to be made out of the personal property of the defendant within the city not exempt from levy and sale under an execution, if such can be found, and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentiary for such time as shall have been directed by the justice, judge or court rendering such judgment and may be issued to and enforced by any member of the police department of said city. Such execution may be issued by the police justice or police clerk of said city, where the judgment was rendered by the police justice of said city.

Sec. 10. Any person harboring a dog for two days prior to any violation of the terms of this ordinance shall be held to be the owner of said dog.

Sec. 11. All existing ordinances inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 12. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Ordered received, filed and published. and upon motion of Ald. Dewey action thereon was postponed two weeks.

Action upon the amendment to an ordinance introduced at the last meeting of this board by Ald. Dewey and reported at page 169 current proceedings being in order. Ald. Dewey asked and received unanimous consent to introduce the following and move its adoption.

By Ald. Dewey—

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 10 of an ordinance relating to streets, passed February 15, 1887, published at pages 462 to 470 of the proceedings of the Common Council for 1886 and 1887.

Sec. 1. Section ten of an ordinance relating to streets passed February 15, 1887, published at pages 462 to 470 of the proceedings of the Common Council for 1886 and 1887 is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 10. It shall not be lawful for any person to drive or cause to be driven or permit his or her servant to drive upon any of the paved, macadamized or improved streets, avenues, alleys, lanes, public places or squares in the city of Rochester, any wagon or other vehicle having upon it a weight, which together with the weight of the wagon or vehicle shall exceed 2,000 pounds, unless the tires upon such wagon or vehicle shall be at least three inches in width; nor shall any wagon or vehicle having upon it a weight, which together with the weight of the wagon or vehicle shall exceed 5,000 pounds be so driven in or upon any such paved, macadamized or improved streets, avenues, alleys, lanes, public squares or places in said city unless such tires shall be at least four inches in width; under a penalty of not less than \$5 nor more than \$25 for each and every offense. tion shall not take effect until January 1, 1895. All penalties collected under this section shall be placed to the credit of the highway fund of said city.

Gentlemen: In the transmission of the communication of the City Surveyor presented to the Executive Board in relation to the nuisance created by the flow of sewage from the Central avenue and River street sewers in the mill race of the Rochester Power Company, which was referred to your honorable body at its last meeting, two paragraphs of the introduction were accidentally omitted; and the Executive Board requests that the record be corrected by the publication of the following copy of the entire communication.

To the Executive Board:

Gentlemen: In the matter of abating the nuisance occasioned by the discharge of the Central avenue and River street sewers into the power race of the Rochester Power Company, which was referred to me by resolution of your honorable body, I beg leave to report:

This same subject was referred to me a year ago, and I have delayed reporting because of not arriving at a reasonable conclusion.

The question of abating the nuisance occasioned by the discharge of the East Main street sewer into the river under the easterly arch of Main street bridge has also been referred to me by the Board of Health.

For many years that portion of the Genesee river from the Johnson and Seymour dam to Central avenue dam has been in most unsanitary condition during the times of low water, and is believed to have been the source of much illness. The cause of this has been the discharge of several sewers into the upper river. It is now possible to discharge into the East Side trunk sewer all that is delivered by the old Twelfth ward outlet so that the trouble is reduced to that arising from the sewers in East Main street and Andrews street, and from buildings along the river and upon Main street bridge.

North Water street upon which many thousands of people are employed in the manufactories, is in a very unsanitary condition, not only because all of the buildings on the

west side of the street face the river, but because there is no sewer in the street and the buildings upon the east side of the street have no suitable drainage.

The comprehensive plan which I recommend is as follows:

Drive a horizontal tunnel five feet square into the face of the cliff just east of the power house of the Rochester Power Co. This tunnel to be at the low water level of the water in the river below the falls and will extend 150 feet to a point under the center of Central avenue and North Water street; sink a vertical shaft five feet square from the surface about 80 feet to the end of the tunnel. In this shaft discharge Central avenue sewer and from it build a brick circular shaped sewer three feet nine inches in diameter through the whole length of North Water street to the center of Main street. Into this sewer discharge the existing sewers in River, Andrews, Mortimer and Main streets and from it put laterals into the buildings on both sides of Water street. Then having caused all the buildings upon the east side of Front and Graves streets to be drained into existing sewers instead of into the river, the river will be maintained in good sanitary condition.

The Johnson and Seymour race occupies North Water street for a distance of about 400 feet north of Main street. The proposed sewer in this part of the street would be laid in the bottom of said race and be made thoroughly tight by the use of Portland cement concrete, and would be connected with the Main street sewer by tunneling through the east abutment of the arch which carries Main street over said race, thus obviating the disturbance of the new pavement on Main street, or in fact on Water street between Main and Mortimer streets.

I estimate the cost of such work as follows:

It would seem to be proper to assess the cost of such improvement upon all of the territory draining into the sewers. The area contains 285.34 acres extending to Marietta street on North St. Paul street, nearly to Hand street on North Clinton street, to Catherine street on St. Joseph street, to Hudson park on Hudson avenue, nearly to North street on Central avenue, Clinton place, Andrews street and Franklin street, to Chestnut street on East avenue, to Court street on South Clinton street and South St. Paul street.

Gentlemen: Your Finance Committee, to which was referred the claim of John C. Ryan for extra work ordered by the City Assessors and City Surveyor would respectfully report:

That they, together with the City Auditor, have carefully examined the claim and find as a matter of law that Mr. Ryan has no legal claim against the city for services rendered, neither the City Assessors nor the City Surveyor having any authority under the charter to order work done. We, however, believe that Mr. Ryan has an equitable claim against the city, the services having been performed. The City Auditor, in his report to the committee, says of the claim: "I am led to believe it is based upon equitable grounds, a possible exception being the single item of \$200 for salary of two men two months." As this item has received the approval of the Map and Survey Committee we have decided to allow it and would therefore recommend the payment of the bill as presented.

The communication of the Auditor requesting the Common Council to make provision for a clerk for his office, heretofore referred to this committee, has also been carefully considered. Your committee recognizes the great amount of work performed by the Auditor, which, under the supervision of Mr. Mann is done in such a capable and thorough manner and believe that a competent clerk would be a desirable adjunct to the office. Your committee, however, feel that this is not the time for increasing the clerical force in any office. When the salary of the Auditor was fixed, it was placed at the extreme limit allowed by the charter, with the understanding that the Auditor should pay his own clerk hire. What view the Common Council would take in the matter of salary is, therefore, doubtful, if it was understood that a clerk was to be provided for the office. That the work of the office has greatly increased during the past year we recognize and would suggest that at times of great pressure a clerk from one of the other offices might be detailed to assist the Auditor. Your committee would therefore recommend that he request of the Auditor be denied.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: In the matter of the threatened control of the shores of Hemlock lake by private individuals or corporations mentioned in the communication presented to this council and referred to the Law Committee, we beg leave to report, that your committee, accompanied by His Honor, the Mayor, the Chief Engineer of the Water Works, the City Surveyor, the City Attorney, and representatives of the Rochester newspapers, visited Hemlock lake and made a careful examination of the matters to which attention was called in that communication.

We found that there was some foundation

for the rumor that foreign capitalists were preparing to buy up the shores of Hemlock lake. We did not find that any actual transfers of property had been made, but we found that they had caused a survey to be made of the shores of the lake and, though their representatives, had secured options upon a portion of the property on the lake. Some of these options have expired and others have been extended to the first of next year. No money, however, has been paid except in one or two instances, and in those cases but a few dollars have been invested. It is well known that a short time ago one of the owners of a part of the lake front unsuccessfully tried to dispose of his property to the city at a fabulous price, and the movement to control the shores of the lake seems to have originated with him. We do not find that the rest of the owners of the lake front have any interest in this matter except as they may have given options on their property, and we also find that they have little faith in the fulfillment of the contracts that have already been made. There are now about one hundred cottages and three small hotels on the lake. The hotels are little frequented on account of the poor transportation, the nearest railroad station being at the village of Livonia, about six miles away. There are some unoccupied cottages along the lake, and many of those that are inhabited are owned by residents of this city who have little confidence in the alleged intention of the so-called syndicate to build cottages and hotels, and no sympathy whatever with the plan and no desire to see the scheme consummated. The lake has a shore line of about fourteen miles, but much of this distance is entirely unavailable for cottage sites. The lake is surrounded by steep banks mostly covered with forests, and little adapted by nature for agricultural purposes. There is no road on the west and none can be constructed except at an enormous expense. There is now no approach to the west side of the lake except by water, and before most of the proposed options can be utilized to any advantage, either a system of driveways or an extensive railroad must be built at a large outlay. This committee is unanimous in the opinion that the proposed scheme can under no possibility be made to pay, and every person who accompanied us concurred in that opinion. It is our opinion also that the proposed purchase of the lake shore is merely a scheme for compelling the city to buy the contracts secured at an exorbitant advance, and this is the impression also which prevails among the residents of that section. We can see no reason why the people of this city should be disturbed in the least by the proposed project, for we believe that it has no foundation except as we have stated.

But assuming that there is an honest intention to speculate in the shores of the lake as a summer resort, we believe even in that view of the case that the people of Rochester have no cause for alarm. The purity of the water which we use has always been a matter of public concern. Since the time when Hemlock lake was first selected efforts have been put forth to preserve the purity of its waters. Its steep uncultivated and thinly inhabited shores are factors which assist the city in accomplishing this end. Not satisfied with these natural advantages, a constant patrol of the lake is kept up, and every effort is put forth to prevent the contamination of its waters. Twice a week, and oftener if necessary, during the summer months, collections of garbage and refuse matter is made from the hotels and cottages

along the lake by employes of the city, and it can be positively asserted that none of the defiling matter from these sources reaches the waters of the lake, so far as human foresight and diligence can prevent it. The margin of the lake too is kept free from underbrush and decaying vegetable matter by men employed for that purpose. Indeed, so many restrictions are imposed upon the residents along the lake that it must discourage future purchases of land there. This system of inspection is maintained at a small expense, much less than the interest on an investment necessary to purchase a strip of land along the shore, and it can be extended to embrace any increase in the population at a proportionately small advance. This patrol and supervision has been maintained by virtue of a provision of law which gives the city the fullest power to protect the purity of Hemlock lake, no matter how many cottages and hotels may be built there. The occupants cannot defile its waters without rendering themselves liable to prosecution and punishment. By the statute referred to, the state board of health is authorized to make rules and regulations for protecting from contamination any and all public supplies of potable waters and their sources, and the officer or board having the management and control of the potable water supply of any municipality, is authorized and empowered to make such inspection of the source of such water supply same from defilement and to ascertain whether or not the rules and regulations of the state board of health are complied with. Under this statute any person willfully violating any rule or regulation made and published by the state board of health is guilty of a misdemeanor and may be fined or imprisoned or both. This statute further authorizes the state board of health to make regulations involving the construction of systems of sewerage or changes thereof, at the expense of the municipality and provides generally for the disposition of sewage which might be liable to contaminate any potable water supply.

Whether the proposed purchases are made in good faith or not, we do not deem it advisable at this time to recommend the purchase of any part of the lake front for the purpose of protecting its waters from pollution. We do not consider such a course necessary to preserve the purity of the water and we do not believe that it would have the salutary effect which some people think it would. Cottages and hotels would be built beyond the line owned by the city and without the patrol and supervision exercised now there would be no guarantee that the water would not be contaminated. Besides the greatest menace to-day is not from the cottages and hotels, but from the lowlands at the head of the lake, and the village of Springwater some miles away. To resort to such a policy as the purchase of the lands along the lake to protect our water supply from pollution, we could not stop short of the purchase of the entire watershed.

The statute above referred to is somewhat cumbersome in its application, and what we most need is an act similar to the one passed last year for the city of New York, which would permit us summarily to take possession of any land along the lake used in such a manner as to contaminate its waters and to appraise the damages after having taken possession thereof. With such a statute on the books we would be prepared to cope with any individuals or corporations that were a menace to the purity of our water supply and would be in a position to protect it against any pollution. This statute as passed for the

city of New York provides that the commissioners for public works may take the title to all real estate and to acquire or extinguish any interest therein which may be necessary for the sanitary protection of all rivers and other water courses, lakes, ponds and reservoirs so far as they are or may be used for the supply of water for the city of New York. It provides for the filing of maps and the appointment of commissioners of appraisal, and on the filing of the oath of such commissioners, the city may immediately take possession of such lands, or any part or parts thereof without any suit or proceeding at law for that purpose, and may enter upon, use and occupy the same in perpetuity for the purposes mentioned and the owner of such lands or any interest therein, is left to prove his damages before the commissioners of appraisal which have been appointed. With such a statute the city would be in a position to command the removal of anything that may be a menace to the purity of our water supply.

As a result of our investigation into the subject matter of the communication of his honor, the mayor, above referred to, we have but one suggestion and remedy to offer, and that is, the passage of the statute just referred to, unless it is that a survey of the watershed be made in anticipation of the passage of such a statute, and also for the purpose of enabling the city in the future to determine the growth, in the building of cottages, and any changes that may occur in the watershed. We believe that the water of Hemlock lake is as pure to-day as it was when the first conduit was laid, and that it will continue so as long as the present system of patrol and collection is maintained, and the existing statute rigidly and unremittently enforced. If any individual and corporation desires to purchase the shores of the lake, they have the undoubted right to do so, but they must use their land so as not to contaminate the water supply of this city. With the state board of health statute above referred to, and the passage of the proposed act, the city will be prepared to protect its water supply so that the reputation of the city as the healthiest in the state may not be impaired by compelling the use of impure water which might affect the health of our citizens.

In the matter of the sewer claims of Louis Duebelbeis, George Beachner and George Meizenzahl upon which propositions of settlement have been made, we desire to say that we have agreed with these persons and recommend that Mr. Duebelbeis be allowed the sum of \$400, Mr. Beachner the sum of \$300, and Mr. Meizenzahl the sum of \$70 per year.

In the matter of Emmanuel Koveliski, who was arrested for violating the hucksters' and peddlers' ordinance, and who paid a fine of \$5, upon investigation we learn that he had received a permit from the Mayor, and we recommend the amount paid by him be refunded.

The default in answering in the case of Matilda Schneider against the city was opened by the court upon the payment of \$20 costs of which we recommend the payment.

We recommend the appointment of Stephen Zielinska and Samuel B. Ray as commissioners of deeds.

Gentlemen: Your Assessment Committee would respectfully report, as follows:

In the matter of the application of Charles C. Seely and others, as executors of the estate of Mary A. Robinson, deceased, it appears that the estate of Mary A. Robinson was judicially settled, and the distribution of the remaining assets made upon the 23rd day of April, 1894; the personal assessment therefore against the estate of Mary A. Robinson for the year 1894, should be cancelled, and we make that recommendation.

In the matter of the assessment roll for the Genesee street trap rock pavement, your committee report, that after a careful examination of the whole subject they can see no good reason why the roll should not be confirmed, they therefore recommend the confirmation of the same.

In the matter of the application of Anthon Kluh for cancellation of assessment on Kluh park and Maple street under final ordinance, No. 5,195, the Surveyor reports that the lots will be drained into the west side sewers where they will be best served, and that it would be equitable and proper to release Mr. Kluh from this assessment; upon the report of the Surveyor therefore, we make such recommendation.

In the matter of the application of C. J. Zurn for refund of \$14 paid by him for a lateral sewer charged against his premises, No. 46 Campbell street, the Surveyor reports that the lateral was not constructed upon his lot, but on the lot belonging to his neighbor. We therefore recommend that the sum of \$14 be refunded Mr. Zurn and collected from Mr. F. Wolz who owns the next premises and who ought properly pay for said lot lateral.

In the matter of the application of the Lawyers' Co-Operative Publishing Company for cancellation of an assessment upon lot No. 44 south side of Birr street, the Executive Board report that lot 44 some two years ago was purchased by the Lawyers' Co-Operative Publishing Company, and made a part of the public street known as the Highlands, and was properly dedicated to the city and accepted. It is proper then that the assessment against lot 44 be cancelled and we recommend that such course be taken.

In the matter of the petition of Nelson H. Barbour, which was referred to the assessors at the regular meeting of the council to make an apportionment, the Assessors report that the apportionment of the premises is impracticable, for the reason that the houses of Mr. Barbour stand upon the same lot, but that he should be given the benefit of his exemption to the amount of \$1,500, upon the ground that one of his houses is occupied by him as a parsonage; we therefore recommend that the Treasurer receive from Mr. Barbour the regular tax on \$1,500 and that the balance be charged to erroneous assessments. With reference to the other requests made by Mr. Barbour to refund a portion of the taxes paid by him for the last eight years on said premises, we recommend that such relief be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Sophia Fechenbach for cancellation of the assessment for six and one-fourth feet on lot 42, east side of Manhattan street, it appears that since the assessment rolls were completed a conveyance was made to Sophia Fechenbach of 25 feet on the east side of Manhattan street, and that the remainder of lot 42, to wit, six and one-fourth feet still remains in the name of the former owner of the property George S. Riley; we recommend that an apportionment of the general city taxes on these premises for the year 1894, be made and the treasurer receive from Mrs. Fechenbach and George S. Riley their proportions of the tax on said premises, as the assessors shall certify to be just.

To the Common Council:

Gentlemen: In order to accomplish the proper reinforcement of the Water Works distributing system in the city it will be necessary to lay the new water main across the Genesee river at some point above Clarissa street so as to obtain proper service for the West Side. A number of surveys for this purpose have been made by the Water Works Engineering Department, and it has been found that the most advantageous route for the new West Side main will be through McLean place and Flint street, from Mt. Hope avenue on the east side to Mansion street on the west side of the river. The present 16-inch supply pipe for the West Side, however, is also located in McLean place at a distance of 12 feet north from the south line of said place, which has a total width of only about 33 feet.

On the other side of the river the same pipe is located on the north side of Flint street at a distance of about 20 feet south from the north line thereof. It is obvious that the present supply pipe cannot be disturbed while the new mains are being laid, and it is therefore necessary that the latter must be laid at a considerable distance from the former. Under existing conditions the new mains would have to be laid on the north side of McLean place and on the south side of Flint street, which would involve the construction of two crossings of the new main under the old main. These two crossings would have to be made at the ends of McLean place, at Mt. Hope avenue and Wolcott street, in both of which places considerable trouble with ground water and quicksand is apprehended.

The expense of these two undercrossings, and the attendant risk of damage to the present 16-inch supply main, would be avoided if the new 36-inch main could be laid on the south side of McLean place. The proper position for the new pipe is about 10 feet south

of the existing main, or, substantially on the present south line of McLean place. This location necessarily involves the widening of McLean place in order to obtain sufficient room for construction purposes; and as we are informed that the owners of property on said McLean place contemplate the widening of said place, and as such a widening would be a desirable municipal improvement, we accordingly recommend the passage of an ordinance for such widening on the south side of said place.

Also the necessary sidewalk grading and crosswalks.

And the City Surveyor, under the directions of this Council, having made an estimate of the whole expense thereof and reported the same at \$1,500, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved.

Resolved, Further, that the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all of the following portion and part of the city, which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Driving Park avenue, from the Boulevard to the city line.

MC LEAN PLACE WIDENING.

By Ald. Edelman—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of widening McLean place, from Mt. Hope avenue to Wolcott street, by adding a strip of land 10 feet wide to the south side of said street. The land necessary to be taken therefore is a strip of land ten feet in width and extending from Mt. Hope avenue to Wolcott street.

Resolved, Further, that two thirds of the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all the following portion and part of the city, which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for and will be benefited by such improvement to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of McLean place, from Mt. Hope avenue to Wolcott street, and one third of the whole expense to be paid from public treasury of the city of Rochester.

The removal of the present sewer and the construction of a new sewer in South Clinton street, from the north line of Bly street to the sewer in Goodman street, and to be of the following forms and dimensions: From the north line of Bly street to the center of Brighton street to be of vitrified pipe 24 inches in diameter; from the center of Brighton street to the center of Caroline street, to be of stone 2x2 feet, with arch invert; from the center of Caroline street to the sewer in Goodman street, to be of stone 2 feet 3 inches x 2 feet, with arch and invert. CHESTNUT STREET MACADAM IMPROVEMENT.

On motion of Ald. Ward, the Common Council proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the following ordinance, viz.:

An ordinance to improve Chestnut street, from East avenue to Monroe avenue.

And after hearing such allegations from all persons appearing,

The Common Council of the city of Rochester, do ordain and determine that the following improvement is necessary and should be made, to wit:

The improvement of Chestnut street, from East avenue to Monroe avenue, by the construction of a macadam pavement with Telford foundation and trap rock surface, with a line of Medina stone curb and cobble gutter on each side thereof, properly connected with all lateral streets, alleys and driveways.

Width of roadway between curbs to be generally 39 feet. Also the necessary crosswalks, surface sewers, manholes, lot laterals, water and gas services and the cleaning of the main sewer in the street if found necessary. Except that from the north line of Elm street to the south line of James street, the pavement will be of Medina stone with joints filled with Portland cement grout. Also such trees as may be selected by the Park Commission shall be removed.

And the City Surveyor, under direction of this Council, having made and reported as an estimate of the expense thereof, the sum of \$18,500, which being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved, and the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all the following portion and part of the city which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for, and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Chestnut street, from East avenue to Monroe avenue.

Adopted by the following vote:

ONTARIO STREET CEMENT WALK.

On motion of Ald. Ward, the Common Council proceeded to hear allegations in relation to the improvement described in the following ordinance, viz.:

An ordinance to construct a Portland cement walk on Ontario street, from Scio street to North Union street.

And after hearing such allegations from all persons appearing,

The Common Council of the city of Rochester, do ordain and determine that the following improvement is necessary and should be made, to wit:

The construction of a Portland cement walk 5 feet in width on each side of Ontario street, from Scio street to North Union street, except where good flag or cement walks now exist, which walks shall be re-laid if not conforming to the proper grade and alignment. Also the necessary sidewalk grading and flag crosswalks.

And the City Surveyor, under direction of this Council, having made and reported as an estimate of the expense thereof, the sum of \$1,350, which, being deemed reasonable, is hereby approved, and the whole expense of such improvement is hereby directed to be assessed upon all the following portion and part of the city which this Council deems proper to be so assessed for, and will be benefited by such improvement, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Ontario street, from Scio street to North Union street.

Adopted by the following vote:

Final ordinances for Van Stallen park pipe sewer, Vincent place sewer, Belmont park macadam pavement, Moulson street sewer, Oswego street plank walk, Potter street curb and gutter, Vincent place Medina stone pavement, Federal Arch, Sidney, Quincey and Kingston streets cement walks and University avenue sewer came up, and, on motion of Ald. Edelman, action thereon was postponed two weeks.

By Ald. Dewey—

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO DOGS.

The Common Council do ordain and establish as follows:

Sec. 1. Every owner or keeper of a dog, or animal of the dog kind, within the city of Rochester, shall cause the same to be registered, numbered and described in the office of the City Clerk of said city. The City Clerk shall keep a complete registry of all dogs in a book to be kept for that purpose, describing the same by name, breed, color and sex, and shall also enter the name and address of the owner or keeper as given, and the number of the city license tag; he shall provide such number of metal tags, of not less than three-fourths of an inch in width, as may be necessary, bearing on the face serial numbers; and such tag shall be furnished by the City Clerk to each owner of a dog at the time of registering said dog, and shall be attached to the collar of such animal. No person shall counterfeit or use any other tag than that furnished by the City Clerk. The fee for registering each dog shall be twenty-five (25) cents, and for furnishing the metal tag seventy-five (75) cents, and all moneys and fines collected under this ordinance shall be placed to the credit of the Police Fund.

Sec. 2. No dog, or animal of the dog kind, shall be permitted to run at large in the city of Rochester unless muzzled when required, as hereinafter provided, nor unless said dog shall wear a collar of metal or leather bearing a tag or plate such as is prescribed in this ordinance. Any dog found running at large without said tag or without being properly muzzled when required, may be caught by any member of the police force, or any other person, and taken into his custody and possession. Said member of the police force, or other person, shall immediately report the fact of such seizure to the superintendent of police, and said dog shall be cared for and disposed of as said superintendent may direct and as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 3. Notice shall be given by the superintendent of Police, by publication in the official paper of the city of Rochester, of the seizure and impounding of any dog in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance; and said dog shall be kept with proper food and water for forty-eight (48) hours after the publication of such notice, during which time the owner may redeem such dog by the payment of the expense of such publication and the expense of his keeping, not exceeding the sum of \$1, to be paid to the person caring for such dog, and the further payment to the City Clerk of one dollar (\$1) for registration fee and tag; if said dog is not redeemed within forty-eight (48) hours after the publication of the above mentioned notice, the Superintendent of Police may direct that such animal be killed; and in case no owner appears to redeem said dog, the person by whom such animal was kept shall be paid a sum not to exceed fifty (50) cents by said Superintendent of Police, which sum shall be a charge upon that part of the fund credited with the fees and fines collected under this ordinance.

Sec. 4. No person shall keep, or suffer to be kept, on his premises, or the premises occupied by him, within the city of Rochester, nor suffer to run at large in said city, any dog of ferocious and dangerous character, habit or disposition; nor any dog in the habit of howling or whining at night, or barking at or in any manner annoying any person or persons; and any person who owns or harbors such dog or dogs above mentioned shall be subject to a fine as hereinafter provided. No female dog in time of heat shall be allowed to run at large within the city limits. Upon a second

conviction for a violation of this section it may be a part of the sentence that such dog be immediately killed; and this sentence forthwith shall be executed by the Superintendent of Police, or any police officer; and any owner or keeper of any such dog who refuses to deliver up the same to any police officer for the purpose of being killed in compliance with said judgment, shall be liable to an additional fine therefor.

Sec. 5. Whenever the Mayor of the city of Rochester shall deem it necessary, he shall issue an order prohibiting, for a certain time therein specified, any and all dogs from running at large in any street, alley or other public place in said city, unless such dog be securely muzzled, or led by a chain, so as effectually to prevent them from biting any person or animal, which order shall be published in the official newspaper of the said city.

Sec. 6. Any person harboring a dog for two days prior to any violation of the terms of this ordinance shall be held to be the owner of said dog.

Sec. 7. Every person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall for each offense be subject to a fine or penalty not exceeding \$150 in amount, to be imposed by the Police Justice, or judge, or court before whom a suit for such fine or penalty is brought, in the discretion of such justice, judge or court, and on failure to pay such fine or penalty when received, shall be imprisoned in the Monroe County Penitentiary for a term not exceeding 150 days, to be determined by such justice, judge, or court, in his or its discretion at the time the judgment is entered.

Sec. 8. Every execution upon a judgment recovered for any fine or penalty or forfeiture imposed for the violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be issued immediately on the rendition of the judgment and shall command the amount to be made out of the personal property of the defendant within the city not exempt from levy and sale under an execution, if such can be found, and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentiary for such time as shall have been directed by the justice, judge or court rendering such judgment, and may be issued to and enforced by any member of the police department of said city. Such execution may be issued by the police justice or police clerk of said city.

Sec. 9. All existing ordinances inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 10. This ordinance shall take effect September 1 1894.

Ald. Dewey asked and obtained unanimous consent for the consideration of the amended ordinance at this time. On motion of Ald. Dewey, the ordinance was then adopted by the following vote:

Allegations were called for, and after hearing same from all persons appearing, the resolution was adopted by the following vote:

Ald. Dewey having given notice at a previous meeting of proposed ordinance "to establish and regulate pounds and restrain and regulate the keeping and running at large of animals," introduced the following:

By Ald. Dewey—

An ordinance to establish and regulate pounds and restrain and regulate the keeping and running at large of animals.

The Common Council of the city of Rochester do ordain as follows.

Sec. 1. No owner or possessor of any swine, horses, sheep, goats, cows or other cattle shall suffer any such animal or animals to run or be let at large in any of the public streets, lanes, alleys or parks within the city of Rochester, nor drive the same in, through or upon any of the public streets, lanes, alleys or parks within said city between the hours of six o'clock in the forenoon and seven o'clock in the afternoon, unless the same are tethered and held in hand by the person or persons having them in charge, under a penalty and fine of one dollar for each animal so tethered, running or being at large, for each offense.

Sec. 2. No owner or possessor of any goose or geese, ducks or other fowls shall suffer or permit any such fowls to run or be at large in any of the public streets, lanes, alleys, squares or parks within the city of Rochester, under a penalty of twenty-five cents for each fowl, etc., so running at large, for each offense.

Sec. 3. It shall be lawful for any person, including any member of the police department or policeman or other officer appointed for that purpose, to seize and take into custody and possession any such animal or poultry straying or being at large, contrary to the provisions of the foregoing sections of this ordinance; and it shall also be lawful for any person to take into his custody and possession any of the animals or poultry aforesaid which may be running at large, or being and trespassing upon premises owned or occupied by such person.

Sec. 4. Whenever any person shall seize and take into his possession any animal or poultry, under authority of the preceding sections of this ordinance, it shall be the duty of such person to give immediate notice thereof to a judge of the municipal court of said city, and said judge shall thereupon cause notice to be given by affixing the same in six conspicuous places in said city, that such animal or animals or poultry will be sold at public auction, at some convenient place in said city, not less than ten days, nor more than thirty days, from the time of affixing such notice, to be specified, including the hour at which sale shall be had in such notice. At the time and place mentioned in said notice, one of the judges of said court shall proceed to sell the said animal or animals or poultry for cash, and out of the proceeds thereof shall, in the first place, retain the following fees and charges for his services and expenses incurred in giving such notice and making such sale, viz: For every horse, mare or colt sold, two dollars; for every other animal sold, one dollar; for every goose or fowl sold, twenty-five cents, and shall then pay to the treasurer of said city said sum or sums so retained, after deducting therefrom any and all expenses connected with the giving of the said notice, and including any expense incurred in keeping said animal or poultry from the time of seizure to the time of such sale.

Sec. 5. If there shall be any surplus moneys arising from said sale, the judge making such sale shall retain the same in his own hands, and pay the same to the owner or owners of said animal or animals or poultry, after a reasonable demand therefor, and satisfactory proof of such ownership, provided such owner or owners shall appear and claim such surplus moneys within one year after such sale. And if the owner or owners of such animal or animals or poultry shall not appear and demand such surplus moneys within one year after such sale has been made, he, she, it, or they shall be forever debarred from recovering any part of such moneys, and the same shall be paid to the treasurer of said city for the benefit of the Highway Fund, and the treasurer's receipt therefor shall be a legal discharge to said judge.

Sec. 6. Any owner of any animal or poultry which shall have been seized under and pursuant to the foregoing provisions may at any time before the sale thereof demand, and shall be entitled to the possession of, such animal or poultry, upon the payment by him of the several sums hereinbefore required to be paid to the said judge and to the said city treasurer, including a reasonable compensation for the seizure, care and keeping of such animal, to be estimated by and paid to such judge, and upon making to such judge satisfactory proof of ownership. And if such owner shall make such demand and proof at least three days before the time appointed for such sale, he shall be entitled to the custody and possession of such animal, upon paying one-half of the several sums above mentioned, together with the whole amount of compensation awarded by the said judge. If no notice shall have been given to a judge of the municipal court of said city, in pursuance of the foregoing sections of this ordinance, the owner of any such animal or fowl shall be entitled to the possession of the same upon paying to the City Treasurer or other authorized agent of the city the expenses of keeping the same and the following fees, to wit: For every horse, one dollar; for every cow or other animal, one dollar; for every fowl, ten cents, which shall be paid to the City treasurer by the person so receiving the same, to the credit of the Highway Fund.

Sec. 7. In case the animal or poultry so seized under the foregoing provisions of this act shall have been so running at large or trespassing, by the willful act of any other person than the owner, to effect that object, such owner shall be entitled to the possession of such animal by making the demand therefor, and the proof required in the next preceding section, and paying to the city treasurer the amount of compensation fixed by such judge for the care and keeping of such animal or poultry, and without paying any other charges; and the person committing such willful act shall be liable to a penalty of twenty dollars, to be recovered at an action at law at the suit of the owner of such animal or poultry.

Sec. 8. Any person who shall hinder or resist any officer or other person while attempting to take into his possession, or after he shall have taken into his possession, any animal or poultry running at large, in violation of the preceding sections of this ordinance, or who shall rescue, or attempt to rescue, said animal or poultry after being so seized by any officer or other person, or who shall break or injure any pound or other place in which such animal or poultry shall be confined in pursuance of the previous sections of this ordinance, shall be liable to a penalty of ten dollars for each offense.

Sec. 9. No person shall keep any swine at any place within the corporate limits or boundaries of either of the first fourteen wards of the city of Rochester, under a pen-

alty of ten dollars for each offense, and the further penalty of five dollars for each week a violation of this section shall continue.

Sec. 10. No person shall keep, at any place within the corporate limits or boundaries of the fifteenth or sixteenth wards of the city of Rochester, any swine, under a penalty of five dollars for each offense, and the further penalty of five dollars for each week such violation shall continue, unless such person, at all times, shall obtain and have the written consent of all owners and occupants of land within five hundred feet from the place where such swine shall be kept.

Sec. 11. Every person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall for each offense be subject to a fine or penalty not exceeding \$150 in amount, to be imposed by the police justice, or judge, or court before whom a suit for such fine or penalty is brought, in the discretion of such justice, judge or court, and on failure to pay such fine or penalty when recovered, shall be imprisoned in the Monroe County Penitentiary for a term not exceeding 150 days, to be determined by such justice, judge or court, in his discretion at the time the judgment is entered.

Sec. 12. Every execution issued on the rendition of a judgment for any such penalty or penalties shall conform to the provisions of the city charter.

Sec. 13. Any ordinance heretofore adopted inconsistent with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed.

Sec. 14. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

On motion of Ald. McMillan, the ordinance was laid on the table for two weeks.

Ald. Dewey, having given notice at a previous meeting of a proposed amendment to the swimming ordinance, introduced the following:

By Ald. Dewey—Resolved, That section eighteen of an ordinance relating to nuisances, passed October 26, 1886, and found at page 284 of the proceedings of the Common Council for 1886 and 1887, be, and the same hereby is re-considered.

Adopted.

By Ald Dewey—

An ordinance to amend an ordinance relating to nuisances, etc., passed October 26, 1886.

Sec. 1. Section eighteen, of said ordinance is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 18. No person shall swim or bathe in any canal, basin, mill race or river within the limits of the city of Rochester, under a penalty and fine of \$5 for each offense, except that any person may swim or bathe in the Genesee river opposite the property of the Vacuum Oil Company, above Clarissa street bridge, on the east side of the river opposite the property of the Rochester Brewing Company, and also opposite the property of the Rochester Gas and Electric Company, and in the Erie canal at the eastern widewaters, and at the western widewaters, provided his body shall be concealed by a suitable covering extending from his knees to his shoulders.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Alds. McMillan, Green, Rauber, Adams, Edelman, Fox, Powell, Ashton, Ward, Dewey, Pauckner, Harris—13.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS GENERALLY.

Ald. Adams, having given notice at the meeting of July 10, 1894, of an ordinance to "regulate the construction and use of bill boards, fences and structures of that character within the city," introduced the following:

By Ald. Adams—

An ordinance to regulate the construction and maintenance of fences within the city of Rochester.

Section 1. No barb wire shall hereafter be used in the construction of any division fence within the city of Rochester unless the person, association or corporation desiring to use such material shall first obtain the written consent of the owner of the adjoining property that it may be used, and no barb wire shall hereafter be used in the construction of any fence along or adjacent to any public street, park, alley or place within said city.

Sec. 2. No wooden fence, or structure of that character, having a greater height than six feet from the ground shall be erected within the limits of said city, unless the consent of the common council thereto have been previously obtained.

Sec. 3. Every application to the Common Council for permission to erect any fence is required to give one week's notice in writing of the time of the application to owner, occupant, or agent of houses and lots within a distance of 200 feet from where such fence or structure is to be erected, except such as have given their written consent to such erection, and he shall furnish proof to the Common Council verified by oath of the service of such notice.

Sec. 4. No fence or other structure, whether of wood or any other material, already erected or hereafter to be erected shall be used for the display of any signs, bills, cards, pamphlets, circulars, notices, pictures or advertisements, without the consent of the Common Council. The same notice and proof required by section 2 of this ordinance shall be a necessary precedent to the consent of the Common Council to use such fence or other structure as provided in this section.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the Fire Marshal to inspect all fences erected and in process of erection or repair, and report to the Common Council any violations of the provisions of this ordinance. If, after inspection, the Fire Marshal shall be satisfied that the provisions of this ordinance are being violated, or that such fence is liable to fall or become unsafe or dangerous, it shall be his duty to notify a member of the Wood Building Committee, and the official so notified, and if such official shall concur with the Fire Marshal, the Fire Marshal shall order that all work thereon be stopped, or that the same be taken down, or may give such other directions as he may deem expedient for the protection and safety of the public. If such order shall not at once be complied with, it shall be the duty of the Fire Marshal to cause such fence to be taken down, or to take such action in connection therewith as he shall deem the public safety and interest require; the cost and expense thereof shall be paid by said city to said Fire Marshal, and after such payment, the amount thereof shall be payable to said city by the owner or owners of such fence, and may be recovered from such owner or owners by action brought by said city.

Sec. 6. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall for each offense be subject to a fine or penalty not exceeding \$150 in amount, to be imposed by the police justice or judge, or court before whom a suit for such fine or penalty is brought in the discretion of such justice, judge or court, and on failure to pay such fine or penalty when recovered shall be imprisoned in the Monroe County Penitentiary for a term not exceeding 150 days, to be determined by such justice, judge or court in his or its discretion at the time the judgment is entered.

Sec. 7. Every execution upon a judgment rendered for any fine or penalty imposed for a violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be issued immediately on the rendition of the judgment and shall command the amount to be made out of the personal property of the defendant within the city not exempt from levy and sale under an execution if such can be found, and if not then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentiary for such time as shall have been directed by the justice, judge or court rendering such judgment, and may be issued to and enforced by any member of the police department for said city. Such execution may be issued by the police justice or police clerk of said city where the judgment was rendered by the police justice of said city.

Sec. 8. All fines or penalties or other moneys paid to or received by said city under the provisions of this ordinance shall be paid to the credit of the contingent fund.

Sec. 9. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 10. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

On motion of Ald. Adams the ordinance was laid on the table for two weeks.

In the matter of the application of Alexis Hamburger for the return of a fine imposed by the police justice, we find that the conviction was reversed on appeal, and that the return of the amount paid was ordered by the court. We therefore recommend that the sum of \$50 be refunded.

In the matter of an action commenced by William Hayward against the city of Rochester to recover the sum of \$47.05 and interest thereon from February 20th, 1894, in the Municipal Court, we are advised by the City Attorney that there is no defense to the action, and therefore recommend the payment of the amount demanded, with costs and disbursements.

In the matter of the case of Sophia Quigley against the city, we are informed by the City Attorney that the General Term has affirmed the decision of Justice Rumsey granting a new trial. In this case a non-suit was granted by the trial court, Mr. Justice Rumsey presiding, who afterwards granted a new trial upon a motion made at Special Term. An appeal was then taken to the General Term, which has affirmed the action of Justice Rumsey in granting the new trial. We have considered the advisability of abiding by the decision of the General Term and taking a new trial at the Circuit or appealing from the decision of the General Term to the Court of Appeals, and in view of all the facts recommend the latter course.

In the matter of the appointment of commissioners of deeds, we recommend the appointment of Helen K. Lorscheider.

In the matter of the case of Hermon Diesel against the city of Rochester for damages for sewer pollution, we recommend that the same be settled for the sum of \$350 and costs.

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE BOARD FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Aug. 22, 1894.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: It scarcely seems necessary that I should call your attention to a matter that has been under consideration so long as has been the question of providing elevators for the city hall building, but in view of the fact that up to the present time the council has failed to act in the matter, I wish to urge that the matter once more be taken up.

By this time I think there can be no doubt in the mind of any member of your honorable board as to the desirability of such improvement. Indeed, no one could have had his duty call him to one of the upper floors of the building, even occasionally, let alone sit in the council, or hold other office having headquarters in the upper portion of the city hall, without having it forced upon him that the city is backward in not providing this improvement, which, even in the most modest of modern buildings, is no longer looked upon as a luxury, but a prime necessity. Buildings constructed before our city hall was erected and before the matter of elevators was considered of great importance, have been remodeled at great expense in many cases simply because their owners found that without elevators there were no longer tenants.

As to the city building, it must be looked upon as a back number until these adjuncts are provided. On two or three occasions within the past few years, when this subject has been up, the council has shown a disposition to act, and twice, at least, it has gone so far as to secure plans and estimates for the proposed improvement. The possibility that even more elaborate alterations would be decided upon, or that the building might be enlarged by, in some way, joining it to the new county building, has, I believe, deterred the council from carrying out the limited plans that might otherwise have been approved. At present the latter proposition is out of the question, and there seems to be no probability of an immediate enlargement of the building. The desirability of having the city hall made more accessible has been impressed upon me during the past few months, when the city hall has been in frequent use by various bodies of a state and national character.

Not less than half a dozen bodies have met in the hall within the past few weeks for council, the meetings extending over two or three days; and the gentlemen and ladies in attendance could not have been pleasantly impressed with the journey up three flights of stairs, which they were obliged to take to reach their convention hall. Rochester has always been a popular place for holding conventions. Among those which have recently been held were the council of the Improved Order of Red Men and the convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians. Only the fore part of the present week the hall was used by the Union Veterans' Union, and the sight of the aged and crippled veterans who were obliged to climb the tedious flights of stairs to gain the hall impelled the thought that if Rochester is to keep up her reputation for entertaining visiting societies and organizations, the city hall, which is the only hall of any dimensions in the city since the Washington Rink has been abandoned for convention purposes, must be made more accessible. It is an advantage to have so many strangers come to us annually as are brought here by these conventions, but the city cannot expect they will keep coming unless it can offer them a convenient place for meeting.

In view of these facts, which I have but briefly alluded to, your board cannot do better than to at once authorize the improvement suggested. Such action should meet the hearty approval of all taxpayers, inasmuch as the cost will be comparatively slight; and in consideration of the further fact that the hall will thus be made available for the free use of all the people for convention and meeting purposes.

To the Common Council:

Gentlemen: In accordance with the request of the Finance Committee, the Executive Board respectfully suggests that your honorable body make provision for an additional appropriation for the Highway Fund at the present time instead of at a later period in the year.

The reasons for requesting this action may be briefly stated as follows:

It is a matter of common knowledge that a large number of men are unemployed, and added to the usual number of common laborers are mechanics and skilled workers in the different trades, who, having families to support and homes to maintain by paying taxes or rent, cannot find employment sufficient to keep their families provided with the necessities of life. Those men are daily calling at the office of the Executive Board for employment, willing to do any common labor that will afford a meager subsistence, and their appeals for assistance and their statements of their impoverished and desperate condition warrants the Executive Board to do its part in providing some relief. This Board has already expended considerable money in repairing streets, in order that many of the men out of work might be saved from the pauper necessity of calling on the poormaster for aid; but with the appropriations granted for the year by your honorable body, this work cannot longer be continued; in fact, it must be stopped, and nothing but the routine work and labor which is absolutely necessary can

be done. If an additional appropriation is allowed now, it will be expended to advantage and will result in some practical good to the public, whereas, if granted in midwinter, as everything now indicates it will have to be, the money will be laid out to better advantage than it can be at that season of the year. A great deal of work in the several streets of the city, in the way of repairing, re-metaling, grading, repairs of walks, cleaning and reconstructing sewers and kindred labor can be done at this season of the year, and therefore money provided now will serve the double purpose of aiding the poor and needy and benefiting the people whose property is taxed for this purpose. It may be suggested that the necessity of providing for the mechanics and laborers will exist next winter, notwithstanding that help may be provided at this time, but answer to this may be made by stating that at no time in the last year has such evidence of actual distress among the worthy and willing workers in all classes of trade been so apparent as at the present time.

The Executive Board has no purpose or object in making this statement, except to call your attention to the condition of things among our citizens, which you have in your discretion and authority means to afford relief; and if your honorable body deem it expedient to appropriate the sum of \$40,000 or \$50,000 for this purpose, the Executive Board will expend it in such a manner as to afford help to those in need of it, and, as before said, do much needed public work.

The construction of a five-foot Portland cement sidewalk on the north side of Seneca Parkway, from the sidewalk on the west side of Lake avenue to the east line of the New Boulevard (so called), and

Whereas, The Board of Park Commissioners in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 317 of the laws of 1891, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at fifteen hundred and thirty (\$1,530) dollars, which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, Further, That the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for 75 per cent. of the whole expense thereof, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on the north side of Seneca Parkway as they exist at the date of the passage of this ordinance, from Lake avenue to the New Boulevard (so called), in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom, and further,

Resolved, That the balance of the whole expense of said improvement be paid from the public treasury of the city of Rochester, to wit, from the Boulevard Fund.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING.

The matter of an ordinance regulating the sale of coal concerning which a notice was introduced at a meeting of this Board held August 7, 1894, coming up, Ald. Fox by request of Ald. Edelman introduced the following:

By Ald. Fox—

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE VENDING OF COAL.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain as follows:

Section 1. The City Clerk of said city shall from time to time license any proper person or corporation to engage in the business of buying and selling coal within the City of Rochester upon the payment to the Treasurer of said city of the sum of \$25 as a license fee; and no person shall at any time vend or offer for sale any coal in the City of Rochester without having such license under a penalty or fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$150 for each offense or sale.

Sec. 2. The legal standard ton of coal in the City of Rochester shall be 2,000 pounds. It shall be the duty of every vendor of coal to send with each and every load or part of load of coal, sold by such vendor, a card or ticket which shall indicate on its face in plain characters the vendor's name, the date of such sale and the weight of the coal contained in the cart or other vehicle in which it is being transported, and the weight of such cart or vehicle; any vendor of coal such cart or vehicle; any vendor of coal found selling or delivering any load of coal without such card or ticket or refusing to allow the weight to be tested as provided in the ordinance shall forfeit and pay a penalty of not less than \$10 nor more than \$150 for every such violation; no person or corporation shall sell or deliver any coal within the city except by weight or measure; and no scale or measure shall be used for that purpose unless the same within six months prior to such sale or delivery was duly tested, sealed and marked, under a penalty and fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$150 for each offense; any scale or measure which shall have been sealed in accordance with the ordinance pertaining to weights and measures shall be deemed a lawful scale or measure within the meaning and for the purpose of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the sealer of weights and measures and such other person or persons as the Common Council may designate from time to time and whenever he suspects that the quantity of coal being transported for sale does not correspond with the amount indicated on the card or ticket aforesaid, or whenever requested by the purchaser of such load, to cause such load to be weighed upon any lawful scale most accessible for that purpose, and if, upon the weighing thereof, it shall be found that such load of coal is less than the net amount indicated upon such card or ticket, the vendor of such coal shall be liable to and shall forfeit and pay to the City of Rochester a penalty of not less than \$10 or more than \$150 for each and every offense. The sealer of weights and measures and such other person or persons as said Common Council may designate as aforesaid, shall receive for said city for any coal that he may weigh the sum of 25 cents per load payable by the vendor of such coal unless upon weighing such coal it shall be found that

the amount indicated upon such card or ticket is correct, in which case the vendor shall not be liable to any expense for such weighing.

Sec. 4. No cart, wagon or other vehicle shall be used for the hauling or delivering of coal within said city without having painted thereon in legible characters in a conspicuous place on the side thereof the name or names and business address of the person or corporation in whose business said cart, wagon or vehicle is being used.

Sec. 5. No license issued under any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be transferable without permission of the Mayor endorsed thereon and any such assignment or transfer without the consent of the Mayor shall immediately terminate said license; every license issued under the terms of this ordinance shall terminate and be at an end when a second judgment or conviction for the same offense shall be recovered against the person or corporation having such license.

Sec. 6. Every person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, unless otherwise provided herein be subject to a fine or penalty not exceeding \$150 in amount, to be imposed by the police justice or judge or court before whom a suit for such fine or penalty is brought in the discretion of such justice, judge or court and on failure to pay such fine or penalty when recovered shall be imprisoned in the Monroe County Penitentiary for a term not exceeding 150 days, to be determined by such justice, judge or court in his or its discretion at the time the judgment is entered.

Sec. 7. Every execution upon a judgment recovered for any fine or penalty or forfeiture imposed for the violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be issued immediately on the rendition of the judgment and shall command the amount to be made out of the personal property of the defendant within the city not exempt from levy and sale under an execution, if such can be found, and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentiary for such time as shall have been directed by the justice, judge or court rendering such judgment and may be issued to and enforced by any member of the police department of said city; such execution may be issued by the police justice or the police clerk of said city where the judgment was rendered by the police justice of said city.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Ordered received, filed and published and upon motion of Ald. Fox action thereon was postponed until the next regular meeting.

The matter of granting permission to Frank P. Crouch to remove an old switch which now lies about six feet south of the B. & P. R. R. tracks on Colvin street and place same at a point not exceeding twelve feet south of the present tracks on Colvin street coming up on motion of Ald. Green, the matter was referred back to the Railroad Committee.

Resolved, That the Central Bank of Rochester, the Traders National Bank of Rochester, and the German-American Bank of Rochester, be and they hereby are, designated as the banks in which the City Treasurer shall deposit the moneys received by him belonging to the city during the year beginning June 1st, 1894, and the Commercial Bank of Rochester be and it hereby is designated as the bank in which the City Treasurer shall deposit the moneys received by him from receipts for local improvements during the year beginning June 1st, 1894, except such as is, or may hereafter be otherwise directed or required to be deposited, and that the Mayor be, and he hereby is, directed to enter into contracts with the said banks respectively therefor, each of which contracts shall provide, in substance, that the contracting banks shall pay and allow upon the moneys so deposited with it during said year interest at the rate of four per cent. per annum upon the daily balances of said moneys; the amount of such interest payments to be credited to receive one-fourth of all moneys received by said Treasurer belonging to the city during said contract year, except such as is or may hereafter be otherwise deposited as aforesaid, and said contract shall also provide that the contracting bank shall, at such time, and in such sums whenever required by said Treasurer or this Common Council, but in the aggregate not exceeding one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, loan moneys to the city, during said contract year, all loans to be at the current rate of discount, but at no time at a rate greater than six per cent. per annum, and such contract shall be operative only in case of the bank or banks so contracting shall deliver to the Finance Commit-

tee of this Common Council, a bond or undertaking in writing, signed by two sureties, to secure the performance of the terms of said contract by said bank, and to secure the city against loss by reason of any of said deposits; the penalty of the bond to be in the sum of one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars, and the form of the bond or undertaking to be approved by said committee and the City Attorney, and the sufficiency of the sureties to be approved by said committee.

to amend an ordinance relating to the use of sidewalks, footpaths, etc., by cycles and other vehicles, adopted August 11th, 1891, and published at page 195-196 of the Common Council proceedings for 1891 and 1892.

Section 1. Section two of said ordinance is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 2. Any person may ride a cycle, registered and numbered as hereinafter provided, upon any sidewalk of this city, except that between the hours of 6 A. M. and 11 P. M. no person shall ride a cycle upon the sidewalks or footpath of Jones Square, Brown Square, Plymouth Park, Franklin Square, Washington Square and Wadsworth Square, or upon any sidewalk of the streets described as follows: Main street from East avenue to

the Erie canal; State street south of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad; Exchange street north of the Erie canal; St. Paul street south of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. to Court street; Front and Clinton streets between the New York Central & Hudson River railroad and East Main street; Mumford street; Market street and Exchange place; Central avenue from Clinton street to State street; East avenue; or upon the footpaths of any and all bridges, under a penalty of \$5 for each offense. And no person shall ride a cycle between the hours above stated, under a like penalty, upon the sidewalks of any street that is now paved or may hereafter be paved with asphalt, brick, cedar block or Medina block pavement.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Gentlemen:—Your Assessment Committee would respectfully report:

In the matter of the petition of Julia A. Spencer for cancellation for personal property tax, it appears that Mrs. Spencer still holds as executrix about \$1,000 of funds of the estate of Sarah S. Mather of which she is executrix. We can there see no merit in her application and recommend that her petition be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Thomas Peart for cancellation of a certificate of sale of general city taxes for the year 1887, on land in the Strong tract on the south side of Clarissa street; it appears that on December 4, 1888, Mr. Peart obtained a tax search of the premises in question, showing that the property was free from taxes. The committee referred this petition to the City Treasurer, and upon investigation he reports that it would be just for Mr. Peart to pay said tax, with interest from the day of sale to December 4, 1888. Your committee would therefore recommend that Mr. Peart be allowed to pay such tax with interest from the day of such sale at 6 per cent. together with the legal fees upon such tax sale.

In the matter of the application of the Humane Society for cancellation of assessment for the year 1893, on their premises on Sophia street; it appears that under the provisions of chapter 498 of the laws of 1893, such premises are exempt from taxation, and it further appears that such property was owned and occupied by said society during the year 1893,

and prior to the time of levying such tax. Your committee would therefore recommend that such tax be cancelled.

In the matter of the petition of T. B. Dempsey, et al for cancellations of certain assessments made against them for construction of Monroe avenue outlet sewer, we find that prior to August 1, 1893, the petitioner had constructed a private sewer through Monroe avenue, opposite the premises in question, which sufficiently drained their premises. That shortly prior to August 1, 1892, the city passed an ordinance for the construction of an 18-inch sewer in Monroe avenue, which was to drain into petitioners sewer, which was only twelve inches in diameter. The Monroe avenue Homestead Association, one of the petitioners on August 3, 1892, commenced an action and procured an injunction restraining the connection of said 18-inch sewer with the 12-inch sewer, and thereafter at a conference between the City Surveyor and City Attorney and others interested, it was agreed that the city should take up the 12-inch sewer, use the pipe, and construct an 18-inch sewer in front of the premises in question, it being agreed that if this were done this action should be discontinued without costs against the city, and the petitioners be assessed but nominally, this being the case and the action, never having been discontinued, we deem it proper after consultation with the City Attorney, City Surveyor, and ex-City Attorney Kiehel, who had charge of the action at the time of the controversy arose, to recommend the cancellation of the assessments.

In the matter of the petition of Conrad S. Kurtz, for cancellation of assessment on part of lot 71 Manhattan Meadow Tract. It appears that Mr. Kurtz owns but 6 1-2 feet of lot 71, but that in the year 1882 and 1883, the general city taxes for those years on the whole lot 71, were assessed against said portion of said lots and the same were sold for general city taxes for those years, we recommend that upon payment of the pro rata share of general city taxes for the year 1882 and 1883, said 6 1-2 feet be released from the lien of said tax sales.

In the matter of the petition of Mary E. Gentlemen:—The existence of two conduits for the water supply of this city renders it necessary that a yard for the storage of reserve pipe, valve and other materials for making repairs shall be available at Honeoye Falls; and inasmuch as all new materials needed for such repairs will be obtained from different distant localities, it is obvious that such storage grounds shall be contiguous to some railroad.

In view of this fact the Executive Board has examined a number of locations for such storage yard in the village of Honeoye Falls. Of all these sites the Executive Board regards the premises, at present owned by Mrs. Minerva J. Holden, as the most suitable for the purpose. These premises have a frontage of about 227 feet on the Canandaigua & Batavia branch of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R., and a frontage of about 216 feet on Norton street in said village; the depth of the lot between Norton street and the railroad being about 400 feet, so that the premises occupy an area of about two (2) acres.

Gentlemen:—Some three weeks since we called the City Surveyor's personal attention to serious obstructions in the bed of the river in the rear of our premises on North Water street, and later we called the Street Superintendent's attention to the same matter, but up to this date nothing has been done to abate the nuisance. It is a huge mass of stone and rubbish washed there from the fire and tearing down of the walls of the burnt Union mills, and upon the occasion of the high water last spring we believe the flooding of our basement was due in a large measure to said obstructions, as heretofore we seldom had water there in high water.

We respectfully call your attention to this matter, and trust you will have the same removed while the river is low. A personal inspection will convince you we believe of the justice of our complaint.

Gentlemen: Though I have approved the proceedings of your body of the meeting held September 4th, it is only after mature consideration, coupled with regret, that the occasion should have arisen that I have allowed one resolution to stand. I need hardly say that I refer to the resolution awarding the contract for lighting the city hall to the Rochester Gas & Electric Company, and authorizing the purchase of the company's wires. I think it is not necessary for me to recall the arguments used by me in vetoing the original resolution making the award to this company—arguments which at that time seemed to the members of your honorable body sufficient to cause you to rescind your former action and to direct the taking of steps looking to the re-wiring of the building and the awarding of the contract to the lowest bidder.

I have been urged by a large number of good citizens and heavy taxpayers, not interested in any of the companies concerned, but only interested in seeing open competition established and encouraged, to disapprove the present resolution. The only reason their arguments have not prevailed with me is that by reason of the delay in the matter on the Council's part, nearly a third of the year has passed, during which time the contract was to run, and as the present resolution makes the contract with the old company at the reduced rate date with the beginning of the year, that is June 1st, the amount of money saved becomes an item of sufficient importance to outweigh some of the original arguments.

As to the purchase of the present wires, while I do not regard them as valuable property, judged in the light of expert testimony, the fact that it is urged that they can be made to answer the purpose for the present compels me to sanction their purchase; all the more that the company has dropped from its former price of \$1,200 to the moderate one of \$500.

Gentlemen:—In compliance with your resolution passed July 24th, last, directing this board to make plans for the improvement of Franklin square, we submit plans and estimates of the cost of the work as follows:

As soon as possible after the receipt of a copy of your resolution, a survey was made of the square and forwarded to Messrs. Olmsted, Olmsted & Elliot, of Brookline, Mass., park architects, for a design.

The first design, of which a copy is hereto annexed, was thought to be too expensive. It included a walk and a stone coping all around the square. The stone coping and the walks on the east and west sides of the square have been taken out of the amended plan, and also some changes made in the walks through the square, to save some of the larger trees. A copy of the amended plan is also hereto annexed and also a copy of our map showing the trees and the spread of the branches of each by circles surrounding the trunk.

The cost of the improvement under the first plan would be \$11,000; under the amended plan, \$4,000.

These estimates include all the work constructing walks, grading, cutting out and trimming trees, manuring and seeding and the necessary shrub planting.

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit the report of the Boulevard and Parkway committee and the resolutions which were adopted for a parkway from Norton street to Clifford street, as directed at the meeting of the Park Commissioners, held on Tuesday, September 4th, last.

I hereby certify the following to be a correct copy from the minutes of the Park Commissioners in reference to the above parkway.

ROCHESTER PARK COMMISSION. }
Monday, August 27, 1894. }

To the Board of Park Commissioners:

Gentlemen:—The Boulevard and Parkway Committee recommend the construction of a parkway 200 feet wide in width, from Norton to Clifford street, being 100 feet on each side of the following described central line:

Commencing at a point on the south line of Norton street, where the dividing line between the lands of Mary E. Leahy and the Erickson estate intersect the said south line; thence southerly on said dividing line to a point 80 feet south of the south line of the Erickson estate; thence easterly parallel with and 80 feet southerly from the south line of the Erickson estate to the west line of Goodman street; thence easterly across Goodman street to the intersection of the line between the lands of Hector McLean and Carolina Caesar and the east line of Goodman street; thence easterly along the north line of the land of Hector McLean and the north line of the land of Nicholas Schum to the northwest corner of the lands of Thomas Jackson and H. T. Ayers; thence southerly on the line between the lands of Nicholas Schum and said Jackson and Ayers, and the said southerly line produced, to the north line of Clifford street.

The Park Engineer has reported the cost of grading two 30-foot roadways, five tile drains across parkway, at street crossings and low grounds, the manuring, seeding and tree planting for this parkway, which is 7,322 feet long, to be \$14,825.

Your committee have decided and recommend to the board, that the amount to be assessed on the property owners be five per cent. of the total cost of the parkway, the balance of the cost to be paid out of the Boulevard Fund.

This makes the assessment per frontage foot on each side of the parkway about five cents.

There is a balance in the Boulevard Fund at the present time of \$14,765.34. Taking out the amount appropriated by the Board for the Seneca Parkway cement walk, \$382.50, leaves

a balance of \$14,382.84. Five per cent. of the estimated cost of this parkway makes \$741.25, this amount taken from the estimated cost leaves \$14,083.75, which amount is \$99.09 less than the balance left of the Boulevard Fund unappropriated. But as the estimated cost of all improvements is always more than the actual cost, we expect to have a good balance to our credit after this parkway is built.

We have had a map made showing the line of this parkway and giving the acreage necessary to be taken, as directed at the last meeting, which is herewith submitted.

We attach hereto a set of resolutions necessary, according to law, to be transmitted to the Common Council as the first ordinance for the above parkway, and recommend their adoption.

PARKWAY FROM NORTON TO CLIFFORD STREET.

Resolved, That the Park Surveyor and Engineer ascertain and report to this Board the cost and expense of laying out a parkway, 200 feet wide, from Norton to Clifford street, by grading two 50 foot roadways, sidewalks and central planting space, the construction of tile drains at street crossings and low grounds across parkway, and the necessary manuring, seeding and tree planting, through property on each side of the following described central line:

Commencing at a point on the south line of Norton street, where the dividing line between the lands of Mary E. Leahy and the Erickson estate intersect the said south line; thence southerly on said dividing line to a point 80 feet south of the south line of the land of the Erickson estate; thence easterly parallel with and 80 feet southerly from the south line of the lands of the Erickson estate to the west line of Goodman street; thence easterly across Goodman street to the intersection of the line between the lands of Hector McLean and Carolina Gaesser and the east line of Goodman street; thence easterly along the north line of the land of Hector McLean to the center line of a new street, lately acquired by the city of Rochester for sewer purposes; thence southerly on the center line of said new street to the north line of Clifford street.

The Park Engineer and Surveyor submitted as such estimate the sum of \$14,825.

Resolved, That the Board of Park Commissioners determine to lay out a parkway 200 feet in width, by grading two 30-foot roadways, sidewalks and a central planting space; the construction of five tile drains across parkway at street crossings and low grounds, and the necessary manuring, seeding and tree planting, through the following described property, which we deem to be proper and desirable to be reserved for that purpose:

Commencing at a point in the center of Norton street, 100 feet westerly from the intersection of the line between the lands of the Erickson estate and Mary E. Leahy; thence southerly on a line parallel with the east line of Mary E. Leahy's land and 100 feet distant westerly therefrom, 2,267 9-10 feet to a point on the land of O. F. Hiller, 180 feet southerly from said Hiller's north line; thence easterly on a line parallel with said Hiller's north line, 727 feet to the center of Goodman street; thence northerly along the center of Goodman street 200 feet; thence westerly 527 feet on a line parallel with the south line of the lands of the Erickson estate to a point 100 feet easterly from the west line of the land of the said Erickson estate; thence northerly 2,067 9-10 feet, on a line parallel with the west

line of the land of the Erickson estate, to the center of Norton street, which said point is about 500 feet westerly from the west line of Goodman street measuring along the center line of Norton street; thence westerly along the center line of Norton street to the place of beginning.

Also, commencing at a point in the center of Goodman street, 100 feet southerly from the intersection of the lands of Hector McLean and Carolina Gaesser with Goodman street; thence easterly on a line parallel with said McLean's north line 2,050 feet to the center of a new street, lately acquired by the city of Rochester; thence northerly along the center of said new street 200 feet; thence westerly on a line parallel with said McLean's north line and 100 feet distant northerly therefrom, 2,050 feet, across the lands of Peter Jackson, M. W. & P. Jackson, M. W. Jackson and Carolina Gaesser to the center of Goodman street; thence southerly along the center of Goodman street to the place of beginning.

And also, commencing at a point in the center of the said new street 100 feet south of the intersection of the lines of the lands of Frederick Bowman and Nicholas Schum; thence westerly 100 feet on a line parallel with Hector McLean's north line; thence southerly about 2,094 feet on a line parallel with and 100 feet distant westerly from the center line of said new street, across the lands of Hector McLean, George E. Peer and J. B. Perkins, to the center line of Clifford street; thence easterly 200 feet on the center line of Clifford street; thence northerly about 2,294 feet on a line parallel with the center of said new street and 100 feet distant easterly therefrom, across the lands of Bernard Schum, Nicholas Schum and Frederick Bowman to a point, which said point is 100 feet northerly from said Bowman's south line; thence westerly 100 feet to the center of the said new street; thence southerly 200 feet on the center line of said new street to the place of beginning.

Whereas, The Board of Park Commissioners, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 317 of the laws of 1891, has made an estimate of the whole expense thereof, and reports the same at fourteen thousand eight hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$14,825), which estimate is hereby approved.

Resolved, Further, That the following portion of said city is deemed benefited and properly ought to be assessed by a local assessment for 5 per cent. of the whole expense thereof, to wit:

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of the described parkway as they exist at the date of the passage of this ordinance, public from Norton street to Clifford street, in proportion to the benefit which each will derive therefrom, and further,

Resolved, That the balance of the whole expense of said improvement be paid from the public treasury of the city of Rochester, to wit, from the Boulevard Fund.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—The Humane Society of Rochester respectfully states to your honorable body as follows:

It is the understanding of this society that the subject of the creation and maintenance of a pound is to be under your consideration at an early day, and in this connection the society desires to propose that the city provide a suitable pound in which to keep such

dogs as may be seized under the ordinance for the period of time prescribed thereby, and also to build a suitable air-tight room, and provide the few appliances by which the dogs may be killed by the method now universally conceded to be the most humane, viz., by the use of carbonous oxide gas. Such a room is in use in several of the cities of this country and has long been in use in Europe. Killing dogs by the use of this gas is perfectly painless and the dogs become gradually unconscious without the least distress.

In a number of the other cities in this country the management of the pound and of the killing of all dogs is placed in the hands of the Humane Society of such city and on account of the constant attention which is thus given to the treatment of the animals, the utmost humanity and the best treatment is attained.

This society therefore proposes that the city shall give to the Humane Society of Rochester the management of the city pound, with authority to appoint and employ a superintendent of the pound and one or more agents to catch stray dogs, and to expend such other sums as may be necessary in order to maintain the pound, and that for this purpose the city annually appropriate a suitable amount for these expenses. The society will receive and account for all redemption money received for the dogs and all money received for the sale of dogs, and will deliver the total amount of such receipts, as your honorable body shall direct.

It will be seen that this society obtains no pecuniary advantage under this plan, but that its purpose is to secure the employment of competent persons to catch, keep and kill the dogs against whom the ordinance is directed, and to secure humane treatment of the animals at all times.

Gentlemen:—In relation to the ordinance for
 sewers in that part of the city south of Mt.
 Hope range of hills, which is herewith sub-
 mitted, I beg leave to call attention to the
 following points:

The outlet is through the State Hospital and
 Goodman street sewer, and this is designed to
 carry sewage only with a small amount of
 storm water from roofs of buildings, so that
 it will be necessary to build two systems of
 sewers, one of which will be generally 12-inch
 pipe laid deep enough to drain cellars and
 the other which is to carry off storm water
 will be from 12-inch to 24-inch in diameter,
 laid only four and five feet below the surface.
 The cost of the sewerage system proper is
 estimated at \$6,500, and of the storm sewers
 at \$4,000, making a total of \$10,500.

It is important that both systems be built
 at the same time so as to lessen cost and per-
 mit of improving the streets, especially South
 avenue.

The assessment for lot sewers will aggre-
 gate less than \$33 per lot on the average, and
 the assessment upon city property will be
 about \$1,500, and upon state and county about
 \$2,000.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—In the matter of the claim of the Humane Society for recent penalties paid into the city treasury by the police clerk for violations of the law relating to cock fights, we find that by section 668 of the penal code these fines are required to be paid over to this society wherever the prosecution in which the fines are imposed was instituted or conducted by the society. We have concluded that the proceedings in which the fines claimed were imposed were instituted by said society, and therefore recommend that its claim be allowed.

On the 27th of July, 1894, this common council adopted a resolution directing the city clerk to draw an order in favor of George Chapman for the sum of \$200 to defray the expenses of cleaning out Chapman pond, so called. This action of the board was not accepted by Mr. Chapman, who proceeded to have the

pond cleaned, and has now presented a statement of the expense thereof. He has also presented a certificate from the board of health of the town of Brighton to the effect that the work has been done satisfactory to them. The expense which he has incurred in clearing out the pond is placed by him at \$30.50 more than this committee allowed. We believe that the estimate placed upon the work by the committee was too low, and therefore recommend that an additional order for the sum of \$30.50 be drawn in favor of Mr. Chapman.

In the matter of the compensation of Inspectors of election who served at the special election in the Twentieth ward, we recommend that the usual rate be allowed to such inspectors, poll clerks and ballot clerks.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Assessment Committee would respectfully report, that they have carefully considered the petitions of Frederick H. Merz, et al., Elizabeth A. Morse, Nicholas A. Bardo and D. M. Anthony for the cancellation of assessments for Maple and Colvin streets sewer; several hearings of your committee have been given to the petitioners for the relief from these assessments, and your committee find that the petitioners object to paying

two assessments for outlet sewers; in nearly every case one of these assessments has been merely nominal and your committee cannot find that they have been assessed proportionately any greater sum than have been other taxpayers in different portions of the city; it frequently becomes necessary to assess property owners for two or more outlet sewers; in some cases property owners have paid for as many as five outlet sewers. Your petitioners have carefully examined the assessment roll for the several assessments for outlet sewers made against the property of the petitioners, and they find that the assessors have evidently endeavored to equitably assess all the persons liable for the assessment complained of. The assessors and city surveyor have attended before your committee from time to time and have been heard, and your committee is unanimously of the opinion, after careful examination of all the facts that the several petitions referred to should be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Mary Callahan, for the cancellation of an assessment against her premises, which she claims was purchased with pension money, your committee report that they have acted upon numerous petitions similar to this, and upon recommendation of the City Attorney, in those cases which we follow in this, the petition should be denied.

In the matter of the petition of Rose A. McCormick, for the cancellation of an assessment your committee report, that this petition was considered by the assessment committee of the last Common Council, and they can see no good reason for taking a different action than was taken by the committee when this matter was last before it; the assessors recommended that the petition be denied, and we believe that such action should be taken.

In the matter of the petition of Adam Eisenmenger for relief from an assessment, which petition was denied at a former meeting of this Council and this committee having been asked by said petitioner to reconsider their former action, and which petition asked for reduction of an assessment of \$63.40, under final ordinance No. 5,104, for North Joiner street sewer on his lot on the southwest corner of Hayward park, the Surveyor reports, that the assessment for the North Joiner street sewer was made before the assessment for Hayward Park sewer, and that the petitioner was treated equitably by the assessors, that he was only assessed for a frontage of 40 feet, while his actual frontage was 100 feet, and a branch was put in to allow for the laying of a lateral to his lot. When the Hayward Park sewer was built it was found to be more convenient for him to run his lateral into that sewer, and he was charged \$8 for the cost of said lateral and only 23 cents for the sewer, because of his assessment on the North Joiner street sewer. Your committee deem it unwise to take any further action with Mr. Eisenmenger's petition.

The Executive Board recommend that this assessment for that reason be cancelled and we follow their recommendation.

One of the Surveyor's assistants, Mr. George C. Strasenburgh, has resigned, leaving a vacancy which your committee would not recommend filling at the present time except for the following reasons:

The office force is fully engaged, as far as other work will allow upon the survey of the old Fifteenth and Sixteenth wards, and such progress has been made that your committee deem it for the best interest of the city to encourage the work, and as the survey requires a very large amount of clerical work which can be done to good advantage in the winter, we recommend that two men be employed for the winter at a salary of \$40 per month each.

As this will increase the efficiency of the force for the purpose very much and will only add to the pay roll \$20 per month.

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

Rochester, N. Y., October 13, 1894.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Your special committee on lift bridges beg leave to report.

Members of the committee and the City Surveyor visited Syracuse and Utica to inspect two bridges differing from the prevailing type, and also saw Mr. Adams, the state engineer and surveyor, at Saratoga, where the subject was somewhat discussed and a definite appointment made for the committee to meet him in Rochester.

Mr. Adams came and accompanied by several of his assistants examined Exchange street bridge in company with members of your committee and the City Surveyor.

It was suggested that the canal could be made narrower at Exchange street, when the existing center pier should be removed, thereby simplifying the problem of designing a lift bridge.

Mr. Adams agreed with the committee that this bridge ought to be replaced by a wider and more substantial structure. In fact it has been one of the most important bridges in the city, and has become of still greater importance by reason of the building of the central police station and the city street department yard on Exchange street, south of the canal, and more especially because of building Court street stone bridge and the new bridge over the Carroll and Fitzhugh race and making Court street full 64 feet wide, at a cost of nearly \$175,000, for the express purpose of affording relief to Main street.

While such a large amount has been spent it is at present almost cut off from Main street by reason of the unsafe condition of the present bridge over the canal, and further on account of this it is impossible for the street cars to tow trailers, so that the large district served by the Exchange street line, including the heavy travel to Mt. Hope cemetery, is greatly discommoded.

Your committee believes that because of the importance of Exchange street and because it was one of the most important thoroughfares before the construction of the Erie canal, that the state of New York should build a suitable bridge there and pay the cost of same.

As no lift bridge has yet been built on the canal which can be considered of a suitable design for Exchange street, and as the last legislature placed at the disposal of the state engineer the sum of \$3,000, for the preparation of plans of a lift bridge to replace the monstrosity at West avenue, and as he had decided to expend a portion of that amount in paying the expenses of our fellow townsman, George W. Rafter, on a trip to Europe, to study the subject of lift bridges, and as his report might be expected by the first of December, it was decided to leave the question of plans to future determination.

In the meantime the City Surveyor was directed to submit to the state engineer and surveyor a plan showing the proposed narrowing of the canal, which, if approved by him, he will submit to the canal board.

In the matter of the lift bridge for Emerson street: Your committee was satisfied with the decision of Mr. Adams to build there a bridge of similar design to the one recently built at Clinton street in Syracuse. This plan obviates the necessity of having the usual unsightly, suspended, barn-frame, over-

head structure, and will be far neater in appearance than any lift bridge now existing in the city.

We congratulate the community that the state engineer and surveyor is determined to secure a more slightly design for these bridges which form such an important feature in the appearance of the city.

In conclusion we recommend the passage of the following:

Resolved, That we commend the effort being made by the state engineer and surveyor, the Hon. Campbell W. Adams, to secure a more slightly and efficient form of lift bridge to place over the canal.

Resolved, That the City Attorney be requested to prepare a bill to present to the next legislature providing for the construction of a lift bridge at Exchange street, with a roadway fifty feet wide and sidewalks on each side ten feet wide.

Resolved, That the president of this board be added to the committee and that they be instructed to assist in the preparation of said bill and to do whatever seems advisable to properly present it to the legislature and secure its passage.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—The special committee on public market respectfully reports progress and asks for further time on the main question submitted for its consideration, and recommends that the resolution exempting East Main street from the operation of the huckster ordinance be at once rescinded.

We have examined the condition obtaining on East Main street, in consequence of the suspension with respect to that thoroughfare of the ordinance which prohibits selling from wagons in the streets of the city, and are unanimously of the opinion that the damage to the property immediately affected is serious, unjustified and so indefeasible.

We believe that the property owners can, and we are informed that they will, resort to the courts for relief if compelled to do so, to protect themselves from the injustice which is being done them and we think that the city cannot afford to push them to this extremity.

We find a wide diversity of opinion upon the main question referred to the committee, and it is thought that much valuable information would be forthcoming as soon as East Main street is restored to the legitimate use for which it was designed.

Certainly your committee would not without careful study and only after the necessity had been fully demonstrated, advise the considerable addition to the municipal debt which a public market would involve; and reasonable assurance on this point cannot be reached until some time has been devoted to the work. If then the conclusion should be favorable to a public market, and your honorable body should adopt the report of this committee, a year would probably be a short time in which to acquire the land and make it ready for use.

There can be no propriety in expecting the present conditions to be patiently endured

for that, or even for any considerable time. The immediate action of your honorable body on this single recommendation is, therefore, most respectfully urged by the undersigned special committee on public market.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO POUNDS.

The Common Council do ordain and establish as follows:

Sec. 1. There shall be maintained for the city one or more public pounds, in which shall be distrained all cattle, fowls and dogs found running at large in violation of the ordinances of the city.

Sec. 2. There shall be one or more poundkeepers whose duty it shall be to take and impound any cattle, fowl or dogs brought to him found running at large in violation of the ordinances of the city.

Sec. 3. Each poundkeeper shall enter upon his books forthwith the name and residence of any person bringing any cattle, fowl or dog to his pound, the date when such cattle, fowl or dog was brought, a brief description of the same sufficient for identification, and the name and residence of the owner thereof, if known, which book shall at all times be open to the inspection of all persons who desire to examine the same.

Sec. 4. There shall be charged for each cattle impounded an impounding fee of fifty cents, and also fifty cents for each day or part of a day for providing sustenance for such cattle, a fee of twenty-five cents for each fowl or dog impounded, and a further fee of twenty-five cents for each day or part of a day for providing sustenance therefor.

Sec. 5. When any cattle, or fowl shall be impounded as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of the poundkeeper where the same is impounded forthwith to make complaint before one of the judges of the municipal court of said city against the owner or owners thereof, if known, and thereupon a warrant shall be issued and upon the return thereof executed, or the defendant having appeared, it shall be the duty of said judge to inquire whether the defendant has been guilty of a violation of the ordinances of the city complained of, and if the defendant be found guilty, judgment shall be rendered against him for the penalty, impounding fee, costs of sustenance, and cost of suit, and an order shall be entered that the cattle or fowl shall be sold to satisfy said judgment in case the same shall not be paid forthwith, such order shall describe the cattle or fowl and state the time and place of impounding.

Sec. 6. When the owner of any cattle or fowl impounded shall be unknown, it shall be the duty of the poundkeeper when the same shall be impounded to make complaint as provided in the preceding section against the unknown owner, describing the cattle or fowl, and thereupon the judge before whom such complaint shall be made shall issue a notice reciting such complaint that the owner is unknown, a description of the cattle or fowl impounded, together with a reference to the section of the ordinance violated, and giving notice of the time and place where a trial will be had, and such unknown owner may appear and defend. The day named in such notice shall not be less than six nor more than twelve days from the time of issuing the same, and it shall be the duty of the poundkeeper making the complaint forth-

with to post three copies of said notice, one at the pound where such cattle or fowl is impounded, one at the municipal court of said city, and one at the public bulletin board at the county clerk's office, and to return said notice with the time and manner of posting to said municipal court. Upon the return of the said notice, like proceedings shall be had as in the case of personal service or appearance. Nothing herein contained shall affect or abridge the right of the accused to a trial by jury.

Sec. 7. Upon the rendition of any judgment as herein provided, unless an appeal shall be taken and further proceedings stayed, the judge rendering the same shall issue to the poundkeeper where such cattle or fowl are impounded, an order commanding him to make the amount of such judgment and costs, stating the same separately, and the names of the parties and make due return thereof.

Sec. 8. Upon the receipt of such order the poundkeeper shall immediately post three notices, as provided in section six, stating that certain cattle or fowl, describing the same, were impounded and that judgment has been rendered and an order for such judgment and costs made, and that unless redeemed they will be sold at public auction for cash to the highest bidder at the public pound, describing the same, and on a certain day and hour. Said sale shall take place not less than three days after the posting of such notices, exclusive of Sundays, holidays and election days, and if such cattle or fowl are not redeemed, the poundkeeper shall sell the same in accordance with said notices. It shall be the duty of the poundkeeper receiving such an order, as prescribed in section seven, to return the same within twenty days from its date to the court issuing the same, with an indorsement showing when and how the same was executed.

Sec. 9. The poundkeeper shall daily give notice in the official paper of said city of such dogs as shall be received by him, giving the breed, color and sex of the same, with the date and place when the same will be disposed of as herein provided. All dogs shall be kept by such poundkeeper with proper food and water two days after the publication of said notice, during which time any dog may be redeemed by its owner upon the payment of the expense of such publication, the expense of impounding and keeping of such dog, and the further payment to the city clerk of one dollar for registration fee and tag, where such dog shall not be registered, and all dogs not redeemed within two days after the publication of the above mentioned notice, the poundkeeper is hereby authorized to sell or cause to be killed.

Sec. 10. At any time before the sale of any cattle, fowl or dog impounded, the owner or owners thereof may redeem the same by paying to the poundkeeper the impounding fee and cost of sustenance, as provided herein, and procuring the registration of any dog impounded, and in case proceedings shall have been instituted before a judicial officer, the cost of such proceeding and the amount of the judgment recovered, together with subsequently accrued costs of sustenance.

Sec. 11. When the proceeds of the sale of any cattle, fowl or dog shall exceed the amount of judgment and costs, and the expense of sustenance which shall have accrued subsequently to the rendition of the judgment, such excess shall be paid to the city treasurer, and the owner or owners of such cattle, fowl or dog shall be entitled to a warrant on the city treasurer for such excess, upon presenting to the city attorney satisfactory evidence of his right thereto. If such excess shall not be claimed within a year

after the same shall be deposited, the person otherwise entitled thereto shall forfeit all claim thereto.

Sec. 12. The Humane Society of Rochester, for the prevention of cruelty to animals is hereby empowered and authorized to carry out the provisions of this ordinance, and said society shall be entitled to and shall receive all impounding fees and costs of sustenance allowed by this ordinance, and also all fines and penalties imposed thereunder in proceedings instituted or prosecuted by said society upon the express condition, however, that the city shall not be liable for any expense, cost or compensation connected with carrying out any of the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 13. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen: The petition of the undersigned property owners on Council avenue, a street extending from North avenue to Miller street, in the eighteenth ward, respectfully shows: That the undersigned are all of the property owners having property upon said Council avenue. That recently a sewer was constructed in said avenue, under a final ordinance adopted by this council; that the contract for the construction of such sewer was duly let to Charles W. Hartung, who proceeded with the construction and completion of said sewer. That the said sewer is an ordinary pipe sewer, laid sufficiently low to drain the cellars of the ordinary dwelling houses on said street. That during the construction of said sewer, Mr. Hartung asked the undersigned petitioners whether they wanted the laterals put in for their respective pieces of property, and as independent to secure the construction of such laterals, he agreed with the undersigned to do the work and furnish the pipes necessary for their construction for the uniform price of \$5 each.

That he was authorized in some instances by property owners to lay said laterals, and in some instances laid them without authority. That upon the completion of the contract he put in a claim to the Executive Board for the sum of \$10 each for such laterals. That your petitioners show that the price of \$10 is excessive, and more than such work was reasonably and fairly worth. That at a conference of the property owners with the Executive Board and the said contractor, it was practically admitted by Mr. Hartung that in some instances he had no authority for the laying of such laterals, but claimed that the work was done by him in good faith and that he should be paid therefor.

The Executive Board, after the conference, recommended to the property owners that Mr. Hartung be paid \$7.50 for each lateral so laid. Your petitioners regard this price as excessive, and as more than should be assessed to them for the work of laying such lateral. They therefore ask that the matter be referred to a proper committee for investigation, and that the payment of the final estimate for the con-

struction of such sewer be delayed until such time as the petition of the undersigned shall have been duly considered by such committee.

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE BOARD FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS OF THE CORPORATION AND THEIR REFERENCE.

By the Clerk—

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
ROCHESTER, N. Y., Oct. 30, 1894.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: I desire to call your attention to a matter which ought, in justice, to have received consideration before now, viz: the menace to the lives of our citizens by the existence of unprotected grade crossings of two principal railways on what has come to be an important thoroughfare, Elmwood avenue.

While Rochester is known far and wide for her system of elevated tracks, a system which was procured only after long negotiations, following earnest public agitation, and though she is in the main better protected in this regard than any of her sister cities possessing like railway facilities, there still remains a large number of crossings at grade which are dangerous in the extreme.

Most of these, to be sure, are on streets in the outlying districts, which have become a part of the city since the main system of tracks passing through the corporation was elevated. In response to demands made by your body from time to time, the various companies owning the lines have furnished a fair protection at very many of these crossings. Until within a recent date, it is only fair to state, most of the fatalities on the railways, within the city limits, have been due to the carelessness of the victims, who were trespassers upon the property of the corporations when the accidents occurred.

While neither your honorable body, nor the railway companies, can be censured for such accidents, you, as representatives of the people standing between them and the corporations operating railway lines within the city, would be held accountable, if, through any negligence on your part, fatalities should result.

The recent accidents within our city, by which two persons were killed at East Rochester, while another one, a child, lost its life at Lincoln park, as well as the other one a few miles beyond the city limits in the town of Henrietta, resulting in the death of two children, can not have been forgotten by you. Certainly the lessons they teach can not have been lost upon the public nor your honorable body. The still more recent accident in the neighboring city of Buffalo, by which three members of the family of one of that city's most prominent business men were crushed to death, the accident being due to a lack of protection at a grade crossing, should have the effect of stirring your body to action, that all defects in the matter of protection may be removed before Rochester is called upon to witness a like calamity.

I need only remind you that Elmwood avenue forms one of the main approaches to Genesee Valley Park, to impress upon your minds how much danger lies in the unprotected crossings of the Lehigh and Erie roads, at a point near together and only a short distance from the entrance to the park proper. Within the past three years Genesee Valley Park has come to be one of the city's most popular resorts, and the drive to and from this great recreation ground is one of the most pleasant as well as one of the best patronized thoroughfares in the city. Every year means an increase in its popularity and patronage, and consequently an increase in the danger, if it is to remain entirely unprotected, as at present. It would be desirable, of course, to do away with the grade crossings entirely, but I recognize that that is hardly possible at present. The best substitute for a crossing either above or below

grade is to have the tracks provided with gates, which shall be operated by thoroughly competent watchmen, who shall be on duty at all hours when there is a possibility of traffic.

I would therefore suggest to your honorable body that you take such action as will be needed to compel the railway companies named to furnish the protection at the crossings I have suggested.

Gentlemen:—In the matter of enlarging the area of assessment for the East Main street bridge improvement which was referred to me for my opinion, I beg leave to say that the city charter provides that when the ordinances for an improvement are adopted, they shall specify, among other things, the territory to be assessed for the improvement, and whether or not any portion of the expense is to be paid out of the public treasury. The ordinance for the improvement in question has long since been adopted and it provides that the expense thereof should be paid entirely by local assessment upon the territory described in the ordinance. The improvement has been made and the expense has been reported to the common council. An order of assessment has been made and an assessment levied in accordance therewith.

Whether or not the area of assessment can now be enlarged must be determined by an examination of the provisions of the city charter. It is a well known principal of construction that a municipal corporation can exercise no powers not conferred upon it by the act under which it was constituted, or such as are necessary to the exercise of its corporate powers, or the performance of its corporate duties, or the accomplishment of the purpose of its association. The charter is silent upon the question of enlarging the area of assessment after an improvement has been made as proposed in this case and no such authority can be inferred from any language found there.

I am therefore of the opinion that the territory to be assessed for the improvement in question cannot be enlarged, and a valid assessment levied upon such added territory.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO DOGS.

The City Clerk shall keep a complete registry of all dogs, in a book to be kept for that purpose describing the same by name, breed, color and sex, and shall also enter the name and address of the owner or keeper as given, and the number of the city license tag; he shall provide such number of metal tags, of not less than three-fourths of an inch in width, as may be necessary, bearing on the face serial numbers; and such tag shall be furnished by the City Clerk to each owner of a dog at the time of registering said dog and shall be attached to the collar of such animal. No person shall counterfeit, or use any other tag than that furnished by the City Clerk. The fee for registering each dog shall be twenty-five (25) cents, and for furnishing the metal tag seventy-five cents, and all licenses, fines and penalties collected under this ordinance shall be placed to the credit of the Police Fund. Any person harboring a dog for two days prior to any violation of the terms of this ordinance shall be held to be the owner of said dog.

Sec. 2. No dog, or animal of the dog kind, shall be permitted to run at large in the city of Rochester unless muzzled when required as hereinafter provided nor unless said dog shall wear a collar of metal or leather bearing a tag or plate such as is prescribed in this ordinance.

Sec. 3. No person shall suffer to run at large in said city, any dog, owned or harbored by him of ferocious and dangerous character, habit or disposition; nor shall any person keep or suffer to be kept on his premises or the premises occupied by him within said city, any dog in the habit of howling or whining at night, or barking at, or in any manner annoying any person or persons; any person who owns or harbors such dog or dogs shall be subject to a fine as hereinafter provided. No female dog in time of heat shall be allowed to run at large within the city limits. Upon a second conviction for a violation of this section it may be a part of the sentence that such dog be immediately killed; and this sentence shall be executed forthwith by one of the pound keepers to be designated by the magistrate imposing the sentence, and any owner or keeper of any such dog who refuses to deliver up the same in compliance with said judgment, shall be liable to an additional fine therefor.

Sec. 4. Whenever the mayor of the city of Rochester shall deem it necessary, he shall sign an order prohibiting, for a certain time therein specified, any or all dogs from running at large in any street, alley or other public place in said city unless such dogs be securely muzzled, or led by a line or chain, so as effectually to prevent them from biting any person or animal; which order shall be published in the official newspaper of the said city.

Sec. 5. Every person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall for each offense be subject to a fine or penalty not exceeding \$150 in amount to be imposed by the police justice, or judge, or court before whom a suit for such fine or penalty is brought in the discretion of such justice, judge, or court, and on failure to pay such fine or penalty when recovered shall be imprisoned in the Monroe County Penitentiary for a term not exceeding 150 days to be determined by such justice, judge or court, in his or its discretion at the time the judgment is entered.

Sec. 6. Every execution upon a judgment recovered for any fine or penalty or forfeiture imposed for the violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be issued immediately on the rendition of the judgment and shall command the amount to be made out of the personal property of the defendant within the city not exempt from levy and sale under an execution, if such can be found, and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe County Penitentiary for such time as shall have been directed by the justice, judge or court rendering such judgment and may be issued to and enforced by any member of the police department of said city. Such execution may be issued by the police justice or police clerk of said city, where the judgment was rendered by the police justice of said city.

Sec. 7. The Humane Society of Rochester for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, is hereby empowered and authorized to carry out the provisions of this ordinance, said society shall furnish at its own expense, all men, horses, vehicles, apparatus and appliances necessary to seize all dogs and other animals found running at large or being within the city in violation of the provisions of the ordinances of the city and to take the same to one of the public pounds; said society shall receive therefor a sum equal to

all license fees hereafter received by said city in pursuance of this ordinance after deducting the necessary expense of the city in procuring books and tags for the registration of dogs; also a sum equal to all fines and penalties imposed under this ordinance in proceedings instituted or prosecuted by said society upon the express condition, however, that the city shall not be liable for any expenses, costs, or compensation connected with carrying out any of the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 8. All existing ordinances inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 9. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Sec. 7. Nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to prevent any person, firm, association, or corporation, residing and transacting business in the city of Rochester, from distributing circulars, or handbills from house to house or store to store advertising the business in which said person, firm, association or corporation is directly engaged.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE REGULATING BILL POSTING AND BILL DISTRIBUTING.

Sec. 1. Section five of said ordinance is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 5. From and after the passage of this ordinance no person or persons shall engage in and carry on the business of bill posting, bill distributing and sign advertising in the City of Rochester, and no person shall go upon any of the streets, sidewalks or alleys of said city for the purpose of distributing or circulating posters, circulars, hand bills, sample advertisements, printed or engraved notices, or advertisements of any kind in any offices, stores, places of business or residences in said city; nor shall any person post, circulate, engrave, write, paint or distribute in said city any posters, circulars, hand bills, pamphlets, sample advertisements, printed or engraved notices or advertisements of any kind whatever, without previously having obtained a license as specified in this ordinance and complied with the requirements of the preceding sections, or without being an officer, agent or employe of any person or persons having such license and complying with the ordinance aforesaid. Nothing herein contained, however, shall permit any licensed person, his officer, agent or employe from distributing bills to pedestrians upon any of the public streets of said city.

Sec. 2. Section six of said ordinance is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 6. No fence or other structure whether of wood or any other material already built, or hereafter to be erected, shall be used for the display of any signs, bills, cards, pamphlets, circulars, notices, pictures, or advertisements without the consent of the Common Council. No person shall scatter or throw upon the streets, sidewalks or alleys in said city, posters, hand bills, advertisements or paper, and nothing herein shall be construed to authorize any person or persons to obstruct the streets, sidewalks and alleys of said city, or create any nuisance therein, or prevent the posting of notices required by law to be posted.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—The following resolutions were duly adopted at a meeting of citizens interested in the assessment roll for the construction of East Main street railroad bridge, held October 29, 1894.

Respectfully,

E. S. HAYWARD, JR., Chairman.

Whereas, All tenures and property rights in land are equally secure under law, whether owned by individuals, (persons) or by railroad corporations, (artificial persons) and every such owner is entitled to its exclusive use as he or it may please, subject always, however, to reasonable restrictions for the public good and safety, under the unwritten and unalterable fundamental laws of eminent domain, that is to say: No individual may interfere with the reasonable rights of his neighbor or conduct on his own lands the manufacture of powder or prosecute any business, even if legitimate, hazardous to his neighbor or to the public, without providing safeguards against such danger at his own exclusive expense. Neither can a railroad corporation conduct its business in a hazardous manner, even if legitimate, without providing ample safeguards, to protect the public or residents while pursuing their legitimate travel, at such railroad corporation's own exclusive expense, and

Whereas, The reserved rights of eminent domain being irrevocable and beyond and above the power of Legislatures, as well as above the power of municipal corporations, any contracts made, or purporting to have been made, infringing on such inherent or reserved rights are a flagrant violation of fundamental law, and are as untenable and void as if contracted by fraud, and

Whereas, The public street now called North Goodman street was one of the principal streets for ingress and egress to and from the city of Rochester for many years prior to the construction of any railroad in this county and which, together with East Main street, was enjoyed for a long term of years after the construction of the N. Y. C. R. R., by the citizens of the outside districts, as safe, easy and level grade crossings of said R. R. with slight reasonable hindrance by waiting on passing trains, without complaint, until up to within a few years previous to the construction of the original East Main street bridge by said R. R. company, preceeding which the tedious delays of standing trains, and the increased number and speed of other trains had become an intolerable nuisance and a great danger and menace to the public, thus making it incumbent upon said R. R. Company to build and maintain at its own exclusive expense, adequate bridges and full regulation sidewalks (the same as are lawfully required at the expense of other persons) at and over both of the public streets named; thus to provide against such delay and danger to the public and to enable said R. R. Company to continue its more profitable, extensive and properly progressive business, thereby, while not restoring to the residents their full privileges and previous rights of crossing at an easy level grade, affording at least safe transit and freedom from the unlawful hazard created by and for the benefit of said R. R. Company alone, and

Whereas, After said R. R. Company had built the original East Main Street Bridge, the city council of Rochester did, in violation of the sacred rights of the public, which are unalterably secured under the laws of eminent domain, coactive with the said R. R. Company and without authority of law, enter into an alleged agreement with said R. R. Company binding the city (the entire city) of Rochester to keep in repair and maintain said bridge and permitting the closing up entirely of the ancient and long established Goodman Street Roadway, instead of properly indicting said R. R. Company as a nuisance for obstructing said crossing for hours with standing trains, and

Whereas, A subsequent City Council did, in alleged pursuance of said unwarranted contract, adopt an ordinance providing for maintaining said bridge by the erection of a new bridge and in violation of the terms of said

alleged contract, instead of doing so at the expense of said (entire) city (as specifically expressed in said contract) and without warrant or condemnation proceedings, unjustly and illegally assess such expense on a portion, only, of said city of Rochester, and,

Whereas, Said new bridge is not only a special private improvement for the especial benefit of said R. R. Company but also a general necessity to the merchants and people of the entire city at large and should therefore be a private charge to said R. R. Company, or else a charge upon the entire city, and,

Whereas, The erection of said new bridge alone permitted the extension of the street R. R. lines eastward, thus creating a new source of franchise revenue for the benefit of the treasury of the entire city which will in time reimburse the city at large for the cost of said bridge. Now, therefore,

Resolved, That we, hereby respectfully request the City Council to relieve us of said unjust local assessment and to assess the entire cost of said bridge and its approaches against, either the N. Y. C. R. R. Company or else against the city at large. Also that the R. R. Company shall be required to construct an adequate bridge for pedestrians over their tracks at Goodman street crossing, thus partly restoring the rights which are unjustly denied to the citizens, also

Resolved, That the president of this meeting request the Hon. Merton E. Lewis to present a copy of these resolutions to the Common Council of the city of Rochester at its next meeting.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

We, the undersigned residents and property owners in the Fourteenth and Nineteenth wards of said city, and in the vicinity of the location of the proposed garbage crematory which is now being erected in said Nineteenth ward, do hereby respectfully record our earnest and most emphatic pro-

test against the establishment of such a plant on the proposed site between the Erie and Western New York and Philadelphia Railroad tracks just south of the Vacuum Oil Company's works in said ward.

We desire to call the attention of your honorable body to the fact that the Rochester Reduction and Fertilizer Company is erecting on the above site several large wooden buildings for the purpose of burning night soil and garbage to be collected in said city. That such buildings are being erected in violation of law and against the provisions of the charter and ordinances of said city.

That such wooden buildings are to be within two hundred feet of property owned by several of the undersigned, and the consent of the owners of such property within two hundred feet has not been obtained; and we are also informed that said wooden buildings are being erected without consent or authority of your honorable body.

We further show that to have and permit the operation of such a plant on the proposed site will be a nuisance of the most aggravating character, and that the undersigned, and nearly all of the citizens of Rochester, will suffer greatly therefrom.

Said plant is located just east of Plymouth avenue (the avenue which is now the principal and, in fact, the only passable driveway to Genesee Valley Park) and is midway between Clarissa street and the Elmwood avenue entrance to said park.

The only means of reaching said plant is by way of Plymouth avenue (paved with asphalt), or Mansion street (unimproved and at certain times of the year almost impassable).

It is evident without argument that Plymouth avenue will be the thoroughfare through which all the garbage and night soil will be carted.

We do not believe the popularity of our South Park will be increased if the principal drive and parkway to it is made the highway for the passage to and from of all the garbage wagons of the city. When it is considered that more than fifteen thousand (15,000) tons of garbage, beside all the night soil, are to be disposed of annually (on an average of fifty (50) tons per day, amounting to not less than seventy-five loads daily), the utter folly and gross wrong of permitting such a plant to operate on the line of the main avenue to our principal park are plainly perceptible.

The condition of affairs on Mt. Hope avenue, another of our principal drives, is not better. The present location of this obnoxious plant is so near that avenue that with the prevailing south and west winds the sickening odors of the garbage crematory and phosphate factory will make that thoroughfare also impassable.

We believe it utterly impossible to operate the proposed plant without creating the worst kind of nuisance. Foul odors are bound to escape; property will become worthless in this vicinity; the health of the people who are compelled to live within smelling distance will be endangered.

We have labored hard to make ours a pleasant and attractive part of the city. We have expended large sums of money in building and improving our homes; vast amounts of our hard earnings have gone to construct costly and extensive improvements, and as a result for the past two years we have seen old buildings disappear, new and beautiful ones erected in their places, former nuisances have been abated, and now we do not propose to have our prospects at this time blighted by having located in our midst the most intolerable nuisance of all.

We object most strenuously, and oppose most bitterly, any attempt to make our vicinity the dumping ground of the whole city, and to your honorable body we most respectfully and most earnestly appeal for protection.

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

By Ald. Dewey—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: Your Special Committee on the revision of the penal ordinances in view of the attention that has been given to the subject by the public press, and the discussions that have occurred upon the floor of this chamber,

deems it advisable to submit a report with reference to the subject referred to them.

The appointment of this special committee has grown out of an urgent necessity for the compilation of the penal ordinances of the city. Some time ago this council at considerable expense authorized a compilation of the ordinances to be prepared. Such a compilation was made and is now in the possession of the city attorney, and is, we believe, with the exception of two or three typewritten copies made by the city attorney to provide in case of a loss of the original compilation, the only complete set of the penal ordinances as now in force in existence in this city. It was the general impression that the work of this committee would consist simply in the examination of the compilation referred to and its publication, but a study of the ordinances now in force reveals the fact that some of them are conflicting, others are ambiguous in their terms, and nearly all require a re-arrangement. It was the plan of this committee to arrange the ordinances under suitable heads and to thoroughly revise the whole of them before recommending their publication. It would be a waste of money to publish them as they now exist. Your committee since its appointment has held meetings from time to time, and this council is aware of some of the work that the committee has been doing by the number of ordinances that have been introduced. There is before this council for adoption at this meeting a re-enactment of the ordinance relating to the licensing of dogs. This subject furnishes a good illustration of the work that this committee is seeking to do on the subject referred to it. When this committee began its labor, there was no special ordinance referring to dogs among the penal ordinances of the city, but here and there were provisions in other ordinances relating to the subject. There was an ordinance relating to public pounds which included dogs among cattle, fowl and other animals of that character. Your committee deemed it advisable to treat these subjects under three ordinances: First under an ordinance relating to dogs and regulating their running at large within the city; secondly, under an ordinance relating to cattle, fowl and other animals of that character straying within the city, and thirdly under an ordinance relating to pounds which would cover all animals mentioned in the ordinances referred to. The ordinance relating to dogs has been adopted. It was first considered by your committee because there seemed to be a demand for a reasonable dog ordinance arising from the numerous cases brought to the attention of the police department of persons who had been attacked and injured by vicious dogs. The ordinance prepared by your committee has met with the approval of this council. It has turned into the public treasury over \$1,300 as license fees, without any special effort having been made to enforce it. Many ordinances relating to this subject as they existed in Chicago, New York, Buffalo and other cities, were considered by your committee, and we believe that the ordinance which has been adopted is the most reasonable of any that your committee has examined, and that it is adapted to this city. The pound ordinance which was in force when your committee assumed its labors, had been in operation for nearly fifteen years, and making the necessary changes which the adoption of the dog ordinance made necessary, your committee presented the old pound ordinance for re-adoption. Some criticisms were passed upon this ordinance although it had been upon the books of the city for the number of years stated. Your committee then prepared a new pound ordinance, after an examination of the ordinances on this subject

as they existed in other cities and consultations with the police department, members of the Humane Society and other citizens interested in the subject. As a result of its investigations the ordinance which was adopted at the last meeting of this common council was prepared. The ordinance relating to the straying of cattle and fowl within the city has been prepared, and is also ready for presentation and adoption by this council. With the adoption of these three ordinances the labors of your committee, so far as the subject of pounds and dogs and straying animals is concerned, will be completed.

A word may be proper at this time with reference to the provision in the pound ordinance giving the control of the enforcement of the pounds and the supervision of the dog ordinance to the Humane Society. Both of these ordinances have been published, and so far as your committee has been able to learn, no criticism has been made upon that provision in the ordinance, but on the contrary, expressions of approval have been heard on all sides, and so far as the public press has noticed the subject, it has also indicated its approval. Your committee did not feel that it was warranted in recommending the adoption of any ordinance providing for the creation of any new office such as a pound keeper, or dog catcher which would entail any additional expense upon the city. The ordinance prepared will not cost the city anything and we believe that the Humane Society will carry it out in a manner satisfactory to all our people. We believe that it is the public sentiment that if any of the dogs in this city, however worthless they may be, are to be destroyed, they shall be destroyed in a humane manner, and we believe that this work can be done far more satisfactorily by the Humane Society than by any salaried officer that may be appointed by this council who may perform his duties in a merely perfunctory manner. There does not seem to be any just ground for criticism upon placing the control of the pound in the hands of the Humane Society. The old ordinance on the subject of pounds has been in force in this city for nearly fifteen years and it is safe to say that not one cent has ever been realized by the city from any of its provisions. If the assumption of the enforcement of this ordinance by the Humane Society should result in a profit to the society, it will not be the cause of depriving the city of any accustomed income. Much more, however, could be said in favor of placing the enforcement of these ordinances in the hands of the Humane Society. The regulation of the subjects mentioned is no trifling matter and we believe that the time of this council in considering and adopting these ordinances is well spent. So important have these subjects become in larger cities, that only last winter a statute was passed by the legislature providing for the licensing of dogs within cities having a population of over 1,200,000. It is a significant fact in discussing the question as to whether the council should place the control of this ordinance in the hands of the Humane Society to remember that the statute referred to places the licensing of dogs within the limits of cities having the population referred to in the hands of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, and gives to that society all fees collected under the statute. The ordinance which is before the council for adoption to-night, relating to dogs, is, as has been stated at a former meeting, a re-enactment of the ordinance which has been heretofore adopted to make it conform to the provisions of the ordinance relating to pounds with the exception of that provision which places the enforcement of the ordinance in the hands of the Humane Society. The three

ordinances that have been referred to, that relating to cattle, fowl and other animals running at large, and that relating to dogs, and that relating to pounds go together, and under the plan of the committee, the Humane Society will see to the enforcement of these ordinances, receiving any license fees that may be collected under them, after their adoption, and all fines collected in cases prosecuted by the society. This latter provision is in line with section 668 of the penal code which gives to that society all fine collected in cases instituted or conducted by that society for cruelty to animals, so that there is nothing unusual in placing the control of these ordinances in the hands of the Humane Society or providing for the payment to it of the license fees and fines collected under the ordinances.

In the matter of the application of the owners of certain theaters in this city for a reduction of the license fee, your committee finds upon investigation that license fees for theaters in the cities of Buffalo and Syracuse is only \$50 and we can see no reason why the license in this city should exceed those in the cities named, and therefore recommend that the same be reduced to the sum of \$50.

Gentlemen:—Taxpayers are daily offering payments on the assessments for Maple and Colvin street sewer, Ord. No. 4,195, and East Main street bridge, Ord. No. 4,542, which, owing to your resolution of Oct. 16th, reconsidering same I am obliged to refuse.

To the Board of Park Commissioners:

Gentlemen:—The land south of Highland avenue, which is included in Highland park, was turned over to the Park Commission for park use by the Common Council on May 29, 1888, subject to use for water and municipal purposes.

This piece of land contains 18.40 acres, and has two lines of water pipe across it, one, the pumping main from the Brighton wells, is not now in use and we suppose will be taken up in the immediate future, the other is the new 38-inch main for the additional water supply.

Goodman street will soon be opened to Highland avenue, and it is thought by your committee, that it should be opened to Elmwood avenue at once. The land to be taken for this purpose will include a part of the above described piece and a piece now owned by Messrs. Ellwanger & Barry.

On consultation it has been found that Messrs. Ellwanger & Barry are willing to exchange acre for acre, land on Elmwood avenue for land on Highland avenue.

This piece of land south of Highland avenue has a frontage of 1,100 feet on the south side of the avenue, after making the proposed change the frontage on the avenue would be 457 feet, and the distance on the center line of Goodman street produced to Elmwood avenue would be 1,855 feet.

In carrying Goodman street through from Highland to Elmwood avenue, as proposed, it could be made into a parkway, as the width of the land owned by the city would be 426 1-2 feet. This could be laid out with a fine drive and walks; in fact, it can be made an extension to Highland park.

Neither of the water mains cross the piece of land proposed to be given to Messrs. Ellwanger & Barry in exchange, and your committee cannot see what use the city can make of it either for water or municipal purposes.

The accompanying map shows the land owned by the city and that proposed to be exchanged.

Your committee recommend, that the Common Council be requested the transfer of the land with Messrs. Ellwanger & Barry as laid out by the Park Engineer on the accompanying map, acre by acre, and also to authorize the City Attorney to draw up the necessary papers and the mayor to sign the necessary deed.

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to present to you the following amendments to the laws of the Park Commissioners, as authorized by the special committee appointed for that purpose, with the recommendation that they be adopted.

AN ACT to amend chapter one hundred ninety-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, entitled,

“An act to authorize the selection and acquiring of certain grants for public parks and parkways in and near the city of Rochester, and to provide for the maintenance and embellishment thereof passed April 27, 1888, as amended by chapter three hundred forty-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety and chapter three hundred ninety-three of the laws of eighteen hundred ninety-four.”

The People of the state of New York, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section six of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 6. On the opening of such court on the day designated in the notice mentioned in the annexed preceding section or as soon thereafter as he can be heard, the City Attorney of said city on behalf thereof shall upon a copy of said resolution, certified by the City Clerk, and upon proof of the due publication of said notices apply to said court to appoint such commissioners. Such court shall hear such application and shall appoint three commissioners for the purpose aforesaid. If any commissioner so appointed shall die, be disqualified or decline to serve, the said court may, upon application of the said City Attorney, appoint another in his place. Each of said commissioners shall be paid from the park fund herein provided, five dollars for each day employed as such commissioner.

Section 2. Section twenty-four of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 24. No plan for the laying out and improvement of the said park or parks, parkways, approaches thereto and streets connecting the same shall be adopted or undertaken by the said Park Commissioners, of which the entire expense of maintenance shall be a greater sum than one mill upon each dollar of valuation of the taxable property of the said city per annum, for the purpose of laying out, completing, improving and maintaining all the parks, squares and parkways within said city, in addition to the interest of the said sum of three hundred thousand dollars, hereinbefore provided to be issued in bonds of the city of Rochester, and the one per cent., hereinbefore provided to be annually levied, and the income derived from rents or privileges granted by the said Park Commissioners. In addition to the power hereinbefore conferred said Park Commissioners shall have the care, maintenance and control of all the public parks and public squares within the city of Rochester, and shall have the power to plant, set out, protect and preserve shade trees in the streets, parks, squares, avenues and al-

leys of said city, and to cause such trees to be removed, pruned and trimmed whenever required for their protection, or for public convenience and comfort, and no person, corporation or any officer, department or agent of said city shall hereafter remove, trim, prune, cut down or in any way interfere with shade trees in the streets, parks, squares, avenues or alleys of said city without first procuring a written consent from said Park Commissioners, or such officer or committee as may be designated by them.

Section 3. Section twenty-five of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 25. It shall be the duty of said Park Commissioners to annually, on or before the 16th day of May, in each year, determine and certify to the Common Council the sums which in their opinion are necessary to be raised for the several purposes mentioned in this act, specifying the sums required for the fiscal year for every of said purposes. It shall be the duty of said Common Council to annually raise by a tax, as provided for by the city charter, a sum not to exceed one mill upon each dollar of valuation of the taxable property in said city, the same to be added to the general tax levy of each year, for the purpose of laying out, completing, improving and maintaining all the parks, squares and parkways within said city, and for the purpose of planting, caring, maintaining and controlling the shade trees as hereinbefore provided, and for keeping in repair the improvements and structures in said parks, squares and parkways and for providing a suitable office or offices for said commissioners.

Section 4. Section twenty-six of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 26. The money raised by the sale of the bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of this act shall be deposited as fast as the same shall be realized with the Treasurer of the city of Rochester. He shall keep a separate account of all such moneys received by him for the laying out and improvement of the park or parks, parkways, squares, approaches thereto and streets connecting the same, to be known as the “Park Improvement Fund.” He shall hold all such moneys on account of and for the purpose of such improvements and the expenses herein authorized and shall pay them out as provided in this act, and not otherwise. The said Park Commissioners shall draw their drafts upon the said City Treasurer, signed by their president and secretary, for all claims, charges and expenses authorized and incurred by the commissioners in laying out and improving of said park or parks, parkways, squares, approaches thereto and streets connecting the same, specifying in such drafts the purposes for which they are drawn, and the Treasurer shall pay the same out of improvement moneys upon the presentation of said drafts. The moneys raised by the Common Council, pursuant to section 25 of this act, shall be set apart by the Treasurer of said city, who shall keep a separate account of all such moneys and the same shall be known as the “Park Fund,” which may be used for the purposes mentioned in this act. And said treasurer shall pay out from such fund upon the drafts of said Park Commissioners issued in the form and manner prescribed by this section and not otherwise.

Section 5. All acts or parts of acts inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

Gentlemen:—Your Law Committee begs leave to report as follows:

In the cases of Adelbert P. Little and the Rochester & Honeoye Valley Railroad Company against the city of Rochester, decisions have been rendered against the city, and as there are questions of law which should be passed upon by the appellate courts, we recommend that appeals be taken to a final determination.

In the matter of the communication of the Board of Park Commissioners for the exchange of certain lands on the south side of Highland avenue with Ellwanger & Barry, we recommend that the exchange be made, as provided in the accompanying resolution.

In the matter of the claim of William H. Allen against the city for services as inspector of election in the first district of the first ward, we find that Mr. Allen was displaced by an inspector appointed by this common council, and that he served three whole days. We therefore recommend that he be paid for his services at the usual rate.

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES,

By Ald. Harris—

ROCHESTER, N. Y., November 27, 1894.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Your special committee appointed to confer with the board of health for the purpose of devising some means whereby the health and property of the residents living in the vicinity of the proposed works of the Fertilizer and Reduction Company might be protected, beg leave to report, that they have carefully considered the matter referred to them and are unanimous in their decision against the proposed location of said works. We believe that whatever the terms of the contract of said company may be, it will be impossible to collect and dispose of the garbage and night soil of this city without creating a nuisance to some of its inhabitants. Experience in other cities has shown that similar works are a nuisance and in some instances they have been abandoned for that reason. There are many grounds why this plant should not be located as proposed. We believe that no further check to the growth of the locality of the proposed site should be imposed than has existed there for some years. It is well-known how that part of the city has been retarded by the presence of another nuisance which, we believe, however, is not to be compared with that which now threatens that section. The proposed location is on the banks of the Genesee river which will serve as a convenient carrier through the heart of the city for any obnoxious refuse or dangerous substance that the company may desire to get rid of. Plymouth avenue is one of the main approaches to Genesee Valley park and most of the carts used in collecting the garbage and night soil must necessarily pass over that thoroughfare. It has recently been improved at large expense to the taxpayers and is one of the main residence streets of the city, and its beauty and availability as an approach to the Genesee Valley park should not be impaired by a procession of garbage carts, which must necessarily use that street in going to and from the proposed site. But we deem it the duty of this board to act, not for the interest of any particular locality, but for the general good. We do not oppose the proposed location upon purely local grounds, but believe that the proposed works should be driven away from the thickly populated parts of the city to the outskirts, or beyond the confines of the city entirely. We have no desire to shift this troublesome factory from one part of the city to another. We believe that the inhabitants of the particular wards affected are not the only ones who are interested in this question. We are informed that naphtha will be used in the reduction of garbage and night soil, and the experience of this city has taught us that the storage and use of this substance in large quantities within the limits of the city is a menace to the life and property of every inhabitant. The results of the recent naphtha explosions whereby property and life were destroyed, are fresh in our recollection. For this reason, and because wherever this plant may be located, it is sure to prove a nuisance, we feel that public sentiment will justify us in con-

demning the proposed site. The Board of Park Commissioners have expressed their opposition, and the press of the city is almost unanimous in its expression of disapproval.

In view of all the facts, we believe that the remonstrance of the residents of that section of the city against the location of the proposed fertilizer and reduction works should be heeded, and that this council should take such action as may be advisable to unite with the residents of that part of the city in relieving them from the threatened nuisance.

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, the assessment committee, beg leave to submit the following report:

In the matter of the petition of Fredericka Berg for cancellation of certificate tax sale on her lots, 34, 35 and 36, east side of Loomis street, for the general city taxes of 1881, we find that Mrs. Berg on January 30, 1882, paid as she supposed her taxes on these lots, but it appears that through an error of one of the treasurer's assistants at that time she was not given a receipt for her taxes on these lots but was given a receipt for payment of taxes on lots 37 and 38, on east side of Loomis street, we therefore recommend that the certificate of tax sale for general city taxes for 1881, on said lots, be cancelled.

In the matter of the petition of Agnes Weigand to pay certain taxes against her premises on Stewart street, with 6 per cent. interest, besides costs, we recommend that Mrs. Weigand be permitted to redeem said premises upon the payment of the amount for which her premises were sold for the general city taxes of 1891, 1893, with legal fees and 6 per cent. interest added, and that she also be permitted to pay her general city taxes for 1894 with 6 per cent. interest.

ing it for the best interest for the city, wish
to make some amendments to the penal or-
dinance of stationary engineers.

First—We would like to have an inspector
appointed at a yearly salary, whose duty it
would be to visit the different plants in the
city and see that they are run in proper
shape, also to see whether the man in charge
is a licensed engineer, etc.

Second—We would like to have a section
added requiring all owners or lessees of boil-
ers to register the same so that the inspector
can find them with the least possible delay.
We think this section should be added in any
event, for what is more dangerous than a
steam boiler under a high pressure of steam,
and a great number of them are under the
sidewalks of our most busy thoroughfares?

Third—That a license be issued to the per-
son only that runs the plant, and that he
must be over 21 years of age. We would like
the above inserted as we understand that li-
censes are issued to minors and to superin-
tendents, who in turn hire an incompetent
person to run the same for them.

There are others of minor importance,
which we will explain, along with above, if
your honorable body will instruct the penal
ordinance committee to grant us a hearing.

It seems that where a street is altered, as

doned, no jury to determine the advisability
of the alteration is necessary.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the
City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—The location of the tracks of
the Rochester City and Brighton Railroad
Company, The Crosstown Street Railway
Company, The South Park Street Railway
Company and the Rochester Railway Com-
pany have, from time to time, been deter-
mined upon by the Common Council and the
Executive Board since the year 1867. These
locations have not, in many cases, been fixed
with due and proper formality. In some
cases the company, formerly owning and
operating the street railroad, put its tracks
on the side of the street, or in the center, as
the property owners desired, without obtain-
ing the formal consent, by resolution, of
either the Common Council or the Executive
Board. In some cases the right was granted
to the company to construct a single track
through a given street or avenue, and sub-
sequently, with the consent of the owners
of the abutting property, a double track has
been laid and maintained without such laying
or maintenance being formally ratified or
approved by your honorable body. A resolu-
tion was passed by the Common Council,
granting the right to double track the street
railroad on any street where a single track
existed at the time of the passage of the re-
solution, providing the consent of the major-
ity of the owners of the abutting property
be obtained. Where a double track has been
laid, under such circumstances, and the ques-
tion of its right to maintain a double track
is raised, it is a tedious and expensive pro-
cess to show that it has such right, and where
the track has been laid between the curb and
sidewalk, it is often difficult, as well as ex-
pensive, to prove all the facts necessary to
show the right of the company to maintain
and operate upon its track in the location in
question.

As the Rochester Railway Company, the
successor of the companies before named, has
substantially completed its system and is
operating all of its cars with electric mot-
ive power, with the single trolley electric
system, it seems right and proper that a
formal resolution should be passed by your
honorable body ratifying and approving of
the location of its tracks, poles, wires and
appurtenances as at present located and con-
structed. If it be claimed that the location
should be changed in any street or avenue,
it would seem fair that such claim be made
now.

The Rochester Railway Company, therefore,
makes application for the consent of the local
authorities of the city of Rochester to the lo-
cation, construction, operation and main-
tenance of its railroad, tracks, poles, wires and
other appliances, necessary for the operation
of such road, in, through, along and upon the
streets, avenues and public places herein-
after described, with the crossovers, side
tracks, turnouts, etc., as hereinafter set
forth. The location of such tracks, poles,
wires and appurtenances to be as at present
laid out, located and constructed, as follows:

NORTH ST. PAUL STREET LINE.

Commencing at the intersection of East
Main street with North St. Paul street, thence
northerly through North St. Paul street, with
a double track in the center thereof, and
side pole, span wire, electrical construction,
to a point near and north of Vincent place;
thence northerly, and with tracks diverging
into two single tracks, one upon either side
of the street, to the intersection of Lowell

street; thence continuing northerly in two single tracks, one upon either side of the street, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, to the intersection of the Ridge Road; thence crossing over with the east track into a double track upon the westerly side of North St. Paul street, with center pole, bracket, electrical construction, to the intersection of North St. Paul street with the northerly line of the city of Rochester; and including therein cross-connections at the following named points:

North St. Paul street near and north of Mortimer street.

North St. Paul street near and north of the intersection of Vincent place.

North St. Paul street at a point about 800 feet northerly from Driving Park avenue.

North St. Paul street at the intersection of the Ridge Road.

North St. Paul street at a point near the northerly line of the city of Rochester.

North St. Paul street near Driving Park avenue, a right hand turnout from the westerly track, with double curves, into the car barn.

NORTH CLINTON STREET LINE.

Commencing at a point in East Main street near and west of its intersection with North Clinton street, thence with a double track curve to the left from the center of East Main street into the center of North Clinton street; thence continuing northerly in a double track through the center of Clinton street, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point north of the New York Central and Hudson River railroad there converging into a single track and continuing northerly in the center of North Clinton street to a point near and southerly from Hand street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout; thence continuing northerly and converging into a single track at the intersection of Kelly street; thence continuing northerly with a single track in the center of the street to a point north of Morris street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout in the center of said North Clinton street, and continuing northerly and converging into a single track at the intersection of Buchan park; thence continuing northerly with a single track in the center of the street to a point north of Clifford street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout in the center of said North Clinton street and continuing northerly and converging into a single track at a point south of Cleveland park; thence continuing in a single track in the center of said North Clinton street to a point north of Avenue A; thence diverging into an equilateral turnout in the center of said North Clinton street and continuing northerly and converging into a single track at a point about 150 feet southerly from Morrill street; and including therein a cross-connection between Division and Mortimer street.

ST. JOSEPH STREET LINE.

Commencing at a point in Central avenue near and westerly from its intersection with St. Joseph street; thence with a double track curve to the left into the center of said St. Joseph street; thence continuing northerly in a double track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, and converging into a single track at a point about 150 feet northerly from Central avenue; thence continuing in a single track in the center of said St. Joseph street to a point about 300 feet northerly from Central avenue; there diverging into a double track and continuing, northerly in the center of said St. Joseph street to a point near the intersection of Hamburg street; there converging into a single track and continuing northerly in the center of St. Joseph street to a point northerly from

Stephany park; there diverging into an equilateral turnout in the center of St. Joseph street and continuing northerly and converging into a single track at the intersection of Baden street; thence continuing northerly in a single track in the center of St. Joseph street to the intersection of Herman street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout in the center of St. Joseph street and continuing northerly and converging into a single track at the intersection of Sellinger street; thence continuing northerly with a single track in the center of St. Joseph street to the intersection of Sullivan street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout in the center of St. Joseph street; thence continuing northerly and converging into a single track at a point about 45 feet north of Sullivan street; thence continuing northerly in a single track in the center of St. Joseph street to a point 150 feet southerly from Hayward park; there diverging into an equilateral turnout and continuing to and through Hayward park to North Clinton street.

CENTRAL AVENUE LINE.

Commencing at a point in State street southerly from its intersection with Central avenue, thence with a double track right-hand curve into the center of said Central avenue; thence continuing easterly in a double track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, and bearing toward the northerly side of Central avenue to its intersection with Mill street; thence continuing in a double track and bearing toward the center of said Central avenue, to its intersection with Front street; thence continuing easterly in the center of Central avenue to a point about 125 feet easterly with its intersection with North St. Paul street, there converging into a single track and continuing easterly in a single track south of the center of Central avenue, to a point about 100 feet westerly with its intersection with North Clinton street; there diverging into a double track in the center of said Central avenue and continuing easterly to a point about 150 feet easterly from its intersection with St. Joseph street; there converging into a single track and continuing easterly in a single track in the center of Central avenue to a point about 125 feet easterly from its intersection with Chatham street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout and continuing easterly to its intersection with Leopold street; there converging into a single track and continuing easterly in a single track in the center of said Central avenue to a point about 150 feet easterly from its intersection with North avenue; there diverging into a double track and continuing easterly in the center of Central avenue to a point west of its intersection with North avenue; thence with a double track curve to the left into the center of said North avenue; and including therein a single track connecting curve from the south track of Central avenue into the westerly track of North St. Paul street, and a double track connection from Central avenue into North Clinton street.

HUDSON AVENUE LINE.

Commencing in the center of North avenue near its intersection with Hudson avenue, thence with a double track curve to the left into the center of Hudson avenue; thence continuing northerly in a double track in the center of Hudson avenue, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point about 400 feet northerly from Clifford street; there converging into a single track and continuing northerly in a single track in the center of Hudson avenue to its intersection with Bernard street.

NORTH AVENUE LINE.

Commencing at a point in the center of East Main street near its intersection with North avenue, thence with a double track curve to the left into the center of North street; thence continuing in a double track in the center of North street, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point southerly from its intersection with Draper street; thence with a double track curve to the right into the center of Draper street; thence continuing easterly with a double track through the center of Draper street to a point westerly from its intersection with North avenue; thence with a double track curve to the left into two tracks, one upon either side of North avenue; thence continuing northerly in two single tracks, one upon either side of North avenue, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, to the intersection of Bay street; there converging into a single track upon the westerly side of North avenue at its intersection with Hudson park; thence continuing northerly upon the westerly side of North avenue to a point about 250 feet southerly from Lansing street; there diverging into a right-hand turnout and continuing northerly to a point near the intersection of Lansing street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing in a single track upon the westerly side of North avenue to a point about 200 feet southerly from its intersection with Lochner street; there diverging into a right-hand turnout and continuing northerly to a point about 150 feet from its intersection with Clifford street and there converging into a single track; thence continuing northerly in a single track upon the westerly side of North avenue to its intersection with Clifford street; and including therein a cross-connection about 10 feet north of Achilles street and crossings with the Rochester and Lake Ontario railway at Bay street, with double track left-hand curves into the North avenue car barns near Cliff-

GENESEE STREET LINE.

Commencing at a point in the northerly track of West avenue, easterly from its intersection with Genesee street, thence with a single track curve into the easterly side of Genesee street; thence continuing southerly in a single track upon the easterly side of Genesee street, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, to a point about 200 feet southerly from the intersection of Genesee street with West avenue; there converging into two single tracks, one upon either side of Genesee street; thence continuing southerly with a single track upon either side of Genesee street, to a point about 250 feet south of Brooks avenue; there converging into a single track upon the westerly side of Genesee street and continuing southerly upon the westerly side of Genesee street to a point about 300 feet southerly from its intersection with Brooks avenue.

JEFFERSON AVENUE LINE.

Commencing in the center of Caledonia avenue at a point northerly from its intersection with Bronson avenue, thence with double track curves to the right bearing toward the southerly side of Bronson avenue; thence westerly in a double track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, bearing toward the center of Bronson avenue, to a point about 200 feet from its intersection with Caledonia avenue; there converging into a single track, thence continuing westerly in a single track through the center of Bronson avenue to a point about 50 feet west of its intersection with Seward street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout in the center of Bronson avenue and continuing westerly and converging into a single track at a point about 150 feet from the intersec-

tion of Bronson avenue and May street; thence continuing westerly in a single track in the center of Bronson avenue to a point about 200 feet easterly from its intersection with Jefferson avenue; there diverging into an equilateral turnout and continuing westerly, bearing toward the northerly side of Bronson avenue to a point near its intersection with Jefferson avenue; thence in a double track curve to the left, bearing toward the westerly side of Jefferson avenue; thence continuing southerly in a double track and bearing toward the center of Jefferson avenue to a point about 100 feet north of Cady street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing southerly in a single track in the center of Jefferson avenue to a point near its intersection with Frost avenue; there diverging into an equilateral turnout and continuing southerly to a point about 100 feet northerly from Bartlett street, there converging into a single track and thence continuing southerly in a single track in the center of Jefferson avenue to its intersection with Hawley street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout and continuing southerly to a point about 125 feet north of Flint street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing in a single track in the center of Jefferson avenue to a point near its intersection with Plymouth avenue; thence in a single track curve to the left into the westerly track of Plymouth avenue.

PLYMOUTH AVENUE LINE.

Commencing in the center of West Main street near its intersection with Caledonia avenue, thence in a double track curve to the left into the center of Caledonia avenue; thence in a double track curve to the left into the center of Caledonia avenue; thence continuing southerly in a double track in the center of Caledonia avenue, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point about 200 feet southerly from the Erie canal; there converging into a single track; thence continuing southerly in a single track in the center of Caledonia avenue, to a point near and southerly from its intersection with Spring street; there converging into an equilateral turnout and continuing southerly to a point near Troup street, there converging into a single track and thence continuing southerly in a single track in the center of Caledonia avenue to a point about 70 feet southerly from Atkinson street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout and continuing southerly to a point about 35 feet northerly from Adams street; there converging into a single track and thence continuing southerly in a single track in the center of Caledonia avenue to its intersection with Edinburg street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout and thence continuing southerly to a point about 25 feet northerly from Glasgow street; there converging into a gauntlet track; thence continuing in a gauntlet track in the center of Caledonia avenue to a point about 500 feet southerly from Glasgow street; there diverging into a double track and continuing southerly in the center of Caledonia avenue to a point near its intersection with Plymouth avenue; thence with two single track curves to the right into two single tracks upon each side of Plymouth avenue; thence continuing southerly with two single tracks, one upon either side of Plymouth avenue, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, to a point about 450 feet northerly from Brooks avenue; there converging into a single track upon the east side of Plymouth avenue; thence continuing southerly in a single track upon the easterly side of Plymouth avenue to a point about 400 feet southerly from Brooks avenue; thence crossing over in a single track to the westerly side of Plymouth avenue and continuing

southerly upon the westerly side of Plymouth avenue to the park entrance; thence continuing southerly in a single track about 15 feet from the park entrance; there diverging into a double track near the westerly boundary of park lands; thence continuing southerly in a double track, with center pole, or bracket, electrical construction, along the westerly boundary of the park lands to a point near Elmwood avenue; thence in a double track curve to the left into the northerly side of Elmwood avenue; thence continuing in a double track upon the northerly side of Elmwood avenue to a point about 200 feet westerly from Elmwood avenue bridge; there converging into a single track; thence continuing easterly in a single track upon the northerly side of Elmwood avenue to a point about 50 feet westerly from Elmwood avenue bridge, and including therein a cross-connection on Plymouth avenue at a point about 200 feet south of Cottage street.

EXCHANGE STREET LINE.

Commencing at the intersection of Main street with Exchange street, thence continuing in a double track, with side poles, span wire, electrical construction, through the center of Exchange street to a point near its intersection with Clarissa street; thence in a double track curve to the left into the center of Clarissa street; thence continuing easterly in a double track in the center of Clarissa street to a point about 75 feet easterly from Exchange street; there diverging into two single tracks upon either side of the roadway of Clarissa street at a point about 160 feet from Exchange street; thence continuing easterly in two single tracks one upon either side of the roadway, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, to the easterly end of said bridge; there converging into a double track in the center of Clarissa street, at a point about 75 feet easterly from the easterly end of Clarissa street bridge; thence continuing easterly in a double track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, through the center of Clarissa street, to a point near its intersection with Mount Hope avenue; thence with a double track right-hand curve into the center of Mount Hope avenue; thence continuing southerly with a double track in the center of Mount Hope avenue to a point about 200 feet southerly from the entrance to Mount Hope cemetery; thence continuing southerly in a single track about 125 feet; and including therein cross-connections at the following named points:

Exchange street—two connections between Main street and Erie canal.

Exchange street at a point 150 feet northerly from Clarissa street.

Mount Hope avenue at a point 100 feet southerly from Mount Hope entrance.

Mount Hope avenue 200 feet southerly from Mount Hope entrance.

SOUTH AVENUE LINE.

Commencing at the intersection of Main street with South St. Paul street thence continuing southerly in a double track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point about 100 feet southerly from Main street; there converging into a gauntlet track; thence continuing southerly in a gauntlet track in the center of South St. Paul street to its intersection with Ely street; there diverging into a double track; thence continuing southerly in a double track in the center of South St. Paul street to the southerly end of the bridge over the Erie canal; there diverging into two single tracks, one upon either side of South avenue, at its intersection with Mount Hope avenue; thence continuing southerly in two single tracks, one

upon either side of South avenue, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, to its intersection with Linden street; there converging into a double track in the center of South avenue and continuing southerly in a double track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point about 150 feet south of Linden street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing southerly in a single track in the center of South avenue, to a point 50 feet southerly from Oakland street; there diverging into two single tracks, one upon either side of South avenue; thence continuing southerly in two single tracks, one upon either side of South avenue, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, to its intersection with Stewart street; thence with two single track curves to the right into a double track in the center of Stewart street; thence continuing southerly in a double track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, through the center of Stewart street, to a point about 100 feet easterly from Mount Hope avenue; thence in a single track to Mount Hope avenue; and including therein a cross-connection upon Stewart street at a point about 200 feet easterly from Mount Hope avenue.

LINDEN STREET LINE.

Commencing upon South avenue in two tracks one upon either side of South avenue; thence with two single track curves to the right into two single tracks, one upon either side of Linden street; thence continuing westerly in two tracks, one upon either side of Linden street, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, to a point near the intersection of Mount Hope avenue; thence in two single track curves to the left into a double track in the center of Mt. Hope avenue.

SOUTH CLINTON STREET LINE.

Commencing at the intersection of Monroe avenue with South Clinton street; thence continuing southerly in a double track in the center of South Clinton street, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point about 50 feet northerly from the Erie canal bridge; there converging into a single track; thence continuing easterly in a single track to the intersection of South Clinton street with Clinton place; there diverging into a double track and continuing southeasterly in a double track in the center of the street to a point about 200 feet easterly of the intersection of South Clinton street with Raymond street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing southeasterly in a single track in the center of the street about 125 feet.

MONROE AVENUE LINE.

Commencing in the center of Exchange street near its intersection with Court street, thence with a double track curve to the left into the center of Court street; thence continuing easterly in a double track in the center thereof, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to the westerly end of the bridge over the Genesee river; thence continuing in a double track in the center of Court street, with center pole, bracket, electrical construction, to its intersection with South St. Paul street; thence continuing easterly in a double track in the center of Court street, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point near and west of its intersection with South street, at which point the double track diverges into two single tracks, one of which passes upon the southerly and westerly side of Washington square, the other passing upon the northerly and easterly side of Washington square, and described separately, as follows:

Commencing at a point upon the southerly track in Court street, west of and near its

intersection with South street, thence with a single curve to the right into the east side of the roadway of South street; thence continuing southerly in a single track, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, along the east side of the roadway of South street, to a point near and north of its intersection with Wood street; thence with a single track curve to the left into the southerly side of the roadway of Wood street; thence easterly along the southerly side of the roadway of Wood street to a point near the intersection of South Clinton street; thence with a single track curve to the right in to the south track of Monroe avenue and into the west track of South Clinton street.

Commencing in the north track of Court street at a point near and westerly from South street, thence continuing easterly in a single track and bearing toward the center of Court street, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point near and west of its intersection with South Clinton street; thence with a curve to the right into the west side of the roadway of South Clinton street; thence continuing southerly in a single track, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, along the westerly side of the roadway of South Clinton street to its intersection with Monroe avenue; thence with a curve to the left into the north track of Monroe avenue and into the east track of South Clinton street.

Commencing at the intersection of Monroe avenue and South Clinton street at the point where the two single tracks converge, thence easterly in a double track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, through the center of Monroe avenue to a point near and westerly of its intersection with South Goodman street; there diverging into two single tracks, one upon either side of the avenue, at its intersection with South Goodman street; thence continuing easterly in two single tracks, one upon either side of the avenue, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point near and west of Adwen street; thence crossing over with the north track into the south track at Adwen street; thence continuing easterly along the southerly side of Monroe avenue, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, to a point about 350 feet easterly from Adwen street; there curving into the southerly side of the roadway; thence continuing easterly in a single track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, along the southerly side of the roadway of Monroe avenue to a point about 425 feet easterly from Adwen street; thence diverging by a right-hand turnout into a double track and continuing easterly and south of the center of Monroe avenue to the easterly end of the Erie canal bridge; there diverging into two single tracks, one upon either side of Monroe avenue, at a point about 100 feet easterly of the Erie canal; thence continuing easterly with two single tracks, one upon either side of Monroe avenue, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to the easterly line of the city of Rochester; with cross-connection on Court street at the station of the New York, Lake Erie & Western Railroad Company.

UNIVERSITY AVENUE LINE.

Commencing in the center of East Main street at its intersection with University avenue, thence with a double track curve to the right into the center of University avenue; thence easterly with a double track in the center of University avenue, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to its intersection with Rundel park and Culver park; thence continuing easterly in a double track through Culver park, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point about

1,000 feet westerly from its intersection with Granger place; there converging into a single track; thence continuing easterly in a single track south of the center of said Culver park to its intersection with Granger place; and including therein a cross-connection at a point about 400 feet easterly from the intersection of Culver park with Union place.

EAST MAIN STREET LINE.

Commencing at the intersection of Main street with Exchange street, thence easterly with a double track in the center of East Main street, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to its intersection with Chamberlain street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing easterly in a single track north of the center of East Main street to a point about 625 feet westerly from the intersection of East Main street with Culver street; and including therein double track curve connections from West Main street into Exchange street; from West Main into State street; from East Main street into Exchange street into North St. Paul street, and from East Main street into South St. Paul street, and cross-connections at the following named points: East Main street between Clinton street and North avenue; East Main street near Birch crescent; East Main street near Goodman street.

WEST AVENUE LINE.

Commencing at the intersection of West Main street with Exchange street, thence westerly in a double track through the center of West Main street, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to West avenue; thence continuing westerly in a double track through the center of West avenue, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point about 100 feet westerly with its intersection with York street; there converging into a single track upon the southerly side of West avenue; thence continuing westerly in a single track upon the south side of West avenue, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, to a point about 125 feet west of Colvin street; there diverging into a right-hand turnout and continuing westerly to a point about 325 feet westerly from Colvin street; there converging into a single track upon the southerly side of West avenue; thence continuing westerly in a single track upon the south side of West avenue to its intersection with Ames street; there diverging into a right-hand turnout, and continuing westerly to a point about 50 feet westerly from Summerset street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing westerly in a single track upon the south side of West avenue to its intersection with Carleton place; and including therein cross-connections at the following named points:

West Main street between Sophia and North Fitzhugh streets.

West Main street east of the Erie canal bridge.

West avenue west of the Erie canal bridge. West avenue near its intersection with Genesee street.

ALLEN AND JAY STREET LINES.

Commencing in the center of State street at its intersection with Allen street, thence with a double track curve to the left into the center of Allen street; thence continuing westerly through the center of Allen street in a double track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point near and east of the Erie canal bridge; there converging into a single track; thence continuing westerly in a single track, which is north of the center of Allen street, to a point near and westerly from said canal bridge; there diverging into

a double track; thence continuing westerly in a adouble track in the center of Allen street to a point near its intersection with Brown street; there converging into a single track; thence with a single track curve to the left into the center of Brown street; thence with a right-hand single track curve into the center of Clark street; thence continuing westerly with a single track through the center of Clark street to a point near its intersection with Romeyn street; there diverging into a double track; thence continuing westerly in a double track to a point near its intersection with Grape street; thence with a double track curve to the right into the center of Grape street; thence northerly in a double track through the center of Grape street to a point near and southerly from its intersection with Jay street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing northerly in a single track in the center of Grape street to a point near its intersection with Jay street; thence in a single track curve to the left into the center of Jay street; thence continuing westerly with a single track in the center of Jay street to a point east of its intersection with Orchard street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout; thence continuing westerly in the center of Jay street to a point west of Orchard street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing westerly in a single track in the center of Jay street to a point near its intersection with Child street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout; thence continuing westerly to a point near the intersection of Child street; thence with a double track curve to the right into the center of Jay street; thence westerly through the center of Jay street to a point near and west of its intersection with Child street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing westerly in a single track through the center of Jay street to a point near and east of its intersection with Ames street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout; thence continuing westerly to a point near its intersection with Ames street; thence with a double track curve to the left into Ames street; thence continuing through Ames street to a point near and south of its intersection with Jay street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing southerly in a single track in the center of Ames street to a point near and northerly from its intersection with Maple street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout; thence southerly to a point near its intersection with Maple street; thence with a double track curve to the right into the center of Maple street; thence continuing westerly in the center of Maple street to a point near and westerly from its intersection with Ames street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing westerly in a single track in the center of Maple street to the westerly line of the City of Rochester.

LYELL AVENUE LINE.

Commencing in the center of State street at a point near and southerly from its intersection with Vincent place, thence northerly with a double track bearing toward the westerly side of the street to its intersection with Lyell avenue; thence with a double track curve to the left into the center of Lyell avenue; thence westerly with a double track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, in the center of Lyell avenue, to a point near and easterly of the Erie canal bridge; there converging into a single track, which is north of the center of Lyell avenue; thence continuing westerly in a single track north of the center of Lyell avenue, to a point near and west of said Erie canal bridge; there diverging into a double track and continuing through the center of Lyell avenue to its intersection with Warner street; there con-

verging into a single track; thence continuing easterly in a single track to the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad.

PARK AVENUE LINE.

Commencing in the center of Main street at a point near and west of its intersection with Elm street, thence with a double track curve to the left into the center of Elm street; thence continuing southerly and easterly through the center of Elm street in a double track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point near its intersection with Chestnut street; thence with a double track curve to the right into the center of Chestnut street; thence with a double track curve to the left into the center of James street; thence continuing easterly through James street to a point near and east of Chestnut street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing easterly in a single track in the center of James street to a point near and west of its intersection with William street; there diverging into a right-hand turnout; thence continuing easterly to the intersection of James street with Court street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing easterly in a single track through the center of Court street to a point near its intersection with South Union street; there converging into an equilateral turnout; thence in a double track curve to the right into the center of South Union street; thence continuing southerly in a double track through the center of Union street to a point near its intersection with Gardner park; thence in a double track curve to the left into the center of Gardner park; thence continuing easterly in Gardner park to a point near and east of its intersection with South Union street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing easterly in a single track through the center of Gardner park to a point near its intersection with Alexander street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout; thence with a double track curve to the right into the center of Alexander street; thence continuing southerly in a double track through the center of Alexander street to a point near its intersection with Park avenue; thence with a double track curve to the left into Park avenue; thence easterly in Park avenue to a point near and east of its intersection with Alexander street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing easterly on a single track in the center of Park avenue, to a point about 100 feet west of its intersection with Meigs street; there diverging into an equilateral turnout, and continuing easterly to a point about 100 feet west of Rowley street; there converging into a single track; thence continuing easterly on a single track in the center of Park avenue, to a point near and west of its intersection with South Goodman street; there diverging into a double track; thence continuing easterly in a double track in the center of Park avenue to a point about 150 feet west of its intersection with Culver street; thence easterly in a single track north of the center of Park avenue, to its intersection with the easterly line of the City of Rochester; including there-in a double track curve into the car barn on Park avenue.

SOPHIA STREET LINE.

Commencing in the center of West Main street near and east of its intersection with Sophia street, thence with a double track curve to the right into the center of Sophia street; thence northerly in a double track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to its intersection with the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad; thence in a double track curve to the left and bearing toward the easterly side of the roadway of

Sophia street into the northerly side of the roadway of Center street; thence continuing westerly through Center street, and bearing toward the southerly side of the roadway of Center street, to a point near its intersection with Jones street; thence with a double track curve to the right into the center of Jones street; thence continuing in a double track through the center of Jones street to a point about half way between Platt street and Brown street; there reversing to the westerly side of the roadway of Jones street; thence continuing easterly in a double track along the westerly side of the roadway of Jones street to its intersection with Brown street; thence continuing northerly in two single tracks, one of which is east of, and the other west of the west curb of Jones street; thence continuing northerly with two single tracks, one upon either side of the west curb of Jones street, with center pole, bracket, electrical construction, to a point near its intersection with Jay street; thence with two single track curves to the left into Jay street; thence continuing westerly on Jay street in two single tracks, one of which is north of, and the other of which is south of the south curb line of Jay street, to a point near the intersection of Jay street with Saratoga avenue; thence with two single track curves to the right into the center of Saratoga avenue; thence northerly through the center of Saratoga avenue, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point near its intersection with Lyell avenue; thence with a double track curve to the left into Lyell avenue; thence continuing northerly and crossing Lyell avenue to its intersection with Saratoga avenue; thence with a double track in the center of Saratoga avenue to its intersection with Vernon street; thence with a double track curve to the right into the center of Vernon street; thence continuing northerly with a double track through the center of Vernon street, to its intersection with Backus avenue; thence with a double track curve to the left into the center of Backus avenue; thence continuing northerly through the center of Backus avenue to a point near its intersection with Emerson street; thence with a double track curve to the left in the center of Emerson street; then continuing westerly with a double track through the center of Emerson street, to a point near its intersection with Thrush street; thence with a double track curve to the right into the easterly side of Thrush street; thence continuing northerly with a double track through and east of the center of Thrush street, to a point near Locust street; there reversing in a double track into the center of Thrush street; thence continuing northerly in a double track in the center of Thrush street, to a point near its intersection with Driving Park avenue; thence with a double track curve to the right into the center of Driving Park avenue; thence easterly through the center of Driving Park avenue to a point at its intersection with the new boulevard; there converging into a single track; and including therein a curve connection between the east track upon Sophia street and the south track upon Allen street; and a curve connection between the west track upon Sophia street and the north track upon Allen street; also a single track curve connection at Saratoga and Lyell avenues; also a cross-connection upon Thrush street near Driving Park avenue; also a double track commencing near and south of Driving Park avenue and near the center of Thrush street; thence northerly and crossing Driving Park avenue, with double track curves to the left into the Rochester Driving Park.

CHURCH STREET LINE.

Commencing on Church street near its intersection with State street, thence with a single track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, westerly through the center of Church street, to a point near its intersection with Sophia street; including therein a curve connection from Church street northerly into the west track of State street; from Church street southerly into the east track of State street; from Church street northerly into the east track of Sophia street and from Church street southerly into the west track of Sophia street.

LAKE AVENUE LINE.

Commencing at the intersection of Main street with State street, thence northerly through State street with double track in the center thereof, and side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point near and south of Vincent place; thence northerly and with tracks diverging into two single tracks, one upon either side of the street, to the intersection of Lyell with Lake avenue; thence continuing northerly in two single tracks, one upon either side of the street, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction to the intersection of Lake avenue with the northerly line of the city of Rochester; and including therein cross-connections at the following named points:

State street between Church and Mumford streets.

State street between Central avenue and Center street.

State street between Center street and Furnace street.

State street near Vincent place.

Lake avenue between Driving Park avenue and Seyle terrace.

Also a single track curve connection from Mumford street southerly into the east track of State street; also the necessary curve connections into the car barns between Center and Furnace streets.

POWER HOUSE TRACK.

Also a track commencing in the easterly track in State street north of its intersection with Center street, thence with a single track curve into the center of Center street; thence easterly through the center of Center street, with side poles, span wire, electrical construction, to its intersection with Mill street; thence with a single track curve into the power house; also a single track connection crossing Otsego street, between the car barns of the Rochester Railway Company.

ANDREWS AND MUMFORD STREET LINES.

Commencing in the west track upon North St. Paul street, near and north of its intersection with Andrews street; thence with a single track curve to the right into the center of Andrews street; thence westerly in a single track, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, through the center of Andrews street, to a point near its intersection with Water street; there diverging into a double track; thence continuing westerly with a double track in the center of the street, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to the east end of Andrews street bridge; thence in a double track in the center of said Andrews street bridge, with center pole, bracket, electrical construction, to the west end of said bridge; thence in a double track to Front street, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction; there converging into a single track; thence continuing westerly in a single track in the center of Mumford street, with side pole, span wire, electrical construction, to a point near and east of its intersection with State street; thence with a single

track curve to the left into the east track of State street on the State street line; and including in said Andrews and Mumford street lines cross-connection at the following named point:

North St. Paul street between the north line of Andrews street and Franklin street, and including a single track curve connection from the east track on North St. Paul street into the south track on Central avenue.

THE BOULEVARD LINE.

Commencing at the intersection of the northerly line of the City of Rochester with the Boulevard, thence continuing southerly in a single track upon the westerly side of the street, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, to a point about 80 feet southerly from said city line; there diverging into two single tracks, one of which continues southerly upon the westerly side of the boulevard and the other crossing over to the easterly side of the boulevard at the Big Ridge Road; thence continuing southerly in two single tracks, one upon either side of the boulevard, with side pole, bracket, electrical construction, to a point near and northerly from its intersection with Driving Park avenue; thence with two single track curves to the right into the double track upon Driving Park avenue.

In the above description where the term "side pole, span wire, electrical construction" appears is meant that the poles supporting the overhead system are located at or near the curb or street lines and support wire cables spanning the street and from which the trolley wires are suspended.

Where the term "side pole, bracket, electrical construction" appears is meant that the poles are located near and at the side of the track, and support brackets from which the trolley wire is suspended.

Where the term "center pole, bracket, electrical construction" appears is meant that the poles are located in the center between two tracks and supporting one or more brackets, from which one or more trolley wires are suspended.

Where the term "center of the street" appears in the above description is meant, substantially in the center thereof, as near as perfect alignment and ease of operation will allow.

Where the term "side of the roadway" appears is meant that the track is not in the center of the street, but is between the curb lines thereof.

Where "side of street" appears in the above description is meant that the tracks are between the curb line and the street line and outside of the roadway.

The tracks above described are substantially parallel to the various streets and their several courses, with such curves at all angles and off-sets as are suitable for proper alignment and ease of operation.

By "equilateral turnout" is meant that a single track divided and turns out equally each side of the center of the street and forming a double track in the center thereof.

By "right-hand turnout" is meant that a single track turns out to the right of said single track, forming a double track, one of which is continuous with the single track aforesaid, the other which is parallel to and to the right of it.

By "left-hand turnout" is meant that a single track turns out to the left of said single track, forming a double track, one of which is continuous with the single track aforesaid, the other of which is parallel to and to the left of it.

The Rochester Railway Company also hereby makes application for the consent of the local authorities of the City of Rochester for the erection and maintenance of insulated feed wire sufficient to supply its trolley wires

with the current required in the economical operation of its road.

By Ald. Dewey—

AN ORDINANCE relating to street railroads.
 Section 1. The rails used by every street surface railroad shall be modern improved rails such as may be approved by the authorities having charge of the highways of said city.

Sec. 2. The cars upon every street railroad now or hereafter constructed shall run as often as once in every fifteen minutes between the hours of six o'clock in the morning and twelve o'clock at night.

Sec. 3. The rate of speed at which cars may be run shall not exceed seven miles per hour between the intersection of Elm street with East Main street and the Erie canal on West avenue, and between Exchange street canal bridge, and the intersection of Central avenue with State street, and shall not exceed fifteen miles per hour on any other street or avenue.

Sec. 4. Said cars shall stop at such places and in such manner as not to interfere with public convenience or travel.

Sec. 5. No street surface railroad company shall operate on its track or tracks more than three cars attached together.

Sec. 6. No street surface railroad company shall suffer any car to be run unless the same shall be in charge, and under the control of, some competent conductor who shall be a person other than the driver or motorman.

Sec. 7. Whenever it shall become necessary in order to prevent stoppage or travel upon any street railroad that the snow which may have fallen, or the ice which may have accumulated upon its tracks should be removed, the same shall be done in such a manner and by such means as not to interfere with the use of any street or avenue, or the sidewalks thereof by the public, and all crosswalks and sidewalks thereof by the public, and all crosswalks and side walks upon which any snow or ice shall be thrown by said company shall be immediately cleared of such snow or ice by said company. When the snow, or ice so removed from the tracks of any street railroad shall be so great as to require that it should be carted from the streets or sidewalks, in order to place any street or sidewalk in proper condition for public use, it shall be the duty of such street railroad company to remove the same, and in default thereof, said city may cause such snow or ice to be removed at the expense of said company.

Sec. 8. Whenever gas or water pipes, sewers, sub-ways, conduits or ducts are now laid, or may hereafter be laid in any street or avenue, such railroad must be laid down and maintained subject to the rights over such gas or water pipes, sewers, sub-ways, conduits and ducts now vested in the city and in the companies owning or controlling the same, and said city and companies may, when necessary, take up, alter repair or remove the same without any claim for damages on the part of said railroad company; the city expressly reserves to itself, the right hereafter to lay down or cause or permit to be laid down in said streets or avenues, or any of them, gas or water pipes, sewers, conduits, subways and ducts, and to alter, improve and repair said streets or avenues whenever the public good or convenience may require, without any claim for damages on the part of any railroad company. But private corporations and individuals who shall take up any pavement or excavate in any street for the purposes of laying any additional pipes, conduits, subways or ducts, not as agents of said city but for their own purposes shall be required to restore the street to its former condition, without expense to any railroad company owning or operating the railroad in such street or avenue.

Sec. 9. Nothing herein contained shall be construed as repealing, modifying or changing in any respect, the terms and provisions of any agreement entered into between said city and any street railroad company.

Sec. 10. Said city reserves to itself the right to make such further orders, rules, ordinances or regulations in relation to street railroads as it may deem necessary.

Sec. 11. No penal ordinance heretofore adopted shall be repealed by this ordinance except so far as any of its provisions may be inconsistent with the terms hereof, but nothing in this ordinance contained shall be so construed as to abridge or defeat any right of said city or its officers to prosecute any railroad company for a violation of any provision of any penal ordinance heretofore adopted.

Sec. 12. Every street railroad company which shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, for each offense, be subject to a fine or penalty of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred fifty dollars in amount to be imposed by the police justice or judge, or court before whom a suit for such fine or penalty is brought in the discretion of such fine or penalty is brought in the discretion of such justice, judge or court.

Sec. 13. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

J., and other places where naphtha has been used in the reduction of garbage and night soil serious explosions have occurred which have resulted in the loss of life and damage to property, and the recent explosion of that substance in this city has demonstrated its dangerous character, and some further and supplemental regulation to that contained in existing ordinances or laws is necessary to the proper protection and safety of life and property within the city, therefore,

Resolved, That said section be amended by adding at the close thereof, which amendment shall take effect immediately, the following language:

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee respectfully reports as follows:

The Finance Committee of the Board of Education has certified to this committee that in order to enforce the provisions of the compulsory education law, so called, it will be necessary that that Board appoint one or more "attendance officers," to compel the attendance at public or private schools of children of school age, residents of the city, and not now in attendance thereat. A failure on the part of said board to enforce the provisions of said law, will result in the withholding by the State Superintendent of Public Instructions of the amount of public money to which the city will be entitled, if that law shall be enforced. Such public moneys amount to about \$80,000, and it will be readily seen that it will be for the best interests of the city that the law be in good faith enforced. For the purpose of providing for the expenses connected with its enforcement, the Finance Committee of the Board of Education requests that an extra appropriation of \$2,000 be granted it. The money to be used in the payment of salaries of attendance officers, in the furnishing of text books to indigent pupils in providing additional seats to accommodate the children who will by this method be compelled to attend the public schools. The committee has decided to recommend that such an appropriation be made, and recommends that the accompanying resolution to provide funds for that purpose, be adopted.

The Park Commissioners have certified that by reason of the extraordinary large attendance in the public parks during the past year, the amount allowed them for maintaining the park police was insufficient. Their maintenance fund has been drawn upon to the amount of \$800, and they find it necessary at this time to employ park policemen for the protection of the trees in the public parks during the holiday season. If left unprotected the pines and hemlocks suitable for Christmas will be ruthlessly destroyed, and for that purpose they require about the sum of \$200.

Your committee has decided to recommend, therefore, an appropriation of \$1,000 to the Park Fund, and recommends that the accompanying resolution to provide therefor, be adopted.

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE BOARD FROM THE MAYOR AND OTHER EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR REFERENCE.

To the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—The attention of the Executive Board has been called to the condition of La Mont park sewer, which extends from Webster avenue northerly about 500 feet.

The Board caused four test pits to be excavated at certain distances the entire length of the sewer, and it was ascertained that the average depth of the sewer was about three and one-half feet. It is constructed of ten-inch tile and laid irregularly and with a grade that would indicate that the sewage is conveyed to the dead end of the sewer instead of into Webster avenue sewer where its outlet ought to be. The sewer was half filled with water and a deposit of sand or mud, and it shows no current or flow into its outlet.

On this street it is reported there are about fifteen houses, which are supposed to be drained by this sewer; two of them have been vacated because of the water backing into the cellars. Since the construction of this sewer Webster avenue sewer has been deepened, so there is ample fall for a sewer in this street. It may be stated also that it does not appear from the records that this street has ever been formally accepted as a public highway by the city; but its use for five years may make it such without any further action. The fact is, however, that before any relief can be obtained by the residents on this street, the sewer has to be reconstructed and re-laid at a greater depth than it now has.

It is therefore recommended that your honorable body cause an ordinance to be introduced that will afford the relief to the owners and occupants of premises on this street in the manner above suggested.

Gentlemen: In the matter of the settlement or the payment of the amount claimed by the Commissioners of the Carroll-Fitzhugh race on account of the water being drawn off during the construction of the Court street race bridge a difference of opinion has arisen between the Commissioners and the Executive Board, a satisfactory settlement of which has not yet been made.

The contract made between the Commissioners and the Executive Board, was to the effect that for the six days, which it was assumed it would require to have the water drawn from the race, the Commissioners were to receive the sum of \$200 per day as damages; and for every day thereafter they were to receive the sum of \$300. On the completion of the bridge it was stated by the contractor that he would have made such progress in his work as to allow the water to be let into the race, if he had not been delayed in some parts of the construction by reason of the re-laying of a large water main across said race; which was demanded for the protection of property as well as for supplying the manufacturing and other business buildings in this section of the city.

The Executive Board are in doubt as to the liability of the city to the race corporation for the enlargement and laying of the supply main belonging to the city, and they referred the subject matter to the City Attorney for his consideration and opinion.

The City Attorney rendered his opinion in which he advised "that the city pay the claimants in the sum of \$1,200 for the liability of the city under the contract, and leave them to their remedy, if they have any, for any delay caused by the laying of water pipes."

In the ordinance for the construction of this bridge an estimate was made by the City Surveyor of \$15,000, which it seems did not include the contemplated payment for damages and privileges which it was found necessary to obtain before the work was commenced, although the ordinance itself appears to presume the acquirement of an easement for the construction of the piers in the race.

At page 238 of your current proceedings a resolution was presented by Ald. McMillan and adopted by your board providing for the first payment for this easement in the sum of \$1,500, which you authorized be paid from the fund for the construction of the bridge in question. The actual cost of the bridge as reported to this office is \$14,548.37; which does not include any moneys claimed for easement, right of way, or damages.

The Executive Board recommends in accordance with the opinion of the City Attorney that you make a like provision for the payment of the \$1,200 which he recommends be tendered to the Commissioners of the race in full settlement of damages stated to have been sustained, as well as for the easement which the city has acquired for the construction of the piers in said race.

Whereas, It is the desire of the parties hereto that the said highway shall be made to pass underneath said railroad tracks by means of a subway and bridge, without change of grade of the said railroad as shown by the plans and drawings prepared by E. F. Van Hoesen, engineer, hereto annexed as a part of this contract; now, therefore, it is mutually agreed,

First, That the party of the second part shall cause its common council and its executive board to adopt all such ordinances and resolutions as may be necessary to legally alter the said highway by reducing its width to fifty feet through the whole length of said subway and its approaches as shown on said plans; and to change and establish the grade of said highway through the said subway and its approaches to the grade as shown on said plans; and that it will, without cost or expense to the party of the first part, construct a sewer in said highway through the said subway to the East Side trunk sewer in Culver street of such depth and capacity as to afford good and sufficient drainage to the subway; and that the same shall be completed on or before the first day of April next.

The party of the second part doth hereby grant to the party of the first part the right to construct and maintain said bridge for the uses of its railroad tracks and railroad to the extent, numbers and location as shown on said plans; and that it will procure a resolution of its executive board confirming the same.

Second. In consideration of this agreement and on the performance thereof on the part of the party of the second part the party of the first part agrees at its own expense, to carry its said railroad tracks over the said highway by means of a bridge and subway to be constructed in substantial conformity to the said plans and drawings prepared by the said Van Hoesen and to do the necessary work of altering the grade of said highway therefor.

It is understood and agreed that the following particulars shall be observed, viz:

The roadway of the said subway and its approaches shall be 36 feet wide. The sidewalks shall be seven feet wide and four feet above the grade of the roadway underneath the bridge. The under side of the bridge shall be 13 feet above the surface of the roadway and 9 feet above the surface of the sidewalks. The bridge shall be supported by iron columns resting upon low stone piers placed in the line of the curb between the sidewalks and the roadway.

The party of the first part agrees to commence the said work on or before the 5th of April next provided the said sewer shall have been completed and the width and grade of said highway shall have been established as herein provided, and to have the subway ready for highway travel within six months thereafter. But it is understood and agreed that the said highway for the whole length of said subway shall be closed for such length of time as shall be necessary to make said subway and to construct said bridge.

It is further agreed that the party of the first part shall not be required to do any work in or for the alteration of grade of any street other than University avenue.

In witness whereof the parties hereto have heretofore affixed their respective corporate seals and have caused these presents to be signed by the president of the party of the first part and the mayor of the party of the second part and the day and year first above written.

J. M. Aikenhead, Esq., Chairman of the Police
 Committee of the Common Council:

Dear Sir: The question submitted to me
 as to whether or not there can be inserted
 in the franchise requested by the Rochester
 Railway Company a condition to carry the
 firemen and policemen of this city without
 the formal payment of fares by them, involves
 two inquiries:

First, Can such a condition be lawfully in-
 serted in the proposed franchise? and.

Secondly, Can such a condition be enforced
 after the revised constitution takes effect?

The old Rochester City and Brighton Rail-
 road Company, whose privileges to operate
 on the streets of this city have been trans-
 mitted to the present company, was given
 its first franchise in 1862.

This franchise imposed upon the old com-
 pany various conditions. It provided that
 the company should use certain kinds of rails,
 how they should be laid, how its cars should
 be operated, what fares it might charge, what
 kind of conductors and drivers it should em-
 ploy, and, among a great many other similar
 conditions, it was required to pay a certain
 sum per car into the treasury of the city.

This franchise has been supplemented from
 time to time by privileges to operate on other
 streets than those mentioned in the original
 franchise, until some time in 1890, when a
 change was made in the motor power of the
 street railroads of the city, and another agree-
 ment was made between the city and the
 company, by which, upon certain conditions,
 it was allowed to change from horse power
 to electricity. The latter franchise also con-
 tains numerous conditions. It regulates with
 detail how the company shall operate its cars
 with the new motor power, and provides for
 a further compensation to be paid into the
 city treasury.

It is now proposed to grant an additional
 franchise in the form of a ratification of the
 lines of the company as established by pre-
 vious action of the city and as operated by
 the company, and it is suggested that still
 further privileges and considerations be re-
 quired as a condition of the new franchise.
 The condition which has been suggested is
 that the company carry the city's paid police-
 men and firemen without the formal payment
 of fares by them.

The provision which has led you to ask
 for my opinion is that section in the revised
 constitution which provides that "No public
 officer, or person elected or appointed to a
 public office, under the laws of this state,
 shall directly or indirectly ask, demand, ac-
 cept, receive or consent to receive for his
 own use or benefit, or for the use or benefit
 of another, any free pass, free transportation,
 franking privilege or discrimination in passen-
 ger, telegraph or telephone rates, from any
 person or corporation," and I am called upon
 to say whether or not the proposed franchise
 would be in violation of that provision.

If I have been able to spell out the inten-
 tion of the framers of that section, it seeks
 to prevent the creation of any obligation on
 the part of public officers to common carriers
 for discrimination in rates or for free trans-
 portation. The public officer who accepts
 from any such company such discrimination
 or free transportation must, it can very rea-
 sonably be argued, be under some obligation
 to the company for the privilege. The pro-
 vision in the new constitution seeks to re-
 move all possibility of the creation of any
 such obligation growing out of the practice
 of granting to public officers such discrimina-

tions or free transportation. This I believe
 to be the spirit of the provision referred to.
 Conceding this to have been the intention of
 the constitutional convention, the proposed
 condition in the franchise is not a violation
 of this intention. The proposed franchise, it
 seems to me, is not for the benefit of any
 particular public officer, but for the benefit
 of the whole city. It is not a transaction be-
 tween a public officer and a common carrier,
 but between the city and a common carrier.
 Under the proposed franchise no fireman or
 policeman would be under any obligation to
 the railway company. But further than that,
 the proposed franchise does not grant free
 transportation to the persons named. It is
 proposed to grant to the railway company
 a franchise for a certain consideration, which
 is the carrying of firemen and policemen
 without the formal payment of fares by them.
 It might very reasonably be said that the
 value of the franchise is the charges which
 the company might otherwise make for trans-
 porting these persons, and that the company
 receives full fare for each of the persons
 named which it carries on any of its lines. It
 is true no moneyed consideration passes from
 the city to the company. But the franchise
 which the city grants to the company has a
 value, and if the company accepts it upon
 the condition sought to be imposed, its value
 is measured by the aggregate number of fares
 which the company would receive from each
 fireman or policeman traveling upon its lines
 were the condition not in the franchise. Who
 pays for the transportation, it is unnecessary
 for me to determine, so long as it appears
 that no one under the franchise is receiving
 free transportation.

The condition sought to be imposed in the
 franchise is similar to conditions imposed in
 former franchises. It is a moneyed consid-
 eration. It corresponds with the \$5 per car
 which the company was required to pay under
 the franchise of 1862, and the 1 per cent.
 of its gross receipts required under its fran-
 chise of 1890. There is no law at the present
 time which forbids the granting of this
 franchise with the proposed condition.

There is a clause in the federal constitution,
 which is well known to you, which provides
 that no state shall pass any law impairing
 the obligation of contracts. Any contract
 which can be lawfully made prior to the 1st
 of January, 1895, cannot be impaired by any
 provision in the state constitution which goes
 into effect on that day, without doing vio-
 lence to the provision in the federal consti-
 tution referred to. If the proposed franchise
 is perfected prior to the beginning of next
 year, I believe it will have the same force as
 if it had been inserted in the original fran-
 chise to the company in 1862, or in the supple-
 mental franchise granted in 1890. No one of
 you would, I think, contend that if, in its
 wisdom, the Common Council in 1862 had
 seen fit to insert the proposed condition in
 the franchise granted to the company at that
 time, any amendment to the constitution
 adopted afterwards could affect the validity
 of the condition or make the exercise of it
 a crime. It makes no difference when the
 franchise is granted, so long as it is perfected
 prior to the time when the provision in the
 revised constitution mentioned takes effect.
 This provision does not become operative
 until the first of next year, and if the city
 should grant the railway company the fran-
 chise which it seeks, and insert therein the
 proposed condition, the franchise would be
 valid and would continue so after the 1st
 of January, notwithstanding the recent
 amendment to the constitution. If the pro-
 vision in the state constitution can be so
 construed as to affect any franchise which
 the Council may see fit to grant to any rail-
 way company prior to the 1st of January, it
 can be made to apply to any previous fran-

chise, and would be in direct conflict with that provision in the federal constitution which forbids the passage of any act by any state which has the force of impairing the obligation of a contract.

I am, therefore, of the opinion not only that the proposed franchise can be lawfully granted prior to the beginning of next year, but also that the condition upon which the franchise is proposed to be granted can be enforced after that time.

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES,

By Ald. Adams—

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your committee on charter revision, consisting of the law and finance committees, begs leave to report as follows upon the matter submitted to it:

The work of your committee in the revision of the charter naturally divided itself into two branches. One, that of re-arranging the material in the existing charter according to a systematic plan; and, second, that of making such changes in the method of governing the city as the growth of the city and public sentiment seemed to demand.

On the first branch of its labors your committee begs leave to say that even a casual examination of the charter will reveal the fact that repeated amendments have displaced any plan which may have existed in the minds of its framers, and that provisions relating to particular subjects are scattered from cover to cover. Under the existing charter it is difficult for any officer to ascertain what his duties are. The provisions governing a particular department are scattered here and there. Provisions exist which have never been indexed because inserted in sections which had no relation to such provisions. To correct this fault, your committee first had the contents of the old charter re-arranged upon a new analysis. Section after section was carefully read and the provisions relating to particular officers or departments were brought together, so that it will be possible for any one to readily ascertain what the duties of any officer or department are.

On the second branch of its work, your committee begs leave to say that various changes have been made in the method of governing the city. We have been prompted in its revision in this particular by a desire to make only those changes which seemed to be demanded by public sentiment, and which would, in the judgment of your committee, redound to the interests of the inhabitants, and the greater efficiency of the municipal government.

In respect to the boundaries and civil divisions of the city, no changes have been made. The boundaries of the wards remain as they exist under the present charter.

In respect to elections such changes have been made as were necessary to make the provisions on that subject correspond with the requirements of the revised constitution. By the provisions of that constitution all elections of city officers, including supervisors and judicial officers of inferior local courts, except to fill a vacancy, were directed to be held on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November in odd numbered years. This provision made necessary a change in our charter which provided for an annual charter election in March of each year. Under the charter as revised, the first election in the city will be held in November, 1895, and succeeding elections will be held every two years thereafter. Instead of annual elections the city will now have biennial elections in November of odd numbered years. The number and appointment of election officers, and the conduct of elections generally are to be the same as prescribed by the general election code.

By the same provisions of the revised constitution by which the time for holding elections in cities was regulated, the terms of office of certain municipal officers were abridged or extended. By the provision referred to, the terms of office of certain city officers elected before the first day of January, 1895, which would expire with an even numbered year or in an odd numbered year and before the end thereof, were extended to and including the last day of December next following the time when such term would otherwise expire, and the terms of office of all of such officers whose terms would expire in an even numbered year and before the end thereof, were abridged so as to expire at the end of the preceding year. This provision in the constitution made changes in the charter necessary to provide for the election of officers whose terms were thus abridged or extended.

The common council has not been changed. It will be composed as heretofore of one alderman elected from each of the wards of the city. Its powers remain substantially the same as under the existing charter. No new appointive power has been given to it except

that of appointing the city purchaser hereafter referred to.

With respect to the qualification and duties of the members of the common council, no change has been made, nor are the duties of the city clerk, supervisors and constables changed in any way.

The power of the mayor remains unchanged. Some alterations have been made with reference to the provisions in the charter relating to the temporary performance of the duties of the mayor during his absence.

The executive board has been abolished, and the powers and duties of this department, modified, have been transferred to two departments, to be known as the department of fire and the department of public works.

The department of fire will be under the charge of a commissioner to be elected by the people who will be known as the fire commissioner and who will be the head of this department. He will have the care and control of the fire department of the city and will appoint, and at pleasure remove, a chief of the fire force, and as many subordinates, assistants, firemen and members of the department as the common council may from time to time designate. It has been suggested that the powers and duties of the fire and police commissioners be consolidated and your committee now has the advisability of this change from the plan outlined in this report under consideration.

The department of public works will be under the charge of a superintendent to be elected by the people who will be known as the superintendent of public works, and who will be head of this department. He will have power to employ and remove an assistant superintendent and as many subordinates and employes in his department as the common council may from time to time designate. He shall divide the department into three bureaus, one the bureau of water works, another the bureau of street cleaning, repairing and sprinkling, and a third the bureau of improvements.

The department of police remains the same as at present.

A department of weights and measures is created which shall be under the charge of a city sealer, at no greater expense to the city than heretofore.

There is also created a department of public buildings which will be under the charge of a superintendent to be known as the superintendent of buildings, who shall have charge of the maintenance, repair and use of all the buildings, including the public school buildings and voting booths, belonging to or hired by the city, and shall provide therefor all necessary furniture and keep such furniture in good condition. He shall see to all coal, fuel and other supplies necessary for such buildings, shall call upon the city engineer for such plans as he may deem necessary in making any repairs; and he shall perform the duties heretofore devolving upon the fire marshal and shall enforce all ordinances which may be adopted by the common council pursuant to the provisions of this act relating to the construction, alteration, repair, removal or safety of buildings, and shall enforce the provisions of the city charter or any other law upon that subject; and perform such other duties as may from time to time be provided by the common council by ordinance not in conflict with the provisions of the charter.

The department of health remains as at present.

The board of education has been abolished and in its stead there has been created a department of public instruction which shall be under the charge of a board consisting of five persons to be elected by the people who shall be known as the board of public instruc-

tion and who shall be the head of this department. The powers of the board under the proposed charter are considerably changed. It shall have general charge of the public schools of the city. It shall appoint a superintendent who shall have power to appoint and suspend teachers, for cause remove them, and he shall also have power to appoint, and for cause remove, all janitors in the public schools.

The department of charities and corrections will be under the charge of an overseer of the poor to be appointed as heretofore. This department has been systematized and various new provisions for the better conduct of the department have been inserted in the charter.

The department of finance will be under the charge of the city treasurer who shall be the head of this department. No change is made in the city government in this respect except to create a department of finance.

Under the head of the department of taxes and assessments have been grouped all the provisions of the city charter relating to the assessment of city taxes and of local improvements. There will be three assessors as heretofore who will be the head of this department. They are required to organize with the election of a president and to hold stated meetings.

The department of excise remains as heretofore provided by the general laws of the state.

No material changes have been made in the department of law.

An engineering department has been created. The design of the committee is to have one city engineer who shall have charge of all the engineering work of the city with power to employ such assistants as the common council may designate. Heretofore there has been no unity of action in the engineering work of the city. There has been a city surveyor, a chief engineer of the water works, an engineer of the East Side trunk sewer, and an engineer of the park commissioners. We believe that the creation of one engineer who shall have general supervision of all the engineering work of the city will be for the best interests of the city.

A purchasing department has been created. It provides for the appointment by the common council of a city purchaser, who in general shall purchase all supplies for the various departments and officers of the city including those of the department of public works and department of public charities and correction. According to the system now in vogue the only check upon purchases for supplies are the appropriations of the common council therefor and the city auditor. The city purchaser is required to advertise for bids for all supplies and to let the contract for such supplies to the lowest responsible bidder.

The auditing department consists of the auditor whose powers and duties remain as heretofore.

The board of park commissioners has been made a department of the city, and as to their powers and duties no important change has been made.

The municipal court, with the exception of slight changes in practice, remains the same.

The police court remains as heretofore. These changes shall not take effect until January 1, 1894, except certain provisions, such as those relating to elections, which shall take effect immediately.

Your committee has not attempted in this summary to outline all the changes that have been made in the charter, nor to define minutely the powers and duties of the various departments mentioned. It has simply in this report desired to call attention to the changes that have been made which would be of interest to the general public. The

bulk of its work has been done. In detail it is not yet perfect. It is submitted for examination and suggestions. Your committee will continue its labors and will report to this body any other changes that may be made, so that when the charter finally comes before you for approval the members of the council and the public may know what it contains. We invite and urge the members of this council, the press of the city, and the public generally, to examine the work which has been done. We shall be pleased to receive any fair criticisms on our labors. The charter will be left in the law department of the city and will be open to the inspection of everybody. When completed, if approved by the common council, it will be sent to the legislature at the opening of the session. The constitution requires that after it has passed both branches of the legislature, the house in which it originated shall immediately transmit a certified copy thereof to the mayor of this city, and the mayor, within fifteen days thereafter, shall return the bill to the house from which it was sent, with a certificate thereon stating whether the city has, or has not, accepted the same. This provision will afford a further hearing on the charter after it has been sent to the legislature, and will afford everyone an opportunity to acquaint himself with its terms.

Gentlemen:—I am directed by the Executive Board to inform you that it will be necessary for your honorable body to make provision for the maintenance and care of the streets, for the remaining months of January, February and March by placing to the credit of the Highway Fund the sum of \$50,000. The funds in hand for highway purposes is practically exhausted. The unexpended balance at this date being about \$6,000. If the ordinary winter season prevails during the ensuing months, it will require at least \$5,000 a week to carry on the work in this department in the removal of snow and ice from the streets and sidewalks, and the labor incidental thereto, and necessary at this time of year. It

is urgently suggested that this appropriation be made without delay as the pay roll on Friday next will exhaust the funds made applicable for highway purposes.

Ald. Green, on behalf of the Railroad Committee, reported favorably on the application of the Rochester Railway Co., made at a regular meeting of this Board held December 11, 1894, and presented the following resolution:

By Ald. Green—Whereas, the Rochester Railway Company has duly applied in writing to the local authorities of the city of Rochester for a ratification and confirmation of the location of its tracks as operated and used through and along the streets, avenues and highways hereinafter named, and

Whereas, the common council, upon the presentation of said written application, duly fixed the time for and the place where the said application should be first considered, to wit: before the Railroad Committee of the Common Council, at the Common Council Chamber, in the City Hall building, on the 31st day of December, 1894, at three o'clock P. M., and directed notice thereof to be published according to law; and

Whereas, the notice required by law, and the time when, and the place where said application would be first considered as aforesaid, was duly published in two daily newspapers of the city of Rochester, designated by the mayor, and,

Whereas, all persons appearing, in pursuance of said notice, were duly heard, and thereupon said Railroad Committee made a report to the Common Council at a meeting thereof, duly held at the Common Council chamber, in the City Hall building, on the 31st day of December, 1894, at 4 o'clock P. M., recommending the adoption of the following resolutions, and

Whereas, due consideration of the allegations presented having been heard, and due consideration having been had upon said application, it is

Resolved, That the location of the tracks of said Rochester Railway Company as now operated and used by said company in the streets, avenues and highways hereinafter named and as hereinafter specifically described, is hereby ratified and approved, subject to such changes and alterations as the Common Council may from time to time direct and subject to all the rights and privileges now possessed by the city under existing contracts or agreements or by law, nevertheless, upon the following conditions:

First—That the provisions of article four of the railway law of the state of New York, being an act in relation to railroads, constituting chapter 39 of the general laws of the state of New York, be complied with.

Second—In order to increase the efficiency of the police system of said city, and that peace and good order may at all times be maintained in said city, and upon the cars of said company, and that the movement of the cars of said company be not interfered with by riotous or unlawful proceedings, that the said company, its successors and assigns fur-

nish transportation without other consideration than the execution of an agreement on the part of said city embodying the terms of these resolutions, to not more than two policemen at a time upon each of the cars of said company, such transportation to be furnished only when said policemen are in full uniform and such transportation to continue as long as the Rochester Railway Company, its successors and assigns shall operate, maintain and use its railroad in said city. It is further provided that on the written request of the superintendent of police the said railroad company shall issue to the active detectives of the police force to the number of not more than nine, tickets for not more than one hundred rides for each detective, on the cars of the company in any one month.

Third—In order that opportunity may at all times be afforded to the members of the paid fire department of said city to reach quickly the locality of any conflagration, that said company shall furnish like transportation for the same consideration hereinbefore expressed to not more than two firemen at a time upon each of the cars of said company, such transportation to be furnished only while said firemen are in full uniform and said transportation to continue so long as the Rochester Railway Company, its successors and assigns shall operate, maintain and use its railroad in said city.

Fourth—That all the provisions of any agreement between the city of Rochester and any street railroad company, and all ordinances, resolutions, grants and consents heretofore passed by said city, with reference to the construction, maintenance or operation of street railroads within said city shall remain in full and binding force; and these resolutions shall not be construed as extending or affecting the franchise of any such company or the time of the expiration of any such franchise or the moneys required to be paid to said city by such company, or as repealing, modifying or changing in any respect the terms or provisions of any agreement previously entered into between said city and any street railroad company.

Fifth—That this ratification and confirmation of the location of the tracks of said company shall have the same effect as if said tracks had originally been laid with the proper consent and authority of said city and no other effect or construction.

Sixth—Said Rochester Railway Company, however, for the same consideration, agrees for itself, its successors and assigns, upon the written order of the mayor, superintendent or chief of police, or fire commissioner of said city or officers performing their duties, in cases of emergencies, to transport upon each of its cars any number of policemen or firemen.

Ald. Kelly moved that the resolution be amended by substituting therein the words "railroad and tracks" for the word "tracks."

Gentlemen:—Your Assessment Committee would respectfully report as follows:

In the matter of the petition of the heirs of James Farley for a rebate of taxes on their premises known as lot No. 50 of the John Williams tract on the west side of Kent street, your committee find that the premises in question should not be assessed at the present time to exceed the sum of \$400. The Assessors report that they have carefully examined these premises and that this property for the year 1895 should not be assessed at a greater sum than \$400. These premises have undoubtedly been assessed at too great a sum and they have not been actually worth the amount for which they have been assessed during the past ten years. It appears that the taxes have not been paid from the year 1883, and there is now due on said premises a large amount of unpaid taxes. In view of the fact that it is apparent that said premises have been over-assessed and that at the present time the said premises will not much exceed in value the taxes standing against the same with the penalties and interest added, your committee have concluded, after a conference with the Assessors, to recommend in order to effect a settlement of this claim that the Treasurer be authorized to receive from the estate of James Farley taxes upon said premises to be computed upon the sum of \$600 as a basis of assessment from and including the year 1893 to the present time with fees and expense of sale, and all fees and expenses the same as though the present taxes were paid without rebate excepting that they be allowed to pay said taxes upon the basis of an assessed valuation of \$600, and redeem said premises from the several sales thereof in all cases where the premises were sold to the city of Rochester, with six per cent. interest, from the date of sale.

To the Common Council:

Gentlemen: I herewith tender to you my resignation as mayor of the city of Rochester.

While this action on my part, no doubt, has been anticipated by you and the public, and while, furthermore, the reason which actuates me is too well known to require any words of explanation, I do not feel that I can sever my official relations with the city without expressing to you, and through you to the citizens of Rochester who have so greatly honored me in the past, something of the sense of gratefulness which I feel because of those honors.

Nearly all the years of my life, since I attained by majority, have been spent in the service of the city. Pleasant years they have been to me, and profitable ones so far as experience goes; successful years they have been to our city for in them she has doubled in population and beautified herself many fold by providing parks, parkways and boulevards and improving both her resident and business streets. She has increased her attractiveness as a city of homes by procuring an adequate supply of water as pure as that of which any other city in the United States can boast, and has rendered her sanitary condition well nigh perfect through the adoption of a model system of sewerage. She has rendered life and property more secure by the establishment and equipment of fire and police departments that are second to none both as to efficiency and department. In my official capacity I have had to do with many if not all the improvements enumerated. It is not that I have been criticised in connection with any of these that I refer to them now, but because this is the first opportunity I have had to say, that I believe even those of our citizens who are wont to be critical would be loth to do away with any of these improvements and would be compelled to admit that, in the main, the millions of dollars that have been expended to secure these improvements, have been expended judiciously; in other words, that the city has in every instance received a fair equivalent for her money.

It is with a feeling something akin to regret that I lay down the pleasurable duties of the mayor's office to take upon myself the exacting burden of the position I am to assume, and I cannot do so without making acknowledgement, which I now do, of the uniform courtesy and wise counsel I have received from the members of your honorable body and from the other officials of the city with whom I have been so intimately associated, not alone during my term as mayor, but during my long connection with the executive board.

A consideration, without which the regret would be more keen, is that I am to refrain my home among you and therefore, though no longer serving the city in an official capacity I shall continue my interest in all that makes for her welfare.

Respeaking for the city a wise executive in the one who is to succeed me, under the charter provision, and predicting for him

Ald. Calihan of the City Property Committee, Ald. Adams of the Poor Committee, Ald. Dewey of the Lamp Committee, Ald. Pauckner of the Contingent Expense Committee and Ald. Aikenhead of the Police Committee, reported favorably upon bills referred to their respective committees, which bills were thereupon duly referred to the Auditor and Finance Committee.

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

Rochester, N. Y., Feb. 5, 1895.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: Your special committee appointed to confer with the West Side sewer commissioners and property owners for the purpose of adjusting the difficulties in connection with the construction of the West Side sewer and reporting a bill to the council for presentation to the legislature, if found necessary, beg leave to say that your committee held a meeting in the city clerk's office this afternoon, which all the members of your committee attended and at which there was represented Mr. Barry, who is interested in property to be taken, and the West Side sewer commissioners, its contractors and engineers.

Your committee, after discussion and consultation, decided to recommend the passage by the legislature of an enabling act permitting the West Side sewer commissioners to file a supplemental map that they may be in a position to condemn property through which they have not acquired a right of way. The necessity for the construction of the West Side sewer without further delay is very urgent. Before any steps were taken toward the passage of an act permitting the construction of this sewer three commissioners were appointed to determine whether the sewer was necessary. The proofs taken by the commissioners show that the construction of the sewer is an absolute necessity. In accordance with their recommendation an act was passed which permitted the

construction of the sewer. Commissioners were appointed and contracts were made. After a large amount of money had been expended the constitutionality of the act for construction of the sewer was questioned. This question has been determined, however, favorably to the city, by the court of last resort in this state, and the commissioners are in a position to go on with the work as soon as they can obtain the necessary right of way.

All of the easements have been acquired except that through a piece of property owned by Messrs. Barry, Ellwanger and Woodworth. These persons refused to allow the commissioners to cross their property except upon certain conditions. The sewer commissioners will endeavor to arrive at terms with these property owners, but pending the negotiations, and that the work may not be unnecessarily delayed, your committee recommends that the enabling act above referred to may be approved by this council and sent to the honorable the representatives of this district in the legislature for immediate passage.

AN ACT in relation to the construction of a sewer in the tenth, fifteenth and twentieth wards of the city of Rochester, and in the town of Gates, in the county of Monroe, provided for by chapter 603 of the laws of 1892.

The people of the state of New York, represented in the senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The commissioners for the tenth, fifteenth and twentieth wards in the city of Rochester, and the town of Gates, appointed under the provisions of section four (4) of chapter 603 of the laws of 1892, may within thirty days after the passage of this act, make and file in the office of the clerk of the county of Monroe, a supplemental map which shall show the extent of the sewer as determined by them; the filing of which map shall have the same effect in all respects as though filed with, or embraced in the map heretofore filed by said commissioners, and all acts and doings of said commissioners since the filing of such original map are hereby validated and confirmed in all respects as though said supplemental map had been made a part of such original map; such supplemental map to be certified to by said commissioners, with a statement written thereon, signed by them, or a majority of them, that such map shows the extent of such sewer as determined by them.

Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Ordered received, filed and published and, on motion of Ald. Kelly, approved.

By Ald. Kelly—Resolved, That the honorable, the representatives of this district in the senate and assembly, be requested to introduce into the legislature and secure the passage as soon as possible, of the act approved at this meeting of the Common Council, enabling the West Side Sewer Commissioners to file a supplemental map.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: At a meeting of your honorable body held January 29, 1895, a resolution was adopted requesting me to give an opinion as to whether there is any provision in the city charter which would prohibit the city from paying the acting mayor a salary. The charter provides that in case of the absence or inability of the mayor to act as such, or in case his office shall become vacant by death, resignation or otherwise, the president of the common council shall possess all the powers and perform all the duties of mayor during such absence or inability or during the remainder of his term of office in case of a vacancy therein (Charter, Sec. 62). By virtue of this provision the president of the common council in the absence or inability of the mayor, or in case the office becomes vacant, becomes the mayor of the city and becomes vested with all the powers and duties of the mayor. As such, however, the acting mayor is not entitled by virtue of his position to the salary of the mayor. The president of the common

council, at the time of his appointment, is presumed to have accepted his position with reference to the duties of the mayor which he might be called upon to perform and the salary which attaches to his office as alderman, it was intended, should cover all the services which he might be called upon to perform as an alderman or as president of the common council. (People ex rel Ray V. Burrill, 14 Hun, 224.)

But though the acting mayor may not be entitled to compel the payment to him of the salary attached to the office of mayor, yet the common council may authorize the payment of the salary to him while performing the duties of mayor. The city charter gives the common council power over the prudential and fiscal affairs of the city (Charter, Sec. 40) and the power to determine the salary to be paid to the mayor (Charter, Sec. 45).

I am of the opinion not only that there is no provision of the charter prohibiting the payment of a salary to the acting mayor, but that by virtue of the provisions referred to the common council has the power to direct the salary of the mayor, or so much thereof as it may deem proper, to be paid to the acting mayor.

One tier of lots and parcels of land on each side of Mortimer street, from North St. Paul street to North Clinton street.

EAST AVENUE CARE, REPAIR AND SPRINKLING.

By Ald. Ward—Resolved, That the City Surveyor ascertain and report to this Council the expense of cleaning, repairing and sprinkling East avenue for the season of 1895.

AN ACT to provide for the sanitary protection of the sources of the water supply of the City of Rochester.

The People of the State of New York represented in Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the common council of the city of Rochester acting for and on behalf of said city, to acquire by purchase, or take, in the manner hereinafter set forth, title to all or any real estate, and to acquire or extinguish any interest therein of which the acquisition, taking, or extinguishment may be necessary, for the sanitary protection of all rivers, springs, brooks and other water courses, lakes, ponds and reservoirs in the counties of Livingston, Ontario and Steuben, so far as the same now are, or hereafter may be, used for the supply of water for the City of Rochester.

Sec. 2. The term "real estate," as used in this act, shall be construed to signify and embrace all lands, including lands under water, tenements and hereditaments, corporeal and incorporeal, and the term "interest therein" when herein used in reference to real estate, shall be construed to signify and embrace any estate, right, title or interest, whether legal or equitable, in lands or water, any privilege or easement in or thereto appertaining, terms for years, incumbrances or liens thereon, whether by way of judgment, mortgage or otherwise, and also all claims for damages to such real estate.

Sec. 3 Said city, or its agents, engineers, surveyors and such other persons as may be necessary may enter upon any land or water on, adjacent or contiguous to the water courses, rivers and tributaries hereinbefore mentioned, in the said counties of Livingston, Ontario and Steuben, for the purpose of making surveys or examinations preparatory to the purchase or acquisition of any real estate or interest therein under this act.

Sec. 4 Said common council for and on behalf of said city, is hereby authorized to take such measures as may be necessary to preserve from pollution and defilement all of the sources of the water supply, whether the same be rivers, springs, brooks or other water courses, lakes, ponds or reservoirs situate in the counties of Livingston, Ontario, and Steuben, and to that end to enter in and upon at any time after the passage of this act or any or all lands near on, adjacent or contiguous to any of the said sources of water supply and take possession of such lands and to abate and remove the cause of any such pollution or defilement. And all damages and injuries to property occasioned by any act under this section, shall subsequently be ascertained, determined and paid for in accordance with the provisions of the following sections of this act. And the said common council shall, within ten days after taking possession of such lands or abating and removing any nuisance as aforesaid, institute proceedings under the provisions of this act to ascertain and determine all damages and injuries occasioned thereby. And if such proceedings are not so instituted any person injuriously affected in property shall have a cause of action therefore against said city, and may bring an action against it for all damages and injuries sustained, which action shall be tried in the county where the premises or property affected is situated. And all sums awarded by the commissioners of appraisal for damages or injuries sustained under any act or doing under the provisions of this section shall be paid by said city, and in case the same is not so paid the person or persons to whom any sum is awarded may bring suit therefor, in which

action the plaintiff shall be absolutely entitled to have judgment tendered in his favor on filing a certified copy of the report of the commissioners of appraisal and of the order confirming the same, and which action shall be tried in the county where the premises or property affected is situated.

Sec. 5. Except as herein otherwise provided whenever the common council of said city shall determine to take any real estate or any interest therein in pursuance of this act, and is unable to agree for the purchase thereof, the proceedings for acquiring such real estate or interest therein, shall be the same as provided by the condemnation law, sections 3357 to 3381 of which both inclusive are made applicable hereto, except at least one of the commissioners of appraisal shall be a resident freeholder of said city.

Sec. 6. For the purpose of securing the payment of, and paying, any awards which may be made by commissioners of appraisal for real estate or any interest therein taken or any judgment recovered or damages, costs or expenses incurred pursuant to this act, said city shall be authorized, and it is hereby directed to issue its bonds to be known as the "watershed bonds of the city of Rochester" to run for a period not exceeding fifty years, at a rate of interest not exceeding four per cent. per annum, and in an amount not exceeding the sum of two hundred thousand dollars.

Sec. 7. Said bonds, when issued, shall be signed by the Treasurer, sealed with the corporate seal of said city, countersigned by the mayor and president of the Common Council, and may be either coupon or registered bonds.

Sec. 8. Said bonds shall be sold to the highest bidder, pursuant to an invitation for sealed proposals therefor by public advertisement for not less than ten days, which proposals shall be publicly opened only by the Treasurer of said city or such other person as said Common Council may designate, in the presence of the Finance Committee of said Common Council, or such of them as shall attend at the time and place specified in said advertisement, and said Treasurer, with the approval of said Finance Committee, or such members thereof as may be present, shall determine what, if any, part of said proposals shall be accepted, provided, however, that no proposals shall be accepted for less than the par value of said bonds, but nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the rejection of any or all of said proposals.

Sec. 9. Said Common Council is hereby authorized and directed to raise from time to time by tax upon the estates real and personal subject to taxation in said city, the sum or sums of money which may be required to pay the interest upon said bonds and to redeem them at maturity.

Sec. 10. For the purpose of paying any of the awards made pursuant to this act or any judgment recovered or damages sustained or costs or expenses incurred pending the sale of any of said bonds, said common council may borrow by a vote of three-fourths of all of the members elected subject to the approval of the mayor upon the credit of the city by its promissory note or notes payable in not more than eight months after their date, so much money as may be necessary and the amount so borrowed shall be placed to the credit of the watershed fund to be refunded with interest from the proceeds of the sale of said bonds.

Sec. 11. The several banks including the savings banks within the said city of Rochester, the Rochester Trust and Safe Deposit Company and the Security Trust Company of said city, are hereby authorized to re-

ceive and keep on deposit at interest any moneys raised by the sale or for the payment of said bonds and each and every bank or company receiving such deposits as aforesaid shall execute and give to said city a bond with sufficient surety conditioned to save said city harmless from any loss by reason of such deposits, said bonds to be approved by the mayor.

Sec 12. This act shall take effect immediately.

Gentlemen:—In view of the apparent necessity of a passable as well as a pleasant driveway or thoroughfare to the park grounds on South avenue, as well as at South park, the Executive Board respectfully recommends that your honorable body instruct the City Surveyor to introduce an ordinance for the improvement of the roadway and sidewalks from the termination of the already projected improvement which extends to the approach to Mt. Hope reservoir, along the line of South avenue to Elmwood avenue.

It is a matter of common knowledge that this roadway is almost impassable at certain seasons of the year, and such an improvement will not only be of great benefit to the public at large, but will open up a beautiful driveway to the pleasure and recreation grounds now provided for the public on the southern boundary of the city.

To the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—In May, 1894, your honorable body adopted an ordinance for the construction of what is designated as "Thomas and other streets outlet sewer, estimated expense of which was \$25,100. The contract was duly awarded by the Executive Board May 19th, for the sum of \$21,419.50, and the cost as ascertained when the work was completed December 14, 1894, was \$21,960.28, which amount was certified to the City Treasurer.

It now appears that Girard park, through which one section of the sewer was constructed, is not a public street, and no right of way has been secured by the city. This block of land is in the hands of a land association and a map showing this street and a tier of lots on each side, made for the purpose of sale of the property, found its way into the city surveyor's department, and upon the statement of a member of the association that Girard park was a public street, the sewer was laid through it and completed as stated above.

The situation now is that the sewer is built, paid for and in use through private property and for this privilege the owners demand the sum of five hundred dollars for the easement or right of way.

They allege that the financial condition of the association does not at present afford any immediate prospect of the street being opened for public use. A copy of a resolution adopted by the association known as the Hayward and Girard Park Association in June, 1893, is shown which in terms demanded one dollar a lineal foot on each side of the proposed street for right of way, which resolution is still in force.

The Executive Board is of the opinion that the sum asked is in excess of the actual value of the privilege required, but in view of the fact, that if the proffer is declined, the laws delay which usually accompany condemnation proceedings, and the consequent postponement in the collection of the assessment and reimbursement of the city for the money already expended, added to expenses of such proceedings and the uncertainty of the results, the board does not feel warranted in advising the acceptance of the proposition or its rejection, but suggest that the matter be considered by your honorable body with a view of determining what is best for the taxpayers who have to bear the burden of the cost for this improvement.

It may be added that an order of assessment has already been made, that it is desirable that prompt action be taken in order that no unnecessary expense should be sustained by the city.

Gentlemen:—The Genesee Valley Park Committee would recommend that the Common Council be requested to provide money for the purchase of the following property:

First. The east bank of the river from the state dam to Elmwood avenue and west of the Wolcott road. Containing 3 44-100 acres.

Second. A strip of land 200 feet wide on the north side of Elmwood avenue, from the river to the Erie railroad crossing. Containing 2 28-100 acres.

Third. A triangular piece of land at the southwest corner of the park, from the Reynolds and Baker farms, such as would continue the Westfall road in a straight line to the river road. Containing 3 68-100 acres.

Fourth. All of the Baker property south of the above named property and west of the

river road. Containing 1350-100 acres. Total 22.90 acres. The value of which we estimate at \$12,000.

The acquiring of the above property is absolutely necessary to protect the park from intrusion, and to carry out the plan already adopted by the board.

The committee would further recommend, that in view of the constantly increasing value of lands adjoining the park, an additional acreage should be at once obtained. This course is urged strongly by very many citizens who are the largest taxpayers.

To this end we would recommend that the Common Council be requested to provide \$45,000 (in addition to the \$12,000 heretofore estimated), either to acquire property on the south side of Elmwood avenue west of the river, or on the east side of the river and south of the Westfall road, 200 acres of land, more or less, owned by N. Westfall, Thos. Ewart, Reynolds estate and B. M. Baker, as may be in the judgment of the commission be the most desirable.

The accompanying maps will show the situation and dimensions of all the property above referred to.

To the Board of Park Commissioners:

Gentlemen:—Your committee beg leave to present the following, as showing that the action of the board on the deaf mute property, at the special meeting on the 21st inst., should be modified. We learn that the large school building can be moved, and left in as good condition as at present, for the sum of \$2,500.

We also find that the boiler house can be torn down and rebuilt, with the heating apparatus as before, for the sum of \$4,000.

That the wooden part of the institute building to be removed is worth about \$1,000, and the barn \$100. A total sum, for the removal or destruction of the several buildings on the ground required for the parkway, of \$7,600. Also that upon the basis of the price paid for the land next south, purchased from the street car company, we estimate the value of the land required at \$1,441 per acre; 2 108-1000 acres would be \$3,037, making the total sum \$10,637 for the lands and buildings that will be required from the Deaf Mute Institute.

Per contra, it is proposed that we give them No. 8 school house and the front part of the lot, 97 feet front on St. Paul street and about 170 feet deep.

We estimate the value of the land to be \$2,500, and are led to believe, by experts in the value of real estate in that vicinity, that if the school house and lot was to be put up for sale it would not bring more than \$5,000. This would leave \$5,637 due the Institute, which sum could be credited on the mortgage held by the city.

To the Board of Park Commissioners:

Gentlemen:—In accordance with the resolution of the board, your committee report the following as their estimate of the cost of securing the land necessary to complete the

Seneca parks on both banks of the river.

We find that on the west side six (6) houses and lots, forty-six (46) vacant lots, and the bank of the river from Seneca bridge north to St. Bernard's Seminary, including the Glen House property, in all about 57 acres, are required, which we estimate will cost \$59,000.

On the east side, one house and lot, thirty-two (32) vacant lots, Brewer's dock and the rear parts of the Electric Light Company, Deaf Mute and No. 8 public school properties are required, in all about 36 4-10 acres, which we estimate will cost \$34,000; a total cost of \$93,400. Believing that the Deaf Mute property can be acquired by the exchange of other property now held by the city, and no money will have to be raised, we have omitted it from our estimates.

Your committee have made careful inquiry, with the view only of arriving at the amount of money that in their judgment will be called for to purchase the lands absolutely required to permit the people to enjoy the use of the parks, and not with the intention of committing this board to any plan of acquiring said lands, or of fixing the price to be paid for the same, and in this connection we recommend that when it happens that a member of this board is interested, personally or otherwise, in the ownership of any lands to be acquired by this board, that the value thereof be fixed only by arbitration or commission proceedings.

We also call attention to the steady rise in the value of real estate adjacent to the parks, since their location, and to the fact, that as soon as the present business depression shows signs of recovery, the increase in values will be more rapid than ever, and to wait until that time before securing these lands will cost the city more than the principal and interest of any debt that may now be incurred for this purpose. Meanwhile the people will be barred from the use and enjoyment of the most beautiful and picturesque parts of the Seneca parks on both sides of the river, from the increase in the taxable value of adjacent properties, and the general prosperity of the city that will surely flow from the completion of the parks.

Dear Sir:—The patrol system of the Police Department has been in constant use for the past nine years. The apparatus in the central office is worn out and entirely unsuited for the present needs of the department. Since the introduction of the electric system of street railway in this city there has been no satisfactory telephone service over the lines of the patrol system. To remedy this defect a second wire has been run at quite an outlay. This wire can not be used with the old central office apparatus without reconstructing, which would cost nearly as much as a new central office outfit, and would have none of the improvements which have been made in police patrol systems since our system was put in. All of these matters were brought to the attention of the Police Commissioners and they recognize the necessity for a new central office outfit for the new police building, but have no funds available to purchase it, and they directed me to place the matter before your committee. In compliance with their instructions, I respectfully submit the above.

Gentlemen:—Permit me to call the attention of your honorable body to the fact that under the provisions of the penal ordinances in relation to licensing peddlers, no discretion is vested in the Mayor, and no power is granted to him to grant permits, without the payment of a license fee.

During the two weeks in which I have been performing the duties of Mayor, I have been frequently called upon by poor, crippled, old men who desired temporary permits to sell pencils, oranges and notions of various kinds from baskets. In every instance the applicant has been unable financially to pay the license fee. And it has seemed to me that had I been authorized to grant such persons temporary permits, they might have been enabled to earn some small amount with which to relieve the necessities of their conditions. Under the charter the Common Council is I believe, authorized to empower the Mayor to grant permits under certain conditions.

I would respectfully recommend that such action be taken.

Mr. President: I rise to a question of privilege and beg leave to submit the following memorial and resolutions on the death of our former fellow townsman, the Honorable Frederick Douglass.

MEMORIAL.

At his residence in Washington, February 20, 1895, Frederick Douglass, a former resident of Rochester died, and this Council have met this afternoon to honor his memory.

Frederick Douglass was born in Tuckahoe, near Easton, Talbot county, Maryland, February 14, 1817. His early boyhood was passed in slavery upon the plantation of Colonel Lloyd. When about nine years of age he learned to read and write; September 3, 1838, he escaped from slavery and took up his residence in New Bedford, Mass, where he was first married. It was here he met and was assisted in his efforts to secure an education by William Lloyd Garrison. In 1841, Mr. Douglass made a speech at an anti-slavery convention at Nantucket which brought him before the attention of the Massachusetts Anti-Slavery Society and this society at once employed him as one of its agents; for them he lectured through New England for about four years, upon the subject which he was so eminently qualified by nature and experience to speak. So successful was he that in 1845 he made a tour of England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales, receiving marked attention everywhere. Rochester was honored by his making it his home in 1847, and here he resided for the most part until 1870.

When he first settled in Rochester he began the publication of a paper known as the "North Star," an organ devoted to the abolition of slavery, and which he continued a greater part of the time until the emancipation of his race removed the cause for its existence.

Mr. Douglass filled many positions of trust with eminent credit to himself and his country. In 1871 he was appointed assistant secretary to the commission of Santo Domingo and later by President Grant as a member of the Territorial Council of the District of Columbia. In 1872 he was elector at large for the state of New York and the messenger of the Electoral College. From 1876 to 1881, he was United States marshal for the District of Columbia, and recorder of deeds for that district from 1881 to 1886. But it was as an orator and author that Mr. Douglass was perhaps best known from the time when he

fired the hearts and zeal of the New England abolitionists until his last public appearance a few years since. He was an orator whose oratory was spontaneous, natural and convincing and the citizens of Rochester have not forgotten the occasions when he held as if by magic, the large audiences which would congregate to hear him. As an author he achieved distinction by his works: "Narrative of My Experience in Slavery;" "My Bondage and My Freedom," published here in 1855, and "Life and Times of Frederick Douglass."

Rochester is proud that he was one of her sons and that he will rest in her beautiful city of the dead.

In his life and life work, our youth can find much worthy of emulation and its lesson to all cannot be lost.

"Who'er amidst the soas

"Of reason, valour, liberty, and virtue

"Displays distinguished merit, is a noble

"Of Nature's own creating."

Resolved, That we do hereby tender to the family and relatives of Honorable Frederick Douglass, our sympathy in their affliction, and that this memorial be spread upon the minutes of this Council, a copy of this memorial and these resolutions, be sent to his family, and further.

Resolved, That the family of Mr. Douglass be requested to permit his body to lie in state in the City Hall on the day of the funeral, and further.

Resolved, That this Common Council attend the funeral services in a body.

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, the assessment committee beg leave to submit the following report:

In the matter of the petition of Bessie J.

Gillette, for permission to redeem certain premises from the sale for general city taxes for the year 1893, and to pay taxes on certain property for the year 1894, and to pay certain assessments for the construction of Sobieski avenue pipe sewer under final ordinance No. 5,191, and Kosciusko avenue pipe sewer under final ordinance No. 5,190, all with six per cent. interest and fees, we recommend that the prayer of the petitioner be granted.

To the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—The Executive Board requests that the Finance Committee recommend to the Common Council an appropriation of \$25,000 to meet the necessary expenditures in the Highway department for the balance of the year.

Under date of December 31, 1894, the Executive Board requested and was granted the sum of \$50,000 for this purpose which was at that time deemed sufficient, if the ordinary winter season prevailed. Such conditions have not existed for the past month or so; on the contrary a storm set in of the most unusual and extraordinary kind. Streets and sidewalks have been blockaded with snow of such a depth that nothing but absolute removal could render them fit for traffic or pedestrians.

This work has been going on continuously in roadways day and night and Sundays up to the present date, and yet there are a large number of streets which if the weather does not moderate, will have to be cleaned of snow and ice. It may be stated that there were removed from East and West Main street, West avenue and State street as far north as Vincent place and North St. Paul street as far north as Lowell street, 45,000 yards of snow, which was done at a considerable expense owing to the fact that men and teams worked only eight hours a day.

The apprehension of the public that a flood would follow this immense snow fall caused the Board to order a channel cut in the upper river, which is estimated to have cost nearly \$800 up to the present time. This is a work for which the Highway Fund should not be charged, as the river is under the jurisdiction of the Common Council in all matters relating to removal of debris and obstructions from its bed.

There is now to the credit of the Highway Fund the sum of \$5,637.70 and over four weeks remain before the year expires. The usual spring cleaning cannot be done, and has not been done for several years at a less expenditure than \$5,000 a week; and, assuming that ordinary conditions will exist for this period of time, the sum of \$25,000 cannot be considered excessive.

Gentlemen: As the finance committee of the common council is now considering various estimates for necessary expenditures during the coming fiscal year, I desire to call your attention to the estimates for the completion of the new conduit and the system of large distributing mains.

To complete the new conduit work, permanent connections at Rush and Mt. Hope reservoirs are yet to be made, and proper buildings are also needed over the gate house and overflow chamber at Hemlock lake as well as at Mt. Hope reservoir. The estimated expense of these items is \$50,000, and as the additional water supply fund is practically exhausted this sum should be appropriated for the purpose.

It may be remarked in this connection that no necessity for an additional appropriation for the new conduit would have arisen if it had been possible to finish, during the past year the legal proceedings for the collection of the bond for \$90,000 which was given by the Moffett, Hodgkins & Clark Company along with their bid for contract No. 2, and which was forfeited by the failure of said company to enter into contract after the acceptance of said bid. The matter is still awaiting trial in the United States court, and as it may continue to be postponed, no definite time for its conclusion can be fixed. In the meanwhile the aforesaid new conduit work should be finished, so as to make available all of the advantages resulting from its construction.

In regard to the new system of large distributing mains in the city, it will be remembered that the estimated cost of the work which was deemed necessary one year ago was \$488,000. Of this amount only \$250,000 was appropriated, and it was expected that the remainder would be provided this year. After all the contracts are completed which were made last year, under the above-named appropriation, no appreciable balance will be left in this fund. If the work is to be continued this year, as originally planned, the sum of \$240,000 will be required.

I also desire to call attention to the urgent expediency of some action in reference either to acquiring Cobb's hill or stopping further excavations for sand in the sides thereof. As has been pointed out before, this locality is the most favorable site for a new and large distributing reservoir, and it is gradually being spoiled for the purpose by the excavations mentioned. While the price asked for the land is very high, and perhaps more than may be deemed expedient to pay under present circumstances, some arrangements should nevertheless be made whereby the highly detrimental excavations shall be stopped un-

til the purchase of the land is consummated.

To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen;

Gentlemen:—We, members of the executive committee of the Committee of One Hundred, respectfully call your attention to certain evils existing in the city of Rochester, and which have existed for a long time, viz.:

The gathering together in saloons behind closed doors and in secluded compartments, of prostitutes and men of evil habits, and also the presence there of young women and young men who are passing from lives of respectability to lives of crime. We know that there are many saloons in our city in which such practices are permitted, and we hold that they are but a degree removed from houses of prostitution, and are demoralizing the youth of both sexes.

Secondly. The practice of permitting children to enter into places where intoxicating drinks are sold, and the selling of liquor to children. We know that such practices, besides being crimes against the peace of the city and against the laws, are schooling children in vicious habits and associations, and should be stopped.

Thirdly. The keeping of saloons open at times prohibited by law. This is not only contrary to law, but denies to the people the quiet and order to which they are entitled by law. We know that the remedy for these evils is in the hands of the mayor and police commission, and that it should be vigorously and constantly applied.

We know there are dealers in intoxicating drinks in the city who desire to conduct their business in a law-abiding manner, and we hold that the permission of the aforementioned evils is an infringement of their rights, and is an open inducement to them to violate the law.

We have ground for believing that offenders against the law, and dealers who sell to saloons, are desirous of securing the election by your board to the office of police commissioner, about to become vacant, of some person who will favor the permission of these evils, and who will be elected to the office

for the express purpose of preventing the police from executing the law, and from gathering evidence against such offenders.

We therefore respectfully protest against the election to the office of police commissioner of any person who is directly or indirectly interested in the liquor traffic, or who will favor or tolerate law-breaking by the dealers in intoxicating drinks.

Gentlemen: The Executive Board directs me to call your attention to the necessity of providing an outlet of sufficient capacity for Richard street sewer. This sewer now connects with the Goodman street sewer, and for want of depth or fall the latter becomes from time to time obstructed so as to require opening and cleaning, the expense of which has had to be paid out of the Highway Fund.

In the midst of the severest part of this winter about two hundred and ten feet of this sewer had to be cleaned to afford relief to the residents of Richard street, and this and other expenses must necessarily be incurred as long as the present condition of the sewer exists. It is therefore recommended that measures be at once taken to cause an ordinance to be prepared for abatement of this nuisance as well as to avoid the maintenance of the sewer at public expense.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ORDINANCE RELATING TO STREETS.

Section 1. Section fourteen of said ordinance as amended October 30, 1888, is hereby further amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 14. No owner, or non-resident owner, agent or occupant of any store or building adjacent to any of the public streets, avenues, alleys, lanes, squares or places within the city, or other person shall place or erect or cause or suffer to be placed or erected or suspended to, upon, from, or adjacent to any such store or building any sign, post or fixture of any kind which shall be and project more than two feet from the front of any such store or building or be less than nine feet above the sidewalk or surface of any such street, avenue, alley, lane, square or place. No person or persons, firm or corporation shall place or cause to be placed or kept or placed for sale in any manner upon any public sidewalk in the city any goods, wares, merchandise or articles of any kind so that there shall not be at all times a space of at least six feet in width from the curb for the use of the public, except, however, that on East Main, West Main, Exchange and State streets there shall be at all times kept clear and unobstructed for the use of the public a width of fourteen feet from the curb. No person or persons, firm or corporation shall hang or suspend or cause to be hung or suspended in any manner from any awning frame or otherwise over any sidewalk, any goods, wares, merchandise or articles of any kind.

Nothing contained in this section shall prohibit the erection of an awning of cloth upon

iron frames in front of stores or buildings, provided the same shall be constructed in a uniform manner, supported by an iron frame work securely attached to the building in front of which the same shall be constructed, and provided that the same shall at all times be self supporting and securely kept and maintained from falling, and every part of the frame work and such awning be at least seven feet in the clear above the surface of the sidewalk, and provided that no curtain or sign shall be attached to any part of such awning or be in any way suspended from the same or any of its frames or so as to extend in any manner across or over such sidewalk. Every person or persons, firm or corporation erecting, or causing or permitting to be erected or placed, or keeping any awning or frame over any of the streets, avenues, alleys, lanes, squares or places in the city in pursuance of the permission granted in this ordinance shall assume all risk and damage resulting therefrom and shall be presumed to do so with the understanding that he, it or they shall be liable for all damages that the city or any person may suffer therefrom by reason of the same being negligently or defectively constructed, or out of repair at any time and shall indemnify, bear and save harmless the city from any and every suit, action or proceeding brought to recover any such damages. Every person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this section shall be subject to a penalty of not less than five dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars for each offense, and a penalty of a similar amount for each twenty-four hours that such violation shall continue.

Sec. 2. This amendment shall take effect immediately.

Gentlemen:—It will doubtless be remembered that the Executive Board, in its requisition last spring for funds for the maintenance and care of the fire department, made application for amount necessary for the purchase of sites and erection of engine houses, one of which was to replace the house on Belmont park and the other to provide for a new location for an engine house in the southeastern part of the city. At that time, in view of the large tax levy, it was thought the old fire house on Belmont Park might be continued in service another year, but subsequently, and after the adoption of the tax levy, it was found that the house on Belmont park had become so dilapidated that it was no longer tenable; and, in view of the fact that a cash offer for the site was made of \$7,000, your Finance Committee deemed it good policy and expedient to sell the same and purchase a new site. The old property was therefore sold for the sum of \$7,000, and the amount credited to the Fire Department Fund.

The building on Belmont Park has been completed, and is now occupied and in commission. In view of all these circumstances; the sale of the old building; the obtaining of an available site, and the erection of the new house, the Executive Board is of the opinion, that the action of your Finance Committee was prudent and judicious.

After crediting the amount received for the old house on Belmont Park, the balance to be provided for is as follows:

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LAMP AND ELECTRIC COMMITTEE.

Rochester, N. Y., March 28, 1895.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen: Your Lamp and Electric Committee submits the following condensed annual report for the year ending March 31, 1895.

In accordance with resolutions passed by your Honorable Board, the lighting of Main street, from the Erie canal to University avenue, with double incandescent arc lights fed from the underground wires, also the lighting of State street, from Main street to Center street, by the same method, has been completed, and the result is entirely satisfactory; and your Committee would recommend the lighting of other central streets in this manner, where conduits may be laid and the wires placed therein.

We wish to respectfully call your attention to the recommendation made in the annual report of the Lamp and Electric Committee last year, to the effect that the gas lamps on the streets should be replaced by arc lights; and as the contract with the Gas Company makes a sliding scale of prices, the number of gas lamps is so small now that under the terms of the contract we are now paying 7 cents per lamp per night, which is one-half cent more than we paid last year. For this reason we would again recommend that the gas lights be replaced by arc lamps.

We would also recommend that arrangements be made to construct conduits in Central avenue, North Clinton street and State street from Center street to Lyell avenue.

To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:—Your Water Works Committee respectfully presents its report for the year ending April 1, 1895, as follows:

In consideration of the fact that the amount

of \$250,000 was by action of the Common Council dated April 3, 1894, authorized to be raised by issuing bonds in payment for the extension of large distributing mains, it was thought advisable by your committee not to recommend the raising of funds by tax levy for ordinary water pipe extensions asked by petition, the balance to the credit of the Water Pipe Extension Fund being deemed sufficient to make imperative extensions.

The following statement shows the balance to the credit of this fund at the close of the year 1893-4; the various amounts raised by issue of city's notes, and amount paid into the treasury by private parties for laying mains under authorization of Common Council:

During the season there were set in all water pipes regarded as mains 72 gates ranging from 36-inch to 3-4-inch diameter making in all 2,502 gates of which 2,265 are inserted in the mains of the Domestic, and 237 in those of the Holly system.

In large services there are 427 gates, 291 in the Domestic and 136 in the Holly system.

Connected with the distributing systems there are 2,484 hydrants, 2,192 on the Domestic and 292 on the Holly system.

MILEAGE.

On April 1, 1895, the total length of all pipes classed as distributing mains in the city was 256,321 miles, of which 237,896 miles belonged to the Hemlock or Domestic system and 18,425 miles to the Holly system.

The conservative action during late years in regard to extending water mains has led to a large accumulation of petitions filed in the Water Works Department. The estimated cost of the new work petitioned for is about \$135,000.

Your committee is of the opinion that in view of the large expenditures made for new distributing mains during the past year and needed for the completion of such work during the coming year, only such extensions of the ordinary distributing mains should be undertaken as are essential to the conservation of the public health and the development of populous districts.

Your committee desires to call attention to the great increase in the number of applications made to the poor department over that of previous years. During the year just past 2,902 applications for aid have been made; each application has been thoroughly investigated by the department, the number of investigations made during the year being 2902. It is important that these investigations be conducted in a thorough manner and with this end in view, two additional investigators were employed so that each application might be considered and discovery made as

to whether or not the applicant was worthy of relief. The number of families receiving aid during the year is unparalleled in the history of the department; 2,664 families having received assistance of whom 2,212 received out-door and 452 in-door relief. Your committee refers with great satisfaction to the novel idea conceived by the superintendent of the poor during the past winter of establishing what is called "The City Stone Yard," the benefits of which are mutual to the strong and able-bodied applicants for relief who are unable to obtain employment elsewhere as well as to the city; the former being given ample opportunity of earning a living for themselves and families while the latter is supplied with stone which is intended to be used in paving the streets within the city limits. Many men well able, but too lazy to work have refrained from applying to this department for aid since the establishment of the stone yard knowing that they would be compelled to labor for their support, and thus the taxpayers of the city have been relieved of the burden of supporting men who are unwilling to support themselves. The superintendent of the poor has cut off from the support of the department 250 men on account of their refusal to work, although well able to do so, 75 of whom having returned and expressed their desire to work, have been given employment. Many tradesmen unable to obtain work at their respective trades and without means of support have been given work by the establishment of this institution and with a good will have embraced this opportunity given them of providing for their families. It will be observed that a continuance of this stone yard will serve as a means of ascertaining the men who are willing to earn a living and are worthy of relief and those who are not.

The stone yard had been in operation since December 29, 1894. It was started at a time which is the busiest season of the department and notwithstanding the continued and severe winter, the experiment has proven a great success and we heartily recommend that it be continued, believing it to be a most valuable factor in the working of the department. The extraordinary long and cold winter with a well known want of employment has been a great drain upon the resources of this department during the past year. It will be remembered that in the winter of 1893-94, benevolent persons in the city established various funds for the relief of the poor which in a great degree assisted the department, for the reason that persons aided by these charities would not be compelled to seek relief from this department. In this connection the fund established by the Chamber of Commerce aggregating \$12,000, may be referred to. During the past year, however, the department has worked single handed in its relief of the poor.

Among the persons aided by the department are many who are unable through old age sickness or other cause to work for a living. This includes old men and women, and widows with children. A large number of sick poor, who are unable to work on account of physical disabilities have been aided by the department, and 335 patients were sent to the various hospitals in the city during the year, of which number 147 are in the hospitals at the present time. A large number of pauper and homeless children have been cared for, having been committed to various orphan asylums, and bound out to worthy families in the city, thus providing for them homes and proper care.

In conclusion, your committee refers with pleasure to the careful and economical administration of the affairs of this department and of the faithful and efficient manner in

which the Superintendent of the Poor and his assistants have discharged their respective duties.

Gentlemen:—Your Assessment Committee would respectfully beg leave to submit their annual report, as follows:

Your committee have met at the office of the City Attorney from time to time during the year, as occasion required, and passed upon the various matters submitted to it by the Common Council.

The following table will show the amount of business transacted by us during the year:

Your committee would say that in the number of petitions granted the greater portion of them related to property which the petitioners desired to redeem from tax sales upon the payment of all of the expenses of sale with 6 per cent. interest and in the cases in which such petitions were granted, your committee considered that under the circumstances existing in those cases it was proper and equitable that the relief be granted, inasmuch as the city could lose nothing by accepting the payment as recommended by the committee.

As compared with former years the petitions granted for rebate of assessments have been less, and we have endeavored while doing justice to aggrieved petitioners, to withhold relief in all cases, excepting where justice and equity demanded that relief be given.

There have been pending before your committee for some time petitions for relief from the assessments for Genesee Valley Sewer extension, the Genesee Valley Canal sewer and Maple and Colvin street sewer and East Main street bridge. We have devoted many hearings to the petitioners in these matters and at an early day in the ensuing year, we shall be enabled to present to the Council a report upon these rolls.

Another matter of some importance is the assessment for the Court street bridge, which is now pending before your committee.

The other petitions which are now undisposed of are of but minor importance and their presentation to the council only within a few days has precluded our being able to pass upon them before the close of the year.

The chairman of this committee desires to express his appreciation of the promptness with which the members of the committee have responded to the calls for meetings of the committee and the great assistance the members of the committee have rendered

him in passing upon the difficult and delicate matters entrusted to the charge of the Assessment Committee.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Your Finance Committee begs leave to submit the following as its annual report:

The past twelve months have seen the substantial completion of the new water line to Hemlock Lake, and your committee is in a position to congratulate the city upon the fact that this work has been done in accordance with the original designs and the expense has not exceeded the original estimate prepared by the chief engineer.

During the year the balance of the million and three-quarters of bonds authorized by the legislature has been issued, bearing interest at the rate of 3 1-2 per cent. per annum, and premiums upon these sales have made for the city a profit of \$335.50. This result has been secured notwithstanding the depression in financial matters throughout the country, and contrary to the opinion expressed by prominent financiers and bankers of Rochester generally. It may not be known, but still is a fact that less than eighteen months ago many gentlemen connected with Rochester banking institutions formally advised the committee to sell all its bonds at 4 per cent per annum, and even to pay a commission for the securing of customers therefor, at that rate if necessary. Your committee believed at that time, and the result has justified its position, that the credit of the city of Rochester was high enough to make

it unnecessary to sell bonds at a higher rate of interest than 3 1-2 per cent.

The amount of bonds necessary to complete the East Side sewer remaining unsold at the time of your committee's last annual report, has been sold during the past year at satisfactory rates of interest, and upon which the premiums have amounted to \$2,889.83. Bonds to the amount of \$250,000 have been sold during the past year for the purpose of providing moneys with which to reinforce the distribution service of the water works system, in accordance with the plans submitted by the chief engineer, and heretofore approved by your honorable body. The premiums upon these bonds amount to \$750. Without this reinforcement, the additional supply of water made available by the construction of the new water line would have been of but trifling advantage to the city, as the distribution pipes existing at the beginning of the year were insufficient for the purpose of distributing that additional supply.

At the beginning of the fiscal year, there was pending in the legislature a bill for the establishment of a sinking fund commission. That act shortly afterwards became a law, and the commission has been properly organized in compliance with its provisions. That commission will undoubtedly submit its first annual report at this annual meeting for reports, which will show the condition of the sinking fund at the end of its first year of existence.

During the past year your committee has found it expedient to follow the plan inaugurated during the preceding year, of borrowing money for temporary purposes, in anticipation of the collection of taxes, by the plan of soliciting sealed proposals. The adoption of this plan has resulted in the saving to the city of many thousands of dollars, inasmuch as loans have been made in some instances at rates of interest as low as 2 1-4 per cent. per annum, and in no instance higher than 4 per cent. Formerly the custom was to borrow money from the Rochester banks upon which we paid interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum.

At the time the Court and Andrews street bridges were under construction, money was needed with which to pay the contractors for their services and materials. It was at that time impossible to sell the city's bonds for that purpose, at any price, and it will be remembered that the city treasurer was authorized to withdraw from the savings banks the moneys which had accumulated from the Genesee Valley stock dividends, amounting to \$100,000, and use the money for that purpose. The treasurer was directed by resolution of your honorable body to issue the city's bonds at 3 1-2 per cent., payable to the city of Rochester, for the above amount. These bonds have never been issued, and your committee is of the opinion that such issue would be unnecessary, as it would require the raising of an annual interest account, payable to itself, which is wholly unnecessary.

Your committee would recommend, therefore that the treasurer be directed to debit the Genesee Valley sinking fund account with the item of \$100,000 heretofore transferred and credited to the construction of the Court and Andrews street bridge account, and that the authority heretofore given to the city treasurer to issue \$100,000 worth of Rochester bridge bonds be revoked.

In conclusion your committee congratulates the city upon its excellent financial condition. The rate of taxation has not been excessive during the past year, notwithstanding the large issue of bonds which has been necessary for the past few years and notwithstanding the many improvements which have been undertaken and completed. Your com-

mittee desires to testify its appreciation of the valuable services of Mr. Samuel B. Williams, the city treasurer, and his clerical force in the office. We have found both Mr. Williams and his assistants unremitting in their vigilance and carefulness and unflinching at all times in their courtesy both to the members of the committee, and to the general public.

PARK SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT.

Rochester, N. Y., March 1, 1895.

To the Board of Park Commissioners:

Gentlemen:—I herewith present the annual report of the work done on the parks for the year ending February 23, 1895.

In my last annual report I said that \$2,300 of the \$10,000 special appropriation voted to the Park Commission on January 23, 1894, had been paid to laborers, masons, carpenters, painters and teamsters at the three parks, erecting sheep sheds, and the three other buildings at the parks. Up to June 9th, when all work on the buildings ended, \$8,204.23 had been paid for labor. Most of

the money was paid the skilled laborers, the unskilled laborers being few compared to the skilled laborers. Besides the sheep sheds, a two-story octagonal building, known as the Athletic building, was nearly completed, except the plumbing. It is situated at the west end of Elmwood avenue bridge, south of the avenue. At Highland park, near the children's pavilion, a two-story building with shed and barn attached known as the administration building, was completed, except the plumbing, and the two-story building at Seneca Park, known as the Shelter, was completed. The white house at Genesee Valley Park was moved to a site just West of the sheep sheds on the Westfall Road, and a small house and a barn on the Warrant property were moved to the east side of the park, south of the foreman's house. In addition to the \$8,204.23 expended for labor in erecting the buildings, \$700 was paid to building movers. The upper floor of the Athletic building at Genesee Valley Park was used as a shelter and refectory, and the lower story for bathing and dressing rooms for men who exercised on the athletic grounds. The right to sell refreshments in the building was let to William H. Jesserer, in consideration of his furnishing a janitor and a watchman to sleep in the building at night. At Highland Park the upper part of the administration building was let to Bernard Meyer, in consideration of his keeping the place clean, furnishing ice water free to park visitors, and paying \$1 per month rent. The Shelter was let to The Rochester Bottling Co., in consideration of their keeping the place clean, furnishing ice water free to park visitors, keeping a watchman in the building at night, and paying \$200 rent for the season. When the season closed, all the buildings were used for storing the park seats, tables and benches, as no other building is owned by the Park Commissioners large enough to hold them.

The park road, extending from the South end of Plymouth avenue to Elmwood avenue, was covered with brick and stone taken from the old court house. An arrangement was made with the contractors of the court house whereby the contractors paid to the Park Commissioners a price per load for drawing away the old material. As the old material made a good foundation for light driving, and was furnished at a less price than any other material could have been furnished, the arrangement was advantageous to the Park Commissioners as well as to the contractors. After the foundation of brick and stone was made, gravel drawn on the W. N. Y. & P. R. R. was used to cover the foundation, making a good road for light driving. Belts of trees were planted along the railroad on the west side of the river, in addition to those planted the year before, and at Seneca Park belts of trees were planted on the East side to conceal the R. W. & O. R. R., which skirts the park the whole length of it.

The line of the R. W. & O. R. R. at Seneca Park was changed from the old line along the top of the river bank and thrown to the east about 250 feet, thus doing away with the two grade crossings of the railway. The line of North St. Paul street from the Ridge Road northerly several hundred feet was thrown to the east to admit of a park drive and walk along the top of the high bank of the river, and the new line of St. Paul street was improved at the expense of the estate of Hiram Sibley. The Irondequoit Boulevard Co. and the Park Commissioners, the Park Commissioners paying one-third, \$350, of the cost of the improvement.

At Highland park, Goodman street was extended to Highland avenue at no expense to the Park Commissioners. The water mains

of the new conduit were laid through the southeasterly corner of the park to the reservoir, and two pipes were laid across the park, one westerly from the new water gate and the other northerly to Meigs street. The road in Highland park from Mt. Hope avenue to the reservoir was covered with stone and gravel and rolled, but it was afterward nearly ruined by the excavations and teaming for water pipes. All the work for the water works was done with as little damage as possible, but it caused a great deal of extra work to the Park Commissioners, and gave a very shabby appearance to the park during the summer.

A large number of permits were issued to persons who wished to use the ball, picnic and athletic grounds. Besides the permits issued, cards were issued to persons who wished the exclusive privilege of practicing fast riding on bicycles.

Eight policemen were engaged on the parks part of the summer, two of them mounted on horses.

The city parks and the Seneca Parkway were cared for during the summer by a small number of men under a foreman. When not engaged in caring for the city parks the force worked on the other parks, the time being charged to the park on which they worked.

Although the legislature passed a law giving power to the Park Commission to care for the street trees, when a number of the residents of a street wished some trees cut down and petitioned to the Park Board to order the work done, other residents of the same street applied to one of the justices of the supreme court for, and were granted, an injunction restraining the Park Commission from cutting the trees. Justice Yeomans was applied to, to vacate the injunction and refused to do so, giving his opinion that it was unlawful to cut trees in front of a man's property without his consent, when his title was clear to the center of the street. Whenever a request was made by the owners to have their trees trimmed it was done by the city park's force of men.

During the year the following named persons gave presents to the park: Mrs. Gilmar Perkins, two ornamental trees; The Chase Brothers Co., 1,500 rose plants; Supervisors of the county, twenty-one park seats; William C. Metcalf, one pair of peacocks; Genesee Valley Fish and Bird Protective and Propagating Association, several dozen Virginia quail; New York State Fish Commission, several cans of perch and bass for the upper Genesee River, and California rainbow trout for the lake at Seneca Park; the Rochester Herald, eight band concerts by the 54th Regiment Band on Sundays at Genesee Valley park; Eli Weed, bed of flowers at Seneca Park; Rev. Fridolin Pascalar, pastor of St. Michael's Church, a pair of Virginia white-tailed deer, and the high fence with which to enclose them.

The doe of the deer was found one morning with her leg broken above the gambrel joint, and on the advice of a veterinary surgeon, was killed.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CITY SURVEYOR.

CITY SURVEYOR'S OFFICE,
ROCHESTER, N. Y., Mar. 28, 1895.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen: I have the honor of presenting the following report for the year ending April 1st, 1895, and take pleasure in acknowl-

edging the uniform courtesy and assistance of the various members of the Council, of the Executive Board and its employes, and also the earnest and friendly help of my assistants and office force.

The total cost of the office has been \$22,600.30, of which \$20,872.32 was for salaries and \$1,727.98 for expenses.

Three hundred and twenty-four contracts have been prepared and fulfilled including 57 for sweeping and cleaning and 197 for sprinkling; the whole costing \$482,611.51. Seventy public improvements were planned and executed, including some of the most important works ever done by the city, as the block pavement on Main and State streets, finishing Court street bridge, State Hospital sewer and Thomas street outlet sewer.

Of the expenditure for improvements, \$207,528.09 was for pavements, \$184,296.10 for sewers, \$15,029.90 for sidewalks, \$21,643.66 for bridges and \$5,075.67 for miscellaneous.

While giving constant attention to these works the engineering labor was not confined to them, as we have made studies, plans and preliminary estimates for 102 pieces of work aggregating \$750,000.

In order to secure good work 601 tests were made of cement and mortar being used, and every piece of work was carefully staked out and restaked and watched with surveying instruments.

To meet the requirements of construction study of proposed work, City Assessors, opening streets, showing encroachments, fixing property lines, Executive Board, Assessment Committee and City Attorney and records, it has been necessary to prepare 150 original maps, 632 tracings, 300 blue prints, and in photography, 196 negatives, 330 prints and 156 lantern slides.

Fourteen maps and 142 blue prints were made for the Executive Board, 94 maps for City Assessors, 16 maps and 60 blue prints and many photographs for City Attorney.

We have reported to the Assessment Committee upon 33 petitions for relief from erroneous assessments.

Copies have been made in the County Clerk's office of deeds covering 8,000 lots, and tracings made of 400 subdivision maps, all of which have been put into books and files for reference and preservation.

The survey of the territory comprised within the old Fifteenth and Sixteenth wards has been well advanced and now covers the section south of East avenue and east of the river, with the adjacent lots in Brighton, which will be finished and mapped early this season. The area surveyed is 2,150 acres and would have cost, under the contract proposed, over \$12,000. The action of your honorable body in confiding this survey to us has resulted already in saving to the taxpayers about \$10,000, or nearly one-half of the total expense of this office.

Once each day, and at extreme high water oftener, the height of water in the river has been measured and the volume of flow computed. It is interesting to note that the volume of water which flowed by Rochester in the Genesee river during the year was 83,844,000,000 cubic feet, which was 8,159,000,000 less than for the previous year, or enough to fill once the largest reservoir proposed for the gorge above Mt. Morris.

I submit herewith thirteen tables showing in detail the characteristics of the work of the year.

In conclusion, I deem it my duty to make the following recommendations:

First. The title of the City Surveyor should be changed to City Engineer, for the purpose of increasing the value of his opinion upon engineering features of local improvements, and to give him proper standing with his professional brethren abroad.

Second. The employment of men in the Surveyor's office should be placed in the hands of the Surveyor, instead of a committee, in order that the discipline necessary to the efficiency of so large a force may be better maintained.

Third. More room should be provided, so that the records may be used readily without being destroyed in handling them.

Fourth. A fire-proof vault should be provided for preserving the original note books and sheets of city survey, as the loss by fire of these might be greater than the value of the city building.

Fifth. Some efficient method of protecting the more expensive pavements from disturbance should be adopted. Several absolutely needless excavations have been made during the year, which tend to utterly discourage one from urging the making of first-class improvements.

Sixth. Record maps should be provided for, showing the location of gas pipes and electric conduits, and the companies should be obliged to file a map of every underground construction, so that necessary excavations for leaks and changes may be confined to the smallest possible area. This is the more necessary because they do not keep proper records.

Gentlemen:—A reference to the annual report of the Poor Department for the past year will at once demonstrate a wonderful increase in the work done by this department during the year over that of previous years. This growth has manifested itself more in the number of sick poor than in any other branch of the work of the department. The calls upon the City Physicians for assistance have steadily increased while the number of physicians has remained the same as it has been for a number of years past. The result is that the city physicians are compelled to give up the greater part of their time in the discharge of their duties connected with this department, for the small salary of \$500 per year. To illustrate this, I respectfully call your attention to the fact that one city physician during the past year made 1496 visits upon patients supported by the poor department.

When it is considered that in addition to the time so taken up in attendance upon patients, the city physicians also furnish all necessary medicines, etc., I think that I am justly warranted in recommending the appointment of an additional city physician. I would therefore respectfully ask that an additional city physician be appointed by your honorable body.

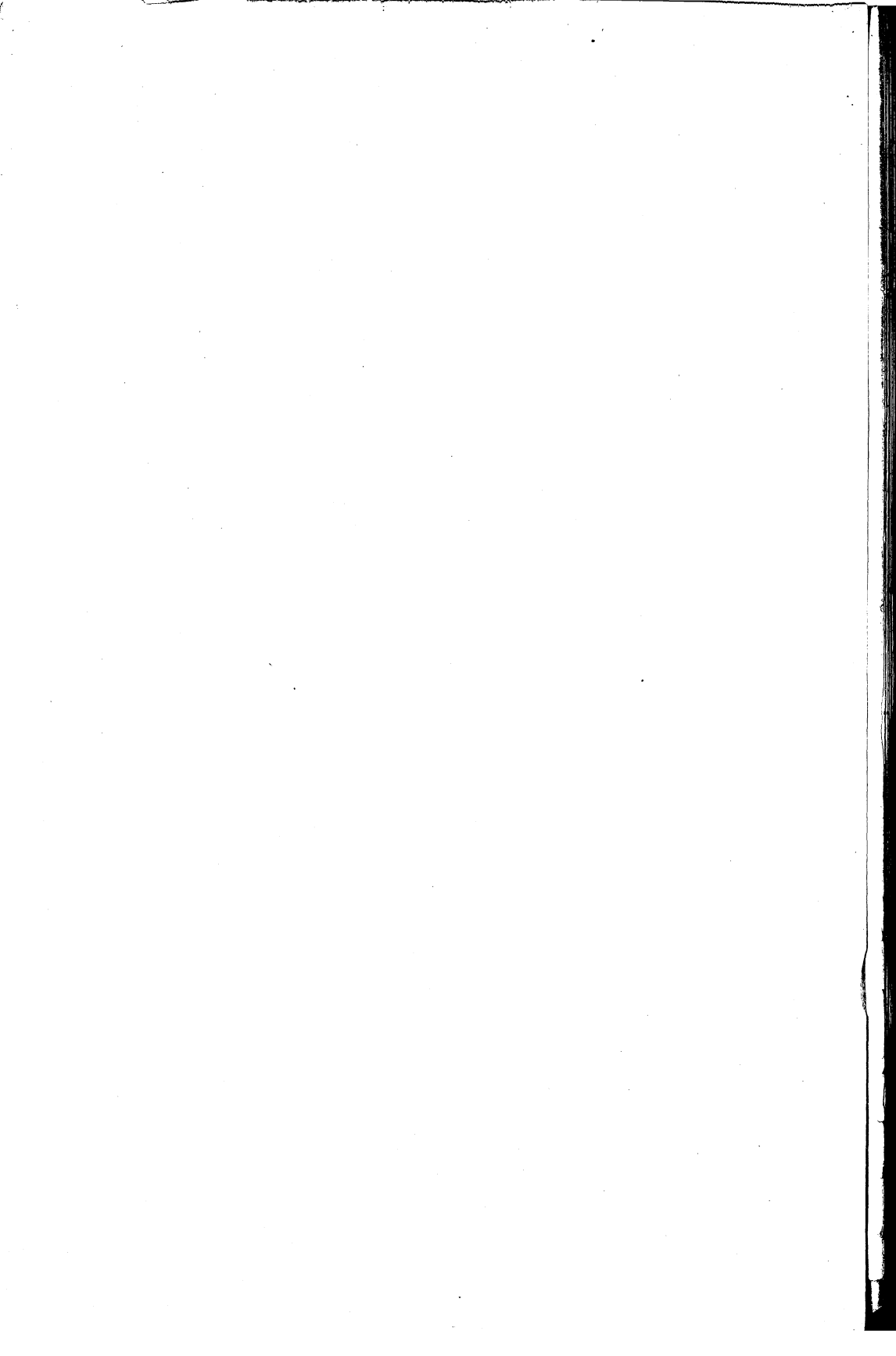

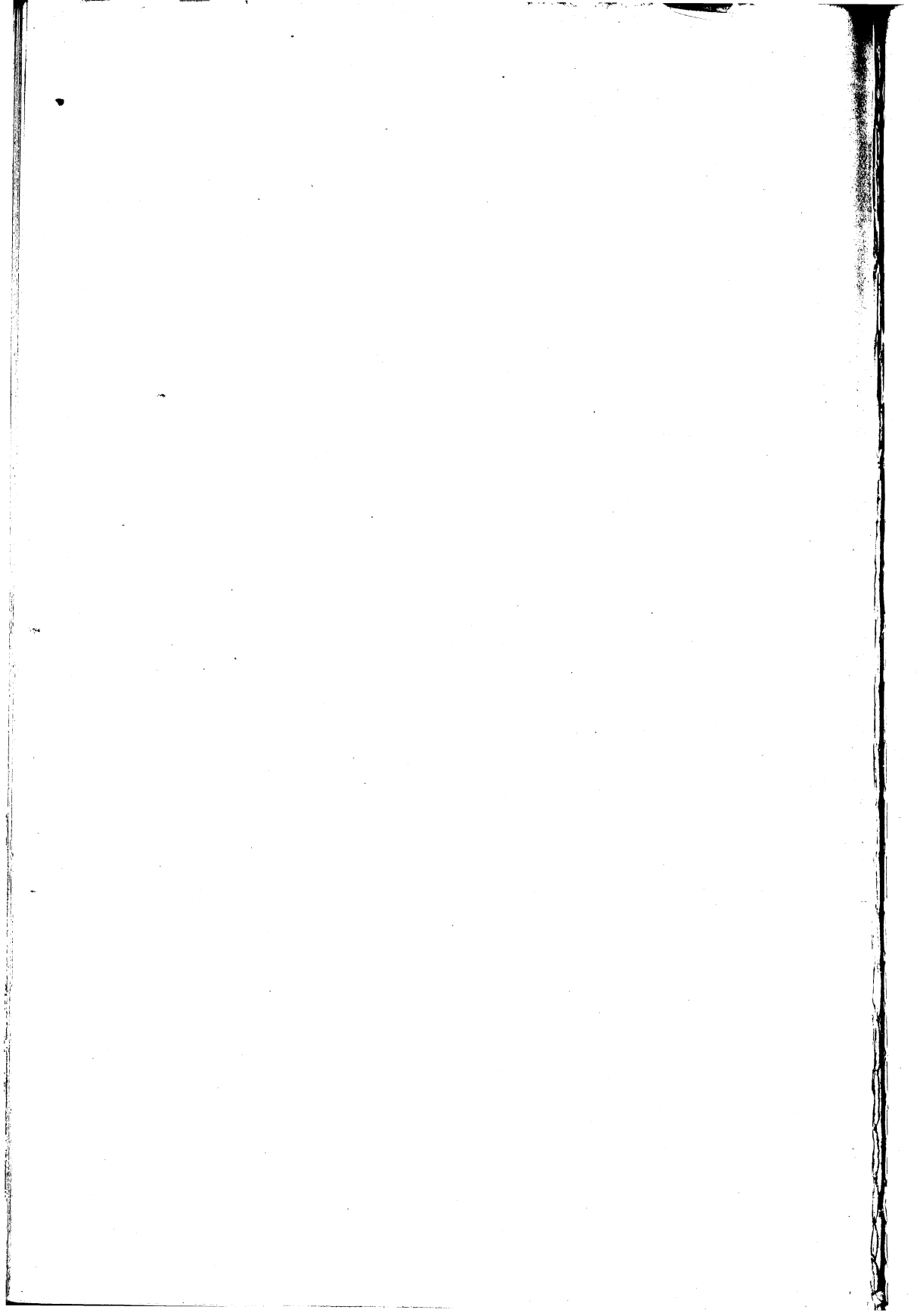
